

which he is organizing.

To him belongs credit for unbounded faith in musical Glendale. He is behind the enterprise with both his time and skill and has no doubt whatever of its immediate success. Both Mr. and Mrs. Marquardt ar well known in musical circles of southern California, having lived in the vicinity of Los Angeles for the past eight years. A few days ago they moved to their present address in the lap of the foothills where they may derive inspiration from the changing shadows of the Verdugo Hills. About a month ago they returned to Glendale after a year and half's absence in Sierra Madre. This is the third time they have responded to the lure of Glendale.

At Head of Orchestras Mrs. Marquardt is a concert harpist and her husband is a well known violinist. At one time he was sec-ond concert master for the Thomas orchestra of Chicago.

Mr. Marquardt has participated in several local programs recently and will play at Sunday's twilight recital at the Glendale the atre in behalf of the organ fund for the Holy Family church.

The purpose of the municipal or-chestra, according to Mr. Marquardt, is "for the advancement of music in general in Glendale." He says that an orchestra "is something which the mmunity should have.

Practically all of Mr. Marquardt's ife has been spent in musical acivities. He has acquired a reputaion as a teacher of the violin, but says that there is no connection beween this fact and the orchestra for he reason that he is now retired.

Rehearsals Being Heard Recruiting is now going forward for the proposed orchestra which held its second rehearsal Tuesday night at the high school and expects to hold one there, every Tuesday night in the future until further noice. Eighteen skilled musicians ave registered so far and Mr. Marquardt expects to increase this numper to forty without difficulty.

"Some musicians are timid about coming out at first," he remarked. They wait until they see things go-Then the players of certain instruments always seem to wait until he last minute before coming for-

Most of those who have reported so far are violin players. Mr. Marquardt stated that it was necessary o teach them to play in unison before they could be combined with other members of the orchestra. However, he declared that this training would be accomplished simulously with the coaching of the players of other instruments.

What Is Required According to Mr. Marquardt's plans, the full orchestra would consist of twelve first violins, six second violins, four violas, two cellos, two bass viols, two flutes, two clarnets, two bassoons, two French horns, two cornets, from one to three trombones, one oboe and the necessary drums.

"In time we will get all those instruments," asserted Mr. Marquardt. I am not at all pessimistic.

Mr. Marquardt stated that the orchestra's immediate need was for viola, clarinet and flute players. He knows of two French horn players residing in Glendale but believes it will be necessary to hire an oboe player and two bassoon players in Los Angeles for each concert.



SHIPPING BOARD IS DRUMMING TRADE BY ADVERTISING

Policy Is Under Discussion in Congress; Farm Loan Is Record, Says Secretary

By U. S. Press Association. WASHINGTON, D. C., Feb. 17 .-The Shipping Board is advertising heavily, and in this respect is a keen competitor in "drumming up trade" for its ships. It is calculated that a million dollars will be spent in Shipping Board advertising this year. Recently an attempt by Representative Byrnes of South Carolina, to limit to \$500,000 the amount the Shipping Board could spend during the coming

fiscal year on advertising, was de-feated by a four-vote margin.

During discussion of the Shipping Board's advertising policy, certain congressmen proposed that it be forbidden to award advertising contracts on which the companies were to receive more than 5 per cent commission, but an amendment to this effect was lost. Declaring that ocean travelers were refusing to make bookings on American vessels on which no liquor was sold, Representative Gallivan of Massachusetts, said the Shipping Board, in advertising worked under tremendous handicaps. The board, he asserted, has been "hamstrung by Dr. Volstead," and is suffering loss of business as

Farm Loan Bonds The twelve federal land banks of the country have just offered \$75,-000,000 of 5 per cent federal farm loan bonds at the price of 102 3-8 and accrued interest, at which price they will yield approximately 4.70 per cent to callable date and 5 per cent thereafter.

Secretary of the Treasury Mellon said: "This is the largest offering of farm loan bonds ever made, but in view of the generally favorable trend of the investment market and the continued strong showing of the federal loan banks, it is believed that will be readily absorbed, and as the funds will go direct to the farmers of the country it should do much to improve the agricultural situa-

Stocks of Coal A number of branches of the govnment have prepared a joint recial stock of bituminous coal on January 1, 1922, to have been approximately 47,000,000 tons. This was 25 per cent less than the amount in storage at the end of the year. The present stock is sufficient to last about forty-one days, if perfectly distributed. Retail yards have bitu-minous coal enough to last 33 days and anthracite sufficient for forty-

Supplementing its statistics of man-days lost on account of strikes, the United States Geological Survey presented data as to the man-days lost through other causes. twenty-year period, 1900-1919 the operators reported a total loss of man-days through strikes, but the loss attributable to other causes was 1,053,576,000 mandays, or eight and a half times as great as the strike loss. To put it another way, in two decades American coal miners lost one and a sixth billion working days, of which 10.5 per cent was ascribable to strikes and 89.5 per cent to other causes, chief of which are no market, car shortage, and mine disability.

These statistics of strikes are based upon annual reports furnished by the operators which give "Number of men on strike," and "Average number of days on strike." The mandays lost on account of other causes are calculated from the operator's reports of number of days of mine operation, the full working year be-

ing taken as 308 days.

The statistics of strikes include time lost through "suspension" dur-ing the period of the biennial wage negotiations, between the termination of one agreement and the signing of another. That the greater part of the strike loss is associated with such "suspensions" is seen from the fact that with few exceptions the years of large strike losses are the "even" years when the wage negotiations occur; particularly 1902, 1906, 1910, 1912, and 1914. In the "odd" years strike losses have been by comparison small, except in 1919, in which year a general strike of union bituminous miners was called. Statistics of strikes in 1920 and 1921 are not yet available, but enough information is at hand to show that in comparison with earlier years the figures for 1920 will not be large, while that for 1921 will be unusually small.

Two of the most efficient weapons against the German submarines were developed by Americans during the war, and these weapons are still regarded as of maximum effect. They are the depth bomb and the mine. American naval officers used both in the war with considerable effect, and one of the outstanding feats of that conflict was the North Sea barrage of mines, in which work the Ameri-

cans had a major share.
Accordingly all destroyers not already equipped are now being sup-plied with an allowance of depth charges. No new manufacture of this device has been undertaken since the war, but ordnance experts are working on improved types and are making satisfactory progress in this development.

The armistice found the Navy with considerable material for mine operations on hand. These mines were manufactured primarily for use against German submarines. Since the war experts have overhauled all this material, effecting improvements and otherwise putting in condition the mines and mining equipment for future use if necessary.

New suggestions are constantly pouring in regarding all sorts of war devices, and in these have been ideas on mines which have all found their use in the navy scheme.





I am paying \$15.00 for this space because I have something to SAY to you in which I believe we are mutually interested---and I want you to see it and read it. I want to tell you some things about Meat.

A great many people think that meat is meat and all should sell alike. One butcher's meat is no better than another's. But to the man or woman who has studied the matter there is a wide difference.

I wish I could take you with me through the different packing houses when I go down to select and mark the meat for the Glendale Market. It would settle the matter of quality for all time with you. You would see hanging there in those great coolers line after line of dressed carcasses ready to be selected and taken to the different markets to be sold for human consumption. At first glance each carcass looks alike, but, as you walk down between those lines and inspect each one separately, you will notice a wide difference. A great many of them are poor and very dark in color, showing that for some reason or other, lack of good feed and care or physical condition, the animal has failed to take on fat.

Then a great many of them you will notice are fat enough but the fat is yellow and the meat dark, denoting age, and you will be told if you do not know, these are cows that, because of age or some other cause, have ceased to be profitable for giving milk or raising calves, and have been sold to the butcher. Then another class that you will notice on close inspection, is the bruised carcass. Owing to all stock being shipped into this market this class is very large. Cattle that would otherwise pass inspection and be suitable for sale in the "Giendale Market" are disqualified.

Some of them have great pieces torn from their sides, others bruised on hips and shoulders, and the whole side is inflamed and discolored. All these different classes of meat are passed by us as being unfit for our customers to eat, and our stamp is placed only on A No. 1 steers. These other classes we can buy for as much as 8c per pound less than the ones we mark, but we have the reputation at all packing houses of being a regular crank for buying nothing but the best. times out of 100 carcasses we inspect there will be only 2 or 3 that we feel are good enough for our trade.

Our friends who know us and have dealt with us for years, know these things are true, but you who are newcomers to Glendale and do not know us, satisfy yourselves by calling any of the big packers of Los Angeles and they will tell you that what I am saying is true.

Notwithstanding the fact that I pay the highest paice for my meats and sell nothing but the very best quality of everything, because of organization and economy in overhead expense, I am enabled to sell this high grade meat at almost the same price the others charge for inferior grades as you will notice by the prices we submit here for Saturday:
