## A Reply to Dr. Harrower's Open Letter In Yesterday's **Evening News**

The development of any city is judged by the amount of its civic improvements. We all boast of the million dollars in building permits issued in the city of Glendale during the past month. Permit me to ask, had every citizen in Glendale followed Dr. Harrower's example in trying to obstruct street improvements where there is no cross street within 1000 feet of him, how many would have taken out permits to build homes in an almost streetless town? There is a stretch along Broadway where Dr. Harrower lives, of something like 1800 feet with no cross-streets. Within this territory between Broadway and Colorado streets there are approximately 40 acres of land with no houses. How can this section of the city be developed without streets?

Dr. Harrower would have you believe that I would be the sole beneficiary by the opening of School street, and that the Union High School would have to pay all of the bills. When this school is open to students, and especially on field days, there will be hundreds of cars to be parked somewhere, and no one will need School street so badly as the Union High School, for it will be practically impossible to leave cars on Broadway or Colorado. In addition to dedicating to the city my portion of School street, am also donating 50x580 feet on Orange Grove, 50x180 feet on Harvard, and 25x400 feet on Harvard. Figuring this land and street improvements on the same basis that Dr. Harrower figured the half of School street, these donations to the city will amount to about \$20,000, so that in the development of this section the Union High School will not have to stand all of the cost.

In my judgment the City Council, the Union High School Board, and the committee that was selected to secure options for school grounds are all well qualified and will look after the best interests of the city and schools without any suggestions from Dr. Harrower or myself.

When the committee came to me for an option, I had my tract platted and streets provided for, had presented my plans to the City Council and it had granted to me the extension of Harvard and Orange Grove streets, these being all of the streets I then needed, but, by letting, the Union High School have a strip across the west end of my tract, it cut off these two streets, and it would become necessary to rearrange my plat. When it was suggested that a street running north and south from Colorado to Broadway would give an outlet both for the school and myself, the committee thought it the best thing to do, and, with that understanding, I granted to them an option.

The Union High School Board has accepted the deal, the City Council has granted the streets, and I don't think

I would suggest to Dr. Harrower that if he wishes to live an isolated life, free from the annoyance of neighbors, that he had better move to the Isle of Yap or buy all of the land that adjoins him, for, within the short time of his natural existence he will see a building of some kind on every available lot in Glendale.

Realizing that this class of reading matter is of no interest to the average reader, and there being no money, pleasure nor Christian spirit in it for the writers, this letter closes the controversy so far as I am concerned.
