RAILROADS HITS HARD BLOWS

Split of Central and Southern Pacific Is Hard on Shipping

SAN FRANCISCO, June 23.-If the order of the United States Supreme Court recently entered ordering dissolution of the Central Pacific and Southern Pacific railroads is carried out, it will mean the greatest unscrambling process ever carried out in railroad history.

In the more than half century that the common control of the two roads has existed they have become so inextricably twined that their physical dissolution will strike a heavy blow to shippers in the Far West. When the Southern Pacific se

cured control of the Central Pacific the two lines were pionee ing practically in a territory which has grown in that period to one of the largest shipping districts in the United States. lines linked together under common management form a network from Oregon to Mexico.

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
