# Vote for the Bonds for Paving Streets Adjacent to Schools in Glendale

Provide Proper Approaches to the Schools for Your Children Vote "YES" on the Proposition Quoted Below

> "Shall the City of Glendale incur a bonded debt of \$35,000.00 for the improvement of streets (including the installation therein of water pipes and appurtenances for fire protection and the municipal water supply), adjacent to public school property and other public property in the City of Glendale?"

As one of the results of the very rapid growth of our city the approaches to nearly all of our schools are in very bad condition, and a great deal of street improvement work is necessary.

The Board of Education is unable to meet the situation because of the large amount involved in improving the streets adjacent to twelve school buildings. If this matter had to be taken care of out of the current funds of the district, and it cannot be otherwise taken care of except by the proposed bond issue, it would seriously cripple the work of the schools for the coming year.

It is very important both from the standpoint of the comfort and convenience of the children in the schools and from the standpoint of advertising Glendale as a progressive city in public matters, that the streets adjacent to the schools and other public buildings should be in excellent condition at all times.

The effect of not having the funds to meet this emergency may be seen by a visit to the Doran Street school on the corner of Doran and Everett streets, where it was found necessary on three sides of the school grounds to make half a street, leaving a dirt road on the school side.
