Following Congressman Lineberger's refusal to debate the issues of the campaign with Charles H. Randall, both being candidates for Congress in the Ninth District, Mr. Randall has issued a second invitation to Lineberger to appear publicly throughout the district. In his new defi Randall says:

"You decline my respectful suggestion that we appear before the voters of the Ninth District in joint discussion on the ground that your official duties require your attention, and, furthermore, you think no criticism of your official record is possible anyway.
