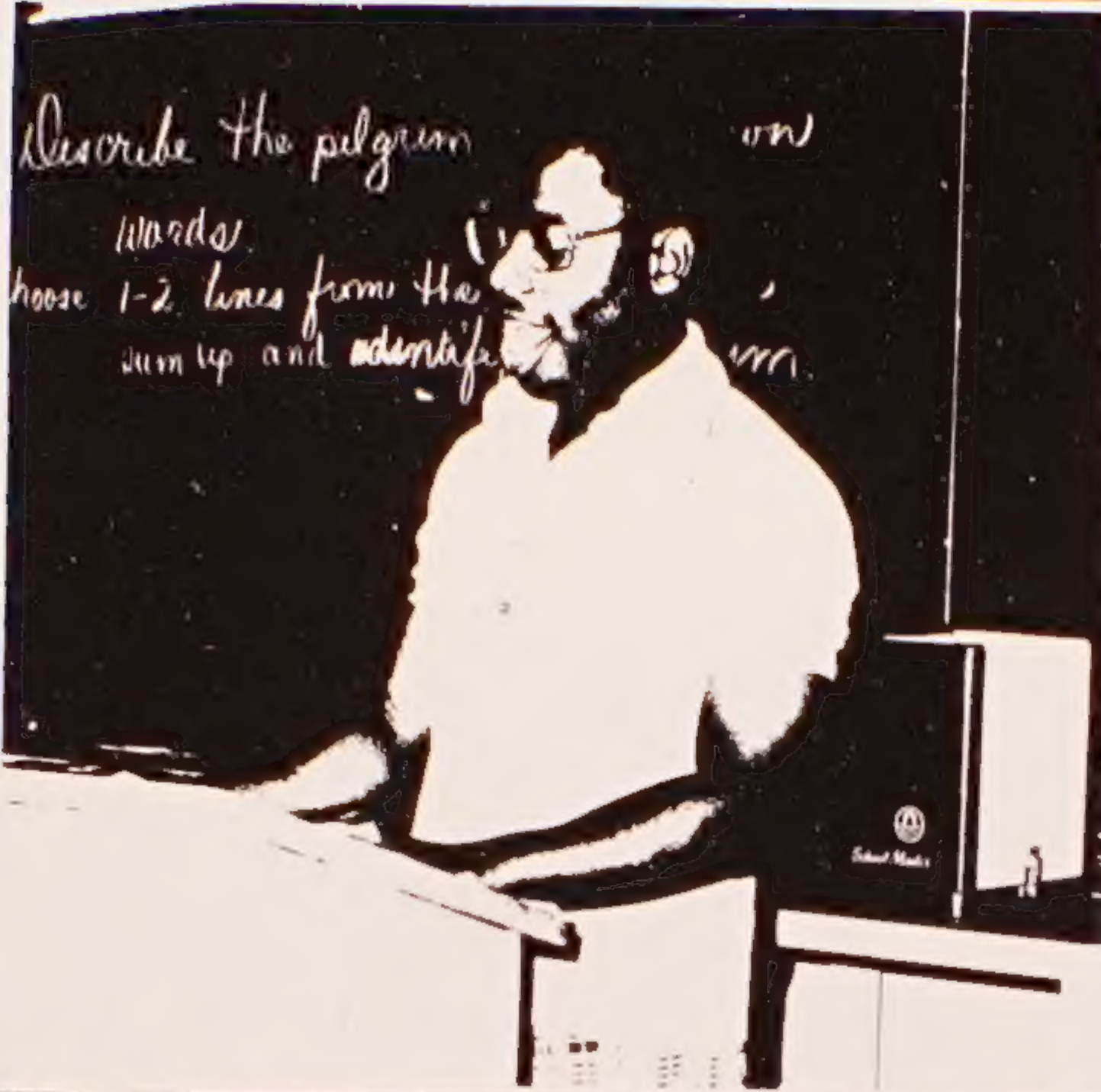

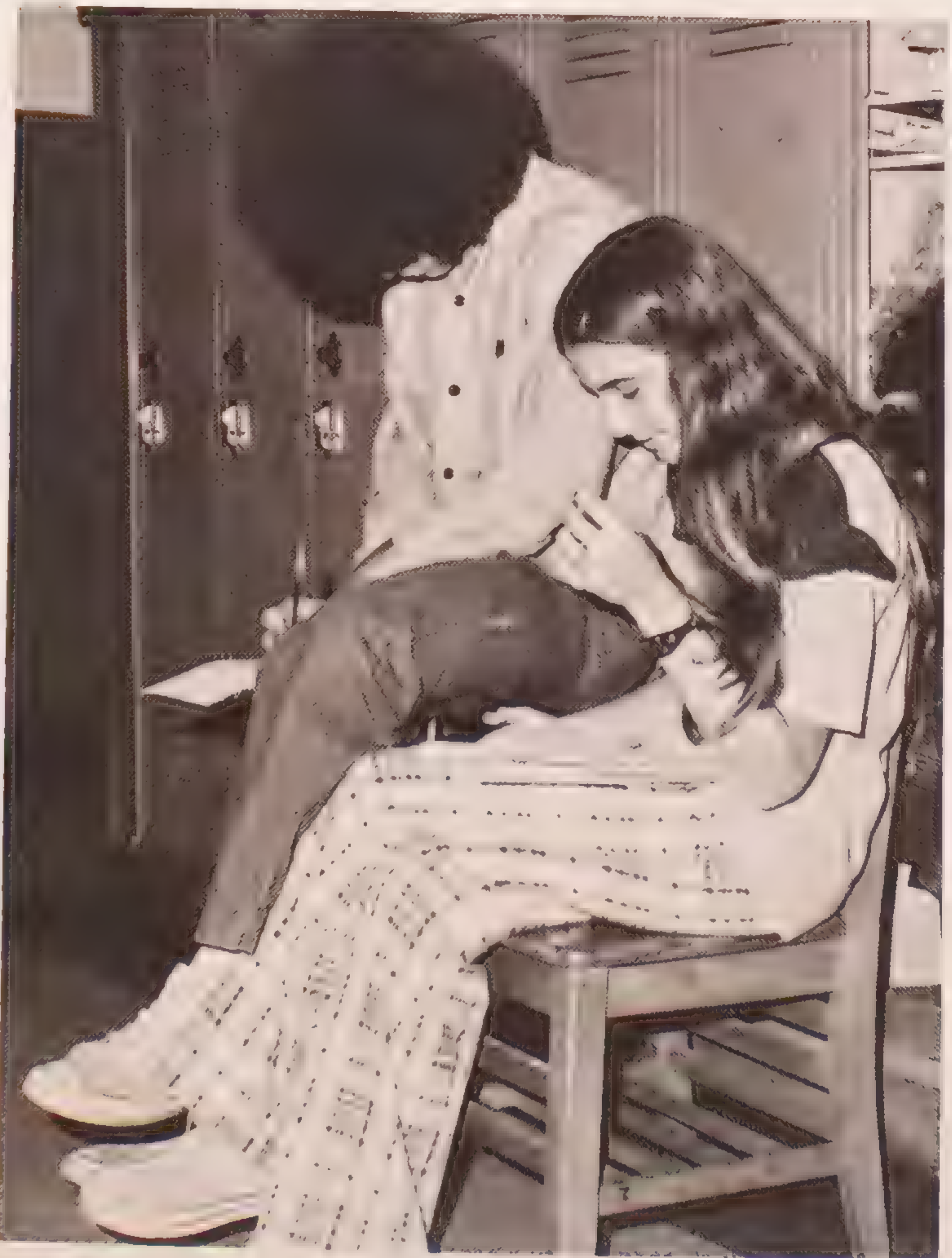
We think school is a hassle now with all the worry about grades and passing, but compared to what waits for us after we graduate — school is just our beginning.

Victory is sweet, but the act of meeting the challenge is a courageous victory in itself.







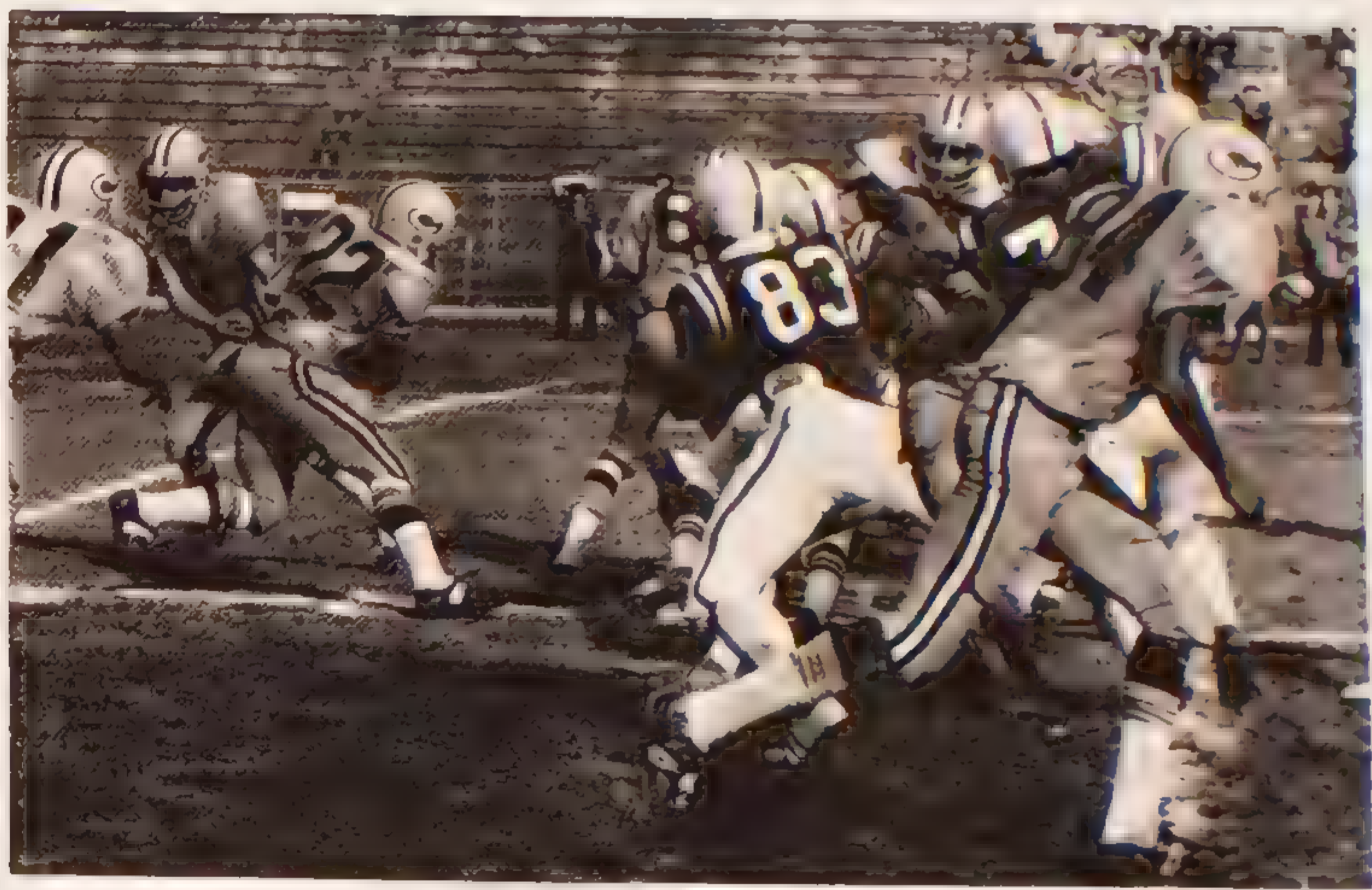


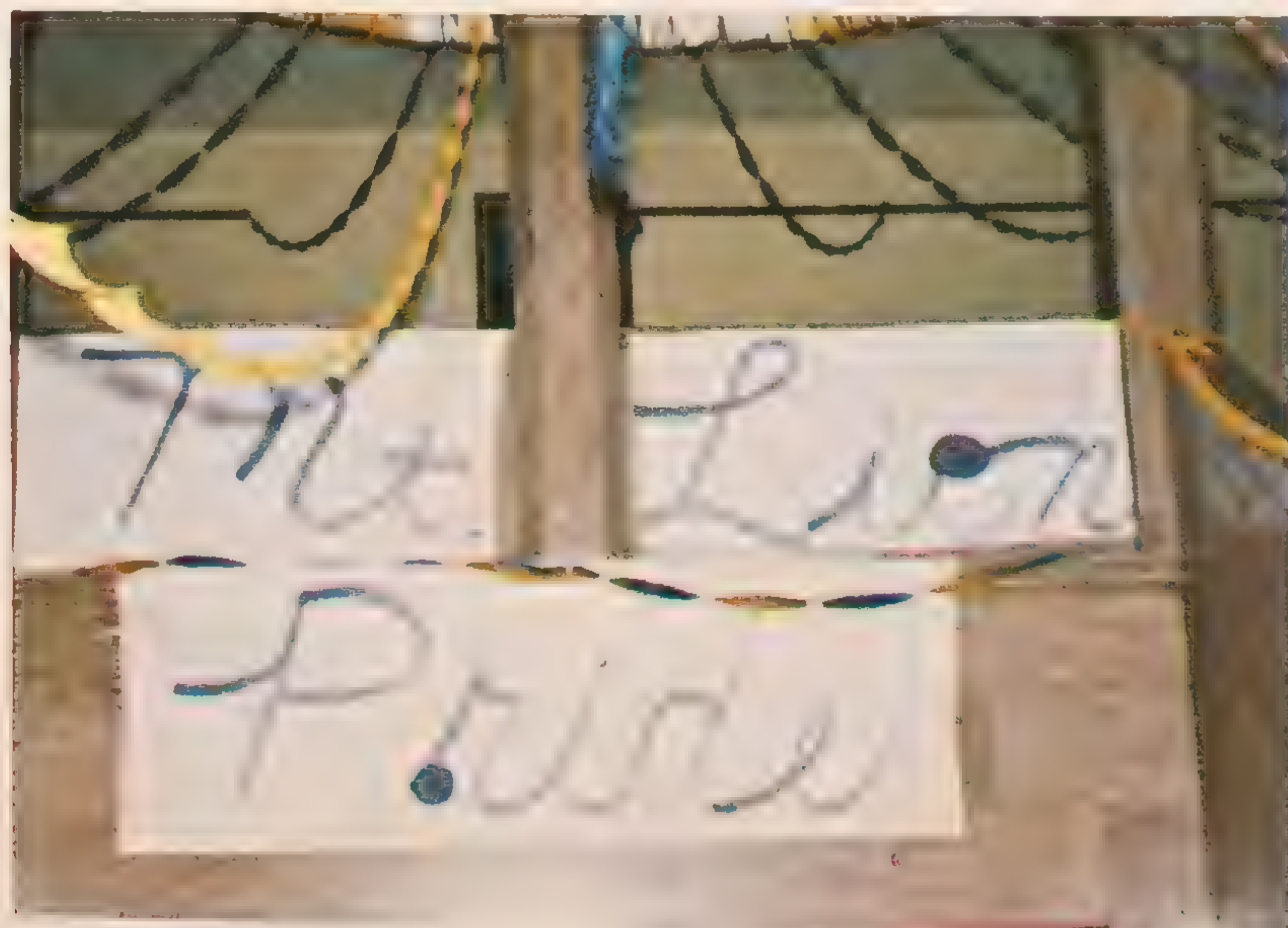

The students are required to have French, Flemish, German, and English from grades 7 to 12. They also are required to take Biology, Chemistry and Physics in the same manner. All written work, except exams, is done as homework because the teachers lecture all period. It is unbelievably different from CHS."

CARVER BRINGS EXTRA

Carver Technical Center, located in Rand, W. Va., is a very important part of Kanawha County Schools. Serving East Bank, Herbert Hoover, Dupont, Montgomery, and Charleston High students, Carver offers an extensive curriculum of courses. These range from coal mining and cosmetology to auto mechanics. The instruction and knowledge gained from these classes prepare students for careers following graduation. 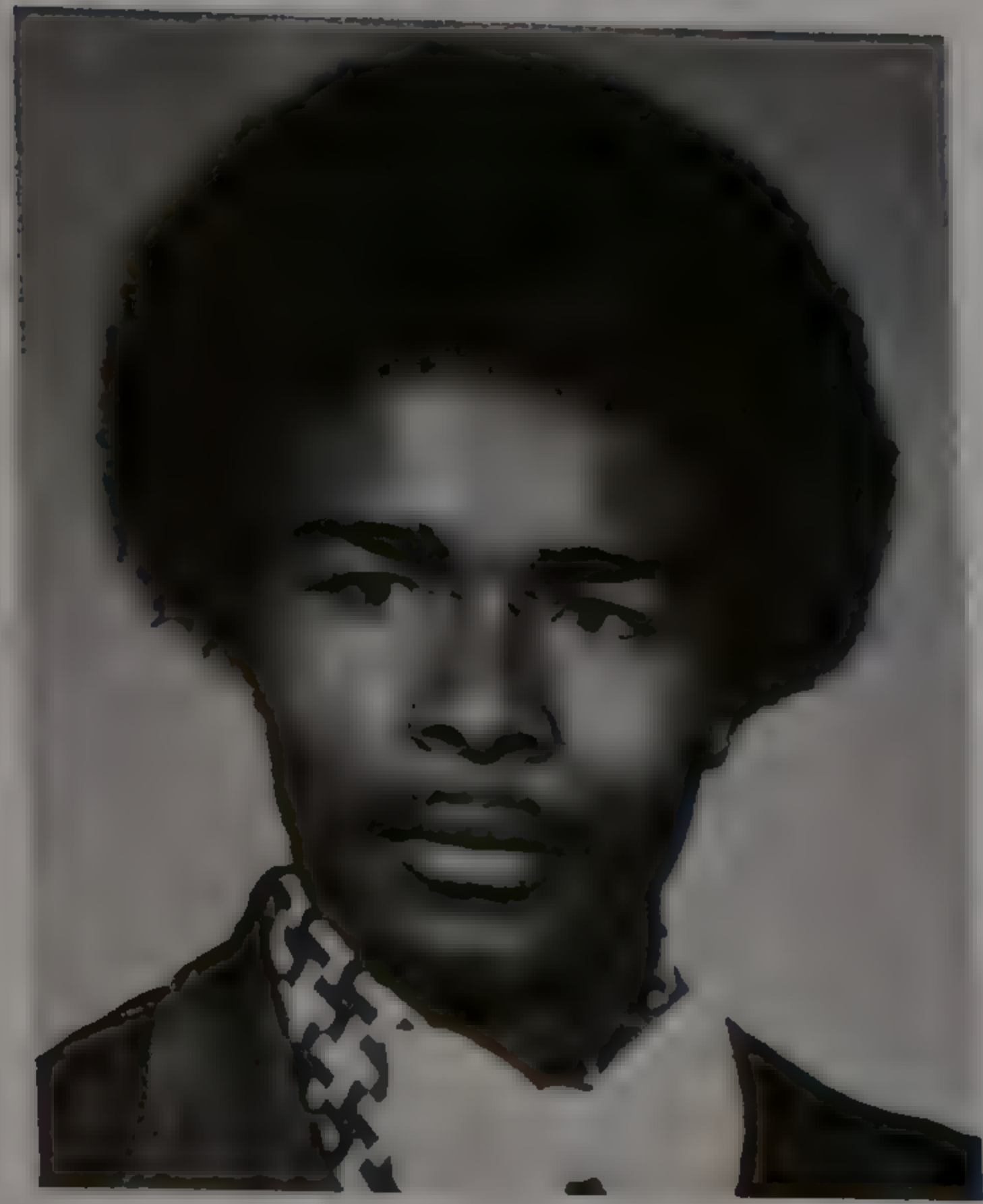

Although our season was not a winning one, we are still very proud of our coaches and players. The coaches spent much of their time working and trying to improve our team.

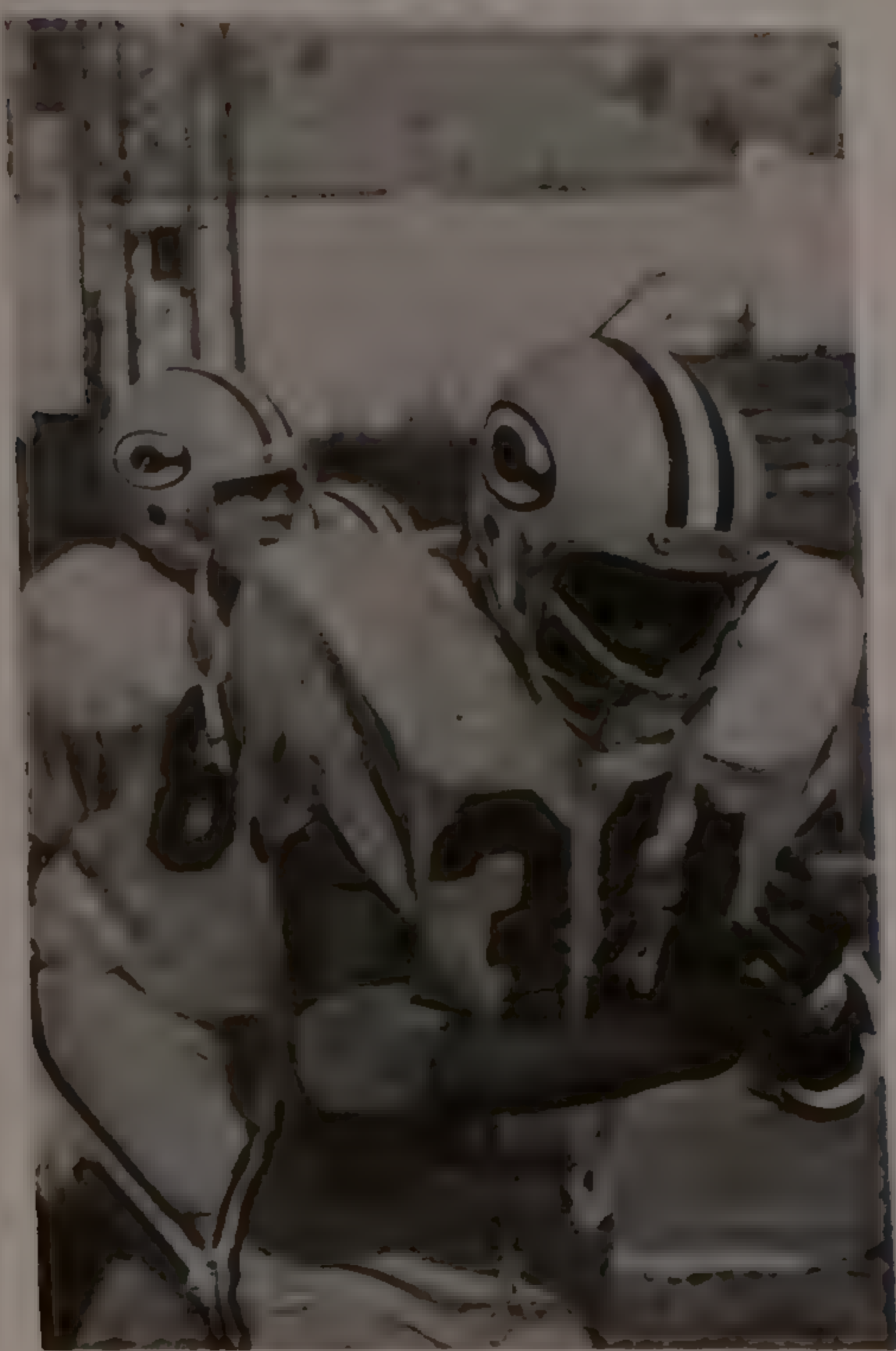

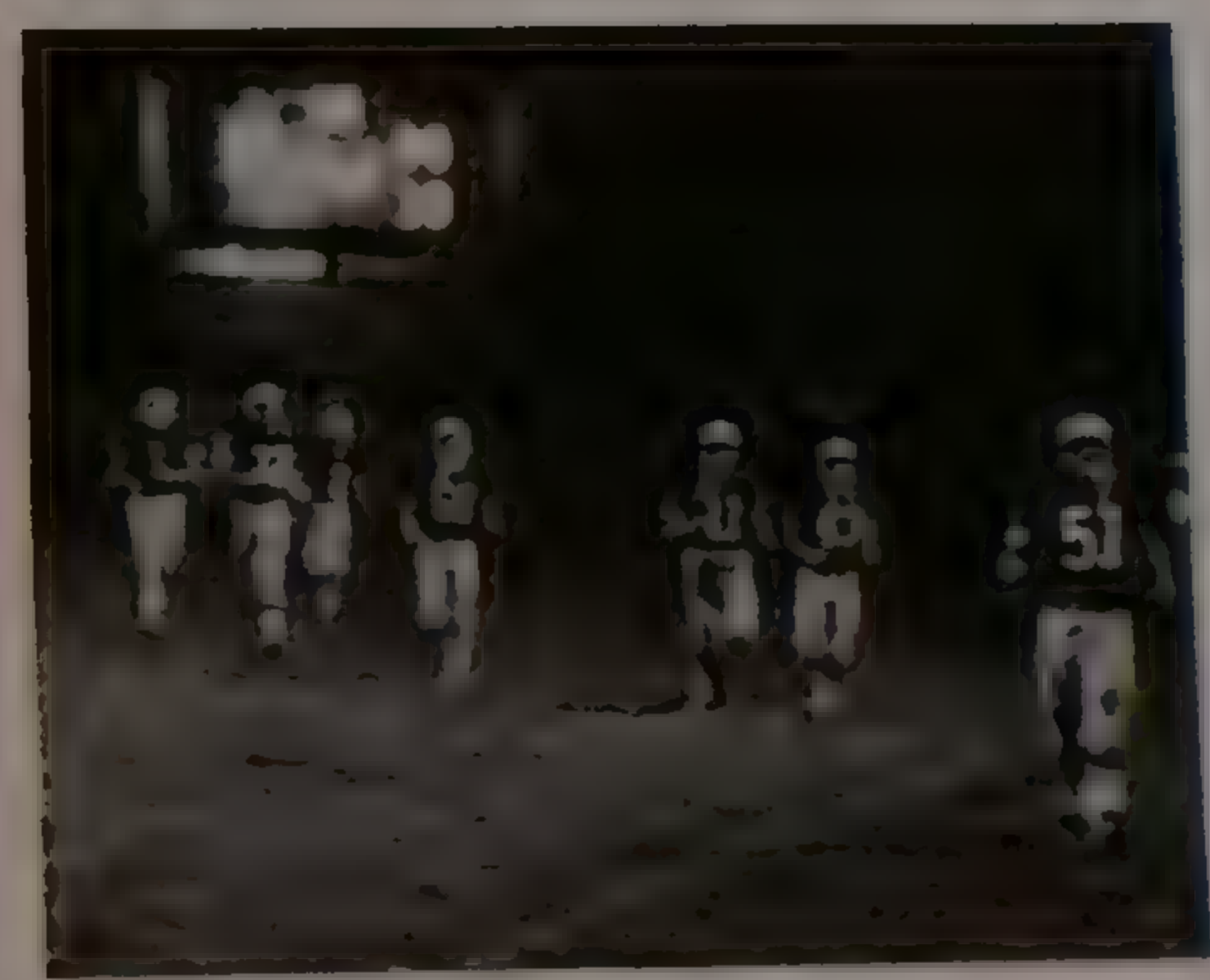

The Lions were defeated again by the Dupont Panthers with a score of 14-8. CHS was in the lead for the whole game until Dupont scored in the last 48 seconds.



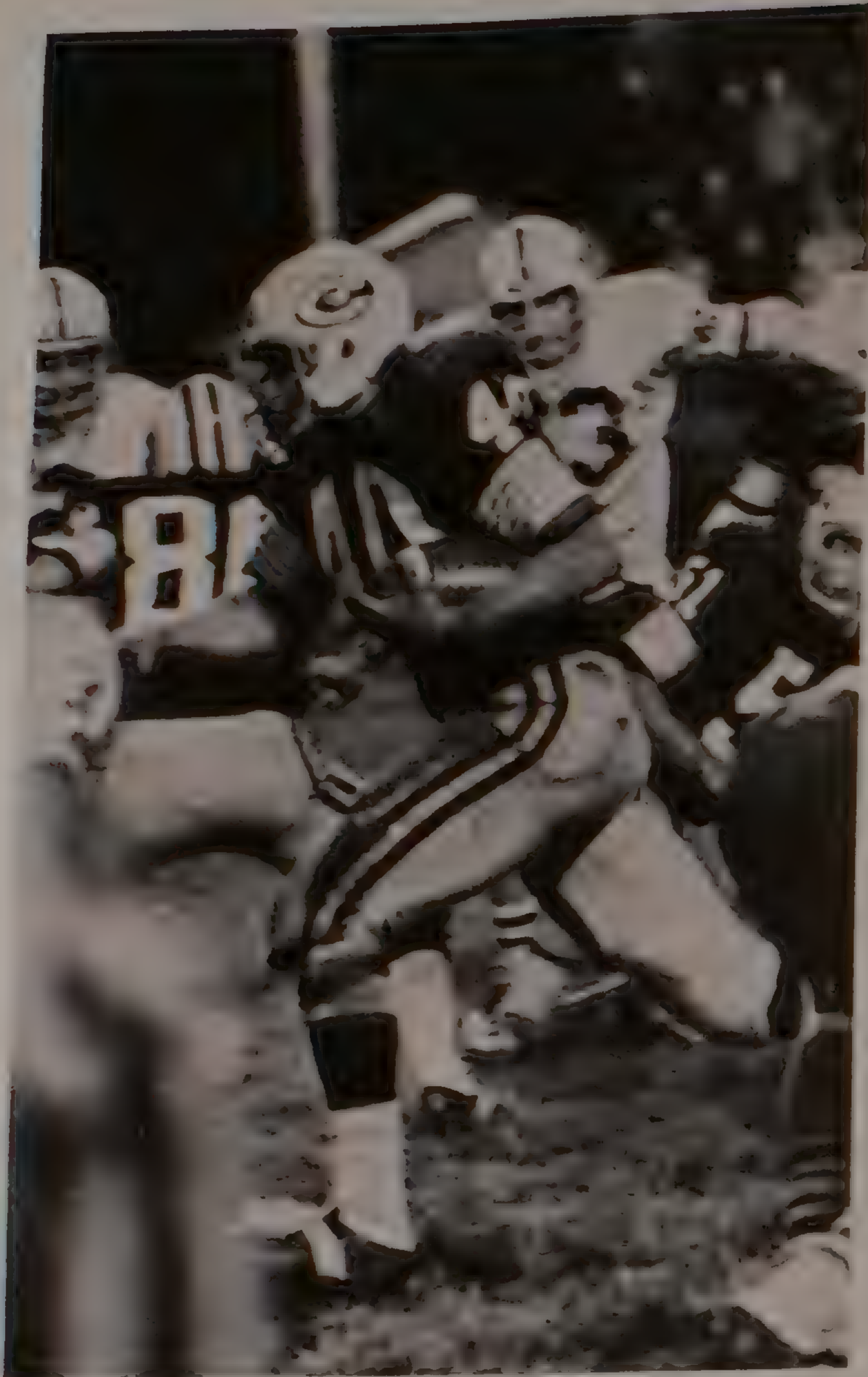

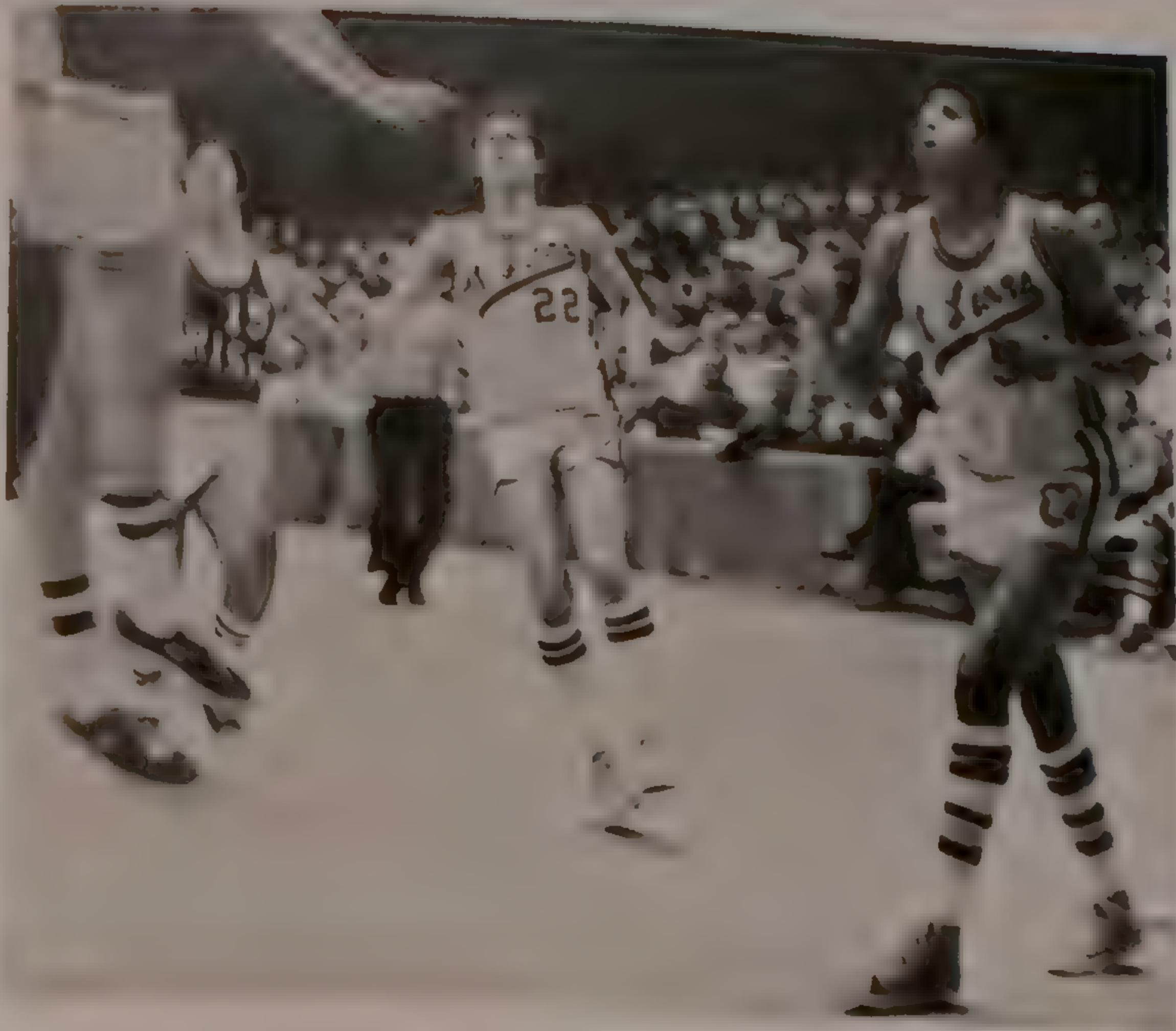

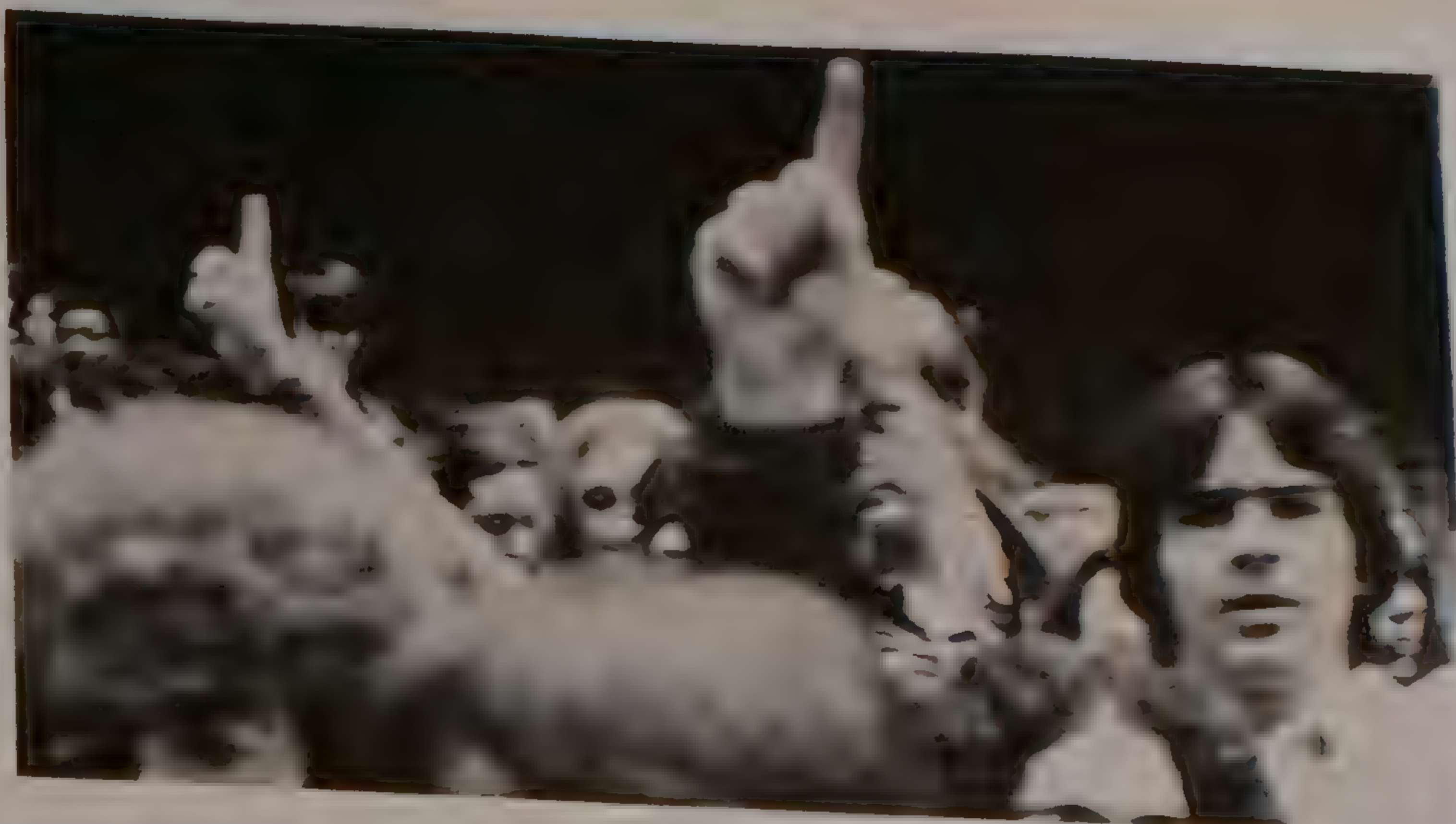
Catholic

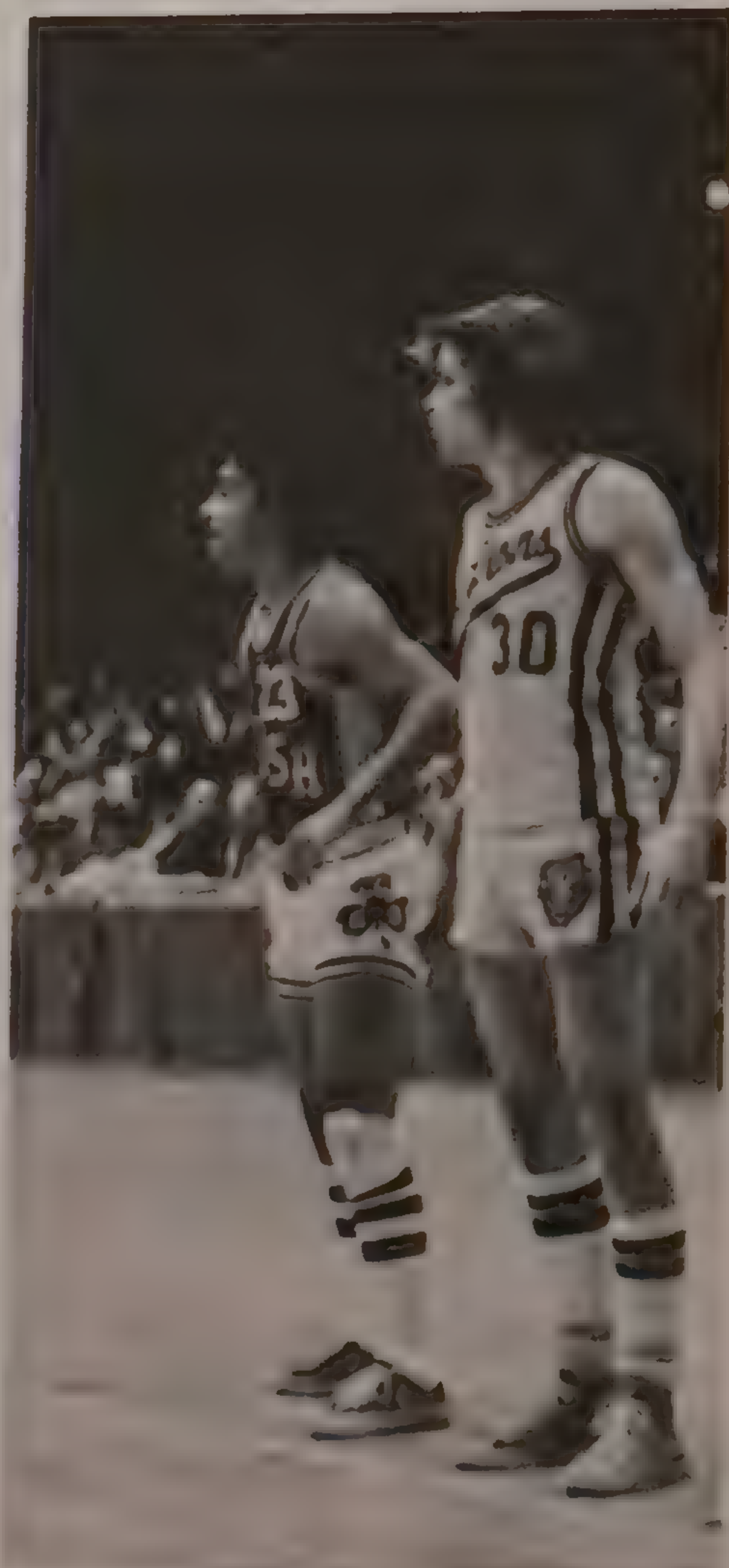

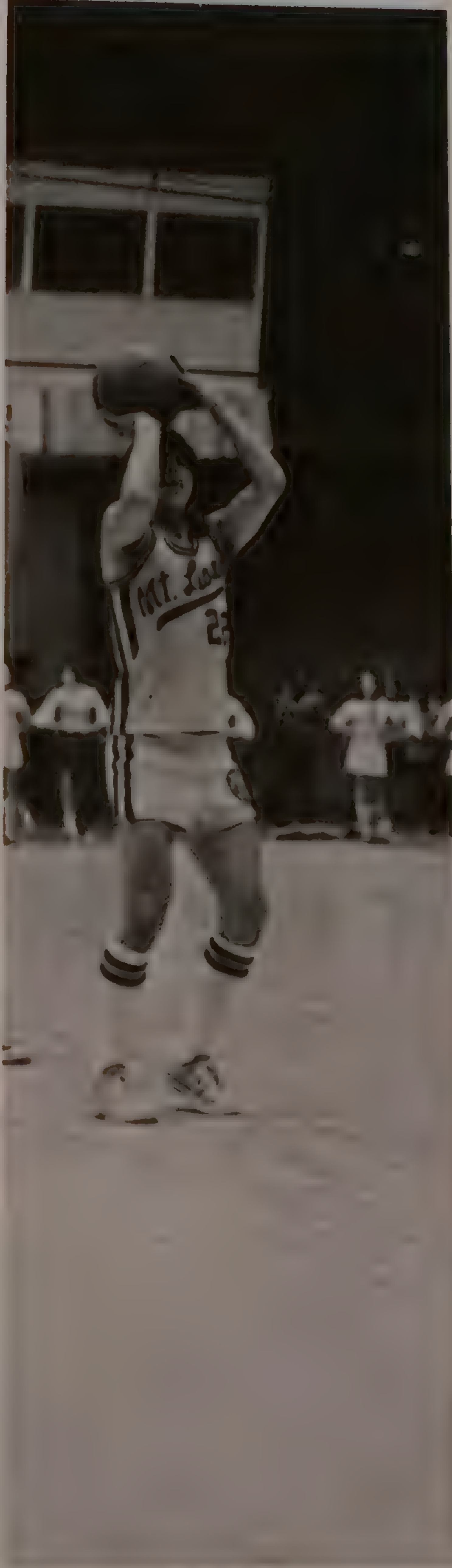

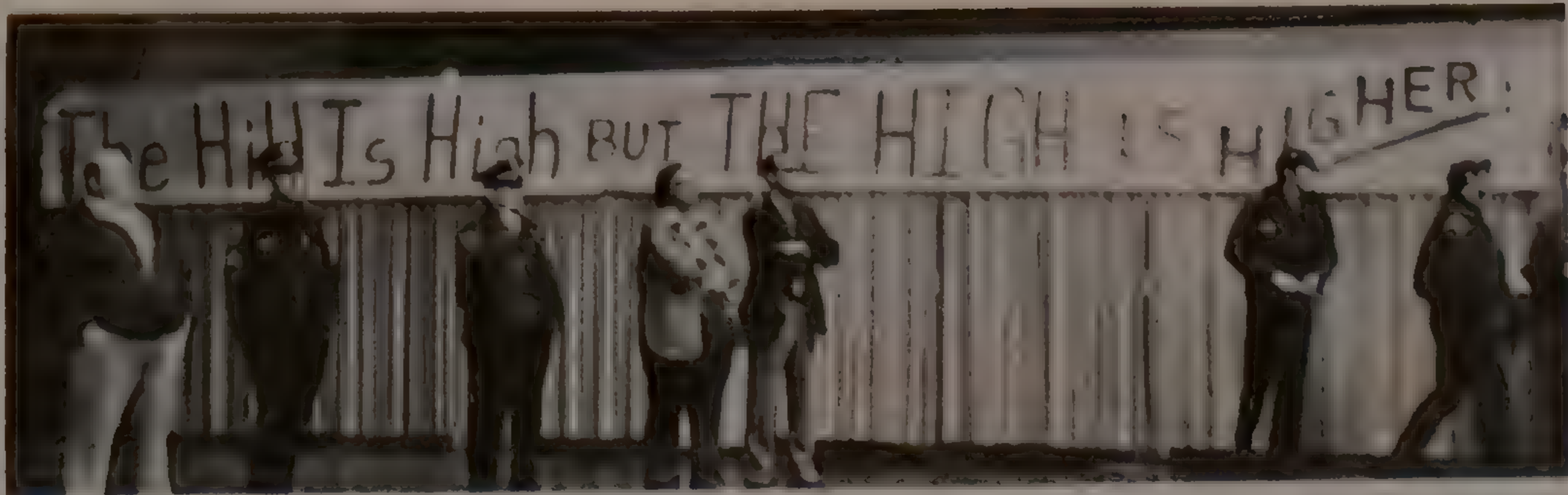

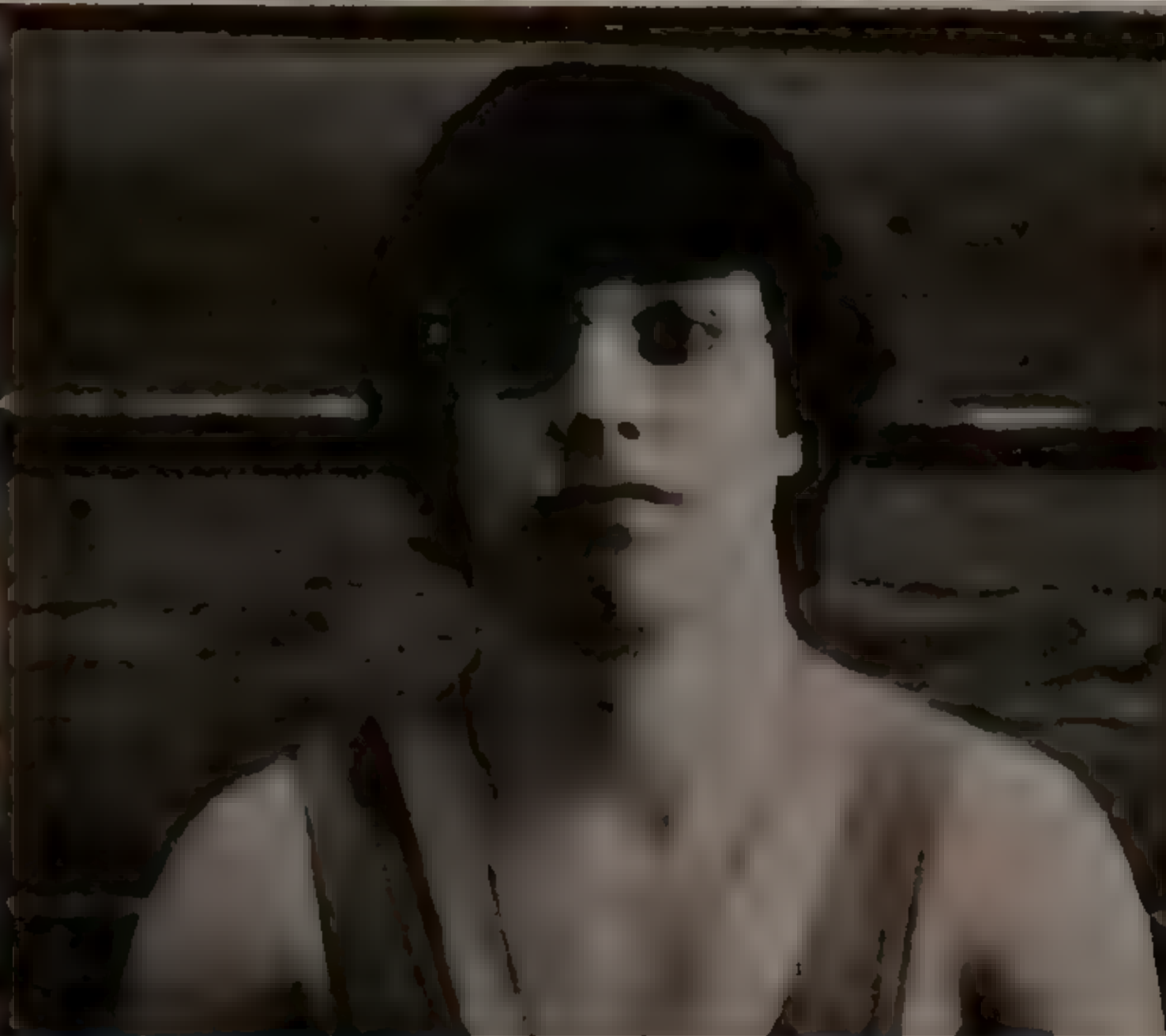

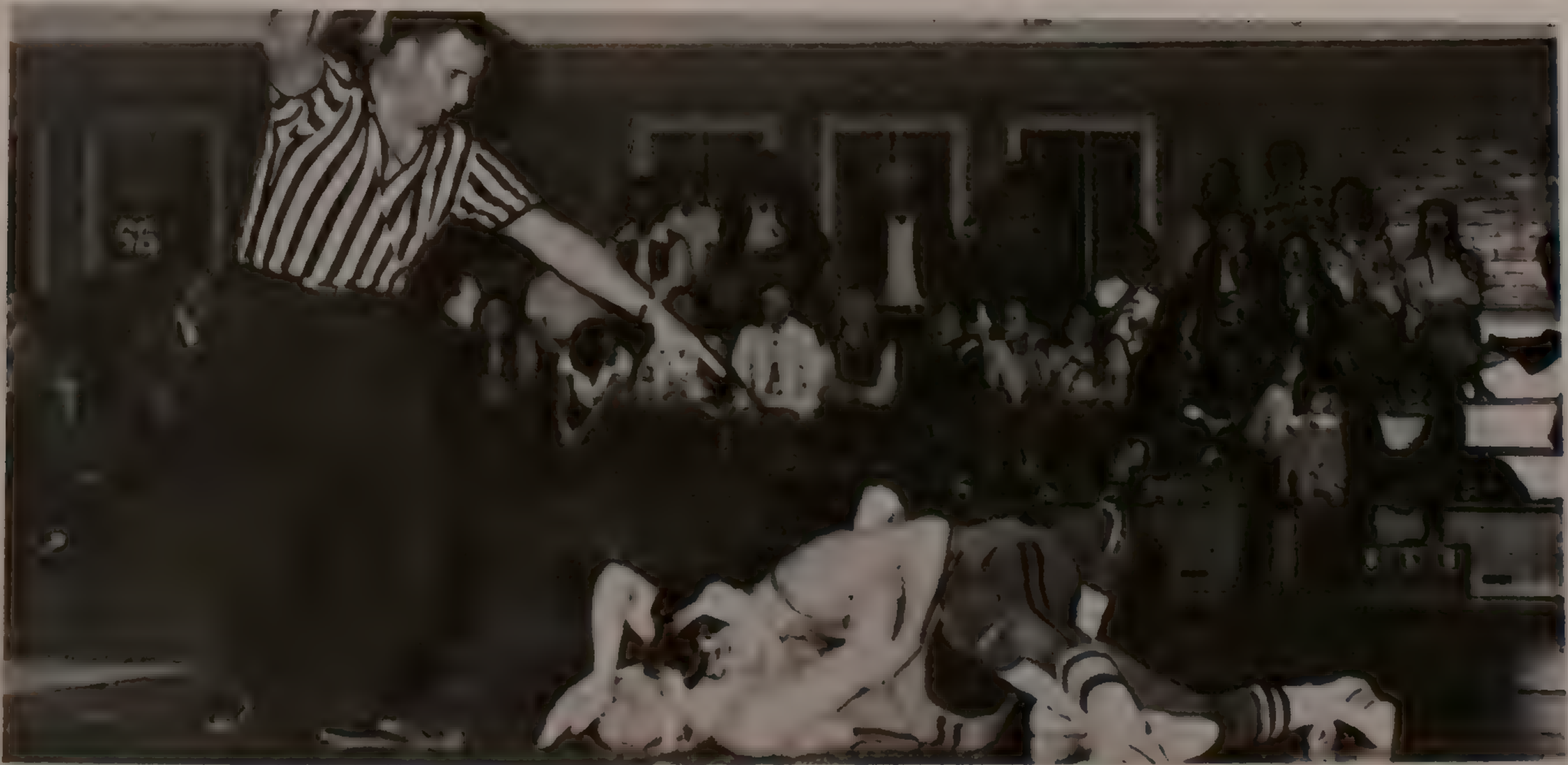

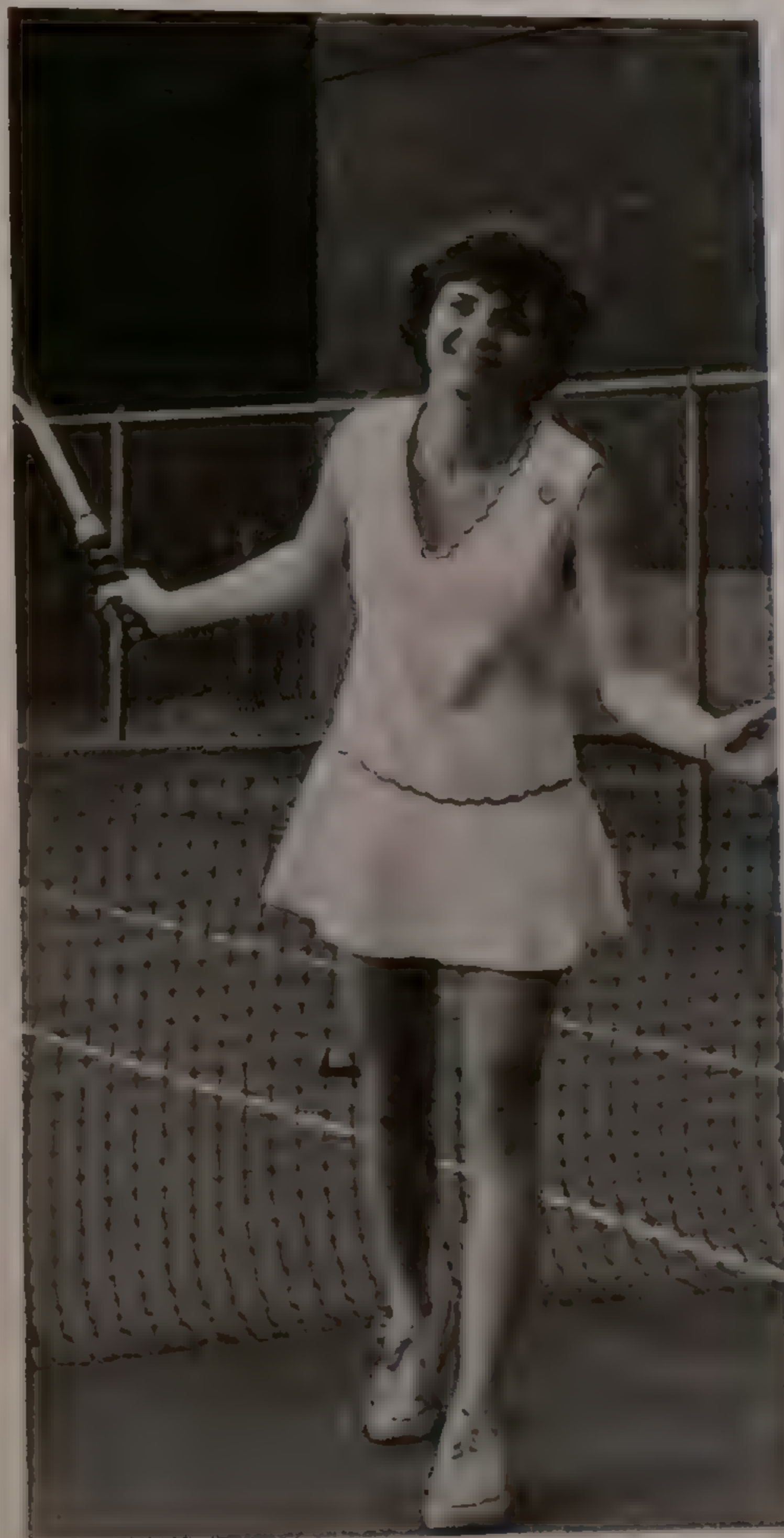

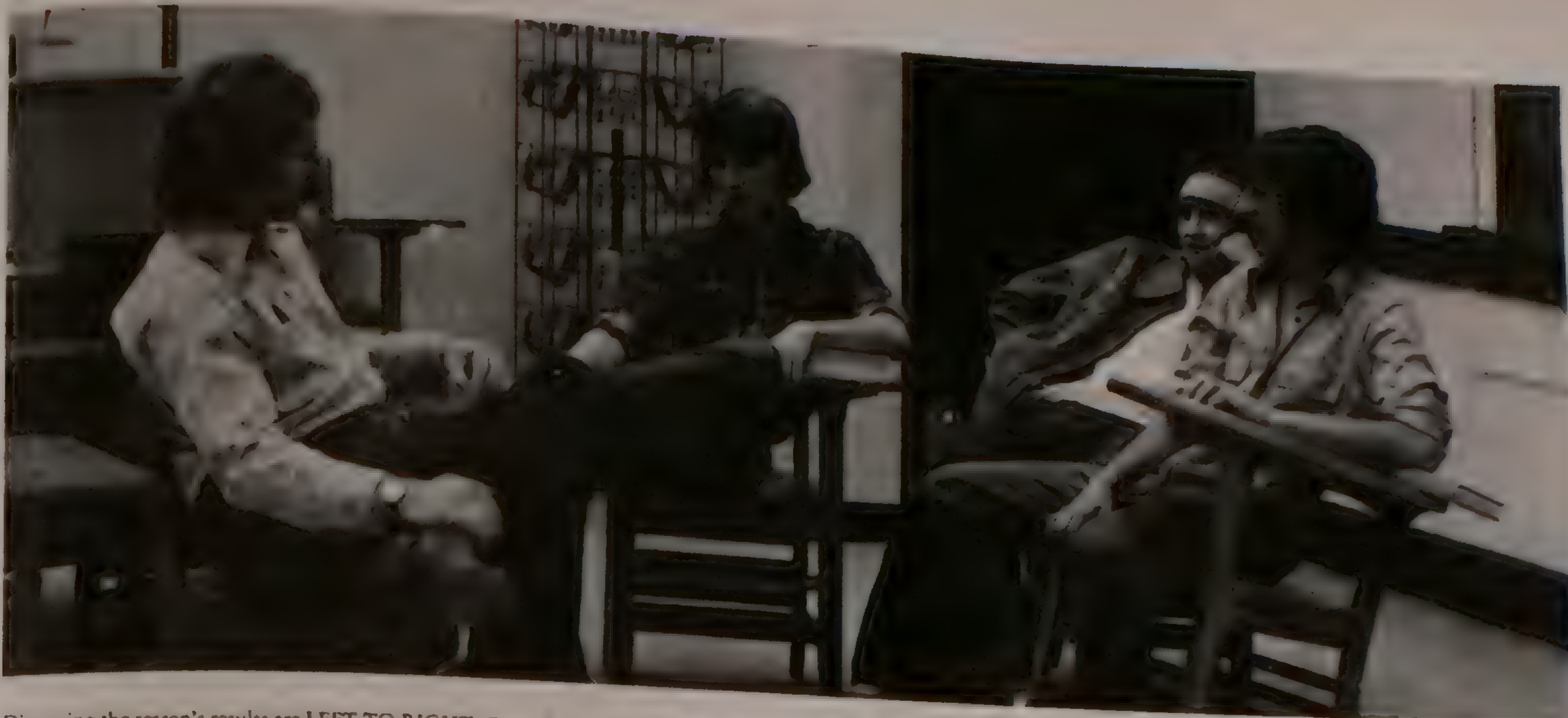

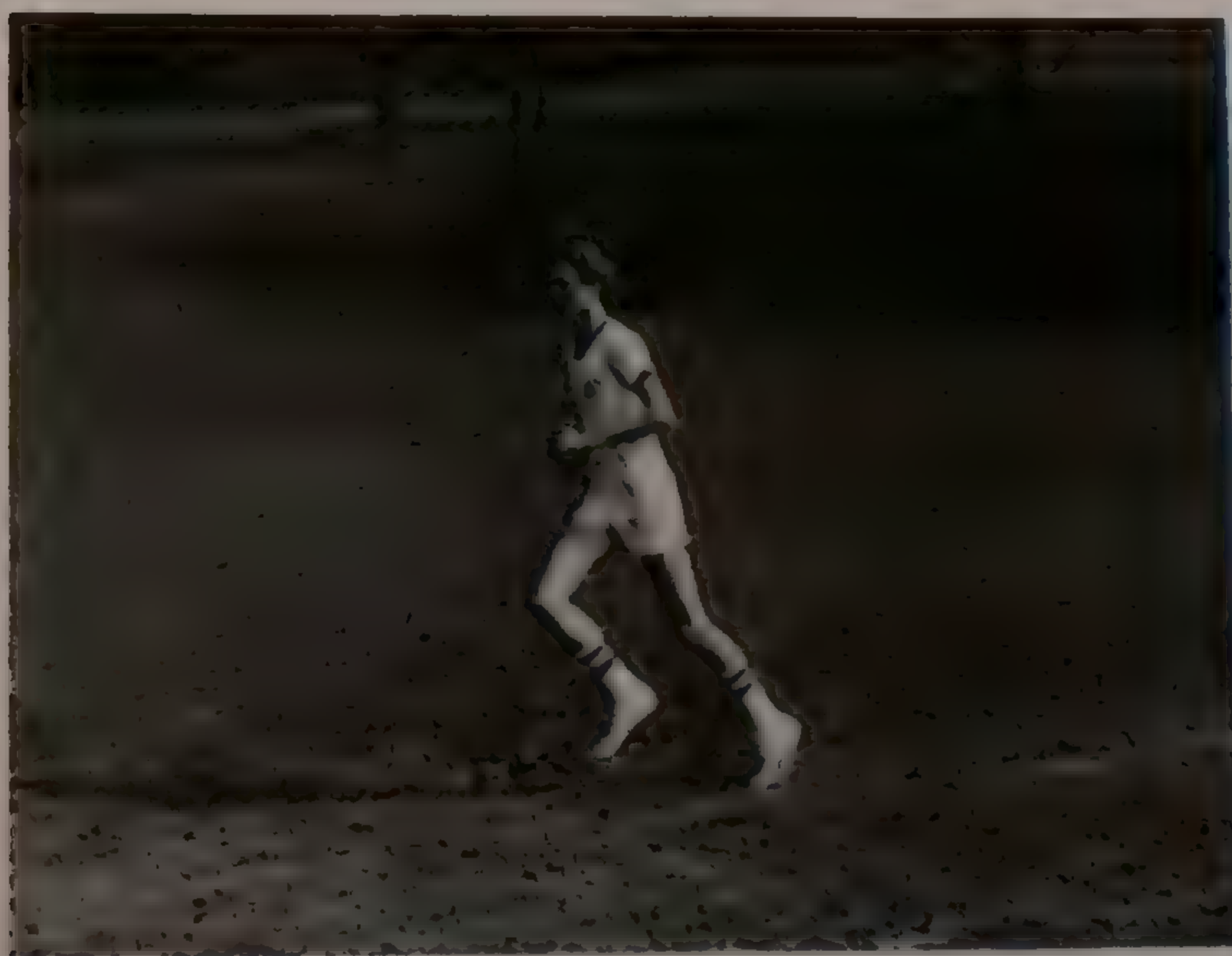

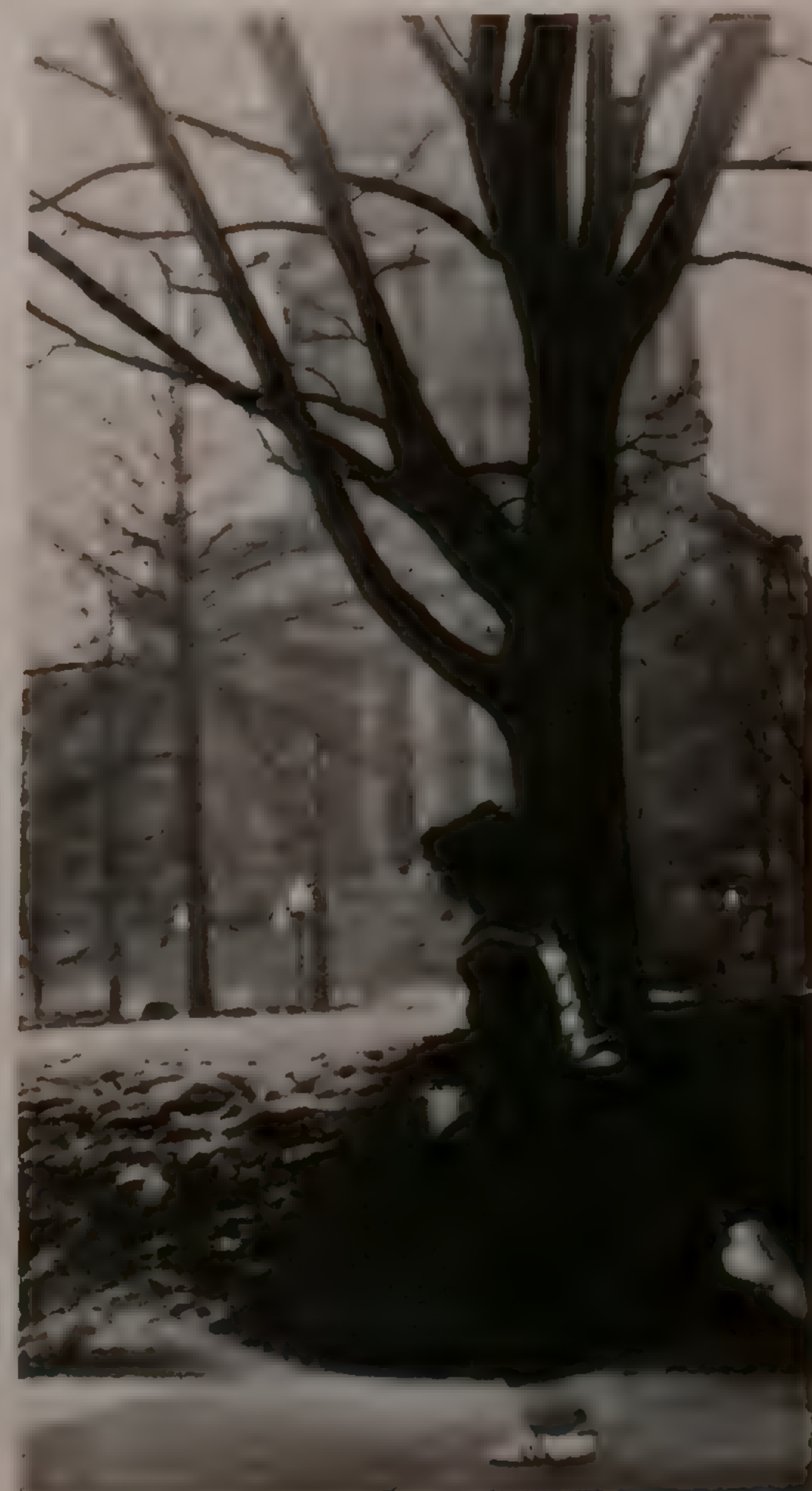

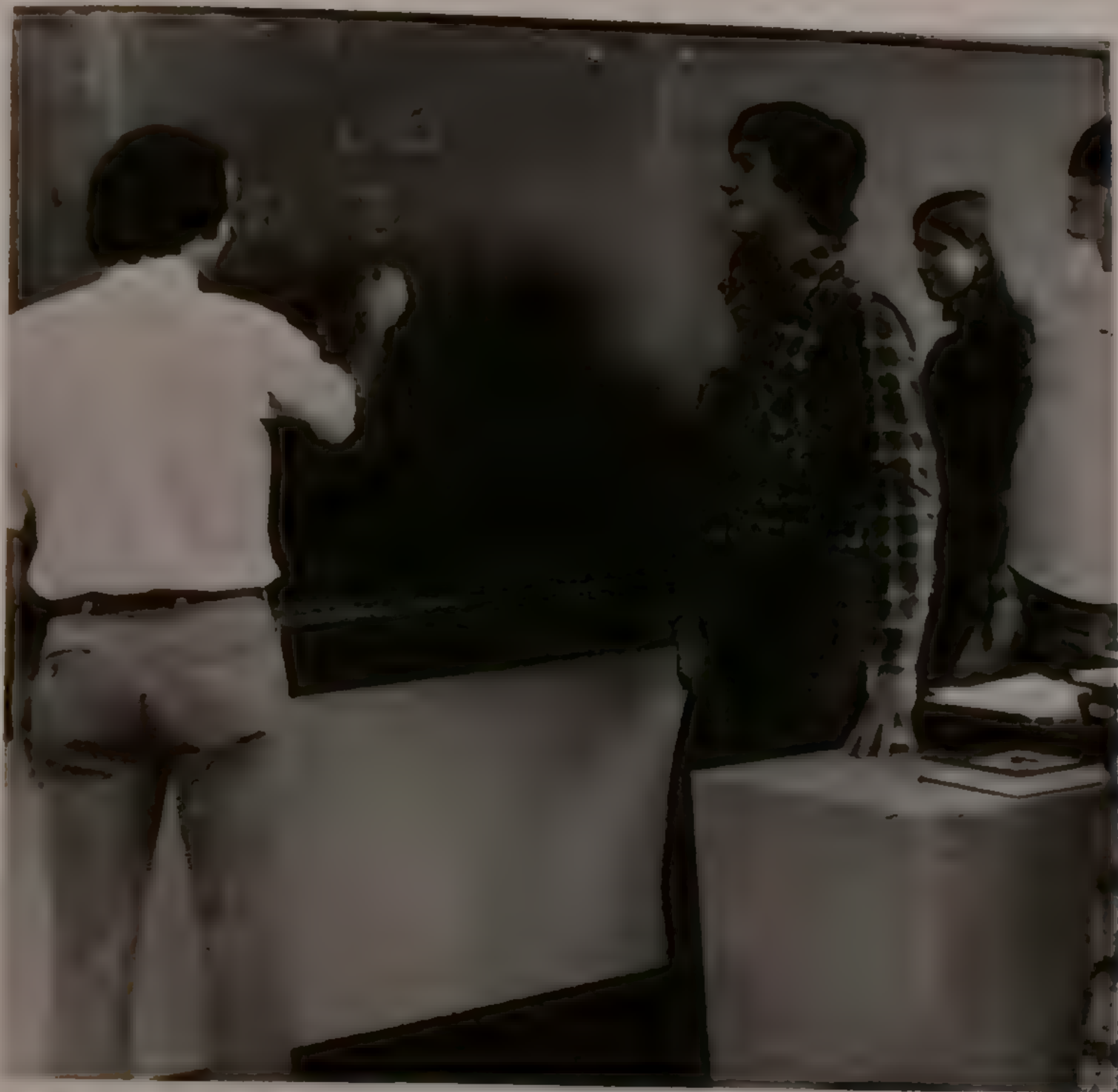

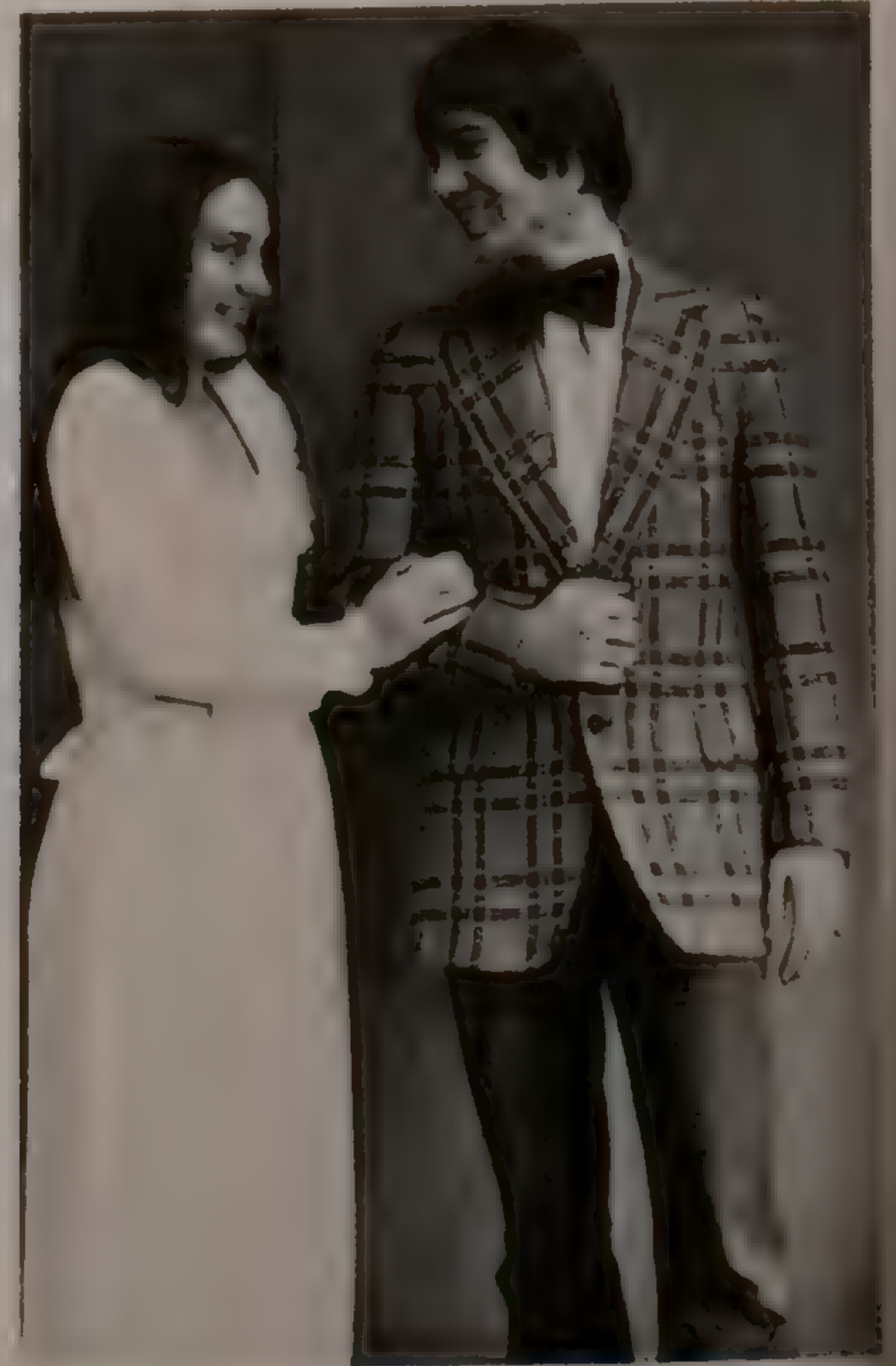

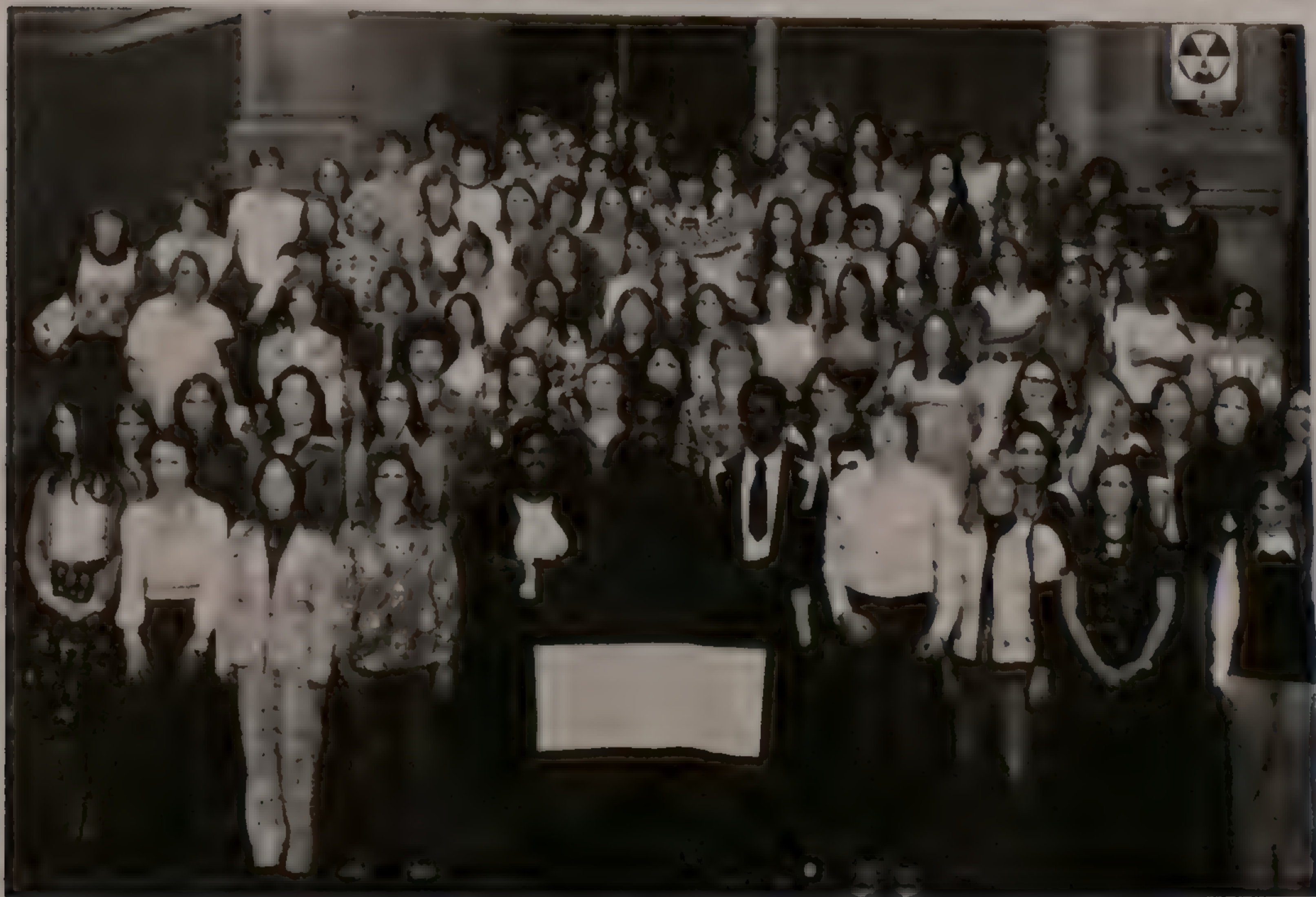

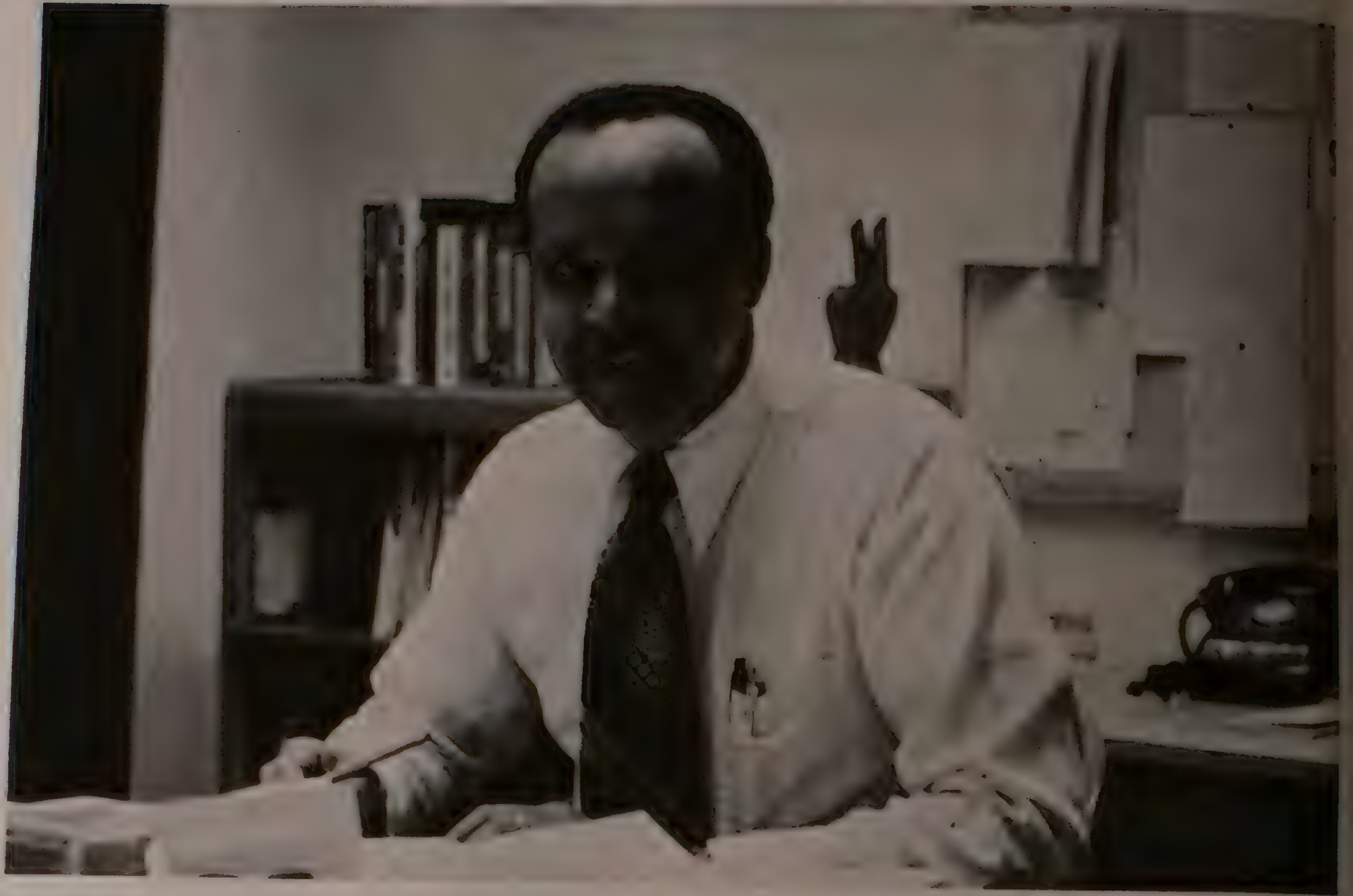




FACULTY AND ADMINISTRATION

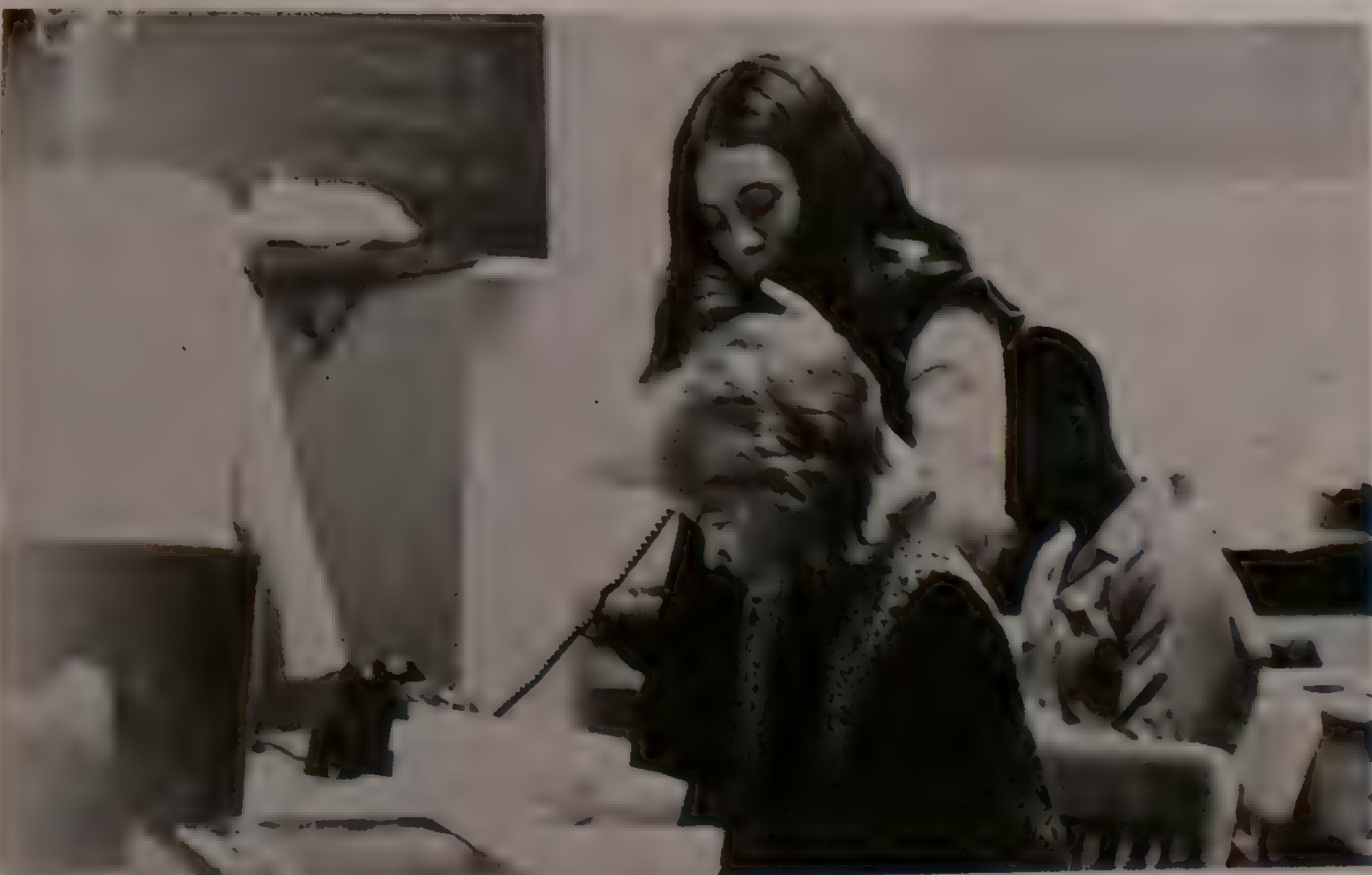
RESOURCE ROOM SPECIALIST

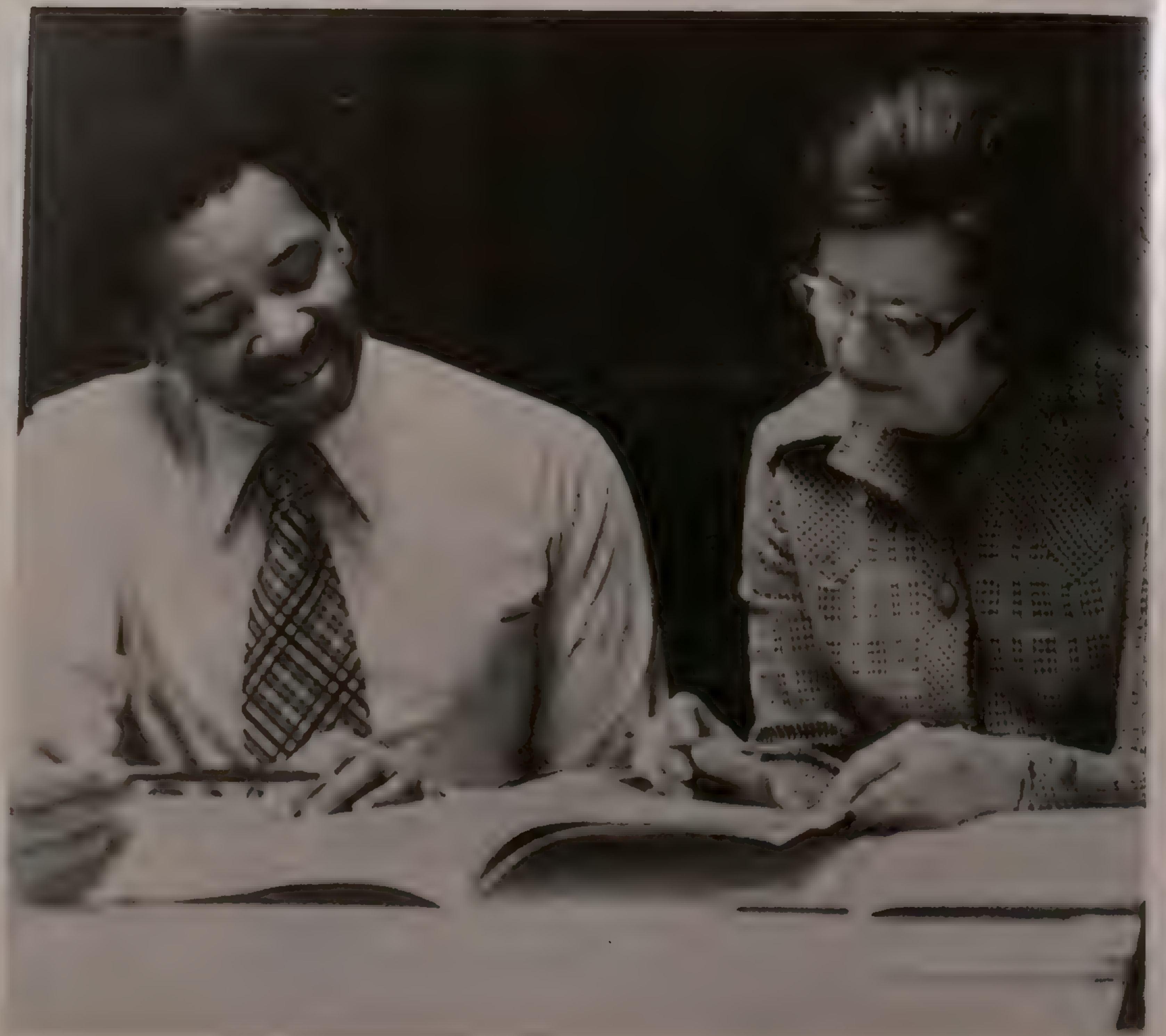
COUNSELORS

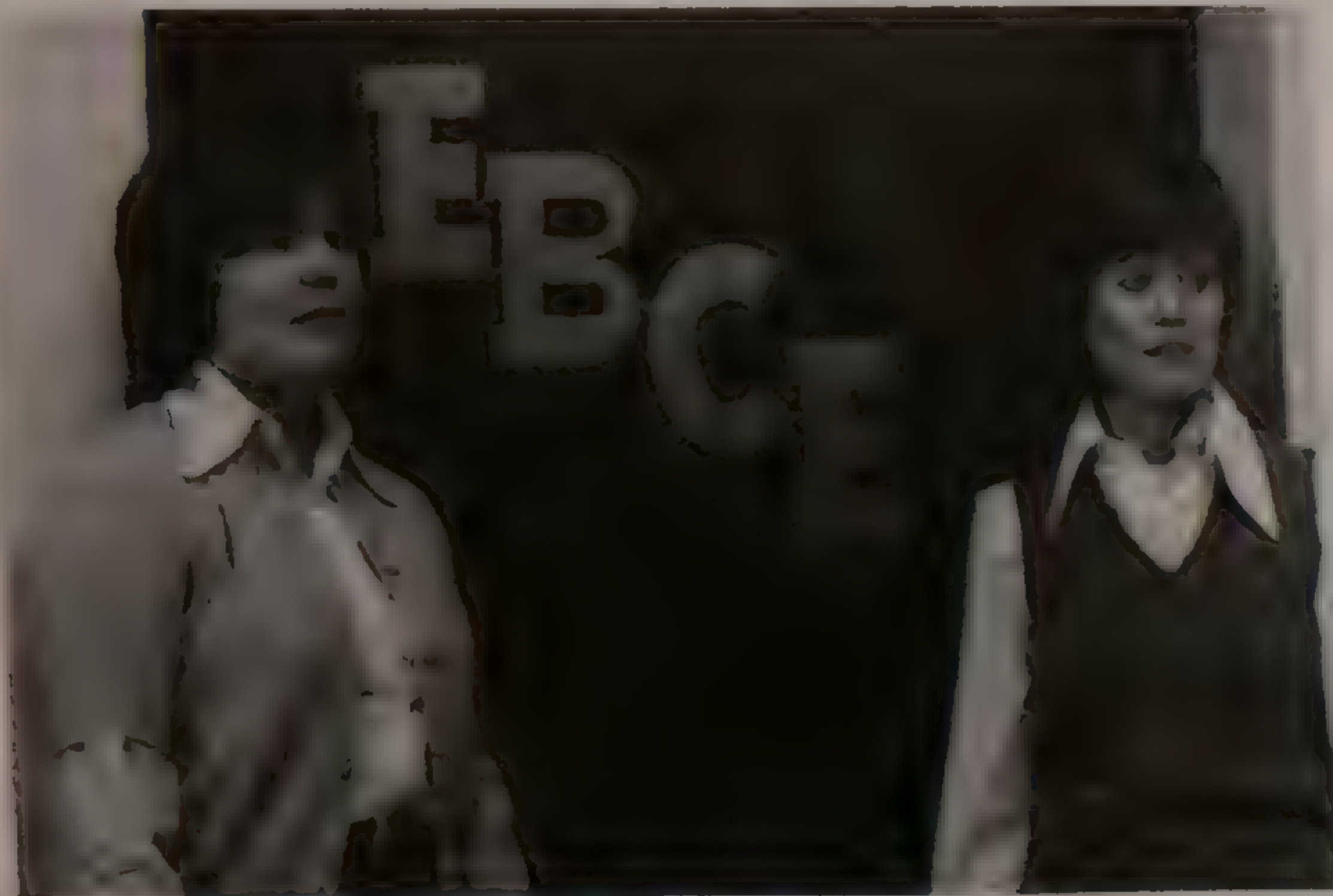

George Mannon taught American Studies II and American Diplomacy this year. He received a BS degree from the University of Tennessee and a MA degree from Marshall.

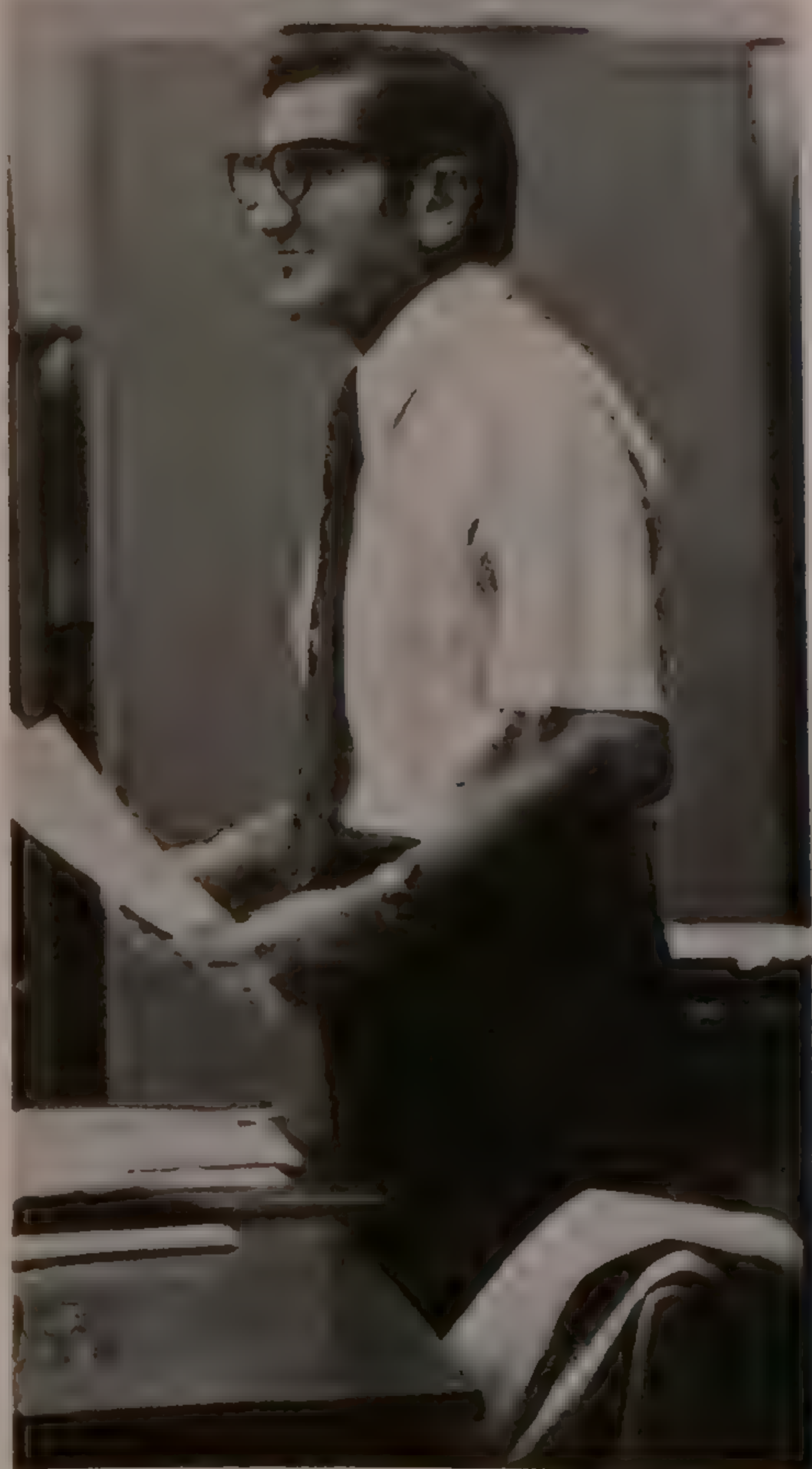
Frank Vincent, an American Studies teacher, attended Glenville State, WVU and received a MA degree from Marshall.

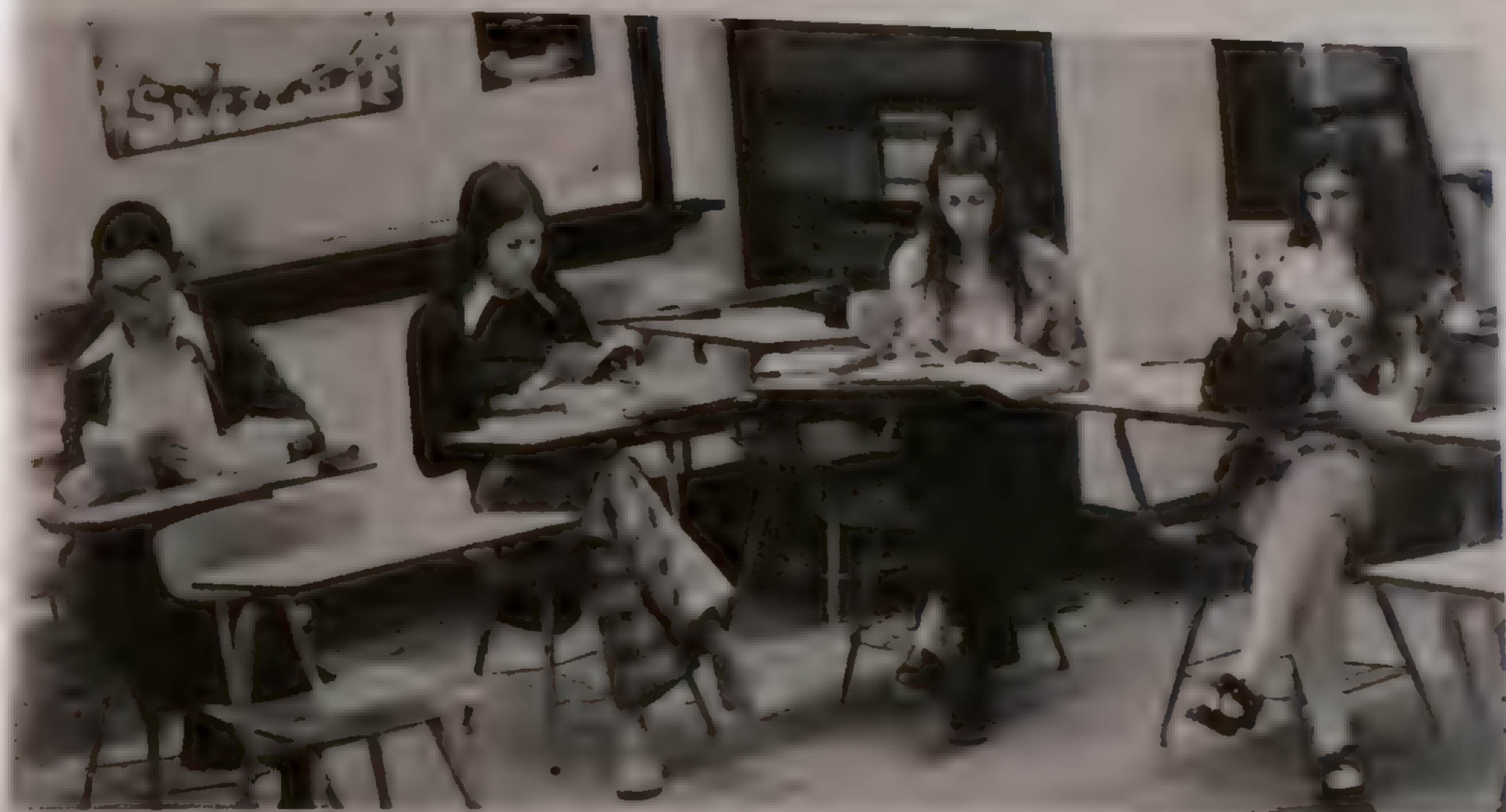
ENGLISH

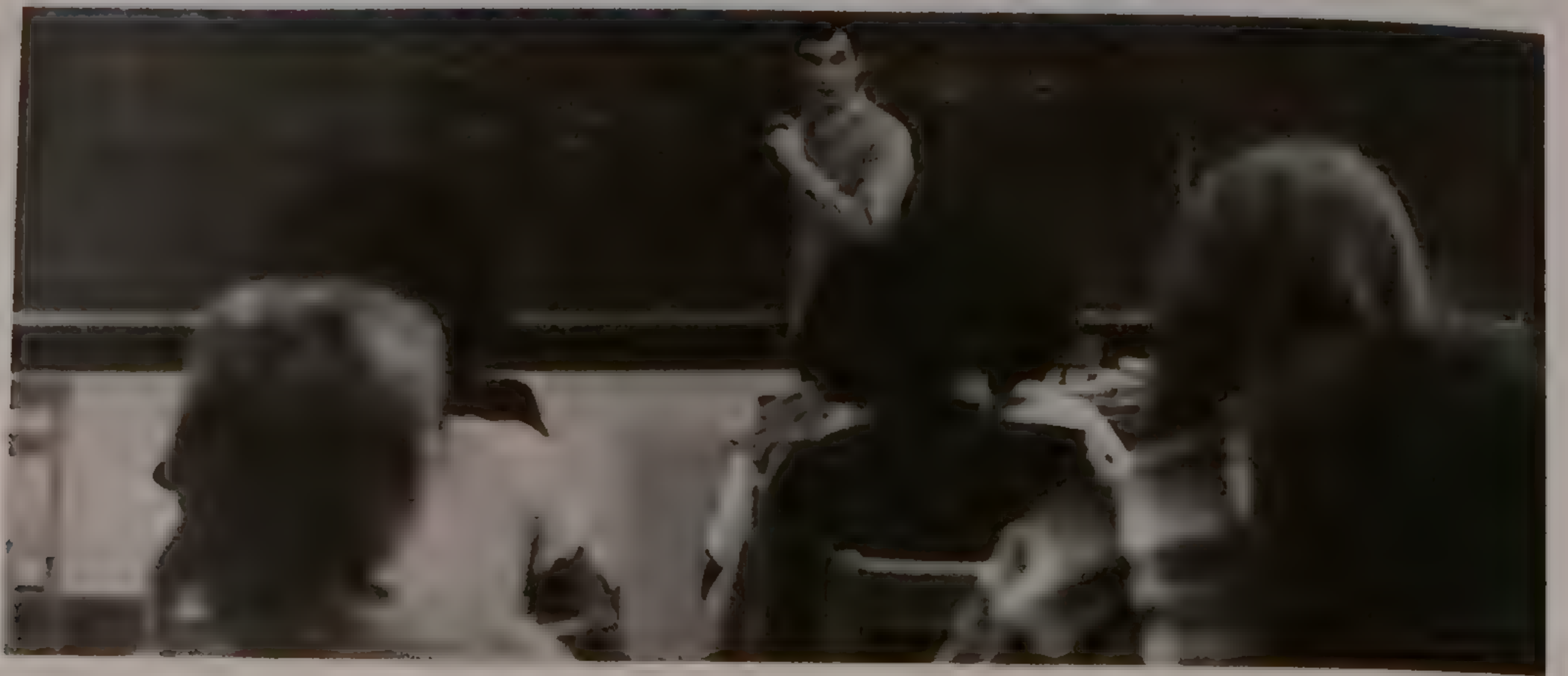
DEPARTMENT

FOREIGN LANGUAGE

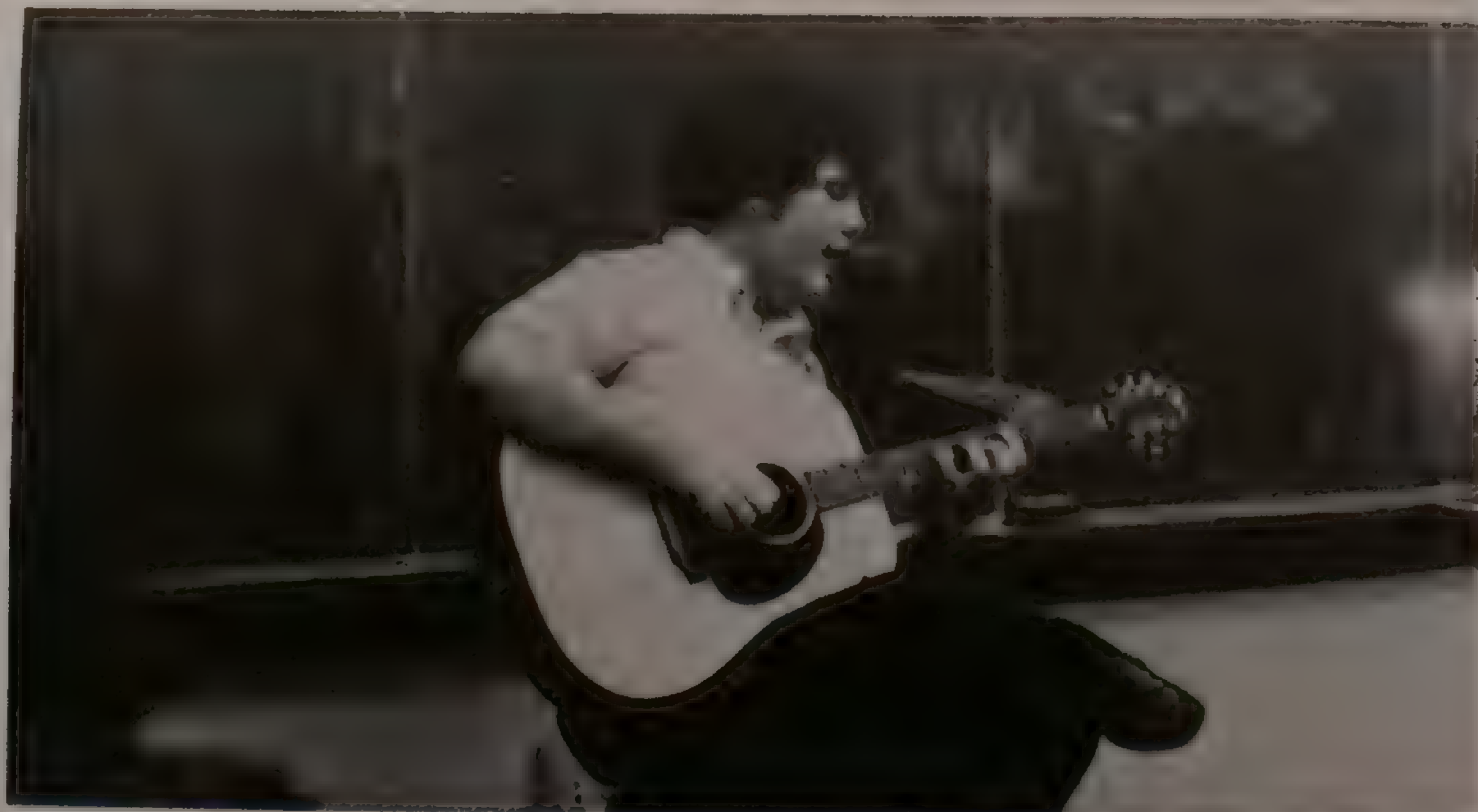

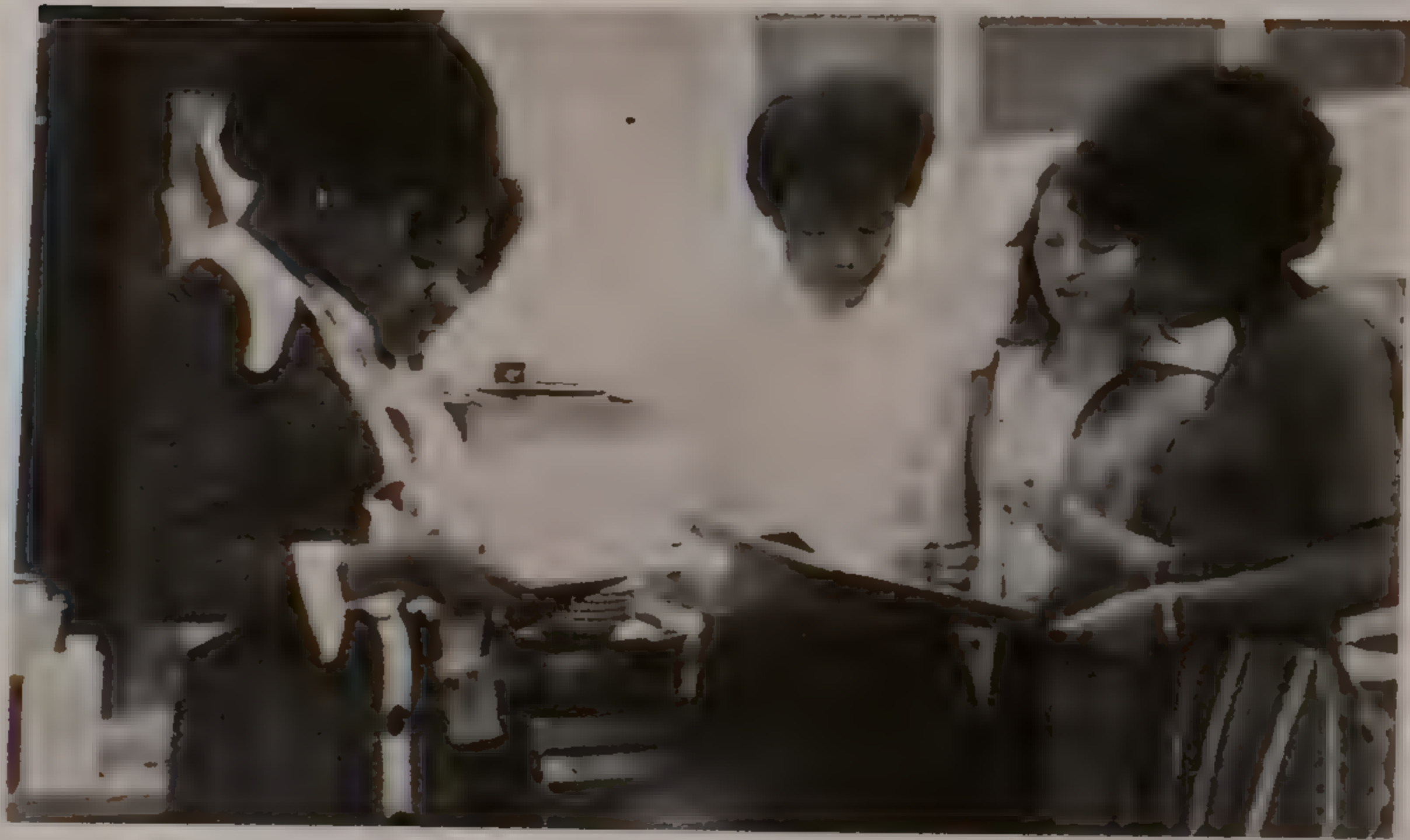
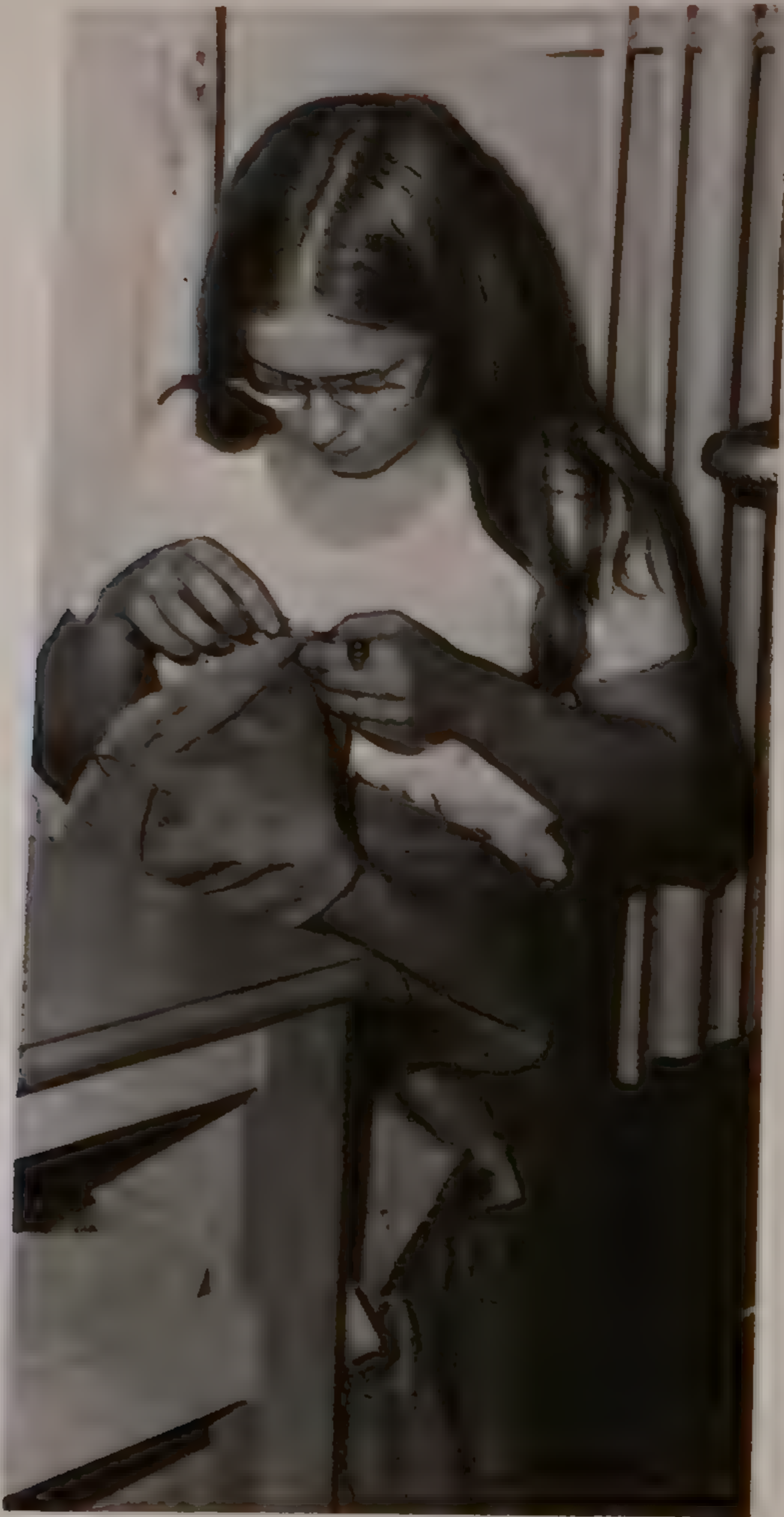
DRIVERS EDUCATION

PRACTICAL ARTS

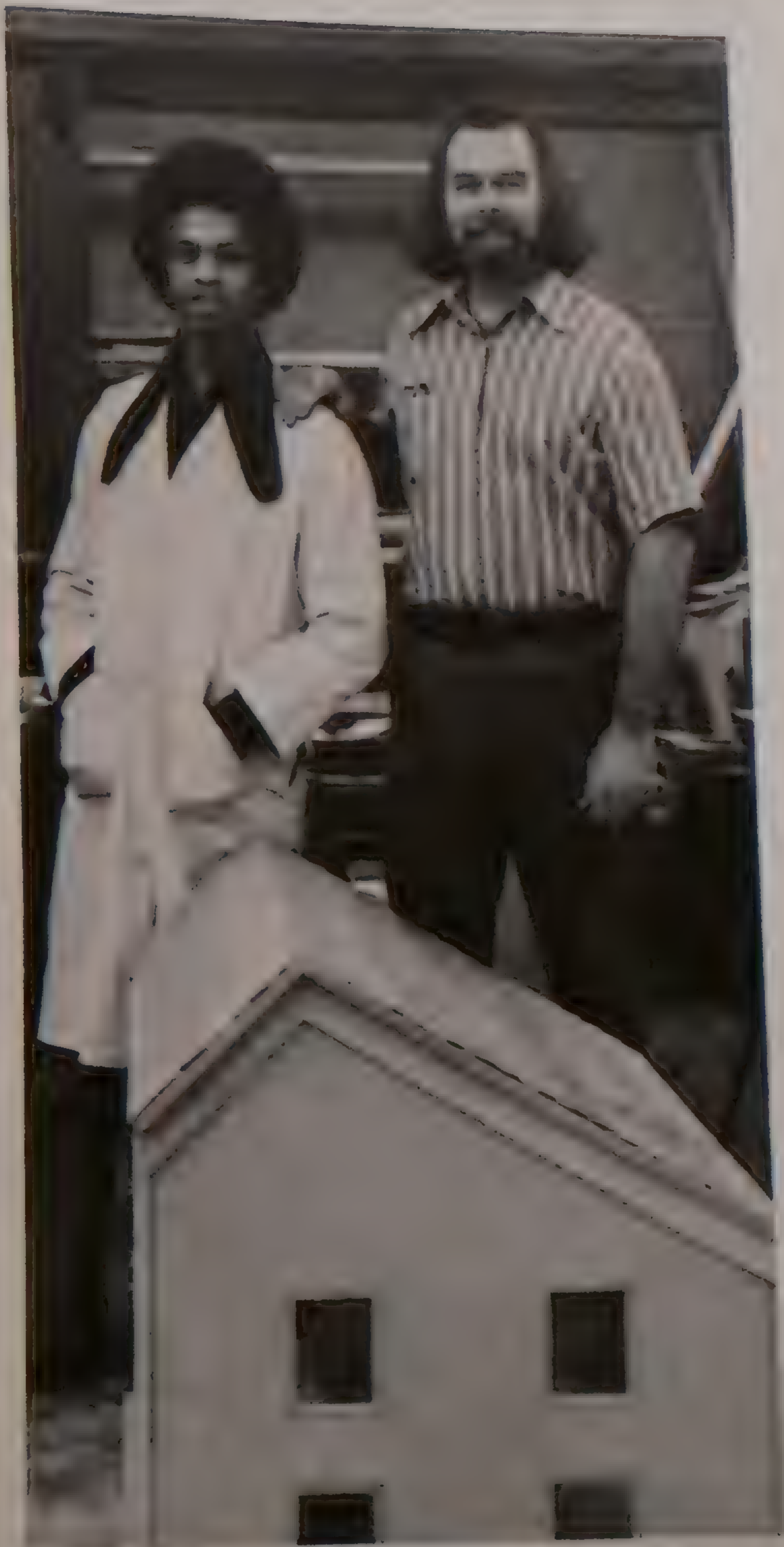

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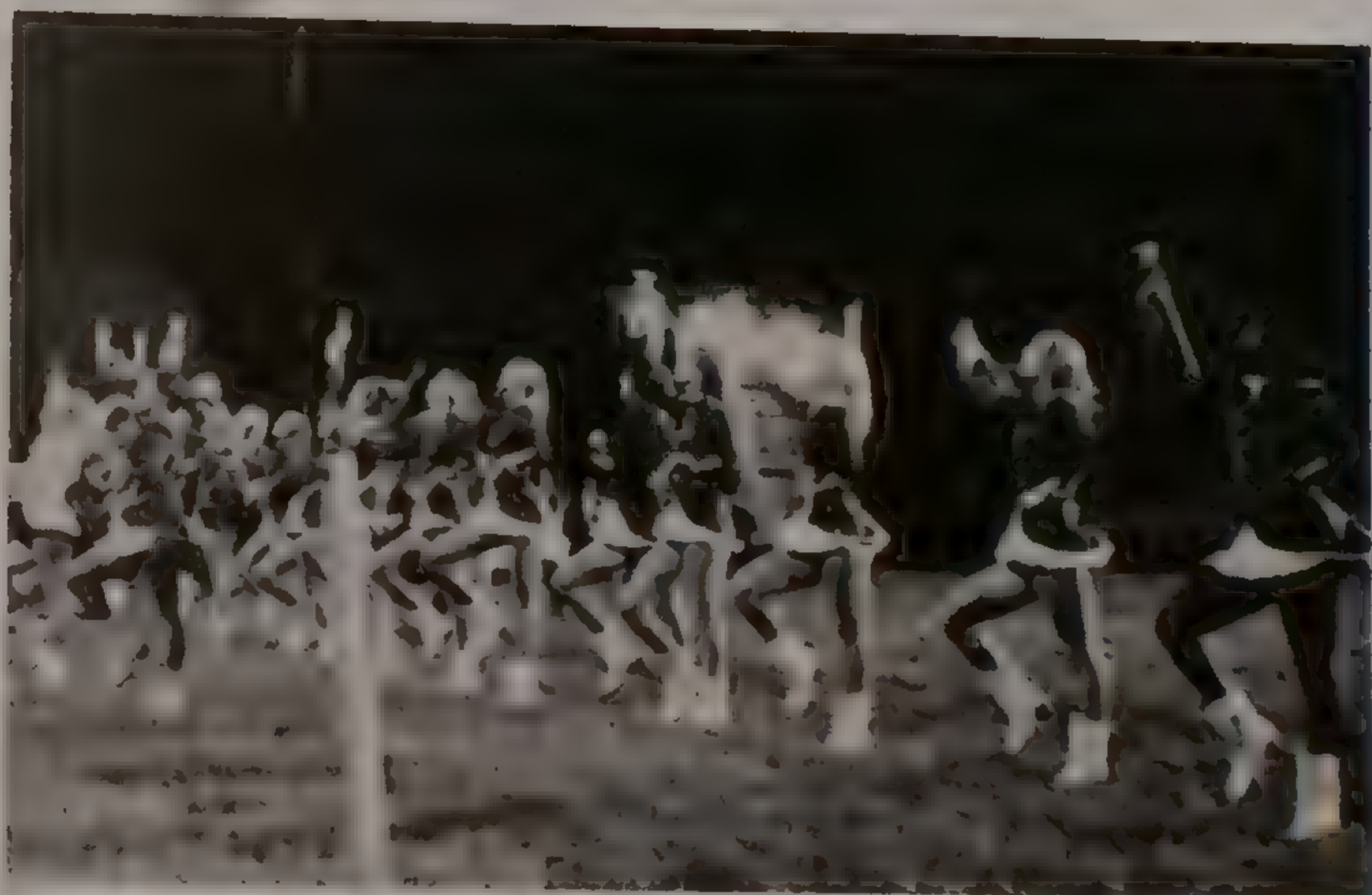
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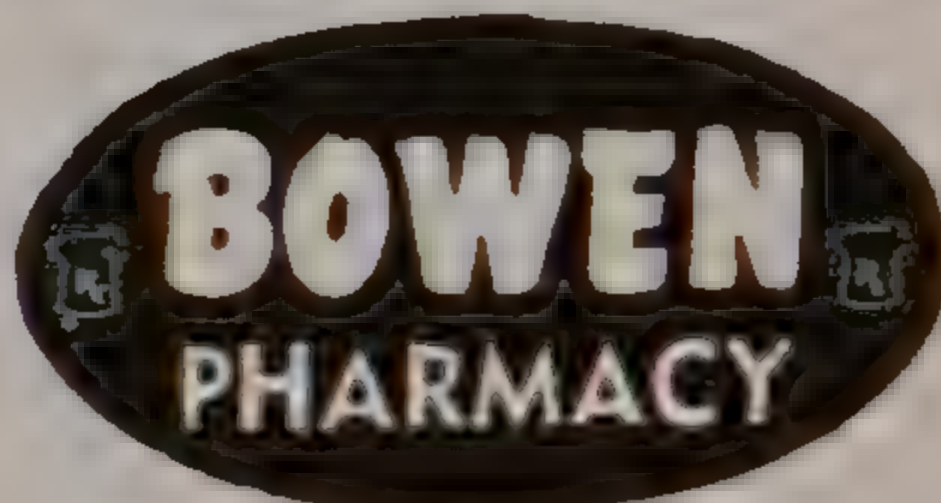

In 1903 the students were moved to the old Mercer school on Quarrier Street, and remained there until 1909. Thomas Jefferson then became Charleston High, home of the CHS Trojans, until 1925. It was then that our "new" building was completed and the Mt. Loins settled down. Recently, however there has been talk of building a new high school. And now it is time — we must leave everything behind and with much regret, say, "Goodbye."





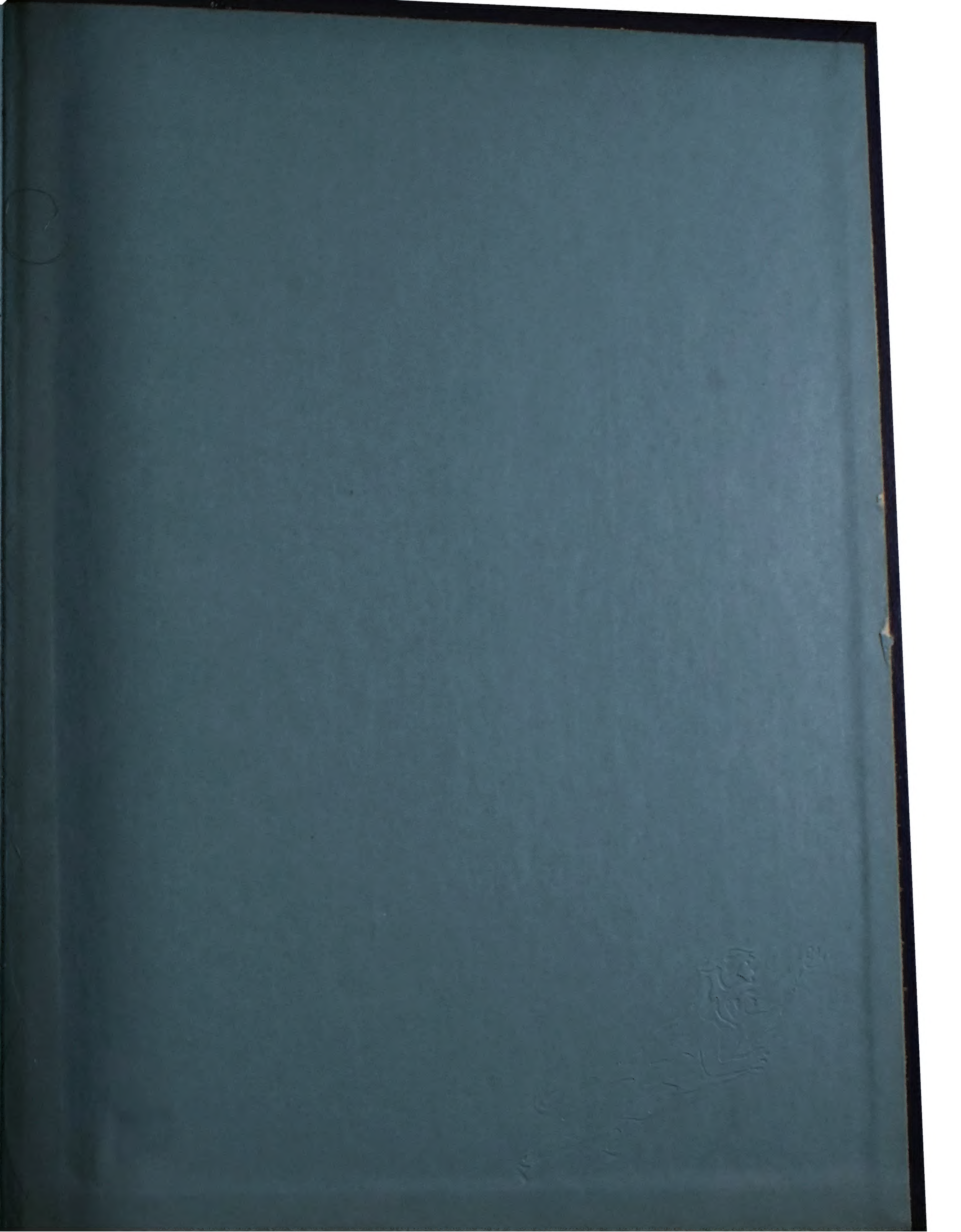
