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



Remember this offer applies only to seed by packet, and not to seed by ounces, pound, quart or bushel, nor to bulbs, plants, berries or anything else.

General Instructions About Ordering

WHAT WE DO

We Take the Risk-We guarantee that all money sent us shall reach us, if sent by Post office or Express Company's Money Order, Bank Drafts, Bills or Coin by Registered Letters. We will not be responsible for coin sent in ordinary letters, or for postage stamps.

Free by Mail or Express-We send Seeds, Bulbs and Plants free by mail or express—we send seeds, Bulbs and Plants free by mail, parcel post or express at the prices named in this Catalog, except where otherwise stated. This brings them to the very doors of our customers without trouble or expense. Of course, we must have the privilege of sending either by mail or express, as we deem best and cheapest.

When buyer asks that goods be sent only by express we do not prepay the charges, but larger and better plants, shrubs, etc., can be sent that way—and we add extras to help out in costs.

We Guarantee that every package we send out shall reach its destination in good condition, and that everything shall be received exactly as ordered, and if not we must be notified at once. If a package is lost, or any of its contents injured on the way, we will send again. We cannot, however, be responsible for losses caused by detention by customs officials of foreign countries. countries.

We Pack all Plants carefully in strong boxes, which insures their safe transit through the mails to the remotest part of the country or abroad.

We Fill all orders as soon as received, if the stock is ready. Customers who wish their order, or any part of it, booked for shipping at a later date, should so state.

WHAT BUYERS SHOULD DO

Forward Money with the order, and at our risk, when sent by Post Office Money Order on Floral Park; bills or coin, by Registered Letter, Bank Draft or Express Company's Money Order. Post Office Money Orders are the cheapest and the safest method for remitting. We earnestly request our patrons to remit by Money Order if possible.

Stamps and Coin—Do not send postage stamps in payment for goods if it can be avoided. The loss is great. Coin, when sent in letters, should be sewed or pasted up in strong paper or cloth, to prevent its breaking through the envelope. We will not be responsible for coin sent us except in Registered Letter, nor for Stamps.

Write Your Order plainly and distinctly by itself and not mixed up with anything else you may wish to say. Be sure to write your NAME and ADDRESS plainly.

Order Early-We strive to fill orders within a day or two after they reach us, but this is frequently made impossible by a great rush of business about planting time. Do not wait until you need your seeds and bulbs before ordering. Anticipate planting time and order early.

IMPORTANT—It occasionally happens that an order is lost in coming to us, or the goods in going to the customer; therefore, if any who order do not hear from us within a reasonable length of time, they should send a duplicate order, naming the date on which the former one was sent and the amount of money enclosed, and in what form. This will enable us to investigate and fill the duplicate at the constant of the state of the sta the duplicate at once.

FOREIGN—Small Extra Charge. To Canada, Mexico, Australia, New Zealand, Newfoundland, Great Britain, China, Japan, most of the countries of South and Central America, and the West Indian Islands, we can send goods by parcel post, prepaid. In fact, we can do this to nearly all foreign countries. We are obliged to charge, however, an extra 10 per cent over Catalog prices on all articles, except seed by the packet, when sept prepaid. This is on account of extra costs in packing and greater cost in postage, etc. We are obliged, even, to pay a duty of 7 cents on every catalog we send to Canada. No foreign postage stamps accepted. Make all remittances by Money Order or Bank Draft.







The railroad strike and express embargo all through April was a severe handicap. The Parcel Post service was overloaded, uncertain and dilatory. Orders were nearly one hundred per cent. above average years, and reliable labor to meet this exigency was impossible to find. We were obliged to return money for some orders, but otherwise got through pretty well, but some of us worked sixteen hours a day for seventy-

five consecutive days. AT FLORAL PARK, L. I., is situated our retail department with large fireproof buildings and immense blocks of greenhouses. Tubers are divisions of field grown roots carefully divided so that each one will contain an eye for sprouting. (We guarantee all tubers we send out to have five eyes.) They start a strong growth and are soon blooming, some blooming well up to frost, others exhaust themselves earlier. For mail trade tubers are in a general way best. The size of the tubers counts for nothing, large or small are equally good, if the eye is 0 K. Is O. K.

The Truth About Green Plants.

These are cuttings, which have been rooted from sprouts of tubers which are started in January or February under glass. If old enough and well established, they ship well with careful packing. If too young and tender, they do not carry well. As a rule they do not bloom as early as tubers, but bloom better in late summer and autumn. All green plants sent out by us are strong, well rooted and well hardened of and sure to do well. In general, green plants are as good as tubers, if shipped properly. If necessary, we ship plants in paper pots without disturbing roots very much.

The Truth About Dahlia Seed.





Set in rows three inches apart, or in masses, four inches apart each way. Plant in full sun, if possible, and keep down weeds. After fall frosts, lift the bulbs, remove the tops, and let them dry a few weeks under cover. Then, after removing the roots, store them in a cellar, or any cool, dry place, away from frost, for planting again in spring.
