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



### The Editor's Word

Our Centennial Year, the one hundredth anniversary of the oldest religious newspaper in the world—the HERALD OF GOSPEL LIBERTY, has come and gone. Nineteen hundred and eight came to us, as a people, full of hope and cheer; and as September 1st approached, to many there came a spirit of praise and thanksgiving to God for leading Elias Smith, just one hundred years before, to give to the world the first religious newspaper. What a tremendous power the religious press has since become!

As a band of Christian workers we have nothing to boast about, but we have very much for which we ought to be sincerely thankful; and, after all, the spirit of thankfulness is much more becoming to the Christian than the spirit of boasting.

Our opportunities for the past one hundred years have been great and, in a large degree, they have been well met. Our early ministers, with all their failings, were strong men. They knew God; they had real access to the throne of grace; they organized churches and conferences—many of which we, with all our machinery, have let go down; they knew how to get men to see Jesus Christ face to face; they laid well the foundations upon which we are building, and our utter or partial failures are not due to any negligence on their part. We know nothing of hardships, sacrifices or discouraging times as compared with what they encountered. God blessed their labors abundantly, and they have entered into rest.

When the people gather one hundred years hence to celebrate the second centennial of religious journalism, what will they be able to truthfully say of us who now are paving the way for them? Will we appear to them as faithful stewards—men and women who put Christ first in all we attempt to do; or will they tell the truth when they shall say that we were mere office-seekers, self-promoters and self-boasters? God grant that the chain may not be weak where we are the links.

As I did not know that I was to edit the ANNUAL this year till the sixth of October, I want to emphasize my gratitude to the conference clerks and others for the promptness with which they have responded to the requests for the material. Some things are omitted because it has not been possible for me, nor for others, in the short time we have had, to get at the facts.

Trusting that this 1909 volume may be a blessing to your home and church, and that, in the kindness of your heart, you will appreciate its value and minify its mistakes, I am

# Wherever It May Lead

In a late issue of a "higher critic" paper (one of the destructive kind) I found a commendation of "the open mind, the willinguess to follow truth wherever it may lead."

Such an attitude of mind is much praised by a set of sophists whose own minds are stubbornly closed. They themselves are not "willing to follow truth," unless it leads to denial of the supernatural events of the Bible. Instead of following broad, lofty, pro-

found and divine truth, they demand that men follow them, although they cannot scientifically demonstrate their doubts. Any evidence that leads to belief in the historical statements of the Bible, they will not follow; no matter how trustworthy it may be.

They will not follow truth, unless it leads to their own opinions. Anything contradicting their opinions, they assume not to be truth. But in their following other so-called truth that does lead to their own opinions, they are not following at all. They are simply standing still, except as they sink in the quagnire of their own materialistic doubt.

They also assume that all Christians that do not, like them, close their minds to the testimony of honest witnesses, are not willing to follow truth.

These sophists close their minds to all statements of the Bible, except those which their tremendous egotism makes them believe that they would know without the revelation of the Book. That is, instead of having open minds, they seal up their minds with the concrete of egotism and materialism, lest the truth of God may lead them to childlike faith. They are not willing to follow "truth wherever it may

lead," unless it leads to doubt of Christian witnesses. That is, their minds are open to sophistry that "leads" to loss of hope, but hardly "open" to faith that leads to heaven.

I charge them with defective mentality, notwithstanding their assumptions of superior intelligence. Their defective mentality, interwoven with doubt, (. . .doubt, which always withers courage, dims hope, and narrows heroic impulses,) results in defective character;—not that they are necessarily un-Christian, or anti-Christian; but they are defective. They lack in that willingness to believe, that marks the child, and which so delighted Jesus (Matt. 18:2-3):—"And he called to him a little child, and set him in the midst of them, and said, Verily I say unto you, Except ye turn, and become as little children, ye shall in no wise enter into the kingdom of heaven."

The sophists are unlike children. That which they misname truth, and which they boast of being willing to follow, *closes* their minds and hearts to childlike belief.

These theological pedants call themselves "liberal;" but there is no student whose mind is so closed to truth as the critics who enter on the study of the Bible, determined not to believe in miracles. They are superstitious, instead of being open. They cannot believe Luke, but they believe Pfleiderer. They cannot believe Matthew, but they believe Harnack. They cannot believe John, but they believe R. J. Campbell. They cannot believe Jesus, but they believe in themselves.

How superstitious they are!!! They cannot believe that Jesus is the Son of God; but they believe that a "higher critic" is the son of some kind of "primordial cell," or bacillus, or a pollywog. They are so "advanced" that they cannot follow the truth of the New Testament that leads to the hills of righteousness; but they are so superstitious that they follow the scent of their own—skepticism into the bogs of doubt, where their unconsciousness of the foul odors they breathe makes them consider those believers "old fogies," who shrink from foul smells, because accustomed to the purer air of the hills of God, where grow the flowers of faith, hope and love.

\* \* \* \* \*

But the point, the great point, in this whole discussion, is not understood by the antagonists of Christian, childlike faith. It is this:—In this creation of which we are a part, there is so much truth that it is impossible for any man to learn it all.

There are some statements of science, which, taken by themselves, seem to be true; but when taken in connection with general knowledge, in connection with relation to other truth, in connection with bearing on other truth, are found to be unreliable. The true scientist always ceases to defend such a principle, when he discovers its fact-isolation, or its unreliability, even if he does not wholly deny it; and he is sure to ignore it as a working hypothesis.

And so we should do in spiritual things. We should not follow doubt, or skepticism: for it begins in the unproved, and ends in the unproved. It is not in harmony with the true heroism of humanity. Faith makes the hero; doubt makes the coward. Therefore Jesus commands to "believe." But believe in him.

Truth?

Another feature of the discussion:

There are many things that are deadly, . . . that are true. God has put before us thorns as well as figs. There are volcanoes as certainly as wheatfields. It is as true that there is poison, as that there is food.

In Jacksonville, Illinois, it was *true* that a young medical student had been experimenting on himself with a poisonous medicine. It was *true* that he rushed into a restaurant, took a seat, and called hastily for strong coffee. It was *true* that the waiter delayed to bring the coffee. It was *true* that the young physician leaned on the table in deepening sleep. It was *true* that he never awoke. The succession of material *truths* led to death.

Oh! there is so much that is true. There is darkness as truly as light. There are hawks as truly as doves. The serpent as truly acts its nature, when it bites one child, as the dog when it saves another child.

There are oceans of truth. There are continents of truth. One kind of truth lifts to heaven. Another kind smites to hell. Technical truth embraces the desert waste, as certainly as the fertile farm. Truth lurks in the bubonic plague of India, as certainly as in the pure air of Colorado. Shall we wander in the desert because it has truth? Shall we follow the plague, "wherever it may lead," because it is true? Such doctrine leads to filth. The vulture, or buzzard, gorging itself in the putrefying richness of the decaying carcass truly acts its nature, and in the materialistic sense is true; but who would follow the vulture "wherever it may lead?"

Goldwin Smith, the skeptic, boasting in the New York Sun not long ago of the increase of skepticism, seemed to shrink from the terminal station of infidelity. He said:—"We are confronted with the great question what the world would be without religion, without trust in Providence, without hope or fear of a hereafter. Social order is threatened. Nations quake with fear of change. The leaders of humanity in the future may even find it necessary to make up by an increase of the powers of government for the lost influence of religion." \* \* \* So the skeptic writes. That is it.

When religion fails, might will make right. We will return to the stone age, and the suitor will knock down his maiden with a club. "The wolf will" not "lie down with the lamb;" but the lion among men will eat the kid. The infidelity of the wolf's den will bring mankind again to the cavern of the beast. Shall we follow it "wherever it may lead?"

\* \* \* \*

Then, in following truth, it is a matter of selection. Every thinker is only following that portion of universal truth, of which he has become aware. Even though he may be following truth, (unless he takes care) the portion of truth the adventurer really follows may be so related to other truth, or to, the facts of God's government, or to the other portion of truth, or to that which Jesus calls "the truth," that he may walk straight (truly) toward a bog, or a precipice: for these features of the continent of materialistic truth are as real as meadows or hillsides.

Therefore the point is, to select truth to follow that leads to heaven, and not to hell; truth that saves men from sin; truth that leads to dove-like harmlessness, and not to serpent-like malice; truth that leads to lamb-like innocence, and not to wolf-like ferocity; truth that leads to faith, and not to doubt; truth that leads to love, and not to hate; truth that leads to the spiritual, and not to the materialistic; truth that leads to the loving society of angelic beings, and not to the animal caves of snarling critics.

Why not follow the truth that leads upward? Why not follow the truth that leads to heaven? There is plenty of truth that exalts the character. That is the truth to follow. Let the other truth alone. You cannot follow everything. "Let thy eye be single; and thy whole body shall be full of light."

# American Christian Convention Greetings

President American Christian Convention.

Two years have come and gone since the American Christian Convention met at Huntington, Indiana. How swiftly time flies. It seems but yesterday since we were

greeting each other from the different parts of our Zion. Many came to that Convention anxious for the best things; anxious for measures to be adopted that would prove an impetus to our work in general. Some feared complications that would impede our progress. But God was with us and by the aid of His Spirit it was demonstrated most clearly that "All things work together for good to them that love God."

There were many encouraging signs in that Convention. One was, the delegates came with well matured plans for future work which showed that they had given it much careful study. Many new plans were adopted; all of which we cannot now discuss. Some of the work inaugurated has been tried and it is not entirely clear to all that it was the best thing. But one could hardly expect that all the work set on foot by a great body like that would meet the approbation of all.

The greatest difficulty I see in launching new methods of work is that we expect

results too quickly. It takes time to get new machinery properly adjusted so it will run smoothly. What we need to do is to watch most carefully that we do not get so much machinery that we cannot adjust it properly. This is a day of organization. This is perfectly right, provided we do not have more organization than power to make it run smoothly. I fear in our conventions, conferences and churches, we have come to depend too much on machinery and not enough on the power that cometh from above, which we must have to keep our machinery moving. There is a possibility of having too

much head for the body. We need to be very careful in our departmental work that we do not spend dollars to take care of cents. In others words, we must watch carefully that the outlay is justified by our income. On the other hand, we must not husband our resources so closely that we cripple our work. I remember distinctly when I was agent of the Christian Publishing Association, and Dr. Summerbell was editor, we were ordered by the Board to rent cheaper quarters. We obeyed. We took quarters where, in cold winter days, we were compelled to wear overshoes to keep our feet warm, the rooms were so cold. The Board said we must husband our resources. correct. Then the Agent was required to visit conferences from early spring until late fall and conduct the business of the House, too. Now we have better quarters; the Agent and Editor, and all the other officers, have nice, comfortable offices. Agent has all the help he needs in the office and a Field Agent to visit conferences, and all he has to do is to look after business at the House. I have often wondered whether we should not husband resources when we have more as well as when we have less. I have been anxiously hoping that we might reach the point when our Christian Publishing Association and other departments might have a surplus to be used in church extension. Hope we may soon see that day.

The report from the recent session of our Mission Board is certainly humiliating to every member of the Christian Church. The Board is not to blame. I say it with all due respect, yet I am confirmed in my belief, and that is, it is another case of too much machinery for the amount of power we have to run it. May it not be a case of costing too much money to handle our small resources. The Board is only doing, can only do, what the Convention made it possible for them to do. Our secretaries are not to blame; they are doing, and working hard, too, in carrying out the plans adopted by the Convention. I thought then, I think now, that we overloaded our Mission Department. Time has proven it. I am more sorry than I can tell that the salaries of our secretaries and other officers had to be reduced, and some of our missionaries retained for a year. Too bad. Yet we must commend the Board for doing what they did. Better do that than create a debt. We must also commend our officers in acquiescing. It was generous. There are only two ways out of the dilemma. Raise more money to justify better wages, or fewer officers to do the work.

The arrangement between the joint Boards of the American Christian Convention and the Christian Publishing Association by which a field agent was employed and sent out in the interest of the joint Boards, will be discontinued at the close of this year. It did not prove satisfactory from a financial standpoint. Time alone will tell how much good the field agent, Dr. Burnett, and our mission secretaries have done in their visitations among our conferences and churches. I am sure the departments they represented received an impetus for greater effort in the future. I hope I shall not be understood as opposing either these brethren in their work, nor the Convention in the plan. I am ready to stand by any plan adopted until the time comes to put more life into it or discontinue it. But I am not in favor of going along at a poor, dying rate and thus suffer humiliation. If any department is loaded too heavily to move off at a good, lively gait, unload some of it. If the load is not heavy enough, load on more. will pull my share. When I drive a team I would rather put on a load my horses could walk off with at a lively gait than to overload them and stick in the mud, or break a wheel. May God's blessing be upon all our work and workers. "With malice toward none, and love for all."



# Our Foreign Missions

For general information the organization of our mission fields may be indicated. Japan Mission: President, Rev. A. D. Woodworth, D. D., Tokyo; Secretary, Rev. C. P. Garman, Sendai; Treasurer, Rev. E. C. Fry, Utsunomiya. Our other Japan missionaries are Mrs. Susie V. Fry, at Utsunomiya; Miss Alice True, recently returned to Japan, probably located at Ishinomaki; Rev. and Mrs. E. K. McCord, South Westerlo, N. Y., now on furlough. Nine missionaries to Japan.

Porto Rican Mission: Rev. and Mrs. D. P. Barrett, Ponce; Rev. and Mrs. T. E. White, Salinas; Miss Jennie Mishler, Leaf River, Ill., now on furlough. Five missionaries.

Two schools: Tokyo Bible Training School, Rev. A. D. Woodworth, director; Utsunomiya Christian Girls' School, Mrs. Susie V. Fry, principal.

Of the Japan Christian Conference and the Porto Rican Christian Conference I will speak later.

Our foreign work has proved very prosperous during the past year. From Japan Miss True has been absent all the year, and the McCords since last January. And yet the results of the work there are very encouraging. The figures for the past year are as follows: Church members, 657; resident members, 316; baptisms, 123; dismissals or removals, 8; money collected, \$406.78; Sunday-school enrollment, 1865; average attendance, 1,143; enrolled in other Bible classes, 436; average attendance, 277; Endeavor Societies, 3. As compared with one year ago, the gains have been: Members, 115; resident members, 47; baptisms, 43; money collected, \$141.73; Sunday-school enrollment, 688; average attendance, 72; other Bible classes, enrollment, 87; average attendance, 71.

In Porto Rico also there have been drawbacks to the work, including the absence of the Barretts early in the year, and of Miss Mishler since April. And yet the annual reports indicate gains. The figures are as follows: Members, 169; baptisms, 22; expulsions, 13; Sunday-school enrollment, 438; average attendance at all services, 270; membership of other Bible classes, 40; candidates waiting, 33; money collected, \$128.88. As compared with last year the gains are as follows: Members, 23; Sunday-school enrollment, 76; money collected, \$5.95.

The loss of a Porto Rican preacher proved a setback to some of our work. Attention is called to the number of candidates in waiting for baptism and church membership. There are good prospects for the organization of two new churches.

One feature of the Porto Rican work is not at all satisfactory, namely, that with a single exception all our preaching places are rented buildings, and the rents are continually increasing, as the demand for houses increases. It certainly is not wise to continue paying rent, when perhaps three years' rent in some places would build a chapel ample for years to come. It is time for us to study economy in this direction.

We have three fields in Japan, and each has prospered. There has been considerable progress toward self-support, and probably within a year or two the Tokyo church will reach the point of self-support. In the Utsunomiya field there have been keen opposition and some setbacks, in spite of which advance is recorded. The largest gains of all have been in the Sendai field, and in the Sendai church.

Both the Tokyo Bible Training School and the Utsunomiya Christian Girls' School have continued work for the twelve months past with an unusual accompaniment of light and shadow. At last reports our Training School had only five or six students,

while eleven were enrolled in the Girls' School. Dr. Woodworth and Mrs. Fry have worked hard as the heads of their respective schools, and have seen good results.

During our missionary year 1907-8 the sum of \$13,080.17 was invested in our foreign work, \$4,242.44 in Porto Rico, and \$8,111.61 in Japan. For the coming year the appropriations for those fields are \$3,800 and \$8,800 respectively. As will be observed, this is a severe retrenchment. Rev. E. K. McCord and Miss Jennie Mishler have their furloughs extended with greatly reduced allowance; Miss Alice True is to go back on \$400 salary, at her request; and the Girls' School will receive no money from the general appropriation, but must depend on the special gifts for the School's use.

By the action of the Rhode Island and Massachusetts Conference in assuming the support of Rev. Saburo Koshiba, who goes back to Japan to engage with our Mission, his excellent ability and splendid educational training will be available for developing stronger pastors and workers in Japan.

The conferences in Japan and Porto Rico have no organic connection with the brotherhood in the United States. The former conference meets in the spring, and is composed of Japanese pastors, representatives of the churches, and the missionaries of the Christian Church. Ten churches are listed: Tokyo, Oji, Akabane, Utsunomiya, Sendai, Ishinomaki, Wakuya, Wakayanagi, Tsukidae, and Ichinoseki. Rev. T. Kitano, Sendai, is president, and Rev. Y. Irokawa. Utsunomiya, is secretary. The ministers enrolled are: Rev. M. Matsuno, Tokyo; Rev. Mr. Naruse, Oji; Rev. Y. Irokawa. Utsunomiya: Rev. T. Kitano, Sendai; Rev. M. Sakurai, Wakuya; Rev. F. Takahashi, Ichinoseki; Rev. T. Matsukawa, Tsukidate. Licentiates: Mr. D. Akano, Ishinomaki; Mr. Ishigaki, Otawara; Mr. Kano, Tokyo; Mr. A. Muraoka, Wakayanagi; Mr. N. Nakamura, Iwaideyama; Mr. K. Tsujimura, Akabane. Bible Women: Miss Ren Hamaguchi, Tokyo; Miss Shirato, Tokyo; Mrs. Watanabe, Akabane; Mrs. Katsura, Utsunomiya; Mrs. Ishigaki, Otawara; Mrs. Y. Takahashi, Ichinoseki.

The Porto Rican Conference meets annually in February. It consists of ministers and representatives of the churches, and the American missionaries. Rev. T. E. White, Salinas, is president; Miguel Angel Rivera, secretary; and Rev. D. P. Barrett, Ponce, treasurer.

Four other persons besides missionaries are now in Porto Rico who lend what help they can to the work of our mission: Misses Ethel Culver and Isabel Geiser, of Dayton, school teachers on the island, and Rev. and Mrs. W. C. McCloud, who have recently gone to the island to engage in teaching.

# Home Missions

The second year of the organization of our Home Mission work into a separate department affords some encouragement.

First, the receipts have been the largest of any year since we began work through the Convention, except the one year when the Porto Rico work was carried as Home Missions, and larger than the receipts of that year, less the portion that was designated for Porto Rico.

Second, the reports of the workers show larger results than in any previous year, except in one or two items. More workers have been employed than ever before and there has been greater co-operation from conferences and other organizations.

Third, the general interest in Home Mission work is increasing among the churches. The Home Mission Secretary has spent about one-third of his time in the field during the year ending October 1, 1908. Conferences and churches were ready to hear the reports of the work and the statement of the conditions which require it.

The efforts of the department have been mainly directed as heretofore to the cities and towns. There can be no turning away from this task. For two reasons the Christians must continue to direct their efforts to gaining or retaining a foothold in the centers of population. We need it in order to conserve our forces. The constant drift toward the cities is weakening the country churches, and many of them will not be able to maintain themselves. New churches must be organized to take the place of those which the shifting of the population puts out of business, or which are lost through other causes. The gain must be made where the people are and we find them in increasing numbers in the towns and cities. But we also are bound to keep up this effort because of the responsibility which rests upon us, as upon all religious organizations, to help in solving the city problem. Here the great battle of our American Christian civilization is being fought out and here we must do our share.

At the same time the necessity of maintaining country and small village churches, and of planting new churches in the new portions of our land must be recognized. The great opportunity of the Christians on the Pacific Coast has been too long neglected. In North Dakota, South Dakota, Montana, Wyoming, Colorado, Oklahoma and Western Canada, representatives of our churches are on the ground, and are calling insistently for reinforcements.

The more we do, the larger the field becomes. The success of our mission work is the cause of its distress. This is as true on the home field as on the foreign. Every new position occupied brings to view twice or thrice as many desirable openings.

Failure to keep pace with the work undertaken in the offerings secured from the churches compelled a slight readjustment of the home work for the present year. Less field work will be undertaken by the Home Mission Secretary. In some cases smaller salaries and allowances will be paid. Some urgent requests for aid had to be granted on condition that money for the special purpose is placed in the hands of the Board. Every effort will be made to develop new resources and employ new agencies, so that the year may show no less accomplishment in all directions.

Two great movements outside of our denominational activities may be looked to for added inspiration and help. The Home Mission Council, organized in New York City early in the year 1908, is to be composed of representatives of all missionary organizations operating within the bounds of the United States. Mutual counsel and co-operation, and for this year, a great publicity campaign conducted in the larger cities of the East, will be its especial care. Also the Federation of thirty-two denominations, represented in the Federal Council of the Churches of Christ in America, with a standing committee on Home Missions to co-operate with the Home Missions Council, is likely to result in greatly increased interest and effectiveness.

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# The Work of the Schools and of the Educational Department

The financial stringency of the year was felt early and keenly by the schools, increasing the hardship of the hardworking teachers, diminishing or delaying the very modest salaries of not a few. The spirit, however, has been not complaining, but enduring as good soldiers.

### THE GAINS.

Notwithstanding the difficulties, most of the institutions have made definite and permanent progress. Franklinton College is not yet able to occupy the needed new plant on the farm, but looks forward by faith to the not distant day when this shall be realized.

Elon College has had her best year, and has entered upon what it is hoped will be yet a better. The Biblical Institute occupies her new hall and has increased the endowment to above \$100,000. This is by far the best equipment and endowment ever at the service of our divinity students. The board of trustees has been reorganized under the laws of Ohio, and the faculty reorganized by reason of Prof. Lester Howard's withdrawal to the pastorate.

Defiance College continues to increase the enrollment, the equipment and the teaching force. The two institutions at Defiance are coming to constitute a center of educational power of greater measure than we have heretofore nourished. The reorganization and readjustment at Union Christian College bears even more fruit than last

year. The number of students promises to exceed the largest on record. The ladies' dormitory has been modernized, and a residence built for the president. Palmer College is encouraged, and developing new vigor. Starkey Seminary has had all the boys she could accommodate, and is surpassing in various respects the work of the ordinary preparatory school. Her graduates carry with ease and with honor the courses of the strongest colleges and universities, attributing their success to thorough preparation. The Seminary has installed a complete water system with a reservoir three-quarters of a mile from the main buildings.

The McMaster colony increases in numbers and spirit and in favor with our brethren and with the University corporation and faculty. Our people of the farther South have organized an academy in Georgia, and the colony at Jirch, Converse Co., Wyoming, is laying the foundation for a college organization. The hardest struggle of all has been in our Missouri and Kansas schools, which are neither largely endowed nor surrounded by strong forces organized into churches and conferences. The school at Lincoln, Kansas, in particular, is passing through a crisis, occasioned by the adoption of state laws, whereby the tuition of students living outside a public high school district, is paid at a public high school, from the public taxes. This turns to the public high schools so many of the students upon which the College has depended, that both enrollment and income are seriously decreased. What readjustment will be necessary to meet such needs as are not in that section supplied, is yet undetermined, but the brethren who have so long stood back of Kansas Christian College, await developments and the leading of the great Teacher.

The greatest gains and the most encouraging prospects are in the states of our most concentrated strength—North Carolina, Ohio, and Indiana.

### THE RESULTS OF CO-OPERATION.

In these states our forces are sufficiently numerous to engender enthusiasm, which seeing something worthy attained is emboldened to undertake greater things. Where our greatest strength is should, in the nature of things, be our strongest schools.

### THE EDUCATIONAL OFFERING.

Receipts for the fiscal year, Sept. 1, 1907 to Aug. 31, 1908, are slightly more than \$1,900. Though a small part of the total expense of maintaining our several schools, this amount has greatly aided in meeting these expenses. The effort of the Board of Education is to appropriate the small amount at their disposal so as to be most productive of good.

No investment is bringing better returns to the churches than that in education. Larger sums so placed will return accordingly larger dividends. We can afford to double the investment. We cannot afford not to increase it.

### THE CORRESPONDENCE COURSE.

This has been completed and published, and the inquiries indicate interest upon the part of those for whom the course should mean most. A booklet giving the list of instructors, the courses offered, the terms, and general information may be had by addressing the secretary of education.

### HOW THE SCHOOLS HELP.

Were the work of the schools appreciated generally, their support would be increased if not multiplied. This work is not only of instruction but of character molding. By the first, the youth sees facts and their relation; by the second he should find his studies so many ways of approaching the secrets of Jehovah. The sincere student should grow into the reverent scholar, who is in this century the most potent personality among men. This primacy results from the blending of reverence

and wisdom—reverence, with its consequent humility and spiritual healthfulness; scholarship, with its breadth of sympathy and vision. Such men, from class room, pulpit, press, platform and practical business occupations are more decidedly shaping human affairs than are generals, statesmen, inventors or organizers of great industries, for they are making leaders in all of these and all other lines.

Christian scholarship, from a basis of facts observable, presents the conception of God as operating in His present world, hence the phenomena of force and life. But this God, whose workings are evident in nature—over all, and through all, and in all—is the Father revealed in Jesus Christ by whom He is drawing men unto Himself. The high privilege of Christian scholarship is to help youth attain such religious faith as shall be not at war with what is everywhere learned from science, but seeing God's world as one, His work as everywhere consistent, and His word as revealing divine sympathy and purpose all inclusive, shall confidently rest upon him the foundation of thought, ambition, life and character, and shall build all these in harmony with the divine plan.

To promote such knowledge, purpose, and service, is the aim of the church schools. Is it a worthy aim? Is it worthy our best encouragement and support? Are we rendering that of which it is worthy?

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# The Sunday-School Department

BY REV. THOS. S. WEEKS,

Your secretary had intended to have a full statistical report for publication in this ANNUAL, but owing to the delay in issuing the new set of blanks we were unable to get returns from the conferences in time for this issue. The reports are being made up and may be published in other form later on, but henceforth it is our purpose to publish the Sunday-school statistics of the year in the ANNUAL.

This has been a Red-Letter year in Sunday-school work. The great event of the year has been the Twelfth International Sunday-school Convention held in Louisville, Ky., June 18-23.

Among the items of interest at that convention we find the following:

The Uniform Lesson System and the Graded Lesson System both received hearty endorsement, and each will be given its fullest possible development by the International Lesson Committee.

In 1905 there were 155,007 Sunday-schools, with a total enrollment of 14,127,541. In 1908 there are 170,028 Sunday-schools, with a total enrollment of 15,110,172. Gain: almost a million members.

For the triennium closing in 1905, \$56,000 was given for the work. For the triennium just closed, the amount was \$106,000. For the triennium to come, it is likely to be \$150,000.

San Francisco will be the place of the next Convention, in 1911.

The International Sunday-school work has to do chiefly with matters of Sunday-school Method, and Sunday-School Lessons. The American Sunday-School Union undertakes the missionary work along Sunday-school lines,

From the last report of the American Sunday-school Union we take the following statement regarding the work of last year:

"There were under commission 272 missionaries; 160 for the entire year and 112 for a portion of the year. 1,821 new schools were organized in hitherto neglected neighbor-

hoods, where the children and youth had no religious privileges. Into these schools were gathered 6,838 teachers and 64,873 scholars; 710 schools were reorganized, containing 2,826 teachers and 25,965 scholars. From this it will be seen that 2,531 schools were opened, having 9,664 teachers and 90,838 scholars; 94 churches of different denominations were organized as the outcome of our schools; 44 new churches have been built, regular preaching has been provided in many communities where churches have not yet been organized, and 362 Young People's Societies have been formed. The missionaries have devoted much time during the fall and winter in conducting evangelistic services, and as a result 11,386 hopeful conversions have been reported."

Thus we see how the Sunday-school movement is in the fore among the evangelizing agencies of the land.

In numerical strength, in financial support, and in all matters of organization the movement has made rapid strides, but as says the *Sunday-School Magazine* of the American Church: "It is evident that there is coming to the front a deeper sense of the importance of the spiritual factor in the religious education of children. A few years ago the air was full of cries for better methods. This was not unnatural. Sunday-school work was starved. The most barren and unattractive schoolroom, the scantiest and poorest of appointments, the most ineffective and disappointing work, all this put the Sunday-school at a tremendous disadvantage. The correction of these defects has not yet been fully reached. But there is a stronger and growing interest. Conferences, educational classes, better manuals and courses of study, finer maps and models and a higher standard of teaching—these will show large results in the near future."

Fundamental to much of this is the consecration of the individual teacher, and this is manifest in all lands where the Sunday-school work is in touch with these great organizations which give it impulse and aid.

Regarding Sunday-school conditions in England, a writer in the *Sunday-School Chronicle* says: "There are signs of a widespread, deepening interest in their work on the part of teachers. They appear to be endeavoring to better equip themselves for the discharge of their duties under a fuller sense of their responsibilities. The church as a whole appears to be waking up to some realization of what may be expected from its members, and those among us who are most closely watching the 'signs of the times' are sanguine that the best days of the Sunday-school are yet to come."

Among the promising movements of the past year we call attention to the findings of a Conference of Sunday-school workers representing eleven denominations and 10,000,000 members, held in Boston, January 2, 3, 1908. There are many items of interest among these "findings," but we call special attention to the first section, which reads as follows:

"This Conference appreciates the fact that in many theological seminaries of our country, members of their faculties are active workers in the Sunday-school, either as officers, or more generally as teachers, thus impressing their own students with their high regard for the Sunday-school. This Conference is also encouraged with the increased attention which in theological seminaries is being paid to fitting their students for their future pastoral Sunday-school work:

"And this Conference would suggest, in recognition of the importance of the Sunday school in its relations to the church, that the seminaries not already fully equipped should enlarge their courses in principles and methods in Sunday-school work, either under the direction of the present members of their faculties, or by adding a new member to their teaching corps, or at least by furnishing an annual course of lectures, or by uniting with other seminaries, not too far removed, in employing one instructor who shall serve them all in rotation."

This is a right move in the right direction, as it will help to make of every pastor a Sunday-school man.

As to the value of the Sunday-school here is the testimony of one who has opportunity to know the truth of his statement: "The Sunday-school is of more value to a community than a police force and of more value to the nation than standing armies. It should have the personal support of every member of the church."—Judge Carter.

The great forward movement of the Convention was the unanimous vote to instruct the Lesson Committee to prepare Courses of Graded Lessons as well as the Uniform System which has been in use so long, and every school desiring to use graded lessons for all the school or for any department may do so after October, 1909. It remains for the schools to say what they wish to do in this matter, and we hope for such concert of action as will make possible the best results from our teaching and also the largest possible profit to our Publishing Association.

The schools that use the graded lessons should not be compelled to buy them of other publishers, and yet the Association cannot afford to publish both systems unless there is a patronage large enough to insure a reasonable profit from the sale. This is a serious question which we must face in the near future. The publication of the Sunday-school Helps is the main source of profit to the Christian Publishing Association, and the cost of publishing two systems will greatly diminish that profit. Our workers must consider this question, and seek to harmonize the interests of the Publishers and the Sunday-schools.

We believe this can best be done by a general adoption of the Graded System of Lessons whon they are presented by the International Lesson Committee. The membership of this committee is as follows:

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# The Department of Finance

There is very little for me to say in reference to the department of which I am, by vote of the body, secretary. The only fund in my possession is the endowment fund of five hundred dollars left us by Dr. J. T. Robinson of Ohio. This fund came into my hands in the year 1902, and from the sum of five hundred dollars it has grown to be worth about six hundred and twenty-five dollars, as it has been loaned out from time to time. At the present date four hundred dollars is loaned at five per cent interest.


The money from the annual American Christian Convention collection from the churches goes direct to Rev. J. F. Burnett, and from this collection, year by year, he pays the annual expenses of the American Christian Convention; and if these yearly offerings brought to Brother Burnett as much as they ought, we would have a surplus every year, and that might be added to the endowment fund. But there has not been any year so far that the offerings for the American Christian Convention have more than met its expenses, and sometimes it has had to borrow money to pay its way. This ought not to be, and 1 do hope the time will come when all our churches will see the need and the opportunity of supporting the American Christian Convention with means to carry on its work more effectively.

Perhaps some may ask the question: Why do the collections for the American Christian Convention go direct to Brother Burnett and he pay the expenses without the money going through my hand? My answer is: That it is done that way to save expense and work. Brother Burnett can prepare and send out the call and receive the collections much better than 1, as he has office help and all the experience of years in the work.

I could not undertake to do all the work involved in preparing and sending out all the necessary notices. So the Board agreed to adopt the present system of work. Brother Burnett makes his report annually to the Board, and his books are open at any time for the inspection of any one in authority to inspect, just as mine would be if I were doing, the work.

Trusting there may be a more generous response to the American Christian Convention offerings, and with best New Year wishes to all our officers and all our people, I am yours in the King's service.

# The Aged Ministers' Home

The Home was incorporated in 1894 and located at Castile, N. Y., but has recently been removed to Lakemont, N. Y. The previous location was fixed upon because it was the home of Mrs. L. L. Sellon, who was the moving spirit in the foundation of the Home and because suitable available property could be had at a bargain.

Through the generosity of several friends, the first cost of the Home, amounting to \$1,300.00, was met, and later through the kindness of the late F. A. Palmer, of New York City, the Home was enlarged and a sum of ten thousand dollars was given as a partial endowment. This sum should be doubled at an early day by those who are able to do so. And any amount towards it will be cheerfully received, and acknowledged, as has been done heretofore in the case of the many who have contributed to its support.

Eight of our ministers or their widows, including Mrs. Sellon, have been buried from the Home. Mrs. B. S. Fanton and Mrs. Calvin Thorn died last winter, leaving the Home vacant so far as inmates are concerned. Since that time the Home has been cared for by Mr. Alden Allen and his good wife, who is the efficient matron. Merton Phelps, the resident trustee at Castile, moved away. The Trustees of the Palmer Fund could seldom get to Castile, though much interested in the Home, and as a desirable property was available at Lakemont, the Home empty of inmates, and the Fund ready to help liberally towards the removal, it was deemed advisable to effect the change which was made about Oct. 1, 1908.

Considerable repairs have been made on the new purchase, and a commodious home well furnished, pleasantly situated, in close and easy walking distance to the Christian Temple at Lakemont, is now ready for the worthy needy ones from the East and the South, the North, and the West. There are four acres of ground for shade and flowers, for garden and fruit, with an abundance of fruit trees, berries and grapes.

The Christian Church at large should interest themselves in this Eden of comfort and plenty for old age; and should see that every worthy and needy one who is eligible to admission is encouraged and helped to go to the Home—this home of the blessed. 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# Our Publishing Interests

At the first meeting of the Christian General Book Association, held at the Christian Chapel in New York City, the following persons were selected as an *Executive Committee*:

### STEPS TO INCORPORATE.

At this session the following was passed:

Resolved: That our Executive Committee be instructed to take measures immediately to have this association incorporated according to law.

The third annual meeting of the Christian General Book Association was held at Stafford, New York, October 5, 6 and 7, 1842. The meeting was called to order by Elder John Ross, Secretary of the Executive Committee.

### FIRST PUBLISHING AGENT.

At this session Elder Seth Marvin was made Publishing Agent.

FIRST STEPS TAKEN WHICH LED TO THE CHRISTIAN PUBLISHING ASSOCIATION LATER. It was at this session that the following was passed:

Resolved, unanimously, That the petition of the Ohio delegation, for the concurrence of this body to publish a periodical in the State of Ohio, as soon as the times will admit, auxiliary to *The Christian Palladium*, to be under the direction and control of an association to be organized by the Christian Conference in the Western States be granted

Fourth meeting of Christian General Book Association was held at Union Mills. New York, October 7, 8 and 9, 1846.

Elder J. Hazen called the meeting to order.

### OFFICERS ELECTED.

President, Elder Elijah Shaw; Secretaries, Elders John Ross and W. R. Stowe.

### EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

Elder Jasper Hazen, David Ford, John Ross, Joseph Badger, Ezra Marvin, W. R. Stowe, J. E. Church, Jason McKee, 1ra Allen, Thomas Henry, Nicholas Summerbell and Edmund Chadwick.

At this session of the Association reference was made to other publications by the church besides those issued by this Association. A resolution was made that The Executive Committee be directed to request our brethren in New Hampshire, Ohio and Canada, engaged in publishing periodicals and books, to unite with them in publishing at Albany or Troy, N. Y., a weekly paper and a monthly magazine and to merge all our periodicals now published "on terms of perfect reciprocity."

The publications referred to, were, in New Hampshire, *The Herald of Gospel Liberty*, by some one of the names it has been published under: in Ohio, the *Gospel Herald*, published by the Ohio Christian Book Association, which had probably been organized in response to the spirit of the resolution passed at the Quadrennial meeting of the Christian General Book Association in 1842. A plan was adopted at this session, in

1844, as a basis for the consolidation of these different interests. While there was no immediate consolidation of interests, yet the spirit manifested was one of fraternity and brotherly fellowship. I quote one of the resolutions passed:

Resolved, That in the union proposed there be three editors, one residing at the place of publication, and one corresponding editor in the east, and one in the west; the first in each section to be appointed by the association now existing there.

Fifth meeting of the Christian General Book Association was held at Marion, New York, beginning Wednesday, Oct. 2, 1850.

Elder J. Hazen was made editor of the Christian Palladium, as appears by the report of the Committee on Finance.

I quote somewhat extensively from this report because it shows the plan of the business and the financial condition of the Association.

### FINANCIAL CONDITION OF THE ASSOCIATION.

The organization being perfected on the afternoon of the first day, the Financial Committee made report of their doings and of the condition of the Association. From this it appeared that for the current editorial term, commencing May, 1847, and ending May, 1851, a contract was made with Elder J. Hazen to take the property of the Association, and to assume its liabilities; and also to publish its paper, *The Christian Palladium*, on his own pecuniary risk, agreeing to pay to the Association the sum of \$150.00 per year. On this arrangement the paper was published.

The new Hymn-Book, or "Christian Psalms," by an agreement with the Executive Committee, was published as the primitive property and on the pecuniary responsibility of Elder J. Hazen; he pledging himself to place it in the hands of the Association whenever they would pay him the expense incurred on its publication.

The property of the association, at the close of the present editorial term, will be "the Philips bequest of one thousand dollars, six hundred dollars then due on the contract with Elder Hazen, the stereotype plates of the old hymn-book, 'Christian Hymns,' together with its interest in the subscription list of our periodicals." This interest was found to be, as reported by a special committee, the *Palladium* list of subscribers and an interest in the *Herald and Messenger* list to the amount of four hundred and fifty subscribers. The balance of the *Herald and Messenger* paper is the property of Elder Hazen. (Copied from the record.)

At this meeting of the association, it voted to separate its book affairs from the periodical department and to conduct each by itself.

### PERIODICALS,

It was decided that the periodicals should be published as at present on individual responsibility and on such terms as would best secure the interest of the association. This arrangement of matters in making of bargains and contracts was left to the Executive Committee.

### CORRESPONDING EDITORS.

Elder J. Ross, Elder Oliver Barr, Elder David Millard and W. R. Stowe were elected Corresponding Editors for the ensuing four years.

### EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE,

Chosen were: John Ross, Philetus Roberts, J. E. Brush, ———, ———, ———, E. Edmunds, M. Kidder, D. F. Ladley, W. B. Wellons and Thomas Henry.

### THE OILIO CHRISTIAN BOOK ASSOCIATION.

The Ohio Christian Book Association was organized at Ebenezer Chapel, Clark County, Ohio, April 24, 1843. Elder J. G. Reeder was selected as president and Elder E. Williamson, secretary-treasurer. The Executive Committee was Elder Jacob G. Reeder. Derostus F. Ladley, Arthur W. Sanford, Robert McCoy, and Elijah Williamson. At this meeting it was decided to publish a semi-monthly paper to be called the *Gospel Herald*, and Elder Isaac N. Walter was chosen as editor. The first number of this paper bears date Oct. 2, 1843, and was issued at New Carlisle, Ohio.

The first matter considered after the organization was the publication of a Hymnary and the association took steps to ascertain the wishes of the church upon this matter.

On October 23, 1843, the association met at New Carlisle, Clark County, Ohio. At this session a constitution and by-laws were adopted. Another meeting was held at the same place February 14, 1844. At this meeting a resolution was passed to publish a new edition of three thousand hymn-books, "providing that the paper, printing and binding can be procured on credit until the books can be sold." Elder I. N. Walter was appointed the first agent of the association at this meeting.

A meeting of the association was held March 12, 1844, at which time Elder E. W. Sanford resigned from the Executive Committee, and Elder M. D. Baker was elected to fill the vacancy. Elder E. Williamson was appointed to compile and arrange the contemplated hymn-book.

The Ohio Christian Book Association met at Covington, Ohio, April 16, 1844, and approved the hymn-book prepared by Elder Williamson.

At the session of the Association held September 9, 1844, the number of subscribers to the Gospel Herald, at the close of the first volume, was 1872, and the total amount

received from subscriptions to the first volume was \$919.25. A resolution was passed that Elder I. N. Walter continue to publish the *Gospel Herald*, as editor, at his own expense, until the termination of Volume II, and that he receive the proceeds thereof for his services and expenses.

At the session held June 10, 1845, Elder J. N. Walter resigned as agent, and Elder D. F. Ladley was appointed book agent for the association. At the meeting of the association held September 2, 1845, a similar order was made as to publishing the Gosnel Herald as the year before, I. N. Walter to be editor, but it was ordered that the office be removed to Springfield, Ohio, at the editor's expense. (On November 1, 1845, the paper was moved to Springfield, Ohio.) At a meeting held November 7, 1845, a second edition of the Christian Hymn-Book was ordered of three thousand copies.

At a meeting of the association held at Bethany Chapel, on the 14th day of December, 1846, M. D. Baker was chosen president, D. F. Ladley, secretary-treasurer, Elder I. N. Walter, publishing agent, and D. F. Ladley, secretary and book agent.

In the proceedings at this meeting, reference is made to the General Book Association of New York.

On December 16, 1846, Elder I. N. Walter tendered his resignation as editor and publishing agent, which was accepted and Elder James Williamson was appointed publishing agent, and James Williamson and James W. Marvin became editors of the paper.

At the Executive Committee meeting November 3, 1847, Levi Purviance, John Philips and D. F. Ladley appear as members of the Executive Committee. At this meeting Levi Purviance was appointed agent to collect and take subscriptions to the *Gospel Herald*: James Williamson was appointed book agent.

On October 23, 1848, the Executive Committee met at the home of M. D. Baker, near Enon, Ohio; at this meeting there were present D. Long, Levi Purviance, Philips, Baker and Ladley. A resolution was passed to publish the third edition of the Christian Hymn-Book. D. F. Ladley resigned as book agent, and M. D. Baker was appointed in his stead. John Philips was elected president; M. D. Baker, treasurer, and D. F. Ladley, secretary. James Williamson was ordered to publish Volume VI of the Gospel Herald.

On October 22, 1849, the Executive Committee met at the home of M. D. Baker, near Enon, Ohio, John Philips, president, presiding. Present also, Long, L. Purvianee, M. D. Baker, and D. F. Ladley. A report made at this time shows, "Books published and sold since last report, 2,014; also 150 books on hand at last Convention."

January 22, 1850, the Executive Committee met at Bethany Chapel, Warren County, Ohio. John Philips, president, D. F. Ladley, secretary, and M. D. Baker, treasurer and book agent. The following members were present: M. D. Baker, J. Philips, E. W. DeVore, Elias Smith and D. F. Ladley, who had been duly elected by the Ohio Christian Book Association at the meeting held at the Knob Prairie Chapel, October 24, 1849. It was resolved that J. Williamson publish Volume VII of the Gospel Herald upon his own responsibility, if the number of subscribers would justify him in so doing, and that he have the use of the press, the association is about to purchase, to publish the 7th volume of the Gospel Herald free of charge—about \$200.00 was donated to purchase a press and about one-half paid down. (April 1, 1850, Marvin resigned and Williamson became sole editor.) J. Williamson and Dr. H. C. Foster were appointed a committee to purchase a press and have it at Springfield, Ohio, before the first of April next, the cost not to exceed \$650.00.

### FIRST PRESS.

August 27, 1850, Executive Committee in session at Bethany Church, Warren County, Ohio, J. Philips, president, presiding, with members of Board all present. The committee to purchase press reported press purchased for \$735.74. The following entry was made in the records: "Heard a report from editor of *Gospel Herald*, which is very encouraging, better than ever before."

February 5, 1851, the Executive Committee met at the Fourth Street Church, Cincinnati, Ohio, John Philips, presiding.

Resolved, That James Williamson publish Volume VIII of  $Gospel\ Herald$  on his own responsibility. A report favorable to locating new press at Yellow Springs, Ohio, was made.

January 23, 1852, the Executive Committee met at Enon, Ohio. A report was made that the issue of *Gospel Herald* was over 2,000. At this meeting it was resolved that James Williamson continue the publication of the *Gospel Herald*, Volume IX, on the same conditions as Volume VIII.

The Executive Committee met at Springfield, Ohio, April 21, 1852. There were present J. Philips, president, J. R. Miller, John Ellis, John Juda, James Williamson and M. Lawrence.

On May 13, 1852, the Executive Committee met at Yellow Springs, Ohio, Elder Philips presiding. At this meeting J. R. Miller was appointed a member of the Executive Committee to fill the vacancy occasioned by the death of Elder Baker. James Williamson was made the book agent of the association, and J. R. Miller, treasurer.

On October 18, 1852, the Executive Committee met at Ebenezer Chapel, Clark County, Ohio. Present at this meeting were E. Smith, E. W. DeVore, D. F. Ladley and J. R. Miller. It was reported at this meeting that the *Gospel Herald* was more prosperous than ever before.

THE OHIO CHRISTIAN BOOK ASSOCIATION CHANGES ITS NAME TO THE WESTERN CHRISTIAN ASSOCIATION.

At a general convention or meeting of the Ohio Christian Book Association, held October 20, 1852, at Ebenezer Chapel, Clark County, Ohio, the name of the association was changed to the Western Christian Book Association. The association had gone beyond the limits of the State of Ohio and was spreading westward over the states of Indiana and Illinois, hence the demand for a more comprehensive name.

October 21, 1852, the Executive Committee of the Western Christian Book Association, which had been elected at the Convention of 1852 then just closing met for organization. It consisted of the following persons: Jacob G. Reeder, Elias Smith, John R. Miller, J. W. Walker and A. W. Sanford. This meeting was held at Ebenezer Chapel. Jacob G. Reeder was elected president, A. W. Sanford, secretary and John R. Miller,

treasurer. A resolution was passed that Volume X of the *Gospel Herald* should be published at Springfield, Ohio, and a contract made with Elder James Williamson to that effect. The contract was as follows:

"The association gives him the use of the press and material, he paying the taxes, insurance and repairs upon the same with privilege of doing job work, not interfering with the regular and proper publication of the paper. Elder Williamson agrees to publish 3,000 copies for \$3,000.00, etc." John R. Miller was appointed book agent. A contemplated change from a twice-a-month publication to more frequent publications was discussed.

March 2, 1853, the Executive Committee met at the *Herald* office, Springfield, Ohio. At this meeting J. G. Reeder, Elias Smith, John R. Miller and John W. Walker

were present. A resolution was passed that the editor be instructed to publish 3,600 copies of the *Gospel Herald* at the beginning of the Volume.

The early Christians must have been a singing people for we find at this meeting of the committee, the book agent was authorized to publish another edition of the Hymn-Book as soon as funds would justify. At this meeting it was resolved that the Gospel Herald should be published on Friday of each week.

January 12, 1854, the Executive Committee met at Springfield, Ohio. Present, J. O. Reeder, Elias Smith, John W. Walker, A. W. Sanford and John R. Miller. Officers elected at this meeting were: J. G. Reeder, president, A. W. Sanford, secretary. It was resolved: "That Volume XI of the *Gospel Herald* should be published weekly at \$1.00 per annum invariably in advance." John A. Miller resigned as book agent and Lawrence and Winchell of Yellow Springs, Ohio, were appointed in his stead. At the session of January 13th, it was resolved that Volume XI be published at Yellow Springs, Ohio, and Lawrence and Winchell were contracted with to publish the paper.

Pursuant to the resolution passed at this session the *Gospel Herald* was, on the 16th of March, 1854, moved to Yellow Springs, Ohio, where it remained until May 12, 1855, when it was moved back to Springfield, Ohio.

The contract was made with Lawrence and Winchell for one year beginning with the commencement of the publication of Volume XI. James Williamson was made editor of Volume XI of the Gospel Herald at a salary of \$550.00. This seems to have been the first time a regular salary was paid to the editor. J. G. Reeder, John R. Miller, and John W. Walker were made a committee in control of the publication. At this time the committee began the agitation of the question of incorporation of the association under the laws of the State of Ohio, and a committee was instructed to so incorporate.

From January 15, 1854, to September, 1863, no record could be found of the proceedings of the Executive Board of the Association. In 1856, however, James Maple and James Williamson became editors of the Gospel Herald, with Levi Purviance and N. Summerbell corresponding editors, and the Gospel Herald was published by John Geary and Sons at Columbus, Ohio. It was then moved to Eaton, Ohio, and published there with H. Y. Rush as editor.

September 4, 1863, the Executive Committee met at Eaton, Ohio; William Worley was chairman of the meeting, J. T. Lynn, secretary, and Elder Peter McCullough was a member of the Board. On February 11, 1864, the committee met at the home of William Worley. William Worley was president and Peter McCullough was secretary. It was resolved that the association retain the office of Gospel Herald at Eaton, Ohio. in the possession of the association.

### PUBLISHES A SABBATH-SCHOOL PAPER.

A resolution was passed that the association publish "Children's Friend." Elder E. W. Humphreys was employed to edit and publish the *Gospel Herald* for one year, being Volume XXI. and commencing on the 27th day of May, 1864, at salary of \$600.00.

March 24, 1864, the Executive Committee met at Yellow Springs. Ohio. William Worley was chairman and Peter McCullough was secretary pro tem. At this meeting it was resolved that Peter McCullough be a committee to collect the former minutes of the aforesaid committee and make a record of the same against the next meeting. This committee never seems to have reported. Evidently no record of the minutes was ever made. At this meeting Elder J. T. Lynn was made assistant editor of the Gospel Herald.

On December 13, 1865, the Executive Committee met at Richmond, Indiana. Being its first meeting after the election of the committee by the Western Christian Book Association at its session held at Ogden, Henry County, Indiana, December 14, 1864.

At this meeting William Worley had been elected president, and J. T. Lynn, secretary. On motion of W. T. Hawthorne the Executive Committee proceeded to elect a general agent in accordance with the plan adopted at the Ogden meeting. E. W. Humphreys was chosen as general agent and J. T. Lynn was elected editor of the *Gospel Herald* from December 26, 1864, to the close of the current volume.

### FIRST MEETING HELD AT DAYTON, OHIO.

January 17, 1865, the Executive Committee met at the home of Peter McCullough. Present, William Worley, C. A. Morse, and W. T. Hawthorne. It was resolved that Elders Humphreys and Lynn are released from their connection with the *Gospel Herald* as editors and publishers, and that Elder Lynn remain to superintend the issuing of No. 37 of the *Gospel Herald*. Elder Henry Y. Rush was appointed editor and publisher of the *Gospel Herald* from the 25th of January, 1865. Another meeting was held

January 31st, 1865, at the home of William Worley, at which time Elder Humphreys resigned as General Agent of the Publishing Association.

### BEGINNING OF SOLICITING FUNDS FOR PUBLISHING HOUSE.

Elder J. T. Lynn was appointed as soliciting agent for all territory west of the line of the State of Ohio and Elder Peter McCullough for all territory east of the western line of Ohio.

At a meeting of the Executive Committee held April 6, 1865, at Ogden, Henry County, Indiana, William Worley presiding, Peter McCullough was continued as soliciting agent in the same territory as before and W. A. Gross was appointed in all territory west of the east line of the State of Indiana. At this meeting Elder Peter McCullough resigned as treasurer, and William Worley was appointed in his stead.

### MOVES TO DAYTON.

A resolution was passed that the *Gospel Herald* office be removed from Eaton, Ohio, to Dayton, Ohio, as soon as practicable. About May 1, 1865, the paper was moved to Dayton. Elder H. Y. Rush was chosen editor for one year from the first of May, 1865. W. T. Hawthorne was chosen publishing agent at a salary of \$900,00 per year, to be paid only after all other expenses were paid.

William Worley and Peter McCullough were appointed as a committee to secure an office at Dayton, Ohio, for use of Gospel Herald. Another meeting of the Executive Committee was held on April 28, 1865, at the residence of William Worley. A resolution rescinding the appointment of W. T. Hawthorne as publishing agent was passed, and Elder H. Y. Rush was made publishing agent as well as editor, and was required to mail the Gospel Herald and the Children's Friend. A resolution was passed that the 22nd Volume of the Gospel Herald be published in the U. B. Publishing House, Dayton, Ohio.

William Worley, Peter McCulluogh and H. Y. Rush were made a committee to determine whether the association should take back the office of Gospel Herald from Tizzard & Morris and set it up at Dayton, Ohio, and employ hands and publish the paper. The same committee was authorized to make a contract with Souers & Shuey of Dayton, Ohio, to publish the Gospel Herald in their office.

June 29, 1865, at a meeting of the Executive Committee, the salary of H. Y. Rush as editor was fixed at \$725 and W. T. Hawthorne as agent, \$800,00.

The Executive Committee met at Hagerstown, Indiana, October 25, 1865, William Worley, president, presiding. Present also, C. A. Morse, W. T. Hawthorne, Peter McCullough, secretary pro tem. Rev. Peter McCullough resigned as agent to solicit, and B. F. Rapp was appointed in his place.

A meeting of the Executive Committee was held at Dayton, Ohio, March 8, 1866, in the Gospel Herald office. At this meeting were William Worley, president, T. J. Lynn, secretary, Peter McCullough, C. A. Morse, and W. T. Hawthorne. An order of business was made at this meeting and the treasurer's report submitted: Amount received \$3.821.45; paid out \$1,673.15; amount of stock issued and script issued to agents \$36,320.00. This report shows the result of the soliciting agents in securing stock and script. A resolution was passed that Elder H. Y. Rush be continued as editor of the Gospel Herald and Sanday-School Herald (this is the first mention of the Sanday-School Herald in the business proceedings of the association). The salary of the editor was fixed at \$800.00.

W. T. Hawthorne was relieved from his duties as agent and Oliver A. Roberts was appointed as publishing agent at a salary of \$800.00 from May 1, 1866, to April 30, 1867. At this meeting P. W. McCullough and H. Y. Rush were appointed a committee to attend to having the association incorporated.

At this session, Elder J. F. Lynn resigned as member of the Committee and Elder C. T. Emmons was elected to fill his place and Elder Peter McCullough elected secretary.

April 12, 1866, it was voted that the Executive Committee take the Sunday-School Herald under its fostering care from this date and \$50.00 was appropriated to buy cuts for the Sunday-School Herald.

A meeting was held at Dayton, Ohio, October 31, 1866; William Worley, chairman, Peter McCullough, secretary, C. A. Morse and C. T. Emmons present, with W. A. Gross as agent, when the following resolution was passed:

Resolved. That the President and Executive Committee be instructed to call a meeting of the stockholders and conferences representing the Western Book Association to meet at Covington, Ohio, Tuesday, November 27, 1866.

For the meeting November 27, 1866, the following was the basis of representation; each conference in the United States is entitled to one delegate for every \$500.00 subscribed to the Publishing House funds, and each Christian conference not so represented shall be entitled to one representative.

Each holder of stock to the amount of \$100.00 is entitled to one vote—votes may be cast by proxy. At this same session it was voted to publish 5,000 copies of the Christian Hymn-Book of the pocket edition; provided the Association can get the legal right to do so.

### CHRISTIAN PUBLISHING ASSOCIATION

At the meeting of the stockholders and members of the Western Christian Book Association held at Covington, Ohio, November 27, 1866, the name of the association was changed to The Christian Publishing Association. The old Board of the Western Christian Book Association was elected to be trustees of The Christian Publishing Association.

William Worley was elected first president of the Association and Peter McCullough first secretary of the Board of Trustees.

On motion it was ordered, in order to facilitate the raising of funds for the Publishing House, that C. A. Gross of Indiana be made canvassing agent for the state of Ohio.

At a meeting held by the Board of Trustees of The Christian Publishing Association held at Dayton, Ohio, March 25, 1867, H. Y. Rush was elected editor of the Gospel Herald and Sunday-School Herald for one year from May 1, 1867 to May 1, 1868 Elder J. T. Lynn was appointed financial secretary for six months from April 1, 1867.

### PUBLISHING HOUSE SITE

At a meeting of the Executive Committee held at Dayton, Ohio, April 16, 1867, a committee, consisting of William Worley, E. M. Humphreys and Peter McCullough was appointed to select a site for a publishing house. At this meeting. O. A. Roberts was appointed as office agent in *Gospel Herald* office for one year.

### THE TRIENNIAL CONVENTION

The triennial convention was held at Hagerstown, Indiana, November 19, 1867, at which meeting the following persons were elected trustees of The Christian Publishing Association, to-wit: William Worley, J. G. Reeder, C. A. Morse, W. A. Gross and Peter McCullough, for the next three years. William Worley was elected president and P. W. McCullough, secretary.

### NEGOTIATIONS FOR THE PURCHASE OF THE HERALD OF GOSPEL LIBERTY

At a meeting held at Dayton, Ohio, December 4, 1867, Elder C. A. Morse was authorized to visit Newburyport, Massachusetts, and negotiate with Elder D. P. Pike and others in the purchase of the *Herald of Gospel Liberty* which was then published by the Eastern Christian Book Association, also hymn-books and plates.

#### PURCHASE OF HERALD OF GOSPEL LIBERTY

At a meeting of the Board of Trustees of The Christian Publishing Association held at Dayton, Ohio, December 30, 1867, Elder C. A. Morse reported a consolidation of papers and the contract of the purchase of the *Herald of Gospel Liberty* and the Eastern Hymn-book at an expense of \$2,200.00 which was accepted by the Board of Trustees. It was moved that an order be drawn for \$1,000.00 to pay for the hymn-books and plates which would show the purchase price of the *Herald of Gospel Liberty* to have been \$1,200 and \$27.00 ordered paid to C. A. Morse for going to Newburyport, Massachusetts. It was ordered also that Elder D. P. Pike act as editor of the *Herald* in connection with H. Y. Rush for one year, commencing with the beginning of the present volume.

### THE GOSPEL HERALD AND THE HERALD OF GOSPEL LIBERTY CONSOLIDATED

By the purchase of the *Herald of Gospel Liberty* by The Christian Publishing Association, both the *Gospel Herald* and the *Herald of Gospel Liberty* became the property of the Association and H. Y. Rush and D. P. Pike, editors respectively of the two papers, became the first editors of the new paper, under the *old name of Herald of Gospel Liberty*.

C. A. Morse was made a committee of one to notify D. P. Pike that he had been appointed agent and corresponding editor for the association.

The first issue of the *Herald of Gospel Liberty* after the consolidation was on the 4th day of January, 1868. At this meeting, W. A. Gross was appointed general agent of the association for one year from January 1, 1868.

On March 4, 1868, H. Y. Rush was elected editor of the *Hcrald* to serve from May 1, 1868, to May 1, 1869. O. A. Roberts was elected office agent.

I have now traced the development of The Christian Publishing Association until the time of its purchase of the *Herald of Gospel Liberty*. I have not however, traced this publication since March, 1850, nor its publisher. In March, 1850, the Christian General Book Association of Albany, New York, purchased the *Christian Herald* of the Eastern Christian Publishing Association, and it was consolidated with the *American Christian Messenger* and published for one year by the Christian General Book Association under the name of *Christian Herald and Messenger*. At the end of one year the Eastern Christian Publishing Association re-purchased the *Christian Herald* and removed it to Newburyport, Massachusetts. The first issue from this place was March 13, 1851, under

the name of Herald of Gospel Liberty, which name it has borne ever since. There were then seven editors of the paper. D. P. Pike, A. G. Morton, Elijah Shaw, Oliver Barr, J. B. Weston, O. J. Wait and Austin Craig. The Eastern Christian Publishing Association continued to publish the Herald of Gospel Liberty until January 4, 1868, when it was sold to The Christian Publishing Association and moved to Dayton, Ohio, and consolidated with the Gospel Herald, where it has ever since been published by The Christian Publishing Association. The arrangements for the consolidating of the Herald of Gospel Liberty and the Gospel Herald were made at Hagerstown, Indiana, November 19, 1867.

The Eastern Christian Publishing Association after the sale of the *Herald of Gospel Liberty* soon closed its business.

I will now go back and trace briefly the Christian General Book Association from 1850. This Association published the *Christian Palladium* at Albany, New York until 1854. Jasper Hazen was editor. From 1855, the *Palladium* was published by the association at Camptown, (Irvington.) New Jersey, until 1860; in that year it was moved to New York City, where it was published until January, 1861. Moses Cummings was its editor from 1855 to 1861.

In January, 1861, the Christian Palladium was consolidated with the Christian Messenger and the papers continued to be published under the name of Christian Messenger and Palladium. This consolidation took place at the close of the 13th Volume of the Messenger and the 30th Volume of the Palladium. The Christian Messenger and Paladium was published by The Christian General Book Association for about one year when, in 1862, this paper was consolidated with the Herald of Gospel Liberty at Newburyport, Massachusetts, and published by the Eastern Christian Publishing Association. After the sale of the Christian Messenger and Palladium in 1862, the Christian General Book Association soon went out of existence.

### PURCHASE OF REAL ESTATE IN DAYTON

At the meeting held March 4, 1868, the following resolution was passed:

Resolved: That the Trustees of The Christian Publishing Association accept the property bought of J. L. Falkner on the Southeast corner of Sixth and Main Streets, Dayton, Ohio, at \$11,500.00 purchased for the association by William Worley, Peter McCullough and W. A. Gross.

At a meeting of the Board of Trustees held July 14, 1868, at Dayton, Ohio, O. A. Roberts, office agent, resigned and W. A. Gross was elected to the vacancy, but refused to accept and J. J. Summerbell was elected publishing agent.

The Board of Trustees of the C. P. A., at a meeting held September 9, 1868, ordered a thousand large hymn-books published.

At a meeting held at Dayton, December 9, 1868, Elder H. Y. Rush was elected editor for another year from January 1, 1869, and D. P. Pike was employed as New England editor and agent. At the same session J. J. Summerbell was elected publishing agent for one year at a salary of \$850.00.

At a meeting held at Dayton, Ohio, April 15, 1869, W. A. Gross resigned as general agent. E. M. Humphreys was elected general agent of field work. On May 27, 1869, J. J. Summerbell resigned as office agent, whose resignation was accepted and William Worley put in charge of the office. August 4, 1869, the Board of Trustees met at Dayton, Ohio, and Elder L. Coffin, of New York was elected office agent for the balance of the term of J. J. Summerbell.

On September 1, 1869, the Board met at Yellow Springs, Ohio. Elder C. A. Morse having died, a vacancy existed and W. A. Coan of Enon, Ohio, was elected to fill the vacancy.

On December 10, 1869, a Board meeting was held at Dayton, Ohio, at which time Elder H. Y. Rush was re-elected editor to continue from January 1, 1870 to January 1, 1871.

At a meeting held January 31, 1870, the works of William Kinkade were ordered to be published; also a quarterly magazine, as soon as the finances of the association would warrant, H. Y. Rush to be editor of the same. At this meeting a resolution was passed that the triemnial convention of The Christian Publishing Association meet at Marion, Indiana, on Tuesday after the third Sabbath in June, 1870.

At a meeting held at Dayton, Ohio, May 24, 1870, it was resolved that the Board proceed to make arrangements with contractors for the erection of a publishing house on the ground on Main Street. This was preparatory to the building of the first publishing house owned by The Christian Publishing Association, and belonging to the Christian Church.

TRIENNIAL CONVENTION AT MARION, INDIANA, JUNE 21-22-23, 1870.

This general meeting was called to order by President Elias Smith. At this meeting the Committee on Finance made a report which showed the total assets of the association at that time to be \$20,721.00. This, however, was not the net assets.

The Christian Publishing Association in accordance with plans adopted by the Christian Convention (not the American Christian Convention) assembled in Ogden, Indiana, December 14, 1864, and amended by the Christian Convention at Covington. Ohio, November 26, 1866 on the 23rd day of June, 1870, adopted a revised constitution on a stock basis. The new constitution provided for biennial meetings of the association instead of triennial meetings, which had been in vogue for some time. The biennial meetings were to be held on Tuesday before the fourth Sabbath in June. The officers elected at this meeting were: President, Elias Smith; Vice-President, A. C. Hanger; Secretary, J. T. Lynn; Treasurer, William Worley; Editor, H. Y. Rush. Trustees: N. Summerbell, A. R. Heath, William M. Pence, W. A. Gross, G. W. Webster, D. Lepley, C. T. Emmons, Thomas Holmes, Elias Smith, A. C. Hanger, J. T. Lynn, and William Worley. Editorial Council: J. J. Summerbell, John Byrkett and M. Gardner.

June 29, 1870, an Executive Board meeting was held at Dayton, Ohio, N. Summerbell, President of Board, presiding. The president and William Worley were appointed and empowered to borrow five thousand dollars and to let contract to build new publishing house.

At an Executive Board meeting at Caton, Ohio, September 7, 1870, William Worley was appointed as a committee of one to have the new constitution of C. P. A., recorded in Dayton, Ohio, to take the place of the old constitution then on record.

At a meeting of the Board of Trustees held January 1, 1871, Elder A. L. McKinney was elected agent of the C. P. A. On February 28, 1871, occurred the death of Elder Elias Smith, President of The Christian Publishing Association. He died at his home at Woodstock, Ohio. *The Christian Pulpit*, publication started by Elder N. Summerbell, was, on May 16, 1861, purchased by The Christian Publishing Association, and was published by the association for a time.

May 16, 1871, The Christian Pulpit owned and edited by N. Summerbell, was purchased by The Christian Publishing Association, and June 20, of the same year Elder Summerbell resigned as editor of The Christian Pulpit. September 5, 1871, William Worley and W. A. Gross were authorized to close up contract for construction of publishing house, to cost not more that \$12,000.00, and William Worley was appointed to superintend the construction of the building. At an Executive Board meeting December 17, 1871, N. Summerbell resigned as president of the Executive Board and E. W. Humphreys was elected president. At an Executive Board meeting held at Dayton, Ohio. January 14, 1872, E. W. Humphreys was appointed a committee to consider the feasi-

bility of transferring The Christian Publishing Association to the Quadrennial convention, and was requested to report at Troy, Ohio, the 17th of June following.

This was probably the official beginning of the agitation to consolidate the publishing interests of the church with the general interests, as represented by the American Christian Convention. Pursuant to this move for consolidation, the biennial session of The Christian Publishing Association and the American Christian Convention met at Troy, Ohio, from June 18 to 21, 1872. At this session of the Publishing Association the report made at that time shows that 5,352 Heralds were published and 19,872 Sunday-School Heralds. At this biennial meeting the following officers were elected: President, A. L. McKinney; Vice-President, P. Stewart; Secretary, T. C. Smith, Treasurer, William Worley; Editor, H. Y. Rush. Trustees: A. C. Hauger, William M. Pence, J. E. Brush, G. Prugh, Peter Winebrenner, D. Lepley, A. R. Heath, S. S. Newhouse. Editorial Council: E. W. Humphreys, James Maple, C. W. Garoutte.

### CHRISTIAN ALMANAC

On July 23, 1872, the Association authorized the purchase of the manuscript of the On June 17, 1873, William Worley reported to the Executive Board that he had Christian Almanac for 1873 of the estate of the late William Hawthorne, purchased as equipments for the new publishing house, press, power, boiler and engine, shafting, safety power elevator, at a cost of \$4,284.00. This purchase was approved by the Executive Board.

A biennial session of The Christian Publishing Association was held at Dayton, Ohio, June 23, 1874, President Perry Stewart, presiding. At this session the net assets of the association were reported to be \$26,329.74. The officers elected at this time were: President, Elder A. C. Hanger; Vice-President, Elder Daniel Lepley; Secretary, Elder J. T. Lynn; Treasurer, William Worley; Trustees: Elder E. W. Humphreys, Peter McCullough, Joseph P. Robinson, Peter Winebrenner, Washington Wilson, Thomas A. Worley, John Kauffman and Jesse Demint. Editor, H. Y. Rush. Editorial Council: E. W. Humphreys, C. W. Garoutte and James Maple. At this session Perry Stewart presided as president, A. L. McKinney who was elected at the biennial session in 1872, having resigned January 22, 1873, Perry Stewart being elected to fill the vacancy, and John Kauffman to fill the vacancy on the Board of Trustees. At this session the treasurer's report showed the net assets to be \$21,913.92. At this time the first publishing house was completed at a cost of \$16,000.00, of which \$6,700.00 was borrowed money. new publishing house had been occupied since December 1, 1872, and the publishing house equipment at that time was at a cost of \$4,500.00, with an indebtedness against the same of \$2,065.00.

The Executive Committee chosen June 24, 1874, was A. C. Hanger, president; J. T. Lynn, secretary; Jesse Demint, William Worley and John Kauffman.

On September 2, 1874, Elder J. T. Lynn was elected general financial agent. December 10, 1874, O. J. Wait was elected associate editor of the *Herald*. J. T. Lynn, general financial agent resigned, and Rev. A. C. Hanger was appointed to the vacancy.

### THIRD BIENNIAL SESSION

The third biennial session was held at Covington, Ohio, June 20, 1876, A. C. Hanger. president; William Worley, office agent who had succeeded W. A. Gross, January 1, 1874. Officers elected: President, Elder A. C. Hanger; Vice-President, William Worley; Treasurer, J. Southward. Editor, H. Y. Rush. Trustees: H. H. Holverstott, Jesse Demint, E. W. Humphreys, E. E. Stewart, Peter Winebrenner, N. Summerbell, A. R. Heath and Jacob Fisher. It was reported that the *Heralds* published at this time were 4,464, and the *Sunday-School Heralds* for the June issue were 18,240. The net assets of the association were given as \$20,050.87. The indebtedness, however, was reported by the pres-

ident to be between \$15,000 and \$16,000. It will readily be seen that the indebtedness was very heavy considering the amount of the assets of the association.

### FOURTH BIENNIAL SESSION

The fourth biennial session was held at Dayton, Ohio, June 18, 1878, President A. C. Hanger, presiding. Amendments to the constitution were adopted at this session.

#### FIFTH BIENNIAL SESSION OF THE C. P. A.

The fifth biennial session of the C. P. A. was held at West Liberty, Ohio, June 15 and 16, 1880. At this session the committee reported in favor of in some way placing The Christian Publishing Association under the control of the American Christian Convention. Officers elected: President, A. C. Hanger; Vice-President, M. Harrod; Secretary, J. B. Weston. Trustees: Perry Stewart, Springfield, Ohio; E. W. Humphreys, Yellow Springs, Ohio; A. W. Coan, Yellow Springs, Ohio; J. B. Weston, Yellow Springs, Ohio; John Southward, Mt. Sterling, Ohio; B. Seever, Springfield, Ohio; A. C. Hanger, Utica, Ohio; C. W. Garoutte, Eaton, Ohio; C. A. Williams, Raymond, Ohio; A. R. Heath, Merom, Indiana; John A. Young, Romeo, Michigan; J. P. Fisher, Delaware County, Ohio.

### SIXTH BIENNIAL SESSION OF THE CHRISTIAN PUBLISHING ASSOCIATION

The sixth annual session of The Christian Publishing Association was held at Yellow Springs, Ohio, June 13, 1882. President A. C. Hanger, presiding. Officers elected: President, A. C. Hanger; Vice-President, J. J. Manville; Secretary, J. B. Weston. Trustees: J. A. Young, A. C. Hanger, Perry Stewart, S. S. Newhouse, C. M. Winchester, W. T. Warbington, William Overturf, W. A. Bell, E. W. Humphreys, C. A. Williams, E. A. DeVore, M. Harrod. C. W. Garoutte was publishing agent at this time.

### SEVENTH BIENNIAL SESSION OF THE CHRISTIAN PUBLISHING ASSOCIATION

Seventh biennial session of The Christian Publishing Association was held June 10, 1884 at Utica, Ohio, A. C. Hanger, president, president, Officers elected: President, Rev. George Hebberd, Lakeville, N. Y., Vice-President, Rev. G. Black, Centerburg, Ohio; Secretary, C. W. Choate, Yellow Springs, Ohio, Trustees: A. C. Hanger, S. S. Newhouse, John A. Young, William J. Warrener, L. Gander, Hon. Perry Stewart, Prof. William A. Bell, Indianapolis, Indiana; Rev. C. A. Williams, Rev. William Overturf, Rev. R. A. Harris, (Central Illinois Conference) and Rev. E. R. Wade, New York Central Conference. C. W. Garoutte was still publishing agent.

The constitution of the Publishing Association was again amended at this session.

### EIGHTH BIENNIAL SESSION OF THE CHRISTIAN PUBLISHING ASSOCIATION

Was held at New Bedford, Massachusetts, October 6, 1886. President G. H. Hebberd, presiding. Rev. C. J. Jones, was editor of the Herald of Gospel Liberty. The constitution of the Publishing Association was again amended. By this amendment, members of The Christian Publishing Association became the same as members of the American Christian Convention. Officers elected: Rev. D. A. Long, President, Yellow Springs, Ohio; Vice-President, J. T. Phillips, Yellow Springs, Ohio; Secretary, C. W. Choate, Yellow Springs, Ohio; Editor, C. J. Jones, Dayton, Ohio; Agent, M. Harrod. Trustees: F. A. Palmer, New York City, C. A. Beck, Philadelphia, J. P. Watson, Dayton, A. Godley, Merom, Indiana, I. H. Coe, New Bedford, Mass., A. H. Morrill, Stanfordville, N. Y., Martyn Summerbell, New Bedford, Mass., J. W. Wellon, Franklin, N. C., John Moss,—E. A. Devore,—Robert Harris, Urbana, Illinois, T. M. McWhinney, Franklin, Ohio, Perry Stewart, Springfield, Ohio. J. P. Watson was elected assistant editor of Sunday-school Literature. Perry Stewart, however, refused to serve as trustee and M. O. Adams was elected in his stead.

The Board of Trustees held a meeting at Dayton, Ohio, January 12, 1887. At this time the resignations of Hon, F. A. Palmer and Martyn Summerbell were accepted, and J. J. Summerbell and James Maple were elected to fill the vacancy. At a Board of Trustees' meeting, January 12, 1887, the invoice of property belonging to the association showed real estate valued at \$18,000,00 and a total of \$29,001.87. At this meeting J. P. Watson resigned as trustee, and S. S. Newhouse of Jamestown. Ohio, was elected to the vacancy.

The Board of Trustees met May 16, 1888, and passed a resolution highly complimentary to Rev. C. J. Jones on account of his services as editor and in securing funds to liquidate the debt of the association. At this session the price of the Herald of Gospel Liberty was raised to \$1.50 per year.

At an Executive Board meeting July 3, 1888, the resignation of Dr. C. J. Jones, the editor of the Herald of Gospel Liberty, was accepted, and J. P. Watson was elected to fill the vacancy.

On January 28, 1890, at a session of the Board of Trustees held at Dayton, Ohio, the report of the president made at this time, shows the assets of the association January 1st, to be \$38,715.57, liabilities, \$11,972.75, showing the net assets to be at this time \$26,742.82.

### FIRST QUADRENNIAL SESSION.

The First Quadrennial Session of The Christian Publishing Association, was held at Marion, Indiana, October 8, 1890, Rev. D. A. Long, president, presiding. At this session amendments were made to the constitution, and the constitution as adopted at that time remains unchanged to the present. At this session a resolution was adopted authorizing the sale of the publishing house at Dayton, Ohio.

Officers elected: President, D. A. Long; vice-president, W. W. Staley; secretary, C. W. Choate; treasurer, M. O. Adams; editor, J. P. Watson; trustees, George W. Gunder, Marion, Indiana; Rev. A. H. Morrill, Stanfordville, N. Y.; Rev. T. M. McWhinney, Marion, Indiana; Rev. Albert Godley, Weaubleau, Mo.; Isaac Hewett, Maple Rapids, Michigan; Rev. A. E. Devore, Merom, Indiana; George E. Hoar, Fall River, Mass.

On November 6, 1890, an Executive Board meeting was held at Dayton, Ohio, D. A. Long, president, presiding. Other members present, Geo. W. Gunder and C. W. Choate. The first publishing house was sold to a railroad company for \$21,350.00 cash and \$650.00 rental to April 1, 1891, making a total of \$22,000.00. The deed was ordered made by the president and secretary, bearing date November 17, 1890.

An Executive Board meeting held January 13, 1891, the Board of Trustees decided to cease doing business as a publishing house after April 1, 1891, until a permanent location is selected.

At an Executive Board meeting held at Dayton, Ohio, February 3, 1891, Rev. Mills Harrod resigned as publishing agent, to take effect February 16, 1891; Rev. T. M. McWhinney was appointed as his successor.

At an Executive Committee meeting held May 8, 1891, at Dayton, Ohio, T. M. McWhinney, on account of being agent for the association, resigned as trustee and Rev. S. S. Newhouse was chosen to fill the vacancy, but he declined to accept, and Rev. T. M. McWhinney continued as agent until August 11, 1891, when he resigned and George E. Merrill of Troy, Ohio, was elected agent.

#### CHRISTIAN PUBLISHING ASSOCIATION INCORPORATED.

January 12, 1893, The Christian Publishing Association was incorporated at Dayton, Ohio. The incorporators being T. M. McWhinney, Daniel Albright Long, C. W. Choate, George D. Black, E. A. Devore and W. A. Gross.

The articles of incorporation are as follows:

#### STATE OF OHIO.

These Articles of Incorporation of The Christian Publishing Association witnesseth: That the undersigned, a majority of whom are citizens of the State of Ohio, desiring to form a corporation, not for profit, under the general corporation laws of said State, do hereby certify.

FIRST. The name of said corporation shall be The Christian Publishing Association. SECOND. Said corporation shall be located, and its principal business transacted

at Dayton, in Montgomery County, Ohio.

THIRD. The purpose for which said Corporation is formed is—the object of this Association shall be to promote the union of Christians and the conversion of the world by the publication of books, tracts and periodicals, and do such other work as may with propriety be done by a Christian Publishing association.

The corporation met at Dayton, Ohio, July 13, 1893, and adopted the constitution and by-laws of The Christian Publishing Association—the same as adopted at the Marion, Indiana, Quadrennial session, and are as follows:

### CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS.

### Preamble.

The Christian Publishing Association, in accordance with the plans adopted by the Christian Convention, assembled in Ogden, Henry County, Indiana, on the 14th day of December, 1864, and amended at the several meetings of the Association to-wit: At Covington Ohio, on the 21st day of June, 1870; at Utica, Ohio, on the 11th day of June, 1884; at New Bedford, Massachusetts, October, 1886, and at Marion, Indiana, October, 1890, do adopt the following Constitution:

Article I.—Name.—This organization shall be known as The Christian Publishing

Association.

ARTICLE II.—Object.—The object of this Association shall be to promote the union of Christians and the conversion of the world by the publication of books, tracts, and periodicals, and to do such other work as may, with propriety, be done by a Christian Publishing Association.

ARTICLE III.—Mectings.—Section 1.—The regular sessions of this Association shall be held quadrennially in connection with those of the American Christian Convention. at such time and place as shall be mutually agreed upon by the two bodies, or by the Executive Boards thereof; and three months' notice of such meetings shall be published in the Herald of Gospel Liberty.

Sec. 2. Special meetings may be called in the same manner, whenever deemed expedient by the Board of Trustees.

ARTICLE IV.—Members.—The members of the American Christian Convention, at the corresponding session thereof, shall, ex-officio, be members of this Association.

ARTICLE V.—Officers.—The officers of this Association shall consist of a President, a Vice-President, a Secretary, a Treasurer, and a Board of Trustees, all of whom shall be elected by ballot by the Association at its regular session.

ARTICLE VI.—Trustees.—Section 1.—The Board of Trustees of this Association

shall consist of nine (9) members, including its President and Secretary, who shall, ex-officio, be members, and also President and Secretary of the Board.

SEC. 2. The Trustees shall have general charge of the business and property of the Association, and shall have such power and responsibility as usually belong to trustees of such an incorporation. A majority of the Trustees shall constitute a quorum.

SEC. 3. Within three months after their election they shall meet and organize and choose an Executive Committee of five (5) persons, who shall perfect a plan of keeping accounts that shall provide a system of checks and vouchers sufficient to protect the Association from loss by its employees.

Sec. 4. The Executive Committee shall have such power as the Trustees may invest in them; may meet when and where they deem useful to the Association; and shall keep a full journal of their proceedings, which shall be submitted to the Trustees for

their ratification whenever called for.

Sec. 5. This Association shall, at its quadrennial meeting, elect by ballot such editor, or editors, as the best interest of the Association may require. Said editor, or editors, shall serve for four (4) years, unless removed by death, or for cause, or shall resign; in either case the vacancy shall be filled by the Board of Trustees as other vacancies are editor, provided, that any one so removed shall have the right to appeal from such action of said board to the Association at its next meeting thereafter.

Sec. 6. All agents and employees shall give such bonds as the Trustees may deem

sufficient to gnard the Association against loss.

Sec. 7. All vacancies that may happen, either of officers or Trustees, by refusal to serve, resignation, removal for cause, or in any other manner, shall be filled by the Trustees.

Sec. 8. To remove an editor, officer, or Trustee for cause, two-thirds (%) of the Trustees must vote for such removal, and the yea and nay vote be recorded by the Secretary.

SEC. 9. It shall be the duty of the Board of Trustees to present full and elaborate reports of the condition of the Association, submitting the various reports of the Treasurer and agents, and all other reports of subordinates submitted to them, with a report of all their transactions, to the session of this Association at which their term of office expires, or at any other time when called upon by the Association in called or extra session.

ARTICLE VII.—Legal Papers.—The President and Secretary of the Board of Trustees shall sign in behalf of the Association all legal instruments of writing in the purchase, sale, or transfer of any real estate, or of any evidence of the indebtedness of the Association.

ARTICLE VIII.—The business of the Publishing Honse shall be conducted, so far as is practicable, on a cash basis. And the agent and other employees shall keep an itemized account of all their transactions, subject to the inspection of any of the Board of Trustees. And all money shall be paid to the Treasurer; and no money shall be paid out by him except on the order of the President of the Board of Trustees or of the Executive Committee thereof.

ARTICLE IX.—Liability of Trustees.—Section 1. For all debts contracted over and above moneys and outstanding assets, Trustees shall be personally liable, except such trustee or trustees as at the time protest against the action and shall have such protest entered upon the minutes.

Sec. B. The Trustees shall be personally liable for the failure or deficiency of any employe of whom they have not taken sufficient bond and security.

ARTICLE X.—Fiscal Year.—The fiscal year of the Association shall commence on the

first day of January of each year.

ARTICLE XI.—Donations.—Bequests and donations made to this Association must be applied, if for special purpose, in accordance with the expressed wish of the testator or donor.

ARTICLE X11.—Amendments.—This Constitution may be amended at any quadrennial meeting of the Association by a two-thirds (%) vote of all the members present.

They also elected the following trustees: D. A. Long; T. M. McWhinney; E. A. Devore; George W. Gunder; Isaac Hewitt; Alva H. Morrill; Albert Godley; George Hoar and C. W. Choate. The trustees elected D. A. Long, president, and C. W. Choate, secretary.

At the Board meeting held January 9, 1893, at Dayton, Ohio, Rev. C. W. Choate resigned as trustee and secretary and A. H. Morrill was elected secretary of the

Board of Trustees and member of the Executive Committee. Rev. O. P. Furnas was elected at this meeting a trustee to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of C. W. Choate.

### SECOND QUADRENNIAL SESSION.

The second Quadrennial session was held October 10, 1894, in the "Old South Church," Haverhill, Mass. At this time the report of the president showed the assets of the association to be \$31,770.97. Officers elected at this session: President, S. S. Newhouse, Piqua, Ohio; Vice-president, B. S. Bachelor, New Bedford, Mass.; secretary, Alva H. Morrill, Haverhill, Mass.; treasurer, Morgan O. Adams, Yellow Springs, Ohio.

Trustees: Rev. Albert Dunlap, Columbus, Ohio; Rev. T. M. McWhinney, Marion, Indiana; E. L. Goodwin, Esq., Boston, Mass.; Geo. W. Gunder, Marion, Indiana; Rev. M. Harrod, —————————; P. F. Pfouts, —————————.

Rev. J. J. Summerbell was elected editor of the *Herald of Gospel Liberty* and Rev. J. P. Watson was elected editor of the Sunday-School Literature.

At a meeting held January 3, 1895, by the trustees of The Publishing Association, President S. S. Newhouse, presiding, P. F. Pfouts declined to serve as trustee, and Prof. Hampton Bennett, of Franklin, Ohio, was elected to the vacancy and Rev. G. E. Merrill was re-elected publishing agent. On January 2, 1896, Geo. E. Merrill resigned as publishing agent and Bode M. Stoddard was elected to the vacancy.

The annual meeting of the trustees being held at Dayton, Ohio, January 6, 1897, President Newhouse presiding, G. W. Gunder resigned as trustee and Rev. Dr. C. J. Jones was elected to fill the vacancy and B. M. Stoddard was continued as publishing agent for the ensuing year.

On January, 1898, the trustees re-elected Stoddard as agent for another year. He continued as agent until January 5, 1899, when he was succeeded by Rev. W. D. Samuel, as publishing agent.

The third quadrennial session was held at Newmarket, Canada, beginning October 28, 1898. Rev. W. D. Samuel was elected president, Rev. Henry Crampton, secretary, Rev. J. J. Summerbell re-elected editor of the *Herald of Gospel Liberty*, and Rev. J. P. Watson re-elected Sunday-school editor. Rev. W. D. Samuel served as president until January 1, 1900, when he resigned his office and O. W. Whitelock, of Huntington, Indiana, was elected to the vacancy by the Board of Trustees.

The fourth quadrennial session of The Christian Publishing Association was held at Norfolk, Va., beginning October 13, 1902. O. W. Whitelock was elected president; A. C. Cable, secretary; Rev. J. J. Summerbell was re-elected editor of the *Herald of Gospel Liberty*, and J. P. Watson was re-elected editor of the Sunday-school literature.

On March 3, 1904, the Board of Trustees of the Association appointed O. W. Whitelock, Isaac H. Gray and D. M. Helfenstein to locate and purchase a site for a *New Publishing House*. This committee was also authorized "to build a new publishing house when a location is secured and property purchased."

At this meeting A. C. Cable resigned as secretary, and Henry Crampton was chosen to fill the place.

On the 14th day of April, 1904, the committee purchased of Maggie R. Bollinger, for the Association, the lot at the corner of Fifth and Ludlow streets, in the city of Dayton, Ohio, on which the present publishing house now stands, at the price of \$28,000.00.

Soon after the lot was purchased, plans were made and a new publishing house was erected and completed at a total cost, for grounds and building, of \$74.373.45. The equipment of the new house was valued at \$10.267.18, making the total value of the new publishing house and equipment October 1, 1906. \$84,640.63, as reported to the quadrennial session of the Association held at Huntington, Indiana, October, 1906.

The new publishing house was formally dedicated June 22, 1905, and has been occupied ever since.

Rev. W. D. Samuel served as publishing agent until the 3d day of January, 1901, when he resigned and J. N. Hess was elected to fill the vacancy. Mr. Hess has been the publishing agent of the Association from that time to the present.

The fifth quadrennial session was held in the city of Huntington, Indiana, October 9-15, 1906. O. W. Whitelock was re-elected president, Henry Crampton, secretary, and are serving at this time. Rev. J. Pressley Barrett was elected editor of the *Herald of Gospet Liberty* and Rev. S. Q. Helfenstein, editor of Sunday-school literature.

### PUBLISHING INTERESTS OF THE CHURCH IN THE SOUTH.

In 1844, Elder Daniel W. Kerr established the *Christian Sun*, which has continued to the present time. For four years during the Civil War, however, the publication was suspended. This paper is owned and controlled by the Southern Christian Convention, which body elects its editor and publisher once in two years. The present editor and publisher is Rev. J. O. Atkinson, D. D., who has served continuously since May, 1900.

#### PUBLISHING INTEREST IN CANADA.

The Christian Luminary was published at Oshawa, Canada, beginning in 1845. The Christian Magazine was published at Eddystone, Ontario, in 1866.

The Christian Vanguard is the only publication of the Christians now in existence in Canada. It was issued for the first time in January, 1891, and has been published continuously ever since. Elder T. Garbutt was its first Editor-in-Chief, and Prof. J. N. Dales, Associate Editor. Elder Garbutt continued its editor until about six years ago, when Prof. Dales became Editor-in-Chief, and is serving in that capacity at the present time. The Christian Vanguard is published by the Ontario Christian Conference from Newmarket, Canada, and is now in its sixteenth volume. W. G. Sargent, of Toronto, Canada, is Business Manager.

The year 1908 was an off financial year throughout the United States and the Centennial expenses were above the normal expenses; yet the year closed with a net gain of \$4,151.43 with the prospect of working entirely out of debt during the present Quadrennium. Besides this, there has been a natural increment to the value of the real estate which makes the financial condition of the House better than the figures indicate. The Inventory of Assets puts the real estate at its cost at the time of its purchase.

A conservative estimate of the value of the plant at the present time would be \$100,000.00 above all obligations.

# The Wyoming Christian Colony

The feeling has been extant in the brotherhood for some time that some method ought to be devised to preserve to our work those moving from our rural districts to the newer sections of the country. Having largely a rural constituency the increase in price of land with corresponding rent values drives many of our people out into new sections, while health considerations lead others to make a similar change. Many of our members have gone and still others will follow. We do not make these conditions but we must meet them. To some of the brethren came the interrogation, Why not place the church before this hegira in a country awaiting development where there is ample opportunity to supply hundreds of families with the commercial items of which they are in pursuit and at the same time provide the religious; thus making it the center of a great community life and conserving to the Christian Church much of its constituency which

would otherwise be scattered and lost? This was succeeded by another thought: Most of our pioneer work is now represented in individual churches with long range, if any, conference relationship, lacking cohesion with the body of our denominational work. Why not make this new point, to which we shall rally, the center of a western work, at which there shall be a college, conferences and a systematized organized effort on the ground to hold and develop the field? This was "the germ of the Wyoming Movement."

A series of articles appeared in the *Herald of Gospel Liberty* setting forth the possibilities of meeting this demand on the broad fertile prairies of Wyoming. At the following annual meeting of the Board of Education of the A. C. C. the following resolution was adopted:

"Resolved, That we endorse the movement for the establishment of a Christian colony in Wyoming, that we approve the plan for the establishment of a college in connection with the colony as soon as conditions are favorable for such an institution, and that the Rev. F. G. Coffin be appointed a committee to represent the Board in the college enterprise."

Learning of the projected enterprise, two towns in the vicinity of the colony wished to secure the college, one of which made an offer of \$15,000.00 in cash and 200 acres of land; the other was willing to consider providing one-half the expense of a \$50,000.00 plant. But in these there was wanting the best moral and social atmosphere for the protection of a student body. It was therefore thought best to establish our own town, prohibiting in the deeds the sale of liquor and cigarettes, gambling and prostitution.

The fund for the purchase of the town site was provided by the sale of stock which will prove a safe investment for the subscribers. The company was incorporated under the laws of Wyoming "to deal in real estate in the interest of the Christian Church." The town of Jirch was then platted on the C. & N. W. R. R. A number of lots have already been sold, a church and schoolhouse, store, depot, switch, and several dwellings built. From the sale of the lots necessary expenses are to be paid after which the gross receipts are to be divided as follows: 10% for a Christian church building fund; 20% for city improvements; and 70% for a Christian college. The total valuation of the lots is \$72,375,00.

About thirty homesteaders of the colony have filed on land in the vicinity of the town. This is all homestead land and hundreds can still find free homes in the state. It is the plan of the Jirch Land Company, which is the company formed by the stockholders of the Christian Church, to make subsequent settlements in other localities. Churches will be established as rapidly as the country settles up. During the present year a Christian conference will be formed in the state and an effort made to enter new fields. It is proposed to erect a college building during the summer of 1909. At the present time there is but one institution in the state doing college work, and the future offers us a needy and non-competitive field. This will also furnish Christian workers to supply the field later, as students can prove up on 160 acres of land while attending college. The company is now planning to purchase a 160 acre tract adjoining the college grounds for a college farm. They will also take over some coal lands to meet the future needs of the colonists. The officers of the company are: Rev. F. G. Coffin, Pres.; Alvin W. Meade, Vice-Pres.; Rev. D. B. Atkinson, Sec'y.; Rev. George Dalzell, Treas.; all of Jireh, Wyo.

The colony is located in a fertile valley in Converse County, eastern central Wyoming. The climate is healthful, being an altitude of over 5,000 feet. The first crops of the colonists have left no doubt as to the fertility of the soil. The opportunity for Christian work is almost unparalleled, as a maximum of work can be done at a minimum of expense. The first Christian Church to be established in Wyoming is at Jireh, having an excellent membership of about forty people. The Christian Church has the platform to welcome the varied religious life coming into the state. We must enter and possess the land.
