## ECLIPSES IN YEAR 1892.

In the year 1892 there will be four Eclipses; two of the Sun and two of the Moon.

The First is a Total Eclipse of the Sun, April 26 th, at 3 o'clock 35 min . in the afternoon. Invisible here. Visible only to the South Temperate Zone, in New Zealand, South Pacific Ocean and western part of South America.

The Second is a Partial Eclipse of the Moon, May 11th, at 5 o'clock 15 min . in the evening. Invisible. Visible to Europe, Africa, Atlantic Ocean,

South America and the extreme easterly part of North America, where the Moon rises eclipsed.

The Third is a Partial Eclipse of the Sun, October 20th. Visible here. Begins at Washington, 12:05 P. M.; at Nashville, 11 A. M.; at St. Paul, 10:40 A.M.; at New Orleans, 11:18 A. M.

The Fourth is a Total Eclipse of the Moon, November 4th, at 10 o'clock 7 min . in the forenoon. Invisible here. Visible to the northwestern part of North America, Asia, and the easterly portion of Europe.

## Christian Publishing Association.

Every member of the Christian Church has close interest in our publishing business. Membership in the American Christian Convention, familiarly called the "Quadrennial," is also membership in the Christian Publishing Association.

The president, vice president, secretary, treasurer, editor or editors, and seven trustees are elected by ballot by the Association at its quadrennial session. The president and secretary are also trustees ex-officio.

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## PERIODICALS.

Herald of Gospel Liberty, weekly, sixteen pages. It is in its eighty-fourth year. Price $\$ 1.50$ per year, strictly in advance. It is the official paper of the brotherhood.

The Little Teacher, a weekly, illustrated; four pages, for the youngest pupils. Price 15 cents per year for a single copy, or 12 cents per year in lots of five or more.

## The American Christian Convention.

## J. J. Sumierbell, Secretary, 2120 W. Norris St., Philadelphia, Pa.

Officers:-Rev. D. A. Long, D. D., LL.D., President; Rev. J. J. Summerbell, D. D., Secretary; Rev. J. G. Bishop, Secretary of the Missionary and Church-Extension Department; Rev. M. Summerbell, D,D., Secretary of the Educational Department; Rev. H. J. Duckworth, Secretary of the Publishing Department; Rev. J. F. Burnett, Secretary of the Sabbath-school Department; Hon. F. A. Palmer, Secretary of the Treasury Department.

By vote of the Convention at New Bedford, in 1886, repeated at Marion, in 1890, the Secretary is made general agent in making effective the general measures of the Christians.

Churches in need of pastors, by addressing the Secretary, may secure names of ministers awaiting call.

This Convention represents over a hundred thousand free Christians.

We invite independent Christians to cooperate and work with us.

Churches are requested by the Convention to take four collections annually:

On the second Sunday in March, for Education.

On the second Sunday in June (Childrens' Day), for Home Missions.

On the second Sunday in September, for Foreign Missions.
On the second Sunday in December, for the American Christian Convention.

Those who have not the opportunity to contribute in the collections of the churches are requested to send money directly to the Secretary of the Convention.
Sunday-schools are requested to take one collection annually for the benefit of the Sunday-school Department.

The benevolent are invited to contribute to The Aged Ministers' Relief Fund; stating whether the money is for the endowment of the fund, or for direct use. The Executive Board will establish regulations.

By the action of the Executive Board of the American Christian Convention, the moneys taken in response to the Convention calls for collections, should be sent to the Secretary, J. J. Summerbell, 2120 West Norris Street, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, and all remittances should be made by bank check, draft, registered letter, or post office money order.

## Rev. Simon Clough, D. D.



A deeply interesting sketch of this talented, industrious, scholarly, and consecrated

George W. Long, M. D.



Dr. George W. Long, the fifth son of Jacob and Jane S. Long, and a young brother of the Rev. Drs. W. S. and D. A. Long, who are so well known among our people, the former as president of Elon College, and the latter as president of Antioch College, was born near Graham, North Carolina, July 15, 1848. He is therefore in his forty-fourth year. Dr. Long was educated under his brother, the Rev. W. S. Long, D. D., and the Rev. Alex. Wilson, D. D., and graduated in medicine from the University of Pennsylvania in 1874. He entered at once his chosen profession and
rose rapidly as a practitioner, winning the confidence of the people and the highest honors in the gift of his brethren of the medical profession. He is now one of the medical examiners on the State Board.

Dr. Long married, when only nineteen years of age, Miss Mary C., daughter of Dr. John A. Walker, of Orange County, North Carolina. He has an interesting family of three children living. He also has three children dead. He is a well developed man physically and a strong man intellectually. In his practice as a physician he has shown many of the family traits of character which have been so prominent in the work of the two college presidents.

Dr. Long is a staunch member of the Christian Church, and is regarded by those who know him well as one of the most thoughtful and conscientious laymen in the churches of the Southern Convention. He is a member of New Providence Church, near Graham, where he is held in high esteem by the membership. His whole life has been spent in his native county. His practice as a physician has been almost wholly among the people who were the neighbors of his parents and the companions of his childhood. They will not hear of his leaving the community to locate elsewhere. At home he is a growing man.

Salt fish are quickest and best freshened by soaking in sour milk.

Cold rain water and soap will remove machine grease from washable fabrics.

Paint stains that are dry and old may be removed from cotton or woolen goods with chloroform. It is a good plan to first cover the spot with olive oil or butter.

Fish may be scaled much easier by first dipping them into boiling water for a minute.

Milk which has changed may be swieetened or rendered fit for use again by stirring in a little soda.

Boiling starch is much improved by the addition of sperm, or salt, or both, or a little gum arabic dissolved.

## HOME DEPARTMENT.

Receipts for 1891, about $\$ 3,500.00$.
The proceeds of Children's Day
(1891), was $\$ 2,830.36$.
Expended for the work during the year, about $\$ 3,300.00$.

Assistance has been given during the year to thirty-two missionaries. Their work has been distributed in seventeen different States, to-wit, Maine, New Hampshire, Massachusetts, New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania, Virginia, West Virginia, North Carolina, Ohio, Michigan, Indiana, Illinois, Iowa, Missouri, Kansas, and Texas.

The following, so far as may be put in figures, indicates the labor, and the results, of our workers in the Home field for the year: Months of labor, 259 ; sermons preached, 3,321 ; family calls made, 6,420 ; meetings held, 4,263; members received,

1,143; baptisms performed, 254; new churches organized, 6 ; new Sunday-schools organized, 32; subscriptions to Church papers, 178.

There have never been as many applications for assistance in establishing Christian churches in the larger centers of population, as well as for rural and frontier work, as at present. A grand opportunity for the Christians. Will they furnish the means by which these doors may be entered? The board is powerless to do only as means are furnished them.

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## The Origin of the Names of Days.

The week was unknown to the ancients of classic ages, till it was gradually adopted, along with Christianity, under the later emperors. The arrangement of the heavenly bodies, according to their distances from the earth, is in the following order: Saturn, Jupiter, Mars, the sun, Venus, Mercury, the Moon; and it was a principle of the ancient astrology that these planets presided in succession over the hours of the day, and from which the Latin designations given to days of the week have been derived; and from these have been formed the modern names used in different countries, either by literal translation, or, in the Teutonic tongues, by the substitution, in some cases, of the corresponding deity of northern paganism for the classical god.

Sunday.-Is so called, because it was anciently dedicated to the worship of the sun.

Monday.-Means literally the day of the moon.

Tuesday.-Was dedicated to Tuisco, the Mars of our Saxon ancestors, the deity that presided over combats, strife, and litigation. Hence, in England Tuesday is assize day; the day for combat, or commencing litigation.

Wednesday.-Is so called from Wodin, or Odin, a deity or chief among the northern nations of Europe.

Thursday.-Was named by the Saxons from Thor, the old Teutonic god of thunder.

Friday.-Is from Frea or Friga, a goddess of the old Saxon mythology.

Saturday.-Means simply Saturn's day, the name being derived from the deity of that name.

## The Origin of the Names of the Months.

January-The Roman Janus presided over the beginning of everything; hence the first month of the year was called after him.

February-The Roman festival Februs was held on the 15th day of this month, in honor of Lupercus, the god of fertility.

March-Named from the Roman god of war, Mars.

April-Latin Aprilis, probably derived from asperire, to open; because spring generally begins and the buds open in this month.

May-Latin Maius, probably derived from Maia, a feminine divinity worshiped at Rome on the first day of this month.

June-Juno, a Roman divinity worshiped as the Queen of Heaven.

July (Julius)-Julius Cæsar was born in this month.

August-Named by the Emperor Augustus Cægar, B. C. 30, after himself, as he regarded it a lucky month, being that in whịch he had gained several victories.
September (septem, or 7)-September was the seventh month in the old Roman calendar.

October (octo)-Eighth month of the old Roman year.

November (novem, or 9)-November was the ninth month in the old Roman year.

December (decem, or 10)-December was the tenth month of the early Roman year. About the 21st of this month the sun enters the Tropic of Capricorn, and forms the winter solstice.

## New Capitol Building at Albany, N. Y.

It was decided to erect the new capitol on the first day of May, 1865. On the ninth day of December, 1867 , the work of excavation commenced, and proceeded to a depth of sixteen feet below the surface. On the seventh day of July, 1869, the first stone in the foundation was laid. The corner stone was laid on June 23, 1871. The size is

300 feet north and south, by 400 feet east and west, and with the porticoes, will cover 3 acres and 7 square feet. The walls are 108 feet high from the water table. Total cost of the building up to February 25, 1886, was $\$ 17,310,720$. It is estimated that it will cost at least $\$ 6,000,000$ more to complete it.
