DIRECTION OF THE MASTER OF THE ROLLS.

ON the 26th of January 1857, the Master of the Rolls submitted to the Treasury a proposal for the publication of materials for the History of this Country from the Invasion of the Romans to the Reign of Henry VIII.

The Master of the Rolls suggested that these materials should be selected for publication under competent editors without reference to periodical or chronological arrangement, without mutilation or abridgment, preference being given, in the first instance, to such materials as were most scarce and valuable.

He proposed that each chronicle or historical document to be edited should be treated in the same way as if the editor were engaged on an *Editio Princeps*; and for this purpose the most correct text should be formed from an accurate collation of the best MSS.

To render the work more generally useful, the Master of the Rolls suggested that the editor should give an account of the MSS. employed by him, of their age and their peculiarities; that he should add to the work a brief account of the life and times of the author, and any remarks necessary to explain the chronology; but no other note or comment was to be allowed, except what might be necessary to establish the correctness of the text.

The works to be published in octavo, separately, as they were finished; the whole responsibility of the task resting upon the editors, who were to be chosen by the Master of the Rolls with the sanction of the Treasury.

The Lords of Her Majesty's Treasury, after a careful consideration of the subject, expressed their opinion in a Treasury Minute, dated February 9, 1857, that the plan recommended by the Master of the Rolls "was well calculated for the accomplishment of this important national object, in an effectual and satisfactory manner, within a reasonable time, and provided proper attention be paid to economy, in making the detailed arrangements, without unnecessary expense."

They expressed their approbation of the proposal that each chronicle and historical document should be edited in such a manner as to represent with all possible correctness the text of each writer, derived from a collation of the best MSS., and that no notes should be added, except such as were illustrative of the various readings. They suggested, however, that the preface to each work should contain, in addition to the particulars proposed by the Master of the Rolls, a biographical account of the author, so far as authentic materials existed for that purpose, and an estimate of his historical credibility and value.

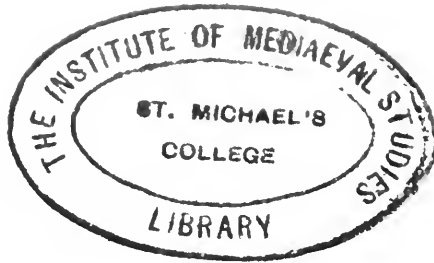

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P R E F A C E.

No Manuscript of the Chronicle of John de Oxenedes but that which forms the text of the volume before the reader is at present known, nor have any particulars reached us as to the personal origin or history of the writer.

The Title of the Cottonian manuscript which stands at the head of the Chronicle, and names John de Oxenedes as its author, is not in the original handwriting of the manuscript, but in a hand apparently of the middle of the seventeenth century. Smith, however, in his Catalogue of the Cottonian Collection, printed in 1696, gives it as it stands, with the name of John de Oxenedes as that of the author. The work is cited as his by Wharton in the *Anglia Sacra*, as well as by Bishop Tanner in the *Notitia Monastica*; and Bishop Tanner has expressly given him a place as the author of this Chronicle in his *Bibliotheca Britannico-Hibernica*. Wherever this Chronicle has been quoted, it has been referred to as the production of John de Oxenedes.

That the writer was a monk of the Abbey of St. Benet Holme is obvious, not only from the particulars enumerated throughout his history regarding the Abbey itself, the progressive rise of its buildings,

and the series of its abbots and their characters, but more especially from a passage¹ in which the minute circumstances are detailed attending King Edward the First's grant in the year 1286, in confirmation to St. Benet Holme of all its previous charters of endowment. Again, the writer's exultation, as regarded his abbey, at the favourable issue of a suit relating to the manor of Swantone in 1289;² and in the very last page but one of his work, where the manor of Ludham Ferding was claimed in a suit for the king, under the advice of one Robert de Rose; but upon the production of Edward the Confessor's charter and the passage of the Domesday Survey in which the manor was entered as belonging to the abbey, the claim made before the lords justices became invalidated. These confirm the connexion of the author with the Abbey of St. Benet. The monk says in the summary of his satisfaction: "Et sic
" Domino volente, et Sancto Benedicto protegente,
" actum est ut, remanente manerio prædicto in statu
" pristino, prædictus Robertus de suo maligno plane
" deficeret proposito."

OXNEAD, the place from which our chronicler is presumed to have obtained his name, is a village situated about ten miles from the Holme, though it appears never to have had any connexion with the abbey, nor is its name mentioned in any of the abbey's Cartularies. We have proof that the estate of Oxnead has continued to be the property of private families from the time of the Saxons to the present hour. The presumption can only be that John de Oxenedes received the additional appellation to his christian name, like a large portion of our best

Chroniclers, from the town or village of his birth. Adam de Neteshirde, one of the abbots of St. Benet Holme, who lived but at a short distance from our author's time, received his name from Neteshirde, one of the manors belonging to the monastery, and of which he probably was a native.

We have now to describe the Chronicle itself, as placed before the reader.

The fac-simile which stands at the opening of the present volume sufficiently indicates the age and condition of the manuscript which has supplied the text. The writing is in the smallest character of its period; the age, that of the very opening of the fourteenth century. It is written upon vellum, in small pages, arranged upon a larger one, like columns, varying as to number upon the quarto page; in most instances containing six, in others eight, and two of them containing twelve of the smaller pages upon the quarto. The total number of the quarto pages is thirty-nine; of the smaller pages or columns, two hundred and seventy-six.

The early history of the Monastery of St. Benet, to the year 1275 inclusive, precedes the general history which forms the Work, like a detached tract. It is written on small pages, in the manner of the history itself, upon the two sides of a single separated leaf; and in the hand unquestionably of the same scribe. Many of its details are essential to portions of the History; it has, therefore, received its place as an accompaniment, and forms the first article in the Appendix to the present volume.

Among some mutilated Scraps which have been selected within the last few years from the remains of the Cottonian fire, some imperfect fragments have been found, in which one or two historical events are

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noticed relating to St. Benet Holme, and which have led to the conclusion that these fragments must once have formed a volume belonging to the Abbey. They are also upon vellum, in a hand nearly contemporary with our present Chronicle, and are now bound with it in the same Book of the Cottonian Collection. These fragments form the second article in the Appendix to the present volume.

We now come to the contents of John de Oxenedes' Chronicle.

It was the practice from the settlement of England after the Norman Conquest, as well as in the countries immediately neighbouring, for persons of leisure, both in the greater and lesser abbeys and monasteries, to collect Annals relating as well to previous times as to their own. Brevity and compression were at first the chief features of these chronicles ; but in our own country, about or soon after the time of Henry the First, more extended narratives appear, which, in many instances, led to the more elaborate composition of History. Few, however, of these annalists aspired to the character of original writers. They took the most approved texts of their times as their foundation, added something of their own, and abridged or omitted what they thought less interesting, inserting such new facts as they relied upon with confidence, or which fell within the scope of their own personal knowledge, or related to the circumstances or localities of the religious houses to which they belonged or had reference. Such Registers of events, moreover, were expected, from authority, to be preserved in our monastic establishments. When Edward the First, as John de Oxenedes relates, claimed to be the superior lord of Scotland, he sent for certain religious of the English monasteries to meet him at Norham with their

Chronicles.¹ Knighton, in his "Compilatio de Eventibus Angliæ," enumerates the chronicles which were produced on this very occasion.² Edward and his council are stated to have examined them, and upon their evidence it became clear to all, both the English of the council and the Scotch claimants themselves, that the "Jus supremum" of that country was his right. The deed of settlement also, then drawn up, vesting the superiority in King Edward, (accompanied by a deed of seisin delivered on the part of the several competitors for that crown,) were finally sent to the Abbey of St. Edmund, as well as to various other abbeys, with the king's order for the insertion of them in their Chronicles. The instruments here referred to appear in the manuscripts and chronicles of various monasteries, in some of them in Latin, and in others in the French language. John de Oxenedes, who appears to have obtained them from the Abbey of St. Edmund,³ has given them in Latin.

After Horsa and Hengist's arrival, John de Oxenedes' history, with slight notices of Offa and St. Alban, Ingleis and Ina, passes, (probably on account of the confused story which the heptarchic portion of our history affords,) to the reign of Alfred, where his Narrative substantially begins. He gives Alfred's pedigree in the style of sacred genealogy, and finally considers him as the first monarch of the whole of

When the clerks were ejected

from St. Edmund's, and monks substituted for them by Canute, the latter, twelve in number, were transferred together with their books and ecclesiastical ornaments, from St. Benet's to begin the new foundation.

England ; possibly as the first of our monarchs who received papal consecration. He enumerates Alfred's actions and character in a few sentences, and particularly mentions his monastic foundations at Athelney and Shaftesbury.

From this time the course of his history, however short the form in which the facts may be stated, goes on unbroken.

Edgar is another of our sovereigns of whom the Author stops to give a particularly favourable notice, as one whose great deeds deserve proportionate admiration from the reader.

It may be proper in the next place to say something of the sources from which John de Oxenedes drew different portions of his history.

In reference to the story of the Emperor Henry the Third, his sister, and the clerk, in the time of Hardecnut, he says : "Ista invenies in libro W. de Malmesbirie."¹ In p. 47, under the year 1128, he notices the Chronicle of Hugh de St. Victor : "Hucus-
" que magister Hugo de Sancto Victore Chronica sua
" scripsit." In p. 55, recording the death of Eustace, the son of king Stephen, he says : "De hoc Poly-
" craticus Carnotensis, libro vj. capitulo xxvii.;" and in the same page, as will again be mentioned, he refers to the "Veteres Historiæ Hibernienses."

Subsequent to the period of the Norman Conquest he follows the general thread of Roger de Wendover's text as an outline, using similar but more condensed language, interspersing new facts and passages in particular parts, and at greater length in the reigns of Richard the First, John, and Henry the Third ; and to the end of his Chronicle in these latter reigns en-

larging the details, differing, nevertheless, in various instances from Wendover's text. A remarkable example occurs under the year 1102, when archbishop Anselm, in the Council held at London, caused the marriage of ecclesiastics to be prohibited. Wendover says: "In hoc Concilio sacerdotes *concupinarios* excommunicavit, nisi eas de cætero amoverent." Oxenedes' difference in his text is material. He says: "Anselmus archiepiscopus Cantuariensis celebravit Concilium Londoniis, in quo prohibuit *uxores sacerdotibus* Anglorum, *antea non prohibitas.*" The proof of this, if required, may be seen even in the Domesday Survey, where, in the account of Lincoln, i. 336, "*uxor* Siuuardi presbyteri" occurs; and again in the second volume, in the notice of Blafelda, in Norfolk, fol. 195, where it is said, "hoc manerium accepit Almarus *cum uxore sua* antequam esset episcopus."

His account of the death of Richard the First is peculiarly deserving of attention. It is nearly identical with the account given by Ralph de Coggeshale in his "Chronicon Anglicanum ab anno M.lxvi. ad M.cc.," preserved in the eighteenth volume of the "Recueil des Historiens des Gaules et de la France," of Dom. Bouquet, p. 85, with no mention either of Bertram de Gurdun or Peter Bazil or John Sabraz as the cross-bow man who discharged the shaft, but simply as "quidam armatus."¹

With Matthew Paris's history he was well acquainted. In p. 184 he finishes a reflection upon the incidents which brought the twenty-fifth half century of the Christian era to its completion, with the words: "Si quis ea inspicere desiderat, quærat in chronicis domini Matthæi Parisiensis apud Sanctum Albanum

“ in anno scilicet M.ccl. Hic enim terminavit prædictus Matthæus Parisiacensis monachus Sancti Albani Chronica sua.” In a subsequent page, speaking of the council held by Otto, the pope’s legate, he says: “In hoc quoque Concilio privavit omnes illos beneficiis suis ecclesiasticis qui successerant patribus suis immediate. Cætera autem quæ in hoc Concilio statuit in Chronicis Sancti Albani scribuntur.”

He refers again to Matthew Paris (p. 217) in relation to a document “*De Vita et Moribus Tartarorum*,” of the bulk of a Psalter, in a manner as if Matthew Paris’s history was laid open to inspection at St. Alban’s; “quod qui inspicere desiderat apud Sanctum Albanum in libro Additamentorum poterit reperire.”

There are several passages in John de Oxencedes’ history to which it may not be improper to draw the reader’s particular attention.

The ravages of the Northern Pirates upon every part of the English coast in the tenth and eleventh centuries afford the first passage on which the editor of the present volume would make a short remark.

Even at this day large hoards of the Coins of our Saxon monarchs, from the time of Edgar, it is to be particularly observed, to that of King Edward the Confessor, are found buried in Denmark, Norway, and Sweden.

M. Bror Emil Hildebrand, in a quarto volume printed at Stockholm in 1817, of considerable thickness, has given a Catalogue of those at present preserved in the Royal Collection at Stockholm; a similar though less extensive catalogue of Saxon coins, ranging through the same period, preserved in the Museum of the Royal Academy of Upsala, was published there in a thinner quarto in 1846, by Prof. J. H. Schröder.

Hildebrand, in remarking upon the Swedish Royal Collection, observes that Anglo-Saxon coins have been

found in other provinces on the eastern shores of the Baltic, but that the discoveries are of small importance compared with those of Sweden. After Sweden, however, he says, the greatest finds have been in Denmark, and it must be observed that the Swedish provinces of Gothland and Scania, in which the richest discoveries of this class are made, belonged to Denmark, at the time when these Anglo-Saxon coins were buried.

Hildebrand observes, and he is no doubt correct, so great must have been the plunder that the finds of buried Anglo-Saxon coins, struck during the period already described, are far more numerous at the present day in these northern Countries than such finds as can be discovered in England.

In these Collections the coins of Edgar, in whose reign the series begins, are few in number. Æthelred the Second's coins are immensely numerous in the Royal Collection, and not insufficiently extensive in the Collection of the Academy. Æthelred the Second, it will be remembered, to save his kingdom consented to pay Dane-geld, a tribute which Hildebrand estimates at the sum of 167,000 pounds of silver.

This was the time when the piracies of the Danes had been extended into a continual war for the conquest of our country. The extension of their ravages, as far as the absorption of coined money went, is singularly shown upon the reverses of the very coins recorded in these Catalogues, upon which the names of almost every city and town in England, where coins had been struck, stand recorded. Denmark and her armies may be said at that period to have exhausted England. The coins of Edward the Confessor in these northern cabinets are comparatively few, tending to the belief that the types are of the early part only of his reign. The Danes had been driven out from England, their ravages had ceased, and we

hear of no finds of coins in Sweden or Denmark of or belonging to the Norman princes.¹

The extreme cruelty with which the Jews were treated in England in early times is carefully recorded by Oxenedes in successive pages of his Chronicle. Usury and the clipping of the current money were the chief charges against this unhappy people. The persecution of them was marvellous—almost incredible; but the statements of our chronicles on this point are fully supported by the numerous entries of fines and punishments regularly entered against them in our public Records.

The earliest mention of the Jews in England which can be relied upon, is that inserted in the Canonical Excerptions published by Ecgbriht, archbishop of York, in the year 740; chronicled under that year by Johnson in his Ecclesiastical Canons. That they were here in the early Norman time seems unquestionable. In the reign of Henry the Second the strong persecution of them probably began, followed, as it was, by the massacre of them at the coronation of Richard the First. John, as we know by his letter to the mayor and barons of London, printed by Tovey, except as far as his own personal extortions might go,

was favourable to them; but the odium they were popularly held in continued unabated till their expulsion in 1290.

There is a curious passage relating to them preserved in one of the Hargrave Manuscripts in the British Museum,¹ formerly copied from a volume, once the Cottonian MS. Otho B. iii., but of which the fire of 1731 left but some poor fragments. It states that in the third year of Edward the Second a few Jews endeavoured to feel their way toward a return to England: "Anno Domini 1310, et regni regis tertio, ut dictum est. Eodem anno, circiter festum Sancti Johannis Baptistæ, sex Judæi venerunt Londoniam eo quod voluerunt impetrare licentiam a rege in Anglia commorare. Unus eorum fuit medicus." That the application was unsuccessful there can be no doubt. The occurrence, as far as the present editor has been able to discover, is unnoticed in any other Chronicle.

In the account of the reconciliation between King Stephen and Duke Henry at Wallingford, in 1153 after the death of Eustace, Oxenedes makes particular mention of St. Patrick's purgatory, and especially of the entry into it of one Sir Owen, a knight of King Stephen's army. "Concordia itaque facta, miles quidam, Oenus nomine, qui sub rege Stephano multis annis militaverat, in Purgatorio Sancti Patricii vivus intravit. De hoc quoque Purgatorio et ejus origine et vita tradunt Veteres Historiæ Hybernienses."

The chronicles here alluded to are, no doubt, those which have since been embodied into what is called the "Annals of Ireland, translated from the original Irish of the Four Masters; published in 1846 by

The Purgatory of St. Patrick was a Cave in an island of the lake of Lough Dirgh, in Donegal, in the diocese of Clogher, where, according to popish doctrine, souls were purged from carnal impurities before they were received into heaven. It is mentioned by several of our chroniclers, and especially by Giraldus Cambrensis. This island, it is said, was of great wildness, and of remarkable physical character, containing caverns from which strange evaporations issued, and was considered even to be the abode of demons.

At the end of the fifteenth century the Purgatory of St. Patrick fell into disgrace. A monk of Eymstadt, in Holland, undertook a pilgrimage to Lough Dirgh; when he arrived at the lake, he applied to the prior of a neighbouring monastery who had the charge of it, who referred him to the bishop of Clogher who demanded a certain sum of money which the bishop said was due to him from every pilgrim who sought the cave. The monk pleaded his poverty and the bishop at last grudgingly gave his licence. The monk subsequently made complaint to the Holy See at Rome, when Alexander the Sixth ordered the destruction of the Purgatory, which was carried into effect upon St. Patrick's day, A.D. 1477.

The Cave, however, or another for it, was subsequently renewed, and pilgrimages are still continued to it at a certain period of the year by devotees from all parts of Ireland, and many from England and Scotland. The annual number of late years has been estimated by one writer at from ten to fifteen thousand persons. Much relating to it may be read in Gough's edition of Camden's *Britannia*, and more extensively in “St. Patrick's Purgatory, an Essay on the Legends of Purgatory, Hell, and Paradise current

A more immediate illustration, however, of this notice by John de Oxenedes will be found in a very curious MS. in the Harleian Collection, in a hand of the fourteenth century: “*Narratio cujusdam Monachi de Purgatorio Sancti Patricii tempore regis Stephani,*” written by Henry, a monk of Saltrey in Huntingdonshire, addressed to the abbot de Sartis; the second division of which is devoted to the visit of King Stephen’s knight, Sir Owen. Other MSS. of this narrative exist in our libraries, one or two as old as John de Oxenedes’ own time.

Our old manuscript records afford numerous entries relating to St. Patrick’s Purgatory. It is clear that at the beginning of the thirteenth century it had become famous through Europe. In a patent of Edward the Third, A.D. 1358, the king gives testimonials to two foreigners, one a noble Hungarian, the other a Lombard, Nicholas de Beccariis, of their having faithfully performed this pilgrimage; and still later, in 1397, King Richard the Second granted a safe conduct to visit this place to Raymond, viscount of Perilhus, knight of Rhodes and chamberlain of the king of France, with twenty men and thirty horses.¹

Froissart records a conversation between himself and Sir William Lisle on this subject, which is thus given by Lord Berners:

“ On the Friday, in the morning, Sir William
“ Lysle and I rode together, and on the way I de-
“ manded of hym if he had been with the kynge in
“ the voyage into Irelande. He answered me Yes.
“ Then I demaunded of hym the maner of the Hole
“ that is in Irelande, called Saynt Patryke’s Purga-

“ torie; if it were trew that was sayde of it or not?
“ Then he sayde, that of a suretie such a hole there
“ was, and that he hymselfe and another knyght of
“ Englande hadde ben there whyle the kinge laye in
“ Duuelyn, and sayd howe they entred into the hoole
“ and were closed in at the sonne goynge downe, and
“ abode there all nyght, and the nexte mornyng
“ issued out agayne at the son risyng. Then I de-
“ maunded if he had any suche strange sightes or
“ vysions as were spoken of? Than he sayd, howe
“ that when he and his felowe were entred and past
“ the gate that was called the Purgatorie of St.
“ Patryke, and that they ware discended and gone
“ downe three or four paces, discending downe as
“ into a cellar, a certayne hoothe vapure rose agaynst
“ them, and stroke so into their heades, that they
“ were fayne to syt downe on the steeres, which are
“ of stone; and after they had sytte there a season,
“ they had great desyre to slepe, and so fell aslepe,
“ and slepte there all nyght. Then I demaunded,
“ that if in their slepe they knewe where they were,
“ or what vysions they had? He answered me, that
“ in slepyng they entred into great ymaginacyons
“ and in marvelous dremes, otherwyse than they were
“ wont to have in their chambres; and in the
“ mornynge they issued out, and within a shorte
“ season clene forgate their dremes and visyons,
“ wherfore he sayde he thought all that mater was
“ but a fantasy. Than I lefte spekyng any further
“ of that mater, bycause I wolde fayne have
“ knowen of hym what was done in the voyage in
“ Irelande.”¹

In the reign of Henry the Second two periods of

coinage are mentioned, not only by John de Oxenedes, but by most of our historians, in the briefest manner. Of the first, under the year 1158, it is said "Nova moneta fabricata est in Anglia."¹ Of the second, under the year 1180, "Nova moneta fabricata est."²

Benedict, abbot of Peterborough, who lived at the time, is the only writer who gives a rather more extended notice of this last coinage. He says: "Eodem anno, scilicet ab Incarnatione Domini 1180, Henricus rex Angliæ fecit in Anglia novam monetam fieri, et præcepit quod a festo Sancti Martini non caperetur alia moneta in Anglia quam illa nova; vetus namque moneta corrupta fuit, et rex monetarios redemit; id est ad redemptionem coëgit." The coins of former sovereigns were entirely withdrawn from circulation.

The type of the first of these coinages there can be no doubt was that of the great hoard found at Tealby, in Lincolnshire, in the year 1813, described by the late Taylor Combe, Esq., in the *Archæologia* of the Society of Antiquaries.

The second type is equally unquestionable. Its obverse representing the full portrait of the king, bearing a sceptre of pearls in his right hand, with a chaplet of pearls instead of a crown upon his head, and moreover a short cross within a circle on the reverse, a reverse which all our Chronicles state to have been so reprobated by King Henry the Third when he issued his coinage of 1247, and extended the cross on the reverse to the outer edge.

Henry the Second, it will be remembered, publicly laid aside his crown immediately after his second coronation at Worcester, in the year 1158.

The coinage of 1180, therefore, might fairly represent him in the aged appearance depicted upon this

money; and the fillet or chaplet, it will be owned, was quite appropriate for one who had determined no longer to wear the royal ornament, and, moreover, who had some years before, in 1170, placed at least the half of his crown upon his son's head, so far associating him in the privileges of regal power.

In all the works upon English coins for many years passed, these coins with the strong bearded face, as may be seen in Leake's *Historical Account of English Money from the Conquest*, in the notes to Tindal's edition of Rapin's *History of England*, and in Bishop Fleetwood's *Chronicon Preciosum*, are uniformly ascribed to Henry the Second. But about, or soon after 1750, the Rev. George North, of Codicote, engraved two plates intended to accompany a dissertation, which he never executed, to prove those coins bearing the portrait of an aged king to have been in reality the first coinage of king Henry the Third. Withy and Ryall, in the fifth of their plates of English coins, dated in 1756, were the first persons who published them as of the first coinage of Henry the Third. Snelling, in his account of the silver coinage of England, gave way to the notion; and, at a still later time, the Rev. Rogers Ruding added his acquiescence; and these coins at present remain in most of our collector's cabinets as belonging to an imaginary first coinage of King Henry the Third.

It is not impossible but that upon the investigation here detailed the last coins of Henry the Second may get back in the cabinets of our collectors to their old position.

The reign of Henry the Third presents several passages in John de Oxenedes' *Chronicle* deserving particular remark; and one, forming something like an anomaly in our general history, that of assigning to

Henry, the son of King John, the title of Henry the Third.

John de Oxenedes writes upon this point with great stress;¹ and in every page of his manuscript which relates to or bears the name of Henry the Third, the small numeral iii. is placed above "Henricus;" for which in the printed text the number has been placed after the name.

It was in the year 1170 that Henry the Second caused his eldest son, Henry, to be associated with him upon the throne; it was on the fourth of the Ides of July that year, though contrary to the pope's prohibition, and without the archbishop of Canterbury's sanction, that his son was crowned at Westminster by the archbishop of York. By some he appears to have been called Henry the younger, by others Henry the Third. In the following year Henry, the father, under the good offices of the king of France, became reconciled to Becket, but with little success as far as his own good fortune was concerned. The moment Becket returned from exile he pronounced an anathema upon all who had given their aid to the younger king's coronation; after Becket's murder, however, release was given to the interdict.

Several of our Chroniclers mention a second coronation of the younger king in 1172 or 1173; but neither Wendover nor Oxenedes, nor several other of our historians, notice it. Such coronation, however, stands recorded. It is said to have taken place at Winchester, when the younger Henry's queen came to England, and that he received the crown on that occasion from the archbishop of Rouen who performed the ceremony.

In the "Chronologia Augustinensis Cant.," printed

Twysden's *Scriptores*, he is called "Rex junior, qui fuit rex transmarinus."¹

Knighton, in another page of Twysden's *Scriptores*, tells us that William, king of Scotland, at the coronation of the son—at the first coronation, no doubt—did homage to him as Henry the Third: "Item Willielmus rex Scotiæ fecit homagium regi Henrico tertio filio regis Henrici secundi in coronatione sua, et iterum Henrico patri anno regni sui vicesimo, sicut patet in quadam conventionione inter eos inde facta."²

Henry the younger subsequently went into rebellion, and seduced his brothers to join him; and though a temporary reconciliation of a promising kind took place between father and son in 1176, it became but of short continuance, and the junior king continued in hostility to his father to the time of his own death in 1183.

During the period that the son participated in his father's throne he was everywhere recognized as junior king; but to what extent his power reached as to exercising the prerogative of royalty in granting charters seems obscure.

The older of the *Chartularies* of Waltham Abbey preserved in the Harleian collection of manuscripts³ presents us with several charters, in which Henry, the son of Henry, is designated by his brother Richard and by his mother queen Eleanor, as Henry the Third.

It was in the year 1177 that Henry the Second changed the religious house of Waltham from a college of a dean and eleven secular canons to an Abbey of regular canons of the order of St. Austin. Among the several charters of security in confirmation of the

abbey's change of its inhabitants, there is certainly one from Henry the younger, in which he calls himself simply "Henricus, Dei gratia rex Angliæ, dux "Normanniæ et comes Andegaviæ, regis Henrici "filius." Dated from Argenton.

A charter of Richard the First, however, after he came to the throne, confirms its possessions to the abbey as "a venerabili principe rege Henrico secundo "patre nostro pro salute sua et suorum condita, et "a rege *Henrico tertio, fratre nostro confirmata.*"

Queen Eleanor also, in another charter granted by her in Richard's time "de mutatione Canonorum," says it is necessary strictly to observe "ea quæ con- "dita sunt a venerabili principe rege Henrico se- "cundo, domino meo, pro salute sua et suorum, et a "rege *Henrico tertio, et a rege Ricardo primo,* "filiis meis."

A charter from the Henry at present acknowledged in our histories as the real Henry the Third, to the same Monastery, in another part of the same volume, is headed by a rubric: "Confirmatio regis Henrici "tertii, *scilicet* filii regis Johannis, de possessioni- "bus."

There can be no doubt but that for the purpose of this very distinction, Henry the Third, upon most of the coins which he struck for currency in his reign, used the numeral III. or the word "tertius," upon the larger portion, in addition to his name as king; a practice not followed by subsequent sovereigns till late in the reign of Henry the Seventh. Oxenedes, in p. 137, decides, at least for his own history, that Henry the younger having died within the period of his father's life, the title of Henry the Third could be alone appropriate to Henry the son of John.

How prevalent the consideration of this point must have been at the time, as to the numeral which it was right should be adopted for the new king, we

may gather from the Chronicle of Hayles, a MS. of the period,¹ where he is named as Henry the Fourth; “Anno Domini Millesimo cc. sexto decimo. Coronatio Henrici QUARTI filii regis Johannis.”

The “*Annales Abbatiae de Bermondsey*,”² under the year 1183, noticing Henry the younger’s death, say: “Et eodem anno obiit Henricus rex tertius, vivente adhuc patre suo, et regnavit tredecim annos. Iste Henricus rex non annumeratur in numero regum, eo quod injuriose coronatus sit a Rogero, Ebor. episcopo, dum Thomas Cantuariensis archiepiscopus pro justitia exularet.”

The irregularity of his coronation seems to have been the most generally received doubt whether Henry, the son of Henry, could properly be placed in the list of succession of our kings.

The reader will find a singular memorandum in John de Oxenedes’ Chronicle, under the year 1234, in relation to a change which appears to have been made, although so advanced in his reign, in the computation of King Henry the Third’s regnal year:

“Anno gratiæ Mccxxxiiij^o, qui est annus regni regis Henrici III. xviiij^{us}. Nota hic ordinem annorum regni regis Henrici mutatum, scilicet ut non computetur pro anno tempus regni sui primitivum, scilicet a festo apostolorum Simonis et Judæ usque ad Natale.”

The calculation of the regnal years of our kings, in early times, was often a source of much confusion both to our chroniclers and our judicial records. The year of reign was usually computed from the day of coronation; and where the date began, as in the case of King John, from a moveable feast, the confusion

became of so great extent that the wonder arises why it had not been attended to and altered even at that early period. Mr. Hardy, in his Introduction to the Description of the Close Rolls, says: "King John did not assume the regal dignity and prerogatives until he had been crowned, although his brother Richard had been dead upwards of seven weeks before the coronation took place. Richard the first died on the 6th of April 1199. King John was crowned on the 27th of the following May, which was Ascension day, and his regnal year was computed from one Ascension day to the next; consequently some of the years exhibit an increase of seven weeks more than others, owing to the day of his coronation being that of a moveable feast, which of course sometimes fell earlier or later, as Easter happened."

The acknowledged hereditary descent of the crown of England might of itself have been expected to put an end to so perplexing a practice. Some of our later sovereigns, however, unquestionably saw the inconvenience. In the opening of the accounts for Cornwall in the Chancellor's roll of the 21st Henry Vth the date is given: "A festo Sancti Michaelis, anno xiiij., dicti nuper regis usque xx^m diem Martii proxime sequentem quo die idem nuper rex obiit et prædictus H. filius incepit regnare."

In a manuscript of Enrolments also, of the time of Henry the Eighth, MS. Egerton, Mus. Brit., 986; there is one evidently intended for the use of the clerks as a direction for them in marking the regnal years: "Rex Hen. VIII. incepit regnare a xxj^{mo} die Aprilis, quo die rex H. VII. obiit."

The dates of epochs fixed upon for regnal years appear, upon investigation, to be quite as irregular and as uncertain in other countries as in our own; so far, to a certain extent, accounting for the disagreements or even contrarieties occasionally found in

the works of the chroniclers of most of the countries of Europe.

On the eve of St. Edmund, 1242, John de Oxenedes chronicles an occurrence which continued to be an occasional nuisance almost to our own time, namely, the inundation of Westminster Hall by the river Thames at spring-tides. At the flood immediately referred to he says boats could swim in the Hall.

It is not a little remarkable that an inconvenience such as this, in the hall of the king's palace, should have continued till late in the eighteenth century.

In the year 1727, a day of spring-tide was unwittingly fixed upon by proclamation for celebrating the coronation of King George the Second and his queen; it being omitted from recollection that the banquet on such occasion would be held in Westminster Hall. The day fixed, October the 4th, was obliged to be altered by another proclamation, and the ceremonial of the coronation changed in consequence to the 11th of the same month.

John de Oxenedes, as well as the rest of the chroniclers contemporary with him, has been particularly careful in noticing the great change in the reverse type of the silver coinage of Henry the Third in the year 1247. This is, in truth, the only date which we have of a coinage of Henry the Third.

John de Walingforde, Matthew Paris, and John de Oxenedes, each in the margins of the respective manuscripts of their chronicles,¹ have given an outline drawing of the coin, all three evidently from different specimens. John de Oxenedes is of the re-

verse only,¹ without inscription. John de Walingforde and Matthew Paris give representations of both sides of the coin.

The great feature of change in this coinage stood in the type of the reverse. The coins of the kings immediately preceding Henry the Third presented upon their reverse a small cross extending no further than the inner circle. On the reverse of the new coins the cross was a double one, consisting of two limbs stretching to the outside of the circle which contained the legend, more effectually to prevent clipping. The circle, the letters, and the portrait on the obverse, extending also every way to the extremity of the circumference, the coin could not in any way be diminished without its loss being at once perceived.² The proclamation of the day commanded that no clipped money should be current. All pieces so diminished were to be received by the exchangers simply for the weight of silver they produced.

The double cross upon the new coins was intended, moreover, to facilitate the correct division of the penny into halfpence and farthings. Henry the First is said in the latter part of his reign to have coined such smaller pieces in their own form; but none have ever appeared. J. de Oxenedes notices those which were subsequently struck as separate coins by king Edward the First in 1280.

Ruding, in his "Annals of the Coinage of Great Britain,"³ says the first regular Trial of the Pix took

place in the ninth or tenth year of Edward the First. But this is a mistake. The earliest Trial of the Pix that we are acquainted with was of the 32nd of Henry the Third, A.D. 1247, evidently connected with the very coinage which we have been commenting upon. A copy of it is preserved in a hand nearly, if not quite, contemporary with John de Oxenedes' Chronicle, in one of the volumes of the Hargrave Collection of Manuscripts.¹ It is important and will be found in the Appendix to the present volume, Num. III. It affords the particulars of the earliest Trial of Assay with which our monetary history is acquainted, and in all probability the very first resorted to.

Henry the Third's plan to prevent the clipping of the coin lasted a considerable time. But clipping was again practised fearfully during the great struggle of the Roses, as well as afterward, and again repressed in 1561 by the introduction of the mill and screw. The partial continuance of a hammered coinage, however, renewed the practice to some extent during the civil war; and it cannot be said to have been finally put down till 1662, when the mill and screw were solely relied upon for perfect coinage.

A few pages onward in his work,² John de Oxenedes mentions another coinage, upon which a brief comment will not be inappropriate. He describes the coinage by King Edward the First in 1279 of a "*Denarius magnus, equipollens iiij. denariis communibus.*" This coin is well known by the more attentive collectors of our ancient money. Specimens are to be found in numerous cabinets, bearing the type and superscription acknowledged to be that of

Edward the First, and of the exact weight in most instances as mentioned by John de Oxenedes as well as by other contemporary chroniclers. Two specimens occur in the cabinet of the British Museum, one of them weighing 77 grains, a small piece out of the edge; the other 80 grains.

A specimen was sold some years ago at the sale of Sir Roger Twysden's coins, which weighed 83 grains. Three specimens at the sale of Mr. Dodsley Cuff's coins, two of them weighing 86 and one 86½ grains; one in the Catalogue of the Pembroke Sale is stated to have weighed 92 grains. These discrepancies in weight have rendered it probable that some of the specimens here noticed must have been Pattern pieces; but there can be no doubt of the generality being the pieces alluded to in John de Oxenedes' text. These "Denarii magni" were probably of too large an amount of value at the time for the ordinary purposes of life; no other groats appearing in the series of our coinage till those came out which were struck at Calais by King Edward the Third, seventy-three years afterwards.

John de Oxenedes, like Matthew Paris, chronicles the arrival of the first elephant in England in 1255, presented to Henry the Third by the king of France. Matthew Paris made a drawing of this animal, the original of which is still to be seen in the Cottonian MS., Nero D. 1; and a drawing of it also appears in the chronicle of John de Walingforde. It arrived at Sandwich, and was conveyed to the Tower of London, where the sheriffs had been directed by the king's precept to build a house for it, forty feet in length and twenty in breadth, taking care to let the building have sufficient strength to be fit for any other purpose.¹

The animal itself was ten feet in height to the top of the back, and was ten years old. He lived to the 41st of Henry the Third, in which year it appears upon the Chancellor's roll that for the maintenance of the elephant and his keeper, from Michaelmas to St. Valentine's day, immediately before the animal died, the charge came to no less than 16*l.* 13*s.* 1*d.*¹ His keeper was named John Gooch.

There is a subject slightly touched upon by Oxenedes under the year 1277, which seems to deserve inquiry. He relates the fact of the great king of the Tartars, called the Mogul, sending a mission of six of the greater persons of his court, with an interpreter, soliciting King Edward the First to join in a new Crusade.

About the same time a mission is stated to have been sent upon the same errand to the king of France, in hope that both sovereigns would join the Mogul.

Documents, it may be presumed, are somewhere to be found affording further particulars in regard to this mission and the conferences arising from it. It was slightly touched upon in the eighth volume of the *Archæological Journal* by the late Mr. Hudson, but the editor of the present volume is not aware that this subject has received further elucidation.

Under the year 1280 Oxenedes chronicles a second friendly mission from the Mogul to the king of England.

As events drew nearer to his own time, John de Oxenedes' Narratives of particular occurrences become more lengthened.

The barons' war with Henry the Third is given at

considerable length, with a detail of the battle of Lewes particularly interesting.

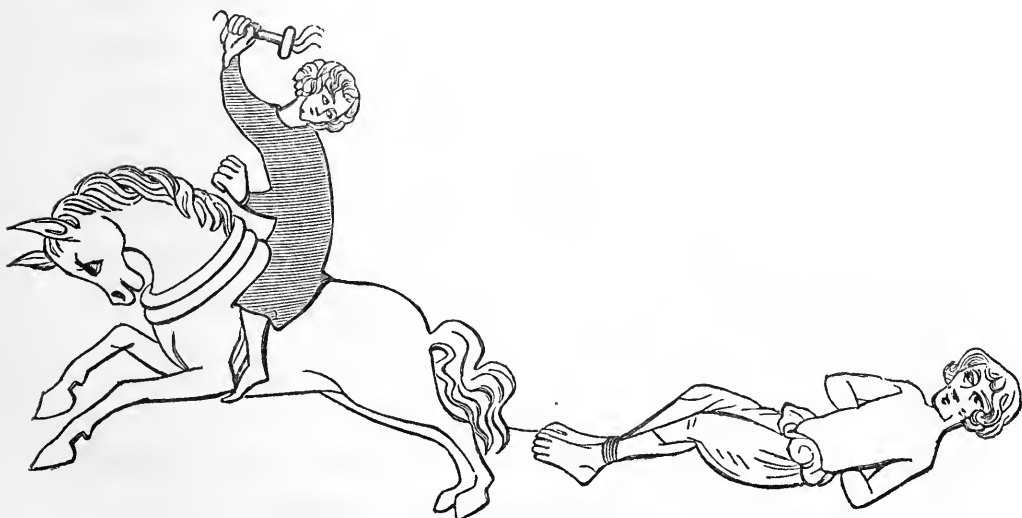
Another remarkable narrative will be found in what relates to the conquest of Wales from the last of the Llewellins in 1282. The details are of a cruel character, but highly descriptive, and singularly so of the state of feeling of our metropolis when the citizens came out to meet Llewelin's head with horns and trumpets. Llewelin's conduct, under the incitement of his people, was treacherous; especially viewed through the impression of the day, when the "Osculum Pacis" had passed between him and Edward, and was supposed to have sealed a continuous alliance.

The present editor, in the course of his researches, found upon the Chancellor's roll of the 19th of Edward the First a minute detail of this War, which proved the ruin of Llewelin, preserved in the Wardrobe accounts of that year, including the sums raised, and from whence, for the prosecution of it, as well as a particular account of the expenditure throughout the whole of the campaign. The sums raised amounted to no less than one hundred and two thousand six hundred and twenty-one pounds and fourpence. The cost of the war is put down at eighty thousand two hundred and forty-eight pounds ten shillings and a half-penny. The whole will be found in the Appendix Num. IV., and is an interesting document.

John de Oxenedes and his fellow chroniclers have carefully noted a last attempt of the people of South Wales, under Rhys ap Meredyth, in 1292, to rescue their country. He says: "Interfecto Reso Mereduci
" filio, qui sibi magna parte Suth-Walensium favente
" regi Angliæ rebellis extiterat, et corpore ejus in
" quatuor partibus membratim diviso in rebellium
" terrorem ad quatuor principales civitates Angliæ
" transmisso, tota Wallia siluit; nec inventus est ibi-
" dem qui regi Angliæ audeat de cætero rebellare."

The Chronicon Roffense, already mentioned as contained in the same volume with Oxenedes' Chronicle, gives a still more moving detail of Rhys ap Meredith's punishment: "Rees a Meredith Walensium potentissimus fidelissimus prius regi, postea Anglorum sævissimus persecutor, qui dum latuerat inter montes Walliæ et speluncas, captus a regis fidelibus apud Berewicum, in confinio Scotiæ est adductus, ibique secundum sua demerita est punitus. Suscepit namque punctionem duplicem, proditoris et latronis, quare tractus ad caudas equorum, suspendia periit, hiis diebus."

A contemporary representation, in the margin of the Manuscript, explains the first portion of this punish-



ment graphically; a punishment so constantly stated by John de Oxenedes, in preceding parts of his Chronicle, to have been inflicted upon the Jews, as well as previously upon David, the brother of Llewellyn.¹

" walk; though usually (by cōnivance, at length ripened by humanity into law), a sledge or hurdle is allowed, to preserve the offender from the extreme torment of being dragged on the ground or pavement."

After all the passages, however, which have been commented upon, a very remarkable feature of John de Oxenedes' Chronicle is to be found in his minute accounts of some of the frightful Inundations of the Sea upon the coast-line of Norfolk which occurred during his own time; none so lengthened or so forcibly described as his detail of the overwhelming flood of 1287.

The great alteration which took place in the Norfolk coast at an early period has long been one of the most embarrassing of puzzles. No one has been able to say accurately when the great encroachments of the sea in some places, and its retirement leaving dry land in others, took place.

All that is now meadow from Yarmouth to the bridges over the Yare, called Harford bridges, which divide the jurisdiction of the county of the city of Norwich from that of the county of Norfolk, was once entire Estuary. Ships came to Norwich, and the Roman galleys to Caistor. Sweyn, Oxenedes says, in the year 978, "*cum navibus multis venit ad NORWICUM et eum prædatus est.*" Ralph Guader, earl of Norfolk and Suffolk, we are told, fled by shipping from Norwich castle to Denmark in 1078. Woodward's "Geological map of Norfolk," 4to., Norw. 1833, gives the most perfect idea of the estuary and waters from Yarmouth to the spot already named.

The late Miss Anna Gurney, then living at North Repps, took a deep interest in the history of the changes of the Norfolk coast. Her brother, Hudson Gurney, Esq., has kindly communicated to the editor of the present Chronicle some extracts which his sister made from a rare and interesting volume, entitled "The North Frisian Chronicle of M. Anthony Heinrich, pastor of the island Mohr, in Fordstrand," an enlarged edition of which was printed at Schleswig in 1668. The seventh chapter of this work "On the Dykes of North Friesland, and the

“Injuries of Waterfloods,” contains, probably, the most numerous and the most frightful series of terrible floods which can be found in the annals of any country; extending in regard to Friezeland, from A.D. 1020 to A.D. 1362.

In the year 1251 John de Oxenedes says: “Mare “horribiliter fluctuans et tumens limites transit con-“suetos, ulteriora littora vendicando.” Matthew Paris has recorded in addition what Oxenedes omitted, that, at the same time, Friezeland was inundated, the flood covering the face of that country for the distance of about seven days’ journey. Heinrich has omitted any mention of this flood in his list.

Heinrich, however, particularly records that on the 14th December 1287 there was a flood which covered all Friezeland, exactly coinciding with John de Oxenedes “anno gratiæ 1287,” when the wind and violence of the sea carried away houses in Yarmouth, Dunwich, Ipswich, and Marshland, “mense Decembri, “ciclo decennovali xv., septimo kalendas Januarii, “luna viij^o.”

It must have been at an unfortunate moment for Norfolk when the force of the sea, probably driven by the wind in an unusual direction, made the greatest of the changes referred to upon our eastern coast. The period was probably within some few years after the Norman conquest, since shipping, it is acknowledged, came up to Norwich as late as the year 1078. Woodward, in the tract already quoted, says: “Since the Conquest the villages of Shipden, “Keswick, Clare, Wimpwell, Eccles, and Ness, or the “greater part of them, have been washed away. “The remains of Eccles church are still to be seen “buried, as it were, within the Marram hills.”

The annals of Inundation, as recorded in our ancient Chronicles, deserve more notice than has hitherto been bestowed upon them. The consideration of them

might, in various instances, bear upon the action of the sea and rivers in other parts of England.

John de Oxenedes' Chronicle finishes abruptly in the middle of a sentence, in which the preferment of Robert de Winchelsey from the archdeaconry of Middlesex to the archbishoprick of Canterbury is announced in the year 1293.

It closes, not from any injury or casual imperfection, but apparently from the scribe's discontinuance of his labour; the verso of the same quarto leaf being left blank as for the continuation of the Chronicle.

That the manuscript is not the author's Original, but a transcript, may be inferred from numerous faults occurring in the copy, such as are seen in the text of most of our manuscript Chronicles which have been the work of transcribers, and which the compilers of them would not themselves have committed.

Where such have occurred in the present work, they have been compared with passages in other Chronicles, and have been noticed in the margins of the respective pages.

SINCE the appearance of this volume a MS. containing the Chronicle of John de Oxenedes has been found in the collection of his Grace the Duke of Newcastle.

Until this discovery, the Cottonian MS., (Nero D. II.), from which Sir Henry Ellis derived his text, was supposed to be unique, and on that account its publication was one of the first in the Government series to which I gave my approval.

By the permission of his Grace, I have ordered it to be collated with the printed text. The variations between the two MSS. will be seen at page 403.

PREFACE TO ADDITIONAL MATTER.

THE Newcastle MS. is a small folio, in the handwriting of the fourteenth century, bound in wood, consisting of 200 vellum leaves, in double columns, in good preservation. It was at one time the property of William Herbert of Cheshunt. It then passed into the possession of Mr. Townley. On the dispersion of his collection it was bought by Triphook the bookseller, and sold to Sir G. Page Turner, at whose sale in 1828 it was purchased for the late Duke of Newcastle. It contains :—

1. Geoffrey of Monmouth's History of Britain.
2. A short description of England, the kingdoms of the Heptarchy, the different bishopricks and shires, and a list of Benedictine monasteries in the province of Canterbury.
3. A Chronicle of St. Benet Holme from the Incarnation to the year 1294, continued by the canons of Hickling Priory to the year 1503.
4. The Chronicle of John of Oxenedes.

Of these articles the second and third will be found in the additional matter, page 412; and the reader will observe that the third article is a complete MS. of the Chronicle of which a fragment only was published by Sir Henry Ellis in the Appendix.

It is worth observing that whilst the Newcastle MS. is evidently derived from an independent source, it faithfully follows the Cottonian MS. in all its errors, and adds upwards of a hundred and fifty verbal ones of its own. But in the Newcastle MS. there are

two passages of considerable length, the first commencing with the words, "Willelmus dictus bastardus,"¹ and the second commencing, "Multi Valentium sunt interfecti,"² neither of which is to be found in the Cottonian. Besides these variations there are others,³ which, though merely verbal, are sufficiently numerous to strengthen the belief that the Newcastle MS. was not transcribed from the Cottonian, but that both have a common original. Otherwise it is impossible to account for the frequent identity of their errors.

That the Newcastle MS. belonged to St. Benet Holme, and is the transcript of a scribe of that monastery, is clear from the care with which the succession of abbots has been recorded. The same inference is strengthened by the list of Benedictine houses in the province of Canterbury printed in the additional matter B. It remained at St. Benet till the year 1294, for up to that year the lesser Chronicle⁴ is throughout in the same handwriting as the MS. It must have passed shortly after into the hands of the canons of Hickling, a priory of Augustinians in Norfolk, who continued the narrative to the year 1503. That these canons had access to some other MS. of John of Oxenedes may be inferred from the corrections with which they have interspersed the Newcastle MS. throughout, and the passages they have here and there supplied. But the most interesting and most important features they have added to it are the notes to be found in the margin of the lesser Chronicle, down to the year 1294, and the continuation of the Chronicle after that year to its close. The former are marked H.; the latter have no distinguishing mark, as they are altogether due to the industry of the canons of Hickling.

These notes and additions refer principally to St. Osith (Chich, Essex), and to Hickling, whose canons, as we learn from a note¹ written by one of them on the margin of the Chronicle of John of Oxenedes, received instruction in the rule of St. Augustine from four canons of St. Osith, sent for that purpose to the priory. In this note we have probably the settlement of the doubt² whether Hickling was founded by Theobald de Valentia or by William Albini, second Earl of Arundel. It says, "Hoc anno mclxxxv^{to} dominus Theobaldus de Valeynes instituit canonicos regulares apud Hickling, sub Alexandro priore." And in the Chronicle under the same year occurs this item, "Fundata est ecclesia sancti Augustini de Hykelyugg," to which the Hickling scribe adds, "cui præfuit Alexander primus prior." The foundation and appointment of canons being thus nearly contemporary acts, they were probably both performed by the same person.

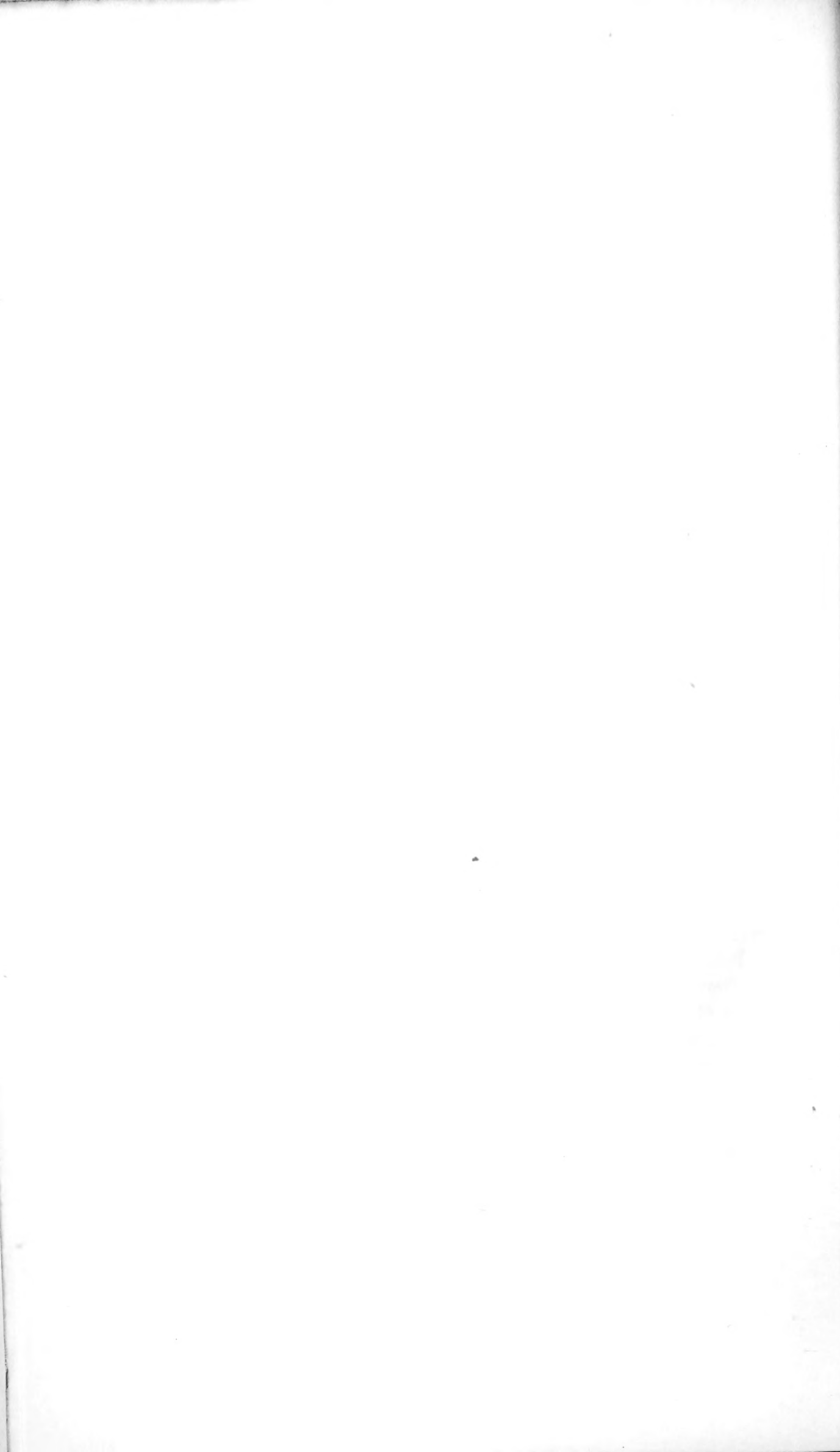
The succession of priors is continued from Alexander to the election and installation of Robert, the twenty-second prior, with whom the lesser Chronicle closes. Brief as is that portion of it which relates to Hickling, it suffices to record some interesting particulars in the history of the priory; the labours of its priors, the effects of the mortality of 1313 on its inmates, when the number of canons was reduced by the prevailing mortality to two, the relaxation of discipline after the fall of the belfry in 1400, and the good services of the servants of the priory in attacking and routing certain Flemish pirates who, in 1437, made a descent on the coast of Norfolk and burned Waxham.
