## RULES AND REGULATIONS.

## MEMBERSHIP.

1. The Members of the Agricultural Societies of the several Townships within the County or Electoral Division or United Counties wherein the Annual Exhibition may be held, and the members of the County or Electoral Division Society, shall be also members of the Association for that year, prowided the Agricultural Societies of the said Townships or Society of the said County, or Electoral Division, or United Counties, shall devote their whole funds for the year, including the Government Grant, in aid of the Assocal tion, and shall pay over the same, accompanied by a list of the members of such Society, to the Treasurer of the Association, two weeks previous to the Exhibition; and provided also that the sum so paid over shall not be less than oue dollar for each member of any such Society.
2. The members of the Council of the Agricultural and Arts Association, both elected and ex officio, the Presidents and Vice-Presidents of all lawfully organized Electoral District Agriculturat Socicties, and of all Horticultural Societies and Mechannes' Institutes, all life members, and all subscribers of one dollar annually (which shall entitle such subscriher to membership only for the year for which the subscription is paid), shall constitute the Agricultur:l and Arts Association. The payment of ten dollars shall constitute a life membership of the Association, when given for that special object, and not as a contribution to any local fund; and those persons who have heretofore been made life members under by-laws ui the Association, shall continue to be life members of the same.
3. Members can enter articles for competition in every department of the Exhibition, at any time previous to the dates hereafter. mentioned.

## ENTRIES.

4. No one but a member shall be allowed to compete for prizes, except in elasses 45 and 46.
5. All entries must be made ou printed forms, which may be obtained of the Secreturies of Agricultural and Herticultural Societies, or of Mechanies' Institutes throughout the Province, free of eharge. These forms are to be filled up and signed by the exhibitor, enclosing a dollar for membership, and sent to the sceretary of the Association. Toronto, previous to or on the following named dates, viz:-
6. Horses, Cattle, Sheep, Suine, Poultry, Agricultural Implements, and Machines:Entries in these classes must he made by forwarding the entry form, as above mentioned, filled up, and member's subseription enclosed, on or before Saturday, August 23, four weeks preceding the show.
7. In the classes of Blood Horses and pure bred Cattle, full pedigrees, properly certified, must accompany the entry. No animals will be allowed to compete as pure bred unless they possess regular Stud or Herd Book pedigrees, or satisfactory evidence be produced that they are directly descended from such stock. In the class of Durham Cattle particularly, no animal will be entered for competition unless the pedigree of the same be first inserted in the English, American, or Canadian Herd Book, or in the Canada Stock Register, kept at the office of the Association, Toronto.
8. Grain, Field Roots, and other Farm Products, Machinery for other-than Agricultural purposes, and Manufactures gener. ally, must be entered previous to. or on Saturday, August 30th, three weeks preceding the show.
9. Horticultural I'roducts, Ladies' Hork, the fine Arts, dec. muy be entered up to Saturday, September 6ill, two weeks previous to the Exhibition.
10. Exhibitore nere particuiariy requested to take motice that it is absolitely required that the entries be mande at the dates above mentioncal, in oraler 10 ational snipheint time to exanmine the entry papers, innd to corresponal with parties, when necessindy, for the conrrection of enrors and omissions; atmal ato exception will be mate to this rule on hay considerationt whatever.
11. In the Live Stock Chasses, the entry must in every instance be made in the name of the bona fide owner, and unless this rule be observed no preminm will be awarded, or if awarded it will be withheld. If any person shall exhibit uny animal of which he is not the bona fide owner, he shall forfeit any premium which may be awarded him, and be precluded from exlibiting in future.
12. In all the other classes entries must be made in the names of the producers or manufacturers only, und by such producers themselves in person, or their agents duly authorized. Any person making entries as all agent for more than one prodncer or manufacturer must pay the usual subseription of one dollar for each of such parties. If any person shall enter an article for exhibition, as produced or manufnetured by himself, when it has not really been so, he shall forfeit any premium which may be awarded the article, and be precluded from exhibiting in future.
13. ${ }^{\text {F }}$ In all, (unless otherwise specified, departments, the competition is open to exhibitors from any part of the world, without reservation, on complinnce with the rules.
14. Manufacturers are requested to furnish with the articles exhibited, a statement of the quantity they can produce. or supply, and the price, for the information of the Judges, whose decision will be based on the combination of quality, style, and price, and the adaptation of the article to the purpose or purposes for which it is intended.
15. No person shall be allowed to enter for exhilition more than one specimen in any one section of a class, unless the additional article be of a distinct named varicty or pattern from the first. This rule not to apply to unimals, but to apply to all kinds of grain, vegetable products, fruit, manufactured urticles, dic., in which each ad-
ditional specimen would nécessurily be precisely similar to the first. No exlibitor in the Arts and Munufactures Department shall bo awarded more thm one prize in any one section of the sume cluss.
16. E.etra lintries.-Every article must be cutered under some one of the headings in the regular list, when possible; but if any article is of a distinct churncter from anything speciffed In the list, it may then be entered in the extra section of that class with which it most nearly corresponds. No article, however, will be allowed to be entered as an extrm for what of suflleient quantity or number, or any other similar defect, when of the same kind or variety as anything numed in the list; in such in case the uiticle cannot be exhibited.
17. All Agricultural or Horticultural products must he the growth of the present year. Mumbactured articles, or works of art, which have been awarded prizes at any previous Provincial Exhibition, shatl not be entered in competition for the prizes named in the prize list for this year, but shanl be awarded diplomas, if, in the opinion of the judges, such articles are superior to any others exhibited, and are deemed worthy of the same.
18. On the entry of each animal or article, a card will be furnished the exhibitor, specifying the class, the section, the mumber of the entry, and the name of the exhibitor,
which chal mast reanain attacheal to such anfinal or articte dnring the Exhibition.

THINSDOHT OF ABTICLES, PLACING THEM ON EXIIIHTION, AND CIIARGE OF THES

## WHILE TIIERE.

19. All specimens in the Fine Arts and all ${ }^{\circ}$ articles other than Live Stock, Fruits, Flowers, and Butter, must be delivered on the grounds, arranged and plaeed on exhilition not later than Saturtay, 2oth September. Live Stoch, l'ruits, Flowers aut Butter, must all be on the grounds not later than Monday, $2{ }^{2} n d, 6 \mathrm{pm}$. Articles or animals arriving after these hours will uot be allowed to compete. Exhibitors of machinery and other heavy urticles are to have them on the grounds during the week preceding the show.
®0. Exhibitors must provide for the delivery of their articles upon the Show Ground. The Association cannot, in any case, anke provision for their transportation, or be subjected to any expense therefor, either in their delivery at, or return from, the grounds. All the expenses connected therewith must be provided for by the exhibitors themselves.
20. Articles not accompanied by their owners may be addressed to the care of

the Superintendent of the Exhibition, who will receive them on their being delivered at the Grounds; but in no case will such articles be brought on the Grounds and placed on exhibition except by and at the expense of the owners or their authorized agents.
22. Exhllitors on urriving with their articles, will upply to the Superintendent of the Grounds, who will be stationed within the entry gate, and will inform them where the articles ure to be placed.
23. Exhibitors will, at all times, give the necessary personal attention to whatever they may have on exhibition, and at the close of the Show take entire charge of the same.
24. No articles will be ullowed to be removed from the grounds till the close of the Exhibition, on Saturday, 27th, at 9 a.m., except live stock, which may be removed on Friday evening, 2bth, at 4 p.m.
25. Though the Director's will take reasonable precaution to ensure the safety of articles sent to the Exhibition, yet they wish it to be distinctly understoon that the owners themselves must take the risk of exhibiting them: and that should nny article be accidentally injured, lost, or stolen, the Directors will give tull the assistance in their power towards the recovery of the same, but WILL NOT MAKE ANY PAYMENT for the value thereof.

26. The Association will make such favorable arrangements as are found practlcable with Steamboat, Kailroad and Ex. press Companies for carrying articles and passengers at reduced rates.
27. Arrangoments will be made with the Customs Department for the free entry of articles from foreign countrics for competition.

ADMISSION TO THE GHOUNDS.
28. Each member on paying lis subscription. will be furnished with four small admission tickets, each of which will admit the holder once, aud must be given up at the gate on passing into the grounds. By economy in the use of these tickets, they can be made to last during the Show: but if a member shall have used them all, and still desires admission, he will have to pay for ad mission in the sanve manner as a non-member. Life-members will be furnished as heretofore with tickets or badges adnitting them during the Show. Delegates from Societies and members of the Press will also be furnished with complimentary admission badges or tickets, as heretofore.
29. The entry tickets upon nuimals or articles will admit the person bringing them to the Show Grounds for exhibition, along witlo such unimals or articles, without the use of nuy other tleket. Afterwards, such parties must be provided with proper admission tickets.
30. Necessary, attendents upon stock and nrticles belonging to exhilitors will be furnished with admission tiekets for each day of the exlibition, with their names written upon them, when tickets wild. he good, to the persung whose names tiey bear. at the Exhibitolis gate ONLY, during the Show.
31. The price of admission to those who are not members will be 25 cents each time of entering through the gates on Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thurstay and Friday. The admission will be by means of Registering Turnstiles, AND EACH PERSON WILL BE REQUIRED TO BE PROVIDED WITH THE PROPER CHANGE BEFORE ENTERING. Carriages and horsemen will not be admitted. All horses entered for exhibition purposes shall only be ridden or driven while being exhibited, and in the ring.
32. Numbers of carriage. buggy and saddle horses having herctofore been entered merely for the purpose of obtaining chear: stabling, and driving about the grounds, the Committee on Horses will exclude from the grounds any such animals as appear unworthy of entering for competition.

## JUDGES AND THEIR DUTIES.

33. The Julges will he appointed by the Council of the Association previous to the Exhibition, and will receive a circular informing them of the fact, and inviting them to act.
34. The Judges are requested to report themselves at the Secretary's office, presenting their cireular of appointment, immediately on their arrival at the grounds.
35. The judges will meet at the committee room on the grounds, on Tuesday, September 23rd, at 10 o'cloek a. m., for the purpose of organizing, mind immediately entering upon their dutics, and will then be furnished with the committee books containing the numbers of the entries in each class. Ou receiving their elass books, they will also be furnished with blank prize tickets, which they shall fill up and affix in each section as soon as they shall have finally determined their awards.
36. No person shall act as a Judge in any class in which he shall be an exhibitor.
37. In aldition to the siated preminms offered for articlesenumerated in the list, the Judges will have the power to recommend discretionury premiums for such articles, not cuumerated, as they may consider worthy, and the directors will determine the amount of premizur. ?'he Judges may also distinguabl sucell aatimals or articles as they consider deserving of notice. but which hare not received prizes, by ticket, with the words "Highly Commended," or "Cominended," upon them. These tickets will not entitle the holder to any money payment.
38. In the Fine Arts and Mechanical Departments, Diplomas will be awarded, in addition to the money prizes, to any specimen evincing great skill in its production, or deemed otherwise worthy of such a distinction, on its being recommended by the Judges, and approved of by the Committee, to whon all such matteis shall be referred.
39. In the absence of competition in any section, or if the stock or articles exhibited be of inferior quality, the Julyes are instructed to arrard only such premiums as they think the articles diserving of. They will exercise their diseretion as to whether they will award the first, second, third, or ayy premium.
40. Under "Extras" in each of the classes, when more than one entry of the same kind of article has been made, they will be judged as in competition for first and second prizes, the same as though they had been in regular sections, and when but one such entry has been made, the article, if worthy, shall be recommended a first or second prize. The Judges, however, are instructed not to recommend prizes in either the "regular" or "extra" seetions of any class, unless the articles come np to the desired "standard of excellence." No award of prize for Extras will be paid until sanctioned by the Commitee of the Association.
41. Each award must be written in a plain, careful manner, on the blank page opposite the number of the entry.
42. Any person who shall. attemipt to INTERFEHE WITH THE JUDAES WHIIE IN THE DISCHARGE OF THEIR DUTIES, OR WHO SHALL afterwards, on the priemises of the ASSOCIATION, USE ANY CONTEMPTUOUS ON ABUBIVE LANCICAGE TO ANY JUDGE in CONsequence of any award made by him, shall FORFEIT H:S MIUHT TO ANY PREMICMS TO WHICII IIE MOHT OTHERWISE BF ENTITLEL, AND SHALI, HE EXCLUDED From exhibiting For ONE IBAR TMEREAFTER.

EXTRACTS FROM BY-LAW.
43. "The Judges shall, in the execution of their duties, be careful to acii with the most rigid impa.tinlity; shall make
their entries in a clenr and conspicuous manner, in all cuses of doubt or difficulty referring freely to the Sceretary, or to the Committee of the Council in charge of the depurtment; and when they have completed their reports, shall sigu and deliver their books to the Secretary of the department to which they belong.
44. "Upon the discovery of any fraud, deception, or dishonest practice, either in the preparation, ownership, or of any representation concerning any article exhihited, which may have affected, or may have been intended to affect, the decision of the Juiges, the Conncil shall have power to withtold the payment of any prize ${ }^{2}$ warded, and may prohibit any such party or parties from exhibiting in any class for one or more years, and may also publish the names of such persons or not, as may be deemed most expedient."

## DELEGATES, THF ANNUAL MEETING, ETC.

45. Delegates and members of the Press are required and expected to report themselves at the Sccretary's office immediately on their arrival, whey the delegates will ie furnished with official badges, and the menijurs of the Press will be afforded all the usual facilities.
46. The Annual Mecting of the Directors of the Association will take place at the City Hall, Ottawa, on Wednesday evening, 24th September, at seven o'elock.
47. Delegates from Country Socicties desiring to obtain a portion of the Canada Company prize wheat for their counties, will please apply to the member of the Council for the District in which their respective Societies are situated.

## THE GENERAL SUPERINTENDENT.

48. The General Superintendent will have the entire supervision of the Grounds and the arrangements of the Exhibition. He will have an office upon the ground, where all persons having enquiries to make in relation to the arrangements will apply.

## PAYING THE PREMIUMS.

49. The Treasurer will be prepared to commence paying the premiums on Saturday, September $27 t h$, at 9 a.m., and parties who shall have prizes awarded them are particularly requested to apply for them before leaving Ottawa, or leave a written oriler with some person to receive them, stating the articles for which prizes are claimed.
50. Persons entitled to cash premiums must apply for them at the Secretary's office, who will give Orders on the Treasurer for the amount.

53. "A.' :ersons to whom a prize is awarded shani apply to the Secretary of the Association for payment there of before or on the 30th day of November of the year in which such prize is awarded, or shall forfeit such prize.
54. "The Council or Board of Directors of any Association or Society organized under this Act. on being made aware of any fraud having been committed by any member or exhibitor, in the entry of any stock or goods in competition for prizes at any exhibition, shall have the power of withholding the payment of any prizes that may have been awarded by the Judges to such members or exhibitors, ou such fraudulent or any other entries made at any such exhibition.
55. "If any person wilfully injures or destroys any property within the Exhibition grounds of the Agricultural and Arts Association. or of any Agricultural or Hortienltural Society, or hinders or obstructs the officers or servants of the said Association or of such Socicty, or any policeman or constable duly appointed as aforesaid, in the excention of his duty, or gatins and. mission to the said grounds contrary to the vules of such Association or Society, he shall be liable to a tine of not less than one or more than twenty doltars; said fine to be enforced and collected as fines are usnally collected a a do to be paid over to such Association or Society for its use and benefit; and in default of payment the said offender slall be imprisoned in the common gaol for a period of not more thun thirty days. 31 V., c. 29, 8. 57.
50. "The officers of any such Association or Society may by their rules and regulations prohibit and prevent all kinds of
gambling, theatrical, circns, or monntebink performances, exhibitions or shows, and also regulate or prevent the liuckstering or trafficking in fruits, goods, wares, or merchandise on the Exhibition grounds, or within three hundred yards therent; and any person who, after due notice of such rules and regulations, violates the same, shall be liable to be removed by the officers, policemen, or ennstables of said Association or Society, and be subject to the penalty prescribed by the next preceding section. 31 V., c. 29, s. 58.

58. Provender will be provided by the Association for live stock at cost price. For information exhibitors will apply to the superintendent of the grain and fodder department, at his office.
59. In case the directors shall require any particular information in reference to animalsor articles taking first prizes, the owners will be expected to transmit it when requested to do so.
60. All protests against decisions of the Judges must be made before the close of the Exhinition, and must be delivered to the Secretary in writing, stating the cause of protest. Any difficn'ty, or protest, in respect to the awarding of prizes in any of the departnents. shaill be referred to the proper committee of the Council over that department, who shall have full power to adjudicate upon the same, and report their decision to the Council, for approval, and such approved decision shall be final, and the protest and report upon it shall be entered in a book kept for the purpose.
