## Tclipsos, 2876.

In the year 1876 there will be Tuo Eclipee of the Sun and Tuo Eeclipses of the Moos, viz.:
I.-A Partial Eclipse of the Moos, March 9,1876 , partially visible at (ireenwich.
The first contact of the shadow occurs at $170^{\circ}$ from the Northcrnmost point of the Moon's limb, towards the East.
The last contact at 118' towards the West.
1I.-An Anmular Eclizse of the Sun, Mareh 25, 18\%6, invisible at Greenwich.

Begins on the Earth generally, March 25, 6h. 20n1., mean time at Greenwich, in Long. $170^{\circ} .40^{\prime}$ West of Greenwlelh, and Lat. $5^{\circ} .41^{\prime}$ South.

Ends on the earth generally, Marel 25 , in Long. $65^{\circ} .47^{\prime}$ West of Greeuwich, and Lat. $62^{\circ} .29^{\prime}$ North.

The middle of this Eclipse will be visible at sunset on March 25, at St. John's, Newfomndland.
III.-A Partial Eclipse of the Moon Sopt. 3, 1870, visible at Greenwich.

The first contact with the shadow occurs at $8^{\circ}$ from tho Northernmost point of the Moon's limb, towards the East.

The last confact at $63^{\circ}$ to wards the West.
IV.-A 'Total Eclipse of the Sun, September 17, 1870, inrisible at Green wich.

This Ealipse will be visible to the inlmbitants of the South Pacific, from the Phillipine Islands to Cape Ilorn, beginning and ending with the former, at sumrise, and with the latter, at sunset, on September $8,1870$.

The Eelipses of Jupiters Satellites (given in the Greenwich Almanac to the nearest tenth of one second of time) afford the easiest means of knowing the Greenwich time and thence to determine the longitude of whatever place on the globe the observer may be sitnated. No calculation is required, but they cannot be observed at sea, the motion of the ship rendering it impossible to secure that steadiness of the instruments necessary to observe them.

Longitude (West of Greenwieh)........... $52^{\circ} .42^{\prime}$ Wresi,
Variation of the Compass, $32^{\circ} .30^{\prime}$ and increasing seven be minf annually.

Note.-The Tide Tables (in the Caiencar nages) may be rendered applicable to varions other places on the eonst, by simply adding or subtracting as the case may be, the difference betwen the times of Migh Water on the full and change of the Moon at St. John's, and the time of the full tide at any other harbor; for example, to find the time of High Water at any of the principal harbors af Conception Bay, add 45 minutes to the time at which it will be IIgh Water at St. John's; for Pacentia Bay, add 2 hours; for sit. Peters, th. bonn. for Felrolle, on the French Shore, 4 hours, de.-S'ee table LIII of Noric's Dpitomi.

Orouds.-Against much rain the clouls increase very fast, especially before thunder. When they are formed like fleeces, but dense in the middle, and bright towards the edge, with the sky bright, they are signs of a frost, with hail, snow or rain.--


If they form high in the air, in thin white trains, like locks of wool, they portend wind and probably rain. When a gencral cloudness covers the sky and small black fragments of clouds fly underneath, they are a sure sign of rain, and probably will be lasting. Two currents of cloids always portend rain, and in summer, thunder,

Fort Amherst Light, at the entrance of St. John's-A light was first established at this station in 1810 ; in 1850 a new House, Lantern and apparatus were erected. The Light burns at an elevation of 1 it feet, is produced by a double argand burner flaced in the focus of an annular lens of the fourth order, and in favorable weather can be scen 16 nautical miles. When Oape Spear is enveloped in fog a heavy piece of orduance is also discharged at this Fort every hour during daylight, to assist vessels in making the harbor. It is situated in lat. $47^{\circ} .33^{\prime} .54^{\prime \prime} \mathrm{N}$. and long. $52^{\circ} .40^{\prime} .18^{\prime \prime} \mathrm{W}$. John Sheppard, Keeper; Thomas Moore, Assistant.

St. John's--Two red lights are exhibited every night from sunset until sunrise, intended as leading marks for vessels entering the narrows. The lower Light on the roof of the Custom House--the other 400 yards in the rear, on a white post, within a few yards of the N.E. angle of the Congregational Church, and 180 feet above the level of the sea. These Lights will be readily distinguished from any other Lights in the town; and keeping them in a line bearing N.W. $\frac{3}{}$ W., will lead in the largest vessel clear of all danger. To serve as leading marks also during the day, the pediment of the Custom House has been painted white; this is to be lept in line with the upper lantern, also painted white. Exhibited ist September, 1863.

Cape Spear Light-This Light was flrst exhibited on the 1st September, 1835; it is produced by seven argand burners and silvered reflectors burning atan elevation of 264 fect-it revolves, shewing a bright Light every minute, and in favomalle weather can be seen 26 natical miles. It is situated in $4^{-0} .31^{\prime} .11^{\prime \prime}$ N. lat., and $52^{\circ} .30^{\prime} .55^{\prime \prime}$ W. longitude. Jumes Comtwell, Keeper; Denuis Cantyrell. issistant.

Cape Bonurasta I.i, hit-Situate in lat. $48^{\circ} \cdot 41^{\prime} .56^{\prime \prime}$ N., long. $53^{\circ} .5^{\prime}$. $20^{\prime \prime} \mathrm{W}$.; is a revolving Light, showing alternately every 90 seconds a white and red light. It is produced by 16 argand burners and retectors, burns at an elevation above the sea of 150 feet, and in favorable weather can beseen 18 nantical miles. By keeping this Light open with Cape J'Argent, it will carry you clear of the Flower Rocks; first exhibited 11th September, 184\%. Nicholas White, Kecper; Matthew White, Assistant.

Cape I'ine Light-This tower is of iron, built by the Imperial Govermment in 1840-50, and first put into requisition on the lst January, 1851. It is a fixed white Light, has 17 argand burners and reflectors-elevated above the level of the sea 314 feetsituated in lat. $46^{\circ} .37^{\prime} .4^{\prime \prime}$ N., and in long. $53^{\circ} .91^{\prime} .45^{\prime \prime} \mathrm{W}$. In a favorable state of the atmosphere it can be seen 26 nantical miles. George Hewett, Keeper; William Costleloe, Assistant.

Harbor Grace Beach Beacon ancl Light-First exhibited 11th September, 1850 ; stands on the point of Beach at the entrance of Harbor Grace. Sailing into liarbor Grace with a fair or leading wind, bring the Beach Beacon to bear W. or W. by S., and by keeping the Light or Building a little on the starboard low it will bring you clear of the Bar, on which at low water there is not more than 8 feet of water. It is situated in lat. $47^{\circ}$. $41^{\prime} .28^{\prime \prime} \mathrm{N}$., and in long. $53^{\circ} .12^{\prime} .33^{\prime \prime}$ W., olevation above the sea level 40 feet; in clear weather it may be seen at a distance of 11 natical miles. Gireen Island Light at the entrance of Catalina Harbor, Trinity Bay--Situate in lat. $48^{\circ} .30^{\prime} .16^{\prime \prime}$ N., long. $53^{\circ} .2^{\prime} .40^{\prime \prime} \mathrm{W}$. This is a fixed white light, burns at an elevation of 02 feet above high water, and in favorable weather will be seen from E.N.E. seaward, to S.W., 15 nantical miles. Vessels bound Northward by leeeping this Light open with the North Head of Catalina until Bonuvista Light opens with Cape LeJean, will give the Flower Rocks an ample berth-or when coming from the Northward and bound for Catalina, by giving the N. Head a moderate berth, you will clear the Brandies Rocks by steering for Green Islund Light. It was first exhioited in 1857. Peter Woods, Meeper ; Peter Martin, Ascistant.

Crize Race Light-Exhibits a revolving white Light, from sunset to sumrise. The light will be visible to seaward from N. E. by L., round by the S. L. and S. to W. The Light is elevated 180 fect above the mean water level of the sea, and may be seen in clear weather 19 nautical miles from a ship's deck. The tower is striped red and white vertically. It stands close to the old Beacon, which has been cut down. The Light House is in lat. $46^{\circ} .39^{\prime} .30^{\prime \prime} \mathrm{N}$. , long. $53^{\circ} .44^{\prime} .30^{\prime \prime} \mathrm{W}$., aud was first exhibited in 1806. Michael J. Dodding IIend, Great Burin Island Light-This Light was put in requisition on the 3rd August, 1858, and is exhibited every night from sunset to sumrise. It is revolving, eatr-dioptric of the second order, producing a brilliant White Light every minute, burning at an elevation of 430 feet above the level of the sea, and in favorable weather can be seen 20 miles-situated in $47^{\circ}$. $0^{\prime} .26^{\prime \prime}$ North Latitude, $55^{\circ} .8^{\prime} .43^{\prime \prime}$ West Longitude. Austin Sheppard, Acting Keeper ; John Churchill, Assistant.

Offor Wadham Island Light-Was first exhibited on the 4th October, 1858 , and is lighted every night from sunset to sunrise. The Light is a steady, fixed lens-light, burning on a circular Brick Tower, 100 feet above the level of the sea, and can bo seen in a favorable state of the atmosphere 15 nautical miles. Situated in Latitude $40^{\circ} .36^{\prime} .0^{\prime \prime}$ North, Longitude $5: 3^{\circ} .45^{\prime} .6^{\prime \prime}$ West. Charles Prowse, Keeper; Henry Waterman, Assistant.

Baccalieu Island Light-This light is exhibited every night from the going away of daylight in the evening to the return of daylight in the morning. The Light IIonse situated on tho Northern end of the Island-Latitude $48^{\circ} .8^{\prime} .51^{\prime \prime}$ North, Longitude $52^{\circ} .47^{\prime} .50^{\prime \prime}$ West--the tower is of brick, the keeper's dwelling (a square building detached from the tower, ) is painted white, with the roof red.

The light is a cato-dioptric first elass Holophotal revoiving white Light, shewing a flash every twenty seconds. It is clevated, 443 feet above high water, and can be seen in clear weather 30 nautical miles, and a lesser distance according to the state of the atmosphere. When the southern end of the Island bears N.N.E., the Light will not be visible when nearer the Island than 8 miles. It was first exlibited in 1858. John Ryan, Keeper ; Michael Ryan, Assistant.

Cape St. Mary's Light--Was put into requisition on the 20th September, 1860 ; it is a revolving cato-dioptric Light of the first order, producing alternateiy every minute a brilliant red and a white light, burning at an clevation of 300 feet above the level of the sea, and will be seen in a favorable state of the atmosphere 26 nantical miles from a vessel's deck; situated in $46^{\circ} .49$. $30^{\prime}$ N. lat., $54^{\circ} .11^{\prime} .34^{\prime \prime}$ W. long. The tower is of brick, and on each side of which stands the dwellings of the keeper and assistant, the sides of which are painted white, roofs red. John Rielly, Keeper ; Wm. J. Collins, Assistant.

Brunet Island Light, Mercer's Heall, Fortune Bay-First exhibited 27 th June, 1835 . It is a powerful flashing white Light, and attains its greatest brilliancy every ten seconds. It burvs at an elevation of 408 feet above the level of the sea, and in clear weather may be seen at a distance of 85 miles, and be visible in every direction from North round East and South, to W.N.IV. Mercer's Head is a bold headland, and situated in long. $65^{\circ} .59^{\prime} .80^{\prime \prime}$ W., and lat. $47^{\circ} .16^{\prime}$ N. Martin Sparrow, Keeper; Jas. Ganlon, Assistant.

Marbor Girace Islund Light-The fixed light for many years past exhibited at IJarbor Grace Island, in Conception Bay, was discontinued on the 1st December, 1869. The Light at that station is now revolving, showing in every d'rection two white flashes, followed by one red flash. The interval between each flash in attaining its greatest brilliancy will be 30 seconds. This Light, in a favorable state of the atmosphere, will be seen 25 nantical miles. It is situated in lat. $47^{\circ} \cdot 42^{\prime} .45^{\prime \prime} \mathrm{N}$., and long. $53^{\circ}$ $8^{\prime} .15^{\prime \prime}$ W. Austin Oke, Keeper ; Ptk. Moulahan, Assistant.

Ferryland Mend Light-First exhibited on the 1st October, 1871. From sunset to sumvise a steady white Light of the 3rd order, burning on a brick tower 200 feet above the level of the sen, visible in farorable weather 16 nantical miles. Ferryland Head light is situated in lat. $47^{\circ} .00^{\prime} .58^{\prime \prime}$ N., and long. $52^{\circ} .51^{\prime} .07^{\prime \prime} \mathrm{W}$. The tower is of red brick; the keepers dwelling, detached from the tower, is painted white and the roof red. Nichac! Kearney, Keeper; Philip Kough, Assistant.
1879. Pufin Island, Greenspond-The Tight IIouse on this Island is built of granite. The tower and keeper's dwelling are attached. The illuminating apparatus is dioptric, of the 4 th order, and a fired red Light is exhibited every night from sunset to sumise; it is 85 feet above the level of the sea, and in clear weather should be seen 0 distance of 12 miles. The Light is risible from North by Fast, through South to West by North, by compass, and is situated in $49^{\circ} .3^{\prime} .37^{\prime \prime}$ North lat., and $53^{\circ} .32^{\prime} .27^{\prime \prime}$ West long. Fred. W. Oakley, Keeper.

No. 1, 1873. Belloram, Fortune Bay-A fiacd white Ligltt is exhibited nightly at this place from sunset to sunrise, at an elevation of 35 feet above the level of the sea, and in clear weather should be visible seven miles. The building is a wooden tower, painted white, and is situated in lat. $47^{\circ} .29^{\prime}$ North, and $55^{\circ} .27^{\prime} .15^{\prime \prime}$ West long. The apparatus is dioptric, of the 8 th order, with a single argand burner, and illuminates an arc of the horizon of $270^{\circ}$. In entering the harbor the light must be kept on the port hand. Samuel Clewett, sr., Keeper.

No. 2, 1873. Rose Blanche Point-This Light House is buitt of granite, upon the eastern head. The tower and keeper's dwelling are attached. The illuminating apparatus is dioptric, of the 4 th order, and a fixed white Light will be exhibited from sunset to sunrise, at an elevation of 95 fect above the level of the sea, and it should be seen in clear weather for 13 miles. The light illuminates the horizon from East by South, through South to West, by compass, and is situated in lat. $47^{\circ} .35^{\prime} .48^{\prime \prime}$ North, and $58^{\circ} .41^{\prime} .30^{\prime \prime}$ West long. Shag Island Black Rock bears West from the light and distant about one mile. Rose Blanche shoals W.S.IW., half mile, and Petites Black Rock E. by S. three miles. Keeper, John A. Roberts.

No. 3, 18\%3. Fort Point, Trinity-On and after 1st January, 1874, a fixed white Light will be exhibited nightly from sunset to sunrise at this place, upon a wooden tower painted white, and at a height of 75 feet above the level of the sea, and it should be visible in clear weather for 11 miles. The erection is situ-
ated in $48^{\circ} .21^{\prime} .65^{\prime \prime}$ North lat., and $63^{\circ} .20^{\prime} .61^{\prime \prime}$ West long. The apparatus is dioptric, of the 8th order, with a single argarel burner, and illuminates an are of the horizon of $320^{\circ}$. In enter ing the harhor the light must be kept on the port hand. Kecper, William Rowe.

No. 1, 1874. Cann Island, Seliom-come-By-A ficed white Light is exhibited nightly at this plate, from simset to sumise, at an elevation of 85 fect above the level of the sea, and slould be visible 12 miles. The tower and dwelling are of wood and attached, and are situated in latitude $49^{\circ} .35^{\prime} .05^{\prime \prime}$ N., and longitude $54^{\circ} \cdot 10^{\prime} \cdot 89^{\prime \prime}$ W. The apparatus is dioptric, of the 8 th order, with a single argand burner, and illuminates an arc of the horizon of $327^{\circ}$. John Hodnott, Kecper.

No. 2, 1874. Boar Island, Burgeo-A fired red Light is exhibited nightly at this place, from sunset to sumpise, at an elevation of 240 feet above the sea, and should be visible 17 miles. The tower and dwelling are of wood, and attached, and are situated in latitude $47^{\circ} .30^{\prime} .12^{\prime \prime} \mathrm{N}$., and longitude $57^{\circ} .35^{\prime} .13^{\prime \prime} \mathrm{W}$. The apparatus is dioptric, of the (ith order, with a single argard burner, and illuminates the whole of the horizon of $270^{\circ}$. Ed. Dicks, Keeper.

No. 1, 1876. Channel Hend, Fort-au-Basques-A wooden light tower has been erected on this head, and on and after this date a fised red Light will be exhibited thercon, at an elevation of 30 feet above the level of the sca. Lat. $47^{\circ} .333^{\prime} .47^{\prime \prime}$ N., and Long. $60^{\circ} .07^{\prime} \cdot 10^{\prime \prime}$ West. In clear weather the light should be visible twelve miles. The illuminating apparatus is dioptric, of the Sth order, with a single argand burner. The whole horizon is illuminated. Timothy Pike, Keeper.

Rocky Point, Llarbor Breton, Forlune Bay-Situated in latitude $47^{\circ} .27^{\prime} \cdot 30^{\prime \prime}$ N., longitude $55^{\circ} .4 \mathbf{\prime}^{\prime} .45^{\prime \prime} \mathrm{W}$. A square wooden tower carrying an oetagon and lantern, in which a white light will be exhibited nightly, with a red light to mark the Harbor Rock.Wm. Lorenzen, Keeper.

Garnish, Fortune Bay-A beacon tower of wood, carrying an octagon and lantern, in which a red liglit is exhibited nightly. Latitude $47^{\circ} .14^{\prime \prime}$ N., longitude $65^{\circ} .24^{\prime}$ W. (approximate.) Joln Grandy, Keeper.

Beacon, Ireland Eye, eutrance of LaPoile Bay-A square building of wood, painted white, with three black bands, has been erected on this Island. It is 75 feet high and is supported on four chains.

Light Dues-One shilling per ton on all vessels entering any port or harbor of the Colony, except coasting, sealing, or fishing vessels; but not to be levied more than once in one year. Sealing and coasting vessels-sixpence per ton on registered vessels of 40 tons and upwards; fifteen shillings per ton on all vessels less than 40 tons.

The 10 th of Victoria, Cap. 5, Sec. 5, enacts,-"That no greater

on any steamer or vessel entering any port of this Colony ; and no steamer plying between larope and any port of North America, and entering any port of this Colony as a port of call, shall be limble to pay any Light Jues, or other port charges, except pilotage."

Giallantry Meate, Island of St. Icter's-The Fixed Iight on Gallantry Head, (Island of St. Peter's) since the 10th August, 1862, has been replaced by a Flash Light, with intervals of twenty seconds, and by one red flash after two white flashes; situated in lat. $40^{\circ} .45^{\prime} .30^{\prime \prime} \mathrm{N}$., lomg. $68^{\circ} .25^{\prime} \mathrm{W}$.; clevation above high water, 64 metres, (e04 linglish feet). Jistance at which the light is visible, 18 miles. The light is hidden at the North ward by the high land of Sit. Peter's.

Light at the South entrance of St. I'eter's-Since 1st October, 1802, the entrance of the harbor of St. leter's, called Sonth Channel, has been marked by two small fixed Lights, onc of which is a white light, illuminating three fourths of the horizon, and placed on the Battery-and the other a red Light, on the plain at the north of the town. The white Light has an elevation of 11 metres, and is visible 6 miles. The red Light is elevated 19 metres, visible 3 miles distant. The line connecting these two Lights indicates the Middle Channel.

The position of the red Light has also been so determined that as soon as it is seen on the left of Cape Eagle, vessels coming from Columbier in beating into the N.E. entrance will have nothing to fear from the shoals of Cape Rouge.

Iight on the South Weest Point of the Islands of Dogs, called Pointe a Leconte-Commencing on the 1st of August, 1874, a Light will be exhibited on the South West Point of the lsland of Dogs, at the place called Pointe a Leconte at 400 metres ( 437 English feet) above the level of the sea. It will be seen in clear weather 7 miles. The extent of the Light is circumscribed in a sector of $163^{\circ}$ presenting two cones of Light, one white, of $40^{\circ}$, will light the passage of the S.E. so as to permit vessels which maintain position within this cone to avoid at the right the shoal Batalle, and to the left the rock of Oape Noir and the rock Bertrand. The second cone will be red, of $123^{\circ}$. It should be avoided by yessels entering by the S. E. passage, and will enable them, when they shall have quitted the white cone, to come to anchor in the roadstead or in the Barachois, in following the line of the white light from Pointe aux Canons, and of the red light from the interior of the city.

A Light House has been erected by the Government of Oanada, on the Western side of Cape Ray, on the Souith-west coast of the lsland of Newfoundland. Latitude $47^{\circ} .37^{\prime}$. N., Longitude $59^{\circ} .1 s^{\prime} \mathrm{W}$. A powerful flash White Light is exhibited, making a complete revolution in two and a quarter minutes, and fashing every ten seconds; at a long distance, however, it has the appearance of a steady light. The light can probably be seen at a distance of twenty miles in clear weather.

The Pillar Letter Boxes are cleared at 9 a.m. and 2 p.m., for town delivery, every day, (Sundays excepted) and also, two hours before closing the mail by the Halifax steamer. Newspapers dropped in the Pillar Letter Boxes will not be delivered.

Letters dropped in the Pillar Letter Boxes for Town, are delivered for one cent, pre-paid by stamp; if not pre-paid they are transferred to the Dead Letter Oflee.

## IARCEI PGST.

Parcels closed at the ends and sides may be posted at any Post Ofice in Newfoundland for conveyance to any other Post Office (not Way Office), in the Island, at a rate of Postage subject to the following conditions:-

1-No letter or letters shall be concealed.
2-The parcel shall not contain any explosive substance, glass, liquid or other matter, likely to injure the ordinary contents of the mail, under penalty of forfeiture of the parcel.
:-The weight of the pareel shonld not excecd :? lbs., nor the sizn excerd vie fool in length or brealh, we wix inches in thickness.

4-Parcels must be pre-paid at the following rates:
 And so on, adding 5 cents for every $\frac{1}{4}$ lb., or fraction thereof.
b-The parcel may be registered on payment of a fee of five cents in addation to the postage.

B-If the name and address of the sender be written on the parcel, it will, if delivery should fail from any cause, be returned unopened to the sender on payment of an additional rate of 20 cents for the return conveyance.

7-The parecl should have the words "by Parcel Post," plainly written over the address. It should be well and strongly put up, and be legibly addressed to the Post Ofice address of the intencled receiver, including the name of the district in which the Post Oflice is situated. No written communication shall be enclosed in any circular, periodieal, pamphlet, book, book parcel, or parcel for the Pareel Post; and no tommmication shall be written upon any circular, periodical, pamphlet, book, book paekage, or parcel.

No letter, or any writing, or any marks to serve the purpose of a letter, shall be written upon or enclosed in any newspaper posted to pass as a newspaper.

Prepaid books, pamphlets and magazines, for Great Britain, are charged the following rates, when exceeding two ounces in weight:

For a packet above iwo ozs, and not exceeding 4 ozs., 6 cents. not exceeding 9 ozs., 12 eents. orer 8 ozs. and not excecding 1 lb .24 cents, And so on, adding ( 6 cents for every additional 4 ozs., or fraction thereof, when the packet exceeds 2 ozs. in weight.

Books, trade paiterns, or sumples, and all printed papers, other than newspupers, not exceeding two ounces in weight, are forwarded to the linited hingem at the reduced rate of :

For a packet not exceeding 1 oz............. 2 eents.
Above 1 oz. and not exceeding 2 ozs. . . . . . . . . . is cents.
Ynpaid books for the linited Kinglom are forwarded, charged with double the prepaid rates of postage.

## Rules of Ruting Letters by Brilish Packet.

For the United Kingdom, West Indies, Dominion of Cauada, P. E. Island, and United States, under $\frac{1}{2}$ oz. one rate; under 1 oz. two rates; under $1 \frac{1}{2}$ oz. three rates, and so on, adding one rate for every $\frac{1}{2} \mathrm{oz}$.

Letters posted in Newfoundland for delivery at any place within the Island, are charged 3 cents for every $\frac{1}{2}$ oz., if prepaid, and 6 cents unpaid.

By the Act 28 Vic., Chap. 2, all letters sent from this Colony, and all local letters deposited in any Post Office in this Colony for delivery or transmission within it, slall be prepaid by stamps, or otherwise such letters shall be chargeable with double postage to the receiver.

Parties desirous of vending Newfoundland postage stamps, will be allowed a commission of five per cent. Stamps, in all casi 8 , to $b$; paid for in advance.

## REGISTRATION.

Any Letters found to contain Coin, as well as any having the word " Registered" written upon them, which may be posted in Newfoundland, will be forwarded charged with a double registration fee.

Money Orders are now interchanged with the United Kingdom, Dominion of Uanada, and P. E. Island, at the following rates of Commission:

Scale for United Kingdom-Orders up to $£ 2$ stg., 1s. stg.; from £2, up to £5, 2 s . ; from $£ 5 \mathrm{up}$ to $£ 7$, 3 s . ; from $£ 7$, up to $£ 10$, 4 s .

Scale for the Provinces.-Orders up to £5, 1s. ; from £5, to $£ 10$, 2s.; from $£ 10$ to $£ 15,3 \mathrm{~s}$; and from $£ 15$ to $£ 20,4 \mathrm{~s}$. No single order can be granted for more than $\mathbf{E}^{2}(\mathbf{O}$. No half-pence to be introduced in the Orders.

Business of Money Order Office closes one howr before closing the Mails by the Halifax Steamer.

## SISTEM.

1-Money Orders are made out in forms supplied for the use of the Money Order Offices.

2-Persons applying for Moncy Orders are recommended to use printed "Application Forms," printed for that purpose.

3-Place of payment of a Money Order may be changed in accordance with instructions provided therefor.

4-Alteration of payee's name may be effected, by issue of a new order and payment of commission thereon.

5-Applicants for Money Orders are expected to observe due care in the examination of the same, relative to filling and stamping ; defect in Orders, when presented for payment, may cause difficulty and delay, for which the paying office is not to be held accountable.

6-Postmasters should be particularly careful to obtain from the person who presents a Money Order, whether the rightful owner or not, full information as to the Christian name, surname and address of the party who originally obtained it, unless such party be a firm, when the name of the firm will suffice. The only exception to this rule io-When an Order is presented through the Bank, in which case it will suffice that the Order, being properly signed, be also crossed with the Banker's name.

7-As however, after once paying a Money Order, by whomsoever presented, the office will not be liable to any further claim, the public are strictly cautioned,-

1st-To take all means to prevent the loss of the Money Order.
Ind-To be careful on taking out an Order, to state cor-

and inconvenience arising from imperfect directions, is caused by the carelessness of the sender, and no bame can attach to the Post OHice--other places beside those maned, have settlements with corresponding appelation, henee the neeessity of being particular in aldressing all letters, \&e.

See that every letter, newspaper, or other pacloet sent by post, is securely folded and sealed. Every such packet has to be several times handled; and even when in the mail bag, is exposed to pressure and friction. Unless, therefore, the article be light and pliant, it should be enclosed in strong paper, linen, parchment, or some other material which will not readily tear or break.

Fasten the covers of aewspapers fimmy, so as to prevent them from slipping ont.

When dropping a letter or newspaper into a letter-box, always see that the packet falls into the box, and does not stick in its passage.

Never seal letters for the East and West Indies and other hot clinates, with wax. Such a practice is attended with much inconvenionco, and freguently with serious injury, in conseguence of the melting of the wax, and the adhesion of the letters to each other. In all such eases use wafers or gum, and advise your correspondents in the combtry referred to, to do the same.

Never seud money or other articles of value through the Post Office, except either by means of a money order, or in a registered letter. "Any person who sends money or jewellery in an unregistered letter, not only runs a risk of losing his property, but exposes to temptation every one through whose hands his letter passes, and may be the means of ultimately bringing some clerk or letter carrice to moral ruin." Carefally secare every letter or packet containing money or value, first with gum and afterwards with good sealing-wat, on which mark the clear impression of the seal.

On posting a registered letter or packet, always obtain a receipt for the same at the office where posted.

When letters or papers are delayed or missing, at once communicate the fact to the Postmaster of tise Division in which is situated the Post Office at which the delay or missing letters were posted. In case of a missing letter enclose value, state the exact contents, the exact address, and the office at which posted; the name of the person by whom posted, and the name of the person by whom received at the office. In the case of a delayed letter or paper, send the cover or w:apper in an entire state, in order that the phace of delay may be ascertained by an examination of the post marles.

Tronble and loss oceasionally arise ont of the carelessness or disimenesty of parties employed in the Post Offec service; yet instances are not wanting in which it has been shown to the satistiation even of the complainats, that the fanlt at first atiributed to the Post Office, in trath rested in other quarters. Theft by private hands, athough very dillient of proof, have not unfrequently bee; bronght to light : am it is gevaty to be desired that those who sutfer loss shonh, in the first instance, and while the circamstances are fresh, endearoy to aseetain

with the utmost precision all paricuars respecting the despatch or regeipt of the lost letters or papers, and lose no time in communicating this information to the Postmaster. Indeed, gencrally speaking, it is only by careful inquiry into minute details that the offender can be detected, whether he be a serrant of a department or not.

The lost Ofice is a department which admits of constant improvement and expansion. The public, by sending to the Postmaster General, clear and correct information respecting faully arrangements, may materially benelit the scrvice. It must be remembered, however, that changes in machinery so extensive and intricate as that of the Post Office, must be made cantiously and with much previous consideration.

Time is generally required to carry out any material change in postal arrangements; for even when decided upon, old contracts, requiring notice of termination, may have to be got rid of, and tenders of new contracts invited by publie advertisements, before the decision cim take effect.

New lost Offices are established by the Department wherever it is ascertained that a sufficient number of inhabitants can be accommodated, and a sufficient amount of postal revenue collected to warrant such a measure. When a new Post Office is required, a petition should be addressed to the Postmaster General, signed by as many of the inhabitants as can conveniently subscribe the same. The petition should state the name of the settlement and district in which it is desired the office should be established; the distance from the neighboring offices; whether at the sight of the proposed Post Office there is a village; the number of mills, stores, taverns, and houses thereat; the extent of the settlement to be served and the probable cost of the mail; together with any other facts which may form any ground for the accommodation applied for.
