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By-Laws of the Township of Raleigh.

No. 169—A BY-LAW

To make provisions for draining a certain locality in the Township of Raleigh; hereinafter named.

Passed the 15th day of June, 1868.

WHEREAS, a majority of the resident owners of the S. E. $\frac{1}{4}$ of Lots numbered 18 and 19, in the 11th con., the whole of lots 18 and 19, in the 12th con., lots 18 and 19, the S. E. $\frac{1}{4}$ of lots 20 and 21, in the 13th con., lots 18, 19, 20 and 21, in the 14th con., and lots 18, 19, 20 and 21, in the 15th con.; in the Township of Raleigh, have petitioned the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the aforesaid Township, to cause a Drain to be made, commencing about the centre of the 11th con., in a Creek on lot 19, thence South-Easterly in said Creek across the S. E. $\frac{1}{4}$ of lot 19, in the 11th con., and the N. W. $\frac{1}{4}$ of lot 19 in the 12th con., to where it intersects the side road between lots 18 and 19, thence South-Easterly along said line of road between lots 18 and 19 to the line between concessions 14 and 15, thence North-Easterly along said concession line across lots 19, 20 and 21.

And whereas, the Petitioners and Council are of the opinion that it would greatly benefit the above lots and roads in that locality to have said Drain constructed, have ordered Levels and Plans to be made, and received a report thereon; with an estimate of the costs of said Drain, amounting to the sum of \$1440.

Be it therefore enacted by the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the Township of Raleigh, in Council assembled, under and by virtue of an Act, Chap. 51, as amended by Chap. 52, 29th and 30th Vict., passed in the year 1866, also an Act to amend said Act passed by the Legislature of Ontario in 1863.

1st. That the said Drain shall be made in accordance with the plan and estimate of the same, made by Arthur Jones, Provincial Land Surveyor.

2nd. That there shall be raised, levied, and collected, along with the ordinary assessed taxes of the present year, the sum of \$1080, for the purpose of paying one part of the costs of said drainage, and the costs incidental thereto, assessed upon the lands in the locality aforesaid, in proportion to the benefit derived therefrom by each lot as set forth in the Schedule hereunto annexed, and forming a part of this By-law, subject nevertheless to an appeal by the parties interested in each case.

3rd. That the sum of \$360, assessed on the Road allowances in the aforesaid locality, shall be paid by the Treasurer of the aforesaid Corporation out of the general funds of the Municipality, on the order of the Reeve.

4th. That the work to be performed under the provisions of this By-law shall be let by public contract to the lowest bidder, (and not in any case to exceed the estimate,) who shall give security for the due performance of the work contracted for.

5th. That Messrs. White and Morrison are hereby appointed Commissioners for the letting and superintending of the work, who are hereby authorized to grant orders on the Treasurer therefor.

6th. That the said Commissioners shall be paid the sum of \$1 50 per day for every day necessarily spent on letting and superintending said work.

7th. That this By-law shall be published in the *Chatham Planet* newspaper for one month before the final passing thereof.

No. 170—A BY-LAW

To make provisions for opening out a certain Drain in the Township of Raleigh hereinafter named.

Passed June 15th, A. D., 1868.

WHEREAS, a majority of the resident owners of the lots numbered 8, 9, 10, 11 and 12, in con. A, and the north west halves of lots numbered 8, 9, 10, 11 and 12, in the 8th con., have petitioned the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the Township of Raleigh, to cause a Drain to be made on the line between concessions A and 8, in said Township, from Cronan's Creek to Dove Creek.

And whereas, the Petitioners and Council are of the opinion that it would greatly benefit the above lots and road allowances to make said Drain, have ordered a Survey and Levels to be made, and received a report thereon, with Plan and estimate of the costs of said drainage, amounting to the sum of \$514.

Be it therefore enacted by the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the Township of Raleigh, in Council assembled, under and by virtue of an Act Chap. 51, as amended by Chap. 52, 29th and 30th Vict., passed in the year 1866, also an Act passed by the Legislature of Ontario in the year 1868.

1st. That the said Drain shall be constructed in accordance with the plan and estimate of the same made by Arthur Jones, Provincial Land Surveyor.

2nd. That there shall be raised, levied, and collected, along with the ordinary assessed taxes of the present year, \$138; in the year 1869, \$138; and in the year 1870, \$138; together with the sum of 8 per cent. per annum on the last two mentioned sums for the purpose of paying one part of the costs of said drainage, and the costs incidental thereto, assessed upon the lands in the locality aforesaid, in proportion to the benefit derived therefrom by each lot as set forth in the Schedule hereunto annexed, and forming a

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3rd. That the sum of \$100 assessed upon the Road allowances, for the purposes aforesaid, shall be paid by the Treasurer of this Corporation out of the General Funds of the Municipality on the Order of the Reeve.

4th. That the work to be performed under the provisions of this By-Law shall be let by public contract to the lowest bidder, (and not to exceed in any case the estimate,) who shall give sufficient security for the due performance of the work contracted for.

5th. That Messrs. McNeil and Dillon are hereby appointed Commissioners for letting and superintending the work, who are hereby authorized to give orders on the Treasurer therefor.

6th. That the said Commissioners shall be paid the sum of \$1 50 per day for every day necessarily spent in letting and superintending said work.

7th. It shall be lawful for the Council of the Corporation of the Township of Raleigh, to raise by way of loan, and at a rate of interest not exceeding 8 per cent. per annum, \$276, from any person or persons, body or bodies corporate, who may be willing to advance the same upon the credit of the Debentures hereinafter mentioned, to meet the second and third payments in this By-law.

8th. It shall and may be lawful for the Reeve of the Township of Raleigh, to cause Debentures to be made out, not exceeding the said sum \$276, such Debentures to be under the seal of the Corporation, and signed by the Reeve and Clerk, and made payable not later than the First day of January, 1871.

9th. That this By-law shall be published in the Chatham Planet newspaper for one month before the final passing thereof.

No. 171—A BY-LAW

To raise certain sums of money therein mentioned in the Township of Raleigh, for the year 1868.

Passed 6th July, A. D. 1868.

WHEREAS, by By-law by the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the County of Kent, passed on the 13th day of June, 1868, and entitled a By-law to raise the sum of (\$19,452) nineteen thousand four hundred and fifty-nine dollars; to meet the current expenses of the County of Kent, and for other purposes.

And whereas, the Municipality of the Township of Raleigh is required to raise the sum of two thousand one hundred and fifty-six dollars, as their portion for said year, to be paid to the Treasurer of the County of Kent, without any deduction on or before the 31st day of December, 1868.

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And whereas, the apportionment of the Legislative School grant for the Township of Raleigh for the year 1868, amounts to three hundred and thirty seven dollars, according to the apportionment of the Chief Superintendent of Schools, the Municipality of the Township of Raleigh is required to raise an equal sum of money according to law in such case, made and provided.

And whereas, it is necessary to raise the following sums of money to meet the current expenses of the Corporation of the Township of Raleigh, for the year A. D. 1868, viz :

For the Salaries of Township Officers, the sum of..... \$650.
 For the support of the poor in the Township, the sum of.... 200.
 For Non-Resident School Accounts, the sum of..... 348.
 For Miscellaneous Accounts, the sum of..... 300.

Be it therefore enacted by the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the Township of Raleigh, in Council assembled, under and by virtue of an Act, Chap. 51, as amended by Chap. 52, 29 & 30 Vict., of the Annual Statutes of Upper Canada, passed in the year 1866; also an Act passed by the Legislature of Ontario in the year 1868.

1st. That there shall be raised, levied, and collected, upon all the rateable, real, and personal property, in the Township of Raleigh, the sum or rate of four and nine-tenth mills on every dollar thereof, for the aforesaid County purposes; the sum or rate of one mill on every dollar thereof for the aforesaid School purposes, except the property of certain Roman Catholic supporters of Separate Schools; the sum or rate of three and one-tenth mills on every dollar thereof to meet the current expenses of the Township of Raleigh, for the current year; the sum or rate of one dollar upon the owner or harbinger of every dog, and the sum or rate of two dollars upon the owner or harbinger of every Bitch entered upon the Assessment Roll of the Township of Raleigh for the year A. D. 1868.

2nd. That if the above sums of money so raised and collected by the said rates, shall exceed in any case the amounts so required for the said purposes respectively, the Treasurer of this Corporation, shall pass such excess to any deficiency that may arise to any or either of the purposes mentioned in this By-law, and if no such deficiency shall happen then all such excess, if any, shall be kept by the Treasurer and appropriated to the general purposes of the Township under the direction and control of the Council thereof, as all the public monies are which may come into his hands.

3rd. That the Clerk of this Corporation is required to levy a special rate over and above all other rates against the estate, real and personal, of any School Section within this Municipality, on the request of the Trustees, who shall furnish him on or before the first day of August, with a written statement signed by such Trustees, of the amount of money to be raised, levied and collected by this Council for Common School purposes in such School Section such a rate pro rata, on all the rateable property in such School Section as will amount to the sum of money required by such Trustees for the aforesaid purposes, together with the sum of six per cent. on said amount to defray the expenses of levying and collecting the same.

4th. That the Collector is hereby authorized and required to collect, according to law, the special rates levied on the Freeholders and Householders of such School Sections, the sums of money set opposite their respective names, and to pay the amount so collected, on or before the 14th day of December next, after retaining the sum of six per cent. for levying and collecting said rates to the Secretary-Treasurer of such School Section, whose receipt with the Corporate seal attached, and deposited with the Treasurer of this Corporation, shall be his acquittance for the sums so paid.

5th. It shall be the duty of the Collector of this Corporation to pay over all monies collected by him to the Treasurer of this Corporation every two weeks, with a report of all the taxes he has received in Bank Notes or other current funds, and to pay over such current funds under a penalty of the

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forfeiture of his salary, and to finally collect and pay over all monies collected by him, and make a return to the Treasurer by the 14th day of December, according to law; provided that this clause shall not apply to Special School rates.

6th. That the Collector shall be allowed the same fees as are now allowed to Bailiffs of the Division Courts for all property seized, appraised, advertised and sold by him by virtue of his office.

No. 172—A BY-LAW

To make provisions for deepening the Ditch on the Drake Road in the Township of Raleigh, from the Railroad to the River Thames.

Passed August 17th, 1868.

WHEREAS, a majority of the Resident owners of the lots numbered 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11 and 12, in the Front concession in the Township of Raleigh, have petitioned the Municipal Council of said Township, for the deepening of the old drain on the easterly side of the Drake Road from the Railroad to the River Thames.

And whereas, the Council are of the opinion that the deepening of the said ditch would greatly benefit the lands above named, have ordered the levels to be taken and received a report thereon, with an estimate of the costs of the work, amounting to the sum of \$368.

Be it therefore enacted by the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the Township of Raleigh, in Council assembled, under and by virtue of an Act Chap. 51, as amended by Chap. 52, 29th & 30th Vict., passed in the year 1866, also an Act of the Legislature of Ontario, Chap. 30, passed in the year 1868.

1st. That the said Ditch shall be deepened in accordance with the plan and estimate of the same made by Arthur Jones, Esq., Provincial Land Surveyor.

2nd. That there shall be raised, levied and collected, along with the ordinary assessed taxes of the present year, the sum of \$246, for the purpose of paying one part of the costs of the drainage and the costs incidental thereto, assessed upon the lands in the locality aforesaid, in proportion to the benefit derived therefrom by each lot as set forth in the Schedule hereunto annexed, and forming a part of this By-law, subject nevertheless to an appeal by the parties interested in the case.

3rd. That the sum of \$20 assessed on the Road allowances in the locality described shall be paid by the Treasurer of the Township out of the general funds of the Municipality on the order of the Reeve.

4th. That the work to be done under the provisions of this By-law, shall be let by public contract to the lowest bidder, (and not in any case to exceed the estimate,) who shall give security for the due performance of the work contracted for.

5th. That Alexander Peck is hereby appointed Commissioner for the letting and superintending of the work, and is hereby authorized to grant orders on the Treasurer therefor, less 20 per cent., until approved by the Township Surveyor.

6th. That the said Commissioner shall be paid the sum of \$1 50 per day for every day necessarily spent in letting and superintending said work.

7th. That this By-law shall be published in the Chatham Planet newspaper for one month before the final passing thereof.

The following Schedule shows the benefit to be derived by each Lot from the drainage to be performed under this By-law.

the Gores 17 and 18, in the 16th Concessions; also, a branch from the Four Rod Road across Lots 14 and 15 in the line between concessions 14 and 15; also, a branch between Concessions 12 and 13, from the Four Rod Road to the line between Lots 15 and 16. And whereas, the Council being of the opinion that it would greatly benefit that portion of the Township to make said Drain, have ordered the levels to be taken and received a report thereon, with an estimate of the costs, amounting to the sum of \$1473 33.

Be it therefore enacted by the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the Township of Raleigh, in Council assembled, under and virtue of an Act, Chap. 51, as amended by Chap. 52, 29th & 30th Vict., passed in the year 1868; also an Act to amend said Act passed by the Legislature of Ontario in the year 1868, Chap. 30.

1st. That the said Drain shall be made in accordance with the plan and estimate of the same made by Wm. G. McGeorge, Provincial Land Surveyor.

2nd. That there shall be raised, levied and collected along with the ordinary assessed taxes of the present year, the sum of \$1128 33, for the purpose of paying one part of the costs of said drainage, and the costs incidental thereto, assessed upon the lands in the locality aforesaid, above described, in proportion to the benefit derived therefrom by each lot as set forth in the Schedule hereunto annexed, and forming a part of this By-law, subject nevertheless to an appeal by the parties interested in each case.

3rd. That the sum of \$348 assessed on the road allowances in the aforesaid locality, shall be paid by the Treasurer of the aforesaid Corporation, out of the general funds of the Municipality on the order of the Reeve.

4th. That the work to be performed under the provisions of this By-law shall be let by public contract to the lowest bidder, (and not in any case to exceed the estimate,) who shall give sufficient security for the due performance of the work contracted for.

5th. That Messrs. White and Morrison are hereby appointed Commissioners for the letting and superintending of the work, who are hereby authorized to grant orders on the Treasurer therefor.

6th. That the said Commissioners shall be paid the sum of \$1 50 per day for every day necessarily spent in letting and superintending said work.

7th. That this By-law shall be published in the Chatham Planet newspaper for one month before the final passing thereof.

No. 175—A BY-LAW

For the widening of the River Thames Road in the Township of Raleigh, in front of Lots No. 2, 3, and a part of Lot No. 4.

Passed September 21st, 1868.

WHEREAS, it is necessary for the Council to provide for the widening of the River Thames Road, now travelled in front of Lots No. 2, 3, and a part of No. 4, in the said Township of Raleigh.

And whereas, all the notices required by law have been given, Therefore be it enacted by the Municipal Council of the Township of Raleigh, in Council assembled, under and by virtue of an Act respecting Municipal Institutions of Upper Canada, and the amendments thereto, passed by the Provincial Legislature of Ontario in the year of our Lord 1868, Chap. 30.

1st. That the said River Thames Road be widened in accordance with a plan and report by Arthur Jones, P. L. S., furnished to this Council and dated August 12th, 1868.

That is to say, across Lots No. 2 and 3, now occupied by John Drewry, to an uniform width of thirty feet, (30 feet), clear of the River Thames Bank, and the fences along said Road as already surveyed and staked out by the above mentioned Arthur Jones, P. L. S., making about one-third (1/3) of an acre to be taken from said lots Nos. 2 and 3, also across lot No. 4, the said River Road to be widened to an uniform width of thirty feet (30 feet) clear of the River Thames Bank, and the fences along said road as already measured and staked out by the within mentioned Arthur Jones, P. L. S., making about 31 perches to be taken from said Lot No. 4.

No. 176—A BY-LAW

To repeal a By-law entitled a By-law to divide the Township of Raleigh into three Electoral Divisions, to establish polling places therein, and to appoint Returning Officers therefor, numbered 150, passed in the year 1866, and to divide the Township of Raleigh into four Electoral Divisions.

Passed November 16th, 1868.

WHEREAS, it is necessary and expedient, and for the convenience of the voters in the Township of Raleigh, that four Electoral Divisions should be made in said Township.

Be it therefore enacted by the Municipal Council of the Township of Raleigh, in Council assembled, under and by virtue of an Act respecting the Municipal Institutions of Upper Canada, and the amendments thereto passed by the Provincial Legislature of Ontario in the year 1868.

1st. That the above recited By-law be, and the same is hereby repealed, and that the Township of Raleigh be divided into Four Electoral Divisions, as follows:

2nd. That the First Electoral Division shall embrace and contain all that portion of the Township of Raleigh lying between the centre of the Eighth Concession and the River Thames, from the line between Lots 12 and 13 and the Eastern boundary of said Township; and that the Polling place be the School House in School Section No. 3; and that William Holmes is hereby appointed Returning Officer for the year 1869.

3rd. That the Second Electoral Division shall embrace and consist of all that portion of the Township of Raleigh lying North of the centre of the Eighth Concession, from the line between Lots 12 and 13 to the Township line between Raleigh and Tilbury East; and that the Polling place shall be the School House in School Section No. 3; and that Abraham D. Shadd is hereby appointed Returning Officer for the year 1869.

4th. That the Third Electoral Division shall embrace all that portion of the Township lying between the centre of the Eighth Concession and the

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centro of the 14th Concession; and that the Polling place shall be the Township Hall; and that John Jenner is hereby appointed Returning Officer for the year 1869.

5th. That the Fourth Electoral Division shall embrace and consist of all that portion of the Township lying South of the centre of the Fourteenth Concession; and that the Polling place be at the House of Edward Blackmoor, in Dealtown; and that Alexander Goulett is hereby appointed Returning Officer for 1869.

No. 177—A BY-LAW

To grant authority to the Trustees of School Section No. 3, in the Township of Raleigh to borrow the sum of Two Hundred and Fifty Dollars, for the purpose of paying one-half the costs for erecting a new School House.

Passed November 16th, 1868.

WHEREAS the Trustees of School Section numbered Three, in the Township of Raleigh, have made application to the Municipal Council of said Township to grant them authority to borrow the sum of Two Hundred and Fifty Dollars for the purpose of paying one-half of the costs of erecting a new School House.

And whereas the amount of the rateable property in said School Section, according to the last revised Assessment Rolls, amounts to \$65,019.

And whereas it will require a special rate of four and three-tenth mill^s in the Dollar, in addition to all other rates, to be levied and collected in the year 1869, for paying the principal and interest of said debt.

Be it therefore enacted by the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the Township of Raleigh, in Council assembled, under and by virtue of the Acts, Caps. 54 and 64, of the Consolidated Statutes of Upper Canada, and the amendments thereto passed by the Provincial Legislature of Ontario in the year of our Lord 1868.

1st. That it shall and may be lawful for the Trustees of School Section numbered Three, in the Township of Raleigh, to raise by way of loan and at a rate of interest not exceeding the sum of Ten per cent. per annum, the sum of Two Hundred and Fifty Dollars (to be paid on or before the First day of January, in the year of our Lord 1870) from any person or persons, body or bodies corporate, who may be willing to advance the same.

No. 178—A BY-LAW

To appropriate certain sums of Money for the improvement of Roads and Bridges in the Five Rural Road Divisions of the Township of Raleigh.

Passed February 8th, 1869.

WHEREAS it is necessary and expedient to appropriate certain sums of money for the improvement of the Roads and Bridges in the Township of Raleigh;

Be it therefore enacted by the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the Township of Raleigh, in Council assembled, under and by virtue of an Act respecting the Municipal Institutions of Upper Canada, and the amendments thereto passed by the Provincial Legislature of Ontario.

1st. That the sum of \$1070 80 be and is hereby appropriated for the improvement of the Roads and Bridges of the Township of Raleigh, as set forth in a report made by the Clerk of this Council, under By-law No. 38 of the Consolidated By-laws of 1865, that is to say—

No. 179—A BY-LAW

To appoint and confirm the appointment of certain Municipal Officers in the Township of Raleigh, and to provide for the Salaries of the same for the year 1869.

Passed February 8th, 1869.

WHEREAS it is necessary that the Municipal Officers appointed by this Corporation in each year, should be appointed under the seal thereof. Be it therefore enacted by the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the Township of Raleigh, in Council assembled, under and by virtue of an Act respecting the Municipal Institutions of Upper Canada, and the amendments thereto passed by the Legislature of Ontario.

1st. That George Coutts, nominated by the Reeve, and Hugh McPherson, nominated by the Council, are hereby confirmed in the office of Auditors, and that their salary shall be the sum of \$6 each, and no more.

2nd. That James Dillon is hereby appointed to the office of Assessor, and it shall be his duty to complete and return his Roll to the Clerk not later than the 15th day of April, and that his salary shall be the sum of \$75, and no more.

3rd. That Martin Dillon be and is hereby appointed Collector for that portion of the Township nor west of the line between concessions nine and ten, and that James Gillhula be and is hereby appointed Collector for

that portion of the Township southeast of the line between concessions fifty and ten, and they are hereby required to enter into bonds on or before the meeting of the Council in the month of May, themselves in the sum of two thousand dollars each, and other good freehold sureties to the amount of eight thousand dollars, which bonds will require them to collect all rates levied on the Collector's Roll and to pay over the same to the Treasurer of this Corporation in manner following, that is to say: on their receiving the Collector's Roll they shall commence to collect the rates and shall pay in all monies received by them for taxes at least every two weeks, and shall finally collect and make their returns to the said Treasurer as required by law. Salary, twenty-five dollars each, and no more, except what is allowed for Special School per centage. And it shall be the duty of the Collectors, in settling with the Treasurer, to make a report of all the taxes they shall receive in Bank notes and other current funds, and to pay over the same under a penalty of the forfeiture of his or their salary.

4th. That Arthur Jones is hereby appointed to the office of Township Surveyor, and that he receive \$4 per day when employed.

5th. That Samuel Craford is hereby appointed to the office of Inspector of Licenses, and that his Salary shall be the sum of \$14, and no more.

6th. That the following persons are hereby appointed Overseers of Highways in the different Statute Labor Divisions.

10th. That the appointments of the Collectors and the Inspectors of Licenses shall be in force as soon as those officers have lodged with the Clerk of this Corporation the necessary bonds, duly approved by the Council.

11th. That any person neglecting or refusing to take the Declaration of Office or Qualification within twenty days after their appointment, and being notified of the same, shall be liable to a penalty of not less than One Dollar, nor more than Ten Dollars, to be recovered in the usual manner on complaint of the Clerk before any Justice of the Peace having jurisdiction in the Municipality.

No. 180—A BY-LAW

To amend a By-law passed the 5th day of May, 1862, entitled "A By-Law to divide the Township of Raleigh into Rural Road Divisions," and numbered 24 of the Consolidated By-laws of 1865.

Passed 8th February, 1869.

WHEREAS it is necessary and expedient and for the convenience of expending the money accruing from Statute Labor Tax, that the Boundary Line between the Third and Fifth, and Fourth and Fifth Rural Road Divisions should be altered.

Be it therefore enacted by the Municipal Council of the Corporation of the Township of Raleigh, in Council assembled, under and by virtue of an Act respecting the Municipal Institutions of Upper Canada, and the amendments thereto passed by the Provincial Legislature of Ontario.

1st. That the N. W. One hundred acres of Lots numbered 1, 2, 3, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10, 11 and 12, in the 14th Concession, shall be detached from the Fifth Rural Road Division, and the same shall be attached to the Third Rural Road Division; and that the N. W. One hundred acres of the Lots numbered 13, 14, 15, 16, 17, 18, 19, 20, 21, 22, 23, 24 and 25, in the 14th Concession, shall be detached from the Fifth Rural Road Division, and the same shall be attached to Rural Road Division numbered Four.

2nd. That anything contained in the Fourth and Fifth clauses of the above recited By-law that is inconsistent or repugnant to this By-law, shall be and the same is hereby repealed.

No. 181—A BY-LAW

To Repeal all By-laws heretofore made in the Township of Raleigh, with respect to the sale of Spirituous or other Liquors therein, and to make other provisions for the same.

Passed February 8th, 1868.

BE IT THEREFORE ENACTED by the Municipal Council of the Township of Raleigh, assembled under and by virtue of the Municipal Act of 1866, and the Amendments thereto passed by the Legislature of Ontario; also, "An Act respecting Tavern and Shop Licenses," passed 23rd January, 1869.

1st. That from and after the last day of February, 1869, all existing By-laws made by the Council of the Township of Raleigh respecting Taverns and Shops, shall be repealed.

2nd. That for the purposes of this By-law the year shall commence on the First day of March, in each and every year, and end on the last day of February, in the following year.

3rd. That it shall not be lawful for any person, either directly or indirectly, to sell by retail, Spirituous Liquors, Beer, Ale, Cider, or other fermented or manufactured Liquors, within the Municipality, without first having obtained a License for that purpose.

4th. That no Tavern License shall hereafter be granted or issued unless upon petition to the Council, praying for the same, and signed by the applicant.

5th. The duty for Tavern Licenses shall be \$30 per annum, including the Provincial duty; provided that any person applying for a License to keep a Tavern after the First day of March, shall pay, exclusive of the Provincial duty in the usual way, at the rate of Two Dollars per month for the portion of the year unexpired.

6th. That Licenses may be granted for the sale by retail of Spirituous Liquors, in Shops or Stores, in quantities of not less than one quart, upon payment of a License duty of \$50; and that the person obtaining such Shop License, shall not allow any Liquor sold by him to be consumed within his Shop or Store, or within the building of which it is a part, either by the purchaser thereof or any other person not usually resident within such building.

7th. That before any of the above Licenses for a Tavern or Shop shall issue, the applicant shall enter into bonds to the Municipality; himself in the sum of Two Hundred Dollars, and two good and sufficient sureties in the sum of One Hundred Dollars each; such bonds to be conditioned, for the payment of all fines and costs incurred for any offence against the provisions of this By-law, and for the performance and observance of all rules and regulations now made or hereafter to be made, by Statute or otherwise, for the good government of all places licensed to retail Spirituous Liquors; such bonds to be drawn by the Clerk of this Municipality, and to be filed in his office.

8th. That the applicant for Tavern or other Licenses for the sale of Spirituous Liquors by retail, to be drunk on the premises, shall, upon depositing in the Clerk's Office the necessary Certificate from the Inspector, and entering into bonds as per the said By-law required, be entitled to a Certificate from the Reeve and Clerk of the Council, who are hereby authorized to grant such Certificates, to the following effect, viz:

"We hereby certify, that it appears that _____, an application for a Tavern License for the House known as _____, in the Township of Raleigh, has complied with the requirements of the Law, and of the By-laws of the Municipality of the said Township of Raleigh, and upon the payment of the Provincial duty thereon, is entitled to such License, to be issued by you according to Law, for the current year, from the First day of March, 18—, to the last day of February, 18—.

"Given at Raleigh, this _____ day of _____, 18—." _____, Reeve.
 _____, Clerk.

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9th. The said applicant shall forthwith take the said certificate to the Issuer of Licenses for the Municipality within which the said License is to have effect, and, on presentation thereof to the said Issuer of Licenses and payment to him of the Provincial duty thereon, the said Issuer of Licenses shall issue to such applicant a license; provided always, that the said license shall be invalid, inoperative, and of no effect until the said applicant shall have paid to the Treasurer of the said Municipality the sum of \$20, or the said sum of \$2 per month, and the Provincial duty as provided for in Section 5, of this By-law, and shall have obtained a receipt for such payment, signed by the said Treasurer, and endorsed on the said License, and it shall be the duty of the said Treasurer on payment or tender to him of the money last aforesaid, and the said license, to fill up and sign such receipt.

10th. That all sums paid into the Treasurer's hands for Tavern and other Licenses, shall be applied to the general purposes of the Township.

11th. In all places whereby the laws of the Province of Ontario, intoxicating liquors are, or may be allowed to be sold by wholesale or retail, no sale or other disposal of the said Liquors, shall take place therein, or on the premises thereof, or out of, or from the same, to any person or persons whomsoever, from or after the hour of seven of the clock on Saturday night, till the hour of six of the clock on Monday morning thereafter, and during any further time on the said days, and any hours on other days during which, by any By-law of the Municipality wherein such place or places may be situated, the same, or the B. r room or Bar rooms thereof ought to be kept closed, save and except in cases where a requisition for medicinal purposes, signed by a Licensed Medical Practitioner, or by a Justice of the Peace is produced by the Vendee or his agent, nor shall any such Liquor be permitted or allowed to be drunk in any such places except as aforesaid, during the time prohibited by this Act for the sale of the same.

12th. For punishment of offences against the above Sections, a penalty, for the first offence of Twenty Dollars; for the second offence, Forty Dollars; and for a third offence, One Hundred Dollars, and in case of conviction any further punishment as provided by Statute.

13th. Any person or persons may be the informant or informants, or complainant or complainants, in prosecuting under this By-law. All proceedings shall be begun within twenty days from the date of the offence.

14th. That every Tavern hereafter Licensed, shall contain in addition to what may be needed for the use of the family of the Tavern keeper, not less than four bedrooms, with the suitable complement of beds, bedding and furniture, and one sitting room, separate from the Bar-room, for the accommodation of travellers; and the keeper thereof shall at all times keep and provide good and wholesome provisions and drink for his guests, and shall also have near, or attached to his tavern or Inn, a stable, secured with lock and key, with proper stalls for at least six horses, and a driving house also secured with lock and key, sufficient to contain two wagons or carriages, and he shall keep his premises constantly supplied with a sufficient quantity of Hay and Oats for the horses and cattle of travellers stopping thereat.

15th. That the keeper of every such Tavern shall see that travellers resorting to his house are treated with attention and civility, and that such horses and cattle properly fed, watered, and cleaned, and that such horses and cattle, as well as such wagon, carriage, baggage, goods, and other things, entrusted to his care, are taken proper care of, and he shall be held responsible for any hurt or damage which such horses, cattle, and other property, may sustain from neglect on the part of himself or his servants.

16th. That the keepers of Taverns Licensed to sell Spirituous Liquors, shall allow no gambling, drunkenness, profane or indecent language, or riotous, disorderly, or improper conduct, at any time in their houses, or on their premises, nor shall they give or sell, or permit to be given or sold, any

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intoxicating drink to any intoxicated person, or to any minor, or to any Indian man or woman, nor shall they knowingly sell or give it to any other person to be conveyed to any Indian man or woman.

17th. That every person licensed to keep a tavern in this Municipality shall at all times permit the visits of the Inspector or Constable for the purposes of his office, and shall exhibit over the door in large letters the words "Licensed to sell wine, beer, and other spirituous or fermented liquors," and every such tavern keeper shall keep posted up in a conspicuous place in his bar-room a copy of this By-law, and such rules and regulations as may from time to time be adopted by the Council respecting taverns, under a penalty in default of complying with this section, of one dollar, recoverable with costs on conviction before the Reeve or any Justice of the Peace for this municipality, upon the oath of one credible witness, one half of which penalty shall go to the informer and the other half to the Municipality; and be it further provided that all licenses shall be constantly and conspicuously exposed in shops, or in the bar-rooms of taverns, Inns, and other places of public entertainment, under a penalty of five dollars for every days' wilful or negligent omission so to do, to be recovered with costs from the person so making default.

18th. That every Tavern, Inn and Hotel, in which spirituous or fermented liquors, or drinks, are ordinarily sold; shall be closed during the day appointed for polling in the election of members of Parliament, in the same manner as it should be on Sunday; and no spirituous or fermented liquors or drinks shall be sold or given during said period under a penalty of one hundred dollars against the keeper thereof if he neglects to close it, and under a like penalty if he sells or gives away any Spirituous or Fermented Liquors or drinks, as aforesaid.

19th. That any person guilty of an infraction of any of the provisions of this By-law shall, upon conviction thereof before the Reeve or any other Justice of the Peace having jurisdiction within the Municipality, when any one such person can act, or before any two of them, when any two of them should act, forfeit and pay, at the discretion of the Convicting Justice or Justices, when no specified penalty is hereinbefore mentioned, the sum of \$5.00 for the first offence; \$20 for the second offence; and \$50 for the third and each subsequent offence; and in default of payment of any fine imposed under this By-law, together with the costs of prosecution, it shall be lawful for the convicting Justice or Justices to levy the same by distress and sale of the goods and chattels of the offender; and in case no sufficient distress can be found to satisfy the said fine and costs, it shall be lawful for the convicting Justice or Justices to commit the offender at hard labor in the common gaol of the County of Kent, for a period not to exceed thirty days; provided that the penalties for the infraction of clauses numbers three and sixteen of this By-law shall be those fixed in section 22, of the Act relating to Tavern and Shop Licenses.

20th. That all penalties imposed for the infraction of any of the provisions of this By-law (except where otherwise provided) when collected, shall be paid, one half to the informer, and the other half to the Township Treasurer, for the general purposes of the Township.

Duties of the Inspector.

21st. It shall be the duty of the Inspector of Shop and Tavern Licenses to take the Declaration and Qualification of Office, required by law, and to enter into Bonds in the sum of two hundred Dollars, with one good surety in the sum of one hundred dollars, conditioned for the efficient discharge of his office.

22nd. He shall in the month of February in each year, visit the premises of all applicants whose applications have been sanctioned by the Council of the Municipality at a meeting held for that purpose on the second Monday in February of each year, and after carefully examining said premises,

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shall, on finding the necessary accommodations, and that the applicant is a fit and proper person to have a License, grant a certificate addressed to the Clerk to that effect; also, after visiting the premises of all applicants, shall send a report on the state of said premises to the Council, stating to whom he has granted certificates, and to whom he has not, with the reason therefor, and any information or suggestion that may be useful for regulating the sale by retail of intoxicating liquors.

23rd. It shall be the duty of the Inspector on receiving notice from any member of the Council, or other person, or on his being aware that any person or persons are selling liquor without a license, or guilty of keeping a disorderly house, if he deems the evidence sufficient he shall promptly make a complaint to the Reeve or some other Justice of the Peace in the Municipality, or, if he deems the evidence not sufficient, he shall forthwith visit the premises of the party or parties complained of, and, on his finding that they are selling intoxicating liquors without a license, or guilty of a violation of Sections Three and Sixteen of this By-law, he shall then forthwith complain as above, which complaint may be made in the name of the Corporation of Raleigh, in which case the whole of the penalty shall go to the Treasurer of the Municipality.

24th. Any Inspector of Licenses may in his discretion (but subject to any By-laws of the Municipality) endorse on any license permission to the person holding the license to sell the liquors mentioned in his license at any place out of his house, or to remove from the house licensed to any other house to be described in the endorsement and situate within the Municipality, and such permission shall authorize the holder thereof to sell such liquors in the House mentioned in the endorsement, during the unexpired portion of the term for which the license was granted, and upon the same terms and conditions, and any bond or security which such holder may have given for any purpose relative to such license shall apply to the house or place to which said removal is authorized, but shall not entitle him to sell at more than one place at a time.

25th. Any person interfering with the Inspector in the discharge of the duties of his office, shall, on conviction thereof, be liable to a penalty of ten dollars with costs.

26th. On the Inspector refusing or neglecting to fulfil the duties as required by this By-law, or who issues a certificate contrary to the provisions thereof, and upon conviction therefor, shall for each offence pay a fine of not less than forty dollars nor more than one hundred dollars, or he may be imprisoned for a period not exceeding three calendar months.

Victualling Houses.

Any person being desirous of keeping a Victualling House, it shall be the duty of the Inspector to visit such house, to ascertain if such person has the necessary accommodations, which shall be the same as those required for a tavern. If he finds such party duly qualified and having the requisite accommodations, he shall grant a certificate and on said certificate, together with the Treasurer's receipt, that the sum of five dollars has been paid, the Clerk shall grant a license, receiving from the Licensee the sum of one dollar, and any person opening such a House without first obtaining a license, shall be liable to a penalty of ten dollars, recoverable in the usual manner before a Justice or Justices of the Peace.
