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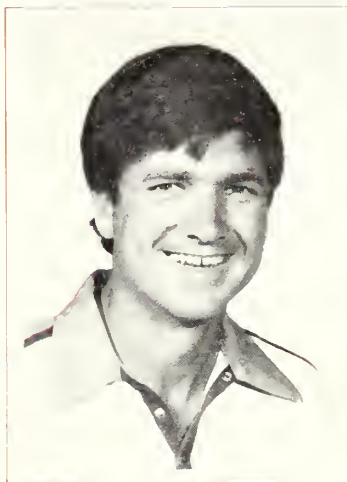

Today's Game

While most of the country feels the top matchup of the sports week took place last Wednesday night in Las Vegas when Thomas Hearns fought Sugar Ray Leonard, Southeast football fans certainly have a different opinion. No matchup in college football today has been more competitive in recent years.

The prize fight in Las Vegas at midweek offered an exciting one-on-one matchup, but this afternoon, football fans witnessing the Clemson-Georgia fray will get added bonuses. With all the key matchups in this game it will be like viewing 11 prize fights at once on each play.

Obviously, some of the matchups stand out more than others. The most publicized confrontation will feature Clemson linebacker Jeff Davis and Georgia running back Herschel Walker. Davis has been Clemson's top tackler this season by far as he has already made 33 stops in two games. He had 20 last week and has gone over the 300-mark in career stops at Clemson. The preseason All-American (according to **Street & Smith Magazine**) was the major reason Tulane gained only 40 yards rushing last week. He is truly the team's defensive leader and one of the strongest hitters in the country.

"Jeff Davis has followed in the footsteps of the tradition of outstanding linebackers at Clemson," said Georgia Head Coach Vince Dooley. "He is a heavy hitter who is an extremely aggressive player, something that is necessary to become a great linebacker."

Walker has certainly been on Davis' mind for some time, but the Clemson linebacker certainly is not alone. The Wrightsville, GA, native is the talk of the country as he has already appeared on more national magazine covers than Farrah Fawcett and Cheryl Tiegs put together. And the statistics and list of accomplishments tell us why he is the nation's most gifted runner.

Only 13 games into his career he is already on the doorstep of the 2,000-yard mark. He has 1,944 yards coming into today's game and needs only 66 to reach the magic number. To give you an example of the magnitude of this accomplishment, just examine the Clemson record book. Only five players in Clemson history ever gained over 2,000 yards in their careers (Buddy Gore, Ray Yauger, Ken Callicutt, Lester Brown and Fred Cone) and it took them at least three years to make it. (Buddy Gore did it in 23 games and that is the quickest in Clemson history.)

Walker gained 1,616 yards as a freshman, the most in NCAA history by a rookie. Also a track star in the spring, Walker was the first freshman ever se-

lected to the Associated Press' All-America team, and of course led the Bulldogs to the national title. And he still has not played in a losing game. That last stat probably will motivate the Tigers more than anything.

Even though the Davis-Walker confrontation will reap all the publicity, there are two key matchups in the trenches that could decide the game. When Clemson tackle Lee Nanney faces off against Georgia tackle Jimmy Payne, sparks (if not chin straps) are sure to fly. Nanney is the strongest player in the ACC and possibly the South based on his 525 pound bench-pressing ability. The Spartanburg, SC, native was All-ACC last year and should be a cleat-in for the team this year. He has been Clemson's top graded offensive lineman in both games this season and 12 of the last 13 overall.

Payne is one of the most active tackles in the South and he was never more bullish than last Saturday in Athens, GA, when the Bulldogs stopped California, 27-13. All Payne did was record three quarterback sacks, (the Georgia D had nine sacks altogether, so run Homer, run) block a punt and bat down a pass at the line of scrimmage. He will be especially motivated to beat the highly regarded Nanney, but an additional incentive will be his relationship with Homer Jordan. The two played high school football together in Athens at Cedar Shoals High. They are good friends off the field, but Jordan would bet that Payne would love to reminisce behind the Tigers' line of scrimmage.

The other highlighted trench warfare will match Clemson center Tony Berryhill

and Georgia middle guard Eddie Weaver. The former is one of the top centers in the South and should be a leader of the Tiger offensive line this season. Weaver, who resembles a mature William Perry at 6-0 and 270 pounds, had his best day of the 1980 season against Clemson last year when he made 14 tackles.

Although two sets of players will not face each other per se, they will have a constant eye on their counterpart on the other side of the field. Fans of today's game will be treated by the performances of two of the quickest and most acrobatic wide receivers in the country, Clemson's Perry Tuttle and Georgia's Lindsay Scott. All pro scouts feel both will be first-round choices next year in the NFL draft.

Tuttle and Scott were both ranked in the top five in career receptions among active players in the NCAA coming into this season. Tuttle has 106 catches heading into today's game and he needs only one grab to move into second place behind Jerry Butler on Clemson's all-time reception list. Scott is also on the brink of establishing a personal milestone, as he needs only four receptions against the Tigers to reach the 100-mark in his career. Like Tuttle, Scott is number-two on his school's career receiving list, and a solid favorite to become the all-time leader before the year is out.

The media will be very interested in the battle of the quarterbacks, Clemson's Homer Jordan and Georgia's Buck Belue. The signal callers do not have much in common except that they excel at their position. Jordan is a slippery QB who excels as a runner and is rapidly becoming an accomplished passer. Belue has a

better reputation as a passer and his 59 percent completion rate so far this season belies that fact. While Jordan is a finesse runner, Belue, also an outstanding baseball player for the Bulldogs, is more inclined to put his head down to muscle for extra yardage.

So, as you can see, there will be many little games taking place within the big game at Death Valley this afternoon. And the big game might be decided by the chess game between the two coaches, Vince Dooley and Danny Ford.

All coaches feel the intangibles can make a difference in college football so the matchup of strategies will also be important. You could also say this might be the battle of the britches if Clemson chooses to wear their Orange pants, as they did for the South Carolina game last season. Georgia will be dressed in their now famous silver britches, something Vince Dooley started last season to give his team a lift in the intangibles department.

No one knows what the Tigers will do as far as the dress code goes. Will Ford bring back the Orange britches, or will there be some other uniform change? There might not be a uniform change at all, but you can be certain the Tigers have something up their tails.

Items of Interest

Today's game will mark the fourth time in the last five years that the Tigers have met the defending national champion or the eventual national champion. Clemson met Pittsburgh in the 1977 Gator Bowl the year after the Panthers won the national title. In 1977 Clemson also played Notre Dame, the team that eventually took the national championship. And of course the Bulldogs defeated the Tigers 20-16 on the way to their national title last season.

* * * * *

Clemson and Georgia will both be undefeated when they clash in Death Valley Saturday. This will be the fourth time in the last six meetings that the Tigers and Bulldogs have gone against each other with unblemished records. Only 22 points have separated the two teams in the last four games, with each team winning twice.

* * * * *

This is the 50th meeting between Clemson and Georgia and the Dogs lead the series 33-13-3. Clemson won the last meeting in Death Valley, 12-7 in 1979, while Georgia won the last two meetings in Athens, 12-0 in 1978 and 20-16 last season.

* * * * *

Last week the Tigers defeated Tulane, 13-5, to gain their second straight win. It marked only the second time in the last

11 years that the Tigers had won the second game of the year. Today the Tigers will attempt to make it three in a row to open the season for the first time since 1960. Of course the record for the best start was set by the 1948 team because they never lost. Frank Howard's 1948 club went 11-0, the only undefeated untied team in the modern era at Clemson.

* * * * *

When Tim Childers, Hollis Hall, Anthony Rose and Terry Kinard all picked off passes last week it marked the first time in Clemson history that the starting defensive backfield had all intercepted a pass in the same game. Clemson has collected four interceptions in a game many times (last time vs. Duke 10-21-78), but never had the starting backfield all gotten one.

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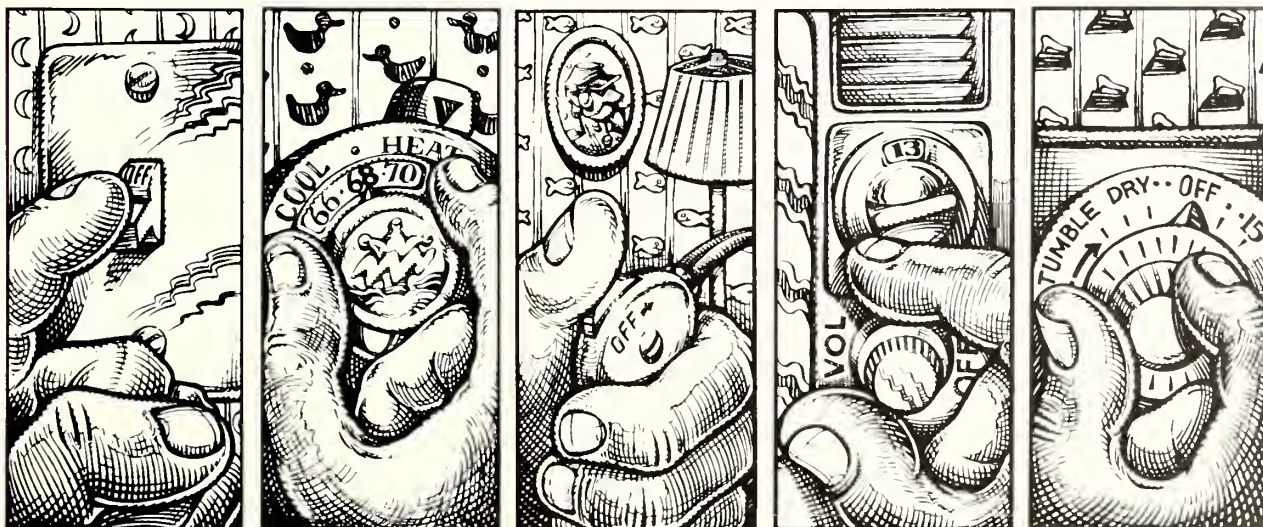
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J. D. — Clemson's Judge

J. D. is the abbreviation for Doctor of Law, or in other words, the formal title for a judge. J. D. is also the initials for a young man who has layed down the law for the Clemson defense, Jeff Davis. A 6-0 223-pound senior, Davis calls the signals on the D and for good reason.

"Jeff is an outstanding leader," said Curley Hallman, Davis' former coach of two seasons. "While he's not a big talker, his leadership ability comes from his actions. When Jeff Davis walks onto the field he creates an air that the other 10 guys pick up on and then things start to happen. He is as good a line-backer as I've ever been around," added Hallman.

Last season, despite injuries, Davis put in a superior performance as he paced the league in the tackling department with 160 stops. A **Street & Smith** preseason All-American as well as an All-ACC choice, Clemson's J.D. is one judge who when he makes a decision to hit you, it's gonna stick! And what's that they say about judges who rule their courtrooms with an iron fist? No question here, Jeff Davis rules his "territory", the Clemson D, with more than just an iron fist and in more than one way. Said Coach Danny Ford of the North Carolinian, "He's like E. F. Hutton, when he talks, the team listens!"

George Dostal, Clemson's strength training director and the man probably most familiar with the iron fist, offered the following observations: "Jeff is probably the most well-rounded and the strongest individual I've met in my 22-year career. Over the years I've worked with a lot of young men but somehow J. D. is different. I can honestly say that I feel so close to him that he almost seems like my son," Dostal said. "Not only is Jeff a pleasure to work with but he's also been a great deal of help to me. When it comes to overall communication with the other players, he's like my right arm. Jeff just seems to have a good rapport with everyone," concluded Dostal.

But Davis has done more than just build a rapport with Dostal down in the strength training room. This

past summer in fact, he broke all kinds of school strength records including the Leg Strength Test (735 lbs.) and the Team Actual Strength record (1,235 lbs.) He also moved into the number-three spot on the 500-lb. Flat-Back Bench-Press lineup behind fellow teammate Lee Nanney and Former Tiger Rich Tuten ('78). The 6-0 iron man even managed to turn a few heads at the Nautilus Company when he lifted 405 pounds on the Compound Leg Press—and they said it couldn't be done! Officials of the nationally-known firm want to come to Clemson to see him do it.

Yes, Davis is a determined and hard working guy and today he's got the opportunity to let people know where he stands as the much talked about matchup with Herschel Walker will finally take place. "I am anxious to go up against the top back in the nation. Last year Herschel was a freshman who played like a senior and I really admired him for it. But, things are going to be different when he comes to the Valley this year. He'll find he won't be able to do as well against this senior! You know," he added, "there's an awful lot of pride at stake in this Georgia contest, both personal and team pride. We had those national champs beat last year and then we let them slip by. That's not going to happen this year. We're hungry and we aim to get some recognition out of this game."

But "the Judge" is not all toughness and tackles, there's a very

human and compassionate side to him as well. For instance, Davis recently revealed that each time he takes to the field he dedicates his efforts to his heroes, his 81-year-old grandmother and his mother.

"They've been so supportive of me over the years that to play well and make them proud of me is one of my biggest goals," he said. In a continued, well thought out statement he added, "I view my ability to play football and my opportunity to earn a degree as gifts from God. If by chance I am able to make it in the pros I plan to spend my free time dealing with the concerns of my family as well as the youth of America. I know these deeds are small but they're my way of saying thanks," offered the industrial education major.

"I think kids growing up today have it pretty tough. It's important for them to have heroes or role models to advise and inspire them. Maybe by my talking to these kids and guiding them they'll be able to fare just a little bit better," said the 21-year-old in a tone which far surpassed his years.

For Clemson's J.D. then, this will be a year of decision-making actions but rest assured he's prepared to tackle almost any situation which arises. One thing is for sure though, whether Jeff Davis presides over some pro defensive unit in the future or not, he'll certainly be a "judge" that will make his presence known no matter what decisions he makes.

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Chuck Kriese

One word can be used to compare the courses of success of the New York Mets in the late sixties and the Clemson Tiger tennis team of the late seventies — miraculous. The 1965 New York Mets were buried in anonymity in last place in the National League, but four years later they were World Champions. Similarly, the Clemson tennis program was in dead last place in the ACC in 1975 with an 0-7 record, but just four years later, they were in the NCAA playoffs fighting for the national title.

And, just as one man, the late Gil Hodges, was the coach who guided the Mets to that miracle, one man at Clemson, Chuck Kriese, has been the driving force behind Clemson's own miracle. Although Kriese's netters have not captured the national title yet, he has certainly brought his team into the national championship picture with a top 10 finish the last two seasons and an 87-19 ledger over the last three years, including three ACC regular season titles and three NCAA appearances.

This past season he was named NCAA Coach-of-the-Year by the Intercollegiate Tennis Coaches Association, the first Clemson coach ever named National Coach-of-the-Year. Today Kriese will be honored at halftime for this outstanding accomplishment.

This honor is the culmination of countless hours of hard work, of course, but Kriese must have had a little something extra going for him to bring about this 180 degree turnaround. "Chuck Kriese is a hard worker, but many coaches put in the hours," said Pender Murphy, a two-time All-American under Kriese in 1980 and 1981, "but he has the ability to motivate his players like no other coach I have seen. He works with you as much as you want and gets you to reach goals you don't think you can establish. Coach always keeps things in perspective."

Keeping goals in mind for motivation was one of Kriese's secrets, but there are other reasons he has been able to move the Clemson tennis program to the higher echelon of the national college scene. "When I first came here I knew Clemson had many assets and I had to make the most of them," said Kriese, who is in his seventh season at Clemson. "First of all, Athletic Director Bill McLellan was behind me to bring the program

up to become a national contender. He wanted us to play a national schedule and that meant a lot of support on his part. Second, we had good facilities, as good as any in the country and Mr. McLellan was dedicated to keeping them that way. We are one of the few college teams that never has to share courts, we can get practice time whenever we need it. Third, we had George Dostal and his strength training program. That man can make a mediocre athlete into a great one. Finally, Clemson has a solid academic and athletic tradition, which makes recruiting easier."

With these assets, Kriese went out to find some players, athletes that were a certain breed. "In recruiting I looked for a good athlete, a person that has a good, unselfish attitude and a person who has a high expectation level. When I first came here I set a goal to win the National Championship, and I wanted players who believed that we could."

Although he did not land the highest ranked players in the country, Kriese did sign players who fit his above description. Mike Gandolfo came to Clemson ranked as the 22nd best player in Florida. When he left Clemson he was an All-American, ranked in the top 15 in the nation. He was named NCAA Senior Player-of-the-Year. Pender Murphy came to Clemson ranked 15th in the South and he concluded his career this past spring as a two-time All-American. He has since joined the pro tour and earned 35 ATP points this past summer, which ranks him among the top 200 in the world.

"We are developing a national reputation as a builder of pros," says Kriese with a glimmer in his eye. "That is important because we are getting the people who want to work hard."

"I wanted to come to Clemson because it has the reputation as the hardest working team in the country," said Richard Akel, a sophomore on this year's team. "Hard work at Clemson under Coach Kriese pays dividends and in general makes you a better person."

Kriese knows when his players are working hard, because he can see the fight in their eyes. "My players need to hate me four times a year, or I'm not doing my job," said the native of Indianapolis, IN. "The long hours can get to you sometimes, but the fighting back breeds unity, and



helps the team's development."

In the early years of the Kriese era at Clemson the victories came steadily as the Tigers played a national schedule. But triumphs over nationally-ranked teams were seldom realized. Then, in 1978, in the third year of the Kriese system, the Tigers registered a landmark triumph. Late in the season his young team traveled to Baton Rouge, LA and upset LSU, then the 12th-ranked team, in America, 5-4. Those Louisiana Tigers went on to a 26-2 record that year, while the Clemson Tigers finished strong to end up near the .500 mark. More importantly though, Clemson had earned national respect.

"The LSU win in 1978 is what turned it around for us because everyone in the nation heard about that win. It gave us so much confidence for the next season and that confidence has continued to grow. Since that win in Baton Rouge we have won 82 percent of our matches."

When you try to impress upon Kriese what he has done, he does not refer to the accomplishments as miraculous, because in his own mind he has not yet reached his goal. "We have the talent, the schedule and, most importantly, the players with outstanding attitudes to win the National Championship. That was my goal when I came here and it still is."

For New York Mets fans the miracle has come and gone, but for Tiger tennis followers the best is yet to come.

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Danny Ford

Danny Ford is the youngest third-year coach in Division I of the NCAA, but the 33-year-old Gadsden, Alabama native has been associated with more winning teams and programs than many coaches come in contact with in a lifetime. Including his years as a player at Alabama under Bear Bryant, Ford has been associated with college football for the last 14 years. Thirteen of those clubs have had winning records and 10 have gone to bowl games. Additionally, the 14 teams have had a record of 111-47-3, a .700 winning percentage.

Ford has brought this winning attitude to Clemson University. Now in his third full season as head coach, Ford has led the Tigers to a 15-9 record and a pair of bowl games since taking over on December 10, 1978. That was a fine day in Clemson athletics because the University announced Charley Pell had relinquished the head coaching duties of the 1978 Gator Bowl to Ford. Nearly 40 years after hiring 31-year-old Frank Howard, Clemson had hired another gifted 31-year-old to lead the Tiger forces on the gridiron.

Ford conquered all kinds of adversity in leading the Tigers to a nationally televised 17-15 triumph over the perennial power Ohio State in the Gator Bowl in his very first game as head coach. Few mentors in NCAA history have made such a celebrated and successful beginning.

But Ford did not rest on his laurels after that landmark win over the Buckeyes. In the last two years the Tigers have won 14 games, (including wins over nationally ranked teams from Georgia, Notre Dame and South Carolina) gone to a bowl game, nearly upset the National Champion and set countless Clemson records.

With this list of accomplishments it is little wonder that the Student Affairs Committee of the Clemson Board of Trustees only considered one name as Pell's successor. Danny Ford not only had the backing of Pell, but also from the members of the Clemson football team. He was then Assistant Head Coach and offensive line coach of the Tigers.

After two meetings between Ford and the committee on the morning of December 5, 1978, it was the unanimous opinion of the committee that Ford should be named Clemson's 21st head coach.

Ford began his association with college football in 1967 when he started for Bear Bryant at Alabama as Ken Stabler's sophomore tight end. He played three years for Bryant, (including three wins against the Tigers) and was an All-Southeastern Conference choice, All-SEC academic selection and team captain during his senior season.

After receiving his B.S. degree in industrial arts in 1970, Ford remained at Alabama as a graduate assistant for the 1970 and 1971 seasons. Upon earning a master's degree in special education in 1971, he was made a full-time assistant under Bryant for the 1972 and 1973

seasons. The Tide went to four more post-season games while Ford was on Bryant's staff.

Clemson's current head man then accepted a position as an assistant coach on Jimmy Sharpe's staff at Virginia Tech. He remained in Blacksburg for three seasons (1974 to 1976), before he was beckoned to Clemson by Charley Pell, who had just been named the Tiger's head coach. Pell and Ford had served together on the VPI staff for two seasons.

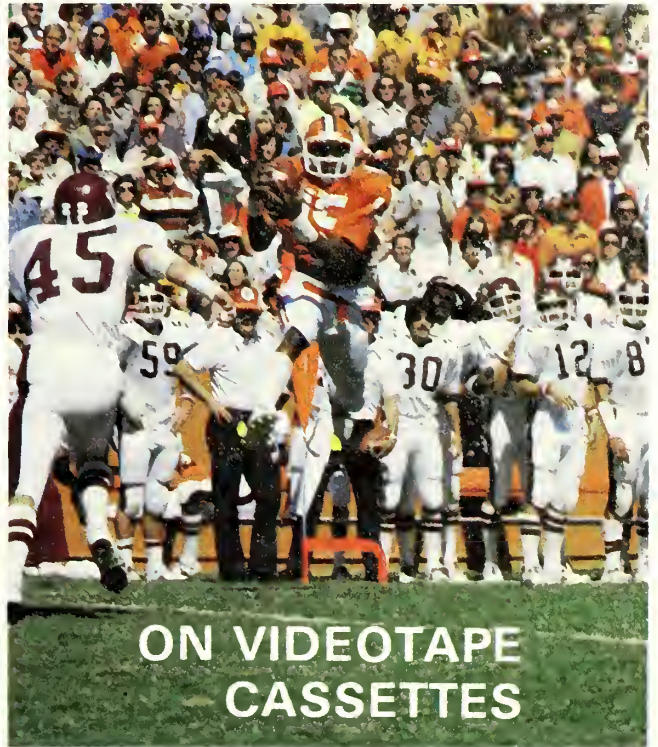
And only 23 games later, Ford became head coach of the Tigers at age 31, the youngest Division I head coach in the country. This season his Clemson team has 17 starters returning, including all 11 off an exciting offense. Based on his past track record, Clemson football should continue to reach previously unattainable heights.

The 1980-81 academic year marked the fifth consecutive season that Clemson's all-around sports program had been ranked in the top 25 in the nation. Twice during that half a decade Clemson's sports program has been rated in the top five in the country in the Knoxville Journal's All-Sports Poll. Without a doubt, the work of Athletic Director Bill McLellan and his dedicated corps of coaches and administrators is the major reason for this consistent appearance in the national limelight.

McLellan is the man most responsible. He has endured countless hours to improve every phase of the athletic program in Tigertown. Under his direction Clemson has built one of the finest all-around athletic facilities in the nation. During his tenure the Tigers have christened the Frank Johnstone Jervey Athletic Center, possibly the most modern and complete complex under one roof, increased the permanent seating capacity of Clemson Memorial Stadium

from 43,451 to 53,306, opened a beautiful swimming facility, which will be the site of the ACC meet this year, constructed a nine-lane all-weather track, and built a new soccer facility.

While he has erected an athletic powerhouse on the varsity level, McLellan has also developed a solid intramural program for the student body which attracts thousands of participants every year. That's why Bill McLellan is recognized as a total athletic director.

Only the third man to own the title in the last 50 years, McLellan assumed his present position February 4, 1971 and since that date has directed Clemson to its greatest decade of athletic prominence. In the last five years Clemson had more All-Americans than in any other five-year period in Clemson history.

An examination of McLellan's experience in athletics explains why Clemson has been so successful under his direction. A native of Hamer, SC, the 49-year-old McLellan was a two-time football

letterman for the Tigers and a member of Clemson's 1952 Gator Bowl team. He received his B.S. degree from Clemson in 1954 and his M.S. two years later.

After joining the athletic staff in 1958 he spent more than a decade with the Tigers as an Assistant Football Coach, Assistant Business Manager, Assistant Athletic Director, and Associate Athletic Director, before his appointment to his current position.

But McLellan will be the first man to say that many knowledgeable people are needed to run an efficient and successful athletic department. Assistant Athletic Director Bobby Robinson is the catalyst of McLellan's group of responsible aides.

Assistant to the Athletic Director Earle Ambrose; Joe Turner, Executive Director of Clemson's very successful IPTAY Club; and Sports Promotion Director Allison Dalton are major reasons Clemson's athletic administration is among the best in the country.

Clemson's IPTAY Club

Number One. There's magic in those two words. Every team battles for the privilege to be called number one, to be recognized as the best. The road to the top is long and rocky and of those teams that become number one, few remain so for very long.

But, one Clemson team is defying the odds as it celebrates its third consecutive year as number one in the nation. IPTAY, Clemson's athletic scholarship fund-raising organization, experienced in fiscal year 1981 the most successful year of any collegiate athletic scholarship fund-raising group in history.

IPTAY enjoyed its 17th consecutive record-setting year in 1981, with total money raised cresting the three million dollar mark. Twenty-thousand members strong, IPTAY is accustomed to success, having raised almost 18 million dollars for Clemson in the last forty-seven years. What's the key to IPTAY's phenomenal success?

"Without a doubt, Clemson people have made IPTAY the best," says Joseph J. Turner, Jr., IPTAY's Executive Secretary. "Our IPTAY representatives are people from across the state and the Southeast who love Clemson University and who want to help Clemson in any way. These folks spend a lot of their time arranging meetings and visiting other Clemson supporters. They're the ones who keep IPTAY head and shoulders above the rest."

IPTAY officers like President John Timmerman, Vice President Bill Reaves and Secretary-Treasurer Lawrence Starkey, Jr., provide sound leadership for the organization.

"IPTAY's officers and board of directors provide the guidance and judgment necessary to administer a successful program. When you take 20 successful businessmen and put them in your boardroom, chances are good ideas will develop," says Turner.

Good ideas were the basis for IPTAY's creation forty-seven years ago. Dr. Rupert Fike and eight other Clemson men met in Fike's Atlanta home in August, 1934 and founded

the I-Pay-Ten-A-Year Club. Originally, IPTAY was a secret society, complete with mystic words and ritualistic ceremonies. Membership was by invitation only.

All that's changed now, but one thing that hasn't changed is IPTAY's purpose: to provide athletic scholarships for Clemson's student-athletes. In the 1980-81 academic year, IPTAY provided more than one million dollars in scholarships for 405 athletes in 19 varsity sports.

IPTAY's tremendous success has made it possible for the organization to aid the athletic department and the university in many ways. In 1978, IPTAY provided funds for new uniforms for the Tiger Band. The band has received \$130,000 from IPTAY in the last two years to supplement its travel budget. This year, the Tiger Band will attend all of Clemson's football games, home and away.

IPTAY has assisted the athletic department in financing capital improvements also. More than \$150,000 has been allocated by IPTAY to construct permanent seats at the Tigers' tennis courts and

baseball field. IPTAY also donated \$22,000 to light the new soccer stadium on Riggs Field.

More than \$300,000 was provided by IPTAY for improvements to Memorial Stadium last year. New stadium graphics, a modern sound system and two new scoreboards help make Death Valley one of the finest stadiums in the Southeast.

The needs of students are also recognized by IPTAY. The organization makes academic tutoring available to all student-athletes at no charge. IPTAY also has contributed a \$125,000 seed grant to begin planning for a Fine Arts Center to be used by all members of the university community. Forty thousand dollars has been contributed by IPTAY for partial funding of a master transportation plan for the University.

"Our commitment is to Clemson and Clemson students," says Turner. "IPTAY is doing several things to make Clemson athletics stronger and to benefit the university as a whole."

With 20,000 Clemson people dedicated to these twin goals, IPTAY can't help but stay number one.

Fred Hoover

The Clemson Athletic Program as a whole has experienced tremendous growth over the years. In 1959 there were eight varsity sports that ran limited inseason training schedules. A small room in Fike Fieldhouse served as the training room for two full-time employees. Today the number of varsity programs has grown to 19 sports which run preseason, inseason and post-season schedules. And since 1973 a modern 4000-square-foot training facility has served as the home base for two fulltime assistant trainers, two grad-assistants and 14 student trainers.

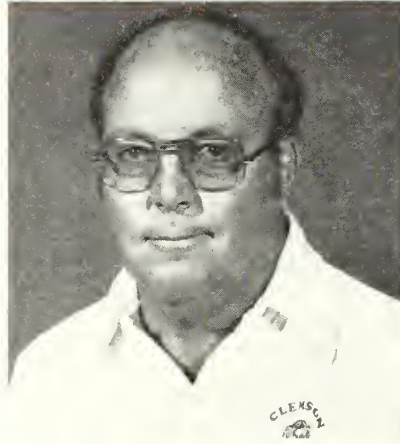
For nearly a quarter-of-a-century one man has quietly been tending to the needs of the injured Tiger athletes. From his behind-the-scenes post that man, Fred Hoover, Clemson's head trainer, has seen practically every athlete in virtually every sport. "You know, I've been down in the training room for so long that something interesting is beginning to happen to me," said the 51-year-old Hoover. "I am now treating the sons and daughters of athletes who passed through here some 20-odd years ago!"

Hoover, a native of Jacksonville, FL, began his career as a student trainer at his alma mater, Florida State. In 1959 he arrived in Tigertown and apparently the chemistry was just so perfect between the Floridian and the upstate institution that Hoover has never strayed from Clemson's Tiger Den. "I really enjoy my work," offered Hoover, "nothing is more rewarding than seeing an athlete who has been down, overcome adversity and return to the lineup full strength. And as far as my feelings for Clemson are concerned," he added, "there's just no place else like it."

"Supervising the medical needs of Clemson's athletic programs has always been a challenge for me," said Hoover. But, after years of dealing with the Tiger athletes, Hoover and his two superior assistants, Larry Sutton and Bert Henderson, have developed guidelines for coordinating a comprehensive training facility.

"First and foremost our job in the training room is to prevent and care for injuries to the athletes," said Hoover. "If an athlete is injured, we must see to it that he or she returns safely to play following the recuperation period. During an athlete's recuperation period we supervise an individualized rehabilitation program. Finally, we work in close cooperation with the team physicians so that we can provide our athletes with the finest medical attention possible," he concluded.

In addition to the above duties which the training staff performs for every Tiger sport, the ambitious Hoover also tackles



a few more responsibilities when it comes to football. As a business manager of sorts, Hoover has a voice in the selection and purchase of much of the grid equipment, and he also coordinates all of the team's travel plans. "I am involved in everything from determining the training table meals to establishing the travel itinerary. I even choose the Friday evening entertainment for the team," he added.

Yes, as head trainer, Hoover is required to be both versatile and energetic. "Meeting the demands of a 19-sport university athletic program is no small task," he explained. "During a typical workday in the fall the training room opens at six in the morning and closes somewhere about eight in the evening. The morning hours are spent supervising treatment sessions and meeting with the various coaches. If there's time

we also develop and make customized pads for the athletes," he added. "During the afternoon hours we again supervise treatments and then attend practice sessions. After practice we evaluate the injury situation with the team physicians. Finally, we prepare an injury report and then it's closing time," he said.

But even when he leaves the Clemson training room, Hoover's zeal for the profession continues. His wife and two children will readily attest to that! His enthusiasm for the occupation even took him out of the country on a few occasions. In 1963 he traveled to Sao Paulo, Brazil for the Pan Am Games. Sojourns to Mexico and Germany followed in 1968 and 1972 respectively, when Hoover served on the training staff of the United States Olympic Teams.

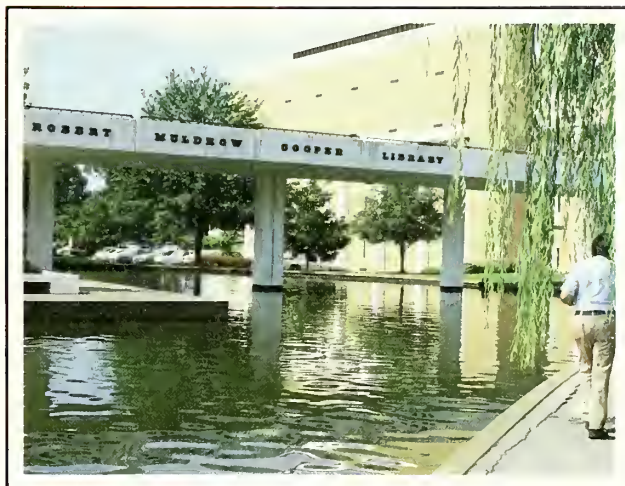
A past president and district director of the National Athletic Trainers Association, Hoover has held practically every post imaginable within the organization. So well-respected is Hoover by his colleagues that last summer he was inducted into the Helms Foundation's National Athletic Trainers Hall of Fame.

Yes, Hoover has traveled far and wide and he's well-known in many national trainer's circles but "Doc" Hoover (as he's affectionately called by some folks) seems to have found the real Rx for success right here in Clemson. And for all of you curious Tiger fans, "Doc's" prescription requires, "total cooperation and support between the coaches, the administration and the university medical staff. A lot of good ole southern graciousness also helps," he added.

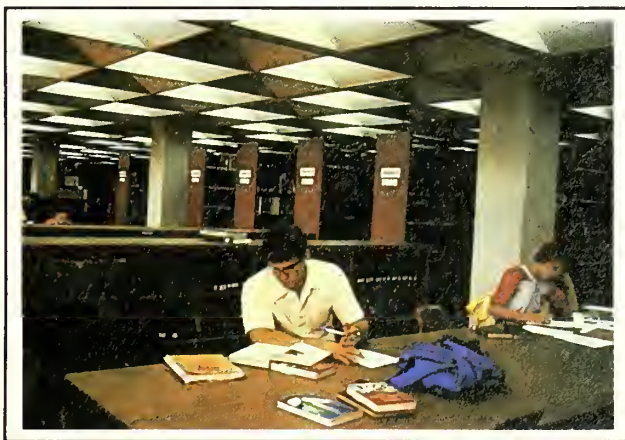

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THE GANT ATTITUDE

When ABC

Ever since ABC began televising college football, schools have bent over backwards to get on the air. Television—the ultimate in public relations and sports promotions—enhances a football program as well as a university. Through television, it is easier for All-America candidates to get recognition or for Heisman Trophy candidates to get the necessary exposure to capture the prestigious award or for a team's ranking to rise.

A classic example is the Georgia-South Carolina game which was telecast on national television last season. The impact of that game helped George Rogers capture the Heisman Trophy and gave Hershel Walker a head start on the 1981 award. Most everyone had heard of Walker but not many had seen him play.

National and even regional exposure received by Notre Dame, Alabama, and Southern Cal and others contribute to their high national rankings and give them a head start on recruiting "blue-chip" athletes.

Therefore, when it became evident that Clemson would have a good chance of being on regional television against North Carolina, last year we realized that it would mean a tremendous amount of extra work in the space of five days, but the benefits would be well worth the trouble. A television date for the Tigers meant that Clemson's football team would be on display for a vast segment of the public throughout the Southeast.

Monday morning, November 3, the phone rang in the sports information office. The caller was Donn Bernstein, the NCAA media director for ABC sports in New York. Bernstein, who is an honorary member of the Sigma Alpha Epsilon fraternity at Clemson and visited the campus in 1978, told Bob Bradley, Clemson's sports information director, that the Tigers would indeed be on television against the Tar Heels that Saturday.

That call set off five days of non-stop activity in the office and lengthened the working day past the already normally late hours during football season. During the whole week, we were virtually always in contact with ABC in New York working out details for the telecast and their arrival Thursday.

The first thing ABC wanted was the entire 10-page football press release for the week of the game. A student assistant in the sports information office telecopied the release at six minutes per page which made for quite a phone bill. The press release is put together Sunday afternoon as the entire staff has to prepare notes on the upcoming game, contact the opponent's Sports Information

Director for the team's statistics, and prepare player updates for the media to use.

Greg Cooke, the ABC unit manager for the telecast, was constantly calling from New York working out details on the construction of the ABC telecast booth in the press box, going over the hook-ups with the phone company, and the almost endless details of organizing the many facets of an NCAA football telecast.

Wednesday night, ABC flew a bonded courier down from New York to pick up Clemson highlights, the university videotape produced by the Communications Center which feature action sequences from past Tiger games that ABC would edit into a one-minute segment for the pregame show. Also, he received a feature on the university itself that ABC used at halftime. The courier flew into Greenville, drove over to Clemson, picked up the film and several press guides, and headed back to New York. He was in our office less than a minute before he left to return to New York.

That night Bob Bradley told me I was going to be working with Greg Cooke when he arrived Thursday until he left after the game Saturday. Greg, who had worked for CBS before signing with ABC, turned out to be one of the best people I've ever worked with. He was easy-going and fun to work for like the rest of the ABC crew that arrived that night.

Steve Zabriskie was the play-by-play announcer who, despite being very business-like and professional, was very friendly and cooperative. The Hilton Head, SC, resident arrived Thursday night along with the producer, Mike Pearlman, the director, John Dabisi, and the production assistant, Marianne Grabavoy. They all spent most of the evening working out the logistics of the telecast with Bob Bradley, Tim Bourret, the Associate SID at Clemson, and Rick

Brewer, the SID at North Carolina. The group discussed taping the head shots of the players Friday afternoon, the pregame, and halftime show. They also worked out the arrangements for showing Obed Ariri receiving the ball if he were to break the NCAA career field goal record during the game.

The mobile unit which carries all the camera equipment, on-sight taping facilities, sound equipment, and cables arrived late Thursday night from New Jersey. The crew, which had been coming into Clemson since Wednesday, began setting up at 8:00 a.m. Friday morning. Bob Bradley had designed the new Clemson press box to accommodate every aspect of the ABC telecast. The organization made setting up much easier for the technicians. Almost all of them commented that Clemson was one of the easiest places in the country to set up.

Even though the ABC technicians and cameramen were an easy-going bunch, they were not lazy and worked at a high rate of speed. But, we did find a little time to talk and swap stories which was one of the most pleasant aspects of working with them. The most interesting story I heard came from a cameraman named Bob, a bearded and cowboy-hatted man who had worked the 1978 Gator Bowl in Jacksonville, Florida.

"I was positioned in the end zone when Charlie Bauman intercepted the infamous pass. I had a perfect shot of Woody Hayes punching Bauman but the director wasn't using my shot at the time. Furthermore, the director was not taping any of the shots that showed Hayes attacking Bauman. The only reason ABC was able to show a replay was because someone in New York happened to be taping one of the other shots that showed the punches. The New York studio fed the tape to the command trunk in Jacksonville which relayed the replay to the viewing audience many minutes later. Almost instantly, Boone Arledge (executive producer of ABC Sports) called the trunk and nearly fired the director on the spot for missing the shot."

Members of the ABC crew told me that they have frequent opportunities to travel. One had been in Scotland through that Monday, flown to New York on Tuesday, headed to Clemson Thursday and was going to Hawaii as soon as the game was over.

Jack Kelly, the audio director for the show, lives in New York but is married to a girl from Anderson, SC and was very familiar with the Clemson area. He had been coming to this part of the state for a long time. After the game, he didn't fly back to New York with the rest of the crew, instead he took the opportunity to

visit some of his relatives here. Kelly and his wife are planning to retire in the Clemson area.

Sean McIver, another Clemson student, was hired by Greg Cooke for Friday and Saturday to help with various duties. For the majority of the day we performed many tasks at the stadium and ran down equipment that ABC needed for the telecast. One of my jobs involved driving to Seneca to a hardware store to purchase poles for the field microphones. Sean headed to Anderson to pick up some audio equipment. The rest of the day involved helping get the players on the field to have them filmed for head shots, finding out the band schedule for the game, and helping the crew with anything they needed. We finally quit about 9:00 p.m. Friday night.

Saturday morning things began to change fast. The atmosphere suddenly grew hectic and it seemed as though there were a lot more people trying to get in and out of the ABC truck, even at 8:00 a.m.

There was one important detail that had to be taken care of. Before we even started worrying about the broadcast, every crew member wanted a Clemson jacket. Since most of our students working for ABC wanted ABC jackets, the wheeling and dealing commenced until everybody got what he or she wanted. The ABC jackets ranged from the regular blue windbreaker with the ABC seal to the ABC Monday Night Football version to Wide World of Sports jackets. All transactions took place between 8:00 a.m. and 9:30 a.m. which meant several trips to the Bookstore for Brad Hoover, Sean, and myself. This had to be done by 9:30 because all cameramen must be in position three hours and 20 minutes prior to kickoff. Furthermore, they can't budge from their positions until after the game.

The ABC people now began checking

their equipment, a process that goes on constantly until the game starts. About the same time, people started putting up the ABC banners; four of them were installed in the stadium. The most difficult one to put up was the one at the top of the scoreboard, a position that gets the most exposure to the crowd and on the tube. So, Chip, an ABC technician, and I climbed up to the top of the scoreboard to look for a suitable place to put it. When we found the spot right below the speakers, I held on for dear life while Chip crawled out in front of the scoreboard to tape the banner up. When he finally felt the banner was secure, we headed down the ladder for safer footing.

When we got to the bottom, I told the policeman standing there not to let anyone up there, the reason being that I wanted to get the banner for myself after the game. But of course, I didn't tell him that. Anyway, by the time the third quarter was over, all four banners were gone, and, needless to say, I didn't get one.

During the game itself, I was working for the production people in the ABC truck. My job wasn't particularly exciting. I spent the whole game talking by phone to the New York studio, keeping them informed of the game. I also had to tell the director what down it was and how far there was to go on every play to help him decide what shot to use and who to isolate on for the instant replays. I was watching the game on a monitor, so I might as well have sat in my living room, but it was exciting to see the behind-the-scenes activity in the mobile unit.

As the game got exciting toward the end with the momentum swinging to the Tigers, I had a very difficult time remaining calm in a very small area allowed for me in the truck. Occasionally, I even forgot to remind them what down it was. Anyway, when the Tigers scored two fourth-quarter touchdowns and drove to

the one-foot line with time running out, the ABC people called it the best finish of any game they had covered in 1980. Clemson didn't pull it out, but you had to admit it was a thrilling game. Hopefully, it will mean more television exposure for the Tigers.

After the game, we worked with the technicians until about 8:00 p.m. taking down the equipment and getting the truck ready to make the trip back to New Jersey.

Putting on the ABC telecast was a lot of work for the Sports Information Office and me personally, and the rest of the Athletic Department. But, despite all the work, it turned out to be an exciting experience. And best of all, I got an ABC jacket out of it.

Russ Cohen

On a Saturday afternoon 30 years ago, I was taking a shower with the rest of the football squad after a victory over Boston College.

An old man—so I thought—stuck his head in and said, “Boys, I took my showers right here 30 years ago when I played for Clemson.”

We smiled and said hello, and I remember thinking, “Who cares old man?” A brave thought like that can be expected, perhaps, from a 20-year-old, but at least the thought went unsaid. I smile when I think of that day because now I am that old man, and I found out who cares: I care.

This past April, all of us who care were saddened to learn of the passing of a great and dignified old man—Russ Cohen, defensive back-field coach for Clemson from 1947 to 1954. And I think it fitting that all of us who came here today to see a great Georgia team tangle with our Tigers, pause for a minute to think of a great Georgia native who touched our lives here at Clemson, and who had significant influence on Southern football.

Most of us didn't know that Russ Cohen was captain of Vanderbilt's famous “point-a-minute” Commodores of 1915. Most of us didn't know that he was head coach of LSU. Most of us didn't know that he was head coach at Cincinnati University, that he was Wallace Wade's top assistant at Alabama, and that he recruited Frank Howard for Alabama despite everyone's opinion that Frank was too small and too slow.

We did know that he was assistant to the great Pooley Hubert at VMI for 10 years before coming to Clemson,

because Coach Cohen used to tell us how tough Joe Muha was for VMI. And, one day when Mr. Hubert came to Clemson to see Coach Howard, Coach Cohen and his son, Pooley, Jr. (who played for Clemson then), I overheard him say, “Cohen is the best football scout in college football.”

Of course, we knew he was good because he helped us beat about everybody back then. Clemson had three bowl trips during my four years there.

When I think back to those days and Coach Cohen, I think of a tough, old, respectable gentleman who used the tactic of encouragement rather than criticism.

Coach Howard called him “Pop” and “Old Man” in a reverent tone. We all called him “The Silver-Haired Daddy.”

He could utter profanity at times, but it never sounded profane because his profane words, like damn, came out to be two-syllable words, like “dah-yem,” and they almost sounded musical.

In 1950, when Ray Matthews got hurt against Wake Forest, Jackie Calvert was switched to wingback and Billy Hair played tailback. I knew that the coaches didn't want to play Calvert at safety, too, so I went to Coach Cohen and told him I was ready to play safety. Coach Cohen got together with Coach Howard, and they let me start against Duquesne, and from then on.

The last game that year was against Auburn, and we were undefeated. We traveled to Alabama and stayed in an old hotel in Opelika that Friday night. It was cold and windy, and the wind seemed to come right through the walls of that old hotel. After our Saturday breakfast of

poached eggs and steak, we were issued long underwear to play in because of the extreme cold. I was putting on my long underwear in my room when Coach Cohen walked in.

“Pete” (Peyat), he said, “All the sports writers have been asking me if Cook can play ball in the big leagues, and I've been answering ‘You're damned right!’ (You're dah-yemmed riot)” “Now, we're going to the Orange Bowl if we look good today, and I don't want that dah-yemmed Auburn quarterback throwing any dah-yemmed touchdowns today and making me and you look bad. So you get out there and hustle and stay awake, and we will get some of that dah-yemmed Florida sunshine this January!”

We got the Florida sunshine!

Shortly after Coach Cohen's death, I visited the Cohen ranch in Waynesboro, GA. It's 1,300 acres of peach trees, cotton fields, pecan trees, cattle and tranquility. I visited with Porter Cohen, whose red hair has turned to silver too, and with Porter's wife, Mimi, who has kept many momentos of Papa's, and who cooked the best ham luncheon I've ever eaten.

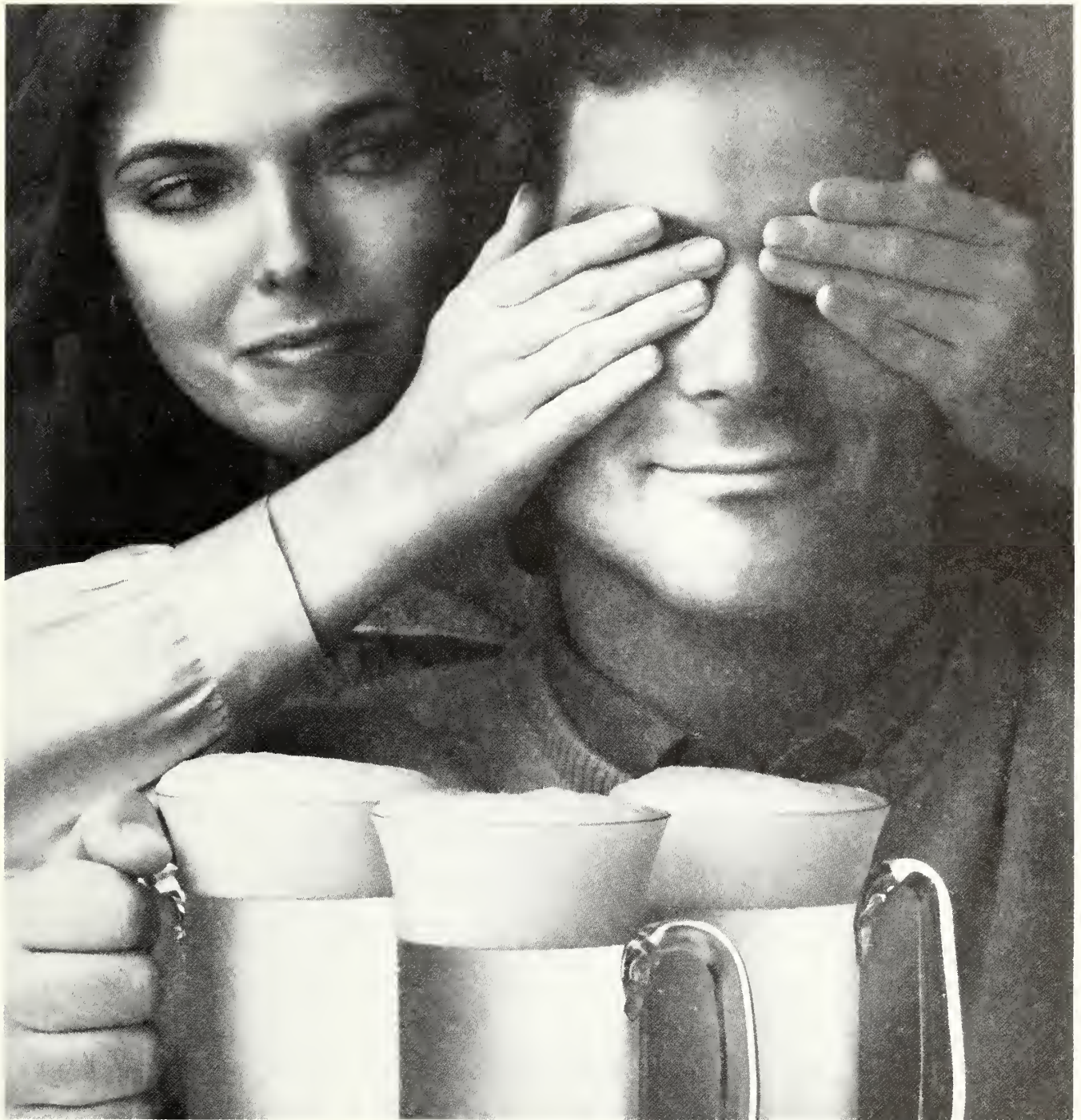
I laughed with Coach Cohen's grandchildren, who told me that Papa could be stern at times, but always encouraging. And, I met Mimi Coleman, age two, who is Coach Cohen's great-granddaughter. She has reddish hair, pale blue eyes, and a round face with a twinkle in her eye, just like Papa.

Dah-yem, it was nice to be there!

AFROTC Celebrates 35th Anniversary

As cadets today celebrate the 35th anniversary of Clemson's Air Force ROTC program, Clemson officials are proudly announcing that the campus Air Force program has achieved "wing status" for the first time since 1972.

That honor comes to Clemson because the Air Force ROTC enrollment now tops 250, more than doubling the enrollment of four years ago and making it the largest Air Force cadet corps at a non-military school in South Carolina.

Today's celebration — complete with souvenir Air Force footballs and flashcards, and a "fly-by" of A-7 fighter planes from the 169th Tactical Fighter group of the S.C. Air National Guard at McEntire ANG Base in Richland County — marks but one of the milestones for the Air Force ROTC program at Clemson.

Established in 1946 under the auspices of the Army Air Corps, the Air Force ROTC program separated from its Army counterpart in 1947. Eight years later, when Clemson College made the transition from a military to civilian school, the standard gray uniforms of all Clemson cadets were traded in for the "Air Force

blues" which remain today.

In 1957 the program took a significant step toward establishing a comprehensive ROTC curriculum when it added its first flight instruction program. Today the flight training offers ground school plus up to 25 hours of in-flight instruction to students selected to be Air Force pilots.

Although women were first admitted to Clemson in 1955, the first woman cadet was commissioned nearly 20 years later, in 1974. Last year the cadet corps had its first female group commander who, incidentally, was also the first woman from Clem-

son to be selected as an Air Force pilot.

The Clemson detachment experienced a particularly noteworthy year in 1979, when University President Robert C. Edwards was nominated by the ROTC program and received the Tasker H. Bliss Medal. The honor is given by the Society of American Military Engineers in recognition of outstanding support of ROTC.

As Air Force cadets celebrate the 35th anniversary of their program today, it will not go unnoticed that Clemson's total ROTC program has reached another milestone. In 1916, 65 years ago this year, Clemson became an ROTC college under the National Defense Act which established ROTC programs in land-grant colleges throughout the nation.

In recognition of the university's support of the Air Force ROTC program, professor of aerospace studies, Col. Lewis E. Jordan, will present a commendation plaque to President Atchley on behalf of the ROTC staff and cadets during the pre-game activities today.

"We don't give a damn about the whole state of Georgia, 'cause we're from Clemson U," yelled a mud-and-rain-soaked Archie Reese as he led a group of cheering Tiger fans outside the jubilant Clemson locker room. The date was September 17, 1977, and the occasion was Clemson's return to prominence in football. Just moments earlier, Reese and the rest of the Tigers had upset the 17th-ranked Georgia Bulldogs 'between the hedges,' 7-6. The last time Clemson beat Georgia in Athens, Woodrow Wilson was the President of the United States.

The 1977 Clemson-Georgia game was more than a win for the Tigers, it was a holy crusade. "It was a weird time, because we were coming off of a bad year and there was a question of whether we could win at all," said former linebacker Randy Scott. "We had a lot of potential, but we had to win one big game." After suffering through three straight losing seasons and changing head coaches, Clemson was hungry for a winner.

Charley Pell's debut as the Tigers' mentor the week before had not been a successful one, as Maryland had scored two touchdowns in the late stages of the game to nip the Tigers 21-14 in The Valley. "The players did not know how to win," Pell said later, "They had worked hard and not gotten any results."

"We had some hellacious practices all that week," said Reese, who now plays in the Sunday league for San Francisco. "We were real fired up about the game. We always had trouble beating them, especially at Georgia, and they had beaten us 41-0 the year before, so we were ready to play them."

It was a cloudy day as Cary Long's kickoff was taken by Clemson's Lester Brown in the endzone. Warren Ratchford moved the Tigers to the Clemson 43-yard line with his 26-yard scamper midway through the drive, but the surge stalled and David Sims punted away. The Bulldogs could do no better, as Reese tackled Georgia quarterback Jeff Pyburn for a loss to end the drive at the Georgia 32. Rain began coming down in the second period and defenses dominated the first half. The contest was scoreless at the half.

Georgia took the second-half kickoff and moved to their own 43 before returning to the punting battle. Clemson could only move three yards and David Sims was called in to punt as Billy Woods waited for the kick. The Tigers got a big break as Woods fumbled the wet ball and Rick Basich recovered at the Georgia 49-yard line.

Tracy Perry moved the Tigers to the 38 on two carries and then Fuller hit Jerry

Butler for a 15-yard pass to move to the ball to the Bulldog 23. Two plays later, on a third-and-10 situation, Fuller hit flanker Dwight Clark for a 17-yard pass to keep the drive alive. Lester Brown scored the touchdown two plays later on one of his patented dives. Jimmy Russell's extra point gave the Tigers a 7-0 lead with a little over a quarter to play.

Georgia took the kickoff and marched to the Clemson 12 before running out of downs. The Tigers fumbled three plays later on the 19 and Georgia returned the favor two plays into the fourth quarter. Three punts later, Georgia got its first break as an interference call on the kick moved the ball to the Clemson 27.

Pyburn slipped and slid his way to the Clemson seven on two carries, but he lost five yards on the next play trying to pass and freshman Rex Robinson was called in to try a field goal from 30 yards out. The kick was wide and Clemson took over at their 20.

Ratchford and Lester Brown moved the ball to the Georgia 40 and with less than 40 seconds left in the game, the win looked safe, but the excitement was not over yet. "We were ahead 7-0 and had a fourth-and-one. We had to make a decision as to whether to punt or go for it," Pell said later. "We decided not to risk a bad snap or a blocked kick, so we called a quarterback sneak. As it turned out, Steve fumbled and they recovered. Georgia's ensuing series seemed like it took eight days to get over with."

Georgia had 58 yards and 29 seconds

to score, and the Dogs pulled out all of the stops. On the first play, Pyburn threw to right end Ulysses Norris, who then lateraled to flanker Jesse Murray. Fifty-six yards later, Pyburn & Company found themselves on the Clemson eight. Pyburn passed to Norris for the touchdown with six seconds left. Georgia line up for the two-point play that would decide the outcome, but was called for delay of game. On the second try, Pyburn rolled right and overthrew Norris and the Tigers and their fans broke into pandemonium.

"They had a tendency to come right back with a play that worked for them, so we looked for them to repeat the same pass play that they used to score the touchdown," said Scott, who was voted Atlantic Coast Conference Player-of-the-Week for his 11-tackle, one interception performance that day. "And they were decent enough to run the play again."

As the perfect end to the perfect day for the Tigers, the sun came out from behind the clouds as the victors walked off the field. It was fitting that the sun was shining because the victory is considered the beginning of an era of success in Tiger football. Clemson went on to the Gator Bowl at the end of that 1977 campaign, went to bowls in '78 and '79 and racked up another winning season in '80.

That aborted two-point effort by the Bulldogs might be the most important play in the contemporary times of Tiger football.
