Today's Game

Tigers 3-0, Winners of Eight Straight

Clemson is 3-0 for just the third time since 1960, and all three 3-0 starts in this time frame have taken place under Danny Ford in this decade. Clemson had a perfect 12-0 season in 1981 and obviously won its first three games on the way to the National Championship. The 1987 club won its first six games before being upset by N.C. State 30-28 in Death Valley.

This is the 18th time in 94 years of Clemson football that the Tigers have been 3-0. Clemson had a 6-0 season in 1900, and also had 3-0 starts in 1902 and 1903. Josh Cody got off to 6-0 starts in 1928, 1929 and 1930. There have been only 10 teams that have gotten off to a 4-0 start, the last being the 1987 team. Other 4-0 starts were turned in by 1981, 1958, 1948, 1941, 1940, 1930, 1929, 1928 and 1900.

Clemson has won eight in a row dating back to a 10-3 loss at N.C. State last year. This is the ninth winning streak of at least eight games in Clemson history, Danny Ford's fourth as head coach of the Tigers. The Clemson record for longest winning streak is 15, set between 1947 and 1949. That streak started with a 35-7 win over Furman on November 8, 1947 and ended with a 33-7 loss at Rice on September 24, 1949.

Danny Ford has had a 13-gamer and two 10-gamers in addition to the eight-game streak that is in progress. The 13-game streak started with the last game of the 1980 season, continued through the National Championship campaign and ended with a 13-7 loss at Georgia in 1982 on Labor Day Night.

Tigers Must Stop O'Donnell

Clemson will face a number of outstanding quarterbacks over the course of this season, but none will be any better than Maryland signal caller Neil O'Donnell. The graduate student from Madison, NJ (both starting QBs in this game already have their undergraduate degrees) is ranked number-one in ACC history in completion percentage (based on a minimum of 300 career attempts). So far this year he has had at least 200 yards passing every game and has completed 66 percent of his passes.

His past performance against Clemson is one reason for his gaudy statistics. In 1987, he hit 12-17 passes for 145 yards and a TD, while last year he connected on 15-23 for 175 yards and a touchdown. He follows in a long line of outstanding Terp quarterbacks (ever here of Boomer Esiason?) and is ranked in the top five in Terp history in completion percentage, completions and passing yardage.

Joining O'Donnell as offensive stars for the Terps are Ricky Johnson and Bren Lowery. The running back duo has combined for 556 yards of all-purpose running this year. Lowery has 92 rushing, 64 receiving, 109 in punt returns and 28 in kickoff returns, while Johnson has accumulated 148 yards as the Terp's top rusher, 65 more as a receiver and 50 yards in kickoff returns.

Defensively, Maryland lost linebacker captain Scott Whittier due to a herniated disk even before the season started, but Glenn Page has taken up the slack and leads the team in tackles with 26. The red-shirt junior from Pittsburgh had just 31 tackles all of last season.

Scott Saylor and Larry Webster are two more outstanding athletes on a Maryland defense that has yielded just 24 points in three games, including just 14 to West Virginia and Major Harris. Webster is a fine all-around athlete who gained over 2,000 yards as a high school fullback. Now he is the top defensive lineman for the Terps. He had seven tackles against Clemson last season. Saylor was the team's top tackler last year with 119, including a 22-tackle effort against N.C. State. He is currently second on this year's team in tackles with 21.

Linebackers Scoring TDs

Over the last two games a Clemson outside linebacker has returned an interception for a

touchdown. It has been almost 35 years since a Clemson outside linebacker or defensive end had returned an interception for a TD prior to this back-to-back accomplishment.

In 1955 against Georgia, Walt Laraway ran an interception back eight yards for a touchdown. Players went both ways in those days and the 6-0 senior also had three receptions for 50 yards in a game, a 26-7 Clemson win. That was Sports Information Director Bob Bradley's first official game as SID.

It was not until the Florida State game of September 9, 1989 that another defensive end/outside linebacker ran another interception in for a touchdown. Wayne Simmons went 73 yards with a Peter Tom Willis pass for a key score in Clemson's win in Tallahassee. Then, last week in Blacksburg, VA, Levon Kirkland advanced 47 yards with a Will Furer pass for a score. Thus, Clemson went 34 years without an outside linebacker returning an interception for a touchdown, then did it in back-to-back games.

Clemson actually has had three interception returns for touchdowns by linebackers over the last 12 games. Doug Brewster did it in Atlanta against Georgia Tech last season (ironically all three have been on the road). Jeff Davis and Johnny Rembert are the only other two Tiger linebackers under Danny Ford to return interceptions for touchdowns. Thus, Danny Ford had a linebacker return an interception for touchdown just twice in his first 108 games as head coach of the Tigers, then had three in a 12-game period.

Two Top Defenses

The Clemson-Maryland game could shape up to be a defensive battle as both teams are currently ranked in the top 15 in the nation in scoring defense. The Tigers have given up just 31 points in their first three games and that 10.3 figure is good enough for 15th in the nation. The Terps have yielded just 24 points in three contests and rank 12th in the nation in scoring defense.

Clemson has forced 11 turnovers defensively, while the offense has committed just two. This +9 turnover margin over three games is good enough for a tie for sixth best in the country. Clemson was second in that category last season. The Tigers are also 12th in the country in total defense and 15th in rushing defense. Maryland is 31st in total defense.

Terry Allen Countdown

Clemson junior tailback Terry Allen needs 546 yards to become Clemson's career rushing leader. The Georgia native has 2369 yards heading into the Maryland game and ranks fourth in Clemson history. Allen needs just 71 yards to go ahead of Ray Yaeger for third place. He is the only runner among the top 10 to average over five yards a carry. Kenny Flowers is the career leader with 2914 yards, a figure he achieved between 1983 and 1986.

Clemson's starting tailback has never been held under 50 yards rushing in a game in 25 games and has a touchdown streak of seven consecutive contests. The last team to keep Allen out of the endzone was N.C. State, who did it on October 22, 1988.

Allen showed his all-around talents at VPI when he threw a 66-yard TD pass to Gary Cooper. It was his first completion at Clemson, but he had many in high school.

Gardocki Establishes New Record

Clemson sophomore Chris Gardocki established a new Tiger record for consecutive multiple field goal games when he booted a pair at Virginia Tech last Saturday. The native of Georgia now has kicked at least two field goals in seven straight games, breaking the record of six held by David Treadwell. The current Denver Bronco had multiple field goals in his last two games of 1986 and then the first four of 1987. Gardocki had at least two field goals in the last four games of 1988 and then the first three this season.

Gardocki has been a model of consistency and success over the last five games. Over this time he is 12-14 on field goals and has a 44-yard average on 27 punts.

Gardocki has now made 13 of his last 15 field goal attempts with the only blemish this year a missed 40-yarder against Furman. He has made five in a row since. He converted on six of his last seven in 1988.

Gardocki might be the best all-around kicker in the nation as he also handles the punting for the Tigers, assignments he also handled last year. You have to go back to Charlie Bussey (1956) to find the last Tiger to handle both the punting and placekicking. Heading into the Maryland game Gardocki ranks in the top 25 in the nation in three statistical categories. He is sixth in field goals with seven in three games,

20th in punting with a 42.8 figure, and he is 25th in scoring with 10.3 points per game.

Clemson Opens ACC Play

Clemson and Maryland usually meet in November and determine the champion of the Atlantic Coast Conference. But, for the first time since 1979, the two teams will meet in September. In the decade of the eighties, Clemson or Maryland have won eight of the previous nine ACC titles. Both had streaks of three in a row, Clemson's is still current and the Tigers could become the first ACC school in history to win four consecutive ACC titles.

Clemson and Maryland actually have the same number of ACC wins over the years, 133. Clemson has the best winning percentage in ACC history with a .671 percentage off a 133-64-5 record. Maryland is second at .640, a 133-74-4 mark. Clemson has more overall wins than any ACC school during the era of the conference (1953-89) with 227. Maryland has 209 wins to rank second and North Carolina is third with 202.

As far as Danny Ford is concerned, he has led Clemson to a 51-13-1 record in ACC games, a .792 winning percentage. This is the best record in history for an ACC coach, based on winning percentage and a minimum of five years as head coach. In overall games Ford has the best winning percentage in ACC history with a record of 89-27-4, a .758 mark. He is also fourth among winningest active coaches in Division I on a percentage basis. Only Tom Osborne of Nebraska, Joe Paterno of Penn State and Bo Schembechler of Michigan have higher winning percentages than Ford.

Ford and the Tigers have been especially successful versus the league of late as Clemson has a 17-3-1 ACC record over the last three seasons. The Tigers have won the ACC title each year and Clemson now has 11 outright titles and one co-championship. Ford has five outright championships to tie Frank Howard for first place on that all-time list. Clemson has won or tied for 12 ACC football championships, more than any other school.

Frank Howard

The Bashful Baron of Barlow Bend — Frank Howard — finally made it!!

Made what??

The only football hall of fame that he qualified for and wasn't in.

At the last nominating and election committee meeting, Howard was voted into the National Football Hall of Fame. We're talking BIG TIME. Waldorf-Astoria. Times Square. Black Tie, Stag. \$300 a plate.

We only remember one other time seeing Howard in black tie and tails and that's when his son Jimmy got married. It was also the only time we ever remember the audience break into laughter when the groom and his best man walked into the sanctuary.

But Howard has been waiting 15 years for the honor he is to receive in New York this coming December 5th. He retired from coaching in 1969, but wasn't eligible to be elected until five years had passed. But he watched 14 elections come and go before his name was added to that illustrious list.

He once told me: "Bradley, if I'm not elected to that hall of fame in **New York** before I die, tell 'em when they do get around to doing it that I don't care about

being in their exclusive club."

But come the first week of December, the Baron is going to pack his bag, possibly with some peanut butter and crackers, and head out for the Big Apple. We hope to tag along just to see what's going to happen. As long as he had to wait for the honor, it's quite possible that his acceptance speech will be written on asbestos.

Actually, this is the ninth hall of fame where Howard can claim membership. He is a charter member in both the Clemson and South Carolina halls. Both the State of Alabama and the University of Alabama have him in, as do the athletic directors and the National Athletic Trainers Association. Howard is also a member of the Helms Athletic Foundation Hall of Fame based in California and of the Orange Bowl Hall of Honor.

Since retiring fully in 1974, Howard continues to maintain an office in the Jervey Athletic Center, still comes in seven days a week and chances are that he'll be at his desk before 95 per cent of the regulars get in at work. And possibly has already sold several hundred dollars worth of **Kickoffs**.

But one trip Howard usually takes time out for during the morning is to go to the 'Holiday Inn Coffee Club', which has a

various and sundry membership. It isn't exactly a melting pot, but it's a pretty good 'Duke's Mixture.'

Actually, it shouldn't be called the coffee club. A more proper name would be 'The First Liar Doesn't Have A Chance Club.'

Because Howard likes to rib people, members of the club poke at him quite often. One particular morning Howard was getting some flack about how few of his players ever made it to the pros. But Howard retorted that he had engineers, wealthy farmers, presidents of banks and corporations and so on. "In fact," Howard said proudly, "I've had several players to become preachers."

Howard had hardly gotten that statement out of his mouth when the Rev. Joe Bowen walked into the Holiday Inn dining room.

"Come over here, Rev. Bowen," Howard boomed.

Anxious to prove a point, the retired Tiger coach asked Bowen: "Rev. Bowen, did you ever play football for me?"

To the surprise of everybody, Bowen answered: "Hell, yes." And followed that with: "I heard the Lord's name used more on the practice field than I ever did in the seminary."

As in this case, there is usually never a dull moment when Howard is around. Win, lose or draw, he was always good copy after a game ... maybe even better after a loss.

In 1960 Clemson paid a visit to Duke and the Blue Devils had two pretty good running backs in Joel Arrington and Mark Leggett. And the two of them had a pretty good day as Duke won, 21-6. Howard got one of the usual post-game press conference questions: "What was the turning point of the game?"

Without batting an eye, Howard snorted: "Three years ago when I didn't recruit any good halfbacks."

Howard has made my job so much easier down through the years by always talking to the press when a reporter wanted an interview. He might throw a couple of expletives at me, but to my knowledge, he never turned down an interview when asked. "I had more time than most coaches nowadays," Howard recently said, "mainly because I didn't have as much money to spend as they do and could devote my time to more important things."

It has been my good fortune that in 25 of my 34 years with the athletic department,

either Howard or Danny Ford has been the head coach. Somewhere between here and Tuscaloosa both Howard and Ford learned how to murder the King's English. But that has been to our advantage because that never was one of my stronger suits either.

It has been rumored that Howard and Ford had the same English teacher at Alabama. But Howard says that since he came through down there, they are teaching you to preface everything with "very, very, very."

Howard, now one of the town's older citizens at 80 years young, has been a resident over 58 years. He remembers coming here as an assistant to Jess Neely after turning down a high school job in Hopkinsville, Ky., which was going to pay him \$200.00 a year more than Neely. But Howard says it's the best decision he ever made. This was in 1931.

When Neely left Clemson to be head coach at Rice in 1940, Prof S.R. "Slim" Rhodes nominated Howard to be the new top man at Clemson. Howard seconded his own nomination and was given a one-year contract. Clemson president Dr. Enoch Sikes asked Howard not to tell anyone what he was making because it might make some of the faculty mad. Howard promised he wouldn't, "because I'm just as ashamed of it as you are." In a matter of months, he lost his contract (while on a recruiting trip) and never had another one the 30 years he was head coach.

He went almost as long without his diploma from Alabama. When Howard graduated in 1931, there was a \$10 fee to receive the actual diploma. Howard was officially graduated for completing the required number of hours, but had nothing to hang on the wall.

"Back then, I didn't have \$10," Howard recalls today. "When I walked across the stage, they just presented me with a blank piece of paper."

In 1956 Howard decided he would like to have his diploma and sent the Alabama registrar's office \$10. It so happens that we brought in the mail the day Howard's diploma arrived. Thinking he might have received a new calendar or a picture rolled up, we gave him the tube, never thinking we were presenting him with his Alabama diploma, something the university's president should have done 25 years earlier.

Maybe it's because Howard received his degree from me that he decided to return the favor.

Soon after Bob Edwards became president of Clemson in 1959, he told a faculty-staff meeting that he would like to have as many of them as possible with their terminal degree. The next day Howard came into my office and asked if we had heard about Edwards' remarks.

When we answered in the affirmative, Howard placed his hand on my head much like a Methodist baptism, and said: "I crown you Dr. Bradley." To Howard that has been my nickname for the past 30 years, although he slips an occasional 'Buddy' in there when he can't remember my name right off.

But Howard has had the knack down through the years to hand out nicknames that stuck. When Wyndy Wyndham was playing for Clemson, he went the wrong way on blocking assignments about a half dozen times one afternoon. Howard told him: "Boy, you're too dumb to be one person, you oughta be two." Thus was born the moniker 'Dumb-Dumb' Wyndham.

Secretaries around the hall haven't escaped Howard either. He calls one 'Midnight,' another is 'Lightnin' and one of the undergraduate students in the sports information office drew 'Pepsi' because of the 'Pepsi Generation.'

When Howard heard that Soccer Coach I.M. Ibrahim had the same first and last name, he immediately became I², although sometimes now Howard calls him Khomeini.

Dr. Max Lennon

When Max Lennon came to Clemson more than three years ago, he brought with him some definite ideas about what was needed in order for Clemson to reach its potential: more emphasis on research and the graduate program (the university's greatest potential for growth and immediate economic impact); increased private support for academics; more effort in frontier areas of research to aid South Carolina's traditional industries; a more global perspective in both academic programs and research; and a significant state investment in higher education.

Those were the ideas; now for the reality:

- more than a 60 percent increase in research funding in a single year
- the most successful private fundraising year ever, with more than a 40 percent increase over last year's record-breaking total
- a landmark experiment in the field of biotechnology, plus research that is breaking new ground in advanced apparel manufacturing, composites, robotics and many other areas
- the addition of international academic programs and research partnerships involving Clemson with institutions in Japan, France, Germany, Italy, Egypt, China, Israel and Great Britain, among others
- a \$5-million higher education initiative called the Cutting Edge

But the Lennon agenda is far from completed. The Clemson president sees more challenges, more opportunities, ahead. At a recent address to the faculty, he said, "We must continue to look for new ways to fulfill Clemson's land-grant mission: aggressively recruiting students into areas

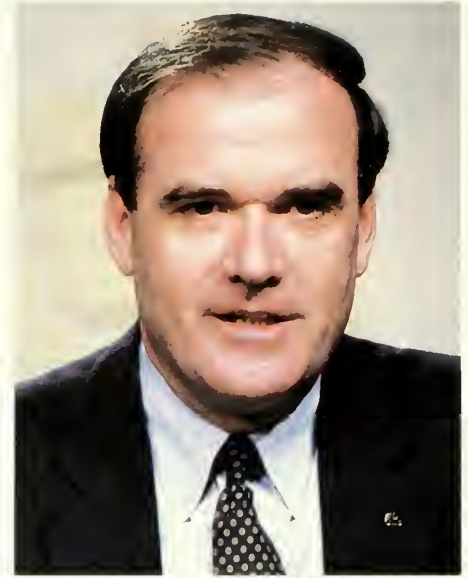
that are exclusive to Clemson — agriculture, forestry and textiles — and that have more job opportunities than graduates, increasing minority representation in the faculty and administration as well as the student body, and making Clemson more accessible.

"As a land grant college, we have an obligation in rural development and to help eliminate the pockets of poverty and illiteracy that remain in this state. Education is the answer, and we have an obligation to make education accessible to all people."

Lennon sees Clemson as still in the process of maturing into a major, comprehensive university with a regional and national reputation in its primary mission areas — science and technology. He has worked hard to bring together the necessary support system by involving not only faculty and staff but also legislators, business leaders and alumni in determining Clemson's future. And the future looks pretty bright. "Clemson is a very exciting place to be right now," he says.

Lennon came to Clemson from Ohio State University, where he had been executive dean for agriculture, home economics and natural resources. Lennon was also on the Ohio State Faculty Senate and was co-chairman of the Governor's commission on agriculture.

Previously, he had served as dean of the College of Agriculture, and as director of the Agricultural Experiment Station at the University of Missouri, and as associate dean and director of research in the College of Agricultural Sciences at Texas Tech University.



Lennon is a native of Columbus County, N.C., and earned his bachelor's degree and doctorate from N.C. State University. He began his teaching career at N.C. State.

The Clemson president has been active in a number of civic and professional groups, ranging from his local PTA and the South Carolina Research Authority to the National Dropout Prevention Fund and the International Development Institute.

In the fall of 1987, Lennon was named to the board of trustees of the Farm Foundation, a national organization devoted to improving research and education to benefit rural areas. He will serve a four-year term as the university representative on the board, which also includes farmers, legislators and executives of leading agricultural industries.

Lennon was appointed in 1988 to the U.S. Department of Agriculture's Policy Advisory Committee for Science and Education Research Grants Program by Secretary of Agriculture Richard E. Lyng, and was a keynote speaker at the AgBiotech '88 international conference in Washington.

This year Lennon also was appointed to chair a committee of top administrators and federal officials from 11 universities across the nation to work with congress on legislation relating to foreign assistance and international development. The committee is a project of the National Association of State Universities and land-grant colleges.

Lennon is married to Ruth Carter Lennon and they have two children, Daniel Ray (27) and Robin (24).

Bobby Robinson

The Clemson athletic program has been on the rise in just about all forms of athletics in recent years. Bobby Robinson is the leader of the department as its athletic director and his commitment to success in competition, academics and facilities has been the key to this level of distinction.

An examination of the chart on this page shows that Clemson has made a steady rise in the national men's all-sports poll since he took over for the 1985-86 academic year. Last year Clemson finished sixth in the **USA Today** All-Sports poll, its highest ranking in six years and the second straight year Clemson has finished in the top 10 in the nation. The number of Clemson All-ACC performers and All-Americans also reached all-time highs.

Both major revenue sports had banner years with the football team winning a third straight bowl and finishing in the top 10 in the nation. Danny Ford's gridders also won a third straight ACC title. The men's basketball team went to its second NCAA tournament in the last three years, and it marked the first time in Clemson history the Tigers took part in a January 1 Bowl game and the NCAA basketball tournament.

The baseball team also advanced to the NCAA regional finals, meaning Clemson was one of just three teams in the nation to win a bowl game, an NCAA tournament basketball game and an NCAA baseball tournament game. A total of nine teams, highlighted by a number-three finish for the Clemson golf team, finished in the top 20 of their respective polls. This is a total topped only by the 1986-87 and 1987-88 academic years, two other years in the Robinson era.

In academics, Clemson student-athletes had another outstanding year. Seventy-five young men and women had 3.0 or better grade-point averages each semester, with seven earning a perfect 4.0 GPA. The football team had three players named to the academic All-ACC team, and two students were named to Academic All-America teams. Over 30 former Tiger student-athletes received college degrees in the past 12 months.

The commitment to success in academics is further confirmed by the decision to build an academic learning center for student-athletes. Encompassing over

29,000 square feet, the center will feature classrooms, learning labs, and an auditorium, as well as office space for the academic advising staff, which now has four full-time staff members. It should be completed at a cost of \$2.5 million by the fall of 1990.

In the area of facilities, Robinson has a record of success and accomplishments second to none. Recent capital improvements include the indoor tennis facility and the soccer stadium, with the learning center and completion of the baseball stadium coming soon. Major renovations recently completed include the golf practice area, cross country trail, stadium locker rooms, wrestling practice room, football coaches meeting rooms and renovation of the football athletic dorm. A complete maintenance and irrigation system has also been implemented for all practice fields.

Renovations recently concluded include the new IPTAY/ticket complex at Gate 9 at the football stadium, a nine-lane all-weather track, Jervey Center offices and gymnasium. Without a doubt, Clemson athletic facilities are among the finest in the

country.

Administratively, Robinson has instituted policies and procedures that benefit all constituents. Among the changes are the drug testing program, the Student Athlete Assistance Program (SAAP), a staff Policies and Procedures Manual, computerization of the department, the pro agents seminar, as well as the athletic academic scholarship endowment.

From a university prospective, Robinson envisions the athletic department as being one of 49 campus departments, serving a viable role to the mission of Clemson University. "Athletic competition provides a common bond for students, faculty, staff, and friends," according to Robinson.

Under the direction of Robinson, the athletic department continues to support the university. Over \$1 million have been contributed to the athletic academic scholarship fund; and band travel equipment and uniforms are funded by athletic dollars. An educational enhancement fund has been coordinated through the efforts of the athletic department and the Athletic Council.

With Robinson's qualifications, it is easy to see why the Clemson athletic program enjoys continued success — he has done it all. He has been an administrator at all levels, he has worked in other areas of the university. Robinson has been a head coach and he has handled the budgetary aspects needed to run a \$12 million program.

Robinson graduated from Furman with a B.S. degree in business and political science in 1968. He was the president of the Sigma Alpha Epsilon fraternity chapter at Furman.

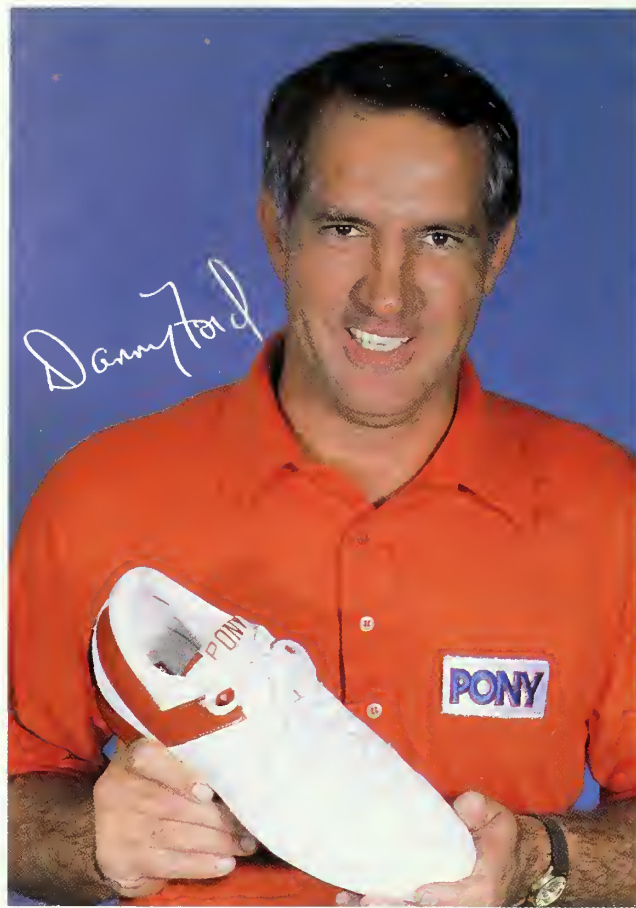
Robinson came to Clemson in 1970, not in athletics, but in the housing office. After three years, he moved across campus to serve as an administrative assistant in the athletic department.

After serving the athletic department in various capacities, he became business manager in 1975. Two years later he was named assistant athletic director, and in 1980 he became associate AD. He held that title for five years, and his area of responsibility moved to primarily football and basketball. The native of Columbia became Athletic Director in March of 1985.

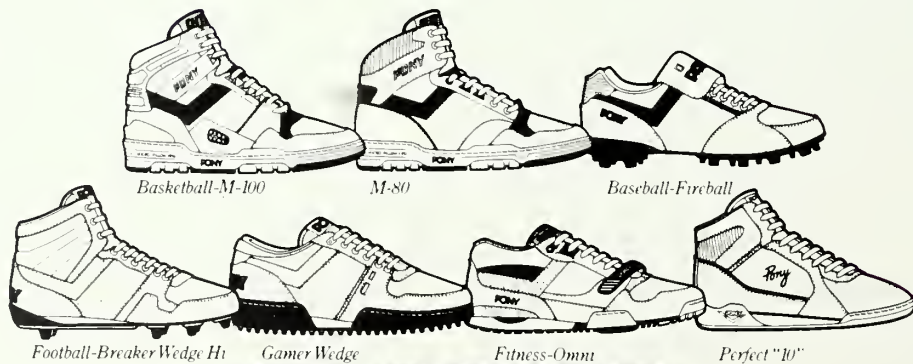
While serving his administrative duties, Robinson found time to coach the Clemson golf team between 1975 and 1983. During his time as the head coach, Clemson won its first ACC title in golf and three times the Tigers participated in the NCAA tournament. In 1983, his final season as the head coach, he guided Clemson to a number-five finish. Robinson is a member of the NCAA golf committee and is a member of the CFA Board of Directors.

Danny Ford

The list of winningest active coaches in college football contains only the very best from the world of coaching. Last year, a new name appeared in the top five of that elite list. Clemson's Danny Ford has moved into fourth place on the list of winningest active coaches in the college ranks on a percentage basis.

Not only has Ford become one of the top coaches in the nation, but on the way to this accomplishment, he has defeated each of the top three as listed at the conclusion of the 1988 season. In only 10 full seasons, Ford has posted wins over Nebraska's Tom Osborne, Penn State's Joe Paterno, and former Oklahoma coach Barry Switzer, the fourth winningest coach in the history of college football. The wins over Paterno and Switzer came after two of the winningest seasons in Clemson history, as the Tigers went 10-2 in 1987 and 1988. The win over Osborne's Nebraska team came on the heels of the only 12-0 season and national championship in the history of Clemson football.

Last year's Citrus Bowl victory over Oklahoma marked Ford's seventh bowl trip in only 10 full years as head coach and his fifth bowl victory in those seven trips. All 10 years as head coach, his teams have had winning regular season records. Clemson has won 80 percent of its games over the last three years and has been in the top 20 for 34 straight polls. Ford has already tied former Clemson coach Frank Howard for the ACC record for sole championships with five and for most top 20 seasons by a Clemson coach with six.

Ford's winning tradition did not begin when he became a head coach, it has followed through his entire affiliation with the game of football. Overall, he has been involved with 21 winning

regular seasons in his 22 years of football, and his teams have won over 75 percent of the time.

His success as a head coach is not only evident in his win-loss record, but also in a long list of accomplishments Ford has compiled in his first 10 years as a head coach. This list would be impressive with anyone's name on it, but considering the fact that Ford is only 41, it is phenomenal. His most significant accomplishment, winning the 1981 National Championship, was attained when he was only 33-years-old, making him the youngest coach in the history of the college game to win the Associated Press National Championship.

Not only has Ford moved into fourth place on the list of winningest active coaches, but he has recently reached another milestone. He is now the winningest coach in the history of the Atlantic Coast Conference on a percentage basis. He is already second in total wins among ACC coaches and needs just 13 wins to break Clemson Hall of Famer Frank Howard's record. These wins have not been easy ones, instead they have come against fierce competition. Ford has already gained more wins over AP top 20 and top 10 teams than any other coach in Clemson history and is the only coach in conference history to have a winning record (15-11-1) versus top 20 teams (top 20 when playing Clemson, minimum 10 games played).

Ford has established a new era in football at Clemson University, creating one of the most solid programs in the nation. Now in his 11th full season with the Tigers, his record stood at 86-27-4 (.752) entering the season. Not only is Ford among the winningest active coaches, but Clemson also has the second best winning percentage in the South during this time period. Clemson is the only team in the nation to win a bowl game, a conference championship and finish in the top 20 of the AP poll each of the last three years. Clemson has the sixth best record (28-6-2) in the nation during this time period.

After examining Ford's football past, it is difficult to imagine him anything but a winner. Ford played tight end and offensive tackle for Paul "Bear" Bryant at Alabama between 1967 and 1969. Ford started all three years, was all-conference in 1969 and played on all three teams that went to bowl games. In 1969 he was a member of the All-SEC academic team, and served as captain of the Alabama squad. Ford also played freshman basketball at Alabama.

Ford earned a B.S. degree in industrial arts and a Master's Degree in special education from Alabama, working as a graduate assistant coach for Bryant and then as a full-time assistant in 1972 and 1973. From 1974 to 1976 he served as an assistant coach at Virginia Tech and joined the Clemson coaching staff in 1977 as an offensive line coach. He was named assistant head coach prior to the 1978 season. At the end of that season at the age of 30, Ford was named the Tigers' head coach, making him the youngest active Division I coach in the country.



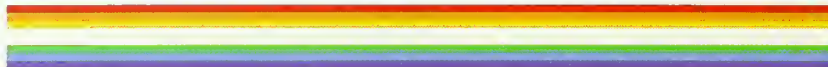
Clemson's head coach has had five bowl wins, five ACC titles and six Top 20 seasons.

MILES ALDRIDGE

Inside Linebackers

ALDRIDGE is entering his fifth season as the Tigers' inside linebacker coach. A native of Kansas City, MO, Aldridge joined the Clemson staff on June 28, 1985 after a two-year stint at Duke. The 1971 graduate of Gardner-Webb College earned three letters in football. He began coaching on the collegiate level at East Tennessee State (1973-77), then moved on to Wichita State (1978) and Tulsa (1979). He also spent three years at Mississippi (1980-82) before taking a position at Duke, where he spent two years (1983-84). The coach of the two leading tacklers returning from the 1988 squad (Ed McDaniel and Doug Brewster), Aldridge recruits the eastern section of South Carolina, Philadelphia and New Jersey.



WAYNE BOLT

Tight Ends & K/O Returns

BOLT joined the Clemson staff on March 10, 1986 and is entering his fourth season with the Tigers. A 1979 graduate of East Carolina, his responsibilities include coaching the tight ends and kickoff return teams. Bolt earned all-conference and All-America honors during his playing career as an offensive guard for East Carolina (1974-77). He began his coaching career as a graduate assistant for the Pirates, then spent a year at Wyoming (1980) before moving on to Auburn (1981-86). Bolt has coached four tight ends who have gone on to the NFL: Ed West (Green Bay Packers), Ron Middleton (Atlanta Falcons), Jeff Parks (Houston Oilers), and Jim Riggs (Cincinnati Bengals). During his first season as a Tiger coach, he coached All-

ACC tight end (Jim Riggs) and his kickoff return team led the nation in average return, just the second team statistical championship in Clemson history. His recruiting territory includes Georgia, Virginia, Washington, D.C., and Alabama.



BILL D'ANDREA

Offensive Tackles

D'ANDREA, who is entering the fourth year of his second stint with the Clemson program, is responsible for coaching the offensive tackles. D'Andrea, who is responsible for recruiting in North Carolina, Pennsylvania, New Jersey, and New York, rejoined the Clemson staff on June 23, 1986 after spending two seasons at Southern Mississippi. Prior to that he was a graduate assistant coach at East Carolina (1974-75), a full-time assistant at the University of Virginia (1975), Massanutten Military Academy (1976-78) and Catawba College (1979-81). He also spent two years (1983-84) at Clemson as a graduate assistant, where he also served as football dorm director. D'Andrea received his bachelor's degree from Indiana State in 1973, completed his master's degree in 1975, and lacks only a few semester hours from completing a second master's degree. D'Andrea has coached an all-conference tackle each of the last two years and the Tigers have ranked in the top 15 in the nation in rushing each of the three seasons he has been a full-time coach.



LES HERRIN

Defensive Line

HERRIN is beginning his first season back with the Clemson football program after coaching at

North Carolina (1988) and East Carolina (1985-87). Responsible for coaching the defensive line, Herrin was the Tiger inside linebacker coach from 1981 to 1984. Herrin's recruiting territory includes the state of South Carolina. Before coming to Clemson for the 1981 national championship season, Herrin also spent a year as the defensive coordinator at Appalachian State (1980). Herrin earned his bachelor's and master's degree from Western Carolina where he was a four-year letterman in football. During his first two years at Clemson, the Tigers ranked in the top 10 in scoring and rushing defense. Herrin also coached ACC MVP Jeff Davis, who went on to be captain of the Tampa Bay Bucs and 1989 All-Pro Johnny Rember of the New England Patriots.



WOODY MCCORVEY

Wide Receivers

MCCORVEY is in his seventh year with the Tiger staff, and is responsible for coaching the wide receivers. For three years, the 1972 Alabama State graduate also coached tight ends, and for two of those seasons he coached an All-ACC tight end. A Grove Hill, AL native, his recruiting territory includes eastern North Carolina, Alabama, Mississippi, and Florida. McCorvey joined the Clemson staff on July 13, 1983 from Alabama A&M, where he spent four seasons (1979-82) as offensive coordinator. Prior to that position, he spent a year as the backfield coach at North Carolina Central (1978). McCorvey lettered four years at quarterback at Alabama State, where he earned his bachelor's degree, and then earned his master's from the University of West Florida in 1977. He has coached six receivers over his career who have been drafted or signed free agent contracts. As a player, he guided the Alabama A&M offense to top 20 rankings in total offense, passing offense, rushing offense, and scoring offense during his tenure there.



BILL OLIVER
Secondary

OLIVER joined the Clemson staff on January 22, 1986 and is in his fourth year as the Tigers secondary coach. Oliver is also responsible for recruiting in Florida, Georgia and Alabama. Oliver came to Clemson from the USFL's Memphis Showboats, where he spent two years (1983-85) and served as senior defensive coordinator and secondary coach. He began his collegiate coaching career as the defensive secondary coach at Auburn (1966-71) and then spent nine years at his alma mater, Alabama, working under the late Paul "Bear" Bryant (1971-80). From 1980-83 he served as head coach at UT-Chattanooga before moving on to the professional ranks. Oliver was a member of the 1961 undefeated National Championship Alabama team, and he received his bachelor's degree in biology from Alabama in 1962. In each of his first two seasons at Clemson, the Tigers led the ACC in pass completion defense and fewest yards per attempt allowed. He has coached three Clemson players who have gone on to the NFL: Delton Hall (Pittsburgh Steelers), Donnell Woolford (Chicago Bears) and Perry Williams (New England Patriots).



CHUCK REEDY
Running Backs

REEDY is in his 12th season as the Tigers' running back coach and is responsible for recruiting

in South Carolina, Georgia, Florida, New England, and New York. The St. Augustine, FL native earned two letters in football from Appalachian State, where he was a 1971 graduate in health and physical education. He came to Clemson from Kentucky on July 5, 1978, where he spent one spring as a graduate assistant coach (1978). Seven of Clemson's top 10 single season individual rushing performances have taken place under Reedy and Clemson has ranked in the top 15 in the nation in rushing five of the last six years. Additionally, he has coached nine Clemson players who have gone on to the NFL: Cliff Austin (New Orleans Saints), Stacey Driver (Cleveland Browns), Terrence Flagler (San Francisco 49ers), Kenny Flowers (Atlanta Falcons), Steve Griffin (Atlanta Falcons), Kevin Mack (Cleveland Browns), Jeff McCall (L.A. Raiders), Chuck McSwain (Dallas Cowboys), Marvin Sims (Baltimore Colts); additionally, Lester Brown played eight years in Canada, and Tracy Johnson was drafted by Houston in 1989.



RICK STOCKSTILL
Quarterbacks

STOCKSTILL is in his first season with the Tigers after joining the Clemson coaching staff on February 20, 1989. Stockstill came to Clemson from the University of Central Florida, where he spent four years as assistant head coach and wide receiver coach (1985-89). Stockstill's responsibilities at Clemson include coaching the Tiger quarterbacks and acting as the football dorm director. Previous to his stay at Central Florida, Stockstill spent two seasons as offensive coordinator and quarterback coach at Bethune-Cookman (1983-84). The Sidney, OH native earned three letters in football from Florida State University, where he quarterbacked the Seminoles to consecutive Orange Bowl appearances after the 1979 and 1980 seasons. Stockstill was also a 1980 and 1981 All-Southern Independent and All-Metro Conference performer for FSU. He received his bachelor's degree in physical education from Florida State in 1982.



LARRY VAN DER HEYDEN
Offensive Line

VAN DER HEYDEN joined the Clemson staff on January 5, 1979 and coaches the offensive line. A native of Brazil, Iowa, Van Der Heyden recruits upper South Carolina, North Carolina, and western Pennsylvania. He came to Clemson after coaching at Memphis State (1975-78), where he served as offensive coordinator, Virginia (1974-75), East Carolina (1973-74), Indiana State (1969-73), and Drake University (1968-69). Van der Heyden coached the defensive line at his alma mater, Iowa State, from 1965 to 1967, and served as a graduate assistant coach there in 1964. He is a member of the all-time Iowa State team selected by former players and coaches. He earned three letters in both football and baseball from Iowa State and received a bachelor's degree in physical education (1962) and a master's degree in education (1968) from the same institution. He has coached three All-America guards over the last six years at Clemson and for a five-year period (1983-87), one of his guards was chosen All-ACC.



TOMMY WEST
Outside Linebackers & Bandits

WEST is in his eighth season coaching the Clemson outside linebackers and bandit ends. His recruiting territory includes Florida and Georgia, and he also follows junior college athletes across the country. Prior to his arrival at Clemson, West coached at Appalachian State for two seasons and spent a year as an assistant coach at Mississippi (1979). West earned three letters in football and baseball at Tennessee (1973-75) and was drafted by the Tampa Bay Bucs in 1976 as a linebacker. He earned a B.S. degree in health education from Tennessee in 1975. West has coached two all-conference bandit ends, including Super Bowl Champion Andy Headen of the NY Giants.

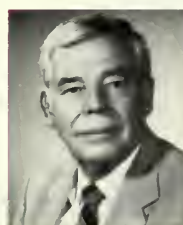

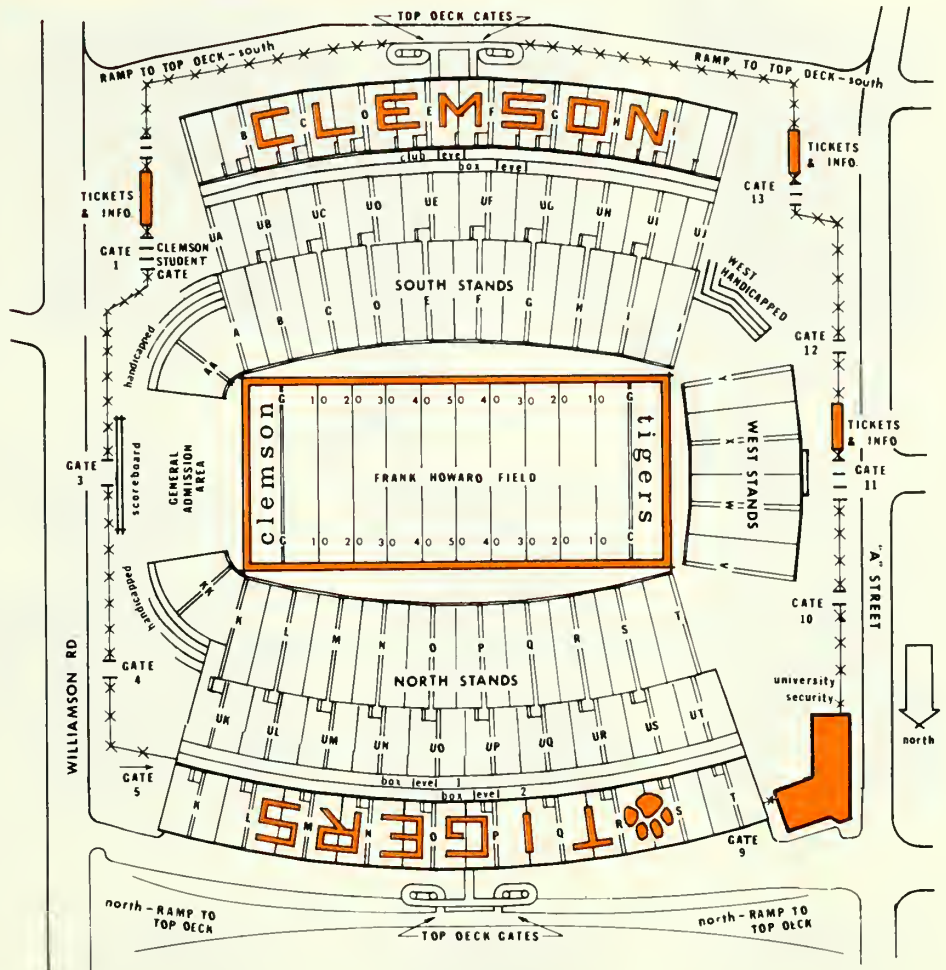

CONCESSION STANDS: Concession stands are located beneath all stands and can be reached by exit from any portal.

EMERGENCY CALLS: Emergency calls are received in the Security Booth. The emergency number is 656-2999.

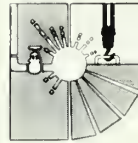

Clemson Coaches

Clemson's 1988-89 sports program was ranked in the top 10 in the nation for the second consecutive year and the seventh time in the last 11 years as the Tiger program compiled 61 points in the **USA Today** national sports poll released last July. Clemson's football team had a lot to do with that figure with its number-nine final AP ranking, but eight other sports at Clemson also ranked in the top 20 last season.

Clemson was one of just eight teams in the nation to play in a bowl game, the NCAA basketball tournament and the NCAA baseball tournament for the 1988-89 academic year and was one of only three schools to gain at least one win in each postseason event. Clemson tied the ACC record for overall conference championships last year with seven. The Clemson football, baseball, men's outdoor track, men's Indoor Track, men's cross country, men's tennis and women's swimming teams all won ACC titles. The Tigers boasted 65 first-team All-ACC players last year, a new school record, and tied the Clemson record for All-Americans with 26. Clemson also had nine top 20 teams last year, one off the school record of 10.

ACC Coach-of-the-Year honors went to Bob Pollock (men's cross country, men's indoor track, men's outdoor track), Wayne Coffman (women's indoor track), Chuck Kriese (men's tennis), and Bob Boettner (women's swimming).

Clemson Memorial Stadium

Just before Jess Neely left for Rice University, he gave Clemson a message. "Don't ever let them talk you into building a big stadium," he said. "Put about 10,000 seats behind the Y.M.C.A. That's all you'll ever need."

Instead of following Coach Neely's advice, however, Clemson officials decided to build the new stadium in a valley on the western part of campus. The place would take some clearing — there were many trees, but luckily there were no hedges.

The crews went to work: clearing, cutting, pouring, and forming. Finally, on September 19, 1942, Clemson Memorial Stadium opened with the Tiger football team thrashing Presbyterian College, 32-13. Those 20,000 seats installed for Opening Day would soon grow; and grow and grow.

When the original part of the stadium was built in the early 40's, much of the work was done by scholarship athletes, including many football players. The first staking out of the stadium was done by two members of the football team, A.N. Cameron and Hugh Webb. Webb returned to Clemson years later to be an architecture professor, and Cameron moved on to be a civil engineer in Louisiana.

The building of the stadium did not proceed without a few problems. One day during the clearing of the land, one young football player proudly announced he was not allergic to poison oak. He then commenced to attack the poison oak with a swing blade, throwing the plants to and fro. The next day, however, the boy was swollen twice his size and had to be put in the hospital.

There are many other stories about the building of the stadium including one stating that Frank Howard put a chew of tobacco in each corner of the stadium as

the concrete was being poured. The story claims the tobacco is still there.

Howard says that the seeding of the grass caused a few problems. "About 40 people and I laid the sod on the field," he says. "After three weeks, on July 15, we had only gotten halfway through. I told them that it had taken us three weeks to get that far, and I would give them three more weeks' pay for however long it took. I also told them we would have 50 gallons of ice cream when we got through.

"After that it took them three days to do the rest of the field. Then we sat down in the middle of the field and ate up that whole 50 gallons."

Howard says that on the day of the first game in the stadium, "the gates were hung at 1:00 and we played at 2:00." But that would be all of the construction for a while. Then in 1958, 18,000 sideline seats were added and, in 1960, a total of 5,658 West end zone seats were added in response to increasing attendance. With the large end zone "Green Grass" section, this expansion increased capacity to about 53,000.

Later, upper decks were added to each side of the stadium as crowds swelled — the first one in 1978 and the second in 1983. This increased capacity to approximately 80,000 which makes it one of the 10 largest on-campus stadiums in the country.

The effect spiraling inflation has had in this century can be dramatically seen in the differences in stadium construction. The original part of the stadium was built at a cost of \$125,000 or \$6.25 a seat. The newest upper deck was finished in 1983 at a cost of \$13.5 million, or \$866 a seat.

Through the years Memorial Stadium has become known as "Death Valley." It was tagged this by the late Presbyterian coach, Lonnie McMillan. After bringing his

P.C. teams to Clemson for years and getting whipped, McMillan said the place was like Death Valley. A few years later, the name stuck.

On November 16, 1974 the playing surface was named Frank Howard Field for the legendary coach because of his long service and dedication to the University.

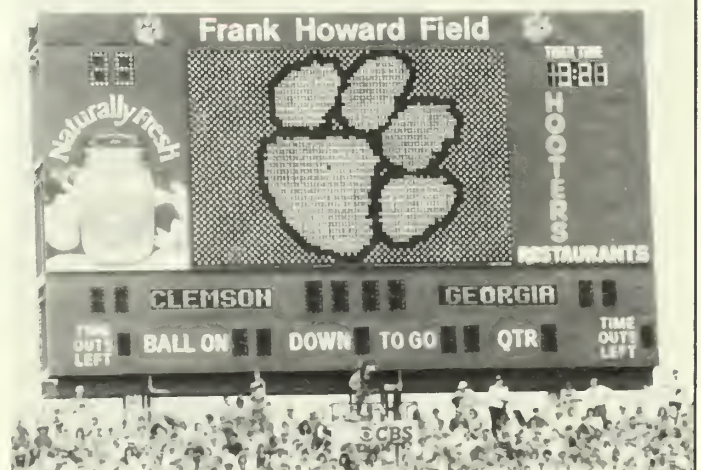
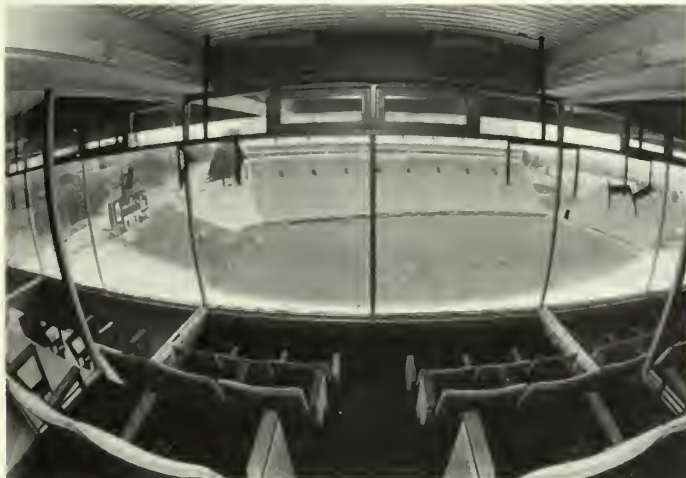
Athletic Director Bobby Robinson says that Memorial Stadium has many features which make it a top facility. "One thing that makes it so good is the number of sideline seats," he says. "We don't think there is a bad seat in the house.

"We also have outstanding dressing rooms, press facilities, and ample parking nearby. A unique feature of the stadium is the number of private boxes."

Rick Brewer, an official in the University athletic ticket office says that despite the stadium's large size, there are still season ticket problems. "When the second upper deck was built, we thought it would take care of everything," he said. "To our dismay, it hasn't. We've filled the upper decks and have moved season ticket holders into the end zone, which are not permanent seats."

Despite the apparent ticket crunch, Robinson says there are no immediate plans to further expand the stadium. "Before we expand we'll have to show over an extended length of time — like five to seven years — that we can sell out what we have now," he said. "We don't want supply to greatly exceed demand. Even though it's hard to get tickets now, we still get people in our stadium. The ticket means more if its harder to get."

But, if Memorial Stadium is expanded again and capacity is pushed close to 100,000, there will be room for the construction over the west stands, enclosing that end like a horseshoe.

Hank Phillips

The Perrys, Riggs, Bostics, McSwains, Browns, Calverts, Gillespies, Butlers ...

The list of brothers who have played together in a Clemson uniform is quite impressive. The "family atmosphere" has played a significant part in the success of the Clemson football program. This year, Hank Phillips continues another Tiger tradition as he anchors the same line where his brother, John, earned All-America honors in 1986 and 1987.

Often, the younger sibling has trouble following in their "big" brother's footsteps. Psychologically, their own identity is hidden behind the comparisons between the two. This is not the case for Hank Phillips who is seemingly settled at his center position three games into his senior campaign.

"John was a great lineman. Anytime someone confuses me with John, I take it as a compliment," says the senior from Spruce Pine, NC. "People get us mistaken all of the time, but we really don't look that much alike. I'm much better looking."

Instead of fighting the obvious comparisons, Hank would rather have fun with it. "Sometimes I will have an entire conversation with someone and they might later ask, 'How is Hank.' I usually just go along with everything and say, 'Hank is doing great. You know he is a great center and mean as a snake. He is a real hustler on the field.' Sometimes after I tell them I'm Hank they will say, 'Didn't you try out for the pros,' and I will have to tell them, no, that was John. People have confused us since I was two-years-old. They will say, 'John, I haven't seen you since you were this high.' I just think to myself, 'You still haven't seen John.' I feel more em-

barrassed for them than for me."

The pranks almost caught up with Hank recently, however. "Once, someone who mistaked me for John saw me with my girlfriend. It got back to John's girlfriend that this person, who they thought was John, was with another girl. After some lengthy explanations, we got everything straightened out."

On the field, Hank has never felt the pressure to live up to John's legacy. Hank feels he has developed his own identity because he holds down a different offensive line position, center. "Center is a lot different than guard. The center's blocks are five or ten yards maximum, where the guard has to pull and sometimes run 30 yards. At guard, you play on a bigger field and block better athletes. At center, you are not trying to fool anybody by telling them you are a better athlete than they are."

The one thing Hank does have in common with John is they both have a great work ethic. "Hank Phillips comes from a good family," says Clemson coach Danny Ford. "They are good people. He really works hard at everything, just like John."

Hank feels his work hard attitude comes from his family. "When John and I were young, we would have to get up every Saturday morning to cut wood with our father. We heated our house with a wood stove and the men in the family had to go cut wood every week. For years, John and I would have to carry all of the wood while dad cut it. Then, when John got old enough, he got a saw to cut with and I was the only one carrying and stacking."

Amazingly, Hank said until he came to Clemson he was not an avid football fan. "People do not believe me when I tell them that I had watched only two Super Bowls

before I came to Clemson. I just love to hunt and fish. As a matter of fact, the outdoors were a much bigger part of my life than athletics until I came to Clemson."

Hank would rather be hunting deer than nose guards, it seems. "When you deer hunt, you spend all day just looking for one. On the football field you won't have to look very far to find the nose guard when you're the center," says Phillips.

Clemson fans can be thankful that Phillips handles opponent nose guards more efficiently. In the first two games of 1989, Phillips held the starting noseguards of Furman and Florida State to just 10 tackles in 123 snaps. That figure includes the play of Seminole All-America candidate Odel Haggins.

Phillips had nine knockdown blocks in the first two games of the season and was a major reason Clemson averaged over seven yards per play (vs. Florida State) for just the sixth time by a Danny Ford coached team. "Hank Phillips is an outstanding all-around lineman," said his position coach Larry Van Der Heyden. "He has moved around the offensive line over the last five years, but he will be a mainstay of our line this year. He has excellent footwork and technique. He is the only senior on the offensive line so we are depending on him to show leadership, just as his brother did for so many years."

If Hank Phillips does not watch it, he will draw even more comparisons to his brother John. But when asked to compare the Phillips' to other brothers who have run down the hill, Hank quickly stated, "We don't exactly match up with the Perrys. Those guys are worth a mint."

Running Down the Hill

Does running down the hill really get the Clemson team fired up before a game? Nine out of 10 Tiger fans think so, and 10 out of 10 Tiger players think so.

Statistically, the only way to measure it would be in terms of winning percentage. Clemson has played 221 games in Death Valley over the years and Clemson has used the hill as the entrance to the stadium 206 of those 221 games.

Fifteen times Clemson has not used the hill as its entrance to the stadium and Clemson's record in those games is 6-9, a 40 percent winning percentage. In the 206 games in which Clemson has used the hill as the entrance to the stadium Clemson has a 148-52-6 record, or a .733 winning percentage. Thus Clemson has won 33.3 percent more of its games when it runs down the hill.

It is called the most exciting 25 seconds in football, but that depends on how many players are suited up for a particular game. Given a normal dress list of 90 players it takes about 25 seconds from the time the cannon sounds until the last player clears the goalpost. But, for the opener with Furman, Danny Ford dressed well over 100 players and it took 34 seconds for the last player, Gary Cooper, to reach the field. Ironically, Cooper caught a 20-yard pass on the first Tiger play. We're glad Gary made the bus.

Defense Awesome

How good was Clemson's defensive effort against Furman in the season opener? For the Danny Ford era it was the best in terms of total defense, passing defense, first downs allowed and of course scoring defense.

Furman had just three first downs the entire day and the fewest allowed by a Danny Ford defense had been just six. You have to go back to 1957 to find the last time the opposition came

up with just three first downs. Frank Howard held Presbyterian to just three first downs that year.

In terms of total defense, it was the best by a Danny Ford coached team, the seventh best in Clemson history and the best total defense since Virginia had just 41 yards in 1963 against the Tigers. Furman had just 58 yards in total offense on September 2, just 27 yards passing. That tied for the fewest yards allowed passing by a Danny Ford coached defense.

In terms of scoring, well of course it tied for the low yield figure as you can't do better than a shutout. Furman crossed midfield just once and had only one drive over 15 yards the entire day. It was the first time in 76 games that Furman had been shut out.

Magic Number

What is the number that all Clemson football players fight for in preseason jersey distribution? The magic number of Clemson football is 85 because it has had the most All-ACC Tigers wear that number.

Four different Clemson players have earned All-ACC honors over the years while wearing 85, one more than the numbers 18, 69 and 78. The Tigers who have worn number-85 to stardom are Ronnie Ducworth (DE, 1967-68), John McMakin (TE, 1971), Bennie Cunningham (TE, 1974-75) and Mark Drag (MG, 1988).

Yankee Coaches

Clemson has quite a strong southern football tradition and the coaches who have guided the program have predominantly been from the South. In fact, out of the 110 different assistant coaches Clemson has had since 1896, Clemson has had only five graduates from non-Southern schools.

Two of those coaches are on the current staff. Bill D'Andrea is a graduate of Indiana State, while Larry Van Der Heyden is a graduate of Iowa State. D'Andrea played for Van Der Heyden

as a young offensive lineman at Indiana State when Van Der Heyden was offensive coordinator of the Sycamores. They have had quite an impact on the Clemson program. They are in their fourth seasons together as full-time coaches in charge of the offensive line and Clemson has finished in the top 15 in the nation in rushing each season.

The other assistants who graduated from non-Southern schools are Larry Beckish, a Wichita State grad who coached at Clemson between 1973 and 1976, Duke Owen, a Georgetown grad who coached at Clemson in 1953, and Earl Hoagland, a Purdue grad who coached at Clemson between 1953 and 1956.

1989 Rule Changes

The NCAA Football Rules Committee, meeting January 16-18, adopted a rule that will eliminate the use of tees on field goals and point-after-touchdown kicking attempts.

"Scoring has increased from an average of 32 points a game in 1958 to 46.1 in 1987," David M. Nelson, secretary-rules editor of the NCAA Football Rules Committee, said. "The average number of field goals has increased from 0.18 a game to a record high of 2.30 in 1984. Successful point-after-touchdown attempts have increased from 68.0 percent in 1958 to 95.6 percent in 1987." In general, there is a feeling that teams are playing for field goals, not touchdowns.

In other committee deliberations, a tie-breaker plan was discussed and considered but the proposal was voted down. The committee also voted to prohibit "split" officiating crews by 1991.

In addition, the committee voted to give teams the option of having penalties assessed after a touchdown enforced on either the point-after-touchdown try or the succeeding kickoff. Penalties previously were assessed on the succeeding kickoff.

In an attempt to reduce the number of crowd-noise delays, the committee voted to penalize defensive teams five yards after the first charged timeout when offensive teams are unable to put the ball in play. Previously, defensive teams could be charged a five-yard penalty only after its three timeouts were exhausted.

In an effort to reduce taunting, the committee voted to charge players who point their finger(s), arm(s) or hand(s) at an opponent with unsportsmanlike conduct.

Other notable rules changes adopted by the committee include:

—Eliminating touchbacks for offensive fumbles that go out of the end zone. Rather than placing the ball on the 20-yard line, the ball will be awarded to the defensive team at the spot of the fumble.

—Returning fumbles forward out of bounds to the spot of fumble.

—Making 25-second field clocks mandatory by 1990.

—Prohibiting players from altering their jerseys so that knots or knotlike protrusions are produced.

The piercing winters of Chicago are more than simply frigid to Jack Cain, they're painful.

"I'm an arthritic," Cain said. "I'm a pretty severe arthritic. These cold winters are no fun for me. I'm in pain when I get up on these cold winter mornings in Chicago, and you have to go out and shovel snow."

Enduring pain, however, is nothing new to Cain.

A former Clemson defensive back who lettered from 1978-80, Cain became well known to Tiger fans for his ability to play hurt. In fact, his persistence enabled him to win the 1980 Brian Piccolo Award as the most courageous player in the Atlantic Coast Conference.

Hampered by injuries on no less than 10 occasions, Cain was forced to wear a shoulder harness and special shoulder pads to protect his right shoulder during his final two seasons at Clemson.

So knowing the price he has had to pay for all the injuries, would Cain do it again if he had the chance?

"I would do it 10 more times out of 10 attempts," Cain said. "It was the right choice to make."

It's not that Cain is a glutton for punishment. It's just that the discipline and work ethic he developed as a player, have paid immense dividends.

After graduating from Clemson in 1981 with a degree in administrative management, Cain has moved up the corporate ladder rather quickly with Quaker Oats. In his eighth job in more than seven years with the company, Cain holds the position of Manager of Sales Planning for Eastern Region Broker Sales for Quaker in Chicago.

"I'm in charge of putting together marketing programs for marketing and sales joint programs for the entire eastern half of the United States," Cain said of his duties in promoting the sales of Gatorade, Van Camp's (pork and beans), and Quaker Frozen Foods.

He's made stops in Columbia, Wilmington, NC, Greenville, Jacksonville, FL, and Raleigh before arriving in Chicago in July of 1987. He and his wife, Donna, who is also a Clemson grad and a Quaker sales representative, currently live in Wheaton, IL.

"The reason that I progressed through Quaker is attributable to a strong work ethic that I developed while a student-athlete at Clemson," Cain said. "It's sometimes tough to be a full-time

student, yet manage a 40-hour a week job.

"It takes a lot of hard work. Those that are willing to maintain a strong work ethic are those ones that will typically carry that through the rest of their life and maintain a strong work ethic in their professional career. In the long run it pays off."

It pays off in more than just discipline, however, according to Cain.

"There are so many peripheral things that you pick up as a successful college athlete, like interviewing skills. I learned to be interviewed on television or radio. I learned public speaking. And I have been able to develop those skills in my professional career.

"With my current job, I do have to do a lot of public speaking. It's those type of things that a student-athlete can take advantage if they choose to do so. When I was in college, I knew I wasn't going to be a professional football player. I couldn't pass a professional football physical. I knew I had other things to do in life and I tried to take advantage of the peripheral things that Clemson offered me."

Cain certainly was an opportunist, getting the most out of his collegiate career that he could. In fact, it seems almost remarkable what he was able to accomplish considering the injuries.

Because of his shoulder problems, he was unable to lift weights with his upper body.

"Everytime I'd get on a bench press, I would dislocate one of my shoulders," he said.

It consequently became quite a chore for Cain to maintain his body weight without the help of weight training. In fact, he said he was more than 20 pounds lighter as a senior than the 182 pounds he came to Clemson at out of Atlanta's Chamblee High School. His inability to "beef up" just compounded his injury problems.

"It was a tough career," Cain said. "I continued to get smaller. And the smaller the defensive back, the worse the concussion when you are hit by a George Rogers or a Herschel Walker."

"A lot of people made a big deal out of the Brian Piccolo award," said Cain, who used to dislocate his shoulder up to six or seven times a game. "I just did what I thought was the right thing to do when I was in school."

Nevertheless, his injuries left quite a legacy. Since completing his collegiate career, Cain has had corrective surgery on his shoulder, had both ankles fixed because they were constantly dislocating, and he's due for two major knee surgeries.

But Cain has no regrets. He's just thankful to people like those at IPTAY for enabling him to attend Clemson.

"I am thankful that an organization like IPTAY was around when I was in school. And it's through the efforts of the people like Bert Henderson and Allison Dalton that continue to maintain good scholarship donations. I would not have graduated from Clemson, if it were not for IPTAY."

Chris Patton

It's been 35 years since a man named Patton took the Master's by storm. Youthful Billy Joe Patton and his baggy pants was in the hunt until the final few holes at the famed Augusta National course.

No amateur has been a threat since. That could change in 1990, however, as another amateur named Patton has burst on the amateur golf scene.

Clemson senior Chris Patton won the US Amateur championship at Merion Country Club in Ardmore, PA in late August and thereby received an automatic invitation to compete in the US Open, British Open, British Amateur and the Master's. He will play the first two rounds of each tournament with the defending champion, meaning he will tee it up with Nick Faldo at Augusta, Mark Calcavecchia at St. Andrews for the British Open and Curtis Strange at Medina Country Club in Chicago for the 1990 US Open.

But, it is the invitation to the famed Master's that caught his eye in particular.

"Every amateur dreams of playing the Master's," said Patton, who was a first-team All-American as a junior and second-team selection as a sophomore. "I am very excited about the opportunity to play in the Master's. I've been there to watch a couple of practice rounds and I've played it three times in practice rounds with our golf team, but I have never been at Augusta National for the regulation part of the tournament."

Patton is confident he can perform well at Augusta and his attitude is one of the reasons he just might rekindle memories of Billy Joe Patton. "I'm going to have a

good time at the Master's. Most people never get a chance to play in that tournament and I am going to enjoy the experience. I am not going down there with the goal of shooting a certain score, or making the cut or something like that. All that will do is add pressure to the situation."

Handling pressure is the key for any golfer. You are on your own, you against the course and the field, or individual competitor, as is the case in match play. "I try to keep the game in perspective. I like to compete, but I also have fun when I play golf. During my round I like to converse with people.

"A lot of guys are all business. They hit the ball and say, concentrate, concentrate, concentrate as they walk to their next shot.

"After I hit the ball, well I might have 250 yards to walk until I reach the ball, so why not carry on a conversation with someone. It is my way of getting the pressure off the situation."

Patton will probably be talking a blue streak at Augusta next April and the man he may be speaking with the most is Clemson Coach Larry Penley. The Clemson mentor took the Tigers to a number-three finish at the NCAA last year and he has now taken Clemson to NCAA play eight years in a row. Penley will be filled to the brim with pride on opening day of Augusta.

"It will be a big thrill when he tees it up on Thursday with Faldo," said Penley, himself an All-ACC golfer at Clemson. "I've been there before and watched Oklahoma State players and other college players and wondered what it would be like to have one of your own out there. I can't wait.

"Chris will do well at Augusta National because the course is suited to his game. Merion was not really his type of course because it took the driver out of his hands on many holes. But, he can turn it loose at Augusta. We will be there for moral support for every stroke."

The entire scene will be a dream come true for Patton, who did not start playing golf until he was 13-years-old. "When I was growing up I played little league football, baseball and basketball and I was pretty good in those sports. One day some of my friends were going golfing so I thought it would be another sport to try. I was ready for a new sport, I was a little bored with the others.

"I have always been competitive and the guys I was playing with were good players. They were shooting in the 80s and 70s, and if I was going to compete with them I needed to practice, so I worked on it. But, it was all on my own. I still have never had a formal lesson in my life."

Patton bid good-bye to the other sports when he matriculated to Hillcrest High School near Greenville, SC. He played only golf in high school and won the state championships in 1985 and 1986. Those titles led to a Clemson scholarship and three years into his career he has earned two All-ACC certificates, two All-America tickets and the second lowest stroke average in Clemson history.

Patton has done all this without a formal lesson. Just think what he might do if he plays a practice round with Greg Norman, his favorite pro.

"I hope we can work out a practice round with Greg Norman at Augusta," said Patton with a smile. "He is the pro I admire the most because he has the overall game and is a classy guy. He has handled every situation well. Time and again he has had reason to be upset with the way the media has treated him after a difficult ending to a tournament, but he always keeps smiling. I just have a lot of respect for him."

Chris Patton's respect level is also rising. Everyone from **Golf Digest** to **Sports Illustrated** reported his US Amateur championship. A solid performance in April at Augusta could bring him to another level in the golf world and add another Patton to the list of amateur legends who have strolled the fairways of Augusta National.

As long as Clemson fans follow the Tigers, they continue to search for the perfect Clemson football trivia question. One that will be sure to stump even the hard-core Tiger fans will be, "What non-football coach ran down the hill with head coach Danny Ford prior to the 1988 Florida State-Clemson football game in Death Valley?"

The answer: Clemson basketball coach Cliff Ellis.

It was a chilly, rainy day when preseason number-one ranked Florida State came into Death Valley to face the number-three ranked Tigers, but the orange-clad faithful (84,576 strong) were hopeful that they could brighten things up a bit. A good reason for coach Danny Ford to try some Knute Rockne approaches to the game.

"Since coach Ellis went to Florida State and we are such close friends, I thought that it would be good for him to come in and speak with the team before the game and run down the hill with us", said coach Ford. "Our players get in a routine. They see an outside guy that knows what it is to be an athlete and it helps. It has nothing to do with preparing a basketball or football team, it just gives the players a little bit of added confidence knowing that someone else believes in them."

Coach Ellis agreed, "Athletes get tired of hearing the same person over and over again. It is easy at the start of the season or when the conference games start to get the kids motivated, but the season gets awfully long. The pregame speeches just get you ready to play. They don't help you kick the winning field goal or score the winning basket, they just give you that effort to win."

Ellis was excited about the opportunity to speak with the football team before the Florida State game, but found out that he was not totally prepared for the contest.

"I went in and talked to the team and could tell they were ready to play," commented Ellis. "When I finished, coach Ford leaned over and asked me, 'We know this is your alma mater, but do you have the guts to run down the hill with us.' I laughed and said, 'you know I will.' "

"I wanted to show the team that it was not just a locker room talk. I wanted to show them that I wanted them to win big.

"It was a rainy day and I had gone to the game with sneakers," remembered Ellis. "Coach Ford looked down at my feet and said, 'No WAY, you will kill yourself going down that hill.'"

"So some of the managers rounded up some cleats for me and Danny told me to stick with him when we got off the bus. When we stepped out of the bus, I was a little concerned about running down the hill because earlier everyone was telling me about how steep the hill was when it rained. I just didn't want to hurt myself.

"I was having a hard time getting excited about running down the hill because I was more

concerned with just making it down. Then the cannon exploded and Ford took off and I was right behind him. Then all of a sudden, he yelled at the top of his voice and at that moment, I just started laughing. There was a big puddle at the bottom and he was all over it."

Although Ellis did make it safely down the hill, the Tigers lost to Florida State 24-21 on the now famous "puntrooski" and Ellis was handed the first loss of his football coaching career.

"It was a game where there was a challenge to get the football team ready," said Ellis. "I really regret the fact that we lost the game, but they were ready to play."

Since Ford used Ellis for a tough game, Ellis did the same with Ford and brought him in to the Clemson locker room for a must-win game with the ninth-ranked Duke Blue Devils. Coach Ford gave the Clemson basketball team a stirring pregame speech and then sat on the bench to witness Clemson defeat Duke 79-74 that night in Littlejohn Coliseum.

"I think both of us at times need help to break the daily routine and would like to have someone else come in and speak to the team," said Ford. "The young people get a kick out of it. At the same time, I think Cliff was in a situation where he had talked enough to his people and they had heard him enough during the basketball season and he wanted a change. So he asked me to do it and I was glad to do so. The only problem is that he still owes me one win!"

basketball games in which he delivered the pregame speech. Ford also delivered the pregame talk prior to a 65-62 win over Virginia in 1987-88.

When the seasons wind down for Ford and Ellis, their relationship even extends off the football fields and basketball courts.

"Our time frame is very difficult because the time that I am at my slowest is in the month of August and that is right when Danny is kicking it in gear," said Ellis. "Although in April and May we got on the IPTAY circuit and that is when we have fun together. One stop we always look forward to is going to Greenwood and ordering crayfish. Then we come back home the next day and enjoy the food and the company of each others' families."

It is very evident that a special relationship exists between the two coaches. As Ellis explains, "I think with the number of years that each of us has been in the business, we both know how tough coaching can be so there is an automatic camaraderie that exists between Danny and me."

Because of this great friendship, it's not surprising for fans to see the two coaches together. So, at the next Clemson game in Death Valley, don't forget to take a close look at the group of people "running or falling" down the hill. There just might be a coach out of uniform. Remember, Ellis still owes Ford a win.

Emergency Services

The Clemson University Athletic Department provides the following for your safety and emergency medical needs:

1. Advanced cardiac life-support stations in four locations (North stands, Upper North deck, South stands, Upper South deck). These units are staffed with skill-care nurses, physicians, cardiologists, internists, paramedics, and EMTs.
2. Mobile units of EMTs and paramedics are strategically located throughout the entire stadium.
3. Ambulances with life-support equipment are available in North stand and South stand areas and have prearranged routes for evacuation to local hospitals.

Learn to recognize these personnel and facilities.

WHAT TO DO IF EMERGENCIES ARISE

Please step back and give the organized stadium EMS personnel room to work. Well-intentioned attempts to help by untrained persons interfere with the effi-

ciency of the EMS system. If you have basic or advanced training in specific life-support methods, make your qualifications known and offer your help. Untrained personnel can be frequently more harmful than helpful.

Most emergencies occurring at the stadium result from pre-existing medical conditions. Bring your medical identification card or wear medical identification jewelry. Moderation is the key with dress, food, beverage intake and physical exertion. Our two more frequent serious medical problems at football games are allergic reactions to insect stings and heart attacks.

INSECT STINGS: Common at outdoor events. Treat immediately with ice. Seek medical advice. If allergic, carry a kit from your physician with you.

HOW TO RECOGNIZE A HEART ATTACK: The symptoms of a heart attack vary, but the usual warning signs are:

1. Uncomfortable pressure, fullness, squeezing or pain in the center of your chest lasting for two minutes or more.

2. Pain spreading to the shoulders, neck, jaw, arms, or back.
3. Dizziness, fainting, sweating, nausea and/or shortness of breath.

Expect a Denial

Frequently heart attack victims deny they're having a heart attack. The event is frightening or they don't want the embarrassment of a false alarm. Therefore, they delay getting help by ignoring their symptoms or rationalizing, "it's just indigestion."

Find out what's really wrong. Prompt response can dramatically increase chances of survival and recovery.

New therapies have been developed that can minimize heart damage and save lives if treatment begins within the first few hours of symptom onset. "Time is muscle." Get help or get to a hospital immediately.

Clemson Coaches

Today, the Clemson Athletic Department is paying tribute to former Tiger coaching legends who are members of the College Football Hall of Fame. John Heisman, Jess Neely and Frank Howard are the three former Clemson football coaches who have been selected as members to the College Football Hall of Fame. But, there are many other outstanding men who have contributed to Clemson football heritage.

The following is a tribute and a brief history of all head football coaches who have guided Clemson through nearly a century of football.

WALTER RIGGS, 1896, 1899

Walter Riggs could easily be called the father of Clemson Football. He coached the football program at Clemson, not only because he had football experience, but he was also one of only two people on the Clemson campus to have ever seen a football when the sport started in 1896. (The other person was Frank Thompkins who played in the backfield on Clemson's first team in 1896).

On September 30, 1896, a small crowd gathered in one of the barrack's rooms and the group discussed the feasibility of organizing a football association. A committee of three was appointed to consult professor Riggs as to management of a football team and to ask his aid as coach.

When the Tigers traveled to Furman for their first game on October 28, 1896, it was the first time that many of the players had ever seen a full-size regulation football field.

Riggs stepped down as football coach after the first season because the players wanted him to devote all of his time to being a professor in

the engineering department.

Clemson athletics and Riggs however could not be split. Although not given the title, Riggs also was the equivalent of an athletic director, managing money and making contracts with other teams.

Riggs could easily be called a loyal man, as he answered the need of the Clemson football team in 1899. The Clemson Athletic Association was low on money and could not afford to hire a coach. So Riggs once again answered the call of the school and became the coach of the 1899 team for free.

Riggs originally came to Clemson from Auburn. He graduated with top honors in 1892 with a B.S. degree in electrical and mechanical engineering. At Auburn, he was captain and catcher of the baseball team as well as the manager and left end of the football team. He also served as class president and was the director of the Glee Club.

Upon his graduation at Auburn, he was assistant to the president of the college until 1896, then he made his trek to Clemson.

Riggs later became president of Clemson on March 7, 1911 and in 1915, a new football stadium with other athletic facilities was named in his honor as Riggs Field. It is currently the home of the soccer team. In two years of coaching, Riggs guided the Tigers to a career record of 6-3 overall.

W. M. WILLIAMS, 1897

Clemson's second coach, W.M. Williams, was a native of West Point, GA. He played at Auburn on the teams of '94, '95, and '96, under the coaching of John Heisman. He was considered the best blocking halfback in the south.

Williams led Clemson to the state champion-

ship and to a 2-2 season. During his time as coach, Clemson played two games in a matter of three days. Clemson was victorious over the Charlotte Y on October 23, but lost to North Carolina 28-0, on October 25.

JOHN PENTON, 1898

The Tigers' third coach, J.A. Penton of Alabama, was captain and starting guard on the University of Virginia teams of '93, '94, and '95. Penton also played fullback at Auburn in '97 under Heisman's coaching. Under Penton, Clemson played its first home game against Bingham. Clemson won 55-0, as W.C. Forsythe kicked every point after touchdown (11). In his only season at Clemson, Penton guided Clemson to a 3-1 record and the state championship.

JOHN HEISMAN, 1900-1903

Probably one of the most famous football coaches in America, John Heisman, coached at Clemson from 1900 to 1903. Heisman turned Clemson from virtually an unknown college to a southern powerhouse at the turn of the century.

Heisman attended Brown University, taking the two-year law course offered at that time, and was a center on the football team. In the fall of 1889, he transferred to the University of Pennsylvania. He lettered in football at both schools and graduated from Pennsylvania in 1893.

In the spring of 1894, Walter Riggs was a graduate manager for the football team at Auburn. It fell on his shoulders to find a coach for the season of 1895. Riggs wrote to Carl Williams, the Pennsylvania captain of 1894, asking him to suggest a suitable coach. He replied recommending J.W. Heisman, an ex-Penn player, and his coach at Oberlin.

After several weeks, Riggs finally found Heisman in Texas, who engaged in raising tomatoes. Having sunk about all of his capital into the tomato venture, he was glad to go back to his old love and he readily went to coach at Auburn for \$500.00 a year.

His coaching career began at Oberlin in 1892 and lasted 36 years. It included positions at Akron, Auburn, Clemson, Georgia Tech, Penn, Washington and Jefferson, and Rice University. He had an overall career record of 185 wins, 70 losses, and 17 ties.

John Heisman invented the hidden ball trick, the handoff, the double lateral, and the "flea flicker." He pioneered the forward pass, arguing that it would scatter the mob. Coach Heisman also originated the center snap and the word hike (Previously the center used to roll the ball on the ground to the quarterback).

Heisman guided Clemson to its first "bowl game" in 1903. Clemson and Cumberland met on November 26, for the championship of the South. Cumberland who had earlier defeated Auburn, Alabama, and Vanderbilt, was considered to be champion of the southern states of Louisiana, Mississippi, Alabama, Tennessee,

and Kentucky. The game was played on a neutral site, Montgomery, AL. Cumberland and Clemson fought to a 11-11 tie. After the news got back to Clemson that the game ended in a tie, the students and the local townspeople built a bonfire and paraded around the campus.

Overall, Heisman took Clemson to a 19-3-2 record in his four seasons at Clemson. His .833 winning percentage is still the best in Clemson history. He was also the Clemson baseball coach in 1901-1904.

SHACK SHEALY, 1904

Shack Shealy holds the distinction of being the only Clemson player to have coached his alma mater. Shealy lettered at Clemson in 1896, 97, 98, and 99 and later played two years at Iowa State. Shealy was a four-year starter playing right guard, end, and in his senior year, he played in the backfield. Shealy only coached Clemson one year in 1904, and guided the Tigers to a 3-3-1 record overall, which included wins over Alabama, Georgia, and Tennessee.

ED COCHEMS, 1905

Ed Cochems lettered at the University of Wisconsin in 1899, 1900, and 1901. Cochems was described as a great halfback or end on the strong Wisconsin teams at the turn of the century, including the undefeated team of 1901. During his playing career he had a 100-yard kickoff return in a 35-0 win over Chicago in 1901, and had four touchdowns in a game against Notre Dame in 1900. After his playing days, he immediately went into coaching. He was the head coach of North Dakota in 1902 and 1903 and briefly an assistant with former teammate, Art Curtis at Wisconsin in 1904.

Cochems led Clemson to a 3-2-1 record overall, including wins over Georgia, Alabama, and Auburn. After his Clemson career, he was head coach and athletic director at St. Louis University in 1906. The forward pass was legalized in 1906. Cochems did something with the pass at once in his first year at St. Louis, while other coaches stuck with the running game. He taught his players not to throw the ball end over end but instead like a projectile — a spiral. He called this new weapon a projectile pass.

In 1906, St. Louis went undefeated rolling up 407 points while allowing its opponents only 11. Historians credit Cochems as being the first coach to use and perfect the first legal pass in a game. The first studied refinements in throwing the ball, which led to the spiral, occurred in 1906 under Cochems. Brad Robinson of St. Louis University threw the first forward pass to Jack Schneider in a game played Sept. 5, 1906 in Waukesha against Carroll College.

BOB WILLIAMS, 1906, 1909, 1913-1915

Bob Williams is probably the only coach in the country to have coached football at two schools that are involved in rivalry. Williams coached football at both Clemson and South Carolina. Before coming to Clemson he coached at Davidson in 1905. He coached at South Carolina for

two years and guided the Gamecocks to a 6-1 record in 1902 and a 8-2 slate in 1903.

During his South Carolina career, he administered the most unexpected defeat of Clemson, as he beat a heavily favored John Heisman team, 12-6 in 1902.

Williams served the Tigers as head coach a total of three terms 1906, 1909, and 1913-15. Between the years of 1915 until 1926, Williams practiced law in Roanoke and was the city's mayor.

One of the highlights of his Clemson career included leading the 1906 Tigers to an undefeated season (4-0-3), which included wins over Georgia, Auburn, Tennessee, and Heisman-coached Georgia Tech.

FRANK SHAUGHNESSY, 1907

Frank Shaughnessy is known for his ability as an administrator in sports as he served many positions, from a professional hockey coach to the commissioner of the International Baseball (Triple A) League.

A graduate in law at Notre Dame, he was captain of the baseball and football teams his junior and senior seasons. After his graduation in 1905, he coached baseball at Notre Dame. The summer before coming to Clemson he played for Ottawa of the Eastern League. That summer, he played left field and had a .352 batting average. He also played with Washington and the Philadelphia A's.

At Clemson he coached the baseball teams in 1907 and 1908, and was head football mentor in 1907.

During his lifetime, Shaughnessy made his name in baseball, but he took part in many other

sports. Besides being a sports legend at Notre Dame, he managed the Ottawa Senators of a professional hockey league and coached football teams at Clemson, Washington and Lee and McGill University. He retired as the president of the International Baseball League.

During his football playing days, in a game against Kansas, Shaughnessy raced 107 yards for the only Irish touchdown as Kansas won 24-5. Football fields were 110 yards back then and touchdowns were five points. This is still a Notre Dame record.

JOHN STONE, 1908

John Stone is one of three coaches to have graduated from Vanderbilt and later become a Clemson head football coach. At Vanderbilt, he was a member of the All-Southern Football team for four seasons. He was a big man for his time, standing 6'2". Clemson was 1-6 in 1908, but the Tigers lost many of their star players and substitutes from 1907 due to a college prank which saw as many as 306 students expelled from school.

FRANK DOBSON, 1910-12

Frank Dobson was a professional baseball player before coming to Clemson as he was the property of the Pittsburgh Nationals. Walter Riggs, President of the Clemson Athletic Association, thought it was unfair to keep shuffling coaches year after year. Riggs offered Dobson a three-year contract, which was the first contract offered and signed by a Clemson coach.

At Clemson, he coached football, basketball and baseball. He was Clemson's first basketball coach, leading Clemson to its only undefeated season in history in the inaugural season 1911-12, (4-0). In 1912-13, Clemson finished the basketball season with a 9-5 record. He was head baseball coach in 1911-1913.

WAYNE HART, 1916

Wayne Hart coached Clemson in 1916 and led Clemson to a 3-6 finish. Under Hart, the Tigers defeated state rivals Furman and South Carolina.

Hart played three years at tackle for Georgetown. He also played one year at George Washington. He was a member of the All-South Atlantic team for four years. He was also an assistant coach at Georgetown. In 1913, he coached the Washington Vigilants, a professional football team, and did not lose a game. The last two seasons before arriving at Clemson, he coached various sports at Technical High School in Washington, D.C.

EDWARD DONAHUE, 1917-20

Edward Donahue had to be one of the most organized men in the country. During the 1918-19 school year, Donahue was head coach of four Clemson sports: football, basketball, baseball, and track. During his four-year career at Clemson, he was head football coach for four seasons, head basketball and baseball coach for two seasons, and head track coach for one season.

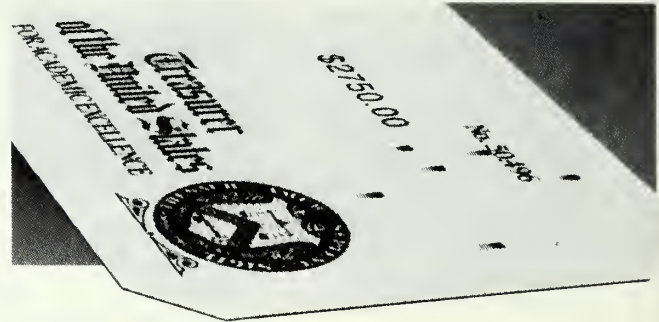

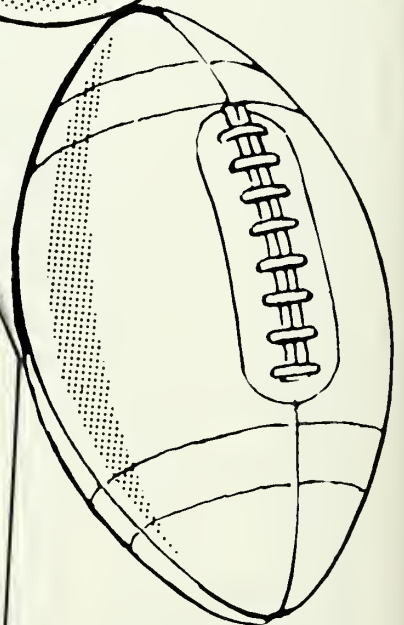
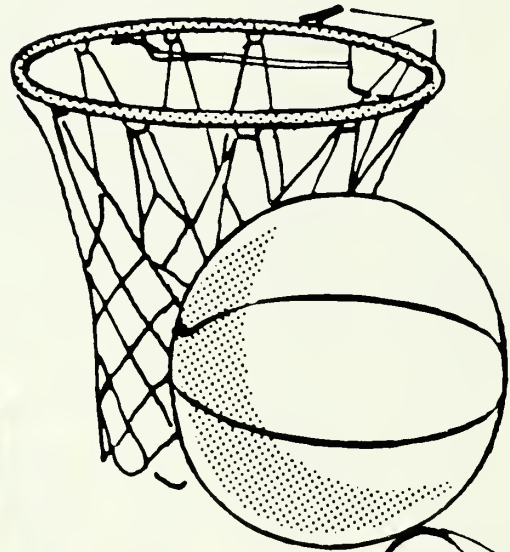

Released for the first time in March 1989, this historic set of pins is the first to commemorate Clemson University participation in major collegiate bowl competition, beginning with the 1940 Cotton Bowl played January 1, 1940 in Dallas, Texas.

Each pin displays that year's distinctive Bowl Logo and the helmets of the Tigers and their opponent, with the points scored under each team's helmet. Each pin has a hanging drop piece that proclaims the name and emblem of the Bowl Champion.

With the assistance of Bob Bradley, Clemson Sports Information Director and his staff, the archives at Clemson University were researched for near forgotten authentic artwork from the fifteen bowls the Tigers participated in. As you look at your pin set, notice the helmets in the 1940 Cotton Bowl were brown leather with no face mask, also notice the absence of the now familiar "Tiger Paw." The Tigers first bowl appearance using the "New Plastic Helmets" was the 1949 Gator Bowl. The face mask made its first Clemson Bowl appearance in the 1957 Orange Bowl and the now famous "Tiger Paw" made its bowl debut in the 1977 Gator Bowl. The results of the research are designs for each pin that pull together and preserve the historic past of Clemson Football.

This Commemorative Clemson University Pin Collection is limited to 15,000 sets. Each set is numbered, with the production of the 15,000th set the molds will be destroyed, thus assuring the purchaser that this commemorative pin set is truly a collectors piece that will appreciate in value year after year.

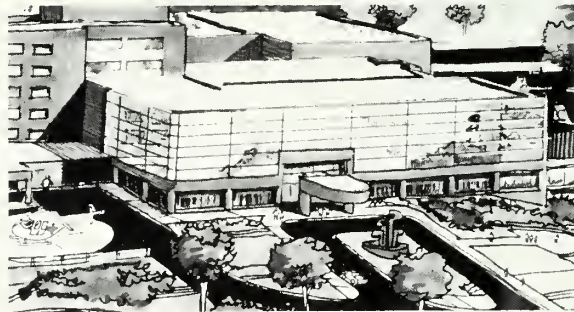

The Clemson University athletic program is competitive on the national level. In the 1988-89 year Clemson was one of just eight schools in the country to have teams participate in a bowl game (1989 Citrus Bowl), the NCAA basketball tournament (1989 West Regional), and the NCAA baseball tournament (Atlantic Regional). Clemson was one of only three schools to gain at least one win in each postseason event, tied the ACC record for overall conference championships in an academic year and finished sixth in the national All-Sports poll.

The success of the Clemson athletic program comes during a time when the integrity and accountability of the academic progress of student athletes are receiving national attention. IPTAY has been a large part of this success by being committed to the student athlete.

IPTAY is recognized as one of the oldest, largest and most successful athletic fundraising organizations in America. IPTAY was the first athletic fundraising organization in the country to top the two, three, four and five-million dollar marks in annual donations. The 1988-89 academic year marks the 25th consecutive year of increased contributions to the IPTAY scholarship fund.

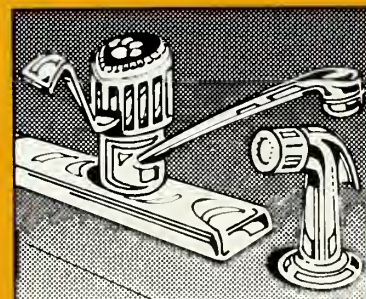
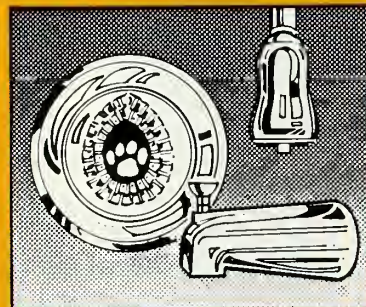
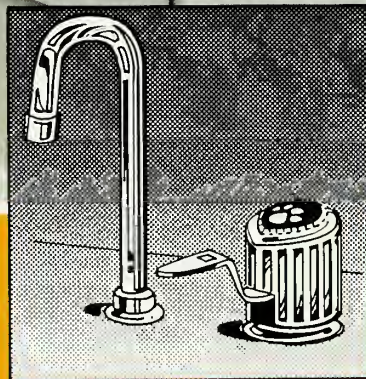

Dalton, a 1955 graduate of Clemson and president of Piedmont Paper in Asheville is joined by his wife, Betty.

The invocation will be delivered by the Venerable Frederick C. Byrd, Archdeacon at Holy Trinity Episcopal Church in Clemson.

Accompanied by the Clemson University Chorus, the Tiger Band offers its rendition of "America The Beautiful", directed by Dr. Richard E. Goodstein. The Pershing Rifles Company C-4 then presents the colors as Dr. Bruce Cook directs "The Star-Spangled Banner." Finally, chorus director Daniel Rash conducts the chorus and band in the Clemson Alma Mater.

Close to the hearts of all Tiger faithful stands the second "legend" to be honored during today's pre-game festivities, former Clemson Head Coach Frank Howard. Prior to the game, Atlantic Coast Conference commissioner Gene Corrigan and Clemson University president Max Lennon will present coach Howard with a College Football Hall of Fame plaque. Howard will be officially inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame during ceremonies at the Waldorf Astoria in New York City on December 5.

Howard won 165 games at Clemson, including a still conference record 98 victories as an ACC coach during 1953-69. He led Clemson to six bowl games, six conference titles and six final Associated Press Top 20 rankings.

Wrapping up this truly special pre-game show will be what coach Howard has called, "One of the most exciting 25 seconds in college football." The Tigers entrance

will mark the 207th time the Clemson team has run down the hill prior to a game in Memorial Stadium.

Today's halftime show features a salute to television theme songs, appropriately focusing on Saturday morning entertainment. Cartoon theme songs from such classics as The Flintstones, The Jetsons, The Bugs Bunny Show, Yogi Bear and Bullwinkle are highlighted. The percussion section, led by captain Steve Hall, is showcased in a tribute to television's golden girl of comedy, Lucille Ball. Rounding out their segment of halftime is the theme song to Peter Gunn, arranged by Robert Smith.

The "Olympic Fanfare and Theme," arranged by Jay Bocook, serves as a backdrop to a tribute to all Clemson University students in a Centennial of truly worldly proportions. Students carrying flags from all 50 states, three United States territories and approximately 75 countries represent the diverse nature of the Clemson student body. The idea, according to Robbie Binnicker of the University's Centennial Committee, is to create a "binding effect, in that all students, no matter what flag they carry, come under the centennial flag in the centennial year."

Concluding the halftime show, the familiar voice of veteran band announcer Nick Peck prepares the Tiger faithful for an exciting second half of Clemson football, as he introduces the "Song That Shakes the Southland" — TIGER RAG!

Edward Donahue was an outstanding athlete at Washington and Lee as he played in the backfield on the football team and played catcher on the baseball team. Upon graduation, Donahue was an assistant coach in football and was the head coach in baseball and basketball.

E. J. STEWART, 1921-22

E.J. Stewart was head football coach for two years at Clemson, 1921-22. However he coached more than one sport during his stay at Tiger-town. In the spring of 1921, Stewart coached the baseball and track teams while conducting spring football practice. In the fall, Stewart's team went 1-6-2, but improved to a 5-4 slate in 1922. He went on to coach the track teams in 1922 and 1923.

Stewart played football, baseball, basketball and track at Western Reserve University. Upon his graduation, he played, organized and served as head coach of the Massion, Ohio professional football team.

He also coached at Nebraska and the University of Texas. After leaving the University of Nebraska, he entered the automobile business as President and Treasurer of the Stewart Motor Co. Because of the economic conditions at the time, he decided to go back into coaching.

BUD SAUNDERS, 1923-26

Bud Saunders graduated from Missouri in 1911, with a bachelors degree in Law. At Missouri, he played football and basketball. He wanted to play two other sports, but a conference rule at the time forbid an athlete to participate in more than two sports.

Saunders was football coach at Knox College before coming to Clemson. In football, Saunders coached for four seasons, 1923-1926. He also coached the basketball teams in 1924 and 1925. His best season in football came in 1923, as he led the Tigers to a 5-2-1 slate.

JOSH CODY, 1927-1930

Josh Cody, fondly known as "big man," will always be a favorite to Clemson fans. Cody, a big man in stature, 6-2, 220 pounds, led Clemson to victories over South Carolina for four straight years. He is the only coach in Clemson history who has been around more than one year who never lost a football game to South Carolina. He also defeated Furman three straight years. Cody had a 13-0-1 record in home games and had a 72 percent winning mark overall, fourth best in Clemson history.

After a 5-3-1 start in 1927, Cody guided Clemson to two 8-3 seasons in 1928 and 1929. On May 6, 1929, to show appreciation to Cody, he was presented with a new Buick by the alumni, student body and faculty. This presentation took place in front of Tillman Hall.

In his final season, 1930, the Tigers finished with an 8-2 record.

Cody also coached basketball at Clemson for five years and guided Clemson to a 16-9 slate in 1930. During the 1928-30 seasons, Cody guided Clemson to a 22-4 mark at home.

JESS NEELY, 1931-39

Clemson played in its first bowl game under Jess Neely in the 1940 Cotton Bowl. The Tigers, unknown at the time, became a household word after beating heavily-favored Boston College 6-3 in the Cotton Bowl Classic. Neely came to Clemson in 1931, after having served coaching stints at Alabama and Princeton. The birth of IPTAY in 1934 and Neely's recruitment of Banks McFadden brought Clemson to another level of competition. In 1938, Neely had Clemson at second place in the Southern Conference with a 7-1-1 record. In 1939, Banks McFadden became Clemson's first All-American, and the team had its first final AP Top 20 Ranking (12th). The season concluded with a trip to Dallas for the Cotton Bowl. Neely left Clemson that Spring and moved on to Rice, where he took that Houston-based school to new heights. Neely is a member of the College Football Hall of Fame.

FRANK HOWARD, 1940-1969

HOOTIE INGRAM, 1970-1972

Hootie Ingram will be best remembered as the coach that made the Tiger Paw famous. Before his first year as head coach in the summer of 1970, Clemson introduced the Tiger Paw as the official logo of Clemson University's Athletic teams.

Ingram was a graduate from the University of Alabama in 1955. He also received his masters in school administration from Alabama and is now athletic director at Alabama.

The native of Tuscaloosa, AL was an All-Southeastern Conference defensive back for the Crimson Tide his senior year.

Ingram had his best year at Clemson during the 1971 campaign with a 5-6 overall record. He also finished second in the ACC with a 4-2

league mark in 1971.

RED PARKER, 1973-1976

Red Parker coached at Clemson for four years. He had his finest season in 1974. His 1974 team lived up to the theme "Excitement Galore, Clemson Football '74." They finished the season with a 7-4 record, which included an undefeated home record (6-0), and wins over Georgia, Georgia Tech and South Carolina.

Before arriving at Clemson, Red Parker spent seven years at the Citadel from 1966 through 1972. During this time, he guided the Bulldogs to a fine 8-3 finish in 1971.

Parker earned a BA degree in Physical Education from Arkansas A&M in 1953. Prior to his graduation, he received three letters each in the sports of football, basketball and track, as a running back-defensive back, second baseman-shortstop, and sprinter, respectively.

CHARLEY PELL, 1977-78

Charley Pell authored College football's Cinderella story in 1977.

The Albertville, AL product took a Clemson team that was 3-6-2 in 1976, and led the '77 Tigers to a sparkling 8-2-1 regular season mark and a berth in the Gator Bowl. It was Clemson's first final Top 20 season since 1959, and only his first year as head coach of Clemson.

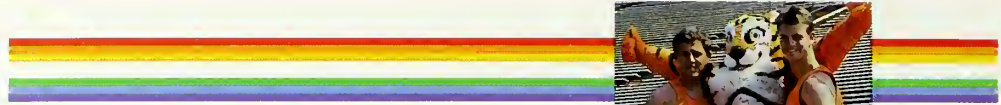
He was a near unanimous choice as ACC Coach-of-the-Year. A two-way starter and three-year letterwinner at Alabama, Pell was a member of the Crimson Tide's 1961 National Championship team and played in the Orange, Sugar and Bluebonnet Bowls during his Alabama career.

He came to Clemson in 1976 and served as assistant head coach and defensive coordinator that year.

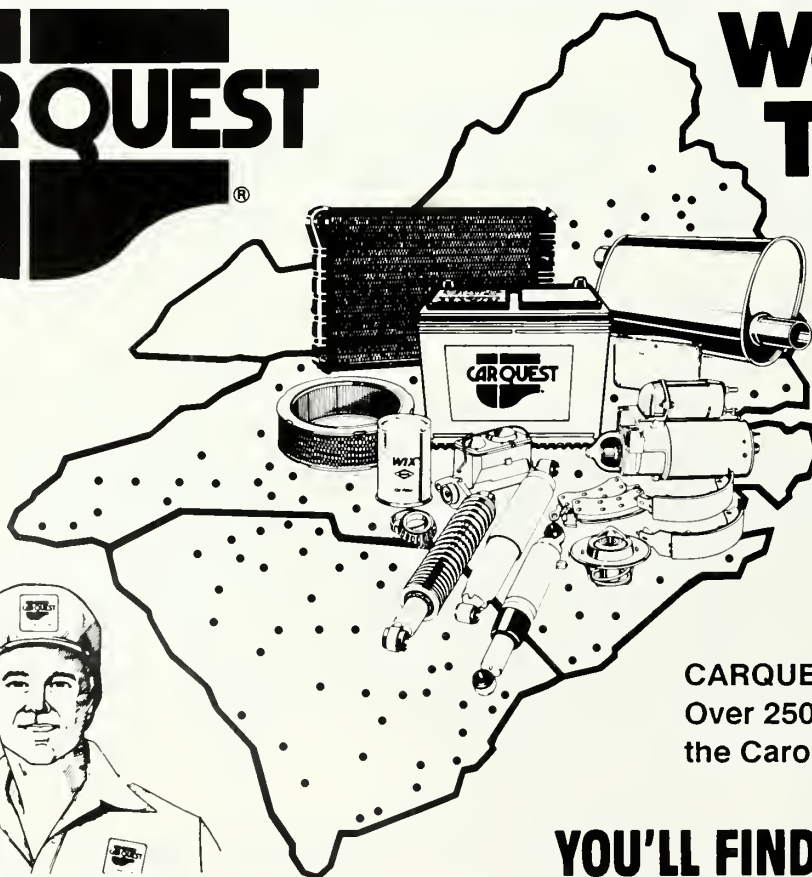

Chris Gardocki

When Clemson sophomore Chris Gardocki wants to "put his best foot forward," he doesn't need a tuxedo or a three-piece suit. This 6'2", 190 pound Tiger kicker — simply needs his #17 jersey and a pair of cleats. Unlike most kickers in football, though, Gardocki uses his left foot, and he uses it to fill two different shoes: placekicker and punter.

As a child, Chris Gardocki had always wanted to play football. Although his football career started in little league, he moved it to a back burner after one season and turned his attention toward soccer. His kicking ability developed during his 15 years playing that sport. Gardocki remembers how his brother suggested that he "try kicking for the football team" when he started high school.

That is exactly what he did. Following a trail blazed by Kevin Butler (now a Chicago Bear) Gardocki played football at Redan High School in Stone Mountain, GA. There his football career really began to develop. He started at punter and placekicker and, during his senior season, played quarterback.

Gardocki recalls two games in high school that stand out in his memory. First of all, he remembers "being really excited" and "having a lot of fun" playing quarterback for the first time to begin his senior year. Later in the season he threw a seven-yard pass with 20 seconds left in the 10-10 game against an arch-rival. Not only was the pass good for a game-winning touchdown, but it was also to one of his best friends.

When his high school season finished, Gardocki then turned to look for a college. He narrowed his choice down to Georgia, Florida, and Clemson; then he came to a Clemson football game. "I met the coaches. They were straight with me and told me how the school was academically and what I'd do if I came here. I just loved the people at Clemson. It's

not too big and it's not too small; it's just the right size for me. I really love it here."

As a freshman Gardocki played punter and placekicker. No Clemson player had handled both jobs since Charlie Bussey did in 1956. Although he did not start at punter until the Florida State game, he began as field goal kicker in the first game. He recorded the highest ever point total by a Clemson freshman by scoring 58 points last season.

Clemson has always had great kickers. Gardocki is doing well to keep the tradition alive. Besides being the highest scoring Clemson freshman ever, he also had the second best freshman punting average in Clemson history, second only to Dale Hatcher (43.4), who is now in the NFL with the Los Angeles Rams. Gardocki's 42.7 figure in 1988 was the sixth best average in Clemson's history. He is also second in the number of field goals in a season with 19 last year.

Chris Gardocki will have to adapt his methods somewhat this year if he is to reach those gaudy statistics. A new rule is in effect prohibiting the use of tees on field goals and extra points. He converted five of his first six field goal attempts without using a tee this season, however, and the change has not had an impact on his approach so far.

"I think it's a good rule," Gardocki says. "It will give the kickers who want to get into the NFL, especially the seniors this year, a chance to see what they can do without a tee. The pro scouts will look at them and see what they can do; instead of (them) coming out of college kicking off a tee, signing (a contract), then having to kick off the ground with poor results. It will make the game more exciting."

Gardocki has no special preparations for this season due to the rule change. "I relax as much as I can, not really thinking about the pressure of kicking. Then I go out there and just do the best I can. Concentration from the start of a game is the most important aspect."

Practice for kickers can become monotonous. For this reason, Gardocki and his teammates have developed some "games" to play during practice. After they get their kicking done, usually between the first and second sessions of practice, they play "football-golf" or "tight spiral". In football-golf, "you pick a target out and try to hit it in a certain amount of kicks." Tight spiral involves, "throwing back and forth to see who can throw the tightest spiral. We play to 10, whoever throws 10 perfect spirals (wins)." The teams are usually Gardocki and Jon Kubu against Roger Hutchins and Scott Beville. No word on who the winners are.

Even with all of his concentration on the game, Chris Gardocki still finds time for family and friends. He spent the first part of the summer visiting his girlfriend in Virginia. "She would hold the football for me while I kicked.

It helped me out a lot."

His fans are also very important to Gardocki. He is always more than willing to participate in media events such as Picture Day. He was the last player to leave the practice field that day this year. "It makes me feel really good. I love children and I love being with children. Like on Picture Day, I had a great time with the little kids coming up and signing autographs. I just hope I can have an impact on them to do the right things and be good people."

Paul Zimmerman, writer for *Sports Illustrated*, selected 23 players who he feels will be among the NFL elite by the mid-1990's. Among them were one high school senior and eight college football players. Chris Gardocki was listed as the punter/kicker. "It's really neat. I never expected anything like this. It is hard to picture myself being on this (list). I've got to prove myself and do the best I can."

With a 42.8-yard punting average and seven straight multiple field goal games under his belt heading into the Maryland game, most feel Mr. Zimmerman knows what he's talking about. He could join David Treadwell (Denver), Donald Igwebuike (Tampa Bay) and Dale Hatcher (LA Rams) as Tiger kickers in the pro ranks.

But few do both duties in the NFL. It would be an accomplishment that would remind many of old-time pro football when players performed multiple duties.

Gardocki could join those ranks. All he has to do is keep his best foot forward.

The Last Word

At some point each day every person should give thanks to the many blessings that have come his or her way. It makes no difference where one is, or in what manner the acknowledgement is made.

Maybe it's for food, or for a loved one, or maybe new clothes, possibly a spiritual experience, it could be for new-found or old friends, or for a solid education and the enjoyment of good health.

Maybe it could have been the result of the vision of a few people several decades ago. Several thousand past and present Clemson students can certainly be thankful for that vision. Many would never have been as fortunate without it.

We're talking about IPTAY. Very few organizations have showered their benefits on so many people ... sent them in the right direction ... with a good education where their influence would be felt by others for the betterment of mankind.

Dr. Rupert "Rube" Fike and a few others kicked an idea around several times before ever deciding on the course to take.

Actually, the first recorded information about IPTAY states that Capt. Frank J. Jervy, Coach Jess Neely, Coach Joe Davis and Capt. Pete Heffner were sitting in a car outside the stadium in Florence just after Clemson had lost to The Citadel in October of 1931. Heffner, a member of the military staff at Clemson, was vitally interested in athletics and assisted with the coaching in his spare time.

There was talk about raising money to assist Neely in giving football scholarships, something that was unheard of before then. Jervy wanted to form a "50 Club" where everyone would give \$50.00. Neely believed if he could get \$10,000 a year to provide scholarships he could give the Clemson fans a winning football team.

Jervy, who was working in Washington at the time, began corresponding with some of his

Clemson friends concerning the "50 Club" and one of those written was Fike, an Atlanta cancer specialist.

An informal meeting between 12 or 13 people was held in Columbia in October, 1932. The \$50 idea had raised very little money, and Fike, determined to find a way to strengthen Clemson's athletic program, which was as dark as the depression, stuck to his guns for the "smaller amount, more members" idea. He enlisted the aid of two other Clemson men, J.E.M. Mitchell and Milton Berry, both Atlanta residents.

Neely suffered through another losing season in 1933 and had only seven wins to show for his first three years.

Although there are several versions as to just how IPTAY started, a letter written by Fike to Neely, dated August 21, 1934, seems to pretty well pinpoint the exact date of formation. Fike said in his opening paragraph of the letter:

"Last night we had a little meeting out at my house and organized the IPTAY Club." He went on to say that those in attendance were George Suggs, Gene Cox, E.L. Hutchins, Bill Dukes, J.R. Fennell, George Klugh, Berry, Mitchell and himself.

The club was to be a secret order, but after four or five years, this idea was junked and everyone was invited to join in support of Clemson athletics.

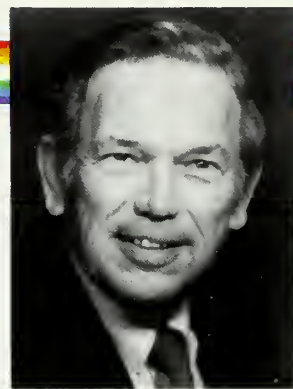
There were 185 members that first year and on the IPTAY year just closed, there were over 20,000 members and over \$5 million in contributions. IPTAY was born for just one purpose — to finance athletic scholarships at Clemson. That is still its purpose today.

Just what IPTAY has meant to Clemson, to the State of South Carolina, to the nation and the many individuals it has helped in the past 55 years would be difficult to put into words. But maybe Dr. Walter Merritt Riggs, who coached the first team in 1896 and who would later become Clemson president, had the right idea when he spoke these words on football, and athletics in general, in 1899:

"So long as the game of football helps to make better men of our students, stronger in body, more active in mind — men full of energy, enthusiasm and an indomitable personal courage; men not easily daunted by obstacles or opposition; who control their tempers and restrain their appetites, who can deal honorably with a vanquished adversary, and can take victory moderately and defeat without bitterness.

"And as long as football properly controlled and regulated helps the student in his college duties, instead of hindering him; gives zest and pleasure to college life, makes name and fame for the college on account of victories won, not only by skill and prowess of the team on the gridiron, but by their gentlemanly conduct in the streets of the town they play, in the hotels where they quarter, and on the trains.

"So long as it helps to bring about a closer bond of sympathy between students and members of the faculty by creating a common



interest apart from the routine duties — so long as in all these ways the best interests of his and other colleges are advanced, and the course of education aided in its highest mission, which is to make the best men out of the material at hand, so long we will say for the game of football, long may it live and prosper."

Although these words were spoken some 35 years before the formation of IPTAY, the ideas expressed by Dr. Riggs are exemplified today in the total educational program at Clemson.

Few athletes have left Clemson with the proverbial silver spoon, but what they learned on and off the athletic field has provided the impetus to face the outside world filled with its pitfalls as well as fame and fortune.

This is worth being thankful for.

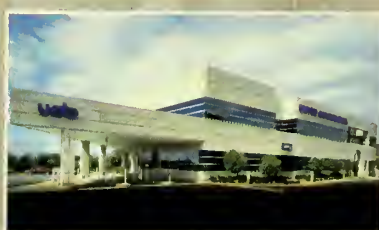
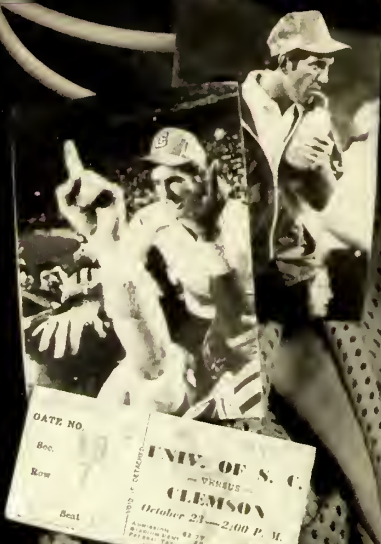
