
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
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
TODAY'S GAME

TIGERS & TERRAPINS BATTLE ON HOMECOMING IN DEATH VALLEY.

24 Straight Polls

Clemson is ranked #8 in the coaches poll and #10 by AP this week, giving the program 24 consecutive weeks (polls) in the top 25 of both polls. It is the longest streak of its kind for the Clemson program since the Tigers were ranked in at least one poll for 50 straight weeks from October 23, 1989 to October 24, 1992. Clemson was also ranked for 45 straight polls from November 3, 1986 to October 9, 1989. Therefore, the Tigers were out of the polls in just one of 95 polls from 1986 and 1992.

This Clemson streak of 24 in a row is third-longest in school history. Alabama, Clemson, Louisiana State, Oregon, South Carolina, and Stanford are the only schools in the nation to be ranked in each of the last 24 polls.



Memorial Stadium Winning Streak Record

Clemson can set the school record for consecutive wins in Memorial Stadium with a victory over Maryland today. Clemson has won 11 games in a row at home, tying the school stadium record set between 1989-91.

Head Coaches Danny Ford and Ken Hatfield combined to take the Tigers to 11 straight victories between October 21, 1989 and September 28, 1991. The streak was stopped with a 20-20 tie against Virginia on October 12, 1991. The Tigers went on to capture the ACC Championship that season

Believe it or not, that is the only other time Clemson has won 11 games in a row at Memorial Stadium, and that dates to the 1942 season.

Clemson has been outstanding during the 11-game home winning streak. The Tigers have scored at least 31 points in all 11 games and at least 35 points in 10 of the 11 contests. The Tigers have averaged 41.3 points per game in those contests and given up 23.8 points per game for an average victory margin of 17.5 points per game.

Maryland Struck By Injuries

Maryland was sailing along with a 4-2 record halfway through the season when an incredible series of injuries hit the quarterback position. To make a long story short, Head Coach Randy Edsall is on his fifth quarterback this season, a converted linebacker. The Terrapins have lost three games in succession.

Still, the Maryland program is much improved over last season and much of that is thanks to an outstanding defense. The Terrapins are 11th in the country in total

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defense, so they will be an interesting challenge to Clemson's offense that is ninth in the nation in total offense and seventh in scoring offense.

Maryland has done a good job stopping the run this season, and the pres-

candidate Joe Vellano is a big reason. The defensive lineman has an ACC-high 14 tackles for loss and six sacks. Linebacker Darin Drakeford has added 9.5 tackles for loss and six sacks.

Maryland does have some exciting offensive weapons, led by freshman wide receiver Stefon Diggs. Regarded as one of the top newcomers in the country entering the season, he is sixth in the conference in both receptions and receiving yards with 43 catches for 721 yards and six touchdowns.

Also a kick returner, Diggs is seventh in the nation in all-purpose yards per game (174.9). If you are looking for a comparison, that is just below Sammy Watkins' mark of 176.0 yards per game last year.



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

Clemson Tough on Defense in Second Half

Clemson has won five straight conference games by at least 14 points, a first in school history. 8owling Green is the only other team in the nation that can also make that claim. While the Tiger offense has been outstanding, the defense has come to play as well. Each of the last three Clemson opponents have failed to score more than 20 points. The Tigers are third in the ACC in scoring defense in conference games.

A look to the stats shows that Defensive Coordinator Brent Venables must be making some halftime adjustments. The Tigers have allowed just 36 combined points in the second half of the last five games, including only four touchdowns.

Duke's high-scoring offense scored just three points in the second half of Clemson's 56-20 win last Saturday. In terms of total offense allowed in the second half, the Tigers have yielded exactly 800 combined yards of total offense in the last five second halves. That is an average of 160 yards per game in the second half, and opponents are totaling just 4.5 yards per play.

The area where the defense has been especially efficient is holding the opposing team's offense after a Clemson turnover. On each of the last eight Clemson offensive turnovers, the Tiger defense has not allowed a single point on the ensuing possession. The defense has allowed just 17 points off turnovers (12) all year.

Clemson Successful on Homecoming

Today is Homecoming at Memorial Stadium. It has historically been a celebration that has included a Clemson victory nearly 76 percent of the time since its first celebration in 1922. The Tigers have an overall record of 65-20-3 (.756) in their 88 Homecoming games. That includes a 35-4-2 record (.878) in Homecoming games since 1971.

The first Homecoming contest at Clemson was during the 1922 season, a 21-0 loss to Centre. The Tigers were actually 0-4-1 through their first five Homecoming games, so it is surprising that the tradition continued. Clemson defeated Auburn in 1927 by a score of 3-0 for its first Home-

There is no record of a Homecoming game in 1930 or 1938, but the event has been held in conjunction with a football game every year since 1939, even through the war

The Tigers have just four losses on Homecoming since 1971. Georgia Tech upset #14 Clemson 30-14 in Danny Ford's final year (1989) as Clemson's head coach.

That was the last loss for Ford as the Tigers' head coach and the only time he lost a Homecoming game in 11 years as head coach. Georgia Tech went on to a 7-4 record in 1989, then won the national title the following year.

Clemson's other three losses on Homecoming since the 1971 season took place in 1997 to Virginia, 2001 to North Carolina, and 2010 to Miami (FL). Clemson had won eight games in a row on Homecoming prior to that loss to the Hurricanes.

The Tigers have a 5-2 record against Maryland on Homecoming, with the last meeting being a 35-14 Clemson victory in 2000.

Swinney in the Top 10 in ACC History

Head Coach Dabo Swinney has moved into the top 10 in ACC history among the winningest coaches on a winning-percentage basis. That list includes coaches who have been in the ACC at least three years, and it applies to overall games and conference games. In fact, Swinney has a better winning percentage in league games than he does outside the conference.

Swinney has a 37-20 overall record (.649), which is ninth. In ACC regular-season games, he is 24-11 (.686).

Hopkins 82 Yards Shy of School Record

DeAndre Hopkins is having a career year. The native of Central, SC has 62 receptions for 1,037 yards and 13 touchdowns in nine games. He is second in the nation in receiving touchdowns, just behind the 15 recorded by Stedman Bailey (West Virginia). Hopkins is one ahead of Margise Lee (Southern California).

Hopkins had another incredible game at Duke with four receptions for 128 yards and three touchdowns. All three touchdowns came in the first quarter. He became the first player in the nation this year with three receiving touchdowns in the first quarter of a game.

With his three touchdown catches, Hopkins became Clemson's career leader in touchdown receptions and also broke the season mark. He has 22 career touchdown receptions, two more than wide receiver Aaron Kelly had between 2005-08. Hopkins has 13 receiving touchdowns this season, one more than Sammy Watkins had as a freshman in 2011

Hopkins also broke the Clemson mark for consecutive games catching a touchdown pass in the win over Duke. It was the sixth straight game he had a receiving touchdown. He actually has a streak of nine in a row against FBS teams dating to last season's Orange 8owl. Furman is the only team to hold Hopkins out of the endzone this year.

Today, we will be watching Hopkins' yardage total closely. He needs just 82 receiving yards to break Kelly's school record in that category. Kelly had 2,733 receiving yards and Hopkins has 2,652 receiving yards. First though,

Hopkins will go past his uncle, the late Terry Smith, who had 2,681 receiving yards from 1990-93






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radition is a big part of college football and sports in general.

Most college football programs honor and embrace the traditions that were established by those who came before them.

However, tradition has many forms and means different things to different people. For graduate defensive back Xavier Brewer and his family, tradition means just one thing...football.

Brewer's father, Chris, and brother, C.J., both played in the NFL for the Denver Broncos and San Francisco 49ers, respectively. The younger Brewer also hopes to make it to the NFL. For the family, life has always been about football.

"All I have known is football, ever since I was little," said Brewer. "I didn't think there was anything else."

Having two relatives play at the highest level has set the standard for Brewer.

"There's really not any pressure to play in the NFL," he stated. "It's more of an aspiration or expectation that I have for myself that I can do it. I am thankful to have them in front of me to give me faith that I can do

The Bartram Trail High School graduate came to Clemson in 2008 with his high school teammate, Kyle Parker.

"Kyle committed before I did," recalled Brewer. "I wasn't really interested in Clemson at the time. I was more interested in Florida, Miami (FL), and Georgia.

"Then, Coach (Dabo) Swinney came down during my sophomore year, because he was recruiting one of our linemen. He said he was going to come back for me and I didn't really believe him, but the next year he came back. All he wanted was a visit

"I visited and that changed everything. I saw that this is a special place. Seeing the coaches and players and seeing what they were able to do showed me that this was a place where you can win and grow spiritually, earn a well-respected degree, and compete at the highest level of football."


After red-shirting in 2008, the Jacksonville, FL native appeared in all 14 games in 2009 and recorded 15 tackles in 119 snaps on defense.

As a sophomore in 2010, Brewer had a breakout season, as he made 10 starts and appeared in all 13 games. He recorded 54 tackles, 5.5 tackles for loss, and two interceptions. One of those interceptions was a 61-yard return for a touchdown in Clemson's victory over Maryland. He was a big reason the Tigers finished in the top 15 in the nation in scoring defense and total defense.

In 2011, Brewer improved again, starting in every game except for one and recording 60 tackles and three tackles for loss. He was a key player during Clemson's ACC Championship run.

He credits his improvement during his time at Clemson to focus.

"I have been trying to focus on what's next after learning from mistakes and focusing on how to make my good plays better," said Brewer. "I do that by spending time in the film room and evaluating my play, where I am my own worst critic."

Also in 2011, he was part of a defense that gave up just 10 points in the ACC Championship win over #3 Virginia Tech, which is his favorite moment as a Tiger.

"That is what you come to a school like Clemson for...to win a championship," explained Brewer. "The fact that it hadn't been done in 20 years with all the good teams from now to then, it is pretty incredible to be a part of that.

"It's something that Coach Swinney says all the time...records will be broken, but those championships will never be taken down. I'm going to come back here in 30 years and be able to tell my children that I was a part of that team. It's a blessing and an honor to be a part of that team."

So far this season, #9 has appeared in all nine contests (seven starts) and has played 452 snaps, third-most on the defensive unit. He has recorded 35 tackles, 2.5 tackles for loss, and an interception (in Clemson's 38-17 victory over Virginia Tech on October 20).

A part of the Tigers' success this season has been in part due to the defense's ability to improve and play better during the second half of games.

"Hopefully that will continue throughout the season," said Brewer. "We have played better in the second half of games, so hopefully we can continue to play better in the second half of the season as well." "THERE'S SO MUCH
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
With a few games left in his Tiger career, Brewer wants the team to finish strong.

"I want to win every single game, obviously," said Brewer. "I also want us to continue to get better and grow closer as a team. I want us to be able to look back at this season and know that we did something special."

Brewer graduated on May 11, 2012 with a degree in psychology. His plans for after college are to attempt to take the next step in his football career.

"I was the first male in my immediate family to earn a college degree and Coach Swinney's influence and stress on the importance of education helped me accomplish that goal.

"I plan to continue playing football as long as possible. I know one day, though, I will have to hang up the helmet and cleats. After that happens, I want to coach.



"There's so much that I've learned from coaches in the past. I have been blessed with a lot of great coaches, with my high school coach, Darrell Sutherland, and now Coach Swinney. I've learned countless life lessons from football that have helped

mold me into the man I am today. I wish to pass down those to the next generation."

With any luck, Brewer will look to carry on the family tradition and take his talents to the NFL before he begins his coaching career.






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or Jonathan Meeks, playing Division I football is a dream come true. The Rock Hill, SC native was not heavily recruited out of high school, but after a year at Hargrave Military Academy in Virginia, Clemson came calling. Ultimately, Meeks chose to join the Tiger program over Florida, Kansas, North Carolina, N.C. State, Penn State, South Carolina, Tennessee, and Virginia

"I formed a good relationship with the guys on my visit," recalled #5. "They were honest with me. I could tell that they were showing me Clemson and not trying to pull the wool over my eyes with all that flashy stuff and tricking me into committing."

It did not take long for Meeks to realize that there is something in these hills.

"It just felt right for me here. I didn't know for sure until I got here, but I knew once I was here, I was making the right de-

In 2009 and 2010, Meeks played in a backup role to talented safety DeAndre McDaniel. In 2009, Meeks saw action on 54 defensive snaps and some on special teams. He had a 17-yard interception return in the win against Boston College.

In 2010, Meeks played 13 games with one start. He registered 28 tackles, one interception, and two pass breakups in 256

snaps. His one interception (for 43 yards) came at home against Presbyterian Col-

As a junior in 2011, Meeks took over the starting spot at strong safety. He started 10 games and totaled 61 tackles. He led

the team in interceptions (3) and also recovered two fumbles.

So far in the 2012 campaign, Meeks has come into his role as a senior. He enjoys being able to mentor the younger players on the Tiger squad.

"I understand where they are coming from. I understand why they do not want to practice sometimes and I understand what it is like to not always play or start.

"I know the right things to say to make them feel better in those situations. I try to use myself as an example. I am playing now, but it has not always been like that. I try to give them encouragement, because I have been there before."

Meeks and the rest of the Tigers cherish their 2011 ACC Championship and are hungry for another one.

"When we won the ACC in 2011, it made everyone work even harder pre-

paring for 2012. It was very cool to win a championship, because I had never won one. So to win one at the FBS level was pretty awesome. It is a memory I will have forever. We now expect to win championships every year."

Meeks is definitely leading with his actions on the field. In the home game against Virginia Tech on October 20, he had a breakout performance with two interceptions. He took one of those interceptions 74 yards for a touchdown that gave the Tigers a 17-7 lead late in the first half and momentum.

His stellar showing did not go unnoticed. He was named the Jim Thorpe National Defensive Back-of-the-Week and ACC Defensive Back-of-the-Week.

That interception return moved him from outside the top 10 to fifth place in Clemson history in career interception

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return yards with 192, six ahead of teammate Rashard Hall, who is sixth with 186 yards. The record is 275 yards by Rex Varn, who played from 1976-79. Meeks' 74-yard return was the longest by a Tiger defensive back for a touchdown since Varn took one 94 yards for a score at N.C. State in 1978.

"Every player wants to have a breakout game that can get their name out there and also make the program and coaches look good," explained Meeks. "I am fifth all-time in career interception return yards at Clemson, and by the end of the season, I'd really like to be #1. Getting interceptions certainly helps the team."

To Meeks, being a part of the Clemson football squad transcends the meetings, practices, and games.

"I believe that our team is one of the tightest in the country," stated Meeks. "We probably spend more time together outside of football. They are not just my teammates, they are my brothers. We have become best friends and I love them."

Meeks, who will graduate in December with a degree in sociology and a minor in education, credits his parents, Carlita and Jonathan Browning, with making him the man he is, both on and off the field.

"My parents have been my biggest inspiration," said Meeks. "When I did not have any scholarship offers, they were always there pushing me to be better. They have always had my back, through thick and thin. They have been to every game since I have been at Clemson and are definitely my biggest fans."


He also credits Co-Defensive Coordinator and Defensive Backs Coach Charlie Harbison with helping him develop into the player and person he is today.

"He is a great man, and that is a reason why my parents wanted me to come to Clemson," said Meeks. "He is spiritual, a good coach, father, and husband. He is a good person to model your life after. We have such a good relationship. I know we will stay in contact once I graduate."

Upon graduation, Meeks plans to attempt a career in the NFL.

"My plan is to try to play professionally and give that a shot. If that does not work out, I want to be a high school teacher. I will graduate with a degree in sociology and a minor in education, so I may go back to school and get a graduate degree in education.

"I want to be remembered as a classy, humble, all-around good guy. I want to be remembered as a good football player, but also just as much as a good man."



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nsie "Lou" Fain, the 2012 Tiger Brotherhood Mother-of-the-Year, is a Clemson, SC jackof-all-trades. Ms. Fain is most recognized as the owner and instructor of the Fain School of Dance in Clemson, in many ways an institution she has run for over 56 years.

Though she chose to attend Winthrop University to earn a degree in physical education & dance, Ms. Fain is a lifelong Tiger fan. The native of Spartanburg, SC married her high school sweetheart, Cliff, in 1954, and they made Clemson their home.

Dr. Clifford Fain earned his undergraduate and graduate degrees from Clemson and a Ph.D. from Ohio State, then spent over 4S years as a ceramic engineering professor at Clemson. He now holds the distinct title of professor emeritus.

While Cliff was busy teaching, so was Ms. Fain. When D.W. Daniel High School opened its doors in August of 1955, Ms. Fain was chosen as the first girls P.E. teacher and basketball coach. Shortly thereafter, she opened the Fain School of Dance. Years later, she gave birth to the couple's daughter, Tish, who went on to be a cheer-

leader, member of Chi Omega, and seventime U.S. waterskiing champion.

Tish graduated from Clemson in 1983, and Tish's daughter, Sutton, also graduated from Clemson (in May of 2012) and is a member of Chi Omega. It is evident that the Fain's love of Clemson runs deep and their blood truly is orange.

"If home is where the heart is, then Clemson is truly my home," said Ms. Fain.

Ms. Fain has touched so many people's lives and done so much for the community. Her dancers performed in the very first Tigerama in the 1950s. She helped with Tiger Band under Directors Lovette, Butler, and Cook, and worked with Clemson's first majorette, Carolyn Willis Creel, in 1956.

In 1973, Ms. Fain choreographed Clemson's "Faculty Follies," which included Head Coach Frank Howard, Banks McFadden, Athletic Director Bill McLellan, Walter Cox, and President R.C. Edwards among others.

"That was pretty neat," said Ms. Fain.

In the early 1990s, Ms. Fain worked on the development committee for the Brooks Center for the Performing Arts. In 2003, she choreographed the musical "Heisman" that IPTAY and Garland Productions put on for their centennial celebration. In 2004 and 2005, she was honored with the title of Businesswoman-of-the-Year and attended the Business Advisory Council in Washington, D.C.

Fain's dancers give performances for schools in the area, nursing homes, pageants (such as the Miss Clemson pageant), and also participate in the Clemson Community Christmas Parade. It is evident that her passion is all about giving and helping young people succeed, all the while helping Clemson succeed as a community.

"I feel blessed that I got into work that I have loved so much," stated Ms. Fain. "I've enjoyed coaching, physical education, and dance. I love working with the students."

Ms. Fain has made her home, and her dance studio, open to all. Anyone who has taken dance in the community probably took it from Ms. Fain. In fact, many of her students have become cheerleaders and Rally Cats at Clemson University.

"I've taught so many of the University and coaching staff's children throughout the years."

For Ms. Fain, it is all about her relationship with the students. Every student who has ever taken a dance class from her has their picture somewhere on a wall in the dance studio.

"Each year, the students have added to my priceless 'memories.' I have watched my dancers grow from tiny tots to wonderful young men and women. They have become a part of our dance family."

Ms. Fain's most prized possession is her family's season tickets on the 50-yard line in Death Valley. The Fains purchased the tickets in 1954 and have attended Tiger games ever since.

"We have seen the stadium capacity grow from 20,000 to its present number," said Ms. Fain. "It's incredible."

When asked what the award means to her, she said, "I will always cherish the picture that I have in my mind of two handsome young men from Tiger Brotherhood coming forward, taking the microphone from me at the recital (on Mother's Day, 2012, when she found out she was named mother-of-the-year) and awarding me with what I feel and others have felt to be such an esteemed honor (pictured below).

"I cannot express how joyfully overwhelmed I am to receive this award."












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

JIM BARKER BEGAN HIS CAREER AT CLEMSON UNIVERSITY AS AN ARCHITECTURE STUDENT AND TRACK ATHLETE. AFTER YEARS AS A PRACTICING ARCHITECT, TEACHER, AND DEAN, HE WAS NAMED CLEMSON PRESIDENT IN 1999 AND HAS SINCE PRESIDED OVER A DRAMATIC ERA OF GROWTH IN ACADEMIC QUALITY TO SEE CLEMSON **BECOME A TOP-25 PUBLIC RESEARCH UNIVERSITY.**

im Barker has worn a lot of hats in his almost five decades as a member of the Clemson family - student, athlete, alumnus, teacher, dean, parent, fan, and president. On reflection, he thinks "student" is the most important.

"I often tell people I learned everything from plumbing to poetry in architecture school, and I use every bit of that knowledge as president of Clemson University."

A 1970 Clemson graduate, Barker was named president in 1999 with a mandate from the Board of Trustees to lead Clemson into the top ranks of American univer-

At his inaugural address in April of 2000, he said, "I am convinced that there is no university in America stronger than Clemson when we are 'One Clemson.' A united Clemson is unstoppable."

During the "One Clemson" decade hat followed, the university harnessed he competitive, determined spirit of the Elemson family to transform itself from a espected state institution into one of the nation's finest public universities

Clemson climbed from the third tier to a top-25 ranking among public universities in the 2012 U.S. News & World Report

guide to colleges, and has been recognized for value, affordability, and return on investment by Kiplinger's and Bloomberg/BusinessWeek magazines.

Ninety-two percent of seniors would choose Clemson again according to the National Survey of Student Engagement. Clemson also ranks among the top public universities in the percentage of alumni who make gifts to their school, another indication of quality and alumni satisfaction.

Clemson continues to attract top students and faculty. It is the top choice of Palmetto Fellows, the state's best students. A record-setting 18,502 undergraduate applications were received for the 2012 fall semester, and freshman enrollment in the Calhoun Honors College is up 16 percent.

The university provides an unmatched educational experience - intellectual development - for students and researchdriven economic development for the state of South Carolina.

Last year's news highlights also include

- · Dedication ceremonies were held for the Larry Penley Golf Clubhouse, the Class of 19S6 Academic Success Center, and the Lee Hall expansion and renovation. Work will be completed this year on a new Life Sciences building.
- · The Will to Lead capital campaign, which raised \$608 million by the original completion date of June 30, 2012, has been extended, with a new goal of \$1 billion. Three families made gifts of at least \$5 million each to name the Glenn Department of Civil Engineering, and to build the Watt Family Innovation Center on campus and the Zucker Family Graduate Education Center near the wind turbine drivetrain test facility currently under construction in North Charleston, SC. These gifts support students, faculty, and facilities, including new athletic facilities.

Barker is a leading voice in higher education for South Carolina and the nation. He served on the NCAA Division I Board of Directors for four years, including three as chairman, and chairs the Working Group, rewriting the rulebook for NCAA athletics. He also delivered keynote addresses at the national Campus Development Summit and the South Carolina AIA conference in April of 2012


For his leadership, Barker has received the Order of the Palmetto, South Carolina's highest civilian honor, and The Cliff's Business Person-of-the-Year Award from Greenville Magazine. He has also been awarded honorary doctorates from the Medical University of South Carolina, South Carolina State University, and Mars Hill College.

A native of Kingsport, TN, Barker received his bachelor of arts degree from Clemson in 1970 and his master of architecture & urban design degree in 1973 from Washington University (Saint Louis, MO), which also recognized him with its Distinguished Alumnus Award. He is a Fellow of the American Institute of Architects and the Institute for Urban Design.

As Clemson's President, Barker remains committed to the classroom. Each spring, he is part of a team that teaches an undergraduate course exploring "a sense of place" in architecture, literature, and his-

In his spare time, what there is of it, he maintains the daily fitness regimen of a life-long athlete and enjoys playing with his grandchildren. He is widely acclaimed for his pen-and-ink drawings of campus buildings and his watercolor paintings.

Barker and his wife, Marcia, have two sons, Britt and Jacob, a daughter-in-law, Rita Bolt Barker, and two granddaughters, Madeline and Eliza.





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he 2011-12 academic year was a rewarding time for Clemson Athletic Director Terry Don Phillips, who announced in August that the 2012-13 academic year will be his last at Clemson.

One of his goals when he came to Clemson was to help the school's football program return to championship form. That goal became a reality when the Tiger football program under Dabo Swinney, who he had hired in December of 2008, led the Tigers to their first league title in 20 years with a resounding 38-10 win over #3 Virginia Tech in Charlotte, NC.

The program defeated a school-record four top-25 teams along the way, including two wins over future Hall of Fame Coach Frank Beamer's Hokies. That 38-10 victory in Charlotte gave the Tigers a 10-win season for the first time in 21 years.

It was also a successful season off the field. From an academic standpoint, Clemson's APR score

of 983 was #7 among FBS schools, and Clemson was the only BCS school to win a conference title and finish in the top 10 in the nation in APR. Sixteen of Clemson's 19 sports had APR scores of 970 or better and those 19 sports had a collective GPA of 2.99, the highest on record.

Overall, six sports finished in the top 25 of their respective sports, there were three ACC Championships celebrated, and four wins over top-ranked teams. A defending National Champion was defeated in two different sports on Clemson's home turf as well.


The Tigers have competed at a high level since Phillips came to Clemson from Oklahoma State in the summer of 2002. In his first year, the Tigers won the National Championship in golf, just the fourth team national title in school history.

From 2008-09 and 2010-11, Clemson and Florida State were the only schools in the nation to go to a bowl game, the NCAA Men's Basketball Tournament, and the NCAA Baseball Tournament each season.

One of the reasons for Clemson's level of success as a total sports program has been Phillips' emphasis on improving facilities. In 2009, the football staff moved into he WestZone at Memorial Stadium. It was day that brought a smile to everyone asociated with the program, but especially hillips, who had been working toward hat day before he arrived in 2002.

Phillips' vision for the WestZone was to reate a top-of-the-line facility for the footall program, but at the same time have a ositive effect on the total sports program. he facility at Memorial Stadium now cretes more office space, new locker rooms, nd training room and strength training icilities for the Olympic sports programs.

Every sport has realized a facilities enancement since he came to Clemson and ie construction has not stopped. The ger football program will enjoy a new door facility by the end of this year. The



baseball program will soon break ground on a new locker room and player lounge facility, and the basketball programs are expected to break ground on a new facility within the next 18 months.

The Clemson men's golf program opened the Penley Building last fall and the women's golf program, which will begin play in 2013, will have a new facility at the Walker Course.

Phillips has been recognized for these accomplishments in recent years. He was named one of the 100 Most Influential Sports Educators in America in 2008 by The Institute for International Sport at the University of Rhode Island.

Phillips was also recognized nationally for his performance at Clemson in 2006 when he was honored by NACDA (National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics) as the 2005-06 Athletic Director-of-the-Year for the FBS Southeast Region. He was one of just four FBS athletic directors honored at the annual convention in New Orleans, LA.

Excellence in academics has been a lifelong pursuit. He has an undergraduate degree from Arkansas (1970), a master's degree from Virginia Tech (1974), a doctorate degree from Virginia Tech (1978), and a law degree from the University of Arkansas School of Law (1996). He is a member of the Arkansas Bar, South Carolina Bar, American Bar Association, and Sports Lawyers Association.

Phillips maintains a classroom presence by teaching a sports law section in Clemson's accountancy & legal studies department. In addition, he is past chair of the NCAA Division I Infractions Appeals Committee and continues to serve the committee as requested.

Prior to coming to Clemson, he served as athletic director at Oklahoma State. Football was transformed from a perennial losing status to very competitive, enjoying a return to bowl games after several years and establishing a winning record against rival Oklahoma. For this, he received the National Football Foundation Oklahoma Chapter Outstanding Contribution to Amateur Football Award in 2002.


Before leading the Cowboys, he was a senior associate athletic director at Arkansas (1988-94). He also served as athletic director at Liberty (1980,81) and Louisiana-Lafayette (1983-88). He was an assistant athletic director at Missouri (1981-83) and began his administrative career as an assistant athletic director at Florida (1979).

Phillips began his career in college athletics coaching football. He started as a graduate assistant at Arkansas in 1970 and 1971. He moved on to Virginia Tech as an assistant coach (1971-78) before joining the ranks of athletic administration. At Virginia Tech, he served on coaching staffs that included future Clemson Head Coaches Charley Pell and Danny Ford.

Winning has been on Phillips' resumé since his playing days at Arkansas. He lettered on three Frank Broyles teams, where he and his brother, Loyd, an Outland Trophy winner, were starting defensive tackles, the first brother combination to start together under Broyles. Arkansas had a 27-5 record in the three years, played in two Sugar Bowl games, and he played in the memorable 1969 national title game against Texas, a contest that continues to be featured on ESPN Classic.

In 2010, he joined Loyd in the University of Arkansas Hall of Honor.

Phillips has two children, John Dennis and Sarah-Jane, and three stepchildren, Meagan (Clemson graduate and former Tiger Band member), Marshall, and Madison. His wife, Tricia, is a graduate of the University of Missouri School of Journalism and earlier enjoyed a career in athletics and development. She is currently active in the Clemson and Seneca communities.





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t 42, Dabo Swinney is the youngest head coach in the ACC and one of the youngest in the country. However, his resumé is already stuffed with many significant accomplishments on a school, ACC, and national level.

First, his mere appointment to the position was significant. In October of 2008, he was named Clemson interim head coach, replacing Tommy Bowden, who had been his position coach as a player at Alabama and was Clemson's head coach since 1999. He led the Tigers to a 4-2 record over the remainder of the 2008 regular season, including a victory over Steve Spurrier's South Carolina Gamecocks in the regularseason finale. That strong finish led to a Gator Bowl bid against Nebraska.

On December 1, 2008, the interim tag was removed from the title and he was

named the program's head coach. At the time, there had been 28 interim head coaches at the FBS level since 1970 and those coaches had combined for a record of 26-86-2. Only one of those 28 interim coaches posted a winning record, and that was Swinney. When he was hired as the head coach, Swinney became just the second interim coach to be elevated to the head coach position at the same school during that time period.

In four years (three full seasons) as

head coach, he has directed the Tigers to a 29-19 overall record (.604) and a 19-10 mark (.655) in ACC regular-season games. He has also led the Tigers to the ACC Championship game twice, won one ACC title, and has been named national coach-of-the-year.

In addition to leading the program to four bowl games on the field in his young career, his players have also excelled in the classroom. In his career as a head coach, his players have an APR score of 991, fifth-best among active FBS coaches.

His 2011 squad, which ended the season ranked #22 in the nation, captured Clemson's first ACC title since 1991 when it defeated #3 Virginia Tech 38-10 in the ACC Championship game in Charlotte,

NC. It tied for the highest-ranked team the Tigers defeated in history and was the most points scored by an ACC team against Virginia Tech since it joined the league in 2004. The victory, the Tigers' second over the Hokies in 2011, gave Clemson its first 10-win season since 1990. The Tigers' four wins over top-25 ranked teams established a school record as well.

The Tigers jumped out to an 8-0 record and a #6 national ranking after being unranked in the preseason. Games

3-5 marked a tough stretch, as Clemson hosted #19 Auburn, who entered with a national-best 17-game winning streak, and #11 Florida State along with a road game at #10 Virginia Tech. The Tigers were victorious in all three contests by scores of 38-24, 35-30, and 23-3, respectively, marking the first time in history that an ACC team won three consecutive games over top-25 ranked (AP) teams.

For his efforts, he was named Bobby Dodd National Coach-of-the-Year in 2011 to become the first Tiger head coach to win a national coach-of-the-year award since 1981, when Danny Ford directed Clemson to the national title.

Swinney, who was also one of five finalists for the Eddie Robinson National Coach-of-the-Year award, one of 10 finalists for the Bear Bryant National Coach-ofthe-Year award, one of 10 finalists for the Liberty Mutual Coach-of-the-Year award, and received the Regional AFCA Coachof-the-Year award in 2011, led the Tigers to their first Orange Bowl berth since 1981.

The 2010 season included wins over bowl teams Georgia Tech, Maryland, and N.C. State. The Wolfpack were ranked #23 in the nation and were leading the ACC in scoring. But the Clemson defense held N.C. State to just one touchdown and 13 points. The team excelled defensively in 2010 and was 13th in the nation in scoring defense and in the top 25 in both total defense and passing defense.

C.J. Spiller was a unanimous first-team All-American in Swinney's first year, and defensive end Da'Quan Bowers duplicated the feat on the defensive side of the ball. Bowers won the 2010 Bronko Nagurski Award as the nation's top defensive player, and he received the Ted Hendricks Award as the country's top defensive end. He was also a finalist for the Bednarik Award and Lombardi Award. He led the nation in



In 2009, Swinney's first full year as lead coach, he led the Tigers to their first hampionship of the ACC's Atlantic Division. The Tigers came just six points short of winning their first ACC title in 18 years. Winney was named ACC Coach-of-theeraby **Sporting News** and was a finalist or the Liberty Mutual Coach-of-the-Year ward.

Swinney accumulated nine wins, secind-most among all FBS coaches in their rst full year. The nine wins tied for fourthnost in ACC history for a first-year head oach. He also led the Tigers to their first owl win since 200S in the 21-13 victory yer Kentucky in the Music City Bowl.

Swinney's first season included a sixame winning streak at midseason, a reak that saw the Tigers score at least 4 points in every game, a first in school istory. During that stretch, the Tigers deated #8 Miami (FL) on the road. The 40-7 overtime victory tied for the highestnked team Clemson has defeated on the ad in school history.

Swinney became Clemson's interimed coach on October 13, 2008 when mmy Bowden stepped down. Then on ecember 1, 2008, the "interim" tag was moved, as he took over on a full-time basas the Tigers' 25th head coach. He had en Clemson's assistant head coach for years and was in charge of the wide ceivers since 2003.

Swinney took over a 3-3 team and led it a Gator Bowl bid against Nebraska. He ided Clemson to a 4-1 record over the t five games of the regular season, with only loss at #24 Florida State. That 4-1 cord to end the regular season tied for best mark in the ACC for that time ped. Four of his six regular-season opponts were later bowl participants.

The 1993 Alabama graduate joined the mson staff prior to the 2003 season. In

his first nine years as an assistant or head coach, the Tigers have finished in the top 25 of the polls five times and totaled 15 wins over top-25 teams.

Swinney coached his wide receiver position to a level of consistency that had not been seen previously at Clemson. He had a wideout finish first or second in the ACC in catches in five of his six years as an assistant coach. In his first year, he had three of the top-10 receivers in the ACC, a first in Tiger history. He has coached a First or Second-Team All-ACC wideout in eight of his nine seasons at Clemson, also an unprecedented feat at Clemson.

The Alabama native has a reputation as one of the top recruiters in the nation. In 2006, he was listed as the #5 recruiter in the nation by <u>Rivals.com</u>. It marked the second straight year that he was lauded by the website as a top-2S national recruiter. He signed 38 players in his five recruiting seasons as an assistant coach and was a major reason Clemson's 2008 recruiting class was rated #2 in the nation by <u>ESPN.com</u> when he signed 11 players. He was named one of the top-25 recruiters in the nation by <u>Rivals.com</u> in 2007 as well.

Swinney received a commerce & business administration degree from Alabama in 1993 after lettering three times (1990-92). A walk-on who went on to earn a scholarship, Swinney was a wide receiver on Alabama's 1992 National Championship team. He was also named Academic All-SEC along with being an SEC Scholaratele Honor Roll member in 1990 and

After his playing career, Swinney served as a graduate assistant from 1993-9S at Alabama, where he coached in the 1994 Gator Bowl and 1995 Citrus Bowl. In December of 1995, he received a master's degree in business administration from Alabama.

He became a full-time assistant coach at Alabama in February of 1996 under Head Coach Gene Stallings (now in the Hall of Fame) and coached a total of five seasons there on a full-time basis.

During his time at Alabama, Swinney was a part of six teams with at least 10 wins, five top-10 finishes, one national title (1992), three SEC Championships (1989,92,99), and five SEC Western Divi-

sion titles (1992,93,94,96,99) as a player and coach.

McCorvey coached at the Division I level for 26 years and went to a bowl game 17 of those seasons. Overall, he had 36 years of experience as a football coach. He coached or signed 36 players who went on to a professional football career as well.

In 2010, McCorvey was inducted into the Atmore (AL) Hall of Fame. The Atmore, Al. native is married to the former Ann Brown. The couple has a son, Marlon.



Brad Scott is in his 14th year with the Clemson program, but only his second in athletic administration. The assistant athletic director moved into administration in March of 2011 after 12 seasons as an assistant coach under Tommy Bowden and Dabo Swinney from 1999-10. His 12-year tenure, which included him working with the offensive line, is tied for the ninth-longest for a Clemson football assistant coach in the program's history.

Scott works primarily with the football program in various administrative duties, but he has department-wide responsibilities when it comes to serving as a liaison between Clemson and high schools in securing documents needed to gain admission to Clemson University

Clemson had great success on the gridiron during Scott's tenure as an assistant coach and associate head coach, as the Tigers set numerous offensive records.

Scott served under Bobby Bowden at Florida State from 1983-93 and was offensive coordinator from 1990-93. In 1993, Florida State won its first national title and Charlie Ward became its first Heisman Trophy winner. Scott later served as head coach at South Carolina from 1994-98.

Andy Johnston is in his 16th year with the Tiger football program and currently serves as associate athletic director or football operations. His responsibilities include managing he program's day-to-day operations. Although this is his 6th year with the football program, he has been involved vith the Clemson athletic department for 30 years. From 983-97, he was the winningest women's tennis coach in chool history.




Season Ticketholders & Other Visitors

lemson's Memorial Stadium has been held in high esteem for many years. Whether it be players from the 1940s and 1950s, opposing players from the 1970s and 1980s, or even professional players in the 1990s, the ambiance of this special setting is what college football is all about. And in 2012, <u>BleacherReport.com</u> rated Memorial Stadium as the best stadium in the country.

The storied edifice added to its legend when the first meeting of father and son coaches (Bowden Bowli) took place before a record crowd of 86,092 fans in 1999. Clemson has been in the top 20 in the nation in average attendance 31 straight years. A crowd has exceeded 80,000 fans 60 times since 1983. in 2011, Clemson was 17th in the nation in average home attendance.

The legend was further enhanced in 2011 when the Tigers had a perfect 7-0 record at home and recorded victories over defending National Champion Auburn and #11 Florida State on consecutive weekends. Defending National Champions are 0-3 ail-time at Memorial Stadium.

The facility's mystique is derived from its many traditions, which date to its opening in 1942, the legendary games and players, and Clemson's corresponding rate of success. The Tigers have won 263 games in 70 years and have won over 72 percent of the contests (263-99-7).

The stadium has definitely been good to the Tigers, but it was constructed against the advice of at least one coach. Before Head Coach Jess Neely left for Rice after the 1939 season, he gave Clemson a message.

 $\hbox{``Don't ever let them talk you into building'}$ a big stadium," he said. "Put about 10,000 seats behind the YMCA. That's all you'll ever need."

instead of following Neely's advice, however, Clemson officials decided to build the new stadium in a valley on the western part of campus. The place took some clearing, as there were many trees, but luckily there were no hedges.

The crews went to work, clearing, cutting, pouring, and forming. On September 19, 1942, Memoriai Stadium opened with Clemson defeating Presbyterian College 32-13. Those 20,000 seats installed for the opener would soon grow.

Howard said that on the day of the stadium's first game, "the gates were hung at 1:00 and we played at 2:00." But that would section), this expansion increased capacity to 53,000.

Later, upper decks were added to each side of Memorial Stadium as crowds swelled it increased capacity to over 80,000, which makes it one of the nation's largest oncampus stadiums. in 2006, the WestZone was added, an area that contains locker

MEMORIAL STADIUM'S FRONT OOOR



he everyday activities for the football program moved to Memorial Stadium on July 1 2009. Tiger coaches moved into new offices in the West-Zone of Memorial Stadium that day. A month later, the team made the locker room in Death Valley its full-time facility.

Additionally, a new equipment facility, athletic training facility, strength training facility, and training table ("The Paw") opened with all the modern conveniences of an NFL franchise's facility.

The new facility is 150,000 square feet, which adds almost 60,000 square feet to previous facilities in the Jervey Athletic Center. It includes a two-floor strength training facility that is 14,000 square feet, among the largest dedicated solely for football in the nation.

"Our program's motto since I became head coach is 'All-In," said Head Coach Dabo Swinney. "This facility shows any Clemson football player, recruit, or supporter that our University is 'All-In' with this program. The facility is among the best in the nation and allows our student-athletes to develop and become the best they can be."

The equipment room was expanded to include, among other items, new offices and a new laundry room that encompasses approximately 6,000 square feet of space. The football staff offices and meeting rooms are composed of approximately 4,000 square feet of existing space and more than 18,000 square feet of new space.

The facility includes offices for the head coach, assistant coaches, and support staff along with position meeting rooms and a 150-seat auditorium with a sloped floor and theater seating.

The training room, located on the north side of the home team's locker room, was expanded to include a hydrotherapy room, new offices, and examination rooms. The training room occupies about 6,200 square feet of space as well.

The level-three concourse was expanded with the addition of the football offices. This space, the roof of the new football offices, is utilized for gameday marketing activities and to provide fans additional space to gather inside the stadium.

In 2012, 8,000 square feet of enclosed space was added on second level, which houses "The Paw."


Former Clemson running back James Davis, the 2005 ACC Rookie-of-the-Year, stated that one of the biggest contributing factors in deciding on Clemson was the University's commitment to upgrading facilities. "Does Clemson want to be a championship program?" asked Davis when he was considering Clemson. "The WestZone (initiative) showed me that it does!"

Building success requires building for success. While the West Zone is located in Memorial Stadium, the completed project provides resources for Clemson's total sports program, permitting all Tiger teams and athletes to compete with the nation's best.

Moving all football operations to the WestZone has opened up space in the Jervey and McFadden buildings for the other 18 intercollegiate sports to improve their facilities for recruiting and have more office, training, conditioning, and sports medicine space. This has greatly enhanced the overall performance, both on and off the field, for all 19 sports

A look to Clemson's athletic history shows the importance infrastructure enhancements have on the football program. The following chart summarizes the relation ship.

A significant aspect of Phase II of the WestZone project at Memorial Stadium was the construction of a new strength training facility on the first floor that is adjacent to the Clemson locker room and the Frank Howard Field playing surface.


For the first time, there is a strength training facility exclusively for the development of the Clemson football team. Director of Football Strength & Conditioning Joey Batson, who is in his 16th season at Clemson, makes sure that all Tiger gridders are ready to compete against the top teams in the nation. In his first, 15 years in Tigertown, Clemson has played in 13 bowl games and he has coached 22 strength All-Americans on the gridiron.

It is the fourth major facilities construction since Batson joined the Tiger football program, an example of his desire to keep Clemson at the forefront of strength training.

The new facility has the best in all strength training equipment, not to mention the existence of a new sound system and nine new flat-screen televisions that give Tiger football players a pleasant atmosphere to accomplish the most strenuous

The strength training facility actually has two floors. The first has all the free-weight equipment, including a dumbbell area, and the second has cardio-equipment.

Batson has a staff of four assistants working full-time with the football squad. Joining Batson are veteran Strength Coaches Larry Greenlee and Paul Hogan along with Assistants Brandon Mahon and Chris Shatley. In 2012, Greenlee was named a Master Strength Coach.

Joey Batson is in his 27th year as a strength & conditioning coach at the collegiate level and 16th year as director of football strength & conditioning at Clemson. Batson, who played a big role in Clemson winning the ACC title for the first time in 20 years in 2011, has served as a head strength & conditioning coach 23 of his 27 years.

Batson was named master strength & conditioning coach by the Collegiate Strength & Conditioning Coaches Association (CSCCA) in 2009. This honor is the highest given in the strength & conditioning profession.

Batson has had a strong impact on the Clemson program since he became director in 1997. He has had much to do with the success of the football program, helping the Tigers to 13 bowl games and six top-25 final rankings. While at Clemson, he has worked for three head football coaches and has had a tremendous impact throughout the state at many notable high school programs.

Not only does Batson bring professional experience to the position at Clemson, he brings experience as a football player at the collegiate level. The Travelers Rest, SC native was a tight end at The Citadel in 1979 before transferring to Newberry, where he was a two-year letterman and team co-captain during his senior season.

UNIVERSITY PROFILE

The University of Maryland at College Park, the flagship of the state's higher-education system, is ranked among the best public research institutions in the world. The university takes full advantage of the unique resources of the nation's capital, attracting top students and faculty, enriching the economic, social, and cultural life of the state, and engaging the global community to address some of the most critical issues of our day.

Founded in 1856 as a private agricultural college, the University of Maryland has grown dramatically in size, mission, and stature. The beautiful 1,250-acre campus, located inside the Washington, D.C. beltway, is home to 12 colleges and schools offering more than 230 academic degrees to-over 27,000 undergraduates and 10,000 graduate students.

These students, representing diverse ethnicities, nationalities, and disciplines, come to study with a full-time faculty of 3,000, a renowned group that includes four Nobel laureates, seven Pulitzer Prize recipients, and more than 40 members of the most prestigious national academies.

The university's academic community is addressing today's most pressing scientific and societal challenges, such as climate change, the economy, energy, homeland security, and public health. University-wide research funding reached a record high of \$545 million in fiscal year 2010, including \$10 million from the National Science Foundation to develop modeling software used in areas like airplane safety and cancer research.

Thanks to entrepreneurship, innovative research, and partnerships that fuel new businesses and create jobs, the university has a \$3.4 billion annual impact on the state's economy. The Great Expectations campaign, a landmark effort to raise a record \$1 billion in private support (the largest goal ever pursued by a public institution in the state of Maryland and the Washington, D.C. area) exceeded \$850 million in June of 2011.

But the foundation of the university is its students, who are among the highest achievers in the state and nation. Three-quarters of the state's top high school graduates who stay in Maryland enroll at the university. And each year, more than 26,000 students apply for around 4,000 first-year seats at Maryland.





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

Our approach is to address the total student-athlete, and we are committed to coaching our student-athletes to success in the academic, personal growth, career, and community service arenas.

As an original member of the NCAA CHAMPS/Life Skills Program, we provide opportunities and services to address the changing needs and skills of studentathletes during college and after graduation. This program was selected for the FBS Athletic Director's Association "Program of Excellence" Award, a lifetime award recognizing CHAMPS/Life Skills excellence.

Clemson's commitment to provide its student-athletes with the best facilities is evident in many ways. From the soaring upper decks of Memorial Stadium and the beautiful WestZone, to the "New Littlejohn Coliseum," to the state-of-the-art strength training facility, young men and women from all of Clemson's intercollegiate varsity sports have the best in facilities for both training and competition.

The Student-Athlete Enrichment Programs are housed in Vickery Hall, located in the center of campus. The \$3-million structure is as impressive aesthetically as other athletic facilities. But the importance of Vickery Hall to our student-athletes is not found in the structure itself, but in the many programs that the building houses.

Vickery Hall, located in the heart of Clemson's campus, opened its doors in 1991 as the first facility in the country constructed solely to provide academic support to student-athletes. The two-story, 27,000 square-foot building is open all day and into the evening hours to accommodate Clemson student-athletes' extended schedules.

Vickery Hall programs are dedicated to providing a holistic, educational experience by inspiring an environment of respect, integrity, and excellence. Through these services, Vickery Hall and the staff guides and encourages each individual to reach his or her full potential as a student, athlete, and citizen.

Vickery Hall is certified (as one of onl 19 programs in the country to date) by th National Association of Academic Adv sors for Athletics. The tutor and mento programs are among only three athleti academic programs in the country certifie at the highest level by the College Readin & Learning Association.

Academic Commitment

Clemson student-athletes posted a school-record 2.99 GPA for the 2012 spring semester according to data released by the Office of Institutional Research & Planning. Clemson's 15 athletic programs had 228 student-athletes named to the academic honor roll, including 111 on the Dean's List and 43 on the President's List (4.0 GPA).

Seven programs posted at least a 3.0 GPA and four others were at 2.93 or better. It was the first time that 11 of the 15 programs had a GPA of at least 2.93.

The football program had a 2.61 GPA, just below the record of 2.63 set in the spring of 200B. Thirty-four team members were named to the academic honor roll, including **AP** First-Team All-American Sammy Watkins. The freshman wideout became the first Tiger to earn **AP** First-Team All-America honors and be on the academic honor roll in the same year since David Treadwell in 1987-88.

Stephone Anthony, Xavier Brewer, Jaron Brown, Dalton Freeman, Rashard Hall, and Dawson Zimmerman were other 2011 starters named to the academic honor roll. Zimmerman, who received the Weaver-James-Corrigan Award, had a 4.0 GPA and was inducted into the Phi Beta Kappa Honor Society.

The women's swimming program had a 3.62 GPA for the spring semester, a team best and the second best on record for any Clemson athletic team. Twenty-four team members had at least a 3.0 GPA, including 17 on the Dean's List. Two (Kerry McLaughlin, Maddie Tarantolo) were inducted into the Phi Beta Kappa Honor Society.

The men's golf team had a 3.23 GPA, its highest on record. The Tigers had eight members on the academic honor roll, the most since the spring of 2003. Other athletic programs that posted a 3.0 GPA or better during the spring semester were rowing, men's soccer, women's soccer, men's tennis, and women's track & field.

Sixty-one student-athletes graduated from Clemson in May of 2012, including 12

members of Clemson's 2011 ACC Championship football team. Eighteen of the 20 seniors on that team already have their degrees.

APR Scores

All 19 of Clemson's programs scored above the 925 APR threshold and 16 were above 970 according to data released by the NCAA

The men's golf team had the highest among the 19 programs with a perfect 1,000 score, the sixth time in the last eight years the program has had a perfect score under Head Coach Larry Penley.

The football team had a 983 APR score, the seventh-best score in the nation among FBS schools. It was the second-best mark in the nation among schools who finished the 2011 season in the AP poll. Only Boise State was better among the ranked schools with a 989 mark.

The NCAA released data that was coach-specific for the four-year period. Dabo Swinney had a 991 score, fifth best in the nation among active coaches and far above the national average of 948. It was also best in the ACC.

Clemson's women's soccer (992), volleyball (989), men's tennis (988), women's cross country (985), and baseball (980) teams also scored at 980 or better.

Athletic Commitment

Clemson won three ACC Championships in the 2011-12 academic year, one in football and two in women's track & field.


The football team broke a 20-year drought with its conference championship after defeating #3 Virginia Tech in the ACC Championship Game. The team finished ranked in the top 25 and had a school-record four wins over top-25 teams.

The women's track & field program swept the ACC indoor and outdoor cham pionships for the third straight year, giving the program six consecutive team titles.

Six programs finished the 2011-12 season with a top-25 ranking. The high

est ranked team to end the season was women's track & field, which finished in a tie for fourth at the NCAA Outdoor Championships. The other sports that finished their respective seasons in the top 25 were football, men's golf, rowing, women's tennis, and women's indoor track & field.

Three Clemson student-athletes, Seth Broster (swimming), Alyssa Kulik (track), and Kim Ruck (track), were recipients of NCAA postgraduate scholarships. The Tiger athletic program had never previously had three award winners in the same academic year.

Are You a Booster?

The NCAA definition of a "representative of athletics interest" generally encompasses most individuals who reqularly attend Clemson sporting events (reminder - once a representative, always a representative). Specifically, a booster or "representative of athletics interests" is any individual, independent agency, corporate entity, or other organization that is presently or has ever:

· Participated in promoting the institution's athletic pro-

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- gram (such as buying season tickets to sporting events).
- · Assisted in providing benefits (such as summer employment) to enrolled student-athletes.
- Assisted or been re-
- quested by the department of athletics staff to assist in the recruitment of prospective student-athletes.
- Attended Clemson University.
- · Contributed to the department of athletics or IPTAY.
- · Participated in or been a member of IPTAY.
- · Been otherwise involved in the Clemson University athletics program.

Ask Before You Act

Prospective student-athletes may...

- · Identify outstanding potential student-athletes in your area and forward information, such as newspaper articles, to the coach of that sport at Clemson.
- · Continue to establish friendships with friends and neighbors, even those with prospect-aged children. However, contact with those individuals for recruiting purposes is
- · Attend, on your own initiative, events such as games and banquets where prospective student-athletes are present as long as you do not contact the prospect(s) or their family for recruiting purposes.
- · Answer a call from a prospective student-athlete (you may not initiate the call) regarding only Clemson University in general, but not about Tiger athletics. Please promptly inform compliance services or the coach should this situation arise.
- · Make donations to a high school if it is located in your community, the donation is not made at the request of Clemson or Clemson coaches, and the funds are distributed through established channels and not directed towards a specific student-athlete.

Current student-athletes may...

- Continue to come out and support student-athletes at Clemson athletic events.
- · Provide summer employment to student-athletes, but only if you contact Clemson's office of compliance services (compliance-L@clemson.edu) first and the studentathlete is compensated for work actually performed at a rate commensurate with the going rate in the locality for similar services

- Institutional Control A central principle of the NCAA by-laws. Institutional control requires that Clemson University conducts its intercollegiate athletics program in compliance with NCAA rules and regulations. This includes booster activities.
- Prospective Student-Athlete A student, regardless of their athletic ability, who has started classes for the ninth grade or any student enrolled at another two or four-year institution.
- Recruiting Any solicitation of a prospect or a prospect's family by Clemson's coaches or representatives of athletic interest for the purposes of securing the prospective student-athlete's ultimate enrollment and participation in athletics at Clemson. Only designated Clemson athletics department staff members may recruit.
- Student-Athlete A student whose enrollment was solicited by a Clemson athletic department staff member or other representative of athletics interest with a goal of the student's ultimate participation in Clemson's ath letics program. Student-athletes are not just those who were recruited or receive athletic scholarships, they are also those who participate in intercollegiate athletics.

Activities That Will Harm Prospective Student-Athletes You may not...

 Contact (including phone falls, texts, email) or interact with a prospective stilldent athlete or family members for the purpose of pelluading them to attend on on

- · Contact coaches, teachers, guidance counselors, or other school administrators in order to gain information on prospective student-athletes.
- · Make contact with a prospective student-athlete or
- the prospect's family during official or unofficial visits.
- · Provide any other extra benefits to a prospective student-athlete, family, friends, or their coaches.
- · Provide prospective student-athletes or their family and friends with transportation or financial assistance.

Activities That Will Harm Current Student-Athletes You may not ...

- · Generally provide benefits that are not available to other members of the Clemson student body.
- · Provide extra benefits to student-athletes or their family and friends. Examples of prohibited benefits include (but not limited to):
 - · Gifts of money, awards, food/drinks, occasional meals, or other tangible items.
 - · Free or reduced housing agreements.
 - · Loans of money or automobiles
 - · Providing transportation for the student-athlete or their family and friends.
 - · Professional services without charge or at a discount.
 - · Promises of employment or loans following college graduation.
 - · Sending student-athletes items to be autographed and returned or using autographed items to raise funds for high schools.
 - · Use of ATM, credit, or other types of gift cards.
 - · Use the name/image of a current student-athlete to advertise, recommend, or promote products/services.

Consequences

Violations of these NCAA, ACC, and University policies can result in severe penalties, including:

- · Disassociation Clemson University may permanently disassociate itself with an athletic booster. You could lose the privilege of purchasing season tickets, the privilege of being an IPTAY member, or any other Clemson athletic-related benefit deemed appropriate.

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evin Booker has heard the constant comparisons his entire life. Rather than view it as pressure.

the senior forward/ center has opted to look at it from a different perspective.

"I just try to play my game," said Booker when asked about playing in the shadow of his older brother, 2009-10 Tiger senior and current Washington Wizard forward Trevor Booker. "He did what he had to do while he was here, and I'll do the same thing to try and make our team better."


Booker will be looked upon in many areas to make the Tigers better in 2012-13. Clemson will open the season against Presbyterian College on Monday with 12 first and second-year players on its roster, the most in program history since freshmen were first eligible in 1972-73.

The 6'B" product of Union High School, who grew up in rural Whitmire, SC, certainly possesses the necessary tools to get the job done. At 250 pounds, he is a superior blend of size, strength, and athleticism.

Heading into his final season with the Tigers, the younger Booker has been asked to elevate his play and set an example of four-year player development under the guidance of Head Coach Brad Brownell and his staff.

Brownell. "He is stronger, but he's always had the physical tools to play at this level.

"Devin is athletically gifted," said



place heading into his senior season."

Booker entered the 2012-13 campaign as Clemson's returning leader in points, rebounds, assists, blocked shots, and steals. Each of the last two seasons under Brownell's staff, he has increased his scoring and rebounding average. Last season, he averaged career highs of 10.5 points and 7.0 rebounds per game, leading the team in the latter statistic.

He had plenty of individual highlights along the way. He had five double-doubles as a junior, including four during the ACC regular season. He scored 22 points against East Tennessee State and 16 points against three other teams. He scored all 10 of his points in a breakout secondhalf performance against First-Team All-ACC power forward Mike Scott in a win over a ranked Virginia squad.

Brownell's plea to Booker has been to consistently produce more big games like the aforementioned ones. Booker has accepted the challenge.

"I have worked on my allaround game," he said. "I got a lot of shots up this summer, especially one and two-dribble pull-ups. I tried to hone different aspects of my game to become a more complete player.

Along with fellow senior Milton Jennings, Booker gives the Tigers a veteran presence in the post, a coveted asset with a team full of young players. He has played 97 games and logged over 2,100 minutes. He needs just 252 points as a senior to reach 1,000 for his career.

"The ability of those two to play consistently well is going to be a part of not only their success as individuals, but also our team," added Brownell.

Booker has been pushed in practice by two freshmen in particular, Landry Nnoko and Josh Smith. Brownell has raved about the energy that both post-players provide in practice on a daily basis, energy that has in turn made Booker a better player.

"I like both of them," said Booker. "Landry can be an intimidating presence because of his length. Josh is powerful, and he uses that to his advantage."

Booker should be the one with an advantage over many of his counterparts this winter. If the Tigers' new starting backcourt blends quickly with the experienced starting frontcourt, Clemson may have something to say about its preseason. eighth-place ACC prediction. It would not surprise Booker in the least.

"The guys on this team are extremely competitive," stated Booker. "They work hard every day and get after it. If we do well this year, I won't be surprised."

If Booker's individual game shines this year, he also would not be surprised. Clemson fans should not be, either. After all, he has proven over four years that he is his own man.







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












t is not often that sophomores are the most senior members of a collegiate athletic team, but that is exactly what the Clemson women's tennis team is facing this season. With the loss of Josipa Bek, Nelly Ciolkowski, and Keri Wong to graduation, the team is looking to its returning sophomores to lead this season.

Last year, they were thrust into action before truly adjusting to college life, but one year makes a huge difference.

Of the three returning sophomores, two saw action last season. Romy Kölzer is still in her first calendar year with the Tigers, as she enrolled in January and hopped into the lineup right away, going 18-8 in singles.

"I came in January and we had no time for anything," said Kölzer. "We had to get right in the matches. I was studying all the time at night and I wasn't organized during my day. It was really chaotic. This semester, I know how to organize. I now have a social life next to tennis...I'm not just on the court and studying."

Beatrice Gumulya, who also started play in January, found her spot in the middle of the lineup, winning 11 consecutive matches to end 2012 and her first five matches of the 2012 fall season.

"My first semester was really hard for me," admitted Gumulya. "I had no life at all. During the summer, my advisor would ask, 'What are you doing this weekend?'

> and I'd be studying. They said, 'During the weekend?' and I said, 'Yeah, I have no other time! It's the only time I can catch up on material.

"In the spring as well. I was taking 15 credit hours and didn't have time to socialize. Now, I feel more relaxed and I'm understanding much better."

Gumulya represents the program's lone ranked player, coming in at #83 nationally, but Yana Koroleva will likely join her in the 2013 preseason ITA rankings after her upsets

at the ITA Carolina Regional in October.

Koroleva, a third sophomore, enrolled last season but sat out while re-instating her eligibility. It has taken little time to make her presence known, knocking off three top-50 players this fall and advancing to the semifinals in an ITF professional tournament playing as an amateur.

These three will form the foundation of a team looking to increase its run of consecutive NCAA Tourney appearances to 10 when play resumes in January.

The sophomore unit has already bonded and will be looked upon for leadership in 2012-13. They already paced the Tigers in the fall, going a combined 17-7 against some of the top competition throughout the Southeast.

"We really try to pass along the team spirit," said Kölzer. "Tennis is tough because it is an individual sport, and you never really learn to play as a team until you get to school. We really have to teach them what being a team is about. If we don't have team spirit, we cannot reach

In a sport largely known for emphasis on the individual, it represents a challenge to come in and find the shared pride of

winning and losing as a team. For that reason, the players find it more and more important to build the sense of team, family, and community.

"One person can destroy a whole team." continued Kölzer. "We all sympathize with each other and love each other. It's easier, because any time there is a negative atmosphere, it can also bring you down."

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HATCHER vs. NEWSOME 1984 Wake Forest Game

You might find it unusual that a pair of punters are on this list, but it was an unusual situation. Clemson's Dale Hatcher and Wake Forest's Harry Newsome were high school teammates and classmates at Cheraw (SC) High School in 1981.

Hatcher was the starting punter for the Braves and Newsome was second string. However, Newsome showed his ability once he arrived at Wake Forest. He finished his career with a 43.6-yard average, still ninth-best in ACC history. Hatcher av-

eraged 42.8 yards per punt for the Tigers and is still 13th. This 1984 Clemson vs. Wake Forest

This 1984 Clemson vs. Wake Forest game was the final matchup of the two punters at the college level (they would later compete in the NFL). Hatcher had just two punts in the game Clemson won 37-14, but he averaged \$7.5 yards per punt. Newsome averaged 44.2 yards on six punts, but he had a punt blocked by William Perry when the lineman pushed the Wake Forest up-back into Newsome.

Both Hatcher and Newsome went on to punt for many years in the NFL. Newsome played nine years in the NFL and averaged 42.5 yards per punt. He led the NFL in punting in 1988 and once had an 84-yard punt.

Hatcher averaged 40 yards per punt over seven seasons. He was an All-Pro and Pro Bowl selection in 1985, his rookie season, when he averaged 43 yards per punt.

WHITEHURST vs. SCHAUB

Two future NFL quarterbacks battled in an overtime game at Clemson in 2003. Clemson sophomore Charlie Whitehurst and Virginia senior Matt Schaub, the reigning ACC Player-of-the-Year, took their respective teams up and down the field for four quarters.

Whitehurst directed Clemson to a 10-0 lead at halftime, as he connected with Derrick Hamilton on a 19-yard scoring pass. The Tiger defense, led by Leroy Hill, shut down Schaub and his short passing game.

However, Schaub responded in the third quarter with a 17-0 run, as he threw two touchdown passes, including one to

tight end Heath Miller, who has also gone on to a long NFL career.

Clemson had a 24-17 lead before Schaub led the Cavaliers on a masterful two-minute drive to a tying touchdown with just 57 seconds left in the game.

In overtime, Virginia had the ball first and the Cavaliers could only muster a field goal. Then on Clemson's possession, Whitehurst hit Kevin Youngblood in the corner of the endzone from four yards out for the walkoff touchdown.

Whitehurst finished the day 27-44 passing for 265 yards and two touchdowns, while Schaub was 33-48 passing for 271 yards and two scores.

ADDISON vs. DAVIS 1966 Virginia Game

On the first day that Howard's Rock was mounted on the top of the Hill, Clemson and Virginia staged one of the great games in the history of Death Valley. And the play of the two quarterbacks made it that way.

Clemson's Jimmy Addison led the Tigers from 17 points down late in the third quarter to a 40-35 victory, at the time the greatest comeback in Clemson history. Addison finished the day 12-19 passing for 283 yards and three touchdowns. He completed six of those passes for 120 yards to Wayne Bell.

Meanwhile, Bob Davis completed 26-48 passes for 312 yards and two touchdowns to lead the Cavaliers. In an era when running was the staple of most offenses, Clemson and Virginia each passed for at least 300 yards, the only game that happened in Memorial Stadium before 1998.

Davis set the ACC record for completions in a game and also registered 40 yards on the ground for 352 yards of total offense.

But in the end, it was the Tigers who claimed the upper hand, as Addison completed a 75-yard pass to Jacky Jackson with 3:49 left in the game to seal the victory.

DANTZLER VS. RIVERS 2000 N.C. State Game

Clemson and NC State were both undefeated entering this October 7, 2000 game in Memorial Stadium. It was the first time that two teams were still undefeated entering a game at Clemson at least four games into the season. It was a battle of two different but effective quarterbacks in Clemson's Woodrow Dantzler and N.C. State freshman Philip Rivers.

Dantzler completed 18-30 passes for 220 yards and added 103 yards on 25 carries, his fourth straight game with at least 300 yards of total offense and at least 100 rushing yards.

Rivers completed only 21-48 passes, but he passed for 370 yards and three touchdowns without throwing an interception.

Clemson had lost 13 consecutive games decided by a touchdown or less, so Tiger fans were a bit nervous when N.C. State took the ball back with three minutes left and trailing 34-27.

However, Charles Hafley deflected a fourth-down pass by Rivers at the Clemson 18 in the final seconds to preserve the victory.



LONG VS. AGNEW 1989 N.C. State Game

Stacy Long earned his All-America status on this day in 1989. A junior at the time, Long was having a solid year as a run blocker, but N.C. State had the best defensive lineman in the ACC in Ray Agnew.

The Wolfpack had a 6-0 record and a #12 national ranking entering the game.

Long had seven knockdown blocks and graded 82 percent in his head-to-head battle with the eventual ACC Defensive Player-of-the-Year. He had key blocks on two Clemson touchdowns in the first quarter, a nine-yard run by Wesley McFadden and an 11-yard run by Joe Henderson.

The Tigers were victorious 30-10 in front of a national television audience and 81,569 fans. The victory moved Clemson back into the top 20 and it gave the Tigers momentum, as they did not lose the rest of the season to finish #12 in the **AP** poll.


HORNE vs. WARRICK 1997 Florida State Game

This is the only game in the history of Death Valley that two opposing players combined for over 600 all-purpose yards. On this warm afternoon (93 degrees at kickoff), Florida State wide receiver Peter Warrick gained 372 all-purpose yards, the most against Clemson in any venue in history.

It was the first big game for the sophomore, who would go on to lead Florida State to the 1999 national title. Warrick had a 90-yard punt return and an 80-yard touchdown reception. For the day, he had 249 receiving yards (most ever against Clemson) and 123 punt return yards.

Clemson wide receiver Tony Horne nearly kept pace with 10 receptions for 131 yards and a touchdown along with 109 kickoff return yards, including a 77-yarder that set up a score. It was like watching a heavyweight fight, as the two receivers made big play after big play.

The two teams combined for only 72 rushing yards, but they had 617 combined passing yards. Florida State won 35-28, but the 80,939 fans in attendance were on their feet most of the game thanks to the performances by Horne and Warrick.



BOYD vs. TRICKETT 2011 Florida State Game

This game was certainly not billed as a great individual matchup. Florida State quarter-back Clint Trickett was substituting for an injured EJ Manuel and had not seen much action in his college career prior to this contest.

However, he responded like a coach's son, which he is, connecting on 24-38 passes for 336 yards and three touchdowns

Clemson's Tajh Boyd was coming off a 386-yard passing performance in a victory over defending National Champion Auburn, and that was the second-highest passing yardage total in Clemson history at the time. On this Saturday against the #11 Seminoles, he nearly duplicated the numbers by completing 22-35 passes for 344 yards and three touchdowns.

A look to the history of games in Death Valley shows that it is the only game in which two opposing quarterbacks both passed for at least 330 yards and three touchdowns.

Clemson held a 35-30 lead late in the game when Florida State had the ball near midfield, but Tiger defensive tackle Rennie Moore sacked Trickett on fourth down, allowing Clemson to take over the ball and run out the clock for the victory.

PERRY vs. SMITH 1984 Virginia Tech Game

Clemson and Virginia Tech had two of the top defensive linemen in the nation in the 1984 season. William Perry was Clemson's senior middle guard who was completing the only three-time All-America career in school history.

Virginia Tech's Bruce Smith was just as impressive and on his way to being a top NFL draft pick.

Both giants were at their best at Clemson on this November afternoon. The Tigers won the contest by a score of 17-10, as Clemson held Virginia Tech to only 79 yards on 44 carries.

Perry finished the game with six tackles along with two tackles for loss. Smith registered nine tackles and four tackles for loss, still tied for the most tackles for loss in a game at Clemson.

But a look to the stats tells us that another defensive lineman actually had a better day, Clemson freshman Michael Dean Perry. The younger Perry had 10 tackles, three tackles for loss, and two sacks.

While William Perry and Smith were both first-round draft picks the following spring, Michael Dean would go on to a six-time Pro Bowl career with Denver and Cleveland.

FULLER VS. MONTANA 1977 Notre Dame Game

Two future Super Bowl winning quarterbacks went head-to-head in Memorial Stadium on November 12, 1977. Notre Dame's only appearance to date at Clemson featured a Fighting Irish team led by quarterback Joe Montana, who would go on to win four Super Bowl Championship rings with the San Francisco 49ers.

The Tigers were led by Steve Fuller, who later became a member of the 1985 Chicago Bears' team that won the Super Bowl title.

Fuller led the Tigers to a 17-7 lead entering the fourth quarter and had the better stats for the afternoon. The junior signal-caller completed 13-20 passes for 185 yards along with 51 yards on 16 carries and a touchdown. That gave him 236 yards of total offense compared to 163 yards for Montana.

Montana was 9-21 passing, but those passes went for 172 yards, good for 19.1 yards per completion. Montana also rushed for two short touchdowns, including what proved to be the game-winner with 7:11 left in the game.

The Fighting Irish were victorious by a score of 21-17, but Clemson gained in terms of national attention by its performance. It was Notre Dame's only close game in its last six contests on the way to the 1977 national title.

DAVIS vs. WALKER 1981 Georgia Game

The battles between Clemson and Georgia between the 1977-87 seasons were legendary, physical contests. They were personified on the personal level in the matchup between Clemson linebacker Jeff Davis and Georgia running back Herschel Walker in 1981.

Davis was the emotional leader of Clemson's defense, and he averaged nearly 14 tackles per game during the 1980 and 1981 campaigns to back it up. Walker had just led Georgia to the National Championship as a freshman during the 1980 season.

Georgia came to Clemson riding a 13game undefeated streak and a #4 national ranking. Clemson needed a victory over this prominent program just down the road in Athens, GA to move into the national picture.

It was the fierce, hard-hitting game you would expect. Walker ran well overall with 111 yards on 28 carries, but he never reached the goal line. He also fumbled twice, two of Georgia's nine turnovers, still the most forced by a Clemson defense in history.

Davis finished the contest with 11 tackles, including a team-high nine first hits, and also recovered a fumble to lead the Tiger defense.

Clemson went on to win the National Championship that season, and this key victory over the Bulldogs started the momentum towards that title.

It ended up being the only regularseason loss of Walker's college career as a Bulldog.



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n 10-plus years as the athletic director at Clemson University, Terry Don Phillips has supervised lasting changes. Monuments to his accomplishments are ample, from the WestZone facility that has turned Memorial Stadium into one of the nation's collegiate athletics treasures, to the pending project to revamp Highway 93 that will revolutionize the façade of the Olympic sports wing of Clemson's campus.

When assessing his legacy on the eve of his retirement, however, Phillips would rather look deep within the walls to evaluate success rather than just gazing at architecture.


"It's still about personnel," said Phillips. "But if you give a great coach the tools that they need - the facilities they can recruit to, the environment they can put their kids in - then they have an opportunity to achieve great things."

Phillips says you can put a quality coach "in a hayfield and he's going to do a good job for you." Fortunately for all involved, Clemson can provide much more than that for coaches and student-athletes alike.

The affinity Phillips has for his coaches is evident in the way he describes them. He sees the needle pointing upward all over the Clemson athletic landscape, while understanding there are some programs where work to improve is continual.

The former Oklahoma State athletic director likens Men's Basketball Coach Brad Brownell to former Cowboys' Coach Eddie Sutton, a College Basketball Hall of Famer whose teams appeared in two Final Fours. He says Clemson Football Coach Dabo Swinney has similar attributes, and on and on the praise went as he reeled off the positive attributes of his employees tasked with leading an array of Tiger programs to

"At this point in our history, I think we have some very good coaches in place



across the board in all of our sports," said Phillips. "We're going to continue to see progress in our total sports program."

As he steps away from athletic administration after 32 years in the profession and 42 years overall in athletics, Phillips leaves behind a legacy that is strong and sound for his successor, Dan Radakovich. In addition to presiding over a number of conference championships and a men's golf national title during his reign, Phillips also organized and facilitated upgrades in virtually all major athletic venues on campus.

Some of those projects, like the renovations to Littlejohn Coliseum, were already well underway when he arrived. Others, like the WestZone, were necessary for Clemson to compete with its peer institutions across the country.

Still others, like the indoor football practice facility, are currently under construction or close to completion. And others, like the Highway 93 development, the new basketball additions, and the renovations to the baseball team room, will be completed after Phillips has departed the

Even given the improvements that have been made on the exterior, the Arkansas alumnus does not want to be known solely as a "facilities guy." He believes the on-field successes of the Clemson athletic department under his watch speak for themselves, and even though there have been some periods that were rougher than others, the positive experiences will ultimately be what defines his

"The way you judge a program is to look at all facets on balance," explained Phillips. "You're going to have some pluses and you're going to have some minuses. At the end of the day, you hope the pluses outweigh the minuses."

Given the task at hand when he arrived, one might surmise that Phillips' commitment to enhancement, no doubt a costly endeavor, put significant strain on the athletic department's finances. But in fact, the opposite is true.

Under his watch, the financial balance sheet in Tiger athletics remained stable to the point that the new leadership will inherit a situation that is not only strong in facilities and manpower, but also in finances. It gives Radakovich some leeway when deciding upon the direction that is best for the department moving forward.

Phillips believes Radakovich will continue to build on the things he did at Clemson in a decade-long tenure that included a variety of triumphs that set standards never before seen at Clemson University.

These included four consecutive NCAA Tourney bids in men's basketball, the school's first ACC football title in 20 years, five straight Sweet 16 berths in women's tennis, and a Final Four in men's soccer among many other accomplishments. The retiring athletic director is excited to see the way the entire expanse of Tiger athletics appears to be experiencing growth and maturity into a collective that competes at the highest level every season.

"When you look at our student-athletes - how they perform in the classroom, how they perform in community service, their athletic accomplishments, and you look at where our coaches are headed - I believe strongly that we're in an uptick across the board," said Phillips.

With options galore when considering places to retire, the choice for Phillips and his wife, Tricia, was easy. They will remain in Clemson, soaking up the sun in the shadows of the aura he helped create in his time as a Tiger. He says the one-ofa-kind feel Clemson gives to its sons and daughters was evident as soon as he arrived, and he is proud to have shared in that heritage for a short while as the athletic director.

"It's a unique university with tremendous loyalty," added Phillips. "With people who have gone to school here and those who haven't gone to school here, there's a great loyalty to the university. It's one of the unique pieces of Americana. That's having lived in other university towns and having lived in other states. There are tremendous positives about Clemson."

One of those positives is the bond Clemson's people have with Tiger athletics. Thanks to Phillips, fans have something to be proud of when assessing their favorite teams, coaches, and student-athletes.

A building sets the tone. It creates the mood and is representative of an attitude that exists within itself. Phillips is not satisfied with just beautifying walls, and he can now walk off into the sunset with the knowledge that what is going on the inside that ne helped put together is just as alluring as the outside on the landscape of Clemson athletics.

ENSURING CLEMSON GOLF STAYS AT THE TOP OF ITS GAME

ven though the Larry B. Penley, Jr. Golf Clubhouse is up and running, Clemson's work to stay as one of the best golf programs in the country is not over.

"There is a whole lot more we can still do," said Joe White, Assistant Director of IPTAY Major Gifts.

Former Tiger golfers Steve Bond and John Engler felt the same way, especially after they visited programs at Augusta State and Georgia. In order to help with the day-to-day cost to run their golf programs, the two schools started booster clubs to raise money to offset expenses.

"When they saw what Augusta State and Georgia were doing, they felt like it would be a really nice program to have at Clemson," said White.

Bond and Engler got the ball rolling and introduced the program earlier this year at Augusta National during The Masters. They also made a push at the RBC Heritage tournament in Hilton Head, SC a week later.

"The idea is that we are going to raise money for the golf program to give Larry, Jordan (Byrd), and J.T. (Horton) the things they need on a day-to-day operations basis," added White.

The idea has come known as Clemson Golf Paws. The organization's motto is "Ensuring Clemson Golf stays at the top of its

Clemson Golf Paws was formed by former players and other supporters to sup-



ply needed operational funding to keep the Tiger golf program performing at the highest level. This initiative is designed to involve thousands of supporters of Clemson golf to benefit both the donor and the team. Funds will be raised from the yearly contributions donated to become a member of Golf Paws.

Donating members will receive Tiger golf gear and will be given unique opportunities to connect with the program. The funds will allow Penley, Horton, and Byrd to maintain a championship-caliber pro-

"Golf Paws will be a tremendous asset to our program," stated Penley. "It will increase involvement and provide funding that we need for our continued success. Golf Paws is a grassroots concept that will benefit all of our golfers."

Under Penley's leadership, Clemson has 63 team wins, nine ACC Championships, seven NCAA Regional titles, and one National Championship (2003). The program has developed a reputation for producing tour professionals at a high rate. Clarence Rose, Dillard Pruitt, Kevin Johnson, Lucas Glover, Jonathan Byrd, D.J. Trahan, Kyle

Stanley, and Charles Warren have all made their mark as champions on the PGA or Web.com Tours.

Corbin Mills, a member of last year's squad who won the U.S. Public Links in 2011, is among the new breed of Tigers joining the professional ranks. With the help of Golf Paws, Clemson is sure to have more professionals on tour in the future.

The money raised through Golf Paws is different than the funds raised through the Tiger Golf Gathering. Golf Paws, as mentioned, is for daily operations, like new equipment, shoes, or materials for the upkeep of the practice facility, which sits beside the clubhouse.

The Tiger Golf Gathering is used for major gift needs, like the funds that were used to build the Penley Clubhouse

"Golf Paws will help us with the type of equipment we need to keep our (practice) greens in the conditions that they really need to be in," said White. "We need some new mowers, aerators, and rowers to get these greens in the conditions they need to be in so we can be competitive."

The funds raised through Golf Paws will also help with the new women's program, which is scheduled to begin competition in the fall of 2013.

"We have a women's program now, and this money will assist the program and what Ceach Horton needs for it to be successful," said White.

So far, Golf Paws has raised more than \$60,000 since it started in April. White said a lot of that credit goes to Bond, who is the co-chairman of the Clemson Golf Commit-

"Steve has really taken over and has done an excellent job putting this together," continued White. "He has spearheaded a lot of this and has got us off to a great start."

Clemson golf has enjoyed great success for almost 75 years. The success of the current team, the recent completion of the clubhouse, as well as expansion of the golf program into women's golf suggest that Clemson's golf program still has the best years yet to come.

"Our goal is to help Clemson stay at the front of the line when it comes to golf," said White. "This program will help us stay competitive for years to come."

BREAKING BARRIERS

lemson will honor player from an oppos ina team today. That is a rare occasion, but the spirit, determination, fortitude, and foresight demonstrated by Maryland wide receiver Darryl Hill 50 years ago warrants it.

Hill became the ACC's first African-American football player in 1962 and became the first African-American to play in a game at Clemson on November 16, 1963 He told University of Maryland recruiter and Assistant Coach Lee Corso (yes,

the same man who is on ESPN College Gameday today), "I'm no Jackie Robinson. I just want to play football."

Like it or not, he was the Jackie Robinson of ACC football, and thank goodness he was. All the African-American players at Clemson, and every other program in the league for that matter, owe him a debt of gratitude.

Hill began his college career at the U.S. Naval Academy. He was a freshman in the fall of 1961 as a standout back. Freshmen were not eligible to play with the varsity in those days, so he teamed with a flashy quarterback named Roger Staubach on the Navy freshman squad. Staubach went on to win the Heisman Trophy in 1963 and later had a Hall of Fame career with the Dallas Cowboys.

Hill was the first African-American gridder at Navy as well, but there was not much written about it at the time, because he could not yet play in a varsity game.

After Hill's freshman season at Navy, Maryland Coach Tom Nugent made it clear that he was interested in having an African-American on his team. Corso contacted Earl Bailey, the head coach at Morgan State, and he asked for a list of candidates. Hill, who had attended nearby Gonzaga College High School, was on the list.

Earlier in the fall of 1961, Hill had scored three touchdowns for the Navy freshmen against the Maryland freshmen, including both a punt return and kickoff return for touchdowns.

Hill was the perfect person to break down this barrier. The son of a school teacher (mother) and a businessman (father), he had a 3.2 GPA as a freshman at Navy.



It took awhile, but Maryland admitted Hill in the fall of 1962. However, he had to sit out the season due to NCAA transfer rules. He spent a year on the scout team, many times taking some very hard late hits from his own team. But he never retaliated and staved the course.

He was finally eligible for the 1963 season, but there was resistance from the other schools in the ACC. Fans treated him poorly, with many throwing objects at him from the stands.

It was a different era. In the middle of the 1963 season, President John F. Kennedy sent federal troops to the Ole Miss campus to stop riots over the admission of James Meredith, the first African-American to attend the University of Mississippi. (One of the recent ESPN 30 For 30 documentaries was on that situation.)

Hill was a terrific player. He won over the Terrapin fans when he scored the winning touchdown against Air Force on a reception on the last play of the game in College Park. He nearly set the Maryland receiving record that year.

However, he had to put up with a lot. At one opposing ACC stadium, he was not provided with an oxygen mask when he was injured.

When Maryland came to Clemson for a November 16, 1963 game, the last road game of the year for the Terrapins, his mother was not allowed in the stadium. Hill was told of this and left pregame warmups in uniform to attend to his moth-

About this time. Clemson President R.C. Edwards came to the entrance by the Maryland locker room (where the police station is today) and told Hill's mother she could sit with him in the President's box during the game.

That is exactly

what she did, another example of Edwards' common-sense leadership during a difficult time. Edwards had earlier handled the enrollment of Clemson's first African-American student, Harvey Gantt, in January of 1963 with the same aplomb.

Clemson was one of the few Southern schools that survived integration in the 1960s without a major incident, and Edwards' respect on this campus had everything to do with that.

Robinson integrated baseball in 1947 and won National League Rookie-ofthe-Year honors. Had there been an ACC Rookie-of-the-Year award in 1963, Hill would have certainly clinched it with his late-season performance at Clemson. He had 10 catches for 83 yards in the contest, a Maryland single-game record for receptions and the most ever against the Tigers at the time


But Clemson's defense was outstanding in 1963, finishing fifth in the nation in total defense. Maryland could not reach the endzone other than on an interception return, as the Tigers won 21-6.

Much more important than a Clemson regular-season victory was the integration of ACC football along with the integration of a football game at Clemson.

Just look at the positive impact African-Americans have had on all programs in the ACC today. Since 1995, 19 of Clemson's 23 All-Americans have been African-Ameri-

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





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
