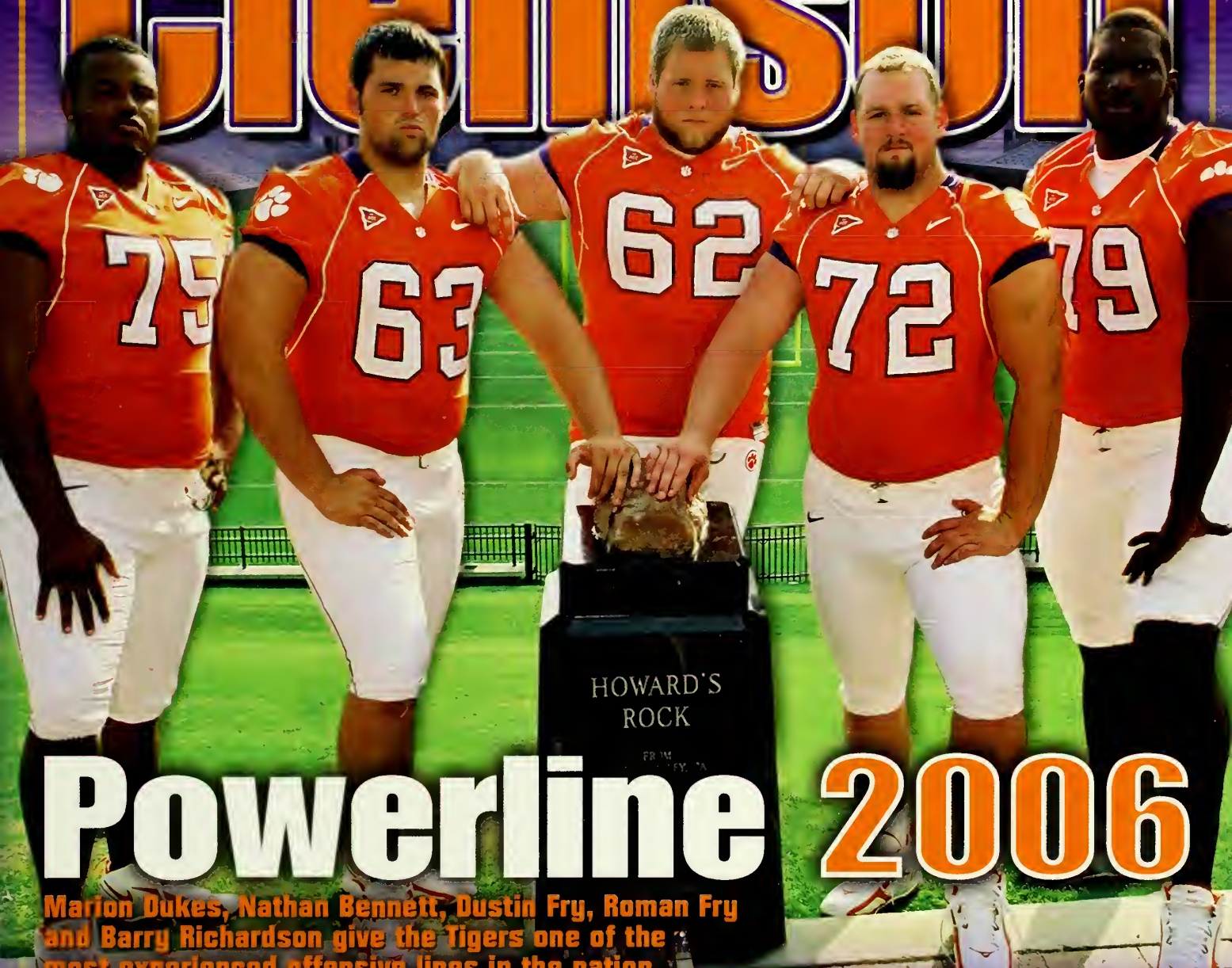

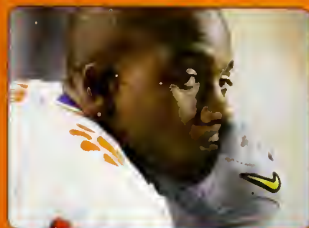

Clemson-N.C. State Series Notes

- Overall, Clemson has a 46-27-1 lead in the series, including a 19-11 record in games played at Clemson. The Tigers are 16-11 against N.C. State in games played in Death Valley.
- Clemson is 12-11-1 against N.C. State in neutral-site games and 16-15 in games at Raleigh. N.C. State has an 11-8 lead in games played in Carter-Finley Stadium, but Clemson won there last year by a score of 31-10.
- Seven of the last nine games have been decided by eight points or less, with the most recent close game coming in a 26-20 Tiger victory in 2004, a game that was decided on the last play.
- Each team has one win by 20 points or more over the last nine years, and both games were on Thursday night. N.C. State won at Clemson on a Thursday night in 2002 by a score of 38-6, and Clemson won last year on a Thursday night 31-10.
- N.C. State was Clemson's nemesis from 1986-88. The Tigers won the ACC title each year under Danny Ford, but never beat the Wolfpack in the process, losing all three games. It was the only loss for Clemson in the ACC in each of those years.
- Tommy Bowden is 4-3 against N.C. State since he has been at Clemson. That includes a 2-2 record in Raleigh and a 2-1 ledger at Clemson.
- Over the last 10 years, the two teams have won in two-game sets. Clemson won in 1996 and 1997. N.C. State followed with victories in 1998 and 1999, then Clemson won in 2000 and 2001 behind Woodrow Dantzler, who rushed for at least 100 yards in each game. N.C. State won in 2002 and 2003 behind Philip Rivers, while Clemson won the last two seasons behind Charlie Whitehurst. Both signal-callers are now quarterbacks with the San Diego Chargers.

Little Difference Between Terps & Wolfpack

The parity in ACC football can be shown by comparing the last four games for Maryland and N.C. State. Maryland's 13-12 victory at Clemson last weekend was the fourth consecutive win by six points or less for the Terrapins, and they now control their own destiny for the ACC Atlantic Division title. They have four wins by a total of 12 points, including wins over Clemson and N.C. State.

The Wolfpack enters Saturday's game with a 3-6 record. But over the last four games, N.C. State has lost each to an ACC foe by eight points or less. Reverse those fortunes and N.C. State would be in the driver's seat for an ACC Championship-game appearance.

The Wolfpack started the ACC schedule with thrilling wins over Boston College and Florida State. The 2-0 mark against two of the top-three teams in the preseason in the Atlantic Division had the Wolfpack thinking of an ACC title-game appearance. N.C. State won both games with last-second touchdown passes from Daniel Evans to John Dunlap.

Evans, the son of former N.C. State quarterback and punter Johnny Evans, has completed 114-215 passes for 1,301 yards and six touchdowns. He took over for Marcus Stone early in the season, and he has had a solid season.

Tight end Anthony Hill is the top receiver for N.C. State with 31 catches for 333 yards,

while Dunlap is second with 22 receptions for 293 yards and four scores.

Darrell Blackman is an all-around player the Tigers will have to watch this afternoon. He is third in receiving with 21 catches for 285 yards and two scores, has 42 yards rushing, leads the team in punt returns with 17 for 182 yards, and leads the squad in kickoff returns with a 31.1-yard average.

Andre Brown leads the N.C. State ground game with 582 yards on 101 carries for a healthy 5.8 average. He and top reserve Toney Baker have four touchdowns apiece for the Wolfpack, who average 119 yards per game on the ground.

N.C. State has a solid defense that is 26th in the nation in pass defense. Patrick Lowery, a senior middle linebacker, leads the team in tackles and is third in the ACC with 79. He also has 6.5 tackles for loss and an interception.

Garland Heath is an outstanding rover who will challenge Chansi Stuckey and company. He has 49 tackles, second-most on the team. DeMarcus Tyler, a 305-pound senior, is the anchor of the defensive line. He has 39 tackles and 7.5 tackles for loss. Martrel Brown leads the team in sacks (5).

Offense Margin Not Always Indicator of Wins

Clemson leads the ACC in total offense margin and is among the national leaders in that category. Clemson is 13th in the nation in total offense, averaging 419.9 yards per game, and is seventh in total defense, allowing 247.6 yards per game. That means, on average, Clemson outgains the opposition by 172.3 yards per game, a big reason for Clemson's 70-percent winning mark so far this year.

Usually, outgaining the opposition is a prime indicator of success for a team, and that has usually been the case in Clemson history. There have been seven teams in Tiger history who have finished the year with a total offense margin of at least 130 yards per game. Those seven teams have a combined record of 72-7-1 and include Clemson's undefeated teams of 1948, 1950, and 1981. Clemson's current +172.3-yards-per-game margin would break the

existing record of +165.2 yards per game (1978) if the season ended today.

A check of the ACC stats shows that winning the total offense margin is not always an indicator of success in wins and losses. While Clemson has a 7-3 record so far this year to go with the +172.3-yard-total-offense margin, Wake Forest, who has the best overall record in the ACC at 8-1, has a -32.0-yards-per-game margin in total offense. Maryland, who is 7-2 and defeated the Tigers last weekend, has a -66.4-yards-per-game total offense margin. The Terrapins have been outgained by nearly 600 yards so far this season.

Clemson Defense Among Nation's Best

Clemson's defense is among the nation's best in many categories so far this season. Vic Koenning's point-prevention unit is in the top 16 in the nation in seven different categories.

Prior to each season, Tommy Bowden lists one of his team goals as finishing in the top 10 in the nation in scoring defense. So far, Clemson is reaching that goal with a 13.7-point-scoring-defense figure that is 10th-best in the nation. The Tigers are seventh in the nation in total defense, allowing just 247.6 yards per game. Clemson is also 11th in rushing defense (85.4), 12th in pass efficiency defense (101.0), and 16th in pass defense (162.2).

The future looks good for the Clemson defense, as only two seniors are in the starting lineup (Gaines Adams, Duane Coleman). Sixteen of the top 18 tacklers on defense are eligible to return next year. And that does not count Tramaine Billie, Clemson's second-leading tackler in 2005 who is red-shirting this year due to injury.

Thomas Hunter's 71-Yarder a Record

Senior tight end Thomas Hunter, originally a walk-on in 2002, caught a 71-yard pass over the middle to set up a field goal that gave Clemson a 12-10 lead late in the fourth quarter against Maryland. That 71-yard reception was the longest in Clemson history by a tight end. The previous record was a 65-yard re-

Alumni Association Gift

Within the last year, the Alumni Association also allocated \$50,000 to a presidential priorities fund.

The Clemson Alumni Association represents Clemson's 105,000 members, and is governed by the Alumni National Council.

Jad Dean Needs One Field Goal for 50

Jad Dean had some challenges as Clemson's placekicker early in the season, but the senior from Greenwood, SC is having a strong finish to his college career. Last week, he was 4-4 on field goals in the 13-12 loss to Maryland. He gave Clemson a 12-10 lead with 2:25 left, and all Tiger fans certainly hoped that would be the difference.

Dean had two kicks blocked at #9 Florida State earlier this year, but since then, he has been outstanding. In the last seven games, he is 9-10 on field goals and 30-31 on extra points. So, Dean has missed just two of his last 41 kicks.

With his four field goals against Maryland, he moved ahead of David Treadwell on two Clemson kicking charts. Dean has 238 points for his career, five more than Treadwell had during an All-America career from 1985-87. Dean is fifth in kick scoring in school history and sixth in overall scoring.

In terms of field goals, Dean also moved ahead of Treadwell on the all-time list. He has 49 career field goals, two more than Treadwell had. The ironic aspect of his performance is that Treadwell was present for last Saturday's game with Maryland. He lives in Denver, so he does not make it to a lot of games. Dean is now fifth on Clemson's career field-goal list with his 49 three-pointers in 63 attempts. He trails only Nelson Welch (72), Obed Ariri (63), Chris Gardocki (63), and Aaron Hunt (55).

James Davis & C.J. Spiller Chasing Records

James Davis went over the 1,000-yard rushing mark for the 2006 season when he had 90 yards rushing on 20 carries against Maryland. He has 1,081 yards for the season, the 10th different running back in school history to go over the 1,000-

yard mark for a season. He is averaging 108.1 yards per game, a figure that is just short of Raymond Priestner's record of 112 yards per game in 1996.

Davis has scored 17 touchdowns and needs just one to tie Travis Zachery's record of 18 total touchdowns in 2000. One more rushing touchdown will give Davis the record of 18. He is currently the co-holder of the existing record with Lester Brown, a tailback in 1978.

C.J. Spiller, Davis' compatriot in the backfield, has score nine touchdowns this season and has 1,020 all-purpose yards. Spiller needs one touchdown and 12 all-purpose yards to break freshman records set by Davis last year. Davis had nine touchdowns and 1,031 all-purpose yards in 2005.

Both Davis and Spiller are averaging 6.3 yards per rush this year. They have a combined 1,686 rushing yards so far this year, good for 168.6 yards per game. They have a combined 24 touchdowns. The Tiger record for two players on the same team is 26, set by Woodrow Dantzler and Zachery in 2000.

Gaines Adams Just Two Sacks From Record

Gaines Adams continues his assault on Michael Dean Perry's near 20-year-old Clemson record for sacks. Adams has 10.5 so far this year, seventh-most in the nation. He has been amazingly consistent, recording at least one sack in each of the last eight games, a Clemson record by three games. Adams did not have a sack in the first two games, but has had at least one in every game since the Florida State game when he had 2.5.

A native of Greenwood, SC, Adams has 26 sacks in his career and needs just two sacks to tie Perry's career record of 28 set between 1984-87. The legendary William Perry, a three-time Clemson All-American, is second with 27.

For the year, Adams is sixth on the team in tackles with 41, including 14.5 tackles for loss. He has 21 quarterback pressures for the season, seven more than any other Tiger.

ception for a touchdown by Bennie Cunningham against Tennessee in 1974.

Any comparison by Hunter to Cunningham is certainly a compliment. Cunningham is the only two-time All-America tight end in Clemson history, and he was the only tight end from any school named to the ACC's 50-Year Anniversary team in 2002.

There have been just five pass plays of at least 50 yards to a tight end in Clemson history, and Hunter has been on the receiving end of two of them. Earlier this year, he caught a 53-yard pass against Temple.

Hunter has 10 receptions for 255 yards this season, a 25.5-yard average. If the season ended today, that would be a school record for yards per reception by a Tiger tight end over a season, and it would be the fifth-best mark in school history regardless of position, given a minimum of 10 receptions.

Hunter's 255 receiving yards are the most by a tight end for a season since Cunningham had 312 his senior year (1975). Overall, it is already the seventh-best reception yardage season in Tiger history for a tight end.



Spiller and Davis have combined for 1,686 rushing yards and 26 touchdowns in 2006, as both are averaging 6.3 yards per carry.

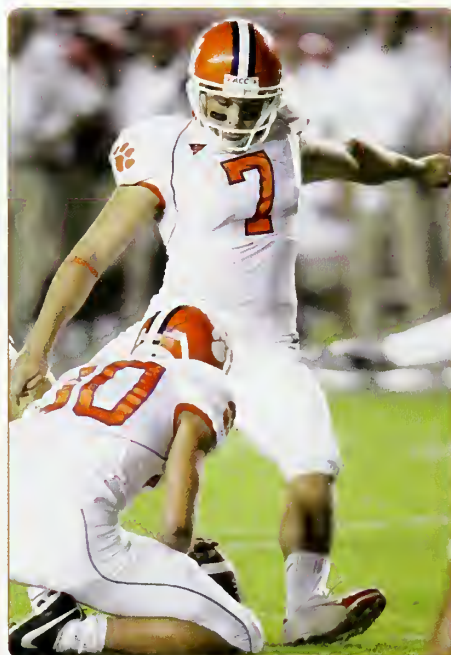

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Roman Fry

Senior Spotlight

He may just be the most versatile lineman in the ACC. Roman Fry, also known as the "Hurricane," has seen time at center, guard, and tackle over the last four years in a Tiger uniform. The 6'4", 300-pound fifth-year senior from Ironton, OH settled into the offensive guard position this year, but he is always ready and willing to go wherever the team needs him.

"It may be nice to play one position, but that's not how I help the team," Fry said.

This Clemson offensive lineman has benefited from a diverse athletic background. He began his athletic career as a swimmer in West Virginia. Little league football coaches told his father Ed that he was too big to play with the guys in his age division. His father then decided that Fry would not play up with the older boys.

Instead, he enrolled him in karate and soccer to jumpstart his athletic career. Ed, now a high school coach, concluded that this would benefit him in the long run more so than jumping in with the older, more experienced players. These other athletic experiences helped Fry practice proper body control, contact leverage, and the precise footwork that he would later need to be a standout football player.

Swimming on a regular basis turned out to be one of the best things for Fry's football career. He spent the majority of four years learning how to use his entire body, combining the strokes of his arms with the kicking of his feet. These instincts molded him into a flexible, multi-talented athlete, landing him numerous scholarship offers. It also allowed him to acquire the exceptional ability to play all five positions on the offensive line.

During his senior year at Ironton High, Fry rotated at offensive line, tight end, defensive line, and special teams. He stood only 6'0" and weighed 240 pounds. Needless to say, it was not easy getting recognized to play on the offensive line, which was where he really wanted to be.

Florida Head Coach Urban Meyer, who was then at Bowling Green, told him he would probably be too small to play football in the Mid-American Conference. Notre Dame wanted him to join its program, but only as a defensive player, while Cincinnati recruited him to play tight end. Ohio State and Purdue also sought out Ohio's #23-ranked prospect.

The two schools that fit Fry's interests and future goals, however, were West Virginia and Clemson. After recruiters met with his father, it was very evident that Fry had another growth spurt on the horizon and would be big enough to compete on the Division I-A level.

"They looked at my dad, who weighs 360 pounds, and they said I would be big enough to play," #72 laughed.

Immediately after his visit to Tigertown, Fry knew that this was the college for him. The combination of the great Clemson tradition along with the impressive athletic facilities and reputation hooked this Ohio native.

Over the years, Fry's father has been the biggest influence on him. Ed has been able to instill more than enough insight and wisdom over the years, because he has held positions in strength and conditioning, as well as a football, basketball, and track coach. He always worked his son hard, but he made sure he was a well-rounded athlete. To be the best, Fry had to be more than just a standout lineman.

Clearly, the apple does not fall far from the tree. Fry can squat 640 pounds, which is second-best on the team behind his fellow lineman Dustin Fry (no relation). He has a 1,785-pound total weight lift, also among the best on the squad. He has a team-tying-best 410-pound lift in the hang clean, 410-pound bench press, 365-pound lift in the power clean, and 310-pound power clean push press as well.

Fry is statistically the second-strongest player on the team even though he is the lightest of the five interior linemen who started during Clemson's 7-1 opening to the season. This is also the one aspect of Fry's career that has remained continual and consistent. Regardless of where he is on the field, his workouts have remained steady, and as a result, his footwork and quickness are his best athletic attributes.

Upon his arrival at Clemson, he was red-shirted, along with Nathan Bennett and Dustin Fry, giving the trio the opportunity to get stronger and learn from the sidelines.

Roman Fry came out strong and ready to contribute to the Tigers' offensive line during the 2003 campaign. While battling for the starting spot all season, he played 300 total snaps, more than any other freshman on the Tiger team. That included 21 snaps in Clemson's 2004 Peach Bowl appearance against #6 Ten-

nessee, the highest-ranked team Clemson had beaten in a bowl game in 23 years.

This was only the start for this go-getter. The 2004 season proved to be even more impressive, as he played in all 11 games, including one as a starter. His 246 snaps again were tops among the reserve linemen. This was where his versatility really started to show. He started at right guard in the Florida State game and had 38 knockdown blocks, more than any other non-starter.

The solid sophomore season only motivated Fry to get even stronger, faster, and better all-around. The 2005 season was his best year, as he played in 11 games, starting seven, and won the team Hustle Award on offense. He was named Second-Team All-ACC at offensive guard, but he also saw action as Clemson's backup center.

Fry was the only Tiger offensive lineman to earn First or Second-Team All-ACC honors in 2005. Though he did not earn his starting position until later in the season (at Wake Forest), he came out strong, leading the team in knockdown blocks in each of the last seven games of the season.

He went on to lead the Tigers in knockdown blocks with 98.5, including an incredible 18 knockdown blocks in just 53 snaps in the win over #16 Florida State, perhaps the best knockdown blocks-per-snap ratio in school history for an offensive lineman. As it was, it was the most knockdown blocks for a Tiger offensive lineman in four years. Playing every offensive snap in the South Carolina game was one of his career highlights as well.

Fry was a huge contributor and a big reason Clemson won six of their last seven games in 2005. In the win over Colorado in the Champs Sports Bowl, he had 10 knockdowns and graded a team-best 88 percent in 55 snaps. He tallied five intimidation blocks, which were the most by a Tiger in a game all year.

In seven games of the 2005 season, he received grades in the 80s and 90s to tie for team-best in that area. Fry truly finished the year strong, as he went from not starting in September, to being an all-conference performer.

As a result of his intense focus and dedicated work ethic, the Football Writers Association of America named Fry to the 2006 preseason watch list for the Outland Trophy. He was one of 54 offensive and defensive linemen listed from around the nation. More impressively, he was one of just five ACC players on the list. He was first-team preseason All-ACC by *Athlon*, *Lindy's*, *Sporting News*, *USA Today*, and *Street & Smith*. *Lindy's* rated him as the eighth-best offensive guard in the nation, while *Sporting News* rated him #13.

None of this preseason hype went to Fry's head, however. He received ACC Player-of-the-Week recognition for his September 16 performance against the #9 Seminoles. He totaled 13 knockdown blocks in just 53 snaps and graded out at 87 percent in the Tigers' 27-20 victory in Tallahassee.

Fry's biggest block came on Clemson's winning touchdown play when James Davis ran behind his block to score the winning touchdown with only eight seconds left in the game. It was noted that he played a significant role, as Clemson had 151 yards rushing against the Seminole defense.

Largely due to Fry and his linemates, the Tigers have returned to their legacy of strong running and powerful offensive linemen. He spends most of his time with these guys. In their close camaraderie, they have learned to block together, play together, and live as a group.

The Frys (who are not related) even have a friendly competition in the weightroom. They keep each other motivated and on their toes. Consequently, they are the two strongest players on this competitive team.

Roman Fry started the first eight games this season before he suffered a torn ACL in the third play of Clemson's victory over #13 Georgia Tech in Death Valley, abruptly ending his football career in

a Tiger uniform. He suffered the injury while pass protecting. It was a sudden ending to what had been an outstanding senior year. *Sports Illustrated.com* had just named him a midseason first-team All-American, and he was also named the same by *CollegeFootballNews.com*. He had surgery to repair the torn ACL on November 1.

Fry completed his Clemson career with 18 starts and 43 career games played. He was leading the Tigers in knockdown blocks this year entering the Georgia Tech game with a total of 62. He, therefore, finished his career with 215 knockdown blocks over his four impressive seasons at Clemson.

"This is another big loss for our football team," said Head Coach Tommy Bowden. "He will be difficult to replace on the field and in terms of senior leadership. When you look at our high national rankings in rushing, scoring, and total offense, Roman has had a lot to do with it."

Though this is definitely not the way Fry expected to end his collegiate career, he still has a lot to fall back on. He is not only a well-rounded football player, he is a well-rounded, charismatic person. He has made the ACC Academic Honor Roll and will graduate in December with a degree in human resource development.

His two other favorite sports are bullriding and fishing. Unknown to most, he is also a very witty, laid-back guy.

"He's an entertainer," quarterback Will Proctor said. "He'll do anything."

Fry has ridden mechanical bulls, and has even sang karaoke songs by Hank Williams, Jr. and *Alabama* over the years. He is a guy that likes to have fun.

Football has been Fry's passion since he was a young boy. He has loved it, embraced it, and has given it as much respect any player possibly could. He has had those same characteristics during his career at Clemson, and we are sure that attitude will continue in his pursuit of an NFL career.

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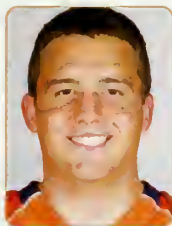

Carey made his way to Clemson from Scott Depot, WV. He was an offensive and defensive tackle at Winfield High School. As a senior, he was named an all-county first-team offensive and defensive lineman, and was an all-conference performer on the defensive line. Carey walked-on to the Tiger football team in 2003.

"Being from the state of West Virginia, I grew up a Mountaineer fan, going to all of the home games with my family," Carey said.

But, Carey explained that he was recruited by several Ivy League schools close to home during his senior year. His decision to come to Clemson stemmed from advice from his little brother and friends, who had participated in camps at Clemson.

"I took their advice and decided to visit," he recalled. "After I was accepted, I decided to come, because it seemed like the perfect fit. I really liked the beautiful campus and great atmosphere."

As an offensive guard, Carey played for the first time in the 37-7 win over Temple in 2005. He also recorded his first knockdown block as a Tiger on his first snap. Carey also saw action in the 52-7 victory over North Carolina and in the 51-0 shutout over Louisiana Tech earlier this season.

Carey says he would not change anything about his experience with the Clemson football team. "It feels good to be a part of something special and be a part of everyone working as a team," said Carey.

His most memorable moment of his career was the 30-27 overtime win in 2003 against a nationally-ranked Virginia team. Carey stated, "Rubbing the Rock and running down the Hill for the first time on homecoming was something I will never forget."

A psychology major, Carey will graduate in May of 2007. Then he plans to go to medical school, and he hopes to one day work in emergency medicine and surgery. Carey says his family has always been supportive of everything he does.

"My parents, especially my father, are my role models, because they taught me to work hard and never quit," Carey said. "They stressed to always do my best at everything I chose to do."



#59 Nic Riddle
LS • Ladson, SC

A senior from Ladson, SC, Riddle has been a walk-on long snapper for Clemson since 2003. He is the first player from Stratford High School to ever play in a game as a Tiger. At Stratford High, he played defensive end and center. He was also a discus thrower on the track team.

An ACC Academic Honor Roll member, he said the reason he came to Clemson was for academics. "I got some offers from small schools, but I didn't want to play football. I got bored and decided to try out for the team in 2003. I decided to learn how to snap because I had never snapped before."

Riddle was a letterman in 2005, as he played in the first eight games before suffering a shoulder injury. He was the first-team long snapper on placekicks before his injury. He has playing experience as a long snapper on field goals and punts.

Riddle said there are many adversities he has faced. "It was hard making the team, because you're not sure if you will make it or get cut. I messed up once and got knocked back to second team. I have just had to stay focused and forget about the mistakes. Then, I had the shoulder injury last summer and knee surgery this past summer."

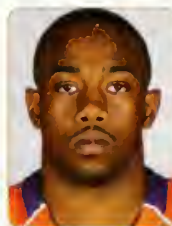
"The fans have always been supportive of me and the rest of the team," he said. "There are always a ton of fans wherever we go, and they always speak positive to us in public."

Riddle said his favorite moment as a Tiger was his first career start in the 25-24 win over #17 Texas A&M last season. He was the long snapper on field goals and punts in that game, and a part of the game-winning field by Jad Dean.

Riddle attributes his success in life to his parents. "They are my role models, because I see how they live their lives. I do everything with my life based on how they live."

A civil engineering major, Riddle will graduate this December. He hopes to get a job in Greenville, SC, working in construction management. Riddle said he is glad he decided to learn the long-snapping position and walk on the team.

"I wouldn't trade it for anything. My best friends are on the team, and I live with some players. The whole team is great, and I've had an awesome time."

A fifth-year senior from Monks Corner, SC, Smith walked on to the football team in 2003. At Berkeley High, he played linebacker, and was an all-region performer in 2000 and 2001. Smith now sits as the second-team fullback on the Tiger depth chart.

Being from the lower part of the state, he grew up a Gamecock fan. "I went with some friends to South Carolina games and only one Clemson game," he said. "So, I was probably more of a Gamecock fan. But when I was deciding on a school, I thought Clemson was a better fit for my goals academically."

"I didn't appreciate Clemson until I got here and ran down the Hill for the first time. It is a family-oriented environment. The fans have a lot of pride in the school."

As a red-shirt freshman in 2003, Smith played in the final eight games of the season on special teams, including the 2004 Peach Bowl win against #6 Tennessee, and earned a letter.

Smith said his mother is his role model and the reason for his success. "She raised my siblings and I in a single-parent home. She always worked hard to make sure we got through school, and she really paved the road for our success."

Smith began his Tiger career as a linebacker, and he thanks Coach David Blackwell for giving him a chance to play. But, Smith missed the entire 2005 season with a torn ACL. After going through rehab for eight months, he has battled back and played in three of the first ten games this season.

An industrial engineering major and an ACC Academic Honor Roll member, Smith will graduate in December. After leaving Tigertown, he will have several possibilities for his bright future.

"I have talked to some companies, including one in Texas," said Smith. "I also may take some graduate school classes at Clemson."

Smith said his best moment at Clemson was this summer when he became a scholarship player. "Coach Bowden said I was going to be on full scholarship this year, and that is a dream for a walk-on. It made me feel respected and appreciated. I immediately called my mom and told her we weren't going to have to pay for school anymore."

Smith said the Georgia Tech game in October has been his favorite part of 2006. "Having GameDay here and wearing all purple was huge. I will always remember that weekend and getting the win."

Senior Spotlight

Waiting has been a big part of Dustin Fry's football career.

After arriving on campus in 2002 after a successful high school career, Fry found himself playing behind Tommy Sharpe. The switch to being a reserve was difficult for him, especially given that Sharpe stood only 6'0" and weighed just 270 pounds.

"You go from being all-world in high school to holding a dummy," said the 320-pound Fry. "It was very humbling to realize that you're not as good as you think you are."

After red-shirting his first year, Fry saw limited playing time in 2003. Though he became the first Tiger freshman to start a game at center since 1980 when he started against North Carolina, he played only 168 snaps in 11 games that year.

The next year was not much better, when Fry was again a backup to Sharpe. His participation actually decreased, which was frustrating to the talented player who is now an All-ACC candidate.

"You start to think, 'is this really something I'm going to be able to do?'" Fighting the self doubt was a big obstacle for me to overcome."

Finally, in his junior year, Fry was given the opportunity he had spent three years waiting for. He started all 12 games and was a big reason Clemson made a 90-yard improvement in terms of total offense over 2004. Fry played the most plays among offensive linemen in nine of the 12 games, including each of the last four, which were all Tiger wins.

Fry also graded in the 80s or 90s in eight of the 12 games, including a career-high 94-percent grade against both Georgia Tech and #19 South Carolina. Fry was the winner of the Solid Rock Award, given by the coaching staff each year to an outstanding offensive lineman.

Prior to this season, the Summerville, SC native was a preseason candidate for the Dave Rimington Award, presented annually to the nation's top center. He was also a preseason All-ACC pick. While Fry was honored by the recognition, the success of the team is what is most important to him.

"I don't need my name to have awards next to it, so it's not that big of a deal," Fry admitted. "It's not what I play for. I think if you just play, the awards will come to you."

During this, his final season, Fry and the offensive line have proved to be one of the best lines in the ACC, if not the entire country. "I consider ourselves to be the best offensive line in the nation," Fry stated with confidence. "I don't think that's being cocky, that's just what we are."

With the exception of junior Barry Richardson, this offensive line has been together for the past four years, which is something that Fry has truly enjoyed being a part of. He credits a lot of their success to knowing each other so well and being comfortable with one another.

"Three of us (Nathan Bennett, Roman Fry, Dustin Fry) came in together, and this is what we've talked about doing since we've been here," said the starting center. "We have wanted to turn this offensive line around and make it so we're not looked upon as a finesse offense anymore. We can pound the ball. This year we've found our own with this zone-blocking scheme, and we have done well."

Clemson is among the top-10 teams in the nation in rushing offense. If the season ended today, it would be among the top-10 averages in school history. Five times in the first 10 games this year the Tigers rushed for at least 200 yards, a benchmark for success with the line.

The Tigers opened with a 7-1 record thanks to the play of the line along with running backs James Davis and C.J. Spiller. But the 31-7 win over #13 Georgia Tech proved costly, as senior Roman Fry (no relation) suffered a torn ACL, ending his Clemson career.

"We're so fluid with each other, I don't even have to make calls," said Dustin Fry of his linemate with the same last name. "I know where he's going to be, and he knows where I'm going to be. We had such good consistency together."

While he misses looking over and not seeing Roman, he believes the offensive line will bounce back with Chris McDuffie in the lineup and continue to help the Tigers remain among the highest-scoring teams in the nation.

Fry has had many great moments as a Tiger, but he points to a few games as some of the most memorable of his career.

"To have three wins over Florida State in four years is pretty big. It was great when we won here, beating Coach Bobby Bowden for the first time in 2003, when they were ranked #3 in the country," Fry said with a smile. "Beating Miami at Miami was huge, because they never lose there. Finally, the Georgia Tech game earlier in this season is something that I'll never forget, because that was such a big game against a top-15 opponent. Hopefully, we'll add more to the list as the season goes on."

Fry is motivated by a con-

stant drive to win. A team player, he prefers to lead by example and hopes that his teammates will follow the example that he sets.

"I'm more worried about letting the team down," said #62. "I want to do the best that I can to help the team win."

Regarded as the strongest player on the team, Fry works hard in the weightroom and leads the team in many different categories. "My greatest strength in football is my strength," said Fry, whose 1,830 total pounds lifted in all areas is fourth-best on record (since the 1980s) and the best on the team.

Playing behind Sharpe for three years was not the first time in Fry's career that he had to wait. It was not until his freshman year of high school that he began to play football, because there were weight limits that did not allow the heavyset young man to participate in tackle football.

So Fry's efforts in his younger years were focused towards baseball, a sport that he excelled in. In fact, while living in Spain for a short time, he was a member of Spain's National Little League team that nearly made it to the Little League World Series in Williamsport, PA.

Playing a position that is dominated by larger men, it is hard to believe that a man of Fry's stature had been left out of the game for so long due to his size. However, he soon found success on the field as a standout for Summerville High.

Fry finished his senior season with 80 knock-down blocks and graded better than 80 percent. He garnered many awards for his outstanding play, including being named All-American by **SuperPrep**, **SportsLine.com**, and **Max Emfinger**. Fry was coached by the legendary John McKissick, the winningest high school football coach in United States history.

Football was not the only sport that Fry excelled in during high school. He found success in wrestling and track & field, and was named all-region, all-area, and all-state in both. During his junior year, Fry won two state championships, including one for shot put and the other as a heavyweight wrestler. He defended his wrestling title during his senior year, once again winning the AA championship, going undefeated in the process.

Fry credits Wrestling Coach and former Junior Varsity Football Coach Steve LaPrad as being a very inspirational figure in his athletic career.

Throughout his career, Fry also credits his parents with much of the success he has had. "It's always been my parents that have been very inspirational to me. They have never pushed me too hard. If I wanted to do it, they would support me, but not be over aggressive."

His parents currently live in nearby Walhalla, SC and attend all of his games. He sees them every week, usually for dinner on Thursday nights. His mother, a massage therapist, gives him a massage before every game. Perhaps that is a reason he has never missed a game due to injury even though he plays more snaps than any other Tiger.

The Fry's came to the Clemson area from Summerville, although

that was the last stop after years of moving. His father was in the military, so Fry was forced to move all over the world when he was growing up.

Born in Wahiawa, HI, Fry lived in Texas, Virginia, Spain, and Florida. His favorite place was Spain, where he lived from the age of nine to 12. While he enjoyed seeing different parts of the world, sometimes moving so frequently was difficult.

"It was tough moving," Fry recalled. "A lot of the kids in Summerville had been there for a long time, and not that I have trouble making friends, but people would always say 'Remember back in third grade...' I could never say that, because I had already moved three times from when I was in third grade. That was tough."

Fry has been very pleased with his most recent move to Clemson. He was recruited by Georgia Tech, Maryland, North Carolina, and South Carolina, but he did not want to be in a big city. So he chose a small town, filled with Southern hospitality and beautiful scenery.

"I just fell in love with this place," Fry said with a smile. "I love the country style and how it is in the middle of nowhere, but it's still close to major cities. I love how this place looks, especially this time of year in the fall."

Fry has thoroughly enjoyed his time at Clemson, so much in fact that he said that he will miss "everything" when he graduates.

"I'll miss the environment, especially this time of year with the leaves changing," said Fry. "I'll miss Saturdays and the Clemson crowds that travel everywhere with us, always packing out the stadium."

"The feeling at the top of the Hill is also something I'll never forget. Rubbing the Rock is another big one...I'll miss that after the South Carolina game when it's my last run down the Hill. It's going to be sad, but it's time to move on to other things."

When Fry is away from football, he can be found on nearby golf courses or at the lake, which are two pastimes he enjoys in his spare time. He is also musically-talented, having played the guitar for eight years. Although for Fry, free time is hard to come by when juggling academics and a football career.

"I enjoy relaxing away from football," admitted Fry. "It's enjoyable to get away sometimes."

A sport management major, Fry spent this past summer working a 400-hour internship with former

Tiger center and recent Clemson Hall of Fame inductee Kyle Young in the athletic department. Fry learned a lot from the experience, and was very impressed by Young and his work ethic. Likewise, Young, who coached Fry as a graduate assistant for two years, enjoyed having him in the office.

"He's a solid all-around guy," said Young, who was a two-time All-American between 1998-01. "He did a good job for me in his internship, just like he does on the field. After he finishes playing in the NFL, he'll be a solid employee. He's a level-headed guy, so everything he does, he does pretty well."

With graduation nearing, Fry looks forward to the next step in his playing career. He has dreamed about being a professional athlete since he was a child, and he is excited about where the future might take him.

He has certainly impressed the pro scouts this year with Clemson's team success on the ground and in pass protection. Clemson has allowed just five sacks all season, the fewest total in the nation. Fry has graded at least 80 percent in every game this year, and he has had the top grade among linemen in four of the first 10 games.

"If I could play anywhere, it would be any team that has a zone-blocking scheme," said Fry. "I wouldn't want to play in any other type of running scheme than that. So that would be anywhere from Atlanta, to Indianapolis, to Denver, and I think Green Bay just put it in. And, I would want a cold-weather team."

Wherever he plays in the NFL, he will probably have to work hard, but with that work ethic and patient demeanor, he is destined to play at the next level.

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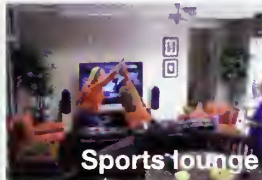
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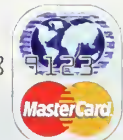

- been recognized as **Time Magazine's** "Public College-of-the-Year" and ranked #1 among the "Best Places to Work in Academia" by **The Scientist Magazine**.
- developed and implemented an academic "Road Map" with eight emphasis areas aligned with South Carolina's economic needs.
- launched major new education and research-based economic initiatives, including the Clemson University International Center for Automotive Research (CU-ICAR) in Greenville, and the Clemson University Restoration Institute in Charleston.
- redesigned the general education curriculum to focus on learning outcomes, and give undergraduates more opportunities for study abroad, service-learning, and research.
- hosted the first-ever ACC "Meeting of the Minds" conference for undergraduate research and creative inquiry.
- attracted more students who are clearly among America's best.
- more than doubled external research funding, and completed Clemson's largest capital campaign.

Working with state leaders and private industry partners, Barker has steered Clemson into a greater economic development role. Master planning is complete for the CU-ICAR campus near I-85. The BMW Information Technology Resources Center is operational and construction is underway on the

Carroll Campbell Graduate Engineering Center. The first class of Ph.D. students in automotive engineering will enter this fall and recruiting has begun for master's degree candidates. They will be taught by distinguished professors brought to the state to hold endowed chairs established under the South Carolina Research Centers of Excellence Act. Three of the four chairs devoted to automotive engineering - the BMW Chair, the Michelin Chair, and the Timken Chair - have already been filled.

Clemson is also investing \$80 million to develop an advanced materials industry cluster. The linchpin is the Advanced Materials Research Laboratory, located in the Clemson Research Park in Anderson County, which is anchored by the nation's top optical materials and electron microscopy laboratories.

Barker also is becoming a leading voice in higher education in South Carolina and beyond. He currently chairs the Commission on Colleges of the Southern Association of Colleges and Schools and chaired the ACC Council of Presidents during the league's recent expansion. He began a term on the national NCAA Board of Directors in spring of 2006.

For his leadership, Barker has received the Order of the Palmetto, South Carolina's highest civilian honor, and the 2006 Chief Executive Leadership Award from the Council for Advancement and Support of Education (CASE) Southeastern District III. He was an invited speaker at the first-ever Forum on Presidential Leadership in June of 2006, sponsored by The Chronicle of Higher Education, and attended by more than 250 college and university presidents and trustees.

As president, Barker remains committed to the classroom. Each spring, he is part of a team that teaches an undergraduate course exploring "a sense of place" in architecture, literature, and history.

In presenting the Distinguished Alumnus Award in 2005, Washington University Chancellor Mark Wrighton said, "James F. Barker has taken the architectural skills and knowledge required to design a building and applied them to the future of a university. His architect's vision, collaborative instincts,

and sense of place are rapidly pushing Clemson up through the ranks of the nation's top public universities. He has become a leader in national academic circles by creating a new model of education, building interdisciplinary partnerships among the professional schools, and the basic curriculum by tearing down artificial walls between disciplines."

A native of Kingsport, TN, Barker earned his B.A. degree from Clemson in 1970 and his master of architecture and urban design degree from Washington University in Saint Louis, MO in 1973. He and his wife Marcia have a son (Jacob) and daughter-in-law (Rita Bolt), and another son Britt.

Clemson University Athletic Director



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It hasn't taken Dr. Terry Don Phillips long to make his mark on Clemson University. That impact was recognized in June of 2006 when he was honored by NACDA (National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics) as the 2005-06

GeneralSports Turf Systems Athletic Director-of-the-Year for the Southeast Region of Division I-A. He was one of just four Division I-A athletic directors honored at the annual convention in New Orleans.

Phillips was honored for many reasons. In 2005-06, Clemson finished its most successful all-around athletics year in his tenure. The program had six-top 25 programs, including top-10 final rankings in men's soccer, golf, and baseball. It marked the first time since 1979 that Clemson reached the Final Four in soccer and the College World Series in baseball in the same academic year.

Clemson also had top-25 finishes in football, men's tennis, and women's tennis. The school's athletic program won a postseason football, men's basketball, and baseball game this academic year, the first time the program has done that since 1993-94. Clemson was the only school in the country to win a postseason football game, a postseason basketball game, and a College World Series game.

Clemson finished #32 in the nation in the Director's Cup standings on a per-sport basis in 2005-06 and #39 in total points, Clemson's highest rankings under the current scoring structure.

From an academic standpoint, nine of Clemson's 15 sports programs scored a perfect 100-percent graduation rate according to the Graduation Success Rate (GSR) figures announced by the NCAA on December 19, 2005. Clemson was #7 in the nation among the 119 Division I-A institutions in percentage of programs with a 100-percent score.

The Tiger football program had a 94-percent rate, fourth in the nation among Division I programs, trailing only Navy, Notre Dame, and Wake Forest. In the spring semester of 2006, the 15 programs had a combined GPA of 2.84, third-best on record, and all-time records were set for most Dean's List and President's List student-athletes.

"There's nothing worse than trying to maintain status quo," said Phillips, who became Clemson's 10th athletic director on July 1, 2002.

That motto has been a basic tenet that has characterized his career as an administrator and his pursuit to develop Clemson into a model athletic program in the 21st century. His beliefs are in line with the University's overall goal of making Clemson one of the top-20 public universities in the nation.

His resolve comes from a unique balance of experience in nearly every phase of college athletics, as well as a devotion to higher education that includes both a doc-

torate and law degree. He remains a classroom presence by teaching a Sports Law section in the Accountancy & Legal Studies department. In addition, he is chair of the NCAA Division I Infractions Appeals Committee, which serves the appellate role for all university and individual appeals arising from the Committee on Infractions.

Those influences are obvious in his strategic plan for Tiger athletics, which provides for a model program that can compete at the highest levels with academic integrity, concern for the student-athlete, financial responsibility, and in full compliance.

Steady strides have been made toward these goals through facility improvements and the development of concepts that will serve the entire program, starting with the endzone expansion. In 2006, 1,000 premium club seats will open and create a vital new revenue stream for future facilities.

Future plans call for a new comprehensive football building at Memorial Stadium. It will benefit the entire department, as it will create additional updated facilities in the McFadden Building for the Olympic sports program. A "One Clemson Center" will also be constructed to showcase the history of Clemson University, including its military and athletic heritage.

Since Phillips' arrival at Clemson, many highlights toward being a model program have occurred on the field as well, beginning with Clemson's first-ever national championship in golf in the spring of 2003, the first title for any Tiger program in 16 years.

His second year included an incredible run on the gridiron to end the season, as Tommy Bowden's Tigers defeated #3 Florida State in November and #6 Tennessee in the Peach Bowl. The football program has continued to make strides since then and ranked in the top 25 for the second time in the last three years with its #21 finish in 2005, and it is a consensus top 20 team in the preseason for 2006.

The women's tennis team was one of three programs to win ACC Championships in the same weekend in 2003-04 and advanced to the Final Four of the NCAA Tournament, the first women's athletic team in Clemson history to reach the Final Four in

any postseason tournament. Nancy Harris' team duplicated the accomplishment in 2004-05, and has a string of four-straight top-20 seasons.

Excellence in academics has been a constant on his resumé. He has an undergraduate degree from Arkansas (1970), a master's from Virginia Tech (1974), a doctorate from Virginia Tech (1978), and a law degree from the Arkansas School of Law (1996). He is a member of the Arkansas Bar, American Bar Association, and the Sports Lawyers Association.

From an experience standpoint, Phillips has worked in nearly all phases of college athletics. He coached on the football staff at Virginia Tech, supervised spring sports and student-athlete enrichment at Florida, handled athletic fundraising and facility enhancement at Missouri and Arkansas, and had 15 years experience as an athletic director, including 13 at the Division I level, prior to his appointment at Clemson, coming from Oklahoma State.

Football was transformed from a perennial losing status to defeating Oklahoma during five of the eight years he was associated with Oklahoma State (1994-02). For this, he received the National Football Foundation Oklahoma Chapter Outstanding Contribution to Amateur Football Award in 2002.

When it came to success on the field and in the classroom, OSU's programs were among the Big 12's best. The achievements of the program included two national titles in men's golf, a men's basketball Final Four, two trips to the College World Series, 13 Big 12 titles, and 11 individual national champions, along with 53 academic All-Americans.

Before leading Oklahoma State, Phillips served as senior associate athletic director at Arkansas from 1988-94. He ran the daily operations and had oversight of facility projects for the men's programs, and was president of the Razorback Foundation.

Phillips was athletic director at Liberty (1980-81) and Louisiana-Lafayette (1983-88). He was also an assistant athletic director at Missouri (1981-83), and began his administrative career in 1979 as an assistant athletic director at Florida.

Phillips began his career in college athletics coaching football. He started as a graduate assistant at Arkansas from 1970-71. He moved on to Virginia Tech as an assistant coach from 1971-78 before joining the ranks of athletic administration.

Winning has been on his resumé since his playing days at Arkansas. He lettered on three Frank Broyles teams (1966,68,69). Arkansas was 27-5 in the three years and played in two Sugar Bowl games.

In addition to Phillips' leadership with the NCAA Infractions Appeals Committee, he also works with the NCAA certification program. He currently serves on several ACC Committees: Finance Committee, chair of the Committee on Infractions & Penalties, Television Committee, the Men's Basketball Committee, and the Football Committee.

Phillips has two children, John Dennis (29) and Sarah-Jane (26), and three stepchildren, Meagan (17), Marshall (15), and Madison (13). His wife Tricia is a graduate of the University of Missouri School of Journalism, and earlier enjoyed a career in athletics and development. She is now active in the Clemson and Seneca communities.

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Tommy Bowden

Head Coach



When one looks at Tommy Bowden's resumé, the first thing that comes to mind is consistency. Bowden has completed nine seasons as a Division I head coach, and all nine of his teams have been bowl eligible at the conclusion of the regular season.

Each of his last six teams have finished the season with a winning record. A winning season in 2006 would give him a Tiger coaching record seven straight winning seasons, and he would become just the fifth head coach in ACC history to record seven straight winning seasons with the same program.

Bowden has also shown consistency in terms of improvement over the course of seasons. In each of the last three years, his teams have won at least five of its last six games. The 2003 team won its last four games, including wins over top-10 Florida State and Tennessee to finish ranked in the top 25. The 2005 team won six of its last seven games, a first for a Tiger team since 1991.

There has also been consistency in terms of success against Clemson's in-state rival (South Carolina). The Tigers have won six of the seven meetings with the Gamecocks since Bowden became Clemson's head coach in 1999, and the 85.7-percent winning mark is the best of any Tiger head coach in history against the Gamecocks given a minimum of five games. He has an average victory margin of 12.3 points per game in the state-rivalry game, and all six wins have been recorded against future Hall of Fame Head Coaches Lou Holtz and Steve Spurrier.

Through nine seasons as a Division I head coach, Bowden has a 70-37 record, a 65.4-percent winning mark that is eighth-best among active coaches with at least six years of experience. In conference games, he has never had a sub-.500 record, and his overall conference record stands at 43-25 for a 63.2-percent winning percentage.

In seven years at Clemson, he has a 52-33 (.612) mark and six bowl appearances. He has 32 ACC wins as well. The only program with more ACC wins during this time is Florida State. The 52 overall victories rank third in Clemson history in total wins. The 29-7 victory over South Carolina in the 2004 season finale was not only the 600th win in Clemson history, it moved Bowden ahead of Hall of Fame Coach Jess Neely into third place on Clemson's coaching victories list. Only Frank Howard and Danny Ford are ahead of Bowden.

Bowden has tallied his record against a difficult schedule. In his first year at Clemson, the schedule was ranked in the top 10 in the nation. In 2001, his team defeated five teams that finished with a winning record, tied for the third-highest single-season figure in school history. One of the wins was a 47-44 overtime triumph at #9 Georgia Tech. It was the highest-ranked

road win in 20 years for the program. In 2003 and 2004, Clemson's schedule strength once again ranked in the top 25 by the Sagarin rating. The 2005 team faced five top-25 teams in the regular season, a first in school history.

Twice Bowden has received ACC Coach-of-the-Year honors (1999,03), joining Howard, Charley Pell, and Ford as the only two-time recipients of that award in Clemson football history. In January of 2006, he was given the Grant Teaff National Coach-of-the-Year Award by the Fellowship of Christian Athletes.

Off the field, Clemson has graduated nearly 80 percent of its seniors in his seven years. Clemson's graduation success rate of 94 percent in 2005 was fourth-best among the 119 Division I programs. In 2003, Clemson was 11th in the nation, including second among public schools, in the NCAA graduation-rate study for scholarship football signees who entered Clemson in 1996. Clemson was first in the nation in graduation rate among African-Americans (100 percent). Each of the top-six semester team GPAs have been recorded under Bowden.

In 2005, Clemson had a record of 8-4, including a 3-2 mark against top-25 ranked teams. All four of the losses were by six points or less and by a total of 14 points. Two of those losses came in overtime, therefore the Tigers lost the four games by a combined five points at the end of regulation.

The 2005 team also won six of its last seven games, including a 19-10 win over Colorado in the Champs Sports Bowl. Clemson had the best record among the 12 ACC teams over that time period.

Clemson finished in the top 25 in four national defensive rankings, including 11th in scoring defense. After the victory over Colorado in the Champs

Sports Bowl, the Tigers were ranked #21 in the final **Associated Press** and **USA Today** polls. Clemson had three wins over top-20 ranked teams, the most in one season by a Tiger team since 1989.

In four years at Clemson, Charlie Whitehurst became the most prolific signal-caller in school history. He set 46 Tiger records, including records for passing yards (9,665), completions (817), completion percentage (59.5), and touchdown passes (49). He directed Clemson to 25 wins as a starting quarterback, the second-most wins in school history.

Consistency in his approach is one reason Clemson went from a 1-4 start to bowl eligibility in 2004. It was the first time since 1963 that a Tiger team had overcome such a deficit to finish with a winning record.

Clemson played a complete game at #10 Miami (FL) on November 6, 2004 and defeated the Hurricanes in the Orange Bowl 24-17 in overtime. It was the second overtime win of the year for the Tigers, who are 4-2 in extra-session games under Bowden.

The win over Miami gave Bowden and the Tigers three wins over top-10 programs in a 13-game span, something that had been done at Clemson just once previously (1981 National Championship team). All three of those programs (Florida State, Tennessee, Miami) have won the national championship within the last eight seasons.

Over the last three seasons, Bowden has won seven games over coaches who have won the national title (Bobby Bowden (twice), Phillip Fulmer, Larry Coker, Holtz (twice), and Spurrier). These big wins have stimulated interest in the program. The Tigers averaged over 78,000 fans per home game in 2005. Clemson has been in the top 20 in home attendance each of his seven years at Clemson, and five of the top-nine average figures have come in his tenure.

With Clemson's selection to the 2004 Peach Bowl, Bowden became the first head coach in Clemson and ACC history to take a team to a bowl game in each of his first five seasons. In fact, no coach had ever done so more than twice to open his career at Clemson.

The 2004 Peach Bowl appearance meant that it was the first time since the senior class of 1991 that Clemson went to a bowl game five straight years. Clemson's red-shirt seniors of 2003 were the first group he recruited, so it is an indication of the firm foundation his first group set. In December of 2003, Bowden cemented his place at Clemson by signing a seven-year contract, which will go through 2010.

The 2003 season was a breakthrough year in many ways. Clemson earned its highest-ever win over a ranked team with a 26-10 victory over #3 Florida State. The Tigers also defeated #24 Virginia in a thrilling overtime game. The 39-3 win over a bowl-bound Georgia Tech team was Clemson's largest victory margin in the series since 1900 as well.

The 2003 victory over Florida State, Clemson's first in 12 tries since the Seminoles joined the ACC, was the beginning of a four-game winning streak to close the season. In those four games, Clemson outscored its opponents 156-48, an average score of 39-12. Clemson defeated arch-rival South Carolina in Columbia 63-17. It was the most points ever scored by a team in the 101-game series and the Tigers' largest win margin in the series since 1900.

The season concluded with a 27-14 win over #6 Tennessee, the highest-ranked team Clemson has defeated in a bowl game since 1981, when the Tigers defeated #4 Nebraska in the Orange Bowl to claim the national championship. As a result, Clemson finished the season with nine wins and a #22 final national ranking.

The 2002 season included victories over bowl teams Georgia Tech and Wake Forest, and a third victory in four years over arch-rival South Carolina. Clemson gained 434 yards of total offense in the

27-20 win over the Gamecocks, the most yards against Holtz's defense all season.

Clemson had another record-setting season in 2001, a season that culminated with a Humanitarian Bowl victory over Louisiana Tech. Clemson set school records for points scored, touchdowns, and total offense in a bowl game in the victory.

When Bowden came to Clemson in 1998, he inherited a team with a 3-8 record. By late October of 2000, just 14 months after his first game, Clemson was ranked third in the nation in the **USA Today** poll after an 8-0 start. That ranking was the highest for the program in 16 years. The final #14 ranking in that same poll was the highest final listing for the program since the 1990 season.

In 2000 and 2001, his dynamic offense produced a Heisman Trophy contender in quarterback Woodrow Dantzler, who placed his name next to 52 school records. In 2001, he became the first quarterback in Division I history to total 2,000 yards passing and 1,000 yards rushing in a single season.

When Bowden came to Clemson, he had one simple goal - improvement. Bowden warned Clemson supporters that the Tigers were unlikely to be bowl participants in 1999, but his main focus was to improve. Bowden's goal of improvement was reached and he was happy to be wrong about his preseason prediction, as the Tigers were invited to the 1999 Chick-fil-A Peach Bowl.

In 1999, Bowden accomplished a personal milestone that no Clemson coach had attained since 1981, the year the Tigers won the National Championship. He became the first Clemson coach since Danny Ford to be named ACC Coach-of-the-Year.

Making strong improvement in his first year with a program was nothing new for Bowden. In the two seasons he was the head coach at Tulane, Bowden took a team that had been 4-18 in the two years previous to his arrival, and emotionally and numerically reversed the team's fortunes with an 18-4 record, posted an 11-1 conference mark, and finished the 1998 season ranked #7 in the nation by both polls. Tulane and Tennessee were the only undefeated teams in college football in 1998.

The Green Wave scored 40 or more points in eight games in 1998, including each of the last seven games. In one game, the Green Wave scored 72 points and rolled up 704 yards of total offense. They converted 52 percent of their third-down opportunities for the season and had just 11 turnovers in over 800 plays. The 1998 season saw the program post a perfect 11-0 regular season under Bowden, its first perfect regular season since 1931. The Green Wave won Conference USA, its first league title since Tulane won the SEC in 1949. Bowden was named Conference USA Coach-of-the-Year.

A look to the list of coaches who had undefeated seasons in the 1990s shows two other men named Bowden. His father, Florida State Head Coach Bobby Bowden, had a perfect regular season in 1996 and 1999, while his brother, Terry, posted a perfect regular season in 1993. Obviously, the Bowdens are the first family of college coaching and this "Wonder Years" environment had a lot to do with Tommy Bowden's decision to enter coaching.

Tommy Bowden began his college football experience as a walk-on wide receiver at West Virginia. He played for his father between 1973-75 and then for Frank Cignetti during the 1976 season.

As a junior, he caught 15 passes for 189 yards and one score. Bowden remained at West Virginia for the 1977 season and began his coaching career, serving as a graduate assistant on Cignetti's staff. His interest in coaching only became more intense after that first year as a graduate assistant. His father then hired him as a secondary coach at Florida State for the 1978 season.

In 1980, Bowden joined the East Carolina staff, where he coached during spring practice in 1980. That spring, he moved to Auburn and served as the Tigers' running backs coach for the 1980 season.

In 1981, Bowden returned to Tallahassee as the tight ends coach. In two more years at Florida State, the Seminoles posted a 15-8 mark. The 1982 team ranked #13 in the final poll, claimed a 9-3 record, and won a Gator Bowl championship.

From 1983-86, Bowden served under Steve Sloan at Duke as the quarterbacks coach, and was named coordinator in 1985. In 1984, he made his first trip to Death Valley as a coach. Among the players he tutored was future NFL player Anthony Dilweg.

After four years at Duke, Bowden became the wide receivers coach at Alabama under Bill Curry. It was there that Bowden refined his offensive coaching prowess under noted offensive mind Homer Smith, then the Tide offensive coordinator.

In 1990, Bowden returned to a coordinator role, serving as Kentucky's offensive coordinator and wide receivers coach. That year, he helped the Wildcats to their first upper division SEC finish since 1984.

In 1991, Bowden joined Pat Dye at Auburn. He remained with Auburn for six years, his longest stint as an assistant. Auburn had a combined record of 46-20-2, including a perfect 11-0 season in 1993.

Born on July 10, 1954 in Birmingham, AL, Bowden is married to the former Linda Joan White, who he first met when the two were in school together at Morgantown (WV) High. The couple has two children, Ryan (24), a 2004 Clemson graduate and currently a law student at Regent University, and Lauren (21), a senior at Clemson.

At Louisiana-Lafayette (1986-91), his defenses were among the nation's top 20 in total defense three times...his defense was in the top 25 nationally in at least one defensive category for six straight years...part of the Baylor team that won the 1994 conference title...under his guidance, the offensive line helped the Tulane offense produce almost 4,700 yards and a school-record 375 points in 1997; the offensive line gave up just 11 sacks...in 1998, the offensive line helped Tulane become the only school in the nation to average over 300 yards passing and 200 yards rushing in the regular season...despite the nation's smallest offensive line, Clemson averaged 403 yards in 1999, set 26 offensive records, and scored 42 touchdowns...transferred to Clemson from Marion Institute, where he was a junior college All-American...coached three-time First-Team Academic All-American Kyle Young...Clemson ranked 10th in the nation in rushing in 2000...his offensive line paved the way for Woodrow Dantzler to become the first Division I player in NCAA history to pass for 2,000 yards and rush for 1,000 more in a season...moved from the offensive line to the defensive line in 2004...helped Clemson to an ACC-best 42 sacks in 2004...has coached defensive end Gaines Adams, one of the top prospects for the 2007 NFL Draft...was a common denominator on the offensive staff of three of the top five offenses in Tiger history...Clemson set over 150 records on offense the five years West was on the offensive staff...his son, Brad, is a Daniel High graduate and was a two-time football captain at Appalachian State.

Clemson Memorial Stadium has been held in high esteem for many years. Whether it be players from the 1940s and 1950s, opposing players from the 1970s and 1980s, or even professional players in the 1990s, the ambiance of this special setting is what college football is all about.

The storied edifice added to its legend when the first meeting of father and son head coaches (Bowden Bowl I) took place before a sellout crowd of more than 86,000 fans in 1999. Clemson has ranked in the top 20 in the nation in attendance 25 straight seasons. In 2005, the streak continued when Clemson averaged 78,232 fans per game.

The facility's mystique is derived from its many traditions, which date to its opening in 1942, the legendary games and players, and Clemson's corresponding rate of success. Clemson has won 231 games in 64 years there and has won over 70 per-

cent of the contests (231-90-7). Forty times since 1983, a crowd has exceeded 80,000.

The stadium has definitely been good to the Tigers, but the stadium was constructed against the advice of at least one Clemson coach. Just before Head Coach Jess Neely left for Rice after the 1939 season, he gave Clemson a message.

"Don't ever let them talk you into building a big stadium," he said. "Put about 10,000 seats behind the YMCA. That's all you'll ever need".

Instead of following Coach Neely's advice, however, Clemson officials decided to build the new stadium in a valley on the western part of campus. The place would take some clearing-there were many trees, but luckily there were no hedges.

The crews went to work, clearing, cutting, pouring, and forming. Finally on September 19, 1942, Memorial Stadium opened with Clemson

thrashing Presbyterian 32-13. Those 20,000 seats installed for Opening Day would soon grow.

When the original part of the stadium was built in the early 40's, much of the work was done by scholarship athletes, including many football players. The first staking out of the stadium was done by two members of the football team, A.N. Cameron and Hugh Webb. Webb returned to Clemson years later to be an architecture professor, and Cameron went on to become a civil engineer in Louisiana.

The building of the stadium did not proceed without problems. One day during the clearing of the land, one young player proudly announced that he was not allergic to poison oak. He then commenced to attack the poison oak with a swing blade, throwing the plants to and fro. The next day, the boy was swollen twice his size and was hospitalized.

There are many other stories about the sta-

dium, including one that Frank Howard put a chew of tobacco in each corner as the concrete poured.

Howard said that the seeding of the grass caused a few problems. "About 40 people and I laid sod on the field," he said. "After three weeks, on July 15, we had only gotten halfway through."

"I told them that it had taken us three weeks to get that far, and I would give them three more week's pay for however long it took. I also told them we would have 50 gallons of ice cream when we got through. After that it took them three days to do the rest of the field. Then we sat down in the middle of the field and ate up that whole 50 gallons."

Howard said that on the day of the first game in the stadium, "the gates were hung at 1:00 and we played at 2:00." But that would be all of the construction for a while. Then in 1958, 18,000 sideline seats were added and in 1960, 5,658 west endzone seats

were added in response to increasing attendance. With the large endzone, "Green Grass" section, this expansion increased capacity to 53,000.

Later, upper decks were added to each side as crowds swelled - the first in 1978 and the second in '83. This increased capacity to over 80,000, which makes it one of the largest on-campus stadiums.

The effect spiraling inflation has had in this century can be dramatically seen in the differences in stadium construction. The original part of the stadium was built at a cost of \$125,000 or at \$6.25 a seat. The newest upper deck was finished in 1983 at a cost of \$13.5 million, or \$866 a seat.

Through the years, Memorial Stadium has become known as "Death Valley." It was tagged by the late Presbyterian Coach Lonnie McMillan. After bringing his teams to Clemson for years and getting whipped, he said the place was like "Death Valley."

A few years later the name stuck.

In 1974, the playing surface was named Frank Howard Field for the legendary coach because of his long service and dedication to the University.

Luckily, the stadium wasn't built behind the Y.

Running Down The Hill

"The Most Exciting 25 Seconds in College Football"

What has been described as, "the most exciting 25 seconds in college football from a color and pageantry standpoint," actually started out as a matter-of-fact entrance, mainly because of necessity.

The first 20,000 seats in Memorial Stadium were built and ready for use before the 1942 season, less than a year after Pearl Harbor was bombed and the United States was drawn into World War II.

The shortest entry into the stadium was a short walk down Williamson Road from Fike Fieldhouse's dressing rooms to a gate at the top of the Hill, which is located behind the east endzone. There were no dressing facilities in the west endzone - there was only a big clock where the hands turned and a scoreboard, which was operated by hand.

The team would dress at Fike, walk down Williamson Road, come in the gate underneath where the scoreboard now stands and jog down the Hill for its warm-up exercises. There was no fanfare, no cannon shot fired, no Tiger Paw flag, no Tiger Rag played...just the team making its entrance and lining up to do the side-straddle hop.

That is pretty much the way things went for the next 25 years.

Either in 1964 or 1965, S.C. Jones, a member of the class of 1919, made a trip to California. He stopped at a spot in Death Valley, CA and picked up this white flint rock. He presented it to Head Coach Frank Howard as being from Death Valley, California to Death Valley, South Carolina."

The rock laid on the floor in Howard's office in Fike Fieldhouse for years. One day, he was cleaning up his office and he told Gene Willimon, who was executive secretary of IPTAY, to "take this rock and throw it over the fence, or out in the ditch...do something with it, but get it out of my office!"

Willimon did not think that was the way a rock should be treated. After all, it had been brought 3,000 miles by a very sincere Tiger fan.

By the mid-1960s, Memorial Stadium was living up to its moniker, Death Valley, because of the number of victories that had been recorded there. Actually, the name was first used by the late Lonnie McMillian, head coach at Presbyterian College in Clinton in the 1940s.

McMillian and the other Blue Hose coaches before him used to open each season by coming to Clemson. Seldom scoring (24 shutouts in 39 games) and with only three victories and four ties to show for it, his teams were getting "killed" by the Tigers regularly. In 1948, McMillian made the comment to the press that he was taking his team to play Clemson in Death Valley.

An occasional reference to Memorial stadium by that name could be heard for the next four years, but when Howard started calling it "Death Valley" in the 1950s, the name took off like wildfire. The Tigers celebrated the 60th year in the "Valley" in 2001.

But getting back to Howard's Rock
The rock was mounted on a pedestal at the top of the Hill. It was unveiled September 24, 1966 on a day when Clemson played Virginia. The Tigers were down 18 points with 17 minutes to play and came back to win (40-35) on a 65-yard pass play from Jimmy Addison to Jacky Jackson in the fourth quarter. That was quite a spectacular debut for that rock.

The team members started rubbing the rock prior to running down the Hill on September 23, 1967, a day when Clemson defeated Wake Forest by a score of 23-6.

Prior to running down the Hill that day, Howard told his players, "If you're going to give me 110 percent, you can rub that rock. If you're not, keep your filthy hands off it."

Howard told of the incident the next day on his Sunday television show and the story became legend.

When Hootie Ingram succeeded Howard as head coach prior to the 1970 season, Ingram decided that the team would make its final entrance on the field out of the dressing room in the west endzone. In all home games in 1970 and 1971, and the first four games of 1972 when the Tigers did not run down the Hill, their combined record was 6-9. The team decided it wanted to come down the Hill once prior to the South Carolina game in 1972. The result, in a cold, freezing rain, was a 7-6 victory when Jimmy Williamson knocked down a two-point conversion attempt, which preserved the win.

The Tigers have made the entrance for every home game since 1942, except for the seasons mentioned above - 313 times heading into the 2006 season.

After final warmups, the team goes back into its dressing room under the west endzone stands for final game instructions. About 10 minutes before kickoff, the team boards two buses, rides around behind the north stands to the east endzone, and disembarks to the top of the Hill behind Howard's Rock.

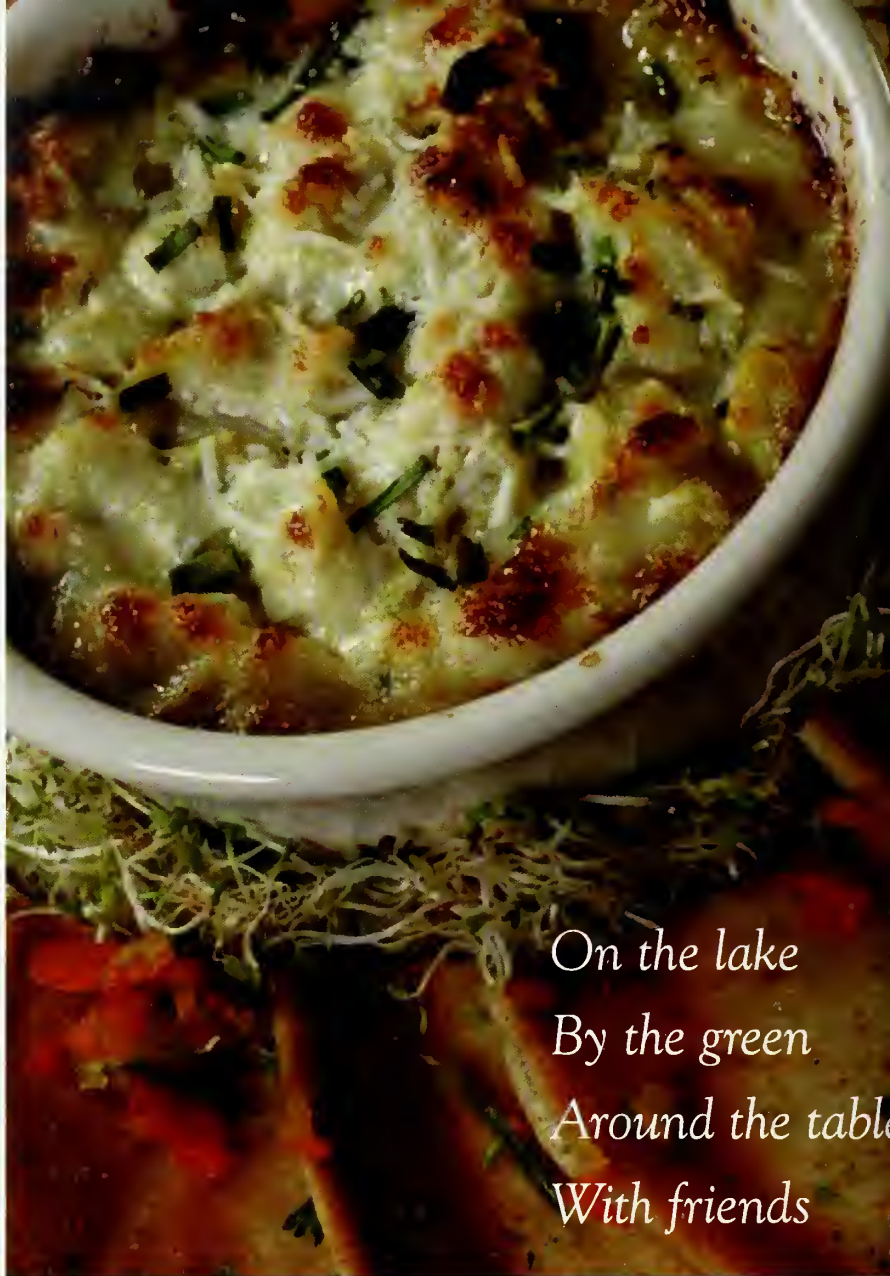
At the appointed time, the cannon booms and led by a high-flying Tiger Paw flag, the band forms two lines for the team to run between and strikes up "Tiger Rag"...the frenzy starts in all sincerity and usually lasts for three hours.

It is a tradition that has inspired Clemson players for many years.

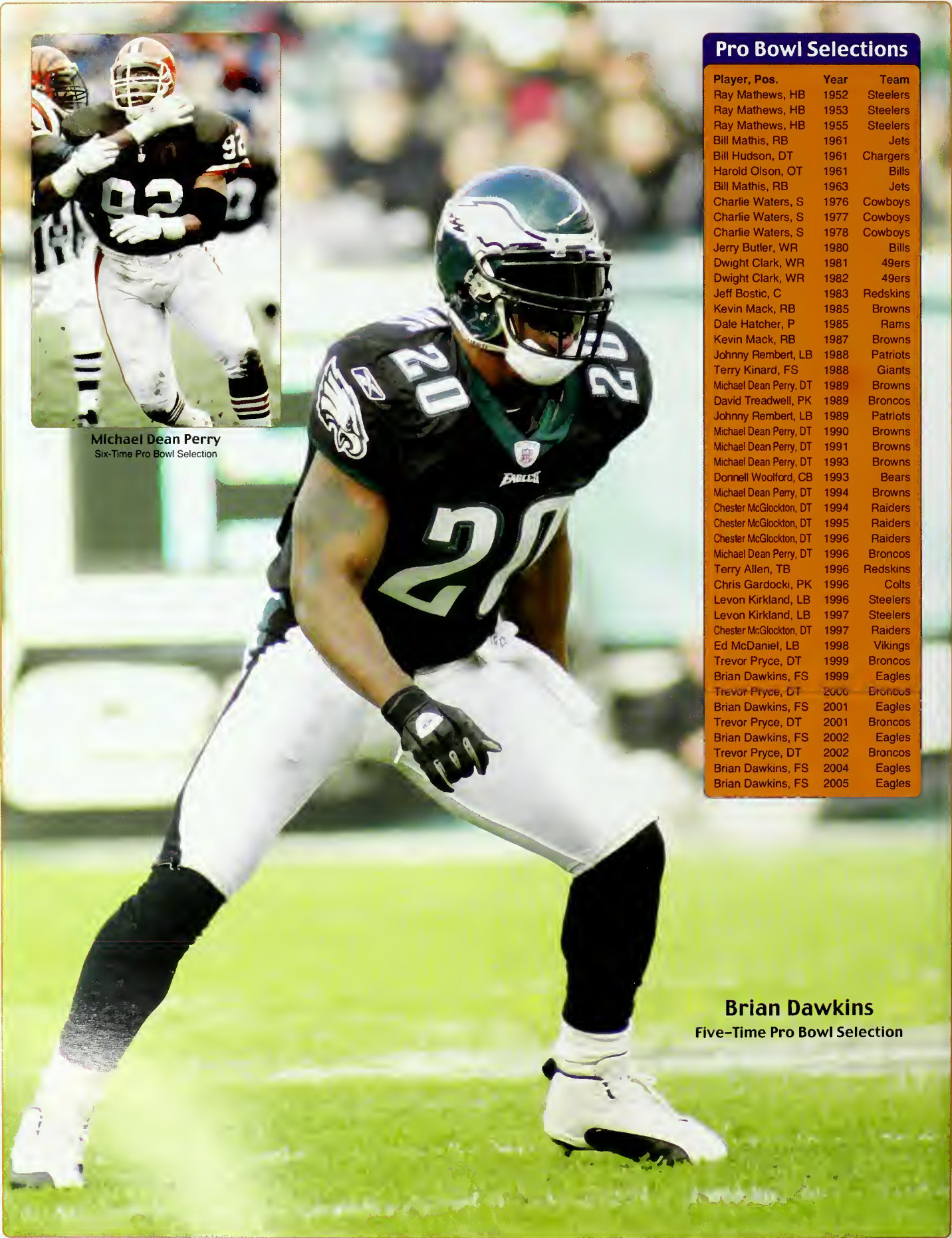

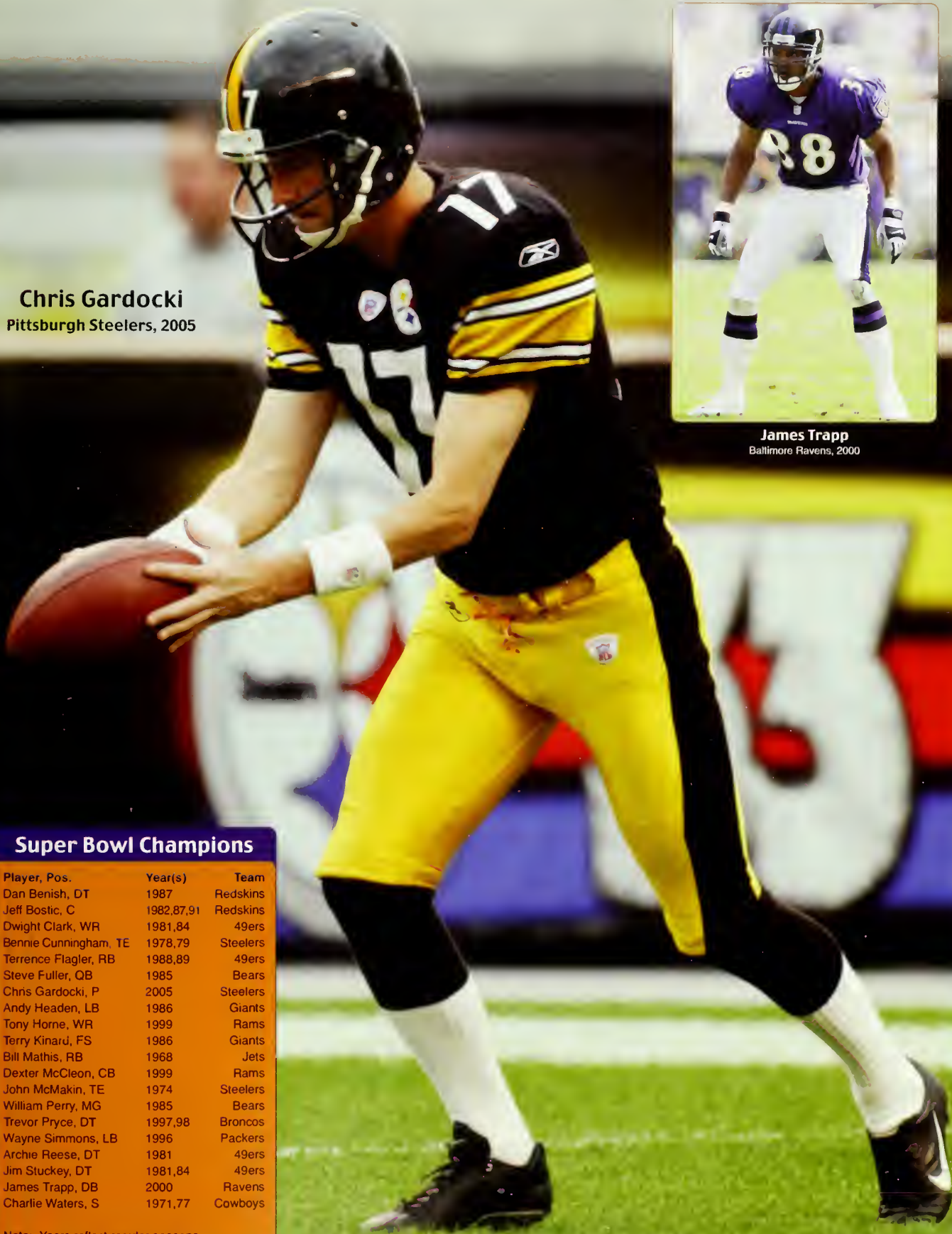

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The Clemson Tiger Sports Network supplies Tiger fans with a full day of broadcast each football Saturday. Each broadcast day has three programs, "Tiger Tailgate Show," "Game Day Broadcast," and the "Fifth Quarter Show."

A tradition since the 1970s, the "Tiger Tailgate Show" is a two-hour entertainment and interactive program. It is produced on the lawn of Littlejohn Coliseum (at the corner) closest to Death Valley.

The program begins three hours prior to kickoff. Bubba Britton, Marsha Byers, Duane Evans, Ben Milstead, Don Munson, and Whitney Walters will host the show. It is the gathering place on gameday. Interviews with former players, games, display items, and excitement are all part of the show.



The game broadcast is anchored by Pete Yanity. The sports director at WSPA-TV in Spartanburg, SC took over in September, 2003 after the passing of Jim Phillips, who had been the longtime voice of the Tigers since 1968. Yanity has been a part of the broadcast team since 2001 as the host of the pregame, halftime, and postgame shows, and as the sideline reporter during games.

Yanity has been the sports director at WSPA-TV in Spartanburg the last 16 years. He has also been a sideline analyst for 10 years on Carolina Panther preseason football games and has considerable play-by-play experience for Comcast Sports Southeast, covering various college events, including Tiger football and baseball. Yanity is also the voice of Tiger basketball and the host of the Tommy Bowden and Oliver Purnell Television Shows.

Joining Yanity in the booth is former Clemson offensive lineman Will Merritt, who played for the Tigers from 1998-01. He was a starter in 2000 and 2001 when he was named Second-Team All-ACC.

Merritt worked on the Clemson radio network pregame and postgame shows during the 2002 season. He also provided color commentary on the television tape-delay broadcasts of selected 2002 games. In 2003, he became the color analyst of the gameday broadcasts. The native of Easley, SC is the host of "The Morning Drive," a sports talk show that airs each morning on WCCP (104.9 FM) in Clemson.

Former Clemson Academic All-American linebacker Chad Carson completes the broadcast team as the sideline commentator. Carson served in that capacity for the final two games of 2003, and all of 2004 and 2005. Carson is fourth in Clemson history in career tackles and was a starter on Tommy Bowden's first three Tiger teams.

As has been the case in the past, the gameday broadcast begins with the Tommy Bowden Pregame Show. Bowden meets with Sports Information Director Tim Bourret to provide Clemson fans with the latest lineup and strategy information. Yanity and Merritt also provide a last-minute scene-setter that includes the latest lineup and weather information.

After the game, fans can tune into the "Fifth Quarter Show," hosted by Ralph Patterson and Munson, or attend the show live from the Wild Wing Cafe in downtown Greenville, SC. 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Remembering 1981 Tiger Lettermen

25th Anniversary of the 1981 National Championship Team

In celebration of the 25th anniversary of Clemson's 1981 National Championship season, we will recall the careers of all the lettermen for the Tigers that season. We will go through the list in alphabetical order, 10 players at a time, as we progress through the season.



#28 Rod McSwain • CB

McSwain made one of the many memorable plays of the 1981 season when he blocked a South Carolina punt. With the Gamecocks leading 7-0 in the first quarter, McSwain flew in from the left wing to block the punt back to the endzone. There, Johnny Rembert, McSwain's future teammate with the New England Patriots, recovered for a touchdown to bring the Tigers to within 7-6. More importantly it gave Clemson the momentum, leading to the 29-13 victory in Columbia.

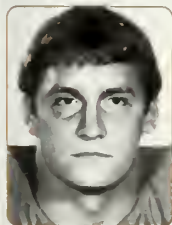
McSwain was a four-year letterman as a defensive back and wide receiver during his Clemson career. He was timed at 4.35 in the 40 and was regarded as the fastest member of the 1981 team. He went on to a seven-year career with the Patriots and played in 90 NFL games.

McSwain is now the personnel manager for a company in Hickory, NC. He stays active in football to this day by representing the NFL in approval of gameday uniforms prior to all Carolina Panther home games.



#87 Eldridge Milton • WR

Milton played six games as a reserve linebacker as a first-year freshman in 1981. He made just three tackles that season, but went on to have a fine five-year career with the Tigers. Milton was injured during the 1982 season and sat out the year, but became a starter in 1983 when he had 78 tackles, fourth-most on Clemson's 9-1-1 team. He was named a second-team sophomore All-American by **Football News** that year. Milton also started seven games in 1984 and six as a senior in 1985.



#77 Lee Nanney • OT

Nanney was Second-Team UPI All-American as a senior in 1981 as an offensive tackle. He was the leader of the offensive line, helping the Tigers average nearly 250 yards per game on the ground. A two-time, First-Team All-ACC selection, Nanney had a pair of games in which he graded 90 percent in 1981, the highest grades awarded on the line by the Tiger coaches in a seven-year period.

A dedicated worker, Nanney had a 525-pound bench press in August of 1981 that is still regarded as the best in school history. Four times in 1981, he was named the state's lineman-of-the-week.



#17 Anthony Parete • QB

We never really got a chance to see how good Parete could have been. He was the third-team quarterback as a freshman in 1981, and he played his entire football career behind Homer Jordan and Mike Eppley, two of Clemson's

greatest quarterbacks in history.

Parete made a big contribution over his career as a holder, a key reason Bob Paulling and Donald Igwebuike had such success from 1981-84. Against Duke in 1982, he was 3-3 for 83 yards two touchdowns. He completed the game with more touchdown passes that day than record-setting Duke signal-caller Ben Bennett.

Parete is now a high school principal in his hometown of Jacksonville, FL.



#6 Bob Paulling • PK

Paulling is one of the finest all-around athletes at Clemson in the 1980s and was inducted into the Clemson Hall of Fame in 1994. Not only was he All-ACC as a kicker, he was an All-ACC baseball player in 1983 when he batted .407.

Paulling was one of two kickers on the 1981 team. He was the third-leading scorer that year with four field goals and 34 extra points. He is still eighth in Tiger history in scoring with 209 points. Paulling was 107-109 on extra points in his career, with both misses taking place in Williams-Brice Stadium.

Paulling now manages a business in his hometown of Saint Matthews, SC.



#66 William Perry • MG

The media became captivated with "The Refrigerator" in 1981. Perry was a 305-pound middle guard as a freshman that year, a behemoth in those days. He once said in **Sports Illustrated**, "Even when I was little, I was

big." But, he backed it up on the field with significant plays in significant games.

He recovered a Herschel Walker fumble in the third game of the year, manhandling the Georgia running back to keep him away from the ball. He had 48 tackles in 1981, eighth-most on the team.

Perry was Clemson's first three-time All-American and was a finalist for the Lombardi Award. He was on Clemson's National Championship team as a freshman, then played on the Bears' Super Bowl Championship team in his rookie year in the NFL.

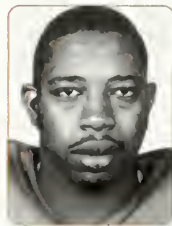


#42 Edgar Pickett • DE

Pickett moved from fullback to defensive end prior to the 1981 season. He had been an outstanding running back as a freshman in 1980, highlighted when he had 12 rushes for 75 yards against Georgia and had a higher

yards-per-carry average than Herschel Walker.

Pickett played in 11 of the 12 games in 1981 and had 14 tackles, including two sacks. But, he became a starter in 1982 when he led the team in tackles for loss (10), a big reason the 1982 Tigers finished 9-1-1. In 1983, he had 39 tackles and 10 tackles for loss, and he earned First-Team All-ACC honors, helping the Tigers to another 9-1-1 season.



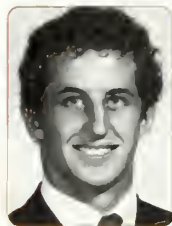
#90 Johnny Rembert • LB

Rembert was a junior college transfer in his first year with the Tigers in 1981. Danny Ford did not take many junior college transfers, but he made an exception with Rembert. One of the most athletic linebackers Clemson has ever

had, he still holds the school record for interceptions by a linebacker in a season and career. He had two as a reserve in 1981, then had six in 1982 when he was first in the nation among linebackers.

Rembert went on to a career with the New England Patriots. He played 10 years in the NFL and 126 games, earning Pro Bowl honors in 1988.

Rembert is now an athletic director at a junior college in Florida.



#92 Mark Richardson • DE

Richardson was one of the most productive original walk-ons on the 1981 team. As a reserve junior defensive end, he had 27 tackles in 1981 when he played in every game. That was the third-highest-tackle total among

non-starters on the team that year. Three of the tackles came in the Orange Bowl win over Nebraska.

Richardson's most memorable game took place at North Carolina in 1981 when he played many snaps head-to-head against his brother Jon, a wideout for the Tar Heels. He had a career-high seven tackles in helping the Tigers to a 10-8 victory.

He has had a very successful career as vice president for the Carolina Panthers, a position he has held since the franchise's inception in 1995.



#21 Anthony Rose • CB

"Spook" was an original walk-on who became a starter in 1981. Rose teamed with cornerback Hollis Hall to give the Tigers an effective tandem. They started 13 games together in their careers, and Clemson won all 13.

In 1981, Rose totaled 25 tackles, two interceptions, and a sack to help the Tigers hold the opposition to 8.8 points per game. No ACC team in the last 25 years has had a better figure. He had five tackles in the victory at South Carolina, a game that was played close to his hometown of Sumter, SC. Rose was from the same hometown as fellow defensive back and All-American Terry Kinard.

Rose now works for Duke Power in nearby Seneca, SC.

Nancy Harris
Women's Tennis

- In her 10th year at Clemson, where she has a 135-89 record, including 84-27 during the last four years.
- Has led Clemson to the NCAA Tourney in six of the last seven years with four straight top-20 finishes.
- Clemson was #18 in the final rankings in 2006.
- Only women's coach in Clemson history to lead a program to the Final Four of an NCAA Tourney in back-to-back years (2004,05); Clemson ranked in the top 10 in both seasons.
- Clemson has played host to an NCAA Regional three straight seasons.
- Her 2004 team advanced to the Final Four of the NCAA Tournament, the first women's sports program at Clemson to reach the Final Four.
- Won the ACC regular-season and tournament titles in 2004.

Jolene Hoover
Women's Volleyball

- The winningest coach in Clemson volleyball history with an overall record of 264-161 and a 113-95 ACC record at Clemson in 13 years.
- Has won at least 20 matches seven times in her 13 years, including 2004 when Clemson was one of three ACC teams with 20 wins.
- Has a 357-192 overall record in 16 seasons as a head coach.
- Led the Tigers to a 31-3 overall record in 1999, which earned Clemson a trip to the NCAA tournament and also the school's first ranking in the top-20.
- Won the ACC regular-season title in 1999 and had a #9 final RPI ranking.
- Guided Clemson to its first-ever ACC title in the 1997 season. Clemson defeated undefeated Maryland, ending the Terrapins 29-game winning streak in the process.



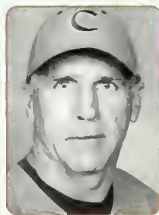
Christopher Ip
Men's & Women's Swimming & Diving

- His men's and women's teams have posted at least a 3.0 GPA every semester at Clemson.
- Lady Tigers finished 28th at the NCAA Championships in 2006.
- The men won the Nike Cup in Chapel Hill, NC for the first time in 2005.
- Led the men and women to a 23-7-1 combined record in 2003-04, the most wins in school history.
- The 13-2-1 record by the men in 2003-04 was a school record for wins, and the 10 wins by the women were the most since 1988. The men's team also had a school-record 9-0-1 mark on the road.
- Named national coach-of-the-year at the junior college level for men's swimming 10 times, including seven years in a row (1992-98), and women's swimming four times.



Chuck Kriese
Men's Tennis

- Has led Clemson to four straight 20-win seasons (25 in 2005).
- His 2006 team posted a 23-10 record and advanced to the second round of the NCAA Tournament.
- Had a 26-12 record in 2004. The 26 wins were the most by a Tiger team since 1988. The 2004 team had wins over #6 Duke and #10 Texas Christian in the NCAA Tourney, and advanced to the Elite Eight.
- Enters his 32nd season with a 639-389 record at Clemson.
- Winningest men's tennis coach in Clemson and ACC history. His 639 career wins rank in the top-15 nationally.
- Has coached Clemson to 23 NCAA Tournament appearances in his 31 years as head coach. That includes seven Elite Eight finishes and 12 Sweet 16 finishes.
- Has 14 top-25 seasons, fourth among all coaches in Clemson history.



Jack Leggett
Baseball

- Has coached Clemson to 608 wins in 13 years at Clemson, an average of over 46 wins per season. The 608 wins are fourth-most in the nation during his tenure in Tigertown.
- Clemson has won at least 50 games six times in his 13 years and at least 39 games in all 13 seasons.
- Has coached Clemson to the NCAA Tournament all 13 years, including five trips to the College World Series (1995,96,00,02,06).
- Led Clemson to the best record in the ACC in the 2006 regular season with a 24-6 record, won the ACC Tournament, and advanced to the College World Series; it was just the second time in the last 25 years the program accomplished all three in the same season.
- Won a record 26 games against top-25 teams in 2006.

Women's Rowing

- Coached Clemson to a South Region title in 2001-02. The Tigers' Novice 8+, 2nd Varsity 4+, and 2nd Varsity 8+ claimed titles.
- Named South Region Coach-of-the-Year, and ACC Coach-of-the-Year in 2000-01 and 2004-05.
- In 2000-01, Clemson won the South Region Championship and finished the year ranked #21 in the country.
- Her teams have had at least a 3.0 GPA every year.

Women's Basketball

- In her second season at Clemson after serving as Rice's head coach for the past 12 years.
- Coached the Lady Owls to nine consecutive winning seasons, during which she guided Rice to two NCAA Tournament berths and four WNIT appearances.
- Has six 20-win seasons and two conference titles in her 12 seasons as a head coach.

- Coached Clemson to a #21 ranking in indoor track in 2005.

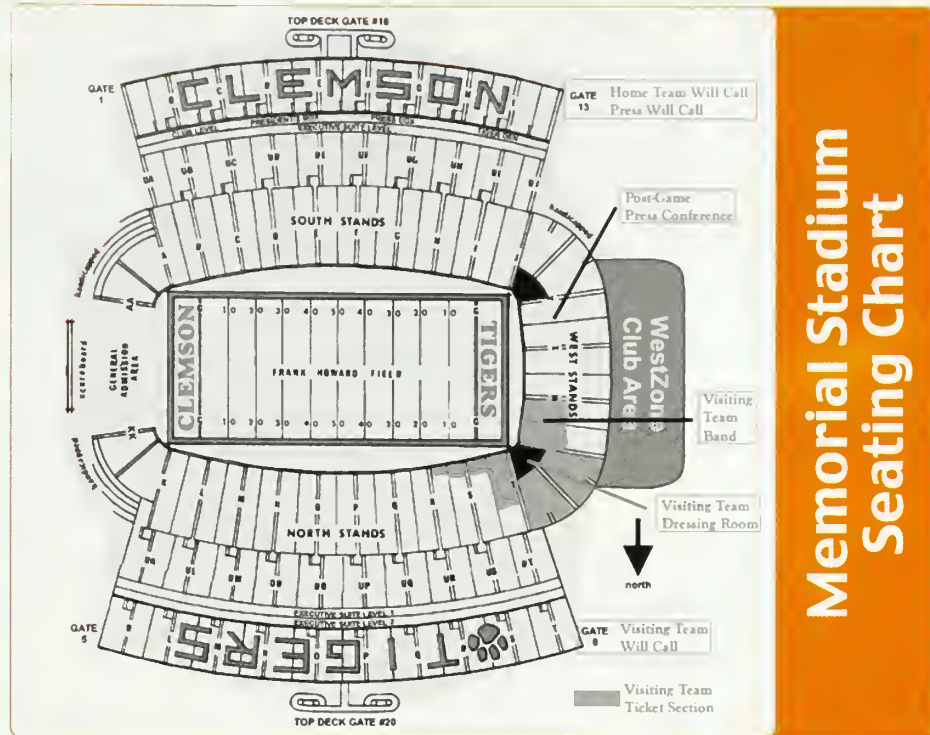

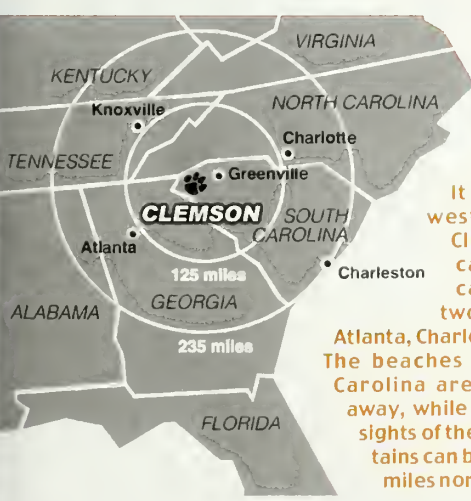
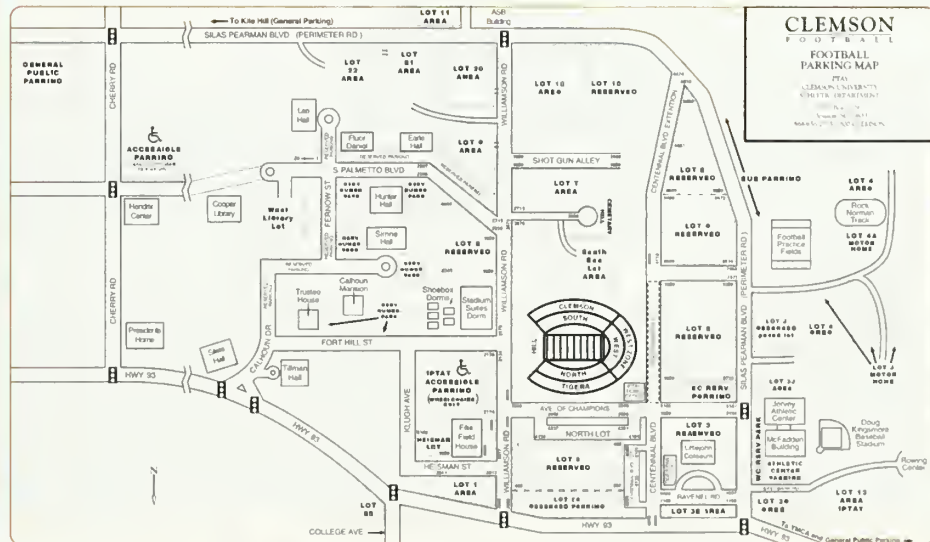

his coach. In the fall, they may watch a prospect compete one time, but they will not have any contact.

Home Visit - During the contact period, a senior prospect may invite college coaches to his home to meet his parents, and to talk in detail about the football program and academic offerings at any college the prospect is considering.

Receiving Mail - Prior to September 1 of a prospect's junior year, NCAA rules allow Clemson to mail a questionnaire, NCAA educational information, and a summer-camp brochure to a prospect. After September 1 of the prospect's junior year, coaches can provide a prospect with the following: personalized letters, media guide and copies of newspaper articles, instant messages and text messages. A prospect can receive a football game program when he visits the Clemson University campus.

Recruiting - A term used to describe the process of acquainting a prospect with a college and the coaches of that college, who are striving to learn more about a prospect. Only coaches can recruit - no one else is permitted to persuade a prospect to play sports at a particular college.

Prospect - Any student who has entered the ninth grade. Once a person becomes a prospect, NCAA rules define how college coaches can interact with that prospect.

Standardized Test - A prospect must take the SAT or ACT before enrolling in college full-time. A prospect may take the SAT or ACT more than once and use the best subscore from different tests to achieve the highest score. Both Clemson and the NCAA Clearinghouse require scores to be reported directly from the testing agency. When registering for the test, list the Clearinghouse Code (9999) and Clemson (511 (SAT), 3842 (ACT)). Clemson University admissions requires students to present either an SAT or ACT writing score. The writing score will not be used to determine a prospect's qualifier status.

Telephone - Clemson football coaches can call a prospect once in May of the prospect's junior year. After September 1 of a prospect's senior year, a coach can call a prospect once a week. A prospect can expect unlimited calls during the contact period, before his official visit and once the prospect has signed a National Letter of Intent.

Frequently Asked Questions

- **Are a prospect's parents invited for an official visit?** Yes. NCAA rules allow a school to provide lodging and meals for parents or legal guardians who accompany their child. However, NCAA rules do not allow schools to provide transportation for parents unless they drive with their son.
- **Can a prospect visit Clemson anytime during his high school career?** Yes. A prospect can have his high school coach call Tiger coaches to set up an unofficial visit. He can attend a football game and talk with Tiger coaches, and it does not count as a contact when it is on Clemson's campus. There are times a prospect cannot visit - NCAA rules refer to them as "dead periods," and coaches will not schedule to meet with a prospect during that time period.
- **Can IPTAY members help recruit me?** No. NCAA rules are clear; only Clemson coaches can telephone, contact, and evaluate a prospect. Only college coaches can offer unofficial/official visits.
- **Is the prospect's high school coach invited for an official visit?** NCAA rules are such that high school coaches may not be provided any expenses for official visits.
- **What is a National Letter of Intent (NLI)?** It is a contract; a prospect and his parents sign a promise that the prospect will attend a particular college. In return, that college promises a prospect financial aid. A prospect signs it during his senior year (in February for football). Once the prospect signs it, he cannot be recruited by any other institution, and it is a binding contract for the prospect's first year in college at the school that provides the national letter of intent.
- **What is an official visit?** A prospect can take a total of five official visits (one per institute), which are expense-paid. Before the visit, the prospect must present a high school transcript, proof of an SAT, ACT, PACT, or PSAT test, and be registered with the NCAA Clearinghouse. Official visit invitations are extended by Tiger coaches only. Official visits may not occur prior to the first day of class of the prospect's senior year in high school.
- **What is the NCAA Clearinghouse?** It is the agency that certifies a prospect's eligibility for NCAA Division I and Division II. A prospect should register with the NCAA Clearinghouse at the end of his junior year in high school. Applications are available in the prospect's guidance office or online at www.NAAClearinghouse.net. Cost is \$50.

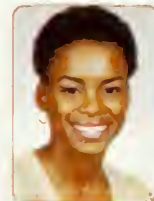

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


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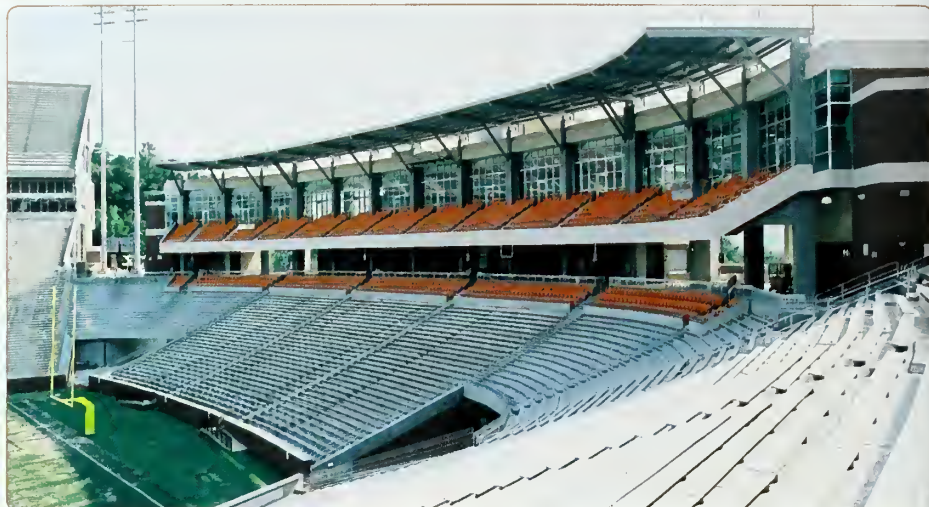
Construction of Component I of the WestZone Initiative at Memorial Stadium is ahead of schedule and will be completed for the season opener on September 2 when the Tigers play host to Florida Atlantic. Visually from the field, the area resembled a construction site during the 2005 season, but that will not be the case in 2006.

On opening day this year, Clemson fans will see a completed WestZone Club seating area that will feature over 970 new orange chairback seats, complimented by a common climate-controlled lounge area that will feature specialty food and beverage, television monitors for replays, and other exclusive amenities. The club-level seats are sold out for the 2006 season, and were actually sold out prior to construction.

Fans will also benefit from a concourse walkway that connects the North and South stands. It offers additional restrooms and concession areas, new seating for wheelchair-bound spectators, and other gameday amenities. Additional seats in the "pie" areas to the right and left of the West stands will also be completed. The new scoreboard at the East end of the Stadium, complete with state-of-the-art video replays, is also a feature of Component I, and was operational during the 2005 season.

While fans attending games at Death Valley this season will see these visible enhancements to the stadium, Clemson's student-athletes will enjoy a finished locker room area that is nearly twice the size of the previous locker room area. New wooden lockers, carpeting, and photo montages depicting the Tigers' football heritage are prominently featured in the new locker room. The visiting team's locker room was completed last season as well.

Since the announcement of the WestZone Initiative in 2004, Head Coach Tommy Bowden and his staff have seen a steady improvement in the quality of young men (athletically and academically) who are considering Clemson University. A look to the recruiting rankings of many services is consistent with that feeling.



The WestZone holds over 1,000 fans and has chair-back seats along with other comforts.

"It is not a coincidence that the quality of our recruiting classes has improved dramatically since we began moving dirt and pouring mortar in the West endzone of Memorial Stadium," said Bowden.

"Our fans who follow the program closely see that in the recruiting service rankings, but I see it through personal contact with the quality of young men who are now considering and selecting Clemson. As we continue to build and eventually finish the WestZone Initiative, it will help us reach the

championship-quality program we all strive for."

Component II and Component III of the WestZone Initiative will have a further positive effect on Clemson recruiting efforts and the overall

quality of the Tiger Athletic Program. Component II will include new offices for the football coaching staff, position-team meeting rooms, a new team meeting room, football administration offices, a player lounge area, an aquatic training facility, a lower concourse entrance area that will include personal plaques of each current Tiger, and a 15,000 square-foot strength training facility.

"The Capital Campaign's original goal was to raise \$27 million," said Senior Associate Athletic Director Bill D'Andrea. "To date, we have raised \$16.3 million, and I am optimistic we will raise the remaining \$10.7 million that will allow us to complete Component II and move our football operations to Memorial Stadium. That is our immediate goal."

Component III will feature a Clemson Museum that will include Clemson's university, military, and athletic history, and a new Lettermen's Lounge.

Based on estimates by an architecture firm and an independent estimator, the cost to complete Component I was predicted to be \$30 million when the evaluation took place in 2003. However, due to the construction market climate and the rising costs of materials, Component I cost roughly \$40 million when it was completed this summer. Funds for Component I have been raised through private donations,

the assistance of IPTAY, existing athletic department funds, and through the issue of state bonds.

Additional funds will be needed to complete Component III, which includes the Clemson Museum and the Lettermen's Area. Former Clemson University President Phil Prince and former Executive Director of IPTAY Joe Turner are the co-chairmen of the WestZone Initiative. The total cost of the three components combined should be approximately \$70 million.

"We certainly feel a sense of urgency to complete Component II and Component III," said Athletic Director Dr. Terry Don Phillips. "We have been behind in this area, and we feel the completion of this project will put us ahead when it comes to facilities. But, we are going to make sound decisions from a fiscal standpoint that won't handicap our department and university in the long-term."

The original plans for a new football administration building were developed in 1999 prior to Phillips' appointment as Clemson's athletic director, and called for a separate building constructed near the football practice fields adjacent to the Jervey Athletic Center. Phillips had administered successful projects at other institutions that combined a new football facility with the construction of a club seating area. The WestZone Club will have a positive effect on the cash-flow needed to finance the overall project. Thus, it was a featured aspect of Component I.

Dr. Phillips is committed to building a model athletic program at Clemson, and he sees seven major areas that need to be addressed in reaching this accomplishment. The WestZone Project addresses five of the seven areas. Specifically, this project will:

- recruit and nurture quality student-athletes;
- attract and retain outstanding coaches and staff;
- give Clemson competitive facilities;
- promote Clemson's school spirit and rich traditions;
- assure sound fiscal accountability.

After the 2003 season, Clemson built a new football locker room in the Jervey Athletic Center and renovated the strength training facility. A new artificial surface practice field was installed and a 53-yard indoor surface was purchased for the Indoor Track Facility for use during inclement weather.

"The renovations we made in 2004 provide our team with a quality environment during the present time, but the new facilities inside the WestZone will be among the best nationally," said Dr. Phillips.

"After meeting with Dr. Phillips on April 25, I have a general understanding of the construction schedule and finances that will be needed to complete the football operations aspect of the WestZone Initiative," said Bowden. "I have the utmost confidence in the people we have leading us in this capital campaign, and know it will be among the best football facilities in the country when it is completed."

The entire 19 sports program will benefit from the WestZone Project, because it will allow Clemson's Olympic sports improved facilities as well. The current football locker room (built in 2004) in the Jervey Athletic Center will be converted into separate locker rooms for Olympic sports. There will be less congestion and less scheduling conflicts in the strength training room at the Jervey Athletic Center. The McFadden Building will give Olympic sports more office space.

"The WestZone Initiative will become the front door to Death Valley and our athletic facilities landscape," said Dr. Phillips. "Facilities aren't the end all, but they are extremely important in the recruiting process. They can put you in position to become successful, both athletically and academically."

In 2006, Clemson signed a football recruiting class that ranked among the top 16 in the nation according to three different services. While there are many factors to consider when a young man is trying to select a university to further his career, it is apparent that facilities are an important aspect.

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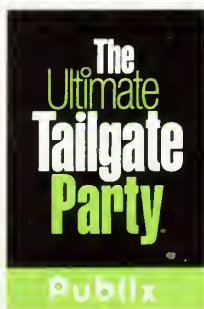

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The ACC's Instant Replay at a Glance:

Objective: To allow for specific types of officiating calls to be immediately reviewed & corrected.

Principles: There must be **INDISPUTABLE VIDEO EVIDENCE** for any on-the-field call to be changed. In addition, a review must have a direct, competitive effect on the game, such as a change of possession, scoring play, etc.

The ACC will be using instant replay for every game during the 2006 season. In addition, the instant replay system is no longer experimental and has been added to the NCAA rule book ensuring that each conference will follow the same guidelines.

Reviewable Plays:

1. **Plays governed by sideline, goal line and end line:**
 - a) Scoring plays, including a runner breaking the plane of the goal line.
 - b) Pass complete/incomplete/intercepted at sideline, goal line and end line.
 - c) Runner/receiver in or out of bounds.
 - d) Recovery of loose ball in bounds.
 - e) A loose ball touching a sideline, goal line or an end line.
2. **Passing Plays:**
 - a) Pass ruled complete/incomplete/intercepted anywhere in the field of play and end zones.
 - b) Touching of a forward pass by an ineligible receiver.
 - c) Touching of a forward pass by a defensive player.
 - d) Quarterback (passer) forward pass or fumble (if ruled incomplete, the play is finalized).
 - e) Illegal forward pass or illegal handing beyond the line of scrimmage.
 - f) Illegal forward pass or illegal handing after change of possession.
 - g) Forward or backward pass thrown from behind the line of scrimmage.
3. **Miscellaneous Reviewable Plays:**
 - a) Runner ruled to have fumbled (if ruled down, the play is not reviewable).
 - b) Forward progress errors with respect to first down.
 - c) Touching of a kick.
 - d) Number of players on field.
 - e) A scrimmage kicker beyond the line of scrimmage when the ball is kicked.
 - f) Clock adjustments.
 - g) Fourth-down/try fumble plays.

Not Reviewable Plays:

1. Holding.
2. Offside/encroachment.
3. Pass interference.
4. Personal fouls (e.g., late hits).
5. Illegal blocks.
6. Illegal formations.
7. Face mask.
8. Taunting/excessive celebration.
9. False starts.
10. Roughing the passer/kicker.
11. Fighting participants.

Coaches Challenge Added to Instant Replay

- The head coach of either team may request that the game be stopped and a play be reviewed by challenging the on-field ruling.
- A coach initiates this challenge by taking a team timeout before the ball is next put in play and informing the referee that he is challenging the ruling of the previous play. The head coach who has challenged the original ruling is not permitted any other challenge during the game.
 - After a review has been completed, if the on-field ruling is reversed, that team's timeout will not be charged.
 - After a review has been completed, the on-field ruling is not reversed, that team's timeout counts as one of the three permitted that team for that half.
 - A head coach may not challenge a ruling in which the game was stopped and a decision has already been made by the Replay Official.
 - If a head coach requests a team timeout to challenge an on-field ruling and the play being challenged is not reviewable, the timeout shall count as one of the three permitted his team during that half of the game. If all team timeouts have been used, a delay penalty will be assessed.
 - A head coach may not challenge an on-field ruling if all the team's timeouts have been used for that half.

One of the most important facilities on the Clemson athletic landscape is the strength & conditioning facility. Located in Jervy Athletic Center, it has continued to keep up with one of the most progressive areas in college sports. Director of Strength & Conditioning Joey Batson, who is in his 10th year, makes sure Clemson student-athletes in all sports are ready for competition physically.

In the summer of 2004, he oversaw a third major facility enhancement. When he came to Clemson, the facility covered 11,000 square feet. It has continued to grow and now covers nearly 15,000 square feet. It is one of the most modern all-around facilities in the country.

The following improvements were made:

- State-of-the-art sound system
- Eight flat-screen plasma televisions
- State-of-the-art ventilation system
- New lighting system
- 10 new multi-functional Clemson power racks
- Mondo-rubber flooring throughout entire weight room
- New orange upholstery on all weightlifting equipment
- New paint on surrounding walls and columns
- Carpeting in entrances and offices
- Front entrance drop ceiling
- Metal overlay for awards displays
- Reconstruction of entryway walls
- Computerized information display

The plush atmosphere provides an interesting contrast to the physical exertion that takes place

within the facility. When a Tiger student-athlete enters the etched-glass doors, he is greeted by nearly \$700,000 worth state-of-the-art equipment.

The 10 plasma televisions are positioned throughout the facility and are used for training and instruction, as strength coaches film athletes and work with them on their form.

Clemson has a staff of five full-time strength coaches along with four graduate assistant coaches, and numerous student assistant coaches who ensure a Tiger football player receives as much individual attention as possible. Training programs are position specific, and are designed to meet the specific needs of each student-athlete.

Batson is one of the most highly-regarded strength coaches in the country. In his nine years directing the program, he has coached 12 strength All-Americans. He is a major reason Clemson has

been to a bowl game in seven of his nine seasons. Also, eight of his former assistant strength coaches at Clemson are now strength training directors at NFL or college programs.

"I had already decided Clemson was the place for me when I showed up at the Brooks Center that fall day, but I had never

been to campus before," Huber said. "From the time I was guided to the practice field until I left the Brooks Center late that night, I was amazed by Tiger Band. Coming from a small AAAA school that was lucky to average around 100 band members, Tiger Band was huge by numbers and even larger by sound."

Plus, a fear that every rising Clemson freshman possesses was wiped away during Huber's High School Senior Day experience. Being transplanted from high school to college leaves most wondering where and how they will make friends. Tiger Band offers new Clemson students 250 friends before school even starts until graduation day.

"While in the stands, I wasn't scoffed at for being in high school, and people talked to me like I'd been there all season," Huber claimed. 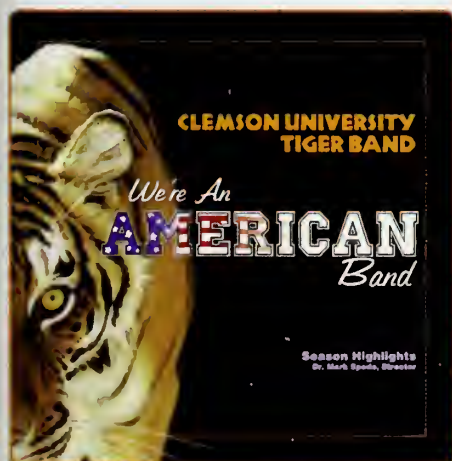

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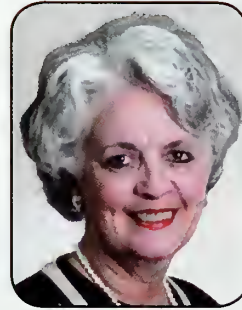
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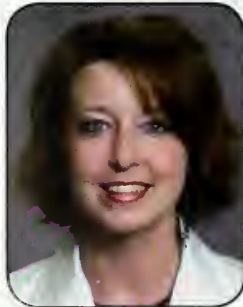
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Marion Dukes

Senior Spotlight

Growing up 20 minutes from Clemson, Marion Dukes experienced the Clemson football atmosphere and community on nearly an everyday basis. From a young age, Dukes envisioned running down the Hill in front of thousands of screaming fans in an orange and white uniform. Little did he know, his vision was going to come true.

Dukes started his career at a young age in Pickens, SC, a small town of friendly people with a big love for football and community activities. Dukes, like other children in Pickens, began playing sports in elementary school.

"I played little league for two years, but then I stopped playing because they said I was too big," said Dukes. "But, I played in all-star football games between the ages of eight and 10."

His size set him apart from the other children, showing that he had the element to turn into a dynamic football player. Even though he had the body and stature for football, surprisingly he preferred to play baseball and basketball as a youth.

Dukes got serious about football in the seventh grade while playing for Pickens Middle School. As a freshman, he played on the junior varsity team for the Blue Flames. He was a varsity starter the next three years under Head Coach Andy Tweito, a time when he really found his element.

During his years at Pickens High, Dukes developed into a diverse and complex athlete. The more years he played for the program, the more recognition he received for his skills on the field.

Dukes was known at Pickens High School to be an all-around athlete, playing three sports. He played baseball his freshman and sophomore years as a first-baseman and a pitcher. He also played basketball all four years as the team center, helping his team to the playoffs his senior season.

Throughout high school, Dukes played various positions on the gridiron, showing his diversity on both offense and defense. He played left offensive

tackle, defensive tackle, defensive end, and tight end during his years at Pickens High. He made 36 tackles and six sacks over his career as a defensive lineman.

But, his most memorable high school experience came as a senior. As team captain, Dukes led his team to its first home playoff game in 21 years and was named first-team all-state. He had an average grade of 80 percent that year and was also selected to the Shrine Bowl in 2002, a first for any Pickens High player since Harold Alexander was selected in 1988.

Dukes was rated the #2 lineman in the state according to **Charlotte Observer**. He was the #8 prospect in the state by **Mickey Plyler** and **BorderWars.com**, and the #9 prospect in South Carolina according to **SuperPrep**. Dukes was also the #50 offensive lineman in the country by **Rivals.com**. Dukes became a very popular recruit for his position, attracting many schools in the southeast and making his dream of becoming a Tiger one step closer.

During his senior year, Dukes had to make a decision of where to play college football. This decision may have been hard to make for any other athlete; however, Dukes knew he wanted to be a Tiger all along. He chose Clemson over Georgia Tech, North Carolina, and South Carolina.

"I grew up around the Clemson atmosphere just 30 minutes down the road," stated #75. "I always came to the home games with my uncles and cousins, and my experiences in the community and at the games allowed me to embrace the Clemson traditions."

"I always hoped for the opportunity to play for Clemson as a child, and when that opportunity was offered, I couldn't turn it down. I did visit other schools, but it did not feel the same. I wanted to play for this type of program and atmosphere."

Clemson, not far from home, was a perfect fit for Dukes. "If I could go back, I would not change my decision to become a Tiger," exclaimed Dukes.

As a freshman, Dukes did not red-shirt, so his transition from playing in a high school game to a collegiate game came very quickly.

"We needed Marion at an early age, so we did not red-shirt him like most offensive linemen," said Offensive Line Coach Brad Scott. "His talent was needed in our football program immediately."

"The first day on the field was a little hard," recalled Dukes of his freshman season. "Everyone was faster and bigger. It was something I had to adapt to. The more practices I attended, the more it allowed me to get used to the program, making the transition easier each day."

"Playing at an earlier age than most of the freshmen allowed me to get the experience quicker than most guys. I also had to learn faster, which was challenging."

Running down the Hill and stepping on the field for the first time in front of thousands of fans can be overwhelming for any freshman. Dukes ran down the Hill and onto the field knowing his dream of playing for the Tigers was about to come true.

He played in the fourth quarter of the season-opener against Georgia that 2003 season. "We lost badly, but I got to play in the fourth quarter," remembered Dukes. "Every one was fast and big, so I knew that I had to work hard to get to that level."

During his freshman season, Dukes played in 10 of the 13 games, helping the Tigers to a 9-4

record and a top-25 final ranking. He played his best game against South Carolina when he recorded an 82-percent grade in his 11 snaps. He played a season-high 17 snaps against North Carolina in an important 36-28 Tiger victory.

His experiences playing as a true freshman prepared him for his future at Clemson as a starting offensive lineman. "I wanted to start the following year, so I prepared myself over the summer, working on my size, strength, and speed," Dukes noted. "I was determined to take my skills to the next level. I got advice from the older guys, which helped motivate me to succeed."

As a sophomore, his goal of starting came true. He started in all 11 games at right offensive tackle in 2004. He led the team in knockdown blocks in the Georgia Tech, Florida State, N.C. State, and Duke games, ending the season with 61 knockdown blocks. Dukes had a season-high 13 knockdown blocks in 75 plays against Georgia Tech and helped Clemson gain a season-high 461 yards. He had a season-high 82 percent grade in both the Miami (FL) and South Carolina games, Tiger victories.

As a junior in 2005, Dukes had his most memorable games against the Hurricanes and Seminoles. "I graded high against two very good defenses," stated Dukes.

He had a season-high 10.5 knockdown blocks against Florida State, ranked #16 in the nation at the time. Dukes started every game that year and played 809 snaps, second-most on the team behind Dustin Fry.

Dukes ended the season with 51 knockdown blocks, including six intimidation blocks. He graded in the 80s in five of the 12 games. Dukes, along with the other offensive linemen, were a big reason the Tigers ranked in the top four in the ACC in rushing offense and passing offense.

In 2006, Dukes has come into his element with his fellow offensive linemen. He has again started every game and has had a grade in the 80s in all but one game. He led the Tigers in knockdown blocks in the win over Wake Forest with 14.5, the high total by a Tiger lineman in any game this year.

"This year has by far been the best year," he admitted. "Our offensive line is more dynamic because of our experience over the years. As the years go on, I have improved on all the aspects of my game that I wanted to improve on as a freshman."

Dukes is one reason the Clemson offensive line is ranked among the best in the nation. He, along with fellow seniors Roman Fry, Dustin Fry, Nathan Bennett, and junior Barry Richardson have all excelled in their positions, which is another reason Clemson is ranked in the top 15 in the nation in total offense and the top 10 in scoring.

The veteran line has mastered the new zone-blocking scheme implemented last year, allowing James Davis and C.J. Spiller to become one of the top rushing tandems in school history.

If you see the offensive linemen not wearing their pads, you will see them talking, laughing, and joking around like brothers. Their bond over the years has allowed them to work together to make the offensive line one sound unit on the field.

"We're like brothers when we get together," smiled Dukes. "I grew up as an only child, so they are like the brothers I've never had."

"Nathan Bennett and I have played together for three years, playing almost every snap together. We know each other's characteristics, which makes our offensive line so successful. We all know how each other plays, so we can feed off of each other."

The whole offensive line works together to get the job done. They do not depend on one teammate to do all the work. They motivate each other to perform to their ultimate best to aid in Clemson's successful offense.

Dukes is known for being a dependable and all-around positive person in the Clemson football

community. "Marion has been a very consistent player these four years," said Scott. "He is always a dependable young man who comes to practice every day with a good attitude. I will always appreciate the initiative Marion presents when he comes in and watches tape on his own. He looks at areas that need more improvement in his game, and he asks for advice as to how to improve his game."

Dukes is known to be a family man and is known for his very close bond with his mother. His father died a week before his first birthday, therefore Dukes was raised by his mother.

"My mother has always been an inspiration in my life," he said. "She has always been the mother and father, and I admire her so much for that."

His mother is very supportive, coming to all home and away games. His stepfather, grandparents, aunts, and uncles have been very supportive of his football career as well.

Dukes is a hometown hero in Pickens. He enjoys giving back to his community and has been a speaker at high school groups in Pickens. All of the younger athletes in the Blue Flame program look up to Dukes as a role model in hopes of becoming a good athlete and a good citizen like him.

He has excelled during his years at Clemson, gaining a good education and developing into a dependable offensive lineman for the Tigers. He plans on graduating in August of 2007 with a degree in human resource development.

As a younger athlete, Dukes remembers his experiences as a fan at Clemson football games, cheering on the Tigers and wishing that one day he would be playing at Death Valley. His work ethic and determination allowed his dream to come true, showing that dreams really can become a reality.

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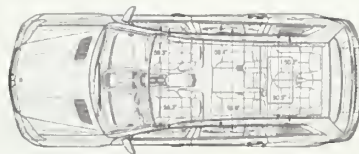

Today's game marks the last regular-season ACC game for our seniors. One in particular, who is known to his teammates and coaches as "Big Country," is looking forward to another chance to prove himself. Nathan Bennett is, no doubt, a country boy who came to Clemson from Dallas...Georgia that is.

Bennett said that his nickname came from being an energetic kid who was extremely vocal in practice. "That's what they called me... 'Big Country.' Being a little rowdy combined with my country accent and toughness made Coach (Thielen) Smith start to call me that when I was a freshman," said Bennett. "Coach (Ron) West ran with it, and it has stayed with me ever since."

Bennett started playing football in the seventh grade during middle school. He later played for Paulding County (GA) High School and was a four-year letterman.

"We only had two losses to our 12 wins my senior year, and we won the first playoff game and first regional championship in our school's history," recalled Bennett.

Bennett remembered his high school days recently, saying that beating crosstown rival Hiram High was one of the highlights of his high school career.

"They had talked smack all year long because our school was split in half, and part of our team had moved to Hiram," said Bennett. "We ran up 21 points on them in the first quarter, and then we had to wait out the rain and went to the locker room for 30 minutes. When we came back out there, we kept pounding them. That was the most special game that I played in high school."

Although most Tiger fans would not care to remember the 2003 home-opener against Georgia (30-0 defeat), Bennett said it was his best game as an offensive lineman. "The Georgia game was my first start, and I shut my opponent down the whole game."

"But, my favorite game was when we played #3 Florida State (in 2003) and I had 12 knockdowns. The fans tore down the goalposts that game. I was living at Daniel Square at the time. They brought some of the goalpost all the way up there, and then they cut it into pieces. I got a piece of it, too."

The offensive line is a close group of players, but three of them do just about everything together, on and off the field. Bennett refers to himself, Roman Fry, and Dustin Fry as "The Brotherhood." They came to Clemson together in 2002 and instantly had a connection.

"Being together with Roman and Dustin is more about life lessons than football," explained #63. "We are three different types of players, but we have learned a lot from each other. We have all become more responsible adults, because when we got here, we were just kids."

Assistant Head Coach and Offensive Line Coach Brad Scott confirmed the kinship. "Those three guys have hung out together since they were freshmen, and they have always been very close. Their positions are close as well, with Dustin at center, and Roman and Nathan as the guards. I think those guys being so close on and off the field has been beneficial to the team, because they challenge each other and they compete during practice."

"On gameday, their communication to each other and their competitive nature has worked for the betterment of the team. They are inseparable. Any offensive line that wants to succeed has to be very close. Those three, coupled with Marion Dukes and Barry Richardson, all mesh together very well."

One former player stands out when it comes to giving advice on and off the field. "Cedric Johnson taught me a lot when he was here about how to play the game and about life," said Bennett. "He taught me not to worry about sweating the small stuff."

Bennett gives most of the credit to Scott for helping him become the player he is today. "Coach Scott means the world to me, and he has been the complete package on and off the field. He cares about his players. He is making sure we all graduate. I can call him any time of day, and we have more of a father-son relationship."

Scott also boasted about the fact that Bennett is graduating this year on top of such a difficult and busy football season. "I am very proud that he is on schedule to graduate in December. He has accomplished everything that he came to Clemson to do...earn his degree, play football at the highest level, and be a really good player at the same time."

Bennett went on to say how much he has learned from Scott over the years, and how he has turned him into a great football player and an outstanding young man. "He's taught me so much, and he has completely refined me. My first spring, he rode me hard, and I wasn't too fired up about it. I was somewhat of a rebel back then, but he grew on me, and I have a tremendous amount of respect for him."

Scott knew early on before he even started coaching Bennett that he would be a unique player. "I knew when he came in as a freshman he had something special about him, because he always practiced hard and always competed hard. If we weren't suc-

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successful in a game, even when he was a red-shirt freshman, he would get pretty upset about it."

Practice is where this young offensive lineman has worked to improve his abilities and get ready for gameday. He keeps practice interesting, because he always has a competition going with some of the defensive linemen as practice goes on.

"Usually as soon as practice is over, Nathan is in the film room watching that day's practice to see what he did wrong," said Scott. "I would say that he practices the hardest of all the linemen and goes full speed, because he is always looking for a challenge out there."

West, a former Tiger player himself, is responsible for bringing this audacious offensive lineman to Clemson. "Coach West recruited me, and I love him to death," laughed Bennett. "We have always been close."

Bennett chose Clemson over Arkansas, East Carolina, and Mississippi State out of high school.

The fifth-year senior has made 35 career starts, more than any other active Tiger offensive lineman. He had a 90-percent grade in three back-to-back games (Temple, Georgia Tech, Virginia Tech) earlier this season. He also accumulated 11.5 knockdowns against Boston College and had an 87-percent grade.

Bennett might have played his best game against #13 Georgia Tech when he had a 90-percent grade and 10 knockdown blocks in 52 plays. He was named ACC Offensive Lineman-of-the-Week in Clemson's resounding 31-7 win.

Bennett and the rest of the offensive line have had to adjust to a new starter this year when starting left guard Roman Fry tore his ACL during the Georgia Tech game. Chris McDuffie has played well in his place, leading the team in knockdown blocks for each of his first two starts. But it is certainly a tough loss for Bennett, because of his five-year kinship with his linemate.

"It is rough without Roman there," admitted Bennett. "Roman and I have done everything together since we both got here. It has been weird with him not staying in the hotel with the team. Roman and I have been through some tough times, especially this past year, and that makes our bond stronger. Since our freshman year, we have lived together, and we have basically grown up together. Roman and I have our own language, and we cut up all the time. I miss that."

When Fry went down in the third play of the Georgia Tech game, his friend and fellow lineman went immediately to his side and took a knee. When asked what was going through his mind, Bennett said "I was thinking, 'get up, you aren't hurt.'"

"I thought it might have been sprained, but Roman knew out there on the field. It is tough watching your 'brother' end his college career. Chris has played great, but for me, I miss Roman. I use Roman's injury as motivation to play harder. I have played two of my best games back-to-back since his injury. I wish he was here playing,

because he and I would compete for the most knockdown blocks."

These two offensive linemen have been best friends since their red-shirt freshman year and have done everything together, including being each other's motivation to play harder.

"Roman and I compete in everything, whether it is weightlifting, video games, or seeing who can eat the most food," said Bennett. "It is all for fun, but that is how we like it, and I think that made us better players."

Scott continued to praise Bennett and his ability to keep his teammates competing and motivated on the field. "Nathan is very motivated, and he is a team-oriented guy. The whole offensive line likes to compete against each other. They are always battling and trying to see who will get the most knockdowns, cut blocks, and intimidation blocks. Last year, it got out to Nathan that Roman had the most knockdown blocks and Dustin got the most intimidation blocks, and he was the odd man out.

"So this year, he has set that as his goal. We have all the numbers posted in the offensive line position room, and Nathan could probably tell you exactly how many he has as well. We use that as a motivational tool to keep the guys competing out there on the field. I like that competitiveness in him. He wants to be a really good player, and he loves football. It is a big part of his life."

"I want to continue to play technique and fundamentally-sound football, and go out with a bang," exclaimed Bennett. "I want it to be my best season, continue to play hard, and make this the best that I have ever played at Clemson."

When asked if he wanted to pursue a career in the NFL, Bennett simply replied, "That is every guys dream that has ever put on pads. I am looking forward to the experience and getting a shot at it."

"He has matured a lot in his game, and has become one of the better players and one of the better offensive linemen since Coach (Tommy) Bowden has been here," said Scott. "And if he will keep working, he will have a future and play on the next level."

"Big Country" has his goals set and motivation in place to finish his senior season with high marks, and maybe a few more wins as well. Nathan Bennett has dedicated his time at Clemson to being the best offensive lineman that he can be.

The ingredients for winning are certainly in place.

Clemson Head Men's Tennis Coach Chuck Kriese is excited about those elements, and he is looking forward to another successful season. The Tigers finished the 2005-06 season with a 23-10 record overall and a trip to the NCAA Tournament for the 23rd time in school history.

The program has undergone a renaissance in many ways over the last four years, winning 99 matches in that time period, the best four-year period for the program since the 1980s, when a younger Kriese was in charge of the program. Now in his 32nd season as head coach, Kriese knows this could be another outstanding team.

"There are four critical elements a team needs to be a contender, or be in the position to contend for important accomplishment," he said. "We strive to be more than just competitive.

"The first ingredient is senior leadership. We have senior leadership, senior experience, and senior success with returning All-Americans Jarmaine Jenkins and Clement Reix along with All-ACC performer and team captain Ryan Young.

"Ryan's leadership means a lot to our team. He has the intangibles that a coach looks for. The focus he has makes me believe that the other three elements will come together and help us contend for championships this season."

Last year, Young finished the year with a 25-14 overall record in singles. Young and Jenkins had a 14-8 record in doubles as well.

Reix was a 2006 singles All-American, as he advanced to the Elite Eight of the NCAA Singles Tournament, something that had not been done by a Tiger in 20 years. Reix finished the season with a

33-8 overall record in singles, good for an 80.4-percent winning mark, the eighth-best single-season mark in school history. His 33 wins were also the most since former Tiger Bruce Li won 38 matches in the 1994-95 season.

The last Clemson player to reach the NCAA Final Eight was Richard Matuszewski in 1986. Clemson had three players reach at least the Final Eight in the NCAA Tournament prior to the run made by Reix.

"Clement was one of the biggest surprises of the season," stated Kriese. "The way he rose and came through for the team was simply amazing. We are trying to get the last five-to-10 percent out of him."

"Jarmaine Jenkins is doing the right things as well. His game is more mature and is more committed this year. It's just a matter of time. He is similar to a volcano in that he is about to erupt."

Jenkins finished the season with an 18-15 record in singles and 10-8 mark in doubles as Reix's teammate. The pair also participated in the NCAA Tournament.

"Young was born to play tennis with his leadership and work ethic," explained Kriese of his multi-year starter. "He is the quarterback of our team.

"The next element needed in the formula for success is to have hungry, young players to keep pressure on the veterans. We have a couple of young players who will fill that role this year. Gera Boryachinskiy (Baltimore, MD) is 6'5", and has good hands and good hand-eye coordination. He also has a great work ethic.

"Carlos Alvarez is from Bolivia and won the South Carolina Fall Invitational B Flight this fall. He is a good athlete, and he also works very hard in practice.

"Rok Bajack will be coming in this spring, and he is a tremendous athlete.

"Finishing out this freshman class is Tina Elgner, who is another great worker and great athlete. Our four freshmen are hungry and very eager."

The third important component to success is depth. Paul Koenke, Kevin Fleck, and Ike Belk return for their sophomore years.

"Depth will push the top guys, and I look for the sophomores to play on equal par with our top player and add success wherever they play."

Fleck finished the season with a 7-3 record, while Koenke had an 11-7 overall record in singles. Belk won a flight this fall at the Georgia Tech Invitational.

"Belk just needs some at-bats, and Fleck has some of the best ground strokes on the team," noted Kriese.

The fourth part that is needed for success according to Kriese is great doubles play. Jenkins and Reix played at #1 doubles last year, but may be split this year. According to Kriese, many of his student-athletes are excellent doubles players, and finding the right combinations will be the challenge.

"The intangibles are in place as well," said Kriese. "This has been one of the best training sessions we have had in the fall since I have been at Clemson. We have worked hard in the weightroom and on the track. In the classroom, we take pride in being excellent instead of just getting by. You can tell we are on a mission.

"It's all about being comfortable with success and high expectations day in and day out. We won 13 straight matches, and we still weren't comfortable last year. We were ranked in the top 25 and got as high as #5 last season. I think that this team will be comfortable with being successful.

"We have a great schedule this season. As the season unfolds, the players will keep improving and growing. When the ball is tossed to them at a high level, our players are going to be ready.

"We had the best fall a coach could hope for. The team's attitude is one in which they feel we have something special here at Clemson, and we are here to work hard. We worked hard on our doubles this fall.

"We are going to let polls and the products take care of themselves. We are going to worry about the process, things that don't look flashy on the surface. At the end of the season, we are going to be in the hunt. This team knows its vision, and they are on a mission."

Cautiously optimistic are the two words that Head Coach Nancy Harris uses to describe her 10th Clemson team. With a squad that will feature just three upperclassmen and possibly five freshmen, she is excited about the talent her players display and the depth they bring. However, Harris also understands the unpredictability that comes with an extremely young team, as well as the phrase, "building for the future."

"We have wonderful talent and very good people to work with," she said, "but we also realize the tremendous challenge."

Harris coaches her teams to play aggressively, a style that takes time to develop, and will spend much of the preseason laying the foundation with each player.

"Right now, my challenge is to hold the girls back, and work more with their ground strokes and returning serves, as well as with their own serves," Harris explained. "We are aggressive baseliners and all-court players, and that takes longer to develop."

The fall season has given Harris and her coaching staff, which includes Assistant Coach Darrell Jernigan, Volunteer Coach Alix Lacelarie, and Student Coach Daniela Alvarez, a chance to observe the talent of her newcomers and to work individually with each player. They have been pleasantly surprised by the rookies' performances.

Selma Babic won her first-round match at the Furman Fall Classic in September and then defeated a veteran Duke player in October's Wilson/ITA Southeast Regional. As a top-five player in Bosnia, she competed in a Women's Tennis Association event in her native country in 2005, winning two matches before falling in the quarterfinals.

"Selma is a superb athlete and has great potential," commented Harris. "I think she is really going to be a superstar down the road."

Also hailing from Bosnia is stellar recruit Ina Hadziselimovic. She was the top-ranked player in Bosnia last year and was recognized as one of the top junior players in the world. Harris believes she will continue that success at Clemson.

"Ina is beyond her years in terms of understanding the game. Rare is it that you have a freshman who really understands court position and shot selection, and she does."

Ani Mijacika, another highly-touted recruit, has shown great potential in two tournaments this fall. The 5'10" native of Makarska, Croatia took the nation's #17-ranked player to two tiebreakers in her opening-round match in the flight-one bracket at the Furman Fall Classic.

Mijacika then reached the quarterfinals of the Southeast Regional before falling to the eventual champion. She defeated two seeded players during her run. She was also one of two Clemson players to reach

the final eight of the Southeast Regional, a claim no other team can make.

Junior Carol Salge joined her in the quarterfinals to continue her outstanding play from a season ago. The San Roque, Brazil native earned a bid to the NCAA Singles Tournament in 2006 and was Clemson's only All-ACC honoree. She took over the team's top position late in the year and posted four wins in six decisions at flight one.

The two losses were to the nation's #1 and #6-ranked players, while three of her victories were over players ranked in the top 60. With a 24-10 overall record last year, Salge finished the season ranked #63 in the Fila/ITA Tennis poll, and she has jumped to the #45 position in this year's preseason singles rankings.

Harris will look for Salge, who is one of only two players with multiple years of experience at Clemson, to play a leadership role this year. "Carol is one of the top players in the nation," Harris said. "She has tremendous desire, and I think that she will have a professional career ahead of her."

Harris will also rely heavily on Maria Brito to provide leadership for such a young team, but it is a role she believes her lone senior will perform brilliantly. "We may have just one senior, but 'Maru' takes the place of two or three in terms of her leadership. She has always set an incredible example for her teammates and is the definition of a team player. She has been a great champion for us."

In testimony to the remarkable career Brito has had at Clemson, she enters her final season just one doubles win and one three-set victory away from the Tiger recordbooks. She has won 75 career doubles matches and has posted 20-win seasons in singles action in all three years.

The Tigers' final upperclassman is junior Kathi Gerber, a native of Vienna, WV. She arrived at Clemson last year as a walk-on, but she earned a scholarship after demonstrating an exemplary work ethic. She played in 29 singles matches last year, mainly at the five and six positions.

"Kathi made a huge improvement last year," Harris said. "Her biggest challenge is to continue to climb, as she did last year, with her strong academic demand being precedentistry."

The two sophomores on the team have had their fall seasons hindered by injuries and illnesses, but Harris expects them to have fully recovered by the start of the spring season.

Federica van Adrichem has played in just one match this year after an extremely successful freshman campaign. She was ranked #55 in the final singles poll last year after posting a 22-15 overall record. She was selected to participate in the NCAA Singles Championships and advanced to the second round of the tournament.

Van Adrichem, who hails from The Netherlands, was also named to the inaugural All-ACC Academic team in 2006.

"Federica is an incredible talent and had a fantastic season last year," exclaimed Harris. "I anticipate that she is going to do the same thing this spring."

Alexandra Luc also showed signs of a promising future as a Tiger. A native of Paris, France, she entered Clemson last January and compiled a 16-7 record in the spring season. Luc also won nine of 11 matches against ACC competition last year.

"Alexandra is a very talented player," Harris noted. "She is still very young, but I think we will see her develop into a great player."

The final member of the 2006-07 team is freshman Samantha Eppelsheimer. She is a walk-on from Mount Pleasant, SC who led Wando High School to state championships in 2004 and 2005.

"Samantha has been a great surprise for us," said Harris. "She has demonstrated that she can really compete, and her work ethic and attitude are tremendous."

With such a deep, talented, and young team, expect an ever-changing lineup during the spring season. However, the players will have little time to adjust thanks to the demanding schedule awaiting them. Harris has put together another challenging slate for her team that she hopes will prime the Tigers to again compete on the national stage.

"If you want to be successful at the national championship, you have to do the things during the season to prepare you," Harris stressed. "Every match will be a challenge, but we have spaced it out to give ourselves breaks in between."

The Last Word

A Tribute to Our Country's Heroes

"Some people wonder all their lives if they've made a difference. The Marines don't have that problem." ~ Ronald Reagan

Today we celebrate this country's military, and our military heritage and tradition at Clemson. It is Military Appreciation Day in Death Valley, and what better way to celebrate than to honor one of our own and his fellow Marines. I would like to tell you about a Marine that has not only served his country in Iraq, of all places, but is a former Clemson baseball player and alumnus of this great institution.

Ryan Hub is a versatile individual and a Second Lieutenant serving on active duty in the Marine Corps. He was an outfielder for Head Coach Jack Leggett from 2000-04 who finished his career with a modest .230 batting average, 53 hits, six homers, and 35 RBIs in 128 games (59 starts).

"Ryan first caught my eye when he came to our baseball camp," said Leggett. "We noticed the return address was Kuwait (where his father was stationed in the Air Force), and we knew it had to be the furthest anyone had ever come to participate in our baseball camp.

"Ryan was the kind of player you wanted at Clemson. He had some great moments here, and he always exemplified what the program is all about, both on and off the field.

"We are very proud of how he handled himself during his time here and since he graduated. He has represented Clemson and our program well, not to mention what he does for this country by serving as a Marine. I couldn't be more proud of him."

The son of a retired Air Force Colonel, Hub knew that he wanted to pursue a career in the Marine Corps at a very early age. His father is Retired Colonel Michael Hub, who flew F-111s in the Air Force for 27 years.

"When I was 14, I decided I wanted to be a Marine," said Lieutenant Hub in a recent phone interview. "I always felt serving in the military would be something that my dad would be really proud of. I was never pushed into being in the military, it was something I wanted to do for myself."

Hub was stationed at Quantico, VA before being deployed to Iraq for seven months. Currently, he can be found in uniform leading his Marines at Camp Lejeune in Jacksonville, NC. While deployed

to Iraq, Hub experienced any leader's worst nightmare.

He was the platoon commander in charge of 35 Marines when they took on enemy fire during patrol last August. They were attacked in a hostile area by an IED (Improvised Explosive Device). One of Hub's squad leaders, Corporal Joe Tomci, was killed, and another Marine, Lance Corporal Walblay, was badly injured.

"The day I feared the most happened on the morning of August 2," said Hub. "One of my Marines was killed in action when he was hit by an IED on the streets of Ramadi, Iraq. Corporal Tomci was an unbelievable Marine and made my life as a platoon commander easy. His squad was always doing the right thing...he wouldn't have it any other way."

Tomci was an "All American kid" who had just celebrated his 21st birthday a month prior to giving his life for his country. He was originally from Akron, OH and was a huge Ohio State fan. This highly-motivated Marine had already received the Navy Achievement Medal just three months into his deployment for the work he had done in Iraq.

According to Hub, "Tomci was above all else a warrior, someone you wanted to go to battle with. He was taking care of his squad, watching them and controlling them. Unfortunately, he wasn't the only Marine hit. Two others were wounded along with our interpreter, and thankfully, they all lived.

"Lance Corporal Walblay was one of the wounded. He lost two toes, but he is alive because Corporal Tomci took most of the blast. I know that if he had it his way, he (Tomci) wouldn't have changed a thing. He would have given his life to save the life of one of his Marines. And that is exactly what he did.

"The enlisted Marine is the most incredible part of the Marine Corps. What most people don't understand is that it's the 18 and 19-year-old Lance Corporals who have provided safety, security, and freedom to this country."

Our enlisted soldiers, sailors, airmen, and Marines are a huge part of our military..."the back-

bone" as we called them in the Army.

As an Army veteran and former enlisted person, I can tell you that serving your country is not a trouble-free or painless profession. It is a 24-hour-a-day job, and you do not get to call in sick, show up late, or leave early. It is blood, sweat, and tears, and it never gets any easier.

But, I can tell you that those who do choose to serve are very proud to give up whatever they need in order to accomplish their mission. In the end, it is all the same mission...protect this country and its people, and do it with the utmost integrity, honor, discipline, and pride. We military types would not have it any other way.

I have been a Clemson fan all my life, and today's game is #47 in a row for me (not bad for a student). I chose to join the Army in order to support myself through college. Clemson is the only school that I ever wanted to attend, and to say that I am a huge Tiger fan would be an understatement.

However, since my Tigers will not make the BCS National Championship game this year, I personally hope Ohio State brings home the national title for one Corporal Joe Tomci, a huge Buckeye fan, and a Marine who gave his life for his country and preserving our freedom.

I am dedicating this article to someone I respected very much and who taught me how to be a better soldier while stationed at Fort Bragg, NC. Retired Colonel John Chambers was not only one of my mentors, but someone I try to emulate in every aspect of my life.

While writing this article, I received word from a fellow Army buddy, former active duty Sergeant Sarah Zavala, that Colonel Chambers recently passed away, just two years after retiring from the Army at age 55.

I had every intention of inviting Colonel Chambers to my graduation in May, because he is one of the reasons I pushed myself so much to get here. One of the first things he did when he got to our office at the 44th Medical Command on Fort Bragg was to ask what I was going to do when I got out of the Army. I simply said, "I'm going to Clemson, sir."

Anyone who knew me in the Army knew that I was going to get to Clemson one day, or die trying. When I received my acceptance letter, he was so proud of me and told me that he knew that I was going to do it when he first met me.

Officers like Lieutenant Ryan Hub and Colonel John Chambers in our military motivate us enlisted people to stay on the right track, and to keep doing the right thing. They essentially turn us into who we were meant to become. And I thank them for that.

So, on behalf of Lieutenant Hub, "Semper Fidelis Corporal Tomci." And to Colonel John Chambers, Airborne All the Way!

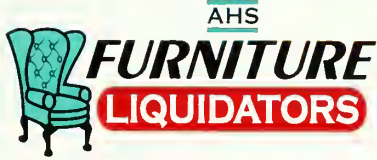

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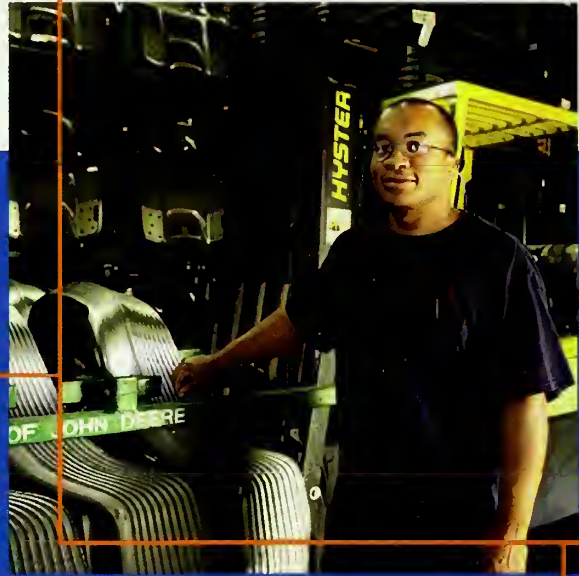
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
