## COACHING STAFF

Mr. H. L. Madden, Director of Athletics, came to Wilson from the Charlotte Technical High School in 1945, and since that time, with the help of his assistants, has developed outstanding football and basketball teams. Many observers in the Eastern Confercnce have credited him with being one of the statc's ablest coaches. A Madden-coached football team won the state championship in 1946, and in 1949 another won the runner-up spot in the East. His basketball teams always have been a threat in conference play and in the state tournaments. The 1948 team, after taking the eastern championship, won the runner-up position for the state title.

Coach Dickens, a Wake Forest product, has been a member of the staff since 1940, with the exception of the three years spent in the U. S. Army. He has
successfully coached junior teams in football and basketball, and has been a big factor in the varsity basketball victories of the past two years.

Coach Roberts began his college career at Mississippi University in 1941. He played football there for two years, and after service with the Marine Corps, starred as a guard for the University of North Carolina. He came to Wilson this year, and as line coach, played a major role in helping to build a successful 1949 football team.

Coach Benton, a graduate of Charles L. Com High School and the University of North Carolina, starred in all sports in high school, and played both football and baseball at Carolina. He has assisted Coach Madden in football and basketball, and since 1946 has served as head coach of bascball. His 1946 and 1948 teams were conference champions.

Gardner made the longest touchdown gallop of the day-a run of 73 yards. Both players were selected on the All-Eastern team, and made strong bids for All-State honors.

## RESUME

In a way the Charles L. Coon High School football team is like the month of March; it dances into the season like a lamb and roars out like a lion. Knowing that the Cyclones would have a good line, formed mostly by seniors, and a fast backfield, local fans were almost certain they would be in the thick of the fight for eastern honors. After a hard-fought encounter with highly rated Charlotte Central, everyone was well pleased with the Cyc's ability, even though they were on the short end of a $1+13$ score.

The following waek a good crowd went out to Municipal Stadium to see the Cyclones defeat a strong team from Kinston High, but the Red Devils surprised everyone but the visiting fans by defeating Wilson 13-6. Kinston later won the state Class A title. The outlook darkened considerably when a "dark horse" squad from Goldsboro stopped the Cyclones again, 13-6. Then, however, came the game with Mt. Airy, which usually starts the team on the right path; the Cyclones played an excellent game and upended the visitors 19-13. The Cyclones then "hit the road"; defeated Raleigh 7-6, lost a "mud battle," 12-6, to Durham, who copped the state AA championship, and swallowed Fayetteville, $6-0$, on the way back home.

The Wildcats of Wilmington at this point in the season were strong contenders for the eastern title, but that meant nothing to the Cyclones, who played a magnificent game in sweeping past the "contenders" 7-6.

Since the Cyclones had begun roaring, their record had gained respect; therefore, they were rated the favorite in the annual classic with Rocky Mount. However, everyone who knew the rivalry between the two schools was a bit uncertain as to the outcome. The Cyclones removed all doubt by defeating the Blackbirds, $1+6$. By virtue of this victory, Charles L. Coon High School retained the coveted Shelton Looms Trophy, and clinched the runner-up spot in the Eastern Conference.

## RESUME
