



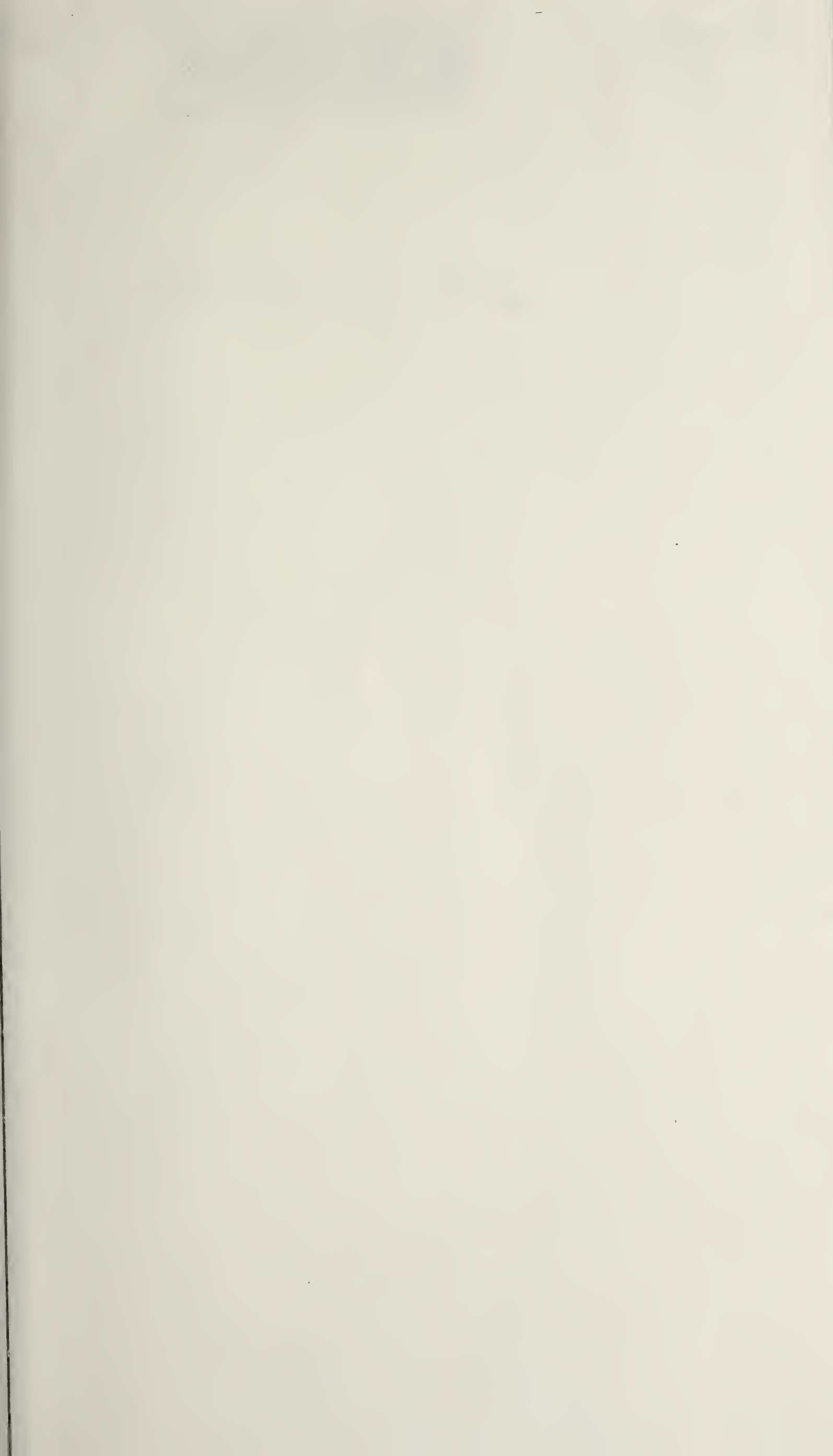
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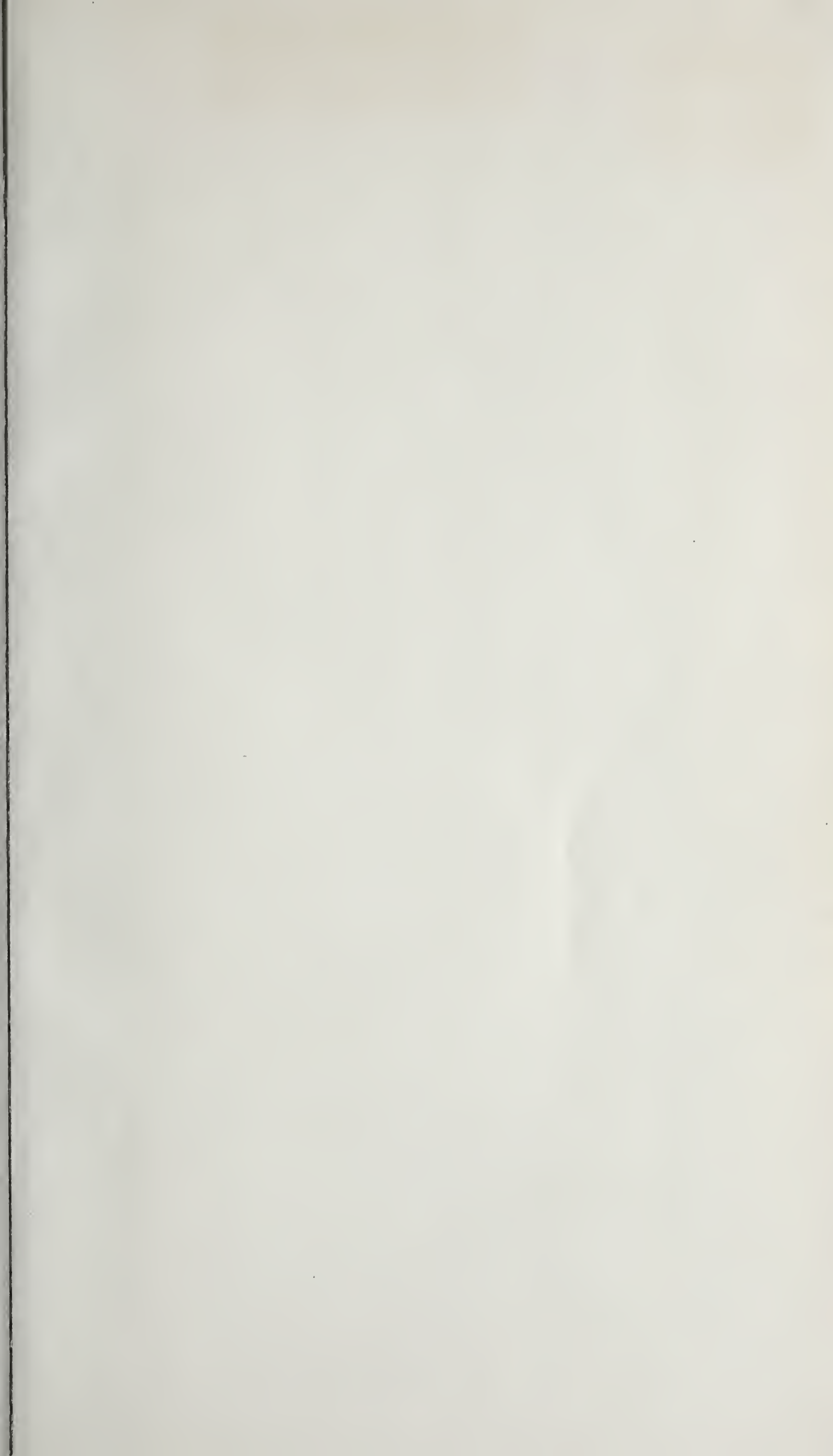


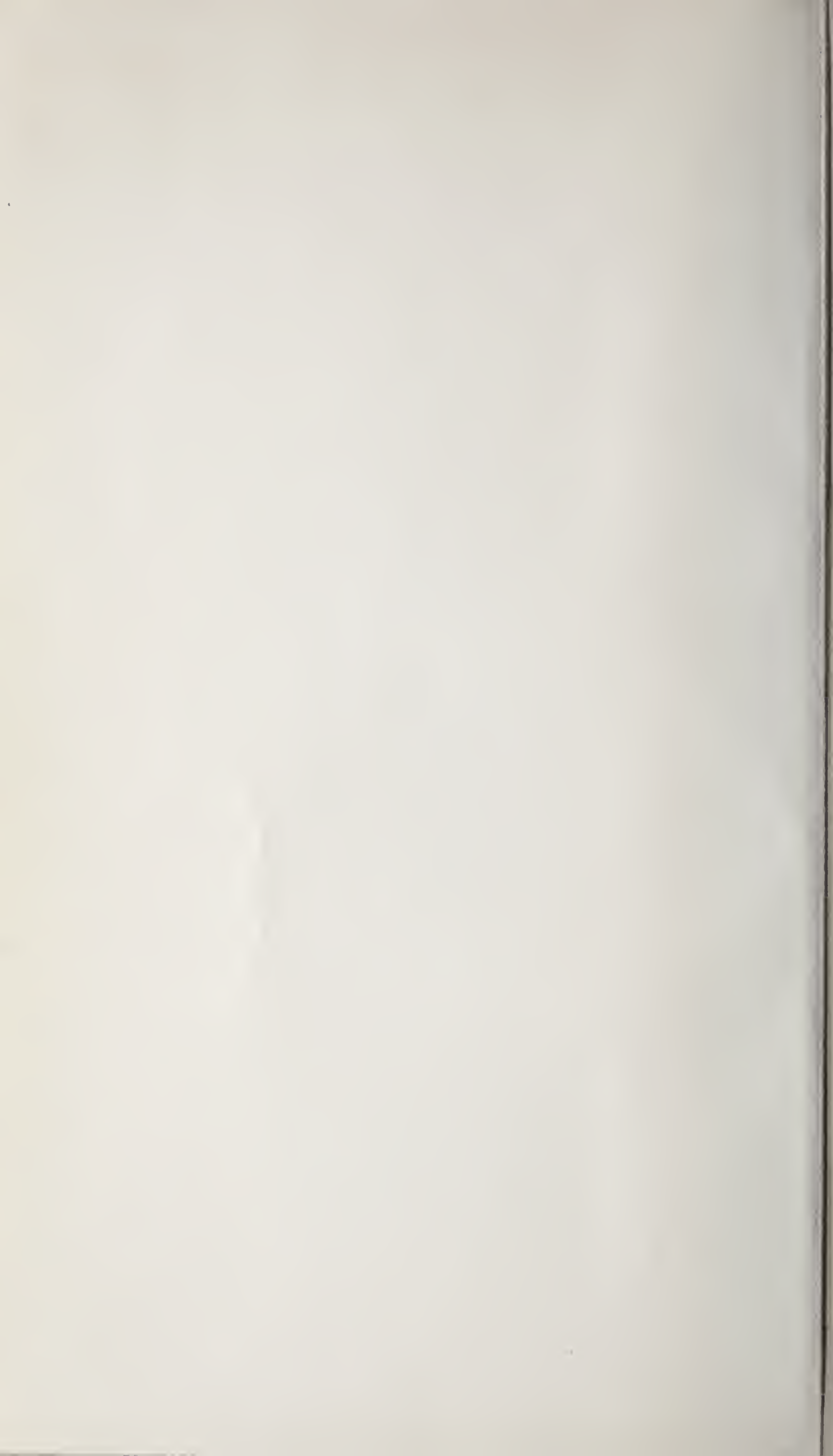

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Introduction

From state and county records and scraps of history collected here and there throughout the country indicate that the Bells and Bealls have figured extensively in the settlement and development of the nation. Many have been distinguished in the arts and science, in law and literature and in war and politics. We had one or more general officers in every war from the Revolution to and including the World War.

We owe to ourselves, to our country and to posterity, the duty of collecting and publishing such information and records concerning the Bells and Bealls, as may become available. Pride in family history should be encouraged and fostered, for it tends to strengthen the moral obligations, elevate the individual character, and broaden our patriotism.

There were eighteen Beal, Beale and Bell immigrants to the Province of Maryland before 1700, who left permanent descent to be considered. Many of these who spelled their names Bell, changed it to Beall soon after arrival.

In many cases individuals have constructed reliable and valuable Bell and Beall lines, covering their own families, and then quietly filed their efforts away, not for a moment realizing that our great family is not only highly interested in, but is entitled to share with them, the knowledge and honors developed in their lines. This condition should not be, for they collectively have not only nothing to be ashamed of but numerous virtues and many brilliant individuals to be proud of.

The origin of the Bell Clan of Scotland does not seem to have been definitely recorded. Numerous data have been collected and digested on the subject, which permits of satisfactory deductions. Previous to the Roman conquest Britain was inhabited by about forty tribes of people called the Cymri, or ancient Britons. Their origin is undetermined. Native legends indicate that they migrated from the East, and took possession of Britain in ancient times, long before the Christian Era. The names of their gods are similar to those of ancient Phenicia and Babylon.

The religion of the Cymri was Druidistical. The objects of their reverence were numerous, viz: Oak trees, mistletoe, the hills, the rivers, the rocks, the sun or the fire-giver; and an imaginary god called Baal, Bel, Beil or Bell. Their priests were called Druids. Their places of worship did not consist of houses, but certain places in the hills formed by a circle of great stones. Many of the stone circles are in existence today. The Romans found these Druid priests had great influence over the natives; so they tried to destroy the priests. They found that their directors and their chief meeting place were on the Isle of Mono or Anglesia, on the coast of Wales. They immediately killed the priests and cut down their sacred trees. There were many other minor places of worship left after the chief one on Mono Isle had been destroyed, but their general authority had been destroyed, and finally disappeared when Christianity appeared. The Druids practiced human sacrifice.

Cæsar first invaded Britain in 55 B. C., and in 58 A. D. sent a Governor-General to control the Province.

The Romans evacuated Britain 410 A. D.

Saint Kentigen and Saint Mungo the Beloved, lit the torches of early Christianity in Britain, and began the destruction of paganism.

Saint Ninian built his first church near Whithorn 391 A. D., and called it Candida Casa.

Saint Patrick commenced preaching in Ireland in 425 A. D.

After the introduction of Christianity in Britain the Priests of Baal, Bel, Beil or Bell, finding their occupation gone, assembled, and for mutual protection, formed a clan called Baal, Bel, Beil or Bell. They located in Scotland on the west coast.

The first mention of the Bell Clan in Scotland's political history was in 1587, when the Bells are put on the unruly lists of clans in the West Marshes.

The literature of the early fifteenth century, and later, indicates that Scottish citizens by the name of Bell were separated into two classes, viz.: those who preserved the clannish form of government, and were referred to in political documents as the Clan Bell of the West Marshes. The other class we find scattered all through Scotland and England, paying little attention to clannish organization, but successfully indulging in literary, scientific and military pursuits. These often, especially in England, changed their surname spelling from Bell to Beal and Beale. But the Bell relationship was

acknowledged; especially when a coat of arms is introduced, by using the Bell characters in the chevron.

Bells Tower is mentioned in 1481 in an Act of Parliament.

William Bell represented the Clan in Parliament in 1545-1547.

In 1751 General Bell commanded Queen Mary's army in Sterling, after the capture of Dumbarton Castle.

In some of the rural districts of Scotland the Fire Festival is today celebrated in May. This is a survival of the Fire Festivals practiced by the Druid priests, before the advent of Christianity. It was called the Festival Beltain, or Baaltein or Bealltein. On the day of the festival the fires of the people were extinguished in the land. Then the Druid priests supplied the inhabitants with the Sacred Fire of Baal, which the priests had kept continuously burning upon their altars. (See the histories of Scotland by James Logan and John S. Kelsie.)

As mentioned above, in 1587 the Bells of the West Marshes were on the lists of the unruly clans of Scotland. Many of them accepted the invitation of King James of England of about 1605, for Protestants to migrate to the Ulster Plantations in Northern Ireland. These Plantations consisted of the Counties Tyrone, Donegal, Armagh, Cavan, Termaugh and Derry, all attained by the English through conquest.

King James invited immigrants from England and Scotland to occupy these desirable lands. Many of the Bell Clan accepted. By 1725 more than 500 families of the Bell settlers had emigrated from Ireland to the American Colonies and flourished. According to the records of the Land Office, Annapolis, a large majority of the Bell immigrants to Maryland came over before 1700 from Scotland. Many of these Bells changed the spelling of their names from Bell to Beall and Beale. The first Bell immigrant who changed his name to Beall was John Bell of Saint Marys County on May 15, 1657. (See Md. Arch., Vol. X; folios 505, 513, 514.)

An incomplete survey of the Revolutionary War records shows that the Bell, Beall and Beale citizens of the Provinces of Maryland, Virginia, and North Carolina responded splendidly to the call to arms of 1776. The other provinces did just as well, but had fewer citizens of the name in question. The records show North Carolina had 124, Virginia 134, and Maryland 188, who loved liberty and honor, and shouldered their rifles to back their love. There were many who

enlisted in the militia of their counties, whose names failed to appear on the state records.

The compilation of the immigrants Beall and Beale and Beal and their descendants are made up from many sources. The greatest care has been exercised. It has required much time and money to collect and compile this record. It has been a great satisfaction to me to have been the humble compiler of a work that will be a source of pride and pleasure to a great American family, who today claim 32,000 souls in these United States.

Generations, Abbreviations, Dates, and Counties Used in the Beall Record

The children of an immigrant or the head of a line have a marginal prefix of a capital letter. For example *A, B*, etc.

The grandchildren of an immigrant or head of a line, have a marginal prefix of a numeral. For example *1, 2*, etc.

The 2 grandchildren of an immigrant or head of a line have a marginal prefix of a numeral in brackets. For example *[1], [2]*, etc.

The 3 grandchildren of an immigrant or head of a line have a marginal prefix of a common letter. For example, *a, b*, etc.

The 4 grandchildren of an immigrant or head of a line, have a marginal index of a common letter in brackets. For example *[a], [b]*, etc.

The 5 grandchildren of an immigrant or head of a line have a marginal index of a Roman numeral. For example, *I, II*, etc.

The 6 grandchildren of an immigrant or head of a line have a marginal index of a Roman numeral in brackets. For example, *[I], [II]*, etc.

The common letter *b* stands for *born*.

The common letters *ba* stand for *born about*, and indicate the date of birth is unknown and has been estimated from circumstantial data.

The common letter *d* stands for *died*.

The common letters da stand for *died about*, and indicate that the date of death is unknown, and has been estimated from circumstantial data.

The common letter m stands for *married*.

The common letters ma stand for *married about*, and indicate the date of marriage is unknown, and has been estimated from circumstantial data.

In handling dates it must be remembered that, up to and including 1751, the English year did not begin on January 1, but on the Feast of Annunciation, March 25. On any transaction between January 1 and March 25, the date was often written in both old (ecclesiastical) style and new (present) style. For example, the date February 25, 1742, old style was written February 25, 1742 $\frac{2}{3}$.

The Gregorian Calendar was adopted by England and her colonies in 1752. By an Act of Parliament the 3rd of September was made the 14th of September.

Cousin was used in the 16th and 17th centuries for *nephew* and *niece*.

Confusion will result in locating settlers and their written instruments in their proper counties unless the following data are understood, concerning Maryland counties:

Augusta Carolina County was erected in 1634. In 1637 the name was changed to St. Marys County, and included all the province that was settled.

Kent County was erected in 1642 and included all the eastern shore of Maryland.

Anne Arundel County was erected in 1650. It consisted of all that part of the western shore over against the Isle of Kent.

Charles County was erected in 1650 out of the western part of St. Marys County. Because its Governor, Thomas Brooke, was a Cromwell man, the act erecting Charles County was revoked in 1654. In 1658 Charles County was re-erected, to include all the country north and west of Anne Arundel County.

Calvert County was erected July, 1654. It included old Charles County and the country back of the Patuxent River. In October, 1654, its name was changed to Patuxent by an assembly hostile to the Calvert family. In 1658 it was changed back to Calvert County.

Prince Georges County was erected in 1695. It included the now Prince Georges County, Montgomery County, Frederick County and Washington County.

Frederick County was erected in 1748 and included the now Frederick, Montgomery, and Washington Counties.

Montgomery County was erected in 1776 out of the lower third of Frederick County. Before 1695 it was a part of Charles County. From 1695 to 1748 it was a part of Prince Georges County. From 1748 to 1776 it was a part of Frederick County.

In 1776 Washington County was erected out of upper district of Frederick County.

Arms

A comparison of the Scotch Bell arms, having three bells in the field, with the several Beale arms of England, indicates a similarity in the general use of the chevron, with three objects in the field. This would seem to indicate a relationship between the Bells of Scotland and the Beal and Beales of England. Most of the following described arms are familiar to many American families of Bell and Beale descent:

1. Bell. Used by Robert Bell of Scotland about 1427.

Arms: Three white bells on a blue shield.

2. Used by Adam Bell of Scotland.

Arms: Azure, three bells, argent, a chevron, argent.

3. Lord Chief of the Exchequer, 1577.

Arms: Azure, a fess ermine, between three bells, argent.

Crest: A falcon, wings expanded.

Motto: Nec quaerere honorem nec.

These arms were found in the churchyard at Newport, R. I., on the tombstone of William Bell, 1737.

4. Bell, Kensington:

Arms: Azure, three church bells, argent, chief fesse, ermine, nine markees argent, in four, three and two, twenty-seven estoiles argent, in three to marquee.

5. Bell, Berkshire and Buckinghamshire:

Arms: Sable, three church bells argent, two and one, and three estoiles or, one and two.

Crest: A hawk, wings expanded argent, beaked and belled or, a string flotant from bells, gules.

6. Bell, of New Castle:

Arms: Gules, a fesse ermine, between three church bells argent.

Crest: A hawk or, close proper beaked and belled.

Motto: Perseverantia.

7. Beale, Exeter:

Arms: Argent, a chevron gules, between three bells.

8. Beale:

Arms: Azure, three cinquefoils over two fesses, ermine.

Crest: A griffin, passant.

9. Beale, Herfordshire and Northamptonshire:

Arms: Or, a chevron, Sa between three pheons Sa, two in chief lying fessways, point to point.

10. Beale, Southampton:

Arms: Ar, three torleaux gules.

11. Beale, London:

Arms: Sa a chevron between three griffins' heads erased ar, three estoiles gu.

Crest: A unicorn's head erased or, remee'd estoiles gu.

12. Beale, Surrey:

Arms: Sa, a chevron between three griffins' heads, erased or, as many mullets of the field.

Crest: A unicorn head Sa erased, armed and crined or.

13. Beale, Maidstone Court, Farmingham, Heath House:

Arms: Sa, a chevron or, between three griffins' heads ar erased, as many estoiles or.

Crest: A unicorn's head or, erased, semee of estoiles gu.

14. Beale or Beal, Hingham, Norfolk:

Arms: Sa, a chevron between three wolves' heads or, erased, as many cinquefoils of the field.

Crest: A demi-wolf rampant, holding a spear, head tasselled in pale, ppr.

15. Beale, Ayrshire:

Arms: Sa, a chevron between in chief two gryphons' heads argent, erased and in base an estoiles, arg.

Crest: A unicorn head or, coupé, charged on the neck with an estoile.

16. From Davies Armorial Families (page 86):

Address Bourm Park, Canterbury. "Matthew Bell, Esq., Justice of the Peace, Deputy Lieutenant for Kent County, son of John Bell, Esq., of Lincoln Inn. One of His Majesty's Counsel. Learned in Law."

Armorial Bearings as used but to which no right has been established so far.

Arms: Sa on a chevron between three bells, or as many lions on chevron erased, proper or. (One lion at apex of chevron. One lion each at the two lowest points of chevron.)

Crest: A lion's head as in arms, Sa.

Motto: Lege et labor.

17. Matthews' American Armory and Blue Book 1913 gives the Bell Blazon as follows:

Arms: Azure, a chevron ermine, between three bells, or.

Crest: A falcon, wings expanded, ermine on breast.

Some individuals recorded as Bell or Bale in the Land Office seem to have later changed their names to Beale or Beall. All immigrants were entitled to 50 acres of land from the Provincial Government, and

if they claimed the 50 acres, the said claim caused their names to be recorded in the Land Office. Many immigrants for cogent reasons, did not claim the 50 acres of land. Their failure to do so prevented any record being made of their arrival.

Colonel Ninian Beall

1625-1717

Ninian Beall was born in Largo, in the County of Fifeshire, Scotland, in 1625. He states his age on Aug. 16, 1708, in Liber P. C., folio 625, Chancery Records of 1712-1724, Annapolis, as 83 years.

He was a son of Dr. James Bell, of Largo. He was probably named for Saint Ninian, who lived A. D. 350-432, in Scotland. He was the patron saint of the Lowlands. The natives of the Lowlands pronounced the name as Saint Ringen. This explains the name Ringing Bell, used for Ninian Bell on a number of occasions, by clerks in official papers.

The Festival of Saint Ninian is Sept. 16.

The name Ninian seems to have a French derivative. A historical woman, Ninion de L'Enclos of Paris, 1616-1705, was about 70 when she saw the little boy Arouet, known later as Voltaire. She favored his progress and supplied him with money to purchase books.

Ninian Bell charged with holding a commission of Cornet in the Scotch English Army, raised to resist Cromwell. In the Battle of Dunbar on Sept. 3, 1650, against Cromwell, Ninian Bell with many other Scotch soldiers were captured, tried and condemned to servitude in the British plantations. These plantations consisted of the six northern counties of Ireland, the American Colonies and many of the West Indies Islands.

On account of his familiarity with Irish names and people, after his arrival in Maryland, it is concluded that Ninian Bell spent part of his eight years of servitude in Ireland, and the remainder in the Province of Maryland.

In the Calendar of the British State Papers for Dec. 13, 1666, there is an interesting entry concerning the disposition of Scotch rebel prisoners, to wit: (1) To have all ministers and officers executed.

(2) Of the common sort, one in ten to be executed. (3) One forced to confession. (4) The rest sent to the plantations.

In 1658 Ninian Beale arrived in the Province of Maryland. See Vol. V, folio 416, Land Office, Annapolis.

August 26, 1663. Then came Richard Hall and enters rights for 50 acres of land each for himself, his wife Elizabeth * * * Ringing Bell * * * all by assignment to John Sinkler. See Liber 5, folio 416, L. O. A.

Jan. 16, 1666. Came Ninian Bell of Calvert County, planter, and proved right to 50 acres of land. See Liber 11, folio 195, L. O. A. He named it The Soldier's Fortune.

Bachelor's Choice. 300 acres, surveyed Sept. 20, 1668, for Ninian Beal. Near Lyon's Creek. Rent 6s. Md. Hist. Mag., Vol. XXII of 1927, folio 274.

Ninian Bell arrived 1658. Richard Hall drew 50 acres of land for Ringing Bell's transportation, in 1663, would indicate that Ninian Bell served about five years of his servitude with Richard Hall.

By the thoughtless, the servitude of Colonel Ninian Beall, first in Ireland and then in Maryland, on account of having been a "King's Rebel," and fighting against Cromwell, may be rated as a disgrace. This humiliation of servitude, which came to him, not by crime, but through the fortunes of war, was an honor. The principles for which he fought finally triumphed in the overthrow of Cromwell. His servitude was a halo of martyrdom for a principle, which was honorable. Although he had great chances of escape from servitude, yet we find the instincts of a gentleman and soldier prompted him to not only honorably and gracefully submit to the fortunes of war, but at the same time, by so doing, to gain the respect and confidence of the people of Maryland to such a degree that they showered continuous honors upon him to the day of his death.

The following names, Saint Andrews, Ringen, Largo, Dunbar, Edinburg, Fyfe, Rock of Dumbarton, are given to some of the plantations Ninian Beall patented or purchased. They are for places in his native Scotland.

His military experience in the Scotch-English Army seems to have been early recognized in the Province, as the following military and civil appointments show:

1668. The official records at Saint Marys City dated Oct. 31, 1668, call him Lieut. Ninian Beall.

1676. Commissioned Lieutenant of Lord Baltimore's Yacht of Warr, Loyal Charles of Maryland, John Coade, Commander. Md. Arch., Vol. XVII, folio 217.

1681. Captain Ninian Beall, Chief Indian Ranger, is given power to press man and horse at any time to give his Lordship intelligence about Indians. Md. Arch., Vol. XVII, folio 68.

1684. Appointed Deputy Surveyor of Charles County, to lay out Ports of Entry and trade towns. Md. Arch., Vol. XVII, folios 319, 407.

1686. Appointed Peace Officer of Calvert County by the Assembly, and charged with seeing that the laws of the Assembly are obeyed. Md. Arch., Vol. V, folio 502.

1689. Appointed Major of Militia of Calvert County by the Assembly. Md. Arch., Vol. VIII, folio 8.

1689. About 1688 Colonel Ninian Beall, Commander John Coade, Colonel Nehemiah Blakestone, Colonel Henry Jowles, and Major John Campbell, headed an association formed for the defense of the Protestant Religion in the Province. Their attack upon the Capitol of St. Marys, August 1, 1689, resulted in the surrender of the Royal Council and Lord Baltimore Government.

The articles of surrender were dated August 1, 1689, and gave the Revolutionists complete possession of the Government of the Province, which never was returned to the Catholics. See Baltimore Sun Dec. 4, 1904. Md. Arch., Vol. VIII, folios 108, 161, 184, 220, and Vol. XX, folio 144.

1689. Captain Ninian Beall signed a "Declaration of Remonstrance," in which it was declared that "All rumors of an Indian Invasion, supported by the Catholics, were found to be false."

Just after the Revolution of 1689, when the Catholics had finished turning over the Government to the Protestants, the Protestants ordered an election of a new House of Burgesses. The Catholic officials of Calvert and Anne Arundel Counties refused to comply with the order.

Barbar Smith, of Calvert County, relates that Colonel Jowles, commanding the Calvert County Militia, ordered out his army, consisting of Major Ninian Beall and 26 men, and had the county officials arrested, after they had again refused to order an election. He then lined up his army and ordered the men to cast the ballot for the county. After counting the ballots it was found that Colonel Jowles and Major

Beall were duly elected Burgesses to represent Calvert County in the House of Burgesses.

Prince Georges County was erected in 1695 out of part of Charles and part of Calvert Counties. Ninian Beall was elected the first Burgess to represent Prince Georges County in the House of Burgesses.

1694. Appointed Commander in Chief of all their Majesties' Forces of Militia of Horse and Foot in Calvert County. Md. Arch., Vol. VIII, folio 410.

1696. May 11, 1696, he took his seat in the Assembly as the first Burgess from the newly erected County of Prince Georges. Md. Arch., Vol. XIX, folio 318.

1697. He was reelected for five succeeding terms as Burgess, and retired Sept. 14, 1704. Md. Arch., Vol. XXVI, folios 55, 56.

1697. Appointed on a commission to treat with the Piscataway Indians, by the Assembly. Md. Arch., Vol. XIX, folios 523, 526, 569.

1698. Appointed to the Committee on Law of the Assembly. Md. Arch., Vol. XXII, folio 224.

1699. Appointed Commander in Chief of the Indian Rangers of the Province by the Assembly. Md. Arch., Vol. XXII, folios 422, 509.

1699. As a member of the Assembly in 1699 he signed a petition to King William III for the Establishment of the Church of England in the Province of Maryland, although he was an elder in the Presbyterian Church. (Considered a move against the Catholics.)

1704. In 1696 the Emperor of the Piscataway Indians, named Echo tomo quathe, died. The tribe was unable to agree upon a successor. On Sept. 21, 1704, the Assembly appointed a Commission, of which Colonel Beall was a member, to acquaint the Piscataway Indians that they make a choice of Emperor, and present him at Annapolis to

his Excellency for confirmation: also that they should pay their tribute and renew their Articles. Md. Arch., Vol. XXVI, folios 383, 384 and 405.

ACT OF GRATITUDE

1699. At a session of the General Assembly Begun and Held at the Town and Port of Annapolis, on the 28th Day of June, in the Eleventh year of the Reign of Our Sovereign Lord, William the Third, by the Grace of God, of England, Scotland, France, and Ireland: King Defender of the Sca Annoq Domini 1699, and ended the 22nd Day of July, following, Nathaniel Blackistone Esqr Governor, the following Laws were enacted. * * * An Act of Gratuity to Colonell Ninian Beall.

Whereas, Colonell Ninian Beall has been found very Serviceable to this Province upon all Incursions and Disturbances of Neighboring Indians and though now grown very Aged and less able to perform, yet continues his Resolution even beyond his Ability in the like Service att this Juncture of Affairs it is therefore thought fitt in Point of Gratitude for such his good Service done and towards his Supporte & Relief now in his old Age to make Him an Allowance out of the Public Revenue of this Province: Be it therefore Enacted by the Kings Most Excellent Majesty by and with the Advice and Consent of this Present General Assembly and the Authority of the Same, that Mr. William Hutchinson, a Member of this House, as a Trustee for and on behalfe of the said Coll. Ninian Beal, hath hereby Given to him full power and Authority to Procure and Purchase three good Serviceable Negro Slaves for the Proper use and Benefit of him the said Colo Ninian Beal for and during his Natural life, and after his decease, to the use of his wife during her Natural life, and after her decease then the said Negros & Slaves, and their increase to the Sole use and Benefit of their Child or Children, according to the request and Desirè of him the said Ninian Beal, by will or otherwise, and for that End and Purpose the said William Hutchinson hath hereby full power and Authority to draw a Bill or Bills for the Same of Seventy five pounds Sterling, upon the Treasurer of the Western Shoar, who is likewise hereby required to Yield and Pay the Same out of the Publick Stock of this Province, for which he shall be Allowed and have Credit on his Acct Current att the Rendering thereof as p Act of Assembly he is obliged. And be it further Enacted by the Authority Aforesaid, by

and with the Advice and Consent aforesaid that the said Negros and their Increase shall not during the life of the said Ninian Beal or his wife be taken in Execution for any Judgment or Attachment whatsoever Obtained or hereafter to be Obtained, any Law, Statute or Usage to the Contrary, in any Wise Notwithstanding. 1699. May 26, 1699. By Virtue of an Act of Assembly of this Province in empowering Wm Hutchinson to buy and purchase for me the three Negros, I do acknowledge to have received from the said Wm Hutchinson three Negros named John, Sarah and Eliza. As witness my hand this day and date aforesaid.

The Official Records of the Province of Maryland credit Colonel Ninian Beall with many successful expeditions against the Indians. Md. Arch., Vol. VIII.

It seems the Susquehanock Indians gave Colonel Beall more trouble than the Maryland Indians. They would make raids in force, into Northern Maryland, rob and burn, then take such white women and cattle, and rush for the Pennsylvania border. The Pennsylvania authorities gave them asylum, free from attack of the Maryland forces. During one of these raids the Indians had captured quite a number of white women and cattle and hastened toward the Pennsylvania border. Colonel Beall hastily gathered 60 mounted men and followed. He came up with the Indians while asleep in camp at night, near the northern border. With the yells of madmen they rushed upon the Indians from all sides, calling to the white women to lay low, and with knives and clubs slaughtered them, none escaping except a few who were with the cattle.

A manuscript written by Sarah Barker, the daughter of one of the earliest settlers in Lancaster County, Pa., mentions a great slaughter of Indians by a party led by a person named Bell. William Penn complained to the King, and demanded that Bell be hung for murder. The King very properly called upon the Maryland authorities for a

report. When he had read it, he promptly approved of the action of the Maryland authorities.

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A massacre of the Susquehanock chiefs occurred, according to Streeter, at Piscataway Fort in 1675, when the Maryland authorities were engaged in a violent struggle with the Susquehanocks.

The official papers and reports rendered by Colonel Beall on file in the Provincial Records show that he was a man of broad experience, great mental capacity, undoubted integrity, perfect moral courage, and had a good education. To these virtues we may add that he was of a most kind disposition, and remarkably broad-minded.

The Provincial authorities trusted him without limit, and he never failed to make a satisfactory return for the trust imposed.

The following three incidents illustrate his fairness and broad-mindedness:

(1) During the Revolution of 1689, when the Province was torn asunder by startling rumors of an Indian invasion, supported by the Catholics, he promptly investigated the rumors and, although he was a Protestant, he boldly declared the rumors were false.

(2) Friends Library, Vol. III, 1838, says: "Although Colonel Ninian Beall was an elder in the Presbyterian Church, he entertained in Maryland the Quaker Thomas Wilson in 1691. Thomas Wilson describes Colonel Beall in his report as 'an ancient comely man, kindly invited us to his house, where we staid two nights and had a meeting.'"

(3) In 1699, although he was a Presbyterian, he promptly signed a petition to King William to establish the Church of England in the Province.

Official papers in the Maryland Records, signed by Colonel Ninian Beall, and the official records refer to him in a variety of spelling, namely: Ninian Bale, Ringen Bell, Ninian Beale, Ninion Beale, Ninian Bell, Vivian Beall and Ninian Beall. He must have aimed to pronounce it Beale. For in all state papers, when clerks had control, the name was nearly always Beale or Beal.

Although Colonel Beall was recognized as a staunch Presbyterian, yet he does not seem to have made any effort to organize a Presbyterian Church or obtain a minister. When he heard of the arrival of Matthew Hill in Charles County in 1669 and organizing a church, and then Francis Makemie was discovered on the Eastern Shore in 1680 building a church, the Colonel became excited, and sent to Scotland for action.

Early in 1685, about 200 Scotch families of the Presbyterian faith came over to Maryland from Scotland through the solicitation of Ninian Beall. He located them along the Potomac River and called the settlement New Scotland. It afterwards was called Scotland Hundred. These immigrants brought with them their Pastor, Rev. Nathaniel Taylor.

There is recorded at Upper Marlboro a deed of gift dated Nov. 25, 1704, from Colonel Ninian Beall, to the Reverend Nathaniel Taylor, of land in Upper Marlboro, on which to build a church. The deed was attested in a Prince Georges County Court, called and held ye 23rd November, Anno Domino 1704 for our Sovereign Lady Ann, by the Grace of God, Queen of England.

In 1707 Colonel Ninian Beall presented the above church with a costly silver communion service, made in London. When the above church was removed to Bladensburg, the communion service went with it. The church was afterwards removed to Hyattsville, Md., where the service is in use today, 1927.

Colonel Ninian Beall was the first elder of the Presbyterian Church in America. See *Presbyterian Review*, Vol. IX, 1888.

A vague but persistent opinion prevailed among the Presbyterians of the United States during the nineteenth century that Ninian Beall 1625-1717, of the Province of Maryland, was the father of the Presbyterian Church of America.

About 1885 the Rev. J. W. McIlvain, of the Philadelphia Presbytery, was commissioned to visit the State of Maryland and collect all available information in the State archives, domestic records, and legendary fragments on the subject. His report was very satisfactory and complete, substantiating the unwritten history, that Colonel Ninian Beall was the active and substantial father of the early Presbyterian Church of Maryland during his life time.

Rev. J. W. McIlvain's lengthy report is published in *Briggs' Presbyterian Register of Philadelphia* for July, 1888. See page 380, Vol. IX, *Presbyterian Review*. Cong. Lib. B, X8901, P8.

In 1668 Ninian Beall patented land called Bachelor's Choice. In 1669 Ninian Beall stated before the Provisional court: "I am a married man." Between the above two transactions he married Ruth Moore, daughter of Richard Moore and his wife Jane, planter and barrister of St. Marys County. Richard Moore is a true and lawful attorney. Md. Arch., Vol. X, folio 367.

James Moore, a brother of Richard Moore, in a deposition dated August 16, 1708, mentions Colonel Ninian Beall as his brother in law. Liber P. C. No. 2, Chancery Records 1671-1712, folio 626, Annapolis.

The act of gratitude passed by the Assembly 1699-1700 was the last mention of Ruth Moore Beall. She did not sign the deed for the church lot at Upper Marlboro in 1704. She died between 1700 and 1704.

Colonel Ninian Beall died in 1717 at his plantation, Bacon Hall, Prince Georges County, 92 years old. His will was probated June 15, 1717. Liber W. B. No. 6, folio 504, Annapolis.

Colonel Ninian Beall figured in many land transactions in the Province of Maryland. The total number of acres, as per the records, is 18,755 acres.

Colonel Ninian Beall passed his last days upon his plantation of Bacon Hall, located near Mount Carmel, the first Capital of Prince Georges County. It is about three miles southeast of Upper Marlboro.

He patented Bacon Hall May 1, 1672. It was then a part of Calvert County.

In 1686 he was made town officer of Mount Carmel. On May 11, 1696, he took his seat in the House of Burgesses at Annapolis as the First Representative of the new County of Prince Georges. His last appearance in the Assembly as representing Prince Georges County was Sept. 16, 1704. His will indicates that he died at Bacon Hall. It is concluded that he and his wife Ruth were buried in the family burying ground at Bacon Hall.

5thly: These are our absolute Resolutions, Concessions and Demands to which we desire your immediate complyonce, being utterly resolved against any personal treaty about the Province.

Given under our hand this first day of August 1689.

The Land Records on file at Upper Marlboro, P. G. Co., showing the transactions of Charles Beall, 1672-1740, indicate that Charles Beall was married twice. The first wife was named Mary Walstead, widow of Joshua Walstead. She made a return for her husband Joshua's estate in 1695. See page 70, Md. Hist. Mag. for March, 1922. Charles' second wife was Mary Price, *dr* of Edward Price, of P. G. Co. She was *ba* 1690, *d* 1767. The following is from the Bible of Ninian [3] Beall, *b* 1696: "My mother, Mary Beal, died Aug. 23, 1767. [Sig.] Ninian Beall, his book."

In his will of 1717, Colonel Ninian Beall gives his son Charles 1,000 acres of land called Dunn Back, lying on the south side of Great Choptank, in a creek called Watts Creek (Dorchester Co.).

Charles Beall's will probated Nov. 27, 1740. Liber W. B. T T, folio 311, P. G. Co. He left his wife Mary land called Beall's Adventure.

To son Charles (the elder) the Mill Branch and the Mill.

To son Charles (the younger) land called Conclusion and Pinkerton's Quest.

To son Ninian (the elder) land between Mill Branch and Pine Branch.

To son Joshua, land between Pine Branch and Beaver Dam.

To sons Ninian (the mariner), land in Dorset (Dorchester) County on the Eastern Shore, near the head of Great Choptank River, Ninian to have the south side of Watts Creek and Joshua the north side.

Co., planter, and Susannah Brooke, the wife of Henry Brooke, mariner, but lately the wife and relict of Ninian Beall, mariner, deceased. The deed recites that Charles Beall, late of P. G. Co., deceased, in his last will gave his two sons, Ninian and Joshua, land called Denby, 1,000 acres, located in Dorchester County, Ninian to have the portion on the south side of a branch of Wallises Creek, and Joshua all on the north side.

The deed then recites that Ninian Beall, in his last will gave to his wife Susannah all his real and personal property. Apparently there was some question as to the proper dividing between these two pieces of property, for the deed then states that for the sum of five shillings, to be paid by Susannah Brooke to Joshua Beall, that Joshua Beall renounces all claim to the land in question, in favor of Susannah Brooke. Diligent search has been made for the will of Ninian Beall, mariner, mentioned in the quit deed, but it has never been found.

The reference to the will in the quit deed indicates that there were no Beall children involved. See Deed Liber NN, folio 225, land records P. G. Co.

The will of Henry Brooke, mariner, made March 13, 1772, makes no mention of Susannah or any Beall children. See Liber T, No. 1, folio 194, Will Book of the Orphans' Court, P. G. Co.

Both the English and the Scotch refused to permit each other to hunt on their side without permission. In 1387 an English party, disregarding their rules, invaded the Scotch side to hunt. The Battle of Ottobourne resulted.

In 1725 Colonel Belt built the Chevy Chase Manor House. It was built of brick, 2½ stories high, with a hip roof. It was located about 400 yards southeast of the now Chevy Chase Circle. It was razed in 1907 to make way for improvements. It was in excellent condition when torn down.

This joyful news was immediately wired to Beall's mother, Janet Yates Beall, then in Brooklyn. It is stated that the Secretary of War, when he heard of Booth's intercession, ordered Beall to be hung the next morning. Booth was wild with grief and anger at what he called the perfidy of the President, and swore to avenge Beall's death. See statement of Dr. Foote, Surgeon C. S. While on the ship John Balch became very busy making love to a fellow passenger named Ann Bloomer. The captain, through fear of detection, put the children ashore in Scotland. John Balch was apprenticed to a shoemaker. He married his sweetheart, Ann Bloomer, and came to Georgetown, Md. They afterwards obtained land on Deer Creek, in now Hartford Co., Md.

James Balch, father of Stephen, moved to Mecklenburg, N. C., in 1769. He was in Charlotte, N. C., May 19, 1775, and was on the committee which drew up the Mecklenburg Declaration of Independence.

After graduating in 1774 at Princeton College, N. J., Stephen Bloomer Balch located in Calvert County, Md., and established a classical school for boys. In 1775 he recruited a company among his scholars. They all enlisted except one boy, who absolutely refused to enlist. Stephen had no intention of permitting one boy to interfere with the success of the war, so he obtained a stout switch and then proceeded to inoculate the timid boy with the real patriotic fever. The inoculation proved to be perfectly successful.

Stephen Bloomer Balch was commissioned Captain of this company and assigned for duty in Colonel Alexander Somerville's Militia Regiment of Calvert County and served from Dec. 1, 1775, to Dec. 1, 1777. The U. S. Pension Report of 1835 shows that Captain Balch was drawing a pension of \$40 per month since Nov. 23, 1832, to date of death in 1833.

There is no doubt that Ninian Beall, 1625–1717, was a devout Presbyterian. He loved the religion of his fathers.

We can realize how much he was affected when he learned that the Rev. Matthew Hill arrived in 1669, located in Charles County, built a church, collected a flourishing congregation, and the Presbyterians of Calvert County had neither a minister or a church.

When that splendid Christian character, Francis Makemie, arrived in 1680, located near Pocomoke City, Eastern Shore, organized a congregation, and by 1683 had built a big log church, Ninian was deeply stirred! "What is the matter with the Presbyterians of Calvert County that we cannot have either church or minister? Wake up!" Something quickly happened. A messenger was quickly dispatched to Scotland to capture a minister of the Gospel and his congregation and bring them to the Province of Maryland. Within twenty months, in 1685, the Rev. Nathaniel Taylor and his congregation arrived in Calvert County. The congregation, consisting of about 25 families, were provided with plantations on the Potomac River in now Prince Georges County, and the settlement was called New Scotland.

Ninian Beall deeded a lot in Upper Marlboro, a church was built, a silver communion service was sent for by Colonel Ninian Beall, and the Rev. Nathaniel Taylor was fully equipped to carry out Ninian's desire, expressed in the deed for the lot, to wit: "For ye propagation of ye Gospel of Jesus Christ."

Rev. Nathaniel Taylor, Edward Willet, and Tabitha Willet seem to be the persons whose names have been recorded as such as composing part of the New Scotland settlement.

The Maryland Land Office has no record of the arrival of those New Scotland immigrants. For cogent reasons they did not claim the 50 acres of land authorized for each immigrant, and therefore were not recorded in that office.

About this time Ninian Beall increased his land holding 1,943 acres. So we can surmise that these immigrants were properly cared for.

There really had arrived and recorded in the Land Office at Annapolis, and otherwise disposed of two women immigrants, named Sarah Bell and Mary Bell, noted as follows:

It is estimated that a Sarah Bell and a Mary Bell appeared about this time in now Prince Georges County, and that they came with these above mentioned 25 immigrant families that came with the Rev. Nathaniel Taylor.

They must have been very attractive Scottish lassies, for Samuel Magruder, 1661–1711, married Sarah Bell in 1686; and John Pottinger, 1662–1735, married Mary Bell about the same time.

Colonel Samuel Magruder, in his will of 1711, mentions "My Brother John Pottinger." This confirms the relationship between Sarah and Mary Bell, as sisters.

Sarah Bell Magruder named two of her children, Mary and John, as a compliment to her sister, Mary, and her husband, John

Pottinger. Mary Bell Pottinger named two of her children, Sarah and Samuel, as a compliment to her sister, Sarah, and her husband, Samuel Magruder.

The apparent fondness of Sarah Bell Magruder for Colonel Ninian Beall and his family indicates either a relationship or strong friendship. She named her second son for Colonel Ninian; and in her will of 1734 she makes valuable presents to Mary and Samuel Beall, children of Ninian [2] Beall, 1672-1710.

An article in the *Presbyterian Review*, Vol. IX, of 1888, Baltimore, states that Thomas, the brother of Colonel Ninian Beall, was a builder and contractor; that he assisted many of his countrymen in Scotland to emigrate to Maryland.

Rezin Beall has a splendid war record. Enlisted as a private and commissioned Second Lieutenant in Captain Ware's Company, in the French and Indian War of 1757-8. Md. Hist. Mag., Vols. V and IX of 1910 and 1914, folios 273, 360.

Jan. 2, 1776, Rezin Beall commissioned Captain of the First Independent Company of the Maryland Regulars. Md. Arch., Vol. XVIII, folio 20.

The Little Iron Man

General Rezin Beall, 1723-1809, and George Beall, 1780-1834, lived on either side of the Little Paint Branch, in northern P. G. Co.

George's father, Ninian [5] Beall, 1751-1784, was a private in the First Independent Company of Maryland Regulars. He was badly wounded at the naval fight at Charles River, St. Marys Co. He never recovered, dying in 1784.

George as a boy and man worshiped The Little Iron Man, and his glorious military record. The General humored his young admirer, George, and related to him how he had driven off 80 British ships with only 100 men.

George made notes of the General's statement, which he afterwards gave to his nephew and heir, Thomas Birch Beall, 1818-1879, the writer's father, which the writer has seen.

Captain Beall's outlook had warned him before dawn of the arriving ships. He deployed his 100 men in a thin line along the coast in

the bushes opposite the ships, with orders that if the enemy tried to come ashore they would not fire until their boats were 25 yards from the shore. Each ship filled a boat with armed men and were soon moving toward the shore. The firing of Captain Rezin's men was such a surprise that the boats were thrown into confusion, and many of Captain Beall's men got in a second shot before their fire was returned by the British.

The enemy did not attempt to land, but returned to their ships and indulged in vigorous big-gun fire. This fire killed and wounded a number of men, wounding Captain Beall in the hip.

This remarkable act of repulsing 80 enemy sail with 100 men prompted Captain Beall's friends to confer on him the title of *The Little Iron Man*.

Annapolis, Aug. 23, 1776, Captain Rezin Beall was commissioned by the Council of Safety Brigadier General vice Thomas Johnson, resigned. See pages 69 and 85, "*The Maryland Line*," by Thomas Balch. Cong. Lib. E203, S49.

Sept. 6, 1776, at the Battle of Harlem, General Beall's Brigade of the Maryland Flying Camp greatly distinguished themselves. Scharf's *Hist. of W. Md.*, folio 140.

Sept. 21, 1776, General Beall's Brigade, consisting of four regiments, at the Battle of White Plains displayed great nerve and steadiness.

Dec. 19, 1776, General Rezin Beall's commission expired. *Md. Arch.*, Vol. XII, folio 540.

On account of his unhealed wound, received at St. Georges Island July 17, 1776, General Rezin Beall declined further service for more than a year.

Envy, malice, and jealousy prompted Wm. Smallwood and Thomas Johnson to attempt to discredit General Beall's military glory, but failed, as they deserved. Johnson suffered cold feet in New Jersey and resigned. Smallwood made it convenient to be absent in New York from his battalion during the Battle of Long Island.

Served through the Revolutionary War from 1776 to 1781. From Corporal to Major.

Corporal Gassaway Watkins, 2nd Company of the Maryland Battalion, commanded by Major Mordecai Gist, at the Battle of Long Island. This battalion's commander was Col. Wm. Smallwood, who found it convenient to remain in New York City. The command of the battalion fell to Major Mordecai Gist.

During the battle General Washington found the British were trying to turn his right flank and capture his army. Washington ordered Major Gist to rush in with his battalion of 404 Maryland troops and hold the British while Washington could withdraw.

Major Gist placed his battalion along the west bank of a canal and made a desperate and successful attempt to hold the British. When Washington had withdrawn to a safe position he sent Major Gist orders to fall back. Out of the 404 men, Major Gist and 13 fit-for-

duty soldiers fell back and followed Washington to New York. Where was Smallwood?

It is estimated that 308 men had been killed and captured, and about 83 wounded men had been ordered to fall back, or were taken back by the troops bound for New York.

Corporal Gassaway Watkins and Sergeant James Beall of Rogers were among the above mentioned 13 fit-for-duty soldiers.

James Beall's war record is beautiful and romantic and is recorded elsewhere.

Major Gassaway Watkins was given military lands in Knox County, Ohio, warrant No. 2406; also warrants 2244, 2245, 2246 and 2247, in Garrett County, Md.

Mary and John had *dr*, Margaret Gassaway Watkins, who *m* Albert G. Warfield, of Howard Co., in 1842, who was father of Governor Edwin Warfield of Maryland.

b. Thomas Watkins had four other children. Thomas received land in his grandfather's will of 1790.

Ninian Beall Edwards went to Kentucky; was Judge, and later on was Governor of Illinois Territory, third Governor of State of Illinois, then U. S. Senator, then Minister to Mexico.

Ninian Beall Edwards and wife Elvira had son, Ninian Wirt Edwards, of Springfield, Ill.

Ninian Wirt Edwards was Attorney General of the State when 23 years old.

Ninian Wirt Edwards *m* Elizabeth Todd, *dr* of John Todd, Lieut. Governor of Territory of Illinois. Elizabeth Todd was the oldest sister of Mary Todd, wife of Abraham Lincoln. A sister of Mary and Elizabeth *m* General Helm, C. S. A.

Mrs. Abraham Lincoln died at the house of her sister, Elizabeth Todd Edwards, in Springfield, Ill. Her casket rested in the same room of the residence of Ninian Wirt Edwards in which Abraham Lincoln and Mary Todd were married. See folio 507, *Century Magazine* for February, 1918, is shown the house of Ninian Wirt Edwards in which Abraham Lincoln was married in Springfield, Ill. Wash. *Star*, May 18, 1919.

Governor Fendall

In 1655 Josias Fendall was arrested and imprisoned by the Assembly, charged with having disturbed the Government by hostile acts under pretense of authority from the late Governor Stone. See page 210, I. V. L., McMahan's History of Maryland, Baltimore, 1831.

The Cromwell representatives took possession of the Province of Maryland, July 22, 1654. Lord Baltimore, then absent, protested. In 1656 he appointed Josias Fendall Governor of the Province, and sent him over to Maryland. Fendall took the oath of office in 1658.

At a provisional court in St. Marys Co., Feb. 23, 1658, Josias Fendall, Governor, presided. See Day Star, folio 66, pub. by G. L. L. Davis, 1665.

In 1659 Fendall headed a bloodless rebellion against Lord Baltimore, probably instigated by the Cromwell Government in England. With the fall of the Cromwell Government, May 29, 1660, the Republic of Maryland collapsed.

In 1661 Fendall was banished from the Province. He went to Virginia. He soon returned and after pleading extenuating circumstances, for his rebellious acts, he was pardoned and restored to citizenship. Charles Baltimore says that Josias Fendall in 1659 was his father's Lieutenant General and Chief Governor of Maryland. He broke his commission and endeavored a mutiny. Md. Arch., Vol. V, folio 311.

Captain Josias Fendall was charged with force to raise a mutiny and sedition, March 26, 1681, at Pick a Jaw Oxen, Charles Co. Tried, found guilty, and sentenced to pay 40,000 pounds of tobacco. Md. Arch., Vol. V, folios 311 to 328.

The will of Captain William Stone, Charles Co., made Dec. 3, 1659, appoints Governor Josias Fendall a guardian for his minor child. Md. Col. Wills, Vol. I, folio 12.

father and mother as Alexander did, it is surmised that Robert was a Scotch foster brother.

Alexander Beall with other county officials signed, July 30, 1695, a congratulatory address to King William, felicitating him upon his escape from assassination. This address was headed "Civil Officers and Magistrates of Prince Georges County." Md. Arch., Vol. XX, folio 546.

Enoch Coombes patented Largoe, which lyeth on the north side of southwest branch of the Patuxent River, before it came into possession of Alexander Beall. Enoch had a daughter named Elizabeth Coombes. Her godmother was Joane, Lawson, Reade, Mounten, Tyler, Beall, wife of John Beall, immigrant of 1670. Joane left Elizabeth a legacy in her will of 1675.

Alexander Beall owned Friendship Enlarged. It extended from (now) Washington City to the Burnt Mills, on Sligo Creek, 920 acres. See Book Montgomery Early Patents.

Alexander Beall bought 648 acres of land in (now) Montgomery County in 1716. Scharf's Hist. W. Md., folio 694.

James Bell was in Major Mordecai Gist's Battalion, 404 strong. In the Battle of Long Island, Aug. 27, 1776, Major Gist had orders from Washington to hold the enemy until the American Army had safely retired to New York. He obeyed orders, Washington's Army was able to retire, BUT, Major Gist's Battalion was destroyed. Nearly all had either been killed, wounded, and sent to the rear, or captured. When Washington sent word to Major Gist to retire he had 13 men fit for duty that reached New York. James Bell was one of the 13. He was promoted Sergeant soon after battle. He was nearly 16 years old.

James Bell re-enlisted April 17, 1777, for three years in Captain Benjamin Stoddart's Maryland Company. This company was attached to Colonel Hartley's Additional Continental Regiment of Pa., Jan. 13, 1777.

Final settlement of the accounts for services of James Bell in the Eleventh Old Pa. Regiment, Continental Line, was made Jan. 1, 1781, on Certificate No. 67580. Total paid \$33.30. See Report of Paymaster General, 1786.

A sweet and attractive romance is woven about James Bell's courtship. It appears that Count Pulaski was sent by General Washington to Chestnut Creek, Oct. 6, 1778, in now Atlantic County, N. J., to

confuse a British force operating there. The patriots had a number of vessels secured in that creek. General Pulaski drove out the British and awaited further orders. James Bell was wandering around the village when he espied a comely Quaker maiden, with downcast eyes and bashful mien, named Michel Johnson. He promptly became interested, investigated, and surrendered. Mistress Johnson announced the terms of capitulation. "Go thou my brave hero, serve thy State until the end, then a prisoner thou shalt be, in the castle of my heart, forever and a day." The terms were accepted.

When he heard that Hull had surrendered his army to the British, Colonel Beall refused to recognize the act, and immediately marched his regiment to the rear and threw up hasty entrenchments. He was very successful in quelling the panic among the American soldiers, who had fled to escape surrender. He promptly formed them into units and armed them for immediate defense. His strength and the strong position so affected the pursuing British that they declined to attack him.

The President was so much pleased with his soldierly action that he commissioned Colonel Beall a Brigadier General.

General Beall was elected to Congress in 1813. He resigned 1815.

After preaching his sermon on the Sunday before he joined his regiment, he removed his priestly gown and disclosed himself to his surprised congregation in a colonel's uniform of the Continental Army; at the same time he dramatically said, "There is a time to pray and a time to fight."

Peter Muhlenberg, *b* in Pa. 1746. Sent to Germany for education. Required to serve two years in German Army. Splendid luck. His military knowledge was put to great use in 1776. In 1776 commissioned Colonel of 8th Va. Infantry; Brigadier General, Feb. 2, 1777; Major General 1783. Member of First Continental Congress. U. S. Senator. Died 1807, and buried in the Lutheran churchyard in the town of Trappe, Pa.

Lieut. Robert Beall was transferred to the 4th Va. Infantry, Sept. 14, 1778. Resigned Dec. 31, 1780. *m* Elizabeth Summers Stephenson, *b* 1745, widow of Colonel Richard Stephenson, Jr. The parents of Elizabeth Summers were Francis Summers, of Buckingham Co., Va., and Mrs. Lane, born Pollard, of Fairfax Co., Va. In 1732 Baron Jost Hite, with his family of 3 sons-in-law and 16 other families, migrated from Pa. to the Shenandoah Valley, Va. See folio 32, History of Martinsburg and Berkeley Co., Va.

Jacob Hite and his wife, Frances Madison Beale Hite, moved to South Carolina just before the Revolution in 1774, taking with them all their children, except Captain George Hite. The British Tories found Jacob sided with the Rebels. They induced the Seminole Indians to murder Jacob and his whole family. Son John was absent. The Indians spared the two daughters, Frances and Eleanor, 16 and 18, and took them to Florida. Frances was murdered en route, a bunch of bucks having quarreled over her possession.

The Indians camped at Savannah, where a number of British officers, stationed there, came out to see the Indians in camp. A Captain Johnson saw a white girl sitting over by a large tree in the Indian camp, a picture of utter despair. He went over to her. "What are you doing with the Indians?" he gently asked. Eleanor told him of the massacre, and the murder of sister Frances. "Will you let me take you from these Indians?" "Please take me away or I will die of sorrow." Captain Johnson ransomed the dear girl, took her to a white woman, gave the woman some money to buy clothes for Eleanor, with a promise to come back soon. The Captain was distressed to know what to do with Eleanor. While studying the subject a band of settlers came by. He found they were bound for the Gulf coast, about where Pensacola now stands. They were willing to take Eleanor along. Captain Johnson turned Eleanor over to them. God bless Captain Johnson.

Eleanor had suffered too much. She died en route to the coast. Her body was taken to Pensacola and buried. A large stone with the name "Eleanor" cut on it marked the grave. My niece, Stella Martin, visited Pensacola in 1926. She enlisted the D. A. R. for aid. They could find nothing concerning the marked stone. See folio 194, Vol. IV, Col. Fam. of the U. S.

Walter Bayne member of the Assembly in 1650 from St. Georges 100, St. Marys Co. Folio 122, E. D. Neill's Founders of Maryland.

Walter Bayne patented a tract of land of 1,000 acres called Barbadoes, located on the east side of Port Tobacco Creek, Charles Co. See *Terra Mariae*, folio 254, by E. D. Neill, Philadelphia, 1867.

In 1663 Walter Bayne had land surveyed for himself near Port Tobacco, Charles Co., called Durham Freehold, 750 acres. In his will, made April 12, 1670, probated May 28, 1670, Liber 1, folio 386, Charles Co., after making provision for his wife Ellinor, *d* 1701, and the other 4 children, he gives Durham Freehold, 750 acres, to my third and youngest daughter, Ellinor, *d* 1710. The other 4 children were:

1. Captain John Bayne, *d* 1701, Charles Co. Will made Oct. 5, 1700, probated Oct. 25, 1701. Leaves personalty to Bayne Smallwood and Major James Smallwood, testators to will made Oct. 5, 1700. In his will Ellinor Bayne and Ellinor Beall are mother and daughter, are mentioned.

John Bayne is mentioned in the will of his mother Ellinor, *d* 1701.

John *m* Ann Smallwood, *dr* of Wm. Smallwood and his wife Elinor. John *d* 1701. In his will he mentions wife Ann, son Walter, son Ellsworth, and *dr*, Ann Bayne.

John Bayne and Anne, his wife, executors of the will of Thomas Gerrard. See Inventory and Accounts, Liber 14, folio 513, 1696, M. L. O.

Walter Bayne, son of John, testator to the will of Wm. Baldy, P. G. Co., made March 22, 1725. Md. Cal. Wills, Vol. VI, folio 1.

Walter Bayne, testator to will of Wm. Elliot, P. G. Co., made Aug. 2, 1727. Md. Cal. Wills, Vol. VI, folio 36.

2. Thomas Bayne.

3. Edith Bayne *m* [1] Jonathan Morles. Liber 16, folio 421, L. O. A. *m* [2] Rev. Matthew Hill, of York, England, ordained 1652, arrived in Charles Co. 1669. Hill *d* 1679 penniless.

Oct. 7, 1679, Ellinor Bayne, Edith's mother, appears in behalf of the Hill orphans. See Liber 7, folio 214, Wills Office, Annapolis, 1679.

4. Elizabeth Bayne.

Mrs. Ellinor Bayne, widow of Walter Bayne, *d* 1670, was administrator of the estate of Philip Dyson. Inventory and Accounts of 1689, Liber 10, folio 262, L. O. A.

Ellinor Bayne, *d* 1701, widow of Walter Bayne. Her will mentions son John, then in England; grandson, Walter Bayne; grandson, Ellsworth Bayne, executor when 21; *dr*, Ellinor Beall, wife of Daniel

Beall; granddaughter, Ann Bayne, and granddaughters, Elizabeth and Ellinor Stone, daughters of her daughter Ellinor by her first husband, John Stone.

During the minority of Ellinor Bayne, *d* 1710, third daughter of Walter Bayne and his wife Ellinor, *d* 1701, it was found that Durham Freehold laid within a tract of land called Panguiah Mannor, owned by Charles Lord Baltimore.

Suit was instigated against Ellinor Bayne; widow, *d* 1701, and her daughter Ellinor, *d* 1710, to cancel the patent issued for Durham Freehold, and Feb. 10, 1673, was set for trial. In Chancery Records, Liber P. C., folio 51, dated July 10, 1673, mention is made of Ellinor, widow of Walter Bayne, as defendant in a suit to recover land called Durham Freehold in Charles County. Ellinor's attorney made a feeble defense and decision was recorded to the defendant. By many it was considered a deed of great injustice, and it was suggested that his Lordship give the Bayne heirs 400 acres of land elsewhere in place of Durham Freehold. This was done in 1676; but the Bayne heirs refused to execute a quit deed for Durham Freehold.

A. Ellinor Bayne, *b* 1665, *d* 1710, *dr* of Walter Bayne and his wife Ellinor of Charles County.

m [1] 1685 John Stone, of Charles Co. John Stone's will was probated in Charles County Aug. 10, 1698. Liber 6, folio 153. He leaves 400 acres of land called Durham (Durham Freehold) to his daughters, Ellinor and Elizabeth, children of his wife Ellinor. His wife Ellinor was executor.

Captain John Bayne, Ellinor's brother, and Major William Dent were overseers. See Judgment, Liber 6, folio 792, L. O. A.

A. Ellinor Bayne Stone, widow, *dr* of Walter Bayne and his wife Ellinor, of Charles County, *m* [2] 1698 Hugh Tears, of Charles Co. No issue. Hugh Tears will probated Feb. 20, 1699, Liber 11, folio 189, Charles Co., 1699.

He leaves his wife Ellinor and stepdaughter Elizabeth the entire estate. If wife should die then 300 acres to his stepdaughters Ellinor and Elizabeth Stone, 300 acres to Henry and Ruth Hawkins, and 300 acres to Ann Bayne, Jr., and Ellsworth Bayne, children of Captain John Bayne. Overseers Captain John Bayne, brother of Ellinor Bayne Stone Tears, and John Hawkins. See Judgments, Liber 6, folio 792, L. O. A.

A. Ellinor Bayne Stone Tears, widow, *dr* of Walter Bean and his

wife, Ellinor, of Charles County, *m* [3] 1700 Daniel Beall, *d* 1703, of St. Marys Co. Daniel Beall arrived in Maryland 1673. Liber 17, folio 60, L. O. A. He lived in St. Marys Co., Anne Arundel Co., and Charles Co.

Daniel Beall is a witness to the will of Richard Lloyd in A. A. Co., made Dec. 9, 1684. Md. Col. Wills, Vol. I, folio 145.

Nov. 10, 1696, Daniel Bell is appointed a peace officer in St. Marys Co. Md. Arch., Vol. XX, folio 54.

Ellinor Bayne, *d* 1701, and Ellinor Bayne Beall, *d* 1710, were testators to the will of Captain John Bayne, of Charles Co., their son and brother, made Oct. 5, 1700, probated Oct. 25, 1701. Md. Col. Wills, Vol. II, folio 435.

Daniel Beall's will probated July 22, 1703, in St. Marys Co. Liber 11, folio 412. He left all his property to his wife Ellinor for the maintenance of herself and her two children, Jane Beall, *b* 1703, and John Beall of Daniel, *b* 1701, *d* 1763. His will Aug. 26, and probated March 4, 1763. Liber D D, No. 1 of 1760-4, folio 998, Charles Co. In his father's will of 1703 he gets the home plantation, Durham Freehold, in the event of his mother's marriage. His will also probated in P. G. Co. in 1763. Liber 1, folio 273. He mentions no wife or children. He leaves land called Durham Freehold, 270 acres, to John Hawkins. He also leaves two Negroes to "Honored Father," who was his stepfather, John Beall of Lawson. A deed of Thomas Sprigg, *b* 1630, *d* 1704, recorded in P. G. Co. Deed Book, Liber A, folio 362, made March 16, 1700, mentions John Bell (of Lawson) as the husband of Sarah Pierce, the granddaughter of the said Thomas Sprigg, and his wife, Eleānor Nuthall, *dr* of John.

Sarah Pierce Beall died before 1704 and left one child, John Beall of Pierce, *b* 1700, *d* 1754. He *m* Mary Beall, *dr* of Charles Beall, *d* 1740. His will probated Oct. 19, 1754, in Charles Co.

A. Ellinor Bayne Stone Tears Beall, widow, *dr* of Walter Bean and his wife Ellinor, of Charles Co., *m* [4] 1704 widower John Beall of Lawson, *b* 1675, *d* 1751, with a son, John Beall of Pierce. See Deed Liber L, No. 2, folio 117, Charles Co., 1732.

Mr. John Beall (of Lawson), Member of the House at Annapolis from Charles Co., April 8, 1707, to Sept. 28, 1708. Md. Arch., Vol. XXVII, folios 24 to 414.

John Beall testator to will of William Dent, Charles Co., made Oct. 2, 1702. Md. Col. Wills, Vol. III, folio 55.

John Beall testator to will of Randolph Brandt (patentee of Anlostian Island, 1680), of Charles Co., made Oct. 12, 1711. Md. Col. Wills, Vol. III, folio 239.

Jno. Beale testator to the will of Thomas Selby, of Charles Co., made Dec. 25, 1714. Md. Col. Wills, Vol. IV, folio 29.

John Beall testator to will of Jane Jones, of Charles Co., made Aug. 6, 1714. Md. Cal. Wills, Vol. IV, folio 53.

John Beale testator to will of Isabella Dryden, of Charles Co., made March 19, 1718. Md. Cal. Wills, Vol. IV, folio 189.

John Beale testator to will of Catherine Ensey, Charles Co., spinster, made Jan. 4, 1735, probated May 5, 1736. Md. Cal. Wills, Vol. VII.

A. Inventory and Account of Ellinor Beall, wife of John Beall of Lawson, of P. G. Co., made July 24, 1710, by Wm. Scott and William Thompson, Liber 31, folio 409, P. G. Co. After death of Ellinor Beall, 1710, John Beall of Lawson *m* Catherine Johana.

John Beall of Lawson, of Charles Co., and his son, Richard Beall, *b* 1705, husband and son of Ellinor Bayne Stone Tears Beall, deceased, on April 24, 1718, petitioned the Assembly at Annapolis to pass upon the Durham Freehold land case and grant them justice. Md. Arch., Vol. XXXIV, folios 10, 68, 404; also Vol. XXXIII, folio 209; also Vol. XVIII, folio 257.

After a prolonged investigation the Assembly decided in favor of the Bayne Beall heirs to Durham Freehold. The Assembly ordered the Sheriff of Charles County to establish these heirs in possession of Durham Freehold, John Beall (of Lawson) to possess during life, and thereafter his son, Richard Beall, and his heirs to have it.

On account of the great expense of this contest of 45 years to recover, the Assembly authorized John Beall to sue the Province, and retained for him the services of Daniel Dulaney, an attorney, to press the suit. Md. Arch., Vol. XXXVIII, folios 428 and 424.

John Beall of Lawson's will was made Feb. 1, 1733, and probated April 27, 1751, in Charles Co. See Book H I I, No. 7, folio 74. Mentions his wife, Catherine Johana, and two sons, John Beall of Pierce and Richard Beall of Bayne.

John Beall of Pierce, *b* 1700, *d* 1754, son of John Beall of Lawson and his wife, Sarah Pierce, *d* 1754. His will, probated in Charles Co. Oct. 19, 1754, Liber B T, No. 1, of 1751-4, folio 247, mentions wife Mary and leaves her part of his property. The remainder is given to

cousin, John Hawkins. Mentions no children. His stepmother, Catherine Johana, and his half-brother, John Beall of Daniel, *d* 1763, are witnesses.

John Beall of Pierce, *b* 1700, *d* 1754, *m* Mary Beall, *b* 1722, *dr* of Charles Beall, *d* 1740, and his wife, Mary Price. They had a son Charles, who was made the executor of the will of his uncle, Charles Beall, *d* 1763, son of Charles Beall, *d* 1740, son of Col. Ninian Beall. He is also mentioned in the Census of 1776 as living in Charles Co.

6. Richard Beall, *b* 1705. His father, John Beall of Lawson, left him in his will land in Essex Co., Va.

Oct. 12, 1728, Richard Beall qualified at the bar of the Lower House of the Assembly as an attorney at law, and took the oath prescribed by law. Md. Arch., Vol. XXXVI, folio 207.

Richard Beall testator to the will of Mary Lenvir, of Charles Co., made Dec. 22, 1725. Md. Cal. Wills, Vol. VI, folio 90.

Two Colonial brides, Joane Lawson, *b* 1653, *d* 1675, and Ellinor Bayne, *b* 1660, *d* 1710, were each married three times, and then their families combine as follows:

In 1704 Joane's youngest son, John Beall of Lawson, *b* 1675, *d* 1751, *m* the three times widow, Ellinor Bayne Stone Tears Daniel Beall.

This combination produced a son, Richard Beall, *b* 1705, afterwards barrister, and heir to the celebrated estate of Durham Freehold, of Charles Co., Md.

Adam Bell's accounts, dated June 25, 1741, Liber 18, folio 245; also Liber 21, folio 451, L. O. A.

Adam Bell, testator to will of Quanton Bratten, Somerset Co., made March 27, 1731. Md. Cal. Wills, Vol. VI, folio 211.

Margaret Bell.

Margaret Bell, sister of Adam Bell, *m* [1] Hunter; *m* [2] Joseph Hackney, St. Marys Co. See will, Liber 15, folio 152; also Testamentary Proceedings, Liber 6, folios 325, 404, 497, and 498, St. Marys Co., 1718.

Richard Beall.

Richard Beale and his wife, Audrey Goodwin Beall, arrived in Maryland 1684.

Captain Richard Beale and Aubrey Goodwin Beale, of his Majesty's Brigandiers, came before the General Assembly in December, 1684, demanding the liberation of William Goodwin, the brother of Mrs. Beall, who had been unlawfully sold into bondage. See Md. Arch., Vol. V, folios 420 to 424, inclusive.

Captain Richard Beall lived in St. Marys Co. and Cecil Co. His will probated Dec. 13, 1725, Liber W D, No. 1, 1723-26, folio 462. No wife is mentioned. His children mentioned were John, Thomas, Jane, Rachel, and Richard.

David Bell.

m Rose Bruce, widow of George Bruce, P. G. Co. See deed, Liber B, folio 182, P. G. Co., 1702.

In the will of Robert Hopper, of A. A. Co., made Aug. 17, 1700, he mentions his brother-in-law, David Bell. He also mentions his wife, Mary Bell. Md. Cal. Wills, Vol. II, folio 204.

Elizabeth Bell.

In 1726 William Innis *m* Elizabeth Bell, heiress of David Bell, of St. Marys Co. David Bell's will probated July 3, 1726. Liber

18, folio 525, St. Marys Co.; also Testamentary Proceedings, Liber 25, folio 41, L. O. A. A deed was filed for record Jan. 5, 1727, in A. A. Co., made by David Bell, for property called Beall's Mills.

George Bell.

George Bell arrived in Maryland 1664. Liber 7, folio 491, L. O. A.

George Beall proved his right to 50 acres of land Oct. 3, 1672. Liber 17, folio 57, L. O. A.

Mary Bell.

Mary Bell arrived in Maryland 1660. Liber 10, folio 286, L. O. A.

Mary Bell and Arthur Young were testators to the will of Mary Bourne, of Calvert Co., made July 26, 1706. The probate records state that the two above testators had been married before the probate of the will, Oct. 22, 1706. Md. Cal. Wills, Vol. III, folio 81; also Liber 12, folio 72, L. O. A.

Martin H. Beale.

Martin Hobart Beale was the son of John Beale and his wife, Nazareth Hobart, immigrants of 1638 from Hingham, England, who settled in New Hingham, Mass.

Their descendants claim the following coat-of-arms:

Arms: Sable, a chevron between three wolves' heads, erased; or, as many cinquefoils of the field.

Crest: A demi-wolf rampant, holding a spear tasseled in pale, proper.

Martin H. Beale signs an address of Nov. 18, 1689, in Calvert Co., Md., to King William and Queen Mary, Protestant subjects in Calvert County, Md., complaining of the conspirators who captured the Maryland government on Aug. 31, 1689. Md. Arch., Vol. VIII, folio 132.

Susanna Bell.

Susanna Bell arrived in Maryland 1672. Liber 17, folio 67, Land Office, Annapolis.

John Beale testator to the will of Susannah Bell, of A. A. Co., made Oct. 4, 1708. Md. Col. Wills, Vol. III, folio 114.

Thomas Bell.

Thomas Bell arrived in Maryland 1665. Liber 9, folio 92, L. O. A.

Thomas Bell *m* 1683 Elizabeth. He *d* soon after marriage in A. A. Co. Elizabeth Bell *m* [2] Richard Burnett, of A. A. Co. See Warrants W C, Liber 4, folio 288, L. O. A.

Prudence Bell.

Prudence Bell, widow of Joseph Bell. See Inventory and Accounts, Annapolis, A. A. Co., 1695, Liber 13a, folio 343.

John Beale, of Queen Anns Co., Md.

John Beale, *d* 1771. Will probated Dec. 2, 1771. Name of wife unknown. Issue:

Major Thomas Beale, Immigrant, 1645-1713

JOHN BEALE, 1680-1734, of Annapolis.

Brother John Beale, with his sister Elizabeth, arrived in Maryland 1654. Liber Q, folio 211, Land Office, Annapolis.

Thomas Beale arrived 1666. Vol. IX, folio 436, L. O. A. They all settled in St. Marys Co.

In his will of 1713 Thomas Beale leaves his brother-in-law, Rev. Henry Jennings, 10,000 lbs. tobacco.

In his will of 1716 Rev. Henry Jennings mentions his brother-in-law, John Beale.

As their coat-of-arms contains 3 bells, they were supposed to be of Scotch descent.

Elizabeth Beale, sister of Thomas and John Beale, *m* Rev. Henry Jennings, rector of William and Mary Parish, St. Marys Co. They

had a son, Thomas Jennings, Chief Clerk Md. Land Office, Aug. 26, 1759. Md. Hist. Mag., Vol. of 1923, folio 155.

The will of Rev. Henry Jennings, probated Oct. 27, 1716, at Leonardtown, St. Marys Co. Liber P C, No. 1, folio 209. He makes John Beale guardian during minority of his son, Thomas Jennings. He mentions no wife. See will, Liber 14, folio 303, St. Marys Co., 1715.

John Beall patented 200 acres of land in 1686, in St. Marys Co., called Beale's First Chance.

John Beale's will, probated April 20, 1733, Liber C G, No. 3, folio 661, St. Marys Co., mentions no wife. Refers to 4 children: John, Thomas, Mary, and William. Leaves two sons, Thomas and William, in care of Thomas Griffin until 18 years old. Thomas, *b* June 4, 1717; William, *b* Dec. 25, 1722.

Thomas Beale, of St. Marys, was transported to Maryland in 1666 on the good ship "Constant Friendship." He came from Topham, County Droon, England, at the head of Exeter. His descendants claim the coat of arms of Exeter, viz.:

Arms: Argent, a chevron, gules, between three bells, or. No crest or motto given.

Oct. 3, 1672, Thomas Beale made claim for 50 acres of land, for services performed in the Province. Liber 17, folio 57, L. O. A. Land called At Hell, 617 acres, surveyed Nov. 12, 1694, for James Murry, lying on the north side Patapsco River, beginning at a bounded red oak near Davis Run, 303 acres, part thereof in possession of Thomas Beale. Rent per annum, 12s. 1½d. See Rent Rolls, Md. Hist. Mag., Vol. XXI of 1926, folio 343.

Thomas Beale is often mentioned in the archives of the Province. He located in the town of St. Marys, the capital of the Province, until 1694, when the capital was changed to Annapolis.

He signed a petition as alderman of St. Marys City, Sept. 21, 1694, against moving the capital to Annapolis. Md. Arch., Vol. XIX, folio 75.

He rented the necessary rooms in St. Marys to the General Assembly in which to hold sessions of 1686 and 1688.

On Dec. 8, 1688, the Assembly allowed him 57,136 pounds of tobacco for services to the Assembly. Tobacco was the currency of the Province, at one penny per pound weight. Md. Arch., Vol. XIII, folios 187, 205, 226, 227, and 208.

Jan. 5, 1694, Thomas Beale Justice for St. Marys Co. Md. Arch., Vol. XX, folios 190, 465.

Sept. 15, 1694, Thomas Beale, of St. Marys, had in his possession 22 muskets of public arms. Md. Arch., Vol. XX, folio 205.

Oct. 23, 1696, due Thomas Beale's house 200 lbs. tobacco for board for Col. Wm. Colebourne. Md. Arch., Vol. XIII, folio 131.

Oct. 23, 1696, Thomas Beale, vestryman of William and Mary Parish, St. Marys Co. Md. Arch., Vol. XXIII, folios 17 and 128.

Nov. 10, 1698, Th. Beale, Justice of St. Marys Co., signed a paper felicitating King William upon his escape from an assassin. Md. Arch., Vol. XX, folio 546.

Thomas Beale appointed Commissioner of Civil and Military Affairs for St. Marys Co. by the General Assembly, 1689 and 1706. Md. Arch., Vol. XIII, folio 245; also Vol. V, folios 491, 513; also Vol. XXVI, folio 638.

Thomas Beale Member of the Assembly 1704, 1705, 1706, 1707 from St. Marys Co. Md. Arch., Vol. XXVI; also Vol. XXVII, folios 61 and 67; also Vol. XXIV, folios 35 to 382; also Vol. XXV, folios 39 to 595; also Vol. XXII, folios 202 and 430.

Thomas Beale, *b* 1645, *d* 1713; *m* Elizabeth Bateman 1679, *dr* of Wm. Bateman and his wife, Elizabeth Selby, granddaughter of Thomas Selby, of Baltimore Co. Selby's will was probated Baltimore Co., Oct. 24, 1702, Liber 11, folio 307.

A deed was filed at St. Marys March 3, 1682, from John Baker and his wife Elizabeth (Selby Bateman) for mutual love and affection they bore to their daughter, Elizabeth Bateman Beale. The said deed recites that Elizabeth Bateman Beale was the daughter of his present wife by her first husband, Wm. Bateman. Liber W C K, No. 1, folio 268, March 3, 1682, St. Marys.

John Baker died 1682, St. Marys. His will probated March 3, 1682, St. Marys. His wife Elizabeth, widow, died 1712. Her will probated Aug. 24, 1712, St. Marys, Major Thomas Beale testator. Md. Cal. Wills, Vol. III, folio 231.

Elizabeth Beale, wife of Thomas Beale and Elizabeth Baker, mother-in-law of Thomas Beale, are testators to the will of Thomas Jackson, probated St. Marys July 16, 1687. Md. Col. Wills, Vol. II, folio 15.

Thomas Beale's will, probated St. Marys May 25, 1713, Liber 13, folio 500, mentions no wife. Leaves all real and personal property

to son John. If John should die without issue, then all his property to *dr* Elizabeth. Leaves one Negro to Richard Goldsmith, and if Goldsmith dies then Negro goes to Vachell Denton. To his brother-in-law, Henry Jennings, rector of William and Mary Parish, St. Marys Co., 10,000 lbs. tobacco. To Thomas Jennings, his nephew, son of Thomas' sister, Elizabeth Jennings, one Negro.

Thomas Beale and his wife Elizabeth had 2 children: John, *b* 1680; Elizabeth, *b* 1685.

Christopher Beall, of Prince Georges Co., enlisted Jan. 22, 1776, in Captain Lucas' Company of Infantry. Md. Arch., Vol. XVIII, folio 9.

Christopher Beal was in the 3rd Company of the Maryland Battalion, commanded by Colonel William Smallwood, during the Battle of Long Island, N. Y., Aug. 27, 1776.

Smallwood was absent, and the command of the Maryland Battalion fell to Major Mordecai Gist. The British were maneuvering to get behind Washington's right flank. If they had succeeded it would have caused disaster to the American Army. Washington immediately ordered Major Gist's Battalion to his right flank and charged him to prevent the British movement. Washington then commenced to move his army across the water to New York City.

Major Gist had 404 men. He promptly deployed his battalion along the west shore of a canal running in a southerly direction. Then commenced one of the fiercest defensive fights in our history—404 men against 9,000 British soldiers. *Major Gist prevented the British advance.* When Washington had moved his army out of danger he sent word to Major Gist to fall back. *There were 13 fit-for-duty men that fell back with Major Gist!* All the rest had been either captured, killed, or wounded. A severe sickness caused this unauthorized absence. After an official investigation Christopher Beall was exonerated and returned to duty.

Crest: A unicorn's head, erased or, semes of estoiles, gules.

These arms and crest were on the tombstone of Thomas [2] Beale, 1649-1679.

Thomas [2] Beale is mentioned in the York Co. Records of 1645 as the "late Sheriff."

Oct. 26, 1646, in York Co., Va., Thomas Beale claimed 250 acres of land for transporting himself, wife Alice, and three others from England to Virginia. See folio 10, Vol. XXIII, William and Mary Quarterly.

Thomas Beale commander of Fort York, 1652.

Thomas Beale was Justice of the Peace in York Co. in 1652.

Lieut. Colonel Thomas Beale and his wife Alice are mentioned in York Co. Records of 1671.

Thomas Beale member of the King's Council of York Co. from 1662 to 1674.

A letter in Thomas Beale's hand is filed in the York Co. Records which shows that he was an educated man.

His residence was near Kings Creek, York Co., Va.

Thomas Beale was a warden in the Bruton Church, Williamsburg, Va. See Parish Records.

Thomas [1] Beale died previous to 1688.

King Charles II of England, in a letter to Governor Berkeley of Va., dated Sept. 30, 1688, says of Thomas Beale "of whose ability and prudence the King had long experienced."

Major Gooch lived at Temple Farm, near Yorktown, Va. Temple Farm mansion was used by General Washington when having drawn the Articles of Capitulation of Lord Cornwallis' surrender.

Thomas [2] Beale patented land on the Rappahannock River in 1662, and moved to Richmond Co., and established a home, which he called Chestnut Hill. He died there in 1679.

Tavener and his wife Elizabeth. Elizabeth Beale's will, probated June 4, 1729, mentions all her children, viz.: 1, Thomas IV; 2, Elizabeth; 3, William; 4, Tavener; 5, Charles II; 6, Richard, *m* Hannah Wilson; 7, Reuben; 8, Ann; 9, John.

[1] Thomas [4] Beale, *b* 1708, *d* 1732; *m* April 28, 1728, Sarah McCarty, sister of Dennis McCarty. Dennis *m*, Sept. 22, 1724, Sarah Ball, *dr* of Col. Wm. Ball, 1676–1745, and his wife, Hannah Beale. Hannah Beale died before 1744. The will of Ann McCarty, made Nov. 7, 1728, leaves a ring to Sarah McCarty Beale.

Thomas [4] Beale's will, probated Feb. 5, 1732, provides for brothers and sisters until they are 18 years old. Mentions no wife. Mentions sister Ann, son Thomas [5], *b* 1729. He leaves a legacy to brother William. See Va. Hist. Mag., Vol. XXIX.

a. Thomas [5] Beale, *b* 1729; *m* 1770. T. Beale was a trustee of the German Lutheran Church of Woodstock, Va., of which Rev. Peter Muhlenberg was pastor. See Va. Mag., Vol. X, folio 122. This Peter Muhlenberg was Colonel of the 8th Va. Infantry in 1776. One Sunday in 1776, after he had completed his church services, he said, "There is a time to pray and a time to fight." He then removed his gown and stood before his audience clad in the uniform of a Colonel of the Continental Army. He attained the rank of Major General before the close of the war. Served two terms in U. S. Congress, one term in U. S. Senate, and was Collector of the Port of Philadelphia. He is buried in the town of Trappe, in Pennsylvania.

Thomas Beale was in Westmoreland Co., Va., in 1782, and had 13 slaves. See Va. Mag., Vol. X.

[2] Elizabeth Beale, *b* 1709; *m* Landon Carter, a widower, *b* 1713, *d* 1779, son of John Carter.

Landon Carter's first wife was the mother of Judith Carter, *b* 1749, who *m* Reuben Beale.

Colonel Landon Carter, Sr., and his wife, Elizabeth Beale, went to East Tennessee in 1770 and settled on land under the Cherokee Treaty of Lochabar, made Oct. 18, 1770, and, with other families, occupied land now known as Carter County. See folio 138, Annals of Tennessee, 1853, by Ramsay.

They took their four sons—John, Jr., Landon, Jr., James, Jr., and A. M. Carter.

Landon Carter, Sr., and his wife, Elizabeth Beale, returned to York Co., Va., in 1772, leaving their four sons in Tennessee.

Carter County, Tennessee, was named for Landon Carter, Sr. The county seat was named Elizabethton for his wife, Elizabeth Beale. See page 304, *The Minute Man*, S. A. R., for December, 1925.

In May, 1779, Captain Robert Beall, 9th Va. Infantry, old 13th, was sent with his company to relieve the garrison of Fort Laurence, located at the present site of the town of Boliver, Ohio. The garrison had withstood a long siege of the Indians, and was starving. The Indians fell back when Captain Beall's Regulars appeared. He relieved Major Vernon, and sent him and his command to Fort Pitt for recuperation. The Indians again appeared, but when they had sampled Captain Beall's seasoned troops, they disappeared after leaving 200 Indians killed and wounded.

Captain Beall was relieved with his company in June, 1779, by Colonel Campbell and a strong command. Beall rejoined his regiment.

This Robert Beall was an adopted son from Maryland. He came to Virginia in 1740. Born 1715, died after 1780. Son of Ninian Beall, 1687–1743. Grandson of Alexander Beall, immigrant, 1649–1744, all living in Prince Georges Co., Md. In 1776 he was commissioned Captain in the 13th Va. Infantry, which was changed to the 9th Va. Infantry on Sept. 14, 1778.

General Edward F. Beale is credited with manipulating and controlling conditions during the Civil War, so as to prevent California joining the Southern Confederacy.

He was appointed Minister to Austria by President Grant.

Edward F. Beale *m* 1849 Mary Edwards, *dr* of Samuel Edwards, ex-Congressman from Delaware. They had 3 children.

Truxton Beale was appointed Minister to Persia by President Harrison.

There is an artistic arch and clock in Bakersfield, Calif., with a legend stating it was presented to the city by General Truxton Beale and his wife, Marie Beale.

[2] Mary Beale, *b* 1852, *d* in Paris June 26, 1925. Mary went to Vienna with her father in 1876, when he was Minister to Austria-Hungary.

In 1877 Mary *m* George Bakhmetiff, a diplomat attached to the

Russian Legation at Washington. Mary was with her husband when he was on diplomatic duty in Greece, Japan and Bulgaria. She was very popular. Czar Alexander III decorated her with the Russian Palestine Order, for splendid relief work. The Sultan of Turkey honored her with the Order of Chefekat, First Class, and the Grand Cordon. The King of Bulgaria decorated her with the Order of Merit, and the Order of the Holy Sepulchre. She received the Order of Elizabeth from the King of Rumania.

In 1911 her husband was sent to Washington as the Ambassador of Russia to the United States. The Russian Government was overthrown in 1917. Ambassador Bakhmetiff refused to recognize the new regime, and resigned as Ambassador. *Evening Star*, June 27, 1925.

[3] Emily S. Beale, *b* 1854; *m* John R. McLean, *d* 1916, large publisher of Cincinnati and Washington. They had a son, Edward Beale McLean, *b* 1883; *m* 1908 Evelyn Walsh, *dr* of Thomas F. Walsh, *b* in Tipperary, Ireland, *d* 1910. Evelyn had a brother Vinson, killed in an automobile accident at Newport, R. I.

Edward and Evelyn had 4 children.

a. Vinson Walsh McLean, *b* Dec. 19, 1909. In 1919, while playing on his father's estate, called Friendship, near Washington, he suddenly eluded his guard, darted out of the gate onto Wisconsin Avenue, and was instantly killed by an automobile. Superstitious people explained this bad luck as follows: In 1911 Edward Beale McLean bought the famous Hope diamond for \$300,000 and presented it to his wife Evelyn. Baron Jost Hite.

After the death of Tavener [1] Beale, about 1760, his widow, Frances Madison Beale, became the second wife, Dec. 15, 1760, in Orange Co., of Jacob Hite, son of Baron Jost Hite.

In 1710 Baron Jost Hite came from Strassburg, Alsace, via Amsterdam, Holland, to New York in his own ships, the "Swift" and "Friendship," bringing Dutch and German immigrants. He located near Kingston, N. Y., until 1715. Then he went to Germantown, Pa.

In 1732, with 16 families, he left York, Pa., passed through Maryland, and located in the Shenandoah Valley, Va., the first white settlers in Va. west of the mountains. After he had established a splendid colony, he died in Frederick Co. in 1760, aged 80 years.

The Baron *m* Anna Maria Du Bois, of Alsace.

Just before our Revolution, Jacob Hite, son of the Baron, moved to South Carolina with his whole family, except son, Captain George Hite.

The British Tories of South Carolina asked Jacob whether he was for the King or the Revolutionists. He chose the latter. The Tories considered him a Rebel and induced the Seminole Indians to murder him and all his family. Son John was absent in Charleston, recording his land deed. The Indians spared the two daughters, Frances and Eleanor, age 16 and 18 years.

The Seminoles soon started for their winter home in Florida. They camped near Savannah for a rest. A number of English Army officers came out to see the Indian camp. A Captain Johnson, in glancing around the camp, discovered, sitting on the root of a big tree, the figure of a white girl, who seemed prostrated with great sorrow. Her filthy clothes did not cover her nakedness. He went over to her. She raised a most pitiful face, so full of despair and terror. "What are you doing with these Indians?" the Captain asked. She told him of the Indians murdering her father's family; of the Indian bucks fighting over her sister Frances and then murdering her, and with a cry of despair she asked to be taken away from the Indians. Captain Johnson's heart was very much moved. He soon ransomed Eleanor for a silver crown; took her to a white family living near the British fort, gave the white woman money to buy Eleanor clothing and food, and then wondered what he could do with the poor creature. Discovering a party of white settlers bound for the Gulf coast, Captain Johnson

arranged with them to take Eleanor along. God bless Captain Johnson.

Eleanor had suffered too much. She died en route to the Gulf coast. Her body was buried where Pensacola, Fla., now stands. A large stone, marked "Eleanor," was placed over the grave. The writer's niece, Estella Martin, of Washington Seminary, Atlanta, visited Pensacola a few years ago. She made urgent efforts to find some knowledge of the Eleanor rock, assisted by the D. A. R. and the local woman's club, but with no success. See page 195, Vol. IV, Col. Families of the U. S.

The will of John Hite, probated March 18, 1777, Berkeley Co., Va., says his father was killed by violence and left no will; that his land in South Carolina, obtained by deed granted by the Cherokee Nation to Richard Pearis, be secured. It set forth the reasons in an emphatic manner why the Colonists should be separated from Great Britain. It had a tremendous sale, and is credited with having moulded the opinions of the people in favor of revolution. Bell was considered a very enterprising citizen. COLONEL OTHNEIL BEALE, 1689-1773.

William Beale, immigrant, *b* 1628, in England. Arrived in New England 1643 and settled in Marblehead, Mass.

Their fifth child, John Beale, *b* 1665, *m* Martha and had 6 children. John was a sea captain. Two of his children, Othneil and William, located in Charleston, S. C. Both were sea captains.

BELLS OF VIRGINIA

WILLIAM BELL, Immigrant, 1685-1757.

About 1605 the Ulster plantations of northern Ireland were designated and at the disposal of the English Government after conquest.

Counties Tyrone, Donegal, Armagh, Cavan, Fermaugh, and Derry were by order of King James parceled out among English and Scotch Protestant colonies, portions being reserved for a few loyal native Irish. Vol. XIII, folio 266, Encyclo. Britannica, Ninth Edition.

Shortly before and during this colonization period the Bells were on the lists of unruly clans in the West Marches in 1587. And the proscription against the clan MacGregor was in full effect and caused many Bells and MacGregors to migrate to northern Ireland, and later to the American Colonies.

Col. Nathaniel Gist, son of Christopher, was with Washington in his western expedition of 1753. He was with Braddock in his expedition of 1755.

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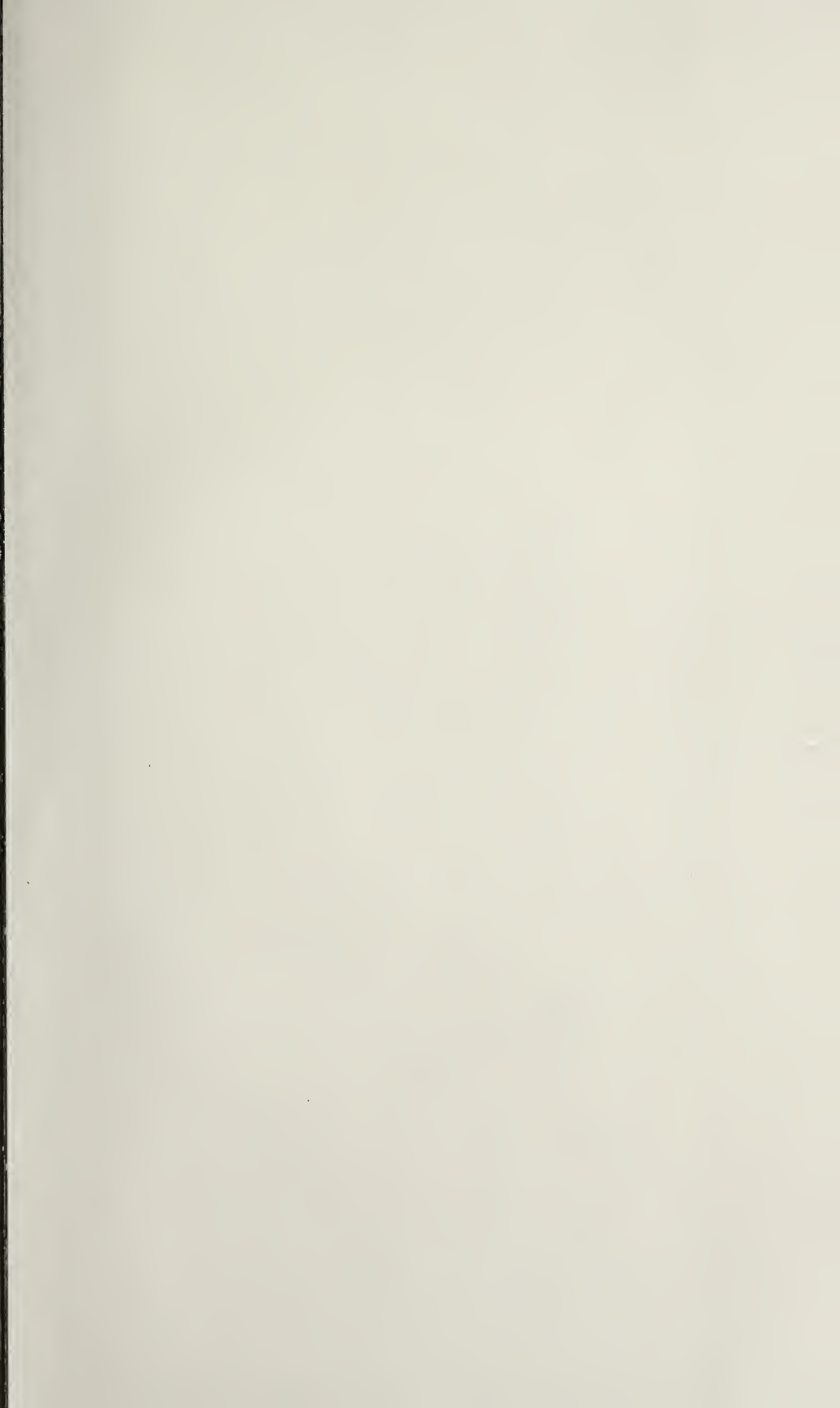
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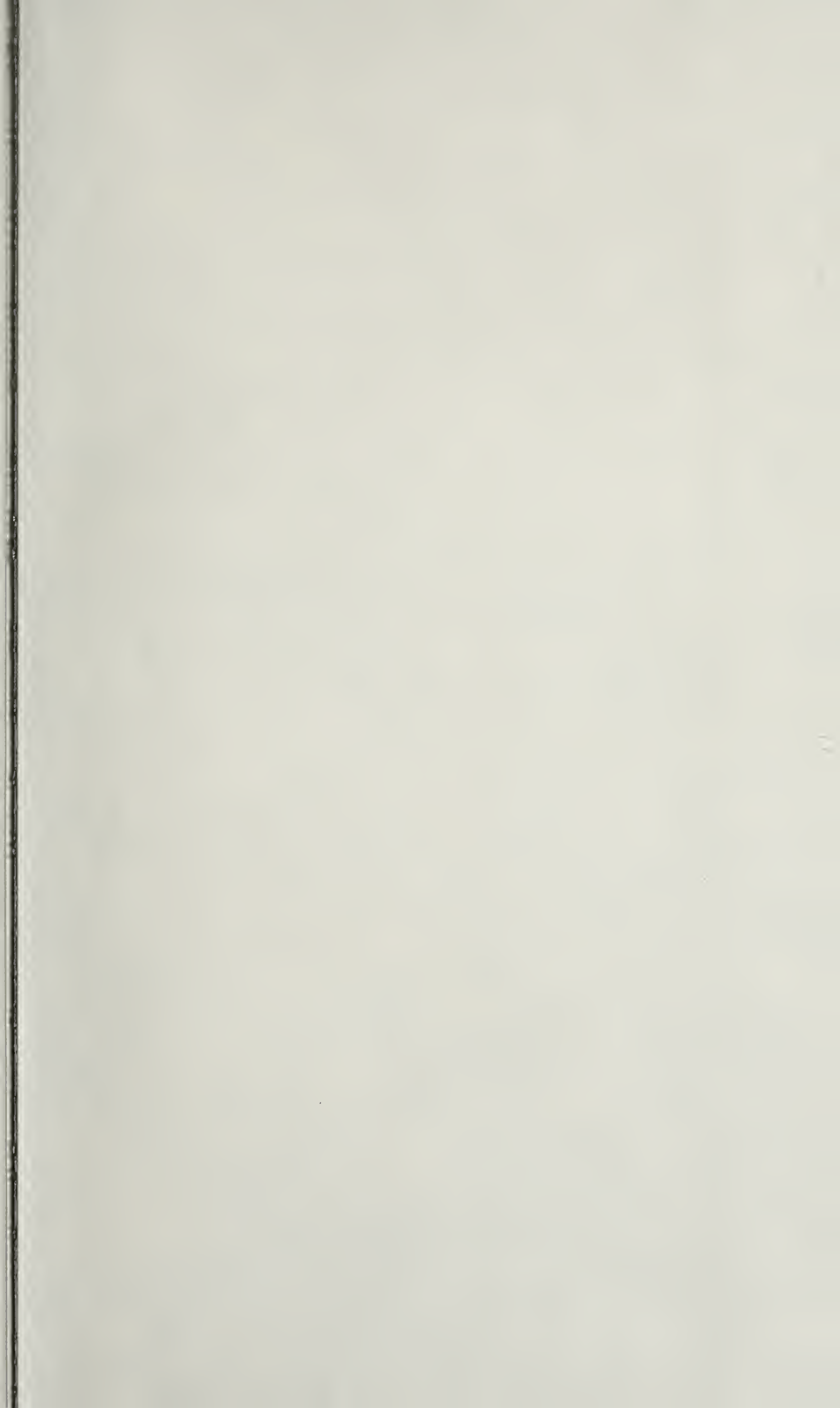
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
