**CHIEF ROBERT ORBELEY**, Officers from the Campus Safety & Security Department attended a one day Workshop-Seminar covering various aspects of the new Penal Code for the State of Indiana which is effective October 1, 1977. In addition to Chief Orbeley, members of the campus force also attended the classes held at the Indiana Law Enforcement Academy in Plainfield, Ind. Patricia Marney, Stephen Boyd, and Officers Lauren Doolittle and Gary Morales, Director of Natural Resources.

The program stressed the strong relationship between class time and proper watershed management and participants received 30 hours towards classroom and field experience and 30 hours towards conservation work for which they were paid the federal minimum wage. Students received 1 hour of academic credit in environmental conservation towards their high school graduation requirements.

Dr. William and other members of the biology department, state fisheries and outdoors biologists, soil conservation and range management personnel participated in this program which is repeatable on a year-to-year basis.

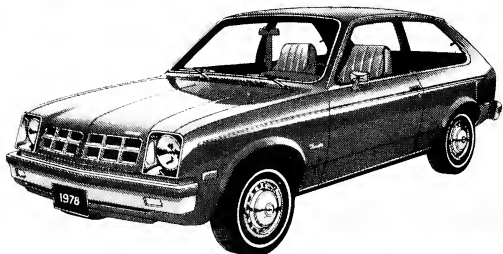
