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THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY

CONGREGATIONAL PUBLISHING SOCIETY.

The managers of the CONGREGATIONAL PUBLISHING SOCIETY respectfully call attention to the following statements:—

1. The free dissemination of Christian literature is one of the most effective ways of converting the world to Christ. To issue the best literature and tempt readers by cheap prices, or outright gifts, publishing societies are needed.

2. Congregationalists ought to do their share toward the world's conversion through the press, as through the other ministries of the churches. The same sphere which our churches fill in life, our Publishing Society should fill in literature.

The vast preponderance of the teaching and activity of our churches has no denominational end or aim, but is in the broad field of general Christian teaching. The Publishing Society is Congregational to the same extent as the churches, and no more. Certain treatises of interests only to Christians of our Way have their place. The controlling work of the Society is to set forth as aptly and forcibly as may be, and scatter as widely, that common evangelical literature which all Christians approve.

3. There is no danger of overdoing this beneficent work. With other societies "all at it, and always at it," we are still needed; our resources, our methods, our prayers are needed. We rejoice in what is well done by the Methodist Book Concern, by the Baptist and by the Presbyterian Boards, and by the union organizations. But we can manage this evangelistic work as economically and as judiciously as others can manage it for us. In addition to all they are doing through outside organizations, Congregationalists have a large field of their own to occupy.

4. **CHARITABLE WORK.** Missionaries, ministers, tract-distributors, Christian Associations, come to the Society for books and periodicals to give away where they will do the most good. To meet these increasing calls we need generous contributions. Whatever is contributed is honestly distributed to the full value in the best literature. No money is diverted for expenses. The colporteurs are unpaid volunteers. We ask of every church an annual collection; we ask general and large donations and legacies for this divine method of telling the good news.

5. **A PUBLISHING FUND OF ONE HUNDRED THOUSAND DOLLARS** is imperatively needed for the work now opening. The income of it could be used to-day to the greatest advantage of our common Christianity. The Society has never yet been endowed with a specific publishing fund. It earnestly solicits liberal gifts thereof.

6. **ITS PERIODICALS AND PUBLICATIONS** generally are believed to be as good of their kinds as can be procured anywhere. We bespeak for them the patronage of all Congregationalists, of churches, and Sunday schools.

7. **AN EASY WAY TO EXTEND THE BENEFICENT WORK OF THE SOCIETY IS TO PATRONIZE IT.** The Society is a book-seller. It is the agent that manages a co-operative bookstore, of which all the profits are for the general advantage of the churches. No individual has the slightest personal interest, or gains the least amount, whether many or few books are sold. The churches and Sunday schools are the ones who gain; the business is wholly in their interest, and for their profit. It is for them, easily if they will, to make it yield a large revenue for the common cause. By not a cent's additional cost, by simply allowing their own co-operative bookstore to reap the profit on the purchases they make somewhere to somebody's profit, Congregationalists may make their Publishing Society a mighty instrument for good. The bookstore furnishes not only its own publications, but those of all societies and publishers that may be called for: Books for theological libraries, for families, for churches and Sunday schools; whatever ministers, superintendents, teachers, private persons may desire. Those who for any reason prefer other publications to our own, may procure them through the bookstore, and so allow the profit to go to the common charity fund. It is no objection that the distance from Boston is great for many. Orders and parcels can be sent anywhere by mail or express at minimum cost. Where there is a will there is a way. Our Methodist friends, by patronizing their Book Concerns, out of the accumulation of small profits have endowed them with a working capital—some two millions of dollars—twenty times what we ask for.

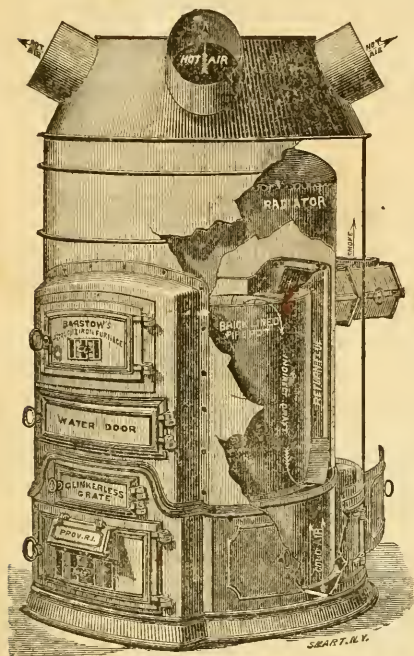
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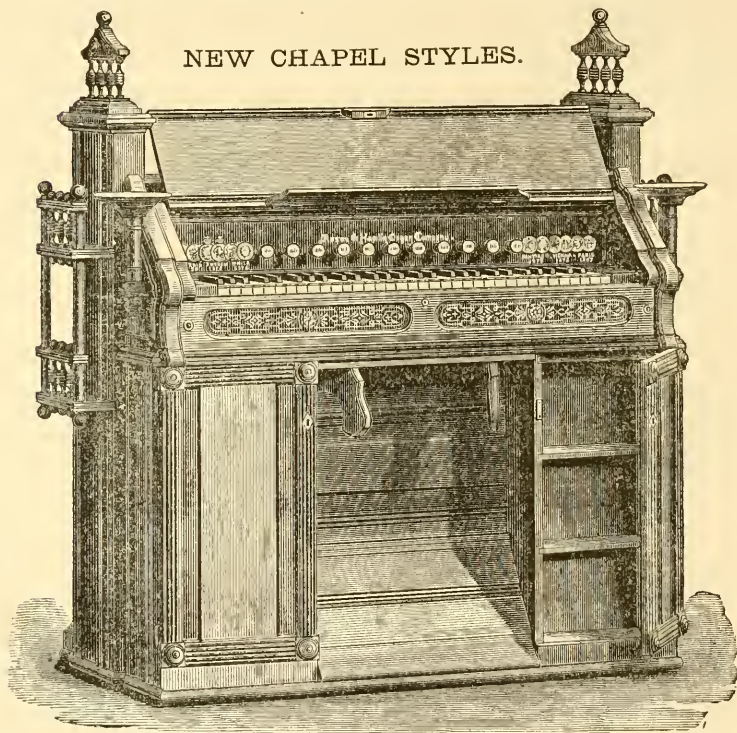
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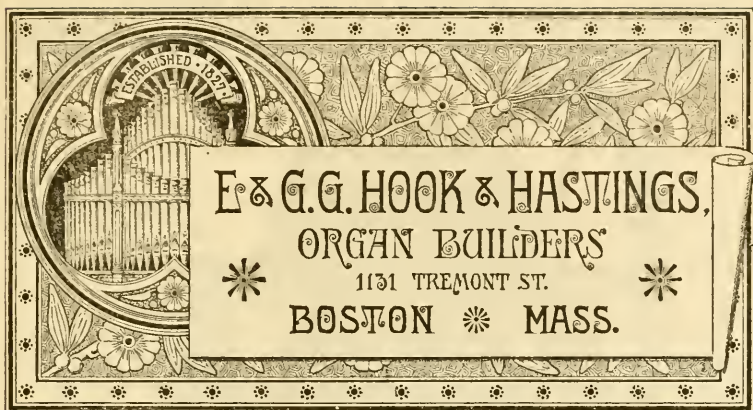
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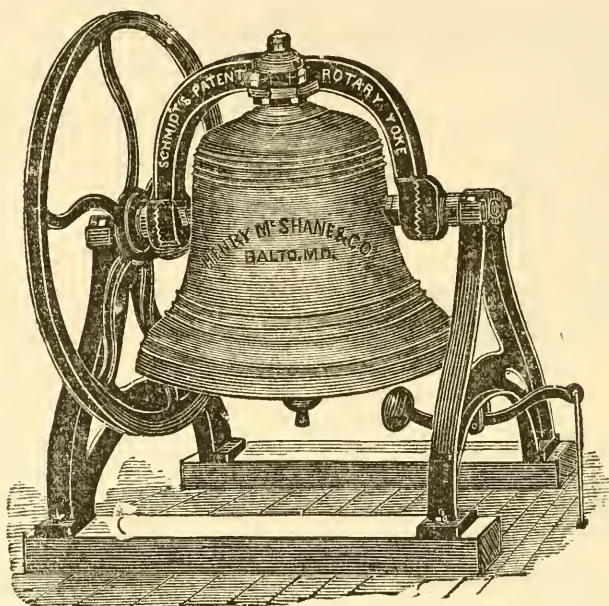
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It has an Academic Department, embracing (a) The *Model School Course* of three years in the elementary English branches (students completing this course are prepared to begin either of the three following); (b) The *Normal Course* of three years, adapted to those who have the work of teaching in view; (c) The *Literary Course* of four years, designed to furnish a good practical education for those who are unable to take the full college curriculum; (d) The *Classical Preparatory Course* of three years; and (e) The *Classical College Course* of four years.

It has also three Professional Departments,—Law, Medicine, and Theology. The two latter are especially flourishing. The Medical Department is under the charge of an able faculty, is the cheapest medical school in the land, and has access to a large national hospital on its grounds. The majority of its students are white. The Theological Course is adapted to the peculiar wants and future work of the students, and gives a regular or a special course. Its faculty and students represent several denominations, but it is supported by the American Missionary Association and by the Presbytery of Washington.

EXPENSES.

Tuition, \$12.00 per year for the Academic course. Room rent the same. No charge to theological students for tuition or room-rent. Rooms are furnished, but students provide their own bedding (except mattress), towels, crockery, fuel and light. Board, \$10.00 per month (cheap table, \$6.00). Washing, \$2.00 per month. Law Department, \$40.00 per year; Medical, \$10.00 initiation fee, \$30.00 graduation fee, and no tuition fee.

NECESSITIES.

Howard University appeals to the Christian public of all denominations for pecuniary aid. It has grounds and buildings which cost over \$500,000, which are *free of debt*, but it has no permanent endowments for its professorships, and no endowed scholarships for indigent students. Situated at the national capital, where its work is conspicuous, it has the noblest opportunity to reach all parts of the land with its elevating influence. Appeal is made, for generous contributions, to churches, Sunday schools, ladies' societies, and benevolent individuals.

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DEPARTMENT OF THEOLOGY. — Instruction is given by the President, five Professors, and eminent special lecturers appointed from year to year. Students have commodious, furnished rooms in the new and attractive building, COUNCIL HALL, which is devoted exclusively to the uses of this Department. They have free access to all the classes, libraries, and cabinets of the other Departments. Fifteen weeks during the summer can be spent in Home Missionary or other labor, with compensation, without interference with studies. The demand for such labor is greater than the supply. During the last half of the course the students have frequent opportunities to supply the neighboring churches. Students who need pecuniary assistance receive the usual aid from the American Education Society and from special funds under the control of the Seminary, enough in all cases to relieve them from embarrassment in pursuing their studies.

DEPARTMENT OF PHILOSOPHY AND THE ARTS. — Ten Professors give instruction in this Department. The *Classical and Scientific Course* embraces the studies of our best colleges, so arranged that after the Freshman year the student may, by elective studies, give a classical or scientific character to his course, receiving the degree of A. B. at its close. For entrance, three years of Latin, two of Greek, and one term of Geometry are necessary. The *Literary Course* is like the above, with the exception that no Greek and less Latin is required.

DEPARTMENT OF PREPARATORY INSTRUCTION. — Comprises a Classical School, which prepares students for the best colleges, and an English School, which offers the advantages of a first-class academy to those who can spend but a little time at school. Instruction is given by the Principal of this Department, six tutors, and about fifteen special teachers.

Expenses in all departments for tuitions, incidentals, and board are very low. Students who do not wish to take a full course can select such studies in any department as they are prepared to pursue to advantage. Both sexes admitted. Location healthful, and religious influences the best. No drinking or billiard saloons in town. Circulars with full information sent free by J. B. T. MARSH, *Secretary*.

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OVER THREE THOUSAND students have received instruction in this Conservatory since it was established. Its faculty consists of five Professors, four of whom were educated in the celebrated schools of Leipzig and Paris, and all of whom give their entire time to this institution.

Instruction is given in class or private lessons, as preferred. The rates of tuition are *exceptionally low*, fifteen dollars a term paying for tuition in piano-forte, organ, violin, or singing, with other advantages of lectures, concerts, recitals, chorus singing, etc., making a total of from one hundred and twenty to one hundred and thirty hours of instruction in various branches each term. All living expenses in Oberlin are also very low.

The Conservatory is one of the departments of Oberlin College, and under the direct management of its Board of Trustees. By virtue of this connection it offers greater advantages for both musical and literary culture than can be obtained elsewhere. Diplomas are given to all who complete, in a satisfactory manner, its course of study. The terms of study begin in September, December and March, each continuing three months. 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This Institution is designed to give the most thorough theological culture that can be obtained by a course of three years' study.

To effect this object it is deemed essential that *nine full months* be devoted to study in each year, and that this period be so divided by suitable vacations as to secure to the studies of the Course those portions of the year which are most favorable to mental vigor.

Accordingly, the first term of the present Seminary Year will end on Thursday, March 4, and be followed by a vacation of three weeks. The second term will commence on Thursday, March 25, and continue till the Anniversary, Thursday, July 1, to be followed by a vacation of nine weeks. The first term of the next Seminary Year will begin on Thursday, Sept. 2.

The Lectures to all the classes begin promptly: it is therefore important that all the students should be present at the beginning of the Seminary Year.

The exercises of the *Special Course* are discontinued for the present. In addition to the usual supplementary lectures, there is reason to hope that, after the present year, Prof. Phelps will be able to give a special course of lectures. The Library now numbers 37,000 volumes, is constantly increased, and is open daily for examination and drawing of books.

BANGOR THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY,

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This institution was chartered by the Legislature of Massachusetts in February, 1814, and was opened for students in October, 1816. It has been in constant service since, and has graduated several hundred pastors, missionaries, teachers, editors and college professors.

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TERMS OF ADMISSION.

Bangor Seminary is open to all denominations of Christians. Candidates for admission must produce testimony of their church-membership, and of their collegiate education. If they have not pursued a college course, they will be examined, and must exhibit mental training and attainments sufficient, in the judgment of the Faculty, to warrant their entering upon a course of theological study.

Those whose age or circumstances forbid the pursuit of the complete course of study, may, at the discretion of the Faculty, be admitted to the studies of the Middle year, and continue their course with the full privileges of the Seminary.

EXPENSES.

Each student is charged two dollars a year for incidental expenses. There is no other charge for tuition, room, furniture, library, or any privilege of the Seminary. The dormitory has been thoroughly repaired and refitted. The rooms are carpeted, and furnished with beds, bedding, chairs, tables, and bookshelves.

The Washburn fund and some other funds were given expressly to aid members of the Seminary. The income of these funds will be distributed to those students whose circumstances require it, and will amount to about half the expense of board.

LIBRARY.

The Seminary has an excellent library, numbering between fifteen and sixteen thousand volumes, specially selected to meet the wants of the students. There is a permanent library fund of eight thousand dollars, with the income of which constant additions are made of the latest and most valuable literature.

The next Seminary year will open on Thursday, September 16, 1880.

Hartford Theological Seminary.

By its organization the Seminary is closely allied to the churches through the Pastoral Union, which annually elects the Trustees.

The plan of instruction is so arranged as to make the study of the Bible the chief feature of the entire course. The patrons, guardians and teachers of the Institution are persuaded that an exegetical and experimental knowledge of the Divine Word should be sought first of all by candidates for the gospel ministry. They also believe that scholarly investigation, controlled and tempered by the spirit of truth, justifies unfaltering adherence to the doctrinal system set forth in the accredited formularies of New England Congregationalism.

It is the aim of each Professor to strengthen, on the part of the students, the habit of personal investigation. Daily drills bring teachers and pupils into such close relations as favor mental activity and appropriate criticism. This confidential intercourse also contributes in many ways to the promotion of personal piety; and it is gratifying to observe how promptly the young men co-operate with their instructors in seeking this fundamental qualification for the sacred office.

TERMS OF ADMISSION.

Candidates for admission are expected to produce evidence that they are members of some Christian church, and that they have graduated at some college, or have made such literary acquisitions as, in the opinion of the Faculty, are an equivalent preparation for theological studies. They will be examined in reference to their personal piety and their motives in seeking the ministry.

THE SPECIAL OR SHORT COURSE HAS BEEN DISCONTINUED.

Besides lectures on Congregationalism, Moot Councils are held from time to time, for the purpose of making the students familiar with the principles and usages of our Church Polity.

Each class receives instruction in vocal culture.

All the classes meet the Faculty each week for general rhetorical exercises, which include extemporaneous discussions, reading of Scripture, and Hymns, Sermons, Essays and Reviews.

Conferences are held by the Professors for familiar instruction and counsel on subjects of practical importance to the students as Christians and candidates for the sacred office.

EXAMINATION.

At the close of each year all the classes are examined, orally and by written exercises, before the Instructors and a committee appointed by the Pastoral Union and Trustees.

EXPENSES.

No charge is made for tuition, room-rent, or the use of the library. The rooms are supplied with necessary articles of furniture.

Arrangements for board, at a common table, are made by the Trustees. The price of board will not exceed \$3.50 per week. Assistance will be furnished towards defraying this expense, in proportion to the necessities of each student, at the discretion of the Faculty. Fuel and lights may be estimated at from \$15 to \$20 the year for each room.

The appropriation for board is made on the condition that those who receive it attend regularly on the duties of the Seminary throughout the term, unless absent for reasons which the Faculty deem sufficient.

In addition, the American Education Society renders aid to the amount of \$100 annually. Students who are licensed have occasional opportunities to preach for compensation.

LICENSED TO PREACH.

By the laws of the Institution, students can receive license to preach at the close of the Middle Year.

LIBRARIES.

Besides the library and reading-room of the Seminary, students have access without charge to the Watkinson Library, one of the best in the country, for consultation. They also have the benefit of the Young Men's Institute Library, including a large assortment of periodicals. These collections of books and periodicals are only a short distance from the Seminary.

CALENDAR.

There is but one term of study in the year, which begins on the second Thursday of September, and closes on the second Thursday of May. Students have opportunity in the long vacation to engage in some form of Christian activity, from which they may derive religious advantages and practical knowledge as well as pecuniary benefit.

Persons desiring to join the Seminary are invited to address Prof. WM. THOMPSON, from whom they will receive such additional information as may be needed.

It is earnestly desired that students should be present at the opening of the term.

PACIFIC THEOLOGICAL SEMINARY.

REGULAR STUDIES.

FIRST YEAR.—Greek; Hebrew; Sacred Geography and Antiquities; Origin, History, Authority, Inspiration and Canon of the Bible; Interpretation of the Scriptures; Religions of the World, other than the Christian; Natural Science; Mental and Moral Science.

SECOND YEAR.—Biblical Theology; Greek; Hebrew; Exercises in the Exposition of the Scriptures; Systematic Theology; History of Doctrines; Elocution.

THIRD YEAR.—Pastoral Theology; Church History; Church Polity; Homiletics; Elocution; Connection of Natural Science with Religion. [An exercise in Hebrew and Greek Exegesis once each week during the third year]

SPECIAL STUDIES.

In special cases, particular and modified courses of instruction will be given to those who cannot remain three years, or who for other reasons cannot take the full course of three years; and these courses of instruction will be adapted to the necessities of each person, it being understood that every one of this class will continue his studies as long as practicable.

PREPARATORY STUDIES.

Young men who have not had the advantage of a collegiate course, and who are, for good reasons, debarred from the prospect of such a course, are enabled to pursue literary and scientific studies, under the direction of the Professors, in the Golden Gate Academy, immediately associated with the Seminary. These preparatory studies will vary with the requirements of each student.

CALENDAR.

The year consists of but one term, and begins with the fourth Thursday in August and ends with the middle of May. There will be a recess from the 20th of December to the 3d of January. Students should begin promptly with the term.

TERMS OF ADMISSION.

Credible evidence of piety, membership in some Evangelical Church, a collegiate education, or such other literary and scientific attainments as promise a fair degree of usefulness, will entitle all young men to the advantages of this Seminary. The benefits of the institution are accorded alike to students of all denominations of Christians.

EXPENSES.

There will be no charge for tuition, rent of rooms, or use of furniture. The Trustees will, as far as practicable, furnish text-books free to those who are in need, themselves being the judges of the necessity. Those who desire it can board on the premises at the rate of three dollars per week. Fifty cents additional will be charged for washing.

The American Education Society will render aid to the pupils of this Seminary who are needy, who are college graduates, and who take the full course of three years. The amount bestowed will be, when possible, \$100 a year to each beneficiary.

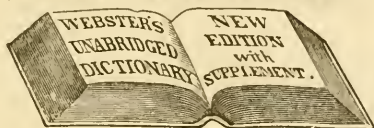

LOCATION AND BUILDINGS.—It has one of the most beautiful and desirable locations in the city. The school building was erected expressly for the purposes of the Institute, on the most approved plan of architecture and interior arrangement. The entire establishment is heated with steam, and has all the modern conveniences.

ORGANIZATION.—It was organized twenty-six years since, and its plan from the beginning has been eminently liberal and comprehensive.

Relation to the University.—The Divinity School is one of the Departments of Yale College. Its members are members of the University, and as such receive from the Corporation, on completing their three years' course of study, the degree of B. D. (Bachelor of Divinity). They have access to the public collections of the University, such as the Library, the Peabody Museum, and the collection of paintings and statuary in the School of the Fine Arts. They are permitted to attend, free of expense, so far as will not conflict with their professional studies, the lectures and recitations in the College and the Sheffield Scientific School. Those who expect to become foreign missionaries are permitted to attend gratuitously the lectures in the Medical Department.

Course of Study.—The first year is devoted chiefly to the Exegesis of the Hebrew and Greek Scriptures; the second year to Systematic Theology and Church History; the third year to Sacred Rhetoric, the History of Christian Doctrine, and Church Polity. Additional lectures on Preaching and other important subjects are delivered before all the classes by eminent ministers and scholars in this country and Europe. There are also optional classes conducted by the Professors, in New Testament Introduction, German, Syriac, and Chaldee. Once a week there is a rhetorical exercise for all the classes. Instruction in vocal culture and elocution is continued through the entire course. Sacred music is taught to those who desire it.

The Libraries of the University, to which the students have access, including the Reference Library of the Divinity School, contain nearly 120,000 volumes.

The Hooker Fellowship, for the encouragement of further theological study in this country or abroad, the income of which is \$700 a year for two years after graduation, is open to the class entering in 1880.

Expenses.—There is no charge for instruction, use of libraries, or room rent. The rooms, which will accommodate 150 students, are designed in general for only one occupant. Each room has a bedroom attached and is carpeted and furnished with all needful furniture except bedclothing. The chief expenses for the session are for board, an average of \$3.20 a week, fuel and light, \$25 to \$30, and \$10 a year for care of room and incidental expenses.

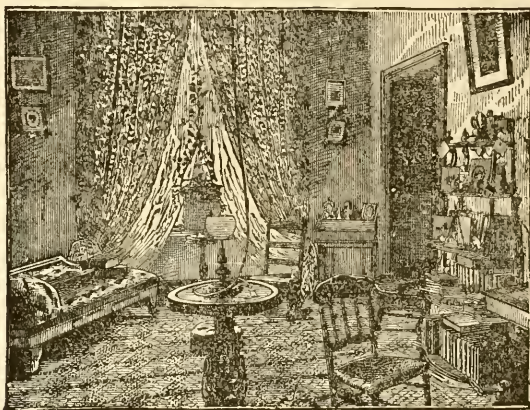
Scholarship Funds and other Aid.—Students whose circumstances require it are aided to the amount of \$100 a year, from the income of scholarship funds. Additional aid to the amount of \$75 to \$100 is afforded by the American Education Society to its beneficiaries.

Commencement of the Term.—The next annual term of study will begin on Thursday, Sept. 16, 1880, and continue till the third Thursday in May, when the vacation of four months, in which the students have the opportunity to engage in some form of remunerative labor, will commence.

Bradford is on the line of the Boston and Maine Railroad, thirty miles from Boston. The entire building is heated by steam and lighted with gas, and supplied with an abundance of pure water. No efforts are spared to make this a model establishment.

This Academy enjoys many incidental advantages through other literary institutions. — The Theological Seminary and Phillips Academy, in the same village, while easy access to Boston and Cambridge brings within its reach fine Music, Art Galleries, Museums, Cabinets, and the Botanical Garden, to all of which classes, with their teachers, have occasional access. The Academy has a fine Clark Telescope, good working cabinets, models, and apparatus of its own.

The domestic arrangements are peculiarly homelike. The school is divided into three separate families in separate houses, each under its own matron and teachers. One of these families is made up wholly of pupils in French, in which language the daily table-talk is carried on under the direction of the French teacher. Another family is occupied with German in like manner. The grounds are spacious and tasteful, forming an attractive part of the quiet and pleasant village.

The school has been successfully conducted for twenty years by the same principal teachers, whose constant endeavor is to so educate girls that they may mature into healthful, cultivated, earnest, Christian womanhood.

The total expenses for board, including fuel, lights and washing, and for tuition, except music and drawing, is **\$300** per annum.

CHAUNCY-HALL SCHOOL,

The Oldest Private School in Boston.

No. 259, BOYLSTON STREET.

ESTABLISHED 1828.

This School has sent classes to College annually for nearly fifty years, and has had but one candidate rejected.

One reason for this thorough preparation is the small size of the Latin classes. If a pupil is in a large class, he cannot receive sufficient help in his efforts to master the difficulties of a foreign language; and if he is entirely under the care of a private tutor, he loses the drill and development that can be obtained only by contact with other scholars of his age.

The arrangements here aim to COMBINE CLASS WORK WITH PRIVATE INSTRUCTION. The members of a new Latin class seldom exceed ten in number; and the teachers are ready to give extra help out of recitation hours.

At this time such students are preparing here for the following schools: Harvard Medical, New York Medical, Harvard Law, Boston Theological.

YOUNG LADIES, who are intending to take the course now open to them at Harvard, can have the great advantage of reciting in the same class with boys who are in the regular course of preparation for that University, and of being under teachers who have successfully carried on such preparation for many years.

THE BUSINESS EDUCATION

Is not confined to Arithmetic and Book-keeping, but gives such broad and generous culture as is demanded for a high position in the mercantile community.

The limited number of teachers in most High Schools tends to the neglect of the English studies for the sake of the ancient classics; but this evil is prevented at Chauncy Hall by having a corps of classical instructors so unusually large in proportion to the number of pupils that the teachers in the English departments are left free to devote themselves to the students who are fitting for the Institute of Technology or for business.

MAPLEWOOD INSTITUTE, PITTSFIELD, MASS.

This institution for young ladies will commence its fortieth academic year Sept. 22, 1880. The uniformly excellent character of its provisions and attendance during this long period, more than the last half of it under the present administration, are presumably widely and favorably known.

COURSES OF STUDY.

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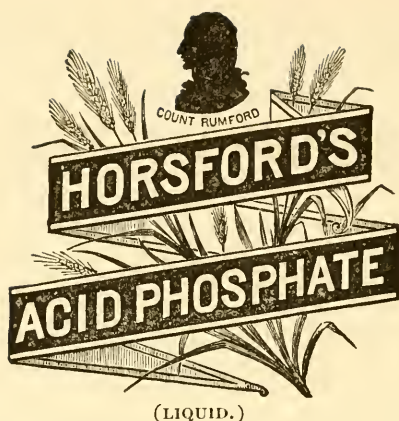

BY WAY OF EXPLANATION.

At a meeting recently jointly held by the Provisional and Publishing Committees of the National Council, it was voted that the *Year Book* be published as near the first of January, 1880, as may be, in an abbreviated form; and that it be introduced by a financial statement which, as briefly and exactly as possible, shall convey to all parties interested the essential facts — for the information of the churches, and the correction of rumors which the committees had learned are in circulation. The following statement has been drawn up in compliance with that vote.

The action of the last National Council on the subject of publication included the following points [*Minutes*, etc., pp. 40, 41]:—

1. That an annual compilation of the statistics of the American Congregational Churches — and especially an accurate and complete list of ministers in Congregational fellowship — “should be published under the sanction of the Council.”

2. That “the necessary expenses thereof should be met by its constituent bodies.”

3. To this end the Council, by unanimous vote, proceeded to request the several State Associations and Conferences “to solicit contributions amounting to *one cent* per member of their respective churches, and remit the same to the Treasurer of the Council.” [This to meet the expense of the *Minutes*, statistics, etc., for 1878, published in 1879.]

4. That if, in compliance with the first vote aforesaid, the Publishing Committee “find it desirable” to issue the statistics for the remaining two years before the next meeting of the Council “for free distribution, one to each church in our fellowship,” the Treasurer of the Council be authorized “to ask” from the churches “for a contribution not exceeding *one half cent* from each member, in each of those years, for that purpose.” [This to meet the expense of the statistics for 1878 published in 1879, and of those for 1879 published in 1880.]

On studying carefully this action, the Publishing Committee felt that they could construe the first vote as no other than mandatory, in respect to the official publication by them, for each of the three years referred to, of the annual statistics of the churches and the ministry. It seemed to them that whatever discretion might be committed to them in the phrase, “find it desirable,” etc., was not intended to leave to their judgment the main question, whether the statistics of those two years should be officially published or not; but only the lesser question, whether any other prudent way of publication than that of their issue at the expense of the churches, might prove to be open to use. Should they find such, they were at liberty to adopt it. Should they fail to find it, they were left under instruction themselves to go forward and print them; calling upon the churches for the *half cent* per member which, in view of that contingency, had been voted by the Council. At the same time—the accompanying pecuniary recommendations having been adopted without question, or suggestion of dissent, by the legal delegates of the Congregational churches of the land in that Council assembled—it seemed to the Committee fair to presume that those churches might reasonably be expected honorably to respond to the constructive, and by no means unreasonable or onerous, pledge thus freely given by their authorized representatives on their behalf, and, as from time to time needed, to remit the moderate sum suggested.

The Committee accordingly proceeded, for the general good, to discharge, according to their best judgment and ability, the laborious and thankless duty imposed upon them. They were confronted in the outset by three difficulties

standing in the way of their securing the performance of the work of publication with that economy which in all such cases is especially to be desired. (1) The Council had included within its Minutes, then awaiting publication, so many and so extended papers read before it, as to swell to a thick octavo volume of more than 460 pages, what otherwise might have been scarcely more than a pamphlet. (2) All publication of statistical matter is much more expensive than common work. And (3) the certainty that months must elapse before, under the most favorable conditions, the money could be expected to flow into the treasury for the payment of bills incurred, rendered necessary the resort to long credit, with its accompanying inevitable charge of interest, while at the same time taking away the advantage of securing the lowest cash rates for the work done.

Thus embarrassed, the Committee proceeded, with the following result of expenditure for the first year (1877-8).

As was last year explained, this was done by pecuniary co-operation with the proprietor of the *Congregational Quarterly*, in whose pages the statistics had for several years been printed, and with the understanding that the right amicably to publish them solely in a *Year Book* thereafter (if deemed advisable) was as fully conceded by him, as it was reserved by the Committee.

When, some months later, the question of what form the publication required by the Council should take for 1878-9 came up, negotiations were held with the proprietor of the *Quarterly*. But it was found that he was not prepared to furnish the Committee with numbers of his journal containing the statistics, except for a larger sum than it would cost them to publish the same in the form of a *Year Book*, while there were some special advantages in the latter shape over the former. The Committee accordingly decided that they ought to publish a *Year Book*. And, in view of the facts,—that ministers especially desire and need such a manual; that to double the issue (the type once being set) would by no means double the expense; and that, were the circulation guaranteed to include ministers as well as churches, important aid could be derived from advertising,—it was voted to print 8,000 copies. This was accordingly done, nine beautiful designs for churches being contributed, free of all expense and ready for binding in, by an eminent architect. A copy of this manual was sent, post-paid, to every church and minister whose name was included within its lists.

In view of the fact that these *Year Books* were thus forwarded gratis to ministers as well as churches, the Committee further ventured to suggest to the churches that it would be welcome were they to contribute for the year at the rate of *one cent* per member, instead of *one half-cent*, as in the Council's vote requested.

The above statement will make it apparent to all that if any person have imagined that the Committee—to use the apostle's words—were “making a gain” from their place, or from the churches, such impression is far from the fact. The secretary has received nothing for any services as secretary; while for labor in collecting, compiling, and superintending the publication of the statistics, he has not been paid ordinary compensation for the time employed,—no regard even being had to extra personal expenses of travel, etc., made necessary in printing. It will further be seen that the present treasurer has never charged, or received, one cent in compensation for service, work upon the *Year Book*, expenses, or discomfort occasioned by the heavy burden assumed and borne by him for the sake of what both the Provisional Committee and the Publishing Committee of the Council regarded as demanded by the honor and welfare of the denomination, and, in the end, indispensable to save it from the disgrace of the failure of its commissioned representatives to meet pecuniary obligations fairly incurred by order of the Council.

When the Committees confronted the question of duty as to obeying the vote of the Council in publishing the statistics and "especially an accurate and complete list of ministers in Congregational fellowship" for 1879-80, they were at first disposed to allow the embarrassments of their position to plead their excuse for declining all further responsibility in the matter. But their conviction of the various inconveniences and misfortunes which must follow the failure to put forth any trustworthy list of the American Congregational churches and ministers for the next current year, at last led them to feel that they could report their action to the next meeting of the Council — to occur within the year — with more confidence, — at least of the assurance that they had not spared themselves in the endeavor to do their duty as they understood it, — should they publish, as directed, than otherwise. The necessity of the most rigid economy pressed on the one hand to suggest the cutting down of the issue one half, so as to supply the churches alone. The certainty on the other that to do so would deprive the Committee of all aid from advertising, which, in their judgment, if rightly managed — should the *Year Book* acquire permanence — may be eventually made to discharge a large part of its cost; with the feeling that the ministry would greatly miss it were it withheld from them; at length determined them to issue the volume substantially as last year, but to reduce its cost as much as possible, by leaving out the calendar, all miscellaneous matter, and chiefly — always the most considerable item of expense — the returns in figures of the exact condition of the churches for the twelvemonth reported.

These do not vary very much from year to year, so that approximate information with regard to them can be gathered from the *Year Book* of 1879; while the lists of ministers, with their post-office address — with multitudes, the most valued item of convenience which the statistics afford — become not only valueless, but misleading, if not annually renewed. The summaries have been retained.

They have accordingly prepared the volume which they thus introduce, in the feeling that of two evils they were bound to choose the lesser.

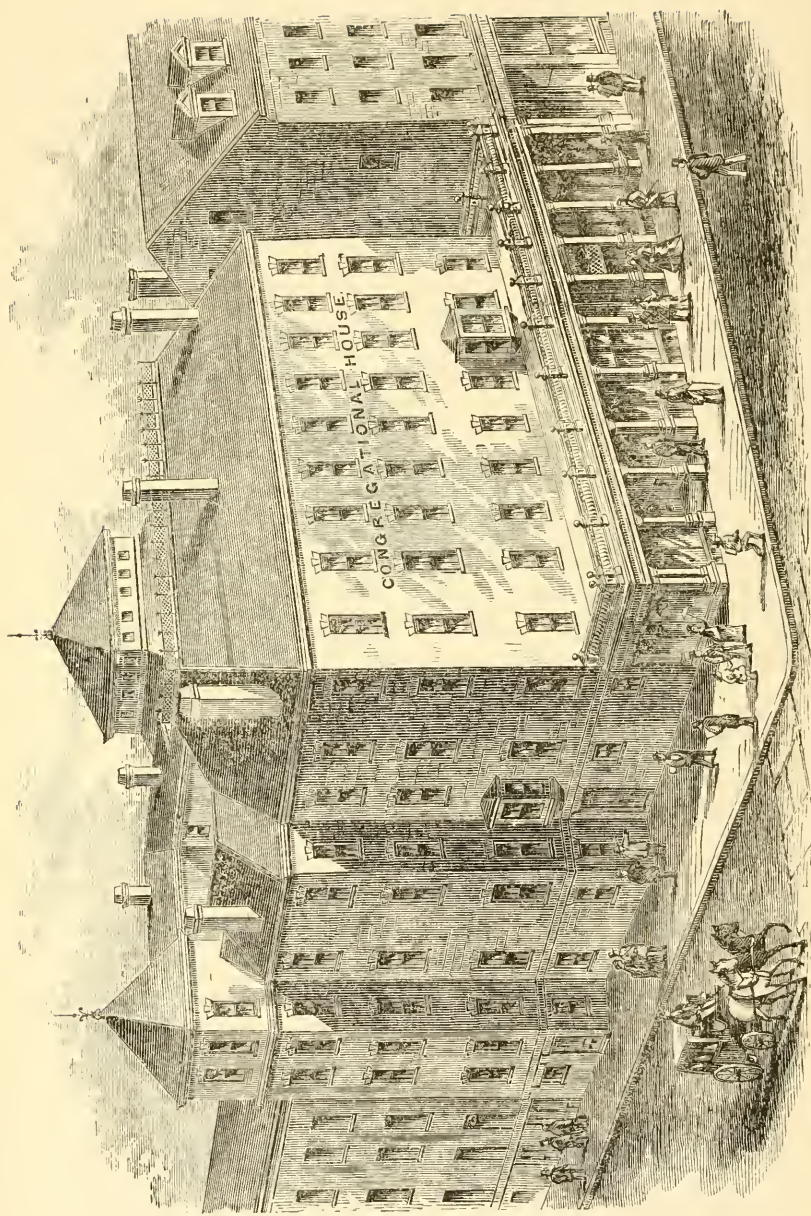
It remains, for the information of all concerned, to append the list of the Congregational bodies by States, with the sums respectively asked from them by the Council in its vote of 1877, with (in parallel column) the amount of their response to the same. It will be seen that no notice has been taken of the Council's action by 24 out of 42; while only 4 of the number have fully responded to both appeals. Connecticut, on the other hand, has generously gone largely beyond her liabilities.

 In all cases where money has been forwarded, it has been first credited to the earliest claim; and where the sum remitted in 1877-8 was not sufficient to square the account of the State for that year, and it remitted again in 1878-9, enough has been transferred from the second payment to close the first account, and the balance only passed to the credit of the second year. Thus, Ohio sent \$210.10 in 1877-8, and \$111.44 in 1878-9; but as the amount asked of Ohio in the first of those years was \$219.94, that full sum has been credited for 1877-8, and the balance (\$101.60) upon the account for 1878-9. In like manner, Iowa forwarded nothing in 1877-8, but sent \$138.63 in 1878-9; which, by this rule, has been credited upon the former year, leaving \$8.98 due upon it, besides the whole sum for the following year. So California, which sent nothing during the first year, subsequently remitted \$42.63. The call for the first year upon her churches being for \$41.99, that was squared, and the balance of 61c. passed to her credit upon the \$22.24 asked for in 1878-9, leaving \$21.60 due on that account. So Colorado sent on in the first year \$7.10, which, as her dues for the two years amount only to \$5.71, leaves \$1.39 to her credit upon the asking for 1879-80.

The Committees respectfully appeal to the churches of States which have thus far, in whole or in part, failed to respond to the Council's request, to send their contributions as desired. Inasmuch as by their legal representatives they did not protest against, or even speak any word in opposition to, the vote under which action has been taken, will it not be a more fraternal and Christian act, even for those who may disapprove of what some have stigmatized as "an unauthorized tax," to assume their fair share with others, until the next Council shall give opportunity for full discussion and action satisfactory to all?

Since the above was in type, Connecticut, first and alone, has generously forwarded \$273.21 as her due for 1879-80; making her total contribution \$1,364.81, or \$282.08 more than the Council suggested for her churches.

He then became secretary and agent of the Brooklyn Association for Improving the Condition of the Poor, and so continued till 1877. He married, 1837, April 19, Sarah Bishop, daughter of Rev. BLISS, SETH, son of Seth and Abigail (Munn) Bliss, was born in Springfield, Mass., 1793, April 23. Studied theology one year with Dr. Osgood, of Springfield, and at Andover and Yale Theological Seminaries, with classes of 1825. Ordained, Jewett City, Conn., 1825, June 15; dismissed, 1832, April 23. General agent and secretary of the American Tract Society, at Boston, 1832-58. Without charge, New York, 1858-70, and Berlin, Conn., after. Published "Letters to the Members and Patrons of the American Tract Society," Boston, 1858, 112 pp. Married, 1824, Dec. 15, Jeannette T., daughter of Joel and Eleanor (Strong) Root, of New Haven. Seven sons and one daughter. Died of pneumonia, 1879, April 8, aged 85 years, 11 months, and 15 days.

BLODGETT, CONSTANTINE, D. D., son of Benjamin and Sarah (Riddell) Blodgett, was born in Randolph, Vt., 1802, Nov. 17. Randolph Academy. Graduated Dartmouth College, 1826. Teacher in South Carolina, 1826, Oct., to 1833, Aug., and studied theology there in private; being ordained in Marion District, 1831, Oct. 19. Installed, Newmarket, N. H., 1834, Dec. 2; dismissed, 1836, June 15. Installed, Pawtucket, R. I., 1836, July 27, and died in office; but became retired pastor, 1871, June 1. Received the honorary D. Graduated Union College, 1832, and Princeton Theological Seminary, 1836. Acting pastor, West Galway, N. Y.; Esperance, Rome. Ordained, Little Falls, N. Y., 1844, Feb. 20; dismissed, 1855, Nov. 20, after a year spent in Europe for his health, and a year at Rochester, N. Y., 1854-5, as acting pastor. Installed, Enfield, Conn., 1855, Dec. 5; dismissed, 1862, June 9. Without charge, Munroe, Mich., until death. Married, 1858, May 4, Eliza, daughter of Harvey and Louisa

(Parsons) Terry, of Enfield, Conn. Three children. Died of congestion of the brain, 1879, May 26, aged 66 years, 4 months, and 18 days.

BUDINGTON, WILLIAM IVES, D. D., son of William and Lydia (Ives) Budington, was born in New Haven, Conn., 1815, April 21. Graduated Yale College, 1834, and Theological Seminary, 1838, also for some time at Andover. Ordained, 1st Church, Charlestown, Mass., 1840, April 22; dismissed, 1854, Sept. 22. Preached 6 months in Western Presbyterian Church, Philadelphia. Installed, Clinton Avenue Church, Brooklyn, 1855, Dec. 19, and died in office. Amherst College gave the honorary D. D., 1856. Member of Long Island Historical Society, and of the New England Historic Genealogical Society. Corporate member of the A. B. C. F. M.; member of Executive Committee of A. H. M. M. to the Ojibway Indians at La Pointe, on Magdalen Island, Lake Superior, 1831-53, and at Crow Wing, 1853-4. Released, 1854. Acting pastor, Sauk Rapids, Minn., from 1854 till death. His translation of the New Testament into the Chippewa language was published by the

Bible Society in 1844; also translations of a Hymn Book and "Peep of Day." Married, 1831, June 10, Betsey, daughter of John and Sarah (Tarbell) Parker, of Weathersfield, Vt., who was born in Pepperell, Mass., 1801, June 10. Of five children, three married daughters are living. Died of paralysis, caused by a fall from a wagon, 1879, Sept. 1, aged 79 years, 4 months, and 2 days.

HELMER, CHARLES DOWNS, son of Steuben and Fanny (Milford) Helmer, was born in Canajoharie, N. Y., 1827, Nov. 18. Two years in Hamilton College, but graduated Yale College, 1852. Teacher in Deaf and Dumb Institution, New York, 1852-4. Graduated Union Theological Seminary, 1857. In Europe, 1857-9. Ordained, 1859, Sept. 11, Plymouth Church, Milwaukee; dismissed, 1865, May 31. Installed, Union Park Church, Chicago, 1866, Dec. 20; dismissed, 1875, Dec. 20. Installed, Tompkins Avenue Church, Brooklyn, 1877, March 28, having supplied that church during 1876, and died in office, although having resigned on account of health. Beloit College gave the honorary D. D. in 1875, but he declined it. Married, 1861, Dec. 25, Susan R., daughter of James and Mary (Hathorne) Bonnell, of Milwaukee. Two of five children survive. Died at residence of his brother in Lockport, N. Y., of malarial poison, 1879, April 28, aged 51 years, 5 months, and 10 days.

HOUGH, LENT SERAJAH, son of Serajah and Elizabeth Shaddock (Avery) Hough, was born in Wallingford, Conn., 1804, Jan. 20. Studied in private with Rev. L. Ives Hoadley. Member of Bangor Theological Seminary, but graduated Yale Theological Seminary, 1831. Ordained, Chaplin, Conn., 1831, Aug. 17; dismissed, 1836, Dec. 20. Installed, North Woodstock, 1837, Jan. 11; dismissed, 1841, May 11. Acting pastor, North Madison, 1842-5; Bethel, 1846. Installed, Westfield, or Third, church in Middletown, 1847, Feb. 10; dismissed, 1863, March 31. Acting pastor, Wolcott, 1863-9; Salem, 1869-70; East Lyme, 1870-6. Without charge, Poquonock, until death. Married, 1831, July 12, Hannah, daughter of Eli and Mary (Whitney) Smith, of Northford, Conn. Two sons and four daughters. Died of Bright's disease, 1879, Sept. 22, aged 75 years, 9 months, and 2 days.

HURLBUT, EVERETT BEMAN, son of Rev. Salmon and Aurora (Willard) Hurlbut, was born in Rochester, Vt., 1830, Oct. 9. His parents soon removed to Illinois. Graduated Knox College, 1852. One year at Andover; but graduated at Union Theological Seminary, 1856. Resident at Andover, 1857. Ordained evangelist, Fontanelle, Neb., 1858, Nov. 1, and acting pastor there, 1858-63; Elkhorn City, 1863-66; Papillion (Irvington?), 1866-70. Without charge, Omaha, 1871-4 and 1877, till death, in California, 1875-6. Married Sarah, daughter of Mark Morse, of Galesburg, Ill. She died 1859, June 5, and he married, 1860, May 1, Cordelia E., daughter of William and Eunice Munger. One son and two daughters. Died of dysentery, 1879, Sept. 24, aged 48 years, 11 months, and 15 days.

JAMESON, THOMAS, son of John and Elizabeth (Fulton) Jameson, was born in Dunbarton, N. H., 1794, March 7. Preparatory study with his pastor, Rev. Dr. Walter Harris. Graduated Dartmouth College, 1818. One year in Andover Theological Seminary. Principal Pembroke Academy, 1819; and 1820-5, of Eflingham Academy. Ordained, Scarborough,

Me., 1825, June 29; dismissed, 1840, Aug. 26. Without charge, Gorham, Me., 1840-60, and after in Exeter and Greenland, N. H., and Cambridge, Mass., with his children. The affection of his eyes, which laid him aside from the ministry, resulted, for the last few years, in total blindness. Married, 1821, Jan. 14, Elizabeth L., daughter of John and Susan Lord, of Effingham, N. H., who died, 1860, Aug. 11. Died of old age, in Cambridgeport, 1879, April 14, aged 85 years, 1 month, and 7 days.

JOCELYN, SIMEON SMITH, son of Simeon and Luceannah (Smith) Jocelyn, was born in New Haven, Conn., 1799, Nov. 21. In early life he was an engraver. Studied theology with Prof. N. W. Taylor, D. D. In 1822 he was licensed to preach, and 1829, Aug. 25, ordained over the Temple Street Church (colored) of New Haven; dismissed, 1834. Without charge, New Haven, 1834-44. Installed, Williamsburg, Long Island, 1844, April 9; dismissed, 1865, July 9. He was one of the founders of the American Missionary Association, and a member of its executive committee. Married, 1822, Nov. 18, Harriet, daughter of Daniel and Rachel (Buell) Starr, of Litchfield, Conn., who died 1877, April 20, aged 77. Five of eight children are living. Died, at his son's home, in Tarrytown, N. Y., of asthma, 1879, Aug. 17, aged 79 years, 8 months, and 26 days.

JONES, DAVID MORGAN, was born in Wales, 1810. He was ordained, 1831, and ministered among the Welsh, in Canada, two years; Palmyra, Ohio, six years; and Sugar Creek, Maryland. In 1843 went to Iowa County, Wisconsin, and there spent the rest of his life, minister of various churches, — Dodgeville, Blue Mounds, and Ridgeway, Welsh churches; and Wyoming, Arena, and Mill Creek. Without charge during his later years, in Arena. Married, 1837, May 26, Charlotte Rice, of Palmyra, O. One son and one daughter. Died of cancer in the bladder, 1879, July 3, aged 69.

KIMBALL, CALEB, son of Caleb and Elizabeth (Hammond) Kimball, was born in Ipswich, Mass., 1798, June 3. Phillips Academy, Andover. Graduated Dartmouth College, 1826. Member of Andover Theological Seminary one year, with class of 1829. Ordained evangelist at Barustable, Mass., 1832. Acting pastor, Harwich, Mass., 1832-4, and at Biddeford, Me., 1840-2; but being entirely blind, he never had other pastoral charge. Labored much as evangelist. Residence in Ipswich, and for twenty-five years in West Medway. He published, (1) "A Child Assisted in Giving the Heart to God"; (2) "The Holy Spirit Resisted"; (3) "The Awakened Sinner Directed"; (4) "The Happy Choice"; (5) "View of Christ"; (6) "The Young Christian Directed"; (7) "The Way to be Saved," which was incorporated with one of the above. These little books passed many editions, and he travelled widely in New England, scattering 125,000 copies. Also, (8) "Gems for Sabbath Schools." Married, 1854, Jan. 9, Martha May, daughter of Jacob and Chloe Guild, of South Dedham, now Norwood, Mass. Died of old age, 1879, June 19, aged 81 years and 16 days.

MANNING, ABEL, son of Israel and Lydia (Richardson) Manning, was born in Sterling, Mass., 1788, March 14. Preparatory study with Rev. John Crane, D. D., of Northbridge, with Rev. Timothy Dickinson, of HOLLISTON, and at Hadley Academy. Graduated Brown University, 1817, and

studied theology with Rev. Dr. Emmons. [He was among the last survivors of Dr. Emmons's pupils. Rev. David Brigham, of Bridgewater, and Rev. Professor Enoch Pond, D. D., of Bangor, probably alone remain.] Acting pastor, Goffstown, N. H., 8 months. Ordained, Plymouth, Vt., 1820, Nov. 7; dismissed, 1824, May 12. Acting pastor, Goshen, N. H., 1824-6; Auburn, 1826-31; Epsom, 1831-4; Ossipee, 1834-7; Dartmouth, Mass., 1837-8; Goshen, N. H., 1838-41; Ludlow, Vt., 1842. Without charge, Pembroke, N. H., 1842-5, and 1850-6; East Concord, 1857-68; and Goffstown, after, until death. Married, 1823, Jan. 27. Mary, daughter of John and Sarah (Chase) Little, of Goffstown, who survives him. No children. Died of old age, 1879, Dec. 20, aged 91 years, 9 months, and 6 days.

MARSH, SIDNEY HARPER, D. D., son of Rev. Pres. James, D. D., and Lucia (Wheelock) Marsh, was born at Hampden Sidney, Virginia, 1823, Aug. 29. His father became president of Vermont University in 1826, and remained president or professor until his death, 1842, July 3. He graduated there, 1846. Teacher, 1846-51. Union Theological Seminary, 1851-2. Ordained evangelist, 1853, May 1 [at the same time and place with Mr. Bayliss, who died one week after him], and went to Oregon, in the service of the Society for Promoting Collegiate Education; became principal of Tualatin Academy, Forest Grove; and president of Pacific University at its incorporation in 1854, and held that office till death. His inaugural address was published Burlington, Vt. Vermont University gave him the honorary degree of D. D. in 1860. Married, 1860, May 28, Eliza Lavina, daughter of George Henry and Abby Phebe (Foster) Haskell, of Ohio. Five children. Died of consumption, 1879, Feb. 5, aged 53 years, 5 months, and 7 days.

Y., 1858, until ordained there, 1859, Oct. 25; dismissed, 1863, May 19. Installed, Howells, 1865, Oct. 18, having been acting pastor from 1863, December; dismissed, 1877, Dec. 8. Married, 1859, Aug. 4, Ellen Sophia, daughter of William and Sally (Whitmore) Goodrich, of Rocky Hill, Conn. One son and three daughters. Died of heart disease and paralysis, in Augusta, Me., 1879, May 30, aged 52 years, 2 months, and 1 day.

MERRILL, HORATIO, son of Nathaniel and Phebe (Merrill) Merrill, was born in Brownfield, Me., 1817, April 26. Phillips Academy, Exeter. Graduated Dartmouth College, 1840, and Andover Theological Seminary, 1843. Ordained, West Newbury, Mass., 1845, May 7; dismissed, 1847, Aug. 11. Principal Washington State School, Maryland, 1847-8; professor of languages, Yarmouth (Me.) Institute, 1848-9. Acting pastor, Bloomfield, Me., 1849-50; New Gloucester, 1850-4. Without charge, Portland, 1854-7. Installed, Salisbury, N. H., 1858, Mar. 17; dismissed, 1864, Mar. 5. Without charge after at Andover, Cambridge, Portland, Cleveland. Married, 1849, Jan. 11, Sarah, daughter of Royal Whitman,

Turner, Me. Four of six children are living. Died of paralysis at Hopkinton, Iowa, 1878, Sept. 7, aged 61 years, 4 months, and 11 days.

MORGAN, DAVID STARRETT, son of Daniel and Roxana (Whiting) Morgan, was born in Johnson, Vt., 1835, Jan. 24. Phillips Academy, Andover. Graduated Union College, 1860, and Union Theological Seminary, 1866, having studied one year at Andover. Ordained, Worthington, Mass., 1867, June 26; dismissed, 1869, May 26. Acting pastor, Montello, Wis., and of Packwaukee (Presbyterian) churches, 1869-70, and Westfield, Wis., 1871-2. Pastor (Pres.) La Porte, Iowa, 1872, Oct. 17, to 1875, Mar. 2, when a severe hemorrhage of the lungs laid him aside from active service. Married, 1867, May 24, Charlotte Battles, daughter of Henry and Angeline Wardwell, of Andover, Mass. Two sons and two daughters. He entered the army, 1862, July, in Co. H, 1st Mass. NICHOLS, CHARLES, son of Silas and Free love (Chidsey) Nichols, was born in Derby, Conn., 1798, Feb. 19. Yale Theological Seminary, 1825. Ordained, Gilead, in Hebron, Conn., 1825, Sept. 28; dismissed, 1856, Oct. 21. Acting pastor, Higganum, in Haddam, 1856, Nov., to 1864, Nov. Without charge, New Britain, till death. Married, 1827, April 4, Louisa, daughter of Dr. Jeremiah and Martha (Williams) West, of Tolland, Conn. They had five children. Died very suddenly, probably of paralysis, 1879, Jan. 22, aged 80 years, 11 months, and 3 days.

PAGE, JOHN CUMMINGS, M. D., son of Capt. Moses and Sarah (Morse) Page, was born in Sandwich, N. H., 1804, May 4. His parents removed to Concord, where he attended school. Graduated Dartmouth Medical College, 1826, and practised medicine in Gilford, Northwood, Centre Harbor, and Gilmanton. Graduated Gilmanton Theological Seminary, 1839, and after supplying the church at Raymond for more than a year, ordained there 1841, Oct. 6; dismissed, 1851, May 7. Resumed medical practice at Centre Harbor, and there remained till death. Married, 1828, June 26, Mary Ann, daughter of Major Ebenezer and Deborah (Greeley) Eastman, of Gilmanton. Two of four sons are living. — Dr. Wm. A. Page, of Centre Harbor, and Rev. Henry P. Page, of Harvard, Neb. Died, 1879, Nov. 4, of general debility from disease of lungs and liver, aged 75 years and 6 months.

PATTON, WILLIAM. D. D., son of Col. Robert and Cornelia (Bridges) Patton, was born in Philadelphia, 1798, Aug. 23. Gray and Wiley's Academy, Philadelphia. Graduated Middlebury College, 1818. Member of Princeton Theological Seminary, 1819-20, in the class of 1822. Ordained evangelist by Addison Association at Charlotte, Vt., 1820, June 8. Installed, Central Presbyterian Church, New York City, gathered by his labors, 1822, May 7; released, 1834, Sept. 15. Secretary Presbyterian Education Society, 1834-7. Installed, Spring Street Church, New York, 1837, Oct. 11; released, 1847, Oct. 29. Installed, Hammond Street Congregational Church, New York, 1848, Dec. 26; dismissed, 1852. Without charge, New York, until 1862, and after at New Haven, where he was acting pastor of the College Street Church, 1863. New York University gave the honorary degree of D. D. in 1836. West Millgrove, 1858-60. Without charge, Bucyrus, 1860-66, but preached at Wyandotte, 1866. Removed to Benzonia, Mich., 1867; acting pastor there, 1869 and 1874-5, and at Homestead from 1871 till death. Married, 1831, Jan. 19, Elizabeth Ramsey, daughter of James and Mary (Ramsey) Agnew, of Gettysburg. She died, 1840, May 24. He married, 1842, Jan. 11, Elmira Ann, daughter of John and Mary Marshall, of Mansfield, Ohio. H., 1861, Oct., to 1863, May; Mount Pleasant, Iowa, 1863-9, June. Agent A. H. M. S. for Southern Iowa, residing at Des Moines, 1869-78, and for the Rocky Mountain district, residing at Colorado Springs, after. Married, 1862, April 10, Mary J., daughter of George and Ann J. (Marvin) Roberts, of Andover, Ohio. She died 1868, June 28. He married, 1878, April 18, Mrs. Sybil B. Rider, daughter of Daniel and Lydia T. (Hopkinson) Dudley, of Mainville, Ohio, and widow of John J. Rider. Two sons. Died instantly by the overturning of a stage-coach near Leadville, Col., 1879, Nov. 14, aged 47 years, 9 months, and 17 days.

PLUMB, ELIJAH WHITON, D. D., son of Capt. George and Patty (Whiting) Plumb, was born in Halifax, Vt., 1798, July 28. Hopkins Academy, Hadley, Mass. One year in Harvard College, but graduated at Middlebury College, 1824. Teacher, Brattleboro', Vt., 1824-6, and Hampton, N. H., 1826-8. Studied theology with Daniel Dana, D. D., of Newburyport. Ordained, Pawlet, Vt., 1831, May 18; dismissed, 1845, Oct. 29. Installed, Pre-byterian Church, Potsdam, N. Y., 1846, June 11; dismissed, 1851. Principal St. Lawrence Academy, 1853-64. Acting pastor, Sterling, Ill., 1864-7. Without charge, Potsdam, 1867-9; East Bloomfield, 1869, till death. He received the honorary degree of D. D. from his alma mater, 1858, and he was a trustee, 1840-55. Married, 1830, Sarah, daughter of Edward and Sarah Woodman, of Brattleboro', Vt. She died 1850, March 25. He married, 1852, September, Aeta, daughter of Deacon Ozias Clark, and widow of Henry Griswold, of Pawlet. Died of stomach disease, 1879, July 12, aged 80 years, 11 months, and 15 days.

SANFORD, WILLIAM HOWE, son of Ichabod and Nancy (Howe) Sanford, was born in Belchertown, Mass., 1800, Feb. 14. Hadley Academy. Graduated Harvard College, 1827. Studied theology with Rev. Mr. Coleman, of Belchertown, and Rev. Ethan Smith, Hanover. Ordained, Boylston, Mass., 1832, Oct. 17; dismissed, 1857, Sept. 15. Bookseller, Worcester, 1857, till death. Member of the House of Representatives, 1856-7. Published, *The Years of Many Generations considered, two historical sermons*, in Boylston, Oct., 1852. Married, 1830, Aug. 23, Harriet, daughter of Rev. Ethan and Bathsheba (Sanford) Smith. Five sons and one

daughter. Died of dropsy of the chest, 1879, Nov. 27, aged 79 years, 9 months, and 13 days.

SEABURY, EDWIN, son of David and Mary (Lowe) Seabury, was born in Yarmouth, Me., 1812, Dec. 2. Yarmouth Academy. Graduated Bowdoin College, 1833, and Bangor Theological Seminary, 1837. Ordained, Newcastle, Me., 1840, June 18; dismissed, 1843, Dec. 14. Installed, 2d Church, in same town, 1844, Aug. 22; dismissed, 1848, June 25. Acting pastor, Byfield, Mass., 1848-9; Lanesville, Gloucester, 1849-51; Westminster, Vt., 1855-8. Installed, South Royalston, Mass., 1858, June 23; dismissed, 1862, May 6. Acting pastor, East Falmouth, Mass., 1863-9, and Berlin, Vt., 1870-5. Without charge, Walpole, N. H., till death. Married, 1837, Sept. 13, Elizabeth, daughter of Samuel and Sarah (Beal) Mason, of Yarmouth, who died, 1874, Jan. 23, aged nearly 66. Four children. Died of disease of the kidneys, 1879, June 14, aged 66 years, 6 months, and 11 days.

SHEPARD THOMAS, D. D., son of Jacob and Mrs. Lydia (Wild) [Clapp] Shepard, was born in Norton, Mass., 1792, May 7. Studied with Rev. Pitt Clark and at Taunton Academy. Graduated Brown University, 1813, and Andover Theological Seminary, 1816. Home Missionary in Georgia, 1816-18. Agent Connecticut Asylum for Deaf and Dumb, 1818-19. Ordained, 1819, June 16, Ashfield, Mass.; dismissed, 1833, May 8. He was colleague here with Rev. Nehemiah Porter, who died in 1820, at the age of 100. Agent American Bible Society, 1833-5. Installed, Bristol, R. I., 1835, April 30, and died in office, though having resigned active service in 1865, and had a colleague after. He was elected a corporate member of the A. B. C. F. M. in 1846; received the honorary degree of D. D. from his alma mater in 1853. He translated school books and tracts into the Choctaw language. Married, 1816, Oct. 16, Matilda, daughter of Thaddeus and Melitable Loomis, of Salisbury, N. Y., who died at Carlinville, Ill., 1844, Mar. 23, aged 50. She had ten children. He married, 2d, 1844, Oct. 23, Mrs. Roxana Baker. YEOMANS, NATHANIEL TRACY, son of John and — (Tracy) Yeomans, was born in Hinsdale, Mass., 1806, Feb. 12. Studied at Albany, N. Y., and Princeton, N. J. Ordained 1833, June. Acting pastor, North Adams, Mass., [?] 1837-8; Palmyra, N. Y.; Gosport; Newstead; Orangeville; Warsaw; Millville, 1854-62; Fowlerville, 1862-9; Bristol, 1869-74. Without charge, Danville, Ill., until death. Married, 1836, Dec. —, Frances, daughter of John and Abigail (Marvin) Bush. She was a sister of Prof. George Bush, and born in Norwich, Vt. She died, 1872, May 10. Of five children, three survive. Died of hemorrhage of the bladder, 1878, May 6, aged 72 years, 2 months, and 22 days.

N. B. Four of the names above, Merrill, Roberts, Wright, and Yeomans, belong to the record of 1878, and for exact accuracy the summaries would need a corresponding change.

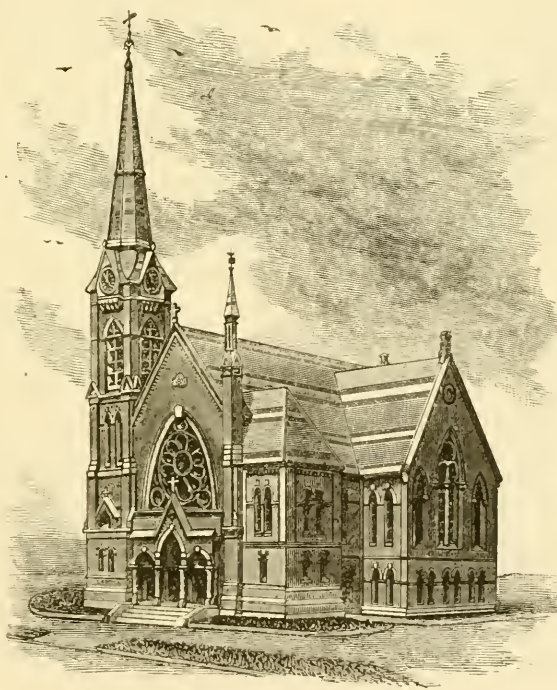

The above tables record 82 churches organized; 186 ordinations or installations; 58 pastors ordained; 77 pastors installed; 36 evangelist ordinations; 15 uncertain; 95 pastors dismissed; 9 pastors who died in office. A gain of 31 in the number of pastors is here indicated; but dismissals are less carefully reported than installations, and the actual gain is probably less. These figures cover a different period from that included in the tabular summaries on a later page, and a part of the difference may be thus explained.

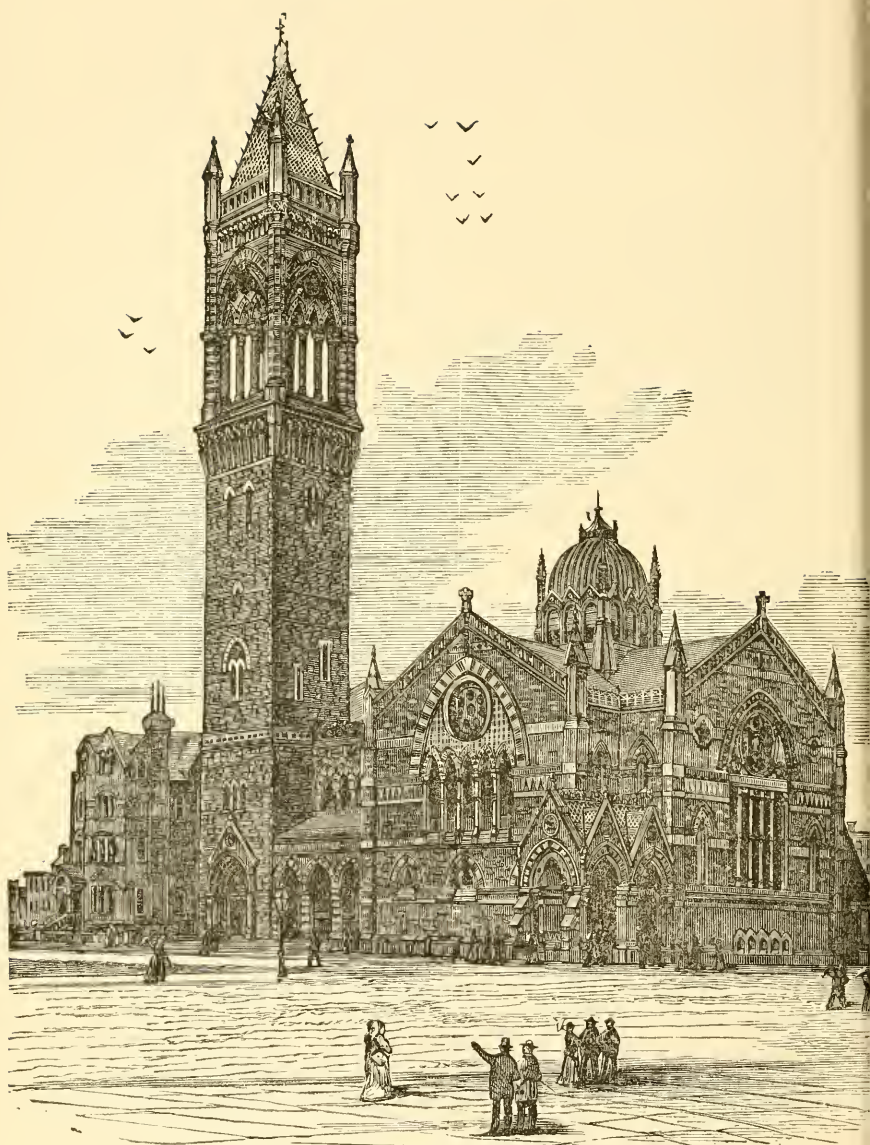

THE ANNUAL STATISTICS OF THE CHURCHES AND MINISTERS.

At the session of the National Council held in 1877, it was unanimously

“*Resolved*, That an annual compilation of the statistics of our churches throughout the country, and especially an accurate and complete list of ministers in fellowship, should be published under the sanction of this Council.”

The following pages contain:—

1. The Lists of Churches (and pastoral supply) arranged by States, and alphabetically in each State.
2. List of Foreign Missionaries.
3. Summaries of statistical reports compiled from the State Minutes, and made to conform to State boundaries.
4. The National and State organizations of the Churches, with lists of officers and times of meetings.
5. Officers of the National Co-operative Societies.
6. Alphabetical List of Ministers, with Post-office addresses.

The List of Churches is compiled from the several State Minutes, or by correspondence. The pastoral supply has been corrected to date by laborious correspondence with the State Secretaries, with Home Missionary officials (to both classes our grateful thanks being due), and with others interested; and *proof-sheets* have been read and corrected by all these persons.

The List of Churches of this year is compared, name by name, with that of last year, and all variations are mentioned at the end of each State list, so that each church can be traced from year to year.

A church in brackets is one organized since date of annual report. Some States prefix a star (*) to the name of a minister (not installed) if he be not a member of any organization of ministers or churches in the State reporting.

An attempt has been made, for the first time, to give the *P. O. location* of churches, and it is partially accomplished. But the P. O. address of *ministers* must be sought in the *Alphabetical List of Ministers*; because one may be in charge of four or five churches, or he may live elsewhere than the place of the church where he preaches.

Installed pastors are marked “*p*”; others in service are not marked. Blanks in the column of pastoral supply, meaning *no* regularly engaged minister, are left blank for the convenience of those who note pastoral changes.

We this year sadly omit (to lessen the cost) the year of organization of each church,—the minister’s year of ordination, and that of commencement of labor at present location,—the columns of membership, additions, removals, baptisms, Sabbath schools, families, and benevolent contributions,—list of ministers without pastoral charge,—and list of licentiates. Some of these items may be sought in last year’s issue. The tables of Summaries, however, are substantially continued; and the *Alphabetical List of Ministers* is so indexed as to show (but not by States) who are without pastoral charge.

SUMMARIES OF STATISTICS.

The most important items in the general summaries hitherto published, are continued this year. The tables of statistics for the years 1857-1879 are regretfully omitted, but may be found in the *Year-Book* of 1879.

The following tables are compiled, with great labor, from the several published issues of State Minutes, or from manuscript reports. Few of the State organizations conform strictly to State lines, and the reports have therefore to be completely revised. Scarce a fifth give "totals" which can be copied. For the items of ministerial supply, and "other ministers," not a single report can (from the nature of the case) be copied. In many States, also, the reports are so planned that it is necessary to "check" on an alphabetical list the name of every minister supplying a church, and then count the classes of churches and of ministers, correcting errors until all perfectly balance.

The several State Secretaries have given the kindest assistance possible. But it is greatly to be desired that all would adopt substantially the schedule of statistics recommended by the National Council; and especially adopt its forms of Summaries. And, for many purposes, it is EARNESTLY requested that the State lists of ministers contain *full first names*. One State this year reports two men named "A. Jones": who, out of that State, can tell which of the two esteemed brothers is at a given place, but for the *Year-Book* to enlighten him?

Compared with last year:

1. Net increase in number of churches, 54.
2. Net gain in number of church-members, 7,266.
3. Net gain in number in Sabbath Schools, 1,764.
4. Families reported in 2,407 congregations,—an increase of 15,450 over number reported in 2,161 families last year. The same average would give a total of 276,000 families; but this would be too high an estimate.
5. Increase in benevolent contributions reported, \$146,800.59; 2,817 churches reporting this year, against 2,760 reporting last year.
6. Increase in money raised for Home Expenditure, \$280,432.79; 1,890 churches reporting that year, as against 1,696 reporting last year.
7. The number of churches having installed pastors slightly decreases as usual. In 1858, our reports gave 947; in 1880, with a net *gain* of 1,359 churches, we report 898 with settled pastors. But the number of churches having pastoral supply slightly increases as usual.
8. It is to be regretted that the separate list of ministers "without pastoral charge" has to be (for economy) omitted. The lack is partly supplied in the *Alphabetical List of Ministers*, where those supplying churches are accompanied by figures denoting pages. A list would show that a large number of the men are employed in various necessary work. The reports show, for instance, that men are employed as presidents or professors in academies, colleges, and theological seminaries; superintendents of schools (State or city); secretaries, superintendents, and agents of the national co-operative societies; missionaries to the freedmen or Indians; chaplains in army, or hospitals, or sailors' bethels, or asylums; city missionaries, evangelists, colporteurs, editors; in pastoral service in other denominations. All of these are in useful, even indispensable, positions.

The returns to be obtained during this year will correspond with the *national census* year. It is therefore particularly desirable that every State organization should secure *full returns*,—an absolutely accurate list of churches, and complete figures. It is also very desirable that each State should adopt all the points in the schedule recommended by the National Council. The only items which any omit are, absentees, number of *families* in the congregations, Benevolent Contributions, and moneys received for Home Expenditure.

THE following is a compilation of the alphabetical lists furnished by the State Associations and Conferences, corrected by correspondence with their Secretaries, to the latest possible date. The Secretary of the Council in no case presumes to insert or omit a name upon his own responsibility. The State organizations are alone responsible; but the Secretary has used his utmost endeavors to obtain a complete and correct list. If any names are omitted, it is because they are not reported by any organization in any State.

The figures refer to pages where the name will be found, but apply only to those in pastoral service or to foreign missionaries. Those without figures are presumed to be not in pastoral service.

Names starred (*) are of persons who, although mentioned (usually as supplying churches), are reported to be members of no organization of Congregational churches or ministers.

Licentiates are not included in this list, nor are ministers of other denominations.

The compiler is painfully convinced of some errors in first names, initials, and spelling. No pains have been spared to secure accuracy; but efforts failing, the compiler has not ventured to follow his own convictions, against the unmistakable testimony of the reports.

The compiler again earnestly begs the State Secretaries to give the *first name* of every minister. A few States exclude them almost entirely.

AMERICAN BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS FOR FOREIGN MISSIONS. 1880.

Our Present Field, as reported in 1879, includes sixteen missions, the statistics of which for a single year are exceedingly instructive, illustrating both the breadth and variety of our work. This work includes direct evangelistic effort through missionaries and native helpers; an immense educational trust, extending from the primary school to the college and theological seminary; Sunday-school instruction; the preparation, publication and circulation in different languages of books, tracts and newspapers; assistance in the erection of buildings for churches and schools; grants in aid to feeble churches and to native home missionary societies; the humane service of missionary physicians, sometimes in the care of large dispensaries and hospitals; also charitable ministry, continuous and varied, to the sick, the poor and the oppressed. All these departments upon the foreign field are economically managed under the one efficient and experienced administration of the American Board. The field now includes the following missions, arranged according to the order of time when the work in each commenced:—

1, Western India, 1813; 2, Ceylon, 1816; 3, Western Turkey, 1822; 4, Madura in Southern India, 1834; 5, Eastern Turkey, 1835; 6, Dakota Indians, 1835; 7, Zulus in Southeastern Africa, 1835; 8, Foochow in South China, 1847; 9, Central Turkey, 1847; 10, Micronesia, 1852; 11, North China, 1854; 12, Japan, 1869; 13, European Turkey, 1871; 14, Spain, 1872; 15, Western Mexico, 1873; 16, Austrian Empire, 1873; 17, Central Africa, 1879.

Our Present Force, now occupying six hundred and seventy-three stations and out-stations, numbers but one hundred and forty-one ordained missionaries, of whom seven are physicians, and two hundred and twenty-seven assistant missionaries, making a total from this country of three hundred and seventy-five. Our native force is more than thrice this number, a total of 1,171, of whom 432 are native pastors, preachers and catechists.

Our Native Churches, two hundred and sixty-one in number, not including those of the Hawaiian Islands, enroll over fifteen thousand members, of which number over two thousand were received last year on confession of their faith in Christ.

Our Training and Theological Schools, including station classes, thirty in number, are giving instruction to over nine hundred young men, many of them fitting for the Christian ministry.

Our Girls' Schools, of the higher order, thirty-four in number, enroll over twelve hundred pupils, many of them fitting to be teachers, many of them to be Christian wives and mothers, constituting the educational power of Christian homes for the next generation.

Our Common Schools, six hundred and twenty-six in number, enroll over twenty-four thousand pupils, making a total of nearly twenty-seven thousand under Christian instruction.

Regular Donations from the Churches, which during the past six years have declined by more than \$100,000, need to advance beyond those of last year at least *forty per cent*, in order to meet the appropriations already made for the coming year. Upon these donations and upon ordinary legacies we must rely for the support of the regular work of the Board, the munificent Otis bequest having been sacredly set apart for evangelistic and educational enlargement, and for a new mission in Africa. May we hope for a contribution, as generous as possible, from every church? Our main instrumental reliance for awakening and deepening missionary interest in the churches is upon pastors.

Upon an average, ninety-four per cent of all the contributions and legacies given to the treasury of the American Board is distributed among the several missions, according to the extent and necessity of the work most economically adjusted. Three per cent is expended in the important department of communicating missionary intelligence to our constituency at home, through the distribution of the monthly *Herald* and other missionary documents, and through the work of our two faithful district secretaries, one stationed at New York and one at Chicago. All other expense, including the grave financial administration annually of over half a million dollars, extending around the world, including, also, a very large correspondence with the missionaries abroad and the churches at home, is included in the remaining three per cent.

Dividends of at least "an hundred fold" are promptly paid, "good measure, pressed down and running over." American College and Education Society.

The American Education Society was organized and received its charter from Massachusetts in the year 1816. The College Society, as the other organization was popularly called, was formed in 1843. It was for years a voluntary association without a charter. In 1872 it received a charter also from the State of Massachusetts. These two organizations were brought together under a new charter from the same State in May, 1874.

Income of the Society for year ending April 30, 1879, \$63,839.74 Of this amount \$37,994.89 was devoted to the help of Western institutions, and \$20,885.32 was appropriated to young men in colleges and theological seminaries, studying for the ministry. The balance was for current expenses.


The whole number of young men assisted by the Society in their studies for the ministry since 1816 is 6,709. The institutions at the West which have been assisted by the Society since 1843 are the following, viz : Western Reserve, Illinois, Wabash, and Marietta Colleges, and Lane Theological Seminary. These five are the institutions which the Society took under its care at the beginning, in 1843. Those which have since been received upon the list are Knox, Beloit, Thayer, Wittenberg, Oberlin, and Berea Colleges, the College of California, Pacific University, Olivet, Ripon, Iowa, Carleton, Doane, Drury, Washburn, and Colorado Colleges, and Pacific Theological Seminary.

The ten last named are still upon the Society's list.

The number of young men now receiving assistance from the Society is 295.

This Society grew out of the first National Council convened at Albany in 1852, and is the only national society ever organized by Congregationalists in the direct interests of their own churches. It had for its end the establishing of Congregational churches, not in New England alone, but throughout the length and breadth of the land.

It does its work mainly by the systematic aiding of feeble churches in erecting houses of worship. Its work is largely in the West. It seeks to build sanctuaries only where they are needed. It makes grants and loans, giving loans to each church not to exceed \$500, and this in such a way as to stimulate personal endeavor, and always to pay last bills, thus freeing the churches from debt. What is given or loaned is protected by trust mortgage against loss, should the churches aided fail, as they sometimes must. These trust mortgages keep the churches afterwards from the possibility of making other mortgages, and so of incurring debts in the future.

Since the organization of the Union it has aided in the erection of 1,066 Congregational meeting-houses, or more than one third of all that now exist on the continent. The great proportion of the churches in the West have been thus aided, and, without such aid, could not have built when they did, if at all. The demand for church building now is greater than ever before. In some of the Western States and Territories from one half to two thirds of the Home Missionary churches are houseless, and they must have aid or die. It seems a waste to organize churches that cannot be housed. The demand for church building increases yearly as the western half of the country is being settled. On the vigorous carrying forward of this church-building work depends, to a large extent, the future usefulness of the churches themselves, the growth of our denomination, the success of Home and Foreign Missions, the future of our country, and so, to human view, the destiny of the world.

THE HOME MISSIONARY, a monthly magazine, published by the Society, at sixty cents a year, including postage, gives a running account of the progress of the work in all parts of the country, chiefly from the pens of the superintendents and missionaries personally engaged in it. An Annual Report sums up the results of the year.

THE LEAFLET, a monthly tract, price five dollars a hundred for the year, is devoted to the Sunday-school department of the Society's work.

For nearly fifty-four years the Society has been organizing churches, mainly in the West, and aiding in the support of their ministers till those churches are able to assume the whole expense. Its missionaries have from the first organized Sunday-schools, provided proper teachers for them, and by watchful oversight have secured their permanence and highest usefulness. The Society now also raises and disburses money for supplying these missionary Sunday-schools with libraries and other helps.

In connection with the labor of its missionaries, 3,936 churches have been organized, and 2,009 have come to self-support. It has collected and disbursed, in cash, about \$8,500,000, and in clothing, books and other supplies, largely the offerings of Christian women, more than \$1,178,000—in all, over \$9,678,000. The additions to the churches have been 286,172. Schools, academies, and colleges in nearly every Western State are among the direct fruits of the work.

The number of missionaries employed in its fifty-third year (1878-79) was 946, about 600 of them in States and Territories west of New York. They preached regularly in 2,126 stations, and at frequent intervals in many hundreds more. The number of Sunday-school and Bible-class scholars was about 88,000. The additions to the churches were 5,232—3,049 of them on profession of faith. Seventy-eight churches were organized, and forty-seven came to self-support. Last year's receipts were, in cash, \$273,691.53; in supplies, \$58,000—in all, about \$331,700.

At least \$300,000 in cash are needed this year to sustain the missionaries now in the field and to take up only such new work as the providence and Spirit of God imperatively call upon the Society to assume *at once*. For securing the means essential to the carrying on of this great work the Society depends, under God, on the zealous co-operation of the pastors and members of the Congregational churches of the land.

THE American Tract Society

Is one of the grand union organizations brought into being by the development of the missionary spirit early in the century. Seven weekly and monthly papers are published, each one of which is a model of its kind. Five thousand books, thirty thousand tracts, and twenty thousand papers can be issued from its presses every day. It has a fine assortment of books for Sunday-School Libraries at moderate prices and fixed discounts. The papers are beautifully illustrated and are furnished as cheaply as those of the same quality can anywhere be obtained.

Thanks to an appreciative public, the business of the Society has become so large as to pay all its running expenses, so that it is in a good position to carry forward its benevolent work. For years it has spent every dollar which has been contributed for the purpose by churches and individuals, in grants of Christian reading to go all over the world, and in the support of its faithful, self-denying, hand-to-hand missionaries, who do their work very largely in regions where as yet the churches have not come.

It is pleasant to notice that the interest in the Tract work, which seemed to flag for a time, is reviving. Many churches have come to its support during the past two or three years. Congregational churches, through this Society, can have the opportunity of furnishing the Christian reading which they love to the needy people of the whole land, without the prejudice of a denominational imprint and without the cost of machinery.

In behalf of those in need in this country and in foreign lands and on the sea, calls are made for ten times the amount that can now be furnished. The Society will gladly respond to those calls to the full extent warranted by the liberality of its supporters.

AMERICAN SEAMEN'S FRIEND SOCIETY.

This society is prosecuting its work among seamen with increasing encouragement. Chaplains and missionaries are in the field, preaching on shipboard and ashore, as they have opportunity; visiting the sick and dying, and ministering to the comfort and spiritual wants of seamen at home and in foreign lands. THE SAILORS' HOME, in New York, which has accommodated over *ninety thousand* seamen, has been rebuilt and is now reopened.

Over 6 500 libraries, containing more than *three hundred and fifty thousand* volumes, are now afloat on board *six thousand five hundred* vessels, sailing on all oceans and seas and navigable rivers. Each library is in the hands of some sailor or officer, who sees to the distribution of the books, and in many cases holds prayer-meetings and conducts religious worship. All donors of libraries are informed what vessel their libraries go to sea in, and also what is heard from them when at sea. These libraries are fast displacing the corrupting literature of the sea. Many conversions have been reported in connection with this agency. Twenty dollars supplies a library containing a Bible and about forty books. Twenty thousand vessels remain to be supplied.

THE SAILOR'S MAGAZINE collects and communicates information to enlist the sympathy and co-operation of Christians of every name. It is published monthly, each number containing 32 pages, making at the end of the year 384 pages of valuable matter, relating to the work of the AMERICAN SEAMEN'S FRIEND SOCIETY, including facts and incidents about Sea Missions, Prayer Meetings at Sea, Letters from Sailor Missionaries, Reports about Loan Libraries and from Chaplains, Disasters at Sea, Position of the Planets, occasional Sermons by distinguished Preachers on the Influence of Commerce in the Conversion of the World, etc., etc., making a volume each year of permanent value for reference, and for use in Monthly Concerts. Price, including postage, \$1.00 a year. Gratis to life members who request it. Also, to pastors taking a collection for the cause, and to donors of libraries.

Some of the considerations that urge to Christian effort in behalf of seamen:—

Sailors are exerting a vast influence in the world. They go everywhere, visit every shore and every port, and come into contact with every class of people. Wicked sailors scatter the seeds of pollution and death, hinder the work of missions, and bring reproach on their calling and country. Christian sailors are scattering the seeds of truth, opening the way for Christian missions, and helping missionaries in all parts of the world. *Over six thousand* sailors are keeping in circulation *three hundred thousand* volumes of Christian books on board of *more than six thousand* vessels, going and coming between the seaports of all countries. The commerce of the United States employs 500,000 sailors.

Vast interests are committed to their care. They have, for the time being, the custody of ship and cargo, and all on board. Millions of treasure, and many thousand precious lives, are dependent upon their fidelity and skill.

It is a WORK APPEALING TO THE GRATITUDE of all civilized communities, every one of which is benefited by the arduous services the sailor renders to society at large.

Congregational Singing.

No part of the service of the church is more inspiring than that of song, but the true value and effectiveness of this service depend largely upon the character of both the hymns and tunes used. Numerous collections have been made and published to meet the requirements of this part of public worship : of them all none has been so deservedly popular or so widely adopted as

“SONGS FOR THE SANCTUARY,”

by Rev. Dr. CHARLES S. ROBINSON. The unprecedented circulation of this book is the most convincing proof of its adaptation to the real wants that Christians have felt in the services of divine worship. It was the first to present a careful and analytic arrangement of hymns according to subject, and yet adapted to music appropriate to their rendering in actual use. It gave, moreover, a frank and cordial recognition of choirs, not only by the higher style of music admitted, but by a mechanical suggestion of special pieces to be sung only by those trained in artistic skill. More than half a million of copies have gone into use among the churches of various denominations.

After a few years, however, there was need of a fuller recognition of psalm-versions in some congregations ; many pastors desired a separate grouping of the Psalms, in their order and in their familiar forms. The power of association rendered these versions dear for their own sake, even if a few should have to be restored to a less felicitous versification. Thus Dr. ROBINSON'S second book,

“PSALMS AND HYMNS AND SPIRITUAL SONGS,”

was published, and the opportunity was taken to introduce some of the later translations of the Scriptural Psalms and of the ancient and mediæval hymns, as well as some of the newer and already favorite tunes.

But what the churches evidently wanted was a manual resembling “Songs for the Sanctuary” in most of its features, though less bulky and less costly. During the fifteen years which have elapsed since that book was published, popular taste has been moving in two directions, almost opposite. Musicians demanded chorals, harmonized according to artistic rules ; tunes of a higher character

in style of composition. In one way and another the various churches had gained access to English and German manuals containing pieces which rapidly rose into favor.

Then, in the other direction, the people at large had been moving towards melodic and refrain tunes. Many most excellent hymns and versions of psalms found their way into the memories and hearts of Christians. How to group all these into a portable volume that should retain the old and yet make room for the new, that should recognize the chorals and keep the refrains, was a task of no light labor. This work Dr. ROBINSON has accomplished in his latest book,

“SPIRITUAL SONGS,”

with admirable skill. But no one can cast his eye over the pages, noting words, music, and adaptation, without seeing plainly that the author has drawn upon all his previous experience in arrangement and choice, and has heard gladly all that the churches have been saying as they tried to tell their real wants.

The following review of “Spiritual Songs” appeared in *The Congregationalist* of February 5, 1879, and is quoted here as an excellent comparison between two of Dr. ROBINSON’S most popular books:—

“DR. ROBINSON’S NEW HYMN-BOOK.

“Rev. C. S. ROBINSON, D. D., of New York City, the compiler of the ‘Songs for the Sanctuary,’ has just published a new hymn-book, ‘Spiritual Songs.’ As the former has been widely used and greatly liked, we have taken it as a suitable standard of comparison in studying the merits of the latter. The ‘Spiritual Songs’ contains nearly three hundred hymns less than its predecessor, and many which it includes are not in the other. This difference, however, is to the advantage of the new book. We always have wondered how a great many hymns in the ‘Songs for the Sanctuary’ ever found admission to its pages. It has been thoroughly winnowed, a number of admirable hymns have been added, and the result is the book before us. A few hymns which are valuable are not here, but few, if any, undeserving ones have been admitted, and among those added are some of the choicest, such as those beginning respectively, ‘There’s a wideness in God’s mercy,’ ‘The Son of God goes forth to war,’ and ‘Lord, my weak thought in vain would climb,’ without which no such book would be reasonably complete. Dr. ROBINSON has gathered his harvest with a cautious, yet catholic spirit, from a broad field, and has chosen only the best.

“As to music, the new book has about a hundred and seventy-five

more tunes than its predecessor. The old familiar friends are here, and care has been taken to add to them only such, in general, as seem worthy of so goodly a fellowship. Many rich tunes are included from German and English masters, and the more modern among our own composers are not unrepresented. The desires of our choirs, and of those who prefer congregational singing, have been met, perhaps, as well as is possible by the same book.

* * * * *

We must not omit to say, also, that words and music have been fitted to each other very successfully, and that both words and music are credited carefully to their authors. The hymns are well proportioned in number and variety to the different subjects, there are the usual indexes, and also an unusual and useful index of first lines of all the stanzas in the book. The Scriptural texts on the inside of the covers are very suitable, and the paper, type, and binding are good. * * * *

"We regard this book, on the whole, as the best hymn-book which we ever have seen, and we predict for it great favor with the church."
