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INTRODUCTION.

THE Catalogues comprised in this little volume form part of a series of communications on the local History of the County of Cork, which have, from time to time been contributed to the Cuvierian Society of this City. These, together with a list of the genera of our Insects by William Clear, Esq., were furnished to the British Association at their late meeting here, it being considered that information on the Natural History of the place visited, was suited for presentation to that body, and likely to be acceptable.

In consequence of a wish which was expressed by several members of the Natural History section of the Association, and being themselves convinced of the value of local catalogues in serving to correct the materials of more extended works, the Cuverian Society have undertaken the publication of this little work. 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PREFACE.

The present, so far as I am aware, is the first Catalogue of the Vertebrated Animals of the County of Cork which has been published. It was originally prepared in a tabular form, somewhat on the plan of Mr. Thompson's report on the Fauna of Ireland; but as its present shape seems best adapted for this little publication, I have considered it sufficient to give the following summary of the number of species in each class which have been found in the County, as compared with those of Great Britain and Ireland respectively.

For the knowledge of a considerable number of the rarer fishes in this list, I am indebted to my friend Robert Ball, Esq., of Dublin; who kindly furnished me with notes on the whole divison: the greater part of the remainder I have had opportunities of observing myself.

Vultur fulvus has only been met with in the one instance here recorded, in the British Isles: Turdus Whitei,

Glareola pratincola, and Naucrates ductor are likewise new to the Irish Fauna; and the only occurrence of Sciana aquila as an Irish species, was in Cork Harbour within a few years.

Since this Catalogue was printed, a female Dotterel (Charadrius morinellus Linn) came into my possession through the kindness of Mr. Olden of Winthrop Street, in this City. A single individual, obtained in Tipperary about two years since by Mr. Robert Davis, Jun., was the only instance I had heard of its occurrence in the South of Ireland before. I have also received a fine specimen of the Cinereous Shrike (Lanius excubitor Linn) which was shot by Mr. John Travers, of Commines near Carrigaline, a few days since.

Another individual, which, from the particulars kindly sent me by my friends George Armstrong & J. Fitz-Henry Townsend, Esqrs. I have little hesitation in referring to this species also, ran in amongst the rocks at Glandore Harbour this summer (1844), and was taken. It was a male, and measured 74 feet in length and 30 in girth. Length of head about 18 feet; gape from point of nose to angle of mouth, 16 feet. The longest plates of baleen were 2½ feet, the shortest 6 inches. Tail 18 feet from tip to tip. One small thick dorsal fin at a distance of 9 feet from the tail. The colour was black above, and a mottled grey on the under surface. The skin of the belly and under parts was thrown into very distinct longitudinal folds. The pectoral fins were of enormous power, but their measurement is not given.

Class AVES.

Of the occurrence of this, the first individual either of the genus or species hitherto recorded in the British Isles, I have received the following particulars from my friend Mr. Ball of Dublin, who obtained the specimen from the Earl of Shannon, and has deposited it in the Museum of Trinity College Dublin. The bird, which was until lately, alive at his lordship's residence at Castlemartyr, and was supposed to be an Eagle, was recognized by Admiral Bowles as a Vulture, and attention drawn to it in consequence. It had been taken about a year before on the rocks in Cork Harbour, and when brought to Lord Shannon's, was in perfect plumage, and presented no indications of ever having been in confinement. From this it does not seem likely that it could have escaped from a ship; on the contrary there is more reason for considering it a rare occasional visitant. Again, being a European bird, and extending its range as far as Switzerland, it was at least as likely to have occurred as the Egyptian Vulture (Neophron percnopterus, Linn. sp.) which has been met with once or twice in Britain.

There can be little doubt that the Kite (Milous Ictinus, Sav.) was a resident a century since. Smith, (Hist. Cork Vol. 2. p. 321. 1750.) describes it as "common" under the name of Melous candâ forcipata, a description which could only have applied to this bird. The Goshawk and the Gentil Falcon, (which last is the young Goshawk) he probably confounded with the Peregrine Falcon. This bird is to be found at present in the same localities to which he referred them.

I am inclined to believe that the Wood-wren (S. sibilatrix, Bechst) is entitled to the place in the Catalogue of Irish Birds which Mr. Thompson doubtfully assigns to it, on the authority of a friend. This gentleman's observations as to the nest being lined with feathers, contrary to the account of it in the different systematic works, entirely coincide with those of my late friend and relative Mr. Henry Fennell of Ballybrado in the County of Tipperary. This talented young gentleman, who was an ardent Ornithologist, closely observed, a few years since, a bird which appeared to him new, and he found both nest and eggs precisely answering the description given by Mr. Thompson in the Annals of Natural History (vol. 1. p. 22.) The nest was "profusely lined with feathers," and the eggs (two of which are now in my possession) quite differently spotted from those of the Willow Wren and much more densely covered. The bird was larger than either the Willow Wren or Chiff-chaff, and whiter underneath.†

Smith (Hist. Cork, vol. 2. p. 300.) enumerates the Great Plover, (Edicnemus crepitans) amongst the Birds of Cork. It has not been met with of late years within the county, but my friend Richard D. Parker, Esq., of Sundays Well, writes me that he met two of these "large solitary Plover" on the wild mountains of Iveragh, County of Kerry, in August 1842. He had full opportunity of observing them, "for," says he, they seemed fond of perching on the rough knolls on the mountain; they allowed me toapproach within ten or twelve yards of them, when they rose, and uttered a shrill whistle." Both this gentleman, and his brother Mr. Adam Parker, are intimately acquainted with our native Birds and their habits. In but one instance, so far as I know, had this bird been met with in Ireland before.

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
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PREFACE.

PREFACE.

DR. C. SMITH in his History of Cork in 1750, DR. W. WADE in his Plantæ Rariores Hiberniæ 1804, and Mr. J. T. MACKAY in 1806, noticed a few of the rarer native plants of the County of Cork; but there was no attempt at a systematic catalogue of our Flora till 1819—20, when Mr. James Drummond curator of the then existing Cork Botanic Garden, and now Colonial Botanist at Swan River, published a list of our Flowering Plants in the Munster Farmers Magazine.—Vols. vi & vii.

Doctor Scott of Cove gave a comprehensive catalogue of the native plants of the Great Island in 1833; and our townsman, Mr. H. T. ALEXANDER, now Surgeon in the Royal Navy, presented to the Cuvierian Society of this City, a list embracing the entire Flora of the County, (the Fungi excepted,) for which an honorary prize was awarded by the Society,

These catalogues, a collection of manuscript botanical notes by the Rev. Dr. Hincks, which he has kindly permitted me the use of, and the records of the Cuvierian Society, together with my own extensive practical

observations, have constituted the chief materials for these pages. I am also much indebted to many of my botanical friends and acquaintances for several lengthened and highly valuable communications, but it would occupy too much space to particularize, in this place, each individual who has given assistance, and it is fortunately the less necessary, as I have invariably under particular species duly acknowledged the claims of each contributor.

Mr. Denis Murray gardener to William M. Reeves of Vosterburgh, Esq., a most intelligent and indefatigable practical botanist, has with few exceptions contributed the entire list of Fungi as well as many other important additions to our Flora at various times, for which he has received honorary prizes from the Cuvierian Society.

In putting together these materials, I have adopted the most approved natural arrangement; and the nomenclature used by Mr. C. C. Babington in his excellent Manual of British Botany, which generally corresponds with that of the London and Edinburgh Botanical Societies. For the more common species I have omitted authorities, and always given the nearest station to the City in which they may be found; thus making this little work, more especially a Flora of the vicinity of Cork; for the rarer species I have given the stations with precision, and the names of the first and subsequent discoverers in chronological order.

The following comparative table of the number of species contained in Mackay's Flora Hibernica, the lists of Messrs. Drummond and Alexander, and the present

catalogue, will serve to convey an idea of the extent of our local Flora, as well as of the additions which are now made to it.

Since these pages went to press I have observed the Hypericum maculatum (Crartz) to be our commonest species and hitherto apparently confounded with H. dubium, which is comparatively rare. Conferva fontinalis has been found in a pool at Willowbrook, Cork, by Miss Ball; and Mr. D. Murray has discovered around the City the following Cryptogamic plants;—Ozonium auricoma, Agaricus gramulosus, A. cerussatus, A. cochleatus, Pollyporus perennis, P. frondosus, Boletus luteus B. luridus, Fistulina hepatica, Hydnum zonatum, (Fr. Epie.) cyathiforme, (Syst. Mycolog,) new to Britain, and Clavaria abietina.

With a view to the extension of our Flora, in a future edition specimens of *New* or *Rare* species with the stations, correctly marked, will be gratefully received and duly acknowledged.

8. R. lingua, L. Great Spearwort. Blarney river, near the castle: Mr. J. Drummond. Inchidony island, Clonakilty bay: Mr. W. C. Nash. It is still in the former station, the latter I have not visited .- very rare.

9. R. ficaria, L. Pilewort Crowfoot. By the Mardyke, and on

old hedgebanks .- very common.

10. auricomus, L. Wood Crowfoot. At Leemount, and by the Lee: Mr. J. Drummond. In a Wood and grove at Blarney: Mr. D. Murray, Dr. Power.—rather rare.

11. R. acris, L. Upright Crowfoot. In the Palace and other

marshes .- very common.

12. R. repens, L. Creeping Crowfoot. By the Mardyke, and in moist pastures in all parts of the county .- very common.

13. R. bulbosus, L. Bulbous Crowfoot. Glasheen and damps fields.-very common.

14. R. sceleratus, L. Celery Crowfoot. In the Monarea, Douglas and most other salt marshes .- rather common.

15. R. parviflorus, L. Small-flowered Crowfoot. Near Carrigrohane castle: Mr. J. Drummond. Near the town of Cove: Dr. Scott. By the Glanmire road: Rev. W. Hincks. 
