HE following family records and biographical sketches were collected and compiled by Howard Soule, Esq., the distinguished civil engineer of Syracuse, N. Y. Although rising eighty years of age when he began his extensive correspondence, the result of his painstaking

researches shows thorough discrimination and accuracy.

We have no documentary proof of the parentage of Elijah Soule whose name stands at the head of this pedigree, but there were several good reasons for assuming that he was a son of Benjamin Soule who was a son of George Soule, "Blacksmith," and Lydia (Howland) Soule, and a brother of Judge Ebenezer Soule of Hillsdale, N. Y. This family, so early settled in the "Great Nine Partners," Dutchess County, New York, were the progenitors of several extensive branches of the Soule and Soules family whose descendants, numbering many hundreds, are now scattered through the United States and the British Provinces; families who have produced many men and women of the highest intelligence and excellency of moral character.

Elijah Soule (1) was probably born in Connecticut or the western part of Massachusetts, but brought up not distant from Dover Plains, in Dutchess County, N. Y., where he was married and where several of his children were born. Sometime before the year 1800 he removed with his family to Saratoga County, thence to Sennett, Cayuga County, N. Y. He was born Feb. 14, 1757, and was married to Lydia Howard of an old New England family from whom several of the early Soules selected their wives. She was the mother of his children and died his widow (being born Jan. 12, 1765), June 12, 1844, at Sennett, Cayuga County, N. Y. He was appointed Ensign in the State Militia of New York by Governor Clinton in 1792 as a resident of Dutchess County. He was a farmer, and died April 22, 1825, aged 68 years, 2-8. He was buried in the Baptist cemetery at Sennett, N. Y. He was mentioned in the Census of 1790. Served during the Revolution in the Militia. There were twelve children whose names will follow.



The town of Sennett, N. Y., was subsequently called Brutus.

Biography of the Family.

- George Soule (1), eldest son of Elijah (1) and Lydia (Howard) Soule, born in Dover, Dutchess County, N. Y., Oct. 2, 1786, moved with his father's family to Sennett, now Brutus, Cayuga County, N. Y. He was an expert millwright and accumulated a moderate fortune, retiring from active life when about sixty years of age. He was a close reader and well informed in the important questions of his day. He lived a bachelor and died at Sennett, N. Y., Dec. 25, 1862. He was buried in the "Soule Cemetery," near Auburn, N. Y. 2. Howard Soule (1), second son of Elijah (1) and Lydia (Howard) Soule, born at Dover, Dutchess County, N. Y., Oct. 2, 1789; moved to Saratoga County, N. Y., thence to Sennett, now Brutus, Cayuga County, N. Y., where he learned the business of tanning and conducted the trade of tanner and currier, owning and managing a farm at the same time. He was supervisor of Sennett and afterwards elected to the office of justice of the peace for many years, in which capacity he was known as "The Peacemaker" among litigants. He was a captain in a company of the State militia and a much respected citizen. He died April 24, 1875, and was buried in the Sennett Cemetery. In 1815 he married Sopнia Wright, daughter of Thomas and Sybil Wright, born Aug. 11, 1794, died July 11, 1840 at Sennett, N. Y. Eight children named as follows:
 - I. FANNY JANE SOULE (1), born in Sennett, N. Y., Jan. 24, 1816; died April 9, 1897, at Port Byron, N. Y. She taught school in her native village several years, and in 1837 was married to ARCHIBALD M. GREEN who was born Feb. 14, 1814, a successful merchant, farmer and politician, residing at Port Byron, Cayuga County, N. Y., where he died Jan. 16, 1888. She died April 9, 1897. They had one son:
 - (1) GEORGE HOWARD GREEN, born at Port Byron, N. Y., Jan. 13, 1843, a commercial traveler and capitalist, residing at Auburn, N. Y. He married Leila Worthey of Wolcott, N. Y., born Dec. 11, 1853, and they have a son, Archibald

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Worthey Green, born June 25, 1893, and now (1915) a

student at Yale College.

II. MARTHA ANN SOULE (1), born in Sennett, N. Y., May 16, 1818; in 1835 was married to ARTHUR STEVENSON of Auburn, N. Y., a commercial traveler who has held county and state offices. Hotel proprietor and timber merchant. Dying at Weedsport, N. Y., May 28, 1879, his widow moved to Auburn, N. Y., dying there July 14, 1906. They had two sons named as follows:

(1) Howard Soule Stevenson, born in Auburn, N. Y., Aug. 3, 1839 and died there Feb. 6, 1911. He was a manufacturer of mowers and reapers at Auburn for several years, and in the manufacture of pianos in Kingston, Canada. He married on Jan. 30, 1867 Cornelia A. Patten of Auburn, N. Y., born March 29, 1846, dying Sept. 19, 1879. They had two children:

(a) ADA STEVENSON, born in Auburn, N. Y., Nov. 18, 1868; was married to Dr. Henry D. Wheeler of that town April 17, 1895, born Feb. 19, 1870 and died June 10, 1902. His widow, a graduate of the State Normal School, was teaching at Geneva Grammar School in 1915.

(b) HERBERT B. STEVENSON, born Feb. 23, 1870, married MAUDE STURGIS of Auburn, N. Y., March 1, 1892. She died Sept. 19, 1909. They had two children,

III. GEORGE WRIGHT SOULE (1), third son of Howard Soule, born in Sennett, N. Y., Jan. 23, 1820, died there March 19, 1823.

IV. Mary Sophia Soule (1), fourth child of Howard Soule, born at Sennett, N. Y., Oct. 12, 1822, married John R. Page of that town in 1848. A farmer. Dealer and breeder of Durham cattle. An artist of considerable skill; a delineator of fine cattle for the annual herd book, also an authority on the pedigrees of fine bred cattle; well known breeder of fine stock, both in the United States and England. He died at Sennett, N. Y., Nov. 20, 1905. They had one son, John Howard Page, born in Sennett, N. Y., July 19, 1854, died there March 8, 1854. Mrs. Page died at Sennett, Jan. 15, 1895. All were buried in the "Soule Cemetery" near Auburn, N. Y.

V. EMILY EVELINE SOULE (1), fifth child of Howard Soule, born in Sennett, N. Y., Dec. 1, 1824, was married to Rev. Spencer M. Rice about 1846, Episcopal pastor of Grace Church, Jersey City, N. J., for many years, dying there in 1909. Mrs. Rice died at Jersey City,

Oct. 16, 1888. Their children were as follows:

(1) EMILY E. RICE, born at Jordan, N. Y., June 29, 1849, was married to GEORGE M. PATTEN at Jersey City, N. J., July 23, 1872, who was long engaged in the manufacture of agricultural implements with his residence at Poughkeepsie, N. Y. They had two daughters:

> HELEN HOWARD PATTEN, born at Yonkers, N. Y., Nov. 18, 1876, was married to George H. Booth of Poughkeepsie, N. Y., Oct. 9, 1900, she dying at New-



HOWARD SOULE, IR., born at Sennett, N. Y., Dec. 8, 1829; married SARAH A. LEONARD, Aug. 1, 1850, she dying at Syracuse, N. Y., July 28, 1904. He died Dec. 10, 1924, aged 95 years.

As a civil engineer Howard Soule, Jr., had a large experience on public works, locating, planning and constructing canals and railroads, and in designing and superintending the construction of storage reservoirs and feeders to supply water to the canals of the State of New York; as constructor, in designing and constructing iron highway and railway bridges; in building portions of the West Shore Railroad in Central New York. Also work on the Welland and Erie Canals. As consulting engineer, planned and designed all the mechanical structures, the conduit lines and reservoirs for the Syracuse city water works.

He was elected a member of the American Society of Civil Engineers in 1866. Was in the service of the State of New York as Resident and Division Engineer in charge of a part of the Erie and Oswego Canal enlargement for many years; and in charge of the draining of the Cayuga marshes by the State of New York. He was many times called a witness as an expert in hydraulics in connection with suits brought against the State of New York on account of alleged overflow of water caused by the construction and operation of the State's canals; was consulted by United States engineers regarding the methods of calculating the quantity of water required to supply canals. Mr. Soule was fond of field and water sports, and spent many days each year in their pursuit. Retiring from active work in 1912, he is at the age of 86 enjoying life at his home in Syracuse, N. Y.

Howard Soule's Birthday.

A distinguished and interesting figure in our local group of octogenarians is Howard Soule who observes his eighty-sixth birthday today. As a civil engineer, and particularly as a specialist in construction work, Mr. Soule had earned an honorable and extended reputation before middle-aged readers of these lines were born. James K. Polk was President of the United States, the

His has therefore been a wonderful record, but in point of years it has not been more noteworthy than its solid and durable achievements. Our local columns today tell something of his honorable connection with great public undertakings in this and other cities—a professional service of manifold kinds that has been from first to last as conscientious as it has been skillful. Mr. Soule is still in excellent health, and the Herald takes pleasure in extending to him its congratulations and high regards on this interesting occasion.—From the Syracuse Herald, Dec. 8, 1915.

VIII. WRIGHT LYMAN SOULE, born at Sennett, N. Y., Aug. 8, 1840; died Oct. 16, 1914, in the house where he was born, "Soule House." He married Mary Esther Barnes in 1860; she died Dec. 13, 1862, leaving two children of whom hereafter. He was a farmer and at times engaged on Public Works in New York and Canada; was a quiet, contented, home-loving citizen. He married second, Mary Pauline Tyler at Sennett, N. Y., Dec. 9, 1888. She was born in 1846 and was living at "Soule House" in 1915. No issue.

3. Betsey Soule (1), eldest daughter of Elijah (1) and Lydia (Howard) Soule, born in Dover, N. Y., June 22, 1791; moved with her parents to Sennett, N. Y., where she was married to a farmer named TIBBLES near Auburn, N. Y., about 1818. Time of his death unknown. She died his widow Feb. 26, 1829.

These had two children, named as follows:

I. Melissa A. Tibbles, born at Auburn, N. Y., Oct. 23, 1820; was married to Richard K. Swift of Owasco, Cayuga County, N. Y., June 14, 1835. He moved and became a prominent banker at Chicago, Ill. Afterwards became a farmer in Missouri and died at Gray's Point in that state, Sept. 28, 1883. His widow died March 22, 1895; both buried at Gray's Point, Mo. These had three children. See foot-notes.

II. EMILY A. TIBBLES, born March 10, 1825, second daughter of Betsey Soule Tibbles, born at Sennett, N. Y., went to Chicago when but a young girl, where she was married to John B. King about 1855 and died Nov. 9, 1910, as his widow. Mr. King was a dealer in real estate and his son, Vere King, is in the same line of business; unmarried. He was living in 1915 at the family seat, 3645 Vernon Avenue, Chicago Ill. The father died Oct. 2, 1864.

4. Lyman Soule (1), third son of Elijah (1) and Lydia (Howard) Soule, born in Dover, N. Y., March 18, 1794; moved with his parents to Sennett, Cayuga

Note.—There was a tradition, and it was published, that the late Lyman Soule, Esq., was buried in a glass casket, but his nephew, the late Howard Soule of Syracuse, N. Y., informed the author of this work that this was unfounded and absolutely untrue. There

County, N. Y., and in early life was engaged with his brother Howard in the tanning business near the village of Sennett. Abandoning that, he later began working at a salary in various employments, and occasionally making loans of money, discounting notes; gradually accumulating capital, making loans on real estate mortgages, always living inexpensively. He was elected supervisor of the town of Sennett several terms. In 1850, he established and was made president of a commercial bank at Weedsport, N. Y. After acting in that capacity for a few years resigned, transferred his stock and turned his activities to Auburn, N. Y. Continuing in loaning money and investing in real property and bank stocks, he accumulated a large fortune. He established his two brothers, twins, each on a farm in the town of Victory, N. Y., for life, and after to their children. He donated to the city of Auburn a large tract of land for a cemetery to be named the "Soule Cemetery." In disposing of his large estate by will, he left valuable bequests to three charitable institutions in the city of Auburn; the residue being left to nieces, nephews, clergymen and friends, numbering sixty-seven legatees; and a bequest to the city of Auburn, the income from which to be used to care for his burial lot and monument and in beautifying the cemetery grounds. He lived a single and simple life and died Nov. 28, 1885.

5. Mary Soule (1), second daughter of Elijah (1) and Lydia (Howard) Soule, born in Dover, Dutchess County, N. Y., Nov. 16, 1795; was married to JOHN S. EVERTS in about 1813, a farmer near Auburn, N. Y. She died at Sennett, N. Y., Jan. 8, 1875, being the mother of five children whose names will follow.

was another statement that Lyman Soule and a close friend of his made an agreement to have made a stone casket in which the one who died first should be laid out and the receptacle sunk in Owasco Lake about two miles south of Auburn, N. Y. No one seems to know whether they bought the stone casket, or what became of the man

Woodin. Certainly, Lyman Soule was buried in a very plain cloth-covered casket.

The gift of the "Soule Cemetery" to the city of Auburn, N. Y., by Lyman Soule was located on land where there had long been a burying ground with tablets dated as early as 1806. He purchased about 48 acres adjoining and built a fine vault, a residence for the sexton, a fine building, a barn, etc. A pamphlet comprising a full account of the gift was issued. In this cemetery Lyman Soule had a fine vault built in which he was buried alone. On the large monument there is engraved, "This monument marks the resting place of Lyman Soule who donated the most of the ground and built at his own expense the beautiful receiving vault at the gate." This inscription is on the east side. On the north side, "Lyman Soule, March 12, 1794—November 28, 1885." On the top of the momnuent are the letters "L. S." On the base, "Lyman Soule." A sign bearing the inscription "Perpetual Care" is fixed on the lot. He left for the Cemetery use \$20,000 for upkeep and improvement, and great improvement has been made since his death. Another Soule lot (four lots in one) contains a momunent costing \$2,900.00, besides markers weighing a ton each, costing \$35.00 each. The monument stands in the center where the four corners meet.

Later he surveyed lines for railroads between the city of Auburn and Lake Ontario, and afterwards engaged for a time on the construction of the railroad from Auburn to Fair Haven on Lake Ontario. In 1856 was engaged as assistant engineer on the enlargement of the Erie Canal at Medina, N. Y. In 1859, he became a medical practitioner, continuing till his death June 19, 1903.

Wright Family.

Soules In Revolutionary War.

Jonathan Soule enlisted in December, 1777, under Capt. John Worthley of North Yarmouth in the District of Maine for three months, marching to Danbury, Conn., thence to Peekskill, N. Y., and served there at King's Bridge, White Plains and Tarrytown for four months. He stated that he never had a written discharge. He was in Colonel Fogg's regiment and McDougal's brigade. He enlisted June 1, 1779 at Newburyport, Mass., and went on board the Continental or State brig-of-war "Pallas," Capt. James Johnson, for an expedition against the British at Penobscot, called the "Bagaduce Expedition." This brig carried 16 guns. He continued in the service until the expedition closed. He was discharged in December, 1779. This brig was cruising off Gouldsborough when the British fleet arrived and thereby met the fate of the rest of the American fleet.

He applied for a pension Aug. 17, 1832, Was born at North Yarmouth (Maine), July 26, 1756 (another gives his birth as July 13, 1756). Removed to Freeport (Maine) in 1785, where his application was dated. His claim was allowed and his certificate issued Oct. 26, 1832, No. 1135, Maine agency, Massachusetts sea service.

Robert Anderson of Lewiston, Me., aged 76 years in 1832, testified to service with Mr. Soule in Captain Worthley's Company.

Samuel Scales of Freeport, 75 in 1832, was with him in the armed brig "Pallas" in 1779.

Job Soule enlisted about April, 1776, under Capt. Benjamin Durfee in Col. Cook's regiment of Rhode Island, stationed at the "Dudly Souse," so-called, on Rhode Island, and at the Malbone Place. Served three months and was discharged and returned home. He belonged to the militia of Tiverton and in the early part of 1777 the militia was classed and the class to which he belonged was called out to serve one-third of the time. During 1777 he served three months under Capt. Ebenezer Slocum, stationed at Fogland Ferry and Howland's Ferry. He was in Spencer's expedition and assisted in collecting the boats at that time. In 1778 he was out in the service four months, a part of that time under Capt. Jacob Soule, at Fogland Ferry, and part under Capt. Ebenezer Slocum, both companies being under Colonel Cook. He was on the island in Sullivan's expedition and stationed at Howland's Ferry. He served two months in 1779 under Capt. Ebenezer Slocum and Daniel Devol, stationed at Howland's Ferry.

He applied for pension July 30, 1833. Residence at time of application, Westport, Bristol County, Mass. Was born in Tiverton, R. I., where he enlisted. Claim allowed for 12 months. Issued Nov. 9, 1833, Mass. agency, Rhode Island service.

Godfrey King, of Tiverton, R. I., aged 82 years in 1833, testified to service in Sullivan's expedition with Job Soule, formerly of Tiverton, who now resides in Westport, Mass. King was a Captain in Benjamin Durfee's company.

William Bordon, of Tiverton, aged 78 years in 1833, testified to service with Job Soule in Captain Durfee's company.

Jeremiah Dwelly of Westport, formerly of Tiverton, R. I., 77 in 1833, testified to service with Job Soule in 1775 and 1778.

Simeon Soule died at Duxbury, Mass., Dec. 21, 1831, aged 80 years. Wife was Asenath Weston, to whom married November, 1803. She applied for bounty land Aug. 2, 1855. Was granted 160 acres. Warrant No. 40,700. Widow's age 77 years. Her residence at time of application, Duxbury, Mass. She stated that her husband was a private in the Revolution under Capt. Nathan Sampson and Col. Thomas Lothrop, on alarm at Rhode Island. He was drafted from Duxbury, Mass., about Dec. 10, 1776. Had heard her husband say he was at Dorchester at the building of the forts, but cannot say how long he served, thought about a month, and was honorably discharged. She made this declaration for purpose of obtaining bounty land to which she was entitled under the act of March 3, 1855.

Samuel Soule enlisted in Providence, R. I., in March, 1782, under Capt. Thomas Hughes in Jeremiah Olney's regiment, Rhode Island Line, and was stationed sometime at Philadelphia, Penn. He served to the close of the war and was honorably discharged at Saratoga, N. Y. He applied for a pension April 27, 1818, his age being 62 years. His residence at time of application was Broad Albin, N. Y., Montgomery County. His claim was allowed. Certificate issued Sept. 6, 1819, act of March 18, 1818. Certificate No. 14,814, New York agency, Rhode Island service.

Jonathan Rounds, "one of the people called Quakers," testified in 1818 that he was in the same regiment with Samuel Soule in Philadelphia, in 1782; also Enoch Place, of Wilton, Saratoga County, N. Y., who was a sergeant in the same regiment. In 1820 Samuel Soule sent to the Department a schedule of his personal effects. Had no real estate. He mentioned his wife Rebecca aged 57 as "infirm." He was bred a farmer and worked at it while able but was then old and unable to labor and was dependent entirely upon his pension for support. See Soules of Broadalbin, N. Y.

David Soule, enlisted early in the campaign of 1776, for six months, under Captain Barber and Lieut, Ichabod Hinckly in Colonel Sage's Regiment of which ---- Russell was Lieut. Colonel. This regiment was in Gen. Wadsworth's Brigade. Marched to New York where he was stationed a while, then stationed on Governor's Island, was there during the battle of Long Island and retreated to New York. He was on guard near where the British landed on New York Island. He was in the battle of Harlem, then marched to Kings Bridge to near Frog's Point, and when the British landed retreated to White A few days later he was wounded in the head by a stone from the wall from behind which he lay and was sent to the hospital at Norwalk, Conn. His six months expired on Christmas day, 1776, but he was not able to return home until the January following. He was drafted in the spring of 1777 for two months and served under Captain Robinson of Stratford, Conn. Marched first to Providence, R. I., thence to Warner, where he was discharged at the end of his term. About one month later he enlisted for ten months and served under Captain Converse, Ensign Lathrop, Col. McLaren's regiment. Was stationed at Tiverton, near Howland's Ferry, R. I. Entire service as private.

From 1776 to 1780, he resided at Tolland, Connecticut, then for about six years at Wilbraham, Mass., then as long at Westfield, Mass., then seven years

at Northampton, Mass., and in 1799 went to Manlius, N. Y.

He applied for pension Sept. 11, 1832. Was born at Tiverton, R. I., June 10, 1758. Residence when application made, Manlius, N. Y. Claim allowed, for ten months service. Issued July 9, 1833. Act of June 7, 1832. Certificate No. 14,843, New York Agency, Connecticut Service.

Jacob Soule was a private in Capt. Nathaniel Wood's Company, Col. Eben. Sproutts' Regiment. Enlisted service May 6th, discharged May 9th; enlisted service Sept. 6th, discharged Sept. 12th; service 9 days. Company marched on two alarms at Dartmouth in 1778. Roll dated Middleborough, Mass.

Asa Soule of Duxbury, Mass., was a private in the company of Capt. Samuel Bradford, regiment of Col. Theophilus Cotton, Aug. 1, 1775. Enlisted May 1, 1775, service 3 months and 8 days; also company rations dated Roxbury Camp Oct. 7, 1775.

Amasa Soule of Duxbury, Mass., was a private in the company of Lieut. Nathaniel Tibbetts' detachment Sept. 8, 1779; discharged Nov. 1, 1779; his service one month 25 days, at Penobscot. Served with guards under Maj. William Lithgow on the seacoast in Lincoln County.

Bildad Soule was a private in the company of Capt. Enos Parker, the regiment of Col. Jacob Gerrish, of Guards, enlisted July 7, 1778; discharged Nov. 18, 1778; service 4 months, 14 days. His regiment was detached from the Berkshire County militia to guard stores at Springfield for 6 months from July 1, 1778. He was drummer in Capt. John Collar's company in the regiment of Col. John Ashley (Berkshire) regiment. Entered the service July 19, 1779, discharged Aug. 27, 1779; service 1 month 9 days. Company marched to Connecticut under Lieut. Col. Powell; also pay roll for 6-months men raised by the town of New Marlborough for service in the Continental army during 1780. Marched to camp July 2, 1780; discharged Dec. 3, 1780. Service 5 months and 6 days. Travel 92 miles included.

Ichabod Soule was with men discharged from the militia of North Yarmouth to reinforce the Continental army as returned to Samuel Thompson, Brigadier for Cumberland County, dated North Yarmouth, Dec. 8, 1776; also a private in the company of Capt. George Rogers and regiment of Col. Nathaniel Jordan. Enlisted Sept. 28, 1779; discharged Oct. 23, 1779. Service one month at Falmouth.

Josiah Soule. Payroll for six-months men raised to reinforce the Continental Army during 1780. Reported deserted.

Micah Soule was a private in the company of Capt. Ebenezer Washburne and regiment of Col. Ebenezer Brooks of Guards service from Feb. 3, 1778 to April 3, 1778; two months at Cambridge.

James Soule of Middleborough, Mass., was a private in the company of Nehemiah Allen and the regiment of Col. Theophilus Cotton. Service 31 days on the second expedition to Rhode Island in September and October, 1777.

James Soule of Plympton, Mass., was mustered by James Hatch, muster-master for Plymouth, to serve in New England States until Jan. 1, 1779. He was in Captain Sampson's Company. His residence was in Plympton and was engaged from that town.

James Soule was a private in the company of Capt, Jeremiah Hill and the regiment of Col. Edmond Phinney, the muster roll dated "Garrison at Fort George" Dec. 8, 1776. He enlisted Jan. 4, 1776.

James Soule, Jr., was a private in the company of Capt. Nathaniel Wood in Col. Ebenezer Sprout's regiment. His enlistment May 6, 1778; discharged May 9, 1778. Service 3 days. Company marched on two alarms at Dartmouth, one in May and one in September, 1778. Roll dated at Middleborough, Mass.

James Soule, 3d, was a private in the company of Capt. Nathaniel Wood and the regiment of Col. Ebenezer Sproutts. He entered the service May 6, discharged May 9th. He entered the service again Sept. 6; discharged Sept. 12th; service 9 days. Company marched on two alarms at Dartmouth in 1778. Roll dated Middleborough, Mass.

John Soule was a lieutenant over men detached from the militia of North Yarmouth, District of Maine, to reinforce the Continental Army as returned to Samuel Thompson, brigadier for Cumberland County; dated at North Yarmouth Dec. 3, 1776. He was also First Lieutenant in Capt. John Gray's company and the regiment of Col. Nathaniel Mitchell. Entered service July 7, 1779. Was 2 months and 6 days on the Penobscot Expedition; roll dated North Yarmouth.

John Soule was a private in the company of Capt. Jonah Washburn in Col. Ebenezer White's regiment. Marched Aug. 1, 1780; discharged Aug. 9, 1780. His company marched to Rhode Island on an alarm. Roll sworn to at Middleborough, Mass.

John Soule, 2d, was a private in the company of Capt. Nathaniel Wood in the regiment of Col. Ebenezer Sproutts. Entered service May 6, discharged May 9; entered service again Sept. 6, discharged Sept. 12th. Company marched on two alarms at Dartmouth, in 1778. Roll dated Middleborough.

Jonathan Soule was a private in the company of Capt. Calvin Partridge in Col. John Cushing's regiment; was drafted Sept. 23, 1776. Service 1 month 2 days. Company marched to Rhode Island.

Nathan P. Soule, aged 21, enlisted at East Bridgewater, Mass., Sept. 12, 1814, under Capt. Cyrus Allen, 3d Mass. Regiment militia. Discharged last of October, 1814, at Dorchester Heights, Mass. Received Land Bounty Warrant. Soldier died Nov. 15, 1867, at Bridgewater; certificate Frank Smith, Town Clerk. Widow applied for pension. Claim admitted. Residence, Bridgewater, Mass. Charity Brett was married to Nathan P. Soule April 8, 1815, by John Reed. Lived ten years in Middleborough, Mass., after that in Bridgewater, Mass. She died Sept. 5, 1880. Testimony, James W. Soule, East Bridgewater, Mass.

Israel Soule enlisted (drafted) June 18, 1814, at Westport, Mass., and served 36 days under Lieutenant Tomkins, Mass. militia, from June 18 to July 24, 1814. Discharged July 24, 1814, at Westport, Mass. Resided in that town. Farmer and fisherman. Received Bounty Land Warrant "20 years ago;" about 80 acres each. Applied for pension April 11, 1878, aged 83 and a half years. Age at time of enlistment, 20 years. Wife Abigail aged 80 years. Soldier died Nov. 23, 1894. Paid last, March 4, 1892, Samuel Howland as a witness, aged 51 years. "Knew Israel Soule 25 years and identify him as a soldier."

John Soule, enlisted Sept. 2, 1814, under Capt. John Shaver and Colonel Jetman, New York militia. Volunteered. Was discharged Dec. 2, 1814, at Sacketts Harbor, N. Y. Had two Bounty Land Warrants under Acts 1850-1855. He applied for pension April 28, 1871, aged 76 years. Claim admitted. Residence. Brooklyn, N. Y. Wife, Harriet Lindsey, to whom married about June, 1817 or 1819. Two children, a son, and a daughter, a widow with two children. Soldier died Dec. 7, 1879. An affidavit of continued life of his widow, Harriet Soule, by Adam Soules, of Brooklyn, N. Y., June 23, 1887.

Jehiel Soule, of Waterville, Me., enlisted at Saco, Me., March 12, 1814, during the war under Capt. Benjamin Adams and Col. Isaac Lane. He was transferred to Capt. Benjamin Dunn's company, same regiment, and marched to the frontier. Joined the regiment at Plattsburg, N. Y., Sept. 10, 1814. He was wounded there in his right knee. Pension increased in October, 1856. Aged 49 in 1832. Bounty Land Warrant granted. Discharged at Plattsburg.

Jesse Soule, enlisted Dec. 24, 1812, under Capt. Thomas R. White and Col. Dana McCobb. He was discharged Dec. 29, 1813, at Burlington, Vt. His wife was Caroline A. Cummings to whom he was married at Freeport, Me., Nov. 27, 1832. He applied for pension Mar. 30, 1871 at Freeport. Claim allowed. Age 80 years. Had Land Warrant. Life-long resident of Freeport.

Rufus W. Soule enlisted Sept. 24, 1814, under Capt. Daniel Beal and Col. Sweet, Massachusetts or New Hampshire militia. Engaged in building a fort at Cape Head, at the mouth of the Kennebec River. Was discharged Nov. 5, 1814. He applied for pension Sept. 1, 1876; claim rejected. Applied again March 19, 1878, and claim was allowed. Application made at Waukegan, Ill. His wife, Ursula Soule, married at Sodus, N. Y., Feb. 12, 1832. Witness: Thomas Lancaster, New Sharon, Me., who served with him.

Soulis Family In Nova Scotia.

Early Homes of the Soulis Families.

Normandie.

HE followers of Rollo the Ganger made Normandy the "Garden of France." This province, called in French "Normandie," borders on the English Channel and is divided into several departments. It is a richly cultivated land resembling a garden in many districts.

The inhabitants are the descendants of the old Norsemen and bear the distinctive mark of their splendid ancestors. They are intelligent, strongly built, of noble and energetic character; warm-hearted and patriotic, they produce some of the best sailors and tillers of the soil to be found in Europe. It was in the northwestern section of this province, upon the elevated "tablelands," where the Norman pioneers established themselves and upon these broad intervales that they built their picturesque cottages and adopted their agricultural lives. This territory became a vineland and a pastoral land, for the peasant population devoted themselves to the cultivation of the grape and the herding of cattle. There was a glamour of the picturesque like the lining of a silver cloud that invested the whole landscape with unrivalled grandeur and attractiveness. The rustic cottages seated in the mist of verdant fields and vineyards, ornamented with flowers, presented a remarkably attractive appearance; while the happy-hearted families supplemented the beauties of the natural and architectural features with the intellectual radiance that surpassed all other specimens of attraction. Full of the vivacity of excellent health and possessing the inherited attribute of cheerfulness, when the day's work was done they gathered about their door-plots and thrilled the vibrant air of the evenings with the music of pipes and the voice of song. Around these charming homes upon the foothills of the Pyrenees, the cattle and sheep were nourished upon the verdure made succulent by the moisture from the neighboring seas, and the soothing tinkling of their bells added to the universal charm of the locality.

However, the inhabitants of this rich territorial heritage did not all belong to the so-called peasant class. When Rollo became the occupant of this province he did not forget those who had been subordinates and had cast in their fate with his adventure, but recognized their service by rewarding them with a deserving landed estate; from these ancestors were derived those Sieurs de Soules who erected their strongholds, called Chateaus, upon the more lofty eminences that overlooked the opulent valleys where their kindred dwelt. Adopting and introducing the feudal system which had already found a foothold in France, Rollo was found the supporter of cast and transmitted this principle to his grandson, William the Conqueror, who followed suit and introduced it into England. It was from these lords of Soule that the Duke selected those brave commanders who fought with him at Sanlace where the "men of Sole" showed such intrepid examples of martial qualities. From this class the great barons who removed to Scotland after the Conquest came;

and they did not forfeit their allegiance to their native land when they became the owners of their extensive territorial estates in Liddesdale, for authentic documents prove that they still held possessions in Normandy where they spent many of their winters. See particular descriptions in the introductory section in this work.

LA ROCHELLE in France having been the center and scene of many a struggle between the Huguenots and their Catholic enemies, we shall devote a little space to a description and history of the ancient town. This is a fortified seaport of France situated on an inlet of the Bay of Biscay, 300 miles west of Paris. There is an inner harbor, close to which are the principal streets and squares. It is entered by seven gates and there are many beautiful arcades and many of the houses have well built porticoes and balconies. Besides the fine promenade of the Place de Chateau, there are, outside the city walls, two extensive public gardens, known as La Promenade du Mail and the Champs de Mars. Rochelle, which was known till the twelfth century by its Latin name, "Rupella," or Kettle Rock, of which its present name is a translation, originated in a colony of serfs who, fleeing from the persecution of their overlord, settled upon the rocky promontory between the ocean and the neighboring marshes and under these pioneers the place increased rapidly in importance. By the marriage of Eleanor of Aquitaine with Henry II of England, she received Rochelle as part of her marriage dower; and it was retained by England till 1224 when it was taken by the troops of the French king. It was ceded to England at a treaty in 1360, but retaken by France, under whose sway it has remained since 1372. As a stronghold of the Huguenot party, the town has been subject to various attacks and sieges during the religious wars and here these devoted adherents of the Reformed faith poured out their blood most freely, during the latter half of the sixteenth century, when the place was unconditionally surrendered to the royal troops in the time of Louis XIII; and then the Huguenots fled from the land of their nativity to seek an asylum where they could enjoy the blessings of civil and religious liberty. For the freedom their ancestors sought and secured at such a cost their descendants should remember their sacrifices with unbounded gratitude and preserve with sacred care their history.

New Rochelle, in Westchester County, N.Y., having been the haven for the refugees who escaped from France and named for their early home, must be briefly mentioned here. The early history of New Rochelle, N.Y., relating to the Huguenot settlement, extends back to 1639, when the first colony of this persecuted and expatriated people landed on the American shores and founded the town. The Historical Society in 1898, erected on or near the spot of the landing of the first refugees at Bonnefoi Point a very fine granite monument in commemoration of that event. The first highway was named Huguenot Street and the present owners of the property bear the names of their ancestors. Fronting on the early roads were well-cultivated farms and the comfortable houses of these thrifty wanderers, and we have seen a picturesque view of an ancient mansion erected by one of the ancestors of the Soulis family in that town. Near the place of landing the first child,

named Guion, was born, and the first marriage was solemnized at the same place. The first census was taken in 1700 and showed a population of 325 and 57 of these were slaves. In 1766 at the corner of Huguenot Street and North Avenue one of these slaves was burned at the stake for killing his master. When the Revolution came on, between 1776 and 1783, many of the inhabitants, being Royalists, left their homes in New Rochelle and settled in the British American colonies; and it was during this movement that Daniel Soulis, along with many neighbors, came to Annapolis Royal in Nova Scotia. Thus we see that the history both in New Rochelle, N. Y., and that held by the families in the British dominions "dovetail" with good joints. It has always been so; the students of history find harmony of fact, while the results of following tradition has been unreliable and confusing.

The Soulis Family In France. Norman Ancestry.

The families of whom we shall take especial notice in this department, were certainly descended from an ancient Norman ancestry whose forefathers were among the followers of Rollo the sometime Viking who invaded Gaul during the ninth century and received from the king the province of Normandy which, under his statesmanship and paternal influence, became the Garden of France. How many generations intervened before the births of those whose names have come down to us in the history of the country, in not known. These Viking progenitors were not then known by any personal or distinctive surname, for such were unknown in Scandinavia or Gaul at that time. At the earliest historical date, these families were known by names spelled variously, and knowing the locality where they resided we have no hesitancy in assuming that all were of the same origin and family connection. In such early documents as the name appears it has turned up as Soulis, Soulice and Soulee but we have no proof of the greatest antiquity of the various forms of orthography.

Report has reached us that researches have been carried on at a comparatively recent date by M. Louis Soulice, bibliothecaire de Pau in France, and that he deduces his descent from a William Soulis, born in Ireland in 1520, and who removed from that country in 1540 and settled in Maranus in the province of Aunes. The son of the said William Soulis, named Jacques Soulis, born in 1554, removed to Coulon, a village in Pouton, six miles from Niort, where his descendants continued to reside until the French Revolution. Nenet, the birthplace of this refugee, Jacques Soulice before mentioned, is a village in the immediate vicinity of Coulon, four miles to the north.

Note.—If the statement concerning the deductions of M. Louis Soulice alluded to in the text are to be relied upon we shall not hesitate to assume that his more immediate ancestors were but a branch broken from the ancient Liddell tree so early transplanted into Scotland. During the prolonged struggles and contentions for the crown in the Land of Heather branches of the Norman-Anglo stock became detached and, as is well known, were removed to Ireland where, even at this day, descendants flourish as the inheritors of estates transmitted from their Scottish progenitors. It would be of interest to pursue this line of research further by access to the musty old public documents that are impatiently waiting in the obscurity of the old vaults to be exposed to the light of day and to the inquisitive eyes of the curious antiquary whose lot was east within the last century.—Author.

first Generation.

Jean Soulise, probably a nephew of Jacques of Benet, was born in 1695, and died in New Rochelle, N. Y., Aug. 28, 1776. He was a son of another Jacques Soulise, a native of the French Pyrenees, who, in 1672, married Jane Carterrie, a native of Rhine, by whom he had sons Joshua and John, who, born in the Pyrenees, fled from the persecution of the Catholics in France and emigrated to America in the year 1700. He established himself in New Rochelle, among others of his countrymen and there married Mary Bonnette, a daughter of Daniel Bonnette of French extraction, born in France in 1697.

The name Soulis does not appear in the British Rolls containing the names of Protestants naturalized in England, but in the records of the French church on Threadneedle Street, London, there is a record of the marriage of Jacques Soulice, a native of Bonet in Poiton "fils de feu Jacques Soulice et feue Maria Ravard, to Maria Bonnette." Daniel Bonnette and his wife Jean Courterrie, were members of the French church in Bristol, England from 1690 to 1700, and their daughter, who was the wife of Jean Soulice, was baptized there May 9, 1697, and died in New Rochelle, N. Y., Sept. 11, 1798, aged 101 years. Her husband, born in France in 1690, died in New Rochelle, N. Y., Aug. 28, 1776, aged 86 years. It was their son, Daniel Soulis, who removed to Annapolis Royal, Nova Scotia, A.D. 1783-4.

Jean Soulise was naturalized Sept. 27, 1715 in the city of New York and a certificate of the transaction is still in possession of his descendants. His coming to America was in 1700 and his passport signed by the mayor of Bristol,

England, has been preserved in the Soulis family.

Jean Soulis made a will while living at New Rochelle, N. Y., from which I shall make some abstract for this section of my book. Among the items of disposal was "One half of the farm and all the utensils to his son Joshua Soulis & one half of a negro slave. To son John Soulis £50. To son Daniel Soulis £25. To daughter Hester Soulis £60 with furniture complete; his side-saddle, his trunk, his English Bible, her looking-glass, a pair of smoothingirons, a pair of Tongs, and shovel that's in my room, a little wheel and my red cupboard and an equal share in all monies hereafter mentioned." To his married daughters, Mary Soulis Devon, Jane Soulis Ondray, widow, Susanna Soulis Lecount and Louis Dubois, their mother's share between them. "To my daughter Soulis and my daughter Magdalen Guion the monies arising from my estate to be equally divided between them."

The Soulis Family In New Rochelle, New York. Genealogical and Biographical.

The earliest representatives of the Soulis family whose history will be comprised in this department, were of French nativity and numbered among the Reformed party called Huguenots during the religious wars that for so many years devastated that country, and fled to America for personal protection and religious liberty. The following, compiled from the scanty and detached notes and family records, is all we are able to submit for the instruction of our clientage.

Second Generation.

CHILDREN OF JEAN AND MARIA BONNETTE SOULIS.

- 1. Joshua Soulis (1), born in 1722; married Susanna Guion of French extraction, died May 30, 1799, aged 77 years. He was a tailor in the New Rochelle hamlet and extant papers show that he had indentured apprentices. He resided on an outlying farm where he erected a large mansion-house.
- 2. John Soulis (3), born in 1724, reputed to have settled in Nova Scotia, but records there do not corroborate the assumption.
- 3. Daniel Soulis (1), born in 1726, removed to Nova Scotia in 1783 and died there in 1819, aged 93 years. See his history under head of "Soules in Nova Scotia."
- 4. Elizabeth Soulis (1), born in 1729, was the wife of Louis Dubois, a nativeborn Frenchman, by whom issue.
- 5. Esther Soulis (1), born in 1731, called "Hester," is not known to have been married. She was mentioned in her father's will as single.

CHILDREN OF JOSHUA AND SUSANNA GUION SOULIS.

- 1. Joshua Soule (2) who married MARY BONNETTE, great-granddaughter of Daniel Bonnette, a Huguenot, before mentioned.
- 2. John Soulis (1), resident of Upper Rochelle, N. Y.
- 3. Susanna Soulis (2), was married to DANIEL DRAKE and was the mother of Thomas Drake who visited France to search for his kindred. In a list of marriages in New York appears that of Susanna Soulis and Josiah Le Conte, Oct. 29, 1762. She was thus mentioned in her father's will.

The Soulis Family In Nova Scotia.

The history of this branch of the Soulis family cannot be better introduced than through abstracts from a written statement by Arthur Soulis, a native of Nova Scotia, but for many years a resident of Winnipeg, Manitoba, with whom the author corresponded during his researches.

"From my early years I desired to learn something definite, reliable and comprehensive respecting the history of my family and their ancestors and always listened with keenest interest to the conversation between the venerable fathers and mothers upon the subject when assembled about their firesides. Thus stimulated, my inclination to investigate increased and I began to write down such information as I obtained in a detached form."

An unexpected event occurred while this gentleman was living in Nova Scotia that was of great interest and satisfaction. Though there had long existed in the Soulis families in Nova Scotia a somewhat vague tradition of a French origin, it was not verified until Mr. Thomas Drake came from New Rochelle, N. Y., to St. John, N. B., for the express purpose of investigating the history of this branch of the family. Having been descended from the Soulis line through his mother and invested with ample means, this gentleman had made a visit to the localities in France from whence the Huguenots had

departed during their persecution and expatriation, and, spending considerable time in and about La Rochelle, procured information concerning the remote ancestry once the inhabitants of that section of the country; through this foreign visitation, became quite enthusiastic in his American family history. So deep-seated was this interest in his quest that he made the long journey from his home in New Rochelle, N. Y., to the British Provinces to seek for such as were "bone of his bone and flesh of his flesh"—and was not disappointed. By consulting the St. John City Directory he located members of the Soulis family living there and was soon clasping the hands of his kindred. By a comparison of the local archives with the "notes" he had brought with him, Mr. Drake, as well as the family he was visiting, were satisfied with the proof of relationship between the two branches of the family; and by this conference a reciprocal friendship and correspondence was established that resulted in much mutual satisfaction; and as a result of the reunion by representatives of the two branches of the family and the harmonizing statistics which followed, the author was enabled to compile and formulate a fairly well connected history of the whole Soulis family from their early homes in the "Vale de Soule" under the shadows of the lofty Pyrenees through the thoroughfares of Time to the present day. The documentary evidence of a consanguinity was not all, but the marked physical resemblance between the two families was distinctly noticeable; especially their "Soulis noses," a feature sufficiently prominent to warrant a "patent of nobility."

While treating this subject and calling attention to the salient features that were emphasized in these families of Soulis, it has been of interest to learn that these in the British Dominion, like their kindred, the early generations of the Soules, have "hugged the coast," locating their homesteads upon lands overlooking the waters of the glimmering sea, and the robust young men bearing the name have early learned to "box the compass" and "trim the sails." Inheriting the prestige of their far-away ancestors, who fearlessly faced the stormy Baltic and North Sea, these sailors of the "New World" have challenged the wrath of Neptune and amid the storms and wrecks never abandoned hope or the ships on which they sailed, so long as there was a rope to grasp. It is doubtful if in the history of any family there has been found as many seamen, especially master mariners, as have been produced by the Nova Scotia households. The inheritance of blood impregnated with saline qualities caused them to make overtures to the mermaids while doing court amid the islands of the ocean. While some of these brawny sons were braving the storms in mid-seas their kindred were wielding the axe and corker's mallet in the ship yards on the land; these sounds being the distant echo floating across the ocean through the period of a thousand years. In many a home on the Nova Scotia coast there were farewells spoken to sons who never returned and many a chair left unfilled.

These families scattered along the shores of the ocean as well as the families inland, acquired the use of nautical language so conspicuous in the conversation of their seniors, and the parlance of their descendants is tinctured with this quaint form of speech. The visitors within the homes of the Nova Scotia Soulis will notice this peculiarity of expression as he hears the members of the family substitute the word "haul" for pull. They say

"taut" for tight, "cast off" in place of let go, and "belay" for fasten. The language of the women smacks of the sea and when they put out their clotheslines they speak of them as "cordage" and the drapery thereon as "canvas." Their clothespins are "marlinspikes" and their beds are "hammocks." going backward they talk of "skidding aft" and when there are storms abroad they "scud to wind'ard." The rains are "cloud-spray" and the gathering clouds make "lowery weather."

The farmers bearing the Soulis name are not content with the fruitage of the soil without the supplementary harvest from the sea, and while waiting for the maturity of their crops they are employed with their weir-fishing along the coast.

As a family the Nova Scotia Soulis have been a religious people. While some of them have been attached to the Episcopal forms of worship, others have been communicants of other Protestant denominations. They have been prominent as committeemen and some have been efficient and influential in the deacon's office.

The patriarchal ages reached by many whose names we shall use in this treatise prove that these Soulis families resident in Nova Scotia were possessed of unusual physical constitutions, supplemented by personal hardihood acquired by exposure to wholesome air and temperate living; and while these grandsires and granddames under snowy locks adorned the firesides of their children, their counsels were a holy benediction.

This remarkable family record can scarcely find a parallel in the patriarchal years of their ages. There was not a death recorded while in youth. All lived beyond the allotted age of "three-score years and ten."

These venerable fathers and mothers were, long ago, called away to the other life and went from this mortal state without a stain upon their character. Hard, industrious tillers of the soil; mariners, artisans, they applied themselves diligently in their several avocations, and during the long years of their earthly tenure were respected, honored and trusted by their contemporaries.

Many of the Soulis families continued to intermarry with families of French extraction long after their removal from New Rochelle, N. Y., and there were few families settled along the shore in whose veins there was no intermingling of Huguenot blood. Nearly all of the descendants of the French families living at New Rochelle, N. Y., were "Tories," otherwise, "Loyalists," and after the victory of the American Colonists removed from their homes to the British Provinces; hence, the Soulis families did not establish their new homes among strangers and foreigners, but with fellow-citizens with their kind in the commonwealth of Nova Scotia.

Third Generation.

Daniel Soulis (1), a son of Jean Soulis and Maria Bonnette, was born in New Rochelle, N. Y., and being a Royalist, after the close of the American Revolution, removed to Nova Scotia in British North America, in 1784. His wife was christened in the chapel at New Rochelle, N. Y., by the Rev. B. Moore in July, 1783, the sponsors being Catherine Lee, Simon Lugrin and Peter Lugrin. She was a little girl aged but three years when, with her parents, she came to Nova Scotia, and at maturity proved herself to be an estimable lady, winning the affection of all who came within the circle of her influence. Daniel Soulis, her husband, was more than six feet in stature and was always "hale and hearty" until one year before his death. He was a man of untiring industry and pursued his avocation of farming and fishing with diligence. word went unchallenged and he lived in peace and quietness during his long tenure of existence, dying without a known enemy. "Aunt Katie," as she was called by her neighbors and relatives, was descended from Simon Lugren, son of Capt. Peter Moses Lugren of a place in the Valley of Lake-de-Jous in the district of Romain Motier, Republic of Berne, born in the Canton of Bome, Switzerland, in January, 1730. See account of the Lugren Family in foot-To this worthy couple was born an only son whose name and what has been discovered concerning him, will presently appear. He died at Smiths Cove, N. S., aged 93.

John Soulis (2), the eldest known son of Daniel (1) and Catherine (Lugren) Soulis, was born at New Rochelle, N. Y., about 1765; married Abigail Smith and settled on the homestead of his father where he cultivated the land and gathered a harvest from the sea. He died in 1856 aged 93 years. His wife died at the age of 89. Their children, ten in number, were named as follows: Daniel, Deborah, John, Joseph, Jeremiah, Charles, Caleb, William, Frederick and Sarah. These will be treated under separate captions as heads of families hereafter.

Daniel Soulis (1), said to have been a son of John (1) and Maria Soulis of New Rochelle, N. Y., having taken the oath of allegiance to King George III in New York City at the close of the Revolution, being a Loyalist—his certificate is preserved in the family—secured passage in a British vessel named "Joseph" with many other "Tories" for the Province of Nova Scotia. After a terrible storm had been encountered they were driven south as far as Bermuda, where they passed the winter. Early in the following spring (1784) they again set sail and entering the Bay of Fundy, passed through the Annapolis Gut and landed at their destination early in the season. These refugees immediately went prospecting for lands and the deed to Daniel Soulis (the name in this document was spelled "Sulis") a copy of which will presently appear, indicates the locality where he established his homestead in the wilderness.

It seems to have been a singular coincidence that Daniel Soules, another Loyalist from New York, should have removed almost simultaneously with this Daniel Soulis. Both were disloyal to the American colonists, lost their estates by confiscation and were now seeking for an asylum of safety from the aggression of the victorious soldiers. It was another singular fact that Daniel Soulis did not receive a grant from the Provincial authorities who were acting so generously in their bestowal of the lands upon the King's loyal subjects who had removed to the British Dominions. He purchased his land, as his deed of conveyance proves, while his distant kinsman received extensive grants of the forest-covered territory. As these representatives of the different branches of the same family did not live far distant from each other, it seems evident that they might have known each other and had "compared notes" in trying to find a link of relationship. Though of the same blood their places of nativity were far removed, and the time long, since they sat down together in their Norman homes.

Daniel Soulis, 1st, after selecting and purchasing his land—Number 9, westward of Bear River—with his son John and probably, with his brother John, as helpers, began to clear away the forest, reserving the straight trees to be used in his loghouse, which was situated on a high embankment near the shore midway between the East and West lines, and the remains of the old cellar still mark the location. With "grub-hoes" they opened the virgin soil between the stumps and planted the seed from which an abundant harvest was gathered. This precious grain was threshed with flails upon the puncheoned barn-floor and carried in small boats up the Annapolis River to the

grist-mill, the going and coming requiring three days and nights; one day at the mill while waiting for their turn and the others in transporting the grain and meal, or flour, to their home where their wives were patiently waiting to make it into bread. There were no roads running along the shore and the small bateaus were the only medium of travel. They had no stoves or clocks and the time of day was announced by crowing cocks upon the barn-beams or the rays of the rising sun touching the incisions made upon the window sills. On overcast days and when the fogbanks hung heavy over the land, the inhabitants resorted to the uncertain expedient of "dead reckoning," to employ a nautical term.

Their wide-fronted fireplaces and deep, cavernous ovens usually laid up with unhewn stones, served for warmth and cooking. There were no regular mails and transient letters were carried from house to house through the settlement in saddle-bags and often did not reach the person for whom they were intended.

In the meantime the Loyalist emigrants were coming into the Province rapidly and fast taking up the land between Bear River and that of the "Joggin" families that were subsequently intermarried with the Soulis persuasion—the Potters, Odells, Winchesters, Bryants, Smiths, Lugrins—that had procured lands in the district.

At the time of the settlement Daniel Soulis was about 51 years of age and his brother John, about 56 years of age. His son John was born in 1763, and was 23 years of age. At the age of 27 John took to himself a wife. In Wilson's History, and copied from the records of Trinity Church at Digby, Nova Scotia, there were married John Soulis senior to ABIGAIL SMITH, October 10, 1790.

The deed of conveyance, a copy of which will appear, indicates the locality in which they established their homes in the wilderness.

"Know all men by these Presents that I John Ritchie of Anapolis Royal in the Province of Nova Scotia Esqr. for and in consideration of the sum of Thirty Pounds to me in hand paid by Daniel Sulis of Anapolis, County and Province aforesaid, the Receipt wherof I do hereby acknowledge and thereof do Acquit and release him the said Daniel Sulis His heirs and assigns forever, do hereby grant, Bargain, Sell and Convey and forever make over to the said Daniel Sulis his heirs and Assigns one Certain right, piece and Parcel of land lying and being in the District of Anapolis in the Province aforesaid, Containing one Hundred Acres and is discribed and known as follows: No 9 being the Ninth Lott to the westward of Bear River commencing at a tree marked EIGHT and NINE, from thence running Westerly to the Bason of Anapolis Forty Rods until a tree marked NINE & TEN, from thence running South Twenty four degrees back one mile and one Quarter and from thence N66 DE Forty Rods and from thence N24 DE West to the first mentioned boundary so as to contain One Hundred Acres, to Have and to Hold the said granted & bargained Premises situated as aforesaid to him the said Daniel Sulis his heirs and assigns forever with all the Rights, Priveleges and Appurtances thereunto belonging or appertaining togather with all my right and title, Property, Interest, Claim and Demand in and to the same hereby Premisis unto him the said Daniel Sulis his heirs and assigns and their own proper use

and behoof forever, and I the said John Ritchie for myself my Heirs Executors Administrators and Assigns both hereby covenant, Promise, Grant and agree to and with the said Daniel Sulis his heirs and assigns shall and may peaceably and quietly enter into, Have, Hold and Possess occupy and enjoy, the hereby Sold Premises and Appurtenances free and clear from all molestation, Interruption or incumbrance whatsoever and that I the said John Ritchie my Heirs and Assigns shall and will warrant and Defend the same to the said Daniel Sulis his Heirs and Assigns against all and Every Person or Persons whatsoever free and clear as aforesaid, IN WITNESS WHEREOF I the Said John Ritchie have hereunto sett my Hand and Seal this first day of October A.D. 1784, in the Twenty-fourth year of His Majesties Reign.

THE SPURR FAMILY.—Michael Spurr came to Annapolis, Nova Scotia, in the ship "Charming Molly" with his wife Ann Bird and family. This immigrant was probably a "Loyalist" or "Tory." He purchased a tract of land and settled at "Round Hill." He was descended from ancestors resident in Dorchester Mass., and one of them was captain in command of a Colonial regiment that fought at Port Royal in 1707, his company being the first to land on the Granville shore at a locality known as "Weatherspoon Point," but known as "Spurrs Point" from the circumstances of this landing to 1770, hence the local name has been known for 50 years before the arrival of the pioneers. LECAIN FAMILY.—This was an English form of spelling the French name of "Le-Quesne." Francis Barclay LeQuesne, whose name was anglicized to its present orthography, came from the Isle of Jersey as "Master Artificer" or "Armourer" in the employ of the Board of Ordinance. This family belonged to the aristocracy and bore arms described in the language of heraldry "Seiur chicibus usque fidelis." The following obituary notice published in the Weekly Chronicle at Halifax, N. S., in 1806, is of interest in this treatment: "Died at Annapolis Royal, Francis Barcla Le'cain,' aged 88 years—the old settler in this county, who lived 64 years in the town. He was an honest and worthy man, and left about 100 descendants. He was for 55 years a Freemason. If these statistics were correct he arrived at Annapolis five years later than John Esson. He married 1st Sept. 1745 Alicia Maria, only daughter of Thomas Hyde, who had also been "master" in the Ordnance Department. She died Sept. 23, 1758, and he married 2d, Elizabeth, daughter of Benjamin and Mary (Woodward) Foster. His second daughter was the wife of John Ritchie and by this alliance became the grandmother of the Chief Justice of Canada and his distinguished brothers. During his long residence in Annapolis, N. S., he was an eye-witness of the stirring and fateful events of which the town was the centre, and contemporary of the long series of brilliant men from Mascarene to DeLancy, all of whom were his associates. The United Empire Loyalists.

HE movement toward the settlement of the Loyalists in Nova Scotia began about 1782 when 300 landed at Annapolis. In 1783 twenty ships left New York for the Province with 3,000 Loyalists on board; these refugees being men, women and children. During

the year 1784 more than 7,000 were brought to Nova Scotia. In 1786 it was estimated that there were from 13,000 to 18,000 Loyalists in the Province,

5,000 being in Shelburn.

The British government provided vessels for the transporting of these families and their belongings and provisions for the voyage and clothing for a year after landing, and building materials; and from 300 to 600 acres of land was set off for each family. Certainly the British government was disposed to show liberality toward its wards, but with all this the conditions were far from inviting; the contrast between the scenes they had left behind them and the dark wilderness that faced them was great, and it is no wonder that some of the mothers shrank from the situation with tears and deep-drawn sighs as they cuddled their little ones in their arms to shield them from impending dangers. These farmers and their families had passed through the trying experiences of pioneer existence before and had waited for years to acquire the comfortable circumstances in which they were situated when the Revolution threatened to deprive them of all these agreeable possessions. After the peace they had been proscribed and persecuted; they had seen their homesteads confiscated and were compelled to expatriate themselves from all that was dear and submit to unknown deprivations and dangers. They had once conquered the primeval forests and with heroic endurance hewed out the homes where they had lived in peace and plenty. Prosperity had smiled upon them. Their acres had increased, their cattle and flocks had multiplied. Sleek beeves had been grazing on virgin pastures. White-fleeced sheep roamed at will among the dales and vales bordering their tilled fields. The hills were adorned with golden grain whose undulating waves glinted in the sunlight. The music of the tinkling bells upon the bell-wethers mingled sweetly with the drone of bees around their hives. The mothers had gone about their domestic duties with hope and the voice of song. A constantly increasing family band had been woven around the hearthstones and the minor voices of children challenged that of patriarchal age.

The flowers upon the door-plot with their wealth of purple bloom vied in beauty with the freckled lillies that swung their inverted censers amid the

verdant clover.

Half-domesticated birds familiar with the movements of the inmates of the home-place builded their nests unafraid and sang their songs with opulence of bubbling cheerfulness.

Their sons and daughters had reached maturity and had married and established homes of their own; but no age was exempt; tender human ties of friends and kindred were rudely sundered and many were the instances when families looked upon the faces of their kindred for the last time.

Known to favor the British armies, the Loyalists were robbed of their cattle and sheep and inroads were often made upon their supplies of food. When the victory turned upon the Colonies, those who had proved their allegiance to the King became the marked objects of oppression and every indignity and insult was heaped upon them.

At the time of removal all was bustle and confusion. The few household goods they were permitted to carry away were hastily bundled and moved to the ships awaiting their transportation. Their cattle were stolen or sold at a sacrifice. Harvests were left within the barns. Supplies of grain were left in the garners. Even the flowers planted around their doorstones by the wives and daughters with dewdrops upon their upturned faces seemed to weep over the departure of their devoted custodians.

These familes were hurried on board and crowded in groups upon the ships prepared for them, and during some of the stormy voyages suffered indescribable misery.

The revolt of the Colonies was not by a large majority, and numbered among those whose allegiance to the British government impelled them to join the conquered armies, represented many of the most intelligent, respectable and wealthy families in the colonies. As strange as it may now appear, since Time has given perspective to guide the considerate historian in his backward survey, there were sometimes nearly as many of the Loyalists in the field as there were soldiers in the British army of invasion; and this fact indicates the stupidity and indisposition of the British officers when they could have made available this material for augmenting their armies and increasing their chances for victory, but did not grasp the situation with anything like military alertness.

The wholesale drain upon the Colonial population when these thousands abandoned their homes and local interests was contemplated by the more conservative spectators with alarm, but what was the loss from Colonial soil was of inestimable gain to the British Provinces. These families proved by their patient industry and allegiance to the Crown to be the very best stock for pioneer incursions upon the forests, and laid the foundation for the subsequent growth and prosperity of the population whose posterity now reaps their reward in the possession of thousands of beautiful homes surrounded by broad and fruitful fields and pastures enlivened by herds of ruminating cattle and white-fleeced flocks. These events in the undiscovered plans of Providence have proven that what has seemed almost a calamity in certain localities has been the greatest material blessing to another field of usefulness. Today, the families composed of the descendants of those pioneer Loyalists represent the best blood in the population of the Provinces. They are not only loyal subjects of the British government, but compose the strongest fabric underlying the material welfare of the communities where they reside. Industrious, conservative, wise in judgment, practicing reasonable economy, seeking for the advantages of education, progressive in their outlook for the future and yet enjoying all of the comforts and amenities of domestic existence.

With large families as a rule, these households have swarmed and sent forth across the continent thousands of their sons and daughters to cultivate the virgin lands of the western slopes, and these sons are driving their reapers over the almost interminable wheat-fields opened for feeding the increasing families and bringing economic wealth to their newly established homes.

Some of the original settlers among the Loyalists settled in Canada were able from their extensive land-grants to cut off farms for their sons and daughters, thus giving them a good start in life. Not only so, but in carrying out this arrangement, they have established small community assemblies composed of kindred blood and common interests of helpful and mutual happiness.

The resounding crash of the giant trees of the heavy forests as they fell before the aggressive onslaught of the pioneers created echoes of significant speech, telling that homes had been founded and fields were expanding; that the light of the sun was being ushered in and the rain invited upon the porous lands for centuries covered by the dense forest. Curling upward among the clearings the smoke from the log-cabin "catted" chimneys was as cheering incense rising from the home altars around which these families paid their devotions and were overtures beckoning forward the era of better days and welcome prosperity. Not many years had passed when the rumbling wheels of the rude saw-mills were heard among the expanding farms and the lumber thus produced enabled the settlers to displace the log-house with a dwelling of more pretentious dimensions and enhanced comforts. Where the refuse of the forests had disfigured the land newly opened fields under the cultivation of the plough, heavy burdens of timothy, clover and waving grain were seen.

"The tinkle of the cowbells adown the pasture lane was responsive to the tinkle of the sheep-bells on the plain."

"The flowery Spring at God's command, perfumes the air and paints the land, The Summer rays with vigor shine to raise the corn and cheer the vine."

The Soules Family In Canada.

ANIEL SOULES (1), a son of George Soule and his wife Lydia Howland Soule, was one of four brothers and three sisters. He was born in Dartmouth, Mass., April 13, 1724 and tradition assumes that he married HANNAH SHERMAN in Dutchess County, New York.

During the Revolution he joined the Royal Standard, took the Oath of Allegiance, and after the peace became a full-fledged United Empire Loyalist. He

had seen active service during the conflict.

When victory turned against the British his farm was confiscated, and with his sons and many of his neighbors he was compelled to expatriate himself and family to Nova Scotia. This was in the year 1783. He had served the King as Quartermaster's Sergeant, having joined the British army with the "Royal Rangers" in 1778. His transportation with this family was on a sailing vessel provided by the British officials in New York, and when they landed they sat down in a vast wilderness. The Provincial Records in Halifax, Nova Scotia, state that, according to promise, Daniel Soules and several of his sons were granted extensive tracts of land upon which to make a new home. There was one grant to Daniel Soules, David Soules and Anthony Hollingshead and about 300 others of sixty-five thousand and six hundred acres in Digby, in the County of Annapolis. Of this tract, Daniel Soules and David Soules were granted two hundred each. This grant was dated February 20, 1784. There was another tract granted to Daniel Soules and eighteen others of four thousand, seven hundred and ninety-seven acres in the Township of Digby, in the County of Annapolis, of which Lot 25, containing 100 acres, was allotted to Michael Soule. As lands were not granted to minors, these tracts were assigned to Daniel Soule, Sr. This Daniel Soule was believed to have returned to New York, as a person of that name living in the Northeast Precinct signed the "Association Test" there in 1775, and the name of a Daniel Soule appears in the Census Returns of 1790 to whom was accredited five children. these families were located in the same neighborhood where Daniel Soule under notice spent his early life, it was quite plausibly assumed that the two were identical; especially as there was no other family in that county in which there was a Daniel Soule. We must leave these problematical questions for future searchers to settle. Certainly, there has lingered no tradition that leads us to believe that Daniel Soule went to "Upper Canada" with his son of the same name. He may have spent his last days with his sons David or Michael and have found a resting place on the banks of the Bay of Fundy. number of his children is not known.

CHILDREN OF DANIEL AND HANNAH SHERMAN SOULES.

1. Daniel Soules (2), a son of Daniel (1) and Hannah (Sherman) Soules, was born in Dutchess County, New York, in 1760 and died April 10, 1846, aged 86 years. These dates were copied from his tombstone in Canada and can be relied upon. He married in Nova Scotia, Achsah Elizabeth Hollings-

HEAD, daughter of Anthony Hollingshead, whose name appears in the land grant with the first Daniel Soules. Being somewhat dissatisfied with his situation in Nova Scotia and hearing of great inducements held out for the families of Loyalists in Upper Canada, now in the Province of Ontario, he with his family, in the year 1795, removed to that country. Tradition tells of the hardships and struggles encountered while making their way through the wilderness to their new home. We do not know what route was chosen, but they probably went through the St. Lawrence River to Lake Ontario and thence to their rendezvous, ten miles north of the present city of Toronto, which was then only an Indian trading past. He settled at Thornhill as record of his grants of land prove. His wife was born in 1770 in Pennsylvania: she was married to Daniel Soules in 1785, the year after his reaching Nova Scotia. She was a girl of only fifteen years at the time. These were the parents of twelve children, eight sons and three daughters, and one unnamed child. was buried at Stroud, Ontario, Canada, where her tombstone, well-preserved, still stands. Daniel Soules died April 10, 1846, aged 86 years, and his tombstone is standing at Stroud, from which the inscription.

Daniel Soules' Petition, dated York, 12th June, 1798, states that he is a native of the late Province of New York and joined the King's standard as the certificate annexed indicates. That he went to Nova Scotia at the Peace and remained there till now. That he is married to Achsah, the daughter of Mr. Anthony Hollingshead, by whom he has five sons and two daughters with whom he has arrived at this place; that presuming his father-in-law may be admitted to the privileges of the United Empire Loyalists he prays 200 acres of land in behalf of himself and 200 in behalf of his said wife as a United Empire Lovalist and otherwise 600 acres under the new regulations. This was certified as follows: "Granville, County of Annapolis & Province of Nova Scotia, April 21, 1799. To whom it may concern: I do hereby certify that I became acquainted with the bearer, Mr. Daniel Sowles, soon after the evacuation of the troops at New York, who came with them to this Province, and at the town of Digby on or about my arrival there in the fall of the year 1783 I became acquainted with the bearer and understood he was a Loyal Refugee during the Rebellion within the Royal Lines at New York. He hath remained in this Province ever since and demeaned himself as a Loyal Subject of His Majesty's Government. I also certify that I am well acquainted with Doctor Christian Tobias who signed the certificate hereunto annexed and that he is a gentleman of strict veracity." Etc.

Digby, 20th April, 1798.

Dear Sir:—Mr. Daniel Soules having applied to me to certify his residence within the British lines in order to procure a certificate from you to the Lieut. Governor of Upper Canada. Mr. Soules came within the Lines in 1778. I have known him ever since and beg leave to commend him to you as a good subject and as an honest, industrious man and I consider a mark of favor to give him the necessary recommendation, I am with much esteem

Your obedient servant

The bearer, Daniel Sole was born a near neighbor to me and brought up by Loyal Parents emigrated early in the war to the British where he remained in the British service to the end of the war.

Achsah Elizabeth Hollingshead, the wife of Daniel Soules, Ir., was the daughter of Anthony Hollingshead, a United Empire Loyalist in Nova Scotia and descended from an old family of Dutch extraction settled early in New York and Pennsylvania. The name is perpetuated in Nova Scotia by the "Hollingshead Brook" and "Hollingshead Bridge." She was well adapted to a pioneer life and with intelligent planning and patient execution she managed her household affairs and brought up her large family of children. was a woman richly endowed with the intellectual faculties. She was sensitively refined and brilliant in conversation. In person she was stately and of full figure, but very agile and graceful in her movements. Full of hope and unwearied fortitude in the midst of deprivation and the many hardships incident to frontier life, she assumed her share of the responsibility with uncomplaining courage and sturdy resolution, looking forward to a more auspicious situation. She retained her mental and physical powers to a remarkable degree till venerable age and continued her interests in current events down to the last. Mrs. Elizabeth Dickey was frequently a visitor in her home when a child and vividly remembered this remarkable old lady; and wrote the author of this work that she exhibited the same brilliant deportment and had the same clear, expressive eyes and ruddy cheeks when far advanced in life. She seemed rather to glide than walk about her house. Her conversation was always interesting and vivacious. All of her children delighted to do her honor and vied with each other in contributing to her happiness—the richest possible reward for her crowning years; the filial regard and cordial affection of her children.

The records disclose the fact that she applied for land as the daughter of a United Empire Loyalist and one hundred acres were granted her at the same time her husband received two hundred acres.

She died April 10, 1862, aged 92 years and 17 days.

- 2. Michael Soules (1), a son of Daniel (1) and his wife Hannah (Sherman) Soules, was born somewhere in Dutchess County, New York and grew to manhood in that community. Like his parents and brothers he cast in his lot with the "Tories" during the Revolution and after the war joined his brothers and removed to Nova Scotia, B. N. A. After his settlement in the British Province he received a grant of land in conjunction with his brothers Daniel and David Soule; and was allotted for his share Lot No. 25, containing 100 acres. From this time, Feb. 20, 1784, we find nothing in the Provincial documents concerning him; but as there were and are families bearing the name in Nova Scotia not satisfactorily accounted for otherwise, we must assume to state that these were his descendants. Farther research may disclose more concerning him and his subsequent career.
- 3. David Soules (1), a son of Daniel (1), was an inhabitant of Nova Scotia in 1784. He was a United Empire Loyalist and having escaped from the British army after the fate of the Colonies was settled, along with others of the family removed to Nova Scotia, where he received, in conjunction with his brothers

Daniel Soule and Michael Soule, a tract of land in Digby, Annapolis County, from which was set off to him Feb. 22, 1784, 100 acres. This allotment was a section of a gratnt of 65,000 and 600 acres in the Township. Concerning this David Soule, we can only state that he has not been discovered in any of the records or documents of the Province subsequent to this land transaction; and this was immediately after the removal from New York. He may have been the progenitor of some of the Sole or Soule families that have since inhabited the Province whose history has not been certainly established.

In the records of grants to Loyalists in February, 1784, the names of David Soule and Daniel Soule appear in the list of names from New York who had dispatched Amos Botsford and others to choose the best location for a settlement. This land had been previously granted to a Colonel McNutt and associates, who having failed to comply with the conditions of settlement, an escheate was carried out.

David Soule's name appears in a memorial presented at a Council held at Halifax March 29, 1784, in behalf of certain Loyalists who had arrived from New York soliciting provisions, as they were suffering for want of life's necessities.

In a Muster Roll containing the names of the disbanded officers and discharged soldiers and Loyalists mustered at Digby, Nova Scotia, May 29, 1784, was that of David Soule, a Loyalist without a family. This was evidently a son of Daniel Soule 1st and a brother of the Daniel Soule who married Achsah Hollingshead and went to Ontario.

Biographical Sketches.

Hannah Soules (1), eldest daughter of Daniel (2) and Achsah (Hollingshead) Soules, born in Digby County, Nova Scotia, 1784, was married to Bernard Vanderburg somewhere in "Upper Canada" and for several years conducted an old-fashioned tavern on York Street, near Thornhill in the County of York. He served as Lieutenant in the Gove Militia under General Brock who was commander of the Canadian Division of the British army in the War of 1812 and was one of the four soldiers who carried General Brock from the battlefield where he was shot and fell from his horse at Queenston Heights on

the Niagara River. Hannah Soule Vanderburg had the care of her venerable mother during her last days. She had no children of her own but had an adopted daughter who, having the property left by her parents, is supposed to have carried away the old Bible containing the records of the family of Daniel and Achsah Soules. This adopted daughter was married to Thomas Somersett and with them Hannah Vanderburg died. Mrs. Somersett died many years ago and her eldest daughter, Elizabeth, was married to Frank Sambrook and removed from Barrie, Canada, to Michigan some time in the 80's. Address when last known was 107 Jackson Street, Marquette, Mich.

Family of John Benjamin and Elizabeth Sturgiss Soules.

Loyalist Branch.

John Benjamin Soules (1), the eldest son of Daniel (2) and Achsah (Hollingshead), was born in Digby, Nova Scotia, about 1780 and went with his parents to York Street, Upper Canada (now Ontario), in 1793, then but a lad. He left his father's home in 1813 and his father's oath to that fact was in the Toronto Records. He had gone from the Province at that date and in 1815 had not returned, to his father's knowledge. He had reached his majority and assumed the ability to "paddle his own canoe." He did not wander far away, however, as he soon married ELIZABETH STURGISS, daughter of Amos Sturgiss, at Mt. Pleasant, Ontario, and settled there as a cabinet-maker and manufacturer of bass-viols and violins. Here, in his small shop, for many years he applied his skill and turned out instruments, some of which were of such quality that they have since been sold at handsome prices. Like his brothers and the whole family connection he was a fine vocalist and an expert performer on the bass-viol and violin. He was for many years, though an ardent Methodist, in great demand when the young people of the community forgathered to "trip the light fantastic toe." Later in life, when the Viking blood began capering in the veins of his sons and their earnest gaze was steadfastly fixed on the West, he went with them, some of them at least, to Scott County, Minnesota, where he took up a claim for 160 acres of land; and served as postmaster there when his son was mail-carrier. After the death of his wife and her burial in the west, he sighed for his old home and returned to Mt. Pleasant, where he died in 1867, aged 77 years—according to his gravestone still standing and the inscription copied for this work. I believe this date is

The Sturgiss Family.

Note.—This family came originally from Wales. Thomas Sturgiss, born in Philadelphia 1722, died in 1802 and was buried in Mt. Pleasant, Canada. His son, Amos Sturgiss, was buried at St. Thomas, Ontario. He was Captain of No. 1 Company, 1778, First Battalion Philadelphia Militia and later in 3d Battalion as Captain of No. 2 Company, under Col. James Barry. William Sturgiss, son of Amos, buried at Mt. Pleasant, Canada, born in Philadelphia 1750, died 1852 and was the father of Elizabeth Sturgiss Soules. Also her sister, the mother of Judge A. D. Hardy of Brantford, Ontario, married Rebecca McKenney of Grand Bend on the Susquehanna. She was granddaughter of Governor Dunn of Long Island (possibly intended for Rhode Island). Amos was ensign in the 5th Company, 7th Battalion Philadelphia County Association, commanded by Col. Isaac Warner and in service 1776 and 1777. Thomas Sturgiss, her father, also saw service during the Revolution.

wrong. He was the "eldest son" as his father stated under oath, and according to the date on his monument would have been but three years of age when he left home in 1813. His grandchildren who remember him say he was tall and somewhat stooping, his complexion rather dark and his hair and beard of the same color. See his portrait, with that of his wife in this book, both paid for by their grandson in Chicago. (A man of fine natural intelligence, a persistent reader, quick in action and of ready wit.) He was educated in the common schools and remained on the farm until eighteeen years of age, when he studied telegraphy, experts on the "wire" being in demand. After finishing his studies he was employed as operator following the Canadian Pacific Survey between Lake Superior and Winnipeg immediately after the right of way was cut through and the poles were erected. He was subsequently employed at his profession in several states, going as far as California, and in 1882 he went to Mexico and from there to the Republic of Guatemala, Central America, where he was Superintendent of the Ferrocarril Central d' Guatemala-the Guatemala Central Railroad.

Returning to the United States in 1887, he engaged in the railroad business in various capacities for several years, since when he became affiliated with Secret Service work, and is at present Principal of the "Soule Secret Service," located in the City Hall Square Building, Chicago, Ill.



- 6. James Soules (2), a son of John (1) and Elizabeth (Sturgiss), born about 1847, enlisted at Lokegon, Mich., in 1861 and served till the close of the war. He is said to have been a great "mimic" and could imitate anything from an Irishman to a singing bird. He was a very "comical fellow." Fond of music; he could play the violin with great skill. Nothing more about him has been supplied.
- 7. Samuel Soules (1), a son of John (1) and Elizabeth (Sturgiss), born at Mt. Pleasant, Canada, was killed on his first trip by an overhead bridge; he was employed as a brakeman and was found dead on the top of the car. He was not married. Resembled his father.

Elizabeth Soules (1), second daughter of Daniel (2) and Achsah Elizabeth (Hollingshead) Soules, became the wife of Samuel Lount, a blacksmith, who was elected to Parliament, in those days called an "Assemblyman," during the MacKenzie Government. He was a man of pronounced views and was arrested for treason; was tried, found guilty, and hung at Toronto in 1837. His treason consisted in his rebellion against the manner in which the British representatives sent over to govern the Canadian people became prodigal of the public lands and gave them to whosoever they pleased. After his trial the responsibility for his fate was left with the Governor-General of Canada, who ordered the sentence to be executed. The authorities refused to deliver his body to his wife and it was buried in the Potter's Field on Bloor Street in Toronto; but, some years later, his remains were removed to the Necropolis Burial Ground. After a great banquet was held by political men of Canada and funds were subscribed for a fine monument to his memory-and others who had suffered with him—in the Necropolis, the inhabitants acknowledged that Samuel Lount had stood for right and justice.

It has been reported that Elizabeth (Soule) Lount exerted herself strenuously and without rest while soliciting signers to a petition to save her husband and that she crossed the ocean and visited Queen Victoria to plead for her husband's life; and that her plea was favorably acted upon but the reprieve was held secret till after the hanging. This family lived at Holland's Landing on Lake Simcoe where the "Smiddy" in which Samuel Lount labored at his forge long stood as a silent witness to his honest industry and his untimely death.

Family and Descendants of William and Hannah Graham Soules. He Was Twin Son of Daniel and Achsah Hollingshead Soules.

William Soules (3), twin son of Daniel (2) and Achsah (Hollingshead) Soules, born at Digby, Nova Scotia, Jan. 19, 1792; married in Ontario, Canada, to which Province his parents had removed when he was but a small lad, Hannah Graham, sister of Jane Graham, wife of his brother James Soules, and of Elder Jeremiah Graham, a pioneer preacher in that section of the country. Her mother's name was Selby, In 1811, when he was nineteen years of age, he "Prayed" to the Provincial officials for a grant of land, but

being a minor he was not granted any territory till Jan. 31, 1816, when, having reached the full age of twenty-one, he received as the son of a United Empire Loyalist, 200 acres. He appointed George Rideout, Esq., to locate this land, make the survey and take out the deed. This was Lot 15 in the 11th Concession, Dorchester, which grant was, I suppose, near Thornhill or East Gwilliambury, in the County of York, Ontario, Canada. Hannah Graham Soules was called a "grand old lady" and was a person of great Christian devotion who trained her children in the precepts of virtue and a reverence for God's word. She was born in Scotland and brought up in a household of piety. She was a member of the Christian church and of such humility and dignity of character that the influence of her example and of the holy instruction she imparted has been very salutary upon her posterity. She was very neat about her household work and her floors were scoured till there was a "gloss" upon them. She spent her last days with her daughter Margaret who remained a single woman till rising 50 years of age. She was the mother of three sons and two daughters, named Daniel, John, William, Sarah and Margaret.

- 1. William Soules (4), a son of William (3) and Hannah (Graham) Soules, born in Ontario (dates missing); married Harriet Doane, by whom he had a son and a daughter, and died in the very prime of life. His widow went to live with her only surviving child and was nearly 90 years of age when she passed away, about 1921. This daughter is Matilda Soules who was married to Edward Montgomery and had one child, a son, who died at birth. She is now living on Sunnyside Avenue, Toronto, Canada, a woman of wealth who is reputed to be well-informed relative to the Soules family history; but seems unwilling to impart any information or render any assistance for the publication of this work. Several times solicited by letters couched in the most courteous language, she has never acknowledged their receipt or favored the author with a reply to his inquiries. She is said to be the resident of a lovely home, is a model housekeeper and true Loyalist.
- 2. Sarah Soules (2), second daughter of William (3) and Hannah (Graham) Soules, born in Ontario, Canada, was married to John Fletcher, a farmer, who had a fine home on Union Street, East Gwilliambury, Ontario, and was the father of three children. The mother survived till these had nearly reached maturity and after her death her husband married, 2d, a widow Dunham by whom there was one daughter, Elizabeth Dunham who became the wife of John Fletcher, Jr. By his second wife he had a daughter named Sadie Fletcher who married and is living in Toronto. William and Hannah Fletcher, the older children of Sarah Soules, went to the United States and were married but both have deceased. William Fletcher died childless, leaving a fine estate to his kinsman, Silas Soules.
- 3. John Soules (4), fourth child of William (3) and Hannah (Graham) Soules, born in Ontario, Canada, married Ellen Dunham by whom he had a son and five daughters, whose names will follow.

II. LYDIA SOULES, born somewhere in Canada, was married to HENRY JOHN WINCH, a well-to-do farmer, and went with him to the West, and her daughter, Delia Soules, was the wife of Melville Shepherd by whom she had a daughter that died at birth.

- AMELIA SOULES, born in Ontario, was married to a farmer, name not known, and soon died childless.
- v. Clara Soules, born in Canada, was married to George Clark and died without issue.
- VI. MARGARET SOULES, born somewhere in Canada, lived till more than 50 years of age a single woman who had the care of her aged mother till her death. A very worthy ministry.
- 4. Daniel Soules (1), a son of William (3) and Hannah (Graham) Soules. born Jan. 18, 1817; married April 15, 1843, ELIZABETH SMITH, daughter of - Smith and Rebecca Chapman Smith who was brought up on Young Street, so-called, between Richmond Hill and Thorn Hill. He was a farmer. He died Dec. 27, 1893. His wife was born July 19, 1825 and died Sept. 6, 1890. She attended the Christian church, it being nearer her home at East Gwilliambury (Lot 26, Concession 4) in the County of York, Ontario. The farm consisted of 100 acres and he purchased another 100 acres. He took great pride in his agricultural improvements and was a prudent and judicious manager. This extra 100 acres was known as the "Squire Morton Farm." He was a staunch reformer in his political relations. There were ten children in this family, three of them named for Christian ministers. The mother had hoped to see one of her sons in the ministry but was disappointed. Mr. Soules settled all of his sons, save two, on farms. He lost his arm in a threshing mill and as surgery was not well advanced he submitted to a second operation, the first below, the second above, the elbow, leaving only a "stub" as he called it. This happened when he was about 34 years of age, but he did not sit down in despair but faced the sad situation with undaunted fortitude and heroism. Whatever he undertook prospered under his wise management and with the assistance of his faithful sons he was engaged in active work on his farm till rising seventy years of age and thoroughly enjoyed his employment. He was attacked with diabetes and he gradually failed in health, but by careful attention to his diet his days were lengthened out beyond the allotted years of men, and when he passed away he left an example for his children of perseverance, honesty and a strict observance of the Golden Rule that cannot be forgotten or fail to have an influence for their good. Daniel Soules retired from the homestead farm and took up his abode in a pretty house on Young Street west of Newmarket after the death of his wife and the old home was broken up. He spent his remaining days with his children and died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Jesse Morton, surviving his wife about three years. His children were named Thomas, Henry, William, John, Daniel, David, Mary, Emily, Margaret, Hester, Jere Squire, Robert and Charles.

Daniel Soules, Sr., died Dec. 27, 1893, aged 76 years. Elizabeth (Smith)

Soules, his wife, died Sept. 6, 1890, aged 65 years.

He settled on the Old Homestead and by making improvements on the barn had one of the best agricultural estates in the County of York. Says he has been medically inclined as long as he can remember, taking a keen interest in discussions of health and disease. Previously a master electrician conducting an extensive business in Oshawa. He passed his matriculation from Oshawa High School in 1911, giving him entrance to the University. Then he worked in a drug store for more than a year, partly to avoid several years of tedious examinations in a medical college, medicine being his preference, and partly under the misconception that druggists were allowed more latitude of judgment in prescriptions than they actually possessed. He felt cramped in the drug store, because his best faculties, discernment and discrimination, received very little exercise; decided that his faculties would be readily adaptable for military tactics, medicine and finance -preferably mathematics and science, or even for the study of social problems. He was house doctor on medical wards of Toronto Western Hospital one summer, and the Emergency Department, Toronto General Hospital the following summer. He graduated from the University of Toronto in 1918, passed his Ontario Medical Council examination the same year, and joined the Canadian Army Medical Corps the same year. Adelaide Euretta Soules born June 22, 1867. Her father, Marshall Hall, lived at Oshawa, Ont., and married Euretta Dearborne.

9. Robert Charles Soules (1), seventh son of Daniel (1) and Elizabeth (Smith) Soules, born in Ontario, Canada, Nov. 29, 1863; married Aleria Winch, daughter of Samuel Winch of Bellhaven, Ontario, Feb. 12, 1890. He purchased a farm near Mt. Forest, Ont., which he sold and purchased a hardware store at Richmond Hill; then sold out and moved to Toronto, where he engaged in real estate, building houses. Then he moved to Port McMichael where he built a hardware store. After the death by drowning of his children he returned to Toronto where he now resides in his own house at 4 Searboro Ave., where he has engaged in building houses for sale. He had but recently moved to Port McMichael and built a fine store and dwelling house combined, having started in business when the place was comparatively new. It was here that

the sad accident occurred which cast a heavy shadow over this once happy household. It was on Aug. 10, 1914 when Floyd Soules sacrificed his own life in trying to rescue from drowning his sister and a Miss Clark, all three going down together. These children had been reared in a Christian home with loving tenderness and were snatched away in their beautiful young manhood and womanhood. The remains of the three young persons were carried to Toronto for burial and a triple funeral service was held in the Methodist Church, the most sadly impressive service ever known in the city. The burial was in Mount Pleasant Cemetery and to that sacred spot the sad-hearted parents often resort and time seems not to have healed their broken hearts. Floyd Soules was 21 years of age and Della Soules was 18 years of age when the accident occurred.

10. Jesse Franklin Soules (1), eighth son of Daniel (1) and Elizabeth (Smith) Soules, born April 7, 1868, died unmarried at the home of his sister, Mrs. Margaret H. Prosser in Bellhaven, Ontario, Jan. 9, 1891.

Family and Descendants of Thomas and Elizabeth Wilder Soules. Twin Son of Daniel and Achsah Hollingshead Soules.

Thomas Soules (1), twin to William, son of Daniel (2) and Achsah (Hollingshead) Soules, born in Nova Scotia at the Soules farm situated on Sandy Cove or Digby Neck, Ian. 19, 1792; was carried by his parents to the Province of Ontario, Canada, in 1795. He married ELIZABETH WILDER COOK, a daughter of Peter Wilder and his wife Freelove Russell, her father being a soldier of the Revolution and her descendants were eligible to membership in the Society of the "Daughters of the Revolution." This union was legally sanctioned in Newmarket, and they lived on Union Street, Gwilliambury, County of York, Ontario, where he erected his homestead and worked as a farmer and builder. When he made application for a grant of land he stated that he had served many years as sergeant in Fanning's Regiment till discharged. The petitioner not having been a resident in this province before the 28th July, 1798, was precluded thereby from the King's Bounty therein as a military claimant; so decided in the Council Chambers at York, 15th April, 1806. He subsequently prayed for land as the son of a United Empire Loyalist and was granted 200 acres 16th July, 1816, the same day on which his brother William received his grant. On this land he cleared his farm. He was said to have inherited the fondness for music so characteristic of this whole family and was himself a charming vocalist who, joining his brothers and sisters, formed a quartette unexcelled in the province. His wife, born in Bennington, N, H., May 20, 1790, died in April, 1860, in the township of Gwilliambury, Ontario. There were six children, three of whom were daughters. See forward.

She died in Barre Sept. 26, 1874, leaving issue as follows:
 - ELIZABETH SIMPSON, daughter of Sarah Ann, just mentioned, born in Gwilliambury, Canada, April 6, 1842; was married to NATHANIEL DICKEY in Barre, Nov. 1, 1860. He was born Oct. 13, 1826 in Lisburn, County Antrim, Ireland, and died Aug. 22, 1911, in Kansas City, Mo. She survived her husband many years, living with her son, Walter S. Dickey, and retained her faculties to a remarkable degree. Having lived for so many years in Canada and having visited so many of her relatives, she could impart much reliable information concerning their families. She had seen nearly all of the sons and daughters of Daniel Soules and his wife Achsah, and her description of them was both accurate and entertaining. instructive recitation was written down and sworn to before witness and was made available for this work by her son as above. It was also the privilege of the author to have a considerable correspondence with this remarkable lady and he can bear witness to her rare intelligence and marvelous memory.
- 3. John Soules (1), eldest son of Thomas (1) and Elizabeth (Wilder) Soules, was born in Gwilliambury, Canada. Oct. 11, 1818; married Caroline Fletcher and lived for many years in that province. He had not less than six children, of whom presently. No record of his death.
- 4. Lydia Soules (1), third daughter of Thomas (1) and Elizabeth (Wilder) Soules, was born in Gwilliambury, Ontario, Canada, July 17, 1821 and died without issue.

- 5. William Soules (1), second son of Thomas (1) and Elizabeth (Wilder), was born in Gwilliambury, Canada, July 12, 1824; married Almira Spooner (born Dec. 13, 1826) April 27, 1847, she being the daughter of James Snow Spooner, a Christian minister and his wife Nancy Dole, a native of New York State, and removed to Canada shortly before her marriage. It was a family tradition that William Soules wanted to become a contractor and builder and displeased his father who wished him to study for the ministry. He was not a success as a mechanic and the family were poor "with nothing to do with and nothing to live for." His wife died of consumption in early life and the second wife was of the "wicked stepmother" kind. The children of the first wife were sent from their home. He died in St. Louis, Mo., a very old man at the home of his son Leander Mahlon Soules in 1910. Children as follows:



He was Gynecologist of Riverside Hospital; surgeon Chautauqua Lake Railroad; surgeon Nickel Plate Railroad; surgeon of the Chautauqua Sanitarium. Episcopalian. Colonel Allan and wife lived on a farm at Newmarket for many years, but have removed to a beautiful home on Oakmount Road. Toronto, Canada. Children named as follows:

Family and Descendants of David and Sarah Yeomans Soules. Canadian Branch.


David Soules (2), son of Daniel (2) and Achsah (Hollingshead) Soules, was born in Nova Scotia, B. N. A., June 18, 1795, the year of the removal of his parents to Upper Canada. He married SARAH YEOMANS, a woman representing an old family and long line of respectable ancestry, and settled on a farm at Big Bay Point, in Simcoe County, Canada, where he was a magistrate for several years. It was published in the Canadian newspapers that he had removed from Nova Scotia in 1826, whereas he was but an infant-inarms when carried through the wilderness of what is now the Province of Ontario. The following was abstracted from his land grant: "David Soules of the Township of Vaughn, son of Daniel Soules, U. E. Loyalist, 'Prayed for land' 22d November, 1815." On the back of his petition was written, "It does not appear that the Petitioner has received any land by Order in Council," and he was granted 200 acres. Warrant issued 30th November, 1815. He also received Lot 18 in the 10th Concession, Dorchester, 30th January, 1816. removed from Thorn Hill in the year 1821 and settled beside his brother James on the shore of Lake Simcoe where he established a permanent home and where he passed the remainder of his useful life He was a farmer and dealer in cattle and real estate and by judicious management acquired a large estate which was ultimately bestowed upon his only son, of whom more hereafter. He was a devoted admirer of Samuel Lount who was hung at Toronto in connection with the Rebellion of 1837, and named his son for him. Mrs. Eliza-

beth Dickey, a relative, who frequently visited the family in her youth, has said: "David Soules was a particularly bright and active man. He was Chief Magistrate for the County of Simcoe and held the office for several years." Like his brothers and sisters he was possessed of a charming voice and strong musical inclinations. He was also a fine mechanic and constructed melodious violins upon which he performed with exquisite skill. He was of a cheerful temperament and enjoyed the pleasures of social existence. Tall, and of fine figure, he stood erect and presented a graceful and dignified bearing. He was held in high esteem by all who knew him. He was a great admirer of children and they instantly became attached to him. Grandchildren remembered climbing upon his knee as he caressed them with evidence of tender affection. He died ———. His wife died ———. One son:

Samuel Lount Soules (1), only son of David (2) and Sally (Yeomans) Soules, born at Holland Landing in the home of his father's sister, Mrs. Samuel Lount, Nov. 30, 1825. He married Maria Louisa Drury, born Oct. 24, 1843. daughter of Councillor Thomas Drury and cousin of Hon. Charles Drury, late Sheriff of Simcoe County and since Premier of Canada. He died at the home of his eldest daughter, Mrs. Julia Meyer in St. Louis, Mo., Jan. 4, 1904. Soules was fond of music and being an expert mechanic made his own violins and jewsharps—and he could play on them, too. His home was long a resort of lovers of music and a lady relative still living remembers when she went across the lake in a sleigh to spend with her parents an evening with the family. Samuel Soule would play his fiddle and one of his daughters play the accompaniment on the piano, while all in the room would join in the vocal parts. He endeavored to make his home a place of enjoyment for his children and joined with them in all of the harmless sports fashionable at the time, There were horses to ride, croquet, tennis, boating, fishing, bee-lining, shooting and trapping. The Indians were frequently encamped around his house and he learned of them much of their language. He delighted to take his children sailing to Holland River to fish or troll for maskinonge and they often brought home a monster specimen. Samuel Soules was fond of hunting and was an adept in all the arts of woodcraft. He wrote a book on trapping which has never been published. When bedfast and near his dissolution he told stories, joked with his physicians and maintained his cheerfulness to the end. He died Jan. 4, 1904. Mrs. Soules died July 28, 1903. His remains were carried to Barrie and laid beside those of his wife. His funeral was largely attended, many of his old friends coming in from the country to show their respect for his memory. He had the distinction of having been one of the pioneer settlers in Innisfil township, in Simcoe County, and his reminiscences of early adventures of the descendants of the Loyalists were listened to by his contemporaries with deep interest.

He was such a fine and ingenious mechanic that he could construct almost anything used on the farm—both practical and ornamental. At his wife's suggestion he built an addition to his farm-house to serve as a school-room where his children were taught the rudiments of their education. Like her husband, Mrs. Soule was a great admirer of the beauties of nature and their home was surrounded with ornamental shrubbery and flowers. There is a

row of wide-spreading maples that were set out through the direction of Mrs. Soules around the school-house many years ago and now much admired by the public. She was the originator and organizer of a religious organization called "The Society of Royal Virgins." She was a good mother and employed every means within her power to give her children the advantages of education. Fond of art in all its branches, all of the children were taught music while living on the farm, their teacher making a journey of fourteen miles twice a week to reach their home. Mrs. Soules was a lady of great natural beauty and possessed a refined and cultivated mind. Though she spent large sums of money on her family, the fruits fully justified her judgment and her children vie with each other in doing honor to her memory. There were nine children. See forward.

CHILDREN OF SAMUEL AND MARIA DRURY SOULES.

- 1. David Soules (3), eldest son of Samuel (1) and Maria (Drury) Soules, born in Simcoe County, Canada, July 24, 1861, was of a roving disposition and his parents would sometimes lose sight of him for several years and wonder if he were still living; then, suddenly, learn where he was located. He was at one time employed in land-surveying somewhere in the West. It has been reported that he has died recently. Tradition has reported that a love romance distracted his mind when young, but this has not been confirmed. It was not known that he had married.
- 2. Thomas Drury Soules (4), second son of Samuel (1) and Maria (Drury) Soules, born in Simcoe County, Canada, April 9, 1863; married Sept. 9, 1897 ELIZA CRAIG, daughter of Robert and Rebecca (Bowens) Craig, who was born April 30, 1863. Robert Craig, her father, born July 13, 1836. Rebecca Bowers, born Oct. 1, 1843. Residence, Barrie, Ontario. No children.
- 3. Dr. Julia Armene Soules (2), eldest daughter of Samuel (1) and Maria (Drury) Soules, born in Simcoe County, Canada, June 28, 1866; was married Oct. 26, 1893 to Ludwick August Meyer, born in Minden, Westphalia. Germany, whose father was a member of the Reichstag for sixteen years and was a member of the order of the "Black Eagle." Mr. Meyer came to America when but eighteen years of age and while still under military discipline. He was a successful merchant in St. Louis, Mo., where he died Aug. 17, 1907. No surviving issue. Two children died in infancy. Mrs. Meyer after leaving the local primary schools was educated at the Demulle Ladies' College, in Oshawa, Canada, for three years. She then attended a Business College at Toronto, Ontario; and was subsequently a student at the Homeopathic College at St. Louis, Mo. She is a highly educated lady and has received a degree as a medical doctor. Since the death of her husband Mrs. Meyer has traveled extensively and has seen much of the world. She is a lady of remarkable intellectual strength and refinement; a pleasant conversationalist. She is a petite, gracefully-figured woman and dignified without ostentation.
- 4. Sarah Lillian Soules (3), second daughter of Samuel (1) and Maria (Drury) Soules, born in Simcoe County, Canada, June 28, 1868, was educated at the local primary schools and at the Demulle Female College in Oshawa, Canada. She and her sister, Julia Armene, were taught music at their mother's home under the instruction of a competent teacher who drove out from Toronto

every week, and was afterward a student of a distinguished teacher. Inheriting a voice of great power from her Soules ancestors she developed remarkable vocal talent. She was twice married. Her first husband was Dr. Edward Yorke, a son of Frederick Yorke of London, England, but settled in Berlin, Germany, where he was court dentist. While living in Germany Doctor and Mrs. Yorke were much affiliated with Court society and it has been said she frequently "dined and wined" the Kaiser. After her return to America she was married, second, to a nephew of General Meade, a prominent officer during the Civil War. She had a beautiful residence in Chicago and a studio where she was a teacher of vocal music. Mrs. Yorke is a lady of great personal beauty and a charming singer. She has seen much of the world and has remarkable conversational ability. She has recently removed to Los Angeles, Cal., to which city she motored in her own car, being an expert and fearless driver. She has no children. See her portrait.

- 5. Samuel Lount Soules (2), second son of Samuel (1) and Maria (Drury) Soules, born at the homestead on the shore of Lake Simcoe, Canada, Sept. 30, 1869; married Grace Fay whose uncle, Thomas Fay, a millionaire of Duluth, Minn., died recently at an advanced age, leaving her a rich legacy. Mr. Soules has purchased an elegant home in Chicago where he spends much of his time in planting flowers and otherwise ornamenting his grounds. He has inherited his admiration for natural beauty from his mother and finds great pleasure in contemplating the loveliness of flowers. No children. See his portrait, with his sisters, in this work.
- 6. Frances Josephine Soules (1), fourth daughter of Samuel (1) and Maria (Drury) Soules, born in County Simcoe, Canada, March 13, 1871; was married to the Hon. George W. Cromer, Congressman, from Muncie, Ind. Residence, 724 Sheridan Road, Chicago, Ill. See portrait.
- 7. Bertram Edward Soules (1), third son of Samuel (1) and Maria (Drury) Soules, born on the farm at Lake Simcoe, Canada, July 26, 1873; married to Freda Parks of Taylorsville, near Springfield, Ill., and resides at Kansas City, Mo. He has represented the largest candy establishment in Chicago, has been very successful in his business and will soon retire. There are no children.
- 8. Oscar Edmond Soules (1), fourth son of Samuel (1) and Maria (Drury) Soules, born on the shore of Lake Simcoe, Canada, Oct. 6, 1876; married MINNIE IRVINE and has been connected with a wholesale candy business. He contemplated a settlement in New York City. No issue.
- 9. Ethel Maud Soules (1), fifth daughter of Samuel (1) and Maria (Drury) Soules, born on the homestead farm, Simcoe, Canada, Oct. 9, 1877; was married to ROBERT FOSTER ROBINSON, a Presbyterian clergyman representing one of the oldest families in Pittsburgh, Penn. No issue. See portrait.

Family and Descendants of James and Jane Graham Soules, Son of Daniel and Achsah Hollingshead Soules.

James Soules (1), one of the sons of Daniel (2) and Achsah (Hollingshead) Soules, was born after the removal from Nova Scotia, Aug. 14, 1797. He married Jane Graham, sister of his brother William's wife and of Elder Jeremiah Graham, an early Christian minister, Jan. 24, 1820, and the same year settled

in Innisfil Township, Ontario, Canada. His great-grandson, John W. Soules, the present owner of the original farm and the oldest descendant of James living, holds the deed of conveyance and informs the author that the land was purchased in 1822. This homestead is situated near the shore of Lake Simcoe, in Simcoe County, Ontario, and adjoins the farm of his brother David. The Land Records in Toronto show that "James Soule of Vaughan Township, carpenter and joiner, son of Daniel Soule of the same place, and a United Empire Loyalist, got Lot 17 in the 5th Concession, Innisfel, 16th of October, 1824, 200 acres.

The following is a copy of his marriage certificate: "Whereas, James Soules of the Township of Whitechurch, and Jane Graham of the Township of East Gwilliamborough were desirous of intermarrying with each other, and there being no parson or minister of the Church of England living within eighteen miles of them, or either of them, they have applied to me for that purpose; Now these are to certify that in pursuance of the powers granted by the Legislature of this Province in the thirty-third year of his Majesties reign, I William Tyler, one of his Majesties Justice of the Peace, having caused the previous notice of the statute required to be given, have this day married the said James Soules and Jane Graham together and they are become legally contracted to each other in marriage this 24th day of January, 1820. Signed James Soules and Jane Graham."

We here make record of his Oath of Allegiance taken by James Soules, Province of Upper Canada. "I certify that James Soules of Vaughan, Carpenter and Joiner, a native of Nova Scotia and son of Daniel Soules of Vaughan, United Empire Loyalist, hath taken and subscribed the Oath of Allegiance as required by law, before me, at York in the Home District, this thirty-first day of May in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and nineteen.

Signed. John Smale, J.P."

His farm was at Big Bay Point where Mrs. Elizabeth Dickey sometimes visited these Soules families and listened to their marvelous voices as they sang together some of the old standard selections, and she has informed the author of this history that James Soules inherited the characteristic taste for music as did his brothers and that he had also in equal measure, been invested with the vocal ability for which the whole family were well known. It was a common event for the families of David and James, comprising their children and grand-children, to assemble at one of their homes to spend an autumn or winter evening and pass an hour in the enjoyment of vocal harmony; and their neighbors roundabout considered it their highest privilege to be present when such family musical performances were carried on.

After a short and peaceable life James Soules died in December, 1833. His wife, born in Scotland, Sept. 15, 1800, died Nov. 28, 1879. There were six

children born to this couple whose names will follow.

1. William Soules (5), eldest son of James (2) and Jane (Graham) Soules, born in Innisfil Township, County of Simcoe, Canada, April 3, 1822; married July 8, 1851, ELIZABETH SIBBALD who was born Sept. 2, 1828. He was a farmer on the homestead at Big Bay Point, where he died Oct. 8, 1864. There were five children in this family. See forward for records.

- Jennie Soules, born Aug. 30, 1853; was married to Hugh Finlay, carpenter, Oct. 1, 1885, and resided in Detroit, Mich., where she died in 1910, leaving two children named Melville and Burton.
- II. JOHN WILLIAM SOULES, born Aug. 23, 1855; married Annie Guest, Dec. 16, 1886, born January, 1864. He resides on the homestead farm settled by his grandfather at Big Bay Point, near Lake Simcoe, Ontario, and is the oldest representative of this branch of the family living. He had two children. Pearl Soules, born in October, 1887, was married to Samuel Wannica, and had William and Burton.
- III. Andrew Soules, born Sept. 14, 1857; married Elizabeth Finlay and resided at Foxmead, Canada. Farmer. Children named as follows:

- James Soules, born April 8, 1861; married Ella Fussey in June, 1895, by whom two children, Arthur Soules and Nora Soules.
- V. CHARLES SOULES, born May 17, 1863; married Feb. 16, 1888, ELLEN ANN ROBINSON, born May 13, 1864. Residence, Toronto, Canada. Has two children, Elmer Soules and Ernest Soules.
- 2. Jeremiah Graham Soules (1), second son of James (1) and Jane (Graham) Soules, born Dec. 2, 1824 in Innisfil Township, County of Simcoe, Canada; married Lavina Burnie who died in 1855. He was named in honor of Elder Jeremiah Graham, a pioneer preacher of the Province. He was a carpenter and builder. Died May 6, 1911.
- 3. Elizabeth Soules (3), eldest daughter of James (1) and Jane (Graham) Soules, born in 1826, died in infancy.
- 4. Sarah Soules (2), second daughter of James (1) and Jane (Graham) Soules, born Feb. 19, 1829, in Innisfil, Simcoe County, Canada; was married to ROBERT ORCHARD June 22, 1852, who was a teacher, born Sept. 14, 1828 and died Nov. 4, 1865. She died Jan. 24, 1904. Their residence was in Stroud, Canada. Children named as follows:
 - I. LAVINA JANE ORCHARD, born May 29, 1848; living at Stroud, Ont.
 - II. JOHN OSCAR ORCHARD, died in infancy.

This estimable lady has for many years manifested much interest in the history and genealogy of the Soules family and has collected considerable data relating to this branch. She has some of the documents and heirlooms handed down to her.
- 5. John Soules (4), third son of James (1) and Jane (Graham) Soules, born in the township of Innisfil, Simcoe County, Canada, in 1831; died Sept. 8, 1853. Unmarried.
- 6. Thomas Soules (3), fourth son of James (1) and Jane (Graham) Soules, born in Innisfil Township, Canada, in 1833; died when seven years of age.

Sally Soules (1), third daughter of Daniel (2) and Achsah Elizabeth (Hollingshead) Soules. For want of that "Old Soules Bible" I cannot record her birth. She was married to James Williams, owner of a woolen mill in Thornhill and later removed to the vicinity of Medford where the sons continued the manufacturing business after their father's death. It is not known how many children were born to this couple, but Mrs. Dickey had seen two of the daughters, very pretty young ladies but a "little stuck up." Several solicitations have been sent forth by the mails but although it was believed that they reached those to whom they were addressed no information was forthcoming. Descendants are still reported as resident in Canada.

George Soules (1), one of the younger sons of Daniel (2) and Achsah (Hollingshead) Soules, was probably born after the removal of the family from Nova Scotia to Ontario, "Upper Canada." The inscription on his tombstone as copied for this work makes him born in 1790 and he died Aug. 3, 1856, aged 66 years. He prayed for land as the son of a United Empire Loyalist and was granted Lot 56 in the First Concession, 200 acres, 22d January, 1835. He was not married but remained at home with his parents, and after their deaths, with his brothers. His grave is in a disused old cemetery near that of his father and brother Peter Soules—at Thornhill, Ontario, Canada.

Daniel Soules (3), a younger son of Daniel (2) and Achsah Elizabeth (Hollingshead) Soules, was born after the removal from Nova Scotia to "Upper Canada," and as I find no application by him for land after the settlement in Ontario, I assume to say he died before having attained his majority. In the absence of the old Bible containing the family record of Daniel Soules and wife Achsah, we cannot give with certainty the dates of his birth and death.

Family and Descendants of Peter and Susan Fulton Soules, Youngest Son of Daniel and Achsah Hollingshead Soules.

Peter Soules (1), youngest son of Daniel (2) and Achsah Elizabeth (Hollingshead) Soules, was born in Ontario, Canada, Nov. 4, 1805; married April 19, 1831 Susan Fulton and settled on a section of the Crown Land which was part of his father's original grant, Lot 31. First Concession, Young Street, in Vaughn Township, Ontario, October 11, 1805. His wife's parents, the Fultons, settled in Pickering Township about the same time. Peter Soules was of good height, of fair complexion and possessed of a spirit of adventure and sport, as it was called in those days; and he was exceedingly fond of good saddle horses

upon which he rode like a Tartar of the Arabian plains. He was a red-hot Tory and was involved in many mix-ups during the trouble of 1837, and when it was about at its height he was imprisoned by the rebels and confined in Montgomery Tavern for a short time; he was so roughly treated that he never was himself afterwards. He died Sept. 25, 1847, aged 43 years and 8 months. His wife was born Feb. 2, 1812 and died in 1898. Children as follows:

- 1. Maria Soules, born Jan. 22, 1832; was married to JOHN PATTEN, a tanner, and died May 18, 1853, her husband surviving her but a few years. She had one child who died in childhood aged about 4 years. Buried at Thornhill.
- 2. Charlotte Soules, born May 11, 1834; was married to WILLIAM McMorran who with several brothers came from Ireland and worked for her father, but was later in the carriage and bakery business. She died May 1, 1855, leaving two sons, Samuel J. McMorran and Thomas F. McMorran. He died at Annandale, Ontario, in 1895. Buried at Thornhill, Ont.

- 3. Sarah Soules, born April 10, 1836; was married 1st to Charles James Drury, one of the fourteen children of Thomas Drury, who was drowned at Big Bay Point, Ontario, while sporting with an axe on the thin ice which gave way under his weight and he was drawn under the thicker ice in the presence of his cousin, Samuel Lount Soules, who himself was exhausted and came near losing his life in his desperate attempt to rescue him. This man left one daughter, now Mrs. Elizabeth Norton, who was brought up in the family of her uncle, David Soules. Sarah Soules was married 2d, to John Warnica, by whom she had three sons and one daughter, Frederick, Asa, David and Susan. She died April 19, 1878 and her husband survives, living at Barrie, Ontario. She was buried at Thornhill, Canada. Children:

Royalist Stock.

Soule, born in Dartmouth, Mass., married Lydia Howland, a young Quakeress preacher of an early Pilgrim family and settled in his native town of Swansea, Mass. His children seem to have been born in Dartmouth, but the family removed to the Great Nine Partners, Dutchess County, N. Y., about 1740. To distinguish him from his cousin of the same name he was called "George Soule the blacksmith," that being his craft, while the other was known as "George Soule of the Oblong" in the same county. At the time of the American Revolution this was an ardent Royalist family and some of them served with the local Royal forces. One of their neighbors stated under oath after his removal to Nova Scotia that he had lived beside them in the State of New York and knew them to be loyal subjects of King George and that some of them joined the English army in 1776. See the following history of a Canadian branch of this family.

Benjamin Soule (1), a son of George (3) and Lydia (Howland) Soule, born in Dartmouth, Mass., Mar. 21, 1728; married ABIGAIL HOWLAND (tradition) and was a resident of Crumb Elbow, Dutchess County, N. Y. He was the first of this name in this branch of the Soule family, and if extant records, supplemented by tradition, are reliable, he was the progenitor of the heads of several families whose descendants have been multiplied in the State of New York and Canada. His name appears in several conveyances of land and he was located as of Crumb Elbow and the North-East Precinct, Dutchess County, N. Y. It seems singular that, springing from a family of radical Royalists, he should have been recorded as serving with the Colonial forces for a short time; and although we have no proof showing that he was with his brothers in the King's army, his descendants are known to have taken sides with the Royal cause. For other descendants see "Soules of Hillsdale, N. Y.," "Soules of Greene County, N. Y.," and "Soules of Chenango County, N. Y."

Benjamin Soule (2), a son of Benjamin (1) and Abigail (Howland) Soule, born at Crumb Elbow, Dutchess County, N. Y., about 1745-6, married Dorcas Ward, his cousin, from an old Bay State family frequently allied with the Soules. He was a resident farmer in Westerlo, Albany County, N. Y. Family tradition says he was taken suddenly ill and was hastened to consult a physician, a distance of thirty miles, and died just before or immediately after reaching his destination. He seems to have died intestate as there are no records of administration found in the county Surrogate Records.

Some of his descendants settled in the States and some in Canada. See forward for particulars.

Howland Soule (1), son of Benjamin and Dorcas (Ward) Soule, bearing the name of his grandmother's family, and a loyal subject of the King of England, was born in Westerlo, N. Y., Oct. 12, 1777; married MARY HAGAMAN, born

Oct. 10, 1783 and died July 23, 1867. He died Feb. 28, 1817. They removed from Westerlo, N. Y., to Tapleytown, Canada in 1810, where he received a Crown Grant of land comprising several hundred acres of territory from which he retrieved his farm and upon which he built his home; while hewing down the forest he was killed by a falling tree. Thus the pioneers of the family had invaded the wilderness where the white man's foot had never trod and echoes raised by the woodman's axe had never been heard. Their cut-downs were followed by the torch and their virgin fields were enriched by the accumulated and fallen foliage of unnumbered centuries. With aggressive wills and vigorous arms they rolled back the primeval forest and ushered in the genial sunshine to warm the earth and revive a thousand dormant seeds; and the refreshing showers literally made "the desert blossom like a rose."

From their holdings these Soules cleared productive fields and were prosperous stock-breeders and fruit-growers. They were a people who appreciated the advantages of education and gave their children the best opportunities afforded in the community to become fitted for the activities and responsibilities of life. Invested with fine natural ability and their minds disciplined and polished by the culture of the schools, these sons and daughters were equipped to meet the conquests and enrich themselves with the achievements of success. The moral atmosphere of their home was exalted and refining and imparted character and efficiency to their subsequent examples. As a family they have held a respectable position in the community where their lot was cast and their names have been a synonym of integrity and veracity. This branch of the family have spelled their names "Soule," seldom using the accent mark, although frequently addressed as "Sou-la." All were born in Tapleytown. Mr. John Soule retired from the farm in 1891. See forward.

Benjamin Soule, son of Howland Soule, owned a very considerable tract of land at Tapleytown, Canada, and lived in quite an imposing style of house for his time and day. It was very large and roomy, with the necessary adjunct of an enormous fireplace armed with a long iron crane, on which various sizes and forms of cooking utensils were suspended from pothooks and trammels. There was a large oven in the yard in which the bread for the large family, and for the assembly of retainers incident to such a primitive establishment, was baked. The parlor in this great farm-house was very capacious; according to the standard of those times finely furnished with articles hand-made and carved or imported. There were large sleeping apartments with their stately four-posted beds in which the members of the family found rest. The women in the Soule family were expert handlers of wool and ingenious weavers, and coverlets fabricated by them of beautiful patterns, are still preserved among the descendants as treasures of almost priceless value. This manor-house was surrounded by a large yard enclosed with a picket fence, and within this green parquet there were cultivated plenty of the old-fashioned flowers such as pinks, roses, and hollyhocks.

Benjamin Soule was a man of considerable wealth for his time and a leader in the life of the community. He took an active part in politics, though he was not ambitious for preferment. He was a man of sufficient means and landed estate to give each of his sons a relatively large and well-equipped farm. The farm-house at Tapleytown is still standing near the several large barns. This rural seat was a fine outstanding residence and although built of wood, was somewhat stately and pretentious. The lands surrounding the house are gently rolling and the landscape very attractive. This country, when the Soules entered upon their grant, was marvelously well wooded. The

growth was primarily oak, hickory and pine. Children as follows:

sibility of obtaining something for nothing. Any tradition coming from overseas having the "smell of money" in it seems to set the "crazy-bone" all a-quiver in a certain kind of persons. A little sugar-coating of the pill and down it goes. I wonder if any of those who are so confident concerning this fleeting shadow have ever seen between the protecting bars the stacks of golden guineas or more modern sovereigns that have been awaiting their hand-grasp all of these lingering years. Try to explain this delusion and they will turn their eyeballs skyward and say: "That can be readily accounted for; he wishes to have us all out of the way, that he may have a free hand and gobble up the whole fortune." During the twelve years in which the compiler has projected his inquiries he has been confronted with this delusion as an insuperable barrier against any progress toward the solution of his historical or genealogical problems and, as elsewhere mentioned, his investigation has been practically useless in consequence of the existing prejudice and unyielding determination not to render any assistance toward the collection of data for this literary work; indeed those of intelligence and experience in solving financial problems would not give credence to the statement concerning the deeprooted and wide-spread character of this pernicious phantom. It has not been confined to a morbid and crude class of persons, but has contaminated some of the "very elect," the most intelligent and well-educated families, who have been waiting with hope long deferred in their fond anticipation of feasting their eyes and caressing their fingers with some of this old gold; and still they wait and will continue to wait.

The writer has not seen the announcement published concerning this waiting fortune and does not know who has been responsible for the contents of it, but the reports by persons bearing the Soule name synchronize precisely with the verbal declarations listened to in scores of instances as well as found in his correspondence during the last ten years; and he has been so annoyed and handicapped during his researches for data of a purely historical and genealogical character that his usually elastic patience has become crystallized and refuses to yield to the most honeyed appeals for attention. The case has, however, gone beyond the redemptive stage and become hopeless. Like the traditions cherished by the tenacious Scottish clans, this story has become hereditary and will be passed on as a sweet morsel to future generations, and the vacuum in the British Treasury will continue to exist and the self-respecting Soules, industrious as ever, will earn their daily bread by the sweat of their brows or the development of well-organized business corporations, not wishing or hoping to receive any endowments of

which they were not worthy.

John Soule (2), second son of Benjamin (3) and Elizabeth (Greene) Soule, born in Tapleytown, Canada, April 27, 1833; married in 1861 MARGARET SHAW, born at Niagara Falls, Canada, Dec. 8, 1840. He was a farmer, fruitgrower and stock-raiser, residing on the homestead until 1891 when he retired. He died May 17, 1903. Mr. Soule was a man of great industry and of sterling character. He was an advocate of all reforms and supported every movement for the public welfare. He appreciated the advantages of education

and sent his children to college.

John Soule sold his place at Tapleytown many years ago. The farm at Niagara Falls, Ontario, was very beautiful and attractive, and the shade trees surrounding the house were exceptionally large and graceful. The residence was of the Old English rough-cast style, quite large and well situated. Mr. Soule was a breeder of Scotch Shorthorns, and Berkshire swine, and acquired quite a reputation in his district. He also made a specialty in fancy fruits which he cultivated to a considerable extent and was interested in the dairy business of the section. He was of a retiring temperament, though he was active in the work of the grammar and high schools, in the township council, and in the Presbyterian Church and one of its chief supporters. An illuminated address setting forth his service to the church is preserved in the family. He was a liberal in politics and very active behind the scenes, but had no desire for office. He gave all of his children a first-class university education; and for his time was considered a successful man and well supplied with temporal goods.

Mrs. Soule has been a remarkable woman, wonderfully active all of her life and naturally ambitious for the welfare of her children. She is still quite vigorous at the age of eighty-four. Their children were instructed in all of the moral and religious precepts considered necessary for the growth of noble characters and the peace, affection and kindness dominant created an atmosphere that left its impress upon their lives. The sons were not allowed to whistle on the Sabbath nor to seek for any out-of-door recreation on that sacred day. The present treatment of the Sabbath has led the youth of our land to dangerous habits of extreme desecration that must cause all reverentially-inclined people to fear for the future condition of the families of the

country.

In 1894 he accepted a position with the Missouri Experiment Station as assistant director and in charge of the live stock and dairy work. In the fall of 1894 he was appointed assistant professor of agriculture and assistant agriculturist of the Texas College of Agriculture and the Texas Experiment Station. He served in this capacity until the fall of 1899 when he was called to the University of Tennessee as professor of agriculture and director of the Tennessee Experiment Station. In 1904 he was elected Dean of the College of Agriculture and Director of the Experiment Station at the Virginia Polytechnic Institute. In 1907 Dr. Soule became President of the Georgia State College of Agriculture and the Mechanic Arts, which position he still holds. From 1917-1919 he was Federal Food Administrator for Georgia and chairman of Zone 5, consisting of the states of North Carolina, South Carolina, Georgia, Florida and Alabama.

Dr. Soule had the degree of Sc.D. conferred on him by the University of Georgia in 1911 and the degree of LL.D. by the same institution in 1916. was chosen a fellow of the Royal Society of Arts of London, England, in 1915. He has traveled extensively in the United States, South America, and Europe. He is ex-president of the American Association of Farmers' Institute Workers: ex-vice-president of the Association of American Agricultural Colleges and Experiment Stations; a member of the Association for the Advancement of Science; the American Genetic Association; the National Geographic Society: the American Economics Association; the Society for the Promotion of Agricultural Science. He was a member of the Jury of Awards of the Louisiana Purchase Exposition held in St. Louis. He served as a member of the Arkansas Educational Survey in the spring of 1922. He was appointed official delegate from the United States to the Second American Congress of Economic Expansion and Commercial Instruction and the World Cotton Congress held in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil, in October, 1922. He is a member of the Phi Kappa Phi and Alpha Zeta fraternities. He is a Rotarian and an elder in the Presbyterian Church.


Dr. Soule is the author of a book on "Agriculture; Its Fundamental Principles," and of numerous papers, bulletins, and monographs on agricultural subjects, and has delivered many addresses and lectures before business, scientific, and educational organizations in all parts of the country. He has been intimately associated with teaching, research, and extension enterprises of great magnitude. He participated very actively in the agitation which led to the expansion of the work of the state colleges of agriculture and the mechanic arts through federal appropriations known as the Second Morrill Act; the Nelson Act; the Adams Act for the furtherance of research work; the Smith-Lever Act for the endowment of extension teaching through the placing of men and women agents in agriculture and home economics in every county in each state; and the Smith-Hughes Act for the promotion of instruction in vocational subjects as they pertain to agriculture, home economics, and the trades and industries. He has thus been identified with every great educational movement originating in the United States in the last quarter of a century.

The Georgia State College of Agriculture has organized and developed

under his direction, and now has a student body of 2300 persons and a teaching, research, and extension staff of 350. The institution has the State of Georgia for a campus and intimately touches the lives of more than 261,000 citizens of the state through its service work. Dr. Soule has always actively participated in the formation and support of all organizations calculated to advance the public welfare and has achieved considerable distinction as a thinker and writer along economic lines.

- 4. John Alexander Soule, born Feb. 23, 1879; married Sept. 7, 1908 to MILLICENT HALLIWELL in Toronto, Can. He was a graduate of Toronto University in 1903 and from Osgood Hall two or three years later, and is now a successful lawyer in Hamilton, Ont., and his firm represents the New York Central Railroad's interest in that country.
- 5. Minnie Soule, born in Tapleyville, Ont., has remained single and lives at home with her mother.

Royalist Branch.

This treatment of the origin and history involves much of uncertainty. Traditions held by various branches of the family disagree. Personally, I have believed they were an offshoot of the Royalist stock from the New York tribe of Soules, many of whom changed the spelling of their names from Soule to Sole, Soles and Sowles; recently a lady in Canada confirms my hypothesis. She remembers having heard when a small child her grandparents discuss the subject of their ancestry around the hearthstone. Probably in some short cut connected with the branch of which the old hunter, "Joe Soles," was a representative.

Edmund Sole (1), parents' names not certainly known, was a resident of Belleville, Canada. This town is the capital of the county of Hastings, Ontario, situated on the Bay of Quinte, from which many of the male persuasion graduated as sailors on the Canadian lakes; the stalwart sons of the Sole families were early employed upon the boats there, and they followed the same laborious life after removing to the States—as will appear farther on. Mr. Soule was also a ship-carpenter. Edmund Sole married Phebe Young, removed to Sacket Harbor, N. Y., and after the Civil War removed to Grand Haven, Mich., where the parents died. Some of the descendants linger around the old home in Canada. There were several children in this family whose names will appear presently.

1. David Soule, a son of Edmund (1) and Phebe (Young), seems to have been born at Sacket Harbor, N. Y., the date being Dec. 28, 1835. He died at

Dexter, N. Y., July 5, 1910. He was twice married, his wives being cousins. His first wife was Eliza Sprague, and his second wife, widow of his brother George Soule, was Lorinda Sprague. He had a son by Eliza who is now living at Pillar Point Ferry. David Soule removed to Dexter, N. Y., more than thirty years ago and was overseer of a pulp and paper mill. His children's names will follow.

The parents of the wife of David Soule were Peter Christie, born in the wilderness of Canada, and his first wife was Jane Ferguson from Wolf Island, Canada. She died and he married 2d, LUCINDA GARDNER of Pillar Point, N. Y., who died April 6, 1890, aged 76 years. Mr. Soule died June 6, 1890, aged 88 years.

- 2. Elisha Soule (1), son of Edmund (1) and Phebe (Young) Soule, married SARA VANHOOSEN, by whom two daughters and a son. This family was buried in the cemetery at Sacket Harbor, but there were no monuments erected at their graves and hence there were no dates of birth and deaths.
- 3. George Soule (1), son of Edmund (1) and Phebe (Young) Soule, married to LORINDA SPRAGUE, a sister to Eliza Sprague, wife of David Soule. He went to Belleville, Canada, where she died with cholera, and he married again, by whom three children—Louisa, Nellie and George, Jr., all of Grand Haven, Mich. Louisa was married to McMahan.
- 4. Richard Soule (1), son of Edmund (1) and Phebe (Young) Soule, born at Sacket Harbor, N. Y., went to Florida during the Civil War and was not afterwards heard from.
 - 5. Henry Soule (1), son of Edmund (1) and Phebe (Young) Soule.
 - 6. Ransome Soule (1), son of Edmund (1) and Phebe (Young) Soule.
 - 7. Alzina Soule (1), daughter of Edmund (1) and Phebe (Young) Soule.

There seems to have been some connection between this branch of the Sole-Soule descendants and the Soules of Stony Creek, Canada, as Mrs. O. A. Backeloo of Kalamazoo, Mich., says she is a daughter of Adam Benn Soule. This Adam Benn Soule was a son of an Abner Soule who removed from New York across the line and settled in Canada, probably a Royalist. He married Sarah Ann Benn. He died in Wallpool, between 1875 and 1876. These had not less than eight children, named as follows:

Local Names in Dutchess County, New York.

HE NINE PARTNERS PATENT. The Great or Lower Nine Partners Patent was granted May 27, 1697, and consisted of a tract of land eight or ten miles in breadth extending from the Hudson River east to the Oblong Patent to near the Connecticut state line.

This tract covered the territory included in Chilton, Pleasant Valley, Washington, Stanford, part of Hyde Park and sections of Amenia and south-east.

The Little Nine Partners was granted to eight partners and a ninth interest being soon sold to George Clark made it "Nine Partners." This territory was north of the Great Nine Partners Patent and embraced Milan and Pine Plains. By an error in making the survey the two patents lapped slightly, forming a wedge-shaped tract called the "Gore." Neither the Crumb Elbow precinct nor Pleasant Valley were in the Little Nine Partners.

Upon the establishment in 1731 of the boundary between New York and Connecticut, a tract of land lying along the side of the latter Colony, consisting of 60,000 acres, from its figure called the "Oblong," was ceded to New York as an equivalent for lands near the Sound that had been surrendered to Connecticut; hence the local inhabitants called this the "Equivalent Land." In consequence of this change of local names families who had "hailed" from Connecticut found themselves quite suddenly, without changing the location of their homesteads, the legal residents of New York. This translation was the cause of much confusion and proved misleading. It also resulted in a misunderstanding of the public records and the confounding of local family names. However, by this transfer of territory the inhabitants escaped from the humility of being called "Nutmeggers" while those still resident in Connecticut continued to be designated by this spicy name.

Amenia was a part of Crumb Elbow precinct till 1761, and in 1780 was organized into a township by its present name. The territory comprises the width of the Oblong tract and the east tier of lots in the Great Nine Partners—a tract from the Hudson River to the west line of Connecticut granted to nine proprietors. The local improvements were small till several families from Connecticut moved in about 1741.

PAWLING was organized in 1788.

Dover was a part of Pawling until 1797.

RHINEBECK, organized 1788; named for the river Rhine in Germany. HILLSDALE, N. Y., organized in 1788, 14 miles east of the Hudson River.

Land Transactions in Dutchess County, New York.

"On November 8, 1841, John Allen and wife, and Edgbert Barton and Elizabeth his wife, of the town of Amenia, N. Y., conveyed to Samuel Soule of Dover, in said state and county, tracts of land described as follows: all

situated in Dover. First: Leasehold Farm containing 275 acres and 30 rods of land. Second: On Oblong line, consisting of 2 acres and 29 rods of land. Third: On the Oblong line containing 30 acres of land. Fourth: Woodland containing 40 acres. Fifth: Tract of land containing 11 rods. Sixth: Tract of land containing 38 and a half acres and 35 rods; and other lands. Recorded April 2, 1842."

"On Nov. 21, 1751, Benjamin Soule (son of George and Lydia Howland) of Crumb Elbow in the County of Dutchess and Province of New York, conveyed to Bastian Brown of Rhinebec Precinct in said county, all that parcel of land in the Lower Nine Partners Patent, Lot 3 in the Third Division, containing 170 acres. Recorded Jan. 6, 1770."

"On Sept. 11, 1773, Nathan Soule of Pawling Precinct, County of Dutchess, conveyed to Thomas Briggs of said town and county, all that parcel of land situate in the town of Pawling, containing 159 acres and 149 rods."

"On Sept. 16, 1801, Nathan Soule of Pawling Town, County of Dutchess, State of New York, conveyed to Prince Dunbar, all that parcel of land situate in the town of Pawling, containing 60 acres. Recorded Dec. 20, 1803."

"On Dec. 1, 1801, Jonathan Soule of Clinton Town, County of Dutchess, N. Y., and Bathsheba his wife, conveyed to Robert Williams of Poughkeepsie in said State and County, all that parcel of land situate in the town of Clinton, containing 15 acres. April, 1816, Bathsheba Soule, relict of Jonathan Soule, late of Clinton Town, deceased, conveyed to Henry Kelsey all of her Dower Rights."

"David Soule conveyed to John French, Oct. 20, 1847 (recorded Oct. 5, 1864), Lot No. 53 of 120 acres; also part of Lot No. 60, 20 acres, in Knox."

"Daniel Soule conveyed to John French, Oct. 20, 1847 (recorded Oct. 5, 1864), same parcel of land as mentioned above."

"Emma A. Soule, wife of Julius E. Soule, conveyed to Jacob Lockners, Feb. 18, 1868 (recorded July 17, 1868), lot North side of Hamilton Street, 36 feet East of East line, Eagle Street." What town and state?

Dutchess County Towns.

PINE PLAINS is a town bordering on Columbia County, N. Y. It was included in the Little Nine Partners and was erected into a township in 1823. At that time many settlers came in from the Oblong, Dover, Amenia and Pawling at the close of the Revolution. There were many Baptists in the Oblong; indeed they largely succeeded the Quakers in that locality. This fact is emphasized by the many marriages solemnized by Baptist ministers after that time and the admission to the Baptist churches of so many members of the Soule families. There is an Old Cemetery at Pine Plains in which many of the Soule families from Clay and Cicero were interred; and from the monuments erected there I have procured many inscriptions for this work.

Stanford Town was included in the tract called the "Great Nine Partners," granted in 1697, formed from Washington County, March 12, 1793. Bangall is a village in Stanford.

Washington belonged to the Lower Nine Partners Patent and South Millbrook, sometimes called "The Four Corners," was one of the earliest hamlets in the town. Here some of the Soule families that removed to Michigan resided during their early lives.

Until 1774 the Quakers of Dutchess County, N. Y., belonged to the Purchase Monthly Meeting in Westchester County; then the Oblong Monthly Meeting was established and services were held alternately at the Oblong and Nine Partners. In 1769 Nine Partners was set off as a separate Monthly Meeting and was so continued for more than 100 years.

In the early days nearly everything used in Pawling was hand-made. In 1813 there were more than 100 looms operated by private families in the town. Many of these families were from Duxbury, Swansea, Tiverton and the adjacent towns from which the Soules had removed and their domestic lives were fashioned after the pioneers' manner of existence.

The Old Quaker Meeting-House.

This ancient edifice occupies a conspicuous position on the summit of Quaker Hill. It is a plain structure, large and commodious. Its frame is composed of timbers of solid oak, sufficient material being used in it to construct several buildings such as are erected at the present day. There are the same benches, with their quaint high backs, in which the austere Quakers worshiped a century ago. There is a moveable partition after the fashion of the Friend churches that separated the sexes. There is a broad gallery, with oaken seats, the rear ones so elevated that they were reached by steps. So great was the space occupied by this gallery that the people seated there could scarcely see those in the audience below. Over the gallery there is a trap-door opening into the attic in which it was said the Loyalists used to hide.

Here were the prayers of many a pious heart offered up while this section of the country was yet a wilderness. Here were solemnized those singular marriages for which the Quakers were distinguished; marriages in which the contracting parties acted more than a silent part, for they advanced and clasped each other by the hand and before the assembled congregation promised to be faithful to each other till death should them part. Here in this quaint sanctuary the Soules of Nine Partners and of the "Oblong" assembled to sit in silence and wait for the spirit to move; here those solemn sighs and groans from the hearts of those plainly clad saints were heard; here the young Soules, both male and female, took their vows after being three times announced as intending marriage; and here the witnesses signed the certificates after the ceremony was performed. Indeed the first marriage was that of Mary Soule and Joshua Sherman.

Picturesque fancy penetrates the veil of intervening years and brings within the range of her far-reaching vision such scenes as were frequent during the period of which we write. On the Sabbath morning the central local landmark looming against the horizon was the broad-gabled, barn-like meeting-house raising its form upon the summit of Quaker Hill; and as all of the Nine Partner and Oblong highways focused on this object they were thronged with a train of pensive families all of "like precious faith" slowly wending their way, all dressed in sober gray, toward the unpainted sanctuary. Quaint saints, they worshiped the God of their fathers with a faith undefiled and went "down

to their houses justified." And it was on the female side of the plain pine-board partition, or from the "high seat" the plaintive voice and solemn appeals with many a pathetic quaver rang forth to greet the ears of those sober saints; and among them that of Lydia Howland Soule, who had been heard with dignified pleasure at Nantucket, Martha's Vineyard and Swansea long before she had assumed the cares of maternity; and she had sought to train them "after the straitest sect" of the Quaker faith. Pity that the austere rules of the Society should have excluded her children, some at least, from the embrace of the Ouaker church!

Mentally view the scene. The venerable fathers must needs remove their broad-brimmed beaver hats from the chests where they had reposed at the side of Phebe's drab, silk, barreled bonnet during the week, and when these terminal appendages were adjusted, overshadowing their long, drab, full-skirted coats and fringed and gracefully-draped silk shawls they caught a sly glance of themselves as reflected in the looking-glass and went slowly forth under the soft breezes of the summer morning to join their neighbors on the road that lay over the Hill to their Zion. Little boys, dressed in puffy jerkins under hats of rye-straw and girls with skirts falling to their heels, holding hands, were following.

An attempt was made to produce a good picture of this ancient house of worship in this book, but failed. There was a very good view of the old church on Quaker Hill seen in the History of Dutchess County, N. Y., by Frank Housbrook, 1919, published by S. A. Matthias, Poughkeepsie, N. Y.

Descriptive.

The early generations of the Soule family in Plymouth Colony, impelled, though unwittingly, by their inheritance of blood from a distant fountainhead, when seeking for new conquests and new homes within the wilderness, turned their faces westward and expatriated themselves as their progenitors had done centuries before, from the land of their birth, and sat down upon a new frontier; and when mentioned by their kindred whom they had left behind it was said they had removed to Connecticut, but when the intelligence reached these kindred families back in the Bay Colony of the transfer of the "Equivalent Lands" the announcement was revised and they were designated as residents of the New York Province. The families settled in Connecticut and who were so unceremoniously transplanted to another state, scarcely knew where they were. If Samuel Soule and wife retired for the night as domiciled in Connecticut they were awakened in the morning by the warning that they had been during their slumbers and unconscious of the fact and without their consent made the loyal citizens of another colony. Nothwithstanding the inconvenience of forfeiting their local titles this "Debatable Land" was a buffer between the old lines and kept the Soule families in more intimate touch with each other; and both the Civil and Ouaker records show conclusively that when one of the "sober gray" Friends wanted a second wife he did not go far afield to find one, but immediately crossed the imaginary boundary and, selecting some left-over maiden he had known in his youth, brought her to his fireside as Isaac of sacred story brought Rebecca, the Hebrew maiden, to his mother's tent and made her his wife.

Another misleading feature amongst the early settlers was the result of the issue of "Letters of Clearance" and "Certificates of Transfer" by the Quaker Societies when their members were moving to new localities; and as these devout communicants estimated their spiritual relations of more importance than their civil responsibility, they were better known by the designation of their church location than by their geographical "hailing-place." Thus John Soule, a son of George and Avis (Tibbetts) Soule, was so frequently transferred from "Washington to Creek" and back from "Creek to Saratoga" that, like the Irishman's flea, his neighbors could scarcely "put a finger on him." See Quaker Records.

How changed the scene in Dutchess County at the present time! In the early days of which we have been writing the pioneer settlement was typical of an earthly Paradise. The Oblong and Nine Partners were being salvaged from the realm of Nature and rude log-houses clustered within the valleys from whose "catted" chimneys spirals of blue smoke told of busy housewife below as she prepared the noontime meal. Small acreage of fields were covered with rank, foul meadow grass or adorned with the waving of golden grain. Industrious farmers wielded the implements of husbandry as with moistened brows they cultivated the virgin soil. Acting in harmony with the laws of Nature there was no discord between these hardy and healthful sons of toil and their Divine Benefactor. The warm earth yielded an abundant reward for the farmer's industry and in the autumn time their barns and garners were filled with plenty. The whole community wore an atmosphere of peace and contentment while on every Lord's Day morning the pensive Quakers, dressed in their drab garments, ascended their local "Hill of Zion" to worship in silence or groan under the pressure of spiritual power. The prevailing parlance was that of the "plain speech" and "thee" and "thou" were used by all in common The moral atmosphere of the homes was that of strict obedience to the scriptural code and any deviation from this government was reproved by the sedate fathers and mothers. In those days it was not inconsistent with the rules of local propriety to call every other man by name "Soule," as the families bearing this name constituted the majority of the population.

We now allow our attention the transfer of one hundred and fifty years and mark the changes Time has wrought in that settlement. When the Revolution came on these Quaker families, wishing to occupy a neutral position, claimed the right of exemption in consequence of their "religious scruples" against going to war and presented themselves before the local authorities and militia demanding certificates of non-resistance which in many cases they received. Thus they refused to sign the Oath of Allegiance to the Colonial Government or to the British Officers. By this course of conduct the Quakers found themselves where "two seas met" and were exposed to serious impositions from both sides when thus seeking to make themselves comfortable while "sitting on the fence." They suffered almost continually from requisitions made upon their herds and flocks and much of their harvests was confiscated and carried away. Families that had acquired practical independence by the practice of economy and industrious living were reduced to comparative poverty when their homes were surrounded by the contending

forces.

After enduring this state of affairs during the investment of the armies for the years when their homes were in the vortex of war, and the surrender of the British forces, these would-be neutral families were acclaimed "Tories" and suffered almost every specimen of indignity and persecution. They were proscribed and insulted when passing along the highways and in their homes. Filled with anxiety and anticipation of the impending storm, they had not long to wait before their homes were confiscated over their heads and themselves and familes expelled from the community by the Colonial Government. Their cattle and sheep were disposed of at a sacrifice and with a few household belongings these families were compelled to vacate their firesides, look upon the fields made productive by their toil, for the last time, and flee to the distant British Provinces; and where once a contented populace were sheltered in pleasant homes clustering along the valleys there are the inverted monuments of indented cellars and a few sunken gravestones to mark the homesteads of the Tory pioneers. For the remainder of this story, see my account of the transportation from New York to Nova Scotia.

Second Generation.

1. Seneca Soule, Esq., whose name stands at the head of this family, the reputed son of Ebenezer and Martha (Thomas) Soule, born Jan. 29, 1760, in Dover, Dutchess County, N. Y., was a man of education and a professional lawyer, who had a respectable clientage and acquired a comfortable estate. He was called to fill several positions of responsibility. Was inspector of schools between 1815 and 1821, and commissioner of schools from Sept. 13, 1822 to 1828. Commissioner of roads from 1819 to 1821. His office and home was at Dover, N. Y. He died unmarried Sept. 13, 1829, and was buried at the side of his sister, Martha Soule, the wife of Ezec Wooley, on Chestnut Ridge in Dutchess County, N. Y. For several years Seneca Soule employed a somewhat venerable woman as housekeeper, and local tradition called her the mother of his children.

Seneca Soule, Esq., made a will which was probated Sept. 22, 1829, and gave his rural estate to his nieces, the daughters of his sister Martha Wooley. James McGrath, merchant at Dover Plains, N. Y., has several souvenirs once belonging to Seneca Soule. Among these is an old-fashioned clock in a wooden case with wooden works, "still ticking away time:" an open-faced, gold-dialed watch and his "Justice Book." His housekeeper, Elizabeth Belding, was much older than he and was the mother of a number of children before his twin sons were born. She was the daughter of Silas Belding and her mother was a Knickerbocker.

The following lines were copied from the headstone of Seneca Soule:

"Friends, nor physicians, could not save My mortal body from the grave, Nor can the grave retain it here When Christ shall call it to appear."

2. Martha Soule (1), reputed daughter of Ebenezer and Martha (Thomas) Soule and the twin sister of Seneca Soule, the lawyer before mentioned, was

born at Dover, Dutchess County, N. Y., Jan. 29, 1760, and died Dec. 4, 1842, aged 83 years. She was married to Ezec Wooley, born May 26, 1757 and died April 4, 1837. They were married in 1778. These were first buried on the Butler farm by the highway side on Chestnut Ridge in Dover, Dutchess County, N. Y., but were disinterred and removed to Millbrook, N. Y., by a relative. This member of the Soule family is remembered as possessed of many virtues and dearly beloved by her numerous descendants. The names of her children will follow.

III. CHARLOTTE WOOLEY, born Dec. 3, 1783, was the wife of DAVID NEWTON by whom Catherine, Abraham, Betsey, Charlotte, Sarah, Jane, Ann, Arnor, Mana, Harrison and Henry.

IV. MARTHA WOOLEY, born Aug. 4, 1788, was married to JOSEPH BUTLER

but died without children.

v. Arnor Wooley, born March 8, 1791, was married to Joseph Butler, but died childless.

VI. Julia Elma Wooley, born Sept. 16, 1792, was married to James Germond and had Edmond, Seneca, Benjamin, Ezec, Catherine, Maria, Isaac and Mary.

I. CATHERINE WOOLEY, born July 27, 1795, was married to GILES

Russell by whom a son, John W. Russell.

CHILDREN OF SENECA SOULE AND ELIZABETH BELDING.

- 1. Henry Soule (1), the reputed son of Seneca (1) and Elizabeth Belding, born March 17, 1783; married Abigail Benson, born Dec. 24, 1789, daughter of John and Hannah Benson, died Dec. 24, 1860. He died March 19, 1866. This man was locally known as "Harry Soule." He was a twin brother of Seneca Soule and a farmer in Dover, Dutchess County, N. Y. There were twelve children whose names will presently appear.
- 2. Seneca Soule (2), the reputed son of Seneca (1) and Elizabeth Belding, born in Dover, Dutchess County, N. Y., March 17, 1783, and died in his youth.

Note.—There persists a tradition in the families of Dutchess County, N. Y., that the parent of Seneca and Martha Soule was an Ebenezer Soule who married Martha Thomas, daughter of Abraham and Mary (Aiken) Thomas, and this nativity seems to have been admitted by many relatives; but the author of this work has never seen any documentary evidence of the truth of the assumption. It is true that the descendants of Martha (Soule) Wooley present some very plausible reasons for their insistent contention.

- 2. John Benson Soule (1), eldest son of Henry (1) and Abigail (Benson) Soule, born in Dover, Dutchess County, N. Y., Feb. 4, 1807; married Jane Belding Tabor, Nov. 14, 1832, she being the daughter of Thomas and Eliphaz Tabor, born Feb. 19, 1804, and died in November, 1864. His wife dying, he married Sarah Clarkson, by whom no issue. He died Sept. 11, 1882. This man supported himself from the time he was seven years of age. He was practically self-educated and was never a student at any seminary or college; and yet he was for many years a popular and successful teacher. He was also an Inspector of Schools. He was often called to assume the obligations of a magistrate. Was Assessor and Overseer of the Poor. Many times inspector of elections. He was long prominent in the Masonic Fraternity and a respected member of the Baptist church. When but nineteen years of age he made the journey on foot from his home in Dover to Erie County near Buffalo and back again, crossing the Hudson River on the ice, winter having set in.

John Benson Soule was a very intelligent and progressive farmer and fruit-grower, cultivating many choice varieties, while his improvements and exhibitions at the fairs attracted wide attention.

The records of the County show that he was an extensive dealer in land, purchasing additional acres for the yearly increasing cultivation of fruits. As a citizen, he was highly esteemed and his judgment often deferred to. Always interested in education, he always exerted his influence for the improvement of the public schools and allied himself with every movement calculated to advance the moral tone of society.

John Benson Soule left one son whose name will appear presently.

Dr. William Soule (1), only son of John Benson and Jane Belding (Tabor) Soule, was born in Dover, Dutchess County, N. Y., Dec. 5, 1834. His education begun by his father was continued in the common schools. His preparation for college was acquired at Amenia Seminary, then under the presidency of Cyrus D. Foss, afterwards the distinguished Bishop in the Methodist church, and later under John W. Armstrong, head-master of the Oswego Normal School.

On recovering from a severe illness, he entered the Freshman class in the University of Michigan in March, 1858, being a total stranger to all present.

He graduated in June, 1861, and the next college year returned and took postgraduate work in Chemistry, Conchology and Entomology, receiving therefor

his Master's Degree.

He was married May 8, 1862, to Miss Adelia E. White, youngest daughter of Elber White, one of the pioneers of the settlement of Ann Arbor, Mich. He died at Alliance, Ohio, April 18, 1914, and was buried at Ann Arbor, Mich. Mrs. Soule died Aug. 6, 1924, and was buried at Ann Arbor, Mich.

In 1864 he accepted the position as teacher of Natural Sciences in Cazenovia (New York) Seminary where he taught for thirteen years. In 1880 he became Professor of Chemistry and Physics in Mount Union College, in Alliance, Ohio, where he taught twenty-three years when his health failed and he resigned. The title of Ph.D. was conferred upon him by Mount Union College in 1881.

He was a member of the National Geographical Society and a Fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science. His name appears

in Professor J. McK. Cattell's "American Men of Science."

He was a member of the Methodist Episcopal church in Alliance, Ohio, in which he was the Recording Steward for twenty-nine years. His wife was also active and efficient in church work. She was a teacher of the Woman's Foreign Mission Society for twenty years and many members of her Bible class have become proficient and successful missionaries.

As a proper memorial to the many years of distinguished services rendered by the late Doctor Soule to Mount Union College at Alliance and to the cause of education and science at large, the following article was prepared by Martin L. D'Ooge, professor emeritus of Greek and member of the class of

1862 of the University of Michigan:

"His father was a descendant of George Soule, who came from England in the Mayflower and was one of the signers of the Cape Cod Compact. On his mother's side he traced his descent from John and Priscilla Alden. immediate ancestors for several generations lived in the eastern part of New York near the Connecticut state line.

"Dr. Soule's father was an intelligent business man, who was fond of books and had been at one time a teacher. William inherited his father's fondness for reading and received from him his earliest schooling. His mother was a domestic woman who looked well after the comfort of her family. The home

life was a quiet and peaceful one.

"After attending the school of his native town Doctor Soule went to Amenia Seminary to prepare for college. This seminary was then a flourishing school under the direction of the Methodist Episcopal Church, and was presided over by Cyrus D. Foss, who later became a well known bishop of that church. In March, 1858, Doctor Soule entered the University of Michigan and was admitted to the Freshman class in advanced standing. He was graduated in 1861 with the degree of Bachelor of Science. In college as in all his life he was remarkable for his studious habits, his gentle manner and his high sense of duty. His favorite studies were scientific and his most inspiring teachers were Alexander Winchell in geology and botany, Andrew D. White in history, and Chancellor Tappan in philosophy. But he made special studies in chemistry and for his work in this science he received a special diploma. In 1861

he returned to the university and took post-graduate courses in chemistry and entomology, for which he received the Master's degree in 1862. Mount Union College honored itself in 1881 by conferring upon Doctor Soule the degree

of Doctor of Philosophy.

"The calling of the teacher early attracted Doctor Soule. Soon after graduation he taught chemistry, physics and botany for a year in the high school of his native town. For the thirteen years following he taught these sciences in the Cazenovia Seminary in the State of New York. During this time he was volunteer meteorological observer for the Smithsonian Institute, and later he rendered a similar service to the national weather bureau.

"In August, 1880, he was appointed professor of physics and chemistry in Mount Union College, Alliance, Ohio, a position which he filled with eminent satisfaction until 1904, a period of twenty-four years of successful and faithful labor. In addition to his regular work he gave instruction also for a part of the time in geology and mineralogy, and, as if this were not enough to tax his strength and occupy his time, he was also charged with the care of the college library, which he rearranged and classified with much labor. The burden he tried to carry proved too great for his health, which before he came to Mount Union College had broken down, and to repair which he had to retire for a while from active service. At the close of the academic year of 1904 his broken health compelled him to sever his connection with the college which he had served so long and so well. In his retirement he tried to occupy himself with various lighter tasks, but even these became too burdensome for his failing strength.

"Dr. Soule was a great reader. His students called him "a walking encyclopedia." He aimed to keep abreast with the rapid advance of the sciences which he taught. His merits as a scholar were recognized outside of his own community. In 1884 he became a member of the American Association for the Advancement of Science, and in 1899 he was honored by an election as fellow of that learned body. He was a charter member of the Ohio State Academy of Science. In 1894 he was invited to read a paper before the International Congress of Applied Chemistry that met in Brussels. He was elected in the fall of 1912 as a member of the Royal Geographical Society of England and invited to read a paper before it. Failing health compelled him to decline this invitation. His attainments in his chosen fields of study were such that he was urged to make some permanent contribution to science in the form of a book or monograph, but his native modesty, together with the numerous demands upon his time and strength, prevented him from rendering this additional service.

"Doctor Soule identified himself in early manhood with the Methodist Episcopal Church, of which he became an influential member. For many years he held an important office in his local church and taught a Bible class. While Doctor Soule never held any political office his influence as a member of the Republican party was pronounced and persistent in favor of high ideals of citizenship and of good government."

Professor Soule and wife had but two children.

I. STELLA SOULE, wife of DARWIN W. WAUGH, M.D., in the Borough of Brooklyn, N. Y., was a graduate in music and had made quite

a study of art, having traveled extensively abroad and visited nearly all of the European galleries and several of the American Exhibitions of Art. She died in Brooklyn, N. Y., April 14, 1915.

II. MARION WINEFRED SOULE has been a music teacher, church organist and choir director in the M. E. Church at Alliance, O. She was an apt student and graduate in music. She died at Alliance, Ohio, Dec. 17, 1920.

The only surviving descendants of Professor Soule are two grandchildren, Clarence Waugh, and Mrs. Earl Nelson of New York City.

Harriet Soule (1), second daughter of Henry (1) and Abigail (Benson) Soule, born June 9, 1809, was married to LYMAN LEE who was the representative of a branch of the distinguished Southern family, Feb. 28, 1829. He was a son of Hezekiah and Jane (Wilson) Lee of Salisbury, Conn., born there Sept. 4, 1807 and died at Dover, Dutchess County, N. Y., Nov. 1, 1885. She died there Feb. 24, 1880, leaving a large family, of whom more presently. Farmers. Buried at Dover Plains, N. Y.

- 12. Helen Josephine Soule (1), daughter of Henry and Abigail (Benson) Soule, born in Dover Plains, Dutchess County, N. Y., Oct. 3, 1831; was married to JOHN CLARK PAGE, who was born Nov. 9, 1826 and died May 31, 1891, son of John Orson Page of Sherman, Conn. Resided in Kent, Conn. Children's names will appear.
 - I. OSCAR CLARENCE PAGE, born May 21, 1848.
 - II. WALTER ODEL PAGE, born April 7, 1850.
 - III. CYNTHIA CAROLINE PAGE, born Aug. 25, 1852; died 1864.

In bringing this family record to a close, the compiler is obsessed with the apprehension that the tradition concerning the progenitors of this branch was not well founded and that future research may reveal something more substantial upon which to build a pedigree. There has been entertained no doubt of some close connection of this line with the other families in Dutchess County, but the deficiency of public records and documents by reason of several destructive conflagrations makes this a barren field for the establishment of a well-connected pedigree. Every known source of documentary information has been examined for data to be incorporated within this work.—G. T. R., Sr.

Did Benjamin marry Sarah, daughter of Ebenezer Allen? If this theory be true, it points to the origin of the name Ebenezer in this branch of the Soule family. Ebenezer Soule of Hillsdale, Columbia County, was his eldest son. He named a son Ebenezer who also had a son bearing the name; and this title

was perpetuated in several branches of descendants. If George Soule, great-grandfather of Professor Soule of New Orleans, was also a son of Benjamin, the connection points to the reason for his naming a son Ebenezer as well as a grandson, the father of this Professor George Soule.

Rowland Soule, youngest son of George the blacksmith and Lydia Howland, married Mary Irish, daughter of Jesse Irish, and probably had issue the sons

named herein.

From a communication received from a correspondent at Dover Plains, Dutchess County, N. Y., the following was copied: "Ichabod Ward, son of Peletiah Ward, was born in 1743 in Killingsly, R. I., and married Mehitable Murray by whom he had nine children. Their son, Spencer Ward, married Miss Pattie Soule. Peletiah Ward (grandfather of Mrs. Hoag), born 1770, married Feb. 27, 1791 to Miss Annie Soule who was born Sept. 24, 1774;

Note:—When Mrs. Ellen Soule Carhart was informed of an attempt to compile a genealogy of the descendants of the Pilgrim, George Soule, she forwarded to the author a manuscript pedigree formulated by her late father, the Rev. Francis A. Soule, during his superannuating days and a considerable parcel of miscellaneous papers, among them many old letters from his correspondence containing general and disconnected information and statistics appertaining to the Soule family-at-large. Among these faded documents, some of them almost illegible, there were several loose and isolated sheets without any annotation or comment, and only by a general familiarity with the traditions

Dutchess County.

Ebenezer Soule (1), was the son of another Ebenezer Soule whose history and place of nativity are unknown. The very name suggests relationship with several other branches settled in New York and his line of descent might be assumed-without authority. We do know that the father had married KEZIAH STEVENS by whom there were two sons, Ebenezer and Zebulon. By the administration of the estate of William Stevens of Pawling Precinct. Dutchess County, N. Y., we learn that she was his daughter, but she had been married again and was called "Keziah Reynalds." Her two sons were also mentioned by name. The letters of administration were granted May 20, 1770. There is another document extant that contains evidence of interest. Ebenezer Soule of "Cumberland County"-evidently Columbia County-New York. May 13, 1770, sold land in Pawlingtown, Dutchess County, N. Y., to Nathan Soule, Jr. In this deed his wife was called "Deziah." Recorded in 1773.

and records of the families, acquired through long experience in research, could they be placed and made available for this work. Some of these papers, however, contained Soule and Sowle family records of great interest and importance and filled places long vacant and waiting. On one of these isolated leaves, or sheets, there was written in an old-fashioned, irregular and vertical hand, the names and dates as herein transcribed. Upon this faded piece of paper there was neither address or comment. It was not attached to any other record or enclosed in any cover; neither could any reference be found in other papers by which it could be identified and located, but by falling into the author's hands its importance was almost instantly recognized and its key-value appreciated. Could we know the origin and history of this prodigal document there would appear nothing mysterious concerning it; and it is the opinion of the present writer that it was a copy taken from some old Bible carried from a Dutchess County family of Soule to Michigan during the exodus when so many families of the name removed to that lake country, and had been sacredly preserved by descendants from children and rodents. Several equally important family records have been unearthed in ponderous old Bibles that had been well-thumbed by the grave old Quaker fathers and mothers who lived under the shadows of the quaint and towering Quaker meeting-house on Quaker Hill at Nine Partners, but after their repose under the turf of that sacred parquet these volumes had been removed to the new quarters. Those discovered were all from New York and two from Dutchess County. Three were found in Michigan, two in Ohio, and two in far-away California.

So great was the author's interest in the character and origin of this paper that at considerable expense and labor he approached every county office in the State of Michigan with large displayed, printed circulars seeking for the families who might, peradventure, have the original Bible from which these names and dates were abstracted. but although two more wandering New York volumes were overtaken and located,

neither contained a duplicate.

Whatever its origin, the names and dates were of undoubted significance, and while other records exist that will corroborate this account, it will forever make null and void several long-cherished traditions. It will be observed that this record, if this be a literatim et verbatim copy, was written in the Quaker form of numerals, and it points to some family brought up in that faith. It is a well known fact that the Friends in Dutchess County, N. Y., did not erect inscribed monuments at the burial-places of their families, but they were almost universally careful to inscribe their names and the dates of their birth in their Bibles.

Whatever the obscurity, or whatever the mystery, involved in the discovery of this list of names and numerals, the author rejoices in its possession and perpetuity.

Land in the Oblong lately surrendered by Connecticut to New York. Ebenezer Soule was styled "Yeoman." The consideration £800. Witnessed by Ebenezer Soule and Deziah Soule August 17, 1770. In the author's opinion the document links the two families in Hillsdale, Columbia County and that of the Pawling District in Dutchess County; and the two names of Ebenezer Soule and Keziah (Stevens) Soule reinforce the geographical assumption. However, this could not have been Judge Ebenezer Soule of Columbia County, though he was of Dutchess County stock. The land conveyed evidently passed forward to his son, the child of Keziah Stevens. Children's names will follow.

Third Generation.

- 1. Zebulon Soule (1), a son of Ebenezer (1) and Keziah (Stevens) Soule, was mentioned in connection with his mother and brother. Persistent research has failed to discover any other reference to his name and he probably died in his youth.
- 2. Ebenezer Soule (2), the son of Ebenezer (1) and Keziah (Stevens) Soule (date of birth unknown), married a woman named BETHANIA, but her full maiden name has not been found. The name of this Ebenezer Soule with that of his brother Zebulon, was found in the settlement of the estate of William Stevens, his grandfather, in 1770. He settled on a farm somewhere in Dover, Dutchess County, New York, where he died intestate Jan. 8, 1841. His widow, long mildly insane, was provided for. She died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Eliza Barton, Sept. 25, 1855, aged 94 years. For a long term of years this unfortunate woman was hopelessly demented and though harmless, was the subject of constant watch and care. And this mental infirmity was transmitted to many of her descendants. This husband and wife were buried, first, in a small field cemetery, but were removed to the public cemetery at Dover Plains where inscribed monuments mark their graves. I have learned that the homestead farm of this family was situated two miles east of the village of Dover Plains and now owned by Ollione Orton; was sold 80 years ago to Samuel Edmunds.

Fourth Generation.

CHILDREN OF EBENEZER AND BETHANIA SOULE.

- 1. Ira Soule (1), eldest son of Ebenezer (3) and Bethania Soule, was born June 4, 1793; died March 4, 1914. Not sure of the first name.
- 2. Nathaniel Soule (1), second son of Ebenezer (3) and Bethania Soule, was mentioned in the settlement of his father's estate as having been in Michigan. He probably returned and lived many years in Dutchess County, N. Y. He married Lydia Benson and his name and those of his children were found in the old account books owned by James McGrath, merchant, of Dover Plains, N. Y. "June 4, 1792 Nathaniel Soule to pair shoebuckles and pocket hand-kerchief." On May 6, 1792 "Nathaniel Soule and his daughter Christiancy by credit to cash paid at his house." This name, probably spelled wrong, appeared frequently in the accounts inscribed in this old journal. Nathaniel

and Lydia Soule also had a daughter Emily by name, who died June 5, 1868, aged 45 years and 10 months. Nathaniel Soule was in the Dutchess County Militia, 5th regiment, during the Revolution and his name appears in connection with "Loss of Bounty Rights." His wife, Lydia Benson, born June 2, 1800, died Dec. 1, 1892, aged 92 years. These references were all the compiler has found concerning Nathaniel Soule and his family.

3. Alanson Soule (1), third son of Ebenezer (3) and Bethania Soule, born April 21, 1801, married Orphia Edmunds Nov. 10, 1828, daughter of Samuel and Phebe Edmunds, and settled on a small farm at Dover Plains, Dutchess County, N. Y., where he died April 30, 1852. He inherited a mild form of insanity from his mother. Children's names follow:

1. HARRIET N. Soule, born Aug. 24, 1829; was married Sept. 25, 1851

to Luzern Dutcher and died Feb. 23, 1888.

(1) MARY FRANCES DUTCHER, born Aug. 6, 1852; died Aug. 18, 1855.

(2) CHARLES E. DUTCHER, born Nov. 25, 1854, married CARRIE E. STERLING in 188- by whom a son, Munro S. Dutcher, who is married and lives in Des Moines, Ia. The father died July 19, 1819.

(3) MARY F. DUTCHER, born March 15, 1859; died Feb. 26,

(4) ELMER R. DUTCHER, born Sept. 6, 1863; married October, 1893, HATTIE E. DUTCHER and has Mabel, born Sept. 10, 1894, and Harry S., born 1897.

4. Polly Soule (1), eldest daughter of Ebenezer (3) and Bethania Soule, born about 1802, was married to JOHN ALLEN, by whom two sons and two daughters whose names will follow. Mrs. Allen sometimes found a home with her sister, Mrs. Eliza Barton, after her husband's death. "She was petite and quite pretty when advanced in life." John Allen and Mary, his wife, joined in the conveyance of land to her brother, Samuel Soule. I have not found the date of her death or place of burial.

EBENEZER SOULE ALLEN, son of John and Mary (Soule) Allen, married a lady of beauty and intelligence and was at one time engaged extensively in business in New York City where he was president of some municipal department and, at the same time, identified with the iron trade. Tradition says that to gratify his proud wife they lived beyond their income in a beautiful house with a retinue of servants. They had a town house, and a rural seat at Quaker Hill in Dutchess County, N. Y. Meanwhile, his wife became acquainted with the well-known Fanny Davenport, the actress, and went on the stage. She had the essential face and figure but was deficient in voice and failed of success. Involved in the forgery of railroad stock he was imprisoned in Sing Sing for fourteen years, and while there, was given clerical work and had a liberal commutation for good behavior. When he came out his daughters were married and one a widow. His subsequent history is unknown, but he died about the year 1923.

- II. ELMER ALLEN, the other son of John and Mary Soule Allen, was a lawyer; married Ella DeIve, daughter of Moses DeIve, of Fordham, where they lived until his death some eight years ago (1914). They had but one child, Esther M. Allen, now about 40 years of age and living in New York but declines to supply any information. Her father was buried in Woodlawn Cemetery.
- 5. Samuel Soule (1), fourth son of Ebenezer (3) and Bethania Soule, born in 1805, married Sally ——— and died Jan. 6, 1845. In the settlement of his father's estate, he received a double portion "because of a legacy from Samuel Stevens," for whom he was named. His three sisters, with their husbands, conveyed on Nov. 8, 1841, tracts of land as follows: First, a lease-hold farm containing 275 acres and 50 rods of land. Second: On the Oblong line containing 2 acres and 28 rods of land. Third: On the Oblong line a tract containing 30 acres of land. Fourth: Woodland containing 40 acres. Fifth: Tract containing 11 rods of land. Sixth: Tract containing 93 and one-half acres and 6 rods. Seventh: Tract containing 38 and three-fourths and 35 rods of land. Deed recorded April 2, 1842. Samuel Soule's wife, Sally Soule, died May 12, 1845, aged 50 years.
- 6. Caleb Soule (1), fifth son of Ebenezer (3) and Bethania Soule, born, say, 1807, married Charlotte Simmons. He was "an ordinary man" of heavy build who, with his family, lived in a small wood-colored house within a clearing of the forest on the road to Chestnut Ridge; about 75 acres, mostly "mountain land." This old farm-house is still standing (1922) and owned by Pearl Metcalf. Charles Ashman, living at Bull's Bridge, Conn., a son of Judson Ashman and his wife, who was Maryetta Soule, daughter of Caleb and Charlotte Soule, has the old Bible containing the family record but will not make this available for this work. There were two children, Maryette and Eliza Soule, who died before her father.
- 7. Eliza Soule (1), second daughter of Ebenezer (3) and Bethania Soule, born in Dover, Dutchess County, N. Y., Feb. 9, 1809; was married, 1st, March 4, 1801 to Horace Dennis, born March 4, 1831 and died Oct. 6, 1834. By this union there was one child. Her second marriage was to Egbert Barton who was born March 4, 1804, and died March 16, 1875. She died Feb. 19, 1876, aged 67 years and 11 days. These were farmers living on "the Old Kirby Place" purchased by Mr. Barton, situated near the Toll Gate on the county turnpike between Amenia and Poughkeepsie. This Old Tollhouse was a favorite resort for the Barton children. The farm-buildings were plain and unpretentious, designed for convenience and comfort. Mrs. Eliza Soule Barton had the care of her demented mother during her later years and she died at her house. Mrs. Barton was a woman of strong character and orderly habits in her household affairs; an excellent mother, beloved of her children, whose names will follow.
 - LUTHER G. BARTON, born Sept. 11, 1841, married but had no children. He died at Sharon, Conn., March 11, 1914.
 - II. EMMA BARTON, born Sept. 11, 1844, was married to JOHN B. KIRBY Nov. 18, 1863 and died Nov. 8, 1916. He was born July 10, 1834 and died Oct. 16, 1899. There were two daughters, Georgia and Helen.

- 8. Ebenezer Soule (4), a son of Ebenezer (3) and Bethania Soule, was born in Dover, Dutchess County, N. Y., about 1810-11 and was twice married. His first wife was CAROLINE A. S. HOAG, by whom he had two daughters whose names will presently appear. He married, 2d, PHEBE CURTIS, by whom a son and a daughter, twins, whose names will also follow. This Ebenezer Soule was a man of education but not a collegian. He was for a series of years a teacher in the common schools and is remembered by some of his pupils to whom he applied the "birch," as a good disciplinarian and very thorough as a teacher. Some relatives say he was at one time in trade with his brother. Samuel Soule, in Rochester, N. Y. Unfortunately, having inherited some dementia from his mother, he was always erratic in his habits and financially a failure; and from his intemperance lost, largely, the confidence and respect of his acquaintances. Having lost his wives and with no remunerative employment, he entered the Union army during the Civil War and died soon after his discharge in Sherman, Conn. He was buried by the town and his grave remains unmarked at South Dover, N. Y. His first wife, belonging to a family of respectability and prominence, died when a young lady and was interred among her relatives with an inscribed monument to mark her place of rest. His second wife was buried in the Congregational churchyard in Sherman, Conn. His children were named as follows:
 - I. ANGELINE A. M. SOULE, born in Dover, N. Y., was married to JEROME B. LUCKE in 1868, a newspaper man and a veteran of the Civil War. Inheriting the mental affliction from her mother she died in the asylum for the insane at New Haven, Conn., April 19, 1919. She is said to have been a beautiful blonde and was endowed with remarkable intellectual ability. She wrote a book of poems comprising much beautiful sentiment and couched in choice language. She was also a fine vocalist and a teacher of music. Her husband died in 1902.
 - II. ELIZABETH SOULE, daughter of Ebenezer and Caroline Hoag Soule, born about 1835, was twice married; 1st, to a Mr. Wright; 2d, to a Mr. White. She died many years ago without children. Tradition represents her as a young lady possessed of a superior mind and remarkable amiability of character, having many friends. Her time and place of death unknown.
 - III. Wesley John Soule, a son of Ebenezer and Phebe Curtis Soule, born in New Milford, Conn., Dec. 29, 1851; died in Chicago, Ill., Oct. 18, 1916. He was not married. He received his primary education under his father's instruction and was probably a classical scholar. He was for many years a teacher and served as supervisor of the Connecticut schools with ability and high esteem. Being interested in his family history he visited Dutchess County, New York, several years before his demise and made a searching investigation of the local and county records. He wrote down copious notes containing the information acquired, which he left with relatives, and these were not recovered.
 - IV. CORDELIA SOULE, daughter of Ebenezer and Phebe Curtis Soule, and

twin sister to Wesley John Soule, born in New Milford, Conn., Dec. 29, 1851; was married to Edward Quein of Chicago and died there, leaving a daughter, Mrs. Fannie Cornelia Kneff, who has supplied much of the information contained in the foregoing paragraphs.

- 9. Caroline Soule (1), third daughter of Ebenezer (3) and Bethania Soule, born in Dover, N. Y., date unknown (probably about 1812), was married to Mr. George Robinson, but with the exception of their joining in the sale of land to her brother Samuel Soule, her name has not been found in any public record. Her relatives disagree about her place of residence and the time of her death. If she had children their names do not appear.
- 10. Sally Soule (1), fourth daughter of Ebenezer (3) and Bethania Soule, born in Dutchess County, N. Y., seems to have remained single. She was mentioned as a legatee in her father's will and a record relating to her brothers, Nathaniel and Samuel, and sister Caroline, was found among some state papers to identify her name.

Soules of Amenia, New York.

Descendants of George Soule, Second Son of George and Lydia Howland Soule.

OSEPH SOULE (1), a son of George and Mary (Bush) Soule, born at Nine Partners, Dutchess County, N. Y., Jan. 27, 1759; married HANNAH RANDELL who was born in the same county 1760. He was mentioned in his grandfather's will in 1779 as the son of his son George, deceased, when he was made the heir of a small rocky farm in Deep

Hollow, Dutchess County, N. Y.

This land was underlaid with iron ore but as the Old Forge was closed and mining too expensive, it was discontinued. This land was bestowed upon his eldest son and namesake on conditions of care and support, but the story goes that this son failed to recognize his obligation, refusing to care for and provide for his father, but turned him over to the county; then another son named assumed the care of the old gentleman and saw him decently buried. At any rate Joseph Soule, Jr., conveyed "through the Commissioners," July 3, 1837, to the "Deep Hollow Branch Turnpike" a tract of land four rods wide for a road. This farm was on the "Mountain Road" near the junction of the Wassic road and the Amenia and Poughkeepsie turnpike. Before removing to Illinois and Michigan, the remainder of the farm was disposed of by the heirs and the place abandoned. A grandson says, "There were fifteen children in this family," and the record found in Michigan corroborates the statement.

Sebenth Generation.

CHILDREN OF JOSEPH AND HANNAH RANDELL SOULE.

- 1. Joseph Soule (2), eldest son of Joseph (1) and Hannah (Randell) Soule, born in Amenia, Dutchess County, N. Y., Oct. 27, 1784; married Anna——— and lived at "Hitchcock's Corner," otherwise known as "Amenia Union," a small inland hamlet three and a half miles southeast of Amenia village, which is on the line of the New York & Harlem Railroad. The Old Soule homestead was on the "Mountain Road" and a barway there is still known as the "Soule Lane." In the local burying ground the children whose names follow were interred.
 - I. Adaline Soule, died April 12, 1812, aged 14 years and 7 days.
 - II. MARVIN H. SOULE, died March 23, 1817, aged 11 months.
 - III. MIRAN SOULE, died Oct. 2, 1826, aged 4 years.
 - IV. SAMANTHA SOULE, died Oct. 7, 1820, aged 1 year.
- 2. George Soule (1), second son of Joseph (1) and Hannah (Randell) Soule, born in Amenia, Dutchess County, N. Y., March 18, 1786 and died a bachelor in 1826, aged 40 years. Was this the George Soule whose gravestone was standing and from which the inscription was copied?
- 3. Rev. John L. Soule (1), third son of Joseph (1) and Hannah (Randell) Soule, born in Amenia, Dutchess County, N. Y., March 30, 1787 and in 1834, accompanied by his two brothers, Gilbert R. and Seneca, removed to Illinois

and later to Sharon, Washtenaw County, Mich. He took up land not distant from Galena, on which he died in 1837 and was buried at "Scales Mound." John Soule had in early life become interested in a study of the Sacred Volume and was an old-fashioned Methodist "Circuit Rider" or itinerant minister. He had no less than five children, one being a son, and if descendants are living their places of residence are unknown. His wife had died before he went to Galena, Ill. He is remembered as a man of sober and dignified expression. The names of three children were: Harriet Soule, married; Melissa Soule, and James Soule who went West before his father's removal and became "lost" to his kindred. It is hoped that descendants may be discovered.

- 4. Isaac Soule (1), the fourth son of Joseph (1) and Hannah (Randell) Soule, was born in Amenia, Dutchess County, N. Y., May 23, 1788; married but his place of residence and children's names were unknown. He died in 1849.
- 5. James Soule (1), the fifth son of Joseph (1) and Hannah (Randell) Soule, was born in Amenia, Dutchess County, N. Y., Sept. 8, 1789; died in 1853, aged 67 years.
- 6. Hannah Soule (1), eldest daughter of Joseph (1) and Hannah (Randell) Soule, born in Amenia, Dutchess County, N. Y., July 2, 1892; died in infancy.
- 7. Frederick Soule (1), the sixth son of Joseph (1) and Hannah (Randell) Soule, born in Amenia, Dutchess County, N. Y., Feb. 23, 1794; married and settled in his native town where he was a farmer, still remembered by the aged residents. He made his will. See the burials of his children in the Dover cemetery.
- 8. Phoebe Soule (1), second daughter of Joseph (1) and Hannah (Randell) Soule, born in Amenia, Dutchess County, N. Y., May 23, 1795; died in 1838, single.
- 9. Hannah Soule (2), third daughter of Joseph (1) and Hannah (Randell) Soule, born in Amenia, Dutchess County, N. Y., Dec. 8, 1796; was married to Samuel Cronk, by whom she had issue children named Seneca, Samantha, Henry, George.

Obituary.

Gilbert Randell Soule, born in Dutchess County, N. Y., July 5, 1805, moved to Michigan and thence to Illinois when a young man. He was married at Freeport, Ill., in 1837. He went from Freeport to the lead mines near Galena, four or five miles south of the present Scales Mound, where his wife died and was buried in a cemetery near Scales Mound. There his uncle, John L. Soule. also died and was buried about one year later, say 1837. About this time he took his family of five children to Kansas and was one of the earliest settlers at Lyon, then Breckenridge County, Kan. Amid all the hardships incident to frontier life through which the pioneers passed he succeeded in securing a home and in giving his children a liberal education; and his sons, though but boys, were given cheerfully to the cause of the Union; the youngest not being old enough to enter the ranks, was accepted as a teamster. He was a man of Christian faith and at an early age became a member of the Baptist church. The town in Lyon County where he settled was then called Eagle Creek, later Olpe. He remained there until 1881 or 1882, when he went to Prescott, Kansas, to live with his daughter Adeline and where he finally died after a long and distressing illness. His life was passed on a farm, and both he and the family he reared were prominent in the country and highly respected for their excellent qualities and Christian character. His wife, Esther Phidelia Freeman, was born about 1820. His children called Scales Mound their birthplace, as they lived near that post office, but Galena, Ill., has been mentioned to better locate them, as the former is but little known at the present day.

FAMILY OF GILBERT RANDELL SOULE.

Freeman Gilbert Soule was a farmer during his active life, but has been suffering from a paralytic schock which left him in a very helpless condition. Besides, cataracts have been forming over his eyes so that he cannot read or write. His daughter Lulu takes loving and dutiful care of him, doing all she can to make him comfortable and happy. He still takes an interest in national and local affairs and she reads to him. On the back of a picture of 1920 he wrote: "Freeman Soule, born April 24, 1839 came to Kansas July 4, 1857; enlisted in Co. 11, Kansas Cavalry, Aug. 12, 1862, and served three years to preserve the Union, and whether our ancestors came over in the Mayflower or not, we know they were Loyalists and patriots to the core, and you will always find me rallying around the Flag." On the back of another picture his daughter wrote: "The flag father holds was presented to him while he was living in

Meade County, Kan. He was the only soldier in the Sunday-school so they gave him a beautiful flag. Whenever anything special or new is going on here, they always ask for father's flag to decorate with, as it is the best in town." Children as follows:



Obituary.

George Alonzo Soule, pioneer citizen, owner of freight lines and stage driver in western Texas before the days of the railroads, and a man whose honesty and integrity were proverbial, died at his home Oct. 4, 1913. His death followed a paralytic shock Sunday morning.

In the passing of Mr. Soule there passed one who had seen more adventure and hardships than most men yet was withal a man of great modesty and one who never boasted. Mr. Soule was born near Scales Mound, Ill., Oct. 16, 1840 and would therefore have celebrated his seventy-third birthday anniversary on the 16th of this month. In his early years he moved with his fathers' family to Kansas where, at Empire, in 1869, he was married to Miss Lilla Clapp. She died nine years ago. Three children survive; Miss Etta Soule and W. A. Soule of this city, and Mrs. M. D. King of Hattiesburg, Miss. The latter was called to her father's bedside several days before his death. Mr. Soule came to Texas in 1873, first settling at Jacksboro, then one of the outposts of civilization in western Texas. For several years Mr. Soule ran a freight line between that place, Fort Worth and Dallas. He brought his family in 1878 and moved to old Fort Griffin, an army post where troops were stationed to hold in restraint the Indians, and also headquarters for the buffalo hunters and a hide market. From 1876 to 1883 Mr. Soule owned and operated stage lines between Fort Griffin and Fort Conchow, the latter being where San Angeles now stands. He also operated a stage line from Fort Griffin to Seymore.

In 1883 he came to Wichita Falls, arriving about the same time as the railroads from Fort Worth and made this town the headquarters for the operation of stage lines to Archer City, Henrietta, Paul's Valley, Benjamin, Round Timber, Vernon and Inanch. This business included the government contracts

for carrying the United State mail to the points mentioned. The section of the country through which Mr. Soule operated his stage lines was truly rough and wooly and in those days a stage driver met with more adventures than any other class on the frontier. Mr. Soule moreover talked but little of his part in the adventures and what little is known was learned almost entirely from his drivers and hostlers, and passengers who rode with them.

Mr. Soule brought his family to Wichita Falls April 4, 1884. After the extension of the railroads from Wichita Falls to other points so that the stage lines were no longer necessary for the transporting of passengers and carrying the mails, Mr. Soule ran livery barns at Wichita Falls, Harold and at Vernon, being engaged in that business up to within five years of his death. Throughout his life he retained a strong affection for that most useful animal, the horse, and the gentleness in his handling horses and all live stock was characteristic of the man. In later years it has been a pleasant sight to see this venerable man driving his thoroughbred mare through the streets with a spirited colt at her heels, or driving a high-lifed colt in a cart. His horses returned the affection of the man.

A little more than a year before his death a buggy driven by Mr. Soule was struck by an automobile and he sustained injuries which, it is believed, hastened his death.

Mr. Soule was a member of no church and belonged to no fraternal organizations, but no man had a better reputation for honesty and integrity and few have lived a more blameless life.

Soules of Nine Partners, N. P.

Descendants of George Soule the Blacksmith.

HEN we open the gateway for the ingress of this branch of the Soule family we are introduced to a mighty host whose representatives have scattered from the Atlantic sunrising to the golden shores. There have been streams whose fountain-heads were close to each other among the mountains of the North but their course was directed through valleys far removed until their currents were a hundred miles distant, but by some topographical formation they converged again and their waters formed an amorous confluence and joyously commingled once more. This reunion of kindred qualities and quantities illustrates the distant origin of families that became widely separated and distributed but long afterewards were reunited and the currents of blood long flowing in separate channels once more commingled in the veins of kindred long isolated.

The foregoing graphically illustrates the physical attitude of branches of the Soule family descended from George Soule, the second son of the Pilgrim ancestor. His posterity formed one of the most prolific family connections whose history appears in this memorial. They have wandered southward from the Old Colony to the Southland and from their homesteads in the valley of the Hudson to the British Dominions of the Maritime Provinces and to the hills of Ontario, and by a rebound of action many of their number again turned their faces toward the West and sat down on the Pacific Coast, where their descendants are living in prosperity and luxury.

There was but one deviation from the rule in naming the descendants of this line of descent from the Pilgrim progenitor. William Soule, the son of George Soule the 2d, was the link of breakage; but wishing to retrieve the honored name he called one of his sons George and from him there have been

sons bearing this title in every branch of the family.

The beginning of the treatment of this subject will introduce the record of the family of William Soule of Dartmouth, Mass., who was a son of George Soule 2d, who was a son of the Pilgrim. We have some hesitancy in making record of this family, for we have been convinced "beyond a reasonable doubt" that some of those who have compiled their pedigree with a William Soule as a link in the genealogical chain have made a grave mistake and have confounded this man with another William Soule of Tiverton, R. I., who was a grandson of Nathaniel and Rose Soule; this Nathaniel being a brother of George Soule 2d. However, we shall leave that question for further consideration when we introduce our special canvass of that branch of the Soule family.

Family Record of William Soule.

William Soule (1), a son of George Soule 2d and his wife Deborah, was born in Duxbury or Dartmouth, Mass., and was the ancestor of a numerous and prolific posterity, several branches of which will be briefly pointed out.

1. William Soule (2), born Aug. 28, 1692 and had issue. See forward.

FAMILY OF GEORGE AND LYDIA HOWLAND SOULE.

George Soule (3), second son of William (1) and Hannah (Thorn) Soule, was born in Dartmouth, Mass., Oct. 5, 1695; married Lydia Howland, a daughter of Samuel Howland, born 8-10-1, and after 1734 removed to the Nine Partners in Dutchess County, N. Y. He was a blacksmith by trade and by this designation he may often be identified. After the births of his seven children he received a "Clearage certificate" for removal to Nine Partners in Dutchess County, N. Y. During the troublesome days of the Revolution George Soule and family were "Red-hot Tories" and some of the sons served with the local British forces in an official capacity. Being Quakers the males could claim exemption from serving in the army by reason of "religious scruples" and were sometimes relieved by the Colonial authorities. This attempt to maintain a neutral position placed these Quaker families in a very embarrassing situation and they were imposed upon by the soldiers in both armies and requisitions made upon their herds and flocks. This blacksmith was "distrained of an oxchain and a steel trap." Lydia Howland, the wife of George Soule, was an eloquent preacher among the Friends and her name appears in their records as holding forth at Nantucket and Martha's Vineyard while she was quite a young and unmarried woman. She was, however, "brought to book" for running down to Dartmouth to visit her daughter without consent of Friends and her confession will follow. "First month 21-1745. I have been under much trouble that I should do anything to cause sorrow for my friends or that I should have been contrary to the good order established among

Friends which I have a great value for which under much weakness I did in going down to Dartmouth without Friends consent which said practice I condemn in myself or any other and desire Friends to pass it by & I hope I shall be more careful in time to come." She was immediately forgiven and restored to fellowship. In the will of Phebe Field she gave to Lydia Howland her "best cloak and cap." This indicates kinship. Were they sisters? She also, Dec. 30, 1734, gave to the people called Quakers belonging to the Monthly Meeting of Newtown, N. Y., £10.

This George Soule made his will in 1777 which was probated in 1784, in which he mentions his children without giving their names or places of residence. He mentions a son George Soule, and grandson Joseph Soule deceased, and made choice of his youngest son, Rowland Soule, to be executor. The

precise dates of the parents' deaths does not appear.

In the following treatment each one will be referred to by name with more particulars.

However, we believe it was through this connection with the Allen family that the name Ebenezer was introduced into the Soule family where it was afterward so common.
- 2. Elizabeth Soule (1), second daughter of George (3) and Lydia (Howland) Soule, was born in Dartmouth, Mass., Aug. 12, 1722, and was the first wife of NATHAN BIRDSALL, who, after her death leaving issue, he married 2d, Content Soule, the eldest daughter of another George Soule and Avis Tibbetts his wife of the Oblong, Dutchess County, N. Y. This Elizabeth was mentioned in her father's will in 1737 as being married and having children. Those who have compiled the Birdsall genealogy assume to say she left two sons. It would be of interest to know the names and something of the history of these Soule-Birdsall children.
- 3. Daniel Soule (1), the eldest son of George (3) and Lydia (Howland) Soule, was born in Dartmouth, Mass., April 13, 1734. When a young man he joined the British forces in New York and served till the close of the Revolutionary struggle. After the peace, whatever real estate he owned was confiscated by the Colonial authorities and with several of his sons and many old neighbors he removed to Nova Scotia. His name appears in the Land Office Records where the author of this work found it. The names of three of his sons, Daniel,

Michael, and David, appear in the grants of land to them. An old Dutchess County "neighbor" who went to the Province with these Soules testified under oath that he had known the family for many years and that they had been loyal to the King and stated that he knew Daniel Soule the elder had served with the British army in New York. Tradition makes his wife as Hannah Sherman, a member of an old Dutchess County family several times intermarried with the Soules. For further particulars the reader is referred to the history of the "United Empire Loyalists" in another section of this work.

- 4. Sarah Soule (4), third daughter of George (3) and Lydia (Howland) Soule, was born in Dartmouth, Mass., March 21, 1726. She was married to ———.
- 5. Benjamin Soule (1), the second son of George (3) and Lydia (Howland) Soule, was born in Dartmouth, Mass., Aug. 12, 1728; married ABIGAIL HOW-LAND, supposed to have been his cousin, and became the patriarch of a mighty host, among whom there were many able and honorable men. The name of this man appears but a few times in the local public records and it has not been proven that he served with the British forces. Nov. 1, 1751, he was styled "of Crumb Elbow in the County of Dutchess and Province of New York," when he conveyed to Bastian Brown of Rhinebeck Precinct "All of that Lot or parcel of land in Lower Nine Partners Patent, Lot No. 3, in the Third Division, containing 170 acres;" but this transaction was not recorded till Jan. 6, 1770. The same territory was conveyed by deed from Jacob Hoff, Ir., to Benjamin Soule Oct. 26, 1750. Benjamin signed the "Association Test" in the North East Precinct. George Howland Soule, a son of Howland Soule who was the youngest son of Hon. Ebenezer Soule of Hillsdale, N. Y., said that the said grandfather had told him that his father was Benjamin Soule, of the County of Dutchess, and his mother Abigail Howland. This George H. Soule had spent considerable time and money in the investigation of the genealogy of this branch of the family while several of his uncles and aunts were living, and his opportunities for procuring correct information should carry weight. Additional suggestions arise from the fact that Judge Ebenezer Soule named his eldest son Benjamin and his youngest son Howland. It will be seen by reference to other branches of the family that this Benjamin Soule was the father of several sons as well as daughters.
- 6. George Soule (4), third son of George (3) and Lydia (Howland) Soule, was born in Dartmouth, Mass., April 12, 1730; married MARY HOAG of Scotch descent and devoted Quaker faith, descended from a common Hoag ancestor and frequently intermarried with the Soule families, and became the progenitor of a numerous posterity now distributed throughout the United States and Canada. For some time the author of this work had believed that this George Soule was the great-grandfather of George Soule, LL.D., President of the Soule Institute of New Orleans, La., but finding the word "deceased" in the will made by his father at a date precluding this conclusion and the discovery of the record of Benjamin Soule, his brother, which contained the name and birth of another George Soule, he "changed his mind," as every honest searcher must under such circumstances. This shifting has not in any way disturbed

the incidental and geographical evidence applying to the other George Soule; but shows the connection of several other heads of departments with the Dutchess County stock. The reader is invited to compare the present statement with those connected with Benjamin Soule.

7. Rowland Soule (1), fourth son of George (3) and Lydia (Howland) Soule, was born in Dartmouth, Mass., Nov. 5, 1733; married MARY IRISH, daughter of Jesse Irish, one of the earliest settlers in the Nine Partners Patent on the 24-12-1761 and was reported "Married out of Meeting" 21st, 7th month, 1766 and, consequently, "disowned." The first intention was reported the 9th of the 11th month, 1761; the second report of intention 17th of 12th month, 1766. On the 21st of the 1st month it was reported as "accomplished." This Rowland Soule, probably named for an early and very respectable family in Connecticut, was the head of a very numerous and, in some respects, nomadic branch of the Soule family whose full connections have been traced with much research and some uncertainty. As he was to be the administrator of his father's will in 1784 he was evidently a resident of the vicinity at that time. His name, or that of his son, appears in the Census Returns of 1790 as the father of several children, and a Rowland Soule appears the same year in St. Albans, Vermont. He was probably making his way toward the Canadian border as a Loyalist refugee to escape the Colonial authorities. He was then a man beyond middle life. According to tradition and suggestive family records he was at one time a resident of Hebron, N. Y. One excellent help in tracing this branch of the Soule family was the continuous use of the name Rowland as a golden link to bind them together, and it was generally perpetuated among his descendants. For further particulars see the "Soules of Hebron, N. Y." and the "Soules of Truxton, N. Y."

Daniel Soule having been the eldest son of George and Lydia Howland Soule, I deem it proper to make record of his descendants first in order of arrangement, hence the families settled in Canada will follow that of his father's Family Record. See the history of the migration to Nova Scotia in 1783.

Rowland Soule Branch.

HE investigation of the history of this branch of the Soule family must involve that of the Soules in Dutchess County, New York; and all is connected and linked by a peculiar name. It was long ago conceded by a distinguished Scotch genealogist (Nisbit) that when some peculiar Christian name was found to be common in two families it was strong presumptive evidence of their relationship. This fact has been illustrated in a very marked degree amongst the descendants of Rowland Soule. the youngest son of George and Lydia (Howland) Soule, who removed from Duxbury or Swansea, Mass., to Nine Partners, Dutchess County, N. Y., early in the 17th century. This was not, however, the first appearance on record of the name of a Rowland Soule (Sole), for a man of this name served in the early wars (1675) under Capt. Daniel Henchman; and the same man was in the command of Capt. Samuel Mosely that year. Where this man came from or whither he went is not known to me. I suppose this would be considered an "accidental coincidence." The history of Rowland Soule of Nine Partners, N. Y., starts very well. He belonged not only to a family of Quakers but during the Revolutionary period of ardent Tories or Royalists. He was appointed as the administrator of his father's will in 1784. He married MARY IRISH, daughter of Jesse Irish, and disappears from the known records of the district. At the close of the Revolution nearly all, if not all, of the male survivors of his father's family were practically evicted from their farms which were confiscated, and expatriated themselves to Nova Scotia and the Province of Ouebec in the North American British Dominion. While there was found public records of several members of the Nine Partners families, nothing was found in Nova Scotia concerning Rowland Soule. He evidently settled in Hebron, N. Y. However, this Rowland turns up in Albany, Vermont, in 1790.

Rowland Soule (1), the youngest son of George (4) and Lydia (Howland) Soule, was born in Duxbury or Dartmouth, Mass., Nov. 5, 1733; married Mary Irish, daughter of Jesse Irish, an early settler in the Nine Partners in Dutchess County, New York, and is supposed to have lived in Washington and Hebron, N. Y. There are some features of uncertainty in the history and genealogy, but the perpetuation of the peculiar name in branches descended from this man are a sufficient evidence of their connection with the parent stock. A principal reason for believing that some of the families whose records will appear in this department of this work lies within the fact that there has been found no other family from which they could have sprung. See a more extensive treatment of this subject where the name of Rowland Soule appears in the list of his father's children. The following records and biographical information will comprise all that is important found in the accumu-

lation of notes during an investigation covering more than fourteen years. We herewith swing wide the gates that open into a broad field wherein will be the treatment of several branches of the Soule family, and we introduce

The Soules of Duanesburg, New York.

Soule Family, Duanesburg, A. P.

Dutchess County Branch.

Jonathan Soule (4), probably the son of Rowland Soule and Mary (Irish) Soule of Nine Partners, Dutchess County, N.Y., and brother of George Soule of Coymans, Albany County, N. Y., and of Enos Soule of Savannah, Wayne County, N. Y., as well as several other brothers and sisters of whom more particulars in other departments of this work. This Jonathan Soule is recorded as having been born in 1761, a date just accommodated to the time when some other heads of departments saw the light. The universal tradition makes this man a native of Dutchess County, N. Y. Descended from George Soule and Lydia (Howland) of an old Ouaker stock, this family were loval adherents of that faith and much of the meagre information preserved within these volumes was derived from the records of this Society and descendants whose early years were passed in homes where their faith was inculcated. This Jonathan Soule was early a resident of Dover, Dutchess County, N. Y., where his name appears with many others of the Soule family in several old account books. Before a more careful search had been instituted the author had supposed this Jonathan was identical with that young doctor, a son of Jonathan Soule of Clinton, but according to the "Sisson Bible" this young professional died when only 25 years of age. Discarding this conjecture the thoughts turned toward another of the name, Jonathan Soule, son of James and a cousin of the young doctor; but he was far too young to fill the niche. Having accounted for all others of this name and a protracted study of the various pedigrees, I have assigned him a place among the Rowlands. One clipping culled from some early publication states that three brothers named Ionathan, George and Isaac removed to Duanesburg together.

CHILDREN OF JONATHAN AND SARAH HATFIELD SOULE.

- 1. Elizabeth Soule (1), eldest daughter of Jonathan (3) and Sarah (Hatfield) Soule, born Feb. 16, 1783.
- 2. Jerusha Soule (1), second daughter of Jonathan (3) and Sarah (Hatfield) Soule, born June 16, 1786; was the wife of Charles Worster, a prosperous man, and there is a certificate of removal dated 1813, when they went to the "Butternut Monthly Meeting." These parents were well known to their kindred and there seemed to be a prospect of procuring their family records, but all attempts failed.

- 3. Peter Soule (1), eldest son of Jonathan (3) and Sarah (Hatfield) Soule, born June 3, 1790; married Mary Lake who was born June 17, 1790 and died June 12, 1879. "Certificate of Removal" dated Sept. 24, 1814, with two children, named Sarah and Jonathan. These lived and died in Quaker Street, in Duanesburg, Schenectady County, N. Y. Devoted Quakers. Prosperous farmers. Issue:
 - Jonathan Soule, born Oct. 28, 1813, married twice. First to Margaret Ann Briggs, born 1827, died 1854, daughter of Stephen and Elizabeth Badgely Briggs; buried at Bloomington, N. Y. He married 2d, Sept. 20, 1855 Sarah A. Ketchum, born May, 1826. Children as follows:
 - (1) Seneca Soule, born at Quaker Street, N. Y., June 19, 1847. He died Aug. 10, 1913; unmarried.

(2) JAMES B. SOULE, born at Quaker Street, N. Y., Nov. 27, 1852; died Dec. 21, 1923; unmarried.

- (3) MARIETTE T. SOULE, born Nov. 18, 1856; was married Feb. 18, 1904 to JOHN M. CADY of Schoharie, N. Y. She died Feb. 28, 1917 and was buried there.
- (4) THOMAS B. K. SOULE, born June 1, 1862; married Rose Marie Picker, born Sept. 15, 1859 at Stamford, Conn.; died Dec. 27, 1921 in said town.
- (5) MARGARET ANN SOULE, born March 12, 1866 and resides at Quaker Street, N. Y. Miss Soule has long been interested in the history and genealogy of this branch of the family and having listened to much conversation relating to the early movements of the Quakers when "trecking" as pioneers from one section of the State, and to other States, she held their traditions with a remarkably retentive memory. She had accumulated some "notes" that might have been used to advantage in this compilation but they were burned. She has, however, rendered valuable assistance in connecting the various branches of the family.
- II. MARY P. Soule, born March 10, 1816; died unmarried.
- III. GEORGE SOULE, born March 24, 1818; died single.
- IV. PETER Soule, born March 24, 1829; died unmarried.
- v. Hatfield Soule, born Feb. 22, 1827; died unmarried.
- VI. JERUSHA SOULE, born Nov. 29, 1834; was married to ——— POTTER and when last heard from was living in Victoria, B. C.
- 4. Benjamin Soule (2), second son of Jonathan and Sarah (Hatfield) Soule, born July 16, 1790; married first, Susanna Norton who died and he married 2d, Mahala Collins, daughter of Samuel and Lillis Collins, born Jan. 8, 1806. He had a "Certificate of Removal" in 1817 when going to Russellville. He removed from the State of New York to Rollin, Lenawee County, Mich., in the fall of 1844, and from that place to Stanton, Montcalm County, Mich., in 1861. He was a farmer, a devoted member of the Quaker Society and a useful and highly respected citizen. After the death of his wife he went to live at the home of his son and namesake. He died May 24, 1863, aged 72

years, 10 months, 8 days. There were eight children in this family. Names will follow:

- I. LYDIA N. SOULE, eldest daughter of Benjamin and Susanna Norton, born in the State of New York, Nov. 7, 1814; was married to BENJAMIN M. GAGE Aug. 15, 1832 and by him had sixteen children, two of whom died in infancy. She died Jan. 20, 1879. He died Sept. 18, 1884. For children's names belonging to this family, see elsewhere in this work.
- Susanna Soule, eldest daughter of Benjamin and Mahala Collins, born Feb. 3, 1825; died Feb. 22, 1828.
- III. MATILDA SOULE, second daughter of Benjamin and Mahala Collins, born March 7, 1828; was married to MILTON LAMB and passed her days in Adrien, Mich. Issue.
- IV. COLLINS SOULE, born Jan. 15, 1830; died March 22, 1831.
- v. Lillis Soule, third daughter of Benjamin and Mahala Collins Soule, born Aug. 25, 1832; died Sept. 24, 1832.
- VI. SARAH M. SOULE, fourth daughter of Benjamin and Mahala Collins Soule, born June 27, 1837; was married to ———— GIBBS, brother of Robert Gibbs.
- VII. BENJAMIN C. SOULE, second son of Benjamin and Mahala Collins Soule, born Nov. 11, 1840; married 1st, Hannah D. Gibbs; died in Bushnell, Mich., Dec. 11, 1911, after eight days of intense suffering with pneumonia, aged 71 years and 26 days. He was born near Binghampton, N. Y., and went to Michigan with his parents when a child. His first marriage was June 23, 1860. After mourning her loss for four years he married 2d, Aug. 4, 1879, Ella Keyes. He was a farmer nearly all of his life. He was a great reader and was a real self-made man. He was familiar with nearly all historical literature and had studied the great religious systems, Christianity, Mohammedanism and Confucianism. He was considered to be the best read man in his community. He was a true Christian and an exemplary member of the Friends Society, composed of people called Ouakers. Children named as follows:
 - (1) JONATHAN B. C. SOULE, born Sept. 8, 1861; married when about 23 years of age, JENNIE LEAN who lived one year. He lived a widower nearly all of his matured life and died May 1, 1901.
 - (2) MARTHA E. L. SOULE, born Oct. 10, 1863 and died Dec. 1906. She was married first to George Butterfield and after 18 years was married to JAMES MILLER and lived but one year. She left a daughter, Ethel Miller.
 - (3) JUSTIN E. SOULE, born Aug. 11, 1866; died when 9 years of age.
 - (4) J. C. Belle Soule, born Dec. 14, 1886 (by second wife); was married in March, 1906 to O. H. KITZMILLER and has a son, O. H. Kitzmiller, born March 7, 1908, named for his grandfather.

- 5. Sarah Soule (2), daughter of Jonathan (3) and Sarah (Hatfield) Soule, born Aug. 27, 1792; was married to Philip Griffiths and lived in the northern section of New York State. "On June 10, 1808, Charles Wooster, Philip Griffiths and Peter Soule (with several others) arrived at Binghampton, N. Y., from Duanesburg, N. Y., and went from there to Silver Lake. This Philip Griffiths lived 59 years at Silver Lake and died there Nov. 21, 1868 in his 79th year. His wife died in 1857. They had ten children, all of them married while their parents were living. Their sons were named David, Isaac, Philip, Ezekiel, Absalom, Charles. The father of Philip was Jabez Griffiths who died March 19, 1868, aged 92 years. The author made an attempt to trace the families of Griffiths and Gage but found the undertaking too labyrinthine.
- 6. Jonathan H. Soule (4), third son of Jonathan (3) and Sarah (Hatfield) Soule, born Aug. 3, 1794; married ELIZABETH GAGE July 2, 1820 and died Aug. 8, 1875, aged 81 years, in Gaines, Genesee County, Mich. An obituary notice sent me by his only surviving daughter, Mrs. Southworth of Ovid, Mich., contains the following concerning this man: "Aug. 8, 1875, in Gaines, Genesee County, Mich., at the residence of his son Isaac G. Soule, died Ionathan H. Soule, aged 81 years. Mr. Soule was born in Coymans, Albany County, N. Y., Aug. 3, 1794, but passed the most of his life till the age of 29 in the County of Schoharie. He was married in 1820 to ELIZABETH GAGE and in 1823 moved to Perinton, Monroe County, where he cleared up a farm in what was then comparatively a new country. In 1842 his wife died leaving six children and the following year he married her sister, MARY GAGE. In the spring of 1855 he removed to Ovid, Clinton County, Michigan, where he again cleared a new-land farm and lived to see the wilderness gradually assume the features of an old settled country, and the village of Ovid grow from its first house to its present dimensions. Children's names will follow.
 - I. Julia Ann Soule, born May 14, 1821; was married to Thomas Southworth Sept. 25, 1841 and died Dec. 21, 1901. She was a "birthright" Quaker. He was born Jan. 31, 1817. Carpenter by trade. Belonged to the Masonic order. Moved from Monroe County, N. Y., to Clinton County, Mich., in 1854 and to the village of Ovid in 1866 where he continued to reside till his house was destroyed by fire Dec. 12, 1901, at which time he went to live with his son, H. Eugene Southworth, in Owosso, Mich. In October, 1902 he went with his sons to Burlington, Vt., where he died Oct. 31, 1902. Late in life he became much interested in Christian Science. Both were buried in Maple Grove Cemetery at Ovid, Mich. Children's names follow:
 - (1) LORENZO F. SOUTHWORTH, born May 25, 1842; married Dec. 1864 MARY E. DOAK. He served three years in the Civil War. Retired physician, residing in Custer, Mich. Free Mason. His wife died and he married a widow, CORNELIA HUTCHINS.
 - (2) ISAAC GAGE SOUTHWORTH, born March 21, 1844; married in 1866 to FIDELIA S. SMITH. Carpenter by trade. Odd

- Fellow. He resided at Owosso, Mich., July 4, 1912 and his widow still resides there.
- (3) ELIZABETH E. SOUTHWORTH, born Aug. 8, 1847, was married Aug. 3, 1866 to Samuel D. Haight, a lawyer, son of Samuel and Jane Haight of Rural Grove, N. Y. He died Feb. 25, 1880. Served three years in the Civil War. Was a Free Mason. Wife was married 2d, May 29, 1895, to Abram M. Eaton who died Dec. 16, 1898. He also served in the Civil War. Merchant and farmer. Buried in Maple Grove Cemetery, Ovid, Mich. She now resides in Detroit, Mich.
- (4) HENRY EUGENE SOUTHWORTH, born Nov. 28, 1851; married Cordelia Fish.
- (5) ALICE JULIETTA SOUTHWORTH, born Jan 23, 1855; was married June 12, 1875 to JAMES DURAND; died Aug. 8, 1878. He died Feb. 1902. Interred in Maple Grove Cemetery, Ovid, Mich.
- II. ISAAC GAGE SOULE, born Nov. 28, 1823, was married April 20, 1845 to HANNAH JONES of Mich., and died Jan. 14, 1899. Had issue six children; four now living.
- III. JONATHAN B. SOULE, born April 7, 1826; married to MARY HATH-AWAY of Michigan in 1848; went into the Union army during the Civil War and has not been heard from; supposed to have been killed in battle or to have died in the army.
- IV. DAVID H. SOULE, born May 29, 1829; was married to MARY E. HAIGHT of Montgomery County, N. Y., Jan. 29, 1849; died Dec. 4, 1898. He married 2d, EMMA TERRELL. He was a farmer in Ovid, Mich., from the year 1853, the most of his time till his death. His church choice was the Methodist to which he liberally contributed but was not a communicant. He was a "Free and Accepted Mason" and was buried under their rites. Two children:

(1) CARRIE BELLE SOULE, died when six years of age.

- (2) Byron V. Soule, born Oct. 7, 1858, was educated in the Ovid, Mich., High School and in the Law Department of the Michigan University; he is now practicing law in his native town. He was married in 1887 to Harriet Baird, of Vernon, Mich., and has one son, David H. Soule, who resides at Arcadia, Mich., single; a farmer.
- v. ELIZABETH SOULE, born Jan. 6, 1833; was married Sept. 27, 1852, to SILAS B. SOUTHWORTH, and is the only survivor of the family of Jonathan and Elizabeth Gage Soule. She lives at Ovid, Mich. Her husband died May 18, 1911.
- 7. Robert Soule (1), fifth son of Jonathan (3) and Sarah (Hatfield) Soule, born Feb. 3, 1797, probably in Dartmouth, Mass. Was carried by his parents to Dutchess County, N. Y., when a child. He married MARY PRATT and lived several years in Danby, Tompkins County, N. Y., where he cleared a farm and erected well arranged farm buildings. His son John went to live with his parents

and care for them in their declining years, but sold the estate and removed to Flushing, Genesee County, Mich., where he died Nov. 25, 1885, aged 89 years. His wife died there Sept. 2, 1890, aged 89 years. There are inscribed markers at their graves and a family monument on the lot bearing the inscription:

"Our Father and Mother are gone; they lie beneath the sod.

Dear parents, though we miss you much, we know you rest with God."

The Quaker records in Dutchess County, N. Y., show that Robert Soule was disowned by the society, Jan. 19, 1803 because of his "being out of plainness and attending a place of diversion." He was only a small lad at this time. Their children's names will follow.

- STEPHEN SOULE, eldest son of Robert and Mary (Pratt) Soule, born in 1821, died in Willsville, N. Y., April 21, 1842, aged 19 years.
- II. RACHEL SOULE, eldest daughter of Robert and Mary (Pratt) Soule, was married to Isaac Robinson and had issue.
- III. LUTHER SOULE, second son of Robert and Mary (Pratt) Soule, went to live with his parents in Flushing, Mich., and died there a very old man without issue.
- IV. REV. JOHN SOULE, third son of Robert and Mary (Pratt) Soule, born in 1820, married ELIZA HOYT and went to live with his parents in the town of Willsville, N. Y., but sold the farm and removed to Flushing, Mich., where he was established as a farmer and Methodist minister. This removal was in 1838. He was reported as an able and useful man and was appointed superintendent of his district, in which capacity he served as long as the rules of the Conference would admit. He left no children save an adopted daughter named Davenport. He died April 5, 1898, aged 68 years, 7 months and 13 days. His wife died March 28, 1898, aged 64 years, 4 months and 13 days. Under their names on their monument are the words: "They rest from their labors."
 - V. MARY ANN SOULE, second daughter of Robert and Mary (Pratt) Soule, born Feb. 17, 1833; was married to MILES C. MIX April 29, 1850. He was born Nov. 17, 1830 and died Sept. 25, 1904. She died April 15, 1911. They were buried in Willsville, N. Y. Children named as follows:
 - CHARLES F. MIX, born May 13, 1851; married ALICE JOHN-SON; died Feb., 1913.
 - (2) ROBERT S. MIX, born May 7, 1853; married EVALINE PIERCE.
 - (3) EMERY C. MIX, born April 20, 1855; married Ella G Strong.
 - (4) Francis B. Mix, born Aug. 10, 1857; married Ella Wright.
 - (5) ESTELLA MIX, born March 24, 1862; married WILLIAM H. CUMMINGS.
 - (6) WILLIE H. MIX, born May 5, 1864; died May, 1868.
 - (7) LEAFIE D. MIX, born June 2, 1868; married Dr. E. L. Bennett.

- (8) Fred G. Mix, born July 28, 1870; married Drusilla Stilson.
- (9) M. Curtis Mix, born March 5, 1877; married Nettie Lovejov.
- VI. SOLOMON SOULE, fourth son of Robert and Mary (Pratt) Soule, died near Elmira, N. Y., leaving one daughter. No other information.
- VII. GEORGE F. SOULE, fifth son of Robert (1) and Mary (Pratt) Soule, was born July 1837; married Hannah H. Hanor of Ellery County, born March 17, 1841. He went to Chautauqua County in 1859; went to South Port, near Elmira, to live in 1862. In 1867 the family went to California, a booming town in Missouri, but in consequence of the disagreeable climate returned within a year. He served in the 144th Regiment, New York Volunteers. In 1872 they removed to Spring Creek, Penn., but returned to Jamestown, Chautauqua County, N. Y., where he continued to reside till his death as a farmer. He was connected with Post Sturdivant, Grand Army of the Republic, Kennedy, N. Y., and was a member of the local Grange. He died in 1905. Widow still living on the homestead. Six children named as follows:
 - LE FRANCE F. SOULE, born 1862; married in 1885 RENA M. FURLOW and had issue four children.
 - (a) LAFAYETTE, born 1890; married and lives in Syracuse, N. Y.

8. Isaac Hatfield Soule (3), a son of Jonathan (2) and Sarah (Hatfield) Soule, was born in Dover, Dutchess County, N. Y., according to Quaker form May 16, 1800, but removed with his father's family to Schoharie County and settled on a farm on Schoharie Creek; afterwards they moved to Duanesburg, Schenectady County, N. Y. He went to Ohio when a young man, lost all connection with his relatives and left nothing for his children but vague tradition concerning them. His wives were half-sisters. Isaac H. Soule was a carpenter and builder by trade and this occupation required his attention much away from his home and family. He was a man of medium stature and build; was well educated for his time and taught school in early life. He was industrious and frugal and avoided disputes and litigation. He was a member of the Whig Party till the Republican Party was organized, then affiliated with that. He was never a party politician but was regular at the polls with his vote. His wife, while wanting in classic education, was a woman of fine intelligence, well-informed and enterprising. She was an ardent Prohibitionist before the Prohibition party was formed. Devoted to her home and the care of her children, she exerted an influence over them for good that was indestructible. Resulting from a fall from a building where he was employed, one of his limbs was permanently crippled and he limped ever afterwards. About the year 1857, he procured 120 acres of land by purchase from the government, and his wife, when the mother of seven children, assisted by her oldest son, removed, transporting her household goods with a yoke of oxen, and covered a journey of 300 miles in fifteen days, camping nights on the road, to settle on the new land. During the pioneer days the family experienced all the deprivation and hardships incident to such conditions, but with frugality and prudent management they forged ahead and were soon abundantly supplied with substantial comforts. Mr. Soule died in 1869 and was buried in Lincoln Township, Trempealeau County, Wisconsin.

Having assigned his foundry and machinist business over to his son-in-law, that is, the active management, though retaining the presidency of the corporation, he purchased a rural home on the seashore in Florida in 1902, where he passed many a vacational season; but wishing to secure better advantages for the education of his children, he purchased an elegant and spacious mansion in Meridian, Miss., his former seat, and established his home there, where, surrounded by his growing family, he enjoyed rest and recreation, resulting from a successful business career. 

Mount Lebanon, N. Y., in 1867, as did her sister Malinda; from a statement from the society was suffering from tuberculosis, but with great care lived till Dec. 1868. The lady superintendent of the Shaker Community, writing the author, says of the Soule sisters: "Both were lovely characters, very conscientious, intelligent, refined, deeply religious, and were fondly beloved as far as known." Her brother, writing of her, says: "She became a great favorite in the Shaker Society because of her sweetness of spirit and benevolence. There was something truly remarkable about these young ladies. They would give their clothing away until they were nearly destitute themselves. One of them on a certain occasion met a poor girl on the street whose feet were exposed, and removing her own shoes and hose she gave them to the stranger. This is only one among many instances that might be recited in which the unselfish, sacrificing spirit of these ladies was manifested. They were too good for this world." Emeline died Dec. 29, 1868 and lies buried beside her sister Malinda in the Shaker Cemetery at Mt. Lebanon, N. Y.

XI. DR. PETER CLEMENT SOULE, born Sept. 16, 1844; enlisted in 1861 at the early age of 17 years in the Union Army; served under Sherman in the Valley and carries nine scars from wounds as the result of his campaigns. His military experiences were exceptional and the reports of his services were several times brought to the consideration of President Lincoln. He studied medicine, graduated from the Ohio Medical College and has practiced in Rochester and Buffalo, N. Y. He settled in Rossburg, N. Y., in 1881 and has made that his principal residence since. He is a man of great originality and has, like his brother, before mentioned, secured patents on several useful inventions.

As early as 1866, he began to advocate publicly woman suffrage and the abolition of standing armies and wars and the establishment of an International Congress by which all national disputes should be settled; thus dispensing with nine-tenths of the expense of the military organizations of the world and its devotion to comfort and happiness of the human family. He has been a prolific writer on these themes under a pen-name and believes the time is near when his dreams and prophetic statements will be realized. He was probably the first man to erect a suffrage pole and unfurl a suffrage flag and this event occurred at his home in Rossburg, N. Y., in 1866. He still has the star, pole, and flag. The design was printed on white ribbon and was worn by the ladies of the "White Star Literary Society" which he organized. Dr. Soule has been twice married. His first wife was CLARA B. BARBER of Duanesburg, N. Y., by whom he had four children. He married 2d, ———— by whom three children. See below.

1. Enos Soule (1), was a son of Rowland (2) and grandson of Rowland Soule 1st, who was the youngest son of George Soule and his wife Lydia Howland of Nine Partners, Dutchess County, N. Y. Miss Mary Soule, the daughter of Enos and Mary Titus Soule of Savannah, N. Y., stated without any evident hesitation that her grandfather was named Rowland Soule and that he died in Vermont. She had listened when a child to the conversation between her parents when they were rehearsing historical traditions and heard this statement many times. This assumption is supported by many evidences and contradicted by none. This Mary Soule also informed me that the family in Duanesburg were her cousins. The Quaker records contain enough to prove the affiliation of the several branches of the family. They were all members of the "Society of Friends" and worshiped together according to the "Inner Light." Then the adoption and perpetuation of the name Rowland should be considered sufficient evidence to support the statement of Mary Soule. This name has not been found in any distant branch of the Soule family and until some authentic documentary proof can be found to cast doubt upon this theory the author of this work will feel well satisfied with his assumptions.

This family lived in Duanesburg, Schenectady County, N. Y., until they moved to Savannah, in Wayne County, N. Y. Enos Soule had been in Duanesburg when a young man and had built a house there before he was married and his children were all, save one and the youngest, born in that town. When they settled in Savannah, the family lived in a log house for a few years, then the residence in which the family subsequently domiciled was

built upon the same site, one mile north of Savannah village.

Enos Soule was an intimate friend of Gerrit Smith who was a resident of Peterboro, and was a practical and fearless Abolitionist, personally active in operating the "Underground Railroad" as well as an ardent leader in the temperance cause. He was a man of staunch independence and of uncompromising determination; he certainly had the confidence of his convictions and seems to have by precept and example transmitted his qualities of mind and heart to his children. He was of medium stature with dark hair and eyes. His wife was of fair complexion. Enos Soule died Sept. 21, 1861. He married Mary Titus, a daughter of Asa Titus, who was born in Everettstown, N. Y., July 19, 1787 and died Dec. 19, 1861. There were seven children whose names and records will presently appear.


2. John Soule (1), second son of Rowland (2) and brother of Enos Soule, was twice married, and the second wife who had been seen by Mary Soule, was named Priscilla. She had a daughter named Jane Soule. This family lived in the town of Scipio, Cayuga County, N. Y., and here the husband and father died. His children were named Wilson, Lavinia, Rowland and Jane, and some of these removed to Michigan and settled there. See account of the descendants.

The following abstracts from an extensive obituary notice published at the time of his death comprise the salient features of his character and career:

"Asa Titus Soule died at the residence of his son, Wilson Soule, after an illness of less than three weeks.

"This visitation of the death messenger takes from Western New York one of its foremost business men. He has always been looked on as a Rochester man, although as a matter of fact he never formally took up his residence here. In this city, however, he started in the principal business of his long and varied career, and here his business headquarters has since remained. Here also he passed a large portion of his time, always stopping at the residence of his son while in the city.

"Deceased was born in Duanesburg, Schenectady County, this state, and was sixty-five years of age. His father, Enos Soule, was a Quaker farmer and it is easy to trace his inherited devotion to truth, his justness and exactness in all his dealings, his sense of honor and his sterling integrity.

About the year 1830, the family removed to Onondaga County and a little later to Savannah, Wayne County, New York, where the farm was purchased which became the family homestead and was Mr. Soule's home up to the time of his death. The children were educated in the village school. After the family grew up one brother, Lewis Soule, went west. Rowland and Asa were noted for their close affection, and while both lived they were really partners in all their business affairs. They married two sisters and jointly conducted the old homestead. The house was divided into apartments for two dwellings.

"The mere record of Asa T. Soule's business and financial career would fill pages. In fact, material could be gleaned from a study of his life for a superb novel. In this brief article, it is only possible to touch lightly upon the principal features of his career. In his early manhood he secured some knowledge of the patent medicine business, being an agent for a firm engaged in that line of trade. The influence of this experience on his future mercantile life, on looking back, would seem most important. Subsequently he dealt in patent rights, acting as agent in their sales, and to this brief experience may be ascribed some of the legal knowledge and shrewdness, especially in the matter of contract law, for which he was noted. Subsequently he bought an interest in the Dodge & Stevenson Manufacturing Company of Auburn, New York, a company manufacturing and selling agricultural implements. Among other things, in his early life he was a produce merchant, kept a hotel at South Butler. New York, and was financially interested in peach orchards and mineral springs in Michigan. Near the close of the war, about the year 1868, Mr. Soule in company with the late Alexander Pomerov of Rochester engaged in the business of mapping various counties in New Jersey and Pennsylvania. In this pursuit the two men continued for several years. Here again it would seem that Mr. Soule was only laying the groundwork for his further operations on a larger scale. It is not going outside the limits of probability to say that in the map business he gained much of the knowledge which he afterwards turned to account in his remarkably successful land investments. In all these ventures he made money. In his career there was no struggle with poverty. It cannot be said that he had the incentive of the wolf at the door to make him work. It was solely the sturdiness and ambition in his nature which impelled him on, not allowing him to rest after moderate success, but driving him far up the hill to fame and fortune.

"In 1873 an incident occurred of vast importance to him. A short time before in the thriving village of Canandaigua a patent medicine known as Hop Bitters had been put on the market, and subsequently the concern moved to Rochester. There wasn't much money in the company and its originators having heard of Mr. Soule as a rushing business man with money at his command, sent for him and invited him to contribute both money and brain power. He considered the matter and decided there was merit in the plan and accepted the offer. The company as at first composed had only put in a few hundred dollars and he at once bought two-thirds of the patent rights, put in all the money he had and took charge of the concern. At the time some people thought he had been victimized. His success was phenomenal but not immediate. With his natural shrewdness he fully recognized the benefits of advertising and in this lies the secret of his triumph. As soon as he took hold of

the establishment he commenced advertising on a colossal scale. His means were limited for going into business so extensively, and now occurred the only critical period of his career. The returns had not yet commenced to come in and he had used up nearly all the funds at his disposal, his own money as well as borrowed assets. Even then, when affairs seemed weighing in the balance, he never lost faith in his ultimate victory and bought from the stockholders more of the stock until he practically owned it all. At last the scale turned in the right direction, money commenced to flow in more freely and Mr. Soule's anticipations were more than realized. To the newspapers Mr. Soule paid many thousands of dollars for advertising. His fertile mind originated many novel ways of attracting notice to his business through the press, including plans for securing most valuable advertising in the form of news. In this city for a couple of years he furnished the funds for maintaining a professional baseball club, only stipulating that the club should be known by the same name as his bitters. Afterwards, he arranged the celebrated Hanlon-Courtney rowing regatta at Lachine, Ontario. The regatta at Chautauqua Lake where Courtney's boat was saved was also under his auspices, as was the one at Washington and the one following at Australia. In London, Mr. Soule arranged an international regatta which created great excitement, members of Parliament and others high in official positions being on the regatta committee. A leading London paper in a long article published after the regatta called Mr. Soule the prince of advertisers and made the assertion that never before had a man succeeded like him in getting from the English press, without charge, the most valuable advertisement in the shape of telegraphic and local news. All these contests took place between the years 1873 and 1880. During the five years following the year of 1879 the medicine had a great sale. Mr. Soule went to London in 1880 and established a branch of the business there and put it in charge of his nephew, James Seeley. A branch was started in Toronto and one in Australia. In France and Belgium the business was put in charge of another nephew, Welling Soule. About that time, Frank W. Dickinson of this city went to India with a view of starting a branch there, but found it impracticable to do so, the field not being encouraging for that line of business. Some years later the English business was sold to a syndicate, and since then all other interests in foreign countries were disposed of. Mr. Soule continued president of the original company in Rochester up to the time of his death.

"Nearly ten years ago, Mr. Soule's attention was called to the possibilities of southwestern Kansas as a field of enterprise. He became the leading spirit of the Eureka Irrigating Company which constructed a canal seventy-five miles long, not including laterals, fifteen feet wide at the bottom. with sloping banks, the water being five feet in depth; the water being drawn from the Arkansas River. The land through which it passed was formerly arid and unprofitable and the charges for irrigating it were paid by the owners at so much per acre. Mr. Soule became the owner of large tracts of land adjoining the canal. Their company's stock was sold to an English capitalist and was bonded in England for one million dollars. Mr. Soule built a railroad connecting with the Atchison, Topeka and Santa Fe line running through southwestern Kansas. At various points along the new road he also acquired large

tracts of land. Mr. Soule became interested in Dodge City, constructing the city's water works and receiving from the corporation a considerable amount of land. He founded in this city Soule College at a cost of fifty thousand dollars, besides endowing it with some of the land which he received from the water works deal. He founded the first National Bank of Dodge City, Kansas. In Spearville, Ingalls, and other places in that section of the state he also started banks.

"While engaged in extensive enterprises in other states, Mr. Soule also invested money freely at home. He owned several farms near Savannah and had considerable money invested in mortgages on farm property in Western New York. He owned several houses and business blocks in the Seventh Ward of Rochester. He was one of the original directors of the company which laid out the boulevard from Rochester to Charlotte. He also owned \$83,000 worth of stock in the Electric Railway on the boulevard. In politics, the deceased was a Republican and he was a leading supporter of the party in Wayne County, contributing liberally to campaign funds. He never held office, although he was many times solicited to accept nominations at the hands of his party. It would be difficult to estimate his wealth. He was certainly one of the richest men in this city, but it is doubtful if anybody can give an accurate idea of what he was worth.

"Deceased was a man not fully understood by people who were wont to call him, as they say of many wealthy men, a close man. He was close, if by the term is meant a strict adhesion to his contract. He allowed no man to defraud him. He thoroughly understood the common-sense spirit of the law. To his lawyers he would often say, 'Tell me the law and I will apply it.' He was most careful in his use of the English language, believing that every word had a meaning. When he made a statement he realized exactly what he had to say. In drawing contracts he was an expert and without a doubt had he followed the law as a profession he would have become eminent in that pursuit. To men who were honest in their dealings with him, Mr. Soule granted many favors. He had helped many business men through difficulties of which their neighbors knew nothing. He gave in his own way, often profusely assisting families whose wants came under his personal attention. The people who knew him best speak most warmly of these charities. He did not often, however, take part in organized charities. His liberal donation to the Young Men's Christian Association before work was commenced on the Association's new building will not be forgotten by citizens. He was much devoted to the temperance cause and furnished funds for starting several local societies, renting halls and conducting the meetings, although few knew of this. In his personal life, he was unostentatious and social among his friends. was not much addicted to society, however, spending with his family all the time he could take from his business."

One son, as follows:

I. WILSON SOULE, born Sept. 4, 1854, in South Butler, N. Y., was killed in a runaway accident July 25, 1894. He attended school in the country district and in Lyons, N. Y., till near his majority and then joined his father in the proprietary medicine business, being secretary of the Hop Bitters Company. After his father's death in 1890,

he found it necessary to retire and give his whole attention to the management of an estate which included not only land but securities of irrigating canal companies, railroads and banks. He was a man of generous nature and gave liberally of his ample means to charities and education. He married MISS FRANCES PARKHURST of Rochester, N. Y., by whom three children; she died Feb. 28, 1895. Issue:

Mrs. Anna Soule Weigel, daughter of William G. Soule, says: "I never heard a word of controversy between my parents nor a shadow of gossip. Father always made it known that no disagreeable elements should be voiced before him and secluded himself from trouble of any kind whenever opportunity allowed. Truth and honesty in word and action were both shown by example and precept. There were no harsh corrections nor free use of the rod, yet we each felt in honor bound to respect and obey his desires, and any attempt at deceit was met by a reproving eye which turned our hearts right. This influence of an irreproachable moral man bore to the end. He was not a churchgoer but a home theologian and broad reader, gaining and progressing ever with the times. He always surrounded himself with the most improved implements and methods. He showed marked humane traits, taking as good care of his stock as of his housed family, and was stern with any employees who neglected any point that would cause distress to dumb animals. Considerate, patient and without one bad habit, we mourned him as few fathers deserve; yet he was always joking and singing, giving to his children every happiness available.

"Our home was on a hill overlooking the town and just bordering the corporation limits, so we could have the advantages of a village school to give us a

start in our education." Children:

Dutchess County Branch.

George Soule (1), reputed to have been a son of Rowland (1) and Mary, a daughter of Jesse Irish of Nine Partners, Dutchess County, N. Y. He was born as early as 1765-70, for he was a married man in 1790 when we find him the owner of a farm in Coymans, Albany County, N. Y. It is on record that his lands joined those of his brother, Jonathan Soule. In a joint deed dated 1808 the name of this George Soule appears with those of Hannah Soule and Anna Soule and the land specified in the conveyance was bounded on one side by that of George Soule. His will was admitted to probate in 1815 and contains the name Rachel as his wife; and in this testament he mentions seven sons and three daughters. To three of these sons he gives horses, saddles and bridles to be available when they have reached their majority. His widow, Rachel Soule, and son Stephen Soule were appointed executors. The names of children mentioned in his will were: Stephen, Frederick, George, Benjamin, Elizabeth, Sarah and Judith. There existed the tradition that there had been a Family Record of the births, marriages and deaths in this family, but after long searching it failed to appear. The detached data embodied in this record has been gleaned from many sources and is not satisfactory. Some members of the family, though often solicited, have persistently refused to even supply their own family records. Certainly George and Rachel Soule were worthy persons, brought up in the Quaker faith, and left some excellent descendants whose names will follow.

- 1. Stephen Soule (1), supposed to have been the eldest son of George (1) and Rachel Soule, born as early as 1794 as proven when acting as executor of his father's will, having attained his majority at this time, but he evidently died young as none of the surviving relatives remember of hearing his name mentioned. I found record of a Stephen Soule who died in Indiana, whom I have thought might have been identical.
- 2. Frederick Comer Soule (1), second son of George (1) and Rachel, born about 1792, was mentioned in his father's will. His wife's name was Polly. Have no account of his after life.

- 3. Elizabeth Soule (1), eldest daughter of George and Rachel, born probably in Coymans Township, Albany County, N. Y., in 1796, was mentioned in her father's will in 1815, but is not remembered by her surviving kindred. Died young?
- 4. Sarah Soule (1), second daughter of George and Rachel, born in Coymans Township, Albany County, N. Y., March 28, 1798; was married Dec. 23, 1819 to ELIJAH TOWNSEND, born April 29, 1793 and died Oct. 8, 1836. After the death of her husband she went by team in a sleigh with seven children from Chenango Forks, in Chenango County, N. Y., to Keefer's Corners, Albany County, N. Y. This was another example of heroism evinced by a woman possessed of a pioneer spirit. She was a God-fearing mother who brought up her children in the "nurture and admonition of the Lord" and they without exception did credit to their training, being exemplary people who reverenced their mother. The father was a man of truth and honor who held the respect of all who knew him. Their children were named as follows:

I. RACHEL TOWNSEND, born Nov. 14, 1820; died April 29, 1821.

II. ROBERT COPELAND TOWNSEND, born Jan. 18, 1822; married May 15, 1852 to Ellen Gedney and lived at Keefer's Corners until 1869, and thence to the time of his death, May 27, 1905, at Cox-

sackie, Green County, N. Y.

III. MARY TOWNSEND, born March 9, 1824; married to ZACHARIAH MEAD and lived for some time at Keefer's Corners; then at New Baltimore, Greene County; then at Troy, N. Y. until the death of her husband, when she went to Coxsackie and New Baltimore where she died Jan. 6, 1898.

IV. ELIZABETH TOWNSEND, born Aug. 14, 1826; married to Dennis Swartout, lived at Albany, N. Y., and Coymans Hollow, where

she died.

v. George Soule Townsend, born Oct. 24, 1828; married Mary Brate Whitbeck and lived from the time of his marriage till his

death, Jan. 1, 1904, at West Coxsackie, N. Y.

VI. JOHN ELIJAH TOWNSEND, born Dec. 12, 1830; married Dec. 27, 1856 to HANNAH BLODGET and died Feb. 19, 1904. He resided in 1857 at Coxsackie Station, Columbia County, N. Y., and from 1858 to 1863 inclusive, three miles West of Coymans, Albany County, N. Y.; then until 1870, at Collanan's Corners, Albany County, N. Y.; then at West Coxsackie, Green County, N. Y., till his death.

VII. HANNAH JANE TOWNSEND, born Feb. 1, 1833; married to DAVID HENRY GAGE and lived first at Albany, N. Y., then at New Balti-

more, N. Y., where she died.

VIII. SARAH TOWNSEND, born April 19, 1835; died Aug. 26, 1853.

5. George Soule (2), a son of George (1) and Rachel, born in Coymans, N. Y., May 17, 1800, died May 17, 1847. His wife was JANE KEEFER, daughter of Baltus Keefer, born June 12, 1801 and died at Morristown, Minn., during the summer, 1775. Their home had been at "Keefer's Corner" but the widow and her family moved to Watertown, Wis., in 1849 and to Morristown, Wis., in 1855. They went from Albany to Buffalo by Erie Canal, thence by steamer

through Lakes Erie, Huron and Michigan to Milwaukee; thence by grain wagon to Watertown, Wis., where the older sons were employed in a brickyard by "Old Boomer" and rented by Andrew Storer, their brother-in-law. Here they were surrounded by Winnebago Indians, a very friendly tribe, from whom no harm ever befell them. After moving to Minnesota the Sioux Indians often encamped on their farm and near their house when on their migratory journeys but were always on very friendly terms with the Soules, one of whom has said: "No Sowles ever known to me was ever troubled by Indians or renegade white men, officers of the law or the inside of a jail, and the whole family have a reputation for minding their own business." During the pioneer days they were often regaled by the howling of wolves. The wild land upon which they settled was composed of small open prairies interspersed with groves of oak, hickory, and black walnut. Wild game, fruits and nuts were plentiful. In the "better days," after a few acres had been opened to the plow, they raised some wheat but were compelled to transport it with slowmoving ox-teams to Hastings, sixty miles away, on the Mississippi, to have it milled into flour. By industry and frugality every obstacle was overcome and Prosperity spread her mantle over the household. Mrs. Jane Soule has been estimated as a very remarkable woman, well suited to the tasks incident to pioneer life, and she assumed the cares and responsibilities of the situation in a new country with heroic fortitude and acquitted herself of her duties in the most conscientious and faithful manner. Full of hope and resolution she did not permit any obstacle to daunt her but patiently and persistently toiled on and achieved success where many would have failed. She became well and widely known for her noble qualities of mind and heart and was sincerely lamented by all who knew her when she passed away. in this family eight sons and two daughters, their names being Elizabeth, Henry, Stephen, Baltus K., Maryette, William R., Frederick N., Leonard E. and George W. See forward.

- 6. Benjamin G. Soule (1), third son of George (1) and Rachel, was born in Albany County, N. Y., 1802 and died in the almshouse unmarried. The statement procured from the records of this institution as follows: "Benjamin G. Soule, aged 75, born in New York State, single, habits temperate, can read and write, very feeble, recovery doubtful, admitted Dec. 27, 1877 and discharged Jan. 17, 1878. There is no headstone to prove his age and the preceding report does not tally with family tradition which makes him dissipated and a "ne'er-do-well."
- 7. Judith Soule (1), third daughter of George (3) and Rachel Soule, born in Coymans Township, Albany County, N. Y., ———; married John Loucks of Coymans Hollow and left issue but her children refuse to furnish records. Her daughter is Mrs. Rachel Cheesbro, Fieura Bush, Albany County, N. Y. There are also sons living.

1. Elizabeth Soule (3), eldest daughter of George and Jane Keefer Soule, born May 23, 1824 in Coymans, N. Y., was married to MICHAEL ONN, Nov. 27, 1847, born Feb. 1814, died Aug. 2, 1872. She died Nov. 12, 1878. They were buried near Cordova, Minn. Children as follows:

He removed to Watertown, Wisconsin and later to Morristown, Minn. He enlisted at Fort Snelling, Minn., in Company H of the Third Regt. Vol. Inf'y., Feb. 18, 1864 and was mustered out Sept. 2, 1865. After the war he went to Baker City, Oregon (1876), where he engaged in ranching and fruit-raising; and died there June 9, 1877. Children named as follows:
 - Andrew Soule, born in 1848, married Alice Fink and had issue Paul, Nona and Cora.
 - II. Frank Soule, born in 1851 in Watertown, Wis., and was married to Stephen Norris in 1870.

- 3. Stephen George Soule (2), second son of George and Jane Keefer Soule, born March 11, 1828 in Coymans, N. Y. He married Mary E. Tarkington of Morristown, Minn. He removed from his childhood home to the West with the other members of the family. After a voyage around Cape Horn to seek the gold fields of California he returned to Morristown, Minn., where he followed farming and shoemaking. He has deceased. Had issue but family did not send the children's names.
- 4. Baltus Keefer Soule (1), third son of George and Jane Keefer Soule, born Jan. 21, 1830 in Coymans, N. Y., and while young removed with his mother and others to Wisconsin and Minnesota in 1849 and 1855. He enlisted at Fort Snelling, Minn., April 29, 1861 in Company G, First Minn. Vol. Inf'y., was wounded at Fredericksburg and Antietam, and was discharged for disability Feb. 16, 1863. He was a farmer near Morristown, Minn., for a few years, then removed to Montevideo, Minn., where he took up a homestead right and was a farmer, drove stage and carried the mails till 1892 when he returned to Morristown, Minn., with a team. In 1896 he entered the Soldiers' Home at Minnehaha Falls, Minn., where he died Sept. 25, 1903, unmarried. He was the "head of the family" after his father's death and his only fault was his extreme generosity.
- 5. Maryette Soule (1), second daughter of George and Jane Keefer Soule, born in Coymans, N. Y., June 23, 1833; was married in 1852 to Andrew Storer

of Watertown, Wis. They removed to Iowa, thence to Morristown, Minn., then to Sherman County, Kansas. His wife died Mar. 25, 1887. Children's names were not supplied.

- 6. William Riley Soule (1), fourth son of George and Jane Keefer Soule, born at Coymans, N. Y., July 22, 1835, and followed the family about a year after their removal and accompanied them to Morristown, Minn., where he resided till his death. He enlisted in Company L, First Minn. Heavy Artillery at Fort Snelling, Minn., Feb. 21, 1865. Was mustered out Sept. 27, 1865. He was always a farmer. He died at Morristown, Minn., date unknown, as his widow declined to supply any information.
- 7. Frederick Newton Soule (2), fifth son of George and Jane Keefer Soule, born at Coymans, N. Y., Nov. 22, 1838 and went West with the others of this family in 1849. He enlisted in Company H, Third Regt. Vol. Inf'y., in Feb. 1864, and died at Pine Bluff, Ark., Sept. 28, 1864, leaving two sons, of whom presently. His wife was SARAH BLOOMER of Morristown, Minn.
 - George Alton Soule, born April 9, 1863 in Morristown, Minn., and was married Aug. 11, 1889 to Louisa Donaldson. His residence was at Lebanon, Oregon. Methodist. Two children: Harold Alton Soule, born Aug. 15, 1890; Naomi Olive Soule, born Aug. 4, 1892; married Charles Snyder, July 10, 1912.
 - II. ELFRED NEWTON SOULE, now of Woodburn, Ore.
- 8. Leonard Elijah Soule (1), sixth son of George and Jane Keefer Soule, born in Coymans, N. Y., Dec. 22, 1842; went West with his mother and others in 1849 and died at Morristown, Minn., Dec. 2, 1859, aged 17 years, 11 months and 9 days.
- 9. George Washington Soule (3), seventh son of George and Jane Keefer Soule, was born at Coymans, N. Y., March 11, 1844. He went West with the others of the family in 1849 and remained on the homestead farm till the Civil War. He enlisted in Co. H, Third Minn. Vol. Inf'y, Feb. 18, 1864. This regiment was on picket duty and engaged in skirmishes at the front until mustered out at Fort Snelling, Minn., Sept. 2, 1865. The principal battles in which he was engaged were Fitzhugh's Woods and Pine Bluffs, Arkansas. After the war he took up farming near Morristown, Minn., but across the line in Waseca County, where he and his bachelor brother, Baltus Soule, lived with their widowed sister-in-law, Mrs. Frederick N. Soule. He married June 13, 1867, MISS SARAH GIBBS, daughter of Henry and Ann Gibbs of Blooming Grove, Waseca County, Minn., born in England in 1848 and came to America with her parents in 1858. By this union two children were born, of whom presently. The mother dying in Sept. 1872, he married 2d, in Jan. 1875, Miss SARAH CANFIELD, of Waseca, Minn., daughter of Judge Job and Mary A. Canfield, by whom two children. He served as county commissioner for two townships in Waseca County, and assessor of Blooming Grove Township for six years at different times. He has said he had held every office in the Methodist Church but that of preacher when the services were held in the primitive school-houses. He was a member of the Farmer's Alliance and is now a member of the Grand Army of the Republic. In 1897, he attended the

National Reunion of the Grand Army at Buffalo, N. Y., riding in a sleeping car nearly all of the way along the line of the old Erie Canal over which the Soule family had travelled slowly in an opposite direction 48 years before; and while on this trip he visited his native town and renewed his friendship with many old acquaintances. In the following autumn, 1898, he and his sons removed to Oregon, and settled in Lacomb, Linn County, "where every man is his brother's keeper; socially and climatically the best country God ever allowed out of doors." He has said that about all of the education he ever had was hammered into his head in a private dwelling or in an old log schoolhouse with the cracks chinked with mud. When speaking of the pioneer days Mr. Soule has said he found, when reaching Morristown, Minn., where his elder brothers had put up a log house and covered it with bark, and that this was a lucky hit, as the following winter was one of Minnesota's coldest. They had planted a few potatoes and a little sod corn and they managed to live quite comfortably. His companions were often Indians. Mr. Soule, who is a man of superior intelligence and of unimpeachable character, has been a confirmed invalid for several years. He has contributed considerable information for this family history in which he has manifested much interest. His children named as follows:

CHARLES EMERY SOULE, born June 25, 1868; married EMMA SEMON of Morristown, Minn., in 1894 and went to Lacomb, Ore., in Oct. 1898. He took up a homestead claim in the Sissetin Reservation, South Dakota, when only 22 years of age. Now living on a farm

in Lacomb, Linn County, Ore.

II. IRA GARFIELD SOULE, born Aug. 14, 1880; married Sept. 5, 1907, MISS MARGARET MATILDA WORKINGER, daughter of Gilbert and Nancy (Gibson) Workinger, of Linn County, Ore., born on her father's farm there Nov. 2, 1886. In 1892 he went with his parents to the city of Waseca, Wis., where he attended the public schools till the removal to Oregon in 1898. He attended the Agricultural College at Casnallis, Benton County, Ore., and is now located on a farm in Lacomb, Linn County, Oregon. He is a man of fine intelligence and of progressive ideas. He is a Justice of the Peace and district school clerk. Children as follows:

(1) LENORE WORKINGER SOULE, born Nov. 11, 1908.

(2) MARGARET MAY SOULE, born July 24, 1910.

Soules of Villsdale, New York.

Ebenezer Branch.

ON. EBENEZER SOULE (1), a son of Benjamin (3) and Abigail (Howland) Soule, was born in Dutchess County, N. Y., May 14, 1750 and died in Hillsdale, N. Y., July 9, 1812. He married first MERCY FOOTE, a fact that was discovered by a legal document in which her name appeared. She was the daughter of one Joseph and Zeruiah Foote, and a daughter of her son, Ebenezer Soule, Ir., was named for her. She was the mother of his twelve children and her husband wrote down in his Bible, "My wife Mercy died on the 14th day of December, 1805, being in her 57th year." Afterwards, quite late in life, he married Mary, the widow of Daniel Lord—after a certain legal document had been formulated and signed by both of them; this concerning their personal property. She survived him and the marriage contract was, in a measure, carried out as mentioned in his will of date March 13, 1811. He may have made his home with the Lane family after his second marriage. Ebenezer Soule was buried in a field cemetery in Spencertown, N. Y., with several other members of his family. Their inscriptions were copied at my request in the summer of 1920.

He served in the New York Militia during the Revolution, and his name with the number of his children appeared in the Census Returns of 1790-1810. He was appointed Judge of the Court of Common Pleas for the County of Columbia as early as 1808, after an extended term of service as Justice of the Peace. He was also a Trial Justice. Was a Commissioner and filled other positions of trust. He was born of Quaker stock and brought up his family in the "straitest sect" of that faith—in which he himself walked and exemplified

its virtues among his fellow-men.

Ebenezer Soule seems to have settled upon leased land. From John Rensselaer Dec. 23, 1773 he received a lease of a farm at Claverack within the Manor of Rensselaerwick, 133 acres, reserving a parcel conveyed by Philip Schuyler and Catherine, his wife, to Samuel Utley. In 1801 John Chase was seized of this parcel and Ebenezer Soule was seized of rent reserved to John VanRensselaer. In 1804 he satisfied a mortgage given by Henry T. Trave of Claverack for £423-25 on lands in Hillsdale, N. Y., the farm formerly belonging to Christian Ray, now in possession of Ebenezer Soule.

Note.—The Foote Family. My venerable correspondent, Mrs. Wentworth, along with her relative, Mrs. Montgomery, have been of great assistance while tracing the branches of the Hillsdale family. The former remembers Mr. Joseph Foote well. He was a veteran of the Revolution; was a very illiterate man but a well-to-do farmer. He lived not distant from Rev. Ebenezer Soule, south of Spencertown. Knew his second wife and his son and daughters. Paulanus Foote lived in Coventry and after the death of his second wife his father went to live with him. The old man was eccentric. He always walked with a cane. His first wife was named Zeruiah and her niece Zeruiah Soule was named for her. Sally Foote, a sister of Mrs. Mercy Soule, was the wife of Charles Hicks but had no children. Some of the descendants of Mercy Foote Soule knew of the connection.

In the preamble of his last will and testament he "blessed God that he was in good health and sound mind and memory." Gave loving wife Abigail all her wearing apparel, two feather beds, one suit of calico bed curtains, one bureau and six "Windsor chairs," six silver spoons marked "A. L." (Abigail Lord) together with many other articles of furniture which my said wife brought with her when she came into my family according to certain articles signed by my said wife and myself when entering into covenant of marriage." This indicated the mercenary character of the marital union.

The old family Bible owned by Ebenezer Soule, now owned by a grand-daughter in Los Angeles, California, contains the following written by his own hand: "Be it remembered that the above-named children all dined at my table in the town of Hillsdale, on the 24th day of January, 1804; ten of them married and setteld in the parts of the country where their lots were cast; their husbands and wives also attending with them, except one. At that time I made a calculation of the number of children and grandchildren, with one great-grandchild, I being at this time in my 57th year, and found them to be 66."

Benjamin Soule, son of this man, inscribed in this Bible the following: "Ebenezer Soule departed this life on the 9th day of January, 1812, in the 67th year of his age. He then left five sons and seven daughters to mourn the loss of the departed father. All of the above-named sons and daughters had

the privilege of attending the funeral of their father."

This was certainly a very remarkable family and such assemblies of so large a number of children at so late a period was very unusual if not unparalleled. Such prolific families were and are very rare.

We shall subjoin the family record as found inscribed in the Bible alluded

to above.

The above record was copied by Mrs. Mary Pierce, daughter of Margaret Soule and Peleg Richmond, from the family Bible of Ebenezer Soule.

Following in the same order, each name as above will be taken up and such biographical sketches as we have data for will be written.

- 1. Martha B. Soule (1), eldest daughter of Ebenezer (1) and Mercy (Foote) Soule, born in Hillsdale, N. Y., Aug. 15, 1770, was married to ENOS HOWARD and had several children whose names were not supplied.
- 2. Rachel Soule (1), second daughter of Ebenezer (1) and Mercy (Foote) Soule, born Oct. 17, 1771, was married to Daniel Rowley by whom she had issue. The Rowleys communicated with and living in the vicinity remember having heard their elders mention some connection with the Soules but disclaim any definite knowledge of the family.
- 3. Benjamin Soule (1), eldest son of Ebenezer (1) and Mercy (Foote) Soule, born in Hillsdale, N. Y., July 27, 1777; married NANCY PALMER and settled in a town near his father as a farmer. He seems to have been a man of some prominence in his community and possessed of excellent intelligence. His family records have not been found although diligent search was made. About all we know about his family was found in his will made June 3, 1818. Gave Nancy Soule, his wife, all of his real and personal estate for five years. have the residence. To have the residue—excepting and reserving "One brown cow, ten sheep, one good feather bed and all the belongings to it, one bureau, one cherry table, one teapot, sugar-bowl and milkcup of a copper color, one sovoer, six teacups and saucers, six silver teaspoons marked C. S. and twenty dollars in money, given to his daughter Charlotte. To son Benjamin, pair red yearling steers; also a saddle and bridle, one 'fir' hat and a blue chest, formerly son Palmer's." Wills that all sons, Benjamin, Amos L. and Ebenezer M. to receive \$400 each more than the daughters, Charlotte, Polly, Almira, and Nancy Ann.

Benjamin Soule died 1818, aged 43 years, and was buried in Spencertown where his parents and several members of the family lie buried; and also his wife and several of his children. Nancy died 1838, aged 65.

4. Elder Stephen Soule (1), second son of Ebenezer (1) and Mercy (Foote) Soule, born Aug. 10, 1778, married Dorcas Morey Feb. 12, 1800; she was born Jan. 21, 1779. He settled as a farmer in his native town. His name appears frequently in the public records in connection with land transactions. He purchased land of Samuel Frost and wife Eunice, Nov. 1, 1806, the consideration being \$122.72. Upon this land he probably settled. For many years he was an itinerant Methodist preacher and "circuit rider;" very humble and devoted to the cause he represented; a good man whose influence over the community was beneficial and lasting. He died June 2, 1866, aged 88 years. His wife died Dec. 3, 1849, aged 61 years. These had a numerous family and their descendants outnumber those of any other branch of the families of whom Judge Ebenezer and Mercy Soule were the progenitors. See forward.

Note.—In the year 1700 the old Congregational church in Spencertown, N. Y., was built and the adjacent ground was opened for a place of burial. Previously the dead had been buried on the south of the village, half a mile distant, and more than one hundred persons were interred there. Within the last ten years (1914) a man from Mt. Vernon, N. Y., bought the farm on which the old graveyard was located, and employed men to "pull up" the inscribed slabs and bury them in the top of each grave; and Theodore Taylor has written, "This was one of the most rascally acts ever perpetrated in a cemetery."

The name of Stephen Soule figures frequently in the records of Otsego County, N. Y. He made his will which was admitted to probate Nov. 20, 1866, the heirs-at-law in the petition for probate being as follows: Paulina Soule, Eveline Westcoat, Erastus Soule, Ebenezer Soule, Charlotte Shove, Oscar Soule, Minerva Marvin, Ruth Westcott, Anna Eliza Marvin, Charles Erastus Miller, Mary M. Colburn, Olden Soule and Ella Soule.

5. Elder Ebenezer Soule (2), third son of Ebenezer (1) and Mercy (Foote) Soule, born in Hillsdale, N. Y., Jan. 13, 1780. He was twice married. His first wife was Celestia Sawyer by whom, tradition says, there were fourteen children. His second wife was ELECTA MATHER, by whom five children. These statements made by descendants do not harmonize with the assumption by his descendants that there were "twenty-one" children in the family. Some of them probably escaped the burden of patriarchal and hard-handled names by dying in infancy. Much interesting information has been supplied by grandchildren who remembered this good man. He was like his brother just mentioned, an itinerant Methodist preacher and a man of fixed principles and determination. However pressing his secular affairs he would not permit them to interfere with his religious devotions. He was a constant attendant at church and regular in his habits of every-day life. He was sufficiently educated to teach in the rural schools and was well liked by his students. He lived on a farm in a plain house. He made his will Sept. 5, 1839 in which he mentioned two sons and eight daughters, three of them being minors for whom two of the intermarried Newmans, Samuel and Rufus, were guardians. There is a monument in the Foster Cemetery with the inscription, "In memory of Ebenezer Soles who died April 30, 1834, aged 56 years, four months and seven days." The Bible in which the names of "his first family" were recorded, having been burned, the dates were not available; but another sacred volume containing the records of his "second family" was traced to Berlin, Wisconsin, and a full transcript procured for this work. ELECTA MATHER, his second wife, was born July 28, 1792; died May 17, 1869. His death is recorded as Feb. 1, 1840. It may have been another Ebenezer Soule whose inscription was quoted in the first part of this treatment. For the names of his children and descendants see third generation.

(One of his granddaughters remembers him well and says he was a vehement controversialist and enjoyed discussions upon religious and political subjects.)

As the old family Bible containing the names and records of the children of Ebenezer Soule by his first wife, Celestia Sawyer, were burned I cannot tell which was the first-born or how the children stood as to their ages. I have their names as found in the will of their father and shall place them in order as given in this document. Full records of the children by Electa Mather, the second wife, were preserved and all dates can be supplied.

- 6. Charlotte Soule (1), third daughter of Ebenezer (1) and Mercy (Foote) Soule, born in Hillsdale, N. Y., April 1, 1781, was married to Joseph McGowan. She was mentioned in the will of her father in 1818 by which she was made a special legatee. This McGowan family was remembered by Mrs. Wentworth of Spencertown, N. Y., but without particulars.
- 7. Mary Soule (1), fourth daughter of Ebenezer (1) and Mercy (Foote) Soule, born in Hillsdale, N. Y., Nov. 10, 1782. Was married to John Palmer, brother of Nancy Palmer, wife of her brother Benjamin. She was mentioned in the will of her father in 1818, by which he left her part of his real estate during "her natural life," then to her son, Ebenezer Palmer and his heirs and part of his personal estate, which by a dividend due Mary may be sold and the money deposited in the hands of Benjamin Soule, one of the executors, to be paid with interest in annual instalments of \$25 each until all is paid."
- 8. Elizabeth Soule (1), fifth daughter of Ebenezer (1) and Mercy (Foote) Soule, born in Hillsdale, N. Y., Dec. 5, 1784; was married to HAZARD MOREY, born Dec. 24, 1780, a son of Joseph and Freelove (Slocumb) Morey, at Kingston, R. I., Oct. 21, 1779. She had sixteen children but the names of but five have been reported. These were named as follows:

Mrs. Wentworth has written the author that "The widow Morey lived in a house near that of Rev. Ebenezer Soule and he probably owned it. She had a large family of sons, and twin daughters. A son was named "Hazard" for his father, who, with his brothers, were pilots on the Hudson River. The mother was Asenath Sawyer, a sister of Celestia Sawyer Soule. This family was very poor and "Uncle Soule" probably helped them.

- 9. Margaret Soule (1), sixth daughter of Ebenezer (1) and Mercy (Foote) Soule, born in Hillsdale, N. Y., Jan. 10, 1786, was married to Peleg S. Richmond, son of Judge Stephen Richmond and Rebecca Sisson his wife, born in Hillsdale, N. Y., Nov. 9, 1780, died in Appleton, Wis., March 24, 1862. Married Feb. 6, 1803, and died Dec. 12, 1839. There were fifteen children in this family whose names will presently appear. This family was settled in Lee, Mass., in 1833, and in 1834 removed to Appleton, Wis., where her grand-children own and conduct the well-known "Appleton Woolen Mills." Names of children as follows:

- 10. Isaac Soule (1), tenth child of Ebenezer (1) and Mercy (Foote) Soule, born in Hillsdale, N. Y., Oct. 4, 1788; married Sarah Chase and had issue, of whom hereafter. Like his brothers he was a Methodist local preacher or old-fashioned exhorter and held forth occasionally in school-houses. He removed from the locality of his birth and settled on a farm; probably in Allegany County, N. Y. He was twice married; his second wife was named Leah and she also had children. When they removed to the western section of New York they had three little children, the oldest named Peter Soule, being about seven years of age. By his first wife he had a son Datus, of whom more presently. My informant believes some financial embarrassment was the cause of the removal of Isaac Soule to western New York, though he was in no way dishonest. Have no record of deaths in this family.
 - Datus Soule, son of Isaac and Sarah (Chase) Soule, married Han-NAH Morris and lived in Corning, N. Y. There were three children. All are deceased and nothing more has been learned concerning them.
 - II. Peter Soule, a son of Isaac and Leah, his second wife, was a man of reserved habits; a miller at Ouquage, N. Y. He is not known to have a family.
- 11. Rebecca Soule, daughter of Ebenezer (1) and Mercy (Foote) Soule, born Feb. 22, 1791, was married to RODERICK RICHARDS.
- 12. Howland Soule (1), youngest son of Ebenezer (1) and Mercy (Foote) Soule, born in Hillsdale, N. Y., May 24, 1793; married Sally Downing, daughter of Daniel Downing (born May 25, 1794), June 6, 1810, and settled in

Hillsboro where he was a farmer and collector of taxes. He was murdered or accidentally drowned, his body being found in the Hudson River near the place where his horse and carriage were discovered. He was supposed to have carried a considerable amount of money with him but there was none on his person. This event was Feb. 26, 1826. Thus his wife was left with five small children to provide for and bring up, and being a woman of resolution and great energy, she performed her duties faithfully. See the tribute written by her son in his sketch.

Howland Soule served in the War of 1812. He enlisted at Hillsdale, N. Y., Sept. 14, 1814 at the age of 21 and served until Oct. 13, 1814 under Capt. Robert Elting; also under Capt. Conrad Wiltsey (infantry), Col. Van Dueson. He was discharged at Brooklyn, N. Y., Dec. 1, 1814. Land Grant received by his widow in 1856. She applied for pension May 1, 1879, when 84 years of

age, then residing at Jersey City, N. J. Her claim was allowed.

After the death of her husband Mrs. Soule removed to New York City where her brother, Daniel Downing, was in business, and had a home there with her family till her sons had served their apprenticeship and were selfsupporting; and these young men proved not unworthy of their duty, but with the tenderest solicitude provided every comfort for her as long as she lived. Of such filial regard it affords pleasure to record.

McKendra Rowley. She died in 1852, aged 36 years. Buried in the Old Spencertown yard by the side of her parents.

- 4. Ebenezer Soule (3), a son of Benjamin (1) and Nancy (Palmer) Soule, was born in Chatham, N. Y., and probably died young. He was, however, mentioned in his father's will in 1818.
- 5. Palmer Soule (1), a son of Benjamin (1) and Nancy (Palmer) Soule, born in Chatham, N. Y.; died in 1817 aged 20 years. Mentioned in his father's will in 1818 as having owned a "blue chest." Buried in the family lot of the Old Spencertown yard.
- 6. Charlotte Soule (1), daughter of Benjamin (1) and Nancy (Palmer) Soule, born in Chatham, N. Y., was the wife of ALLEN HANOR. Y., was married to ALLEN BELDING and had six children, Charles, Mary, Ann, Delia, John, Alonzo, William, and their descendants were numerous. She received by her father's will, probated in 1840, \$3.17.
- 4. Calista Soule (1), fourth daughter of Ebenezer (2) and Celestia (Sawyer). Soule, born in Hillsdale, N. Y., Feb. 6, 1802, was married to Rufus Newman, a farmer and the owner of a woolen mill at Egremont, Berkshire County, Mass., where they had a beautiful home of which there has been a sketch made by one of the daughters. The family were identified with the M. E. Church. By this union there were twelve children whose names will presently appear. After the death of Mr. Newman and sixteen years of widowhood, Mrs. Newman was married to John Bell, Esq., merchant, then living at Honey Creek, Wis-

During the Civil War he enlisted in Co. F, 17th Michigan Infantry, and was commissioned 2d Lieut. of Co. I, Sept. 4, 1862. Was promoted to 1st Lieutenant Co. F, May 13, 1863. Was in the battle of South Mountain, Md., Sept. 14, 1862. His was called the "Stonewall Regiment" because of its achievement. He was wounded by an Enfield bullet at Antietam, Md., which was removed from the bone by a very dangerous operation. He was discharged for disability from gunshot wound July 21, 1864. He has since been interested in mining at Aspen, Col., and owns a beautiful stock farm called "The Mac Rose." His fine chateau with the ornamental surroundings are much admired by visitors.
- XII. ALICE EMELINE NEWMAN, born Sept. 2, 1842; died Dec. 9, 1859. Buried at Honey Creek, Wis.
- 5. Harriet Soule (2), a daughter of Ebenezer (2) and Celestia (Sawyer) Soule, born in Hillsdale, N. Y., became the wife of Erastus Belding by whom there were five children: Emily, Julia, Melissa, Mary Jane, and Hiram.

- 9. Mary Soule (2), a daughter of Ebenezer (2) and Celestia (Sawyer) Soule, was married to Henry Belding and had Edwin and George Francis. He was mentioned in his father's will in 1839, receiving \$297.
- 10. Zeruiah Soule (1), a daughter of Ebenezer (2) and Celestia (Sawyer) Soule, born in Hillsdale, N. Y., and died unmarried. She was mentioned in the will made by her father in 1839 and received \$176.
- 11. Rachel Soule (2), a daughter of Ebenezer (2) and Celestia (Sawyer) Soule, born in Hillsdale, N. Y., and became the wife of Rev. Julius Doane, by whom she had a son. She received by her father's will in 1839 \$156.
- 12. George Morrell Soule (1), the only son of Ebenezer (2) and Celestia Sawyer, born in Hillsdale, N. Y., was a successful "Hudson Lawyer" who died when a young man; single. In 1839 he received \$100 as his legacy by his father's will.

Griswold, Esq., visited the old part of the cemetery in Spencertown, he found near the large church, two monuments erected to the memory of the Soule family, one being inscribed: "George M. Soule, Esq., son of Ebenezer Soule, died Nov. 18, 1848, aged 31 years." Underneath this inscription were the words:

"Death waits for none, prepare to die.

Y., near the homestead of his grandfather, and having survived till a very advanced age he could supply much interesting information concerning his ancestors: moreover several letters now in the author's hands show that he had a deep interest in the history of the descendants of the Pilgrim ancestor. Upon the statement found in one of his letters was found the name of his great-grandfather, Benjamin Soule, son of George and Lydia (Howland) Soule of Nine Partners, Dutchess County, N. Y. After the singular death of his father, he went with his mother and brother to his uncles in New York City and was apprenticed to learn the manufacture of jewelry, and after serving his time he opened a store in Maiden Lane connected with the factory in Jersey City, The sale of their wares became extensive and the firm was widely known. After the death of his second wife and the breaking up of his home, he disposed of his plant and went to Ohio to live with his daughter, Mrs. E. B. Baker, but this family removed to Detroit, Mich., and he found a home with another daughter, a widow, Mrs. James W. Soper. He subsequently went to Detroit where he died in July, 1916, in his 93d year. Mr. Soule retained his mentality and his physical powers till more than 90 and wrote letters in a vigorous and legible hand. A letter written to Rev. Frances Asbury Soule and found among his papers contains such beautiful sentiment that I shall give space for it here: "My mother always lived with me since early manhood and died in my house, and it is a source of pleasure to know we were never away from each other longer than two months at any one time and that I could minister to her every comfort during her last hours, and held her hand and felt the last pulsations of her life, and laid her quietly to rest within the peaceful shades of Greenwood. Her life was one of no ordinary events, my father having mysteriously disappeared, leaving her with a family of five children, all young and helpless, and during her long life she bore her afflictions with fortitude, saw them reach maturity and filling positions of usefulness and able to offer her every comfort of a home in old age. She had long lived in full membership of the Methodist Church."

Private services were held at the Baker home, after which the body was removed to the family lot in Greenwood Cemetery, New York, for interment by the side of his wife and mother.

Soules of Chenango County, A. P.

Dutchess County Branch.

ARIOUS theories and much controversy has been excited concerning the origin and history of this branch of the Soule family and the late Edgar Soule of Chicago assumed to have discovered the parentage of his ancestor, Isaac Soule; but when given conclusive proof that this could not have been the man, he confessed that he did not find sufficient data to warrant his assumption and should, when visiting the Newberry Library in Chicago again, make more discriminating search for the right person. The author has taken up every Isaac Soule whose name he has found and whose age would have been contemporary with the head of this branch of the Soule family, and has disposed of them all through other pedigrees. The date of his birth, the location of his early married life, the names in his family and the prevailing traditions all seemed to point to Dutchess County, New York, as the locality where he spent his early life; but like all of the younger generation of those pioneer settlers, he was probably born in Massachusetts or Rhode Island. Some of the Census returns assign the births of his older children to that colony. The name Isaac was of frequent occurrence in the early branches of the Soule families in New England and he was evidently a native of that region.

Isaac Soule (1), born Oct. 20, 1746, was evidently a son of Benjamin (1) and Abigail (Howland) Soule of Crumb Elbow, Dutchess County, N. Y. will be seen that the name and birth of an Isaac Soule appears in the family record of Benjamin Soule reputed to have come from an old Bible that had been carried from New York to Michigan, and the date of birth was approximately as given in the family pedigree a few years later. This was nothing unusual when families had frequently removed from the home of their nativity. This Isaac Soule married Jan. 20, 1774 ABIGAIL PORTER, born Jan. 23, 1750. She was evidently a native of Rhode Island, as a series of old vellow letters in my possession indicate. Family tradition places this family as residents of Greene County, N. Y., and the history of the shire finds them living there as the proprietors of an old-fashioned hotel, or country tavern, where they made comfortable the early magistrates when making journeys to attend court and the ministers who carried their sermons in their saddlebags with the hymns of Dr. Watts and the Wesleys when itinerating through the sparsely populated settlements of the new townships. We do not know how long Isaac Soule served as landlord in Greene County but he finally removed to Chenango or Monroe County, as in after life his children and descendants were living there. The traditions held in the descendants' memories preserve the reputation of great religious zeal possessed by these parents. A very good portrait of Mr. Soule, furnished by his grandson, the late Harrison Soule, is in the custody of the author. This likeness represents him as a venerable gentleman, bald, wearing spectacles and carrying a cane. He wore the old-fashioned doublebosomed waistcoat buttoned to the chin and his neck encircled by a voluminous neck-cloth. His facial features were of the proverbial Soule type; his expression intelligent and grave. Children's names will follow.

In an old stained letter written by Polly Hewitt at De Ruyter, N. Y., Dec. 27, 1807 to her mother in Freehold, N. Y., she states that "Alanson is going to move to Otselic, N. Y., in a fortnite." In another letter by the same daughter, dated De Ruyter, N. Y., April 29, 1808, she says: "Mr. Hewitt and Alanson and Lois and myself are all well." Then followed the statement: "Alanson went from here this morning, and says he likes his new home very well." In 1806 he had sold his farm near Herkimer, N. Y., and moved to Brookland, suburb of Cleveland, Ohio, where his wife died Feb. 10, 1839. In 1840 he removed to Kane County, Illinois and died at the home of his daughter, Mrs. Roser, May 14, 1851, aged 68 years, 9 months and 11 days. These old, faded letters were of great interest in proving the relationship between Mrs. Hewitt and her mother's family. See her sketch. In Alanson Soule's family there were nine children whose names will appear with the eighth generation.
- 6. Luther Soule (1), fourth son of Isaac (1) and Abigail (Porter) Soule, born Jan. 18, 1786; married SALLY TRUMBULL and settled on a farm in the town of

Otselic, N. Y., where he was a man of influence and respectability. He had a numerous family whose descendants have also been a prolific race and have done their share toward replenishing the earth. See forward to third generation for children.

- 7. Calvin Soule (1), the fifth son of Isaac (1) and Abigail (Porter) Soule, born April 17, 1789; died Jan. 22, 1801, a single man.
- 8. Cynthia Soule (1), the third daughter of Isaac (1) and Abigail (Porter) Soule, born May 5, 1791; was married to David Babcock of Cazenovia, a town joining De Ruyter in Madison County, N. Y., on the north. This David Babcock made a will dated May 3, 1854 and probated May 31, 1854. He had died May 13, 1854. By this instrument he made provision for his wife Cynthia. His heirs were his two daughters, Mrs. Mary Ann Eggleston, wife of ROYAL EGGLESTON, and Harriet R. Caswell, wife of CHARLES C. CASWELL. Royal Eggleston died Nov. 14, 1860 and left Mary Ann, widow, but no issue. Mary Ann Eggleston died Dec. 27, 1861 at Cazenovia, N. Y., leaving no husband, child, father or mother but an only sister, Harriet Caswell.
- 9. David Soule (1). The name of this son was found in one of the copies of the family records sent me and was evidently an error, but as there may have been a son bearing this name I have deemed best to preserve it for all it was worth. Born Aug. 4, 1798.

Third Generation.

CHILDREN OF ISAAC AND CYNTHIA CARTER SOULE.

1. Theron Soule (1), probably the eldest son of Isaac (2) and Cynthia (Carter) Soule, born in Freehold, Greene County, N. Y., May 20, 1803; married Sept. 7, 1837, SARAH FOOTE, daughter of Capt. Luman and Ruah (Scofield) Foote, who died April 7, 1841, and he married 2d, Dec. 7, 1841, the widow of Seth Dean who was the daughter of Andrew and Eunice Pickens. He died March 19, 1885, aged 77 years, of Bright's disease, in Albion, N. Y. He was a good citizen and neighbor, filling in all the walks of life, whether in his private affairs or as a public officer, his place with faultless integrity. Prior to 1835 Mr. Soule was engaged in farming but later gave his attention to mercantile pursuits. In 1837, when the north part of the township of Murray was organized into a town named Kendall, at the first election he was elected clerk. moved to Michigan in 1841 and took up his residence in Sheridan, but shortly after his second marriage he removed to Homer where he was proprietor and landlord of a hotel; but soon returned to Kendall where he remained till 1843. In May of that year, he set out with his family in a two-horse wagon for Michigan, settling in the town of Sheridan and making the township his permanent residence. Here he purchased 280 acres of Section 22 in the locality and lived there for ten years; and when in 1866 he sold this farm, it was estimated one of the best in Sheridan. During the spring of 1866, Mr. Soule purchased the brick house for his home and in 1869 he and a partner erected the Opera House in the village of Albion. Being of a speculative turn he dealt largely in wild and improved lands, and uniting industry with forethought he obtained a competency. Believing that he who subserves the public interest advances his own, Mr. Soule was ever forward in promoting public measures of utility, and ranked among the leading men of his town. His life presents an example of the success which awaits all, however poor, who are willing to make the efforts which are indispensable to wealth. His first wife, Sarah Foote, born at Saratoga, N. Y., April 19, 1815, was a teacher at Brockport, N. Y. She died April 7, 1841. She had two daughters:

- I. SARAH R. SOULE, born May 30, 1838; was married to JAMES FLEMING.
- Frances A. Soule, born Sept. 14, 1839; was married to Edwin Dinsmore.
- 2. Milo Soule (1), second son of Isaac and Cynthia (Carter) Soule, born July 8, 1804 in Madison County, N. Y. He was married April 20, 1830 at the home of her parents, Sardius and Sabra, to MISS IRENE BLODGETT in Vermont, and immediately began domestic life on a farm in Murray, Orleans County, N. Y., which he had but recently purchased. Brought up in Freehold, Greene County, N. Y., he had the usual experiences of the farmers' sons at that time, working on the land in summer and attending school in winter until he was 15 years of age, when his place at the student's seat was exchanged for the teacher's desk: and he continued to teach till he was 26 years of age, and proving his devotion to his parents by giving them the major part of his time for five years after he had attained his personal independence. In 1835 the family removed to Michigan, locating upon a farm near Marengo village in what is now Calhoun County, and lived there until 1869 when he sold his rural estate and moved into "town" where he made his residence for many years. Milo Soule was an active, model citizen, looking after his own affairs with scrupulous care that brought him success, and, as he was strictly honest in his dealings, never weary in assisting his neighbors, it was not strange that he was repeatedly called upon to fill positions of honor and trust till he had filled every office within the gift of his fellow-townsmen, and in 1843 he was chosen county treasurer and reelected in 1845 and 1847. In 1850 he was elected a member of the convention to revise the State constitution. He served thirty-six years as justice of the peace and was never ashamed of the title "Squire" by which he was commonly saluted. He was one of the organizers of the Farmers Mutual Fire Insurance Company of Calhoun County and was its secretary for many years, a position which from its very nature determined the life and success of the organization. He was afterwards treasurer and one of the directors of the company for many years. He adopted the cardinal principles of the Jeffersonian Democracy at an early age and was a young man of 25 when the immortal founder passed away. He had the advantage of listening to the words of the wise and patriotic sages of the earlier and purest days of the Republic and he was as true to principle as the needle to the pole, through his long life. Although a strong partisan Mr. Soule never allowed political differences to influence his actions in his conduct and social relations with those who differed from him; many of his warmest personal friends and admirers were his political opponents. association with the agricultural interests of the county gave him an extensive acquaintance with the farmers who long remembered his cordial and kindly greetings. To those of his friends and acquaintances who knew him most

intimately, his sympathetic nature, his accommodating spirit as a nieghbor, his happy and cheerful disposition maintained up to the end of the long life of 87 years, ever after held a place in their memories.

Anticipating the advice of Horace Greeley for several years, he went west in the fall of 1835, being three weeks on the road, arriving at Marengo, Mich., on October 12th. After paying for his land at the Government price he was the owner of a pair of horses, a cow and ten dollars in cash. With this meagre outfit the brave pioneer with his stalwart frame, his good health and energy, aided largely by his industrious and frugal wife, soon had all the comfort that could be acquired in a rural home. He died April 2, 1891 and his funeral was held at the family residence with a very large attendance, many of the old residents of the outlying districts being present thus to testify their regard for their old friend. Irene Blodgett Soule died in Marengo, Mich., May 31, 1900. She was born in Georgia, Vt., and came with her parents to New York only a few months before her marriage, having been born Jan. 31, 1807. Their route from New York to Michigan was through Canada and they were three weeks on the journey, going by horse team. Their neighbors during the early days were wild Indians, and she with her husband endured all of the hardships of pioneer life. There were five children whose names will appear in the record of the fourth generation.

- 3. Hiram Soule (1), third son of Isaac (2) and Cynthia (Carter) Soule, born in Freehold, Greene County, N. Y., Oct. 8, 1805; married Sophia Hickok TURNER, Oct. 10, 1831; she was born Oct. 30, 1811. He moved from New York to Ohio about 1830, stopping at Greene, Trumbull County; then he went to Coitsville and Poland, Mahoning County, where he engaged in the woolen business. From the latter place he removed to Newton Falls, Ohio, in 1837, where he built a woolen mill in which he carried on carding and the manufacturing and dressing of cloth. This was at a time when every farmer kept a flock of sheep and much of the business of Mr. Soule was of local interest for domestic wear, and this facory was considered a very important industry and adjunct of the community. It was a pioneer adventure and proved successful. Hiram Carter Soule was a man of untiring devotion to his business and a man of excellent moral character who won and held the respect of his associates. He was benevolent and accommodating and in many respects a useful citizen. He died Aug. 20, 1889, aged 84 years. His wife died Sept. 26. 1881, aged 70 years. Children's names will appear with the fourth generation.
- 4. Stephen Platt Soule (1), fourth son of Isaac (2) and Cynthia (Carter) Soule, born in Freehold, Greene County, N. Y., March 29, 1809, was twice married; 1st, to Hannah Barker by whom issue. She died and he married 2d, Lucinda Crowell. He was a teacher in his early life, but later a farmer and stock-breeder. He settled in Whitewater, Wis., but removed to Trumbull County, O., and thence in May, 1854 to a farm near—one has said "Fairwater, Greene Lake County, Wis.," where he lived the remainder of his life. One correspondent says he was married three times (the author does not know who to believe). Time of his death and that of his wives unknown. Reported to have been a man of cultivated mind and a great reader who was always

interested in education. Children, as far as known, by both wives, will be mentioned in the fourth generation.

- 5. De Alanson Soule (2), fifth son of Isaac (2) and Cynthia (Carter) Soule, born in Freehold, Greene County, N. Y., Jan. 13, 1811; married Jane L. Bullock, May 30, 1841; died Jan. 8, 1901. There has been some misunderstanding about the name of this member of the family and some correspondents have insisted that it should be written "Dr. Alanson Soule." The author leaves the subject for the study of those who know best. Mr. Soule lived on the farm in Kendall where his father first bought until he was too old and infirm to perform manual labor; then he moved into the small village of Kendall Corners, where he built a house and where he died. Here his son and daughter continue to reside. This family embraced the creed of the Universalist Church. The father was a staunch Democrat and a man of strict integrity, well liked in his community. Mrs. Jane Soule, the mother, died Jan. 15, 1909. Children's names and record will appear with fourth generation.


CHILDREN OF MILO AND IRENE BLODGETT SOULE.

1. Harrison Soule (1), eldest son of Milo (1) and Irene (Blodgett) Soule, born in Murray, Orleans County, N. Y., Aug. 4, 1832; married Mary Parker in Detroit, Mich., Nov. 24, 1855, ceremony by Reverend Wilbur of the M. E. Church. She was born in Porter, Cass County, Mich., Sept. 13, 1838. He was carried to Michigan when but a lad of four years and his early educational privileges were supplemented by study in the Marengo schools and also in Marshall, Mich.; subsequently he attended the Albion Collegiate Seminary, while he afterwards pursued a course of study in Gregory's Commercial College in Detroit, completing his studies there when twenty-two years of age. Entering upon his business career as bookkeeper for the firm of Jackson & Wiley, proprietors of a large machine shop and foundry, he remained in that position two years, then began working for the Michigan Central Railroad Company as clerk in the car shops, where he continued for two years.

Immediately after his marriage he removed to Port Huron where he engaged in the retail boot and shoe business for two years, at the end of which time he went to Albion, Mich., the former home of his wife, where he conducted the shoe business for a year and a half. Personal interests and business were then put aside, for in August, 1861, he responded to his country's call, en-

listing for three years in defense of the Union.

He was among the first to respond to the call for three years service, and with his command was ordered into camp at Fort Wayne, Detroit, for military instruction and discipline, where he displayed such aptness and ability that he was commissioned as captain with instruction to raise a company of volunteers. This he did and the organization was mustered in as Company I of the Sixth Michigan Infantry, with Harrison Soule as captain. Later this company was transferred to the heavy artillery department and subsequently to the gunboat Wissahickon, being with this fleet at the time of the surrender

of New Orleans. Major Soule was under Commander Farragut on the first expedition for the capture of Vicksburg, led by General Thomas Williams. At Baton Rouge he was wounded and sent to the North for medical treatment, but after three months, when only partially restored to health, he reported for duty, and with his arm in a sling engaged in the siege of Port Hudson. He was honored in general orders for gallant service on the field, and he made a splendid military record; during over four years of active service, was never away from his company save the time he spent in the hospital with a wounded arm. He was twice commissioned major, the first time declining the promotion, for he preferred to be on active duty with his heroic company rather than to serve as major of the regiment without a command. A year later when he was again given a commission as major he instantly assumed command of the regiment as its superior officer and was detailed on other active duty. On July 9, 1865, he took his regiment to New Orleans under orders and received a new outfit of light siege guns. He was there transferred to General Sherman's command for a campaign on the Texas frontier in view of Maximilian's occupation of Mexico, but did not take part in the movement there, and with his regiment returned to Michigan.

On again taking up the pursuits of civil life, Major Soule became passenger agent of the Michigan Central Railroad Company, with headquarters at Jackson, Michigan, where he remained for fifteen years, when he resigned to accept the position of treasurer of the State University. This honor was unsolicited, and there were over fifty applicants for the position, but the regents of the university sought the services of Major Soule, and finally induced him to accept, which office he held with great satisfaction to all concerned until his resignation on account of poor health in 1907. He has also been interested in business enterprises of Ann Arbor, being a director of The Ann Arbor Organ Company and a director and vice-president of the First National Bank.

In the Detroit News Tribune, Sunday morning, Dec. 1, 1907, were sketches of the services of Maj. Harrison Soule, from which we make the following extracts: "Major Soule's record as treasurer of the university is an enviable The absolute accuracy of his accounts, the manner in which the details of his office have been administered and the unvarying attention and painstaking devotion which he has given to his work are matters for congratulation among the officials of the institution. His office in short has been administered in a soldierly manner and at the same time in a large-hearted and genial way that has attached him to every one with whom he has come in contact. Major Soule is a member of the Independent Order of Odd Fellows which he joined 58 years ago, and he has held every office in the order up to and including that of Grand Master, to which he was raised in 1885. While Major Soule has endeared himself to all with whom he has come in contact, none the less has Mrs. Soule been filling a place which no one else could fill among the students of the university. If ever so busy, she always found a moment for the homesick college girl, and has probably mothered more girls than any other ten women in the faculty. She has been one of the moving spirits of the Woman's League ever since its organization, and her counsels on the board have been invaluable. He is highly esteemed for his social qualities, and like his honored father has won many friends because of his social disposition and

genial nature that recognizes the worth of the individual. His military and business record, as well as his connection with the university, entitles him to be represented as one of the leading citizens of Ann Arbor. Mrs. Soule was the daughter of Charles T. and Sally Ann (Beardsley) Parker, the former a native of Ohio, and the latter of New York. There were but two children:

Lester Soule (1), a son of Milo (1) and Irene (Blodgett) Soule, born on his father's farm, June 15, 1843, left home when 19 years of age and began the life of a "railroad man" by running a truck in a freight house; he quit in 1887 as general manager of the Michigan Central Railroad and engaged in

contract work. He built several lines and was president and general manager of one in Iowa. "Went flat broke" in 1907, but secured a position building water works in which he was financially successful. He married CORNELIA DAY, Dec. 13, 1867, who was the mother of his children and who died Dec. 23, 1890. He married 2d, FANNIE MOTRAN DUBOIS, Dec. 11, 1897, who died June 10, 1910, and he retired from active business. During his comparative leisure has devoted considerable time in the well-known Newberry Library in Chicago collecting data for a genealogy of the "Isaac Branch" of the Soule family; and assumed that he had established full connections between his line and the Mayflower Pilgrim; but afterwards admitted that there was a "missing link" back of his grandfather which he hoped to find when he returned to Chicago. Alas, his plans were interrupted by death in 1924. Four children:

- I. John Lutman Soule, born May 1, 1869; married Adelaide (Yeates) Darborough, April 1, 1910. He is a professional accountant living at Baker, Oregon. He has been the auditor for eleven lumber companies under a handsome remuneration. Mr. Soule was much interested in the publication of this family memorial at one time and made an attempt to raise contributions for that purpose with the offer of a liberal donation himself, but his plans did not mature and this arrangement proved impracticable. He was principal of San Luis Academy at Manassa, Col., for three years. Was elected superintendent of schools for Conejos County, Nov. 3, 1914. He is a member of the Mormon Church. A Royal Arch Mason. His wife is a graduate of Dasarte College, Dixon, Ill., and taught in San Luis Academy two years. Children named as follows:

Alanson Soule (2), the ninth child and fourth son of Alanson (1) and Lois (Bragg) Soule, born Sept. 22, 1827, at an early age went with his parents to Cleveland, O., and after the death of his mother went to live with his sister, Mrs. Rosser, in Kane County, Ill., where he enlisted for the Mexican War, and after his term expired and his return to Cleveland he learned the cooper's trade with his brother Solomon. He married Hannah Bassett April 17, 1852, and in 1854 he moved to Dodge County, Wis., where he intended to take up farming but unfortunately he lost a foot and resumed work at his trade in Maysville, Wis., until 1866 when he moved with his family to Niles, Mich., where he died Nov. 16, 1890, aged 63 years, 1 month and 16 days. He was an active member of the M. E. Church and belonged to the Odd Fellows Fraternity. Hannah Bassett Soule died March 13, 1911. The six children named as follows:

Soules of Onondaga County, A. P.

Syracuse Branch.



N turning our attention to the branch of the Soule families settled in Dutchess County, New York, we shall only follow the line of descent from George Soule, the Pilgrim, through the several intervening generations to the families represented by the well-known business

house in Syracuse, N. Y.

Lineal descent: George, George, Nathan, George, Nathan, Latten, Ephraim, Oscar, Frank, Oscar.

George Soule (2), son of George Soule (1), the Pilgrim, and Mary Beckett, was called in the Colonial records, "One of ye fyrst born children." The date of his birth has not been ascertained. His wife was Deborah but her full maiden name is unknown. He received a half-share of his father's lands in Dartmouth along with his brother Nathaniel, and settled there. His name frequently appears in connection with land transactions in the early records of the township. He made his will March 25, 1697 and it was probated July 1, 1704. This gives us an approximate date of his death. His wife also made a will. and from the settlement of the estate we procure the names of their children, as follows: William, John, Nathan, Deborah, Mary, Lydia and Sarah.

Nathan Soule, son of George and Deborah, was probably born in Duxbury, Mass., before the removal to Dartmouth; time of birth unknown. He married in Dartmouth, June 12, 1704, Mary Gifford. His name is of frequent occurrence in the record of land surveys and land divisions in the town. He died in Dartmouth, Mass., Sept. 10, 1736, leaving a will in which his heirs were mentioned, proving clearly the line of descent. His wife made her will Jan. 7, 1772, in which she confirms the evidence of descent by the names of children and grandchildren. The issue as follows: Timothy, George, John, Content, Mary and Ann.

George Soule, son of Nathan and Mary (Gifford) Soule, was born in Dartmouth, Mass., Aug. 15, 1709; married first in Providence, R. I., Dec. 3, 1730, to Avis Tibbetts, daughter of John and Sarah (Soule) Tibbetts, and his first cousin. She was from Greenwich, R. I., and inherited her name from Avis Stanton. Her parents were devout Quakers and joined the great wave of emigration that moved to North Carolina, and her father died in Carteret County, N. C., April 19, 1755, leaving a noncupertive will in which he mentioned his daughter Avis Sole, to whom he gave "Two Shillings Starling." (See the will of John Tibbetts, page 806, this section.)

By this first wife, George Soule had seven children, four of whom were born in Dartmouth, Mass. The other three were born in Connecticut or Dutchess County, N. Y., and the full record was found in the Register of the Quaker Society of the Oblong there. Avis (Tibbetts) Soule died Jan 12, 1756. He had a certificate of clearance at Swansey, Mass., being styled "son of Nathan and Mary Soule of Dartmouth," 20-10-1757, in order to marry Alice Davis, and the Vital Records of Rhode Island (Swansey marriages) show that George

Soule, son of Nathan, dec., and Mary was married to ALICE DAVIS, daughter of Thomas Davis, dec., and Lydia of Freetown, 2d month, 1758. By this second wife, whose death-date is unknown, he had two more children. There is a tradition that he was married a third time and somewhat obscure records point to such a conclusion. He was a devout Quaker and worshiped for many years in the Meeting House built on Quaker Hill, so-called, which was the common gathering-place for the people of that sect in the Oblong and Nine Partners. The records show that he suffered great oppressions from the Loyalists in consequence of his religious faith and his refusal to sign the oath of allegiance to King George. Several requisitions were made upon his flocks and herds. He died intestate and administration was granted on his estate to his son Nathan Soule of Pawling, "Miller," Dec. 9, 1793. Children named Mary, Content, Alice, Nathan, John, Sarah, Ann, Elizabeth and Thomas.

Fifth Generation.

CHILDREN OF GEORGE AND AVIS TIBBETTS SOULE.

- 1. Mary Soule (1), born March 31, 1732, was married Aug. 10, 1757 to Joshua Sherman, son of Ebenezer and Wait Sherman, and the ceremony, the first performed in the Quaker Meeting House on Quaker Hill, will be preserved by being subjoined. This Joshua Sherman was styled "Shoemaker" in a list of Quakers enrolled in Dutchess County who by reason of their religious faith refused to take the oath of allegiance to King George and to bear arms. He was also a Quaker preacher and the following concerning him was found in the Oblong minutes: "Our well beloved Friend and Minister, Joshua Sherman, of Poag Parish, died Sept. 8, 1777, aged 40 years." Time of Mary's death unknown. Children as follows:

Quaker Marriage Ceremony.

"Whereas Joshua Sherman, son of Ebenezer Sherman and Wait his wife, and Mary Soule, daughter of George and Avis his wife, both of Beckman Precinct, Dutchess County and Province of New York, having declared their intention of marriage before several meetings of the people called Quakers at Oblong and Nine Partners, according to the good order used among them, and proceding therein after deliberate consideration thereof with regard to the righteous law of God in the case, they also appearing clear of all others, and having the consent of their parents and such as are concerned therein and were allowed of by your meeting: NOW, These may certify to all whom it may concern that for the full accomplishment of their intention, this 10th day of the 8th month, in the year of Christian account 1757, they, the said Joshua Sherman and Mary Soule, appeared in the public assembly of the aforesaid people and

others, met at the Friends Meeting House in Oblong, and in a solemn manner, he, the said Joshua Sherman, taking the said Mary Soule by the hand did openly declare as followeth: Friends, I desire you to be my witnesses that I take this my friend Mary Soule to be my wife, promising by the Lord's assistance to be unto her a true and loving husband until it shall please God by death to separate us; and then and there, in said assembly, the said Mary Soule did in like manner declare as followeth: Friends, I desire you to be my witnesses that I take this my friend Joshua Sherman to be my husband, promising by the Lord's assistance to be unto him a true and loving wife until it shall please God by death to separate us, and as further confirmation thereof, the said Joshua Sherman and Mary Soule did then and there to those present join their hands, she according to the custom of marriage, assuming the name of her husband." There were many witnesses, among them her father and brother Nathan.

(Signed) Joshua Sherman Mary Sherman.

- 2. Content Soule (1), born Feb. 2, 1734; married to NATHAN BIRDSALL, son of Nathan and Jane Birdsall of Oblong, Dutchess County, N. Y., June 10, 1750, she born Dec. 1, 1732. This was "out of the Society," consequently their children, whose names follow, were not birthright members."

Alice Soule (1), born Aug. 4, 1736; survived her parents and was a member of the family of her brother Nathan Soule when he made his will in 1806, and he made especial provision for her maintenance by legacies. She was also mentioned in the will of her grandmother made in Dartmouth, Mass., in 1772. The latest date concerning her leaves her rising 70 and she probably continued her life of single blessedness, wearing her garb of sober gray to the close of her life. She may have been an invalid or non compos.
- 4. Nathan Soule (2), born Aug. 9, 1738; married SARAH BIRDSALL, daughter of Nathan and Jane Birdsall of the Oblong, Dutchess County, N. Y., Oct. 31, 1762 (intention recorded Sept. 16, 1762), and settled in the vicinity of

Note.—Sarah Clark, daughter of Nathan and Sarah (Birdsall) Soule, of Oblong or Pauling, Dutchess County, N. Y., born June 14, 1773; was married Oct. 22, 1790 to Erastus Berry who was born Sept. 16, 1768 and died Oct. 7, 1838. She died April 8, 1855. Their residence was at Kinderhook or Chatham, N. Y.

Benjamin Birdsall Soule when writing to his brother Thomas in 18—stated that he

Benjamin Birdsall Soule when writing to his brother Thomas in 18—stated that he had recently returned from a visit to his sister Sarah in Ohio. Her father, in his will of date 1806 gave her, equally with her sisters, \$25, and calls her "Sarah Lane." Benjamin Birdsall Soule calls her his sister Sarah Lane and says she was living in 1843 in Ohio, 40 miles from John (her brother) and he was 30 miles from Chillicothe. He contemplated visiting her the following summer.

Here we encounter a problem. She was the only sister whose date of birth has been found. Her parents were married in 1762, and she was one of the older children.

his childhood home. His name is of frequent occurrence in the County records. He was, latterly, a miller in Pawling, but no person living can tell the stream on which his mill was located. He sold 250 acres of land in Oblong, N. Y., to Thomas Briggs, Sept. 11, 1773 for £1,085. This may have been the homestead farm taken up by his father when he first removed from Dartmouth, Mass., to Dutchess County, N. Y. He was appointed the Administrator on his father's property in 1793, and was named the principal creditor. I assume to say that the old gentleman had become enfeebled by age and that this son had sold the old farm and taken his father to live with him in Pawling. Nathan Soule made his will, proved Oct. 4, 1806, then a resident of Pawling. This document indicates that he had considerable property for the times. His carefully worded provision for the care and comfort of his maiden sister shows nobility of character.

Will of Hathan Soule.

I Nathan Soule of Pawling in the County of Dutchess and state of New York, Being in sound mind and memory, do think fit to make distribution of my outward estate by will in the following manner, Viz,—First, I Do order all my Just debts & Funeral charges payed out of my money by my Executors hereafter mentioned.

Item, I give and bequeath to my well beloved wife, Sarah Soule, all the profits of one third of my estate after my debts are paid, provided she takes care & provides for my sister Alice Soule, All which I have Given to my wife in lieu of her right of dower, or power of thirds which she is to have so long as she remains my widow and no longer.

Item, I give and bequeath to my daughter, Mary Soule, one fifth part of all my estate after my debts are paid, as long as she remains single or unmarried, and if she should marry, one half of what I have given to her is to be equally divided between my four sons, Latten, John, Thomas & Benjamin Soule, and she is to take care of her mother and sister Alice as long as they live if she remains unmarried & no longer provided she pays the legacies hereafter mentioned for her to pay. All which I have given to my daughter Mary is to her and her heirs and assigns forever.

Item, I give and bequeath to my four sons, Latten, John, Thomas & Benjamin Soule, all the remainder of my estate both real and personal, to be equally divided between them, provided they pay all the legacies ordered for them to pay & take care & provide for my sister Alice after her mother's death, if Alice is living, and my daughter Mary, if she is not married is to be at one fifth part of the expense of taking care of and supporting of her as long as she lives. And my four sons are to be at one four-fifths part of the expence of taking care of her equally, and if Mary is married they are to be at all the expence of taking care of her, as they are to have one half of Marys as above directed, all of which I have given to my sons is to them and to their heirs and assigns forever.

Item, I give and bequeath to my four daughters, Jane Lane, Elizabeth Simpson, Anna Ward, & Sarah Lane, twenty-five dollars to each of them, in

one year after my decease, paid by my daughter Mary & four above named sons, equally to them. And it is to be understood that if my daughter Mary should die after my wife and sister Alice are deceased unmarried, the same half that is mentioned above if she married, is given to my four sons, equally as if she married.

Lastly, I do hereaby nominate and constitute and appoint my two sons, Latten Soule & John Soule, Executors to this my last will and Testament, ratifying and confirming this to be my last will and Testament, disallowing and making void all former wills or Testaments heretofore made by me, in witness whereof, I have hereunto set my hand and seal, this third day of the fifth month, eighteen hundred and six. (Signed) Nathan Soule.

Tradition reports that this Nathan Soule had a record of his family in his Bible, but diligent search has failed to find it. He was a Quaker, but his name does not appear with those who refused to take the oath of allegiance to King George; on the contrary he was enrolled among those who served in the Revolution; probably in the militia.

The exact date of his death and that of his wife are unknown, but the

probating of his will gives an approximation of his death.

His children were named as follows: Latten, John, Thomas, Benjamin, Mary, Jane, Elizabeth, Anna and Sarah. For particulars see forward.

5. John Soule, second son of George and Avis (Tibbetts) Soule, born in Oblong, Dutchess County, N. Y., July 19, 1741; married MABEL HOAG and settled in his native town, but received a certificate of removal to White Creek from the Oblong Friends of 7th month, 1779. He returned to Oblong in 1781, but went back to White Creek in 1784, in which year, 11th month, his wife Mabel joined the Friends society. That was after their children were born, hence they could not have been "birthright members." The last mention of John and his wife Mabel was 11-19-1798 when they witnessed a marriage. In the returns of the first U. S. census, 1790, his name appears as of Cambridge Town, Washington County, N. Y. with four children. He was one of the petitioners who appeared before Timothy Soule, Esq., Justice of the Peace for Dutchess County, N. Y., April 14, 1763, and made affidavit that a certain tract of land asked for, if granted, would be settled upon and that his name was not made use of in trust for some other person. He had petitioned with four others, for a grant of land consisting of 2,100 acres bounded on the West by Cambridge. Dec. 10, 1789, a caveat was presented against two tracts of 2,000 acres each on the East side of the river Hudson, by John Gregor in his own right and in behalf of his son William Gregor, deceased. On Oct. 13, 1789, a return of survey for John Soule and his associates was made of eleven lots containing in all 2,1631/2 acres lying on the East side of Cambridge, North of White Creek and Jackson, in Washington County, N. Y.; and on Feb. 3, 1790, the caveat was withdrawn and consent given to grant Letters Patent to the claimants. On Jan. 4, 1790, Certificate of Surveyor-General that there had been no caveat entered against the grant. The following found in the files at Albany, shows the consummation of this land transaction.

"The People of New York, hy the Grace of God, Free and Independent.

To all people to whom these present shall come, Greeting: Know ye, That we have given, granted and confirmed, and by these present do give, grant and confirm unto John Soule all that certain tract land situate in the County of Albany on the East side of Cambridge and on the North side of the Patent granted to Arent Van Corlear and others, beginning at the South-East corner of the tract applied for by George Searles, and running North fifty-eight degrees and twenty minutes, East fifty chaines and fifty links to James Baine Patent, thence North one degree and forty minutes, West forty-two chaines and twenty-five links, then Soulth one degree and forty minutes, East forty-two chaines and twenty-five links to the place of beginning, containing one hundred and eighty-four acres."

John Soule and wife Mabel conveyed by deed Oct. 12, 1799, being then of Cambridge, consideration £525, to William Russell of said town, the deed recorded at Hudson, N. Y., Aug. 26, 1808. The dates of his land-transactions will synchronize with his removals.

No record of his death or that of his wife has been found. The number of their children is not certainly known, and the disparity in the ages of those purporting to be theirs is so great as to leave us in doubt. However, we shall give the names and all we have found concerning them. They were: George, Nathan, Content, and Elizabeth.

John Soule (1) lived in White Creek, Washington County, N. Y. His certificate of removal from the Oblong was dated 7th month, 1779. He returned to the Oblong in 1781 but went back to White Creek in 1784. His wife Mabel joined the Friends 11th month, 1784. That was after their children were born, and they could not have been birthright members. The last mention of the names of John and Mabel Soule was 11-19-1798 when they were witnesses to a marriage.

- 6. Sarah Soule (2), fourth daughter of George (3) and Avis (Tibbetts) Soule, born in Oblong, Dutchess County, N. Y., Dec. 5, 1744. We have no record of her marriage. The Quaker records show that her son was born out of wedlock in 1765. This son was named Tibbetts Soule and he was indentured to his uncle John Soule during his minority, but tradition says he became dissatisfied with his treatment and ran away. He was married and became the progenitor of a large family whose records will appear in another section of this book. Some say he gave his mother a home in his family; others that she married late in life. One record makes her birth 6-4-1747.
- 7. Annie Soule (2), fifth daughter of George (3) and Avis (Tibbetts) Soule, born in Oblong, Dutchess County, N. Y., April 6, 1747, was mentioned in her grandmother's will in Dartmouth, Mass., 7-1-1772, along with her sister Alice. She was then 25 years of age and unmarried.
- 8. Elizabeth Soule (1), daughter of George (3) and Avis (Tibbetts) Soule, born in the Oblong, Dutchess County, N. Y., Oct. 28, 1749, was left an infant

at her mother's death. She may have been the Elizabeth Soule who was married to John Smith in 1791 as recorded in church register of Bagnall, N.Y.

9. Thomas Soule (1), son of George (3) and Alice (Davis) Soule, born in Oblong, Dutchess County, N. Y., 5-1-1759; we find no other mention of this son.

Sixth Generation.

CHILDREN OF NATHAN AND SARAH BIRDSALL SOULE.

1. Latten Soule, eldest son of Nathan and Sarah (Birdsall) Soule, was born in Dutchess County, probably in Oblong, in 1763; married Lydia Leech, daughter of Ephraim Leech of Dover, N. Y., and lived for several years in that town. About 1819-20, he purchased land in the then wilderness of Onondaga County, N. Y., and located his home near what was subsequently Clay Corners, some ten miles from Syracuse. He was a man of good judgment and business ability, and a successful farmer, but his health failed and for many years he was incapacitated for manual labor. He was tall, slender and stooping; his features thin and elongated, and his general habits serious and quiet; possibly in part the result of his physical infirmities. His grandson, Rev. Henry Birdsall Soule, writing of him, said: "There was something venerable in his appearance and manner that commanded respect; his influence. however, derived the most of its weight from his goodness of heart, and the exemplary character of his life. He was an active member of the Methodist church, and the clergyman who conducted the services at his funeral and eulogized him in the highest degree had refused to perform the burial rites of his son because he had made no public profession of religion; this exhibition of bigotry having much to do with making the grandson a Universalist minister. Latten Soule died in 1828, aged 65 years, and left a will containing much genealogical information. Tradition makes him derive his name from the Latten family with which it was supposed his mother was connected. The names of his children as follows: Clement, Nathan, Mary, Ambrose, Ephraim, Myron, Benjamin, Sally Ann, Harriet, Demmis, Emdia-and others died young.

The Latten Family.

Note.—Much interest and inquiry has been excited by the appearance of this very uncommon surname as a first name in the Soule family, it being an isolated instance, but critical research has revealed sufficient evidence to base the assumption upon that the Birdsall family was in some way connected, and Sarah Soule had good reasons for naming her first-born son "Latten" Soule. This family name, though of rare occurrence, has been found in the early Court Records, and was spelled according to the fancy of the scribes, "Latin," "Lattin," "Lattan," and "Latting."

Richard Latten came to Boston from England in 1638-9, bringing his wife and children and first set down in Concord Mass. In 1641 he removed to Reinfeld Concord Mass.

Richard Latten came to Boston from England in 1638-9, bringing his wife and children and first sat down in Concord, Mass. In 1641 he removed to Fairfield, Conn. In 1647 his name appears in the records of the General Court. In 1658 he was a resident of Hempstead, Long Island, where he probably came into contact with the Birdsalls, who had early settled there. He was at Oyster Bay in 1661 and removed to Huntington the same year. In 1672 he was accused of "speaking too freely and probably disloyally, against the Duke of York and his representative, Governor Lovelace, and a proclamation and warrant of arrest were issued against him. He was pursued for a while but his offense was extenuated because of his advanced age. He died about 1672-3. The name Latten seems not to have been very popular as it was not continued in the Soule family for more than two generations.

Mill of Latten Soule.

"I Latten Soule of the town of Clay, in the County of Onondaga and state of New York, being weak in body but of sound mind and memory do make and publish this my last will and Testament in manner and form following, that is to say: First, I give and bequeath unto my beloved wife Lydia all the profits or use of one third of my estate after my just debts are paid as long as she remains my widow and no longer. I also give and bequeath to my son Myron the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars to be paid in two years after my decease. I also give and bequeath unto my son Benjamin the sum of one hundred and fifty dollars, to be paid in three years after my decease with interest from my decease until paid. I also give unto my daughter Sally-Ann sixty dollars to be paid in one year after my decease. I also give and bequeath unto my four daughters, Mary, Demmis, Harriet and Emdia, the sum of fifteen dollars each, to be paid in one year after my decease. I further give unto my grandchildren, that is the heirs of Clement Soule, the two boys Harry and Griffith, the sum of one hundred dollars each, and to the two girls, Maria and Emily, the sum of forty-five dollars each, and the widow of Clement Soule deceased is to have the use of the same as long as the children shall remain with their mother. I further give and bequeath unto my three sons, Nathan, Ambrose L. and Ephraim L. all property that shall remain after paying the above legacies, which property is to be equally divided between them; likewise after my wifes death, or if she marry, then her dowry or thirds is to be equally divided between my three sons, Nathan, Ambrose L. and Ephraim L. And lastly I hereaby nominate, constitute and appoint my three sons, Nathan, Ambrose L. and Ephraim L. executors of this my last will and Testament hereby revoking all former wills by me made, in witness whereof I have hereunto set my hand and seal this fifth day of September, in the year of our Lord one thousand, eight hundred and twenty-eight."

(Signed) Latten Soule.

2. John Soule (2), a son of Nathan (2) and Sarah (Birdsall) Soule, born in Pawling or Dover, Dutchess County, N. Y., 1765, was mentioned in his father's will in 1806. From an old letter written by his brother Benjamin B. Soule in 1843, he says he and his brother Thomas are the only members of his father's family living. From this letter written soon after a visit to his sister, Sarah (Soule) Lane in Ohio, there was a hint that caused the compiler to believe that John Soule was also living in Ohio, but a record of papers of Administration and Especial Guardian appointed to look after the interest of the three young children of John Soule, found in the Surrogate Court of Dutchess County, N. Y., shows that he owned real and personal property in Champlain, Clinton County, N. Y. This was of date Feb. 9, 1812. There were three children, John Milton Soule, Eveline Soule, and a daughter not named. This indicates that the father was a young man (born subsequent to 1764) with a small family of children at the time of his death intestate.

There is on record a deed dated Nov. 4, 1805 of 210 acres land in the town of Moores, Clinton County, N. Y. Also a deed from Elizabeth Soule, widow of John Soule, of date 1815 of the same land to Benjamin B. Soule. Also in

the Surrogate's office of Clinton County, N. Y., the administration of the estate of said John Soule in 1813, but the papers containing the names of the heirs-at-law have not been found.

Benjamin Birdsall Soule was a brother of John Soule, both sons of Nathan Soule of Pawling, Dutchess County, N. Y.

3. Thomas Soule (2), third son of Nathan (2) and Sarah (Birdsall) Soule, born in the Oblong, Dutchess County, N. Y., Feb. 3, 1782; married BETSEY HUFFCOOT April 5, 1895 and lived in Dover, N. Y., for several years but finally settled on leased land in New York described as follows: "May 15, 1810, between Martinus Dusler and Mary his wife of the town of Menlin, Montgomery County, and Thomas Soule of the town of Dover and County of Dutchess and State of New York, consideration \$525 United States currency, That tract of land or parcel of a lot of land situate and lying in the aforesaid town and county, about five miles south-westerly from the upper Canajoharie Indian Castle, in a certain tract of 4,000 acres of land which was on the eighteenth day of July in the year of our Lord one thousand, seven hundred and eighty-six, by Letters Patent under the great seal of the State of New York, granted to Isaac Tradman, Esq., being part of a lot of land described by Lawrence Tradman, Surveyor, on a map of said tract by him thereof made by the name of Lot Number Nine and containing forty-two acres to be taken from the North end of said lot number Nine, that is to say, The northernmost forty-two acres of said lot."

(Signed) Martinus Dusler.
Maria Dusler.

Thomas Soule was a farmer and died on the homestead situated on the road between Floyd Corners and Chrishany, Sept. 9, 1844. His wife died Aug. 9, 1860. This Soule farm has been in the family about one hundred years. It was on the bank of a great gulf called the "Punch-bowl" and aside from about ten acres within this depression of swamp land, is nearly level and of sandy soil. The place is half a mile from the State Road leading from Rome to Utica and comprises about 90 acres. The old buildings consisted of a story-and-a-half house and a barn and the road from Floyd passed between them. Thomas Soule was a man of good ability and was employed for some years as agent for George Clark, the millionaire landowner, and from him held the lease of the farm; which lease he sold to his son, Nicholas C. Soule, who subsequently purchased the soil. This he sold to George Clark, Ir., and on his failure bought it back on mortgage. Mr. Soule was a "birthright member" of the old Quaker Society in Dover, N. Y., and worshiped with that sect while he lived in Dutchess County, but after his removal to Floyd he affiliated with the Methodists and was long a class-leader in the local church. His posterity were mostly connected with that denomination. He was a member of the Masonic fraternity and joined the King Solomon Lodge in Dover, Dutchess County, N. Y., Feb. 21, 1815, and the year of Masonry 5815. After his removal to Floyd he joined the Christnan Lodge.

An old note was found among the papers of Thomas Soule that strengthens the evidence of the connection between him and his ancestors. It reads as follows: "For value received I promise to pay Mary Soule or bearer the sum of one hundred and forty-seven dollars on demand with lawful interest until all is paid, as witness my hand and seal this second day of February, in the year 1814. Dover, Dutchess County, N. Y.

(Signed) Thomas Soule. Batty Soule.

The name of his brother Benjamin B. Soule appears on this note as another link of proof of the relationship.

Children of Thomas and Betsey Soule as follows: Susan, George, Jane, Nicholas, Cornelius, Mary Ann and Sarah Ann.

4. Benjamin Birdsall Soule, fourth son of Nathan and Sarah (Birdsall) Soule, born in Dutchess County, N. Y., probably in Oblong, was mentioned in his father's will in 1806 as one of the legatees. How long he lived in his native town is not known. He married MOLLY ----- and removed to Catherine township where he resided for many years, but finally went to a farm near Havana, now Montour Falls, Schuyler County, N. Y., where he died and was buried but his body was removed to the Coe Cemetery where his monument now stands, bearing the date 1856. After her husband's death the widow went to Michigan to live with her son, Seman Soule, and died there. Benjamin B. Soule was a birthright member of the Quaker Society and lived in the fellowship of that people till his removal to Catherine, then he united with the Methodist church. He always adhered to the strict discipline of the Quakers in his home and never allowed his children to participate in many of the amusements of the youth in his neighborhood; but they sometimes climbed out of the windows and stole away to attend the social gatherings held near their home.

In an old, faded letter written by him Nov. 13, 1843 and addressed to his brother Thomas Soule, he mentions a recent visit to the sourthern section of Ohio where his son John and sister Sarah Lane were living, and being in a feeble condition of health, intimates his intention of moving to that state in the following spring. He writes of the excellent climate, rich quality of the land and limestone water. He has heard the improved land could be purchase for \$10 an acre. There were but few cases of consumption or of rheumatism known there. Believes he and his brother Thomas, to whom he writes, are the only members of his father's family living with the exception of Sarah Lane. Writing of religious matters he says he loses much when his health does not admit of his going forth to meet with God's people where they worship; says the only substantial happiness to be enjoyed in this world is derived from a knowledge of God's favor and in communion with Him. He mentions a letter received from Nathan Soule (Hon. Nathan Soule, M. C.) who informed him that three of his brothers were living in Ohio. Children of Benjamin and Molly as follows: John, Seman, and Adaline. See forward.

5. Mary Soule (2), daughter of Nathan (2) and Sarah (Birdsall) Soule, born in the County of Dutchess, N. Y., was not married when her father's will was made in 1806. He made especial arrangements for her to care for her mother and aunt Alice who was living in the family. We have no other knowledge of this woman save the note running to her mentioned before, given by her

brother Thomas Feb. 2, 1814 and bearing the last endorsement of date Sept. 12, 1827. If she was the oldest daughter, and in the absence of records, we follow the order of names as found in the will, she was then rising 50 years of age. We assume to say she acquitted herself of her responsibility with faithfulness and died with the sweet approval of her own conscience.

- 6. Jane Soule (2), daughter of Nathan (2) and Sarah (Birdsall) Soule, born in Dutchess County, N. Y., was the wife of ——— WARD in 1806, in which year she was mentioned in her father's will, receiving a conditional legacy of \$25. No knowledge of her subsequent life.
- 7. Elizabeth Soule (2), daughter of Nathan (2) and Sarah (Birdsall) Soule, born in Dutchess County, N. Y., was the wife of ——— SIMPSON in 1806 when she received a legacy of \$25 by her father's will. No knowledge of her after life.
- 8. Anna Soule (2), daughter of Nathan (2) and Sarah (Birdsall) Soule, born in Dutchess County, N. Y., was the wife of ——— WARD in 1806 and was a legatee of her father's will. No account of her after life. Another Anna Soule in the town was married to a Ward; some relation.
- 9. Sarah Soule (2), daughter of Nathan (2) and Sarah (Birdsall) Soule, was born in Dutchess County, N. Y., and became the wife of ——— LANE. She was a legatee mentioned in her father's will in 1806. She was living in Ohio in 1843 "40 miles from where John is and he is 30 miles from Chillicothe."

CHILDREN OF JOHN AND MABEL HOAG SOULE.

- 1. Elizabeth Soule (3), daughter of John (2) and Mabel (Hoag) Soule, born in Dutchess County (probably in Oblong), N. Y., 1760-4; was married to Capt. Paul Cornell, son of Stephen Cornell, July 5, 1781, and settled at White Creek, Washington County, N. Y. She died in April, 1805, leaving six children. He married, 2d, one Abigail Rowley. Capt. Cornell was born in Dartmouth, Mass., 9-17-1759. Children of Elizabeth Soule Cornell as follows:
 - I. ESTHER CORNELL, born April 16, 1785.
 - II. MARY CORNELL, born Jan. 24, 1787; was married Jan. 21, 1811, to JOHN R. OSBORN, a merchant on Seneca Lake who built the first canal boat for the transportation of wheat to New York; and when he went through to that city he was entertained at a public dinner and presented with a silver pitcher. He died Sept. 9, 1841, and his widow was married 2d, to J. HILLER. She was a Quaker in early life, but embraced Spiritualism. She died Jan. 26, 1868, aged 81 years.
 - III. HANNAH CORNELL, born Dec. 11, 1791; married John Stephens and lived in Belgium, Onondaga County, N. Y.
 - IV. ALVIN CORNELL, born Feb. 25, 1793.

- 3. George Soule (3), son of John (1) and Mabel (Hoag) Soule, born in Dutchess County, N. Y. (family Bible has it Cambridge, Washington County), April 1, 1779; was married to Lucy Wells (born in Cambridge, N. Y., July 25, 1784) at Hebron, N. Y., July 10, 1800. How long this family remained in the State of New York is not known but they moved to Michigan about 1835 and settled in Redford, Wayne County, where he died Dec. 20, 1850, aged 71 years. Funeral discourse from Luke 16:3. His widow died in Nankin, Mich., June 16, 1848. The old family Bible containing the records is now in the possession of George W. Soule of Grand Rapids, Mich., from which copies were made by Mrs. Martha Soule Tomlinson for this work. It will be seen that this family, or some members of it, lived in Stockbridge, Mich., at one time, where the grandfather of Col. George Soule lived with his son, John Soule. They were not aware that they were of the same branch of the Soule family. As the same names occurred in both families their mail sometimes crossed. His children were named as follows: Lucinda, John W., Harriet, Olive, Benjamin, Henry and Lucy.
- 4. Content Soule (1), daughter of John (1) and Mabel (Hoag) Soule, born in Cambridge, Washington County, N. Y., Jan. 1, 1782; was married to Henry Vowers, born in New York, April 28, 1771, by whom she had issue. She was married 2d, to George Babcock. She died in Redford, Mich., Aug. 10, 1859, aged 77 years. Her granddaughter, Mrs. Viola Holbrook, has visited Cambridge, N. Y., to examine the Quaker records for the purpose of procuring the evidences to secure her admission to the Daughters of the Revolution; and is reported to have been successful in convincing the organization of her eligibility. This lady has collected much relating to the Soule family history but has refused to make her note available for this work; assuming that she was to publish it herself. However, the compiler has had access to all the sources of information and the Soule family will not be likely to lose anything by her disinclination.

Seventh Generation.

CHILDREN OF LATTEN AND LYDIA LEECH SOULE.

1. Clement Soule (1), son of Latten (1) and Lydia (Leech) Soule, born in Dover, Dutchess County, N. Y., Jan. 24, 1789; married MARY ODELL, born Aug. 28, 1791, and removed to the town of Cicero, Onondaga County, N. Y.,

in the winter of 1822. The family went with great freight sledges, carrying all of their household goods with them. After a long and tedious journey of two weeks they reached the home of his father, Latten Soule, late in the night nearly exhausted and weary of existence. Here they were taken in and though there were eight persons including the teamsters, they made beds on the floor and found rest for their weary limbs. Much of the following information was culled from the biography of his son, Rev. Henry Birdsall Soule, written by his wife and she drew from her husband's diary for the matter relating to his early home and parents. Of his father he wrote: "My father I remember as a tall, spare man, with a long, thin face, wide mouth, large, irregular teeth, light brown hair, gray eyes, large nose, narrow, high forehead loaded with strong, deep furrows. His voice was strong but musical, and when he was engaged, was exceedingly rich and melodious. He possessed an amiable disposition and strong affection, and when he smiled, his whole countenance was expressive of great serenity and benignity. I cannot tell exactly how it was, but when he was deeply interested in any subject of a cheerful character, those coarse, irregular features were invested with a charm that was perfectly irresistible; they fastened the attention of the beholder as with a spell—while a resistless witchery dwelt in those

> ".... Gray eyes lit up With Summer lightnings of a soul So full of Summer warmth."

There were great promptness and decision of character—not that promptness marked with the folly of haste, nor the vulgar kind of decision which sinks into mere obstinacy or imperturbable mulishness-but qualities which give a man readiness and energy. His advantages of education were of the most limited character, being such as scarcely enabled him to read and write when he entered upon his majority. But he possessed an inquisitive mind and loved information; and as soon as he could command the means to procure books, he put himself to study, devoting to it all the leisure he could find. He was a professional farmer which afforded him frequent opportunities for communion with his books, especially after his marriage and settlement in life. So much advantage did he derive from this employment, that he became a very competent surveyor, which yielded him in the course of his life no inconsiderable pecuniary emolument, besides storing his mind with an immense amount of general knowledge. Few men who have supported families by manual labor have been more extensive readers. His means always remained too limited for him to gather a large library, though no man would have gloried more in the possession of such a treasure. It was a custom for him to dispose of his books as soon as possible after reading them and to devote the proceeds to new purchases. He also carried on a pretty extensive business in borrowing books—as much as possible in a section of the country where that article was not very abundant. In his family no man was more kind and happy than he; while as a neighbor he was too obliging and generous for his own interests.

The wife of Clement Soule was a woman about the middle size, with an active and energetic temperament, and great decision of character. Her son in writing of her used the following laguage: "Over her thin and pale coun-

tenance was thrown a calmness and thoughtfulness that, especially when she gently smiled, invested her with a melancholy though pleasing interest. disposition accorded with the indication of her features, being kind and forbearing to a degree which is witnessed in no other being but a woman. Strong in her affections, the objects of her attachment became, as it were, a part of herself; and no labor was too arduous, or endurance too great, for the demonstration of her devotion and the performance of the duties which her feelings suggested. She was always interested in the sick and suffering, and spent many of the most instructive hours of her life in attendance upon the one and in communion with the other. Her education was narrow and imperfect; but she possessed strong natural abilities, a quick and accurate perception and good sense, which qualified her to discharge the responsible duties of wife and mother, and the neighbor and friend, in a manner every way worthy of her She belonged to that class of women who never yield to anything but The heart within her always was stronger than the circumstances without her, however dark and trying those circumstances might be. In all the trials through which the family passed—and they were not few or light she was never known to exhibit discouragement, but was unusually active and earnest in times of great difficulty, in seasons of greatest darkness; never seen to sit down sad and despairing as if giving up the struggle with adverse fortune. She never distrusted the providence of God, but always looked for a profitable issue from every trial. She would say it would come out all right, for God did only smite to heal; and her countenance was an assurance that she felt what she said."

The wedded life of this couple was a perfect and beautiful consummation of youthful hopes and bridal anticipations. They seemed always to be happy; seldom more so than when under their roof, alone with their little ones. Their home, though always an humble one, never boasting of luxuries, and at times only furnished with the bare necessities of life, was always neat and well ordered.

Writing of the new home in Cicero, Onondaga County, N. Y., the son of Clement Soule stated that it was doubtful if his father ever fully recovered from the exposure of the journey from Dutchess County. During part of the two weeks while they were on the road the weather was exceedingly cold, often stormy and blustering, and they suffered much.

After remaining a few days at his father's home, Clement and his family took lodgings with his brother-in-law, Andrew Johnson, who had married his oldest sister and but recently moved into the township. It was the season when preparations were being made for making maple sugar, and the two families carried on the business in company. In the early part of April they moved into their own house, which, with its situation, was thus described:

"On the eastern side of Vails brook, and distant from it nearly a quarter of a mile, there stood a rustic dwelling. The public road that makes its course east, passed within a few yards of it, making the building face to the north. It was large and nearly square on the ground, and was constructed of round logs with the rough bark on, just as they grew in the woods; these reached the whole length of each side, and lay horizontally upon each other, being locked together at the four corners by a sort of inverted dove-tail. The sides

of the logs that faced into the room were slightly hewn, to lessen a little the inequality of the surface; between them were inserted thin chinks of wood, over which, both inside and outside of the building, was spread a thick coat of clay mortar, to keep out the wind and frost and render the room more comfortable. The house was but one story in height. At the eaves, large logs were placed transversely to serve as beams for the support of the garret floor, which consisted of loose boards, with rather ungracious openings between them, making a wild clatter when walked upon. Above was mounted a steep roof covered with riven shingles two yards or more long. The same material clothed the gables, through one of which one small pane of glass admitted the light. Below, two wide passages were cut for entrance doors—one facing the highway, the other looking back upon the farm. There were two small windows, not always supplied with glass, one close beside each door.

"So low was the main story as to forbid a man of ordinary height walking with his hat on; indeed even without it, the naked logs that hung threateningly over the room, would sometimes remind him to be humble and stoop a little. The floor above was rough, having gone through no smoothing process, save by sand and usage. It was, however, secured with nails. Nearly in the center of the room was a trap-door opening into a small, dark, square hole, five or six feet deep, that served as an apology for a cellar. There were two small apartments for sleeping purposes, separated from the main room by a crazy partition of coarse boards set upright with openings between them of such unpardonable extent that the inquisitive eye could readily be gratified. In these rooms there were no windows, and of course they were dark, sombre places, except when lighted with candles. They were, however, proof against wild beasts from without and gave a sense of security to the inmates from a foe that was a source of almost constant danger. But the chimney and fireplace were the most curious adjuncts of the log dwelling. This was in the end of the building, and rested for support against the wall of the house. broad stone hearth, nearly as large as a bed-room, had a broken, uneven surface; and from this a cobble-stone wall rose six feet in height, and upon this one side of the chimney was commenced, the other side resting on the cross-beam of the house. The chimney was made of long, flat laths and plastered with a liberal quantity of clay mortar. The width of the funnel was about ten feet, but gradually diminished until at the top which rose just above the ridge-pole, it was not more than four by five feet. This opening served a three-fold purpose; it was a conductor of smoke, served as a window to admit light, and permitted those who sat by the hearth to look out and study astronomy. There were no jam-stones to the fireplace; the fire was right out in the room. There was a huge pair of andirons with the fore feet melted off, and the bars resting on stones to support the wood for the fire. A long wooden crane flung its strong arm across the fireplace as high as it could swing, loaded with hooks, chains and trammels of every size and shape; and this engine screamed and groaned piteously every time it was moved.

The attic was reached by a short step-ladder. This part of the building was not separated by partitions, and was filled with a variety of barrels, boxes and winter bed-clothing. The furnishing of this rude house was of the most simple and primitive kind, and in quantity just enough to meet the necessities of

the family. And this was typical of the dwelling-houses that prevailed in that section of the country at the time.

The situation of this rustic home was romantic, and not altogether devoid of beauty. The ground was slightly undulating. On the opposite side of the road from the house, a deep, unbroken forest stretched as far as the eye could reach. The same majestic wood bounded the vision on the east, and stood boldly up against the farm on the south. The trees of this forest were very large, lifting their heads to a lofty height, and during the summer were clothed with a foliage so dense as to wrap the earth in perpetual shadow. Then there were the clematis, the hop and creeping vines running hither and thither over the walls of that rude building, and the roof was nearly concealed from view by the mass of leaves and flowers. Altogether, the scenery surrounding this humble home was imposing and full of interest to the nature-loving and meditative heart."

Some cattle and sheep were procured and the family were soon comfortably settled in their new quarters. While the father was tilling the soil the mother was busy with her wheels dressing the wool and flax to clothe the family. But how inscrutable are the ways of Providence! Only a few months had passed when Clement Soule was cut down by an illness of short duration and gloom settled over the household. This affliction left the care of the farm to the mother, and being under a mortgage, the most rigid economy was required. But this industrious woman devoted herself to weaving woolen and linen for the neighbors and thereby earned considerable money with which to reduce the debt on the farm. Kind-hearted men cut and drew the winter's fire-wood to the house. Thus affairs moved on till about 1834 when the good woman was married to Andrew Johnson who had been the husband of Mary Soule, the sister of Clement. This man proved to be a kind step-father to the children, and manifested the deepest interest in their bringing up and education. Mr. Soule's death occurred Aug. 17, 1828. Mrs. Johnson died Feb. 3, 1876.

2. Hon. Nathan Soule (3), son of Latten (1) and Lydia (Leech) Soule, born in Dover, Dutchess County, N. Y., Aug., 1790; died Jan., 1860; married Chris-TIANA ——— (died April 2, 1853, aged 61-9-10), in Herkimer County; soon after moved to Fort Plain, Montgomery County, N. Y., commencing his public life, filling successfully the offices of justice of the peace, sheriff, supervisor, canal superintendent, member of the Legislature, judge of the County Court and Representative to Congress. In 1833, he moved to the town of Clay, Onondaga County, where he was supervisor of the municipality and judge of the County Court; also two terms in the Legislature. He was an extensive contractor in building the Chenango Canal. Judge Soule was a man of strong mind, kind and conciliatory in his manners and friendly in his intercourse with his fellow-men. He was the common and trusted law-advisor of his townsmen for many years and a peacemaker among them. He was a man of gigantic proportions, weighing more than 300 pounds, and his nephew, Judge C. E. Soule, of Grand Haven, Mich., remembers him as he was, in company with his brothers, visiting his father in Ohio, and mentions his "great expanse of waist-coat" displayed by him. At a prayer-meeting held in his house in 1855, Frances West, his granddaughter, aged only 18 years, when her presence was

unknown to him, was so deeply moved upon that she knelt at his side and poured forth an earnest prayer for his conversion; and this unusual incident so deeply convicted him of his need of salvation through Jesus Christ, that he consecrated his heart and life to God and was ever after a devoted Christian. Under the ministry of Rev. William Moorse he was baptized, joined the Methodist church and lived consistently in its communion and fellowship the remainder of his days. He suffered much from consumption during his decline, but uncomplainingly and with Christian fortitude and submission. His prayer was for a full preparation, a full consciousness of death when it came and a calm, peaceful exit from this to the other life. In these wishes his Heavenly Father was very indulgent, and his aged physician who had seen many persons die, never saw an adult depart from life so apparently easy. No expression of pain came over his face, no groan was heard. He composed his form, closed his eyes as if going into a natural sleep, and nought but his breathing told that he was dying. Not a muscle convulsed, not a limb moved. He had considerately closed up his business affairs and made arrangements for his funeral. He bade farewell to his family and friends, closed his eyes to this world and then consciously entered upon the narrow strait which connects Time with Eternity, carrying with him the full expectation of meeting his companion and other loved ones who had preceded him to the home immortal. He had made his will Aug. 16, 1859. Eleven children survived him.

The following abstracts show the distribution of his estate: He gave his five daughters as follows: To Polly, two hundred dollars and a note against her husband for one hundred dollars. To Lucinda, three hundred dollars. To Rhoda R., three hundred dollars. To Lydia, three hundred dollars. To Harriet, ten dollars, she having had her share. To Nathan Soule, Jr., five hundred dollars. To Alfred Soule, six hundred dollars. To Betsey, wife of son James Soule, his furniture for her care since the death of his wife. To five daughters, all the beds and bedding to be equally divided. To John Soule, his secretary. To his three sons, John, Andrew J. and James O., all of his real estate and personal property—on conditions. To son Harvey L. Soule, five dollars, he having had his share. Appointed sons John Soule and

Andrew J. Soule, administrators.

The order of births of his children is not known, but following the will they stand as follows: Polly, Harriet, John, Lucinda, Rhoda, Lydia, Nathan, Alfred, James, Andrew J. and Harvey L.

3. Mary Soule (3), eldest daughter of Latten (1) and Lydia (Leech) Soule, born in Dover, Dutchess County, N. Y., Aug. 28, 1792; was married Nov. 13, 1813 to Andrew Johnson who was born Aug. 7, 1794. She died April 1, 1833, and he married 2d, Mary Griffin Soule, widow of Clement Soule (brother of his deceased wife), she having been born Aug. 28, 1791 and died Feb. 3, 1876. They began life in the town of Minden, described as "a past-township of Montgomery County, N. Y." From his name written on the covers and fly-leaf of an old dictionary now owned by Henry Birdsall Strever of Cherokee, Wis., they lived in this town in 1815, 1816 and 1817, but sometime before 1822 they had removed to Euclid, now Clay, Onondaga County, N. Y., for when Clement Soule and family removed to that town that year, they

lodged awhile in the home of the Johnsons who had "recently moved into that town." On April 27, 1827 Andrew Johnson was elected first supervisor of Euclid that had been taken from the town of Cicero. He was also appointed postmaster of Euclid in 1827. From a statement written by Judge Charles E. Soule, of Grand Haven, Mich., Mrs. Johnson was a woman of enormous size, weighing about 300 pounds, and it was with difficulty and considerable exertion that she could pass through an ordinary door. After Andrew Johnson married the widow of his first wife's brother she carried her children to that home; and it was published in the life of Rev. Henry Birdsall Soule, son of Clement Soule, that he was treated with great kindness while living there; a commentary worthy of preservation. The members of this family were buried in the Old Cemetery at Pine Plains where so many of the Soules were interred. There were five children bearing the Johnson name.

Ambrose Latten Soule (1), third son of (Latten (1) and Lydia (Leech) Soule, was born in Dover, Dutchess County, N. Y., June 26, 1801; married in 1824, RUTH PADDOCK, a sister of the second wife of his brother, Benjamin Soule, the widow of one William Brown and a lineal descendant of Elder William Brewster. He was in early life an extensive contractor in building canals in the State of New York. Being a tall, powerfully built man, he gave his employees examples of strength when excavating and in other heavy work. When he was 35 years of age he was commissioned Colonel of the Onondaga County militia, and during one of the "General Musters" of his command where athletic sports were in evidence, a bully somewhat under the influence of drink, challenged him to a test of strength in wrestling. This adventure the Colonel wished to avoid, but was at last forced into the match by the continual hectoring of the bully and his own admirers. In this encounter he was victorious and threw his adversary, but the leg of the vanquished was broken in the struggle and he was made a cripple for life. The outcome of this encounter so distressed Colonel Soule that he forthwith resigned his commission and would not allow any person to address him by his military title or to refer in any manner to his connection with the militia. He also aided in the support of the crippled man and his family and sought in every possible way to make amends for the injury inflicted by his hands but against his will. After his removal to Ohio a letter was received from a brother addressed "Col. A. L. Soule," and he was so enraged that he tore the envelope into shreds and only read the contents after much deliberation and self-struggle.

About the year 1835, his brother, Ephraim L. Soule, compounded and manufactured a household remedy known as "Soule's Sovereign Balm Pills."

This medicine proved so popular about the old homestead in Onondaga County, that it was decided to enlarge the territory of sale, and Ambrose L. Soule moved with his family to north-western Ohio about 1841 to take charge of the distribution in Ohio, Indiana and Michigan. Mr. Soule had been brought up a Quaker, but after his removal to the West, became identified with the founding and upbuilding of the Campbellite or Disciple Church, and became a lay preacher of high standing and great influence in that denomination. He was thus associated with James A. Garfield, afterwards President of the United States; and they were long firm friends. He was one of the founders and a liberal contributor to "The Western Reserve Eclectic Institute," now Hiram College, at Hiram, Ohio, and was one of the Trustees from the founding of the institution in 1850 to the time of his death.

Ambrose L. Soule was a superior business-man and became the most wealthy of any in his county while living in Ohio; also in Michigan where he was early identified with the lumber trade; and lived in Iona County in that state. His death occurred in 1857, a few days after his 56th birthday, just as the financial panic of that year came on, and his estate suffered much from the difficulties that followed, but there was left nearly \$250,000 to be distributed to each of his children. The names were as follows: William, Jane, Delia, Mary, Annette, Sarah, Julia, Ambrose L., Julius M., Charles E., James, Francis, Carlos, Arabella, William F. and Belle. See forward for full records.

5. Ephraim Leech Soule (1), son of Latten and Lydia (Leech) Soule, born in Dover, Dutchess County, N. Y., Sept. 19, 1803.

In 1819-20 he moved with his father's family to what is now the township of Clay in Onondaga County, New York. The latter part of his business life was spent in Greenpoint, town of Salina, near Syracuse. He was the third doctor recorded in the town of Clay, being recorded in the Centennial History of Onondaga County as a "botanical doctor." He originated what was later known as "Soule's Sovereign Balm Pills" and met with such success with them in his practice that the idea occurred to him to go into the more extensive manufacture of them, with the result that he built up an extensive business, sending forth into Ohio and Michigan his brothers who acted as distributing agents. From 1840 to 1870 these pills enjoyed a remarkable distribution, being consigned over the remotely settled territory of the West. They were shipped by the Erie Canal to Buffalo and thence by steamer to Cleveland, and from there conveyed by teams to the new home of Ambrose L. Soule who had charge of sales. From that point the distribution and sales was by peddlers who filled their packs with small paste-board boxes of the pills, and traversed the new country for miles, returning for a new supply when their stock was exhausted. At times more than fifty men were out on the country roads and not a single habitation was overlooked by these hardy vendors. "Onondaga's Centennial History" has this to say of the hamlet of "Belgium," town of Clay: "In 1848 it contained one hundred and sixty inhabitants, twenty-eight dwellings . . . and also the celebrated 'Oriental Balm Pill' manufactory, which generally employed from thirty to fifty persons. This establishment subsequently moved to Euclid, where Dr. E. L. Soule made the 'Oriental Sovereign Balm Pills' for several years, doing quite an entensive business." This business kept in-

increasing to the time of his death in 1856. It then was taken as their share in the estate by his daughters Almeda and Ermine Soule who married brothers, Elson T. and Alonzo Wright. They carried on the business successfully for a time, but eventually more progressive methods on the part of others in the same business told heavily against them; the business gradually died a natural death. Ephraim L. Soule died in his prime, and it is an interesting subject for speculation to what extent he might have built this business had he lived.

In 1851 he moved with his family to Greenpoint, town of Salina, in order to be nearer Syracuse, which was a growing center of activity. He continued in the manufacture of pills, but also became interested in the salt industry which was the principal industry of the locality. He operated a solar salt business at Greenpoint, making his son Oscar F. Soule superintendent of his salt yards.

On Feb. 24, 1824, at Euclid, town of Clay, he married Abigail Kinne, daughter of Moses Kinne and Betsey Williams, born Jan. 17, 1804; died March 4, 1856. Moses Kinne was one of the original settlers of Euclid, and taught the the first school in his own log house there in 1805. He was a direct descendant of Henry Kinne, Thomas Palmer, Capt. John Johnson and George Felt, early New England pioneers. They had nine children, named as follows: Almeda, Moses, William, Betsey, Ermine, Oscar, Oscar F., Adelbert and Irving.

In 1856 his son Wallace, who resided in Goodrich, Mich., became very ill and his father learning of it immediately went to Michigan to do what he could to nurse him back to health. Wallace died Sept. 30, 1856, of his illness, and his father after his return home, died of the disease which he had contracted

of his son Wallace, shortly after his return, on Oct. 24, 1856.

Judge Charles E. Soule of Grand Haven, Mich., has written of him: "In my childhood there were annual visits between Uncle Leech and my father, and a strong affection existed that was mutual. My father was a local preacher, and on hearing of his brother's death he gave, in a sermon, a touching eulogy in his memory. Ephraim was of different build from his brothers. They were tall and large men. He was not over medium in height, but was thick set and quite portly. He was a very genial man, and much less austere than his brothers. They had the Quaker seriousness, while he liked his joke. From what I have heard of him I think he had large ability and excellent standing as a business man. His wife was known as "Aunt Abigail," and I remember her very well. She was slender but not tall; a delicate appearing woman with dark eyes, and must have been a beauty when in her youth."

He was rated highly by his friends and neighbors, and was often called upon to speak in public, gaining quite a reputation by his natural eloquence. When the plank road was built between Syracuse and Liverpool, he was president of the company operating it: the Salina, Liverpool and Clay Plank Road

Company. This office he held from 1850 to 1856.

Quoting from "Onondaga's Centennial" again, in speaking of the building of a Lutheran Church, it says: "This society was followed by the Christians or Unitarians, who about 1837 built a church in Euclid, the builders being Dr. E. L. Soule, Hosea Crandall, Moses Kinne, Judge Nathan Soule and others. This was a natural transition of his religious connections from the Quakerism of his immediate forebears.

From a clipping from the press, in the family Bible, we quote the following:

Thoughts Suggested by Mitnessing the Burial of Dr. E. X. Soule.

BY MRS. F. FREEMAN.

Slow and sadly, back they've borne him
To the haunts he long had known;
And have laid him with his kindred,
E'en with loved ones, all his own.

Here amid these scenes he sported, When in youthful vigor gay; Here in manhood's prime he labored, And e'en here his locks grew gray.

And with manly perseverance

Here he strove with fortune's wiles,

Meeting cheerfully, and firmly,

All its fickle frowns and smiles.

Here, too, in their native hamlet,
When youth's charms were well combined,

6. Myron Soule (1), son of Latten and Lydia (Leech) Soule, was born in Dover, Dutchess County, N. Y., 1805; married Sophia Ives, who died and he married 2d, Annah Smith. He removed to Ohio with his brothers in 1841, and died there without issue. Like his brothers he was brought under the Quaker faith and home government, but after his settlement in the West, embraced the peculiar doctrines held by the Campbellites and became an earnest preacher in that denomination. He was a very religious man and held in high esteem by a large circle of acquaintances. He was a plain farmer. It is understood that he and his wife adopted and brought up several children.

At the home of Moses and Lydia Ives on Oct. 30, 1831, there was a double wedding, when Myron Soule and Sarah Sophia Ives, and Dr. Joseph Haven Smith and Annah Carrington Ives, were married. Dr. Smith was a young widower, the husband of Emmeline Ives (an older sister of the two brides who had died leaving two little girls). To Dr. Smith and Annah were born three children. Dr. Smith died June 17, 1838, and Annah returned to her father's home where Myron and Sophia had lived since their marriage. The next year the father, Moses Ives, died, and this left Myron Soule the head of the house in this complex family—consisting of his wife, her mother, and her widowed sister Annah, and the five children. After a few years the mother died, and not long after this his wife, Sophia, died. Then on Jan. 28, 1847, he and Annah were married; he continued his kind care of the children in the home.

They all loved Uncle Myron, and were happy to call him "Papa Soule," which was the name their own children learned and loved in the years that followed. Myron died March 23, 1863, and Annah lived until March 19, 1899,

when she died aged 92 years.

The children of Emmeline were Lydia Annette, born May 13, 1829, married to J. M. Burnett Sept. 14, 1849. Their home was in Russell, Geauga County, Ohio. She died Feb. 17, 1912.

Susan Emmeline, born Feb. 8, 1831, and married to H. B. BOYNTON, Orange,

Cuyahoga County, Ohio. She died May 11, 1904.

Annah's children were:

Jane Priscilla, born Oct. 11, 1833, married to R. U. ROBERTS Aug. 15, 1850. She is now living in Weiser, Idaho.

Levant Moses, born Jan. 1, 1835, married Lydia Roberts Oct. 11, 1855, and lived at the old homestead in Russell a number of years. He died May 31, 1905.

Clarissa Annah, the youngest of the five children, was born Jan. 6, 1838; married to J. H. Sanborn of Londonville, Ashland County, Ohio. She died Dec. 30, 1913.

As I understand it, Myron did not adopt these children, as they all used their father's name—Smith. But he was like an own father to them and before his death made a will which left a share of his property to them.

7. Benjamin B. Soule (2), youngest son of Latten (1) and Lydia (Leech) Soule, born in Dover, Dutchess County, N. Y., May 20, 1810; married for first wife, MISS MATILDA MILLER in 1832 who died May 15, 1833, just eight days after the birth of her only child, Mortimer Wilson Soule, who was born May 7, 1833. This son died at the age of seven years. He married for second

wife Rhoda Paddock, sister of his brother's wife, who was born April 20, 1810, died Aug. 15, 1883. Mr. Soule was born May 20, 1810 and died Jan. 27, 1900. His first wife was buried in Euclid, Onondaga County, N. Y. He and second

wife were interred at Spring Lake, Mich.

During the time when his brother's patent medicine was having such an extensive sale in the West, Benjamin Soule settled in Ohio, but afterwards removed to Spring Lake, five miles from Grand Haven, Mich. He once met with a heavy loss by trusting a worthless fellow as his partner in business, but fortunately procured a good dairy farm upon which he acquired a comfortable independence for his venerable years. When he was 84 years of age he was styled "A stiff-necked and rigid old Puritan." He was an ardent Prohibitionist during his last years. Self-respecting, conservative, close-mouthed and independent, he "paddled his own canoe" and asked favors of but few. He and his good wife always enjoyed the respect and esteem of all who knew them. He was lacking but three months of 90 when he died. Having no surviving children of his own, he adopted nine of other nativity who took his name and became people of whom no family need be ashamed. These sons and daughters were much attached to their foster-parents and we herewith append their names. George R. Soule, Hannah Lansing, Rhoda Lansing, Adelbert C. Norris, Ioseph Jordan, Margaret Hubbard, Julia Soule (a niece), Minnie M. Green and Frederick Thomson. The latter was known as "Frederick Soule." He married a Swede lady, Cassie M. Sandellius, born in that country May 18, 1856. These inherited the fine old Soule farm, but have sold a part of it for a golf-link and moved into another house. Mr. Soule was born in New York City, Jan. 2, 1852; died Nov. 30, 1903. Children:

1. Rev. Henry Birdsall Soule (2), born July 7, 1815, in Dover, Dutchess County, N. Y., was the eldest of four children. His name was conferred upon him by an intimate friend of his father's and he was wont to call it his "Unmusical cognomen." He assumed that his mother was of Irish descent. He is described as of serious, reflective temperament; amiable but frank; obedient and obliging. His early life was passed in a pioneer home and community. From his childhood he manifested an ardent love for the beautiful in nature and in character, and an insatiate thirst for knowledge. He had learned to read long before he knew the alphabet. He was sent to a "little school in the woods," as he called it, when eleven years of age. In young manhood he had decided to be a mechanic and spent some time as a carpenter. Encouraged by his mother and step-father, he entered a select school in Lodi, near Syracuse. N. Y., April 20, 1834, and in 1835 became a student in the Clinton Liberal Institute. During his vacations he taught school. He early contributed articles for the press and exhibited a remarkable aptitude for literary work. He was ordained to the ministry of the Universalist Church and was for a number of years stationed over some of the largest charges in the denomination in New York and in New England. Was at Fort Plain, N. Y., in 1839; in Troy, N. Y., in 1841, and became Principal of the Clinton Liberal Institute in 1842. He settled in Utica, N. Y., in 1843 and went thence to Lyons, N. Y., and died there in the home of Hon. L. Sherwood, of small-pox, Jan. 1852. He was buried there between 8 and 9 o'clock in the morning on which he died, and funeral services were held at his grave. A memoir was written by his widow, Mrs. Caroline A. Soule, and published in New York in 1852, in which abstracts from his sermons and personal diary appear. The frontispiece is a portrait of Mr. Soule, engraved in steel. From this work the following was copied:

"Thus, died he, to love whom was my life; thus died the father of my five little ones: no friend beside him, no place upon his lips where one could press

a kiss. Life has its mysteries, and this is one."

"With silence only as their benediction,
God's angels come
Where, in the shadow of a great affliction,
The soul sits dumb."
"Yet would we say, what every heart approveth,
Our Father's will,
Calling to Him the dear ones whom He loveth
In mercy still."

Mrs. Caroline A. Soule, widow of Rev. Henry Birdsall Soule, was a preacher in the Universalist church and when last heard from was settled in Glasgow, Scotland. She was a lady of fine education and literary ability. There were five children in this family but little information has been obtained concerning them.

At 17 years of age he moved with his father to Greenpoint, near Liverpool, where his father was interested among other things, in the manufacture of salt by the solar process. He superintended the salt works for his father, and at his father's death in 1856, he took as his share of the estate, his father's salt interests. He continued operating this business until 1868, when he sold out and moved to Syracuse with his family. At the end of 1868 he had formed a co-partnership with G. Lewis Merrell, and established a canning business under the firm name of Merrell and Soule. The product the first year amounted to less than \$2,000. In the following year they enlarged their plant, and the business continued to increase until in 1881 they found it necessary to again enlarge their facilities, and they relocated on West Fayette Street. In 1883 his son, Frank C. Soule, was admitted as a member of the firm, and they established a canning factory at Chittenango, on the line of the Erie Canal. Later, additional factories were located at Fayetteville. In 1873 the firm developed new machinery for canning corn and secured valuable patents on their inventions, and the sale of this machinery soon became an important part of the business. In 1885 the firm engaged in the manufacture of con-

densed mince-meat, which also developed into a large industry, and the trade mark "None Such Mince Meat" has become a household word. In 1893 the firm was incorporated, Oscar F. Soule becoming vice-president, which position he held until his death.

Oscar F. Soule was first and last a "family-man." In 1857 (Sept. 23) he married in Ithaca, New York, MARY AGNES LAWRENCE, daughter of Nicholas Lawrence, and by her he had three children. Mary Agnes Lawrence's older sister, Adrienna Margritta Lawrence, had married John McDowell Pelton who had a large sugar plantation in Dulac, La. To this plantation Oscar F. Soule and his wife used to go to spend the winters, for that was a season of inactivity in the salt business, and there their eldest child, Elizabeth Van Slyke, was born, Nov. 19, 1858. There also they were when the first rumblings of the Civil War were heard, and they were importuned to hurry back home to avoid being held in the South an indefinite period. As it was, they had difficulty getting back through the rebel and Union lines, but eventually succeeded. That spring, April 3, 1861, their second child was born in Greenpoint—Frank Channing Soule. On Jan. 8, 1863 their third child, Agnes Lawrence Soule (called Nattie), was born. Mary Agnes Lawrence was born in Buenos Ayres, South America, while her father was there as an engineer in charge of harbor construction work. "Nattie" is Spanish for Agnes, hence the name "Nattie" in the Soule family.

On September 24, 1868, Oscar F. Soule married SARAH BRADLEY of Syracuse, and moved to Syracuse to live. For a short time they lived with her parents. but soon purchased a home on the corner of West and Seymore Streets where they lived until 1894. In 1894 they moved to West Onondaga Street, near Delaware Avenue. They took to live with them Emma, the daughter of W. Wallace Soule (who had died in Goodrich, Michigan in 1856), and it was from their house she was married to Ira E. Swart of Auburn, Michigan. Emma named her first child "Nattie" after "Nattie" her cousin Agnes. Emma died soon after the birth of her twin sons Ira and Wallace, and then (about 1892) Oscar F. Soule took the daughter "Nattie" to live with him.

Oscar F. Soule suffered a severe financial set-back in 1893 when through endorsement of notes, he became involved in the failure of The Bradley Manufacturing Co. His son, Frank C. Soule, interested himself in the matter, however, and through his efforts his father was saved from financial ruin, and

eventually recovered.

His greatest pleasure was derived from his love of horses. He owned fine spirited animals, and never was so happy as when behind the reins of his favorites. In 1894 he and his son, Frank C. Soule, bought with three other families a summer estate at Skaneateles Lake, eighteen miles from Syracuse. This they called "Mingo," meaning in Indian tongue "the five united nations." There he spent his summers until he died, and there he taught his grandsons to swim, and ride, and fish. His genial nature and never-failing cheerfulness won for him from all by whom he was surrounded the name "Uncle Oscar."

He died Jan 18, 1902, and the following is from his obituary notice:


"Oscar F. Soule, the well-known business man of this city, and vice-president of Merrell-Soule Co., died on Saturday evening at Pasadena, Cal., from pneumonia. Two years ago, Mr. Soule suffered from an attack of this disease

from which he never fully recovered. The past summer he spent at Skaneateles, and in October, in company with his grand-niece, Miss Nattie Swart, he left for California, where he proposed to spend the winter. At that time he felt much improved and under the influence of the changed climate he continued to gain in health. But he was again attacked with pneumonia which resulted fatally. He was a Unitarian, but out of deference to his wife, Sarah Bradley, he attended the Fourth Presbyterian Church of Syracuse, and was for several years a trustee of the society."

- 8. Adelbert N. Soule, born Nov. 3, 1836; died Nov. 16, 1902. Of this brother, Oscar F. Soule wrote, Dec. 6, 1893, "My brother Adelbert, two years younger than myself, left Syracuse some fifteen years ago, migrating from place to place, and we have never heard that he was married. He is one of the besthearted fellows in the world; too much so for his own good; spending early the portion received from his father's estate and never accumulating anything since so far as I know."

Frank Channing Soule was born April 3, 1861 at Greenpoint, near Liverpool, iust outside the city of Syracuse. He attended school in the old red schoolhouse which still stands on the hill at Greenpoint overlooking Onondaga Lake. He early moved with his father to Syracuse and received his education at the public and private schools of that city. At the age of eighteen he entered the employ of the firm Merrell and Soule, where he progressed rapidly, and when only twenty-one, he was admitted to partnership in this firm, then engaged in the canning of vegetables and the manufacture of canning machinery. The story of Frank C. Soule is the story of the progress of Merrell-Soule Co., of which he is now the president. The co-partnership Merrell and Soule was established in 1868. In 1879 Frank Channing Soule entered its employ as bookkeeper, salesman, factory foreman, and man of all work, and in 1883 he was admitted to the partnership. The business at that time was confined to canning of vegetables and fruits. In 1893 the firm was incorporated under the name of Merrell-Soule Co., but in the meantime, in the year 1885 the firm had taken up the manufacture of None Such Mince Meat, a product now well known from coast to coast. In 1905 Frank C. Soule went to Europe accompanied

by his son, Oscar F. Soule, and there purchased a basic patent for the manufacture of powdered milk. From small beginning in 1905 the powdered milk branch of the business has steadily grown until now it is one of the principal

parts of the inudstry.

In addition to his intense interest in the development of the business of Merrell-Soule Co., he has filled many offices of a semi-public character. He was a commissioner representing the State of New York at the Jamestown Exposition in 1910. He has been active in the undertakings of the Syracuse Chamber of Commerce in betterment of the city, and has served as a director of that body for a number of years. He is a director of the Syracuse Trust Co. and was at one time vice-president of the National Bank of Syracuse, until its consolidation with the Syracuse Trust Co.

He takes his recreation in the country, on his estate "Vanderkamp" which is located on the north shore of Oneida Lake. This estate takes its name from one of the early owners of the property, Francis Adrian Vanderkemp, who as a refugee from Holland located there in 1794. There he has built up a beautiful summer home, on what is known as Vanderkamp Lake. There too he has built a summer home used jointly by his two sons, Oscar F. and Robert G. and their families. His greatest pleasure is found in Vanderkamp, when he is surrounded by his grandchildren, who enjoy to the fullest extent the pleasures with which he has surrounded them. At one time he had built up on his farm there a justly famous herd of thoroughbred Holstein-Friesian cattle, but with the coming of the World War and the entrance of the United States into hostilities his entire attention was necessarily devoted to his business, due to the demands upon it for supplies of the United States and English governments, and he found it necessary to give up his breeding activities and sold his fine herd. His farming activities now are confined to producing vegetables for his own use, and to producing eggs on a semi-commercial scale. In 1922 he sold his home in Syracuse to Mrs. Hendrick Holden, mother-in-law of Robert G. Soule, and in exchange purchased her home at 1100 James Street. one of Syracuse's finest residences, where he now resides.

He is a member of the Century Club, and the Onondaga Country Club.

On November 12, 1884, he married Grace Gere, born December 29, 1862, daughter of William Henry Harrison Gere and Octavia Frances Cady Gere. She is a direct descendant of George Gere who came to New England in 1635, and of such pioneers as Thomas Stanton, Capt. George Denison, Thomas Wheeler, John Gallup, Dr. Thomas Lord, Nicholas Cady, William Chesebro, and others, all of whom came to New England in the early days of the colonies.

Scientific School, Class of 1911) and received a degree of Ph.B. in 1911. The following fall he entered the employ of Merrell-Soule Co., as a chemist. Working up through the production department, he was made treasurer of the company and a director in 1916, and now holds the position of general manager (1921).

In April, 1912, he married Dorothy Bigelow Smith, daughter of Wing Russell and Mary Abigail Bigelow Smith of Syracuse. She is a descendant of Nehemiah Smith, Samuel Boardman, John Biglo, Stephen Paine, etc., all of whom were early settlers in New England. They have two children, both

Letters home showing a tendency toward the Catholic faith caused her father to send for her to come home. After the birth of her children she became a semi-invalid and spent several years at a sanatorium in Geneva. She was a brilliant scholar, and devoted the greater part of her time to reading.

Her son, Oscar Soule Hanchett, is living in Syracuse.

"The 9th day of the 4th month called April, 1755 a memorandum of John Tibbetts mind and will is to make his wife Sarah Tibbit his hole and sole Excecraticks to his will he gives to his wife Sara Tibbits all his moveable estate with his negro gall named Felis and the child she is now big with all free and clear to her own disposal after his gust debts and legessies paid the legases he gave away that is to his son Henry Tibbits eight shillings starling to his son George Tibbit his gun, to his daughter Mary Hopkins two shillings starling to his daughter Avis Sole two shillings starling to his daughter Anne Bala two shillings starling to his daughter Alse Hill four shillings starling.

The above noncupitive will of the above said John Tibbits taken about

half an hour before his death pr. Ephraim Bull."

John Tibbetts married Feb. 20, 1726, SARAH SOULE, daughter of George Soule 2d, and went to North Carolina with the great Quaker movement about 1750. His daughter, Avis Soule, was therefore, first cousin to George Soule, her husband. After the death of John Tibbetts, Sarah, his widow, returned to Dartmouth and as record proves was living in a chamber of her nephew's house. See record. Married 2-20-1726.

Descendants of Tibbetts Soule.

Collins, New York.

HE following was written by Stephen W. Soule, a son of Tibbetts Soule. "Tibbetts Soule came to Collins, I think, in 1823 and located on lot 24, township 6, range 8, one mile east of Gowanda, amid a forest of as noble pines as could be found in western New

York, and died there in 1837, aged 79 years. His family consisted of five sons and three daughters. Jonathan, the eldest, died in 1849. Stephen Soule died in 1880 at the ripe old age of 81. Luther, the third son, settled at Pontiac, in the State of Michigan, in 1822, took up a large tract of land on which the city now stands; built mills, cleared up a farm, and soon after was taken sick with that fatal scourge of the new west, the fever, and died. Lydia Ann Palmerton of Collins Center, is the only one remaining of the family. Thomas B. Soule, the surveyor and teacher, settled on lot 23, township 6, range 8, and removed from there in 1838 to the town of Aurora, this county, and died there soon after. Charles E. Soule, now of Kansas, is his only son. Abram H. Soule settled in Hamburg, one and a half miles north of the village and raised a large family. Hon. Oscar H. Soule, his eldest son, now resides near the old homestead. Jonathan Soule, the eldest son, came to this town three or four years prior to his father's coming and settled on lot 60, township 6, and range 8, now known as the Peter Potter farm. Tibbitts Soule, the father, was an exemplary Christian and before that fatal division among Friends, was at the head of the society and truly did he merit the exalted position. Equal and exact justice seemed his ruling trait of character, and his counsel and advice was seldom gainsaid or laid aside. Jonathan Soule was an exception in the family. He began preaching young, first in his sleep, afterwards in public, and continued to preach until his death in 1849. Not a flowery speaker, but a plain, straightforward, honest man; was especially sought for in the trials of sickness whose talk by the sick bed and to mourners always seemed to heal the wounds of sorrow and cheer the drooping spirits. Such I believe to be an imperfect sketch of the prevailing character of Jonathan Soule.

Stephen W. Soule wrote some interesting incidents illustrating the conditions of society when the Quakers were prominent in the township where he lived during the pioneer days. As the family of Tibbetts Soule were devoted members of the Quaker church, it was nothing singular for their descendants to be found loyal to that sect. The lives of this people were modelled after the teaching of the sacred Oracle and of the most practical character. The following incident was a case in point:

Jonathan Soule was clearing his farm and had opened a section in which there were several acres of fallen trees, then called a "cut-down." Before he had time to burn off the heavy logs and clear the ground of the brush he was taken ill. Apprehending the situation, his neighbors advised him to make a visit to Hamburg as they believed it would do him good. Taking their prescription in good faith, he went and was absent for a whole week When

he returned he found his "fallow" burned and all of the charred logs rolled up; the ground well cleared, the wheat sowed and harrowed in, and the entire clearing well fenced. This was all done as a "neighborly kindness," the lending of a helping hand in time of need.

Genealogy and Biography. Dutchess County Stock.

Tibbetts Soule, the head of this branch of the Dutchess County, New York, family, was the son of Sarah Soule, a daughter of George and Avis (Tibbetts) Soule, residents of the "Oblong," near Quaker Hill, and was born at the home of his grandfather, 18th day, 12th month, 1762, on the first day of the week. Tradition among his descendants states that this young man never knew his father's name but that he was reputed to have been a native of Wales, an "Old Countryman." When but a lad he was indentured to his uncle, John Soule, during his minority and the written document has been preserved among his descendants. However, it seems that he became dissatisfied with his treatment and ran away before the expiration of service. He claimed that his uncle changed the dates of his birth that he might hold him in servitude and was otherwise harsh and imperious. He found a home among his kindred and being very ambitious and possessed of unwearied industry, he found employment and took care of himself. He married in Cambridge, Washington County, New York, December, 1787, REBECCA HOAG, daughter of Stephen and Anna (Hunt) Hoag, who were charter members of the Quaker Society at White Creek, and had moved from Dutchess County. Her grandfather. Jonathan Hoag, a son of John Hoag, was said to be the progenitor of all the Hoag families in the United States. Rebecca was a Quakeress and having been married "out of meeting" was disowned. Her case was brought before the meeting, May, 1788, one year after her marriage, and in 1790, two years later, she was reinstated in the society at White Creek; hence we suppose her children were "birthright members" of the Friends Society. Her husband was mentioned as a "Friend and pioneer" in the History of Saratoga County, New York. His name appears in the census returns for 1790 with a family consisting of one male and four females under sixteen years of age, as residents of Cambridgetown in Washington County.

In an old Bible owned by Ralph S. Soule, in Berwyn, Illinois, there was a full record of the family of Tibbetts Soule containing the births, marriages and deaths of his children and grandchildren; a full copy was made for this work. The family finally settled in Collins, Erie County, N. Y., where they passed the remainder of their lives. He died Feb. 21, 1836, aged 79 years, 7 months and 3 days. She died Dec. 11, 1844, aged 82 years, 4 months and 25 days. See statements by Stephen W. Soule in the preceding paragraph.

A profile portrait of this woman is owned by Mrs. Julia E. Knight Eddy of Aurora, N. Y., upon which was written by Mrs. Anna Soule Freeman: "This is my aunt Anna Soule, my mother's only sister, taken many years ago."

- 2. Sarah Soule (1), second daughter of Tibbetts and Rebecca (Hoag) Soule, was born in Cambridge, Washington County, N. Y., 6-12-1789, on the 7th day of the week; was married 25-2-1810, to ISAAC FREEMAN, and died 17-4-1852. She has been called "a woman of amiable temperament and beautiful as dressed in her Quaker garb." She was the mother of ten children named as follows:

A George Soule was the husband of a Temperance Robinson from Sidney, Maine, who had a removal certificate from the Friends Society 2d month, 20th day, 1812, and the records of the society in Easton, N. Y., show that Temperance Robinson was disowned in 1813 for marrying out of the society. It seems singular, but George Soule and wife Temperance conveyed land in Easton, N. Y., to Ebenezer Deuel in 1812, the same year of the marriage of Temperance Robinson to Jonathan Soule. A second examination of the registers of deeds in Dutchess County confirms the first copy made. There is no mistake in the writing. Jonathan Soule, a Quaker preacher of considerable prominence, died in Collins, N. Y., on the 13th of the 4th month, 1849, aged 57 years, 7 months and 1 day. There were six children whose names will presently appear.
- 4. Stephen W. Soule (1), second son of Tibbetts and Rebecca (Hoag) Soule, born in Cambridge, Washington County, N. Y., 20th of the 3d month, 1793, on the 7th day of the week. One account makes him a native of Dutchess County, and this may be correct, as his parents moved several times from that to Washington County. He was three times married; 1st, 14-10-1819,

to Lydia Handy, by whom three daughters and who died 11-9-1826; 2d, 15-2-1829, to Cynthia Peer who died 27-3-1833, without issue; 3d, 1-6-1833, to OLIVE DARBEE who died 4-2-1840, and by whom seven children. Stephen William Soule, as he was called, died in 1874, aged 81 years. He was a farmer but did not take kindly to the cultivation of the soil. He was a popular educator for 50 years or more. In the county history by Briggs, he is represented as the first settler on Lot 50 in Range 7, but he did not live there long, for he went back to the old home location and settled on Lot 24, T. 7, Range 8, near the present village of Gowanda, and always resided in the town of Collins, Erie County, N. Y. He was so prominent and popular as an educator that although he was a life-long Democrat and the Third District of Erie County a Republican stronghold, he was elected school commissioner and held the office for three years. He contributed a five-page article to "Briggs' History of the Original Town of Concord," in which he gave considerable information concerning the Soule family of which he was a member. death was in Otto, Cattaraugus County, N. Y. "Bill Soule," as he was called by his neighbors and friends, was a prominent Odd Fellow, being a member of Friendship Lodge, Collins Center, from its institution till his death. He had filled all the important positions, and was often complimented on his rendition of the Past Grand's charge; once by the officers of the Grand Lodge of the State of Minnesota where he was visiting. He served one term in the State Assembly with honor to himself and the pleasure of his constituents. He was a man of sterling character, wide and favorably known. There were eleven children, of whom presently.

Mrs. Julia Theodosia Soule Foster, daughter of Stephen and Olive (Darbee) Soule, says her father was brought up in the Quaker faith, but used to say he was only a "birth-right member Quaker." The greater part of his life was spent in Otto, N. Y. He was a man of medium build, with blue "Tibbetts" eyes and had white hair in middle life. The parents of Stephen Soule's third wife were Chester and Theodosia (Church) Darbee, originally from Vermont, but removed to Dayton, N. Y., where they lived until their deaths. Mrs. Foster says her father was married four times, but does not give the name of

his fourth wife.

- 5. Luther Soule (1), third son of Tibbetts and Rebecca (Hoag) Soule, was born in the Oblong, Dutchess County, N. Y., 2d day of the 1st month, 1796; was married 15th of the 1st month, 1817, to Polly Fish. New England Branches.

ANY years ago while building a railroad through the mountains of New Hampshire the workmen discovered in a layer of the stratified ledge that protruded from the hillside, a cavity from which a large block of stone had been removed. Curious persons assembled about the place and a geologist passing his vacation in the vicinity was called to come and explain this singular freak of nature. Diligent search was made in the valley below for a missing block that would correspond in size and angles to the vacated seat, but nothing resembling this was found. The walls of the cavity were smooth and regular and the strata of stone from which the block was removed was level and of equal thickness. The geologist, after taking a scientific measurement of the cavity and the making of a diagram showing the angles of its sides, advanced the theory that during some ancient period this block of stone had been removed by a glacier into which it was frozen and had been carried away into some distant locality where it might have been released by the melting of the ice. It is related that while wandering along the bank of the Kennebec River, more than a hundred miles distant on an airline, this same geologist discovered an isolated block of stone reposing upon the earth's surface, and having remembered the cavity seen among the mountains, made a careful survey of it. He found three indisputable proofs of the origin of this fugitive block of stone. It was of the exact size of the recess from which it had been removed; the sides were on precisely the same angle and the quality and color of the granite were the same. Photographs of the piece and of its former seat among the hills of the North were taken and placed on exhibition to prove their relationship as well as the means of transportation across the states.

I have appropriated this interesting incident as a suitable vehicle that may graphically illustrate the existence of certain peculiar conditions encountered by the genealogist. When his field has been carefully surveyed and every source where desired information might have been hoped for has been exhausted he finds himself in possession of certain negative evidence which is not supported, nor contradicted, by documentary corroborative proof and

such must be appropriated for what it is worth.

In many instances the searcher finds a vacancy, a break, in a pedigree and there is a missing member to be found and accounted for; he investigates with the hope of finding the straying one; he takes into consideration all the circumstances bearing upon the case; the prominent mental and physical peculiarities of the ancestral line; their habits and idiosyncracies; their supposed age as compared with the time of marriage between the parents and the ages of supposed brothers and sisters; the geographical locations; the family traditions; and then, like the geologist, sallies forth to find the history of some person bearing the name who will supply the required essential features and fit into the vacant niche of the family where he belongs. The examination of the displacement and break in the pedigree and as careful a measurement of

the person assumed to possess the requisite qualities for reinstatement in the ruptured lineage; and there are always certain environments and peculiarities which as negative evidence are indisputable and satisfying to all but the most ultra skeptic. Force of circumstances often as irresistible as the glacier that bore away from its created seat the granite block and left it upon a distant resting place sometimes carries away a son from the parental household and leads him to distant lands where he forms new associations and becomes isolated and weaned from kindred and early environments. Such persons voluntarily wandering away or led onward by promises of better fortune, are frequently fugitives and only here and there can a footprint be found in the "Sands of Time" by which they can be traced and their history made known. It has been the high privilege of the author of this work to discover such lost and wandering sons and, in some instances, to see them restored to the homes and embrace of their aged and longing parents.

It has been found impossible to prove by direct evidence who was the great-grandfather of Col. George Soule, the founder and president of the Soule Literary Institute in New Orleans, Louisiana, but there are several circumstances and conditions considered of great importance in establishing the connections with his paternal ancestry as descended from George Soule

who came over in the Mayflower in 1620.

For many years Colonel Soule had desired to establish such a connection and had employed an experienced genealogist to carry forward an intensive and extensive investigation for the purpose of finding, if it were possible, documentary evidence of this lineage. This gentleman, Prof. Schuyler de Luze of New Rochelle, N. Y., assembled many detached notes relating to the numerous Soule families in New England and New York, but failed to find the "missing link" with which to connect the separated sections of the genealogical chain. In the midst of this research Professor de Lutz died and the work was suddenly interrupted. Soon afterwards, however, Colonel Soule opened correspondence with the author of this work, and having placed the notes and correspondence of the former employee in his hands authorized him to institute a thoroughly scientific and exhaustive search for the purpose of discovering the early history of his branch of the Soule family. was therefore taken up with zeal, guided by an experience of many years along the same lines. As it has been intimated in the preliminary department of this work, the investigation was prosecuted for about four years, being financiered principally by Colonel Soule of New Orleans. At this time although a great mass of notes had been collected, nothing definite had been discovered that was proof of the descent from the Mayflower Pilgrim. Believing that others bearing the Soule name should bear their share of the expense of continuing the investigation, Professor Soule declined to have the sole financial responsibility and the research was discontinued; but was resumed five years ago and has been pursued with unabated zeal to the present time. The results, though not all that a conscientious genealogist might desire, have been of deep interest. The ancestors of George Soule of New Orleans seem not to have been the owners of lands but lived upon leased farms, therefore the public records, the registry of wills, deeds and dispendens, were found nearly barren of any entries of conveyances. In New York, at the period under investigation, there were no records made of births, marriages and deaths and thus such vital sources of information were wanting. Moreover, the early representatives of this branch of Soules, living true to form to perpetuate the bent of their Norse progenitors, were a nomadic people who did not become wedded to the soil.

When compiling a sort of caveat pedigree for George Soule and sons at the close of my earliest period of search. I stated my conclusions relative to his connections with the Mayflower Pilgrim. My present views remain unchanged with one exception. I was confident that he was descended from the family of George Soule and Lydia Howland his wife, of the Nine Partners in Dutchess County, N. Y., and the evidence seemed to point to their son George as the great-grandfather of the resident of New Orleans. From a documentary statement and date since discovered, I have found that this hypothesis was untimely and that the evidence leaned strongly toward a brother of the son George, namely Benjamin Soule, who settled in the same county. About the time in which these sons lived the hold upon the younger generations of the Quaker Church was becoming weak. The austere creed and severe discipline enforced against their young people by "disowning" them when they were married out of "Holy Orders," served to alienate the sons and daughters from the society, and taking advantage of the local situation, the "hard-shelled" Baptist ministers who were then, as now, noted tacticians in the spiritual field, established themselves upon the local heritage and planted their denominational banner there; and to sustain our assumption we can show the copy of a record of the marriages of ten persons named Soule who are known to have been descended from Quaker families in the vicinity. Among these were found the names of George Soule and Mary Bergh, grandparents of Colonel Soule of New Orleans. Some of the others were probably his sisters. We subjoin the record:

The foregoing records were from the Baptist Church (Stanford) at Bagnall, Dutchess County, N. Y. The earliest records of this body are dated at Great Nine Partners, Charlotte Precinct, N. Y., and show that the sympathies of the younger members of the Quaker families had been deflected from the church of their parents and were directed toward the Baptist people. The Soules at Nine Partners belonged to a branch of the family in which the name George has been perpetuated, and there was but one exception to its continuity in that line of the pedigree. George Soule, the Pilgrim, had a son George Soule who was the father of William Soule, the father of George Soule (blacksmith), whose son George Soule died when a young man, leaving a son Joseph

Soule who, with his descendants, were accounted for. In every branch of the family descended from George Soule and his wife Lydia Howland, the name

George has been conspicuous.

George Soule and his wife Mary Bergh were devoted members of the Baptist Church, as was his sister. The family of George Soule, "Blacksmith" of Nine Partners, were ardent Tories during the Revolution and some of them are known to have served with the local British forces in New York. Our first knowledge of the George Soule, who is assumed to have been the greatgrandfather of George Soule of New Orleans, was when he was drafted May 11, 1775 and after serving four months in the 9th company of the 5th Regiment of the Continental Troops of Connecticut under Capt. Nathaniel Beardsley of New Fairfield, and Col. David Waterbury of Stamford, Conn., he was discharged Sept. 16, 1775. This regiment was raised on the first call for troops by act of the Legislature in April-May, 1775. Soldiers mainly from Fairfield County marched to New York under General Worcester and then to the Northern Department. On account of sickness many of these men were allowed to return home. A detailed account of the experience of each company during the campaign is contained in a work entitled "The Revolution in Connecticut" to be seen in the Boston City Library.

The history of this George Soule after his brief service in the Colonial army is not known till he was married and removed, temporarily, across the line to Pennsylvania; then, after the close of the Revolution, with others of the same family, he removed to Nova Scotia. He appeared in Shelburn in that province in the autumn of 1783 with a family of three children and was granted 200 acres of land by the Provincial authorities. Following this family by public records and correspondence with his descendants still living, we learn that he removed with his family to a locality called Chizzticook, where some of his descendants have since resided as farmers. They hold the tradition that George Soule returned to New York and was supposed to have died there. His posterity in the British Provinces have nearly all died out and only some of the great-grandchildren remain to perpetuate the tradition concerning their progenitor. They claim that their family were Loyalists from New York.

Following our survey we return to New York and to Dutchess County, the homeland from which these branches of the Soule families removed. Here we find a George Soule living in Rhinebeck, near the residence of his parents, with a family, and from this locality there was a George Soule who married Mary Bush and lived for some time in Prattsville and in Windham, Greene County, N. Y., with several children baptized there, and was later settled at Rhinebeck where the names of some of his children were found. Among seven other George Soules this was the only one who has not been otherwise accounted for. The locality where he was found when a young man, his accompanying his uncle, Daniel Soules, Sr., and his three cousins, Daniel, Ir., David and Michael to Nova Scotia, after the war between England and the Colonies closed, and his being found with them in that province, seems strong presumptive evidence of their kinship. His son, George Soule, grandfather of George Soule of New Orleans, married Mary Bergh, daughter of Adam and Cata Bergh, and it seems a suggestive incident that these persons went to Nova Scotia with the Soule families. The geographical features, the church connections, the other family names and the spelling of their surnames all combine to prove the relationship between this George Soule and the family of George Soule the "Blacksmith" at Nine Partners, Dutchess County, N. Y. We have found no other whose age, movements and circumstances would fill his place and we have accounted for all others bearing the name of contemporary ages. The Bush family, sometimes spelled "Busche," were early settled in Dutchess County, N. Y., and the wife of this George Soule was evidently one of that house.

We shall herewith make record of the Soules of Rhinebeck so far as we have found them, believing them to have been of the same ilk.

George Soule served in the Fifth Continental Regiment of Connecticut. during the Revolution in 1776 and after his discharge disappeared. A George Soule appeared in Prattsville and Windham, Greene County, New York with his wife Mary Bush and three children in the year 1800. In the year 1783 a George Soule with a family of three children appears among the Loyalists who had recently removed from the State of New York and was granted 100 acres of land by the Crown. In the same year several other families of Soules from the New York colony landed in Nova Scotia whose parentage is well known, all descended from a branch of the race in which for several generations, the name George was conspicuous. That whole family, then living in Dutchess County, N. Y., were loyal to King George, and their oaths of allegiance are on record. After an almost exhaustless search covering a period of seven years in which every other George Soule discovered has been accounted for, it is the firm conviction of the compiler of this genealogy that this was the ancestor of George Soule of New Orleans, whose grandfather, George Soule, and his family has been satisfactorily traced and recorded. He was married by a Baptist minister in a Baptist church and was a life-long and devoted member of that body. Some of his children were also communicants of the same church. The Quakers settled in Dutchess County, N. Y., declined because of their rigid discipline in disowning their children when they were married outside of the "Holy Orders" of their own societies.

Returning to the Soules who as Loyalists removed to the British Provinces, it may be proper to state that they universally spelled their names "Soules" and their descendants have largely perpetuated this form of spelling till the present day. Families descended from the other Dutchess County branches have almost all spelled their name "Soules." We have failed because of defective records to trace all of the descendants of the George Soule and wife who settled in Shelburn, Nova Scotia. Indeed it seems almost certain that the parents returned to New York after the peace and the excitement following the war had subsided; but several families descended from him settled per-

BUSH FAMILY.—Thomas Bush, son of Frederick Bush, lived in the Old Bush homestead on Quaker Hill at Oblong at Nine Partners, Dutchess County, N. Y., toward the close of the Revolution. His wife was of enormous size, weighing 360 pounds. These had five sons, viz: Thomas, John, Stephen. Isaac and Cornelius. The descendants of this family were well distributed throughout the county and the name is common throughout the State of New York, and in the last Book of American Ancestry I find a Mary Bush, daughter of Ebenezer Bush, born Aug. 2, 1743. Families of the name resided in Yates County, N. Y., and in Westchester County, N. Y.

manently in the Province and their families still reside there. The traditions held by them support the hypothesis advanced in the foregoing statements. The common name George has been retained in these families as an evident memorial of their forefathers.

Not another George Soule in all the fields of investigation whose age admitted of assuming that he might have been the head of this branch of the family has been found. The history and destination of every other George Soule in the whole race of American Soules has been accounted for and this representative of the name stands out alone as the man who will "fill the bill." When positive and direct evidence is wanting in genealogical research we have no other alternative but negative evidence and tradition; and these must be appropriated for what they are worth, however unsatisfactory. Until some more astute searcher who has had access to documents and records that have escaped our notice shall come forward and prove another person to have stood at the head of this branch of the Soule family, we shall cultivate the spirit of reconciliation and "rest upon our laurels."

Singular Circumstances.

It has often been demonstrated that truth was stranger than fiction and here we have a case in point. A John Soule had procured a tract of Government land in Redford, Wayne County, Mich., and after the death of his mother in Barrington, Yates County, N. Y., went there and took his venerable father to his new home and provided for him during the remainder of his long life and this old gentleman was named George Soule. Another man bearing the Soule name, John W. Soule, born in Hebron, N. Y., procured a tract of land in the same town of Redford, Wayne County, Mich., and carried his venerable father to his Western home where he was made comfortable the remainder of his days-and that man was named George Soule. Grandchildren of the two families assume to say that there had been no concerted transaction between the two John Soules when purchasing their lands nor were the two branches aware of each other's existence or relationship for a long time after they had settled in their new western homes. Here were these families as towns-people, and, possibly, as neighbors, unknown to each other till their mail was crossed; and after their acquaintance had been formed they could not assume any kindred connections. Here psychology must explain the mysterious underlying causes that reveal such singular results. Such events disclose by visible transactions what might be termed "the vicissitudes of families," while the material effects supplied the evidence and sequence of a definite and potent cause none the less actual because unknown or unexplained. After an introduction and acquaintance between the two families a mutual interest became manifest and a reciprocal friendship was stimulated between them, and still they were ignorant of the remote source from which they sprang. Not until after many years and when many of each household had closed life's pilgrimage, and when the "mousing" genealogist's hot scent on the trail had found these two branches from the same old tree, were they informed of their family affinity. The grandfathers of the two George Soules carried to Michigan were two other George Soules, first cousins, who were born in Dartmouth "next-door neighbors" and had removed to Nine Partners and

Y., born Oct. 15, 1765 (one record has it 1755, another 1763); married William Banker in Sept., 1780; he was born Feb. 9, 1756 and baptized in the Dutch Church at the Flats, near Rhinebeck, N. Y., March 7, 1756. He was a soldier of the Revolution, having enlisted at Rhinebeck, May 12, 1777, as private in the Fourth Regiment of the New York Line under Col. Henry Livingstone and served three years, being discharged May 12, 1780. After the war they lived for some time at Nine Partners, Dutchess County, N. Y., but about 1785, moved to West Peru, Clinton County, N. Y., where they continued the remainder of their lives. They had twelve children, as follows:

His wife died and he went to Cardigan, Ohio, where he married 2d, Aug. 24, 1836, Deborah Parker. He died at Mt. Gilead, O., in April, 1860. Twelve children.

- XI. HULDAH BANKER, born June 12, 1805, in Peru, Clinton County, N. Y.; married June 12, 1823, WILLIAM J. PEASLEE, son of Abraham and Maria Phoebe Jenkins. He was a lawyer and judge in Indiana, where he died July 12, 1868. His wife died Aug. 17, 1891 or Jan. 18, 1891. Nine children.

Benjamin Soule (1), second son of George Soule, "Blacksmith," and Lydia Howland, born in Dartmouth, Mass., March 21, 1726, was carried by his parents and the other members of the family to the Nine Partners, Dutchess County, N. Y., about 1740 where he grew to manhood. His name appears in the county records of land transactions several times. He was styled of the North-East Precinct where he signed the Association Test. Benjamin Soule of Crumb Elbow, yeoman, sold to Bastian Brown, Nov. 21, 1751 for £63, land in the Lower Nine Partners. He married Abigail Howland (another says, Rachel Allen), and evidently had a large family. Long search in the New York archives failed to find more than an occasional mention of his name, and the following record from an old Bible, carried from Dutchess County, N. Y., to Michigan, is supposed to contain the births of his children. There

were so many Benjamin Soules in Dartmouth, Mass., several of whom removed to New York, that the searcher finds it difficult, in the absence of authentic records, to distinguish between them.

George Soule (4), a son of Benjamin (1) and Abigail (Howland) Soule, was a native of Connecticut and served for a short time in the Continental Army there during the Revolution. He married Mary Bush and was for a time a resident of Prattsville and Windham, Greene County, N. Y., where some of his children were baptized. He is next found temporarily in Pennsylvania from whence, along with his uncle and cousins, he removed to Shelburn, Nova Scotia, where the record assigns to him three children. This was in the autumn of 1783 when he must have been 33 years of age. These dates with many others in this branch of the family proved to have been correct by extant documents. He evidently returned from the British possessions after the antagonism between the Tories and Colonists had subsided and was found associated with his kindred in New York, where he probably died. See "Soules of Hillsdale, N. Y." and "Soules of Greene County, N. Y." It has not been ascertained with certainty how many children he had.

1. George Soule (5), probably the eldest son of George (4) and Mary (Bush) Soule, born in Dutchess County, N. Y., in 1770; married Mary Bergh, daughter of Adam and Cata Bergh of Dutch extraction, in Stanford, Dutchess County, N. Y., Oct. 26, 1796, and the record of this transaction was found in the old Baptist Church there among the marriages of nine women named Soule who were his kindred and probably, some of them at least, his sisters. He was early settled in Windham, Greene County, N. Y., where his eldest children were born as proven by the family record found in his Bible. His name appears in a tax-list in Windham in 1801 and his son John was born there in 1807 as recorded in his Bible late in possession of his son in Stockbridge, Mich. I have not found that he was the owner of any land in Barrington, Yates County, N. Y., to which town, with some of the Hogebooms, his kindred connected by marriage, he had removed. Through correspondence with an intelligent old lady whose family succeeded the Soules on the farm I derived the

following information: "The name of the neighborhood where the Soule family lived was locally known as 'Jocky Street,' but there was nothing peculiar about the place to suggest the title. The farm was somewhat isolated, being approached by a lane. This was estimated to be one and a half miles from Keuka, formerly called Crooked Lake, and the land, of excellent quality, descended by a steep grade between the farm and the shore of this body of water. There was an old house, part of logs and partly framed, on the farm when it was vacated by the Soule family, and their successors erected a timber barn on the place. A family named Walcott, of considerate culture and prominence, lived neighbors to the Soules, between their farm and the lake. The nearest village, a few miles to the northwest, was called Warsaw. Free Communion Baptist Church, of which George Soule and his daughter Caroline, were members, was about three miles south of the village and one and a half miles southeast of the Soule homestead. The burying ground, where the wife of George Soule was probably interred, was not adjacent to the old church, which was long ago dismantled, but on a farm some distance from it, and from the public road. Mrs. Hewitt, an old resident, is quite sure there are no inscribed monuments to mark the graves of members of the Soule family. George Soule lived on this homestead several years after the death of his wife, his housekeeper being his oldest daughter, Mrs. Kate Gelong, whose husband was found dead in the forest. A grandson in California, Mr. Andrew Soule, remembered that he went to live with his grandfather and Aunt Kate, and of being present at the funeral service.

John Soule, the eldest son of George Soule, having purchased a tract of Government land in Stockbridge, Ingham County, Michigan, and established a home there, came back to Barrington and carried the old gentleman back with him, and he was tenderly provided for the remainder of his days. This was in 1834. While living in Barrington, N. Y., he was well known and highly respected and in a familiar way called "Uncle George." After his removal to Michigan he devoted much of his time in reading his great Bible, which he considered an inestimable treasure. He was well beloved and tenderly cared for; was a great favorite with his grandchildren and sported with them in great glee. He had united with the Free Communion Baptist Church of Barrington when a young man and was ever afterward a devoted Christian. One of the grandchildren has written, she having been brought up at his knee. "If ever there was a saint, my dear old grandfather was one, and in his heart there was no guile." When he lived in my father's home he did not dwell in conversation upon reminiscent events as many old persons do, and no member of the family can remember of having heard him mention the name of his wife; singular as it may appear, among seven grandchildren, some of whom lived in the house with him for nineteen years, not one of them could tell the name of their grandmother. Although diligent and continuous search has been made in Barrington where he so long resided and some of the old residents remember her funeral services, not one was certain of her place of burial. No inscribed monument marks her place of rest so far from that of her companion and there are none to make a pilgrimage to the isolated spot. Mary Bergh was the mother of eight children whose names, and what we have learned about them, will be recorded in the following pages. George Soule died at the home of

his son, John Soule, in Stockbridge, Michigan, in 1862, aged 92 years and was interred in the family lot of the local cemetery.

- 2. Adam Soule (1), a son of George (4) and Mary (Bush) Soule, of Windham, N. Y., was baptized in the Dutch church in Prattsville, N. Y., Jan. 3, 1770, and is said to have settled as a farmer in Barrington; one who remembered his place of residence has informed the author: "When we were passing on the road my parents would say, 'That is where Adam Soule lives.'" After long and unremitting search and some advertising the compiler has failed to learn more concerning this man's history. Several Adam Soules have been traced, but none were identical. He may have married and had a family, he probably did, but nothing has been learned of their names or lives. The name Adam was continued in his brother's family.
- 3. Kate Soule (1), supposed to have been a daughter of George (4) and Mary (Bush) Soule, was baptized in the Dutch Church of Prattsville, Greene County, N. Y., but the date was not given. Her name appeared with those of her parents, but nothing more was found. The name "Cata" and "Kate," as well as that of "Catherine" were adopted from the Bergh family and have been continued in the Soule descendants.
- Ebenezer Soule (1), a son of George (4) and Mary (Bush) Soule, was born at Windham, Greene County, N. Y., Nov. 14, 1781; married Anna Hogeboom, a sister of Andrew Hogeboom whose daughter Cornelia was the wife of Ebenezer Soule, son of George and Mary Bergh Soule. Tradition makes the Hogebooms remove from Columbia County to Greene County, N. Y., and thence to Yates County; and the extant records sustain the statement. presents another feature of possible family connection, as Judge Ebenezer Soule was long a resident of Hillsdale, in Columbia County. The public records supply many names of the Hogeboom families there. This Ebenezer Soule removed from Barrington to Bradford, in Steuben County, N. Y., where, as a farmer, he continued the remainder of his long life. He had the reputation of being esteemed for an exemplary character, for strict honesty and truthfulness. Among his nephews he was known as "Uncle Eb," while living in Barrington, and familiarly known in Bradford as "Uncle Eben Soule." He died April 23, 1864, aged 81 years, 6 months and 9 days, intestate. petition for administration contains the names of Anna the widow, three sons, Daniel H., John, and Stephen Soules, and a grandchild, William Judson Van Amburg, son of a deceased daughter, Iulia Soule Van Amburg. Anna (Hogeboom) Soule died March 17, 1871, aged 78 years and 14 days. family was buried at South Bradford and the above dates were copied from inscribed markers erected at their graves at my request by Mr. Ira M. Drake in June, 1912. (See description of house, etc.) An old Bible, said to have contained a full record of the births, deaths and marriages, has been lost.

CHILDREN OF GEORGE AND MARY BERGH SOULE.

1. Caty Soule (2), daughter of George (5) and Mary (Bergh) Soule, born in Windham, Greene County, N. Y., July 28, 1799; married Mat. Delong, who was afterward found dead in the woods. Stephen H. Soule, of Little Shasta, Cal., remembers Aunt Kate's funeral. "She had been keeping house

for grandfather and I was living with them." She left children who followed the Soules to Michigan. A niece has said, "Aunt Katie had a hard time." Her name in her father's Bible found in Michigan was spelled "Caty" and follows a form used in the Bergh family of Dutchess County, N. Y.

- 2. Adam Soule (2), son of George (5) and Mary (Bergh) Soule, born in Windham, Greene County, N. Y., January 30, 1801, was married in Barrington, Yates County, N. Y., and removed to Michigan, along with his kindred. Had three children, Elisha, Ann and John. Adam lived to old age. His portrait is in possession of his niece, Mrs. Lester of Los Angeles, California.
- Ebenezer G. Soule (2), second son of George (5) and Mary (Bergh) Soule, born January 14, 1805, in Windham, Greene County, N. Y. A bit of romance is attached to the name of this member of the Soule family. When a lad he was visiting the Hogeboom family, being in some way connected by kindred ties, and became enamored of Cornelia, a daughter aged about twelve, and when he was about to return, probably to Windham, he said he was coming back for this rosy-cheeked, black-eyed girl when she was grown to maturity; he came when she was sixteen and they were married. They settled on land in Barrington, Yates County, N. Y., where three sons were born, of whom presently. He died June 17, 1837, and his widow, Cornelia E. Soule, was appointed administratrix, March 5, 1838. She married, secondly, WILLIAM H. BABCOCK, removed to De Kalb County, Illinois, and became the mother of several children. She was baptized Nov. 8, 1814, in the Dutch Church at Prattsville, Greene County, N. Y., and she was probably born a few weeks only before the record of her baptism called her "Cornelia Lisibeth." She died Sept. 11, 1893. Her second husband, William H. Babcock, died Sept. 12, 1884: both were buried in Hampshire, Kane County, Ill. Ebenezer G. Soule was the father of Col. George Soule of New Orleans.
- 4. John Soule (1), third son of George (5) and Mary (Bergh) Soule, born in Windham, Greene County, N. Y., November 15, 1807; married MARY ANN PATTERSON, daughter of John and Eleanor (Reynalds) Patterson, of Wayne, Steuben County, where one child was born. He went to Stockbridge, Ingham County, Mich., where he purchased a large tract of government land, from which he hewed down the forest and cleared a fine farm, where he erected capacious and comfortable buildings, beautifully situated and attractive as a homestead. John Soule did not resemble his father for he was of a very fair complexion. He had learned the blacksmith's trade when a young man, but did not follow it after his settlement in Michigan. He returned to Barrington after his mother's death in 1835, and carried his father to his western home, where he provided for him the remainder of his days. Mr. Soule died in 1881; his wife, born Feb. 11, 1815, died in 1889. Six children, as follows:
 - I. MARY JANE SOULE, born in Barrington, Yates County, N. Y., October 24, 1835, married Horatio A. Barker, a Baptist minister, by whom she had two daughters, now living: Mrs. Flotie Sheriff, of Chesaning, Mich. and Mrs. Ida Lansing of Owasso, Mich. Mrs. Barker was one year old when she was carried to Stockbridge, Mich. She died in 1911.

II. James Bignal Soule, born in Stockbridge, Ingham County, Mich., April 28, 1837; married 1st, Mary Reaves, by whom three children. Her parents' names were James and Eliza Reaves. She died and he married 2d, Mary E. Moore, born Sept. 18, 1854, daughter of John and Rebecca Moore of Reed City, Mich., Sept. 10, 1876. He died Nov. 30, 1907, in Reed City. He had been a farmer and railroad man. His widow is now living in Randsburg, Cal., with her children. Issue:

- JOHN B. SOULE, born March 7, 1887; Randsburg, California; unmarried.
- (6) Neil Soule, born April 13, 1890; Randsburg, Cal.; unmarried.
- (7) Roy Soule, born Dec. 16, 1891; Randsburg, Cal.; unmarried.
- III. GEORGE WILLIAM SOULE, born in Stockbridge, Mich., April 23, 1837; married JULIA ROBBINS and had one child, now Mrs. Ina Dutchess of Stockbridge, Mich. He died in 1806. Wife was of Mattawan, Mich. She died about 1906.
- IV. ARTHUR LEE SOULE, born in Stockbridge, Mich., March 12, 1843; married Louisa Miller in 1882. He has sold the old Soule homestead but still resides in the town of Stockbridge in summer, going to St. Cloud, Fla., in winter, being in poor health. No children.

v. WILLIAM HENRY SOULE, born in Stockbridge, Mich., Jan. 24, 1849; died in 1850.

- VI. LENTHA ELEANOR SOULE, born in Stockbridge, Mich., Jan. 24, 1850; married Andrew Lester and resides in Los Angeles, Cal. No children.
- 5. George Daniel Soule (3), fourth son of George (5) and Mary (Bergh) Soule, born in Windham, Greene County, N. Y., July 25, 1810; married first, SARAH JAYNES, sister to Oren and Austin Jaynes, the brothers who married his sisters Polly and Fanny Soule. By his first wife he had three children of whom presently, and as the mother died when they were young, they were brought up in the home of Austin Jaynes. He married, 2d, MISS JANE HUFTATING and settled at South Bradford, N. Y., where he raised a family of four children, and where he died. His widow is supposed to be living. He was generally known as Daniel Soule during his later years. Issue as follows:

I. JAMES SOULE, born in Barrington, N. Y., married in July, 1867,

MISS HULDAH JAYNES, daughter of Smith Jaynes, by whom he had two children: Elizabeth, died at Hammondsport, N. Y., in childhood, and Clark, a son, now living at Geneva, N. Y. His wife died five years ago in Utica, N. Y., and was buried at South Urbana, N. Y. Mr. Soule is a member of the Methodist Church at Ham-

mondsport, N. Y. Now very feeble.

II. Henry Soule was left motherless when a child and brought up in the home of his aunt, Fanny (Soule) Jaynes. He was a shoemaker by trade. Was in the Union Army during the Civil War. He married on the Hudson, Isabella ———, but had no children. He was in poor health and went to Alexandria, Va., with the hope of improvement, and a physician's certificate before me shows that he had consumption. He was a member, with his wife, of the Purity Lodge, I. O. G. T., of Frederick, Md. Mrs. Soule was commended as an "honest, hard-working woman entitled to the confidence of the public." He continued to fail and came back to Hammondsport, N. Y., to die, but his wife pre-deceased him about one year. They were members of the Episcopalian Church.

III. GEORGE SOULE, died in childhood.

- 6. Polly Soule (1), daughter of George (5) and Mary (Bergh) Soule, born in Barrington, Yates County, N. Y., Sept. 25, 1813; married Owen Jaynes and had two sons, of whom presently. She and husband were buried at Savona, N. Y.
 - NATHAN JAYNES, living at Penn Yan, N. Y., age 68; four children, two sons and two daughters.
 - II. GEORGE JAYNES, living at Campbell, N. Y.; four children, two sons and two daughters.

She died Aug. 13, 1872, aged 52 years, 3 months, 6 days. Her husband died May 19, 1880, aged 64 years, 3 months, 22 days. Buried at Sonora, N. Y.



CHILDREN OF EBENEZER G. AND CORNELIA E. SOULE.

1. Andrew Soule (1), eldest son of Ebenezer (2) and Cornelia (Hogeboom) Soule, born in Barrington, Yates County, N. Y., Nov. 15, 1832; married April 14, 1861, LOVINA ANN BARNARD, who was born Aug. 22, 1842, in Kingston, Canada. Being left fatherless when a lad he was taken by his mother and her second husband to De Kalb, Ill., where he was brought up and spent his young manhood. After his marriage he turned his eyes and thoughts toward the gold fields and rich agricultural lands of the Pacific coast and on April 6, 1854, with several other families and young single men he started to cross the Great Plains with ox-teams and a drove of cows. During this long and tedious journey, which was attended by many adventures of hardship and danger, he kept a journal which has been published in a small booklet from which we would fain quote copiously did our space permit. There were exposures, hardships and illness among this company but they all survived the ordeal and arrived at their destination in vigor and good spirits. Suffice to state that Andrew Soule established a home, now called a ranch, at Little Shasta, California, where he was afterward engaged in mining and farming. The Soule homestead, large and commanding, is situated in the midst of a long grove of the indiginous forest trees and ornamental grounds and gardens of which the engraving herewith published presents a fair representation. Well adapted for the experiences of pioneer life, and inspired with the spirit of adventure and hope, Andrew Soule made an attack upon the forces of nature and the conquest was victorious. He was reasonably successful in his enterprises and secured for himself and family all of the comforts of life. For many years he was the honored deacon in the Congregational Church and superintendent and teacher in the Sabbath school. A man of great kindness of heart, he was benevolent and ready to encourage and assist in every good work. Eight children, named as follows:

- I. LOVINA ESTER SOULE, born July 19, 1862, in Little Shasta, Cal.; married D. E. ERKHART of Hornbrook, Cal., and has one son, Cecil Erkhart, of Berkeley, Cal. Hardware dealer.

Biographical Sketch of Prof. George Soule.

The following biographical sketch was compiled from a newspaper article published more than ten years ago and has been revised and supplemented to bring its contents down to date.

Prof. George Soule, LL.D., was the second son of Ebenezer and Cornelia Elizabeth (Hogeboom) Soule, born in Barrington, Yates County, N. Y., March 14, 1834, and was descended from George Soule the Pilgrim who came from England in the Mayflower to Plymouth, New England, in 1620. He married MISS MARY JANE REYNALDS and has had nine children whose names will presently appear. His father having died in 1838, when he was but seven years of age, his mother and other relatives removed to the West and settled about fifty miles northwest of Chicago.

In the year 1853 George Soule graduated at the Academy of Sycamore, Ill., and he, afterward, with a view of acquiring a broader knowledge of the sciences pursued the studies at McDowell's Medical College, at St. Louis, Mo., at the St. Louis Law School and Jones Business College in the same city, from which he graduated in 1856. In the same year George Soule moved to New Orleans and seeing the need of good commercial schools, he founded in the fall the Soule Commercial College and Literary Institute which became a chartered establishment that has had the confidence and support of the most refined and





discerning people in the State and of which Mr. Soule was the president. This institution has an existence of about 69 years and during that time has occupied a prominent position among the educational circles and, constantly expanding, has gained an enviable reputation; within its walls Professor Soule has taught many students who have since filled important positions in mercantile service throughout the Southern States.

The College was kept open during the early years of the Civil War, but when the urgent call for soldiers came it was soon deserted by its members, many of whom fought side by side with their teacher. At this stage of affairs Professor Soule transferred the charge of his educational work to his assistants and in 1862 entered the military service of the Confederate States as captain of Company A, Crescent Regiment of New Orleans, and served through the war with credit. At the battle of Shiloh he was captured and passed five months as a prisoner of war on Johnson's Island. He was twice promoted while in the army, first to the rank of Major and then to Lieutenant-Colonel. His regiment was sent to the trans-Mississippi department, and at Shreveport Colonel Soule was made chief of the labor department under Gen. E. Kirby Smith. Stationed at that place when the war closed, his command was the last to surrender in that department and, therefore, was the last body of Confederate soldiers to lay down their arms.

Upon his return to New Orleans Colonel Soule resumed his educational labors and since that time his college has had an uninterrupted career of success.

This institution, situated at the corner of St. Charles and Lafayette streets, opposite Lafavette Square, is a high-grade business school well housed in a splendid building which has been enlarged to accommodate the constantly increasing number of students who have enrolled their names there and placed themselves under the instruction of its able teachers. The present building is stately and attractive and has a capacity sufficient to accommodate nearly two thousand students. In the year 1913 this institution had prepared for the practical business of life nearly 20,000 students and was equipped with an able staff of instructors, its head being George Soule, LL.D., who for more than sixty years has been known as a teacher and author. He has been distinguished as a Practical and Consulting Accountant, Commercial Lawyer and Lecturer on Commercial and Scientific topics, and his standing in the profession is indicated by the fact that he is a Fellow of the Institute of Accounts of New York, member of the Associated Accountants of New Orleans, La., member of the National Association of Education of America and a member of several other associations and societies. The original edifice erected for the great Commercial School was designed by the architect Robert S. Soule, a son of Professor Soule, and with its rebuilding and enlargement stands as one of the most beautiful and imposing edifices in the South. In short, Soule College is a most worthy institution and its founder a versatile, enthusiastic, and progressive educator. who as a student for a long term of years has enriched his mind by diligent study and extensive foreign travel.

As an author of practical text-books, Dr. Soule has achieved a pronounced success. His chief publications are: Soule's Philosophic Practical Mathematics, 1014 pages; Soule's New Science and Practice of Accounts, 782 pages; Soule's Introductory Philosophic Arithmetic, 578 pages; Soule's Contraction

in Numbers; Soule's Philosophic Drill Problems; Soule's Manual on Auditing. and Soule's Partnership and Financial Settlements. These books are of the highest grade and indicate the exercise of profound scholarship and long training.

As a lecturer and public speaker Doctor Soule is known to a wide circle and is a general favorite. Every winter he has delivered free public lectures upon such subjects as Hygiene, Sociology and other topics and these instructive discourses are looked forward to with great interest; his familiar talks having been replete with rich and racy incident as well as illustrations of the themes upon which he treats, and not as the usual cold and formal lectures of the school-room.

Though Professor Soule has often declined political preferment and honors. he has accepted service and won in the realm of societies an enviable name as a benevolent and humane man. As the first grand dictator of the Knights of Honor in Louisiana, he organized and placed that order on the highway to success.

He has been a working member of the institution of Free Masonry for a long term of years. He has received all of the degrees of the York and Scotch Rites, including the highly honorary thirty-third degree, and is an officer in the Grand Consistory. He is past grand commander of Knights Templar in Louisiana, and a member of the Grand Encampment of Knights Templar of the United States. He has long been a member of several other societies, both benevolent and educational.

Personally, Doctor Soule is well known and very popular with the people of New Orleans. His tall and well-proportioned figure and his shapely, intellectual face, dark from exposure and appearing more so from the piercing grey eyes and long, black hair, since bleached by the winters of age, have made him a prominent and distinguished feature of the local thoroughfares.


As a man of sterling integrity he has always ranked high, and as an earnest, conscientious, progressive educator he has occupied a leading place and has achieved honor in his own locality as well as throughout the entire country.

The genial urbanity and native politeness of his manners engage and captivate the good-will and confidence of his patrons and secure their cordial and continual support, while his pleasing address and gentle suavity draw the hearts and affections of his students magnetically toward him, securing their closest attention, easy control and ardent interest in their studies.

The numerous graduates who have gone forth from this Institute and the valuable companionship of its teacher, never forget the impress of his instruction or the versatility of his genius; but years afterwards, and from distant lands, send him their warmest greetings and congratulations; while his assistants and teachers repose implicit reliance on his superior judgment and business acumen, and highly appreciate the untiring energy, unflagging zeal, and ceaseless devotion he has always manifested for the promotion of educational improvements, and progress of social reforms.



Professor Soule has long been assisted in his educational work by three of his sons, Albert Lee, Edward Everett, and Frank, all graduates of the Soule College, of Cornell University and the Tulane Law School. These able men have brought to the aid of the institution ripe scholarship, progressive spirit, high ambition and the laudable determination upon which the hopes and success of mankind so largely depend.

The annual lectures delivered by Professor Soule to his students have been models of moral instruction and business preparation for the young people graduating from the College; as well as literary construction. These lectures have been continued until this great teacher reached his 90th year. He still survives and retains his broad interests in the various departments of education and moral standards. In all of our acquaintance with American educators and moral teachers we do not recall one whose life has been more useful; who has exerted such a profound and beneficial influence over so many young men and women as Doctor George Soule; and it must be a great satisfaction during these ripened years for him to take a survey of the decades when he has been instrumental in starting so many of the youth of our land on the highway to moral and mercantile success. May he still abide with his pleasant family and many friends as a benefactor and example of noble living.

ACOB SOULE (1), son of William (1) and Jemima (Baker) Soule, and grandson of Nathaniel and Jane Potter Soule, born in Tiverton, R. I. (birth recorded there but probably born in Westport or Dartmouth, Mass.), married Oct. 15, 1763, to Meribah Lewis of

Barnstable, Mass. He was for many years a seaman, sailed to the far North engaged in the whale fishery and endured many hardships, from the rigors of the climate and the strenuous life. He served in the Navy during the Revolution, but later in life he followed the tide of emigration that was then flowing from New England westward and settled with his family and brothers in Blenheim, Schoharie County, N. Y., now South Gilboa, N. Y., where he spent the remainder of his days. His removal was about 1798-1800. He made a will Ian, 31, 1807, which was probated June 5, 1822, soon after his death. He gave wife. Meribah Soule, one-third of the estate, one cow to be kept on the place, his wearing apparel and household furniture, and as long as his daughter Phebe remained single she was to have a home on the farm and be provided for by her mother. He also mentions his brother, Job Soule, the miller of Tiverton, R. I. It is said that he predicted his death many weeks before the event and passed away the very day and hour as stated, in the old "Gate House." His wife survived him about seven years; they were buried in the Lewis Soule Burial Ground. There were eleven children, Silas, Jacob, Lewis, Betsey, Rebecca, Annie, Sally, Meribah, Mercy, Phebe, Abby.

The site of the old Gate House may still be seen at the roadside where a

heap of stones mark the spot.

Legacies in the Will of Jacob Soule.

He gave his wife Meribah one-third of his estate, one cow to be kept on the place, his wearing apparel and household goods; and as long as his daughter Phebe Sowle shall remain single she is to have a home on the place and be kept by her mother.

1. Silas Soule (1), son of Jacob (1) and Meribah (Lewis) Soule, born in Tiverton, or Little Compton, R. I., Dec. 8, 1769; married Phebe Watson, daughter of Levi Watson, a soldier of the Revolution; died at the home of his daughter; buried in an old grave-yard on Jones Hill, near the Soule farms. His wife was born July 14, 1775. He was for 14 years a seaman, sailing from New England ports as a whaleman and in the merchant service. His vessel was named "The Three Brothers." He died Feb. 7, 1854, aged 84 years and 2 months. His wife died March 30, 1852, aged 76 years, 8 months and 14 days. These dates copied from their headstones in the old Lewis Soule grave-yard in South Gilboa, N. Y.

When Silas Soule and his brothers settled in the township on "Blenheim Ridge" the country was a vast wilderness and sparsely populated. He built a log house where the house of his son Erastus Soule subsequently stood, and the family slept in the loft which they reached by a ladder; this they drew up after them to protect themselves from bears, wolves and panthers that invaded the premises below and helped themselves to all eatables. A pine grove now covers the ground where he raised his first crop of wheat. In the early days he pounded his grain and bagged it on horseback through the forest by spotted trees, to the place now called Bloomville, in Delaware County, taking three days for the journey and the time for grinding the grain, constantly in danger from Indians or wild animals. His old log-house was succeeded by a good-sized dwelling which stood the storms during the remainder of his life. Children as follows:

Obituary of Erastus A. Soule.

The announcement of the death of Erastus A. Soule Oct. 20th was sadly received by the community at large, which severed the ties with his family and friends, with deepest grief. He was a life-long resident of South Gilboa, born and reared on the place where he died. The farm was cleared from the wilderness by his father and has been the home of Erastus A. Soule for 84 years, the ripe old age at which he died. He was married to Mary Burnes over 50 years ago. They passed their Golden Wedding anniversary, built a new house to beautify the place he so dearly loved, and dwelt in peace and plenty. Away back in the sixties he was a prominent butter-buyer, collecting for one firm over thirty years without a dispute of even a penny in dealing between them. He also bought for the Mayor of Fall River, Mass., for many years. His life among the community in which he lived was known and acknowledged by all as one of the utmost integrity and honesty, and no one can point to an act of

unkindness or dishonor in his long life among his fellow-men. His heart and home were ever open to his friends; the "latch-string" was always out and no one entered his portals who did not find a hearty welcome. The home is now darkened for the first time; the circle is broken and the wife and four daughters and six grandchildren remain to mourn his death. He was visited by the pastor of the Gilboa church and was assured by Mr. Soule that "he was ready" when the Master called.

2. Jacob Soule (2), son of Jacob (1) and Meribah (Lewis) Soule, was born in Tiverton, R. I. (possibly in Dartmouth or Westport, Mass.), on "Independence Day," July 4, 1776. Some mistake here, for the records of the family in the old Bible make the birth Sept. 4, 1785. He married 1st, May 24, 1805. MARIA SHOEMAKER, born March 18, 1786. She died and he married 2d, Sept. 4, 1844, AGNES MARIA FANNING, widow of Jacob Fanning, née Albert, who was born June 26, 1823. He died Feb. 28, 1864. His name on the census records of 1810, places him in Windham, Greene County, N. Y., a town formerly in Ulster County, and from which Prattsville was taken in 1833. He sold land in Prattsville in 1846, and gave mortgage on land in 1836. Owned a farm in Dutchess County and a silver mine in New Canada. His wife bought the house she had lived in from childhood, in 1863. He died Feb. 28, 1864, aged 78 years, 4 months and 28 days. Maria, his wife, died July 20, 1843, aged 58 years, 4 months and 2 days. His 2d wife was the widow of Benjamin Fanning (see back). Married to her by Elder Hezekiah Pettitt of Lexington, at Prattsville in Huntersfield. His first marriage was by the same man. Agnes Maria Alberty, born July 27, 1792.

Jacob Soule was an old-school Baptist in early life but became a Methodist and was a local preacher for many years. He was a millwright by trade. He seems to have lived at several places. His house was at Little West Kill in

Windham, or Prattsville, in Greene County, N. Y. Children:

Soules of Gilbon, New York.

Recompense Soule (1), a son of William (1) and Jemima (Baker) Soule and grandson of Nathaniel and Jane (Potter) Soule, was a brother of old Jacob Soule, the "Whaler," and of Job Soule, the "Miller," of Tiverton, R. I. He settled on the Blenheim Ridge, now South Gilboa, Schoharie County, N. Y., along with his brother but was of a migratory disposition and the public records show that he lived in several towns. He was a speculator in lands and many

conveyances have been found recorded. At one time he lived at Verona, N. Y., where he purchased land in 1822. An indenture of date April 14, 1826, shows that for the consideration of \$150.00 he sold land in Verona, N. Y. The records show that there were six transfers of land in which he was interested between 1822 and 1830. Tradition says he was a great horse-fancier and speculator in horses, owning some very fine and fast animals. His wife's name is not known, nor the time and place of his death. Children named, so far as known, as follows:

Soule married 2d, Feb. 13, 1845, at Urbana, Ohio, SARAH JANE HUNTER, daughter of George and Ruth (Fitch) Hunter, born Dec. 29, 1827 and died June 10, 1900. Mr. Soule moved to Ohio in 1833, locating at Urbana, where he became a farmer, merchant, hotelkeeper and proprietor. He was an honorable and high type of a gentleman whose word was his bond. He was exceedingly kind and benevolent, giving freely to help the poor and unfortunate and to promote industries for the growth of his adopted town. His home was a model of domestic propriety and peace. His children honored and loved him and were obedient to his wishes. Mrs. Soule was a devout Christian lady of the Episcopal faith whose noble deeds of kindness in supporting the church and in helping the needy endeared her to all who knew her. She was broad-minded and full of charity toward every creed and color. A remarkable feature of her experience was the fact that she was born, reared, married and died in the same house at Urbana, Ohio. Her children loved and esteemed her as one of the best of mothers and the most rare type of breeding and womanhood. Mr. Soule died at Urbana, Ohio, Feb. 4, 1898, aged 87 years. I., and his place of residence as Westport, Mass., and from this town he applied for the Goveenment bounty July 30, 1833. He enlisted in April, 1776. Was stationed at "Dudly House," so-called, and at "Melborn Place." Belonged to the Tiverton militia. In 1777 was stationed at "Fogland Ferry" and "Howland Ferry." He served under Capt. Jacob Sowle in 1778. His claim was allowed for twelve months service. But little appears concerning this member of the family and it was only recently that his family record was found. Unknown Ancestry.

MANIEL SOWLE, ancestry and parentage unknown, born Aug. 15, 1791, settled in Middleburg, Wyoming County, N. Y., as a farmer. He married HANNAH PERRY who was born Feb. 2, 1801 and died at the home of her son, Anson, July 25, 1863, aged 62 years. Her husband pre-deceased her March 21, 1854, aged 63 years. He made a will by which he bestowed all of his estate to Hannah Sowle, his wife, during her lifetime; then to his son, David Sowle. He mentions children Stephen M., Anson, David, Persis (Ward), Edmond and Orren, of whom three were minors "having no general guardian in the State of New York." There were ten children, three of whom died young. Mr. Sowle was active in the erection of the Baptist church and the family were communicants of that organization. The members were natural vocalists and several of them sang in the church choir. This Daniel Sowle was a man of excellent character and a reverent and devoted Christian. A relative has stated that Daniel Sowle lived in a humble home in a neighborhood known as "The Dale" on the main road near the rural school-house and opposite the public cemetery. For record of children see forward to Third Generation.

John Sowle, a brother to the preceding, born Dec. 4, 1788, married SALLY WARD (born Feb. 3, 1789), on May 21, 1804; and these were the parents of seven children all born in Middleburg, N. Y. Through the influence of a brother, William Sowle, who had visited that country, this family was induced to go to Macomb County, Mich., in 1825 and settled in the town of Washington, there. In this locality the remainder of the parents' lives was passed. See forward for names and record of children.

Sowl Family In Salamanca, A. P.

Francis Sowl was reputed a native of Vermont but may have been born in the territory now comprised in that state when it was considered a part of New York. He was born June 10, 1799 and died Nov. 9, 1885. He was married three times. His first wife, Betsey Lyon, born July 17, 1798 died Aug. 19, 1829. His 2d wife, Lucy Gifford, born Aug. 19, 1802, died Feb. 11, 1854; 3d wife, Sarah Howard, born Dec. 29, 1799.

Francis Sowl removed from Vermont to Northampton in the Adirondack mountains, then in the town of Stockton in Chautauqua County, N. Y., and settled in the town of Busti after 1830. He was a millwright by trade and a general mechanic who could turn his hand to almost any class of work that required ingenious ability. He assisted in the construction of the first machinery for making pointed or "gimlet" screws, a great improvement on the old-fashioned article that was started by first making a hole in the wood. While a resident of Northampton he was called from his home to work at mill-building, and when he returned found his wife dead and buried. She had been taken ill during the summer and as his whereabouts were not known he could not be advised of her condition and death. Those were days when the means of communication were deficient. There were no mails, no railroads, no telegraphs, no telephones. After settling in Busti, N. Y., he erected several houses which are still standing, and becoming owner of the water power, he built a grist-mill and saw-mill. He had also a carriage shop and smithy, where he turned out hand-made wagons constructed in the most substantial manner. After retiring from active business "he mended the lame clocks and sick watches" of the community for several years. He was an honest man. upright in all his dealings, trusted by everybody; a very useful person greatly missed when he was buried in the village cemetery.

Francis Sowl was a man of gigantic size, being six feet and six inches in stature and weighing 340 pounds. One of his contemporaries said of him, "He had a hand, a foot and a gait that reminded me of an elephant." His children were named as follows:

He was a very stalwart young man and held off five Indians for some time, but the chief, seeing his braves getting the worst of the fray, crushed his head with his tomahawk. He remained unconscious, but was revived and lived many years, always suffering from his wound, and was a soldier in the Mexican War in which he served as drummajor; he was at the battle of Santa Anna. He returned from Mexico and finally died, from the effects of his wound, by a stroke of paralysis. He was buried at Amsterdam, Sheboygan County, Wis. Caleb Soule married MARY RECTOR, a daughter of John Rector, who was mortally wounded during the same battle by the Mohawk Indians. His parents lived at Cicero Corners and afterwards went to Richland, N. Y., thence removed to Wisconsin. children were born at "The Corners." For children's names see forward.

The Rector Family.

Marie Weskett, the youngest daughter of Dr. Oliver Weskett, was born in Germany (Berlin), about 1745 and lived to the extreme age of 95 years. She became the wife of John Rector, who was killed in the Mohawk Massacre where Caleb was badly wounded—a crushed skull. There were born to this couple children named Barbara, Lucretia, Nancy, George, Nicholas, Hannah and Mary.

2. Phylinda Soule (1), a daughter of David (1) and Olive (Wallen) Soule, was married to WILLIAM BROWN. She was born in 1808 and died in 1872. Her husband was born in 1802 and died in 1869. If these had children, I have not found their names.

Soules In Moodstock, Vermont.

New York Branch.

This family of Soule was a branch broken from the Pilgrim tree in Old Plymouth, Massachusetts, and early transplanted to the fertile soil of the Mohawk Valley.

Elisha Soule, with whose name we begin this treatment, was reputed to be the son of another of the same name. There were several of this name in the New England branches but those found do not "fill the bill." This Elisha was a man of education and substance. He was long a teacher in the common schools; early removed to Ohio, thence to Michigan. His wife was Clarissa Willard and there were five sons and one daughter in the family, of whom more presently. Tradition makes him a soldier of the Revolution as well as a gentleman of fine intelligence and benevolence. The time of his death is not known. His wife died when her children were all small and after a farm was purchased the daughter became the housekeeper.

Samuel Willard Soule, born in Pompey, N. Y., Jan. 25, 1830, married Betsey Call Pelton, daughter of Amos Pelton, the ceremony performed by Rev. Moses Kidder, a minister of the Christian Church, Jan. 21, 1867, in Woodstock, Vermont. She was born in that town July 2, 1844. Mr. Soule

died of cancer in Brooklyn, N. Y., July 25, 1875. In our treatment of the career of this man we approach the history of no ordinary person. Somewhere, probably under the tuition of his father, he had acquired a fine education and was an efficient linguist, speaking and writing "Parisian French" with facility. He was also a scientific mechanic and was the originator of the most important movements of the typewriter. In the summer of 1867 C. Latham Sholes, the local Collector of Customs, with Carlos Glidden, conceived the idea of formulating a machine in which types could be used for writing, and Mrs. Soule, still living and in possession of a fruitful memory, recalls the appearance of the first working model produced. It resembled an old-fashioned melodeon but the keys were marked with letters and numerals, and when the proprietors failed of accomplishing some important result they appealed to Samuel Soule to assist them. He was the man who first suggested the cylindrical arrangement of the types, the movement of the carriage, the spacer, the inked-ribbon and its unrolling from one spool and simultaneously winding upon another. A treadle was used to place the carriage wherever desired at the beginning of next lines and sentences. This model was a lumbering concern and after it had been developed into working order Mr. Soule suggested a change in both size and form. Whoever claims the invention of the idea, it was Mr. Soule who made it practical. He was the inventor also of several other useful machines: paging and numbering machines; those for paper-cutting, for stamping, and agricultural implements. He was therefore his own inventor and draughtsman, model maker and manufacturer.

Previously he had studied law and was an adept in making out all of the legal documents when applying for a patent. He had been a teacher and superintendent of schools; was well known for his mathematical abilities. He was a surveyor of public lands and waters and a practical printer. His literary ability was exceptional and his moral character unimpeachable. Temperate in all things, his word was as good as his bond. Had he been spared he might have achieved success in almost any calling. Mrs. Soule, a lady of refinement and culture, is still living in Woodstock, Vt., respected and well-beloved by all who know her.

There was an adventure by Samuel Soule when a lad that shows the beginning of the future man. After the death of his mother and the home was broken up, at the age of twelve years, he started on foot and alone to find his father who was teaching somewhere in Michigan. It was a long and wearisome journey and he was often exhausted and faint for want of food. Sometimes he was overtaken by some farmer returning from market who gave him a ride. Sometimes he found passage on a canal-boat. Having reached nearly the end of his journey he was directed to cross a field by a path to shorten the way to the house where his father was said to be boarding; but utterly worn out and discouraged he sat down upon a log and began to cry. Then a person came along and asked the cause of his sorrow, and looking up, he saw the face of his

Note.—It seems a little singular that members of this family should have been married into two families, the Marvins and the Kirbys, both intermarried with Soules and all of New England nativity. And the name of John Benson Soule reminds us of that other John Benson Soule whose history is a part of the family of Soule in Dover, Dutchess County, N. Y.

father. From that day as long as his father lived they shared each other's fortunes. When the father had given up teaching they bought a farm in Leroy, Wisconsin, and his sister was their housekeeper till her marriage. Children:

Edwin B. Soule, a son of Elisha and Clarissa (Willard), was an architect and contractor, who in 1855 erected the public buildings—custom house, post office, etc., in Oswego, N. Y. In 1858 he was found, after being murdered, on the banks of a stream in Cairo, Ill. He left a wife (Mary Ann Marvin), a daughter, Emma Soule, and a son Willie who lived with his uncle, George Marvin; a wonderful scholar but for several years had fits and died when 31 years of age.

John Benson Soule, a son of Elisha and Clarissa (Willard) Soule. He was never married. He enlisted in Co. B, 10th Regt. Wisconsin Vols., and on the day of the battle of Chattanooga, June 30, 1864, while lying ill in his tent, he was killed by the falling of a tree that had been cut off by a cannon ball.

Mary Ellen Soule, the only daughter of Elisha and Clarissa (Willard) Soule, was married to Robert Kirby of Brownville, Wis. She died in 1878, aged 48 years.

Soles Family In New York State.

Jacob Soles (1), parents' names and place of birth unknown, married Sarah Ann Barber who died in 1875. He died about 1850. Was an early resident of New York, but afterward removed to Brinton, Versailles Township, Allegheny County, Pa. As the name "Howland" appears in this branch of the Soule family I am inclined to believe they were in some way connected with the other branches in which this title was conspicuous. Thaddeus Franklin Soles, a son of Valentine Soles, born Jan. 17, 1846; died Jan. 24, 1921. He married in 1870, ELIZABETH ZIMMERMAN who died Oct. 10, 1902. His mother died when he was but a lad and his father put him out with a neighbor, Samuel Campbell, where he acted as chore-boy for his board. He was but fifteen when the Civil War came on, and being undersized he was unable to enter the service until Feb. 23, 1864; then, by standing upon his tip-toes, he managed to "pass muster" and was enrolled as a drummer-boy in Co. G, 195th Regiment Ohio Vol. Inf'y. His army record shows him to have been four feet, nine and one-half inches in height. He was a member of Corwin Post 259 of Vinton, Ohio, and held different official positions in that organization. After his discharge from the army he was apprenticed to one James Craig to learn the trade of blacksmith, and followed that craft for several years; but in later life, was in the grocery business. He was a life-long Methodist. His children's names will follow.

Jacob Soles, a son of James M. Soles, born July 7, 1845, married Margaret Meyers in 1868 and had issue, Laura, Philip and William. He entered the service of the Union Army at the beginning of the Civil War in the Light Artillery of Pennsylvania, Captain Thompson's Battery, and served till the close of the war. While acting as one of President Lincoln's body guard, at the time of his assassination, saw him shot, and helped to carry him from Ford's Theatre to the house where he died April 14, 1865. Mr. Soles is still living at the advanced age of eighty years, at Turtle Creek, Penn.

Sowles of Broadalbin, A. P.

Tiverton Branch-Plymouth County Stock.

HEN he contemplated the arrangement and composition of the abundant mass of records and family history from which this branch of the old Duxbury Soule race was constituted, the author was oppressed with a sense of his inability and shrank from the strenuous

undertaking. Great bundles of manuscript and parcels containing hundreds of fat letters tied about with strings, constituted the materials from which he evolved order from disorder and attempted to classify that which seemed to have no affinity. From a candid examination of this assembly, gathered from a hundred sources and much of it supplied by persons of venerable years with uncertain vision and cramped hands, the chirography irregular and ungraceful and difficult of transcription, the task seemed impossible for one whose milestones have nearly all been passed and the pathway of whose days is enwrapped with constantly lengthening shadows. We can only dare to hope that those who handle this volume and peruse these statements will cherish a spirit of forbearance and appreciate what has been accomplished in an attempt to permanently preserve the records of the numerous and widely distributed family.

There could be no more appropriate preface for the family history-proper than a summing-up of the attributes and peculiar traits of the individuals of which this especial branch was composed. A venerable man bearing the name, whose acquaintance with his kindred has made him familiar with them and having been personally acquainted with those representing five generations, was qualified to produce a candid and realistic description of his kindred, and

we herewith subjoin his deductions:

"The Sowle families with whom I was acquainted, being pioneers who settled upon the frontiers and fringes of civilization, by reason of their birth, training and environment, were a rough-and-ready people, accustomed to a strenuous existence with hard labor and considerable suffering. They had but meagre advantages for an education and the few weeks schooling by which they derived what little instruction they obtained, were spent by long journeys through the borders of the woodlands, by winding and bush-grown paths, while bending over rude slab-hewed benches under the eagle-eyes of stern and combative masters. In summer some of the young female members of the families spent a few weeks in study, presided over by ripened spinsters with pimpled noses and whiskery chins whose estimate of their learning elevated them to the most lofty altitudes of their assumed value as members of the community.

"The majority of those I have known were strictly moral and many very religious. But few were habituated to the use of profane language or of strong drink. They were by inheritance independent and outspoken in their intercourse with their fellow-citizens. They avoided the courts and the meshes of the law; they paid their debts and were seldom sued. Bold to advocate

what they conceived to be right, their opinions were never changed by the

most plausible sophistry or sugary arguments.

"The majority of those known to me were of medium stature, not many of them heavy men. Their height ranged from five feet-seven to six feet. Nearly all were of medium complexion with dark hair and eyes; some were fair, and even blonde, by transmission from the maternal side of the house. They were educated by circumstances to habits of economy and thrift, but were not penurious when claims upon their attention were worthy of their benevolence. Kind of heart and constitutionally sympathetic, they were at the homes of the unfortunate and the bedsides of the afflicted.

"From their early years the home instinct was strong and when they had acquired a comfortable protection from the storms and a warm hearth for their families, they had personally reached the realm of contentment. Being generous providers for their families they enjoyed all of the material concomitants of existence."

From the deductions of Mr. Best, who made a very thorough and intensive investigation of the history and genealogy of this branch of the Sowle family, coupled with the result of my personal research among the records comprising the names of the early generations of the family, I have been convinced that it was not William Soule, a son of George Soule and wife Deborah, who were the parents of the Joseph Soule who married Charity Tripp, but another William Soule, son of Sylvanus Soule, of Tiverton, R. I., who married Jimima Baker: consequently, this Ioseph Sowle was a brother of Iacob Sowle who left the whaling fleet and settled at Blenheim, N. Y., and accounts, more intelligently, for the traditions that recounted how Recompense Soule and Jacob, the "whaler," made visits to Joseph, another brother, at Broadalbin, N. Y., and the conversation around the fireside concerning events at Tiverton, R. I., were remembered by the grandson, Abel Sowle. What, then, shall we do with the other William Soule whose wife was Hannah Brewster? That he had a family we know, but the son by name Joseph, who married the daughter of Benjamin Davis, was an early pioneer who, after the death of wife Mary Davis, married Content Wood. The records of Dartmouth and those in Danbury, Vt., settle that question. The history of the Sowles has therefore been well authenticated and we can stand upon solid ground.

There has been considerable speculation and disagreement concerning the parentage of the Joseph Sowle whose name stands at the head of the Broadalbin branch of the family. There were two William Soules contemporaries, William of Dartmouth, son of George and Deborah, and William of Tiverton, son of Sylvanus and grandson of Nathaniel and his wife Rose (Thorn) Soule. Both Williams figured conspicuously in the early Land Records and in the Vital Records of the bordering towns. In nearly every instance the Dartmouth branches were designated by the name "Soule" while those of Tiverton, Westport, and Swansea, were spelled "Sowle," and their descendants have quite generally followed the same rule. See the families about New Bedford at the present time.

While collecting the names and family records in settling the estate of the late Peleg Soule, Horatio Best, lawyer, of Bloomington, Ill., made a very extensive and critical investigation of the history and genealogy of the Soule and

Sowles families descended from the George Soule who came to Plymouth in 1620. In collecting his information he not only advertised quite freely in the newspapers of the locality but caused the Registry of Wills and of Deeds to be examined in his behalf; and through these avenues of research this discriminating gentleman acquired a very extensive and interesting assembly of information. When handling his materials he employed a very careful process of sifting and was enabled to trace the heirs backward to their progenitors. This very thorough work of research by Lawyer Best proved opportune and it was the pleasure of the compiler of the present work to have quite an extended correspondence with him. He not only made available the results of his research by placing at the disposal of the author his whole collection, but fully supplied the reasons for his deductions.

His notes and records were all preserved in several blank books which he designated by such titles as "The Black Book," "The Blue Book" and "The Red Book," and within each of them his information was recorded in a very concise and distinctive form, each family and generation being designated by numerals that were unmistakable. His written comments upon the records, and his graphic description of his methods, were of great interest and importance as materials for this genealogical treatise. In my conclusions bearing upon the history and connections of this branch of the Sowle family I have followed, generally, the reasoning of Lawyer Best, for these were founded upon authentic

documentary evidence.

Concerning the name of the ancestors of the Broadalbin branch of the family, a grandson of Joseph Sowle who had listened to the conversation of the family around the fireside in the home in New York, had made a visit to the East to see his great-grandfather, then a very aged man. This visit to Tiverton was supposed to have been about 1819-20. This member of the Broadalbin family was positive that the venerable man was named William Sowle. He was also fond of relating his experience when visiting the old homestead in Westboro, where the family had lived until their removal to New York, and of describing the contrast between the long stone walls and piles of pumplestones in the field-corners, and the more alluvial lands of the newly acquired home.

Both William Soules had sons named Joseph nearly contemporary in age, and this recorded fact only complicated the genealogical entanglement. The records of land-transactions and field-notes of the early surveyors are worthy of study and afford much reliable information concerning the early generations of the Soule family. William, the son of George and Deborah, figured frequently accompanied with the name of his wife, and her signature, "Hannah Soule," aids in the identification; while William Sowle, son of Sylvanus, being farther removed by one generation, did not appear as frequently in the events growing out of the division of the lands in Dartmouth that had been long owned in common by George and Nathaniel Soule, sons of the Pilgrim. The name of the wife of this William Sowle, Jimima Baker, does not appear with that of her husband in the early land records and this absence renders the distinction between the two men more readily adjusted. It should be remembered that the persons and families under notice were not far isolated geographically; their places of residence, though designated as in different towns,

were considered to be within the same community and their lands often bordered upon the State lines.

There were many interesting and dangerous incidents concerning the removals and pioneer settlements of the Sowle families when they were passing from New York to Ohio and Indiana and some of these stories procured from venerable persons who participated in the adventures or were witnesses of them will be reproduced as characteristic of a feature of this work promised in the introductory section. One of the young wives made the journey from New York to Ohio on horseback with much of her household furniture strapped on behind her. To reach the lands purchased they were guided by trails outlined through the forest by spotted trees.

The country around their log houses abounded with game and the lakes with fish; wild berries were plentiful and their tables were supplied with wholesome and delicious food. One of the Sowles killed about 70 deer in one year. Many of the hollow trees were filled with honey and some of the swarms were hived and domesticated. There were many Indians roaming through the forests and bands of them visited the houses of the Sowle families; but although they were sometimes rude and uncouth and tested the courage of the women, they were never hostile. These pioneer families had no clocks nor factory-bells to awaken them and their only announcement of the dawn of day came from the collar-beam of their rude barns by the clarion voices of the superintendents of the "speckled harems." The wolves frequently made the night-hours hideous with their persistent howling and sometimes encroached upon their flocks, while the sly old foxes, following their inherent inclination, carried away some of their favorite poultry to supply a feast in their burrows. Elder John Allen's favorite hymn was frequently translated into literal significance amid the rural population of these rustic hamlets when "feeding on milk and honey."

Heads of the Sowle families walked through the forest some eighty miles to make payment for their land and were supplied with food from their capacious pockets.

In these remote settlements the "neighborly spirit" prevailed, and with tender solicitude each watched for the opportunity to lend a hand when there was evidence of trying to bear too heavy burdens. There were then no trained nurses to be had in the time of sickness and people were permitted to cross the mystic river without the assistance of a physician. Lusty infants accomplished their short journey from babyland to this sublunary sphere without the intervention of modern inventions or the administration of anaesthetics. Habitual obedience to Nature's laws secured the rewards of excellent health and a cheerful spirit. The fashionable visitation of the "blues" was unknown, and "melancholia" was absent from the firesides of the husky pioneers. As unimpeachable evidence of the perennial vigor of these adventurers see the records of the names and births appearing in these pages.

In order to bring the subject of identity more clearly before those interested, we shall briefly make record of the marriages of the several Joseph Soules, or Sowles, who were the contemporaries of the head of the Broadalbin family; then, the conclusions may be personal. There were five bearing the name Joseph whose marriages were found in the records.

- 1. Joseph Soule (often spelled "Sowle") who married MARY DAVIS April 8, 1736, by whom she had Samuel, Rebecca and Hannah mentioned in the will of Benjamin Davis as the children of his "dear daughter Mary deceased" in 1749. This Joseph Soule was a son of Jonathan Soule and Lydia Sisson, and married 2d, July 17, 1773, CONTENT WOOD who was mentioned in his will made in Danby, Vt., a township in which he was a pioneer.
- 2. Joseph Soule, son of Jacob and Rebecca, married DINAH TRIPP, daughter of Joseph and Elizabeth Tripp, July 13, 1758.
- 3. Joseph Sowle, Jr., "of Tiverton" married ABIGAIL WILBUR of Little Compton, R. I., Feb. 23, 1775. This marriage was forbidden by Comfort Macomber and the publication of the bans prohibited March 1, 1775; but it seems that love slipped the bolts of wedlock and the interested persons were united in the bonds of matrimony in February following.
- 4. Joseph Soule of Tiverton and CHARITY TRIPP, married Nov. 8, 1763. Francis Tripp in his will mentions her as Charity Soule, his daughter, in 1779; so this settled her identity. These were the parental heads of the Broadalbin branch of the Sowle family.
- 5. Joseph Soule and Elizabeth Tallman were married Nov. 18, 1762.
- 6. Joseph Soule and RUTH TRIPP were married Dec. 13, 1761.

Horatio Best, Esq., intimated that Ruth and Dinah Tripp were sisters of Charity, wife of Joseph Sowle of Broadalbin, but the foregoing proves that one,

at least, was the daughter of Thomas Tripp.

Having stated our conclusions relative to the parentage of Joseph Sowle, Sr., of Tiverton, Westport, and Broadalbin, the reader can more readily understand why he was visited by Jacob Sowle "the whaler" and Recompense Sowle "the jockey;" these men being his brothers from Blenheim and South Gilboa, N. Y. In their earlier days these three brothers were whale-hunters on the stormy seas, and enjoyed "spinning yarns" around the firesides when visiting their kindred. As "old salts" they could never quite forget the flavor of the spume-drift and saline spray that dashed over them when manning the long-boat and sharpening their harpoons.

We shall now proceed with the genealogy of this branch of the Sowle

family settled at Broadalbin, Fulton County, N. Y.

Joseph Soule (1), reputed youngest son of William (1) and Jimima (Baker) Soule, born in Dartmouth, Mass., Sept. 1, 1733; married Charity Tripp, daughter of Francis and Desire Tripp, of Tiverton, R. I., Nov. 8, 1763. Francis Tripp made his will March 1, 1779, which was recorded May 2, 1780, and in this testament he mentioned among his children Charity Soule. There was a tradition in this family that the wife of Joseph Soule was named "Rachel" but this was an error; it was Rachel, wife of Joseph Soule, Jr. An abundance of proof has been found to settle this question and that he was married but once.

Joseph Soule, frequently spelled "Sowle" and by some descendants still spelled "Sowles," probably made his home in Tiverton, R. I., till about 1790. There is an old deed in possession of the descendants, dated Jan. 24, 1790, whereby Thomas Gridley, laborer, of Dartmouth, Mass., conveyed to Joseph

Soule, Yeoman, of Tiverton, Rhode Island, about sixty acres of land in the town of Westport in the County of Bristol and Commonwealth of Massachusetts Bay, in New England. In 1802 he sold this farm and having purchased land in Broadalbin, Fulton County, New York, he removed to that country. Here the family lived for some time in a log house, but he finally erected a larger framed residence of sufficient capacity to accommodate his numerous The price paid for this new estate was \$1200. The farm was purchased of Benjamin Simmons, probably one of the Old Plymouth County There were 99 acres. The deed dated May 1, 1802, was recorded on the 9th of the same month. The place had evidently been settled for some time, as there were "50 acres of cleared land and an orchard." Here Joseph Soule and his wife passed the remainder of their days, and when they died they were laid to rest in the soil of their homestead. Letters of administration were taken out at Fonda, N. Y., October 5, 1822. Settlement of widow's estate made July 5, 1835. He was about 87 years of age. Names of his children and grandchildren will follow in regular order.

fifth Generation.

1. Robert Sowle (1), probably the eldest son of Joseph (1) and Charity (Tripp) Sowle, born in Tiverton, R. I., Nov. 3, 1767; married Jan. 1, 1793, MERIBAH DURFEE, born Oct. 24, 1768 and died May 23, 1817. He was married a second time to Betsey ———, and third, to Cynthia Capron. Robert was a farmer near Broadalbin, N. Y., where he died Feb. 2, 1848. He was a man of excellent reputation and useful as a citizen and neighbor. Children's names follow.

I. GARDINER SOULE, eldest son of Robert and Meribah, born Sept. 30, 1793, and went with his parents to Broadalbin, N. Y., but relatives of the family do not agree concerning his fate. Some assume that he died young and single while others believe he went to Michigan and had a family. The author gives him a family.

II. Anna Soule, daughter of Robert and Meribah, born Mar. 1, 1795, was married to Chauncy Fox by whom she had issue. See record.

- III. CHARITY SOULE, daughter of Robert and Meribah, born Oct. 17, 1796.

 IV. Durfee Soule, son of Robert and Meribah, born Dec. 17, 1798.
- V. JUDITH SOULE, third daughter of Robert and Meribah, was born Dec. 16, 1800. Never married.
- VI. RILEY SOULE, third son of Robert and Meribah, born Nov. 22, 1802.
- vII. RUTH SOULE, daughter of Robert and Meribah, born Oct. 27, 1804; married March 7, 1827 to ——— PORTER and died Nov. 25, 1857.
- VIII. GIDEON SOULE (1), fourth son of Robert and Meribah, born Oct. 15, 1806, in Broadalbin, N. Y., made his residence in the village, where he carried on his farm and was employed as a carpenter. He was a man of strict integrity and exemplary conduct; an active member of the M. E. Church and an ardent Democrat in politics. He and his wife were buried in the Broadalbin cemetery and their headstones inscribed there bear the following: "Gideon Soule who was born Oct. 15, 1806; died Sept. 13, 1870. He was married Jan.

- 1, 1830 to Sally Brower, who was born Feb. 29, 1812 and died Nov. 21, 1878." After her husband's death, Sally Soule was married to Jedediah Roberts, a farmer of Mayfield, Fulton County, N. Y., and was living near that place when she was taken ill and died. There were eleven children, of whom more presently.
- IX. PHEBE Soule, daughter of Robert and Meribah, born Nov. 2, 1809.
- x. George Soule, son of Robert and Meribah, born March 5, 1812.
- XI. ELIAS SOULE, sixth son of Robert and Meribah, born Oct. 9, 1821.
- 2. Peleg Sowle, born 1773. See page 884.
- 3. Isaac Sowle, born 1775. See page 897.
- 4. Job Sowle, born 1781. See page 899.
- 5. William Sowle (1), probably a son of Joseph (1) and Charity (Tripp) Sowle, born in Tiverton, R. I., about 1783, married Sally Deval in Tiverton, R. I., and is supposed to have gone with the other families to Broadalbin, N. Y. But little has been found concerning him or his family. He was buried on his father's farm and his widow survived several years. Of his family we only have the names of four, viz:

Durfee Sowle (1), a son of Robert (1) and Meribah (Durfee) Sowle, born probably in Westport, Mass., Nov. 17, 1798; married Mary Cosleman (who was born July 30, 1802) in July, 1821, and lived near Charleston, Montgomery County, N. Y. He removed to Ohio in 1840 and to Steuben County, Ind., in 1854. His children named as follows:

After remaining a widow for several years Mary Hill was married to WILLARD WAIT and moved to Sing Sing, N. Y., where he had secured a position as keeper of this noted prison. They subsequently removed to New York City, and later still, to Jersey City where Mr. Wait was connected with the Police Department, and there they spent the greater portion of their married lives. Some time in 1901-2, the Waits left Jersey City and lived for a short time in Gloversville, N. Y., and then went to live with their son Charles Wait in St. Louis, Mo. In the fall of 1902, they returned to Gloversville and lived with the family of Mortimer E. Brockway, whose wife was a sister of Mrs. Wait; and here Mr. Wait died in the spring of 1903, being more than 80 years of age. His wife died at the home of her son Charles in St. Louis in the summer of the same year. Her remains were brought to Broadalbin for burial. She had two sons:

Joseph Soule (2), son of Joseph (1) and Charity (Tripp) Soule, was born in Tiverton, R. I., April 30, 1785; was married at Provincetown, called Old Providence, Saratoga County, N. Y., in the spring of 1804 to RACHEL ALLEN, daughter of Adam Allen, born Nov. 17, 1785 and died in Steuben County, Ind., Feb. 15, 1851. He died at the same place April 1, 1862. Buried on their 80-acre farm in the "Soule Settlement," so-called. After his father's death he inherited a few acres of land in Broadalbin, N. Y., which he sold to his brother James and the conveyance reads: "Joseph Soule to James Soule on the 22d day of Oct. 1822, sold his portion of his father's estate, now deceased, for two hundred and fifty dollars." He removed to Wayne County, Ohio, with his family, in 1834-5, and helped his son, Francis T. Soule, who cleared and fenced 40 acres of land there and raised a crop of wheat. In 1836, with his sons Francis and Abel, and his son-in-law George Tabor, he removed to Steuben County, Indiana. Here Francis Soule entered an 80-acre trac of land in his father's name and here he settled and his kindred around him and the locality was known as "The Soule Settlement." This Joseph Soule served in the War of 1812, enlisting as a private in Capt. William Newton's Company, also known as Lieut. Charles Brockway's Company, in the 10th Priors Regiment, New York Militia; discharged Feb. 18, 1813. He was stationed at Sacketts Harbor and said the soldiers died there like sheep, with a malignant sore throat called "black tongue." While he followed the sea, and as they came out of the North Sea on a return voyage from Holland they were overtaken by a north-easter that blew them far from their course before its abatement, and being a very strong man, he was called to hold a rope that in some way held

the mast from going overboard and for two days stood at his post while his food was brought to him. He said the most lonesome sound he ever heard was the boo-hooing of the wind through the bare poles of the ship. On one of their return voyages from the East Indies the crew was taken by Algerian pirates, and one of them, Allen, Joseph Soule's relative, was held as a slave for five years. He was one chosen by General Howe on the lake-who wished to land on an island where fields of oats were growing, but the men, believing the British were concealed there, refused to accede to his wishes. There were eleven children, all born at Broadalbin, Fulton County, N. Y., and all removed to Steuben County, Indiana, except Hannah and two that died young. Seven children, as follows:

- 1. Hannah Soule, eldest daughter of Joseph and Rachel Allen, born at Broadalbin, N. Y., Dec. 18, 1804, was twice married; 1st, to John Dennis, by whom two sons and four daughters; 2d, to Thomas McBride of Wayne, O., by whom two sons.
- 2. Adam W. A. Soule (1), eldest son of Joseph and Rachel Allen, born in Broadalbin, N. Y., Jan. 20, 1806; married May 4, 1830, in Oneida County, N. Y., to Experience Whaley and resided at Evans Mills, N. Y., in 1845. He later purchased a farm near Fremont, Steuben County, Ind. He was fully six feet in height, full-chested and elastic on his feet. He was the champion wrestler and while not quarrelsome was a man not to be imposed upon—"If you don't believe it, sir, just you take a holt." He was a carpenter and cabinet-maker, a skilled workman, and continued at these trades till late in life when he and his sons, Orin Soule, engaged in the furniture business in Angola, Ind. He died Oct. 18, 1887, and was buried in Circle Hill Cemetery. His wife, born May 16, 1809, died Jan. 6, 1899. There were nine children. See forward.

Note.—The statement herewith given was supplied by A. W. A. Soule, a son of Joseph and Rachel (Allen) Soule of Broadalbin, N. Y. This man had seen his grandfather while visiting Tiverton, R. I., and said he was then a very aged man. In conversation with this venerable sire he related some incidents handed down by tradition concerning George Soule, the Mayflower Pilgrim. He said this ancestor was on very friendly terms with the Indians who frequently visited him; that George was small but very strong and sprightly and that in wrestling feats he vanquished them; and that they finally refused to match their muscle with him, saying, "If the boy can throw us, what about the strength of the full-grown men!" We believe this to be the only tradition purporting to have been brought down to us from the Pilgrim himself. Several persons claim to own articles of household furniture once belonging to George Soule, but we doubt. The stories about the Old Gourd-shell at Plymouth and the fragment of the "Diary" preserved in Ohio, seem more consistent.—AUTHOR.

Naming of the Sons.—This was how the story ran: The fathers were upon a lake and entered an agreement that when they reached the shore they should name their first-born sons for the first tree they came to; and this compact they strictly carried out. One was named—middle-named—"Walnut" and the other "Beech." Thus we find the name of Adam Walnut Allen Sowle.

- Francis Tripp Soule (1), second son of Joseph and Rachel Allen, born Oct. 21, 1808, in Broadalbin, N. Y.; married May 23, 1829, at Castile, Wyoming County, N. Y., Susan Maria Vrooman, born Sept. 18, 1808, died Sept. 19, 1845 in Angola, Ind. He married 2d, Nov. 30, 1846, HENRIETTE HALDRIDGE who died at Angola, Ind., Sept. 7, 1848; 3d, married July 23, 1849, BARBARA McMahon who died March, 1891. He died Aug. 31, 1901. Was named for his great-grandfather, Francis Tripp of Tiverton, R. I., or Dartmouth, Mass. He was "bound out" when in his eleventh year but was treated so unkindly that he ran away and worked for his uncle for fourteen years, during one of which he made paper. Then he went to Genesee County and was employed, for six years, hauling flour, and coopering. After a brief residence in Wayne County, Ohio, he went to Steuben County, Ind., and entered four 80-acre tracts of land in his father's name in 1836; one of these lots he presented to his father; then sold the others and bought 400 acres in the same county, which he made his homestead farm and where he passed the remainder of his life. This man had all of the experiences incident to pioneer life, and the stories he told of his early adventures were of deep interest. He had only corn bread while at home and the first short-cake he ever saw was made of oat flour. There were 1300 pounds of sugar made on the 40 acres of heavily timbered land the year he cleared it. He had no money, but had enough pork and flour to last through the winter. He raised a good crop of wheat and in the spring of 1839 he had about \$900. He then moved his family to Indiana, locating two and a half miles north of Angola, where he built a frame house and bank-barn, and lived there three years; then moved into the town and bought property there, renting his farm. Wild game was abundant and he was not out of fresh venison for three years. His father shot and wounded a deer in town one day that ran north to his farm, and his little boy and his dog captured the deer right at his gate. Wild turkeys were plentiful. There were no roads and people generally went through the woods on foot. When he and his father and brother Abel and brother-in-law George Tabor, went to Indiana in 1836, they went on foot by an Indian trail from Coldwater, Michigan, but traveled by stage from Toledo. He once found a bee-tree, from which he and brothers took honey that filled a wash-tub and two pails. There were many Indians around his home but they were harmless. He, one day, shot a fawn and when he reached it, having stopped to load his gun, he found an Indian. He said he had found a bee-tree and the next morning he went to buy it but he would not sell. He found the Indians all lying around their fire save an old squaw; she was mixing flour for a cake and he remained till it was baked; then she divided it according to the size of the Indians. The first Indian that got up took his rifle, looked at it, sighted it and handed it back, and so did each of them in turn.

Francis T. Soule carried on a cooperage business for some time after moving from his farm to Angola; later, was in the grocery business, and after that manufactured bricks. In 1852 he left his business in charge of his brother-in-law, Loton Wells, and with his son, went overland to California and for about one year and a half conducted a general supply store at a mining town, his son freighting the goods by team from Sacramento. He returned home by way of Panama. Mr. Soule was a man of simple and regular habits and when rising 91 attributed his long life to temperance, cleanliness and good nature.

From his obituary notice we make an abstract: "Mr. Soule, like almost all others, had faults, but he had virtues as well. He was public-spirited and generous and people who knew him long and well unite in declaring him scrupulously honest in all his business affairs. Hypocrisy had no place in his make-up. A large concourse of people, especially old residents, attended his funeral, held in the Congregational Church. He was buried in the Old Cem-

etery." For children see eighth generation.



Charles I. Seeley, son of Malinda (Sowle) Seeley, was born Aug. 30, 1878 at Nashville, Mich.; was given away at the time of his mother's death, being but a babe, and was first taken by Eugene Cook of that town but was given away and adopted by E. F. Blake of Middleville, Mich., who brought him up, but when he was about 18 years of age he learned that the Blakes were not his natural parents and ran away to Butte, Montana, where he was called Charles I. Blake. Mrs. Seeley had other children, all dying in infancy.

- Peleg Sowle (3), a son of Peleg and Betsey (Warren) Sowle (some say adopted), born at Broadalbin, N. Y., April 18, 1815. He was the son of a carpenter and the grandson of an Atlantic sea captain. His parents were natives of Rhode Island and he was next to the youngest of a large family of children; the last to pass away. They were of long-lived, energetic, industrious stock and these characteristics were emphasized in the make-up of Mr. Soule. His parents died in Fulton County, N. Y., rising four-score years of age. In his youth he developed the practical eye of a mechanic and in the rural community where he was brought up he was frequently called upon to exercise this skill. Having mastered the trade of carpenter, he left home when but fourteen and struck out for himself. He was equipped with but two months of schooling, but with a knowledge of the use of tools and an abundance of ambition he was determined to succeed. He was married in 1855 in his own county to Miss Eliza A. Macomber and started in for domestic existence. He had erected a saw-mill in Fulton County which he operated for five years, but being dissatisfied with the venture he sold out for \$400, and in 1840 moved to Genesee County where he bought a farm and later procured 1140 acres which

he cultivated for five years. He sold this estate and purchased another farm comprising 204 acres near Batavia, N. Y., where he lived for three years.

At this period of history the West, and especially Illinois, was said to offer great advantages for young men, and Mr. Soule disposed of all of his property in the East and removed to McLean County, settling near Shirley in 1847. where he speculated in land. He also carried on farming and stock raising on a moderate scale. After ten years of activity there he again sold out and removed to Bloomington, Ill., where he bought \$11,000 worth of stock in the Phoenix Bank which was then one of the most prominent institutions in the town: and there he was soon a director of this financial repository. He continued his speculation in real estate, his transactions always proving successful. He soon purchased one of the best houses on Market Street where he resided till 1870, when he exchanged it for a 120-acre farm in Twin Grove, upon which he lived for a short time, then sold and bought back his former residence at a profit of \$2,500. After five years residence here he again traded it for a farm, to which he removed and occupied for seven years. At the end of this time he again returned to Bloomington and purchased a residence on East Jefferson Street; then, after two years, he purchased a house on the same thoroughfare, where he passed the remainder of his life. His almost constant exchange of property was the secret of his remarkable success. In such transactions he exhibited keen insight and almost prophetic anticipation when buying land. While he resided in Bloomington he never relinquished his farming and stockraising operations; and by his strict attention to his affairs with his good judgment his ventures were a great success.

For many years Peleg Soule was a familiar figure on the streets of Bloomington, being out in all weathers, and was cordially greeted by all who knew him. He was of medium stature and became somewhat stooping in advanced life. His bodily vigor was retained for a long term of years and when 85 he was remarkably active. Peleg Soule did not have children of his own but adopted William H. Cutler and Annie Strickland while he was living in New York. The former died several years ago but the daughter, the wife of William J. Steele, settled on a farm three miles east of Bloomington, presented to her by Mr. Soule. Mrs. Soule died several years previous to her husband and was buried in Fulton County, N. Y., the place of her birth, in the town of Oakfield, where they had lived in their younger days; and Mr. Soule was laid down beside her in a cement grave. For many years the Misses Roth, grand-nieces of Mr. Soule, had kept house for him.

Peleg Soule was a Republican always, but was genial and respectful toward those who differed from him in their political faith. At one time he was elected a justice of the peace, and to show his aversion to office, refused to qualify. His impulses were generous and he assisted many needy persons; a very generous entertainer to all who came to see him. While the Civil War was in progress he was a staunch supporter of the Union, and being too old to serve in the ranks and wishing to be represented, he hired a substitute for the entire duration of the campaign.

The life of Peleg Soule was of peculiar interest and deserves more attention here from the fact that his early advantages were so limited; he acquired a practical education and a fortune by his own exertion and became one of the leading and best known citizens of the state. While he was shrewd and financially keen, he possessed many estimable traits of character. He left an estate of from \$60,000 to \$75,000.

After making provisions for his adopted daughter the remainder of his estate was administered on and settled by Attorney Best, and after extensive advertising and correspondence, supplemented by much personal research, he collected the names of the numerous heirs and assigned to each their small share of the money. Learning of this search for the relatives of the deceased financier and anticipating the data assembled, the author was permitted to make copious abstracts from his note books and thus has salvaged much information that could not have been available.

This branch of the Soule family, descended from George Soule the Pilgrim, was an offshoot through Nathaniel Soule of Dartmouth and his wife Rose (Thorn). This Nathaniel and Rose had four children, Nathaniel, Jacob, Sylvanus and Miles. Concerning the first three we have found particulars; of the last, probably the youngest, but a bagatelle.

William Soule (1), a son of Sylvanus (1), born as early as 1690, was married twice and had issue by both wives. His first wife was JIMIMA BAKER, a daughter of Joseph and Martha Baker of Swansea, Mass., Aug. 17, 1733. She died before 1747, leaving two children mentioned in their mother's will. These were named Edward and Jimima Soule. Both sold land inherited from Joseph Baker through their mother. Before 1756 William Soule married 2d, Keziah Gifford, by whom he had a large family named as follows:

Edward Soule (1), the son of William Soule and Jimima Baker, presents a subject worthy of consideration. This is the first occurrence of this name in the Soule family and appears frequently in the Tiverton records. Whether he was married and had a family is not known. He was a grantee of a large tract of land in North Carolina in 1738 and is supposed to have made this locality his permanent home. See record of land grants in the account of the "Soule Families in the South." Born as early as 1734.

Jimima Soule (2), only daughter of William Soule and Jimima Baker, born before 1747 and mentioned in her mother's will and also with her brother Edward Soule in land sales, was married to her kinsman Daniel Baker and is supposed to have had issue. This marriage was of date "13th day, 2d mo., 1755" according to Quaker form. She was born as early as 1735 and was not more than twenty years of age when her mother died.

William Soule (1), as before mentioned, father of Joseph Soule and Charity Tripp who lived in Tiverton, R. I., and Westport, Mass., till 1802 and finally removed to Broadalbin, Fulton County, N. Y., continued his residence in Tiverton where he died a very aged man. He was living as late as 1819 when he was visited by his grandson from the West; belonged to a Quaker branch of the family and in every instance known his name was spelled "Soule;" while many of his descendants adopted the form "Sowle." He died at the home of his son, Job Sowle, the "miller," and the inventory of his estate was beautifully inscribed in the County Records seen by the author of this work. William Soule has been frequently confounded with another of the same name. the oldest son of George Soule 2d and his wife Deborah Soule. One was a "Tiverton man" and the other a "Dartmouth man." The name of the Tiverton William, he being a generation later than the Dartmouth William and farther removed from the partition of the "Soule Lands" formerly owned in common by George and Nathaniel Soules, sons of the Pilgrim, does not figure in the records; while the William Soule of Dartmouth often appended his name with that of Hannah, his wife,

Rew England Branch.

The Soules in Broadalbin, Montgomery County, New York, were from Massachusetts. The families in Dartmouth and Tiverton, though residents in two states, were often confounded in consequence of the location of their lands. They lived close to the borders and some of their farms lapped across the lines. In the public records the same persons were mentioned as "of Dartmouth" and "of Tiverton." However, there were two quite distinct settlements; one being on "Horse Neck" and the other at "Cranberry Neck."

This cluster of towns in Massachusetts and Rhode Island was the homeplace from which went forth numerous families westward to clear the land and establish new settlements; and their descendants have pushed still farther toward the Pacific Slope as pioneers who opened up the vast prairies and ushered in the thousands of families who have enriched the territories with an almost interminable embellishment of golden wheatfields and animated the landscape with vast herds of sleek cattle. A benevolent Providence has

employed various and often mysterious ways of distributing the inhabitants of the earth and the maintenance of the populations thereof; and not the least important of these methods is the inherent disposition to roam and discover new and distant lands. As the winds and streams are mediums for the dissemination of seeds that are borne afar to clothe the barren lands with forests, so have the nations of the earth produced an overflow that has proved a gracious medium for the extension of civilization and the elevation and enlightenment of mankind.

Deed dated Oct. 22, 1822, given by Joseph Soule, Jr., and his wife Rachel Allen to James Sowle, consideration \$250, conveying all right and title to their share to the estate, real and personal, of the late Joseph Sowle of Broadalbin, New York.

Article of agreement between Robert and James Sowle in which the former agrees to convey all of his right and title, being the one-tenth equal and undivided part of 99 acres formerly of the estate of Joseph Sowle now deceased of Broadalbin, the said Robert being one of rightful heirs of the said Joseph Sowle. This was dated April 7, 1823. Consideration \$150, one-half to be paid by the first January next with interest; the other half to be paid by first day of January, 1825. There was also written into the instrument a statement that upon the receipt by the said Robert of the principal and interest he should execute within one month a quit-claim of all his right and title aforesaid. The money seems to have been promptly paid and the deed was dated Dec. 24, 1824, signed by Robert Sowle and his wife Betsey to which they convey to James Sowle for \$150.

Another deed dated May 3, 1843 states that "Frederick Mills and his wife Abigail deeded to James Sowle that certain piece or parcel of land distinguished as the 'Widow Charity Sowle's thirds.'" There is nothing in this deed to show whose widow this Charity Sowle was, but we are safe in assuming that she was maiden-named Charity Tripp who was married to Joseph Sowle of Tiverton, R. I., Nov. 8, 1763.

Another paper found among the treasures of Mrs. Fox was headed "Survey for the heirs of Joseph Sowle, deceased, in partition of the widow's third April 16, 1830." The first parcel described was "Allotted to Peleg Sowle," the second piece "Allotted to Isaac Sowle," and the third section to Mary Allen; then the residue of said Lot No. 1 (the widow's thirds) is "Allotted to Jane Sowle," being the shares of Job Sowle, Charity Sowle, Sylvia Chase.

Probate Records.

William Sowle, a resident of Broadalbin, N. Y., died intestate Nov. 7, 1855. There were no letters testamentary or administration issue. Petition on file praying that the execution may issue against the estate of the deceased and recites that the decedent left surviving a widow and a daughter, his sole heir, but contains no names or place of residence. Of course we know that his wife's name was Sally Sowle. As William resided near, if not on, the homestead, he was widely known by his kindred.

William Sowle, before mentioned, was probably the oldest son and named in honor of his grandfather, William, son of Sylvanus Soule of Tiverton, R. I. It has been suggested that Joseph Sowle, head of the Broadalbin family, was twice married, there appearing a record of marriage, Joseph Soule of Dartmouth to Ruth Tripp, a sister of Charity. I think the record shows that Charity and Ruth were not sisters. One was the daughter of Francis Tripp and the other of Thomas Tripp; probably cousins.

Names of Legatees.

The following very important list of names of descendants of Joseph and Charity Sowle will afford the reader a fair estimate of the number in whose veins their blood was flowing at the time when they were collected: and these numerous families have continued multiplying, probably not in the same ratio, ever since this list was compiled. This number was a considerable contribution to the seven thousand estimated descendants of the Pilgrim ancestor, George Soule, since 1620; a bounteous harvest of human souls. Genealogically, this assembly of the names of the heirs of Peleg Sowle is of inestimable value and its discovery in the Surrogate's office was opportune and appreciated.

I have examined John Lowry under oath to me personally known, who says he is acquainted with the above-mentioned Benjamin and Abigail Simmans and knows them to be the persons described in and executed the within Instrument. I have examined the said Abigail separately and apart from her husband and she acknowledged that she executed the within Instrument freely without any fear or compulsion from her said husband. I do (therefore) Certify that I am satisfied that the said Benjamin Simmands and Abigail his wife who made the acknowledgment to me are the persons in and who executed the within Deed. Having examined the same and finding no material erasures, interlineations or obliterations excepting those noted do allow the same to be recorded. James McCarthy.

Tryntje DuBois, daughter of Huybartus and Cornelia (Blanshan) Du-Bois, born Oct. 21, 1753; died Oct. 24, 1739; was a sister of Lydia DuBois, wife of John Soule. She was married 1st, to Gosie Hermance, by whom issue; 2d, to Michael Phillips; 3d, to John DuBois. 

Pilgrim, the degree of relationship has not been ascertained with the assurance desired. This Benjamin Soule has been assigned a place as the son of Benjamin Soule senior, head of the family in Plympton, but he has been accounted for in another position. Again the Benjamin heading this branch has been published as a son of Jacob Soule and his wife Rebecca Gifford, and we shall follow this order.

Benjamin Soule (1), a son of Jacob (1) and Rebecca (Gifford) Soule, born in Dartmouth, Mass., Nov. 18, 1719, married Meribah Wait and had issue several children, among them the names that will follow. Their marriage was of date (intention Sept. 16, 1742) Nov. 26, 1742. He died Jan. 31, 1803. Meribah died Feb. 3, 1813. Children far as assured by record as follows:

- 1. Martha Soule, born in Dartmouth, Mass., Oct. 1, 1743; was married 9-26-1765 to Benjamin Davol, son of Peter and Susanna Davol, and probably went to Dutchess County, N. Y.
- 2. Patience Soule, born in Dartmouth, Mass., Jan. 30, 1745.
- 3. Benjamin Soule, born about 1750. Here we stand upon uncertain ground. Long search among the early records fails to find the date of this man's birth or to identify him as the son of Benjamin and Sarah Waite. A published statement reads: "He appears to be the Benjamin Soule of the adjoining town of Plympton, Mass., a soldier of the Revolution in Captain Thomas Loring's company on the Lexington alarm, April 19, 1775. He was also in Captain Samson's company, Brigadier Joseph Cushman's regiment, in Rhode Island in 1776. In the census of 1790, Benjamin Soule of Plympton was reported to have two sons under sixteen years of age and two females in his family; and this statement is corroborated by the vital records of Plympton. He was the only Benjamin Soule reported in New England, and there were none in New York at that time." According to family tradition he went to New Milford, Conn., and died in Binghampton, New York.

John Soule (1), the reputed son of Benjamin, born "about" 1770-5, settled in New Milford, Conn., where he married Esther Lane by whom issue as will presently appear.

John Soule (2), a son of John (1) and Esther (Lane) Soule, born in Kent, Conn., Jan. 7, 1802, died there in November, 1894. He was educated in the common schools and learned the trade of blacksmith at which he wrought, in connection with farming, all of his active life. He settled on Long Mountain, New Milford, in the first house south of the Old Abel Canfield Place, in 1827.

He married Jan. 19, 1826, LUCINDA WHITEHEAD, born in Kent, July 11, 1803. died June 18, 1876. She was the daughter of Hezekiah and Olive (Buckley) Whitehead. His last days were passed in the village at the homes of his daughters. Mrs. Titus and Mrs. Losee. The children in this family were named as follows:


Turney Soule (1), son of John (2) and Lucinda (Whitehead) Soule, born in New Milford, Conn., Oct. 10, 1831; married Nov. 11, 1856 to Alosia B. FAIRCHILD, and eleven years subsequently, in 1867, he moved into the village where the firm of T. Soule & Co., builders and contractors, was formed, and this business was supplemented with extensive dealing in grain, feed, etc. He was also one of the prominent tobacco men in the Connecticut valley and from 1873 to 1902 was actively interested in tobacco packing. Several of the village streets were opened up by him and to a large extent built by this firm.

While Mr. Soule was a man who never sought public official preferment he was nevertheless honored by his fellow-citizens with many positions of trust. He represented the town in the state legislature in 1897; served on the Board of Relief and Board of Assessors; was a director of the New Milford Water Company and chairman of the New Milford Fire Association for many years. He was one of the Board of Directors of the Center Cemetery Association from 1885 until his death, serving as its president since 1907.

He was elected a corporator of the New Milford Savings Bank in 1879, a director in 1881, vice-president in 1896 and president of the bank in 1905, which office he held at the time of his demise. For many years he was active in the affairs of the First Ecclesiastical Society and faithful to the duties required of him.

Turney Soule passed away May 27, 1922, aged 90 years and 7 months.

"There passed out of this community one of that small group of native sons who, during their entire life-time, lived in this town and built up its life and institutions by their splendid devotions and their tireless industry. For the first seventeen years of his life he remained on the homestead farm, acquiring

in the meantime a common school education and laying the foundation for that manhood which has so characterized the old New England types of which he was a worthy representative. His choice of a carpenter's trade followed, with a service of three and a half years as an apprentice. As a contractor and builder he was to become one of the men to whom New Milford owes much of its upbuilding.

"Mr. Soule's death removed from the community one whose life was an example of the old-fashioned virtues which cannot be neglected by the people with impunity. As the pastor said of him in his prayer at the funeral: 'His life was characterized by simplicity, animated by industry and crowned with success. He was true to his friends, careful of relatives, devoted to his family and was esteemed by his fellow-citizens. He lived a long life and lived it well, enjoyed many of its emoluments, and never strayed from the path of integrity and uprightness.'

"The funeral services were held at the family residence fronting the New Milford Green. The wealth of flowers were a generous evidence of the love and esteem in which he was held, and the eloquent words spoken by the clergyman who conducted the services were appreciated by all who had known the deceased townsman. His pall-bearers were representative citizens. The

interment was in the Center Cemetery."

Mr. Soule was survived by several children and grandchildren. See his excellent portrait. Children's names follow:

- II. GEORGE T. SOULE, born Sept. 12, 1864; married May 18, 1887 DAISY M. WILL, born Jan. 25, 1869, and has two children: Mildred Soule, born in New York City, May 31, 1888; Marian A. Soule, born in New York City, Dec. 26, 1893; was married to Frank W. Adams Nov. 29, 1920.

David Edwin Soule, son of John Soule (2), was born March 4, 1838, at New Milford. He was educated in the district schools of Long Mountain and attended private school two winters. He learned the trade of carpenter and worked from the age of seventeen to twenty-three at this vocation. He enlisted in August, 1862, from New Milford, in Company H, Nineteenth Connecticut Regiment of Volunteer Infantry (afterward the Second Connecticut Volunteer Heavy Artillery), for three years. After assisting in raising the full company and at the time they were ready to go to Camp Dutton in Litchfield, upon the earnest solicitation of the town officers he consented to raise a company for a nine-months' regiment then being formed in the state, and had received permission from Governor Buckingham to do so. After remaining two days behind his company for this purpose he decided to join them and was welcomed with great delight by his comrades. After drilling

several weeks the regiment was ordered to Washington, and Soule went as a corporal. The regiment received a most kindly greeting all along the Nauga-At New York City the soldiers were transferred by transports tuck Valley. to New Jersey and thence proceeded by rail by way of Philadelphia to Balti-They spent an anxious night in the railroad station at Baltimore, having no arms. The regiment went to Washington in the morning, and for a year and a half was on picket duty about Alexandria and in the forts. were transferred to the Second Connecticut Heavy Artillery Regiment, making that organization eighteen hundred in number. Mr. Soule had charge of rebuilding the powder magazine that had blown up at Fort Lyon, having one hundred and fifty men assigned for the work. He was made sergeant, then color sergeant of his company. He was offered a position under Burke, the civil engineer, under whom he worked at Fort Lyon, but he preferred to remain with his company. His regiment joined the army of the Potomac in May, 1864, and took part in the battle of Cold Harbor. He was in the series of marches and engagements around and south of Petersburg to the Welden railroad, and then returned to City Point to embark for Washington, in July, in order to drive the rebel General Early and his command from the borders of that city. The regiment marched through Maryland, across the Potomac at White's Ferry, close behind Early, through Loudoun County to the Shenandoah Valley, thence back to Washington, to Frederick City, Harper's Ferry, Clifton Heights, near Berryville, in the Shenandoah Valley, where it remained until the battle of Winchester, September 19, 1864. After the Shenandoah Valley campaign the regiment returned to Harper's Ferry and Washington, and thence went to City Point, again to form part of the forces at Petersburg. At this time Mr. Soule was commissioned by Governor Buckingham as second lieutenant and assigned to Company F for duty in February, 1865. regiment took part at Appomattox, and he was one of the first to march into Petersburg on April 3. following General Lee's army in its retreat from that city to Appomattox. "One of the happiest days of my life," said he, "was the ninth of April, when we got news of Lee's surrender, and even now I can see the different demonstrations of joy of the officers and soldiers when the news was confirmed. The cheering, crying, throwing of caps and anything else in the air, the firing of blank cartridges from the different batteries, and the general expression of joy that went up from thousands and tens of thousands within hearing, all are still ringing in my ears." Lieutenant Soule was in all the battles in which his regiment took part, except one skirmish, and enjoyed good health throughout the war, escaping both wounds and disease. He was mustered out in September, 1865. At the present time (1910) Lieutenant Soule is the only commissioned officer who served in the Civil War, now living in New Milford.

At the close of the war he resumed work at his trade. In 1865-66 he engaged in business on his own account in partnership with his brother Turney Soule, as builders and lumber dealers. Their place of business was on West Street, alongside the railroad. The firm name was T. Soule and Brother, and they were very successful, building a large share of the new houses and business blocks in New Milford. The firm also dealt in building material, flour and feed. George H. Lines became a partner in 1881, and the firm went into the

tobacco business and had a warehouse. Fred and George H. Lines were admitted to the firm in 1881, and in 1884 David E. Soule withdrew and was a partner of Nicholas Staub under the firm name of Soule & Staub, in the hardware business. David E. Soule bought and packed tobacco from 1873 to 1896, when he resumed the business of builder and contractor and continued until 1905. After the great fire of 1902 in New Milford, he built many of the present business blocks, planned and erected the New England Hotel. He had contracts amounting to \$100,000 for one man, Noble Bennitt, on a single street. Since 1905 he has been in the tobacco business again. He bought \$78,000 worth of tobacco in 1908, and \$410,000 worth in 1909. He built his own residence in New Milford in 1881.

He has traveled extensively in this country and he spent part of the years 1893-94 in Europe in sight-seeing and business. He was a director of the First National Bank of New Milford from 1878 to 1894. He was a Republican in politics, and voted for Lincoln both times, but in later years had been a Democrat. He has been chairman of the board of assessors of the town and has been selectman for several years. He was county commissioner of Litchfield County for four years. He was a member of St. Peter's Lodge, No. 21, Free Masons, of New Milford; of Ousatonic Chapter, Royal Arch Masons, No. 33; of Hamilton Commandery, Knights Templar, of Bridgeport; of Pyramid Temple, Mystic Shrine, of Bridgeport; of Good Shepherd Lodge, No. 33, Odd Fellows, of New Milford; of Upton Post, No. 14, Grand Army of the Republic, and had the honor of naming the Post and of being commander for eight years; he was department inspector of the State for the Grand Army in 1891.

Sixth Generation. CHILDREN OF DAVID E. AND SARAH SULLIVAN SOULE.

Frank Ellsworth Soule, born Nov. 29, 1871; married GWENDOLYN BEERS of Bridgeport, Conn., by whom two children whose names will appear presently. He was for some time a merchant in New Milford, a dealer in books, stationery and other useful articles. He was employed in the State Treasurer's office. Hartford, Conn., as assistant clerk under Marvin H. Sanger, treasurer during the term of Governor Luzon B. Morris, 1893-94. In April, 1915, Mr. Soule was appointed Chief Bank Examiner of the State of Connecticut Banking Department, by Everett I. Sturges, Bank Commissioner, and held this position until Dec. 31, 1919, when he resigned and entered the public practice as certified public accountant, having received his commission from Governor Marcus H. Holcomb in 1918. In March his practice was consolidated with that of Hadfield and Rothwell under the firm name "Hadfield, Rothwell and Soule," certified public accountants, with offices in the Hartford, Connecticut Trust Company building in the city of Hartford and First National Bank building, Bridgeport, Conn. He is a member of the following Masonic bodies: St. Peter's Lodge No. 21, F. and A. M. of New Milford; Ousatonic Chapter, Royal Arch Masons No. 33 of New Milford; Crusader Commandery No. 10, Knights Templar of Danbury; Pyramid Temple, Mystic Shrine, Bridgeport; Dimaryp Court, Royal Order of Jesters No. 66 of Bridgeport; Lafayette Consistory 32d degree, Ancient Accepted Scottish Rite Masons of Bridgeport.

Richmond, where he is assigned as Pay Clerk; and it is a singular coincidence that the Paymaster himself should be named Benjamin Soule Gantz, but descended from a Maine branch of the Soule family.
- II. HELEN DIANA SOULE, born Aug. 7, 1907; attending the Hillside School at Norwalk, Conn.
- 2. Florence Alena Soule, born Sept. 27, 1876. Since 1911-12, she has been secretary to the Compensation Commissioner, Frederick M. Williams, in Waterbury, Conn.
- 3. William F. Soule, born May 7, 1879, is employed by a construction company in Minnesota. He married (first) Bessie Booth, by whom one son. Dorothy Soule, daughter of William and Sadie Goodrich, was married to George Newberry of Augusta, Ga., in June, 1924.

About an Ebenezer Soule.

Mrs. Baker says she had always heard that Ebenezer Soule, the one whose nativity has been a mystery, was born in Vermont and his wife, Sarah Oakley, born in Dutchess County, N. Y. He died when in middle life after eleven children were born, and she was married to Jonathan Wilson. She died Sept. 30, 1852, aged 72 years, and her funeral services were held in the Manning Christian Church in Barre, Orleans County, N. Y. She was buried a short distance west of Clarendon and an inscribed monument stands at her grave.

Drusilla Soule, daughter of Ebenezer and Sarah Oakley Soule, born in Dutchess County, N. Y., in 1809, was married, first, to URIAH TIPPLE, a son of Solomon Tipple, born in Cooperstown, N. Y., and lived in Chatham, N. Y., where he died in 1845 and she was married to Joseph Boots in 1849. She died April 23, 1860, aged 51 years. Her children were named William Henry, Solomon, Judith and Uriah, born 1833, 1835, 1837, 1839. She was buried in Holly—Hillside Cemetery, N. Y.—beside Joseph Boots.

Descendants of Jonathan Soule.

Westport Branch.

ORE time and expense has evidently been put forth in research to trace the lineage of the Jonathan Soules whose names appear in the New England and Western records, than in the investigation of any line of descent from the common ancestor; and some of the most experienced genealogists who were connected with branches of the Soules. after unwearied search covering several years, have frankly acknowledged that they had been left in doubt concerning the proper place to assign some of them. The following is all that has been procured by the compiler during the many years of devotion to this family history. So far as public records have been found, searchers have stood upon solid ground and such data as will be herewith recorded has been principally gleaned from such sources and family Bibles. Family traditions have been carefully considered and what seemed plausible has been conserved. Some of the theories advanced may be presented in the last analysis. Mrs. Alden, a genealogist of long experience and good repute, says: "The Jonathan Soule who married Lydia Sisson is an unknown quantity." We shall accept him for what he is worth—or seems to be worth.

Jonathan Soule (1), assumed to have been the son of William, the son of George Soule and wife Deborah, was born in Dartmouth, Mass., Dec. 10, 1710. He married Lydia Sisson, daughter of Richard Sisson who mentioned her in his will in 1744 as "Lydia Soule" Feb. 12, 1736. His residence was in Westport, Mass., where he made his will in 1779 which contains the names of his children as follows: Joseph, Jonathan, James, David, Jethrow, Susanna, Thankful, Mary and Earle. Some of these were married and had families whose line of descent has been well established. Date of his death not known.

Joseph Soule (1), the eldest son of Jonathan (1) and Lydia (Sisson) Soule, was born in Dartmouth, Mass., where he married 1st, MARY DAVIS, a daughter of Benjamin Davis, April 8, 1736, and her father, in his will of probate 1749-50, mentioned his grandchildren Samuel, Rebecca and Hannah, "children of my daughter Mary Soule late deceased." Joseph Soule probably married three times. We know he married Content Wood June 22, 1772 and she was mentioned in his will in 1777, as his wife. This Joseph was a pioneer settler in Danbury, Vermont, and somewhat associated with the Wesson Soule branch of the family that removed to that town about the same time. He was a townsman of considerable prominence, was moderator of the municipal elections and sent as delegate to conventions during the strenuous days preceding the opening of the Revolution. He was a Justice of the Peace, owned a mill in town and was a man of good repute among his contemporaries. He mentioned his children named Joseph, Eliza, Elizabeth and Perry. Gave his homestead to son Joseph and enjoins him to care for his grandparents. fate of his children by Mary Davis is not known. They probably did not remove to Vermont. We shall assign them a place in the family record with his other children.

2. Jonathan Soule (2), the second son of Jonathan (1) and Lydia (Sisson) Soule, was born 1730, and was twice married; first, to ELIZABETH GIFFORD, who seems to have been the mother of his children. I suppose she died somewhere in New York but have not learned where. He married 2d, July 7, 1778, when he was 68 years of age, BATHSHEBA RUSSELL, daughter of William and Elizabeth Russell. In some of the public records the children were called "Children of Jonathan and Bathsheba Soule;" this probably because she was step-mothering them. She may have given birth to a few extra ones to fill the quota. He was mentioned in his father's will in 1779.

According to family tradition this Jonathan Soule was a sea-captain who made many voyages to foreign ports and was finally taken prisoner by the British Naval forces and confined in Dartmoor Prison, that vile den where so many sea-faring men of the Soule family suffered. After the Revolution he removed from his home in Dartmouth, Mass., to near Poughkeepsie, N. Y., and settled as a farmer on a 300-acre tract of land on Gore Hill, north-east of the small village where there was but one store owned by a Dutchman named Van Klec. He afterwards settled in Clinton, Dutchess County, N. Y., where he was recorded as a member of the Medical Association in 1798; being an old-time herbalist doctor. This Jonathan Soule had been brought up in a Ouaker family and was many times mentioned in the records of the Society. He was chosen by his brother James Soule as executor of his will and made guardian of his son Jonathan Soule. Acting in this capacity for the widow, Iemima Soule, he conveyed several parcels of land between 1789 and 1793, to the town of Saratoga and to Jonathan Griffin, containing from 25 to 60 acres, all of these comprised within the Saratoga Patent. He disposed of his extensive farm and out-breaks, the transactions being witnessed by his wife, Bathsheba Soule. She finally sold her right of dower and having been married again. left that section and returned to the home of her childhood. She was married 2d to JEREMIAH D. TRIPP of Westport, Mass., Nov. 1840, and in the record was styled "Bathsheba (Russell) Soule, widow of Jonathan Soule of Clinton, Dutchess County, N. Y." She must have been a well-seasoned widow when she was last secured by wedlock. The children of this Jonathan Soule were named in the "Sisson's Bible" as follows: David, Joseph, William, Jonathan, Lydia and Mary. These have been recorded and each will be treated personally in turn.

I. DAVID SOULE, son of Jonathan Soule of Clinton, N. Y., born about 1785 and died June 11, 1860, aged 75 years. He married Jan. 2, 1811, HANNAH HALLOCK, and spent his life principally in Clinton, N. Y. The Quaker records contain his name as receiving "Certificates of Clearance" when moving from one place to another and the Dutchess County records contain his name as conveying lands. If he had children their names were not found.

II. Dr. Jonathan Soule, a son of Jonathan of Clinton, N. Y., was a member of the Dutchess Medical Society Nov. 10, 1813. He had studied medicine at some local institute and was a young practitioner when he died Sept. 11, 1815, in his 25th year. Among the Jonathan Soules that seemed to abound in this branch of the Soule family I had supposed that he was identical with the Jonathan who

was head of the Duanesburg branch, but the records did not confirm my assumption, for that man was born in 1761.

- III. WILLIAM SOULE, a son of Jonathan of Clinton, N. Y., married but his wife's name not revealed. His name appears frequently in the records.
- IV. Joseph Soule, a son of Jonathan of Clinton, N. Y., died Nov. 9, 1865, aged 71 years. He was married but his wife's name is not known. No mention of children.
- v. Lydia Soule, a daughter of Jonathan of Clinton, N. Y., born Oct. 5, 1795; was married to Platt Sutherland, June 8, 1815 and died June 25, 1885, aged 92 years. She had several children, the records of whom follow. He was born May 3, 1795 and died May 4, 1861, aged 62 years and 2 days.
 - (1) MARY SUTHERLAND, born Nov. 8, 1817, was married to Edwin Mabbet; died Nov. 26, 1845, aged 28 years 18 days. He died Nov. 12, 1872; married Jan. 24, 1838. Issue:
 - (a) Catherine Mabbett, died Dec. 27, 1862, aged 19 years.
 - (b) JAMES P. MABBETT.
 - (2) WILLIAM SUTHERLAND, born Oct. 24, 1822; married ELMINIA R. STEPHENS April 3, 1861; died March 25, 1893 Brockton, N. Y., aged 70 years. There were two sons. William I. Sutherland married in New York City and had two children.

James Soule (4), a son of Jonathan (1) and Lydia (Sisson) Soule, born in Dartmouth, Mass., Aug. 12, 1742; was married first to MARY WHITE, intention recorded in Dartmouth, March 6, 1765, ceremony performed April 13, 1765. She was born April 4, 1756 and was the mother of five children. She died in 1777 and he married 2d (intention recorded at Nine Partners, Dutchess County, N. Y., Sept. 1781) in the Quaker Meeting House there Sept. 27, 1781 to JIMIMA Russell, daughter of Tristram and Jimima Coffin of Nantucket, Mass., and of a distinguished Quaker family. She was appointed an Elder in the Quaker church in Eastern, Oct., 1785. James Soule died in 1786 and she was again left a widow and was married the third time to JESSE ARNOLD in 1790. was the mother of three children by Soule-James, Robert and Hannah. had been the widow of ROBERT RUSSELL whose estate was divided in November. 1785, between her and Benjamin Russell. Her first husband was a brother of Bathsheba Russell, wife of James Soule's brother, Jonathan Soule. She had a daughter by Jesse Arnold and her name appears in the old Bible of James Soule as Lavina Arnold. In his will, probated in 1763, Tristram Coffin of Nantucket, Mass., mentions as one of his minor children his daughter Jimima. James Soule and wife Jimima had a certificate of removal from Nine Partners, Dutchess County, N. Y., with his children Lavina, Deborah, Lydia, Eunice and Hannah, April, 1783 and removed to Saratoga (Easton) where they settled on a farm called the "Potter Place." He was a farmer and "hatter," making the conventional "broad-brims" for his Quaker brethren. He made his will March 24, 1785, and was probated April 10, 1786. An abstract of this testament was published in a book of New York wills and his name was spelled "Sowle." See forward for abstracts.

Will of James Soule.

"JAMES SOULE, Hatter, of Saratoga, Albany County, New York. After my just debts are paid out of my dues, I give my wife Jimima, my best bed, bedstead and cord with full set of furniture for Winter and Summer, togather with what interest she has at Nantucket, both real and personal, free to her own disposal; also the use and improvement of my homestead farm, called 'The Potter Place,' for ten years, if she remain my widow, to enable her to bring up my children that are under age; also the use of all my household goods until I shall otherwise order, my meaning is that if my wife shall remain my widow after ten years, for her to have the choice of either room in my now

dwelling-house and the profit of thirty acres of the East end of my homestead farm, so long as she remains my widow and I desire her to accept the above gifts in lieu of her thirds or dower; to my son Jonathan the two thirds of one half of what estate I may have left, to be delivered unto him when he arrives at the age of twenty-one years: to my sons James and Robert, the three fifths of one half of my estate on every account in like manner as the above gifts to Jonathan; to my daughters Deborah, Lydia, Eunice and Hannah, each an equal quantity and quality of household goods as I have already given to their sister Levinah; also to each of them a cow to be given them when they arrive at the age of eighteen, out of my household goods or other estate to be left to the discretion of my Executors. To my five daughters, Levinah, Deborah, Lydia, Eunice and Hannah, the other half of my estate exclusive of all particular gifts to be equally divided among them and to be delivered to all that has arrived at lawful age. When my son Ionathan arrives at lawful age and in like manner as it becomes clear of other gifts my intent is that my wife have the use of all my live stock for ten years if she continues my widow, to be left to the discretion of my Executors whether to give them up to her as she may need or to demand them for division; Also my widow to have all my provision both harvested and growing, for the use of my family; To my two sons Jonathan and James my guns. I make my brother Jonathan Sowle, Guardian to all my children under age; also sole Executor, authorizing him to take a deed or deeds as circumstances of my land may need; also to sell, dispose, give, deed for to settle my estate for my children's benefit. Dated March 24, 1785. Witnesses Gideon Mead, Asa Brown, of the Saratoga District, Yeomen; Rebecca Leggett. Proved April 10, 1786."

After long and persistent search, comprising advertising and investigation in several states; with correspondence with the custodians of the probate records and registry of deeds in several counties, the compiler was fortunate in getting in touch with representatives of the branches of this old Quaker family and the result has been realized by connecting in very satisfactory arrangement the extensive pedigree as herein published; and those surviving who bear the name or who were maternally descended should feel especially grateful for the permanent preservation of their ancestral history and genealogy. Some of these Soules and kindred were buried at Crumb Elbow, near Poughkeepsie, where there are monuments. Dates of all at Lithgow, Dutchess County, N. Y. Possibly some were interred at Millbrook, same county.

Henry Soule (1), a son of Jonathan (1) and Lydia (Sisson) Soule, born in Dartmouth, Mass., May 1, 1743; married BARBARA COTTRELL and settled in Connecticut, probably at Newport, as his children's births were recorded there. David Soule (1), third son of Jonathan and Lydia (Sisson) Soule, born in Dartmouth, Mass., 1754, married Hannah White, sister of Mary, the first wife of his brother James, Oct. 23, 1777, and was a seaman during the trouble-some days of the Revolution. He made his will Oct. 31, 1778 and gave his honored father and mother 400 silver dollars. He also mentions his three sisters. Susanna Russell, Thankful Soule and Mary Tripp; his three brothers, Joseph, Jonathan and James. He was about to make a voyage to sea and seems to have been moved by some premonition to dispose of his estate. He had no legal heir but made provision for one in case of birth. He was reported to have been taken by pirates off the coast of Virginia and never returned. A posthumous child was born after his departure and named Sarah Soule, Jan. 21, 1779, who was married to Adam Gifford Sept. 20, 1801.
- 6. Susanna Soule (4), second daughter of Jonathan (1) and Lydia (Sisson) Soule, was the wife of DAVID RUSSELL of Dartmouth, to whom married Oct. 26, 1750, and was mentioned in the wills of her father and brother. She was the mother of several children and her descendants have figured actively in the affairs of the country. The author's grand-aunt was one of them.
- 7. Thankful Soule (3), third daughter of Jonathan and Lydia (Sisson) Soule, was married to ABNER KIRBY and went to Maine. See names of children.
- 8. Jethro Soule (2), fourth son of Jonathan and Lydia (Sisson) Soule, was born in Dartmouth, Mass.; married Sylvia Ricketson, published Oct. 14, 1789, ceremony Dec. 25, 1789.

sisting of several children but the records are deficient.

Married Jennie —— and has a son. Earl B. Soule is not married. Maude Soule was married to —— McRedman and lives in Boston. Son, Ernest Soule McRedman. Frank Edmond Soule was living in North Adams, Mass., unmarried.

(2) Alfred Asa Soule, resides in Los Angeles, Cal., and has a daughter there who was married to FREDERICK WOOL.

 MARY SOULE was married to Isaiah Smith of Phoenix, N. Y., and died without issue.

3 Mestport, Mass., Fragment.

From a letter written by Capt. John Weston of Westport, Mass., in 1913 when he was 88 years of age, he stated that nearly all of his life had been passed on the sea and hence he knew but little about his mother's folk, the Soule families of that town. He stated that John Soule, brother of his mother, removed to Maine and that, according to a letter written by him in 1827, he was postmaster in Vassalboro, in that State. He had a daughter, Duesbury Soule. Lydia S. Bryant, whose mother was a daughter of Nathaniel Soule and a cousin to Captain Weston, has written that her uncle, John Soule, was a very religious man. Miss Bryant also wrote that Duesbury Soule, who was the wife of Seneca Wadsworth, was buried in Duxbury, as also a daughter, Celena Wadsworth. Capt. John Weston forwarded the family record of Nathaniel Soule as given below.

Soules, New Marlborough, Mass.

APT. MOSES SOULE, son of Isaac of Middleton, baptized April 2, 1738 in Pembroke, Mass., was a resident of New Marlborough, Mass., for many years, and his children were evidently born there. His wife was Eleanor Williams. He left a military record for service during the Revolution equalled by few. From the Army Records at Washington, D. C., we have extracted the following: "He was Lieut. in command of a company of minute men in Col. John Fellows' regt., which marched April 21, 1775, in response to the alarm of April 19, 1775; service 17 days; company served to May 7, 1775; also Capt. Col. Fellows' regt.; list of officers, dated Roxbury Camp, May 23, 1775; ordered in Provincial Congress, at Watertown, June 7, 1775; that commission be delivered said officers; a receipt for the commissions is dated Camp at Roxbury, June 10, 1775, and signed by Col. Fellows; also Capt. Col. Fellows (8th) regt.; return of officers for rations between May 28, 1775 and July 3, 1775, dated Roxbury; also muster roll dated Aug. 1, 1775; engaged May 8, 1775; service 3 months, a day; also company return dated Oct. 7, 1775; also Captain 6th Co., Col. Asa Whitcomb's regt.; muster rolls dated Camp Ticonderoga, Nov. 27, 1776; appointed Jan. 1, 1776; reported discharged (also given resigned) Oct. 1, 1776, and was succeeded by Capt. Noah Allen." Two, if not three, of his sons were in the army during the war of the Revolution, as will appear presently.

Captain Soule's wife released her dower in land conveyed by her husband in New Marlborough, Mass., Aug. 18, 1779. He conveyed land there at various times. Deeds of land from the Tax Collector of New Marlborough and "the 11,000 acres" (now in Sandisfield) Dec. 3, 1782. Moses Soule of Schanaus Creek, Montgomery County, N. Y., conveyed land in New Marlborough, Dec. 29, 1786. Dec. 3, 1782, he received deeds of land from the Tax Collector of New Marlborough and the 11,000 acres (now in Sandisfield, Mass.). Administration on his estate was granted to Isaac Soule in New York

April 4, 1796. Children of Moses and Eleanor Soule as follows:

He enlisted in New Marlborough, Mass., May 8, 1775 or in Roxbury from the former town, and served as fifer under Capt. Noah Allen, Col. Fellows, for eight months in Mass. Militia. Order for bounty coat or its equivalent in money dated Camp at

Dorchester, Nov. 1, 1775; also fifer, Capt. Noah Allen's (Late Capt. Soule's) company, Col. Asa Whitcomb's regt.; muster roll dated Camp at Ticonderoga, Nov. 27, 1776; enlisted Nov. 18, 1775; also list of men raised to serve in the Continental Army, as returned by Capt. Oliver Lyman and Capt. Joseph Cook: residence New Marlborough; engaged for town of Northampton; joined Capt. Noah Allen's company, Col. Edward Wigglesworth's regt.; also list of men mustered by Thomas Newhall, Muster Master for Worcester County: Capt. Allen's company, Col. Wigglesworth's regt.; mustered April 19, 1777; term 3 years. He was Fife-Major of company, Col. Calvin Smith's regt.: in Continental Army pay accounts for service from Mar. 1, 1777 to Dec. 31, 1779: reported promoted to sergeant April 1, 1779; muster rolls for March and May, 1778, dated at Valley Forge; also muster roll for June, 1778, dated Camp Greenwich and sworn to at Camp Stamford; also fifer same company and regiment. He served under different commands till 1781, being at Providence part of the time. He was in the Continental Army from Jan. 1, 1780 to Dec. 31, 1781, in the 6th regt. He was commissioned Ensign April 2, 1781; the original document being on file with his pension application in Washington. in which he was styled "Charles Soule, Gentleman," and signed by "His Excellency Thomas McKeen Esq., President of Congress of the United States of America at Philadelphia, the 18th of October, 1781, and in the sixth year of our Independence." Endorsed on the back, "Headquarters Newburg, Dec. 4th, 1782. I hereby certify that Ensign Soule has obtained permission to resign his commission in the Army of the United States. By command of His Excellency C. D. Humphreys, Aide de Camp." In his descriptive list taken in 1781, his age was given as 19 years; stature, 5 feet 8 inches; complexion. dark; hair, brown; eyes, blue; residence, New Marlborough; rank, Sergeant, Enlisted during the war. In 1820 he gave a schedule of his property as, "40 acre of poor frosty land" etc., and states his occupation was farming but that he had never had good health since he left the army and "for the last two years had not done one month's work on account of rheumatism." He then had in his family wife Chloe, aged 35 years July 11, 1820, in poor health: daughter Eleanor, aged 9 years; Lucretia, aged 1 year. He died in Oneonta. Otsego County, N. Y., July 3, 1831, leaving no widow but had four surviving children who applied for arrears of pension due in 1856. His application was made March 18, 1818, immediately after the pension law was passed, and his certificate April 13, 1819, when he resided at Scott, Cortland County, N. Y. From the records quoted it seems that he was twice married, but the full maiden name of his wife Chloe has not been found. By his first wife he had two sons. Daniel and Joseph. See forward for children.

Eleanor Soule, eldest daughter of Moses and Eleanor Soule, born in Pembroke or New Marlborough, Mass., April 18, 1764, was married to ORIGEN BRIGHAM, son of Francis and Phoebe (Ward) Brigham, who was a physician and surgeon in the army in the Revolution, and died at Schoharie, N. Y., without issue.

Bildad Soule, son of Moses and Eleanor Williams Soule, born in New Marlborough, or Pembroke, Mass., Sept. 17, 1766. He was also a soldier during the Revolution, having enlisted when a mere lad. He was a private

in Capt. Enos Porter's company, Col. Jacob Gerrish's regt., guards; enlisted July 7, 1778; discharged Nov. 18, 1778; service 4 months, 14 days; regiment detached from Berkshire County Militia to guard stores at Springfield for six months from July 1, 1778. He was a drummer in Capt. John Collins' company, Col. John Ashley's (Berkshire) regt.; entered service July 19, 1779; discharged Aug. 27, 1779; service 1 month, 9 days; company marched to Connecticut under command of Lieut.-Col. Powell. Also pay roll for six months men raised by the town of New Marlborough for service in the Continental Army during 1780; marched to camp July 3, 1780; discharged Dec. 3, 1780; service 5 months, 6 days, travel, 92 miles, included. In a return made by Brig.-Gen. Patterson, he was reported to have passed muster, dated Camp Totoway, Oct. 25, 1780. For children see forward.




AMUEL WHITE SOULE, a son of John Soule, a master mariner who married a lady named White, while visiting his kindred down in Maine, sojourning in the Sandy River Valley, was introduced to a lady, ELIZABETH SOULE, daughter of William and Clarissa (Goodwin)

Soule of Avon, Me., otherwise called Bettie, and as sure as you live he married her, and thus two currents of blood springing from the same fountain-head commingled in their posterity—of whom there was a whole quiver full. Samuel Soule was born in 1785 and was married Nov. 3, 1827. His wife was born in Avon, Maine, in 1805. For reasons unknown this couple removed to Canada where they sat down as farmers for a few years; then crossed the borders and were permanently established in Michigan. He died July 26, 1867. Author's Note.

HE problematical and perplexing traditions concerning two branches of the Soule family each headed by an Ebenezer, has caused more trouble and persistent investigation than any other obscure and tangled genealogical skein encountered during the author's researches, and notwithstanding the many starting-points and angles from which

the subject has been approached and the evidences employed—the evidences necessary to establish the relationship between the two branches—the veil remains closely drawn and the author must, though with feelings of humiliation and defeat, discontinue the pursuit and publish such fragments and disconnected traditions as were found. That there was some close and intimate affinity between the families of Judge Ebenezer Soule of Hillsdale, N. Y., and the Soules in Berkshire County, Mass., there are sufficient reasons for believing, traditionary and otherwise. Several surviving members of this branch distinctly remember having heard their elders when sitting around their firesides converse about Tyringham, Sheffield, Great Barrington and Washington: these traditions were verified by finding in the Register Office of the County in which those towns were situated, conveyances of land between members of both families in which the towns where each lived were mentioned. From land transactions recorded in Columbia County, N. Y., in which Hillsdale is situated, it is evident that families representing both branches were living in intimate association there for many years. Moreover the same Christian names prevailed in both families. That name "Ebenezer" in the Soule families has proved to be a strong connecting link in the genealogical chain in several instances—and is a title to be conjured with. For four generations in this family connection this hopeful biblical appellation has been retained.

The family tradition connecting the Berkshire branch with Vermont lends another interesting feature to the inquiry. Ebenezer Soule, the head of the Berkshire family, married SARAH OAKLEY of Vermont and there was a record of the transaction published in a gazeteer and seen by the author of this work. How did he happen to find his wife among the Green Mountains? We know that Rowland Soule, an uncle of Ebenezer Soule of Hillsdale, N. Y., was in St. Albans, Vt., in 1790; and it should be remembered that Mary Soule of Savannah, N. Y., said her grandfather, another Rowland Soule, was born in Vermont. The names Ebenezer, Rowland and Howland have been perpetuated in several branches of the family—until they became unfashionable. This whole group were from Dutchess County, N. Y. We must leave this fascinating inquiry for those to adjust who find sources of information of which we

Souls of Wales, Mass.

An English Family.



ARIOUS theories have been advanced respecting the origin and history of this branch of the ancient family descended from the Soles of England. One astute lawyer has assumed that they were derived from that Major William Soule, who, though a New England

man, removed from Spencertown, New York to Vermont after the Revolution, being an ardent Royalist; but this assumption was far-fetched and unwarranted. It was long ago published that George Soule, the Pilgrim, was the ancestor, with a few unimportant exceptions, of all families bearing the name in America; but subsequent research has dispelled this illusion and revealed the fact of settlement in America of several branches originating in foreign countries.

The Souls (mark this peculiar spelling of the name), well known as early wool-workers in Wales and other Massachusetts towns, came from the County of Somerset, in England. There were several brothers but they did not all come over at the same time. The descendants have no records of their remote progenitors, but know that they left relatives bearing the name in the Old Country. Some of these were artisans who were employed as tool-makers in Birmingham, England. Four of the brothers having the various arts of manufacturing woolen goods, came over here and found employment as expert workmen. They were an intelligent and industrious people and became excellent citizens. The following presents a summary of their personal history.

William Souls, parents' names unknown, was born in England, March 7, 1788; was married in Utley, England, Sept. 28, 1807; and after the death of his wife, without issue, he married ELIZA ANN SHAW in Webster, Mass., about 1834-5, by whom there were several children whose names will appear hereafter. She died in Wales, Mass., June 13, 1873, aged 66 years. He came over to America in 1827, and from Stafford, Conn., to Wales where he was an operative and owner in the Wales Manufacturing Company; a very industrious, hardworking man. He was genial and of a social temperament, much inclined to jovial and jocose habits. He was scrupulously honest, benevolent and compassionate toward the needy and distressed. His whole deportment was morally correct. He died in Wales Sept. 21, 1854, aged 66 years. ises owned and occupied by him at the time of his death, designated the "Souls Place," was situated upon the west side of the main street in the Central Village, about twenty-five rods from the mills of the Manufacturing Company before mentioned. His death was an event of universal regret and caused deep sadness among the people of the entire community where he was so well and favorably known. William Souls always claimed an interest in the "Pitchcomb Estate" in England and made some attempts toward a recovery of his share, but nothing ever was realized. William Souls had brothers named George, Richard, James, and a sister Hannah who was married to a widower with eight children and she bore him twenty-four more. Her second husband

was named Humphreys and they resided when last heard from at Walls Onarry, near Minchinhampton, Gloucestershire, Eng. He had three children named

James Souls, parents' names unknown, brother of the preceding, was born in Somersetshire, England, about 1807 and died in Wales, Mass., March 18, 1868, aged 68 years. He removed from Spencer, Mass., where he first settled, to Wales, in the autumn of 1858, accompanied by his wife, and the twain constituted his family. In the spring of 1859 he returned to Spencer but came back to Wales; then after a few months, moved to Stafford, Conn., where he remained till his death. James Souls was in some respects unlike his brother William. He was more of a "sharper," more shrewd, cautious, close and moneysaving, while his brother was frank-hearted and free-hearted. He was, however, a man of moral worth.

Anson Souls, another brother of William and James, came to Wales, Mass., in 1871 and was a resident till 1920 when he removed to Brimfield, Mass. He subsequently bought the northern and eastern outskirts of what had been the "Winchester Place" which was situated northward of "Mount Pisgah," extending from the north part thereof to within a hundred rods of the Brimfield line, and upon this tract he erected his residence on the eastern slope of the hill pushing out northward from Mount Pisgah and in 1824 he returned thither and fixed his after-life home upon these premises which became well known as the "Anson Souls Place."

When he first came to Wales he was fond of high times, sprees, frolics and intoxicating beverages and sometimes indulged his appetite until he used profane and even vulgar language; but he became a changed man about 1830 and united with the Methodist church, after which, having abandoned all of his wayward habits, he continued a sober, steady man of exemplary morals until his death. His subsequent life was full of good deeds and words of kindness. He was agile and light-footed as a roe. He was a man of great industry, especially when tasked with the imposed burden of a hired laborer. He had a longer lease of life than any of his contemporaries in the town at the time of his death, which occurred Dec. 18, 1866. His wife, SALLY SHERMAN, born March 27, 1777, died March 4, 1871. She was the daughter of Gideon and Sarah and was married Jan. 21, 1796 to DANIEL SHERMAN of Brimfield, Mass., with whom she went to Vermont where they parted, but in 1817 came to Wales as the wife of Anson Soule. He had probably been married before and was the reputed father of a son. His children known to the writer were named as follows:

1. Halsey Souls married Louisa Nelson Jan. 30, 1834 and died Nov. 3, 1858, aged 52 years. He was a skilful stone-cutter and sculptor and was employed in many places while his family remained in Wales. His death occurred in Palmer, Mass., where he was at work and was taken ill. His home was on "The Halsey Souls Place" and on the south side of the road to Monson, about

a half mile west of Central Village. He was an industrious, well-behaved man and full of kindness and neighborly accommodation. There were five children in this family, named as follows:

His characteristics were deceitfulness, treachery, a species of low cunning and frivolity, revelry, debauchery, and intoxication. He was revengeful, profane and dishonest. After all, he possessed some redeeming qualities of kindness and honor. He lived for many years on the "Sol. Munger Place." Because of his reputed neglect and ill-treatment, his wife determined to desert his "bed and board," as she was wont to say. Children as follows:

Soule Families in the South.

New England Branches.

O prove that my researches were not discontinued when this work entered the press and to show the possibility of an "eleventh-hour" and valuable addition to my stores of genealogical treasures, I have to call the reader's attention to the following statement. While

examining the first U. S. Census I found that several persons named Sole, Soule and Sowle were resident in North Carolina and South Carolina. This discovery was enough to excite the curiosity of an antiquary worthy of the name and I went to my files of Notes to see whether I could find any New England stocks from which these southern branches were broken off. It was evident that these families were natural offshoots from the New England ancestry, for there was not another known person of the name who had settled

in this country at that period of history.

My next experiment was within the alcoves of the Boston City Library where I searched diligently through the published volumes of Carolinian There were found a few more references to the southern branches of the family. What impressed me especially was the occurrence of the same names peculiar to the early New England families-Benjamin, Sylvanus, Nathaniel, Timothy, Joseph and Edward. The appearance of this last name, an isolated instance; an uncommon name in the Soule family of Plymouth County. Remembering that I had once seen this name in the records of Tiverton, R. I., I hastened to the train and ran down to that old town. Here, and in Swansea, I found some of the families from which the southern branches had been dismembered, their property having been disposed of about contemporary with the time of settlement of the families in the Carolinas. These names once well known to searchers disappeared from the local records and were transferred to the South. Having returned to my home I immediately applied to the custodians of the records at the Land Office and the Registry of Probate and was rewarded by abstracts from the files with grants and patents of tracts of land to the same persons bearing the name of Sole, Soule and Sowle who had removed from New England. Such records will herewith appear as the satisfactory proof of the assumptions arrived at.

My next step was to learn the probable cause for this exodus from the New England homes of these families. The dominant inherited instinct for roaming must be held responsible for the possibility, while local conditions and inducements must be recognized as strong factors operating in the individual cases. It is my opinion that the engagement in navigation by the Soules in Dartmouth and adjoining towns provided a medium and a means of transportation for these disconnected families; and the migration was not confined to the families bearing the Soule and Sowle names; families intermarried with them, finding the kindred ties too strong for resistance, joined the company and established new homes in the Southland.

When we are careful to remember that the early generations of the New England families of Soule and Sowle were devoted Quakers and whose methods of communication are familiar to us, it will be more feasible to account for this concerted action by so many families. Previous research, when compiling the Genealogy of the Milliken-Milligan families had revealed the fact that numerous families bearing those names along with those of their collateral kindred had removed from Nantucket and Martha's Vineyard to North Carolina; and that these were principally persons of the Quaker faith. With the finding of these familiar names in the South we also learned that the movement was largely the result of the influence of the itinerant Quaker preachers who perambulated the newly settled colonies on horseback under their broad-brimmed gray hats. These humble travelers were the news-carriers and mail-transporters and considered an important adjunct to the sparsely settled communities. Whether the inducements held out were religious or material—probably both we have no authority for assuming.

Several persons who have been interested in collecting Soule data have intimated that their experience had convinced them that several names and records of the early generations of the families living about Duxbury and Tiverton had been lost to their descendants by reason of the missing records. The compiler thought so too, till he discovered the settlement of the Soule families in the South. While making a study of the vital records in Tiverton and the county records he found that many names of the Soule families once resident in the locality had disappeared. There were some records of real estate transactions in which these persons had been interested, but like a flock of frightened birds they had disappeared from the town and county. An extensive and discriminating search in many localities where branches of the Soule families had settled did not reveal anything concerning these "missing links" of the genealogical chain; but unexpectedly, by mere accident, while making an examination of some southern documents the very names of several of the missing members of the families were discovered as pioneers in North Carolina and South Carolina, whither they had gone after disposing of their property in New England. Of course this was a pleasant surprise and considered to be of great importance in making connections not before known. It has not been known that any other searcher for Soule history had discovered the fact of this settlement in the South and the compiler experienced something of the exultation known to a searcher of lost treasure when he holds in his hands some of the shining coin. Like the father of the "Prodigal Son" he could say, "This my son was lost and is found; he was dead but is alive."

It is to be regretted when we learn that these natives of an old New England family did not preserve any vital records or account of the reasons for their removal. Had it been possible to procure such data it would have been feasible to formulate another interesting department of Soule Family History; whereas only a few detached items of importance could be salvaged from the vital statistics; enough, however, to prove conclusively the fact of the removal and permanent settlement. It was an interesting incident that the tradition was preserved among those now living in North and South Carolina that their forefathers lived in the New England Colonies and that they were a sea-faring folk who owned the ships in which they sailed the seas. Thus we see that the "salt" in the blood of those hard-handed sons of Neptune had not lost its "savor" by a transportation southward.

The very knowledge of this migration is suggestive of many incidents of a romantic character that must have been true to fact; and through the powers of a stimulated fancy, we reinstate those who were actors in the pioneer drama and reinvest the scenes in which those early Soules acted their part. We can see those old mariners after their returns from their southern trading voyages spending an evening around the hearthstones of the taverns, surrounded by a group of eager residents who with opened-mouthed wonder listened to the recitals concerning the cheap, rich lands in the "Carolinas" that could be purchased for a trifle and the assembling of these Soules to consider the prospects of removal. The townships where they then resided were becoming too narrow for the constantly increasing population and as bees, some of the younger and more vigorous, must "swarm" and seek for homes in some new country. Thus the project was developed and the arrangements for selling out their small holdings matured. Since the discovery of this removal of the Soules to the Southland those meagre records found in the land transactions have become eloquent with significance as historical documents; whereas they had been mute and untranslated as the ancient parchments.

Then came days of "breaking camp" and the removal of their household goods, their horses, their cattle and sheep, with such farming utensils; the day of sailing on board of the "Dolphin" or the "Sea-flower" when the farewells were spoken and kindred Soules were separated, possibly to meet no more. All such incidents have been, to the writer, invested with a feature of

tender pathos because they involved so many sad possibilities.

However, the hour fraught with so many touching scenes came at last and all wore an aspect of bustle and confusion. The last hand-clasp was given and the refugees were hurried on board. The ropes were hurried through the rattling blocks, the sails unfurled to the breeze, the ships were turned toward the broad ocean and those standing upon the landings with hand-shaded eyes turned away from the scene to resort to their homes and express their opinions relative to the adventure. These Soules had departed and turned their faces toward new scenes and hard conditions. The lands assigned to them and secured by their Patents were bordering the coast and covered with heavy forests. The undertaking involved all of the contingencies and deprivations of the average pioneer adventures and called for strong physical hardihood, heroic courage and persistent endeavor. Among the names familiar to the Soule families of the earlier generations were those of Edward, Sylvanus, Nathaniel, Timothy, Benjamin, Joseph, William and Cornelius. Some of these evidently did not make any permanent settlement and probably disposed of their lands and returned to New England: while we know that several families became permanently established upon their new estates and their descendants are living there at the present day.

Census Records, North Carolina.

The Census Returns for the year 1800 for the State of North Carolina show that there were living in the Wilmington District the persons whose names follow:

John Sole, in whose family there were two persons aged 45 years or more.

Timothy Soles, in whose family there were three persons, aged 45, 26 and 16 years respectively.

Nathaniel Soles, with parents aged 45 or more, two persons aged 16 or more, and 4 persons aged 10 years.

Genealogy of the Family.

The names of those mentioned in the First Census of 1790, were Sylvanus, Timothy, Benjamin, Nathaniel, Joseph, Edward and James. These, however, were not of the same generation as the earlier pioneers who removed from New England; but the names were perpetuated in many instances. Coming down to the later families we must begin with

Timothy Soule (1), who was born about 1780; married AMELIA EDWARDS and removed to Alabama where he was a merchant and mill-owner. He was the progenitor of a large family of sons and daughters whose names, as many as we have procured, will follow: Lemuel Burton, Joseph, Timothy, Henry and Helen. All of these removed from North Carolina to Alabama. Timothy Soule, first, later removed to Texas where he died. Another authority assumes that this Timothy Soule and seven others of the family died in the same year, with typhoid pneumonia. His residence was situated about four miles northeast of Troy, Pike County, Alabama. It is reported that this Timothy Soule gave the name to Pleasant Hill church where the family were buried. The family traditions do not agree and we can only publish what has been supplied.

Timothy Soule (2) entered the service during the Mexican War and was killed in action; probably a young man and unmarried.

Lemuel Burton Soule (1), a son of Timothy and Amelia (Edwards) Soule, born in 1812, married in Troy, Alabama, Louisa Virginia Gardner, daughter of Benjamin Gardner, one-time Attorney General of the State. This Lemuel Soule ran away from his home in North Carolina to Alabama and changed his name to "Soles." He had instructed his family to spell their name "Soule," assuring them that this was the original and proper form of orthography. Among the children of Lemuel B. Soule there was a son,

Edgar Clark Soule (1), who removed to Houston, Texas. He married MILLICENT KATHRYN HUCKABEE, by whom several sons, as follows:

Hon. Edgar Clark Soule (2), United States Consul at Cardiff, Wales, a son of Edgar C. and Millicent Louisa (Huckabee) Soule, was born in the town of Waxahachie, Texas, in December, 1886 and was educated in the Houston High School which he attended from 1900 to 1904.

In 1906 he entered the service of the United States Government in the construction of the Panama Canal, and remained on the Isthmus of Panama at various stations for a period of seven years, excepting one session of the University of Texas. He entered the University of Texas in 1909, where, as a freshman, he won first prize in the annual oratorical contest open to all students. He holds the B.A. degree from the University of Texas.

After terminating his final period of service on the Panama Canal, Mr. Soule taught school in Texas several years; but when the United States entered the World War, he served in the U. S. Army as an officer in the Air Service, being honorably discharged in March, 1920. During the time he was stationed at Washington, he was granted an M.A. in course by George Washington

University.

In 1920 he entered the Consular Service, being appointed U. S. Consul at Cartagena, Colombia, by Woodrow Wilson. After a brief period of service at Washington in 1922-1923, he was appointed U. S. Consul at Cardiff, Wales, by Warren G. Harding.

He was married in 1911 to FLOY DEVORE PERFECT, of Paris, Texas, who is a member of the D. A. R. through a Bosworth ancestor, and who is descended from Mayflower progenitors. They have three children: Gardner, Peggy and

Patricia.

Mr. Soule is a member of the Methodist Church, South; a Mason, 32d degree, and Shriner; a Democrat in politics; a member of the Cardiff Rotary Club, the Whitchurch Golf Club, and of the oratorical honor society, Delta Sigma Rho. Both he and his wife were elected to membership in Phi Beta Kappa on graduation from the University of Texas. Their home address is: 1515 Rusk Avenue, Houston, Texas; but they are at present at the American Consulate, Cardiff, Wales.

Horace Soule, Esq. (1), a son of Edgar C. and Millicent Louisa (Huckabee) Soule; Assistant United States District Attorney; was a candidate for Criminal District Attorney, Harris County, Texas; has a record during the World War.

Dr. Marion Soles lived in Palestine, Texas, for many years and died leaving a son, Clayton Soles, a graduate of the A. and M. College, Texas, who may still be living in that town.

Lafayette Soule (1), a nephew of Lemuel Soules, was killed in the Civil War; parents' names not known.

Lucinda Helen Soule (1), a daughter of Timothy Soule, born March 20, 1832, was married Feb. 2, 1852 to Stephen Powell, born Aug. 8, 1832 and died Nov. 14, 1901. She died Aug. 3, 1908. They were buried in Pleasant Hill Cemetery, Pike County, Ala. Children's names as follows:

Jasper Soule entered the Confederate service during the Civil War and was never heard from.

Newton Soule entered the Confederate service during the Civil War and his fate was unknown.

Jane Soule was married to ROBERT BEARDSLEY and had a son.

Anna Maria Soule was married to DAVID SMITH. Deceased.

Land Transactions with Soules.

At a Council held at Newberne, N. C., October 6, 1748, there was a petition presented for a warrant for land (300 acres) to Sylvanus Soul.

On September 13, 1735, Petitioners who had obtained warrants and asked

for patents; among them

Benjamin Sowl, 320 acres. Granted 300 on N. W. above Swan Creek; 320 acres on Hammond Creek, February 20, 1735. Petitions for patents, Benjamin Sowl, 50 Blanden, Sept. 10, 1735. Warrant executed called for patent by Joseph Sowl, 640 acres, Blanden.

On September 4, 1735 Edward Sowle received patent for 517 acres in Onslaw.

A will made by Abram Soule was found in the Probate Office, Tarbore, N. C., that was of peculiar interest, he having been an owner of slaves. His deceased sons were not mentioned by name, but he gave his estate to his two grandchildren, each by name, along with two negro girls. This transaction indicates the possible changes of opinion and conduct of families within two generations. When living among their Quaker neighbors in the New England Colonies the grandparents of this slaveholder were known for their love of liberty and rigid opposition to the institution of slavery, but their descendants seem to have adjusted their consciences to quite changed conditions and, being among the Romans, acted as the Romans did.

Soules of Rockingham County, Virginia.

New England Branch.

Members of this family hold the tradition that they are descendants of one Isaac Soule who was born in or near Bangor, Maine, but thorough examination of the public records of that city and vicinity fails to discover his name or any family from which he could have sprung. His descendants report that this man declined to give any information concerning the history of his forefathers or family connections; consequently, though the compiler has been in correspondence with several descendants, he has but meagre and detached materials with which to build a pedigree.

Rev. Isaac Soule, a reputed native of the State of Maine, was born about 1790 or 1800. He served in the American Army during the War of 1812 and is supposed to have enlisted in Maine, but the Muster Rolls do not reveal his name. He was an educated man and probably a graduate from the University of Pennsylvania. He subsequently entered the Methodist Conference and was assigned to a charge in Rockingham County, Virginia. That he had several brothers and sisters was well known but he refused to impart any information concerning them. He married in Virginia MISS SMITH and by this union there were born no less than six children. He and his wife died in Virginia about 1875.

- 1. William C. Soule (1), a son of Isaac (1), was married and had five children named as follows: Mrs. Sarah Turner, Mrs. Olive Wheeler, Florence Blackburn, Mrs. Ida McCracken, George W. Soule. These all had children.
- 2. Henry L. Soule (1), a son of Isaac (1), born in Virginia, was a well-educated man, a farmer; served in the Confederate Army during the Civil War. His wife born in Iowa and named CERELDA C. SOULE. Their son, Henry E. Soule, born at Stanley, Ia., Sept. 30, 1881, is a college man, a Mason and when last heard from was clerk of the Swift Canadian Co., Toronto. His sister, Iva B. Soule, was married to C. F. HOPPER and resides in Omaha, Neb. She was born at Stanley, Ia., Aug. 2, 1883.
- 3. Emery Soule (1), a son of Isaac (1), was born in Virginia, married and was resident in Hooper, Nebraska, when heard from. There were eight children in this family, and four of them are lawyers; all actually self-made men. Frank and Henry are located at St. Anthony, Idaho. Orson Soule, Esq., resides in Salt Lake City, Utah. Their ages run from 35 to 60 years. All are engaged in active practice. Grant W. Soule, located in Dubois, Idaho, was a lieutenant in the late World War. The daughters were named Lucretia, Eva, May. A son, Elmer Soule, is deceased.
- 5. John Soule (1), a son of Isaac (1), was born and died on the homestead farm in Virginia. His widow is living (Mrs. Mary E. Soule) at Woodbine,

- Va. In this family there were six children, viz: Grasty, Craver, Elizabeth, Marvin, Jesse and Bedford.
- **6.** Lucretia Soule (1), a daughter of Isaac (1), born in Virginia, was married to Mr. Hammill and had four children—possibly more. Their names were Edith, Bessie, Isaac and Henry.
- 7. George Soule (1), a son of Isaac (1), born on the homestead in Virginia; died when in childhood.

There are many of the third generation married, settled in homes and have children; these so scattered that their history and records were not readily available. Biographical sketches of the professional men were solicited, but their extreme modesty caused them to decline.

Cornelius Soule Branch.

Tiverton, Rhode Island.

Cornelius Soule (2), a son of Nathan (1) and Mercy (Gifford) Soule, born in Dartmouth, Mass., Jan. 26, 1712; married SARAH DENNIS, daughter of Robert and Sarah Howland Dennis, May 1, 1835, and settled in Tiverton. R. I., from which old town he sailed forth upon many seas. He was also engaged in the whaling fleet sailing from New Bedford, Mass., and was well known among those who sailed to the northern seas for his skill in throwing the harpoon. He was also associated with the local militia, being ensign of a Tiverton company of soldiers every year from 1746 to 1760. I have evidence of his being in the Louisburg Expedition and in the Revolution. Captain Soule was evidently a brave and resolute man who was foremost in many enterprises. Robert Dennis by his will Nov. 19, 1743 gave to his daughter, Sarah Soule, £200 and a negro girl named "Jenney" besides a share in the sale of another negro named "Newport." According to the census of Rhode Island, 1774, Capt. Cornelius Soule had an Indian servant. He did not remove southward at the time when his brothers George and Timothy and his sister Content (Soule) Sheldon, settled in Dutchess County, New York, but as a blacksmith hammered away in Tiverton after leaving the seaman's life. In his will of 1783, he mentions his blacksmith's tools. This will, or rather, the copy of it in the registers kept at Tiverton, was an elaborate and deeply interesting document filling nearly three pages. The inventory following filled one and one-half pages. These records were most beautifully inscribed, the handwriting delicate and the characters as uniform and gracefully written as engraving. The publication of a fac-simile of a section of the will would have been an attractive contribution to the illustrations of this work. testaments contained many genealogical references that were clear evidence of family connections. The time of death of Cornelius Soule has not been found. There is a large framed portrait in oil hanging in the city library of Providence, R. I., presented by his son-in-law, of this man, the costume looking somewhat old-fashioned.

From the following records it seems that the portrait alluded to as hanging in the library at Providence was not that of Cornelius Soule under notice and may have been his son Cornelius, born Oct. 15, 1769.

Sowl Family In Misconsin.

This family were evidently descended from or some way not distantly connected with the Broadalbin branches or those of South Gilboa, N. Y. The following information was all I could procure, as some solicited have not replied to my inquiries.

Thomas Sowl or Sowle, lived in Chester, Ohio, in 1820 and removed to Wisconsin in 1840. He was buried near Argyle, Wisconsin, and the inscription on his monument reads: "Thomas Sowl died June 29, 1904, aged 56 years and 15 days. Elizabeth Sowl, his wife, died May 24, 1881, aged 34 years, 6 months and 10 days." This shows that they were born in 1848 and 1847 respectively, and this was evidently a second wife.

William Soule removed from Ohio to Argyle, Wis., where he died but was buried in Scotland, South Dakota. His son, David A. Sowl, was born near Argyle, Wis., removed to Scotland, South Dakota, about 1905, and was living there in 1917. His son, William H. Sowl, was born in 1872. He was the oldest son. Had three sisters and three brothers living in 1917. He has six sons and no daughters. Carson G. Sowl was the eldest son. One sister of David A. was living in 1917. David A. Sowl married Frances Burroughs, a doctor's daughter. His sons were named Marshall Sowl, Duluth, Minn.; Frank Sowl, Argyle, Wis.; Leslie Sowl, Argyle, Wis. Sisters, Mrs. Grace

Mrs. Irvin Joy of Beloit, Wis., says her great-grandfather had three sons and two daughters whose names were Mrs. Caroline Humphrey and Mrs. Marilla Saideson? The sons were John, Lyman and William. William Sowl was her grandfather, born in Chester, O., June 29, 1820. He it was who married Miss Frances Barrows in Cleveland, O., 1840, and emigrated to Illinois in 1841 where he lived a short time and then took up some land in Iowa County, Wis. He had thirteen children of whom only two are now (1914) living:

New Bedford Branch.

HIS branch of the Soule family was derived from an old Duxbury stock broken from the parent stem during the fourth generation by one Micah and Mercy (Southworth) Soule, and was closely connected with those brothers who settled in Winslow and Waterville,

Maine; and there were depositions by the members of the family in the home town that proves the relationship.

Constant Southworth Soule (1) was the second son of Micah (1) and Mercy (Southworth) Soule, born in Duxbury, Mass., in 1744 (baptized May 3), and was a brother to Ionathan Soule and Asa Soule who removed to Maine after their service in the Revolution. These brothers married sisters, their cousins, Honor and Mercy Southworth. Constant Southworth Soule also served in the struggle for independence and was honorably discharged. He was a private in the Company of Capt. Calvin Partridge and in the regiment of Col. John Cushman, serving in the Colonial Army during the war of the Revolution. He was drafted Sept. 25, 1776, being in service a month and twenty-eight days, having marched to Rhode Island. He was also in the company of Capt. Nathaniel Allen and the regiment of Col. Theophilus Cotton; serving 33 days on a secret expedition to Rhode Island, in September and October, 1779. His wife was JIMIMA but her full maiden name has not been ascertained. He became insane and drowned himself in a brook July 10, 1790. His widow was married, 2d, to WILLIAM ADAMS of Enfield, Conn., where they had charge of the toll-gate. By his father's will Constant received, with his brothers Iosiah and Asa, "Half of the Salt Meadow and a bed." It is not known that he had more than one child, a son, whose name will follow.

Thomas Soule (1), a son of Constant (1) and Jimima, born in Duxbury, Mass., July 1, 1788; married Lois Howard of Pomfret, Mass., by whom two children. This family resided in Belchertown, Mass., where he had charge of the toll-gate, but soon returned to Duxbury, Mass., where he died July 23, 1819, at the early age of 31 years.

1. Thomas Howard Soule (2), eldest son of Thomas (1) and Lois (Howard) Soule, was born in Belchertown, Mass., Feb. 22, 1810, during a short residence of his parents in that town. He married May 5, 1833, at Nantucket, Mass., Margaret Albertson Dunham, born at Mattapoisett, Mass., April 10, 1810, daughter of George and Mary (Albertson) Dunham. Mrs. Soule was descended from several old and respectable families in the state. There were five children in this family whose names will appear hereafter. She died in New Bedford, Mass., July 16, 1879. Mr. Soule remained in Duxbury until he was 21 years of age and there learned the trade of ship carpenter. After completing his apprenticeship he went to New Bedford where he resided a short time, later removing to Fairhaven and from that place to Mattapoisett; but in 1841, he returned to New Bedford and was for a time the foreman of

a well known builder of whaling vessels, Stephen Andrews. In 1853 Mr. Soule formed a partnership with William L. Edwards under the title of Edwards & Soule, ship builders, and was so engaged until he retired from active business in 1872. Mr. Soule early took an interest in public affairs and was ever ready to assist in any worthy movement tending toward the advancement of the city of New Bedford. In 1856 he was a member of the Common Council and was active in the establishment of the Free Public Library. He was a member of the Republican Party from its earliest organization and was one of the first Republicans to be elected from New Bedford to the General Court, serving as representative in 1857-58. Thomas Howard Soule represented a high type of citizenship and held the respect of all who knew him. He died April 19, 1900. His children were by name William Thomas, Rufus Albertson, Henry Warren, Thomas Howard, and Mary Elvira. These will receive attention in their order of birth.

2. Stephen Dana Soule (1), second son of Thomas (1) and Lois (Howard) Soule, born in Enfield, Mass., Dec. 17, 1813, and was left fatherless when a lad of six years. He was cared for and brought up by his mother whose circumstances did not admit of giving him many advantages for an education. With her two sons Mrs. Soule removed to Duxbury, Mass., where she was employed by a farmer, Baker, and there Stephen worked tilling the soil till early manhood; then removed to North Bridgewater, Mass., where he learned the shoemaker's trade, and at that craft he was employed for nearly 25 years in various towns, principally in Stoughton, Mass., and was appointed warden of the almshouse, a position he held for four years. He later went to Abington, Mass., where he filled a like position for two years. He then removed to Whitman, Mass., where he passed the remainder of his days in comparative retirement. He died Jan. 9, 1887, and was laid to rest in the Evergreen Cemetery, Stoughton, Mass. His first wife, by whom there were three children, was Tabitha Jackson, who was buried at his side. He married 2d, Elizabeth CALDWELL, daughter of Ebenezer and Betsey (Howard) Caldwell of West Bridgewater, Mass., by whom two more children. This Mrs. Soule was an attendant of the M. E. Church. She died while visiting friends in East Bridgewater and was buried in the family lot in Evergreen Cemetery.

CHILDREN OF THOMAS HOWARD AND MARGARET ALBERTSON SOULE.

1. William T. Soule, a merchant in New Bedford, son of Thomas H. Soule, was born at Mattapoisett, Mass., March 15, 1833. He was educated in the public schools of his native town and at the age of fourteen entered the store of Nathan E. Hammett, dry goods dealer, with whom he remained seven years. He was afterwards in the same business in Boston two years and in New Bedford one year. On Sept. 14, 1861, Mr. Soule enlisted in Co. K, First Regt. of Cavalry, M. V. M., and was mustered into the U. S. service Oct. 5, 1861, as sergeant. By order of the War Department, the battalion to which his company belonged was permanently detached from the regiment, and Feb. 12, 1864 it was incorporated into the 4th Regt. of Massachusetts Cavalry. He was commissioned second lieutenant in that regiment Jan. 19, 1864; was promoted to 1st lieut. and regimental quartermaster Dec. 10, 1864, and to be

captain July 5, 1865. He was mustered out Nov. 14, 1865. After leaving the army he re-entered the dry goods business in New Bedford on his own account and continued it until his decease.

Captain Soule was a prominent Free Mason, being a member of the bodies of the York Rite in New Bedford and of the Scottish Rite in Boston. He was an active member of Post 1, of the Grand Army of the Republic in New Bedford and of the Union Veterans Legion. He died at his residence in New Bedford, Mass., May 30, 1888. He had been Mayor of the city in 1879.

2. Rufus Albertson Soule (1), one of the four sons of Thomas (2) and Margaret Albertson (Dunham) Soule, was born in Mattapoisett, Plymouth County, Mass., March 16, 1839. He married Aug. 28, 1860, Miss Susan Nesmith of Bucksport, Me., daughter of Carver and Eleanor (Williams) Nesmith and sister of the wife of his brother, Thomas Howard Soule, of pure Scottish descent. Mr. Soule received a good education in the public schools of New Bedford, and excellent business training. Upon leaving school he was employed as a clerk in a boot and shoe store, and was for eight years a salesman for Union Boot and Shoe Company of New Bedford.

When the Civil War broke out he enlisted in Company E, Third Regiment, Massachusetts Volunteer Infantry, and contributed his share to the service of a remarkable family—each of his three brothers also going into the Union Army, one in the Cavalry, one in the Artillery and one in the Navy. All save one passed through the awful conflict unscathed,—Henry Warren was killed in

action at Gettysburg, Pa., July, 1863.

After the war, Mr. Soule engaged in business on his own account, forming a co-partnership with Mr. Hathaway for the manufacture of shoes. At the beginning the business was small, employing but five or six hands. In 1866 the style of the firm was Hathaway & Soule and so continued till 1876, when Herbert A. Harrington of Boston was admitted and it was changed to Hathaway, Soule & Harrington. In June, 1890, this firm became a stock company, under the title Incorporated, with Mr. Hathaway as president, Mr. Soule as vice-president and Mr. Harrington as treasurer, and the three members constituted the board of directors.

This business continued to expand until June 1, 1893, the sales of the corporation had reached nearly a million and a half. Its factories were in New Bedford and Middleborough, the main office in Boston, with the salesroom in New York; and its interest and retail stores also in New York City, Washington, Chicago, St. Louis; Boston and Springfield, Mass., New London, Conn.,

and several other New England cities.

In addition to this extensive business Mr. Soule was interested in the City and Bristol Manufacturing Corporation, in each of which he was a director. He was vice-president of the New Bedford Safe Deposit and Trust Company and President of the New Bedford Board of Trade. He served in the New Bedford city government; member of the Common Council five years, 1869-1870-1871-1874-1875 and was president of the body in 1874. He was a member for New Bedford in the Massachusetts Legislature of 1878 and 1879, serving during both terms on the committee on railroads. He was chairman of the Board of License Commissioners of New Bedford, appointed for the term of

six years from the first Monday in June, 1894. Upon his appointment to the latter office the New Bedford Mercury remarked that "that is the right stamp of man to hold public office—he is honest and courageous, devoted to what he believes to be right and fearless in his words and actions."

He was a member of the Loyal Legion; past commander of the G. A. R., Pierce Post No. 190, Grand Army of the Republic (was delegate from the Massachusetts Encampment to the National Encampment, Pittsburgh, Penn., Sept. 1894); member of the Sutton Commandery, Knights Templar, the Adoniram Royal Arch Chapter, and Star in the East Lodge of Masons; of the Wamsutta and Dartmouth Clubs of New Bedford and the Saturday Night Club of Hyannis. In every official position which he was called to fill he acquitted himself with fidelity and ability and received the merited appreciation from those he served.

- 3. Henry Warren Soule (1), third son of Thomas (2) and Margaret (Dunham) Soule, born in New Bedford, Mass., 1841; was killed in the battle of Gettysburg, during the Civil War, 1863. He was not married.
- 4. Thomas Howard Soule (2), youngest son of Thomas (2) and Margaret Albertson (Dunham) Soule, born in Mattapoisett, Plymouth County, Mass., Nov. 15, 1844 and received his education in the public schools of New Bedford, graduating from the high school in 1860. He soon began his career in the merchant service (marine), making a trip to San Francisco, Cal., in the merchant ship "Mary Robinson," owned by Mott Robinson of New Bedford, Mass. On his return he entered the Navy service for the Civil War in April, 1864, becoming acting master's mate in the "Bienville," which was for a year a part of Farragut's fleet, under whom he took part in the battle of Mobile Bay

at the capture of Fort Morgan, receiving his share of the prize money awarded for the taking of the ram "Tennessee." Leaving the navy in 1865 he resumed the sea-faring life in the merchant service, but did not continue long, making his last voyage in 1867, at which time he was first officer. He subsequently engaged in the hotel business in which he continued for many years, his first hotel being the Sherborne House of Nantucket, where he was for several years engaged in a successful dry goods business. In 1888 he went to Hyannis, Mass., and purchased the Tyanough Hotel. This establishment has been enlarged under his management, having some forty guest rooms, and has been undergoing constant improvement, being modern in all its equipment and is deserving of the reputation given it by its patrons. Mr. Soule has proved himself well fitted for the entertainment of the public and his business has been a great success.

In 1891 Mr. Soule was elected commissioner of Barnstable County, was re-elected in 1908 and held the office in 1912. He was a firm Republican and is widely known in Grand Army circles, having been commander of the Theodore Parkman Post, No. 244, a position of honor he held for several years. He is also a Mason, holding membership in Fraternal Lodge, A. F. and A. M., Hyannis, and belongs to the Knights of Pythias and the New England Order of Protection at Hyannis.

In March, 1867, Mr. Soule married Martha M. Nesmith, daughter of Carver and Eleanor (Williams) Nesmith, of Bucksport, Me., and sister of Susan C. Nesmith, wife of Rufus A. Soule of New Bedford, his brother. They have one daughter, Martha Nesmith Soule, born 1875; was married to Frank K. Rich and is living at Hyannis, Mass.

- 5. Mary Elvira Soule (1), only daughter of Thomas (1) and Margaret (Dunham) Soule, born in New Bedford, Mass., 1850; married, 1872, to Anthony D. Hall, for forty-three years manager of the Adams House in Boston, who was born in Tiverton, R. I., Jan. 13, 1845. Mr. and Mrs. Hall are still living. Children:

In 1883 he engaged in business for himself, establishing a stationery and news store which he conducted successfully for several years, during which he engaged in the fire insurance and real estate business. For the last quarter of a century Mr. Soule has been successfully engaged in the latter business, representing from fifteen to twenty of the most influential insurance companies in the country. In 1889 Mr. Soule was one of the incorporators of the Whitman Co-operative Bank of which he was a director and since its formation the secretary and treasurer. He resigned his office as treasurer of this bank in 1917, after holding the position for twenty-eight years. He is now the president and his son, Harrison D. Soule, was elected treasurer, a position he still holds.

In public life Mr. Soule has been quite active, having been for a number of years a member of the Republican town committee, and for several years its chairman. He also served continuously for twenty years as a member of the board of selectmen of Whitman to which he was elected in 1886, the year in which the name of South Abington was changed to Whitman, and for years was chairman of the board. He has also served as assessor and overseer of the poor. Fraternally he is a member of the Puritan Lodge A. F. and A. M. of Whitman, having been made a Mason at the age of 21. He was one of the organizers of the Board of Trade, and was its secretary for seven years: later. its president. In religious faith he is a Unitarian and clerk of the church in Whitman. He married Nov. 14, 1869 in North Bridgewater, Mass., ELIZABETH B. HOWARD, daughter of Ephraim Howard, who died Feb. 28, 1901, and was buried in Colebrook Cemetery, Whitman, Mass. There were four children whose names will follow. George D. Soule married 2d, June 12, 1902, ANNA HOWARD BROWN of Abington, Mass., daughter of William Brown. She is a member of the First Unitarian Church in town.

The Genealogy.

Joseph Soule of Westport, Mass. This is the starting point. But which one?

Benjamin Soule, a son of Joseph, was born in Westport, Mass., in 1777. He married Mary Russell, born May 28, 1771. He died July 26, 1859. She died March 17, 1877. Children, far as known, as follows:

Bailey tells us that

"We live in deeds, not years; in thoughts, not breaths; In feelings, not in figures on a dial. He most lives Who thinks most, feels the noblest, acts the best."

I have tried to live and act in accordance with these sentiments and shall continue to do so, until the drama of life ends and the curtain is rolled down.

With the consciousness of having done my duty to the best of my ability, "with malice toward none, with charity for all," I am happy and joyous as

life's golden leaves appear.

In the brief time that remains for me to walk in life's golden sunset, I shall continue to toil in the cause of education, in the development of good government, and in behalf of the rising generation, whose interests, physical, mental, social, moral, educational and economic, it shall be my pleasure to promote.

Today I give you my ninetieth birthday advice and admonitions.

In the near future all the interests of the nation, of civilization, of society, of economics and of the welfare of mankind will devolve upon you in common with the present youth of our country. Therefore, as Tennyson directs:

"Study yourselves and most of all note well, Wherein kind Nature invites you to excel." With Emerson,

"Think truly, and thy thought shall the world's famine feed; Speak truly, and thy word shall be a fruitful seed; Live truly, and thy life shall be a great and noble creed."

Erect your social, political and business lives upon an ethical and religious basis. For, as Bishop Galloway has so eloquently said, "Love of country is intensified and purified by the love of the Lord we worship and the religion we embrace." And the Father of our Country, in his farewell address, said:

"Public prosperity has no foundation but morality, and religion is the only security of morality."

Be true to your country. Every citizen is under ethical obligation to support the government that protects him by its laws, in the enjoyment of life, liberty, and the pursuit of happiness.

By uniting these purifying elements, you have the lamp that lights the way to truth, virtue and humanity—the key that opens the casket containing

the crown jewels of the moral sovereignty of mankind.

If you are unfaithful or recreant to these ethical, religious and patriotic obligations, no brilliancy of genius nor splendor of achievement can save you from the obloquy of your fellow-citizens and the merited condemnation of history.

Remember how truly Goldsmith sang when he said:

"Ill fares the land, to hastening ills a prey, Where wealth accumulates and men decay."

On the Death of James Soule.

A wealthy farmer of Danby, Rutland County, Vermont. Composed Dec. 10, 1821, it being a few weeks after the death of the author's father, who lived in Westport, Mass. (Copied from an old newspaper.)

The author of the following evidently supposed he was writing some fine poetry and his production would not have been published were it not a relic belonging to the Soule family. The particulars intimated in these lines will be found in the sketch relating to James Soule.

Statement by Wesson Soule.

From his Account Book.

"Wesson Soule. His Book of Accounts 1792.

I was born the 8 day of January in the year of our Lord 1735. My great-grand-father George Soule was one of the 42 that first landed in New England. You may read of him in the New England Memorial. His wife's name was Rosamond Thorn. She died in hir 104 year. I remember hir well. My fathers name was Nathaniel (4).

"My mother's name was Hannah."

"The Dark Day was in the year 1780 May 19 and the 6 day of the week."

The statement by Wesson Soule, written by his own hand, is one of the earliest on record made by a representative of the Fourth Generation of the descendants of George Soule the Pilgrim—his grandson—who could remember his grandparents well; and we wish he had written more about their personal history. This statement should settle the question so long in doubt concerning the full maiden name of the wife of the first Nathaniel Soule. In legal documents her name was "Rose Soule." In this statement by her grandson we have her full maiden name. We still believe she was a connection of Rose Standish, second wife of Capt. Myles Standish.

He then went to Minnesota but came back to Foxboro, Mass., in 1860 and that year became a member of the firm of Fisher & Son and was employed in doing country work, building, plastering, etc., for five years. In 1865 he settled in Lawrence, Mass., where for ten years he carried on business as a master builder. Returning to Boston in 1872, he established his business headquarters there but made Cambridge his place of residence. Lawrence P. A man possessed of an antiquarian temperament visited every cemetery in Plymouth County, Mass., making accurate copies of all inscriptions found upon the monuments and slabs standing, which he preserved in blank books for future reference; and learning of this treasure, the author of this work employed him to reproduce and supply all of the Soule names, paying him a handsome price for them. These names and attending dates are now incorporated in this family history.

In the life of Elder Moses Hicks, pastor of the Christian Church in Middleboro, Mass., was found a record kept by him for several years, and this also was copied for this work. Thus in his nearly world-wide search, everything that would contribute to its value, has been gleaned from the fields.

William Bradford, son of William and Annie Bradford of Leicestershire, England, was born there May 20, 1663. The family name is not found in the list of printed pedigrees of Leicestershire, but appears in that of Wiltshire, South Yorkshire and county of York. He served his apprenticeship and learned the art of printing with Andrew Sowle, printer and publisher of Quaker books in Grace Church Street, London. Some doubt exists as to the time of his emigration to America, but it is, we believe generally accredited that he came with William Penn and his company in the ship Welcome, Capt. Robt. Greenway, which sailed from England Sept. 1, 1682 and arrived at New Castle, October 27, 1682. He was living at, or near, Philadelphia, on the 12th of Sept. 1683. He married, 1685, ELIZABETH SOWLE, daughter of Andrew Sowle, his former master; she born 1663, and died in New York City July 8, 1731. He married 2d, a widow in New York, named Smith; by his second wife he had no issue. He died May 23, 1752 and was buried by the side of his wife Elizabeth in Trinity Church-Yard, where a stone is erected to his memory. Issue: Andrew, William and Tacey. Many descendants. Inscription:

"Here lies the body of Mr. William Bradford, Printer, who departed this life May 23, 1752, age 92 years. Spencertown, N. Y.

In this township there was a long ridge from north to southwest, and all of the original settlers west of this elevation to the Hudson River came from Holland. The east side was settled principally from New England and mostly from Connecticut. Upon tracts of this fertile soil several of the Soule families founded homes before the Revolution, but having been in sympathy with the King to whom, some of these at least, signed the oath of allegiance and served as officers with the British forces, and when the victory had been won by the

Colonists, these "Tories," or, more politely written, "Royalists," lost their homes by confiscation and escaped to the British Provinces. As stated in another place, some of the families of Soules went on board of the King's transport at New York, while others made haste to Lake Champlain to sail north and thus reach "Lower Canada." It has been reported by my venerable and local correspondents that some of the forsaken homes of the Soule families stood for many years as the objects of slow decay and final disintegration, while the broad farms, cleared and made productive by their toil, reverted to the dominion of Nature and were rehabilitated by a noble forest.

Lands of Gorham and Phelps. Genesee County, N. Y.

The inherited receptivity and tales from their ancestors, patent to all students of the history of their race, invited the search for their families to

settle on the acquired lands in New York.

Nathaniel Gorham, Esq., and Oliver Phelps, Esq., purchased from Massachusetts, the pre-emption rights of an extensive tract of land in the eastern section of Genesee County, then under the jurisdiction of the State of New York, and held out great inducements for settlements, and after the Revolution pioneers from Massachusetts, Vermont, Rhode Island and Connecticut began to move. Some of the first proprietors purchased the township of the original grants and sold farms to the incoming new settlers for \$2.00 to \$3.00 an acre, according to quality, situation and local advantages.

This was a wonderfully productive country in its natural condition.

One of the first settlers could cut enough wild grass on Genesee flats to feed 200 head of cattle through the winter, and such hay with rushes and vegetables as were found above the snow kept their stock in prime condition without further cost.

The New England settlers who established homes carried such favorable reports of the soil, water and climate to their old neighbors that hundreds of families with many of the material comforts of life, were ready to pack their household belongings, abandon their cleared lands and, driving their cattle before them, with their flocks of sheep, "treck" to the newly discovered land.

At the mouth of Crooked Lake and on the eastern edge of the Genesee grant, there were settlements composed almost entirely of Quakers, and in 1790 this colony consisted of two hundred and sixty persons. They were industrious and enterprising and made rapid improvements. Some of these pioneers were excellent mechanics and soon erected good grist-mills and saw-mills on the streams that flowed through the rural hamlets between the Crooked and Genesee lakes. These were the days when the itinerant Quaker preachers were riding from settlement to settlement and were the mail-carriers and newsdealers, and these austere brethren told, while entertained around the hearthstones of the families in Dartmouth, Middleboro, Halifax, Kingston and Westboro, such stories respecting the new country that hundreds of these families were induced to leave the lands of the Bay State and remove to the rich alluvial lands of the Genesee Valley.

Among these pioneer settlers were many families named Soule and Sowle with the inter-allied families, their kindred, and children. Some of these re-

movals had been anticipated by families settling in Dutchess County as early as 1750, as proven by the Quaker certificates received from the churches in New England and carried with them to the new settlement in the Oblong, and Nine Partners.

These newly acquired lands were frequently mentioned as "The Saratoga Settlement," "The Mohawk Country," and the "Genesee Valley."

"The present estate of the plantation of New Plymouth, 1624.

"At New Plymouth there are about 180 persons, some cattell and goats, but many swine and poultry, 32 dwelling houses, whereof 7 were burnt last winter and the value of £500. The town is impailed about half a mile compass. In the town upon a high mount they have a Fort well built with wood, lime and stone, where is planted Ordnance; also a fare Watchtower partly framed for the Sentinel. The place it seems is healthful, for in the last three years notwithstanding their great want of most necessaries, there hath not one died of the first planters. They have made a saltwork, and with their salt preserve the fish they take, and this yeare hath freighted a ship of 180 tunnes. The most of them live together as one family or household, yet every man followeth his trade or profession both by sea and land, and all for general stocke out of which they have."

AMERICAN SOULES.

Rowland Solley or Soule. Among those who were credited with military service under Capt. Samuel Moseley in June and July, 1675 appears the name of Rowland Solley. In the same year, in a list of names of those who were credited with military service under Capt. Daniel Henchman, appears that of Rowland Soles. This name should have doubtless been Rowland Soule. In the various lists of soldiers engaged in the Narragansett war their names were spelled in several fashions. In a document found in the Boston archives were found "Soal" and "Soule." This double name of a member of the Soule family is suggestive and interesting, and it is the opinion of the author that it did not occur as a coincidence or an accommodation. A Rowland Sole was in England during the sixteenth century. Rowland Soule, a son of George and Lydia (Howland) Soule, was born in Dartmouth, Mass., in 1730 and the same peculiar name was perpetuated among his descendants. There was a Rowland Soule in the Freeport, Maine, branch of the family. Bradford stated that George Soule "hath eight children." We know that he had nine. He

may have had a son Rowland who died young and this Rowland, the soldier, may have been a grandson named in his honor. His birth was approximately 1660 and would be of right time for a son of the Pilgrim. We herewith preserve the name and dates for what they are worth.

This William Soule of Swansea and Tiverton was the father of Joseph Soule who settled Broadalbin, N. Y., whereas he had been assigned as the son of William and Hannah Soule of Dartmouth.

It is reported of the herds of reindeer feeding upon the hills of Lapland, that if the animals are not permitted to visit the sea-shore as often as once a year to inhale the saline vapors and drink their fill of salty waters, they will soon pine away and die; and this same hereditary inclination seems to be a universal inheritance bestowed through the will and testament of Nature's laws whereof the whole north race are legatees.

It is said the slumbers of the Norseman's child are never disturbed by the undulations of the waves of the sea and their equilibrium will never be lost in after years, when "Rocked in the Cradle of the Deep." Every current of blood in the venial system, every mental element and every pound of flesh in the corporeal of the Norseman person has been so nicely adjusted to the movements and moods of the restless sea that he revels in the heaving billows.

Kipling's "My Captains" is especially appropriate for designating many persons bearing the Soule family name. When the pedestrian was passing along the waterfront of old Plymouth and Duxboro, during the early days it was safe for him to salute every second man he met with the title "captain." The same authority might with equal propriety be assumed with strangers walking along the shores of Casco Bay at Freeport, Maine.

For a brief period, for a few fleeting years at most, they were isolated from the sight of the sea. When the prolific habits of the families became responsible for the great increase of the population of Plymouth, Duxboro, Dartmouth, Westboro and New Bedford, it was imperative for the human swans to evacuate the localities of their births and seek for homes where the lands were more readily obtainable.

Hence, they migrated across the undefined borders of Connecticut and New York, and these representatives of the third and fourth generation of their Pilgrim ancestor lost sight of the admired blue billows of the ocean; and though often disturbed by an insatiable longing for a taste of the breath of the seasoning seas, they had not long to wait. Their strong, free disposition to royalty, associated with local conditions following the close of the Revolutionary struggle, opened the gates of adventure adapted to their inherited inclination, and several families bearing the name were restored to the welcoming embrace of the amorous ocean, where on the Bay of Fundy they resorted to marine adventure and the catching of lobsters.

All along the shores of Maine the Soules were, in a small way, engaged in navigation. They were the owners and skippers of their own craft. The abundant store of fish they caught and cured upon the warm rocks along the coast constituted an important article of trade and food for their families through the winter when the storms prohibited their going to sea.

Adventures of Samuel Lount.

Samuel Lount was the eldest son of Gabriel Lount, an Englishman who immigrated to the State of Pennsylvania in the middle of the nineteenth century. His mother was maiden named Hughes, of a respectable Quaker family in that state. In 1811 Samuel Lount immigrated in Pennsylvania and settled near the town of New Market, where he married ELIZABETH SOULES, daughter of Daniel and Achsah Hollingshead Soules, where he met with fair measure of prosperity by means of a sterling integrity and force of character, winning the confidence of the people of his district.

In sympathy with the Reform pitted against the rule of the Tory oligarchy known as the Family Compact, in 1834 he was elected to the Upper Canada Parliament by the County of Simcoe and held the seat for two years.

He was an outspoken member of the Rebellion and his arrest was ordered. For a time Samuel Lount was secreted in the homes of the farmers who were in sympathy with the reformed movements and were willing to take the risk of sheltering a Reformer, although he was a fugitive rebel.

Spies for the government were constantly watching them and their vigilance was unremitting. Bending their steps westward they reached Paris, half-way between Brantford and Woodstock, where they found shelter at the home of a Mr. Latshow, who conveyed them by night to the town of Simcoe, not far from the shore of Lake Erie.

By this time he was worn out by fatigue, anxiety and exposure. He narrowly escaped near Galt where several officers were searching for him, entering the front door of the farm-house. He slipped out the back door to hide in an adjacent forest. His case was now desperate and he was determined to escape from the province. A few miles south of Simcoe a long, narrow neck of land reaches a number of miles into Lake Erie.

From the end of this land, then called Long Point, to the nearest southern shore in the State of Pennsylvania, is about thirty miles. Leaving his hiding place near Simcoe, he traveled by night down to Long Point, where he found a French Canadian named Deas who sympathized with their cause. They embarked in an open boat and for two days and nights, without food or sleep, they battled with the winds and waves of Lake Erie. Cold waves saturating their garments, they suffered indescribable misery, making slow progress. His heart beat high with hope when seeing the Pennsylvania shore.

Suddenly, a strong wind blew up from the south and their boat was blown back into the lake. Crushed by despair, they ceased rowing and allowed the boat to go with the wind and current.

If the fugitives and companions remained in the boat they knew certainly that death awaited them. Believing them to be smugglers, a farmer assembled his neighbors and seized them. This, for Samuel Lount, was the beginning of his journey to the scaffold. He was identified and sent to Toronto, where he was lodged in jail.

The following statement concerning the branch of the Soule family early settled in Canada was abstracted from letters received from descendants. There is no doubt of their origin; they were originally from the United States and traced their lineage from George Soule, the Pilgrim ancestor.

Wilson Soule was a medical doctor, born August 29, 1837, somewhere in the United States and was at one time a practitioner in the township of Manous, County of Durham; date and place of death unknown. Name of his wife not known. He was the father of several children, among them the following:

Wilson Soule of Linden, Michigan, says his father, Dr. Wilson Soule, was a native of the State of New York. Wilson Soule was eighty-five years of age in 1920, says his brother George; is still living in Canada. Wilson Soule says he has three sons and seven girls. He has lived in Michigan more than forty years.

The French-American Soules.

The traditions held by the several American families of the Soule family claiming a French derivation do not harmonize, but the apparent discrepancy may, however, arise more from the variety of language employed in the statements concerning their history than in the actual fact. A more willing and comprehensive statement by those who were familiar with the history of the several branches would have removed all of the problematical doubts and have supplied considerable information to enhance the memorial.

The Misses Virginia and Maria Soule, residents of Bridgeport, Connecticut. daughters of the late Blaise Soule, a popular railroad official and respected citizen, have stated that he was a native of France and came to this country with an uncle, and that all of the remaining kindred were residents of their native country; but these ladies, though often courteously solicited, have persistently refused to supply any names of relatives, location of residences or other particulars concerning their grandparents. Such information with brief biographical facts and a portrait of their respected father would have enhanced the interest and value of this memorial and have made stronger the bond of union between the French and American families.

Several other representatives of the late French branches have been found during the author's researches, but their willingness to supply the desired information required to fill the scope of this work has been very limited and indicated the existence of some family experiences in the land of their nativity which they wished to conceal, and which may have given impetus to their settlement in America.

In contradistinction to this prevailing inclination to secrecy one venerable and reliable gentleman, descended from a respectable French family, has faithfully informed the compiler of this work concerning the history of his immediate family connections. His grandfather, one John Soule, came to America before the Revolution and settled on Long Island in New York harbor. His brother, Marshall Soule, was a distinguished commander in the French army and probably a kinsman of Count Jerome Soule whose military career won for him the engravure of his name on the Arche de Triomphe and a burial in Pere La Chaise. This emigrant ancestor died before the close of the Revolution, leaving a widow and three children, John, Benjamin and Lambert, who removed to Orange County, N. Y. There was also a daughter, named Sarah, who was married to Ananias Smith, without issue.

Benjamin Soule, son of the first John, died somewhere in the West Indies and his personal history is unknown.

Lambert Soule, son of the first John, born Jan. 10, 1803, removed from Orange County, N. Y., about the year 1824, and married CATHERINE RITCHIE Dec. 20, 1827, by whom there were eight children to carry on the family. was a farmer and an ardent member of the local Methodist Church. Soule died Jan. 17, 1848, leaving a will in which the names of her children were given. Lambert Soule died March 17, 1888. He married, 2d, a widow. Children as follows:

1. Eli Soule, Esq., was a lawyer of ability, whose career is mentioned in another place. He left a family and this strain of Soule blood is not likely

- to be extinguished. He was a member of the Presbyterian Church and a prominent Mason. He resided in Canisteo for many years. He read law in Ithaca, N. Y. He married a widow, JANE FERRISS, who died in 1905. He died Oct. 31, 1902, childless.
- 2. Emily Soule, born Jan. 15, 1831, remained unmarried. She had a good share of the bringing up of the younger children. The stepmother, being an invalid, spent much time at water cures. Emily Soule was very religious and an earnest worker in the Methodist Church of Mecklenburg, N. Y. After the death of her father, she and her sister Adelaide established a little home at the last-named place where they were employed with plain sewing and dressmaking for many years. She had previously learned the trade of tailoress. She died Dec. 23, 1896, greatly lamented for her unblemished character and useful life.
- 3. Sarah Soule, second daughter of Lambert and Catherine (Ritchie), born Jan. 28, 1833, was married to Madison Head Jan. 15, 1861. Removed to Illinois, where she died Oct. 12, 1854, childless.
- 4. Robert R. Soule, second son of Lambert and Catherine (Ritchie) Soule, born March 6, 1835, learned the carpenter's trade; married Jemima Douglas Nov. 7, 1861 and was a farmer for many years. He worked at his trade, however, a few years in Alpine, N. Y., where he became a Mason. He returned to his farm, where he continued until the failure of his health; from that time on until the death of his wife, April 9, 1908, he lived at Trumbull's Corners, N. Y. He now (1912) makes a home with his relatives. Has no children.
- 5. Lawrence L. Soule, third son of Lambert and Catherine (Ritchie) Soule, born June 25, 1837, learned the trade of printer but was, in 1912, and had been for many years, living on his farm near Moreland Station, Schuyler County, N. Y. He married HARRIET SHERWOOD and they had three children, Estelle, Arthur and Ralph, whose records of births have not been ascertained.
- 6. Clarissa Ann Soule, third daughter of Lambert and Catherine (Ritchie) Soule; born April 11, 1840, died Feb. 2, 1855.
- 7. Oletha Adelaide Soule, the fourth daughter of Lambert and Catherine (Ritchie) Soule, born Jan. 10, 1842, lived on her father's farm until his death, but is now (1912) living in Mecklenburg, N. Y., where she does plain sewing. Like her maiden sister before-mentioned, she is a devoted communicant of the Methodist Church, and unmarried.
- 8. Jerusha Young Soule, fifth daughter of Lambert and Catherine (Ritchie) Soule, born April 24, 1845. After her mother's death, and when but three years of age, she went to live with her aunt, Jerusha Young Soule, in Ithaca, N. Y., where she continued till seventeen years of age. She was educated at Ithaca Academy. On Jan. 29, 1863 she was married to Elijah Wintersteen of Sandusky, Ohio, by whom she had a son, Lambert Soule Wintersteen, born Dec. 3, 1864, and died in August, 1865. The family then came to her father's home in Tompkins County and lived there for five years. She taught in the public schools of Sandusky, O. On June 28, 1880 she was married to her brother-in-law, John W. Wintersteen, by whom she had a daughter, Emily Adelaide Wintersteen, born March 7, 1884. After her second marriage she

lived in Toledo, O., Wabash, Ind., Chardon, O., then came back to New York. She was a Methodist and died at her sister's home in Mecklenburg, N. Y., Sept. 25, 1910.

I. LAMBERT SOULE WINTERSTEEN is a druggist in Park Ridge, Illinois. He married Florence Vincent Goodwin about 1891.

II. EMILY ADELAIDE WINTERSTEEN was married to CLARENCE CARMAN June 17, 1911. Before her marriage she taught school in Rochelle, N. Y., and Belvidere, Ill., and several other schools. She was a graduate from Canisteo High School and the Brockport Normal; her education being acquired through the untiring efforts of her mother, Jerusha Soule Wintersteen.

This family history was supplied by Emily Wintersteen Carman of Trumansburgh, N. Y., R. F. D. No. 31.

The foregoing furnishes sufficient evidence of all that has been found to prove the unreliability of the statement so often made, and sometimes given publicity through the press, that all the currents of Soule blood sprang from Plymouth, Mass. It also strengthens the claim that France was the land from which came the English and American families. The descendants of those hardy old Norsemen who followed Rollo to Gaul have not all left the country, and among the sunny hills and sequestered vales of that picturesque land there still reside in peace and contentment many families who bear the name, and in whose veins flows the pure Scandinavian life-current.

New York Census Records, Washington, D. C.

Knowing that the census returns, if well preserved, would furnish a prolific treasury of genealogical information the author of this work employed several women who were familiar with the numerous volumes to turn the pages leafby-leaf and make copies of all entries containing the names of Sole, Soale, Soule, Soules, Soules, Sowles, etc. These copyists were competent and faithful, and though the books were heavy, dusty and somewhat shattered, they were all culled and the records written down. The charges were fifty cents per hour and the results well worth this price. The names of the children were not all recorded in regular order and were found, in some instances, to disagree with the family records; but these discrepancies were often the result of the deaths of children when quite young, whose names were unknown to their present-day relatives, and thus the criticisms. These records, with the dates of the years when taken, have proved of great value and assistance in placing the approximate times of birth and in giving the location of the births of the parents, and by corroborating personal names and distinguishing persons bearing the same Christian names. For reference it was thought best to publish these in full as they now appear.

The Soules in New Orleans, La.

It is with regret that the author of this work presents the result of his long research to the family-at-large without a particular account of the numerous families who have borne the Soule and Sowle names in this city and community. All names found in the city directory have been culled and circulars mailed to each person; but only one person in the whole list has ever replied or furnished any particulars concerning the origin of these families. This was, evidently, a letter written by an old lady without education, and her knowledge of their history was meagre and disconnected.

There are two theories presented for consideration. These families may have been descended from a Spanish ancestry who were among the early pioneers of the locality and of pure Spanish blood. There were in Spain families named "Sole" and "Soal." It is, however, more reasonable to suppose that these families were the descendants of some of those who early removed from Plymouth County, Massachusetts, about 1730-38. Some of the second generation are known to have moved South from North Carolina and to have

founded homes in distant localities.

Whatever their origin, these families have remained ignorant of the early history of their ancestors or they were willing to have their posterity follow their example. This deficiency invites the attention of the future historian and genealogist, and the author fondly hopes that they will be more successful in their efforts to break the silence and procure an intelligent account of them.

Sole in Norway.

I had occasion to mention a locality named "Sole" in the introductory section of this book but had no further knowledge of the place since the information there supplied. I have recently learned of a family living in the West who were formerly residents of the place and have forwarded the facts comprised in the following description.

"Sole" was near Stayanger, Norway. On this place thirteen men lived at one time with their families. This landed estate was not distant from Trondiem and bordered on the North Sea. This was the home of ----- Sole, whose name seems to have been derived from it. He raised a family here and died at the age of 94. His children were named Ole, Kristian, Serina, Ingeberg and Anne. Kristian Sole is still living at Haaland, Stavanger, Norway, One of the daughters was married to Andrees A. Rosland, Bryne, Orre, Stavanger, Norway. One sister resides at Bore and they derived their name from the place. Enok Erickson Sole came to America in 1881 and his fiancée followed: they were married soon after and were the parents of five children. Her maiden name was Anne Johanne Petersen Weigdel, from a place called Weigdel. The residence of Enok Ericksen Sole is Marshall, Minn. A grandfather, named Erick, married Kristina. Children of Enok Ericksen Sole were: Petra Caspara Sole, now at the United States Veterans Hospital, Northampton, Mass.; Clara Elida Sole, was married to Hiram S. Palmer who was killed on a train; Elmer Arthur Sole, born Jan. 6, 1888, married Ethel Shave and has issue, Ludvig Conrad Sole, married Ella Martha Moe, by whom issue: Anne Johanne Sole, died in 1892.

Arms of Soules in France.

The verbal description of this coat-of-arms, printed in the vernacular, seemed very mysterious and could not be translated with certainty into the English abbreviated heraldic forms. The French description was forwarded to a teacher of that language in Los Angeles, Cal., and while there was submitted to the president of a university, but neither were willing to guarantee the translation. It will, therefore, be seen that the French version, as well as the supplied translation, were published in the heraldic department of this work. The colored drawings made for the engravers were expensive and obscure and the author feels a sense of uncertainty and embarrassment as he submits the results of his difficult task to the readers. He cannot, therefore, introduce this, though beautiful, drawing to his critics with the assurance desirable. This coat was considered important because from it the embattled dungeon-keep seemed to have been transferred to the arms borne by the early English Soles and Soules; thus supplying a strong connecting link between the two branches of the family. The picture is a beautiful specimen of heraldic art and must be accepted for what it is worth.

He published an article that was considered a reflection upon the Empire and was placed under arrest. He escaped, however, and disguised, filled the position of a shepherd for two years. He finally reached the English Channel and the United States. He settled at New Orleans, La., where he engaged in the practice of law. His ability soon attracted the attention of the public and he was elected to the United States Congress. Afterward he was sent as Minister to Colombia, South America; then to Spain, where he fought a duel and wounded his rival in the throat. His son, an assistant, also fought a duel while in Spain.


Pierre Soule was an orator of great eloquence and held his hearers spell-bound by his singular dramatic force. See his portrait in this work.
