

THE WALLS OF JERICHO. A PLAY IN FOUR ACTS BY ALFRED SUTRO

The scenes of "The Walls of Jericho" are in London, and the action centres around two men from Australia, one of whom has married the young and beautiful Lady Alethea, and the other of whom contemplates marrying Lady Lucy Debenham, Lady Alethea's sister. "The speeches that Mr. Sutro puts into the mouths of his characters carry their wit or their point, their mood or their passion, across the footlights. Most of the situations in which he places his personages come reasonably into being, and have humorous or emotional pungency. He respects our Anglo-Saxon fondness for sentiment as the spring of every action in the theatre, and for the blending of that sentiment with humorous or satirical contrast. There is fervor in Mr. Sutro, and it flowers into dramatic strength. He has even a moral earnestness that in this particular play makes him the heir of Henry Arthur Jones. Yet he observes keenly, and he puts the result of that observation into dramatic form with persuasive vivacity. From beginning to end there is the breath of sincerity in 'The Walls of Jericho.' It is steadily alive. Mr. Sutro has something individual to say, and he has acquired some of the means by which he may say it impressively. The result is a striking, even a notable play."

## SHAW—A MINIATURE BIOGRAPHY

George Bernard Shaw-novelist, journalist, critic, politician, Socialist, and dramatist-was born in Dublin, July 26th, 1856. He left school at the age of fourteen, went to London in 1876, and for years did his best to gain recognition as a writer. He attrated attention as a critic of music and plays in the early nineties, and began to write plays himself. He first became known as an acted dramatist in this country in 1894, when Richard Mansfield produced his "Arms and the Man." Extended reputation came to him in 1898 when his two volumes of "Plays Pleasand Unpleasant" were published, and now his fame is world-wide.




## THE REPERTORY THEATRE


