\section*{CHARLES, R}

Trusty w wellbeloned, Wee U rect you Well. Having beer leformed that several of our Subjects amongst you, called Qua= Keri, hatic been, \&are Imprisoned by you, whereof Some have been Executed, \&others (as hath been represented into \(\mathrm{D}_{\mathrm{y}}\) ) are in danger to bndirgoe the Like: Wee halle \(\sim\) thought fit t to signifie our Pleafure in that behalfefor the future, And do hereby Require, that if there be any of thole People called Quakers amongst yowl, now all: ready Condemned to fifer Death, or other Corporall Punishments, or that are ImpriSon d, obobnoxioufs to the like Condemnation, you forbeare to Proceed any farther a there in. But that you forth with send the fid Perfons, whether Condemned of I mprifon ed, suer into this our ting dom of England, to ether with the rejpectine Crimes" or offences laid to there charge, to the end gush cur \(\int\) e may be taken with them here, as halle agreeable to our Lawes, at their Demerrits, And for soc doing, the fe our Letter, ghalbe your Warrent, of sufficient Discharge.

Given at our Court at WhiteHall, the \(9^{\text {th }}\) day of September, 1661 in the 13 yare of our Reigned

England; os all the Collonies thereunto belonging, that now are, or here after halle: And to all \& every the Ministers, of oficersthere, off Our \(\int\) aid Plantation, Collonies Whatsocuer, in the Continent of new England.

\section*{A Copy of A Letter sent from Hew England, to Friends.}

The \(2^{d}\) night after wee weighed Anchor from the Downer, wee had agreat storm, es were Suddainly in the night/surprized with a whirlwind, \&s were greatly del liuered with the lofsc of our maine Sale, Wee had a very comfortable passage, being Inf y weeks, wee were brought mere the Land in a months time, but melt with prity hard \(\sim\) weather on the Coast, \& great storms, but were preferued in all, st the Presence of the Lord was with vs. When wee came into Bojton Harbour, many came
on Ship board, for INewes 8 Letters; But were some what Struck in \(A\) maze, when
 they pafsed a way; SoI continued on Ship board, waiting to fce what would be done, expecting wee might be fent for, \&f finding other wife, the Mafter \&o my selfe, fitted our Selues togo on ghoare, to deliuer our Letter, to the Governour; when we came on Shoare, wee found all very ftill, \& a very great calme; the moderate sort (as Imet them) Reioyced to jee me, \& some of the violent wee met as men Chained, so bowed downe, os could not looke vs in the face (the weight of Guilt: being on them). Soe wee pafsed to the Gouernour, which some of the per fecu: tors perceining, hagted the ther befor \(\mathcal{v}\); when wer Came before the Gouernour, at his houfe, Ralph Gold Jmith (master of the Defsell)deliuerd him the Letter; Soe he required our hats to be pulled off, \& bid that they fhould be giuen vS a: gaine, then he opened the Letter, \&s looked on it, \&s had few words to vs, only a/ked me, why I came againe,' \(x\) why I did not send for my family to England: is soe wee pajsed a way, os went to Difit our friends in prifon, which were lohn Smith s\% his wife, \&s Iohn Chamberlaine of Bofton; the Woman had been aprifoner two yeares: Soe on the first day of the weeke, the Confables in the fore part of the day, was at three houjes to looke for bs, but we were on= shipboard; But about noone wee went on hoare, ow were at a meeting at Io hn Chamberlains house; on the morrow I pafsed to Falem, where I was re= ceiued with much loy sgladnefs of heart, by many of the people of the Towne; And many friends did accompany mee into the Towne, to my Dwelling. Where 1 found all things well, the LORD hauing been (in my abferce) A father tomy Children, \&s A hufband to my Wife: And though Cruelty hath greatly abounded, yet truith hath here gotten prety much ground of the Aduerfary; \& the Coming of our Ship is of wery wonderfull ceruice, for the Bowells of the Moderate Sort are greatly refrefhed, through out the Country, and many mouthes:are now opened, which before were shult, is fome of them now Say, Its the Wellcomeft ship that euer came into this Land, \&s the lowe of friends one to another, in Sending the Ship on this Account, \(\sim\) preaches much in this place, \& the seruice of it is like tobe very great; A Generall Court is now Called, st the Minifters are alfo Summonedto Bofton for Counfell. But wee remaine quiet in our Habitations. Iosiah Southwick \& Vicholas Phelps are well: Iosiah was whipt 3 times: \(=\) as this John Chamberlaine (aboue said) hath been whipt Nine times, at the CARTS = TAYLE, becaje he fuffers A meeting at his How \(\mathrm{S}_{0}\). Word is come from the Court that they entend at Prefent to = Let out friends that are Prijoners, \& at Pre eent to 1 cH there Laws alone, and to Send an Agent for England about the Bufine fs.

Ralph Gold mith also writt to London, from Boston bearing date the \(=\) tenth day of the tenth Month 1661). That Friends (the Prisoners \(a=\) bour mentioned) are released out of Prifon, And that Nicholas Vp= Shall, who hath been Banished fine yeares, s Imprisoned about two yeares of it, is released. Al foe, that Truth hath great Dominion in the Land.

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
