My Dear Sir,

After Your note of July 1st, informing me of the ~~general~~ opinion of the George Thompson Testimonial Committee, that it would be ~~advice~~ best to invest the money, ~~now~~ ^{contributed} here for said object, in United States securities ^{and} of the kind known as "five-twentieths," was duly received. ~~The~~ occupation of my time has presented an immediate attention to the ~~object~~. can know, may be his, without
ceasing, in time and in eternity.
