My dear Mr. Spur,

I should have written you long ago re the North India School of Medicine at Luckhiana. I wish to very heartily commend the School, and to urge that our Board give a Grant annually for its current expenses. It has now been in existence for four years, and its first students will soon graduate.

It is interdenominational and thoroughly Christian and Missionary. It is controlled by a Council of which I am Pres.

Dr Anna Fullerton is with  
us and will send you a  
Report for last year, from  
which you can gather certain  
facts. I content myself with  
writing - not only in grant of  
Scholarships to students who  
are being trained for ourselves,  
but for the payment of the  
teaching staff. Several others



Missions are siding in Fris  
way, You ask in a recent  
letter as to why a student  
from Fris School should  
not do the work in the Dakota  
School, If a medical helper  
is wanted for the School only,  
one of the trained girls certainly  
will do all that is required.  
The trouble is that we do  
not yet have a supply of such  
people, A dozen places are  
waiting for the members of  
the first class, These have  
been claimed by those who  
sent them in for training.  
In short it is my judgment  
that you will do well in  
granting the Missions estimate

for this good work, Let  
it be remembered that the  
£25: given last year was  
far more than earned by  
Medical treatment given to  
two or three sickly families of  
our Mission, living in Louisiana.  
It is, in no sense, fair to regard  
that as a gift to the School.  
Had three doctors not been in  
Louisiana, the Board would  
have been called on for  
much more. Dr. Fullerton has  
written very fully to Philadelphia,  
and has shown me the correspond-  
ence. All that I would recommend  
the Board now to do would  
be to grant what the Mission  
has asked. It is a very modest  
request, only £25: more than before.  
Hence a "scrappy" letter.
