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

CONSTITUTION OF THE SOUTHERN PRESBYTERIAN CHURCH FORMULATED IN 1861.

"The General Assembly desires distinctly and deliberately to inscribe on our Church's banner, as she now first unfurls it to the world, in immediate connection with the Headship of her Lord, His last command: "Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature," regarding this as the great end of her organization. (2)

Obedience to it is the indispensable condition of her Lord's promised presence.

A proper conception of the magnitude and grandeur of the task is the only thing that can ever sufficiently arouse her energies and develop her resources, so as to cause her to carry on with vigor and efficiency those other agencies necessary to her internal growth and home prosperity."

We are proud of this Christlike declaration of our fathers, but prouder still that they practiced what they believed.

In 1867, as soon as the Northern blockade was lifted, though so bereaved and impoverished by the war, they sent two missionaries to China Two years later two to Brazil, and so on.

This faith was fully justified in the growth and spirituality of the Home Church.

Dear Mr. Robert:

The old familiard phrase that comes so naturally to the lips. It was a real pleasure to hear again from you.

His trip to Alaska this summer in company with his professor makes a good opening. Elizabeth married and soon to be a mother; may it it be an occasion of deep joy to you all; and the circle I think is complete in the word of the good health of your sisters Bessie and Mary and Mrs. Flening. I recall with pleasure my visit with the Flemings in Harrisbur Please give them all very cordial greetings from me.

You will be interested to know that Philip and Sarah with their four children are just at the point of leaving us again for the work in Teheran. Mrs. Wright, Sarah's mother, is also here, living with her son Robert. Dr. Wishard and his good wife are still living here, doctor/heing still in practice. He has taken Robert Wright in with him which lessens his labors so ewhat. Robert.as you may know, spent one term in Persia but because of complications due to the claims of the Persian government upon him as being a native born Persian and under obligations to serve in the army and perform all other citizenship duties he decided to re ain in this country. Edwin Wright is liable also to fall into these same toiks but for some obscure reason has thus far escaped. In time two of Philip's boys will be liable to military service etcet.

Mrs.Wilson-S.G.-together with some of her family are expected here today as guests of Mrs. Wright-on their way east. I shall pass on your le

letter to her, though she may have been hearing from you directly.
Robert-my son-received his Ph.D. of the U.of M. at Ann Arbor in June What a pity he and Ben could not have known about each other and at least shaken hands. But I can understand how busy Ben must have been; and Robert also burdened with double dutoes-his exams to meet and at the same time carry on his daily duties on the staff of archeology,

He is preparing two books for publication covering the results of their excavations at Seleucia on the Tigris. This assures him of his job until June 1934. Then if there are funds for digging he will again be sent to the field. He has also assurance of work with the U.of Chi-

cago.

As you say Dr. Speer has been undergoing a storm of criticism. It has placed him in a very difficult situation. But the criticism is so evidently unfair and sometimes even unchristian that I think it will eventually fall to the ground and he will standforth more clearly than ever as the leader and champion of conservatism, or in other words, of the Gospel of Jesus Christ the Son of God securely recorded for us and for all mankind in the Scriptures. It was my privilige to see and hear him at Columbus. He handled the situation so adequately and without a sign of resentment against the unjust criticism of him personally. There is no man living that I love more and trust more fully as a leader than Dr. Robert Speer. And yet I do not worry for him. I do worry for the cause of evangelical religion that is bound to suffer more through the unwise leadership of unchristlike zeal than through wither light weight novelists or the so called Laymen's Report.

But I would not be misunderstood: I am an evangelical in the fullest meshing of the word and accept the inevitable conflict that is upon the Church to maintain the one and only true Gospel of Jesus Christ the Son of God, as handed down by prophets and apostles. There are danger points within our church that have to be guarded-perhaps even in our board of foreign missions. It is well that our church as a whole, pastors and elders and laymen, contend vigorously for the Truth as revealed to man in the Scriptures; to guard the purity of our faith: But I also believe that we have an injunction from the Master, as we have an example in Him, to carry on that warfare in the spirit of Christ, ever specking the truth in love and in absolute sincerity.

To my mind Robert Speer comes more nearly to measuring up to this

standard than any others of our leaders-God bless him.

Now I have prolonged this unduly-so shall say in a word about myself: that I am in better health; that I plan in the near future to join my son Robert in Ann Arbor; then a lew weeks in Pennsylvania; then Florida for the winter.

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

You are well upon the way to full recovery: And we are so glad to receive the good news that you will soon be able to carry on the fine work you have been doing. We are grateful that the prayers of folk throughout the church are being anwered.

The above words of greetings, it is my privilege to send to you from the twenty ministers who met at Cadiz, Ohio, Friday and Satruday, November 18, 19, in that delightful Conference.

It was truly a "mountaintop experience"! The devotional element, led so well by Dr. George Irving, was a great inspiration. Then, to sit at the feet of that great man of God, and man among men, Dr. Robert M. Speer! well, words fail me! And to look into the face of that great preacher, Dr. Hugh T. Kerr, and to be led in thinking together of the great implications of the Gospel of our Lord, was a delightful and refreshing experience. And to have come in contact with that beaming personality, Dr. Charles J. Turck, as he led us to face some of the problems of our day, and, to see how we may cope with them, added true balance to the whole program. God bless you, Bob. I wish I could see you and sit down and talk to you about the whole situation.







My dear Dr. Speer:

I thought our meeting the other day was one of the best we have ever had and I want to say that your presence and the part you took helped more than anything else to make it a success. When I went home I told Mrs. Atkinson that I was happier over that meeting than any we had held and that you were at your best. I have two or three things that I want to ask.

- l. Mr. Taft finds it impossible to attend the meetings of our Executive Committee. Krumbine insisted that he should be elected this year but Taft is far away and it is impossible for him to get to New York. We have his resignation from the Executive Committee. Will you allow us to elect you to the Executive Board? I realize that it is possible that you cannot attend always but you could attend three or four of the meetings during the year.
- 2. You made some splendid suggestions regarding a treasurer. I wonder if I could see you some time in the near future and we could talk this matter over. Perhaps you can open the way to introduce me to some of these men. We ought to find a man of middle age, who is deeply interested in our work, is a recognized churchman and has some standing in the business as well as in the religious world. You can help us get such a man.
- 3. This is really one of the most important requests I have ever made. Our Goodwill Congress in San Francisco was a real success and we succeeded in bringing into it more of the religious spirit than we ever have had in any other of our

national meetings. The sermon on Armistice Day preached by Bishop Oldham was an outstanding event.







I resented the ill that kept me in and from my work on this Palm Sunday. The congregation was denied the preaching. Scattered? Perhaps so.My mate sick, and away from home --- and I, alone. I contended to go to church, but the was doctor was "thumbs down". He said it would hurt both me and my folks. The first was all right; the other halted me. I could only send in some announcements and try to set the stage for another day.

The service bour approached, radio on, and Bible and the Upper Room in my hand. While the last two waited, the other brought the secrets of Paul-a man who met Jesus, and knew Him; was disciplined into LIFE, by the "goads" against which he found he could not kick. It seemed a good time for me to consider obstacles, and "foads", and the rest of them that set in men's way---and seem to hinder.

and the rest of them that get in men's way --- and seem to hinder I asked again for "the peace of God" that has so often be been the cry of my soul. What is that? Of course a good conscience. Of course, the absence of anhoyances and frictions, along with the assurance that my best ideals are satisfied, as also those of the great Idealist. And how secured -- with Him, whose peace alone matters? Just as it is secured with any other percentative friend, or fellow. Are we two in hormony, the one with the other? Do we seek the same things, moved by the same motives, purposing the same best and highest as good? And have I given him any offense? Does he hold any thing against me? So when God and I talked it over, bedded after this fashion. I added, "And if-beave you hold any thing against me, forgive it". And then-there-stele-into-my-scull the quiet calm of the peace of God--and I was quiet and satisfied.



### Re the Cook Lectureship

Understanding that you are soon to start for Europe, the Executive Council has requested me to write to you regarding the Cook lectureship, which, by official Board action, you have been asked to accept for the year 1939-40. Our thought regarding the lectureship is briefly as follows:

- (1) Whereas India, China and Japan are the three countries specified in Dr.Cook's will, the intent would not be to stop the lectureship because any one of those countries was not widely open at a given time, and that other countries might be visited, either as an emergency substitution for one or more of the three mentioned or in addition to them.
- (2) The Executive Council believes that the next Cook lectureship should not await the end of the disturbance in China, --- a date which no one can foresee which may be some years away.
- (3) India is now wide open, particularly after the Madras Conference, and a number of representative India missionaries have told me that this coming year would be an exceedingly auspicious period for you and the Cook lectures. Also, Japan is indicated as being a good though perhaps not quite as free a field as ordinarily for this service. There would be little opportunity in inland China. Nevertheless among the grest student groups in Canton, Shanghai, Peiping and other accessible centers, the message would be very helpful. Furthermore, the Philippines and Siam want to welcome you, and needless to say, you would be warmly received in other places in Asia. For instance, you might wish to stop in Beirout and Singapore; and Cairo with Watson at the University, Smith at the Y.M.C.A., Elder and Adams in the Mission, Morrison, executive of the C.M.S. and others would arrange a good hearing.
- (4) The Board and Council here in New York and the missionaries and Missions on the field are all very eager to have you deliver the next course of lectures, and naturally we must recognize that prolonged deferment of them decreases the likelihood of your accepting the responsibility.

Let me know frankly what you think about the whole matter. I know enough not to press you for a decision if, as I earnestly desire, I wish it to be favorable !

We don't see you nearly as often as we would like. Won't you drop in more frequently when you are in New York? Are you willing to be approached occasionally about undertaking a speaking engagement or rendering other helpful service for the Board? You have no idea how greatly and how sorely you are missed in many many areas of the Christian missionary movement in general and of our Board work in particular. Are there any publications, Minutes or other issuances of the Board or of other organizations which you have not received and which you would care to have? If your copy of the

### Re Joseph Cook Lectureship

After my conference with you last Friday regarding the Board's invitation and hope that you would be the next representative of the Joseph Cook fund for the presentation of Christianity in southern and eastern Asia, I reported to Foreign Council that afternoon that for various reasons you were hesitant about accepting. You would have been personally embarrassed by the immediate and unanimous response of the Council. Every member is extremely eager to have you go, especially those members who know Asia at first hand by visit and service there. I could easily make your ears burn by quoting the remarks of four or five of your former colleagues, but I will spare you. However, when I next see you personally, I may report to you two or three of the statements, as they may have some influence, on a couple of different counts, in leading you to a favorable decision.

At the meeting of the Foreign Department of the Board on Monday report was made regarding your attitude toward the lectureship. The members of the Board feel the same way as the Executive Council --- perhaps even more so ! The Chairman, Dr. Herrick, requested the Secretary, Miss Sheppard, to draft a Minute expressing the Department's point of view. He later presented the Minute to the Board, which unanimously expressed itself as hoping that you could take the lectureship. The Board's Minute was as follows:

"The Foreign Department Committee reported that Dr.Robert E.Speer was doubtful as to his acceptance of the Board's invitation that he be the next Joseph Cook Lecturer, preferably in 1939-40. The Board cordially and unanimously endorsed the earnest desire of the Committee and of the Missions to be visited that Dr.Speer will find it possible to undertake this important service for which he is preeminently qualified. The Board and Mission also covet the helpful contribution by Mrs.Speer who it is hoped would accompany her husband on this visit to Asia."

Dr.Herrick may have written you personally. If so I fear he may have placed more "pressure" upon you than you would like. Several times in Department meeting the expression was used, "We must place pressure upon Mr.Speer to go", and I ventured to intimate that too heavy and urgent pressure might not produce the result that everyone desires. However, you know Dr.Herrick much better than I do and will know how to interpret whatever he may write to you personally.

In as much as you spoke of the possibility of your writing to Dr. Erdman in connection with this lectureship. I am sending a copy of this letter to him.


Dear Dr. Speer:

I finished reading "George Powen of Bombay" some time ago and want to thank you for writing it. His life surely shows the power and presence of God in a completely surrendered soul. I got acquainted with Mrs. W. W. Bruere, whose testimony you include in the last chapter, while we were on our last furlough. Her son Bowen was my classmate at Princeton Seminary and I was in correspondence with him shortly before he died in Bombay, while still a young man. I can remember his deep earnestness in prayer in his room in Alexander Hall and how pardee Erdman, unlike him in temperament, came a number of times to see him.

The Board deputation has come and gone and it was a pleasure to have them in our home. Dr. Emmons stayed with us; he was pastor of the Stroudsburg, Pa. Church when that Church sent us to India as their representatives in 1918. "Pete" always says that we are their substitutes in India, for he and Mrs. Emmons had hoped to come. It was a joy to help him get some carved wood tables and trays for which Saharanpur is famous, and he wrote us a very nice letter from Karachi just before he took the plane to Persia. pr. Odell knew my brother Harold and he said the moment he stepped onto the verandah that he could recognize me as Harold's brother. Leroy Dodds spoke in Urdu in our Seminary Chapel and he hadn't forgotten many words, his full-face smile helping him to get his meaning understood where there was a slight hesitancy in vocabulary. I sat next to Miss Schultz at station dinner and I'm afraid we were guilty of talking about you some! Perhaps your ears burned a little. Miss Frame impressed us all, and we are particularly grateful to her because she later helped our son Erdman when he and Mason Harper passed through Shanghai on their way to America.


I have recently completed reading H. V. Morton's "Through Lands of the Bible" and enjoyed it very much. He describes his experiences in out-of-the-way places in Mesopotamia, Arabia and Egypt. My wife and I have also enjoyed Nora Waln's "Reaching for the Stars" because of her kindly understanding of German people and her clear portrayal of the detrimental hold the present Government has upon them. There is a book that I have nearly finished which reminds me of your good advice to mingle the old with the present-day; "Selected English Sermons" from the sixteenth to the nineteenth centuries. My dear Dr. Spear:-

Yesterday afternoon I finished rereading for the second time (many parts third and fourth time) your book on "The Meaning of Christ to me".

I cannot recall whether I wrote to thank you after reading it the first time, but be that as it may I want to thank you now, for it was a strengthening of my own faith, greatly needed at this time.

The last chapter or letture on the Second Coming of our Lord is

esnecially beautiful.

Every Sunday morning in our Church Litany we pray

"Hasten the day when the kingdoms of this world shall become the kingdom of our Lord and of lis Christ; and may we be accounted worthy to stand before Him.

Lord, for Thy coming us prepare: May we to meet Thee without fear,

At all times ready be: In faith and love preserve us sound;

O let us day and night be found Titing with joy to welcome Thee.

Keep us in everlasting fellowship with the Church Trimumphant, and let us rest together in Thy Presence from our labors:

Hear us, gracious Lord and God."

That represents the position of our Church on this great

doctrine and also my own personal position.

I cannot have any sympathy with those, who we in these days are continually asserting, that the present world situation is the assured evidence, that our Lord is now coming.

But how one does yearn to pray with St. John, the Divine:-

"Amen. Come Lord Jesus. Come quickly."

There does not seem to be any solution of the present world situation, unless the Lord comes. The outlook is most gloomy and terribly depressing. And what an indescribable blessing it would be in one's own life, if the Lord would come:


Have you ever published anything on the great mysterious problem of unanswered prayer? I can find nothing in the list of your

published works.

The promises of our Lord seem so absolutely limitless, and yet practical experience points to unnumbered unanswered prayers. I have in my library only one book, which tries frankly to meet this problem, and that is Sir Robert Anderson's "The Silence of God". That was published in 1913, and he begins with the unanswered prayers of the Armenians in the awful massacres of the late 90's. But think of all that has happened since then. He of course does not really solve the problem.

Think of the millions of agonized prayers, that are being unanswered even now. What shall we think of the prayers for peace that were offered before the fatal September days? Must we assume that all were merely formal or offered without faith?

And quite apart from the present world situation, what can we say about the unanswered prayers with our own personal experiences?



Of course I know very well the zwnekiwnxk convential and so to say "arthodox" answers to these problems. Have I not again and again have had to use them in public preaching and in private "cure of souls", but these traditional answers do not really satisfy and do not seem to rhyme with the promises especially in St. John 's Gospel.

I can think of many cases within my own experience, when prayers we which would have seemed to be well within the will of Lord have

remained unanswered even unto this day with disastrous consequences. Of course I admit without any reservation that the fault is not with the Lord, but with the one who prayed or with the one, for whom the prayer was made, but that does not solve the problem and brings no comfort to the troubled soul.

Pardon me for inflicting all this upon you, but I could not resist the urge to unburden my heart with some of the thoughts that are pressing

heavily upon me.

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

My dear Mrs. Speer,

Within the last few days I have had the very strong conviction that in the projected Religious Education Building in the State College Presbyterian Church in the unit given over to the work of the Westminster Foundation, there ought to be some tangible memorial to the contribution your family have made to Christ's cause throughout the world.

Our Westminster Foundation here is planning a section of the Religious Education Building with a Gothic Chapel that will seat some two hundred. Four meeting rooms similar to the Freshman, Sophomore, Junior, Senior Class Prayer Meeting Rooms in Murray Dodge Hall in Princeton, especially at the time of my class, 1915. Each one of these four rooms will be planned as distinct in itself, with beautiful pictures that will make fellowhip inviting. We hope also to have a library with facilities for quiet meditation. There will also be a fireside room, accommodating some seventy-five students, with stones from significant places of religious interest, such as Mars Hill, the Lake of Galilee, the Mount of Olives, Northfield, etc.

The Dr. Harold McAfee Robinson Memorial Fellowship was established last spring to commemorate the influence of Dr. Robinson. Miss Ione V. Sikes, a person with a very distinguished record in Christian education throughout the country, lately Assistant Director of Young Peoples' Work under the Board of Christian Education, has been designated as the first recipient of this Fellowship.



I came to know Elliott during the years 1919 to 1922 while I was a student in Princeton Seminary and he was in the University. I recall his asking about my opinion of his going to Northfield to be associated with Mr. Will Moody. My brother John was his predecessor at Lafayette as Head of the Bible Department.

I have known your husband for more than a quarter of a century.

The conviction that has come to me has been that of setting aside one of these four meeting rooms, or the library, or the fireside room, as a memorial to the Christian contribution of your distinguished son and husband. I am confident that friends in Huntingdon as well as in Harrisburg would be happy to participate in the establishment of such a memorial. Mr. Vance C. McCormick is a member of the Board of Trustees of the Westminster Foundation here as is Dr. Lewis S. Mudge, formerly of Pine Street, and also Pit Van Dusen.

My home for many years was in Harrisburg, where my father served as State Secretary of the Y.M.C.A. of Pennsylvania. Mrs. Edward Bailey was an intimate friend of my late mother.

Dr. Speer was born in Huntingdon Presbytery and has always been claimed as one of our distinguished sons.

Our Board of Trustees is definitely related to the Sesqui-Centennial Fund for Christian Education. There is not the slightest doubt in my mind but what funds are to be made available throughout the Synod of Pennsylvania for the Westminster Foundation unit.

Tonight the architect is to present some of his drawings of the quarters to be occupied by the Westminster Foundation. Last week a member of the Board of Trustees pledged \$1,000 to the Westminster Foundation Building Fund. The local congregation has already pledged approximately \$29,000 thus far. The ultimate success of the undertaking does not seem to be in doubt.

I am communicating with you somewhat informally to present this matter to you for your judgment. I have not as yet presented this to the Board of Trustees and am therefore acting on my own responsibility. Naturally, I would not feel free to write Dr. Speer, knowing his innate Christian humility, since it concerns him. I have not written as yet to your daughter-in-law.

It happens also that the Reverend Robert L. Dieffenbacher, the Director of our Sesqui-Centennial Program in the interests of this project, was a student in Lafayette, and came under the influence of Elliott when Elliott served as Chaplain there.

I should be glad to come to New York to discuss the matter more in detail if you felt it necessary before the family gave their willing consent for such an evidence of lasting remembrance. The united witness of yourself, your husband, your son and your daughter ought not to be passed by without deep gratitude to God. I am confident many would welcome the opportunity of having a share in making such a lasting tribute possible.




The Seminar at Granville was very enriching and stimulating to me. For a long time I have felt that the Board of Christian Education might do a very valuable piece of work by sending out a kind of minister to minister. Of course a call on each minister is out of the question, but such gatherings as we had the other day help serve the same purpose.

Now as to suggestions. I think you do well to have some one with a mind as tough as Dr. Piper's on the team. And it is well that his point of view be thrown into the discussion. However, I found that my mind and his mind did not meet; we did not talk the same language; he seemed to think in a world quite foreign to my own. Of course this is no reflection on Dr. Piper, but rather upon myself. The trouble, however, is that when two trains of thought fail to come anywhere near each other, there can be no there can be no collision out of which discussions arise. I wonder if somehow Dr. Piper could be induced to start with the kind of theology most of us have (if there is any such theology) and lead us out into the kind he thinks we ought I suppose if my mind were good enough, I could start with to have. the kind he has and lead myself out of the wilderness. felt myself left "cold" by his presentation of "authority". sources of authority are mine, but somehow what he said about them did not "bite in".

Dr. Speer was unusually good and even if I could think of them, I would not suggest any ways by which his presentation could be improved. It happens that I thinknof no such ways.

Your own job of leading the Seminar and pulling together the ends, was done superbly well.

The Conference on "Faith and Life" at Wilmington, I think, was a real success. The men who were there found real help for themselves. I do not believe Dr. Piper made the addition to the conference that man of us had expected. More and more I am convinced that there is a real difference between the American type of theological presentation and the Continental. Our minds are different. It may be that young men just out of college may eagerly grasp what our friends from across the sea bring out. But many of us who have been in the thick of the fight like what you and Dr. Speer bring us.

So impressed were our men with the seminar that the suggestion has been made that it might be possible for us to secure Dr. Speer for our laymen's retreat and also for one for our ministers.

For two years we have had a retreat of picked groups of laymen who meet from Saturday afternoon to Sunday afternoon. The meetings are held in our conference grounds at St. Edmunds, Glendale.

We also have an annual retreat of our ministers. We have wondered if it would be possible to combine these two groups. I imagine we would have a group of sixty laymen for the full period and probably one hundred or more ministers. Can you suggest to me the best way to approach Dr. Speer on this matter?

It was a pleasure to have you at the Wilmington conference. The contribution you gave was one that many of our men appreciated.






