Mr. Speer's Minutes for Council Meeting July 9th, 1919.

Letters were presented to the Council from Mr. Scott and Mr. Schell with regard to their visit in California.

Mr. Speer made a report with regard to the two bequests made to him under the will of the late Mrs. Emma Carradine Stuart of St. Louis. One of these bequests was for \$15,000. the annual income of this amount to be used to support some missionary on the foreign field. Under this bequest Mr. Speer had received a check for 8,218.75, being a partial payment of \$9000. on account of the legacy, less inheritance tax of \$750. and \$31.25 interest thereon, at the rate of 6% per annum from October 9, 1918, when payment of the inheritance tax was due. Mr. Speer reported that he had turned over this amount to the Treasurer of the Board with the understanding that the Board would accept this and any further payments that might be made on account of this legacy and hold ^{the} same as an endowment fund, the interest to be used as specified by Mrs. Stuart in her will. The other bequest was for \$35,000. to be used according to his judgment or that of the Board in the advance of foreign and home missionary work. Mr. Speer reported that after consulting with Mr. Stiger he had decided with Mr. Stiger's approval that it would best meet the terms and intent of Mrs. Stuart's bequest if he should divide the amount of this legacy administering one-half of it according to his judgment and dividing the other half between the Boards of Home and Foreign Missions. In accordance with this arrangement Mr. Speer reported that he had received the full bequest, less \$2412.50 and \$100.54 interest thereon at the rate of 6% per annum from October 9, 1918, the date when the inheritance tax was due, and that he had sent checks for \$8,121.75 each to the Treasurers of the Boards of Home and Foreign Missions. It was voted to express approval of these actions of Mr. Speer as Trustee of these bequests.

Dear Sir:

In making out checks for your legacies under the will of Mrs. Emma Carradine Stuart, I am deducting not only the amount of the inheritance tax assessed against same from the amount of the respective checks, but also interest thereon at the rate of 6% per annum from October 9, 1918, the date when said payment was due.

I am requesting you in a form letter to send me a receipt for the full amount, but as the Probate Court has not determined as yet the matter of allowance of interest on legacies, nor the matter of interest on the inheritance tax paid by me on your legacy, it might be better for you to defer sending me the receipt requested until these matters have been determined.

By the terms of the check the payment is made on account, so that I think there is no reason why you should hesitate to sign a receipt on the back of the check or endorse same, and this will be for the time being a sufficient acknowledgment of the check for my files.



An additional \$8000. is left to advance the work of the student volunteer movement, the object of which is to train missionaries.

\$50,000 LEFT TO MISSIONS IN WILL OF MRS. STEWART

The will of Mrs. Emma Carradine Stewart, who lived at 4368 Lindell boulevard, was filed in Probate Court yesterday.

Mrs. Stewart left \$50,000 in trust to Robert E. Spear of New York. The income of \$15,000 is to be used for foreign missionary work by the Presbyterian Church, and the rest to advance home and foreign missionary work.

To her cousin, Rev. Beverly Carradine, 5736 McPherson avenue, Mrs. Stewart left \$2,000.

Other bequests are: Student Volunteer Movement, \$8,000; Young Women's Christian Association of St. Louis, Presbyterian Church at Natchez, Miss., and Mrs. Mary L. Gilman, \$2,000 each; First Presbyterian Church, St. Louis, Markham Memorial Mission, St. Louis, Mrs. Robert E. Williams and Gerret Ten Broek, \$1,000 each; Mrs. Baarent Ten Broek, 4378 Lindell boulevard, mother of Gerret Ten Broek, Mrs. Ten Broek's daughter, Maurine, Mrs. Mary G. McDonald, Rev. Rockwell G. Brank, Savannah, Ga., and Rev. A. Lee Wilson, a Presbyterian minister of Wyoming, O., \$500 each.

Mrs. Stewart left several bequests of jewelry and wearing apparel to relatives and friends. Bequests to servants are: Emma Price, \$4,000; Kate D. Issler, \$3,000, and Henry Loving, \$2,000. The rest of her estate goes to her son, Robert Stewart Jr., of New York.

Mrs. Stewart, who was a widow, died Tuesday. Her body was taken to Natchez, Miss., her old home, for burial.

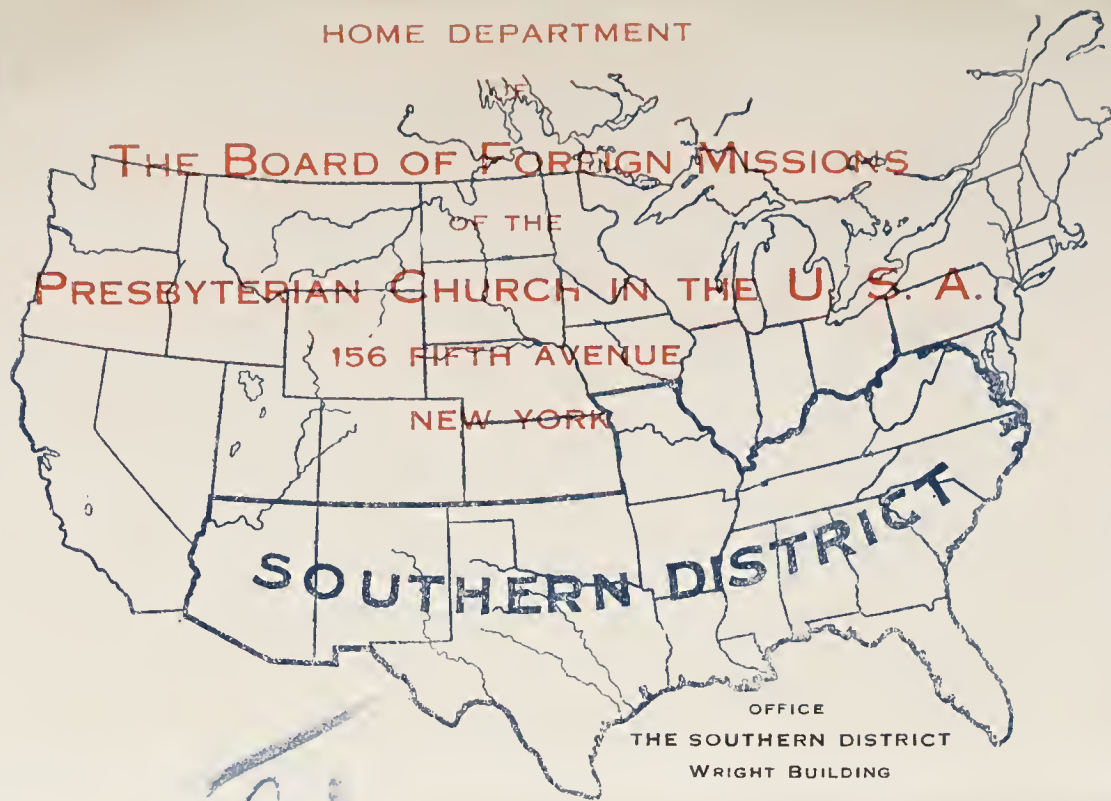
