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
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

Sir A. Cadogan's telegram No. 1384 to Foreign Office: Palestine.

At a cordial interview to-day, the Minister for Foreign Affairs told me the President of the Republic had not yet nominated Uruguayan representative on Committee of Investigation. I therefore read out to him a translation, mutatis mutandis, of relevant passage in paragraph 3 of telegram under reference and expressed personal doubt as to whether Senor Fabregat was of sufficient calibre or experience to do credit to Uruguay on such a critically important Committee. Minister for Foreign Affairs who fully understood the implications of my demarche said that it was a pity that Maceachen could not be spared from London at this time in view of the fact that he was the main spring of Uruguayan delegation to forthcoming financial talks in London. He promised, however, to consider the matter carefully, and I feel that this may result either in instructions being sent to Fabregat to support the British attitude if he is selected as representative or in the nomination by the Uruguayan Government of a representative more to our liking.

our leadership, the influence that we have on world peace than the preservation of our soil. Much has been said and written on the importance of soil conservation. In these days of uncertainty and reconversion when there is evidence of reduction in such a program on the basis of economy, I am sometimes fearful that we propose paring to carry out an objective and in reality accomplish the opposite. In fact, the proposal to tremendously reduce our soil-conservation program has been, I think, appropriately designated as dangerous economy.

The Camden Daily News, of Camden, Ark., carried an editorial under date of April 15, 1947, on dangerous economy. I think this is a very fine editorial and approaches this issue in a most interesting and fair manner. I think it should be of interest to every Member of Congress as we consider this problem, and I include it with my remarks:

DANGEROUS ECONOMY

If Congress takes out of the conservation or triple A program the \$100,000,000 that has been put over in proposed budget-paring column, we may pay for it in the health of this and succeeding generations because a sharply-reduced program won't do much good, and the discouraged agency would likely just fold itself up.

Few people but those engaged in farming and in the soil program realize what has been accomplished in its 10 years of rapid progress. This progress, at that, is only a beginning of what can be done in putting back into the soil what we have taken out of it.

We city cousins may say, "We haven't taken anything out of the soil," but we have.

We, our fathers, and forefathers have continually drawn from the "bank account" of natural soil elements. Like any other bank account, the funds are exhausted when we continue to draw out and never make a deposit.

What we eat, what we wear, what we live in came from the bounty of the land. Each time a pound of produce is harvested something is gone from the soil. Each time it rains and dirt washes into streams, each time the wind blows the sand off our acres, something is gone that only conservation practices can replace.

It's only fair that each of us who takes sustenance from the earth should help the farmer to replace the minerals we've used and help him to replace what's seeped into the rivers or gone with the wind.

We should not look on the soil conservation program as a relief program, as many alphabet agencies are. Under the plan of assistance by the Government, the farmer puts out about \$1 of his own money to each 50 cents paid by Uncle Sam-

It would be difficult to arrive at a dollarsand-cents value of the improvements resulting from conservation practices in Ouachita County alone—the figure would be unbelievable, no doubt. Use of phosphate, limestone, winter legumes, pasture seeding lespedeza, pond construction, and many others now common practices of our farmers were practically unknown to them in 1936.

Yes, if we expect to continue our standard of life, we should be willing to cooperate with the farmer by bearing a part of the cost of maintaining the fertility of the soil. We cannot depend on him to assume the entire responsibility. The productivity of the soil concerns us all—in the price of food and clothing we buy, in the quality of food we eat.

Money put into a Nation-wide soil-building program could take the vitamins off the drugstore shelf. It could insure the productivity of the land we pass on to our children. The Palestine Ouestion

HONORABLE SIRS: Inasmuch as the United States became a party to the international covenant for the establishment of the Jewish national home in Palestine, as contained in the League of Nations mandate to Great Britain of 1922, through the American-British Palestine Mandate Convention of December 3, 1924, we, as Members of the Congress are deeply concerned with the performance of this promise. When Great Britain proposed recently to refer the Palestine question to the United Nations it was reported that the United States delegate, as a condition precedent to the United States consenting to a special session of the General Assembly, insisted that a concrete formulation of the problem must first be made by Great Britain. Accordingly, we would appreciate information on the following questions:

(1) What proposals, or what concrete formulation of the problem, has Great Britain made with respect to Palestine which induced the United States to agree to a preliminary session of the United Nations General Assembly?

sembly?

(2) In view of the fact that article 79 of the United Nations Charter states that "the terms of trusteeship for each territory to be placed under the trusteeship system * * *, shall be agreed upon by the states directly concerned," will the United States take the position in the United Nations Assembly and in the Trusteeship Council that it is one of the states "directly concerned" in the disposition of Palestine?

(3) Has the United States formulated its policy with respect to the matters referred to the United Nations by Great Britain on the question of Palestine, and, if so, what is that policy?

In transmitting this communication we imply no criticism or direction nor any variance from the bipartisan foreign policy of the United States in respect to Palestine, but we seek only to ascertain what will be done by the executive branch so that we may consider how the Congress can contribute its part in bringing about a just solution.

MY DEAR MR. WADSWORTH: I have received the letter dated April 22, 1947, addressed jointly to me and to Senator Austin by you and a number of your congressional colleagues with respect to the reference of the Palestine question to the United Nations.

In reply to your numbered questions I may state as follows:

1. In the preliminary discussions which took place between representatives of our Government and the Secretary General of the United Nations, as well as with representatives of the British Government, we gave it as our view that the procedure adopted for the consideration of the Palestine question should be of unquestionable legality, and should be undertaken by the appropriate body of the United Nations at the earliest possible date. In accordance with this position, we were able to concurin the calling of a special session of the General Assembly of the United Nations for the purpose of creating and instructing a committee to prepare for the consideration of the Palestine problem by the General Assembly at its next regular session.

The concrete formulation of the proposal by the government of the United Kingdom bringing the Palestine issue before the United Nations is contained in a letter from the United Kingdom delegation to the Acting Secretary General of the United Nations under date of April 2, 1947. A copy of this letter is attached hereto.

2. The question of United States policy with regard to article 79 of the United Nations Charter in its relationship to Palestine

will not arise unless or until action is initiated to place Palestine, now held under mandate, under the trusteeship system of the United Nations. According to article 77 of the charter, the trusteeship system applies to such territories, including territories held under mandate, as may be placed thereunder by means of trusteeship agreements. Thus, the transfer of territories from the mandate system of the League of Nations to the trusteeship system of the United Nations is a voluntary rather than an automatic action. The trusteeship agreement must then be approved by the General Assembly or, in the case of strategic areas, by the Security Council.

3. The Department of State believes that, as the special session of the General Assembly of the United Nations was called at the request of the Government of the United Kingdom for the purpose of constituting and instructing a special committee to prepare the Palestine question for consideration at the September 1947 session of the General Assembly, it would be premature for this Government to develop its policy with regard to the substance of this question in such a way as to limit the full utilization of that committee's recommendations and its report.

As regards the procedural questions coming before the special session, our attitude is as follows:

(a) We advocate the restriction of the agenda to the single item proposed by the British Government, on the ground that the sole business of this session should be the constituting and instructing of a committee to work on the Palestine problem.

(b) As regards the composition of the committee, it is our view that it should be of a convenient and workable size and might consist of the representatives of 10 countries. We feel that the committee should have neutral character, so that the members would be able to study this complex problem without being bound by any particular point of view, and to weigh the question on its merits.

(c) We consider that the committee should be instructed to give due weight to all facts and information of value in relation to the problem, hear all important and representative points of view which are offered, and present to the regular meeting of the General Assembly several alternative solutions with a statement and analysis of the advantages and disadvantages of each solution, together with recommendations.

I welcome this opportunity to inform you of the Department's position at the present stage of United Nations consideration of the Palestine question.


"His Majesty's Government view with favour the establishment in Palestine of a national home for the Jewish people, and will use their best endeavours to facilitate the achievement of this object, it being clearly understood that nothing shall be done which may prejudice the civil and religious rights of existing non-Jewish communities in Palestine or the rights and political status enjoyed by Jews in any other country."



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

Price-Cut Drive Puts Emphasis On Wholesaler

Truman Adviser Calls for 'Synchronization' With Retailer to Win Success

While scattered price reductions in stores, along the lines of the Newburyport, Mass., plan, continued throughout the country, the emphasis appeared yesterday to be shifting from the retailer to the wholesaler, producer and big business generally.

Leon H. Keyserling, vice-chairman of President Truman's council of economic advisers, in Washington, called for large-scale, systematic and orderly price reductions, noting that there must be synchronization in the decrease of wholesale and retail prices.

Similarly, Senator Ralph E Flanders, Republican, of Vermont, chairman of a joint Senate-House subcommittee considering the report of the Keyserling group, commended the Newburyport experiment, but indicated that it was his view that it could not succeed without the co-operation of whole-

salers. Mr. Keyserling, in a statement broadcast at 1 p. m. over the Columbia Broadcasting System, calling upon industry to make the price reductions, warned that "it is a difficult feat of business engineering to accomplish price reductions without bringing on corresponding deflation in ployment and production."





The Palestine Problem---Test of Humanity and Democracy

The Hearst Newspapers have been the consistent champion of the Jewish people and have staunchly advocated the creation of a Jewish homeland. They have maintained that this is not a Jewish question but rather a humane question; that it is not a Jewish problem but a world problem; that it is a test for humanity and democracy.

Thirty years ago, in recognition of the great injustice done to the Jewish race. Great Britain issued the historic Balfour declaration. It pledged itself to the establishment of a Jewish homeland. It inculcated hope and happiness among millions of oppressed Jews. It was the rainbow of a new life, and cheer to the homeless and persecuted in the storm-laden skies of the Jewish world. It was in accord with the loftiest principles of justice and with the highest dictates of humanity.

- It was the greatest event since Titus destroyed Jerusalem.
- It was hailed by Christians and Jews alike.
- It was the triumph of righteousness.
- It was endorsed by 51 nations.
- It was approved by the United States government.
- It was reaffirmed by every president since that time.

Weekly Intelligence Appreciation.

Initial satisfaction that the Jewish Agency had secured at last the second of its two objectives, a mandatory hearing by the Political Committee of U.N.O., later gave way to anxiety as to the future course of the enquiry when draft terms of reference of the Fact Finding Committee, containing no reference to the Jewish National home or the problem of Jewish displaced persons and stressing independence as the witimate purpose of any plan, were made known. The attitude of the U.S. delegation has continued to cause disappointment and general Jewish expectations are more sombre than they were a week ago.

2. Arab feathers, ruffled by (?the hearing) of the Jowish Agency, have now been antagonised by parallel



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treatment of the Arab Higher Committee, extorted by the Arab states from the Assembly. The decision to withdraw the Committee's application for an audience was taken by Emile Chouse so that without consulting the Arab Higher Committee, although it was initially accorded a warm press reception, it is known that the Mufti considered it an unwise move and a telegram from Cairo requesting the delegation, should there be reversal of their decision, has been published in the Arab newspapers. Instructed opinion considers that much harm to the Arab cause might ensue from a policy of boycott.

- Jamal Husseini has paid a fleeting visit to Palestine during which he called on the Chief Secretary, received delegations and went on what his supporters described as a trium hant tour. He has now left for Cairo. Muin El Madi, on his return from Egypt, told a press correspondent that the Arab Higher Committee was proceeding with revival of the local National Committee, ostensibly in preparation for elections to a new Committee, but doubtless with the real object of organising opinion behind the present body. Sir Alexander Cadogan's endorsement of the Committee's claim to be fully representative of Palestine Arabs has attracted less ettention than might have been expected, but has been used in a letter from Dr. Rhalidi to the American Consul General here as an argument in support of a protest against refusal to grant a visa to Rasem Khalidi. This protest has been referred by the State Department (according to the Consul General) to the American Delegate to United Nations since it raises interesting question as to how far the United States can control access to United Nations. It might even apply to the Mufti if the Arab Higher Committee asked for his attendance.
- Reports in the American press of negotiations between the Transfordan Government and the Agency, whereby the latter's support for Greater Syria Scheme would be repaid by the former's advocacy of a Jewish State in part of Palestine are, as far as can be ascertained, without foundation.
- 5. Arab officers under Musa Alami's directions are to be opened in Chicago and San Francisco.
- 6. Extensive mandeuvring for position in the pending meeting of the General Ziomist Council at the end of May is going on behind the Jewish front. The opponents of Doctor Silver are trying to ensure that the venue is Palestine. While prospects of anti-Silver (corrupt group) appear not unpromising, it is probable that the course of events in U.N.O. will be the


determining factor. Indications that the outcome will be unfavourable to Jewish aspirations will inevitably favour the extremists, not only the Silver faction, but Revisionists, while supporters of Weizmann have suffered a set back by failure of negotiations between Hashomer Hatzair, Achdut Avodo and Mapai. Doctor Weizmann's refusal to participate in representation of Jewish Agency before U.N.O. at this stage is generally approved, not only by his opponents but by his friends.

7. Delegations of P.K.P. and of P.A.W.S. have left for Europe to attend the formal opening of Yugo-Slavia's five year plan and the Czecho-Slovak Government Congress in Prague.

By the National Military Organisation continue, the liberation of prisoners being apparently not regarded as an act of warfare. Weekly Intelligence Appreciation.

The special session of U.N.O. has closed to Jewish jubilation and Arab lamentation - the Jews being particularly gratified that the terms of reference of the Special Committee, as finally approved, no longer imply that the issue is a local squabble between Arabs and Jews but give scope for consideration of the Palestine question in the general context of the Jewish problem. The attitude of the United States is still a cause of bitterness and disappointment but relief at the line of the U.S.S.R. in the closing stages has predominated over other emotions. Although there is a general recognition that the policy of the Soviet is based neither on sympathy for Zionism nor any genuine compassion for the state of Jewish displaced persons in Europe, and that it is in fact simed solely at eliminating British Administration from Palestine and so liquidating a potentially

hostile/

hostile bridgehead, there is now a widespread expectation that a ground of common interest has been reached with MOSCOW, which will make it relatively easy for U.N.O. to pronounce in favour of a Jewish State created by partition. This eatisfaction is enhanced by the belief that the Soviet's last-minute interpretation of its demand for independence for Palestine as not necessarily implying a unitary State, has exploded Foreign and Colonial Office arguments that the establishment of Jewish States, even in part of Palestine, would finally sever the traditional Anglo-Arab ties of friendship and lead the Arab States henceforth to look to Russia as their champion and protector. While hopes run high, there is, however, a strain of sober reflection that the session now closed has been concerned with proliminaries only, that much may happen before September and that Great Britain as the power in possession will take a groat deal of dislodging against its will. The importance of Mr. Bevin's recent statement on Middle East policy has been fully approciated.

The Arabe regarded the special session of U.N.O. from its outset as an elaborate Anglo-American Zichist conspiracy and based such small hopes as they entertained of a favourable outcome on the support of Ressia for immediate independence for Pelestine and of Asiatic bloc for Arak struggle to and British Imperialistic domination. Mr. Granyko a statement has come as the last and worst of a number of disillusions. The Araba now feel probably alone in a hostile world where justice is only a word. Even Ten Sand, so long immune from criticism, is no more secresanch and Assem Pasha is also under fire for his comparatively optimistic view of the course of events at Take Success. While the ignorant and oredulous believe that the leaders of the Areb world will redeem by force what they have failed to soldeve by diplomacy, an illusion which Jamel Russoint has encouraged by calling to the Arabs to arm, the instructed know that talk of secret resolutions of Mindan is likely to remain only talk. The Arab Higher Committee, and Emile Choury in particular, are subject to good deal of criticism, especially by the Left Wing, for their hendling of the Palestine case but there is no general disposition to repudiate their leadership or replace them by other figures, more effective and more representative. In the present mood of bitterness, almost

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any folly is possible, there is already a body of support for a general Arab boycott of the Special Committee. This course has reportedly been advised by the Arab Higher Committee representatives in New York. Presumably the Committee will define its attitude at its meeting in Cairo this week.

- 3. The intentions of dissidents continue to be a subject of speculation. Some say the National Military Organisation and Stern Group are on the verge of amalgamation, others that a final decision has been against fusion but that the country has been divided between them into zones of influence. On the one hand there are remours of truce; on the other that the war will continue and be intensified until the last British soldier leaves Palestine. Few believe, however, that the U.N.O. appeal will perceptibly alter the course of events. Both organisations are said to have replied that they will only cease operations if the British will discontinue action against the Jewish people and Underground. A noticeable feature has been the dissidents' and particularly the Stern Group's tentative approach to the Communists, in return for which the latter, doubtless on instructions, have ceased to inveigh against "Fascist criminals" of the Jewish Underground. What effect the new Russian approach will have on ardent supporters of the three Palestine Communist Groups remains to be seen. Arab League for National Liberation, at any rate, is likely to he faced with a difficult task of exegesis.

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7. The deportation of a further fifty suspected terrorists to Fraya has swoked the usual protests, including routine statement from Vaed Lewis.

negotiations it has been decided that the general Zionlet Council shall be convened in Palestine. The chances of the moderates, which have thereby been improved, have suffered a set-back by the breakdown of negotiations between Mapai, Achdut Avoda and Hashomer Patzair for a common front. Following this failure, Achdut Avoda is reportedly undergoing fisabon; the more temperate minority may seede and re-enter Mapai.

9. The formal dissolution of the new Zionist Organisation which is the constitutional pre-requisite for re-entry of the Revisionists into the Zionist Organisation has been announced.

10. Pollowing the successful Asre prison break, police and military action has been atepped up. Seventy five prisoners have been suptured or have voluntarily surrendered. During the week, searches were carried out at Nathanya and Givat Shaul, as a result of which ten persons were detained on suspicion of being implicated in terroxist activity.

Weekly Intelligence Appreciation.

The week has been devoted by Yishuv to a re-appraisement of their prospects after Lake Success. Further reflection has (?modified) attitude of extravagent optimism to one of sober confidence based mainly on Mr. Gromyko's clarification of Soviet policy.

2. The Jewish Elected Assembly concluded a three-day session on 22nd May. The (?specific) resolutions expressed support for illegal immigration, endorsed demand for a Jewish State, denounced dissident terrorism and reaffirmed "defensive" measures taken to combat it. A new Yead Leumi was elected which was virtually indentical with the body which preceded it. On the issue of partition, opinion was divided. The main features of Ben Gurion's speech were his recognition that a Jewish State in an undivided

Palestine

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Pelestine was not a practical propostion, and his proposal that the central part of Palestine should be retained under Mandate in order to facilitate Jewish settlement, while the remainder should be constituted a Jewish State. The continuation of the Mandate over Palestine as a whole, the constitution of a binational State and a Trusteeship of three great powers were categorically rejected. In view of the difference between this statement and that made by Silver at Lake Success (?Gurion) has explained that he was speaking in a personal capacity.

The members of the Arab Higher Committee have assembled in Cairo, where they are discussing whether or not the Palestine Arabs should boycott the Special Committee of U.N.O. Doctor Khalidi has stated that a majority is in favour of this course; but there appears to be a substantial body of contrary opinion, and the Arab press as a whole seems inclined towards co-operation. The A.L.N.L. in particular advocates co-operation and is (corrupt group ?calling) for a national conference to lay down a common line based on popular will for "evacuation of all foreign troops, complete independence and (corrupt group) a democratic Government". The Palestine Delegation to U.N.O. has continued to be under fire for its handling of the Arab case before the Political Committee and particularly for its impetuosity in recommending a boycott of the Special Committee before the Arab States had defined attitude.

On 20th May, a party of armed members of Hagana reided a cafe in the Arab village of (?Feauteh) near Petah Tiqva, shot and killed one Arab, seriously wounded three others and slightly wounded a further four. Shortly after, another party raided a Beduin encampment in the same locality, shooting one Arab deade The leader of the first party was killed, but it is still obscure whether he was shot by Arabs or whether he was accidently (?despatch) by his own followers. These outrages have been justified as measures of reprisals for and prevention of Arab banditry, which has been endemic in the Petah Tiqva locality for some time past, The dead Hagana leader was accorded what amounted to a state funeral in Petah Tiqva and J.R.M. issued a communique stressing that the incident had no retalistionary significance. The immediate Arab reaction (2 corrupt groups) which raised expected howl of indignation was less sharp than might have been anticipated, possibly because most of the

/casualties

casualties were regarded as professional malefactors and also perhaps because a high proportion of them were Egyptians. Since then, however, information has been received that Nejjada may be contemplating a reprisal. The Arab High Committee has discussed the matter and it is understood that the Mufti has called for a full report. It is difficult to avoid a suspicion of deliberate provocation on the part of Bagana and attitude is in marked contrast with that of the Stern Group, which is assiduously wooing the Arabs in an andeavour to seduce them into a allience against British Imperialism.

- 5. The Arab High Committee has issued from Cairo a manifesto calling upon noble Arab youths to support "The Youth Movement" and stating that an agreement has already been signed for co-operation of the Nejjada and Futuwa in the new Movement which, it is reported is to be headed by an Egyptian, Mahmord Labib.
- 6. On 23rd May, a 400 ton illegal immigrant ship carrying 1,457 passengers (believed to be from Italy) was expected and brought into Haifa. The boarding and deportation of these aboard were carried out almost without incident. A representative of the Jewish Agency has stated that strict orders have been issued that opposition to boarding is to discontinue. He further intimated that the Jewish Agency's policy during the U.N.O. investigations was co-operation with the Mandate wherever possible.
- 7. In view of frequently reiterated statements that Yishny could in no circumstances co-operate actively with the Government in the suppression of terrorism, an offer by the Mayor of Tel Aviv to produce up to 2,000 Jews to serve in an independent force of Municipal Watchmen and his argument that they should be enrolled in the Police as Special Constables are significant. Combined British and Jewish patrols of regular Police have been restored to the streets of Tel Aviv during the week. The latter step has been welcomed by the inhabitants in spite of adverse press comment and has led to requests from two other Jewish local authorities for increase in Combined British and Jewish patrols in their areas.
- Terrorist action during the week has been on a relatively minor scale, the outstanding incident being the blowing up of the Lyle Railway on 27th May, which saused damage estimated at £5,000, Military action too has been restricted to a search of the Betar Training Centre at Khirbet Esh Shureh on 22nd May (Yukich committed) (Yled) to the discovery of a medium-sized arms

Weekly Intelligence Appreciation.

The full delicacy of the situation confronting the Jewish Agency, consequent on indication of Soviet policy contained in Mr. Gromyko's statement, is evidently realised by Jewish leaders and not lesst by Mr. Ben Gurion. Over eagerness to close with Russia may, it is felt, estrange American sympathies and, since Russian support for partition will clearly be conditional on complete autonomony of Jewish State, it would (corrupt group ? no longer) be possible to purchase Anglo-American support for solution by partition by offer of an alliance and military (corrupt group ? base)s. Hence Mr. Gurion's advocacy before the Elected Assembly of the creation of a Jewish State in part of Palestine while remainder of Palestine steys under British administration. Not only will Jewish penetration of the latter be facilitated, but British will be able to maintain a technical foothold and the Jews will be able to discharge their obligations to U.S.S.R. by refusing facilities to Anglo-Americans. Apparently (corrupt group ? a) decision as to official Jewish line before the Special Committee will rest with the

Jewish Agency Plenum, which is shortly to be convened, or with the General Zichiat Council. Meanwhile, every effort will be made to enforce Zionist discipline on anti(15Biltmorists) sho to muzzle the Agudath Israel. There are signs, however, that Hasbomer Hatzeir and Aguda (as well, doubtless, as Ihud will insist on presenting their views to Special Committee.

- The Arab Higher Committee has concluded its deliberations in Cairo. According to information from Dr. Khalidi a majority is in favour of boycotting the Special Committee, but the Arab Higher Committee as a whole will take a final decision when the Political Committee of the Arab League has defined the League's attitude. According to the same source, feeling among Arab States fevours a boycott, and Azzam has been sharply criticized for his support of co-operation with Special Committee, sinct it is considered that, as Secretary General, he should have remained silent until the views of the League itself were known. Meanwhile, Palestine Arab press continues for most part to advocate the appearance of a Palestine delegation. It is (corrept group? apparent that) apponents of co-operation are swayed mainly by their emotions and have not sariously debated whether it is in the interests of Palestine Arabs to let their case go by, The United States Consul General was asked by Dr. Tannons for his Advice (no doubt as a test of foreign reactions and his opinion was passed on to the Committee in Cairo.
- The Foreign Secretary's speech at Margate was coldly received by Yishuv. The Araba, while gratified et his recognition that the mandate gave the British Government no permission to deprive the Araba of their rights, remained sceptical of his good intentions, since they told that Jewish immigration, in particular, and lack of constitutional development are a denial of Arab rights and they see no disposition on the part of His Majesty's Government to remedy these wrongs.

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
Agency and Civic Bloc on one side and dissidents on the other, in an effort to ensure that terrorist organisations keep the peace while the Palestine issue is subjudice U.N.O. Should these efforts fail Ben Gurion, it is suggested, might agree to discreet co-operation between Hagana and the Police as a preferable alternative to direct action by the former with its attendant danger of civil war. A further sign of help to the Police is the offer made by the Mayor of Nathanya to produce to the Police within a few hours any person in his community for whom they may ask, rather than that searches should continue in his town.

5. An illegal immigrants ship (ANAL of 253 tons) was intercepted during the week, carrying 399 passengers, who were deported to Cyprus. A substantial proportion of these seem to be Jaws from North Africa.

5. The Arab press carried daily reports that recruits are flocking to enrol in the new Arab Youth Organisation. The leader, Nejjada, has however declared, in an obscurely worded manifesto, that the Arab Higher Committee's announcement of the information of the new body was premature, since, although an agreement had been reached in principle, details were still in the process of being worked out. Arab preparations for active resistance in Palestine to any adverse decision of U.N.O. should not be underestimated.

7. A report was received during the week of a meeting in Cairo between Hassen El Banna of the Moslim Brotherhood and Monseigneur Hughes, the Pope's Ambassador in Cairo, at which the latter is said to have promised his good offices in representing the Arabs through the Archbishop the (corrupt group) Church and the Minister for Foreign Affairs at the Vatican to the Catholic Ecclesiastical authorities at Rome.

Weekly Intelligence Appreciation.

It was announced on Monday night that the Arab Higher Committee "appealed to all Arabs" to boycott U.N.S.C.O.P., and to Arabs of Palestine to observe a general strike on 16th July, the expected date for the Committee's opening session. Emile Ghoury, on his return from New York, said that the Arab Higher Committee's Delegation was certain that U.N.S.C.O.P. would recommend further Jewish immigration, partition and trusteeship, and added that the Secretary General's memorandum showed anti Arab bias. He gave six reasons why the Arabs should boycott the Committee:-

- (1) The Palestine problem requires no further study.
- (2) Imperialist and Jewish interests prevailed at U.N.O. and Britain was seeking a new international sanction for

continuation/

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continuation of her policy of Judgising Pelestine.

- (3) The demand to sever the problems of Palestine and of displaced persons had been rejected.
- (4) Pelestine independence was excluded from the terms of reference.
- (5) The inclusion in the terms of reference of the mention of the rights of three world religions forshadowed trusteeship.
- (6) Britain and U.S.A. had opposed the inclusion of the great powers in order to assert the neutrality of U.N.S.C.O.P.'s recommendations.

The Arab States seem unable to agree on a common policy, but it would appear that a majority favour co-operation. This attitude has caused disappointment in Arab Higher Committee circles in Cairo.

It is clear that the Arab Higher Committee's policy of boycotting does not command universal support in Palestine. The success of the Committee's endeavour to isolate U.N.S.C.O.P. from contact with the local Arab community (including the Arab press) will be indicative of its hold on public opinion and its ability to enforce "national discipline". There are suggestions that the Arab League for National Liberation at any rate may contact the Special Committee.

- J. For Jews the week has been one of diligent preparation in an atmosphere of increasing confidence. The Jewish Agency presumably charged the Secretary General with exceeding his functions in circulating the British Note on illegal immigrants.
- 4. The Vaad Leumi has decided to invite Doctor Weizmann to present the Jewish case before U.N.S.C.O.P.,



and a Delegation headed by Mr. Ben Zvi has visited him for the purpose. Indications in the press suggest that he will accept. The Vaad Leumi's action has given open expression to the latent antagonism between Yishuv and American Jewry which has existed ever since the Basle Congress. The Vaad Leumi's decision was probably precipitated by the indications that any attempt at the early restoration of Doctor Weizmann to office in the Zionist Organization was doomed to failure.

- 5. Ben Gurion's statement at Session of the Elected Assembly has (corrupt group) subject to criticism by opponents of partition, both Left and Right, and it is known that Doctor Weizmann deems it an ineptitude. Nevertheless, there is a substantial body of Jewish public opinion which endorses his proposal.
- 6. The Vaad Leumi has refused permission to Hashomer Hatzair and Aliya Oviasha to present their views before U.N.S.C.O.P. It remains to be seen whether they will accept this decision, particularly if they are invited by U.N.S.C.O.P.
- 7. Jemal Husseini has defined the immediate programme of the Arab Higher Committee as follows:-
 - (a) The merger of Youth Organisations.
 - (b) The union of all National Organisations in support of Beit El Mal / the Treasury of the Arab Higher Committee/.
 - (c) The establishment of National Committees.
 - (d) The holding of general elections to select a new Arab Higher Committee.
- 8. The new Arab Youth Organisation appears to be a device to boost Futuwa at the expense of (?Nejada) and is



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so regarded by Hawari. The latter has gone to Egypt for discussion with "those responsible there" presumably Haj Amin to whom personally the (?Nejada) has always owed allegiance.

- 9. Doctor Hussein Khalidi has seen both Polish and Czechoslovak Consuls (corrupt group)ly to discuss the attitude of their countries to the Palestine question and the Jaffa Chamber of Commerce has sent a letter to Polish Commercial Representative threatening an Arab boycott of Polish goods if Poland continues its support for Zionism. The Polish Consul has stated in conversation with a member of the Secretariat that Poland regarded herself as under a moral obligation to the Jews, but would, nevertheless, endeavour to do justice to the Arabs.
- 10. The reception of Abdul Karim in Egypt evoked enthusiasm in Arab circles and has called forth a sheaf of telegrams expressing gratitude to King Farouk. The Arab press has published a letter from the Free Tunisian Constitutional Party in Cairo calling on the Arabs of Palestine to support the struggle of Tunisians against French Imperialism.
- ll. On Monday afternoon two British Policemen were kidnapped by armed Jews from a swimming pool at Ramat Gan. The Hagana issued a statement demanding their return and calling on the public to help to this end by communicating information to "the Yishuv's Security Institutions" not be it noted to the nearest police station. Both Policemen were recovered unhurt on the following day. The kidnappings are regarded as an attempt by dissidents to stir up serious trouble on the eve of U.N.S.C.O.P. The Yishuv, said the statement, will not allow itself to be made a pawn in their game.
- 12. There have been sporadic acts of (2 corrupt groups) terrorism during the week probably as a reaction to ANAL deportations. Language of Stern Group and National Military Organization utterances increasingly echoes the phrases of Communist propoganda and the possibility of an understanding between dissidents and U.S.S.R. cannot be (?obvisted).

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13. Arab terrorists have struck at powerful feudal chief Abdur Rahman Bey El Azzeh, who is implicated in land sales to Jews in the Hebron area, by murdering two of his relatives.

14. Two (?Bedouins) thieves were shot in Jewish Township of Rehovoth, doubtless by a Hagana security patrol. Meanwhile, excitement over the Fejjeh affair appears to be subsiding.

Weekly Intelligence Appreciation.

UNSCOP began its investigation of Palestine problem on afternoom of Monday, 16th Jume, by hearing in camera an oral amplification by Chief Secretary of Government's written material contained in survey of Palestine. On following day the Committee heard Mr. Shertok's remarks, which were in a noticeably sharper vein than his statement before Anglo-American Committee, (?who omitted) have not disclosed Agency's objectives, but earlier in weak he had stated that main points of its case would be to attack white Paper, to press for large scale immigration and settlement, and to stress compelling urgency of claim for Jewish statehood. A session of Vaad Leumi on Monday decided on complete identification of its political claims with those of Jewish Agency. It will, however, be separately represented before UNSCOP.

2. The Jewish Agency plenum has been meeting in secret session (without the attendance of American members) but no information regarding decision taken has yet transpired 3./

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- 3. Three Jews were sentenced to death on Monday by Military Court, Jerusalem, on charges arising out of attack on Acre Prison on 4th May. Two other Jews, who were found to be under eighteen years of age, were sentenced to fifteen years imprisonment on one charge and to detention during the High Commissioner's pleasure on another. These sentences have not yet been confirmed by G.O.C.
- 4. As reported in paragraph 11 of my telegram No.4 (?No.1124) under reference, the two British members of Police Force kidnapped from Ramat Gan on 9th June were recovered the following day, when security forces cordened Jewish settlement establishment Kiryat Shaul. Although there have been rumours of considerable Hagana activity at that time, no substantial assistance was in fact received from Jewish community; the recovery of the two policemen was due entirely to smart police work.
- 5. There is a perceptible lull in illegal immigration, attributed by Hagama to shortage of fuel consequent on British pressure on countries of embarkation. Whether this is in fact the true cause may be doubted. Possibly the Agency has decided not to force the pace while Palestine question is subjudice U.N.O., or possibly an attempt will be made to concert the arrival of a number of illegal immigrant vessels in order to impress the Special Committee.
- 6. Reliable information has now been received of course of meetings of Political Committee of Arab League on 5th and 6th June. The first was opened by Fadil El Jemali, who said that he had come to the conclusion that no good would come to Palestine from United Nations, and that Arabs ought to try to find a solution with Britain and America. The Syrian Delegate expressed agreement. The Lebenese Delegate said that his Government's instructions were against a boycott of UNSCOP, and both he and Syrian Delegates stressed the fact that Arab States could not withdraw their participation of United Nations. Saudi Arabia, Egypt and Trans-Jordan also supported co-operation with UNSCOP. Jamal Ausseini insisted that Palestine Arabs were united in their desire to boycott UNSCOP, to which Nokrashy Pasha retorted that Arab Higher Committee could not force the Political Committee to accept a decision made by the former, before the latter decision. Nokrashy insisted that the Political Committee was not, in fact, called upon to make a decision on matter of boycott, which would be dropped on understanding that contact with INSCOP was necessary. The resolution of the Political Committee reported in Cairo's telegram No. 1513 to the Foreign Office, was drafted by a sub-Committee consisting of Fadil Jameli and Jamil Mardam. The

The Arab Higher Committee has issued from Cairo a statement denying that there was any contradiction between its attitude and that of the Arab League, or that there was any ambiguity in latter's resolution. It seems, however, to be trying to realise that a difference of opinion does exist, particularly after Jamal Mardam's statement to the press in Damascus, that boyoctt was never discussed by Political Committee, since it would be unnatural for such a course to be (?taken emitted) by states who were members of U.N.O. The Arab Higher Committee, a national body, had however a free choice. The local Arab Press reports Jamali as having said in Baghdad that Political Committee took two secret decisions which, it is understood, were

- (1) to give information to Fact-Finding Commission in (?spite of) boycott declared by Arab Higher Committee, and
- (2) to encourage Arab illegal immigrants into Palestine to offset Jewish illegal immigration.
- The local boycott of U.N.S.C.O.P. by Palestine Araba has so far been complete, and while there seems to be widespread disapproval outside immediate circle of Arab Higher Committee, no person or body has so far ventured to defy the ban. The Arab Press, which generally opposed boycott is now taking the line that, a decision having been taken, national discipline must prevail. No Palestine Arab journalists have accordingly attended meetings of U.N.S.C.O.P. The one-day Arab strike was completed but passed off without incident. The "Southern Section" of the Syrian National Party put up posters in Jerusalem supporting the strike and boycott.
- 8. On his return from his visit to the Mufti, Hawari issued a proclamation calling upon the Najada to join Arab Youth Organisation. This development was probably necessitated byrapid secession of his followers, and appears to signalise his elimination from the political scene.
- 9. The Indonesian Deputy Foreign Minister, in an interview in Cairo with a correspondent of a Palestine daily, expressed sympathies of Indonesians with Palestine Arabs and promised them the support "of Arabs of Indonesia, allied in religion and language to Arabs of Palestine".


Having heard the Chief Secretary in camera and Hr. Shertok in public session during the preceding week, U.N.S.C.O.P. has since devoted its time to local travel. in order to familiarise itself with the country. On these tours it has been accompanied by a horde of pressmen, mainly Jews, who have annoyed the Committee as well as others. While the Arab boycott has not been lifted, the Committee has been received by a number of Arab Mayors and notables, the Arab Higher Committee apparently acquiescing in the view that Arab hospitality must take precedence over political intransigeance. attitude does not, however, extend to the press which was excluded from visits paid on Tuesday to Arab centres in Lydda District. There were slight indications that Arabs might be reconsidering their decision not to co-operate with the Committee, though a tentative approach by the Chairman and Indian Delegate to Jemal Russeini met with a rebuff. It is known that King Abdullah is making strenuous efforts

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to secure a reversal of the Arab Higher Committee's decision. The Foreign Minister of Iraq, John (corrupt group), has said that the Arab States would not take the initiative or (?make an) appearance before the Committee, if, however, the Committee (?wish) ed to (?hear) them they would consider the request.

- 2. U.N.S.C.O.P. has released to the press the text of a Resolution expressing concern as to the possible unfavourable repercussions that the execution of the death sentences, passed by Jerusalem Military Court, on three Jewish terrorists, might have on the fulfilment of its task and has forwarded to the secretary General for transmission to the Mandatory Power a copy of a letter addressed to it by relations of the condemned men. The Chief Secretary has drawn the Chairman's attention to the fact that the sentences, having not yet been confirmed by the G.O.C., have no legal force so that the issue is still subjudice. The Resolution has destroyed the efforts which were being made to bring about a relaxation of the Arab boycott of the Committee, and many moderate Arabs now believe that the Arab Higher Committee was right after all.
- 5. The Committee has also allowed the press to obtain an uncorrected version of the informal emplification of material in the survey of Palestine given by the Chief Secretary at the in camera session. For this lapse apologies have been (group emitted) ed.
- 4. The meeting of the Jowish Agency Planum has been concluded. It was announced that no statement on its resolutions would be issued as their tenor would be apparent in the presentation of the Jowish case to U.N.S.C.O.P. Zehdiot Abarenct has asserted that the session decided to base its claim on a Jewish State in the whole of Palestine, but other reports indicate that the demand is to be only for a Jowish State, it being left to the Committee to take the initiative in suggesting its extent. Permission has been decided to those Zionist bodies, particularly Hashomer Hatzair and Aliya Hadura which desired to present independent evidence to U.N.S.C.O.P. Jewish optimism as to the result of the Committee's enquiry appears to have been somewhat

damps d/



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damped: (fgroup omitted) there is not a Jew, even in the Agency, who believes that Palestine's future will be decided, not by U.R.S.C.O.F. recommendations but by the interests of the Big Three.

5. On 18th June an explosion in a building near Military Headquarters in Tel Aviv revealed a tunnel some 45 feet long leading in the direction of Citrus House. The body of a Jew, later established to be that of a Hagana officer, was found near the entrance. It appears that the Hagana, naving discovered preparations by one dissident group to undermine and blow up Citrus House and, having failed to halt these preparations by oral and written warnings, had decided to spal up the entrance with coment. The entry was, in effect, a booby trap and, in the ensuing explosion, the Hagana leader was fatally wounded. His funeral was attended by a crowd estimated at 20,000 persons. In view of the fact that he lost his life while engaged in an operation which, in fact, saved the lives of a number of British soldiers, the District Commissioner was represented by a Jewish Officer of the District Administration and the Superintendent of Police was also rapresented.

A few days later a large arms factory believed to belong to the Hagana was found in the same locality.

On 22nd June, an abortive attempt was made to kidnap a senior British Police Officer in Jerusalem. On the evening of the 24th a grenade was exploded in the garden of a house near the Military Courts in Jerusalem. The house was afterwards found to be booby trapped. Previous varning of this had been received.

- Palestine, has addressed letters to leading personages in various countries emanating from Haifa, Beirut and London, saying that, while the Arabs, if left to themselves could reach "a modus vivendi" with their Jewish brothers, there is no room for further Jewish immigration which is being organised for profit by "occult exterior forces". They have, therefore, received orders to prepare suitable measures to stop illegal immigration since the Government is unable to do so.
- 7. References to the Farran case have now begun to appear in the press. So far local comment has been restrained. The Jewish/

Ashkenazie Jewish Community Members, the Control Committee of the Palestine Communist Party, the Ihud and a Mr. J. W. Abilesh. Revisionists, Hashomer Hatzair and Aliya Hadasha are not to give independent testimony.

- There is no evidence in support of rumours that the Chairman and Doctor Hoo interviewed representatives of the Jewish underground during their visit to Tel Aviv. At Acre Prison, the Chairman had a talk with three prisoners from Dissident groups: the conversation was in French. Prisoners of dissident groups were also interviewed separately by two delegates with their two alternates (thought to be those of Czecho-Slovakia and Yugo-Slavia). The conversation was principally of prisoners status, the dissidents apparently claiming that they should be treated as prisoners of war. The Chairman was not impressed.
- 4. His Majesty's Government's reply to Resolution of U.N.S.C.O.P. regarding the death sentences passed on three Jews for offences arising out of the attack on Acre Prison in May has been conveyed to the Chairman.
- 5. On 29th June, the Committee passed a Resolution taking note of published reports of acts of violence committed in Palestine since their arrival and decided (Australia and Iraq abataining to record their warning that such acts constitute a flagrant disregard of the appeal made in the Resolution of the General Assembly on 15th May.
- 6. The local Jewish press has been unremitting in its efforts to poison relations between the Committee and this Administration, but with no success.
- The week has been marked by a number of assassinations and attempted assassinations of British coldiers. It is believed that these were the work of the Stern Group and that they are a reprisal for the death of Rubovitz, the victim in the Farran case. It has now been established beyond reasonable doubt that the arms factory referred to in paragraph 5 of my telegram No. 1226 was operated by Hagama and was one of a chain of such factories making sten guns and ammunition.

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Authorities on 29th June. The comment on this case which has been permitted by the censorship to appear in the local press has continued to be relatively restrained but excised the matter testifies to the increasing disposition on the part of the Jews to make political capital out of this unfortunate affair and to exploit it in order to embarrass this Administration.

9. The General Zionist Council, 1t is announced, is to meet in Zurich on 24th July.

It has been announced that the price of petrol will be increased by 13 mils a gailon in order to cover the damage caused by terrorist outrages to Haifa oil installations in March. 25% of the proceeds of the increased price will be turned over to the Government for "fulfilling development projects of which certain areas in Palestine stand These development projects would be of so badly in need. a category for which financial provision could not otherwise be made and would be administered under suitable machinery and in closest consultation with the Arab community". Jewish comment has of course taken the line that this tax constitutes a collective fine on the Jewish community and that it is discriminatory. Arab reaction has been surprisingly violent, contrasting what it chooses to regard as a punishment of the whole community with the collective fines and demolition imposed on the Arabs in 1936 - 1939. The fact that part of the increased price (roughly equivalent to the Arab share) will be devoted to Arab welfare is ignored in the press but may be appreciated in due course.

that it is holding four National Conferences in the near future. First, the National Conference, is to take place in Haifa on 6th July and will be concerned mainly with the boycott of Jewish goods and the prevention of land sales. The other Conferences, the Youth Conference, Women's Conference and "Peace between Brothers" Conference will take place later. The last mentioned is intended to put an end to family and other feuds which divide the Arabs.

On the administrative side a Chief Administrative Officer has been appointed in the Jerusalem Office and appointment of a Press Liaison Officer is promised. These measures are having some success and it is probable that the Arab Higher Committee is more firm in the saddle than previously. In particular, many who formerly doubted the wisdom of approving boycott of U.N.S.C.O.P. are coming round to the view that the Arab Higher Committee was right. The efforts of King Abdullah to persuade the Committee to reserve its decision have been politely rebuffed.

Weekly Intelligence Appreciation.

U.N.S.C.O.P. has devoted week to hearing the oral evidence from, and to cross-examination of, Jewish witnesses. The highlight was forthright plea by Dr. Weizmann for a Jewish State created by partition, able to absorb one and a half million Jews and to comprise the area assigned to the Jewish State by the Peel Commission, plus Negev. The previous day Ben Gurion, under pressure of cross-examination, had stated that the Jewish Agency "stood by its attitude last year - that it was prepared to consider a viable Jewish State in a viable area of Palestine; in his main testimony he had restricted himself to demanding statehood for the Jewish people.

While Dr. Weismann passed only the mildest of 2. censures on the Palestine Government, the official representatives of the Jewish Agency and Vaad Leumi, particularly Bernstein, Kaplan and Katznelson, have been severe in their strictures, accusing the local Administration of deliberate obstruction of development, and of racial discrimination against the Jewish community. British policy in Palestine, according to Bernstein, was motivated both by fear of rapid Jewish progress in the social and economic spheres which, by widening the gap between the two communities, would have accontuated political difficulties, and also by apprehension that such progress would set in train a similar development in the Arab world, which would accelerate the arrival of the day when it would seek escape from British tutelage. The Agency has reinforced its attacks on the mandatory by a printed survey of political development in 1946 - 47, in which this Government is represented as having, in effect, indulged in a wanton and unprovoked onslaught on the Yishuv, accompanied by ruthless collective penalties and individual brutalities. Symptomatic of the tendencious approach of this production is emission to so much as mention the White Paper on Agency complicity in terrorism. The general tendency of Zionist evidence before the Committee is that continuation of British administration, in any form, is anothema. For this, the reason may be a realisation that Great Britain would be in no

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position/

position to decline to convert the mandate into a trusteeship, and that provisions of articles and those of the charter render it improbable that a trusteeship document would incorporate requirements of mandate for promotion of a national home by immigration.

- minority, have not been impressed by these over-statements, which, by their lack of restraint, have been their own best answer in illustrating the sort of thing the administration has had to contend with and they will reply shortly by publication of a further factual statement.
- 4. (Corrupt group) Committee has appealed to Arab Higher Committee to abandon boycott, to which Committee is reported to have replied that it sees no reason to revise its attitude. The Arab Higher Committee has, however, broken its self-imposed silence in order to deny Ben Gurion's statement that there had been Arab Jewish negotiations and agreement on political issues in 1937, and particularly, that the Mufti was behind these negotiations. Generally boycott has continued to be strictly observed. There has been report in Arab press that Committee intends to pay a short visit to Cairo in order to hear testimony from representatives of the Arab States. The Committee has announced that it will not visit detention camps in Cyprus and will not hear evidence from detainees. It was also decided to take no action on individual requests for immigration certificates and liberation of detainees.
- 5. These dissident groups have been quiescent, despite confirmation of death sentences by the General Officer Commanding passed on three Jews for offences arising out of attacks on Central Prison at Acre. The Stern Group, in a recent pamphlet, has advocated a re-orientation of Zionist policy to bring it into line with Russian aims against British imperialism.
- The first of the conferences called by the Arab Higher Committee took place at Haifa on 6th July. It passed 17 resolutions, of which the principal were aimed at strengthening the boycott of Zionist goods and at prevention of land sales. In the latter connection, mention was made of "Dunum" plan, under which every Arab able to do so will buy a dunum of land, presumably with the intention of donating it to some trust or want which will preserve it inviolate in perpetuity from Zionist purchase. A more sensible resolution was that calling for legislation for Pelestine Arabs to plant fruit trees on wased land under supervision of Land Department of Arab Higher Committee. An appeal was also made to Arab capitalists to establish industries and to set up importing companies. Some speeches were in a flery vein: first item submitted to censorahip by a Jewish newspaper reported that Jamal Husseini's oration amounted to open incitement to rebellion. Whether action by any other is called for is under consideration, While tension in Arab circles is undoubtedly rising, rumours of impending insurrection in August are probably eneggerations. The Hagana professed to be taking them sexious.
- Committee's lead in the matter of boycott, the Areb League for National Liberation has not foregone its criticism of the Committee's undemocratic constitution, and has pointed out that such Conferences as that at Haifs are no substitute for a recressorative Conference

which would work out machinery for creation of a supreme Arab Body, vested with a mandate signed on (group omitted ?behalf of) the people, deriving from popular election.

- participating in Beit El Mal has criticized the way in which the Advisory Committees for Acre and Haifa were selected.

 Nevertheless the Beit El Mal is making steady progress. It is announced that it now has offices in 6 large towns and 19 branches in smaller towns. Dr. Tannous has prepared a report on agricultural development, which he will shortly submit to the Arab Higher Committee.
- 9. The Youth Conference to be held in Jaffa on 13th July, will doubtless be the scene of more inflammatory oratory. The Mufti's wife has accepted the Chairmanship of the Women's Conference to be held in Jerusalem three days later.
- 10. The Arab Higher Committee has set up a sub department concerned with village affaire.
- Il. It is reported that ?Rajai Husseini is to be Permanent Palestine member of the Arab League's boycott committee.
- on 3 Communists have evoked sufficient criticism to induce Iraqi Consulate to publish an explanatory statement that the accused were not sentenced for Communism, but for specific offences against the law.
- Hagana has issued a statement repudiating insinuation of dissident groups that return of Jewish refugees to their home land has been discontinued for political reasons while the Palestine issue is under consideration by the United Nations. The intermission is attributed to difficulties caused by British representations to the littoral countries. The belief was expressed that programme for the year would be nevertheless completed.

Weekly Intelligence Appreciation.

U.N.S.C.O.P. has concluded its reception of oral evidence from the public, but has still to hear the Chief Secretary and other Government representatives in camera.

- 2. Among the bodies accorded a hearing during the week were the Palestine Communist Party, Ihud, the League for Jewish and Arab Rapprochement and Co-operation, Mr. Shertok (for the second time) on behalf of the Jewish Agency and Histadruth.
- The P.K.P. statement developed on the lines ted. "The history of the British Mandate", declared anticipated. Mikumia, " is a history of Colonial oppression and exploitation". The administration was a police and military terror, British policy was based on the fostering of mutual antagonism between Arabs and Jews. Partition was rejected categorically and repeatedly/

repeatedly. The Party advocated Windependent, democratic, bi-unitarian State" which (it was explained) meant a single State inhabited by the two peoples, Jews and Arabs having equal rights. The constitutional machinery would consist of two Chambers, one elected on a basis of proportional representation and the other on a regional basis and composed half of Arabs and half of Jews. The United Nations should proclaim the independence of Palestine and should fix a time limit for the evacuation of British forces, The Communist spokesmen were evasive on the subject of immigration, on which (they said) Jews and Arabs left to themselves would agree.

- 4. Dr. Magnes's plea for a bi-national State was made in eloquent terms, but seems to have failed to carry conviction with the Delegates. More impression was probably made by the League for Jewish Arab Rapprochement and Co-operation, which appears to have instilled a doubt whether this Government had done all it should to bring the Jews and Arabs together.
- 5. Shertok again, and this time more strongly and explicitly, attacked this administration for its obstruction of progress particularly Jewish, and made a plea for an emergency recommendation to the United Nations to enable large scale immigration to proceed forthwith. Rubashov identified Histadruth with the Agency's demand.
- 6. The Anglican Bishop stressed the religious issues, intimated that a basis of understanding existed in religious-minded persons of all communities and chided the Committee for meeting on Sunday.
 - 7. The Arab boycott has continued in full rigour.
- 8. On leaving Palestine, the Committee will visit the Lebanon to hear representatives of the Arab States. Some Delegates may pay a brief visit to Trans-Jordan. Jemal Husseini has left for Beirut. It is denied that his journey has any connection with U.N.S.C.O.P.
- 9. The Revisionists, Acdut Avoda and Hashomer Hatzair (?recognised) India (corrupt group) as substitutes for presentation of their views to the Committee from which they had refrained in deference to Zionist (?speal). The first two expressed opposition to Partition and the last reiterated its thesis of a bi-national State.

- 10. The Youth Conference and Womans Conference, referred to in paragraph 9 of my telegram under reference, were held during the week. Both were the scenes of impassioned oratory and each passed a number of resolutions chiefly concerned with the boycett of Zionist goods and the prevention of land sales. A feature of the former was the oration accorded to Huwari and his 64 men in local Boycett Committees. Among the speakers was Abdul Khaliq Tuvis, head of the Moroccan Reform Party. Tuvis and his colleague Latif Salim also gave a press conference at the Arab Office on the Moroccan question.
- 11. The Arab Higher Committee is reportedly engaged with measures to implement resolution of the Haifa Conference (c.f. paragraph (76) of my telegrem under reference). It has called on the Arab Chamber of Commerce to formulate plans for an immediate economic conference. The Dunam Plan has been inaugurated by purchase of 10 dunams by the Mufti.
- 12. The branch Arab Office in Rio de Janeiro has opened under Anwar Nashashibi.
- an produce constructive efforts are to be found in the laying during the week of the foundation stone of an industrial school for Arab orphans at Haifa and the opening of a subscription list for a training college for rural teachers in Jerusalem. The womens Conference has stressed the need for agricultural and technical education.
- 14. There have been a number of terrorist attacks on military personnel during the week which have resulted in casualties to Security Forces mostly from road mines. On 12th July two soldiers were abducted in Nathanya. At 19.00 hours on 14th July Nathanya and its environments were declared a controlled area under part XV of Defence (Emergency) Regulations, and intensive searches were begun. The two soldiers have not yet been recovered. While there has been considerable talk, mostly in press circles of extensive Hagans activity simed at recovering the missing men, it is difficult to guage whether Hagans is in earnest. There are indications that

that crisis within Hagana itself on the issue of active suppression of dissidents and the resumption of active resistance may once more be becoming acute. Group, which stands for a resumption of anti-Government activity by the Hagana, seems to be gaining in strength. organisation is, however, continuing its preventive campaign against dissidents. Their practive of warning members of terrorist groups to leave certain localities is believed to have evoked reprisals from National Military Organis ation in Haifa, where three local Hagana leaders were beaten up during the early part of the month. In return, Hagana has given the perpetrators a time limit by which they must leave Haifa, Generally, the two dissident groups seem to be adopting a perceptibly firmer and more confident tone with Hagana. Indications continue of some form of understanding between the Stern Group and the U.S. S.R. The N.M.O., however, does not seem to have undergone any similar reorientation.

16. The intermission in illegal immigration has come to an end. The illegal immigrant ship PRESIDENT WARFIELD with some 4,493 passengers ex France was intercepted during the night of 17th July /18th July and after stiff opposition had been encountered was boarded by the Royal Navy and brought into Haifa at 16.00 hours 18th July. Transhipment effected speedily and three transports with 4,429 illegal immigrants sailed from Haifa at 06.00 hours on 19th July.

17. According to press reports suspect that WRISSI which was damaged by explosions while lying at Genca has been sabctaged by Defenders of Arab Palestine. This body is mentioned in paragraph 6 of my telegram No.1226.

Chief Secretary and other Government representatives in private session. The attitude of the Committee was perceptibly more cordial than on former occasion and it was evident that my informal discussion of the background to the Palestine problem on 16th July had not been without effect. In retrospective, it now appears that the policy confining the Government's part before U.N.S.C.O.P. to presentation of memoranda and to answering of specific questions in camera has fully justified itself and the reasons for it were appreciated by the Committee.

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
- 2. The Government memoranda presented to U.N.S.C.O.P. have, as was to be expected, been criticised as expecte and polemical by Jews but have been, on the whole, welcomed by Arabs.
- J. The Committee on leaving Palestine proceeded to Lebanom where it heard representatives of Arab States, other than Trans-Jordan. Hamed Franji, the Lebanese Foreign Minister, read a memorandum on behalf of all States represented, emphasizing Palestine Arabs' rights to self determination and the dangers to peace in the Middle East if their demands were not granted. The specific demand was for an independent State based on proportional representation. Enquiries arising out of the memorandum were answered in closed session. The Hebrew press has reported that Emil Edde and Maronite Patriarca have been in touch with members of the Committee and have (?dissociated) the Christian population of Lebanom from official demands from Arab States. Both are reported to have favoured partition.
- 4. A (corrupt group) U.N.S.C.O.P. visited Amman on 24th July and received a memorandum from (?deputation) who replied to questions in a closed session. The memorandum was on the same lines as that of other Arab States and (corrupt group) Partition.
- 5. The above mentioned has formed the conclusion that the Committee will recommend the establishment of two autonomous Provinces and a Federal Government by a Trustee.
- 6. You have been kept informed of steps taken to carry out H.M.G.'s decision to return the illegal immigrants on the PRESIDENT WARFIELD to France. The action taken undoubtedly caught the Agency unawares, and successful preservation of secrecy until transports were well on their way probably prevented a sharper reaction by the Yishuw. Nevertheless, bitterness evoked by this departure from practice must not be underestimated. The Arabs were naturally gratified, particularly since the Arab Higher Committee had recommended the course adopted by H.M.G. before a public announcement was made.
- 7. The Magana reacted to the return to Europe of the passengers on the PRESIDENT WARFIELD by an ineffective attack on the Radar installation on Mount Carmel and by sinking the EMPIRE LIFEGUARD. It seems likely that the J.R.M. will similarly protest by token operations on a minor scale against

eny,

any future applications of the principle of refoulement.
Jewish Agency representatives have, however, been at pains to stress that war against dissidents continues and seems indeed anxious to shield relations with the Government from being further impaired.

- 8. Dissident activity has continued on a fairly intensive scale and has occasioned considerable loss of life and injury to members of security forces. Operation "Tiger" is still in force in Nathanya. The two missing men have not yet been recovered. Mr. Rokach has attempted, as a middle man, to strike a bargain whereby the missing men would be returned against an undertaking that dissidents under sentence of death would not be executed. His intervention has been repulsed. Feeling is undoubtedly tense among Yishuv, and even responsible members of that body have voiced fear that (?any more) (group emitted) dissidents may provoke the Government into taking sterner measures, such as extension of controlled areas or possibly action against the Agency itself.
- 9. Genorges Hakim, Greek Catholic Archbishop Galilee, has set off on a tour of Italy, France and Belgium in order to acquaint the countries with the true facts of the Palestine situation, i.e. on a propaganda tour on behalf of Arab Higher Committee.
- 10. Yaaqub El Ghussein, Mayor of Remleh, former member of the Arab Higher Committee, deported to Seychelles 1937 and founder of the Arab Youth Congress, died this week.
- 11. The Indonesian situation has attracted much attention from the Arab press which has been ally of the (?supposed) "Victims of Dutch Imperialism".



The wents of the week have profibed a state of tension comparable only to that of last summer. There is general apprehencion lest the murder of the two Sergeants should provoke H.M.G. to drastic measures directed against the community at large or of such a nature that, although aimed at dissidents, the Vishuv generally will suffer for the latter's misdoeds. Rumours are rife of impending action against the Agency on the lines of June. 1946, Agency officials are reported to be burning incriminating papers and removing documents to secure localities. The general imposition of Martiel Law (got "Statutory Martial Law" but Mertial Law in the common acceptance of the term) is also believed in some quarters to be imminent).



3. The unofficial reprisals taken by Police and Militery elements in Tel Aviv on the night of Blat July at first produced no sharp reaction, the press and public doubtless realising the provocation to which Security Porces had been subjected. Capital will, however, doubtless be made of these regrettable incidents, and there are already indications that the local press are out to make the most of them. The general tope of the Hebrew press in fact has become such that densorable which shall be both lemient and also adequate has become a matter of the greatest difficulty. The Arab press in general confines itself to its customary criticism of the Government's weakness and of current policy as compared with the sterner measures taken during the disturbances of 1936 - 1939.

4. Arab activity has been directed to furthering internal solidarity on the lines indicated in previous telegrams.

5. It is reported that the Arab Higher Committee will shortly meet in Cairo to consider among other subjects the despatch of representatives to Geneva to maintain contact with Arab State's Liaison Officer U.N.S.C.O.P. Camille Bey Chemoun, the Lebatese Liaison/

Liaison Officer, called on the Mufti on his way through Cairo. Musa Alami has denied "Al Masri" report that has Dr. Weizmann and Nuri Pasha (corrupt group) Said are to support a joint "solution" on the lines of the Morrison plan.

6. A Soviet delegation has arrived in Palestine to register Armenians for repatriation. M. Podvigin concerned himself with that subject on his recent visit and apparently found the prospects sufficiently encouraging to follow up.

The public expected strong Covernment action would follow murder of the two sergeants, and was prepared for something more severe than the detention on 5th and 6th August of some leading Sevisionists and others, and the declaration of Betar (Edvisionist Youth Novement) as an unlawful association. Jewish official indignation has been confined to cases of heads of the three local authorities who were also detained. Hamashkiv has indeed lamented that "the spokesman of the Agency and others have passed over arrest of members of the Revisionist party as though it had never happened". Haaretz in rigoste has criticised the pevisionists' "shameless attempt to make party capital out of a national emergency" and has retorted that the right was not unduly heartbroken at the arrests of Agency leaders last year. Generally the Jewish public consider mass of arrests was justified and even overdue; the Arabs, while approving of

them_o/

them, complain that they do not go far enough and hope they are but a prolude to more sweeping action which will include the Jewish Agency.

- The detention of Mayors Rokach, Bon and said Krimital is regarded by Yishur as a special case. The Tewish community and the Agency itself, on first thoughts, evidently suspected Government of deliberate design of disrupting united antiterrorist front created after murder of the two sergeants, or alternatively attributed to administration crass ineptitude. In face of this it was evidently difficult for the Left to beine its opportunity, and indeed both Remez and Hrs Hysreon, Maper stalwarts, were constrained to voice demand for their release. The position however may be radically altered by refusal of the three Majors to answer interrogation. This may afford the Left bloc a pretext to abandon them and to make use of the period of their incarceration to weaken position of those who covertly sympathise with dissidents in three important urban centres. At all events it is clear from Mrs. Myssociastetement at Veed Leumi meeting of 7th August that it is not at present intended that struggle against terrorism will be interrupted as a result of detention of three persons nemed above. Indeed her reference to possible spilling of blood may portend an intensification of counter terrorist action by Hagena, even to extent of armed attack on dissidents.
- 5. The regulations providing for vesting in Government property of unlawful associations, promulgated immediately prior to action against Betar, have evoked no heatile comments.
- 4. Other novel action against terrorists during the week was demolition of a house in Givat Shaul in which arms and explosives were found.
- 5. Dissident terrowism has continued. Details have been reported to you. There are continued rumours that a big terrorist coup is impending.
- 6. The Arab Higher Committee has been meeting in Cairo. The only report of its activities so far received says it has sent a telegrem to the Security Commeil supporting the Egyptian case. Strong support for Egypt has of course been voiced in local Arab press, which has also continued to back Indonesians against the Dutch. Rashid of Haj Ibrahim, an Istiqial(?) leader in Halfa has gone to Cairo for consultation regarding appointment of local Mational Committees in the north.



The Traci Legation in Cairo has denied report referred to in paragraph 5 of my telegram under reference in so far as it relates to Nuri Pashe 3s Said, but Egyptism press continues to publish reports that Nuri and Musa el Alambara prepared to sponsor a solution less favourable to Arabs than their official claims.
- 9. The Pope has received Archbishop Hakim, (c.f. paragraph 9 of my telegram No.1424).
- 10. The Yishuv has followed events at Port du Bouc With close attention. The intransigeant attitude of the passengers has been applauded but there are evidently form that when it is clear that they will be sent neither to Palestine nor Cyprus a considerable number will elect to go ashore in France. Meanwhile, the Hebrew press scizes every opportunity to use this incident as a stick with which to beat the Palestine administration and H.M.G., and to sustain bitterness which deportation has undoubtedly aroused.
- 11. A Hebrew press campaign is in preparation regarding conditions in Cyprus camps, which are stated by this section of the press to be deteriorating.
- 12. It has been announced that a further 485 orghans will be admitted to Palestine outside the terms of where, and placed in charge of wouth Aliya. They will receive certificates later in their turn as determined on "first ing first out" principle. Ends.

Weekly Intelligence Appreciation.

The most disquieting development during the week has been a flare-up of Arab - Jewish tension, starting with an attack on the night of 10th August by 5 men armed with automatic weapons and hand granades on a Jewish cafe north of Tel Aviv. 4 Jews and 1 Arab were killed. The identity and race of the attackers have not been established. Jewish witnesses described them as Arabs and Arab witnesses as Yemenite Jews. The most probable conclusion is that they were Arabs motiviated, as is usual in such events, by a mixture of family feuds and nationalism. The cafe formerly belonged to an Arab who sold it to Jew, retaining a certain interest in it and was patronised by Arabs and Jews.

area, and in particular the slum quarters between the two towns, was the scene of numbrous stabbing, stoning, shooting and arson incidents/



incidents which caused the death of 4 Arabs and 4 Jews and 1 man of unknown race, and injuries to Arabs and 25 Jews. Curfews have been imposed on the affected areas and the situation has been kept under control.

- There is no reason to believe that the Jaffa = Tel Aviv incidents are anything more than unorganised hooliganism and responsible leaders on both sides have been at pains to call upon their followers to remain calm. A number of Jaffa organisations headed by the Municipality and including the Moslem Brotherhood and Najjadah, have issued a joint appeal to the inhabitants to avoid acts of harm to the town and the national cause and to refrain from being provoked. The A.L.N. Association and influential Arab newspapers have called upon the Arab Higher Committee to ask Arabs to refrain from violence. The Arabs profess to see a "secret hand" harmful to Arabs that is behind these incidents while the Jews are inclined to lay the blame on the Government. The Vaad Leumi has called upon Yishuv not to be drawn into a fight with the Arabs or to magnify these incidents out of their true proportion. It has, however, been made clear that Haganah, while not taking indiscriminate reprisals, will endeavour to trace and punish those. responsible for the cafe shootings, and the Jewish Press has stated that an Arab, whose body was deposited from a car near Petah Tikvah on 13th August was believed to be one of the attackers. He was presumably a victim of Haganah action.
- 4. A more serious incident occurred when 20 to 55 armed Jews attacked an Arab building in an orange grove near Petah Tikvah in the early hours of 15th August. 4 male Arabs were killed by indiscriminate automatic fire and 7 more, including women and children, were killed when the building was almost completely demolished by an explosion. It is freely stated that Hagenah has admitted responsibility for this incident, claiming that it was a punishment for the cafe attack described in paragraph 1; this incident and rumours have done little or nothing to assist the efforts of those working for peace.
- 5. Dissident activity has continued on a reduced scale. Incidents have already been reported to you. The son of Jewish Assistant Superintendent of Police was arrested in possession of a revolver and a phosphorous bomb following upon an unsuccessful Stern Geng raid on a Jerusalem bank.

Comment on the arrests of last week has continued on much the same lines as before, although the Agency asked for the release of Doctor A. Altmen to enable him to attend the forthcoming meeting of the General Zionist Council in Zurich. Demands for the release of the 3 Mayors continue but it is still not clear whether the Agency is wholehearted in its desire to see these stalwarts of the Right at large again. Nevertheless, Agency circles have been endeevouring to find a way out of the impasse caused by the refusal of the Mayora to submit to interrogation. It has been made clear that fighting against dissidents continues and will be intensified; an Agency spokesman in Geneva has advanced, as a reason for non-co-operation with the Government, new excuse that co-operation would weaken the struggle against dissidents. There are, however, indications that a section of Haganah, whose strength cannot at the present be estimated, is strongly opposed to any anti-dissident action and is engaged in propaganda to prevent it.

It is stated that its members will shortly return to Palestine and publish a communique on decisions taken. Latest reports from Cairo state that it has prepared a memorandum for submission to the United Nations through the Arab States, demanding expulsion of all Jews who arrived in Palestine after 1917. It is also reported to have considered the speeding up of a plan for Arab immigration into Palestine. Arab Higher Committee circles continue to attack Musa Alami for his alleged intention to flout the boycott of U.N.S.C.O.P.

8. Indirect collections for Beit el Mal have started. On Arab bus routes, every passenger is expected, on one day in the week, to buy a ticket for 5 mile as a contribution to this fund. The ticket bears an outline map of Palestine with the inscription "My Country" and inset of the Dome of the Rock and the Church of the Holy Sepulchre.

Labib's permission to stay in Palestine has expired but his return to Egypt has been delayed by alleged illness. In the meantime, he is being watched by the Police, in view of report that he intends to go underground and his departure will be insisted upon immediately he is fit to travel.

Il. Pollowing upon the sabotage of the EMPIRE LIFERNARD (see paragraph 7 of my telegram No. 1424) and with a view to avoiding further damage to British ships suployed in transferring the monthly quota of illegal immigrants from Cyprus to Falestine, negotiations are now in progress with the Jewish Agency with the object of transferring responsibility of providing transport on to Agency shoulders. In the meantime, and until some satisfactory arrangement has been arrived at, the balance of the June - July quota remains in Cyprus, together with the July - August quota. These arrangements will not, however, prejudice the transfer to Palestine of the orphans mentioned in paragraph 12 of my telegram No. 1526. This will be effected as soon as the ordinary administrative arrangements have been completed.

Weekly Intelligence Approclation.

Arab-Jewish tension, which reached a dangerous lovel following Potah Tikvah incident reported in paragraph 4 of my telegram under reference, particularly after Haganah had openly admitted responsibility for this outrage while expressing regret at deaths of wemen and children, has somewhat subsided though one may suppose Arabs of area have neither forgetten nor forgiven. During early part of the week four Arabs and one Jow were killed in Jaffa-Tel Aviv area, one of the former being driven out of a cafe in the heart of Tel Aviv and stabbed to death in the street, but it has now been proved possible to lift the curfow and life is returning to normal in the troubled areas.

2. Resent events have provided a salutary lesson to all of the danger that irresponsible action may bring samplete/


complete disaster to both communities, a lesson which appears to have been taken to heart. There is evidence that Agency circles were shaken by the Petah Tikvah incident and the Hebrew press has openly suggested that all is not well with Maganah, "Hasrotz" going so far as to call upon Haganah leaders to hold an enquiry into the circumstances of the Incident and to make public all details. In Jerusalem Jewish organisations, including Agudath Israel, the Sephardic community "Hashomer Hatzeir" and Revisionists, and headed by the Jewish Community Council, issued a joint appeal to preserve the peace.

- Arab political and religious leaders and press have also been insistent that their followers should refrein from violence. The Arab Higher Committee, whose members have now returned from Egypt, has issued a moderate statement on the incidents, saying that it is dealing with questions of helping victims and preventing recurrence of violence by the appointment of armed guards in: consultation with Government. There has been some criticism in Jaffa of lack of leadership from Arab Higher Committee over the The A.L.N.L. bases its appeal on the argument that the recent events were instigated by British imperialism in order to justify maintenance of British rule, an idea which appears to be current in Arab minds. In fact name of Brigadier (?Clayton) figures constantly in bazaar rumours. Two Arab-Jewish "reconciliation meetings", one between Arabs and Yemenite Jews in Jeffa and one between Givat Shaul, a notorious nest of terrorism on outskirts of Jerusalem, and neighbouring village of Deir Yassin, have taken place. These are however of only local significance.
- It has proved necessary to suspend the Arabic newspaper Ed Difaa for publishing without submission to the Censor an extrect of Mahmoud Labib's speech at Ramallah (vide paragraph 10 of my telegram under reference) which was likely to endanger the peace. This paper had been warned for a similar offence on a previous occasion. Labib has now returned to Egypt.
- .5. It is reported in the press that the Arab Higher Committee 's delegation to the forthcoming session of the General Assembly will consist of Jamal Husseini, Doctor Khalidi, Emile Ghourt, Rajai Husseini, Henry Cattan, Issa Nakhleh, and Wassef Kamal. The Arab Higher Committee's delegation to Teheran has returned to Beirut and is reportedly well satisfied with understanding of the Palestine Arab case which it found in Iran.
- 6. Terroriet activity has continued on a reduced scale. Incidents have already been reported to you. A considerable arma

arms cache, including 401 grenades, was found in a Jewish quarter of Jerusales.

- 7. On 21st August the interior of an Arab shop to Jerusalem was wronked by a bend placed, it is believed, by enforcers of the boycott. On the same day two samed Araba, one of whom was subsequently captured, exceeded in steeling 510,000 from the Ottoman Benk in Halfa. It is not known who there crime has any political dignification.
- Events in Port de Bone, partievierly the alleged hunger strike and burning of Hebrer and Middles kooks, have continued to cocupy the minds of Yishaw. The ennouncement that the Phislippy Tarpikld's passongers rould be transferred to Germany waless they obseted to disemberk in France has aroused the expected atom of indignation: first resetions have been the subject of a separate report to you. Mrs. Golda Meyerson, in an interview with the Asting Chief Secretary, categorically rejected the suggestion that a representative of the Jowish Agency should pay a vialt to Port de Bous to make a last apposi to resson. She added that no Jew could contemplate advicing another Jew to proceed enywhere but Palestine. The Chief Rabbinate is contemplating a cell to the Jove of the world to observe Menday next as a day of fasting should the transfer be implemented. une to be seen to what extent the charrin so far displayed in verbal and written someont on the British Government's decision will be translated into sots of violence in Palastine. The I.Z.L. have made an appeal to Maganch to join them by rising against the English, if not with arms at least by civil dischodiense, before it is too late. "Do what you can. We. Shall strike without morey Whorever there are Englishmon".
- Oppres (see paregraph 11 of my telegrap No.1572) arrived in Palestine on 20th august and very transferred to Athlit for a few days pending their reception into Youth Align settlements. The Jewish press did not fail to point out that if British ships could be amployed to transfer the orphism there was no good reason for further suspension of transfer of adult illegal imagrants from Cyprus. The negotiations mentioned in last weak's telegram are however still in pregress; the Jewish Agency, having declined to enter into a financial board as a guarantee against paketage.

Following personal from Lloyd. Begins:-

Palestine Committee has decided to hold its first meeting in New York on May 26th (repeat 26th). It is not yet possible to say what programme Committee will then decide to adopt, but it is expected that they may hold preliminary meetings in New York for perhaps ten days (primarily to decide procedure though possibility of their receiving evidence cannot be excluded) and then fly probably to Palestine in the first instance.

Martin who has represented us at the Assembly will now return here and we think it would be desirable for MacGilkivray to arrive New York by the 26th so as to be available to answer enquiries from the Committee e.g. as regards itinerary, conditions in Palestine etc. We therefore hope that it will be possible to arrange for MacGillivray to fly to London in time for brief consultations here before onward flight to New York arriving there not later than May 25th. A day or two here at most would be ample. Please telegraph when we may expect him.

It is thought at present that party visiting Palestine is unlikely to number much under 100 (repeat 100). Please let us know as soon as possible whether this number can be accommodated, and also telegraph direct to United Kingdom Delegation, New York, information for which Committee has asked regarding climatic conditions in June and July, clothes required (e.g. dinner jackets?) and vaccination and inoculation requirements. MacGillivray will leave here by our Skyways Charter 21st May, arriving London in the evening. Grateful if accommodation may be arranged for him for that night and intervening period before departure for New York. I assume that you will arrange for onward passage to the United States.

- 2. He will be in a position to report arrangements being made for accommodation, but you might wish to emphasize at this state that hotel accommodation will not be available as it was for the Anglo-American Committee and that such accommodation as can be provided will not be up to first-class hotel standards. Morêover, I understand that Press (?Association) here will be increased by not less than 100 during the Committee's stay in Palestine.
- 3. Question of finding sufficiently large hall for public meetings of the Committee, to satisfy the demand of the press and the public, is being examined.
- 4. These arrangements will necessitate secondment of several British Administrative Offivers to special duty connected with the enquiry and I must request again that some serious effort should be made to provide the Administrative Officers for whom we have repeatedly asked.
- 5. Cost of MacGillivray's passages is being charged to the Colonial Office. Ends.

CABLES RECEIVED FROM NEW YORK ON PALESTINE SESSION GENERAL ASSEMBLY.

3.22 p.m. 28.4.47. No. 341.

First Special General Assembly of United Nations convened this morning at Flushing to face Palestine issue.

Aranha of Brazil elected President, decision receiving 45 of 50 votes cast. No other candidate received more than one. This Special Assembly streamlined version of Regular Meeting which closed here December 15th last. Were empty seats in Delegates Section but overflow crowds in seats for public. Many countries staffed Meeting with fewer Delegates than full session requires and most appointed Diplomats already stationed in this country. Extraordinary security precuations marked opening. Hundreds of Special Police checked visitors of Delegates and Officials alike as they converged on the re-opened City of New York Building of the 1939 World's Fair in New York. The wraps are off and the facilities offered to Delegates show, no sign of the four month lay-off since the regular session closed.

The Provisional Chairman pending the election of Dr. Aranha was H.E.M. Fernand van Langenhove, deputising for M. Spaak. Saying that one criticism which might be levelled against the United Nations was the length and number of the meetings he added "But circumstances today are stronger than our desire not to overload the Organisation". "Over long and over frequent meetings are in part explained by the fact that the United Nations is still in the organisational stage" he added.

Van Langenhove went on "Another reason is that the world we live in is still suffering from the shock of a terrible war and peoples and governmentts turn more and more to the United Nations in the hope of finding the solution for their direct difficulties.

"The nuestion which called for this extraordinary session is a striking example. In so for as this testifies to further progress in the spirit of international co-operation, we can only rejoice. But the more numerous the appeals to the Organisation grow, the more urgent it becomes for us to improve our methods and to exert every effort for increased efficiency!

In his inaugural address Dr. Aranha declared that the problem which had brought the Assembly together most decisively challenged through the ages the minds and sentiments of individuals as well as peoples. Now "the time brought forth the hour of decision for our consciences".

7.17. p.m. 28.4.47. No. 343.

The first special session of the United Nations General Assembly made good progress today in clearing its procedural decks before taking up the Arab appeal to put the question of ending the British Mandate in Palestine in the Agenda. This is likely to be the most contraversial feature of the Assembly. The five state request must receive a two-thirds majority of the world body before it can come before the session. The Assembly was called to appoint a Committee to study the Palestine problem and to report to the General Assembly in September.

The proposals of the President, Dr. Oswaldo Aranha, to avoid breaking any new procedural grounds and so delaying the session were adopted and seven vice-president were elected in secret ballot before the adjournment for lunch.

The vice presidents were won by France, U.S., U.K., China, U.S.S.R. Ecuador and India.

One additional member nation took part in balloting for the first time - Siam, having been formerly installed in United Nations during the opening session. Membership was granted to Siam as the 55th country in the United Nations at the last Assembly meeting in December 1946. Prince Wan Waithayakon, who also heads the Siamese Delegation, replied to speeches of welcome from the chief delegates of India, China and Denmark pledging his country to play its part in the work of the Organisation.

National views on the Arab bid for inclusion their motion for Palestine freedom now began shaping up during afternoon session of General Committee of Special General Assembly at Flushing New York. Committee will continue session tomorrow further postponing Plenary Session of the Assembly. The United States and Canada expressed support of limiting Agenda to appointing Committee to report Assemblywards next September while U.S.S.R. supported Arab move to extent it lead to discussion. Soviet Delegate Gromyko made it clear he did not favour the Assembly's decision on the Palestine problem of this Special Session.

Delegates for Iraq, Lebanon, Saudi, Arabia and Syria were stated without voting privileges. Egypt fifth Arab state holds seat on the Committee. Iraq's Doctor Fadil Jamali cited Arab Revolt for freedon from Ottoman Empire and League action recognizing Arab seatch for independence which all but Palestine attained. He advanced Thesis League gravely wrong in approving Mandate for British embodying endorsement Balfour declaration for Jewish National Home in Palestine. Effects of Political Zionism on Palestine nothing less than Imperialism at worst. It disturbed harmony between Jews and Arabs.

Egyptian delegate Mchmoud Hossan Pa ha repudiated "Malicious rumours" that Arabs are Anti-Jewish. Arabs and Jews are semitic he saidand had lived in Harmony until Mandate. Question of Palestine can't be linked with Jewish problem Egyptian held nor with Zionists "Fantastic claims"

Polish delegate Maniewicz raised question of Jewish representation at Assembly but question undecided as neared conclusion. Meeting still in session.

13.58 30.4.47. No. 46 (?).

General Committee of the United National Special Assembly on Palestine resumed deliberations this morning at Flushing with opening plea for Jewish representation by AsafAli Chairman India Delegation. He called discussin Palestine without Jewish representation "Playing Hamlet without Prince of Denmark".

Some Committee strength reported for compromise move which would allow special session to debate entire Palestine question without waiting for regular September Conference but without commitment to reach decision now. This formula grows from suggestion by Soviet delegate Gromyko just before adjournment yesterday.

American opposition to broadening topic for Assembly to include whole Palestine question and not just appointment of Committee to report September was unshaken by Arab case. Herschel B. Johnson said "I am certain every member of the United Nations looks forward to the day when Palestine will be free and independent state. There are views however of people vitally concerned in the question which differ about independence form in Palestine".

Johnson felt Arabs assumed Committee of Inquiry would be unguided by terms of reference. This exaggeration Johnson said. Afaf Ali complimented Arab delegates on the able presentation of their viewpoints himself insisting no conflict between British request for Unatied Nations Inquiry Committee and Arab demand for immediate independence. Indian added Assembly couldn't possibly avoid issue Arab proposal putforward in any discussion of Palestine.

Jewish Agency pushed claim for Jowish right to speak with statement that appearance of four non-Committee Arab States justified claim. Acting Polish Delegate Maiewicz told the General Committee he was not voting until Jewish Admission question was decided.

Swedish Delegate Herman Eriksson confessed to lack of background on Polestine other Delegates obviously had endorsing information impartial Commission now with widest terms of reference so all Assembly members would be in a position to hold full discussion at next regular session.

9.26 p.m. 28.4.47. No. 345.

Special General Assembly this afternoon elected Chairmen for six main Committees acting successively as these groups since each Committee includes all 55 members of the United Nations. Chairmen were Lester B. Pearson Canada 1st Committee, Dr. Jan Papanek Czechoslovakia seond, Mahmoud Hassan Pasha Dr. Jan Papanek Czechoslovakia seond, Mahmoud Hassan Pasha Egypt third, Herman G. Eriksson Sweden fourth, Josef Winiewicz Egypt third, Dr. Tiburcio Carias Honduras sixth. All elections by acclemation and all unaminous.

First report of the United Nations Military Staff Committee ready for submission to the Special Council. Document 86 pages and some time expected to elapse until processing distribution and study make possible release by the Special Council.

If this is agreeable to you, will you take care of any such consignments until the Special Committee arrives? The Secretariat say that this seemingly premature arrangement is necessary now in view of the prohibitive cost of sending packages by air. It is not expected that the parcels will arrive before the middle of June.

First direct Soviet comment on Palestine debate appears in Moscow Belshevik Review of 22nd complaining that the functions and competence of the Fact-Finding Committee have been restricted, that the British attitude, supported by the United States Delegation, did not assist the investigation of the substance of the problem, and that the terms of reference of the Special Commission de net mention the necessity of being guided by the principle that the ultimate aim of any plan fer Palestine's future should be the independence of the population.

- 2. Review then claims that the session showed the complete bankruptcy of the mandate system and that Britain has not been able to fulfil the obligations undertaken at the Treaty of Sevres.
- 5. Grenyke's proposals are then given, tegether with the claim that the Seviet attitude is based on the principle of recegnising the right of every people to self-determination.
- 4. Finally, Review centrasts the epinion of the "Times" that U.N.O. should limit discussion to Jewish immigration while Britain continued to occupy a "watchman's position", with the welcome given to Gromyke's prepesals in certain ergans of the American press including the "Heraid Tribune" and "Washingtonn Pest". In particular "P.M." is quoted for the assertion that the Seviet Union's position removes the barriers to a constructive compremise solution of the problems.



I wish to endorse with all the emphasis and carnestness at my command the very moving appeals which have been made during the meetings of the General Committee, with an eloquence and authority to which I do not pretend, that all concerned strive to establish during the whole of the period between this meeting and the final decision of the Assembly after the report of the Committee of Inquiry, that atmosphere of peace and tranquility which is so essential if the work is to be done as we all wish it to be done. That is a plea which should be unanimously sponsored by this Assembly supported by every Government, broadcast throughout the world, emblazoned on every journalistic headline, endorsed in every pulpit, repeated in every school and adopted by every public speaker on this great and solemn problem: that all right-thinking people, throughout the world, so comport themselves during the next few pregmant menths as to insure that this inquiry may be conducted in that atmosphere of calm and peace which alone can enable us to perform our task and to stain the solution that will bring justice to all and relief to suffering humanity. Let all hands be held. Let all voices be stilled except in considered and responsible argument before the Committee we are to establish. I do most solemnly urge magnanimity, patience and mederation on the part of all so that we may establish a true truce of God during these menths to come that all will refrain from any form of provocation or / exacerbation....
