Itinerary of Committee is not likely to be settled until all principal members have assembled and next formal meeting held on 2nd June. But indications are that Committee will proceed direct to Palestine in parties arriving Lydda by air on following dates; provisional travel arrangements are being made accordingly by Committee's Secretariat. Thursday 5th June. Small advance party consisting of officer responsible for accommodation and two other members of Secretariat staff. Sunday 8th June. Party of 38 consisting of Secretariat staff including chief administrative officer and press officer and possibly also some of the alternate representatives. This party would leave New York on 6th June by special charter via Geneva. Unless it is thought that I should stay here longer I would propose to accompany this party. Friday 13th June. Main party of about 60 persons including all representatives and also most of the senior officials of the Secretariat. 30 will probably travel by charter aircraft direct from New York leaving 12th June; the remainder by B.O.A.C. in three batches each of ten leaving New York on 8th, 9th and 10th for London and proceeding thence together by special charter leaving London evening of 12th June.

SPECIAL SESSION OF GENERAL ASSEMBLY TO CONSIDER PALESTINE QUESTION

On the orders of the day:

Mr. JOHN BRACKEN (Leader of the Opposition): I wish to direct a question to the Secretary of State for External Affairs. It is based on a press dispatch issued from the united nations headquarters at Lake Success yesterday. According to this dispatch a special session of the general assembly of the united nations is to be called for April 28 next to take up the Palestine problem. My questions are two in number: (1) Has Canada been invited to attend this meeting? (2) Will the minister now advise the house of the government's plans with respect to this special united nations meeting, and, so far as it can do so, indicate its policy with respect to the Palestine question?

Right Hon. L. S. ST. LAURENT (Secretary of State for External Affairs): To the first question the answer is in the affirmative. The department this morning received a dispatch from Lake Success dated yesterday notifying us that a majority of the members had yesterday concurred in the request of the United Kingdom to summon a special session of the general assembly, and that in accordance with rules 3 and 8 of the provisional rules of procedure of the general assembly the secretary general was notifying us that this special session will open on Monday, April 28, 1947, at eleven a.m. in the general asembly hall, Flushing Meadows, New York City. The provisional agenda of the special session is to be as follows:

- 1. Opening of the session by the chairman of the Belgian delegation.
- 2. Election and report of credentials committee.
- 3. Election of president for the duration of the special session.

- 4. Organization of session.
- 5. Adoption of agenda.

All these are, of course, just preliminaries. Then the only real item on the agenda is the following: Constituting and instructing special committee to prepare for consideration of the question of Palestine at second regular session. The Canadian government had previously expressed its acquiescence in the application of the United Kingdom for a special session of the assembly for the limited purpose mentioned in this article of the agenda.

As to the second part of the question asked by the leader of the opposition, the government feel that this special session will not require a delegation comprising cabinet representation, but that it will suffice to have a delegation of officials of the Department of External Affairs. The present plans are to have that small official delegation headed by the Under-Secretary of State for External Affairs.

As to the remainder of the question, asking for an indication of the government's policy with respect to the Palestine question, the government's policy at present is to concur in this application that there be set up a committee to prepare for consideration the question of Palestine at the next general session of the assembly.

Mr. BRACKEN: Would it be correct to say that this meeting which is called for April 28 is more in the nature of a preliminary meeting for the study of this question, the same to be eventually decided at a fuller and larger regular meeting of the general assembly?

Mr. ST. LAURENT: Our understanding is that it is to constitute a committee which will gather information which will be available for the purpose of dealing intelligently with the problem at the next regular session of the assembly.



The principal American newspapers have continued to report the U.N. discussions on Palestine at considerable length, but there is if anything even less comment than last week. General approval is given to the proposal that the Committee of Enquiry should consist of neutral states. The Soviet attitude has caused some surprise and speculation, as it had previously been assumed that the Soviet

Union would incline towards the Arab thesis.

- The New York Times, in an editorial, takes issue with Arab threats to boycott the Committee and to take matters into their own hands. This, it says, prejudices their case, which has not been improved by their defence of Hitler's ally, the Mufti. It adds that they do not stand alone in their attitude, since Zionist elements are likewise defying the constituted authority in Palestine. The editorial adds that the declaration of H.M.G. that they will accept any United Nations decision, but will not themselves carry out a policy of which they disapprove, may require a reconsideration of the Mandate and Mandatory power. It feels that the best hope of a solution lies in the willingness of all parties to submit to the authority of the United Nations.
- An editorial in the New York Herald Tribune supports the U.S. Government's refusal to clarify their position at this stage as the proper course, in view of the special purpose for which the Special Assembly was summoned, but adds that it will have to take a definite stand at the appropriate moment.

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The editorial criticises the Soviet attempt to get the Big Five on the proposed committee and claims that the Soviet aim is simply to get Britain out of Palestine as quickly as possible and to make trouble for both Britain and America in the Near East.

- This particular point, together with the wider issues in the area, are also referred to by Hanson Baldwin in an article in the New York Times. After speaking of the royal tour in South Africa and the possibility of changing the centre of gravity of the British Commonwealth, he speaks of the British imperial position and the importance to Britain of Middle East oil. He then refers to the shadow of the Soviet Union which, like that of Czarist Russia, is cast over the warm waters of the Persian Gulf. Dissensions provide a fertile field for Communism and for the Soviet desire to oust Britain immediately from Palestine. Three main principles must, he says, govern U.S. policy in this difficult question. The first is that criticism without the acceptance of responsibility must cease. The second is that it must be understood that Palestine and the Middle Eastern area are a strategic and military problem, as well as a humanitarian, political and social one. This means that the United States must not espouse in Palestine any policy which will run counter to that already accepted for Greece and Turkey. The third and most important point is that Palestine must be seen in perspective. It must not be weighed solely in the scale of Jewish, Arab or Christian interests. The solution must promote world stability and the interests of the United States. Middle East oil is vital to Britain, he concludes, and it is not in American interests to establish a power vacuum in the Palestine-Middle East area.
- 5. A later report will be made on comment upon the decisions of the Special Assembly.
- 6. One further item of news which may be of

interest is that the American Jewish Conference is reported in the press to have requested, in a letter to Mr. Marshall, that the U.S. Government should take steps for the immediate removal of American Lend-Lease equipment from Palestine. The letter makes the charge that this equipment is now being used against the Jews and that this is contrary to the original purpose of the Lend-Lease Agreement.



In view of the fact that His Majesty's Government is the Mandatory for Palestine, the Secretary-General has the honour to request the Secretary of State to be so good as to take such steps as may be possible to implement this resolution in so far as it concerns the inhabitants of Palestine.



The Jewish Agency has written to the Secretary General proposing "that an accredited representative nominated by the Jewish Agency be officially attached to the Committee as a permanent liaison". He would be present at all meetings of the Committee and would "receive for study and comment the memoranda and documents submitted to the special committee from other quarters".

The eleven principal representatives appointed to special committee are likely to be accompanied by five alternates and some twenty secretaries, stenographers and [grp.undec.?key] members of their personal staffs of whom particulars are not yet known. This makes a total of about thirtysix excluding official secretariat.

2. Composition of secretariat changes from day to day and has not yet received final approval of Secretary General. It is not yet possible therefore to provide list of names of principal officers but it can be assumed that numbers will be made up approximately as follows:

Advisory staff - 7 men and 2 women, total 9.

Administrative staff - 6 men and 1 woman, total 7.

Public Information and Languages staff - 8 men and 4 women, total 12. Stenographers - 15 women.

We learned last night that some members of the secretariat were under the impression that His Majesty's Government wished to appoint a permanent liaison officer to the special committee with rights similar to those requested by the Jewish Agency. We were also told that the members of the committee in New York were to hold an informal meeting this afternoon and that this speculation as to His Majesty's Government's wishes might affect their attitude to the Jewish Agency's application.

2. Beeley accordingly arranged for Hoo to call on him before the meeting. After explaining the distinction between the Palestine Government and the mandatory power, Beeley said that the liaison office established by the former in Jerusalem would have purely administrative functions. Its purpose was to facilitate the work of the committee during their stay in Palestine. He then said that although he had no instructions from Lendon on this subject, he was confident that His Majesty's Government would not (repeat not) wish to appoint a permanent liaison officer with the right to attend all meetings of the committee and to receive its documents. They would take the view that it would be preferable for the committee to be able to meet in absolute privacy, free from the influence of any interested party. He must add, however, that if the committee should decide to grant exceptional

privileges to any interested party, His Majesty's Government would ask to be treated in exactly the same way.

- 3. Hoo said that it seemed, from the informal discussions at present proceeding among the committee members, that the committee would probably decide to inform the Jewish Agency that they did not wish to have a permanent liaison officer attached to them, but that they would like the Agency to nominate a representative to whom they could apply at any time for information. He was glad to hear that His Majesty's Government would probably regard this as an acceptable arrangement in their case. Knowledge of the British attitude would, he thought, make it easier for the committee to reach its decision.
- 4. I hope you approve of Beeley's statement.

As regards numbers and dates of arrival in Palestine nothing can be added at present to information contained in my telegrams Nos. 20 and 23.

- 2. Cost of the visit will be borne by United Nations, but MacGillivray has informed Committee's Secretariat that he does not anticipate that Government of Palestine will wish to make any charge in respect of Government's Liaison Office except possibly in so far as it may be necessary to engage temporary staff, e.g., Arabic and Hebrew translators, for work undertaken solely on behalf of the Committee. It is evident however that Committee will wish to be as independent of Government as possible and itself engage and pay directly any additional staff which it may require for work in Palestine.
- From enquiries made by MacGillivray in London and here it seems that there are no complete spare sets of records of oral evidence given to Anglo-American Committee in Washington, London and Jerusalem. Committee's archivist has obtained one complete set of Washington evidence and hopes to obtain from Colonial Office a set of the London evidence while she is in London on her way to Palestine. Committee's Secretariat considers that, unless readily available, no steps need be taken to provide more than these single sets of Washington and London evidence but that it would be useful if each representative were to have for reading before date of public hearings in Jerusalem one complete set of the Jerusalem evidence. MacGillivray suggests therefore that 100 sets should now be prepared in Jerusalem so that 50 can be given to the Committee on their arrival and remainder made available, if desired, to press and public.

His Majesty's Government's memorandum on adminstration of the mandate is complete down to outbreak of war have been sent by Beeley to London by fast mail. Beeley hopes to finish remaining sections this week.

- 5. Committee cannot yet be expected to reach decisions as to the type of evidence which they will require from the Government of Palestine but their Secretariat has been notified that the Government is preparing a supplement to the survey of Palestine which will bring up to date the factual matter contained therein in so far as it appears to be pertinent to the enquiry.
 - 6. First public meeting of full committee will now probably take place tomorrow afternoon when it is likely that certain decisions will be taken as to procedure,.

Mr. Bellenger, pursuant to his reply [OFFICIAL REPORT, 23rd May, 1947; Vol. 437, c. 322], supplied the following information:

I have now received a report on these allegations, which were completely unfounded. Mordechai Alkachi was one of four Jews arrested after attempting to break through a military road block on the night of 29th December, 1946. They were all armed, and ammunition, explosives and two whips were found in their car. During the time they were in military custody they had the same food and medical treatment as military personnel. They were, however, handcuffed for security reasons. At no time were they ill-treated after their arrest and they made no complaints to the officers who visited them. Alkachi was tried by a military court and sentenced to death, the sentence being carried out on 16th April, 1947. Denials of untruthful reports such as that which my hon. Friend the Member for Bosworth (Mr. A. Allen) was good enough to bring to my notice, are sent to the local Press and to representatives of the world Press in Palestine.



Mr. Creech Jones: The documents found in the baggage of Mr. Emile Thouma on his return to Palestine on 27th April were impounded by the Palestine Police and sent to Jerusalem for examination. After examination they were sent to the Police Station in Haifa, where Mr. Thouma resides, and were available for him to collect from 8th May. In spite of several requests, Mr. Thouma has so far neither called for the documents, nor has he made any protests concerning them to the Palestine Government.

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

My telegram No. 1469: Palestine.

The Special Committee on Palestine met in public on the afternoon of 2nd June. All the principal delegates were present with the exception of Fabregat.

- 2. When nominations for the Chairmanship were invited, the Uruguayan substitute at once proposed Grangdos (Guatemala). This was seconded by the Yugoslav (who, I understand, had been present, unlike the Uruguayan, at a private meeting at which the election of Sandstrom (Sweden) was agreed). After some moments of confusion, Sandstrom was proposed by Canada and seconded by Persia. He was elected by 7 votes to 3, with one vote cast for Entezam (Persia). Ulloa (Peru) was unanimously elected Vice Chairman.
- 3. The Committee next adopted the text of a letter which will be sent to each of the 13 organisations whose request for a hearing at the Special Session of the Assembly had been rejected (my telegram No. 1359). The letter states that it will not be practicable for the Committee to grant a hearing to all of them; invites them to submit their views, with a statement of their claim to represent an element of the population of Palestine, by the 6th June; and promises that the Committee will then decide whether to grant oral hearings to any of these erganisations. How subsequently told a member of the delegation that any such hearings would take place in New York before the Committee's departure.

*4. The Committee then adopted some of its rules of procedure. It has decided that "the Mandatory Power, the Arab Higher Committee, and the Jewish Agency for Palestine, may appoint Limison Officers to the Committee who shall supply such information or render such other assistance as the Committee may require. The Limison Officers may, suo motu, present at the discretion of the Committee such information as they may think admisable". It appeared from the discussion that the Committee do not intend the Limison Officers to sit as of right at their meetings.

He eventually compromised with the Prime Minister who does not want to weaken Transjordan's co-operation with other members of the Arab League and agreed that Transjordan Government should be represented by its Minister in Cairo and not by Samir Pasha on the understanding that Transjordan would not in any case boycott the Fact-finding Commission.
