



Mr. Keeling asked the Secretary of State for the Colonies whether he will draw the attention of the United Nations Organisation to the risk that the valuable and irreplaceable contents of the Rockefeller Archaeological Museum in Jerusalem may be looted or damaged if the museum area be the scene of fighting; and whether he will state the present and future position of the museum's endowments.

Mr. Creech Jones: A working committee of the Trusteeship Council is now preparing a draft statute for the City of Jerusalem in accordance with the plan for the future of the city approved by the United Nations on 29th November. I shall arrange for the United Kingdom representative on the working committee to draw its attention to the risk referred to by the hon. Member. The endowment of the museum is held in investments valued on 30th June of this year at £320,000. Income from the endowment during the present financial year is estimated at £P.9,500. Consideration is being given to the future of this endowment so as to ensure its continued application to the purposes for which it was created.

Mr. Keeling: Will the Secretary of State keep the risk to the museum and its contents under constant review?

Mr. Creech Jones: Yes, most certainly.

Addressed to Jerusalem telegram No. 107 of 16th December: repeated to Fereign Office and Saving United Kingdom Delegation, New York.

In some United States press reports about disturbances in Palestine the Palestine Administration is being represented as favouring the Arabs and preventing the Jews from defending themselves.

- 2. Typical accusations, some of which according to P.N. are to be included in a 'Tewish Agency White Paper", are -
 - (A) that neither the Police nor the Army have made any serious effort to keep open the Tel Aviv Jerusalem road;
 - (B) that Jewish conveys are not escorted and that revolver licences are refused to bus drivers;
 - (C) that Jewish [gp. undec. ? sattlement] Police are not allowed to use armoured cars and are consequently being killed by Arabs while riding in open cars;
 - (D) that the Police scize the arms of Jews who are defending themselves against Arab attacks but make no effort to disarm Arabs (a case at Holom on 14th December is cited);
 - that arms are being distributed to Palestine Arabs (this was dealt with in paragraph 4 of your telegram No. 2143 to the Secretary of State for the Colonies): P.M. of the 16th December also carried a Palcor report from Jerusalem to the effect that careful investigation had revealed a black market in armed escerts, with British Policemen hiring themselves out as paid guards to safeguard Jewish conveys at a tariff varying with the size of the convey.
- 3. A telegram has been received from the American Zionist Emergency Council which refers to the failure of the British authorities, while holding full responsibility for law and order, to secure safety on the public highways and prevent

attacks on Jewish travellers. It also mentions points (C) and (D) in the preceding paragraph, refers to reports of two attacks by the Transjerdan Frontier Force on Jewish conveys and emis by placing responsibility for "exciting conditions of lawlessness and disorder" on the Palestine Administration.

4. Although the object of these stories is clear, it would be useful to me to know what your general policy is as regards policing, arming and convoying and to have any information and guidance that would enable me to give concrete answers in enquiries or accusations based on points made as those cited in paragraph 2 above and to the telegram referred to in paragraph 3.

Nuri Pasha's ideas as outlined to Clayton yesterday appear as follows.

1. As a first step an attempt will be made to persuade Ibn Saud to approach the Americans with a view to their modifying their attitude over partition. Arguments it is suggested that he uses are the difficult position [?grp.emitted] he is himself placed between other Arabs and the Americans. It is also apparently hoped that he will use the suggestion that he might cancel or restrict oil concessions. If he succeeds the way will be [grp.undec.] compromise of some sort. If he fails the Arabs will continue with their military plans. These as Nuri Pasha envisages them are to occupy as much of Palestine as possible with regular forces of Transjordan and Iraq but no (repeat no) troops to enter the country until after the termination of the mandate. Thereafter they will occupy areas as we evacuate them both in Arab and Jewish zones. There will be no interference with our military facilities or communications and every care is to be taken to avoid the risk of clashes with us. Irregulars will

move in also though Nuri Pasha wishes this discouraged until we relinquish administration. By these tactics he hopes to be able to disrupt Jewish sources of supply expecially of petrol.

2. Salih Jabr whom Clayton also saw yesterday sketched more or less the same line of action but he is a good deal more extreme in his views of what Ibn Saud should do. He wishes to demand that the latter carry out economic sanctions agreed to in the Arab League Council in the autumn and cancel or suspend American oil concessions. If Ibn Saud acts accordingly Salih Jabr says he will do the same by concessions in Iraq. If Ibn Saud refuses Salih Jabr will not consider himself bound by the League's decisions and will not attempt oil sanctions but resort to such military measures as may be agreed upon.

Saud's refusal to apply oil sanctions a useful weapon against Ibn Saud's influence in the Arab world and a means of increasing relatively that of Hashimite States. It is not unlikely that the same idea is in Nuri Pasha's mind. At the same time there is no doubt that always the thought of both of them is to try to upset or alter the Palestine decision.

Mr. N. Macpherson asked the Secretary of State for the Colonies whether he will give the population of each of the seven areas into which Palestine is to be divided under the revised U.N.O. plan, showing it under the following separate headings: Arab, Jewish, other races.

Mr. Rees-Williams: The figures in the form requested by the hon. Member are not readily available. The population of Palestine is classified in official statistics under two heads: (a) Jews; and (b) Arabs and others. The Palestine Government estimate that the distribution of the population, settled and Bedouin together, in the two States and in the area of the City of Jerusalem on 31st December, 1946, was approximately as follows:

I am asking the High Commissioner for Palestine for an analysis of these figures to indicate respective populations in the different sectors of the Arab and Jewish States and will communicate with the hon. Member when I am in receipt of his reply.

It will be understood that the above figures relate to the areas within the boundaries described in Part II of the United Nations plan and do not take account of any changes which may result from the instruction in Part I of the plan that these boundaries are to be modified in such a way that village areas as a rule will not be divided by State boundaries unless pressing reasons make that necessary.

The enclosed message is for transmission to the Mayor and Councillors of your Corporation. It concerns all the citizens of your town.

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Though your Government has announced its intention of evacuating our country, it is making plans for a bloody struggle between Jews and Arabs, out of which it means to gain renewed control of the country.

The British representative at the United Nations has made it clear that the Government plans to withdraw the civil administration but to keep the Army, in military occupation of the country. The Army is not only to organise its departure. It is going to rule the areas in which it remains while the evacuation is going on.

The evacuation is to be carried out in such a way as to encourage and aid the Arabs to attack the Jews who, on account of the continued British occupation of their key areas, will be tied hand and foot in their efforts at defending themselves or counter-attacking.

Officially, the British troops will be "looking on". They will not lift a finger -- except to crush any military activity by the Jews still "subject" to British Occupation.

The long-cherished dream of the British Foreign Office is thus to be achieved: an Arab-Jewish war in which (it is planned) the Arabs are to have the upper hand. And the Jews are thus to be crushed -or driven to beg for British aid. British aid will then be offered, on condition -- that the country remains effectively under British control.

That is the master-plan. In accordance with this plan, Arab attacks have already begun even before the evacuation begins and they are being carried out with the cooperation of the British forces. British forces are thus providing cover for the Arab attacks, preventing the Jews from putting their defensive measures into operation, killing Jewish defenders and disarming them. Already the British forces have made it possible for their Arab hirelings to paralyse communication between Tel-Aviv and Jerusalem and forced the evacuation by Jews of part of the Tel-Aviv - Jaffa border area. A substantial proportion of Jewish casualties have been inflicted by British arms -- including a woman and her child crossing a street.

These events of the past few days have only made clearer your Government's intentions and plans. And we want to warn you that we shall act to counter and frustrate them. If Arab dupes and mercenaries, misled or paid by British wire-pullers, and encouraged to believe in an easy victory, continue to attack us, we shall not only defend ourselves against them. We shall attack the real enemy, who sends and helps them. If there is more bloodshed in our country it is not, as Mr. Bevin plans. going to be only Arab and Jewish blood that is shed. It will be British as well.

We want you to know this because it is your sons and brothers, sent to risk their lives for your Government's squalid policy, who will pay the price of that policy. We want you to know this because we are not interested in killing them. We want to be left in peace in our country and have no objection to their remaining in peace -- in yours.

But as long as they are here and we know the purpose of their presence is to ensure the shedding of Jewish blood we shall attack them.

Moreover, as your Government's war against our people and its efforts to crush us are world-wide (remember the sea blockade against our repatriates, remember the "Exodus 1947") -- our counter-attacks will not be limited to Eretz Israel.

We have determined to liberate our country and re-establish our independence, and we mean to finish the job.

It is for you to decide whether your sons and brothers are to risk their lives in order to carry out a senseless policy of hate and oppression.

evacuation, concern themselves only with evacuation they will not be attacked by us.

But any attempt by whatever means to perpetuate British rule in whatever form and in whatever part of our country will result in a new offensive by the Irgun.

We feel it is right to give you this warning because we know that your Government is not telling even its own people the truth. We prefer you to succeed in changing your Government's plans by your own means. If you do not -- we shall have to do it.

Demand of your Government therefore that it carry out its evacuation from our country speedily, in orderly fashion, and without further interference of any kind in our affairs or our relations with our Arab neighbours. So that your soldiers may return Home in peace.

2. I have the following observations to make on the accusations set cut in Washington telegram:

Paragraph 2(a). Army and Police mobile patrols operating from Jerusalem and Juffa- Tel Aviv eres cover the entire road and a British battalion is stationed in the Remleh-Lydda area where the majority of the attacks on Jewish transport have taken place. In addition, Police mounted patrols operate in the areas bordering the main road, while a considerable amount of Police and Army traffic uses the road which, in itself supplements the special dispositions made. Finally, plans for intensifying mobile patrols and military action in the neighbourhood of the road itself are now being put into force.

Paragraph 2(b). Organisation of Jewish traffic in convoys has been carried out independent of official advice. This form of travelling has never been considered advisable for the following reasons:-

- (1) The man power at the disposal of the Security Forces is quite insufficient to provide close escorts for the number of convoys which would undoubtedly be demanded.
- (ii) Groups of vehicles are easily distinguishable and would be targets for attack in view of the fact that Arab traffic still operates normally.
- (111) The system of road patrols offering overall protection to single vehicles is considered the most effective form of security.

It is considered that to permit drivers of Jewish transport to be armed would increase the general insecurity, since drivers of all vehicles, Jew and Arab alike, would immediately demand similar consession, and injudicious use of firearms by private persons would precipitate rather than (group omitted) trouble. Moreover, postession of a firearm by the driver of a vehicle constitutes no effective protection against small arms fire from ambush. Similar requests by Arab transport drivers have been refused. In this connection please see my telegrem No.2457. /Paragreph

Paragraph 2(c). 17 armoured cars are held on the establishment of the Jowish Settlement Follow and have been authorised for use in close defence of the Jowish colonies in which they are stationed. It would be inadvisable to divert them for convey duby nor are they suitable for bhin purpose.

No goveral approval has been given for Jewish Settlement Police to escort conveys of Jewish transport outside the Jewish Colony areas. It has been found that the very prosence of Jowish Southement Police, either in armoured cara, or open vehicles, is in Arab mixed areas, provocative of intense racial feeling and is thus a potential source of trouble.

A large number of British Police engaged on eccurity patrols on main roads continue to use open vehicles.

2(e). P.M.'s report of a black market in armed escepts is mischievous nonsense. There is not the elightest evidence to support the allegation, nor has a single complaint on this subject been ledged with the authorises by anybody, Jew or Centile, in Palestine.

3. The general deterioration in security in Palestine since the acceptance of Partition by U.N.O. is the result of reaction by the Palestine Arabs, which was not unexpected. The full resources of the Police Force, with what military support as has been available, have been used in the maintenance of law and order. A return to normal security conditions might have been achieved had the Jewish population adopted a less aggressive attitude and co-operated with the Security Authorities, but their tendency to take the law into their own hands by using illegal para military organisations has aggrevated the situation.

The Jewish Agency controlled Hagambas been on its own admission, responsible for severe attacks on Arab villages, which have eaused considerable loss of life (including women and children) and damage to preperty. Hagana members have, also, turned their weapons on British Police and troops attempting to resters order. Jewish terrorists have been responsible for unprovoked attacks on both Arabs and British Police and soldiers, yet, while estensibly condemning such attacks, it is known that the Jewish Agency is (corrupt grp.)ingwith the terrorist leaders and that it has not altered its policy of refusal to co-operate with the present administration.

Reference to alleged attack by Trans-Jordan Frontier Force on Jewish convoys is not understood. On the contrary, Jews attacked two Trans-Jordan Frontier Force trucks leaving Jerusalem on 11th December killing one trooper and injuring two others. Reference may be intended to incident at Beit Nabala on 14th December when Arab Legion Guards opened fire on a Jewish convoy. Present evidence suggests that the action started by the Jews throwing grandes into the Arab Legion camp. On another occasion, near Asluj, the Police opened fire on a Jewish convoy after a shot had been directed from the convoy at a Police Inspector.

4. On the general question of arming the populace, it must be obvious that indiscriminate arming is no contribution to security, and the maintenance of law and order means that carrying of arms contrary to the law must be regarded by the Security Forces as an offence. Neverthelese, some discretion must be exercised, in the psculior circumstances of Falestine, as between attack and self protection, and this would be easier in actual practice if Jewish attacks on the British were to cease. Within the past work two British Police Sergeants and a British Officer and Warrant Officer of N.M. Forces have been shot by Jews at close range in broad daylight in the streets of Jerusalem, and two of them have been killed.

The Government has, however, shown its willingness to arm both Jews and Arabs for their own protection, where they are prepared to co-operate with the Government and Security Forces, and where the Government is satisfied that they will be under the control of proper authority.
