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

In the light of our recent experience with the Panamanian Chargé d'Affaires in London, I wonder whether we should not re-consider the line taken in the minutes on E 72/48/G. Morales is at present co-operating with us in removing the registry of Panamanian vessels known to be implicated in the illegal Jewish immigrant traffic. He has cancelled the registry of five vessels and we have put up another five to him for similar action. cancellation of registry is not of course a final solution, since the organisers can take steps to secure another flag or may even possibly use an unrecognised flag like the Zionist emblem. Nevertheless, it is clear that the loss of flag means a considerable delay in the movement of any vessel and I am sure that this delay is valuable to us.

_ I would propose now to approach the Honduranean Government with a request that they, in the same way as the Panamanian Government, should cancel the registry of vessels under Honduras flag known to be involved in this traffic. We have already raised the question of diverting the "Ulua" with the Honduranean Government and received quite a friendly reply. I think there is a hope of getting the Honduranean registry of various vessels cancelled.

Reply has now been received from the State Department in the shape of a personal letter from Director of Office of Near Eastern Affairs. It says that careful thought has been given to the ways and means of meeting our wishes and goes on as follows.

"According to information available to the Department, it is understood that the ship in question is M.S. Abril of Honduran registry, which sailed from port of New York on December 26th for Marseilles. It was reported to have had no arms aboard although it did carry a generous store of life jackets, mess kit [?gps. omitted].

In the light of such evidence as Department was able to obtain, it did not appear that departure of this ship would represent a violation of American law. Consequently we had no legal grounds on which to take the action which you suggested in your aide-memoire of December 19th.

- 2. I am asking His Majesty's Consul-General New York to report urgently whether this is the same vessel or another.
- 3. I am returning to the charge with Honduranean Ambassador (my telegram No. 7227 paragraph 3) but you will no doubt now consider the desirability of persuing the matter with the Honduranean Government.

No. 199 of November 28th, replying to the enquiry contained in your telegram No. 36 Saving (E.10454/ 7656/31) of the 4th November last, and to report that I have now been notified by the Uruguayan Ministry of Foreign Affairs to the effect that all Uruguayan Consular Officers in Europe are authorised to grant visas, provided that prior authorisation for each visa is obtained from Montevideo. The only cases where reference to Montevideo is not necessary are those of nationals of Republics on the American Continent desirous of travelling to Uruguay for a temporary visit. In the case of foreigners, whatever may be their nationality, who desire to proceed to Uruguay for permanent residence, only career Consular Officers may transmit applications to Montevideo.



governing immigration into Costa Rica, and to report as
follows.-

- All applications for an immigration visa have to be submitted in full detail to the Migration Department of the Ministry of Public Security by the Costa Rican Consular Officers to whom the application is in the first place addressed.
- There are no specific regulations with regard to the entry of Jews, refugees or stateless persons, and the decision as to the admittance of such persons into Costa Rica rests with the Migration Department of the Ministry of Public Security, each case being treated on its own merits. Collective visas may, however, be authorised for refugees after each individual member of the group has been accepted for entry, but such individual members would, in addition, receive a personal entry card.
- All Costa Rican Consular Officers in Europe are stated to have authority to grant visas, but for purposes of permanent residence in Costa Rica no visa may be issued without reference to the Department of Public Security in San José. Even for a temporary stay for purposes of business or pleasure, British subjects are the only Europeans entitled to receive the new combined visa and passport for limited residence, the details of which are given in my letters of the 7th and 10th of December addressed to the Passport Control Department.
- 5. A list of Costa Rican Consular Officers was enclosed in my letter of October 29th addressed to the Library of the Foreign Office.

With reference to Coulson's letter 41/231/46 of 5th December and to our P.L. 1086 of 13th December, we enclose a copy of a Note from the French Ministry for Foreign Affairs about the "Archangelos", the "Merica" and the "Ulua". This is satisfactory so far as it goes; we shall however continue to remind the Ministry that we are waiting to hear the results of the search of these vessels.

We were told the other day verbally that definite instructions have now been given to the Ministry of the Interior that the camps at La Ciotat were to be closed down and no further camps established on the Mediterranean coast. It remains to be seen whether the Ministry of the Interior will act upon these instructions.

Dear Department,

With reference to our letter No. 126/50/46 of 22nd November last, we transmit herewith copies of letters from Mr. Josef Tellery to the Costa Rican Ministry for Foreign Affairs and Mr. Ronaldo Falconer (a British subject by birth, Costa Rican by naturalisation) who is Costa Rican Consul General Designate at Amsterdam.

- 2. These letters will bring the story of the Costa Rican visas up to date as far as it is known in Budapest. It is clear that Mr. Tellery thinks that the Jewish emigrés have in some way used the letter which he gave in 1944, though it is difficult to see how a letter addressed to the Roumanian Red Cross stating that in the event of the bearers wishing to continue their journey onwards from Roumania they would be obliged to apply to Mr. Tellery for the necessary documents, could be construed into a visa for Costa Rica.
- 3. Mr. Tellery is very anxious that these letters shall reach their addresses as soon as possible. He states that recent experience of the ordinary mail has shown him that letters take anything from 2 to 3 months and there is no airmail service from Hungary. We should, therefore, be glad if you could see your way to posting these letters by airmail from London or to forwarding them by air-bag provided there is one in the very near future. Mr. Tellery thinks that Mr. Palconer is leaving Costa Rica at the end of January.
- 4. There have been no further developments as a result of enquiries into the activities of Mr. Ehrenfeld.
- 5. We are sending a copy of this letter and its enclosures to San Jose, Bucharest and Moscow.

My dear Falconer,

Enclosed you will find a copy of my report addressed to the Minister of Foreign Affairs in C.R. The report speaks for itself and was in reply to a letter received from the C. Rican Foreign Office. I am dreadfully sorry that complications arose out of an act of pure sympathy but the audacity of these jews in applying now to the authorities for a permission to land in C.R. and at the same time pretend to hold a visa from me, is astounding. I am sure, if they had any documents at their disposal, they would not have suspended their immigration schemes for years. I am now sorry to say that while the German and arrow-cross reign of terror prevailed in Hungary, many of us belonging to christian society, tried our best to rescue the life and property of the jewish population. In one case, for instance, I was lucky enough to save from confiscation millions worth of shares belonging to Mr. K. by having them transferred to my name. Hiding jewish property was a capital offence at this time and if government people had known about the transaction, nothing would have saved me from swinging for the fellow. What we got in return was often not even a "thank you" as in the case of Mr. K. for instance. On the other hand by such actions the policy of the arrow-cross Gov. could be resisted successfully. However, unlike to the representatives of the foreign powers in Budapest, I refused to give a visa or passport even in cases of emergency. Therefore I hope that the Minister, should be not approve humanitarian motives, will at least accept my explanations, and take into consideration that the Covernment principles with regard to visas, passports and immigration were strictly observed by me. There are many things I should like to talk over with you personall and hope to be able to do so when you come to Europe next year. Until then, I remain,

Dear Sir,

With reference to your instructions of 9th December, 1946 Nr. 3437/H I beg to inform you as follows.

In the autumn of the year 1944 the jewish population in Hungary applied in masses to the representatives of foreign powers in Budapest for protection against the cruelties and often wholesale massacres committed by the Germans and the arrow-cross Government in Hungary. To save them . from extermination the Swiss, Swede and Spanish Legations functioning in Budapest also during the war, provided the jews up to a certain quota with provisionary visas, passports and letters of protection. I was also approached at this time by the representative of a certain group of jews for a visa. Although it was a case of emergency, I refused to comply with their request. However, to help them escape persecutions, on the advise of Mr. Farkas, counsellor at the Spanish Legation, I agreed to hand them a letter addressed to the Roumanian Red Cross, in which I have stated that in case they wished to continue their journey from Roumania they would have to apply to me for the necessary documents. The object in view, when giving this letter, was to enable these refugees to cross the Hungarian frontier and by reaching in adjacent Roumania the Russian zone of occupation escape further persecutions. To accomplish this end there was no need for a visa to Costa Rica nor for any immigration documents. All these were flatly refused and besides they had been told definitely that on no account would they be furnished with such documents in the future either. Therefore this group of jewish persons was not in a position to produce a rightful visa or passport nor a prolongation of their passport to justify a claim for admittance in Costa Rica and if they are in a possession of such documents, they are certainly not from me.

May I be permitted on this occasion to state that according to the instructions received, I refused all applications for a visa or passport during all the time I had the honour to represent the lovernment of Costa Rica and it happened only in one instance during the war that in December, 1943 I prolonged the passport of a Costa Rican Pamily consisting of five members and this with the knowledge and on the consent of the Hungarian Poreign Office.

I assure you I shall always be glad to be at your service in the future and beg to remain

My dear Falconer.

Thanks for your letter of 11th October. It reached me only to-day, exactly two months after it has been posted by you. I note what you say about my being reinstated as consul of Costa Rica and thank you ever so much for the trouble in inducing them to put me on the list again. It joes, of course, without saying that I was delighted to receive the glad tidings and especially so, as I am fully aware of the advantages offered by such an appointment. You may rest assured that I always took care never to undertake anything inconsistent with the position of a consul.

Re profits, all I can say is that I never looked upon my position from a financial point of view. Before the war broke out I was promoted to the position of a manager and as one of the directors of the biggest bank in Hungary I was fairly well off, materially independent and my prospects during the war were still more promising. Conditions, of course, since Russians keep this country occupied changed considerably. Depreciation or rather inflation of our currency, which was far worse than the one in Garmany after the first war, made life still more miserable. At this critical time, after 40 years of service. I was put on the retired list and my pension, which would have afforded a comparative luxury before the war, now dwindled down to an almost vanishing point. It will of course be still sufficient to keep soul and body together but hardly more than that. My old flat with all its luxuries was completely destroyed by fire during the war and it is only by sheer luck that I was offered an elegant flat last year (in the house of my wife's uncle). The house is situated in fashionable quarters of the city and I am glad to say it is also in every respect adequate to the requirements of a consul's office. Discussing the question how far war has affected the livelihood of masses and also of each individual's I have come to the point of making you acquainted with an extraordinary and most annoying discovery which I have made quite recently. Namely the other day I met a physician, a fellow I have never seen before and during the course of our conversation, he was referring to a friend of his, a gentleman by the name of Mr. Threnfeld, who was supposed to have represented Costa Rica in Budapest. On my having enlightened him as to who the real consul in Budapest, was, he insisted obstinately and told me he had seen Ir. Threnfeld's documents which proved to him conclusively that Ir. Ehrenfeld was the lawful representative of Costa Rica in Budapest. In spite of the Poctor's assertions, his story seemed to me incredible to such an extent that I refused to believe him and as soon as I had left him, I chucked the whole tale as a most absurd supposition out of my mind. Shortly after this, however, a Costa Rican family consisting of 5 members applied to me for the prolongation of their passport. While in Budapest they were under my protection and in spite of German persecution, thanks to the help and courtesy of our Foreign Office, they could live here peacefully and unmolested. Wishing to assist them now in their endeavours to make their passports valid again, I have called on the English Sinister at the British Political Mission in Budapest in the hope that he might be able to suggest some means by which their passports could be prolonged. The Minister's Secretary proposed Lisbon as the nearest Costa Rican Consulate and while thus discussing the matter he asked whether I had given any visa during the war. I told him I had instructions received through the Consulate General in Hamburg not to give any visa and therefore all applications for a visa were flatly refused by me. This reminded me, however, of the Doctor's tale and I related the whole thing to him. This happened about three weeks ago but shortly after my visit at the Legation I received a letter from the Georetary which reads as follows: 121/41/46. Dear r. Tellery, With reference to our conversation during your recent visit I should be very much interested to learn whether you have been able to discover anything about the gentleman who is said to hold himself out as Costa Rican representative. You may remember that you told me you were proposing to make enquiries about this and you would be kind enough to let me know the result. Yours sincerely .T. M. Walsh. I was getting annoyed myself about this unexpected news re this pseuco-consul and made up my mind to do some detective work and find out all about the fellow. I set to work at once and the result was that according to Alexander Ehrenfeld, his brother, Desider Ehrenfeld, was functioning in Budapest as Consul of C.R. up to the end of the year 1944. And once the fact established, who knows whether he has not given any visa or passport? I have not the slightest idea how far this fellow ventured to carry his fraudulent action. At present my source of information consists of the alleged consul's brother, Alexander Ehrenfeld, the physician Dr. Geza Lang and the person I sent to A. Ehrenfeld to ask him whether

he could get a visa to Costa Rica. I have already informed the English Minister of the result of my investigations and told him that I have reported the case to our Foreign Office as well, requesting him to hand over the case to the political department of our police headquarters, which they promised to do. If evidence will prove that these rumours are well founded. I have the full assurance of our Minister of Foreign Affairs that the Costa Rican Government will duly be informed by him. Since all these informations, however, are based so far only on hearsay I still hope that we are dealing with a false alarm. As for Aunt Vilma, I am sorry to inform you that she is now laid up in a hospital where she has been taken to about five weeks ago. However, in spite of a most careful nursing and the best of medical attentions, her health is continuously on the decline. Every time I go to see her I always find her getting weaker and as far as I can judge her condition, she is rapidly drawing to her end. Mach time I go to the hospital she never fails to enquire after you and is always asking me whether I had any news from you. I don't think you ought to worry yourself any more about sending her a parcel or making her some remittances, for I am afraid, she will be gone long before your parcels could get here. She has never told me and I never asked her either what the matter was with her but last week I was told by some one, who is in the same ward with her that she is suffering of intestinal cancer (anus) and that her recovery is beyond all hopes. I am dreadfully sorry for this nice, intelligent and clever woman and above all, a good and reliable friend, whose premature death would be a deplorable loss to many of us. I am glad to say, however, that in the hospital she is well provided for. She herself is also perfectly satisfied with all she is getting there, praising the food, treatment, nursing and everything. She has been sent to this hospital by the so called American Joint Jewish society for aiding destitutes) and all the expenses incurred are naturally defrayed by this society.

I am glad to hear there is every hope of your coming to Turone next spring. Holland is a nice country and suppose far more agreeable at present than Germany. Once you are there I hope you will take up your old habits again and spend your holidays abroad. A bit of selfishness makes me say this for it would give me great pleasure if we could possibly bass our holidays next year together on my wife's farm in the country. Gince I am ponsioned, I can freely dispose of my time and not like before the war, when I am sorry to say, I hardly had any time for you during your stay in Budapest on account of my long office hours. As Trs. M. has already informed you I have met with an accident on 3rd July. I slipped on a staircase and broke my lef in four places. It was a very severe fracture and though four months passed since it happened, I am still under medical treatment and have to use a stick when walking even to-day. But there is all the same an improvement in my general condition. I am answering your letter by return of post but considering that overseas postal delivaries are exceedingly slow now-a-days I am sending a copy of this to your brother as well, in case this should not reach you before you leave. Howing to hear from you soon and wishing youa merry Mmas and a Marry Mew Year, I am sincerely yours. Mellery.

P.S. Just after having finished my letter I received the sad news that Mrs. Kaufmann died last night, on 14th December in the hospital. I was told that she fell asleep and never woke again. Passed away peacefully without any suffering. Please note my new address: VI. Vilma Kiralyno ut 32.

Your telegram No. 11 Saving and Marseilles No. 4 to the Foreign Office.

We have spoken strongly to the Ministry of Foreign Affairs pointing out that, in spite of the assurance contained in the French Note of December 19th (Chancery letter to Eastern Department 41/283/46 of December 31st) that these vessels would be kept under strict supervision, we had heard nothing since that date from the French either as to their movements or as to the result of the search for arms. had learnt that the "Ulua" had left to embark her passengers at various points, amongst others at Palavas, a Jewish camp to which we had recently drawn the Ministry of Foreign Affair's attention. We had also heard that the "Merica" had left for La Ciotat. Moreover the "Yolla", which was a vessel of the same type as the "Ulua", was reported to have embarked Jews at La Ciotat, in spite of the instructions alleged to have been given that this and other camps on Mediterranean coast should be closed.

- While our information was still subject to confirmation there was little doubt that the position was as unsatisfactory as before. We were particularly concerned at the absence of news of the results of the various enquiries being conducted by the French authorities into these Jewish activities.
- Ministry of Foreign Affairs were inclined as usual to blame the Ministry of the Interior for their failure to implement the undertakings given by the French Government and their slowness in conducting investigations. We have since been informed by telephone that the search they promised was carried out on the "Archangelos" and that nothing was found. No search seems to have been made on board the "Ulua". Ministry of Foreign Affairs say that the latter vessel left Marseilles ostensibly for Le Havre, without passengers, and that the French Government have no power to stop vessels leaving for

legal destinations. They maintain however that "Ulua" will still be kept under observation if she calls at another French port. A further reply in writing has. been promised.

progress in this matter and that in spite of the French Government's undertakings, illegal departures are taking place as before. We should be grateful for confirmation of arrival in Palestinian waters of "Yella" or any other illegal emigration ship from France, to enable us to make official protest.

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

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THE DEPORTATION OF ILLEGAL IMMIGRANTS

- 1. Although the decision of the Supreme Court of Palestine in Funt v. the Chief Secretary and others disposes of the question of the validity of the action taken by the naval authorities in the territorial waters of Palestine, the further question may arise of the validity of the transport of the immigrants on the high seas. This question might be raised either on an attempt to bring habeas corpus proceedings in respect of detention on the high seas (though this seems unlikely) or on an action for false imprisonment, and such proceedings or such an action might be brought in either case in Palestine or some other court.
- 2. The first line of defence in such proceedings would be that, as was evidently the opinion of the court in the Funt case, there is actually no detention or false imprisonment. The deportees are simply placed on a ship and carried in it out of the jurisdiction on to the high seas. The action of placing them on the ship, necessitating their landing in practice at a particular port, is covered by the Palestine legislation and the decisions cited in the judgment of the Supreme Court. To these decisions may be added the following:-

Rex v. the Home Secretary, exparts the Duke of Chateau Thiorry, 1917, 1 K.B. 922;

Attorney-General for Canada v. Cain, 1906, Appeal Cases 542; and

In Re Adam, 1837, 1 Moore Privy Council 460.

- Some further degree of restraint may be imposed on the deportees other than that which is involved in the sheer physical impossibility of leaving the vessel when on the high seas (this being covered by the first line of defence). exact degree of further restraint placed upon the deportees in transit to Cyprus is not clear, and the judgment of the Supreme Court was not concerned with a state of facts in which such further restraint was involved, the Court having held that there was no sufficient evidence before it that the deportees would suffer any more restraint than the restriction of liberty incidental on a ship, whether it be the Queen Mary or a ship of His Majesty's Navy, whilst it is on the high seas proceeding to a definite port. If, however, authority were needed to justify such further restraint supposing that evidence of it was available the principle of common law might be invoked that a master may take such steps in this direction (that is to say in placing passengers or members of the crew under restraint) as are necessary to ensure order on board and the safety of the ship.
- 4. If forcible detention beyond the limits envisaged in paragraphs 2 and 3 above should be proved, a third defence is available in the doctrine of an Act of State. This doctrine is a difficult one, and uncertain in its operation, but it is considered that there would be a good chance of success here. The principle is that an act which is committed in territory not/

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not being part of the dominions of the Crown and which is adopted as an official act cannot form the basis of any action by an alien in the courts, because the act is done by the Crown in the sphere of foreign affairs, in which sphere its prerogative is absolute. The leading case is Buron v. Denman, 1848 2 Ex 167, Other cases in which Acts of State have been considered are Salaman v. Secretary of State for India, 1906, 1 K.B. 613; Rex v. Crewe ex parte Sekgome, 1910, 2 K.B. 576; Sobhuza II v. Miller, 1926, Appeal Cases 518. There is no direct authority on the question whether a British ship is part of the dominions of the Crown for this purpose, but if it should be argued that it is, reference may be made to recent observations by English judges to show that a British ship on the high seas is not to be deemed for all purposes to be a floating portion of British territory - Chung Chi Cheung v. The King, 1939, Appeal Cases, 160; Rex v. Gordon Finlayson, 1944, 1 K.B. 141.

Secretary of Presidency asked me to see him today and conveyed personal message from President. He informed me that Andrews Somers United States Congressman when visiting this capital last year asked the President to agree to issue 1200 visas to European Jews who would go to Palestine although declared destination the Dominican Republic. President refused but recently Somers' representative arrived and pressed the request for visas. President again refused but has now received telegram from Somers pretending to believe visas were promised. President declares that no such visas have been granted and that strict orders have again been issued to Dominican representatives abroad to refuse although all possible tricks are tried. President declared the desire to show sympathy and friendliness with Great Britain, and disgust at the suggested prostitution of his country's good name. I expressed thanks but stated that from my knowledge of the President I would not have expected any other action. Exact copy of text of Somers' telegram follows in my next. I hope some special expression of thanks can be made to the President particularly in view of Somers' open attempt at bribery and implied threat in conversation that United States opinion would be influenced against the President if he refused. Dominican visas for illegal Jewish emigrants may thus be considered forgery.

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

Accept my warmest thanks for kind reception given to my representative Mr. Joseph Sharfsin and for your country's gracious offer to aid Hebrew refugees by placing 1,200 visas at our disposal on basis you proposed. Please send 1,050 visas to Paris to be made available for my representative there who will bear credentials from Z. Please send remaining 150 visas to Washington available to me or my accredited representative. When credit for humanitarian aid is given I shall see to it that your country and your Gracious President receive their full share. If it is agreeable to you I hope to arrange for a group of my Congressional colleagues to visit your beautiful country as soon as schedule of Congressional business permits. Signed Andrews L. Somers M.C.
