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

Colombian Counsellor yesterday informed His Majesty's Minister that he was about to protest to the Ministry of Foreign Affairs that not only had the Colombian Embassy's communiqué of the 23rd July been ignered by French press, but that French official sources were still encouraging idea that Jews could, if they wished, proceed from France to Colombia.

- 2. Colombian Embassy were pursuing investigations of forged letter from their Consul at Marseilles to the Prefect of the Bouches du Rhône. The Prefecture had so far refused to show them the original document. Colombians were also investigating whether Prefect issued not merely exit visas, but also travel documents.
- Colombian Embassy's formal request that French Government should prosecute the Jewish organisation responsible for forgeries. Ministry suggested that the Embassy should themselves prosecute, and Embassy are now collecting necessary evidence for the purpose.
- 4. M. Bousquet of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs subsequently said that supporting action would be taken by the French Government but it was by no means clear what form this would take.

- 2. If you approve please arrange for similar instructions to be sent to Commander-in-Chief Mediterranean and let us know immediately.
- 3. We shall press French to agree to deletion from communique of words "will not force them to disembark but" or failing that to have no communique at all, but we are not sanguine of success.

Following are draft instructions to His Majesty's Consul General at Marseilles.

You are responsible

- (a) For representing His Majesty's Government on the committee to be set up by the Prefect of the Bouches du Rhone.
- (b) For ensuring liaison between the French and British authorities concerned; for this purpose you should make the earliest possible contact with the Senior British Officer in charge of the refugees.
- (c) For advising the Senior British Officer in the light of the local situation.
- 2. The object to be achieved is to ensure the voluntary transhipment into French tugs of the maximum number of passengers. For this purpose, it will be important
- (a) To ensure that the French authorities make their offer of hospitality as attractive as possible.
- (b) To ensure that this is fully understood by the passengers.
- (c) To encourage by all suitable means that an early lead to disembark is given which will be followed by the rest.
 - 3. It should be borne in mind
- (a) That the putting ashore of passengers must be a French operation for which the French authorities are / entirely.....

- (b) That in no circumstances should members of the British armed forces set foot on French soil.
- (c) That every possible precaution must be taken to prevent a serious Anglo-French incident arising.
- (d) That priority should be given to the landing of stretcher cases; for this purpose arrangements should be made to allow representatives of the International Red Cross Committee on board the transports. (This may in itself encourage a general move to land).
 - 4. The main problems likely to arise are:
- (a) Whether, in the event of a considerable number of passengers refusing to disembark, they should be forcibly placed in the tugs (or landing-craft) provided by the French. It will be for you to decide, basing yourself on the temper of the French authorities with whom you are in contact, at what point to advise the Senior British Officer to use such force.
- (b) What action should be taken if persons forcibly embarked refuse to land and are returned to the transports by the French authorities. In this event, you should advise the British Commander to take them back on board.
- (c) What should be done with passengers who never leave the transports or are returned to them by the French authorities. Subject to any further instructions received from the Foreign Office you should advise the Senior British Officer to hold them and await instructions for departure. This period may amount to some days and in the meanwhile he should use every endeavour to induce them to land.

Foreign Office please repeat Most Immediate to Jerusalem as my telegram No. 22 and Most Immediate to Commander-in-Chief Mediterranean.

Illegal Immigration.

Question of evidence as to ports at which two ships mentioned embarked passengers has been considered here, but sufficient proof for representations to foreign Governments unfortunately cannot be established. It would, therefore, be extremely difficult to apply principle of refoulement in their cases, even if adequate transports were available.

- 2. In the circumstances it appears that the immigrants will have to be taken to Cyprus.
- 3. I will telegraph separately regarding additional transports.

- important that all Jews should be disembarked. On success of operations depends effective establishment of principle of REFOULEMENT, which should have very great effect in discouraging future illegal immigration. Besides, any Jews remaining on board the ships could only be taken to Cyprus as there is no other possible destination for them, and this, after all that has taken place would make most unfortunate impression of weakness which should at all costs be avoided.





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

- (b) to allow you the exercise of discretion within clearly stated limits.
- You should, therefore, in place of instructions in paragraph 4 of Paris telegram No. 754 substitute the following.

It seems possible that the following problems may arise, calling for a decision on the spot:

(a) If the immigrants refuse to leave the ships for the tugs, at what stage should force be employed? You should of course give O.C. Troops the benefit of your

/advice




advice on this point, but the responsibility for a decision lies with him.

- (b) If the immigrants refuse to leave the tugs for French soil, what action should be taken?
- 5. In this connexion you should bear in mind that it is most important that all Jews should be disembarked. On success of operation depends effective establishment of principle of Refoulement, which should have very great effect in discouraging future illegal immigration. Besides, any Jews remaining on board the ships could only be taken to Cyprus as there is no other possible destination for them, and this, after all that has taken place, would make most unfortunate impression of weakness which should at all costs be avoided.
- 6. Disembarkation from the tugs will be an exclusively French responsibility. However, their failure to transfer the passengers from the tugs to the land may threaten the success of the purely British operation of transferring them from the ships to the tugs in two pessible ways. Either:
- (i) The French may request us to take these passengers back on beard the ships, or,
- (ii) There may be no empty tugs left.
 You should not agree to the French request envisaged in
 (i) above, unless you and O.C. Treeps consider that
 this is actually necessary to premote the success
 of the operation. As regards (ii) above, you
 should advise O.C. Treeps in the light of circumstances
 prevailing (and with the objective of ensuring
 the success of the operation). Situation might
 for example justify demand to local French
 authorities for permission for ships to go
 alongside or, alternatively, it may be necessary
 to postpone proceedings until French authorities
 make more tugs available.
- 7. With reference to paragraph 3 of Paris telegram No. 755 you have discretion in event of danger of very grave incident to advise O.C. Troops temporarily to hold up disembarkation, but operation

/should.....

should on no account be abandoned without express instructions from London.

- 8. In connexion with paragraph 4 of Paris telegram No. 755 and paragraph 2 of Paris telegram No. 756, we hope French committee will not go on board at all. O.C. Troops, should, therefore, if he considers this will premote success of operation, make a statement to passengers as indicated in my telegram No. 1709 to Paris and ensure that this is disseminated throughout all ships as early as possible.
- 9. I presume that necessary arrangements are being made to maintain constant contact between yourself and O.C. Troops throughout operations
- 10. I would emphasise ence mere that eperation will only be fully successful when all Jews have disembarked.
- 11. These instructions have been agreed by War Office and Admiralty.

Ministry of Foreign Affairs state that instructions having now been issued to all authorities with the express approval of Prime Minister it will be very difficult to obtain formal modification at this late stage. They have, however, instructed their representative on the committee immediately on arrival in Marseilles tomorrow (27th July) to inform Prefect that British Officer in Charge of Warfield's passengers considers that they will disembark peacefully provided that no outside propaganda reaches them. He is to say that in view of this new information it is surely better that the persons going on board on arrival should be confined to usual police and health officials, together with representatives of International Red Cross and I.G.C. who will help with removal of stretcher cases. If he cannot secure this he is to try to get proposed message suppressed altogether or at very least modified in accordance with your wishes.

- 2. We cannot be sure that this will come off but we shall rely on His Majesty's Consul-General and Mr. Coulson (who leaves for Marseilles by air 27th July) to try to carry point in the committee.
- 5. Your telegram No. 1701. We have throughout reserved the right to use force in the last resort and have reiterated it today in the presence of official who will represent Ministry of Foreign Affairs on Committee. You may nevertheless still want to consider whether British Officer in Charge of the operation and His Majesty's Consul-General in consultation should not be granted latitude to call off physical operations if there appears to be danger of very grave incident of a character which we cannot foresee but which may call for an immediate decision on the spot.

Foreign Office please pass Immediate to Jerusalem as my telegram No. 23 and Most Immediate to C-in-C Mediterranean.


While general arrangements decided upon by French Government seem quite satisfactory, I am very much concerned about arrangements for committee to go on board and make statement on the lines indicated in paragraph (e) of your telegram No. 750.

- 2. It would be far preferable that committee do not go on board at all, but if this cannot be prevented, then it is of utmost importance that statement should be amended to omit the objectionable phrases "French Government..... will not force them to disembark", "will give refuge to all who disembark voluntarily. Those who decide to disembark and the whole of the last sentence.
- 3. It is of course for His Majesty's Government to arrange disembarkation and for the French Government to arrange reception when they have left the ship and French Government must not interfere with our part of the operation. It is intention of His Majesty's Government that everything possible should be done to ensure voluntary and peaceful disembarkation of the passengers (see in this connexion my telegram No. 1707), but His Majesty's Government must reserve the right, if the passengers resist, to use such force as is necessary. In any event, no encouragement must be given to the passengers not (repeat not) to disembark.

4. Please make urgent and pressing representations to the French Government on this matter. You should in the first instance urge the French Government to agree that the committee should not go aboard the vessels. If, however, they insist on this you should urge that the proposed statement is modified in the sense indicated above.

5. We should be prepared if necessary to accept statement on following lines:-

"French Government wish to make known to the immigrants who were on board the "Exedus 1947" that they will give them refuge on French soil, where they will enjoy all the freedom etc. etc. "
- and delete the final sentence beginning "In consequence....".





We have had a preliminary talk with Prefect's Deputy who is in charge of operations. Representative of Ministry of Interior was also present. French seem to have abandoned the idea of the whole Committee going aboard; visit will be confined to normal sanitary and police inspections.

2. It is their intention that before permitting disembarkation of volunteers, police should briefly check their identity to make sure that no one disembarks who did not leave on the President Warfield. We can hardly object to this, but have pointed out that passengers have probably thrown all papers everbeard. To avoid difficulties may we give fermal assurance that there was no possibility of any other passenger getting into the three transports? Was transfer from the President Warfield effected at sea? This assurance if it can be given should perhaps also be communicated to French Government by His Majesty's Embassy Paris.

5. Foreign Office please repeat IMMEDIATE to Jerusalem and Commander-in-Chief Mediterranean.

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

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

Dear Department,

With reference to Foreign Office secret telegram No. 1474 to Paris and repeated to Casablanca as No. 19 of 11th July, on the subject of the possible activities of the Panamanian-owned steamer, "Valena", in transporting Jews to Casablanca, the following is the result of my enquiries:

The Casablanca Police Commissioner informed me that the "Valena" - a yacht-type of ship - is managed by the Cie. de Navigation Paquet and makes the run as often as possible between Casablanca and Marseilles for the purpose of easing the congestion in passenger traffic between here and France. Its last arrival here was 10th July when it carried about 100 passengers, mainly civil servants returning from leave in France. It is expected back here towards 20th July with a similar passenger list.

You may be aware that the Protectorate Government envisaged earlier in the year importing some 6,000 badly needed industrial technicians, but the Police Commissioner told me that this number has since been reduced to about 1,200 and that they were to be recruited from amongst displaced persons in Europe. number about 80 came here by the "Valena" a little over a month ago. They have no nationality - possibly several of them are Jews, and it may be this fact which gave rise to the report which was the basis of your telegram above-mentioned. The Police Commissioner added that he was watching very closely any Jewish movements in or out and would keep me informed of anything coming to his knowledge in this connexton.

In view of the negative nature of this information I have not reported by telegram and I trust this will meet with your approval.

I am sending copies of this letter to the British Embassy, Paris, and to the Acting Consul General, Rabat.

- 1. We have informed attorney for owners of "Colony Trader" that there is nothing that we can do here and that action can only be taken in Gibraltar.
- 2. Attorney has, however, requested that we inform you of a letter dated July 9th he has addressed to the Embassy. This reads as follows:

"I am authorised by the owners of the S/S Colony Trader, detained at Gibraltar since May 23rd on suspicion of future use in connexion with illegal immigration into Palestine, to assure the British Government that the vessel intends to proceed to Genoa to discharge her cargo of scrap (used and worn) rubber tyres, there to discharge her crew which was signed on in the United States, there to repair the vessel and then to use her in cargo trade between Red Sea ports and French North African ports.

Further, if the vessel is sold the owner will notify the Dritish Government at whatever office it may designate, the name and address of the prospective purchaser and port of delivery and will require a warranty from the purchaser that the vessel will not be used in connexion with any illegal immigration into Palestine.

At Genoa the owner intends to sign on a European crew and to repatriate the American crew because of the great disparity in crew wages. As near as the owner has been able to learn, the difficulty at Gibraltar arose through disagreement between the Master and certain members of the crew. In an apparent attempt to embarrass the Master one or more members of the crew thereupon circulated false and malicious statements as to the intended use of the vessel. Claim has already been made by (sic) the cargo for \$200,000 damages and the out of pocket expenses already incurred by the owners by reason of this detention have been ruinous.

I am advised that the owner of the vessel is the Transamerica Compania de Navegacion, S.L., a Lanamanian Corporation and that the vessel flies the Costa Rican flag. The stock ownership of the company, I am also informed, is owned in its entirety by a citizen of the United States."

Minister for Foreign Affairs was absent from Paris this morning so I called on M. Chauvel and protested very vigorously against the French proposal that M. Blumel should be allowed to go aboard the ships bringing the refugees. I said that we had reason to hope that the immigrants would agree to go ashore if they were not subjected to Zionist propaganda. It therefore seemed to me that to allow M. Blumel who was at the head of all the Zionist organisations in France to go speak to those people was deliberately to encourage them to refuse to go ashore and that nothing could be done which was more likely to provoke an incident of the kind that I was sure that both our Governments wished to avoid.

- 2. I went on to complain of the lack of assistance we had received from the Press Section of the Quai D'Orsay and the failure of any French newspaper to produce the true facts of the case. In this respect "Le Monde" notoriously under the influence of the Quai D'Orsay, had been as bad as any other paper. We on the other hand in our desire to avoid injuring Angle-French relations had refrained from stating the full facts and showing how badly the French Government had behaved in breaking their word both in regard to the careful scrutiny of visas and in regard to the enforcement of regulations affecting the safety of life at sea. I said that since I had been in France no incident had occurred in which the French Government had shown such a complete absence of goodwill and lack of any spirit of co-operation. I said that I was sorry to have to say this to him because I knew that he and his Minister had been anxious to help us and had done what they could.
- 3. M. Chauvel promised to see what could be done and suggested that it might be arranged for M. Blumel to address all the immigrants after they had landed. I said that I did not mind who addressed them once they were ashore.



Candido with whom British Field Security is in constant touch and whose territory embraces all places mentioned in your telegram, deny any knowledge of crossings or attempted crossings from British zone.

Military authorities would be interested to know whence Italian Ministry of Foreign Affairs obtained their information as it seems possible that this may be an attempt to divert attention from actual crossing points, chief amongst which is believed to be Krimmel Pass from American Zone.





The French press are making the most of the situation that now exists at Port de Bouc which is as I ventured to foretell (see my telegram No.745) mest unedifying. It must now be apparent that to attempt to land the emigrants by force without French co-operation and in face of the hostility of the population is not a practicable operation and I therefore recommend most strongly that the ships be withdrawn with the least possible delay.

The fact that the French Government has behaved very badly does not affect the situation that has arisen and it is a fact which will require time to impress upon the French people. Meanwhile all the odium is being incurred by His Majesty's Government.


Second and third transports were visited during the afternoon with the same results. Procedure of Committee was also similar but on second transport they got rather out of hand and mingled with immigrants, this led to exchange of questions and answers and Sub-Prefect asked a few selected immigrants specifically whether they wished to come to France. After some wavering they were intimidated by others into refusing.

- 2. On the strength of this and the fact that there had been mass refusal to land by all three transports Sub-Prefect and Committee affected to believe that none would land voluntarily. Military Commander asked for landing craft and doctors to stand by one of the transports tomorrow morning but Sub-Prefect flatly refused saying that in the circumstances he could take no further action without instructions from Paris.
- This is sheer obstruction since Officer Commanding troops is satisfied that with no further outside interference a certain number of volunteers would land tomorrow. We strongly protested that mass refusal was merely a sign of hysteria and intimidation and was no proof whatever that no one would land; but the French authorities were adamant that they could not do more without instructions. I hope therefore that His Majesty's Ambassador at Paris will intervene urgently so that the necessary instructions are sent to the local authorities to continue to provide the agreed facilities for the operation.
- 4. As stated, however, in my telegram under reference, the real point still remains whether the French can be induced to co-operate in some use of force without which we fear there will be relatively few disembarkations.
- 5. Above is not (repeat not) agreed textually with Officer Commanding troops who is not at present available here.







Whole Paris press this morning from Right to extreme Left criticises British action in bringing illegal immigrants off the President Warfield back to France on grounds of inhumanity and cruelty to people who have known the horrors of a Nazi prison camp and resents that France should be dragged into the picture. Even the Brest catastrophy is overshadowed by long and violent outbursts from Port-de-Bouc.

2. The following brief extracts are representative of the general tone:

"Humanite" refers to the three British ships as a floating Auschwitz and goes on to ask what will be the fate reserved for these immigrants by the London Government for whom sentiments of humanity seem to lag far behind egotistical imperialist aims.

"Franc Tireur" says there are no longer true liberty ships but prison ships (bateaux/ cages) still exist.

"Populaire" after reporting refusal of the immigrants to land refers to the execution in Palestine of the three Jewish terrorists and regrets their execution coincides with the arrival of the ships off France.

"Combat" is the most indignant of all newspapers and refers to the ships as being cages for wild beasts, criticises the accommodation on board and says that these people who were in Nazi concentration camps find themselves today behind Allied barbed wire.





President Warfield.

I am quite sure that it would be useless to ask the French Government to give the necessary instructions to their officials to assist us in using force to disembark passengers. Such a decision would in any case accessitate a Cabinet meeting, and the Socialist Ministers, including the Prime Minister, feel very strongly on the subject. M. Daniel Mayer, Minister of Labour, recently informed me that M. Moch, Minister of Transport, had convinced the Cabinet that France had been in no way to blame in this matter. The press (my telegram No. 769) are unanimous in condemning Great Britain already, and the reaction throughout France to the use of violence against those who are represented as having escaped from German prison camps would be deplorable.

2. Mr. Ashley Clarke is flying to London this afternoon in order to discuss the matter. Meanwhile, I am suspending action on your telegram under reference. The result could only be that Minister for Foreign Affairs would genuinely assure me of his desire to cooperate, but also of his impotence to persuade his colleagues. We are insisting on tugs being made available to passengers who may be willing to disembark.



Foreign Secretary has instructed ONE Paris Embassy to make strongest possible representations to the French Government and to request them to send urgent instructions to local authorities to co-operate in disembarking volunteers and non-volunteers alike and to ensure that these instructions are carried out.

Foreign Secretary has pointed out to the French Government TWO that it is in the interests of the passengers themselves that the French authorities should co-operate with us in exerting a calming influence and in helping to carry out disembarkation in as orderly a manner as possible.

It has furthermore been suggested to the French authorities that, as they cannot provide tugs for the disembarkation operations, it would seem that the most satisfactory arrangement now would be for the vessels to go alongside, either in PORT DE BOUC or elsewhere, to carry out disembarkation, and for the French local authorities to take adequate steps to ensure the maintenance of order during disembarkation operations.

COMPULSORY LAW NO. 1746/1939

Re:- Prohibition of transport to Palestine of persons not supplied with valid passports.

GEORGE II KING OF THE HELLENES

On the proposal of Our Council of Ministers, We have decided and ordain.

Article I

Transport of persons, not supplied with valid visaed passports, by Greek vessels, small craft of any floating means, from a Greek or foreign port to Palestine, is prohibited.

Persons violating this prohibition shall be liable to imprisonment for a term up to two years or to a pecuniary punishment not exceeding five hundred thousand drachmae, or to both these penalties.

Article 2

The same punishments shall be imposed on Greek shipowners, shipagents, charterers, shipmasters or any other seamen, if they have intentionally performed the transport of such persons by vessel, small craft or any other floating means under a foreign flag, as well as if they have intentionally participated in such a transport, the alien principal not being liable to punishment notwithstanding.

Article 3

If the transgressor is a Greek shipmaster or any other seaman, he shall be also liable to disciplinary prosecution under the Penal and Disciplinary Code of the Mercantile Marine.

Article 4

- 1. The Port Authorities, on instructions from the Under-Secretary for Mercantile Marine, may prohibit any communication with the land and may order the vessel, small craft or floating means conveying persons whose transport is prohibited under the provisions of this law, to leave the territorial water.
- 2. Non-compliance with the orders of port authorities referred to in this Article, shall imply a punishment as provided for under Articles 1 and 3.

This Law shall come into force with effect from the date of its publication in the Government Gazette.



His Britannic Majesty's Embassy present their compliments to the Royal Hellenic Ministry for Foreign Affairs and, with reference to the Note No. 31454 which the Ministry were good enough to address to them on the 2nd July, have the honour to state that they have studied with interest the draft law which has now been tabled with the Chamber of Deputies and which has as its object to modify and complete Decree Law No. 1746 of the 25th May 1939.

His Majesty's Embassy fear that the last paragraph of the new draft law leaves a loophole by which a shipowner who, for example, sells his ship "irregularly" (that is, without registering the sale with the authorities) may escape the penalty of confiscation of his ship. His Majesty's Embassy therefore venture to suggest to the Royal Ministry that it would be advantageous to amend the passage in question to read:

"Toutefois seront exempts de toute mesure de confiscation les navires, petits bâteaux ou embarcations quelconques irrégulièrement acquis par la personne coupable du transport illicite, si il est établi que telle acquisition a été effectuée sans le consentiment du propriétaire legitime. His Majesty's Embassy avail themselves of this opportunity to renew to the Royal Mellenic Ministry for Foreign Affairs the assurance of their highest consideration.

Mr. Cable of Eastern Dept. telephoned this morning to say that in a debate in the House of Commons in April 1939 the Colonial Secretary stated that a ship containing 1,220 illegal immigrants had been returned from the Palestine coast to Constanza and mentioned other cases of the same sort which had also occurred, thus showing that the system of refoulement, which it is now attempting to establish, was already in force.

French authorities are at present providing food and water for all three transports daily and this will continue at any rate for next three days, but Prefecture warned me this morning that this cannot continue indefinitely.

2. It is clear that future situation will depend entirely on the general attitude of the French Government to the main problem of disembarkation and that no amount of pressure will produce further food from the French authorities unless the French Government have decided to co-operate on the main issue.
