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



Sir,

I have the honour to enclose an extract from the "Journal d'Egypte" of 13th May, containing a French Press Agency report of an interview with the ex-Mufti of Palestine in connection with the reported publication in the United States of America of documents and photographs purporting to prove that the ex-Mufti had collaborated with Nazi leaders, notably Himmler, for the extermination of Jews.

- It will be seen that the ex-Mufti categorically denied such accusations, which he attributed to the Zionists. He then asserted that certain accusations against certain members of the Palestine delegation to the United Nations Organisation were entirely false; the Arabs, both Moslems and Christians, had never fought against Jews for racial and religious reasons, he stated. On the contrary, the Jews had always found a welcome among the Arabs, and relations between Jews and Arabs had never been disturbed before the recent apparition of Zionism. The Arabs had to defend themselves to protect a peaceful Palestine which the Zionists, by their imperialist policy, had transformed into an inferno.
- I am sending copies of this despatch to the British Middle East Office, and to His Majesty's Representatives in Washington, Jerusalem, Bagdad, Beirut, Jedda, Damascus and Amman.

I agree that representations to the Egyptian Prime Minister on the lines suggested in paragraph 3 of His Majesty's Ambassador's telegram under reference are desirable.

2. The Egyptian newspaper el Ahram, which circulates in Palestine, published a message from Haj Amin to the Arabs of Palestine in its issue dated the 10th April, 1947. A translation of the message is as follows:

ambitions which surround our home have lead me to ask you to stand against the danger and use all your might to prevent disaster in order to keep safe the inheritance of your ancestors. As the stages of our national struggle are beset with difficulties it is necessary that we should be united and we may have to make many sacrifices. I therefore call to every individual of the liberal people to be brethren in good and bad conditions, to unite your forces and statements, avoiding party disputes lake a strong edifice.

As our popular revival and national movement can only be realised on the basis of good organisation the public is therefore in need of a strong financial system in Palestine to feed the national movement and prepare means for the active national bodies to carry out their responsibilities and guide the ship in this disturbed sea. The Arab Higher Committee which is leading the national movement has established this system which is known as the Arab Treasury (Beit el Mal). Its plans have been completed and its ambitions the warrant the best results. Its task is to contact the people and collect subscriptions and contributions! Brethren, I call upon you to give generously. Give as much as you can as the national movement is in need of money as well as unity and it is a great responsibility which you are bound to shoulder as the nation is threatened by ambitions.

O liberal people, you have given much for your dear home from your souls and your fortunes. This is not your first secrifice and I am sure you will give willingly, support the Arab Treasury and assist those who are working for this object."

3. I suggest that the publication of such a message is in itself proof of political activity at the nature of which Nokrashy disavows knowledge.

The Minister of State has asked for the views of Eastern Department on Mr. Stokes' suggestion that the Mufti should be used by us to counteract Communist propaganda activities in the Middle East and that the Mufti could best do this from Jerusalem.

The attached correspondence (E 1175/49/31) H.M. Ambassador at Cairo suggested is relevant. in a letter of January 28th that the Mufti could do less harm in Jerusalem than in Cairo, but, after consultation with the Colonial Office, the suggestion was turned down in Sir R. Howe's letter of April 3rd. There appears to be no doubt that the High Commissioner would strongly resist any attempt to return the Mufti to Jerusalem. Moreover, he is a man who cannot be trusted and cannot therefore be used to help us in our propaganda. If we allowed him to return to Jerusalem, we should of course be accused of helping the Arabs at the present critical stage of the Palestine question.


My dear Stokes,

I understand that important Arab leaders are insisting on the necessity of an Arab rising in Palestine as the only means of stopping Jewish immigration. The decision to rule out the independence of Palestine as a term of reference made some responsible Arabs doubtful of British intentions.

I do know that the Mufti has been standing stolidly against such an action at present. I sincerely think that, to avoid the conclusion by Arabs that Britain is hopeless, an understanding with the Mufti is essential. He asks for nothing personal; he merely needs to be assured that Great Britain is not concealing political intentions which would endanger the future of the Arabs in Palestine.

You will recall that in May 1945 when it seemed possible that the Mufti of Jerusalem, then in Europe, might fall into our hands, it was proposed that if arrested he should be sent for detention in Seychelles. My telegrem No. 165 of the 7th May 1945 refers. The Mufti himself evaded us at that time but in December 1945 it was decided that five of his associates who were then in detention in Brussels should be sent to Seychelles for further detention (my telegram No. 364 of 3rd December, 1945 and subsequent telegraphic correspondence refer). The last of these detainees were released in November, 1946. Reports have recently been current in the Middle East that the Mufti of Jerusalem now resident in Egypt may attempt shortly to transfer his residence to the Lebanon. If he makes this move it is possible that he will call at Haifa, and I have had under consideration with my colleagues the action which should be taken by the Government of Palestine in this event. A decision has been reached that if Mufti should come within jurisdiction of Palestins Government he should be arrested and deported

immediately to Seychelles for detention as political prisoner. I assume that accommodation vacated by his accomplices in November of last year is still available to house Mufti should be arrive. All expenses in this connection would be met by Government of Palestine.

I am asking Righ Commissioner for Palestine to inform you immediately should Mufti set foot in Palestine and also to advise you now of arrangements he would propose to make in that event for Mufti's transference to Seychelles. It seems unlikely that Mufti will take serious risk of entering Palestine jurisdiction but it is necessary that we should make arrangements now for the action to be taken in such an event. I much regret to have to ask you again to make preparations for reception of an unwelcome visitor and I sincerely hope that he will not in fact be thrust upon you. Please let me know if there are any difficulties regarding his reception in which I can help you. I shall inform you if there are any indications that such a move on Mufti's part is imminent.



Possibility of Mufti calling at Heifa and action to be taken has been considered by His Majesty's Government, who have decided that if he should come within the jurisdiction of the Palestine Government he should be arrested and deported immediately to Seychelles for detention as a political prisoner. His Majesty's Minister at Beirut is being instructed to repeat the warnings already given to the Lebanese Government against allowing the Mufti to enter the Lebanon and to say that His Majesty's Government count on the Lebanese Government taking all possible measures to prevent this from happening.

Presumably you will make such provisional arrangements as are possible locally for the immediate transference of the Mufti to Seychelles should be be arrested in Palestine. If you are likely to require any assistance in this matter you will no doubt let me know soom. Governor Seychelles is being informed of possibility of arrival of Mufti in telegram which is being repeated to you.

Governor, Seychelles, is prepared to provide accommodation for person named at few days' notice and anticipates no difficulty regarding his reception. He has asked for information regarding probable number of Mufti's retinue and for permission to purchase locally suites of furniture in advance owing to very short supply.

2. No doubt if he enters Palestine Mufti will be accompanied by attendants, some of whom may be liable to arrest and deportation under Palestine law. It seems most probable however that Mufti will be arrested alone and may later request that certain members of his staff be permitted to join him in Seychelles to attend to his physical needs. Presumably no reliable estimate can be made in savance of number of retinue but no doubt you will bear in mind, if Mufti is arrested in Palestine, that Governor, Seychelles, is anxious to have this information. I doubt whether arrest is sufficiently likely to justify expenditure now from Palestine funds on suites of furniture. Grateful for your views on this point.



He is probably by now aware that he would be arrested if he attempted to enter Palestine and I consider that it is unlikely that he will do so. The purchase of suites of furniture would not (repeat not) be justified at present.
- J. It is impossible to say who would be with the Mufti if he were arrested. It seems unlikely that he would travel alone, and it would be difficult to refuse a request for him to be accompanied by one or two personal attendants if deported.

I was received by Lebanese Prime Minister this afternoon and spoke to him on special offer indicated in paragraph 3 of my telegram under reference. Riad Bey said the ex-Mufti's arrival had come as a complete surprise to both him and the Egyptians. (Sheik Yussef Yassin whom I saw later told me that Riad Bey had given him the same version). Riad Bey said first indication he had of the arrival was a telephone call from Beirut sirfield from the Mufti in person. He had travelled without passport or visa in an Egyptian aircraft. (It is learnt from other sources that aircraft belonged The Mufti was accompanied by to the M.I.S.R. Company). Ahmed Hilmi, Sobhi Abu-Khadra, Osman Kamal Haddad and Nujhad Hussein. I have since learnt that in a second M.I.S.R. aircraft the following also arrived; Sheik Hassan Abou Scoud (present Mufti of Jerusalem), Ishaq Dar[gp.undec.]aul, Marouf Dawalibi and Majdi Jaouni. Riad Bey told me the ex Mufti was being accommedated for the present in his (Riad's) house.

Riad Bey attributed the sudden arrival to a very human desire on the part of the ex Mufti not to be absent when far-reaching decisions affecting Palestine were being taken. He added that in his epinion his presence would make no great difference to work of the Arab League Council (Sheik Yussef Yassin teld me the same thing) but agreed that spectacular effect would be considerable. He said from such conversations as he had had with the ex Mufti he had fermed the impression he was new much mere mederate and also that he had been duly impressed by importance of Colonial Secretary's statement.

8. Riad Bey's parting remark was that Saleh Jabr was prebably more excited than anyone clse about the matter.





My telegram No. 1786; attitude of Mufti to partition.

I enclose a copy of note by the two officers of the Palestine Police who recently had an informal talk with the Mufti with the object of eliciting whether he would be prepared to acquiesce in any form of partition of Palestine.

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TOP SECRET

Hai min Eff. El Husseini.

An effort has been made to obtain the Mufti's response to the following questions:-

- (i) Is the Mufti irrevocably opposed to any form of partition?
- (11) What would the Mufti's reaction be to a modified partition scheme which would leave Jaffa and the Negev in the Arab state?
- (111) Does the Mufti wish for a rapprochement and if so on what basis?
- In the absence of Sir Walter Smart and Brigadier Clayton we saw the A/Oriental Counsellor at H.M. Embassy at Cairo on Friday 19th September, 1947 to whom we explained our mission. After reference to Mr. Bowker, the British Minister who is acting for the Ambassador, and after Mr. Giles had discussed the matter with Mr. Bowker, we were requested to refrain from directly contacting Haj Amin El Husseini. Mr. Bowker expressed surprise at our mission and the fact that he had not been previously advised by the Government and suggested that we should remain in Cairo until the matter could be referred to the Foreign Office and a ruling obtained. I made it clear that our mission was completely and entirely unofficial, that I did not think it was necessary to refer the matter to London and that I had deemed it advisable to consult the Embassy as it was not the wish of the Government of Palestine that the Embassy should in any way be embarrassed by our inquiries. As no assistance was to be expected from the Embassy we made no further contact with them.
- the prevailing hostile atmosphere in Cairo rendered contact with official Egyptian and Palestinian Arab circles in Cairo difficult. However, we were fortunate in being able to obtain the assistance of a highly placed British resident of Cairo who is on friendly relations with Hak Amin El Husseini. The text of the conversation between our contact and Haj Amin El Husseini, from which the answers to the questions can be deduced, is attached. It is apparent that the answers to the three questions are:-

(i) Emphatically yes.

(ii) An emphatic rejection.

(iii) Haj Amin El Husseini would be prepared to co-operate only if Britain withdrew its support from Political Zionism.

4. From conversations held with both Egyptians and Palestinians of Cairo it would appear that the Mufti, thriving in the hostile and anti-British atmosphere of Egypt, is determined to call a rebellion and his old intransigent attitude remains unchanged.

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His Eminence was in excellent mood, charming, joking. He listened to my questions with great care, wrote them down, translated into Arabic, and will in due course provide written replies. In his oral replies he spoke without any hesitation or apparent equivocation and it is probable that the average observer would have believed that he was quite sincere and not trying to bluff.

Of course, it is possible that what His Eminence wants and what Jamal Husseini may be forced to agree to are different. The test will come if Jamal attempts to persuade Haj Amin to a compromise.

As regards partition, in any form, under any conditions, with or without the Negeb and Jaffa, disguised as federalisation the answer would be a simply uncompromising NO. In the first place, he was not bargaining with the Zionists about a possession in dispute. Palestine, including Jaffa and the Negeb, was Arab, and he did not recognise the right of anyone to "offer" him what was theirs as a condition of Arab consent to partition. It was like a robber trying to make conditions on which he would return stolen property. In the second place, the Arabs were absolutely convinced that no form of partition or federalisation would finally satisfy the Zionists. Whatever they got would merely be a springboard from which to leap on more. He had the best reasons in the world for this belief. The Zionists had openly and repeatedly declared that a part of Palestine was not their aim; they had declared that their eventual aim would never be relinquished. Take Weizman. In 1922, "We have no thought of a Jewish state"; by 1936-7, "We would accept partition"; by 1942 (Biltmore) "Palestine to be a Jewish state"; today, "Palestine to be a Jewish state and Trans-Jordan is part of Palestine". What more could we want? People used to say Hitler did not mean what he said in Mein Kampf, and even when he stuck to the programme in that book people wouldn't believe. So, people today are foolish enough or scheming enough to pretend to believe that the Zionists would give up their avowed aims and designs if they were given a part of them. Put yourself in the Arabs' place. Remember yourselves in 1940. Did you ever think of offering the Germans part of Britain on condition they let you alone in the rest? Of course not, and you never would. To start with, you would have preferred to die defending it. In the second you know that they would never have kept their word to remain in the one part. All right. That was how the Arabs were; and, once again, the answer to "Partition", "Federalisation", in fact any system that gave the Zionists political authority in Palestine, was NO, categorically NO. The Jews, like anybody else, would have as many and no more rights as the other citizens of Palestine. Jews in England did not vote, etc., until they were naturalised. Jews and Arabs for that matter - in Palestine also would not have full There would be rights until they became Palestinian citizens. no discrimination against the Jews nor against any other people in Palestine. But the Arabs would NEVER agree to any bestowal on the Zionists of political power or privilege that put them above or independent of the Palestinian state government.

As regards co-operation with the British, there was no fundamental reason whatsoever why the two peoples, Arabs and British, should not co-operate. They had many interests in common, many of the leaders in the Arab countries admired, liked and were grateful to the British - but don't let that deceive you into thinking that any Arab leader will weaken where Palestine is

concerned./

concerned. There are a few weak sisters, but the country has no use for them and they have no influence in the country. Palestinian Arab enmity towards the British is purely political they hate the policy which has founded and nourished the Zionists national home. The moment it has become clear that Britain is no longer supporting Zionist political aspirations in Palestine, that moment will the depth of Arab friendship for Britain become clear. It would be too much to hope that Britain who, as everyone knows, is one of the Big Five in the United Nations, would make it evident there that she did not intend to support Zionist political claims and aims in Palestine? That she would reject Partition or any other scheme giving the Zionists that political foothold which they need and want in order to realise their ultimate aims? Were Britain to take such a stand she would have gained Arab friendship in a moment. It was little to ask. Britain has done a great deal for the Jews. Let her merely refrain from doing any more -Palestine. "We do not ask justice. We ask less than justice", because we do not ask Britain to undo the past.

Those are the conditions. Decide whether you will continue to support political Zionism. If you do, you can never hope for Arab co-operation, for the Arabs would be co-operating in bringing about their own destruction.

As regards the withdrawal of British troops from Palestine, we would not mind. We do not fear the Jews, their Stern, Irgun, Haganah. We might lose at first. We would have many losses, but in the end we must win. Remember Mussolini, who talked of 8,000,000 bayonets, who bluffed the world that he had turned the macaronis back into Romans. For 21 years he made this bluff, and what happened when his Romans were put to the test? They crumbled into nothing. So with the Zionists. They will eventually crumble into nothing, and we do not fear the result, unless of course Britain or America or some other Great Power intervenes. Even then we shall fight and the Arab world will be perpetually hostile. Nor do we want you to substitute American or United Nations troops for the British. That would be even worse. We want no foreign troops. Leave us to fight it out ourselves.

not directly raised, beyond my observations that he was a key man in the attitude of the Palestinian Arabs. But I would say that he fears no rival, that it never enters his head that he has a serious rival, and that any attempt by an outside power to place another Palestinian Arab at the head of the Palestinian movement could not succeed. I would say that he was supremely confident in the strength of his position and in his belief that the Palestinian Arabs look to him as unquestioned leader. At the same time, he gave a definite impression of personal disinterestedness; but that would be because he has probably never doubted the strength of his own position.

Most of the convergation was in Turkish, Important words and phrases repeated in Arabic. Haj Amin occasionally lapsed into broken French and even, once or twice, into a word or two of English. Speaking of the Zionist ultimate aims, he several times repeated with evident pleasure the phrase "L'appetit vient en mangeant.")

Enquiries made here have so far failed to establish the precise circumstances of the ex Mufti's departure. Present indications are that there must have been some degree of collusion at high level on the part of Egyptian authorities or else serious negligence on the part of centrel authorities at airfield.

It seems that probably the ex Mufti's departure is attributable to fortuitous circumstance of Arab League Council's meeting in Beirut instead of Caire where meeting would have taken place but for chelera epidemic and where ex Mufti could certainly have had all contacts he desired with Arab Delegates.

It will be recalled that as stated in paragraph 4 of Sir Renald Campbell's telegram No. 1114 of June 19th 1946 Sidki was unwilling to guarantee that Egyptian Government could prevent the ex Mufti's escape from Egypt. As regards Nokrashi's attitude regarding the ex Mufti's activities please see Sir Renald Campbell's despatch Ne 8 354 April 25th. Despite the latter de you wish me to make a formal protest to Egyptian Government about the ex Mufti's departure and to ask them to prevent his re-entry into Egypt? It may be thought that protest would be apprepriate for form's sake but have no hope that the Egyptian Government would cooperate in preventing re-entry.

Ex Mufti.

Arrival of the ex Mufti in the Lebanon perhaps effers a suitable opportunity for a review of our attitude towards him particularly in the light of the favourable Arab reactions to the Colonial Secretary's statement on Palestine. There is little soubt that the British are no longer regarded as Arab public enemy No. 1 over Palestine and to this extent at least the ex Mufti is possibly new less of a menace from our point of view.

Assurances given by the Egyptian Gevernment that the ex Mufti would not indulge in any political activities appear to have been of little value. I think that any Lebanese assurances would fall in the same category. Furthermore I doubt whether the present Lebanese Government headed by Riad Bey Solh would be prepared to give any such assurances - if the press communique incident reported in my telegram No. 732 indicates anything it is surely this.

3. As seen from here it appears doubtful whether any useful purpose would be served in making representations to the Lebanese Government in connexion with the ex-Murti's political activities. An additional argument in favour of this attitude is that according to the Lebanese Prime Minister the ex-Mufti is unlikely to stay long in the Lebanon. (Riad Bey Solh told he that he had not put the question to Haj Amin but that he had formed this impression).

When I saw Saleh Jabr this morning, Fasked him whether he had been informed in advance of the ex Mufti's arrival. He replied in the negative and added that as far as he was aware the Lebanese Prime Minister had also been kept in the dark. He had no doubt however that the Egyptians knew all about it.

- A communiqué had been published in local press to the effect that all heads of Arab delegations called on the ex Mufti on October 9th. This was incorrect as he, Saleh Jabr, had not (repeat not), paid him a visit and he proposed to issue a démenti. Saleh Jabr added that Mufti called on him he would receive him very coolly. Salch Jabr added that if
- Salch Jabr said that he had made known to Arab League Council his views on the subject of the ex Mufti. He had told them that he thoroughly disapproved of the ex Mufti's ways and that in his opinion the ex Mufti was not a man who had the cause of Palestine truly at heart. Haj Amin had spent twenty five years attempting to deal with the Palestine question and had been unsuccessful. The time had now come for him to retire and to leave the field open to others.
- Saleh Jabr said that he would use his influence here to ensure that the welcome given to the ex Mufti should on not be overdone and that he would wrge the Lebanese Prime Minister to curtail his stay in the Lebanon. The ex Mufti has whether he will meet with much success. been hailed in the local press as the Arab hero.

The ex-Mufti.

When I saw the Lebanese Prime Minister late last night after the Arab League meeting, he drew my attention to an Agence Francaise de Presse report of which following translation.

[Begins] It is announced by official sources that the British representative in Beirut yesterday made a démarche to the Lebanese Government to inform them of the British point of view on the subject of the presence of the Mufti in Lebanon. The British representative specially mentioned the unfavourable impression created in Lendon by the liberty accorded to the Mufti as regards political activity. [Ends].

Riad Bey said that if this was published in the local press he would be obliged to issue a démenti.

- There seemed to me to be little doubt that the report, at least the part referring to the Mufti's political activities, had been inspired with a view to a dementi being issued subsequently, particularly as the type-written sheet shown me by Riad Bey contained two versions of the report, one short and one long. I told Riad Bey that it seemed to me to be a manoeuvre and that somebody was trying to forestall a move by His Majesty's Government. Riad Bey almost admitted something of the sort had occurred but attempted to blame the French. He said that he had would try to prevent it appearing in the local press. He added, however, that he would obviously not be responsible since been informed it was broadcast in the Egyptian radio on the evening of October 9th).
- The probability is that the original report to the effect that I had pointed out to the Lebanese Government that the ex-Mufti's arrival would create an unfortunate impression in London (which was included in L.P.S. of October 9th) has been expanded to include reference to

his political activities in order either to anticipate any possible representations to the Lebanese Government or to furnish an excuse for denying the whole report.

that as various versions of the report have been sublished in the local press, he proposed to issue a dementi. In my presence he drafted a vague denial to the effect that "the news published does not conform to the truth" (which is in fact the case). I raised no objection but pointed out that according to my information the true facts have already been published in London. He wished to add a sentence to the effect that the ex-Mufti was enjoying full liberty of action but agreed to emit it.

5. My feeling is that no useful purpose will be served by pursuing this matter further.

My immediately preceding telegram.

The President said that the Director General wished to tell me personally that the ex-Mufti's arrival had come as a complete surprise to him and furthermore that the Lebanese Prime Minister had assured him that he also had no knowledge of the ex-Mufti's intention to come to Lebanon. He did not say however that in his opinion Riad Bey Solh was innocent in the matter; in fact other sources quote the President as saying that he believed Riad Bey was aware of what was afoot.

The President said that he had arranged for a member of Surete to be in constant attendance on the Mufti both for his protection and in order to keep some check on his movements, and to this extent his activities would be controlled and restricted and he said that we could be sure that he would not be allowed to indulge in any activities directed against British interests.

When I saw Samir Pasha this morning I asked him about ex Mufti's arrival. He said that it had come as a complete surprise to him. Like Saleh Jabr he had not (repeat not) called on him.

2. Samir Pasha said that in his opinion Mufti's arrival was a sign of weakness. He was losing ground in Palestine and therefore could not afford to be absent when far-reaching decisions were being taken concerning Palestine.

The Mufti has arrived in the Lebanon, where the meeting of the Arab League is taking place. H.M. Chargé d'Affaires has told the Lebanese Prime Minister that the Mufti's arrival will undoubtedly create a most unfavourable impression on H.M. Government. The Lebanese Prime Minister asserted that he had no previous notice of the Mufti's arrival.

The last Cabinet decision about the Mufti is in E 6076/G. The Mufti was then in Egypt but was thought likely to go to the Lebanon.

The Cabinet agreed that the High Commissioners for Palestine should be instructed to arrest and deport the Mufti if he came within Palestine jurisdiction and that H.M. Minister at Beirut should repeat warnings already given to the Lebanese Government against allowing the Mufti to enter the Lebanon.

It appears that we have never asked the Egyptian Government to prevent the Mufti leaving Egypt, but only not to allow him to indulge in political activity there.

The Mufti has a strong position with the Arab League. He has in the past been mal vu by the Iraqi Government, particularly because of his association with Rashid Ali. The present attitude of the Iraqi Prime Minister, who is at the Arab League meeting, is said to be one of "excitement", but it is not clear whether the excitement is pleasureable or the reverse.

It has for long been anticipated that, when the situation in Palestine became more critical, the Mufti would move to the Lebanon, in order to direct from there Arab activities in Palestine.

It seems perfectly clear that the Lebanese Government would be unable and unwilling to take any action either to remove the Mufti from the Lebanon or to curb his political activities while he is there, and it seems quite unrealistic for us to ask them to do so. We might, however, ask them to see that he does nothing to make things more difficult for the British Administration.

I have discussed this question generally with the Colonial Office. They feel that the situation has considerably changed with our undertaking to withdraw from Palestine. Once we have begun to withdraw, the activities of the Mufti in Palestine, provided they are not directed against us, will not be our concern. We may indeed at a somewhat later stage find ourselves having to reach agreement with him if he succeeds in establishing himself in Palestine or part of Palestine. The Colonial Office are therefore in favour of a policy of masterly inactivity as regards the Mufti's arrival in the Lebanon.


