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

Referring to your letter of the 1st instant I have to inform that I have heard nothing further from the Consulate regarding the question of putting a watchman on board. Certainly the expense would be considerable and I am very doubtful whether it could be recovered as Costs, as the law makes no mention of a ship under arrest by a claimant having to be looked after by a watchman.

Meanwhile I have had occasion to talk with an official of the Harbour Master's Office on the point. He says that if the vessel while under a decree of arrest, sailed without her papers, it is unlikely that the police would take any steps to bring her back to port. As to placing a watchman on board, the Harbour Authorities, on application, would give us permission to do so.

easy matter to find a watchman willing to take the risk of passing his nights in the midst of what looks more or less like a piratical crew. If the crew made up their minds to escape with the vessel, they would probably not hesitate in overpowering the watchman and taking him with them. Possibly, if it comes to having the ship watched, it would be preferable and more effective to have a man keep his eye on her from ashore.

Every now and then the Agents call me up to hear whether I have received instructions from London regarding the release of the ship.

Ltd., but we do not think that that firm has any monies here from which settlement could be made, and in any case, as a foreign owner is involved, under our Defence Finance Regulations a special consent would be necessary from the Bank of England before any payment would be allowed.

In order that we may be ready to deal with any question of settlement here, perhaps you will be good enough as previously requested to let us have some indication of your costs and outlays in respect of the claims, calculated to date.

My telegram No. 1,297 - publicity for Jewish Illegal

We have reviewed the question of publicity for Zionist activities in Italy in the light of London Bress Service of July 9th and July 14th and series of Daily Mail articles referred to in your telegram No. 1,499.

2. These two together provide an excellent background for such publicity. But while [grp.undec.] press gives us the right line on broad political and human aspect of illegal immigration Daily Mail articles while detailed and factual, contain little direct reference to Italy. We are thus still faced locally with the difficulty of providing factual information for the press about Zionist activities in Italy without running into the risks mentioned in paragraph 4 of my telegram under reference. This is particularly important since there are now signs of surreptitious co-operation from both the Italian Government

(c.f. my telegram No. 1,505) and the I.R.O. (c.f. my

I think that these difficulties could best beovercome by arranging for one or two selected correspendents of London daily newspapers who are new in Italy to be given a special assignment to investigate and write up illegal immigration here. We could give off-the-record briefing to such correspondents and guidance as to how and where to pursue their enquiries. My Information Sceretary has one or two correspondents in mind who are well known to us and who would be suitable for this role. I have asked him to sound them out on their willingness to undertake it and will inform you of the likely candidates. If you agree to this scheme you might then consider persuading newspaper or newspapers concerned to give special prominence to "Jewish" features sent by such correspondents. To help in selecting correspondents we should like to know which of the big London newspapers would be most inclined to publish the material. We

/ourselves

ourselves should suggest the Daily Telegraph, Daily Express and News Chronicle whose Rome correspondents have shown a good deal of interest in the subject in the past.

- 4. If we can proceed as proposed above this Embassy would confine itself to answering enquiries on general lines given in "Diplomatic programme".
- 5. Much evidence about illegal immigration from Italy is of course obtained by British authorities in Palestine from material taken from immigrants and interrogation reports. Copies of some of this evidence is sent to us from Jerusalem and is available to support official complaints to the Italian Covernment as the occasion may demand. We suggest, however, that some more recent material involving Italy could be useful publicity to the press in [grps.omtd.] and increase the effectiveness of the publicity.
- 6. I think that a press campaign on above lines would be valuable in exposing the abuses which have been made of Italian territory and might shame the Italian Government into further efforts without compremising their existing co-operation with the Embassy.



These ships have been "PRESIDENT WARFIELD" "BRUNA" the subject of separate reports. "LUCIANO"

- No outward change. We understand that she is shortly to be sold by auction.

- There is still no sign of life around this "PAN YORK" vessel. No departure is listed.

- Arrived from the Levant with 99 passengers on 11th July. Left for Alexandria with 15 passengers on 12th July. Next sailing on 26th July.

> - Arrived from the Black Sea with freight and 185 passengers on 13th July. Is due to leave for the same destination on 18th July.

- Arrived from the Levant with freight and 58 passengers on 13th July. Is due to leave for the same destination on 16th July. Future sailings on 7th and 28th August.

- Arrived from Casablanca with 140 passengers on 15th July. Is due to leave for Casablanca on 17th July. Future sailings on 28th July and 8th, 19th & 30th August.

Is listed to leave for Genoa with freight on 17th July. (This vessel is not yet in Port and no indication is given of her arrival).

- Is listed to leave for Beirut on ist August.

In the meantime we are not acting on your letter since apart from the undesirability of getting this Legation mixed up in the matter, we feel that an oral apology is the worst possible solution. It would give the impression that we were ashamed of ourselves, but had not the strength of character to admit it frankly. Moreover, even if it were accepted, the acceptance would be meaningless; if it were rejected, as it might be, we should be worse off than ever.

With reference to your confidential letter (E 5595/84/31) of the 1st July and to Baxter's letter (E 5691/84/31) to Brenan of Rabat of the 10th July, it seems almost certain that the "Anal", which was eventually intercepted in Palestine waters on the 31st May with a certain number of Sephardic Jews on board, is the same as the unknown ship which arrived off Tenes on the 10th May anchored in the Bay of Tarania, and was prevented from taking passengers on board by the French authorities, and also as the ship reported off Port Gueydon on the 12th May calling herself the "Anna Andrée" and anchoring for one hour in Dellys harbour on the following day.

- From a long conversation which I have recently had with a high-ranking French Naval Officer, it would appear that this ship came from the Balearic Islands, and it would seem highly probable that she embarked a certain number of Sephardic Jewish The French officer immigrants either at Minorca or Majorca. said that this ship was boarded by the French customs officials from Port Gueydon on the 12th May, when she gave a false name and stated that she had 130 persons of various nationality on board and that the Captain's name was Nicolatoff, which is only a slight variation of Captain Nicolatos of the "Anal". may have had more than the 130 immigrants reported on board off Port Gueydon, but there appears to be a difference of about 270 between the figure which she gave there and the final figure of 399 illegal immigrants found on board in Palestinian waters. I suggested that after the unsuccessful attempt to embark Jewish immigrants at Tenes they may have been rushed across eastwards in motor vehicles and that during the hour that the ship anchored at Dellys on the evening of the 13th May, Jewish immigrants may have been smuggled aboard her. Naval Officer, however, informed me that the French authorities were on the watch out, and he did not think it probable that in fact any Jewish immigrants were embarked at Dellys on this occasion. I am, however, requesting the French Government authorities here for a definite statement to this effect.
- It seems highly probable that at least 130 illegal 3. immigrants, and quite possibly a larger number, were embarked on board the S.S. "Anal" when she touched in at the Balearic Islands about the 8th May, having left Sète without passengers on the 6th May. It would therefore appear that the Balearic Islands may again in future be used as a collecting centre for Jews from Spain.
- Copies of this letter are being sent by H.M.S. "Truelove", 4. now in Port, to Gibraltar addressed to the Staff Officer Intelligence Malta and to the Staff Officer Intelligence Gibraltar, as well as to Paris, Rabat and Tunis later.



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

I am most disturbed to learn from His Majesty's Consul at Bordeaux that the "Paducah" and the "Northlands" have respectively received 150 tons and 100 tons of bunkers at Bayonne.

Full information concerning these two vessels has already been passed to your department, and in particular we were even able to tell you that the Master of the "Paducah" had notified the Bayonne agents of the vessel that she would require 150 tons of fuel oil. It is surely clear that the action of the French authorities in permitting these vessels to take bunkers in this way, in spite of our continual representations, is simply preparing further trouble, such as we are now having in connection with the "President Warfield".

We understand that these vessels intend to sail from Bayonne on the 23rd or 24th July. May I ask you to do everything that may still be possible to prevent them from participating in the illegal immigration traffic to Palestine. I would point out in particular that the "Northlands", which incidentally is owned by the Weston Trading Company, i.e. the proprietors of the "Trade Winds" and of the "President Warfield' is flying the Panamanian flag, though in fact the Panaman authorities have informed His Majesty's Government that her registration was withdrawn in 1942. The vessel thus has no port of registry and should not, therefore, be cleared from the port.

"ARKANGELOS"

- No change .

"ALBERTINA"

- Arrived from Genoa on 16th July with a cargo of tinned fruit and vegetables. She was due to leave for Genoa on 21st July, but she is still in port, unloaded.

"ALEXANDRA"

- Left for Alexandria on 15th July with 60 tons of freight and 1 passenger.

"EFTHALIA"

- Arrived from Port-Said on 18th July with 10 tons of freight. Left for the Levant with 70 tons of freight on 19th July.

"CADIO"

- Arrived from the Levant on 22nd July with 3 tons of freight and 106 passengers. She is due to leave on 23rd July.

"KEDMAH"

- Arrived from London on 22nd July with 3 passengers. Left for Haifa and Tel-Aviv in the night 22nd/23rd July with some 180 passengers. She is not considered suspect (see press cutting attached).

"ANDRIA"

- Arrived from the Levant on 22nd July with 13 passengers. She is due to leave for the Levant on 23rd July.

"PHOENIX"

- Arrived from Alexandria on 22nd July and did not make any declaration of cargo . This vessel accepts "Dangerous" freight. She is due to leave for the Levant on 25th July.

"CHIARINA"

- Italian sailing vessel said to be enginepowered. She arrived on 16th July in ballast from Genoa. No indication of her date of departure is given and she is considered suspicious on account of her type, her movements and the fact that she is consigned to Ginesta. We should appreciate any information you may have about this vessel.

"PAN YORK"

- Nothing further to report.

During the week the Prefecture and Inscription Maritime have been asked to keep the PAN YORK, ALBERTINA and CHIARINA M under close observation.

Committee visited Runnymede Park this morning and Acting Prefet read out revised communique. Unanimous response of Jews was refusal to accept French offer. We fear passengers on the other vessels will react similarly.

- 2. We are now in no doubt that the passengers will not disembark without use of force. French authorities have made it plain that they can only accept genuine valunteers.
- French co-operation cannot be successful. They will not provide tugs for unwilling passingers. If on the other hand we brought transports alongside the quays the French police could not be expected to co-operate in keeping the port clear.

Dear Crossley,

Although the departure of the "PRESIDENT WARFIELD" from Sète on 11th July has probably been overshadowed by her subsequent interception and the arrangements for the return of her passengers to a French port, you may nevertheless like to have, in rather more detail than was possible by telegram and telephone at the time, an account of the action which we took in an attempt to prevent her departure from Sète and the circumstances in which she left that port.

As you know, the PRESIDENT WARFIELD left Port-de-Bouc in ballast at about 6 p.m. on 9th July bound ostensibly for a Black Sea port. In spite of the representations which we made locally, it was clear that the port authorities at Port-de-Bouc were unwilling or unable to prevent her departure in ballast. They interpreted the "fine weather" proviso in her clearance certificate as applying to the conditions prevailing at the time she left the French port, rejecting our argument that this proviso should be considered in relation to the whole of the projected voyage and the weather which she was likely to encounter en route.

On the following morning (July 10th) Lloyds agent at Sete telephoned to say that the PRESIDENT WARFIELD had arrived there overnight and was embarking illegal immigrants. Kay at once telephoned weiss, Prefet of Herault, who promised his full co-operation in preventing the departure of the ship. At the same time, we contacted the Directour General of the Inscription Britims at Marseilles and acquainted him with the facts. As sete comes within his jurisdiction, he at once telephoned his people there and gave orders that on no account was the ship to be allowed to sail. A member of our staff, who was with the Directour General at the time, heard these orders being given.

We learnt subsequently that, as a result of the Directeur General's instructions, the PRESIDENT WARFIELD was refused both a pilot and tugs. Horeover, a picket was stationed on the quay-side to prevent the ship slipping her moorings. Late on the same day (July 10th) the ropes were cut by the crew and she left her berth under her own steam. While still in the port of Sète, she ran aground on a sandbank but managed to refloat at about 6 a.m. on 11th July when she finally put to sea. She had cleared for BARANQUILLA (Colombia) via Tangiers.

embark at Sète in the face of instructions which, we understand, were sent from Paris to all the local authorities concerned. Apart from these specific instructions, it was clear from the ship's papers that she had been permitted to sail from Port-de-Bouc in ballast only and for the Black Sea. There appears to have been gross negligence on the part of someone at Sète in failing to examine the clearance certificate issued at Port-de-Bouc or — and this seems the more likely explanation — collusion by someone in authority at Sète with the organisation responsible. for this traffic. This is however a point which you have no doubt taken up in Paris.

Apart from the fact that Jews were allowed to embark at Sete, one interesting point arises from the incidents which took place there: that the French authorities were apparently unable to stop by physical ferce a ship which Modetermined to leave port at an cost. In this particular case, we appear to have had the full cooperation of the Inscription Maritime in preventing the departure of the ship but she nevertheless sailed.

It seems to me, therefore, that if further embarkations take place in the South of France we must try to secure the co-operation of the French in establishing a state of affairs where it will, be physically impossible for a suspect ship to leave port, however fanatical the crew may be. If the PRESIDENT WARFIELD had been refused bunkering facilities at Caronte she would have been unable to leave Port-de-Bouc, let alone Sète. I would therefore suggest that we might usefully approach the French Government with a request that all authorisations for the issue of fuel oil and other bunkers should be witheld in the case of ships whose names are notified either by you to the Ministry of Foreign Affairs or (in case of emergency) by us to the local authorities. I do not know to what extent suspect ships would be able to obtain fuel oil or coal illicitly but I am inclined to think that in the case of ships of the size of the PRESIDENT WARFIELD the refusal of bunkering facilities would effectively inmobilise them.

I recently discussed this point with Beguin, Directeur du Cabinet at the Marseilles Préfecture, who has recently been fairly co-operative in the matter of suspect shipping at Marseilles. While he appreciated my point of view, he thought that it would be difficult for the French to refuse bungers to a suspect ship clearing in ballast. In any case, such a refusal would depend on specific instructions from Paris. It is obviously of the first importance to deny bunkering facilities to suspect ships clearing in ballast as well as to those embarking Jews; otherwise the door is left open for a repetition of the FRESIDENT WARFIELD incident.

No questioning of individuals has yet taken place. Only one ship has so far been visited. Attitude of immigrants on journey was very calm. Relations were good between crew and immigrants. Children played on deck with soldiers food supplied on very generous scale 1500 people travelled on 7000 ton boat.



We have been instructed by our Clients, Messrs.P.Wigham-Richardson & Co., Ltd., of Armadores House, Bury Street, London, E.C.3. to write to you with reference to the recent detention of the "DOLORES" and matters arising therefrom.

As your records will show, we had some conversations over the telephone with Mr. Cable, with reference to this vessel, for which our Clients had acted as Agents.

The Master of the "DOLORES", whilst that vessel was in course of being fitted out as a luxury passenger vessel at Cardiff, applied to the immigration Authorities to sign on certain officers and ratings. He was refused permission to do this on the grounds that her Owners were suspected of having the intention of running her in transporting illegal immigrants into Palestine.

When the facts came to be investigated, there was found to be no substance or grounds for the suspicion and the Master of the "DOLORES" was allowed to sign on his Officers and crew.

Our Clients, were concerned in the matter merely as agents, but the active steps which they instructed us to take at the time were taken on their initiative because it had been reported to them, by the Owners of the vessel, that the desired permission had been refused by the immigration Authorities only because of our Clients' connection therewith.

Attempts have been made by our Clients to identify the official of His majesty's Government at Barry who was responsible for this Statement, which was so greatly to their detriment, and enquiries on the subject are still proceeding, but, inasmuch as we were later informed, on our Clients' behalf, that no corroboration was forthcoming for the supposed activities of the "DOLORES" and her Master was allowed afterwards to make preparations for his voyage, and it is obvious that in this case - as in others - action had been taken on the uncorroborated testimony of some person, or persons, who might well have some grudge or grievance against our Clients or their Directors.

However, that may be, a great deal of harm has been done to our Clients over this matter and unfortunately, the case of the "DOLORES" is not an isolated case. Recently, two other vessels consigned to our Clients' agency, the "KYLEMOUNT" and the "COCKEREL" were apparently subject to similar suspicion. These vessels were delayed on this account causing considerable loss and inconvenience to all concerned. In fact both vessels narrowly missed the cancelling dates under their Charter Parties, and the only explanation which was vouchsafed to our Clients came in the form of a message over the telephone, to the effect that some mistake had occurred for which regrets were expressed.

Our Clients have always deemed it their duty to assist any Government authority and throughout the whole of the War they whole-heartedly supported and co-operated with the Ministry of War Transport, and are still continuing to do so.

It is therefore greatly resented by our Clients that some action should be taken against vessels with which they have some connection, on the basis of "information received", which, in at least three cases, has been proved incorrect, when direct enquiry to our Clients would have resulted in the fullest disclosure of all their available information followed by such action as might be deemed appropriate in the light of the facts.

As instances of our Clients policy of not knowingly having anything to do with vessels engaged or likely to be engaged in the immigration traffic we refer to the case of a vessel called the Our Clients were employed in the "BEATRIZ" ex "MIN YUNG". usual way, to take delivery of and to pay over the purchase price They were also requested to make a of this vessel as agents. We refer also to the case of the Panamanian Steamship "KORA" which is now under arrest at Genoa. It is unnecessary for us, in the course of this letter, to elaborate the steps which our Clients took to facilitate the detention of the "KORA" at Genoa, at the instance of Norton Co., Limited, of Lisbon, and other Claimants, of which you have already been advised in the course of Our Clients acted as our separate correspondence on that case. trade, but they acted with promptitude when the contrary was suggested, and it is manifest that had Norton Co's account been paid on presentation to our Clients here, that vessel would not now be subject to the arrestment proceedings in Italy, which we have in hand for Norton & Co., Limited and other Claimants. Our Clients in fact readily fell in with the suggestion that they should decline payment, and thus provided grounds for arresting the "KORA". Since then they have done their best to help in every possible way with regard to this Ship of which you already have first-hand evidence.

Our Clients hoped and expected that the suggestion we made in the course of dealing with the "DOLORES", viz., that the interested Departments of His Majesty's Government would have been ready and anxious for our Clients to meet them in order that these matters, of which they complain, could have been thoroughly discussed and some programme made for dealing with any future vessels with which our Clients might have some connection.

Whilst they were, of course, pleased to be vindicated with regard to the "DOLORES", they appear to be in exactly the same position as they were before the detention of that vessel. That is to say, they have no means of knowing when some other vessel in which they may have some business interest might be delayed and the cause of delay laid at their door.

Owing to the wide publicity that these incidents have obtained, our Clients can now do nothing without some official action being taken which will remove the clear impression which now exists in shipping circles in the City, that they have, in fact, taken some part in assisting in the illegal immigration business. They can only take appropriate action in Court if and when they have direct evidence against some person or persons.

It is accordingly desired that we should endeavour to make plain to you our Clients' present unhappy position over this matter, as above set out, and to suggest that an opportunity be given them of attending a meeting on the lines of that which was proposed in connection with the "DOLORES". At the same time our Clients would like to be assured that in the event of another vessel, with which they may be connected, in the future, coming under suspicion, that they will receive a direct approach in the matter by the Department concerned.

We shall be glad if you will consider what we have written and to hear from you at an early date.







EDITORIAL The Word Is Murder

Stone

There was triumph as well as tragedy in the arrival of the Jewish immigrant ship, Exodus 1947, off Palestine last week. I know from friends abroad and diplomatic contacts in Washington, the persistent and passionate fury with which the British

have been working to stop up very border road, every mountain pass, every port from which Jews might escape to Palestine.

The war against the so-called illegal immigration has become a kind of personal feud with Bevin, a merciless and petty war to be pursued with vindictive vigor at considerable and growing expense. At the highest levels and in the lowest reaches of the British diplomatic and intelligence services, the task of preventing the miserable

remains of European Jewry from making their way back to their ancient homeland has No. 1 priority. There is hardly a British negotiation in Europe

or Latin America in which the English government has not surprised the conferees by bringing up at the very start demands for the stoppage of clandestine help to the Jewish "underground railway." Despite financial stringency in Britain of the most severe sort, there has been increasing expenditure on this task of crushing Jewish hopes. And these expenditures range from the cost of constant air and naval patrol in the Mediterranean to the bribery of minor officials in obscure European fishing ports.

The British were especially anxious to prevent any immigrant ship from reaching Palestine while the United Nations Special Committee was there. The terror can be utilized to excuse British occupation and oppression, to confuse the issue of a people's fight for life with the issue of "law and order," but an immigrant ship is too vivid a sight for the cleverest obfuscation, a mute appeal to whatever conscience is left in the world, the affirmation-under the very guns of the British Navy-of Jewish determination to live.

With the Exodus 1947, the Haganah beat the British deadline. It is fortunate that on the ship was

a young former clergyman, John Stanley Grauel of Worcester, Mass., to provide the UN Commission with an eyewitness account of what occurred. I know Grauel. He went on that ship because he is the kind of man to whom Christianity is a living faith to be demonstrated in action.

For me the terrible story of the ship's running fight with the British, in which three were killed and five very seriously injured, had painful immediacy. Some of those in the crew were boys with whom I sailed to Palestine last year on the illegal immigrant ship Beria. Most of the boys on the Exodus 1947 were in the Army and Navy during the war. There could be no finer, no more devoted, group of American boys than the Jewish youngsters who went off or that hazardous trip.

There was a sense of personal grief for me in the news that one of these boys, William Bernstein of Los Angeles, had been killed in the battle with the British boarding party. Bernstein, if I recollect rightly, was in the crew of the Sir Josiah Wedgewood. I saw its escape from the carabinieri on a lonely starlit Italian coast last year with some 1500 young chalutzim it took to Palestine. This was Bernstein's secand voyage. He leaves a young wife and baby. He gave his life for his people.

I hope there will be pressure on the State Dept. to do more than issue its usual anemic and ambiguous statements in the British arrest of Capt. Bernard Marks and two Brooklyn boys in his crew. This ship was seized outside territorial waters. The attack on the Exodus 1947 in those waters was piracy. The killing of Bernstein under those circumstances was murder.

The policy Bernstein gave his life to fight is itself murder, though of a subtler and slower variety. The restrictions being enforced by the British against the Iews are illegal under the mandate. They are part of a cold war designed to kill the hopes and the morale of the Jewish DPs, to choke off the growth of the Jewish nation in Palestine, to reduce it to an other helpless ghetto in the Arab world. They give the Jews the choice of resistance or death.

by a New York firm called Cushing & Company for a
license to "export" to Panama a frigate named
H.M.S. ANGUILLA. This application was transmitted
to the State Department by Horace M. Gray, attorney,
of 42 Broadway, New York.

- 2. It appears that this ship is being converted to a cargo carrier for operation in freight and passenger service within the "Greek Archipelago" and between Mediterranean ports.
- The title of this vessel now rests with a firm called Pro-Industry Products Inc., of 80 Warren Street, New York 7. This firm is applying to the U.S. Navy Department for permission to sell the vessel to the Sociedad de Navegacion Levante S.A., a Panamanian corporation which is about to be created, and the whole of whose stock is to be owned by United States citizens. The address of this corporation is to be 33 Central Avenue, Panama City. An application is also being made to the Maritime Commission for the sale and transfer of the vessel under the Shipping Act of 1916.
- 4. The State Department consider that there is a possibility that this ship may be intended for

the illegal immigration traffic into Palestine, and have therefore asked the Navy Department to go slow with the application. They themselves propose to do nothing much about it until pressed, when they will ask for further details, such as the names of stockholders in the proposed Panamanian corporation. There were no details about this ship in the application, except that the sale price is \$65,000.

- We, too, think that there are grounds for suspicion here, and although there is not very much to go on, we will try to discover a bit more about the application. A list of stockholders may prove to be useful.
- 6. We are sending copies of this letter to Jerusalem, Panama and H.M. Consulate-General, New York.



I have now succeeded in identifying the refugee ship which appeared off the coast of the United States in the summer of 1939.

She was the Hapag liner "St. Louis" which sailed from Hamburg for Cuba with 900 refugees on board. Having been refused admission to Cuba, the ship cruised off the coast of Florida with a coastguard ship accompanying her for the purpose of restoring to the ship any refugees who might jump overboard and seek to swim ashore. Reports of the incident are to be found in the "New York Times" of June 5th, 6th, 7th and 8th, 1939, including a leader rebuking the Cubans for their failure to accept the refugees.
