Crossley's letter to Beith of October 8th about Mr. Powers' application for two tankers to sail under Honduran flag.

This sounds like same application as was recently submitted to us and in respect of which our approval was conveyed to His Majesty's Minister at Tegucigalpa in our telegram No. 5. Our approval was given after consultation between those concerned in this Embassy on the strength of an affidavit from the Attorneys, in which it was stated that "the Ministry of War and Marine of the Republic of Honduras will not document these vessels until the British Government is satisfied that the vessels will not be used to transport refugees from European ports to Palestine. This affidavit is made for the purpose of assuring the British Government that these tankers will be used for transporting gasoline in the Mediterranean under contract to the French Government". Oral assurances that the ships would not be used for transporting illegal immigrants were also given.

2. Attorneys have just been in touch with us again to say that Honduran registry has not yet been granted and they asked us once again to assure the Honduran Embassy in Washington that we had no objection since the deal might otherwise fall through. This we have done since we still have no reason to believe that ships activities will not be legitimate.



There is no doubt that Dr. Porras did give an interview to a correspondent of the United Press on the 15th or 16th of October, and that this interview was arranged after a conversation between the correspondent and an official of the Panamanian Legation during the previous week, when the correspondent was told that Dr. Porras would have a statement to make on his return from Paris.

Dr. Porras spoke very freely and, according to the correspondent, somewhat wildly of the necessity for the Panamanian Government to act immediately "to prevent a massacre" - a statement apparently based on his conviction that the vessels The Legation official already referred to had suggested that no less than 75% of tonnage. wearing the Panamanian flag should be deprived of Panamanian nationality, but Dr. Porras put the figure more modestly at about 100,000 tons. affirmed his intention of flying immediately to Panama to take up the whole question and insist on speedy action.

This interview and the previous conversation with the Legation official were both fully reported by the United Press.

The following are the texts of the messages sent by United Press after the two interviews mentioned, the first on the 11th of October and the second on the 16th of October:

(1). 11th October.

"An official Panamanian source said today that the Panamanian Minister to Britain, Dr. Demetrio Porras, will leave for Panama on October 20th to launch a nationwide campaign against the abuse of the Panamanian flag by foreign racketeers.

Sources close to the Panamanian Legation estimate that 75% of all ships sailing under the Panamanian flag were 'phoney'.

Dr. Porras is spending the week-end in Paris to confer on the matter with the Panamanian Minister to France and with various Panamanian Consuls. After his return to London he is expected to issue an important statement in which he might expose the entire registration scandal. Three weeks ago Dr. Porras/

Porras returned from Greece where he found out that Greek shipowners and Panamanian honorary Consuls of Greek nationality worked hand in glove to carry out formally legal but 'immoral' registrations of ships.

After his return from Greece, Dr. Porras met the British Foreign Secretary, Ernest Bevin, at the Foreign Office. Bevin is understood to have drawn the attention of Porras on the fact that practically all illegal immigrant ships to Palestine sailed under the Panamanian flag. A spokesman of the Panamanian Legation referring to the Bevin-Porras talk said today 'We are as anxious as the Foreign Office to clear up a most embarassing situation'.

A close collaborator of Dr. Porras said that, as a result of his investigations, the Minister will formulate heavy charges against various honorary consuls and officials of the Panamanian Foreign Office. He added that the Consuls concerned had made a great deal of money out of the registration of 'Panamanian' ships without paying any attention to their unseaworthy and unhealthy conditions. He declared that a 'major battle' would be fought out in Panama on that issue and added 'We are sure we will win it'".

(2). 16th October.

"The British Foreign Office yesterday informed the Panamanian Minister in London, Dr. Demetrio Porras, that two ships sailing under the Panamanian flag, 'Pan York' and 'Pan Crescent' were presently in the Black Sea and took 8,000 armed illegal Jewish immigrants on board in the harbour of Constantsa.

According to the information made available to the Panamanian Minister, Constansta is now a principal assembly point for illegal immigrants from Central Europe en route to Palestine.

Dr. Porras sent an urgent cable to the Panamanian Government asking it to take immediately all measures 'to avoid massacre' since British naval authorities had issued the instruction that any armed resistance of illegal immigrants should be broken by force. warned the Panamanian Government that the matter might have 'grave international consequences' and stated in his cable that the Panamanian Government might be held responsible for such incidents as might occur in connexion with the two ships. Porras also informed his government that altogether twelve ships sailing under the Panamanian flag had been recently engaged in illegal immigrants' traffic in addition to 'Pan York' and 'Pan Crescent'.

Porras told United Press that he repeatedly drew the attention of his government on the part taken in the traffic of illegal immigrants

by ships carrying the Panamanian flag, but he felt that the government did not take sufficiently energetic and thorough measures to prevent the abuse of the Panamanian flag. the government will not take the necessary measures to stop the abuse, I shall place the matter before the Panamanian people', Porras Porras who will leave London for Panama next week said he would take up the campaign for the honour of the Panamanian flag in his capacity of leader of the Socialist Party. Porras said he would suggest to the Panamanian President the registration of Panamanian ships be made more difficult".

United Press correspondent's original story ended with the words "altogether not more than 100,000 tons of shipping would be affected by the reforms he advocated" but this sentence was deleted from the message as sent.

With reference to my telegram No. 94 of October 20th regarding the Panamanian registration of ships engaged in the illegal transport of Jews to Palestine, I have the honour to transmit to you herewith a translation of the communiqué issued by the Panamanian Ministry of Foreign Relations on October 18th.

It will be observed that the final paragraph of this statement refers to an enquiry to be held on the return to Panama of Dr. Demetrio Porras, who was reported by the local Press recently to have given an interview in London stating that Panama must withdraw registration of the ships in question and that if necessary he would, as a political leader, appeal to the people of his country over the head of the President himself.

However, tonight's Press states that Dr. Porras has telegraphed directly to President Jimenez denying that he gave any such interview and professing his complete ignorance of the circumstances which gave rise to this report. The President mentioned this telegram without comment at his weekly Press Conference today.

TRANSLATION

In connection with recent publications made regarding certain vessels of Panamanian registry, the Chancellery wishes to make the following statement:

During the month of July of the present year, the British Legation in Panama made representations to the Ministry of Foreign Affairs regarding the possibility of cancelling the registry of the vessels "PADUCAH" and "NORTHIANDS" due to suspicion entertained by the British Government that the said vessels were engaged in the illegal transport of Jews to Palestine.

In view of the provisions set forth in our laws relative to the procedure which should be followed for the cancellation of Panamanian registry, the British Legation was informed that it would be necessary to have documentary proof attesting to the illegal activities of which the said vessels were suspected of engaging in, so as to order the cancellation of their Registry. So as to prevent the vessels from engaging in the activities complained against, instructions were forwarded to our diplomatic representative in France to investigate the matter without delay and take steps toward obtaining the necessary proof which would necessitate ordering the cancellation of Panamanian registry of the said vessels; and he was, in addition, instructed to take all necessary measures, requesting the co-operation of the French Covernment, with a view to preventing the ships in question from carrying out the activities of which they were accused.

Since that date to the present, the Chancellery has exchanged considerable correspondence with the British Legation in Panama and with the diplomatic representatives of Panama in France and England. This correspondence reveals the express interest of the Government of Panama to do what they possibly can to prevent vessels under Panamanian registry from engaging in illegal activities. Nevertheless, the action of the Panamanian Government should have been limited to warning the agents and captains of the vessels, since the lack of documentary proof, as set forth in existing laws, prevented the Government from ordering the cancellation of the Registry and licences in question.

The Panamanian Minister in London transmitted on different occasions the request of the British Government for the cancellation of the registry of the vessels mentioned, and latterly has requested in like manner the cancellation of the registry of the vessels "PANYORK" and "PANCRESCENT", because they suspect that these vessels are also engaged in the transport of Jews to Palestine.

In these circumstances the dossier was submitted to the legal Adviser of the Ministry of Foreign Affairs for study, who has submitted the following opinion:

"Following a study of the contents of the dossier and of all the facts relating to the illegal activities, which it is said certain Panamanian vessels are engaged in, and in connection with which a complaint has been filed with this Chancellery on behalf of the British Foreign Office by our Minister in that country, I am of the opinion that there are no grounds for proceeding with the cancellation of the registry of the vessels "PRESIDENT WARFIELD", "TRADE WINDS", "PADUCAH", "NORTHLANDS", "PANYORK" and "PANCRESCENT", all of which are owned by the A.F. and B. Shipping Company.

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"I am of the opinion that there is no legal basis for acceding to the request in view of the fact that it has not been possible to adduce a single authentic proof to corroborate the truth of the allegations made by the British Government, all of which is based on merely circumstantial evidence or suspicion. From the reports transmitted by Minister Porras it is adduced that the preparations for departure of the vessels mentioned are taken to indicate that they are engaged in the mass transport of Jews to Palestine. In his telegram of September 2, he (the Panamanian Minister) mentions among other things, the suspicious preparations of the vessels "PADUCAH" and "NORTHLANDS", the property of the same company which owns the vessels "PRESIDENT WARFIELD" and "TRADE WINDS," which were surprised disembarking Jews in Palestine".

"This information of Minister Porras, even though it be regarded as official information, cannot constitute in itself authentic proof, as required by law, to establish the responsibility which must be fixed relating to vessels engaged in contraband, illicit trade or piracy, since it relates to something which it is said has already taken place, having committed a difinitive act, which should be easy to prove by more efficient means, thus constituting undisputed proof of the alleged act.

"In effect, Article 1 of Law 54 of 1926 in this connection, states textually:

"Article 1. Vessels which have acquired the status of Panamanian nationality, shall be deprived of same in any of the following circumstances.

3) When they habitually engage in contraband, illicit trade and piracy."

"Resolutions to the effect that a vessel has lost the status of Panamanian nationality shall be issued by the Executive Power through the Ministry of Finance and Treasury, and may be reconsidered by the said Executive Power when reasons exist for doing so."

"Article 2. Any person, national or foreign, may request in writing and under his responsibility or under the responsibility of the person or concern whom he represents, the withdrawal of a vessel from Panamanian registry, attaching to his request authentic proof or proofs, adducing one or more of the reasons specified in the previous article."

"The Ministry of the Treasury and Finance shall forward a copy of the request and of the documentary proof which might have been presented, to the owner, agent or captain of the vessel, for them to disprove the charges made, and a time limit for submitting their reply shall be given, which time limit shall be fixed bearing in mind the distance, in addition to a grace period of 15 days. If the owner, agent or captain of the vessel does not reply within the time limit granted, the Executive Power shall proceed to issue the Resolution concerned, to the effect that the vessel has lost its status of Panamanian nationality and ordering the cancellation of its registry and of its Navigation Licence which was previously issued in accordance with the Law."

"The Ministry of Finance and Treasury shall forward a copy of the Resolution to the applicant, the owner, agent or captain of the vessel, to the Administrator-General of Posts

and Telegraphs and to the Inspector of the Port, who, once the entry has been cancelled, shall communicate the fact to the Registrar-General and to the Director-General of the Tax Office in order to carry out the cancellation of the registry concerned."

"To proceed with the cancellation of the Navigation Licences of the vessels mentioned, along the lines indicated to this Chancellery by the Panamanian Minister in London, would tend to cause criticism if such Resolutions were issued, since the law requires "authentic proof" to substantiate the complaint which has been put forward".

"In addition, Minister Porras has reported that Secretary of State Bevin has assured him that he would not have requested the cancellation of the Navigation Licences of the vessels in question if he were not convinced that the activities of those vessels are illegal, but such information cannot be regarded as undisputable proof to substantiate the charge of piracy which is made against the vessels mentioned."

"There does not exist in the whole dossier one single authentic proof in support of the truth of the charges made against the Panamanian vessels referred to, and in these circumstances the Executive Power could not take the steps requested without breaking the clearly defined provisions of the law, thus placing itself in the position of being sued for damages."

In the circumstances, the National Government wishes to state that it will comply with the legal provisions governing the matter.

As regards certain public statements made by the Panamanian Minister in London in which he permits himself to pass judgment on the action taken by the National Government in the matter referred to, the Chancellery wishes to state that, following the return of Minister Porras to Panama, it will take such measures as are applicable against a diplomatic representative for conduct such as his while in the exercise of his functions.

Please refer to our telegram No. 5800 of the 20th October about illegal Jewish immigration.

Statements have recently been made, urging the United States Government to put its full weight behind a United Nations solution for Palestine, by Senators Ives (Republican) and Robert Wagner (Democrat) of New York, and by former Governer Harold Stassen of Minnesota. Senators Ives and Wagner made their statements at a ceremony in New York for laying the cornerstone for a memorial to the six million Jews killed by the Nazis in Europe. According to the Palcor News Agency, Senator Ives said that not only did the United States have an obligation where Palestine was concerned, but that as a member of the United Nations and as one of the great world powers, the United States had a specific duty towards the homeless in other lands who among the living had been the war's chief victims. He felt strongly that Americans had a duty and an obligation towards the displaced persons of Europe and that they should recognise this duty and accept the obligation with the least possible delay. Senator Wagner said that the enforcement by the United Nations of the promises solemnly made to the Jews would at once establish that body as an organisation of international law and morality.

Mr. Stassen, speaking to the Annual Convention of the Jewish War Veterans of the United States in St. Paul, said that the United States should not vaccilate

by proposing a semi-official volunteer army to back up a United Nations decision on Palestine, but should make it clear that their true forces would be behind a solution. He, too, said that America must help to end the tragedy of displaced persons by admitting them into the United States.

It is also reported in P.M. on October 23rd that a number of leading political figures, including Mayor O'Dwyer of New York, have appealed to Gael Sullivan, Executive Director of the Democratic National Committee, in protest against the failure of the State Department to back the American position for the partition of Palestine. This report adds that Sullivan went to the White House with these protests, and from there to the State Department, where he was assured by top officials that steps would be taken to assure full support for the United States endorsement of the UNSCOP majority report. P.M. then gives a warning that although there is no reason to doubt the sincerity of the high officials in the State Department, there is much to be feared from others who have always been opposed to a pro-Jewish solution in Palestine. In this connexion they single out Mr. Loy Henderson for attack, as they have done on one or two occasions recently.

We are sending copies of this letter to Jerusalem and to the U.K. Delegation at New York.

JEWISH ILLEGAL IMMIGRATION INTO PALESTINE VIA ITALY.

Ever since the end of the War, Italy has been one of the main transit areas for Jewish illegal immigration to Palestine. During the year 1947 \$780 Jewish illegal immigrants arrived in Palestine waters from Italy while, of the 17 ships arriving with Jews on board during the same period, 10 had been serviced in Italian ports. The number of migrant Jews now in Italy who wish to go to Palestine is estimated at 28,000 and the total carrying capacity of suspect shipping in Italian ports at 13,500 persons.

- 2. If the two suspect ships "PAN YORK" and "PAN CRESCENT" now at Constanza succeed in reaching Palestine, as we feel they will, with 16,500 Jewish illegal immigrants, the Cyprus camps will be filled to capacity. The arrival of still more Jews would create a critical situation. It is therefore essential to secure the full co-operation of the Italian Government in preventing the sailing of suspect ships and the embarkation of Jews from Italy.
- J. The attitude of the Italian Government towards this problem has, on the whole, been reasonably satisfactory until the last few weeks, when several strongly suspect ships have been allowed to sail in spite of repeated representations on our part. These ships were the "PAN CRESCENT", the "YILDERAN" and the "GIOVANNI MARIA", of which the last two actually embarked Jewish illegal immigrants from Italy.
- 4. We are no longer in a position to bring the same pressure to bear on the Italian Government as we were before the ratification of the Peace Treaty. To overcome their natural reluctance to prevent the departure of unwanted Jews, there are two arguments we can employ;
 - (a) We are doing all we can, by representations to the U.S. and French authorities in Austria and by the loan of an expert immigration officer to the Italian authorities,

to prevent the influx of Jews into Italy;

(b) Now that we have stated our intention shortly to withdraw from Palestine, we are asking the Italian Government to help us for the last few critical months of our administration, i.e. for a special limited period only.

5. The Secretary of State may, therefore, wish to explain to Count Sforza the importance attached by H.M.G. to Italian co-operation in preventing Jewish illegal immigration from Italy in the critical period before British withdrawal from Palestine and to request him to ensure that the various practical means to this end suggested to the Italian authorities by H.M. Embassy in Rome are energetically and resolutely applied, in regard both to preventing the embarkation of Jews and the fitting out of ships for the traffic.



I then said that, as emigration was being discussed, there was one aspect of it that concerned His Majesty's Government: illegal Jewish emigration to Palestine.

Count Sforza said that he could have been impeached for what he had done to help over this. The result was that Jews had stopped trying to embark for Palestine from Italy. There was now only a small illegal traffic by air. In view of what Italy had done for refugee Jews, she had the right to ask Jews not to embarrass her in her relations with His Majesty's Government.

Jewish Illegal Immigration to Palestine through Italy.

As the result of a suggestion by the Official Committee on Illegal Immigration. and with the blessing of the Italian Government. Mr. Ruck. a senior immigration officer. went to Italy at the end of July in order to investigate the methods inployed by the Italian authorities to control their northern frontier and to make recommendations for their improvement. The object of the extercise was to assist the Italian authorities to prevent the influx of Jewish illegal immigrants from Austria en route to Palestine.

Mr. Ruck submitted his final report (which was communicated to the Italian Government) on September 8th and returned to this country. The Home Office had originally insisted as a condition of his employment on this mission, that Mr. Ruck should only undertake a preliminary investigation and that, if it were considered important to employ a British expert as a liaison officer on a more permanent basis, another and more junior officer should be provided. This was explained to H.M. Embassy at Rome before Mr. Ruck went to Italy.

As a result of Mr. Ruck's report, the Italian Government, supported by H.M. Embassy at Rome, have now asked for the services of a British expert to supervise the implementation of the report's recommendations and to maintain liaison between the Italian frontier authorities and their counterparts in the British and French Zones of Austria. The Home Office have agreed to second an immigration officer named Perry for this purpose and he could leave for Rome next week.

Both H.M. Embassy and the Italian authorities are naturally disappointed that Mr. Ruck, who wrote a useful report, cannot return to carry on his work in Italy. Moreover, Mr. Ward has suggested that we should take the opportunity of Count Zoppi's visit to emphasize the continued importance we attach to preventing illegal immigration through Italy. I have therefore suggested that Mr. Ruck should call on Count Zoppi before his departure, to introduce Mr. Perry. A representative of the Eastern Department could also be present.

Mr. Ward has pointed out that Count Zoppi should be approached in the first instance on the Under-Secretarial level. Perhaps Sir Oliver Harvey's office would be good enough to arrange a time before Saturday at which Count Zoppi could receive Mr. Ruck.

I attach a copy of an extract from the record of a meeting held in the Foreign Office on 29th October between Sir O. Harvey and other Foreign Office officials on the one hand and Count Zoppi, the chief Italian official accompanying the Italian Foreign Minister.

On 28th October the Secretary of State had already mentioned the question of illegal immigration into Palestine via Italy to Count Sforza and emphasised the importance which we attached to preventing this traffic.

The particular point of importance at the moment is to inform Count Zoppi of the proposal which I understand is now being put forward for a successor to go to Mr. Ruck in Italy as an officer to co-operate with the Italian authorities to prevent the traffic.

Perhaps this could be done by the Egyptian Department getting into touch with Signor Winspeare and suggesting that Mr. Ruck and his successor should go round to see Count Zoppi before the latter leaves on Saturday morning.

Perhaps Egyptian Department could mention this point to Sir O. Harvey before action is taken.



Fellowing report that "Colonel F.C. Jehnson" would attempt to sail for Rotterdam and the Mediterranean on November 1st, I spoke again last night to Mr. Lovett who at once telephoned to the United States Attorney-General and the Secretary of the Treasury. It emerged that the vessel would not now try to sail for at least a fortnight.

- 2. State Department confirm that all possible precautions have been taken to prevent sailing and all concerned appear to be in earnest about this. The Treasury Department, which controls the coastguard service, has arranged for the vessel to be stopped if there are signs of movement and the United States Attorney-General will in the last resort issue a libel to prevent departure. This involves legal proceedings to establish ship's bona fides.
- 3. F.B.I. state that a certain Ginsberg is taking over ownership from Derecktor. He may be identical with Morris Ginsberg of the American Foreign Steamship Co. of New Work, who assisted sailing of "Trade Winds", "Northlands", and "President Warfield".

On receipt of your letter of 5th September concerning the investigations made by your Consulat Bordeaux about the "Northlands", we wrote to His Majesty's Consulat Bordeaux, asking him to send us a copy of the lists furnished to him by the Panamanian Consul, showing the provisions and complementary nattical gear on board.

His Majosty's Consul was also requested to inform us by whom, apart from the Captain of the vessel, these lists had been signed, sealed and certified correct, since, although it appeared to be implied in your Consul's letter, it seemed hardly to be expected that he should have accepted the word of the suspect Captain alone.

I must confess that we have been most disappointed to learn from His Majesty's Consul that such was in fact the case. The lists were certified correct by no one but the Captain of the suspect vessel who drew them up. Moreover, it had been arranged that the Panamenian Consul and His Majesty's Consul should go to Bayonne and inspect the ship, on receipt of the inventory. His Majesty's Consul received the lists, however, within a few hours of the vessel's departure so that it was impossible for him to do anything further in the matter.

I am sure you will be distressed that the co-operation which you were so good as to offer us led to nothing. Indeed the investigations made by the Panamanian Consul in Bordesux can hardly have been very serious, as is amply demonstrated by the fact that the "Paducah" and the "Northlands" each had a quantity of provisions and of bunkers on board which enabled them to proceed to the Black Sea, pick up some 3,000 illegal immigrants between them and errive in Palestine waters without refuelling or revictualling.

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
