

Your Saving telegram No. 152 of the 28th November.

Recruitment for Palestine Police Force.

I have consulted Canadian authorities and, as a result, have come to the conclusion that any recruitment campaign in Canada would not be likely to produce any worth while results.

Commissioner of R.C.M.P. informs me that recruitment for that force is seriously behind and that, in spite of intensive efforts, they have been able to secure less than 300 constables since the end of the war. They have, in fact, had a greater number of applications but these have had to be rejected mainly on account of the marriage bar, which would also presumably apply to Palestine. As apart from height qualification (R.C.M.P. requirement is 5'8") conditions of appointment for police here and in Palestine are probably similar, it does not seem likely that any of the rejected candidates would be suitable for Palestine. Director of Personnel in the R.C.M.P. gave it as his considered opinion that even with intensive publicity campaign most we could hope for would be 20 to 30 candidates and from the political standpoint there might well be difficulties here in any considerable publicity.

I regret that I cannot hold/better prospects but sheer fact is that owing to the present prosperous conditions in agriculture and industry candidates are just not coming forward for police or Armed Services.

His Majesty's Legation has recently been engaged in delicate question of a Palestine police officer and two companions who left Palestine for Syria without permission as a result of a train of circumstances attendant to the disappearance of a Jewish terrorist. After the legation had, at the behest of Palestinian Government asked for the apprehension of officer, the latter agreed to return voluntarily with Palestine officer sent here to make contact with them. Gonsequent reversing of Administrative machine has been tricky having regard to the fact that the officer did a good deal of talking so that frankness the officer did a good deal of talking so that frankness with Syrians was essential, and to Syrian sympathy with with Syrians was essential, and to Syrian sympathy with any opposition to Jewish activity. I have had to section officers suddenly withdrew their agreement to resurn and demanded political asylum. I will report further as necessary. medessary.

Major Farr[gp. undec.], officer principally concerned, has made a written statement to the Syrian police (which is being kept secret) admitting that he might be put on trial for the murder of a Jewish terrorist and definitely asking for political asylum in Syria. Colonel Ferguson, officer sent here by the Palestine Government to make contact, has again tried unsuccessfully to induce Farr[gp. undec.] to return voluntarily.


- 2. In these circumstances the President of the Republic has stated that he desires to do nothing to embarrass His Majesty's Government and has offered the following alternative proposals:
- (a) to regard the Legation's demand for the arrest as withdrawn and to release Farr[gp. undec.]
- (b) to compel Farr[gp. undec.] by force to return to Palestine under escort.
- (c) to regard Legation's demand for arrest as maintained, and to allow extradition proceedings to take their course.

Palestine Government are now considering these alternatives.



Fergusson delivered your message and we have decided to apply for extradition in the ordinary way. Before this is done however we hope to arrange for Farran's Commanding Officer Third Hussars to see him and persuade him to return.

[Ends].

From the point of view of this post there is no (repeat no) objection to the course proposed. I am therefore informing the Syrian Government accordingly and asking them to grant the necessary facilities for the visit of the officer above mentioned.

I have warned the Palestine Government that in the circumstances the Syrian Government would almost certainly regard the case as political and refuse to extradite.





My immediately following telegram contains text of a message from the General Officer Commanding Palestine. I have answered that I must refer to you but I thought you would wish me to claim the privilege.

- 2. I would recommend this course for the following reasons.
- a) Mr. Male is the only member of the senior staff who was here at the time. He did not deal with the case directly.
- b) Obviously wrong to give the court some documents while witholding others. To give all might embarrass the Government of Palestine and would involve the head of the Syrian State.
- c) In order to arrive at an amicable way out of the affair [? grp.emtd.] personally intervened. It should also be remembered that Farran made a false statement to the Syrian Police, the contents of which we do not know.
- J. If the Commander-in-Chief's defence merely is to prove Farran returned voluntarily to Palestine either Male or I (basing myself on [grp.undec.]) would gladly answer an interrogation subject to your [grp.undec.? comment if] procedure allows of this. I have so informed the General Officer Commanding.
- 4. I should be grateful for instructions.



I enclose a copy of a despatch from the High Commissioner for ralestine with enclosures concerning the employment by the military authorities of supernumerary police recruited or authorities of supernumerary police recruited on their behalf by the Palestine Police Force in Palestine.

> You will see that this correspondence relates to a proposal that the military authorities should take over the sole responsibility for the recruitment of personnel for employment by H.M. Forces as static guards at their installations, etc., in Falestine and that a new force should be raised to be called the "Palestine Guard Force" in which the present supernumerary police employed by the military would be empodied.

In discussing this proposal the War Office have raised the point that the establishment of such a force in Palestine at this juncture might lead to allegations that we were pre-judging the issue now under consideration by United Hations. Our feeling here is that there is no substance in this particular "hare". The transfer of this force to the military would be purely a matter of administration: in fact, the personnel in question would continue to carry out their present military


