The owners should acknowledge receipt of the property and, if they have any claims for dilapidation, etc., make them then.

If we do not adopt this procedure this Department will be dogged by claims, and justified claims, in respect of this property.

Please refer to Baxter's letter to Trafford Smith, No. E 6971/1293/31 of 11th August about the requisitioning of religious property in Palestine.

We approached the High Commissioner about the representations made in the Apostolic Delegate's letter of the 30th June, and he replied to the effect that two of the buildings concerned, namely the Franciscan and the Salesian Monasteries of Nazareth, had already been released, and that further consideration would be given to the release of others, although there was little prospect of either the Army or the Government being able to give up many in the near future. He reiterated the wellknown fact that suitable premises for offices, or for billeting troops and police are very scarce, and that these ecclesiastical properties are not only frequently the most serviceable kind of buildings, but also frequently the only ones available for such purposes.

At the time of receiving the High Commissioner's comments we felt we should like some further details about individual buildings, before replying to Baxter's letter. We, therefore, made a second approach to the High Commissioner for more information. We have, however, had no reply to date, and in view of a specific request from the Palestine Administration only to refer to them, at present, matters of major importance, we do not feel able to press for an answer.

As you are aware the difficulties under which Government are labouring have greatly increased during the past weeks, and whole Departments have been virtually paralysed owing to the defection of Palestinian staff.

I think you will agree that it is most unlikely that these buildings will be able to be released before our military and administrative staffs are withdrawn from the districts in which they stand. With the termination of the mandate in sight, therefore, we trust that the Apostolic Delegate will agree to let the matter stand as it is for the present.

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Would you please refer to Higham's letter to Beeley no. 176395 of January 15th about the requisitioning of religious property in Palestine and correspondence about requisitioned French schools ending with Lloyd's letter to Harvey of October 23rd.

We are greatly concerned at the prospect that the requisitioned properties might simply be abandoned in the course of our withdrawal from Palestine, whether by the Army or by the civil Administration. It may well be that the Government of Palestine are making the necessary arrangements to hand these properties back to their owners as soon as they have become available as our people move out. We should, however, like you to confirm this urgently in view of the fact that, according to Lloyd's letter under reference, 42 religious and educational institutions are still occupied by the military authorities in Palestine.

The material provided by the Colonial Office on E 777 and in this paper does not provide us with a very helpful reply to the Apostolic Delegate: certainly not nelpful enough to justify the very long time His Grace has had to wait. In view of this long delay, and of the new situation arising from our withdrawal, I think it would be best not to revert to the matter with the Apostolic Delegate. I understand from the Colonial Office that the Government of Palestine are working hard to hand back all occupied properties in the proper form (we may expect a reply to my letter on E 777 as soon as a report is received from the Government of Palestine), and no doubt the Apostolic Delegate has heard from the Ecclesiastical authorities on the spot of what is being done.

If Apostolie Delegate comments on the use of Tantur Convent by a Protestant school, I suggest that it might be best to refer him to the Apostolie Delegate's letter dated the 19th March 1945, addressed to the District Commissioner, Jerusalem, which reads as follows:

I thank you for your letter 5/25/265 of the 15th March. As far as the property of Tantur is concerned I realise from personal experience the difficulties of transferring and placing communities as a result of war-time necessity. I am therefore ready to agree in the terms of His Grace Archbishop Testa's telegram quoted in your letter to the temporary letting of Tantur school for the purpose mentioned in your letter (Transfer of Talima Kumi School) naturally with the reservation mentioned by Archbishop Testa regarding the Chapel."

2. For your information the reservation mentioned by Archbishop Testa in previous correspondence was that the Chapel in the Convent should not be used for Protestant Services. It has not been so used.

Would you please refer to your letter of the 22nd January about requisitioned religious property in Palestine.

You expressed concern for the future of these properties, and asked what was being done to assure their transfer to their owners before the withdrawal of the Mandate from Palestine. We have now received a report of the situation, as it is at present, from the High Commissioner, and I enclose a copy of his Savingram No. 198, for your information. enclose a list of the names of the hirings whose numbers he quotes.

You will see from this report that the authorities have this matter well in hand, and that they will do all in their power to settle claims in all areas before the Army is withdrawn from there. It looks, however, as if it may not be possible to deal with all outstanding points while establishments are still in areas under British control, but much as we regret this we do'not see that we can urge the High Commissioner to further efforts.
