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INTRODUCTORY.

THE selection from the Council Minute Books of the Corporation of Glasgow which is contained in this volume, follows generally the arrangement of one published in a Glasgow Newspaper many years ago. That publication obtained so much approbation, that some time afterwards, the papers were transferred to a volume, now become exceedingly scarce. But in executing the transfer, the various slips and clerical and typographical errors connected with newspaper productions of that time, were likewise perpetuated, and the compiler of the present volume has had the task of correcting a very considerable number of such mistakes. In the older records to which he has required to refer, the difficult penmanship of the period renders it quite possible that an equally large number may have escaped his notice. Some of the minutes contained in the volume referred to have been omitted, being in no way connected with our City, others extended, and some new matter has also been included, with a

few notes, while the whole has been confined entirely to the Records of Glasgow.

The compiler entertains hopes of being able to make arrangements for the reproduction of another interesting selection of Minutes from the same Council Books, published many years ago in a volume under the auspices of the Maitland Club. If he succeeds it will form part first of a work, of which the present volume will become part second. The reader will accordingly notice that the various sheets of the selection now presented are marked Vol. II., and that a double title-page is prefixed, so as to render it equally convenient to regard this as a complete publication, if necessary, or as forming the second volume of a work.

X^{III} Octobris, 1588.—The quhilk day it is statut and ordainit be the baillies and counsall, in consideratioun of the apperant danger of the pest now in Paislay, That na persone indwellar within this toun, because of the mercatis of Paislay and Kilmacolme approcheing, pas or repair furth of this toun thairto, vnder the pane of fyve pundis, to be tane of ilk persone repairing thairto, and banished furth of the said toun for zeir and day, without leif askit and geven be the baillies.

And als it is ordanit, that ane man be placit for keiping of the Brig Port; quhill farder ordour be tane and to be satisfeit for his panis at the discretioun of the baillies.

26th Oct.—The quhilk day the baillies and counsall haifing consideratioun of the present perrell of the pest now being in the toun of Paisley, hes statut and ordanit that the brig port be kepit be twa honest men of the Briggait, and the officeris to wairne thame nichtlie: And quhatsumevir persone kepis nocht the said port, being warnit be the officeris, sall pay xxs. money. And als

the said baillies and counsall ordanis, that Hecter Stewart and Johne Mwdie sicht and visie everilk day the said honest men swa that the statut be keepit; and ordanis Williame Stobo officer to warne the said personis.

26th Oct., 1588.—The quhilk day, the baillies and counsall haifand consideratioun of the wrang done be James Cochrane, contrair, Robert Rowat, baillie, for invading of him with ane quhingar at ten hours at evin; requeistis the provest to ressave him in the castell, and thair incarcerat him during the baillies and counsellis will.

Ultimo Octobris, 1588.—The quhilk day the provest, baillies and counsall haifing convenit and foirsene the grit apperand danger of pest, lik to ensew throw the infectioun of Paislay and utheris places thairabout, and being maist cairfull to sie the samyn preventit, hes thairfor statut and ordanit, first, that the haill commoun portis of the toun be repairit, and that twa honest men of the toun be appointit according to the auld ordinance maid thairanent, for keeping of everie ane of the saidis portis, to wit the Briggait port. The [.....] gait portis, the Stabill-grene and Castill portis, and these to be keepit be the indwellaris thairof according to the articles sett doune for that effect and the personis keeparis of the said [portis] to be nichtlie warnit be the officeris as wes appointit.

Siclyk, It is statut that Lindsayis port, the Stinking vennall and Gray-freir port, to be all closit; the Scule wynd to be likwayis closit, and keepit daylie, as use wes, be the maister of the scule; [the] wickit of the gray freir port to be patent to the nichtbouris besyd, and they to be answerable for the same; and the Rottin-raw port to be lokit nicht and day, and the kie thairof to be keepit ather be Mr. Andro Hay or Mr. Harie Gibsoun.

Item,—It is statutit that euerie persone repair and hauld cloiss hair zaird endis and bak sydis, swa that nane may repair thair-

throw to the toun, bot be the commoun portes, vnder the pane of fyue pundis to be taikin of ilk persone quha contravenis the same.

Item,—It is ordanit that na indwellar within this toun ressaue any strainger or passinger within thair lugeing without the knowlege and licence of the baillies or quartar maisteris appointit for taking ordour in that mater, vnder the pane of fyve pundis, euerie fault vnfoirgevin.

The quhilk day the present baillies and counsall, togidder with the Deaconis of the Craftis, viz. :—Deacone of the Hammermen, Johnne Hamilton; Deacone of the Baxteris, William Heriot; Deacone of the Cordineris, James Braidwod; Deacone of the Tailzeoris, Johnne Dalrympill; Deacone of the Wobsteris, Mathow Blak; Deacone of the Masonis, Robert Burne; Mairtine Petticrew, Deacone, in absence of George Esdail, of the Wrichtis; Deacone of the Cowperis, Phillan Snyp; Deacone of the Fleschouris, for thameselfes, and in name and behalfe of the communitie of the said toun; understanding altogidder that it behuiffit thame to tak the myln sumtyme perteyning to umquhill Archd. Lyoun in titill and few fra my Lord priour of Blantyre, Lord fewar of the baronie of Glasgow; or ellis to tyne the samyn, incure grit expenssis, labour and pley thairthrow, in the law and utherways: And that they and the commoun guidis of the toun, maid and debursit be thaim throu the occasioun of the last pest being in the toun, and uther grite stentis and chargis cumit upon thame sensyne, quhairthrow the commoun guidis is nocht able to releiff the samyn: And that the [. . .] of the myln man be instantlie haid and uthir chairgis [. . .] [with quhilk] they ar burdenit: And als throw this present pest appeirand, quhilk as they trewlie suppose will surmount to the soume of sex hundreth pundis money, quhilk the said toun, throw occasionis foirsaidis, ar unable

to furneis at this present. Thairfoir they all with ane consent condiscendit and aggreit to gett samekle silver as may perfurneis the samyn, to latt furth and sett in few to sik personis, burgessis and indwellaris of Glasgow, as thai can aggrie with, samekle of thair east and west comoun landis of their comountie leist hurtfull, and that best may be spareit, in baith or ane places, as salbe appointit on, forsamekle interes silvir as may satisfie the said sowme and yeirlye dewtie that may be haid thairfoir, eftir the sicht and consideratioun of the saidis provest, baillies and counsall, as thai can aggrie thairupoun; and to that effect they haif appointit the provest, baillies and counsall, or the maist pairt of thame, with the foirsaidis hail deaconis, and fowre of the honestest of everie ane of thair craftis, with twa fischearis, viz. Niniane Schyre and Mathow Mure; and fowre meilmen and maltmen, viz. Johnne Mudie and Peter Patersoun, to convene upon thair saidis comoun muris and landis, upon ane day as they salbe warnit thairto to sicht and visie quhair the samyn may be spareit best and last hurtfull as said is; and thairefter to convene in the counsalhouss to conclude thairupoun, for putting the same to the maist availl, may be haid thairfor, swa that the samyn may be rowpit as salbe sett down be the actis maid thairefter.

16th November, 1588.—*Statutum.*—The quhilk day it is statut and ordanit be the saidis provest, baillies and counsall, That the sex penny laif salbe of xij unce wecht, and that the same be of guid and fyne flour, weil baikin, vnder the pane of sextene schillings the first fault. The nixt fault dealing of the same to the pure, and the thrid fault the contravenaris to be dischairgit of baiking for the space of yeir and day. Siclyk it is statut that the baiking of wastellis be dischairgit, conforme to the auld statutis maid thairanent of befor.

Item,—It is statut and ordanit, That the stane of candill be

sauld for thretty schillingis, and na derrar, under the pane to be injoynt to the contravenaris thairof, contenit in the auld statutis maid thairanent of befoir. Siclyk, It is statut that the pricis of the talloun be observit cõforme to the ordour set down in the samyn statutis.

22d Nov., 1588.—*Trublande—Elphinstoun, Reidis.*—The quhilk day anent the trublande persewit be James Scott, painter, burges of Glasgow, againis Adame Elphinstoun, glasin-wright, David Reid, Thomas Reid, Arthour Fischour, and Andro Bucklis—The said Adame is fundin in the wrang and amerciamento of court, for the streking of the said James Scott on the breist with ane pistolat, throw the force quhairof he dang the said James to the eird, and effusioun of his bluid in grit quantitie. And siclyk the said Adame is fundin in the wrang and amerciamento of court, for cumin to the said James Scottis hous at Lambes last or thairby, and sutting of George Scott, sone to the said James, with ane drawin sword, and saying, gif he had him, he suld lay his pudenis about his feete, and biddin of the said George Scott come furth or ellis he suld haif ane cauld arnefull of him.—And the said David Reid is fundin in the wrang also, for cuming to the said James Scottis dure with ane drawin sword, and making provocatioun to him thairwith, and als for taking of the said James and drawing of ane quhingar to him on Twysday last. [The others are also “fundin in wrangis and amerciamentois,” and an act is passed ordaining them to find security.]

26th Nov., 1588.—*Wrang.*—The quhilk day Johnne and Richie Kirklandis ar decernit in ane wrang and amerciamento of court, for cumyng to George Kirkland thair fatheris hous, with swordis, basting thair father thairwith, and gevin of him injurious words, than and at sundrie tymes, and dome gevin thairupon.

3d Dec., 1588.—The quhilk day Colein Campbell and Margarete Lyoun, his spous, ar decernit and ordanit, be aith of partie referrit

thairto, to content and pay to Archibald Campbell the soume of threttie nyne markis money, and that for ane silver piece and ane ensenzie haid in keeping be him in thair handis.

13th Dec., 1588.—The quhilk day Thomas Kneland is absolvit fra the soume of fyve markis sex schillingis, allegit promittit be the said Thomas Kneland to Thomas Myln, chirurgeon, for the cureing of William Dowglas, sone to Johnne Dowglas of Harwod, and that in respect of the said Thomas Knelandis aith gevin thairupon, referred thairto be said Thomas Myln.

24th December, 1588.—*Statutum Consilij*.—The quhilk day the provest, baillies, counsall, and hail deaconis of the craftis, with the hail personis contenit in the former act maid of befor being convenit within the counsalhouss, efter they haid viseit the peitbog, milndame, Greneheid, and utheris, thair comoun landis—quhat might be best spareit thairof for releveing of thair necessitie, to sett the samyn in few, and being resolvit thairintill, they all in ane voce, findis and consentis, that the landis wnderwritten of thair said comountie may be best spareit be thame, viz.:—The Mylndameheid, as the samyn salbe stobit (reservand ane passage to be the rowme of ane cargait); and als the Peitbog and Dassiegrene (reservand the like passage); and siclyke the Greneheid betwix the gavill of the lands of Johnne Mudie, passing to the Brigend (reservand ane rowme for ane port passand to the watter of Clyd, as salbe stobit); as als ane uther peice of land foiranentis Williame Muris sydwall of his houss to the hie calsay (reservand ane passage betwix the said Williame Muris sydwall of his said houss, and the houss that salbe set doune and biggit next the said Williame Muris houss—as als, the hail wall of the Westport, on baith the sydis of the samyn—(and swamekle thairof in breid and lenth as salbe stobit); and siclyk the scuile sumtyme callit the sang scuile togidder with the foir front thairof, and swamekle mair of the samyn, as appertenis to the toun, or sett in few be

thame, of befor as salbe stobit inlikwayis with the foirfront of the mealmarket, as the samyn salbe stobit in like manner. [The act then proceeds to detail the feu duty to be exacted for the lands so stobbed off, and to specify the day when they were to be rouped, as well as to impose certain conditions regarding buildings at the West-port. The lands referred to in the above appear, by a subsequent marking, to have been rouped on the 2d January following, in order to liquidate the heavy charges the town had incurred in consequence of the pest, &c.]

28th Dec., 1588.—*Statutum Consilii*.—The quhilk day, the baillies, counsall, and deaconis convenit (within the counsalhouss and calling to mind how necessar, profitable, and comlie it wilbe to the decoratioun of the toun, to transport the West-port, presentlie ruinous, and to be repairit of new to the Stokwalheid, and (.....) to includ the hail rew and housses betwix and thair inwith the toun, condescendit, all in ane voce, that the samyn salbe done with all convenient speid, provyding the provest, at his returning, be content thairwith.

31st Dec., 1588.—*Wrang*.—The quhilk day Patrick Wilsoun and Mathew Wilsoun, of their awin confessionis, is decernit in ane wrang and amerciament of court, for bying of wyld foulis and uther pultrie in grit, contrair to actis and statutis maid thairanent, and taping of the samyn owir againe, and dome gevin thairupon.

* 18th Januarij, 1588.—The quhilk day, it is statut and ordainit be the present baillies and counsall, that the officiaris sall put all rolmentis hereafter to executioun within xv dayis, baith quhilkis thai haif in thair handis presentlie, or quhilkis thai ar to ressave within the said space, utherwayis thai ar to be deprivit of thair office, *ipso facto*, confirme to the statut sett down for

that effect. And thairfor hes ordaint, that all and sundrie the inhabitants within the burgh be warnit as efferis, to be present within the tolbooth agane the said fyvetene day nixt heirefter, to gif in thair complentis upoun the saidis officiaris, gif ony thair rolmentis beis, unput to executioun as said is.

— The quhilk day, the baillies and counsall foirsaid, hes grantit and gevin license and oversicht to Williame Robesoun thair thesaurar for his tyme, he being in office, to tak fra burgessis sones, for thair fienes, five pundis; and fra sic as maries burgessis dochteris, not being widowis, in likmaner fyve pundis for thair fienes.

21st January, 1588.—The quhilk day Jonete Bogill, spous to James Craig, is decernit in ane wrang and amerciament of court, for the hurting of Jonete Clogy, spous of Johne Cuthbert, on the heid, with ane stane, to the effusioun of her bluid in grite quantitie; and siclyk the said Jonete Clogy is decernit in ane wrang for streking of the said Jonete Bogyll on the halfatt, and ruiging of hir couch af hir heid, and dume gevin thair-upoun.

24th January, 1588.—The quhilk day anent the clame of airschipe persewit be Marioun Bar, dochter of vmquhill Robert Bar, and onlie air to vmquhill Patrik Bar, hir fathir brother, aganis Cristiane Raith, relict of the said vmquhill Patrik, executrix, at the leist intromissatrix with his guidis and geir, clameand and craifand fra the said Cristiane, the airschipe guidis following, of the prise and availl underwritten:—In the first, ane cloik of maldy, price thrie pundis, ane coit of the samyn hew, price fourtie schillings, ane dowblet of [camlet?] ane pair of gray breikis, ane pair of maldy schankis, ane lynning serk with ane neck, ane belt, ane quhingar, price of all ten markis; ane pair of schone, price thair of fyve schillingis. Item, ane young meir, price thair of ten pundis, ane kow with ane stirk, price of baith

twentie markis. Item, ane chymnay with the rakis, price thairof aucht pundis. Item, ane pair of [tangis?] and ane rostin speit, price thairof ten schillingis. Item, ane erne cruik, price thairof xiiij. sh. iiij d. Item, ane beiff pott with the boullis, ane . . . pott, price of baith thrie pundis. Item, ane acquawytie pott, and ane flaik with ane flaik stand, price of baith 13 libs. vi. sh. viij. d. Item, ane grit charger plait with ane counterfit, price of baith twentie three schillingis. Item, ane gaird of brass, ane chandler of brass, price of baith xiiij. s. iiij. d. Item, ane quart stoip of tin, ane pint stoip of tin, price of baith xlv. s. Item, ane weschell buird, price xiiij. s. iiij. d., ane meil almarie, price thairof xl. s. Item, ane schyre, price vj. s. 8d. Item, ane brewing caldroun, price thairof twentie pundis. Item, ane coit half worne and mair, of auld blew. Item, ane cloik of blew, ane sark, ane wyliecoit of mylne walkit lyning. Item, ane jak, steilbonnet, ane sword, ane speir. Item, ane fwrneist feddir bed. Item, ane caldroun, ane mask fatt, twa gyle fattis, burne-stand barrow, laid galloun. Item, ane stand bed. Item, ane lang settil. Item, ane almarie, ane kist, ane sait buird. Item, ane pott of brass of ane galloun. Item, ane troche stane for wort. Item, ane counter. Item, ane pan of thrie pyntis. Item, barkit hyd. Item, ane plait trunschier, and saltfatt of pouder. Item, ane chandler of brass. Item, ane pynt and chopin stoupis of tyn. Item, chyre, ane weschell burde. Item, ane chimney with rakis, irne cruik, tangis and speit. Item, ane elcruik, ane ladell of trie. Item, ane flesche and fische fattis. Item, ane graip, schole redill, bark-seif, ane cleik, ane bark wecht. Item, ane lang theiking ledder, ane pair of schone. Item, ane rak stop with lastis, trescheors, irne schaping knyfe, elschingis, and schaving irne, and ane hewing aix.

* 26th Martij, Anno 1589.—*Hirdis*.—The quhilk day the baillies hes electit and chosen Johnne Tempeltoun and Johnne Hair to be commoun Hirdis of the toun for this yeir to cum, viz. the said Johnne Tempeltoun for the nolt and guidis† aboue the croce, and the said Johnne Hair for the nolt and guidis † beneth the croce

and the rest of the nether pairtis of the toun, and hes gevin thair athis of fidelitie for leill and trew administratioun in their office ; and for that effect hes fundin souirties and cautionaris for thaim, viz. for the said Johnne Tempeltoun, Robert Flemyng, elder, merchand, burges of the said burgh ; and for the pairt of the said Johnne Hair, Thomas Mure, burges of the said burgh. Ilk persone under the pane of twentie pundis ; and the saidis personis are actit to relieff thair souirties of the premissis.

12th April, 1589.—*Statutum*.—The quhilk day the provest, baillies, counsall, and deaconis, being convenit within thair counsallhouss, for consulting upon His Majesties missive derset to thame, for outtredding and furneissing to his Hienes, of the number of thrie scoir hagbutteris to await on his Majesties service in the North ; and they vnderstanding that thai may nocht guidlie furneis swa mony, vnles the same be to thair grit hurt : And thairfoir condiscendit and concludit that fourtie hagbutteris, with thair commanderis, salbe furneissit and outtred for obedience of his Majesties missive ; and for that effect, hes grantit ane taxatioun of fyve hundreth pundis for furneissing of thame be the space of ane month, conforme to his Hienes charge, and for stenting thairof hes appointit and ordanit quhair that ony persone payit of the last taxatioun of foure hundreth pundis foure pennies, sall now pay fyve pennies, or xxs. xxvs. be ressonne this present stent is fyve hundreth pundis ; and for stenting and ingaddering of the same, hes electit and chosin Archibald

presented to the authorities of Glasgow on 21st June, 1576, by the Deacons of the Trades, a request is made for the use of certain portions of the common muir, for the purpose of "pasturing their gudis," which might indicate cattle generally ; but farther on in the same document, complaint is made of the great want of the means of "the pasturing of guddis for the sustening of our babies."—W.]

Wilsoun, merchand, and Williame Millar, maltman; and that ane of the thrie baillies be present thair day about, with the saidis collectoris to sic the same ingadderit.

19th April, 1589.—*Statutum.*—The quhilk day the provest, baillies, and counsal, conveyit within thair counsalhous, for consulting vpoun this last chaarge, direct from Dundie the xv day of this instant. The provest and baillies, and counsall, being throughlie resolvit thairwith, Findis that the fyftie personis hagbutteris, directit to his Majestie, conforme to his Hienes missive of befoir, sall satisfie the will of this last charge, and ordanit the saidis personis to be furneist according to thair remanyng as wes appointit be the saidis provest, baillies, and counsall, at thair departure, and swa the hailf fyve hundreth pundis to be collectit for furneissing of thame in manner foirsaid.

Statutum.—The quhilk day the provest, baillies, and counsall, being conventit within thair counsal hous, for taking ordour with the passage of ane cargait to the Provestis Hauch and utheris nychtbouris landis, about through the landis of Peitbog and Dassiegrene, laitlie set furth in few to Thomas Mylne, chirurgene, concludit that the saidis baillies and counsal, and deaconis, sall pas thaimselfes to the groundis of the said Peitbog and Dassiegrene, and thair limit and mesure the said passage. To witt, that the same be on all partis the braid of sex futtis, and that through the same ane horss chairgit with ane car full of come or ony vther kind of stufte may easlie repair thairthrow: And that the same sall pas alongis the bak of the dyk, beginning at the first entrie to the saidis landis of Peitbog to the said Provestis Hauch.—And the samyn passage to be mesurit fra the rute of the auld dyk, as it stude of befoir, and to the effect the said passage may be the better decernit, and that the said Thomas Myln and the remanent nychtbouris besyd may acknowlege everie ane of

thame thair awin landis and richt merches be utheris, it is appointit and ordanit the saidis baillies, counsall and deacons sall pas and visie the saidis landis, the xxi. day of May next to cum, and thairefter stob and mesure the same, *ad perpetuam remanentiam*.

The Coble Court of Glasgow, halden at the Brunelaw thairof, be honorabell men, James Flemyng and Robert Rowat, baillies, the xxi. day of Aprile, the yeir of God Iai. vc. four scoir nyne yeirs. The suittis callit, the Court confirmit. Dempstar Johnnie Maxwell.

Wrang.—The quhilk day Niniane Huchesoun is decernit in ane wrang and amerciament of court, for the wrangus and maisterful away taking fra Johne Clerk of twa salmound fische: As also for the forgeing of ane wrangus complent againis the said Johne, alleging him to haif tane schot of fische quhilk suld haif pertenit to the said Niniane; and decernit the said Niniane to pay to the said Johnne instantlie nyneteen schillings for the said twa fische wranguslie tane be him, as said is and dume gevin thairupon.

1st May, 1589.—The quhilk day, the provest and baillies, with awyse of thair counsall, ordanis Stevin Hill's fredome to be cryit doun, for his contempt done to James Stewart, baillie, and for breking of ward; and efter the crying doun of his fredome, ordanis him to be putt in the heigh houss, to remain thair for his contempt forrsaid, during the provest and baillies will.

. thamesefis, dew and lawful adverteisment being maid that sall pay ane vnlaw of viij s. and to haif na voyce in court till the unlaue be first payit, and the samyn to be applyit to [and vptane] for thair calsay.

Item,—It is statut and ordanit be provest, baillies, and counsal, becaüs of the grit abuse and sleuth of the ordinar officaris in nocht doing thair dewtie in awaiting upoun the provest and baillies quhair they may resaue command, as occasioun sall serve, to execute thair office; thairfoir, for evading of the said abuse, hes ordanit in caice they be fund culpabill thairof, and decernit thairintil be the said provest and baillies onlie, or the maist pairt of thame, they be depryvit be thame upoun thair judgement, but awyse of the counsall, and nocht to serve in office for that yeir agane.

Item,—It is statut for keeping of a dew gravitie and amitie in counsall, and reverence to be borne to the provest, baillies, and honourabell counsall of the toun, that quhatsumever he be that injureis ane vther in counsalhous, be word or deid, salbe depryvit immediatlie of the counsall, and will nocht be admittit for the space of thrie yeiris thairefter of the number of the counsall, besyd vther punischment that the counsall shall think meet to injoyne to thame for the tyme.

Item,—It is statut and concludit, and siclyk decernit be provest, baillies and counsall, at the complent of Mr. Adame Wallace, comoun procurator of the toun, that ane act insert in the buikis of this auditorie, of the date the xxij day of May, 1581, bering Archibald Heigart to be admittit comoun clerk of the toun, being presentit be my Lord vmqll. Duik of Lennox, then provest, with command and autoritie of the Kingis G., for that effect, to be simpliciter deletit, and put furth of the said buik, as repugnant and maist prejudiciall to the libertie of the toun, they haifand electioun in their awin handis of the said office in all tyme

bygane, and to haif na faith, credit, nor effect in any tyme cumyng.

Statuta pro presenti Anno 1589.—The quhilk day the present baillies and counsall vnderstanding the name of God to be blasphemit be banning and swearing, and the command thair-
anent oppinlie brokin, in this toun; but punischment hes thairfoir statut and ordanit that na maner of persone blaspheme Godis name, be banyng or sweiring in tyme to cum, vnder the panis contentit in the actis of parliament: And it is inhibit that na markat be keipit vpoun Sounday, vnder the panis contentit in the saidis actis of parliament.

Item,—It is statut and ordanit that thair be na dearer aill sauld nor ten d. the pynt, aye and qll the provest, baillies, and counsall tak furder ordour thairanent; and that the same be kingis aill, and very guid, vnder the pane of xij s. the first fault—the secund, dealing of thair brewing—the third, dealing of their brewing, and breking of thair fattis, and discharginge brewing for zeir and day thairafter; and that nane brew but friemen, under the pane of dealing of thair brewing, and breking of thair weschellis; and that the browstaris mak thair aill patent to the taisteris, sa oft as thai ar requirit to that effect.

Item,—It is stated and ordanit that the vj d. laif be twelve unce wecht, at the leist; and that na baxteris baike wastellis to sell agane, vnder the pane of xij s.

Item,—It is statut and ordanit, that na middingis be laid vpoun the hiegait, nor in the meill nor flesche mercattis. And that na flescheouris teme vschavis in the saidis places, vnder the pane of xvjs. unforgevin. And that na stanes nor tymmer ly vpoun the hiegait langer nor zeir and day, vnder the pane of escheit thairof; and that na truff stakis be maid vpoun the foregait vnder the pane of xvjs. ilk falt.

Item,—It is statut and ordanit, for preservatioun of quheit sawin, or to be sawin and saifing of zairdes, that thair be na scheip pasturit within the burrow ruidis, symmer nor winter, vnder the pane of xvjs. the first fault—the second xxxijs.—the third escheiting thair of; and ordanis the poindar to exerceiss his office in crying furth of this statut, vnder the pane of depryving of him furth of his office.

Item,—It is statut and ordanit, that the markat place of corn, gerss, hay and stray be in the new zaird in tyme cumyng, and that they present the same to na vther place vnder the pane of xvjs.

Item,—It is statut and ordanit that the kail fruite the flaikis thairof be put betwix the gutter and gybett, and that ilk [flaik] be elne lang and als braid.

Item,—It is statut and ordanit, that na fleschour haif ma flesche stokis nor ane, and the vnfriemen to haif nane.

Item,—It is statut and ordanit, that na usschavis nor nor na vther thing be waschen in the burne of Malindonar, vnder the pane of xvjs. the first fault, the secund confiscatioun of the guidis, the thrid wairding of thair personis and punischment of thame.

The provest, baillies, and counsall ordains him to be wardit quhill Tysday next that farder ordour be tane with him for the same.

Contempt of Stevenson.—The qlk. day the provest, bailleis and counsall, haifing weyt and considrit the injurie and blasphemie done be Willame Stevensoun, in judgment to Archibald Heygait, clerk of this burght, and the said Wm. personallie present, being accused thairof confessit the wrang done and utterit be him against the said Archd., in saying the said Archd. had cancellet and vitiat the actis of the Court Buik become in the Provost and Bailleis will for the same: Ordains the same Wm. to big ane rude of Calsie for his said blasphemie, and to compeir in ane

fensit Court, and thair to ask the Provest and Bailleis, and the said Archd. thair clerk, pardoun for his said blasphemie.

10th Jany., 1612.—The qlk day Malcolme M'Caullau, being befor convict for hurting and bleeding of Jon. Patirsoun, seruitor to Archd. Fyndlay, customer of the brig, and he haifand nathing to mak satisfioun to the said Jon. Patirsoun for his hurting and bleeding of him, nor yit for his unlaw, nor yit to the barbor quha curit him, of his awin consent, is banisht this Toun for evir, and gif ever he be fund in the Toun heirefter, to be nailit be the lug to the trone, excipt he pay the said Jon. £20 for his hurting and curing of him, and submittand him to the jurisdictione of the Provest and Bailleis of this Burgh, consentis that decreit pass upone him in the manir foirsaid.

Herbertson for Oppressioun.—25th Jan., 1612.—The quhilk day the provest, baillies and counsall haifing accusit Richeart Herbertsoun, fleschour, for the maist barbarus bangsterrie done be him against James Watsoun, elder, flescheor, and Jon Watsoun, his sone, in the howss of Archd. Schelis, merchand, and upon the morn thaireftir, for stiking of the said James Watsounis grit dog, maist necessar and profitable for him, worth to him the sowme of £40; and that upone complante maid be the said James Watsoun, and Jon Watsoun, his sone, craifand to be fred of his oppressioun, bost and bangsterrie in tyme cuming, and to mak the said James satisfioun and recompens for his said dog: The said Richeart personallie present and accusit, confessit the stiking of the said dog causles upone malice and hattrent. Thaireftir the said Jon Watsoun gaif his aith that he dred and ferit the said Richeart Herbertsoun bodilie herme, and of his lyfe. Quhilk being considrit be the said provest, baillies, and counsall, and that the said Richeart, is of dissolut lyfe and disparit in himself: Ordanis the said Richeart to be wardit qll Mononday nixt, the 27 of Jany. and that day stockit at the croce, and the dog to be

laid befor him, during thair will, and thairefter to be put in sure ward qll he find lau souerties to the said Jon Watsoun, that be salbe hermless an skathless of him in bodie, gudis, and geir.

22^d February, 1612.—The quhilk day the provest, baillies, and counsall, above written, being convenit, and Wm. Watsoun, *alias* Blackhous Wm., personallie present ; quha being accusit for contempt and misbehaviour done be him to the magistratis, in uttring disdaynfull speichis to thame with his bonet on his heid ; and being desyrit be ane of his nychtbors to tak af his bonet and reverence the magistratis, answerit and said with bannyng, that he wald not take af his bonet to the baillie, quhilk his misbehaviour, the said Wm. confessit, quhilk lykewise being weyit, hes fund the same ane hie and proud contempt, and evill example to utheris to do the lyke. Thairfoir, is fynit in ten pund—to be payit to ye pure, &c. King, twa to Mr. Thomas Hendersoun, ane to Mr. Wm. Hay, and ane to James Winrame, with 10 lb. to ilk ane of thair clerkis.

The quhilk desyre they thought ressonable, and thairfoir the said baillies and counsall sent for the said James, quha cam and acceptit the said office in and upoun him, efter thair admission of him thairto, and gave hiȝ aithe *de fidei administratione* thairintil; and thairefter the said provest nominatt and sett down the lyttis for the baillies, and being vottit be pluralitie of vottis, the persounis following were put on lytt to be presentit to the said Archbishop, that he might nominat thrie of thame to be baillies for ane yeir to cum.—[Follows the names and subsequent presentations to the Archbishop, who accordingly nominates three persons to be baillies, and this is done yearly.]

14th Oct., 1637.—The said day ordaines Walter Stirling to ryd to Edinbrought with maister Robert Wilkie (thair minister) to the

next counsall day, thair to attend ane gracious ansuer of his Majestie, anent the buik of common prayer.

11th Nov. 1637.—The said day, it is statut and ordanit, that the toun sall be liberat heireftir be the majestrats of ony charges sall happin to be spent heireftir, upone the fyft day of November yeirlye, being the King's night.

27th Jany. 1638.—The said day ordaines the wall at the croce to be takin doun, and maid equall at the calsay, in the best forme can be devysit be craftisemen ; and that the provost, bailies, dean of gild, and deacon convener, speik and deal with James Colquhoun, to draw and convoy doun the spouts of the tolbuith in maist cumlie forme that can be for saifing of the drop to fall upone the plain-stanes, and that upone als chaip a pryce as they can.

Anent the Manufactorie.—31st Jany. 1638.—The said day, foirsameikle as Robert Fleyming, merchand, and his pairtineris ar of mynd and intentioun to erect and take up ane hous of manufactorie within this burgh, quhairby ane number of the poorer sort of people within the samin may be imployit and putt to wark. And the said provost, bailies, and counsall, considering the grait good, utilitie, and proffeit, will redound to this burght, and hail incorporation thairof, thairby, they have concludit, all in ane voyce, for the said Robert, his better incuragement to the said god wark, to sett to him ane lare and tak of thair grait ludging and yaird att the back thairof lyand within this burght, in the drygaitt, except the twa laich foir vouttis and back galreis att the back of the samin lyand be eist the entrie of the said grait tenement, and of the buithe under the tolbuithe, presentlie occupayt be James Wood, all maille frie, or ony uthir kynd of deutie, during the space of fifteen yiers efter his entry.

[The lease is afterwards extended to 17 years ; and on 5th May, 1638, the “deacon convener reportit that the weivors friemen

within this burght, feirit that the erecting of the manufactorie sould prove hurtfull and prejudiciall to thame: Thairfoir Patrick Bell, ane of the undertakeris, for himself and in name of his partineris, was content that it sould be enactit and ordanit, that there sould be no woovis wovin of townis folkis thairin, be thair servandis, in hurt and prejudice of the said friemen, bot be thais onlie quha ar frie with this calling.”]

24th Feb. 1638.—The said day Coline Campbell, ane of the present baillies of this brught, Gabriell Conynghame, Ritchard Allane, and George Portirfield, are electit to ryd to Edinbrught as commissioners for this toun, to concur with the remanent burrowes of this kingdom, so far as lawfully may be done anent the Buik of Canones and Comon Prayer.

13th April, 1638.—The said day the provost, baillies, and counsall, understanding the grait abuse done and committit be William Andersone, present breker of the salmond, in taking such grait and exhorbitant pryces for the taillis of salmond, att his awin pleasour and optioun, far exceeding the pryces that was wont to be takin of old; for remeidng quhairof it is statut and ordanit, that the said William nor na utheris, the brekeris of salmound att the tounis comoun stock, tack na mair for salmound taillis heireftir, except the pryces following, viz.: aucthpennies for ye taill of ane lytil salmond, and sixtein pennies for the taill of ane meikle salmond, and that under the pain of deprivation, presentlie the samen being tryit and yeit for the regard they beir to the said William, they will oversee him to tak, during thair will, onlie twelf pennies for the taill of an lytill salmond, and twa schillingis for the taill of ane meikle salmond.

5th May, 1638.—The said day forsameikle as of befoir thair was ane act sett down in favouris ôf James Sanderis, reidder, that na maner of persone sould be permittit to teiche musik within this brught, or keip ane schole to that effect, except himself allanerlie,

as the act in the self bears. And now, seing that the musik school is altogidder deokayit within this said brught, to the grait discredit of this citie, and discontentment of sundrie honest men within the samin, who has bairnies whom they wold have instructit in that art: And that Duncan Birnet, who sometime of beforit teachit musik within this brught, is desyrous to tak up the said scholl againe and teitche musik thairin; quhairupoun the said baillies and counsall convenit the said James Sanderis befor thaim, and eiftir deliberatioun thairanent, they, with consent of the said James Sanderis, (in respect of the former act sett down in his favour) hes grantit licence to the said Duncan Birnet to tak up ane musik scholl within this brught, during thair will and pleasour; he taking fra the toun bairnis such skollegis as is contenit in the act set doun of beforit, in favor of the said James Sanderis.

11th August, 1638.—The said day ordaines the thesaurer to have ane warrand for the soume of fyftie pundis money debursit be him to John Boyd, for translaiting of the stock wall of the hie streit, and setting the samyn doun in ane uthir place, and for taking doun ane wall at the croce, covering the samein, and for translaiting the heid that was thairon, and setting it on the said new wall in the Stockwall gaitt.

The said day it is concludit and ordainit, that William Hynschaw, Mr. of wark, by to the townis use, fyftie muskatts, with stalpis and bandeleiris conforme, and fyftie pickis: and becaus he is gone to Flanderis, ordanis ane letter to be derset to him to that effect.

8th Sept. 1638.—The said day it is ordanit that thair be electit thrie score of young men, apt to be tranit up in handling of thair armis, and to begin on Tuisday nixt; and the dreiller to have for his panes fourtie shillingis ilk day for his cuming out of Edr., till he be dischargit, with his hors hyre home and afeild.

8th Oct. 1638.—The said day, for sameikle as the provest,

baillies, and counsall understanding that His Sacred Majestie hes been graceouslie pleasit to indict ane generall frie assemblee to be haldin, and beginnin in this citie, the twentyane of November nixt, to the quhilk it is expectit that ane grait number of noblemen, commissioneris from presbyteris, and utheris commissioneris, will repair hither: Thairfoir it is statut and ordanit, that na burges nor inhabitant within this brught, sett, or promise to sett, for mail deutie or utherwayis, or yeit let to ane freind any hous, chalmber, or stables, untill thay first acquent thaim thairwith, who salbe appointit be the provest, baillies, and counsall, to that effect, and obtien their licence thairto, to the end that everie ane may be ludgit according to thair qualitie and abilitie of this citie, under the pane of ane hundreth pundis, lossing of thair libertie, without favour to be execut, and imprisonment of thair personis during the magistratts wills: And lykways, that all give obedience to thais, who ar appoyntit to survey the hail houses within this burgh, conforme to the ordour gevin thame be the said provest, baillies, and counsall. And als, that nane expect moir dewtie for thair housis, chalmberis, bedis and stables, nor sall be appoyntit be the said provest, baillies, and counsall. And ordanis the same to be intimat throu the toun with sound of drum, to the effect that na person pretend ignorance.

20th Oct., 1638.—The said day, for sameikle as the said provest, baillies and counsall, understanding the grait panes that is to be takin about the hie kirk for making of the sait for the assemblee approaching, repairing of the flure of the uter kirk, taking down certain windous in the inner kirk biggit up with stane, and putting glass thairin, and uther warks thair incumbent, as occasioun sall offer: Quhilkis wark cannot be commodiously attendit upone be the provest or baillies, or Mr. of wark, in respect they are utherwayis employed. (The remainder of the minute refers to the appointment of men to oversee the work.)

3d Nov. 1638.—The said day the provest, baillies and counsall understanding ane grait number of people to convey within this burght at the assemblee, enschewing, thairfoir, they have statut and ordanit that thair be ane gaird of men kept within this burght be day, and ane watche be night, at the sight, will and arbitrement of the provest, bailies and counsall.

18th Dec. 1638.—The said day ordanis the thesaurer to buy to the toun's use ane hundred muscattes, with staff and bandeleiris, threttie pickis, four hundred wecht of powder, four hundred wecht of matche.

22d Dec. 1638.—The quhilk day the saidis provest, baillies and counsall understanding the guid and comendable ordour that was kept within this burght the tyme of last generall assemblee, be reteiring of the poor off the calsay, and susteining of them in thair awin houses, to the grait credit of the citie, and contentment of all strangeris resorting heir for the tyme. And seing the same is both godlie and honest, thairfoir they have statut and ordanit that the poor be kept and sustenit in thair houses as they are now at this present, and the inhabitants of this burght to be stentit to that effect: and this day aucht days ilk counsallor to propose his best overtour what way it can be best accomplished. The said day ordanis the provest, bailies and counsall to unlaw and punish thae inhabitants within this burght wha did not put out candills and bowattis the tyme of the lait assemblee, conform to the act sett doun thairanent.

The said day the said provest, baillies, and counsall, undir- standing how cumlie and decent it is, and creditable to this citie, to have the calsayes frie of middingis and foulay, Thairfoir, it is statut and ordainit that the samein calsay be kept clein heirefter; and that na middingis or foulay be sufferit to lay longer thairon, or ony pairt of the samin, towards the Kingis hie streit, nor the said foulay can be brought of backsydis and

borne and led pairtlie away, and comittis the cair heirof to the baillies, &c.

9th February, 1639.—*Anent Inglisch Scooles.*—The said day, for certaine guid considerationes moving the saidis provest, bailzies, and counsall, it is statut and ordanit be thame that nae mae Inglisch scooles be keipit or haldin within this burghe heireftir bot four only, with ane wrytting schooll, and the maisteris thairof to be admittit be this place, and receive injunctions thairfra anent the place of thair duelling and utheris neidfull, and ordaines this to be intimat be sound of drum.

16th February, 1639.—*Anent Wapinschaw.*—The said day it is statut and ordanit, that thair wapingschaw, be keipit within this brughe be the hail inhabitants thairof, without exceptioun of persones, upon the first Wandisday of April next; and that intimatioun be maid heirof be sound of drum, to the effect that all maner of persouns may be in reddiness with armis sufficient effeirand to their qualitie and estait, and not to be absent thairfra, ilk persoun undir the pane of fourtie pundis money ilk person unforgiven.

12th March, 1639.—*Muscattis.*—The said day it is statut and ordanit, that the money ingottin of the stent sall be advancit and debursit be the bailyies for bying and provyding of mae muscattis, powder, and match to the townis use, and to pay for thaise, that the provest hes spokin for in Edinburgh.

15th.—*Hangsinzeis electit.*—The said day, Thomas Morsoun and Walter Neileone ar electit and choysine to carie the cullowris this nixt enschewing wapingschaw.

16th.—The said day ordainis the thesaurer to have ane warrand for the sowme of ten markis money, debursit be him at thair comand to James Watsoun, flescher, to help him to saw his land; and for the sowme of aught pundis, debursit also be him at thair comand to Robert Cauldwell, maissoun, for the hewing of the

tounis armis to the toun mylne, scherping of the maissounis ironis thairto, and for beitting and mending of Inschbellie bridge.

23d March, 1639.—*Proclamatioune*.—The said day it is ordainit that ane proclamatioun be sent throw the toun be sound of drum, That na maner of persoun lend his armis to ane uther, under the pane of fourtie pundis ; and that all man be reddie to give his aith at the wapinschaw, that the armis he careis ar his awin, under the lyke pane.

10th April, 1639.—*Men sent out*.—The said day it is concludit be the saidis provest, bailzies and counsall, that thair be sent out ane hundreth men to the bordor, to the comoun defence, and to be maintenit upone the comoun chargis of the toun, and to intimat with all diligence be sound of drum, to requyer all eable men, wha will goe on the said service, to inroll themselis.

13th April, 1639.—*Porterfield Capitane*.—The said day George Porterfield is electit and choysine Capitaine to that companie, to goe out fra this brughe to the border, and ar to march in my Lord Montgomries regiment, conforme to the promeis maid be the saidis provest, bailzies and counsall to his Lordschip thairupon, and the said capitaine and his companie ar to be subject in all thingis to the magistratis of this citie during thair abod thairin, as also efter thair return thairto.

Nota.—The lettir direct from the committee, datit the fourt of this instant, anent the outputting to the bordor of the fourtman, cam not to thair handis quhill this day.

16th April, 1639.—*Provision of Powder and Matche*.—The said day ordanes ane proclamatioun to be sent throw the toun with sound of drum, comanding all inhabitantes within the samin, wha ar myndit to carie musquattis, that they have in redines ilk persone twa pund weght of powder, twa pund leid, and fyve fadom of match ; and that all persones be readie with thair armis upon twelf hours warning ; and who sall be fund negligent in

provyding of the said powder, leid, and matche, he sall be onlawit in twentie pundis, and farther punischit at the sight of the magistratis.

Mae men sent out—The said day the saidis provest, bailzeis, and counsall, hes concludit to send fyftie men further to the border nor the hundrethe they appoyntit of befor.

25th May, 1639.—Anent Tymes of Dreilling.—The said day Capitaine Cunynghames and Capitaine Doroches companies ar ordanit to dreill ilk tuisday in the weik, Capitane Nisbitt and Capitan Morsounes companies ar ordanit to dreill ilk wandisday in the weik, Capitane Andersones companie and Captane Flemyngs are ordanit to dreill ilk thursday in the weik, Captane Colquhoun and Captane Nelsones companies ar ordanit to dreill ilk fryday in the weik.

15th June, 1639.—Proclamatioun anent Silver Plait.—The said day it is ordainit that publicatioun be made throw the toun, be sound of drum, that the inhabitantis of this brughe bring thair haill silver plait, to be bestowit in defence of the good comoun cause in hand, conforme to the ordinance of the comittee at Edr., and ordaines James Stewart, lait provest, Walter Stirling, deane of gild, John Barnes and Gawaine Nisbet, to attend upon the ressaung of the said silver plait, and to meitt the dayis following, at nyne houris in the morning, &c.

The said day ordanis the thesaurer to have ane warrand for the soume of twentie seavin pundis money, debursit be him to Johne Cuthbertsoune, drummer, in consideratioune of the extraordinarie paines he has takine thir tymes bygane.

19th June, 1639.—Silver Wark.—The said day ordanis the personis eftir namit to goe throw the toun, and tak up the inventar of the silver wark, to the effect the samein may be moir readie to send to Edr., conforme to the directioun of the committee of supplie for the comoun cause, viz. Henrie Glen, &c.

The said day ordainis the thesaurer to have ane warrant for the soume of thrie scoir pundis money, debursit be him to Robert Wilsoune Smythe, for 29 scoir and 2 swanis fetheris that was sent to Edr.

Penultimo Junij, 1639.—Auent Portis Bulding.—The said day it is statut and ordanit that ane dyk be buildit at the Stockwall heid, and ane port put thairin, and to build ane dyk from the lithous to the custome-hous, with ane port thairin, lykwayes ane betwixt the bridge and umqll. Johne Holmis hous; in ane cumlie and decent forme, and with all convenient diligence.

3d Julii, 1639.—Salt Bargane.—The said day, compeirit James Lawrie, skipper of that good schip callit the David of Queensferrie, of the burding of scoir tunes or thairby, and maid offer to them of the said schipis laidnyng of Frenche salt of Sanct Marteinis, brought in be him within the River of Clyde for sex pundis the watter boll—twenty-twa, and ane half for twenty to be payit within — dayes aftir the ressait thairof; and the said Provost, Bailzies and Counsall having considerit the said offer, after advysement thairanent, they imbraced the said bargain, and ordanit to signifie the same to the Bailzies and Counsall of Dumbartoun, to sie if they will tak the half thairof.

13th July, 1639.—Ordaines the Thesaurer to have ane warrant for the sowme of thrie score sextein pundis, ten schillingis, ten pennies, debursit be him to Margaret Forrett, for making the tounis denner, quhilk sould have been maid on Witsonday last.

20th Julii, 1639.—Porterfield Commissionar.—The said day the saidis provost, bailies, and counsall, understanding that thair Hie Kirk is now vaikand of ane minister, to the grait grief and sorrow of hart to them and the inhabitants of this brughe, and being most willing that the samein sould be filled and supplied with ane apt and qualified man, meit for sutche ane eminent place, they have thairfoir appoyntit George Porterfield to ryde to the wast countrie,

and thair to speik Maister David Dick, minister att Stirling, to that effect, and to vse all the fair and lawfull means he can for his transportatioun hither.

27th July, 1639.—*Licence Dowglas*.—The said day thair is Licence grantit to Sir Robert Dowglas to gett ane hundreth kairtis of the tounes quarrell to help to build out the dyk of his zaird, narrest Clyde, bezound the bridge.

10th August, 1639.—The samein day, forasmeikle as Johne Gilmor, merchand, and James Muir, cordiner, did both petitionat the said provest, bailzies, and counsall, for that waikand place, last occupyit be Johne Zoung, in making of the gravis; and becaus they war equall in voittis, the counsall having ane respect to them baithe, they have thairfoir concludit, statut, and ordainit, for baith thair weillis, that the said Johne Gilmor sall have the said waikand place, and to begin presentlie; and ordaines the thesuareris of this brughe, present and to cum, to pay to the said James Mure, fourty schillingis, and to begin presentlie, and so to continew, whill he be provydit to ane commoun place of als mutche worthe as the said monethlie pay will extend to.

20th Oct., 1639.—The said day the saides provest, baillies and counsall, understanding the commendable cair has been had of the poor this tyme bygaine, be keiping them aff the calsay fra opin beging, and interteining of them in thair awin houses to the glorie of God and good report of this cite; Thairfoir, it is statut and concludit that ordor be keipit for this yeir to cum; and that the contribution be collectit to that effect, and intimatioun be made be sound of drum to certifie all personis wha cumes not to pay thair contrabutioun at the ringing of the bell, as sall be appoyntit to that effect, sall be poyndit for the double, and thair names oppinlie publisched in the kirkis wha refuss to doe the samyn.

23d November, 1639.—The said day, ordaines the thesaurer to

have ane warrand for the sowme of fourtie markis money, debursit be him to Mr. Johne Maxvellis wyf, for causis knawin to them.

4th January, 1640.—The said day ordaines the thesaurer to pay to George Andersone, prenter, ane hundredthe pundis, in satisfioun to him of the superplus he debursit in transporting of his geir to this brughe, by the ten dolloris he gave him of befoir to that effect; And als, in satisfioun to him of his hail bygane feallis fra Witsonday in anno 1638, to Martimes last.

1st Feb., 1640.—Ordaines the thesaurer to pay Margaret Forrett fyftein pundis for the denneris givin to the Ministeris of the Presbitrie, at thair command.

28th Feb. 1640.—The said day ordanis the Thesaurer to pay to Johne Corss twenty markis, to help to pay for the curing of his sones leg that was cut from him.

10th March, 1640.—The said day the Mortificatioun granted to vmquhyll George Hutcheson anent his hospitall to be buildit, is presentit and producit be James Stewart, to whom the same was intrustit be the said vmquhyll George.

14th March, 1640.—The said day, ordaines the drum to be send throw the toun, to warne all the inhabitantis of this brughe to have their armes in reddines.

11th Aprilis, 1640.—Ordaines to by fourtie muscattis and twenty pickis, to be adc̄it to the comoun magasine.

16th Aprilis, 1640.—The said day ordainis Patrik Bell to ryde to Edinbrughe to attend this present meiting of the estaitis, and to concur with them in all things that may contribut for the glorie of God and good of the comoun cause now in hand, and if his advyse be sought anent the unioun of the hail shyre, to answer, if the full body of the shyre had unittit togidder Glasgow had been content, but seing the hail rest of the regalitie of Glasgow, quhilk is very considerable, as also sundrie parochis narrest Glasgow, and proper pairtis of the shyre hes not unitit, Glasgow as zitt cannot uneit

untill farther advyse, or otherways lett it be att the determinatioun of the Table.

27th May, 1640.—The said day, the saides provest, bailzies, and counsall, ordanes Patrick Bell, lait provest, to ryde to Edinbrughe to attend the doun-sitting of the parliament, the secound day of Julii nixt, to the whilk the samein was prorogat be his Majesties autoritie; and in caice it fall out, as God forbid, that his Majestie give not warrand to continue and conclude the said parliament, quhairby the estatis in the exigence of tyme may resolve and conclude upon sik things as they think most conducible for the publict good, and for preservatioun of thair liberties, lyfis, and estaites, and requyr the said Patrick his consent thairto; and thairfor they, be the tenor heirop, gives thair full power and commissioun to the said Patrick, in caice foirsaid, to consent to sik things as be plurall or commoun consent sall be thought necessar for the publict good, and preservatioun of thair religioun, liberties, lyfis and estaitis.

Penultimo May, 1640.—The said day, ordaines the Thesaurer to have ane warrand for the sowme of Twenty pundis money debursit be him to John Jamesone, drummer, in satisfacioun of his last zeirs fie, to help him to by ane stand of cloathes, and for his extraordinar paines heirtofoir.

9th Junii, 1640.—The said day ordaines thir persons following to revis the rollis, and to mak up ane perfytt catallog of the hail names of the persones within this brughe, able for weir, viz. James Stewart, Wm. Neilson, James Bell, John Baines, John Andersoun, Harie Glen, Niniane Gilhagie.

29th Junii, 1640.—Ordaines the thesaurer to have an warrand for the soume of fyve hundreth aughtein pundis threttein schillings, debursit be him to the colonel for payment of the sojourns of fortoun, thair fialls for the monethis of Februar, Marche, Apryle,

May last, and Junii instant, conforme to the compt and discharge in Williame Yair's handes.

16th *Julie*, 1640.—The said day, ordaines Johne Kirkwood to goe out with the companie, who ar direct for ane recrew to Captain Porterfield, and to convoy them to Dunglas to the armie.

1st *August*, 1640.—The said day, it is ordainit that twa barnes be takine for the imputting of the tynd schaves of the aikers about this brughe, that was wont to be drawin be the bishop.

11th *August*, 1640.—*Silver Wark*.—The said day, ordaines James Hamiltoun, William Neilsoun, Coline Campbell, zounger, and Johne Kirkwood, to attend in the tolbuthe for receaving in of the haill silver and gold wark sall be brought in conforme to the instructiounes, for help of the common cause, and ordaines them to sett down ane perfynt not of all that is inbrought; and they to sit twa hours efter noon, and twa hours befor noone, for receaving of the samen, conforme to the instructiounes: and ordaines the same to be intimat be sound of drum, and als to invit all wha will lend moneys for supplie of the common cause, or give any voluntar contrabutioun for supplie of the same.

11th *August*, 1640.—The said day, Gavend Nisbeit is appoyntit to ryd to Barrowstouness with the fiftie shouldiers that ar to convey thidder, the Governour and others who were in the Castell of Dumbarttaine.

5th *Sept.* 1640.—The said day the provest is appoyntit to goe to Edinbrughe with the silver and gold wark, the lent money, and the contrabutions collectit for the common cause, and to tak John Kirkwood with him, for delyverie of the silver wark, and Coline Campbell, younger, and to get securitie thairfoir, conforme to the instructiouns.

12th *Sept.*, 1640.—*Anent Ramsay, minister*.—The said day, the bailzies, with Patrik Bell and utheris, wha war appoyntit to

meit with Mr. Robert Ramsay, upoun the aught of this instant, anent the matter of his stipend, maid this report this day, anent thair aggrement with him, quhilk is as followes :—He sould have aught hundrethe pundis of stipend be zeir, ane house maill, and twa mairtis zeirlic; and sould have in hand aught scoir fyftein marks, for causes knawin to the toun; and to be payit of his stipend efter the first Sermone maid be him, his admission to Mertimes nixt, *pro tanto*. Quhairunto, the saides hail bailzies and counsall did accord and agrie.

17th Oct. 1640.—*Anent Blair*.—The said day, efter lytting be pluralitie of voittis, Mr. Hew Blair is electit minister to serve in the hie kirk, and it is thought guid that he be spoken to and delt with anent the serving of the cuir at the said kirk, to sie if he will abyde the hazard of the stipend belonging thairto, and ordaines the dean of gild and deacon convener to meitt thair folkis on Wandisday nixt, and to crave thair opiniouns anent the man.

23 Oct. 1640.—*Anent ane Bell*.—The said day ye Deid bell delyverit to Patrik fforsyth, qm. ordains to give ye half of ye prycis of his pairt of ye bell to Willia Bogle during his lyfetime, and ordains ye Deane of Gild to caus mak ane new Deid bell, to be rung for and befor ye deid under hand.*

* The following excerpt from the Council Minutes of 1st August, 1867, has, no doubt, reference to this very Bell :—

[*Read the following letter from the City Chamberlain, date August 1, 1867*].

MY LORD PROVOST AND GENTLEMEN,

I BEG on behalf of Miss Morgan of Greta to present to the Corporation an ancient Bell formerly its property, and bearing the City Arms, and the date 1641. It is no doubt the “deid bell” referred to in the following Excerpt from the Council Record of the City of date 23d October, 1640, and was probably the “passing bell” of former days :

Item,—Recomendis to the Dean of Gild to caus form ane new port to the new west port.

Ultimo Octobris.—The said day, be plurality of vottis, Gabriell Cunynghame is appointed to goe east to the lordis of the Comittie, with ane letter from the Counsall and ane uther from my lord Montgomerie, for getting back fra the Comittie als meikle of the voluntar contributioun and the tent pennie and twenty pennie quhilk they have receavit for provyding of the armie in claithis and hois and shoes.

5th December, 1640.—*Aneut Howstoun*.—The said day the

“*Aneut ane Bell*.—The said day ye Deid bell delyverit to Patrik “fforsyth, qm. ordains to give ye half of ye prycis of his pairt of ye “bell to Willia Bogle during his lyfetime, and ordains ye Deane of “Gild to caus mak ane new Deid bell, to be rung for and befor ye “deid under hand.”

The Corporation is greatly indebted to Messrs. Michael Connal, William Henry Hill, and William Keddie, through whose kind intervention this relic of the past has returned to its original place.

On the motion of the Lord Provost, the Council unanimously accepted the ancient relic—accord their thanks to Miss Morgan for her very interesting gift—direct a copy of this minute to be transmitted to her, and resolve that the Bell shall be preserved in the Corporation Galleries. On the motion of the Lord Provost, the Council also accord their thanks to Messrs. Michael Connal, William Henry Hill, and William Keddie, through whose instrumentality the Bell had been obtained.

Deane of Gild and Deacon Convener maid their report of the dealling with Mr. James Howstoun, anent his preaching in the toun, quhilk is thus: That the said Mr. James is content to aggrie to preach anes on the Sunday, and anes in the weik day, during the Counsalls pleasour, and referris to themselfis his price.

26th December, 1640.—*Item.*—Ordaines the thesaurer to have a warrand to deliver to Walter Stirling ten dollaris, to be gevin be him to Mr. Johne Campbell, blind minister, for his preaching heir, and out of charitie to supplie his necessitie.

10th April, 1641.—*Item.* Ordainis Johne Liddell to plant twelff asche tries of seven inches of greatnes, at the Lymehous, betwix and Candilmes next.

17th April, 1641.—Ordainis a warrand to be gevin to the thesaurer to pay to James Dunlop, travellour, xv. dollors out of charitie, for the loses of his horses in their absence; to be allowit in the first end of his horse pryces and wages, at thair returne.

8th May, 1641.—The said day ordainis the counsallours to meit heir on Weddinsday next, at nyne hours in the morning, and ordainis Thomas Scot to produce the letter of Deaconheid of the baxters that day, that some ordor may be taine anent the abuse of quheit bread.

15th May, 1641.—*Baxteris.*—The said day it is statute be the counsall that in all tyme cuming the baxters baik no bunnnes to be sold, bot onlie sufficient loafes to serve the toun and countrey, under the paine of fyve pund *toties quoties*.

12th June, 1641.—The said day ordainis the thesaurer to have ane warrand to pay to James Colquhoun fyfe dollaris for drawing of the portraict of the toun to be sent to Holland.

19th June, 1641.—*Warrand.*—The said day ordainis the thesaurer to have ane warrand for the soume of three scoir dollaris, extending to the soume of a hundreth three scoir twa pundis, deliverit be him to Mr. Gawin Forsythe, for his bygane service

within this brughe in baptising of infantis, visitatioune of the seik in the tyme of the tounes necessitie, examinatioune of ane of the tounne at the desyre of the magistratis, and for preaching of Godis word ilk Tysday fra the day of Janiwarij last to the day of Julij next tocum for making up half ane yeir.

7th August, 1641.—Proclamatioun anent Stowpis.—The said day ordainis ane proclamatioun to be sent throw the toun, anent the stowpis, commanding and charging that na vender or drawer within this brughe, of wyne, aill, beir, or ony vther soirt of liquour, to tak upon hand to sell any stoup ayther of thair awin, or of ony uther personis, except such war sealed with this present yeir of God, undir the paine of fyve pundis money, unforgeven; and gif ony doe come to by with ane unscallit stoup, the seller is ordainit not to fill the samyn, but to schawe the same to the magistrates, that the owneris thairof may be punished accordingle, &c.

14th Aug. 1641.—It is ordainit, that ane new commissioun be direct to Patrick Bell, anent the divisoune cravit of the parochine of Glasgow, and to supplicat his Majesty anent the dissolutione of the personag from the Bishoprick, and for the ministeris maintenance out of the Bishoprick, as they formerly had; and for ane minister to be mantenit out thairof, in place of the Bishop; and for ane competent allowance out the said Bishoprick, for upholding the great kirk, and for helping the poor of the Bishopis Hospitale and gramer scoolle: and becaus the clerk is now in Edinburghe, ordainis ane letter to be sent to him to draw up commissiounes, ane or mae, to the said Patrick, as he sall requyre him for managing of the saidis particularis; and als ane commissioun for defending this brughe fra that craveing be Gabriell Conynghame, for his attending the valuatioune of the Tythis, and doe his best to hold it of the tounne.

9th Oct. 1641.—Anent Electioun of Baillies eftir twa zeiris.—The said day it is statut and ordainit, that in all tyme heireftir ther

sall no baillie be ressaveit in office eftir the zeir he hes been in office, quhill twa zeir thaireftir, so that he be frie for twa zeiris.

16th Oct., 1641.—Item, ordainis ane warrand to be gevin to James Tran, lait Thesaurer, to pay the cadgeris the soume of ane hundreth and threttie pundis and ten schillings for carriage of the sojouris bagage from Tweed to Mussilbrughe, and from thence to this toun, conforme to the particular compt gevin in thairanent.

26th Oct., 1641.—The said day, James Bell producit Thomas Conyngham, factor of Campheir, his discharge of his ressait of the townes proportioun of thair gilderis adebtit for the amunitioun, togidder with James Murray, his band of Corroboration, quhilkis ar ordainit to be put in the charter kist.

Item.—Ordanis a letter to be direct to Patrik Bell, to deall the best he can anent the accomodating the bussines anent the libertie of the electioun of thair awin magistrates, and they sall approve the same qlk he sall doe be advyse of Walter Stirling, thair for the present at Edinbrughe; and any other of the tounis commissioners wha sall be thair east for the tyme; and that he aid and assist Renfrew, and give thame his advyse anent the mater concerning Paislay.

1st Dec. 1641.—Item, It was ordanit that sume Holland cloathe and Scottis linning cloathe, with sume plydes, be sent as a propyne to Mr. Web, the Duikes servand, as a testimonie of the tounis thankfulness to him for his paines taine for the tounes bussines.

4th Dec. 1641.—The said day Mr. Pa. Gillespie producit a presentatioun grantit to him be his Majestie of the place of the Highe Kirke, instead of the bischope. Efter he was removed, it was appoyntit that the provest, Patrik Bell, dean of Gild, and deacon convener, should speik him thairanent, and to report at the next meiting.

8th December, 1641.—*Ancut transporting men for Irland.*—The

said day, my Lord Marqueis of Argyll exhibit, in presens of the counsall, ane commissiounne from the secreit counsall, anent the transporting of fyve thousand men to Irland, and to provyd boatis and barkis for their transport. Efter reasoning, it is thocht fitting that the fraucht of ilk sojour be threttie schillings, and that ilk persone, baith of sojourns and boatmen, have sex schillings in the day for victualls during the tyme they ar at sea, to be payit be the publict, and sume proportiounne to be advanced befor they goe aboard. To agree with sic boatis for transport that it may be lawful to thame to return back quhen they have dischargit thair companies at Irland, and that ilk boate to be hyred, be twentie foote of ground at least, and ilk slayer boate have twa straikis above, and ilk couper ane, or mair as they sall think fitting; and that ilk boat be in readines at ane port, within xlvij. houris, as they sall be requyred, and that ilk boat get half fraucht bcfor their away going, and the rest quhen thai cum to Irland; and that ilk boat quhen it cumis to the place quhare they ar taking in ther sojourns, the boatmen sall have thair paye daylie.

Item, It is thocht expedient that Jon. Andersone, the baillie, and the clerk, goe to Paislay the morne to the presbytrie, concerning Mr. Hew Blair, his transportationne to this toun.

14th Dec., 1641.—The said day, ordainis a letter to be direct to the Duik of Lennox, giving him thanks for byganes, and intreating his favor in tyme cuming.

Item, Ane uther letter to Mr. Web, his servand, with a propyne of lx. elnes of lining cloathe, twa gallounes of aquavytie, and four half barrels of hering, and twa pair of plydes.

27th December, 1641.—*Item,* Ordainis the maister of wark to send east to the tounes advocattis and thair agents thair fies and thair herring; and to Mr. Robt. Bruce, the Duik of Lennox, his agent, twa half barrels of herring.

5th Jan., 1642.—The said day the saids provest, baillies,

counsall and deacons, being informed that Robert Hogis yaird had spred and distribut amongst certain of the deacons of craftis of this brughe certane letters anent ane minister, and he being ane privat man, having no warrand of this place, finding the sam ane great wrang, ordainis him to be warnit to Saturday nixt to ansuer thairto.

Item.—*Act anent Tysters to subscriye writtis without warrand.*—It is statut and ordanit that na maner of persoune within this brughe presume nor tak upon hand heirefter to tyst, intyse, or perswad any persoune to subscriye any kind of writt quhat sumever concerning the publict good of this toune without special consent and warrand of the counsall, certifieing all those who dois in the contrair sall be hauldin and reputt as seditious persounes and disturbers of the comoun peace, and thair friedome to be cryed down and punisched conforme to thair burges ticket.

15th Jan., 1642.—The said day the forsaid provest, baillies and counsall, with the bretherin of the dean of gild's hous, with the deacons of crafts, all for the moste parte being present, whose votes and opiniounes being requyrit, if this place sould submitt any thing concerning thair patronages to any persounes quhatsumever, who, all in on voice, disassentit that the counsall sould submitt any privileg belonging to the toune.

12th February, 1642.—*Act anent Patrik Adam.*—This said day forsameikle as the said provest, bailies, and counsall, was certainlie and trulie informit that Patrik Adame, tailyour, had so far vilependit and vilefiet the magistrates of this brughe, in saying to the forsaid John Clark, thesaurer, that he regardit not the provest, bailies and counsall of this brughe, ane fart of his erse, anent his cautionrie to thaim, for Jonnet Baird ane delinquent, accused be the sessioun, for abusing of the ministers of this brughe, and that he had desyred the said Johne Clark to tell thaim that from him; as also being certainlie informit, that the said Patrik com upon Monday last,

to the said Johne, and avowed and repeated the same in words over again at several tymes, and did avow and approve the same; and he being conveyed this day to answer thairfor, missregarding the saids provest, baillies, and counsall, did say in thair presens to the said Johne Clarke, that he sould be avenged of him, ather ther or some other place: And thairfor the saids provest, baillies, and counsall, ordainis the said Patrik to enter his persoune in ward, and remaine thairin, within the tolbuthe of this brughe, the space of eight dayes, shorter or langer at the sight of the saids provest or baillies, and to pay twentie pundis to the procurator fiscall, to be applyed *ad pios usus*.

Scholmaster.—*Item.*—Ordainis Johne Andersoune to ryd to Stirling, to try anent the schoolmaster his qualitie and present conditione ther; and to trye the man himselff, if he be willing to transport himselff.

Drummers.—The said day ordainis the drummers to touk throughe the tonn weik about, and he who toukis for the weik sall onlie have power to touk to the hail Lords and strangers sall cum to the tonn for that weik, and John Cuthbirtson to begin upon Mononday morning nixt, and to serve so for the first weik, and this to stand onlie during the counsalls will allanerlie; and ordains tham to leave together peacable as brether, and not wrang or injure uthirs, and if John Jamiesone wrangs his colligie be word or dead heireftir, he sall lose the place of the right hand, quhilk he sould bruik untill September nixt.

Item.—It is statut and ordainit in respect of the great increse of the poor, speciallie *these that cum from Irland*, that the Thesaurer give to the Mr. of Wark twa hundreth merkes, moneye to be gevin out be him to the use of the poor allanerlie, and thaireftir to geve in his compt thairupoun.

Item.—Ordains the act of Parliament mad anent linnen cloathe

to be published at the crosse vpon Monunday nixt, that non pretend ignorance.

26th Feb., 1642.—*Item.*—Ordainis ane letter to be sent to Pa Bell, at Londone, to schawe him how the toun is abusit with theifes without punishment, and to entreat him to doe his best indeavour to gett the sam remeidit, and that so soon as can be.

5th March, 1642.—The said day, ordains ane proclamatioune to be sent throw the toun to desyre all these who will geve or contribut any supplie to the distressd people that com from Irland, that they cum vpon Weddinsday next, at the ringing of the bells.

Item.—Ordains the dean of gild, deacon conveiner, Walter Stirling, James Hamiltoune, Niniane Gilhagie to meit at such tymes as they think convenient, and to tak consideratioune of these poore people, and to geve them support out of the contribution to be collectit for that end, according to thair necessitie, and as they shall think meit and expedient.

19th March, 1642.—*Act in favour of Capitane Gibsone.*—*Item.*—Ordains the maister of wark to lend to Capitane Gibsoun ane of the tounis tentes, He acting himself to restor the same to the toun at his homcoming; or else the pryce thairof, to be modefiet be the Dean of Gild and Deacon Conveiner.

Item.—Ordains Mathow Colquhoun, to have ane rowme under the galrie of the Castell, during the counsals pleasour.

Change of the Mercat from Moonday till Weddinsday, Oct. 15, 1642.—*Item,* ordains a proclamatioune to be maid be touk of drume on Monunday nixt, discharging the meill mercat, beir, yron, salt and schooe mercates, and all craines vpon the Moonday, to be hauldin heirefter vpon the Weddinsday weiklie, (except the fairs and principall mercat dayes that sall happen to fall vpon the Moonday), and that vnder the paine of confiscatioune.

Commissioner Bell, Oct. 22, 1642.—*Item*, be pluralitie of votes, James Bell is chosen commissioner for the toune to goe to Edinr. for the erecting of manufactories.

Anent Electing of the Provost.—*Item*, it is statut be the counsall, all in ane voice, That in all tyme cumming, at the electioun of the provest, that the provest who was the zeir befor sall be onlie put in lyt for the zeir thereafter; swa that no provest sall be ather lyted or chosen provest but for two zeirs togidder, and no langer.

Ransome Melvill.—*Item*, ordains that when Archibald Melvill his ransome is payit, the thesaurer pay for the tounes pairt thairof, seavin pundis sterling, extending to four scoir four pundis Scotis moneye.

Rowane is presentlie building ane chop in Rattoun Raw, against the quhilk his haill nightbours hes compleinit that it will hinder and impend them of the sight of the Hie Streit vp and doane, in respect it cumis farder out nor any of his nightbours does ther; and efter severall visitatiouns, the samein being fund to be trewe, and that he vilipending the ordinance of the Dean of Gild, be bringing out the said wark farder towards the King's Hie streit nor the said Dean of Gild and his bretherin had ordaint, above thrie fut and ane half, Therfoir, the saidis Baillies and Counsall ordains the said Robert Rowane to demolische and tak doune his foirsaid chope, now building be him, and to build the samein out conforme to the said Dean of Gild, his first ordinance, &c.

4 March, 1643.—Ordains the thrie bailleis, dean of gild, Deacon Convener, &c., to meit with such as the Presbitrie sall appoint to meit with them, anent the inlaik of ministers of this burgh.

18 March, 1643.—The said day, efter reasoning and voting, be pluralitie of votes, it is appointed that ther sall be twa ministers presentlie chosen, with all conveniencie.

1 April, . . .—Grants commissione to James Bell to deal and agrie with the toune of Edinr. anent Mr. Williame Struthers legacie left to the college.

22 April.—The sd. day ordains ane warrant to be gevin to the thesaurer, to pay to James Bogle the soume of ane

hundrethe punds, for helping of him to pay his ransome from the Turkis.

20th May, 1643.—*Ordinance for Collecting of Moneys for the Irische armies supplie.*—*Item.*—Ordains the bailleis, dean of gild, deacon conveinar, Harie Glen, James Bell, and Coline Campbell to meet in the counsall hous, on Thursday and Friday nixt, befor and efternoone, the tyme of the ringing of the bell, for receiving of offers of such as will lend money to the publict for the supplie of the Irishe armie.

The gars of litle St. Mungows kirkzaird is sett to Johne Andersone for ane dollar, payit in hand, and gevin be the bailleis to the poor.

17th Junii, 1643.—Ordains the kings and counsals declaratioune to be red and proclaimit at the croce, vpon Weddinsday nixt.

17th Julij, 1643.—Ordains James Trane to goe to Dumbartane, to meit with them anent the buying of the dails offerit, and to try them if he can gett ane pennie worth thereof.

14th Aug., 1643.—*Clanging of Clyd.*—Grants Commissioun to Coline Campbell, Thomas Glen, and Thomas Morsone, to aggree with workmen to tak away the staines out of the water about the brig, and to tak away the stobs out of the water on the south syd.

25th August.—*Andersone Commissioner.*—The said day ordaines Johne Andersone to goe as Commissioner from this place to the sessioun of Eastwood and Presbyterie of Paislay, to deall for Mr. Hew Blair his transportatioune to this burgh.

In favours of George Duncane.—The said day, the saids Bailleis and Counsall taking to ther consideration, that Georg Duncane of Borrowfield, out of the good will, love, and affectione, he hes to this burgh, hes gevin into them sex hundrethe merks money, to be warit and bestowit upon ane bell, to be hung in the steeple of the Blackfriar Kirk, and to be rung at thir tyms following viz. : everie

morning at five hours, to the morning and evening prayers, and on the Sabbothe day, and uther preaching dayes in the week, at the ordinar tymes, according to as the rest of the bels in the toune does, and ilk night at eight and ten hours at evin, and oftner, as the Provest Baillies and Counsall of this burgh sall think meit and expedient. And therfor the saids bailleis and counsall dois heirby rander to the said George Duncane hartie thanks, and ordains the said bell to be hung in the foresaid place appoyntit be the said George, and to be rung at all tymes, as is above writtine, according as he hes desyred,

Muister.—*2d September, 1643.*—*Item,* Ordains ane mister to be proclaimed be touke of drume, to be in this burgh the xxv of this instant.

Cuschin.—*Item,* Ordains ane velvet cuschein, and ane velvot black clothe to be laid in the kirks before the provest in tyme cuming, and to be readie against the tyme that the magistrates be chosen.

23d Sept.—The said day ordains the muster to be proclaimed of new againe to the threttein day of October nixt to cum.

2d Octobris, 1643.—*For Exercersing of Armes.*—The said day the foirsaides persones taking to ther consideratioune his Majesties proclamatioune gevin out anent the puting of this hail kingdome in ane present postour of war conforme to the tenour thereof, They have thought good, that in everie ane of the four quarters of the toune, ther be the provest, or ane baillie, with twa considerable men of the counsall, and under them twa capitaines and four serjands, who sall tak notice, and caus everie man be in readines at all tymes with sufficient armes, and that they use and exerce the same, and continues the electiounne of ther bailleis and counsallours for everie quarter, whill the electiounne of new Magistrats be by past, and hes maid joyse of ther saids capitanes as fallows, quha, in all things, sall be subject and obedient to the provest, bailleis,

and counsell, and for that quarter calit Mr. Robt. Ramsayes quarter, Walter Neilson, Peter Johnesone; and for that quarter calit Mr. Edward Wright's, Thomas Pollok, and Thomas Morsoune; and for that quarter calit umqll. Mr. Robert Wilkies, Rot. Dorroche, and Androw Conyngham; and for that quarter calit umqll. Mr. Johne Belis, Johne Donyng, and Johne Muir; and gevs ordour to the foresaids Capitanes to mak chois of their serjands, as they sall think most fit and expedient.

Proclamatioune.—*Item*, Ordains the King's proclamatioune to be proclamit publickly on the croce, be sound of drummes; and that ther be ane proclamatioune sent through the toune immediatly thereafter commanding all the inhabitants of this burghe to be readie at touk of drume, to cum out at all tymes, as they sall be appoyntit by the foresaids persones choisine be the saids bailleis and counsell to that effect under sik paines as sall be injoynit.

6th October, 1643.—That nane of the counsell depart out of the Counsalhous quhill the provest and bailleis ryse, without licence craved and granted.

Ordains the drum to goe throw the toune for the officers, and that they bring in their wands this day eight dayes.

Item, for furneishing candle to the laighe kirk, and skouring the lamps, xxviijl. xiijs. iiijd.

18th Novembris, 1643.—*Hamilton.*—The said day it is ordaint that the toune has aggried with Mr. Gawine Hamilton to preache, in the Laich Kirk, in Tronegait, qll. they be further provydit for payment, conforme to twa hundreth merks be zeir, and his entrie was at Martimas last.

Unlaws.—The said day the lait bailleis productit ane compt of last zeirs unlaws, extending about twentie three dollours, and they have requestit that ane or twa of the windows, on the south syd of the Black Frier Kirk, nerest the est gavell, the staines therein may be taken doune, and build agane with glas, so far as the moneys will doe with diligence.

xij Decembris, 1643.—*Sojourns.*—The said day ordains the drum to be sent throw the toune on Monunday nixt, to requyre all to inroll themselfs for the present comoune expeditioun, that they com and doe the same, and to certifie all those who will willinglie inroll themselues out of them ther officers will be chosen. And if it be found that any countrey men be hyring for sojourns within this burghe, that notice be mad therof to the magistrates, to the effect they may be presentit to the committee.

Item, Capitane George Porterfield is now of new againe

electit Capitane of the companie qlk the toune is presentlie to sett out.

2d Januarij, 1644.—George Porterfield is ordanit to buy in Edin. fourtie muscats for the tounes use to be gevin to the sojourns going out.

The said day, Williame Barclay is choisine levetennent, and Johne Buchanane is electit ensigne.

Act anent the Breking of Salmont.—*Decimo Septimo Februarii*, 1644.—The said day the forsd Provest, Bailleis, and Counsall, taking to ther considera^oune the great wrongis and abuiss done be Williame Andersone, Breker of ye Salmount, not onlie in taking far greater and more exorbitant pryces for the tails of salmount nor hes bein done heirtofor, or allowed be ye Counsal, as also for buying of salmount from these who brings them in to sell, keiping them up for ane derth, and not suffering the inbringers to sell the samyne as the mercat rolls, to ye great hurt and prejudice of ye inhabitants of this burght. And the sd. Wm. Andersone being convenit this day theranent, he denyit the buying of any salmount in manner as said is, but granted that he had taken greater pryces for the salmount tails nor is allowit to him conforme to the Act sett doune theranent, upon the threttein day of April, 1638.* And the sds. Provest, Bailleis, and Counsall, knowing both the sds. alledgances to be true, and that therfor they might justlie have deprivit him of his sd. charge and benefit his therby, yet they having compassionune towards him, and for the many promises mad be him in keiping of good ordour in tym cuming, hes continuet him in his sd. place and charg, he fulfilling the condi^ones fallowing and no other wayes, viz: That he tak no moir for the tail of ilk salmount he breiks of ye pryce of twentie schilings and beneth but twelff pennies Scots monye allanerlie, and for the tail of ilk salmount he breks that is of ye pryce betwixt twentie and threttie

schilings, sixtein pennies, and for the taill of ilk salmound that is above threttie or fourtie schilings or above, of his breiking, twentie pennies Scots moneye, swa that the dearest taill of salmound that he sall brek sall not exceid the sd. soume of twentie pennis moneye. And to the effect the sd. Williame may better observe and keip the haill premisis and pryces above written, he sall be herby bund and astricht to lay the tails of ye salmound to these ptes that he sall brak, that gif it be the buyers will and desyr to have the tail with that part of ye fische they buy that the persone sall have it to whom it sall fall be lot or cavill, the sd. William sall render the samein upon payt. of ye pryces on the taills as is above written, having respect to ye pryces of ye salmound as is above speit. Nather sall it be leasum to him to cut the salmound above the crumbe, or any pairt therof. Nather sall it be leasum to ye sd. Williame to presume or tak upon hand heirefter to buy any salmound aither in haill or in pairte fra these who brings the samen to the mercat to be sold. And gif it sall happen him to contravein in any of ye premisis heireftir he is herby content pairtlye to be dischargeit of his sd. charge and haill casualities he hes therby, and never to be reddmited therto, notwithstanding of any request or sollicitatioune sall be mad for him in the contrar. In witness wherof ye said Williame has subt. yr. pentis wt. his hand.

threttie twa punds, and the seaventhe man the toun payit. *Item*, for fourtein baggage horsis at fyftie merkes the piece, four hundrethe thrie scoir sex punds threttein schillings viij. d. money. *Item*, for thrie other baggage horsis, quhair of the toun bought twa for four scoir eight punds, ane hundrethe and twentie punds. *Item*, to the last twa baggage men to the thrie last horsis, fyve pund vi. s. viij. d. *Item*, to twa cariers that helpit to carie the armes of the first companie to Lawder, thretten punds vi. s. viij. d. money.

2 *Martij*, 1644.—*Watche*.—*Item*, ordains ane watche to be keepit nightlie heirefter of the halff of ilk quarter of the toun, fra sex hours at evening, and to cum af at fyv hours in the morning.

23^d *March*.—The said day ordains the haille hoislar wyfes to be payit this efternoone the soumes awand be the sojours to them.

5th *April*, 1644.—Ane warrand to pay to Coline Campbell, the soume of fortie-nyne punds, vi. s. viij. money, for the charges warit be him and his companie to Edinr. with the marqueis of Argyll, and the Chancellours bairnis.

4th *May*, 1644.—The said day, ordains ane warrand to be gevin to the Thesaurer for the soume of Thrie scoir seventeen punds, money debursit be him for twa horsis sent out with George Mitchelson, chirurgeon to the lait expeditioun, to him and ane of his twa men to ryd on; And for the soume of twentie-four punds, money debursit be him to Johne Lykprivick, for twa hors carriage to Dumfreis, with the said George, his chests and baggage, and ane horse to his other man to ryd on.

18th *May*, 1644.—The counsall all, in ane voyce, ordains Peter Johneson, ane of the Capitanes who went out in the lait expeditioun to be written for to com back agane.

11th *June*, 1644.—The gers of little St. Mungow's kirk-yaird, is

sett to Johne Andersone for one dollar gevin to the officers to buy ther denner.

10th August, 1644.—*Musquets.*—*Item*, Ordains those persones who hes lent out ther musquets in the lait expeditioun, to have musquets gevin to them, and these who hes bought musquets to give out to have the pryces thereof restored to them.

24th August, 1644.—*Overtur anent the Ministers Preaching.*—The said day the foresaids provest, bailleis, and counsall, taking to ther consideratioun that now be the mercie and providence of God, the wholl kirks of this burgh, ar provydit they did think it fitt they sould preache in the places, and at the tymes vnderwritting, viz.—Mr. Edward Wright vpon the Sabbothe, in his kirk, before and efternoone; Mr. Rt. Ramsay, in the Blakfrier kirk, befor and efternoone; Masters Hew Blair and George Young, in the New Kirk, and vpon the Tuysday and Thursday ilk week. And what the foresaids ministers getts, be Maisters David Dickson and Robt. Baillie, they doe think it expedient the samein accres to all their behuiffs, *per vices*. And this to be presentit to them as ther overtur.

31st Aug.—*Item*, Ordains ane proclamatioun to be sent throw the toune, commanding all maner of persones betwixt sextie and sextein, to be in readines with ther best armes, and to this effect, to cum out presentlie with ther severall capitanes, with matche, powder, and lead, and also to provyd themselves with twentie days' provisoun, to marche according as they sall get ordours, vnder the paine of deathe; and syklyk that no maner of persone presume, or tak vpoun hand, to goe within any hous to drink or stay ther in tyme of the night watch, vnder the paine of warding of ther persounes in the tolbuthe.

14th Sept., 1644.—*Guard.*—*Item*, Ordainis ane guard to be keept at all ports of this burgh in the day tyme.

Port.—*Item*, Ordainis the salt mercat port to be taken doune,

and to be buildit of new nearer the water, at the end of the umqll. Colin Campbell his hous.

5th Oct., 1644.—*Beir*.—The said day ordainis eight tun of beir to be presentlie furneised be the toune, for outreiking of that schip whereof Capitan Kerse is Capitan, conforme to the act of the committee of estaits.—[This schip was called the “King’s Eight Whelpe,” as appears from some subsequent entries.]

Aill, Candell, &c.—The said day ordainis the pryce of the pynt of aill with the excyse, to be twentie pennies. The haill bun to be twentie unce weght; and the half to be ten unce; and the fadge to be twelff unce weght; and the pryce of the stane of good maid candell xlviijs.

26th October, 1644.—*Officers*.—*Item*, Ordainis the officers of this burgh to weir, in tyme cuming, everie man his sword and halbert.

Swords.—*Item*, Ordainis the master of wark to send to Holland for sex scoir sword blads.

9th Nov., 1644.—*Proclamatioune*.—The said day the foresaids persones haveing considerit that it hathe pleased God to visit the south countrie with the plague of pestilence, doe ordaine ane Proclamatioune to be sent throw this toune, commanding all inhabitants fence and build up their close foots and yards, that no passage be had throw ther closes, and lykwayes that no inhabitants within this burgh suffer any strangers to enter the samen, or recept them to ther houses, without testimonialls to be shawne to the Magistrats, and that nane of the inhabitants that ar now furthe of this brughe in these bounds be receavit within the samein to ther owne houssis till they shaw the Magistrats ther testimonialls.

2d Dec., 1644.—*Porterfield*.—*Item*, grants commissione to the Provost to complein to the Committie of Parliament upone the wrong done to George Porterfield, in his absence, be reasone

of his seikness, be imposing of ane new Capitane upon his companie.

EXCERPTS FROM TREASURER'S ACCOUNT.—DISCHARGE.

17th February, 1645.—Debursit to Capitane Porterfield, for fourtie muscats he bought for the use of the companie, went last with him to England, and for new cullours to the said companie, iiijc. xxxviiij. lib.

Item.—Debursit for outreiking of the sojourns baggage, men and baggage hors, that war sent out last with Capitane Porterfield, ijm. ijc. lxxxvi. lib.

Item.—Debursit for entertainment of the Lord Sinclair's regiment, the tyme they war quartered in this toune, vijc. lxxxiv. xvi. iv. d.

Item.—Debursit for quartering Lowthian's regiment, iijm. vic. lib.

22d March.—*Item.*—For the soume of fourtie-thrie pundis vis. debursit for the trouperis that cam in with old Colkittoche, and for the officers and horse hyres that went with them to Linlithgow.

30th Sept.—The said day being the day of electing of the Magistrats, according to the accustomed form, compeirit the Right Honourable the Earle of Lanarke, and be vertew of the commissionne grantit to his Lordshipe be the Lords and others of the Committee of Estates of Parliament, dischargit Gilbert Merschell, Daniell Wallace, and Thomas Pollok, who war joined in commissionne with the Commissare, to capitulate with James Grahame of any publict charge within the said burghe, and thereafter did discharge James Bell, Provest, of his office of Provestrie, his tyme being expyrit, and the tyme com of the electiounne of ane new Provest, until farder tryall be takine be the said Committee of Estates.

The said day the said Noble Earle being authorised with a commissionne from the State, to sie all such Magistrats within this

burghe suspendit and dischargeit of ther offices wha have bein actours in ther capitulatione with James Grahame, or accessorie thereto, and their places filled with men weill affected to the caus and cuntrie, did also desyre to knawe from the thrie Bailleis in charge, and Toune Counsall of this burghe, gif they will, for the preservatioune of the liberties of this burghe, (quhilk he desyrit may inteirlye and inviolablie be preserved,) presentlie proced to the lyting of their Magistrates out of any other lyte than that of the present Counsallours.

(This being declined by the Baillies, who, after due consideration, resolve "to stand firm to the ordour they have been in vse to choise their Magistrats out of the present Counsall, and no otherways.")

Therefter comeperit the said Earle, and gave in, subscrivit with his hand, ane paper, quhair of the tenour followes :—The Earle of Lanerke, finding that the Bailleis and Toune Councell of Glasgow have declared that they will onely chuse ther Magistrats out of ther present Councell, and no vtherways, as by ther declaratioune given him, and signed by ther clerk doethe appear: And considering that, by the commissioun granted to him by the Estaites, all such as have bein actours in, or accesorie to their capitulatione with James Grahame, ar to be suspendit, or dischargit of their offices, and finding by ther depositiones of the 29th of September, that the Provost, Bailleis, and wholl Towne Councell, (except George Porterfield,) war accessorie to ther sending to and capitulating with James Grahame, Therefore, he finding that he cannot be answerable to the Estaites if any of the said Councell shall be choisen or admitted to the charge of being Provost or Bailleis within this burghe, did (be vertue of his commissioun,) discharge them to proced to the electione of any persone of their Councell, or any others within ther toune who hathe bein accessorie to ther capitulatione with James Grahame, to any publict office within

ther burgh, untill they knowe the Estates' further pleasure, which, with all possible diligence, he will labour to have returned vnto them, wherein they ar not to fail, as they will be answerable vpon ther heighest perrill, at Glasgow, the 30th September, 1645.

(Whereupon a protest is taken, to preserve the liberties of the burgh in electing their Magistrates, in consequence of the election not being "perfyted" this day.)

11th Oct.—The said day compeirit personallie Sir Williame Baillie of Lammington, Sir James Lockhart of Leye, Sir Wm. Carmichaell, and others of the Committee, of Clydisdail, and producit a letter direct to them be the Committee of Estaites, willing them to wait in Glasgow, and sie the Magistrats therof accept ther charges, and in ther names to tak ther oathes of ther faithful discharge of ther dewties therin; and thereafter producit ane other letter, direct be the Committee of Estates to the burgesses of Glasgow, quhairin ther was conteinit ane list, subscrivit be the Earle of Crawford Lindsaye, conteining the names of such as war to be Provest, Baillies, and Counsall of this burgh, viz. George Porterfield, Provest; Robert Hamiltoun, Peter Johnestoun, Baillies. (Then follow the Councillors' names.)

Quhilk list being red, it was protested be the foirsaid old Provest, Bailleis, and Councill, abovenamed, that the said electione sould nowayes be derogatorie or prejudiciall herefter to the liberties and privileges granted to the said burgh anent the electione of their Magistrates and Councill, conforme to the Act of Parliament, their ancient and laudable custome observit therir, past memorie of man; Sieing all who are now nominat, at least the most pairt of them, ather war accessorie to the capitulatione with James Grahame, als weill as such as ar chargit, or then would have bein if they had bein present. (Then follows the election of the persons named in the list, the Council consisting of 12

“merchants” and 12 “craftis,” in addition to the Provost and Baillies already named).

Lykas the saids Commissioners being removed, Mr. Harie Gibson Clerk, producit ane letter, quhilk he received from the Earle of Lanerke, and quhilk was directed be the Committee of Estaites to the Provost, Baillies, and Counsall of this burghe, daitit at Perth the 27th day of September last bypast, quhairintill the said Committee desyres the said toune to choise no Magistrates, nor Commissionaris to Parliament, who had treated with James Grahame, or received protectiones from him.

15th Nov.—The said day, in regard it is ordainit be the Committee of Estaites, that fyve hundrethe bollis of meill be advancit for the vse of the people that cumis in to help to cast up the trinche about this citie, quhilk is to be payit out of som sowmes of monye the Provost is to receive for the vse of the publick; and becaus the meill can not be commodiouslie gottine, the said Provost, Baillies, and Counsell, hes concludit to pay to everie man that cumis in to wirk at the said wark, ten schilling Scots for the hail tyme they wirk, in satisfacioune of the peck of meill ilk man sould have conforme to the act and ordinance of the said Committee, and ordains the same to be payit be John Grahame out of the excyse monye quhill it be payit back againe.

6th Dec.—The said day the said Bailzies and Counsell tacking to their consideratioune the lamentable estaite and conditione of the poore people within the toune of Pasley, and of the hard strait they are brought to, by God’s visitatioune of the plague of pestilence lying upon them now this long time, for thair present supplie, they have condiscendit to bestow upon them twentie bollis meill, and to tak als much monye out of these monyes as wer collectit for Kelso as will pay thairfor.

13th Dec., 1645.—The said day ordains the saids Bailzies to goe about be all meins, and use thair best diligence to get in and

collect the sax moneths' mentinance that are awand be the inhabitants of this burghe, conforme to the stent roll sett doune thair-ament; and as they goe throw the toune, and gets in money, ordains to pay all those who wants for quartering of the druggners, rebaitting aff thame quhat is awing be thame of the scalt money, and thair pairts of the monethlie mentinance.

15th Dec.—The said day they appoint Wm. Lightbodie, Williame Neilson, Walter Bryce, and James Forgisoune, to cognosche upon the loisses of this toune, by cornes cuttine and plunderit.—*Item*, Ordains the toune Quarter-Masters to tak up the hail quarterings of the toune, ather be the enemie or be our awine armyes. *Item*, Robt. and Thomas Allen and James Armour to tak up ane note of the plunderit guds. *Item*, Ordains Johne Andersoune, callit Woodsyd, Wm. Neilsoune, George Louck, and Thomas Scott, to cognosce vpon the loisses of the toune, by the trinche casting, to be referrit to the Parliament, that they may be brought in with the commoune burdings.

20th Dec.—*Item*, ordains that ane tounsmen be in the wathe at ilk port, betwix sevine in the morning, and ten at night, for taking notice of testimonialls.

7th Jan., 1646.—The said day Thomas Browne and Robert Mack ar appoyntit to have the charge of the magaseine, and that the hail pouldir in the toune, ball, and vthers armes and amounitionne, be brought into the tolbuthe, and put in thair keipping vpon ther noitts of recaite, to be furth comand, ather for the pryce of delyverance thairof, for the quhilk they are to be comptable to the Councell, and the Councell to pay that quhilk sall be imployit for the publict use of the toune, in caise the inhabitants receavers thairof, may not pay, and ordains them to provyd and munt the armes they have, with all possible speide.

21st Feb.—The said day Francis Bunteine, nottar, is unlawit in fourtie pundis for his miscarriage in judgement, some few weeks

since, and to remaine in warde during the Magistrats pleasoure, and the unlaw to be disposit upon be the Magistrats at their pleasoure. *Nota*, That that for quhilk Francis was challancit was, that he said to the Bailzies sittand in judgement, that he wald anger the best of thame, and if they wer out of judgement, he wald tell thame ane vther tell, quhilk he confessit to be trew, and cam in the Councells will for his fault, wha unlawit, as said is.

28th March.—The said day it is ordaint that all the armes lent furth of the tolbuthe, be brought in, and diligence to be reportit the nixt weik.

18th April.—The said day Thomas Brown producit and laid up 54 swords, quhilk were gevine out to be dressit, and declarit he had debursit 40s for the dressing of the peice of them, inde jc. viijl. quhilk the thesaurer is ordainit to pay.

The said day ordains Jon Johnstoun to goe to the Presbiterie of Lanerk, and get answer from them anent ther sending of men, or monyes to hyre men, to work at the trinch;—As als ordains to wryte to the rest of the Presbitries for ther deficiencie, and to report diligence.

25th April.—The said day ordains the thesaurer to pay to Daniell Brown, Chyrurgiane, twelf punds money, for the helping and curing of certane poore sojurs hurt at Kilsyth, at command of the lait Magistrats.

9th May.—*Wark at the Trinches.*—The said day ordains the hail inhabitants of this burghe to come out ilk Mononday of the weik to the works, and to begin on Mononday nixt, and ilk Mr. of familieis to provyd materialls necessar for thair servants thairin, and these who comes not out, bot neglects the same, sall be countit disaffectit to the caus in hand, and punishit be the Sub-Governour, according to the will of the Magistrats: And ordains publication to be maid heirof be touck of drum; and for this end, quhill the work be finischt, ordains the exerceisses, quhilk was usit to be on the Mononday, to be changit to Weddingsday, and ane note heirof sent to ilk Minister to mack publicatioun thairof

out of the pulpit, and to exhort the people to the work, and to be present thameselves.

23d May.—The said day Thomas Allane is nominat and electit to repaire to Dumbartane, and thair to agrie with thame anent the bargaine of tobacco brought in be strangers, for the behuif of baith the brughes.

6th June, 1646.—The said day it is ordaint ane compt be sought of the moneye gathered for the outreick of these men went to St. Johnston.

The said day Rot. Hamiltoun is chosine to Lanerk, anent the outreick sent to St. Jonston, and report diligence.

24th July.—The said day the Provest is maid choyce of to go to Edinburghe anent the summonsd given to the touns people for compliyence with the enemie, to supplicat that they may be examinat heire.

1st Aug.—The said day ordains the thesaurer to give David Logan tuentie-four pund, for dressing of muskats to the regiment, for quhilk these presents sall be his warrand.

8th Aug.—The said day ordains that the Magistrats tack up ane list of the hail horses in the toune, and caus ane competent number of thame serve weiklie at the trinche, for quhilk service the people, awners of the horses, are to be frie of watching and service at the trinche.

5th Sept.—The said day ordains the thesaurer to give Mirriane Gilhagie twa hundreth pundis whairwith to buy ane hundreth and four picks to be laid up in the long magasein, and he to report his diligence the nixt meitting.

12th Sept.—The said day, anent Jon Cant, Musician, it is inactit, concludit, and agriet, that the Provest, Baylzies, and thair successors in office, sall pay to him zeirlie, for the space of fyve zeirs, efter Witsunday last, quhilk was his entrie, for to raise the psalmes in the Hie Kirk on the Saboth, and in the Blackfreirs at

Johne Walkinshaw to the Blackfreir Kirk, and Thomas Pollok to the New Kirk, to collect the morne efternoone for the poor Hielanders.

5th Dec.—The said day ordains ane warrand to be given to the thesaurer for the soume of thrie scoir punds monye, debursit be him in smallis to the Hielanders, when they war put aff the toune.

6th Sept.—The said day the Magistratis and Counsell allowis the call givine, be the Commoune Sessioune, to Mr. James Durhame, to be one of the Ordinar Ministers of this borough, and promeisid heirty to concur with thame therintill.

13th Sept.—The said day the electing and chooseing of George Porterfield and James Hameltoune be the Sessioune, to goe and give ane call to Mr. James Durhame, was approve.

6th Dec.—When it is condiscendit that Mr. David Diksones land and rent within the toune, be fred of all publict burdeings, bygane or to come, durezza his awin lyfytyme, and that in consideratioune of the gud service done be the said Mr. David to the toune.

10th Jan., and 24th Jan., 1652.—Supplication given to the Counsell by the Buikbinders. (No particulars stated).

13th March.—Two hundrethe pundis given to Mr. Hew Binning, in compt of his stipend the yeir 1651.

22d June.—The same day, forsameikle as it hes pleased God to raise on Thrusday last was the 17th of this instant, ane suddent fyre, in the hous of Mr. James Hamiltoune, above the Crose, quhilk hes consumed that close—the haille close—on both sydes, belonging to Wm. Stewart, Thomas Norvell, and ithers; with the haille landis nixt adjacent therto, quhilk belongit to umqll. Peter Jonstoun and Patrik Maxwell, baith bak and foire; and the haille tenement, bak and foir, on the south syde of the said umqll. Patrick Maxwellis tenement, betwixt that and the lands occupyet be Jon Bryssoune and siklyk; the haille houssis, bak and foir, upon bothe sydis of the Saltmercat; with the houssis on the west syde of Wm. Lawsounis close in Gallowgait; and the houssis on the west syde of Gilbert Merschellis close; with divers housses on the north syde of the Briggait,—Wherby, efter compt, it is fund that there will be neir fourscoir closes all burnt, estimat to about ane thousand families, so that, unles spidie remedie be vseit, and help sought out fra such as hes power, and whois harte God sall move, it is lyklyte the toune sall come to outer ruine; and, therefore, they have concludit and appoynted that the Proveist, with Johne Bell, to ryde to Air to the Inglish officers there, quha hes bein heir, and seen the townis lamentable condition—such as Collonell Overton, and others, and to obtaine from them lettres of recommendatioun to suche officers or judges who sits in Edin-

burgh, to the effect that the same may be recommendit be them to the Parliament of England, that all helpe and supplie may be gotten therby that may be for supplie of such as hes thair landis and guidis burnt.

6th Aug.—The Provost and two others to meit with Mr. Patrik Gillespie, Mr. James Durhame, and Mr. Johne Carstairs, anent the filling of Mr. Patrick Gillespies place in the Hie Kirk.—[See also 22d Oct.]

13th Aug.—The same persons to meit with the Principall of the Colledge, anent the moneys awine be the toune to the Colledge, and anent the mater betwixt the toune and the executores of the deceisit Mr. Zacharias Boyd.—[See also 17th Sept., 1653; 17th, 24th, and last of Dec., 1653; 10th Feb., 1654; also, 5th Aug., 1654.]

30th Dec.—The said day appoynts Mr. Archibald Grahame, ypothecar, to be admitted burges and Gild brother without payment of any fynes, and the benefite thair of is to redound to his bearnes, with this provision, that he visie the seik poore of the towne, and help them in all things relateing to his calling, they paying for the medicaments.

The said day ordains the townes herring to be provydit, and sent to the Advocats, to wit, to Sir Johne and Mr. Andro Gilones, Mr. Jon. Nisbet, Mr. Arch. Fleming, and Johne Nicoll.

17th Feb.—*Prenticss Enterand Gild Brether*.—The said day the foirsaidis Magistrates and Councill taking to their consideratioune the great hurt, damage, and prejudice susteinitt be the haill merchand rank within this cite, throw admitting these to be Gild brether quha obtains thair burgesschip be right of thair prenticsschip, at so easie ane rate as hes bein observeit heirtfore, Quhairas, all these being in ane manner strangeris, ought naiewayis to be respectit, or come in competiounne with burgess barnes borne and broght up within the towne, For remeidng quairof, and for the better stirring up and moveing all suche of that qualitie to marje Gild brethers dochters, quihll will be to these parents ane great comfort and ease, as is expressit in the Lettre of Gildrie, It is, thairfor, heirby enactit, statute, and ordanit, that nae manner of persone, either merchand or craftisman, wha sall obtin his burgesschip be right of his prenticsschip in tyme comeing, shall not be admittit Gild brother within this burghe be vertew thairof, unless he serve his master, or other friemen, four full yeris efter he is past burges be right foirsaid, And

that without any gaine or profite to be made to himselfe, bot to his master allanerly, unless he pay to the hospitall of his calling the sowme of ane hundreth merks Scots money, and this is no wayis to be extendit to burgess and Gild brether barnis, nor to those wha maryes the dochters of burgess and Gild brether.

Carteris.—The said day the aforesaid Magistrats and Councill, takeing to thair consideratioune the great and exorbitant pryces takine be the kairters within this brughe, serveing about the water of Clyd, and they being most willing to remeid the samyne, also weel for inhabitants as strangers, have thairfor hereby inactit, statut, and ordanit, That nae kairter, vseing that tread for the present, or wha sall vse the samyne heirefter, sall presume or tak upon hand to tak any mor pryces for thair draughts nor is heirefter expressit, to wit, for everie drauch from the Broomelaw to the Stokwell, Briggait, and Wynes, one schilling four pennies. *Item*, from the Bromielaw to the Trongait, Gallowgait, and Salt Mercat, two schillings. *Item*, from the Bromielaw to any part betwixt the Cross and the Colledge, two schillings aught pennies; and from the Bromielaw to above the Colledge, to the Wyne heid, and fardest place in the towne, four schillings. *Item*, for ilk draucht from the Wyne-hill to the Cross, four schillings; and frae Kelvene Pott, sex schillings;— And from these pairts respectivelie to any pairts above the Cross, ane schilling Scots farder: And quhaever does in the contrairie heirop, be exacting mair for thair draughts nor as above specifit, They are to be punished in their persone and gudis, according to the will of the Magistrats and Councill, and dischargit from of the libertie to leid with ane kairt in all tyme heirefter, and ordains thir presents to be intimat throw the towne be touk of drume.

24th Merche.—Coill Heuche.—The said day, forsameikle as ane motioun being maid be Patrik Bryce, weivar, and James Andersoune in Gorballis, for the winning agane of the muir henghe thair, And the saids Magistratis and Councill being

most willing to entertein the same for the guid of this citee and hail inhabitants thair of, Hes condiscendit and aggreit to deburse for advancement of the said work twa thousand merkis Scots, and to draw vpe ane contract with the saidis persounes, in this maner :—The saids Patrik Bryce and James Andersoune ar to be obleist to keipe the work on futt threttein yeirs, and to have the first yeir frie, but payment of any dewtie, and to pay in yeirlie to the towne for ilk yeir thairefter, sax hundrethe merkis, and at nae tyme to exceid four schillings for the pryce of the hutche of coals, and to mak the hutche of the quantitie of nyne gallowns, and they ar to be bund onlie for aucht hewaris, and ar to employ nae mae; and the foirsaid twa thowsand merks is to be payit at these terms, the equall half thair of at the beginning of the work, and the vther equall half thair of at Lambes nixt.

24th March, 1655.—The said day ordains the Measter of Work, with all diligence, to cause repair that pairt of the tolboothe, that was last brokine be the thiefes, with ane grait of iron.

31st March.—*Suckine Perpetuall.*—The said day, forsameikill as it was remonstrat and shawine be bill given in befor the saids Magistratis and Councell, at the instance of the Procurator Fiscall, That in anno 1608, the said brughe for the tyme being in great burdeings of debtt, and sundrie overtours being maid for reliefe thair of, for the tyme, nane was fund so valeid for releiveing the said debtt and advancement of the commoune guid then to suckine and thirill the hail inhabitants to the towne mylnes, according to the guid example of all vthir weill governed borrowis, Quhilk, throw the blessing of God, was concludit vpon and aggreit vnto be the hail Magistrats and Councell for the tyme, with consent of the hail merchands and craftis vnanimously according thairto, and that for the spaice of ten yeirs;—Lykas, in anno 1615, these worthie men, Magistrats and Councell for the tyme, they weell weying the guid thair of, with consent of the hail Deakins of craftis, did then

statute, inact, and ordain, and subscribe with their handis, that the haill burgess and inhabitants of this burgh should be thirled and suckinet to the townes awn mylne perpetuallie in all tyme thairefter; And for the better keeping and observeing thair of, they did ordain the Dein of Gild for the tyme, and all vther succedand Dein of Gilds, should tak the aithe of everie burges at thair enterie, that they should keep the samyne inviolatlie, and quhilk aithe has beine administrat and takine accordinglie, whairby the towne, be the blessing of God, hes beine enabled to repair thair kirks, brigs, build thair tolbooth, commoune caseys, paying thair ministers stipends, and many mae commoune works, to the great guid comodatioune and decorment of the citie; And now, of late, sundrie persones within this burgh, and these of guid quallitie, wha reapes the greatest benefite thairin, and should prove guid example to vthers, does sindrie things contrair to all these laudable actes sett doune for defence of the said suckine, not only in causing to brew malt in thair houssis not grond at the towne mylne, but also of lait be bringeing in of barrells of aill out of the countrey for giveing thair famileis, quhilk, gif thes and the lyk be sufferit, will not fail to breck the said suckine, quhilk the saids Magistrats and Councill, and their worthie predecessors, hes settled with so great paynes, to the great guid of the said haill citie and inhabitants thair of: And the foirsaid Magistrats and Councill, takeing that so wegthie a mater to thair wyse consideratioune, and knowing the haill particulars contenit in the said bill to be trew, for remeiding quhair of, they doe vnanimouslie heirby ratifie, allow, and approve the haill actis, statutes, and ordinances, sett doune of befor be them and thair worthie predecessors, for setting the said suckine and thirlidge of the haill inhabitants to the saidis towne mylne, and ordains the samyne to have the full force and strenthe, in all tyme coming: And does heirby faithfullie promeis to abyde thairat themselves, and to mentein and defend the samyne to thair outer-

most; and hes dischargit, and does heirby discharge, the inbringing of any barrells or any vthir veschells out of the countrey to this brughe; and for the wrang that the said Coline Campbell hes done thairintill alreadie, he being removet from the table, they unlawit him in fourtie pundis, quhairof he is to get bak aught, for some malt he grund at the saidis mylnes, and payit the dewis theirof, and ordains the Bailleis to be comptable for the vnlaw to the Councell this day aught dayis.

The said day that place as Bibliothecar in the Colledge, foundit by Mr. Thomas Hutchisoune, quhilk was last Councell day granted to Mr. Robert Hoggiszard, sone to Mr. Hoggiszard, tanner, in this day declarit vacand, and that presentatione to be halden as null and of nane effect, because efter tryell taken, many and sundrie of the Councell, quha was thair present at thair downe sitting, was removit, and went away befor that mater came in voyceing.

5th May.—Redding of the Gutter at the West Port.—The said day, it being maid knowne to the saidis Magistratis and Councell that the great abundance of red layed without the west port,* had fallen in the gutter and stoppit the current of the water, so that sundrie people on the northe syde of the Trongait were forcit to mak brige stones for entrie to thair houssis, The foirsaidis Magistratis and Councell, thairfoir, does heirby inact statute, and ordaine that thair be no more red laid downe in that pairt heireftir,—as also that everie heritor or tennant wha has either Kill or Borne on the north syd of the gait thair, betwixt the west gavill of Hutchisones Hospital* and the Kow lone* mouthe, be chairget at all occasiones to red the passadge of the water thair foiranent themselvis, and that vnder the payne of

* The "West Port" then stood immediately to the west of the foot of the present Glassford Street,—and Hutcheson's Hospital occupied the foot of the present Hutcheson Street. The Cow Loan is now Queen Street.

fyve pundis, and to be poindit be the officer thairfor, how oft and swa oft as they shall contravin.

The said day ordains the thesaurer to pay to the weemen quha dichts the Tolbooth, thair beltane pension, quhilk is four dolloars.

9th June.—The said day appoyntis Charles Glen to get ane tryell of the skellet bell for aught dayes.

23d June.—The same day ordaines William Patersoune, maltman, to get the twentye pundis that Mr. William Wilkye sould pay for his wyfe buriall in the Hie Kirk, to help to buy him ane kart and hors.

30th June.—The said day Henrie Gardiner, merchand, compeirit, and made offer to the towne of nyne butts of canarye seck, for twentie-sax pundis sterling the butt; and because the towne lyked not the pryce, they grantit him libertye to sell it to whom he pleisit, he not selling it cheaper than he offered it to the towne, and giving something to the poore: As also James Hamiltoun, Deane of Gild, made offer of fourtein or fyftein tunnes of French wyne, for threttie pundis sterling the tunne; and because the towne could mak no guid vse thairof, they grantit him libertye to sell the samyne the best way he can.

28th July.—The said day, notwithstanding the towne payed of befor to the Colledge twa thousand merks for the help of the fabrik thairof, yett, for the love and respect they have to the flourishing estait of the samyne, It is aggreit and condiscendit to be thame to bestow farder therin sax hundrethe pundis, and ordains John Andersoune to deburse the samyne out of the first end of the moneys he receaves from the collectors of the mylnes.

27th Oct.—The said it is concludit that the officers get clothis, and the Deane of Gild, with Thomas Allane, to wail the cloth

10th Nov.—The said day appoynts the Magistratis to putt the wyfe of vmquill. Patrick Wryt off the towne, because it is alledgit schoe ludges all vagabonds and strangers that comes to hir hous, contrair the proclamatiounes emitit thairanent.

24th Nov.—The said day it is condiscendit that James Colquhoun sall have fyve hundrethe markis Scots money, for the hewing, forming, and putting up of Mr. Thomas Hutchesouns portraiture in the Hospitall, and he hes vndertaken to accomplish the samein with all diligence.

22^d March, 1656.—The day foirsaid the thesaurer to have ane warrant for the sowme of ten pund starling, quhilk was debursit in Edinbro to ane friend for dooing the towne ane guid turne.

1st April.—*Baxteris*.—The same day the foirsaidis Provest, Bailleis, and Counsell, taking to thair consideratioune how that oft heirtofore they have admonished the baxters of this burgh to baik guid and sufficient breid heir as as is done elswer in weill governed cities, and that they wald never amend to the great discredit of this brughe, and seing thair are twa honest men baxters come from Edinburghe, and hes offerit their service to the towne, wndertackes to baik als sufficient wheat breid heir as is baikin in Edinburghe, It is, thairfoir, unanimously condischendit upone and aggreit be the saidis Provest, Bailleis, and Councell, that the mater be brought to sume guid perfectioun, and for that effect, appoynts Baillie Walkinschaw, James Bell, the Dean of Gild, and Dekin Conveinar, to settill with thoes men the best commodious way they can for the townes credit, and to report.

The said day ordains the hail officers to provyd thair halbertis, and to wear the samyne at all occasiounes, and not to be sein walking on the streit without them, vnder the paine of deposing all sutche who contraveines, from thair office.

19th April.—*Redding of the Calzis*.—The said day the foirsaidis Magistratis and Councell, takeing to thair consideratioune that the Judgis is to be heir at the Sircueit Court, and seing necessar it is that the streits be red and maid clein of all midings and the lyk. The persounes thairfor war maid choyse of to have the cair of everie streit for the cleinging thairof, and does heirby commit to thame the

full power, according as the Magistratis have ather to poynd or to ward all maner of persouns quha refussis to obey them thairintill, anent thair removeing of thair midings of fulzie or the lyk of the streits, or in reding or cleinging the meikill gutter at the Wast Port, To wit, for the Trongait, Patrick Park, George Broome ; for the Gallowgait, James Pollok, Andro Conynghame ; for the Salt Mercate, Thomas Scott and James Duncane ; for the Briggate and Stockwall, the Deane of Gild, Johne Millar, tailzour, Andro Mudie ; for that bounds above the Crosse to the Blackfreir Kirk, Thomas Allane, John Hail ; and from that to the Wyneheid and thairabout, Robert Hamiltoune and Walter Neilsoun.

The said day, seeing the morne is appoyntit for collecting ane contributioun for supple of thais wha sufferit by fyre in Edinburge, in October and November, 1654, Appoyntis Baillie Anderson and the Deane of Gild to attend the Laign Kirk, Baillie Walkingschaw and Robert Hamiltoune the Blackfreir Kirk, Baillie Neilsoun, the Dekin Conveinar, Patrick Park, and Johne Hail, the twa Hie Kirks.

24th May.—The said day appoyntis the townes dennar on the first Tysday of June next, to be made reddie in Thomas Glenis hous, and the Dein of Gild to have ane cair thairof, and of thais quha sould be invited thairto.

16th Aug.—The said day ordains James Barnis to pay to James Colquhoune the sowme of three hundrethe merkis money, in compleit payment to him for the making and vpputting of the portraitour of umqll. Mr. Thomas Hutchesoune.

[There follows here a long act in favour of the *Cherurgeons and Barbours*, appointing them to elect a deacon or visitour, and stating the conditions on which they were to exercise their calling.]

23^d Aug.—The said day ordains Baillie Walkingschawe and Dekin Conveinar to meit with James Colquhoune, and to grie with

him anent the making of the ingyne for castying of watter on land that is in fyre, as they have in Edinburghe, and appoyntes thais moneys collectit for the bucketts, to be employed for payment thairof, and appoyntes the theasurer to pay to James Colquhoune twenty thrie pundis fourtein schillinges for his chairges the last tyme he went to Edinburghe to see the said ingyne.

1st Nov.—The said day ordains ane lettre to be writt and direct to Andersoune, printar in Edinburghe, to signifye to him in the townes name, that give he be willing to cum and mak his residence within this brughe, and exerceis his calling thairintill, that the towne will be willing to pay him zeirlie, dureing his lyftyme or abode, the soume of ane hundrethe markis Scottis money, that they wont of old to pay to his deceist fader.

26th Sept.—The same day ordainis ane bauck to be sent throw the towne with touck of drume, to charge all maner of persouns to pay thair locallitie thankfullie, without any troubling of the Magistratis thairfor, or these to certifie them to pay the double thairof.

29th Sept.—The said day the Provest productit ane letter direct from his Highnes the Lord Protector, quhairby his Hienes desyres the electione of the Magistratis of this burgh be deferred untill he sall be mor fullie informed in that particular.

The said day, in respect thair was no electioun of Magistratis and Counsall made at Michalmes last, and so no aithe tackine as aught to be, thairfor the fairsaids hail Provost, Bailles, and Counsall present, gave thair great oathis to give thair best counsall in everie thing for the townis good, and to keip counsall, and to reveill nothing spokine of or concludit vpon at the Counsall table.

23^d Jan.—The said day appoynts the Dekin Conveinar to caus cutt ane trie at the burnesyd of the craigis, for mending of the townes wack mylne.

13th Feb.—The said day appoynts ane dyall to be sett up and fixit at the brige, and James Campbell to have ane cair to sie the samyn done, and that in the most fitest and commodious place.

20th Feb.—The said day appoynts the Bailles to discharge the womane that hes tackine vpe ane schole in the heid of the Salt Marcatt at hir awin hande.

27th Feb.—The same day compeirit Major Henrie Dornie, and productit ane act sett doune be the Counsall of Stait, for removeing and away tacking the stope was putt to the electioun of the Magistratis of this brughe, and appoynting ane new electioun to be maid, daitit the twentie-four of this instant, togither with ane lettre direct fra the said Counsall of Stait to the Provost, Bailles and Counsall of this brughe, for that effect, quha for giveing obedeance thairto, ordains the said electioun to be made on Tyisday nixt, and the Counsall to be choysine on Friday thairefter, the Deane of Gild, Dekin Conveinar, and vthir members on Wandisday thairefter, conforme to old vse and wont.

13th March.—The same day appoynts Bailleis Walkinshaw and Neilsoune, the Deane of Gild, and James Pollok, to repair to Edinburghe for defence of the townes liberties now agitating befor the Counsall of Stait, and for giveing obedience to the citationne given out thairant, and the Clark to see ane commissioun subscrivit to them accordingle, beiring expresslie that they sall not medle with any capitulationne whatsomever quhilk in any wayes in the leist may infringe the townes liberties in its freedome of electione of the Magistratis and Counsall thairof, and wthirs office beirers thereintill.

The same day ordains the Clark to wryt ane lettre to the Lord Cochrane by way of excuis for refusing of the Duik of Lenox Commissionar his nominatioune of the present Provest, and commissioun productit for that effect, and Baillie Walkinshaw and Mr. Archibald Grahame to ryd to his Lordship with the said letter.

8th April.—The said day the foirsaidis Magistratis and Counsall being conveyned to consider the great ryott committed be the towne of Dumbartoun, the agenting thairof is recommendit to the Provest, the thrie Bailleis, the Deane of Gild, with Johne Bell, Thomas Allan, and Fradrik Hamiltoune, and ony sex of them to be quorum, and heirby commissionates them to use all meanes that may tend for the good of the burghe and credit thairof in all maters relateing thairto, and to mak report to the Couunsall therant ilk weik.

16th Aprill.—The same day Johne Graham is commissionat to goe to Dumbarton, and ther, in the townes name, joyn with the

Magistratis of Dumbartane, for electing of ane third persone for collecting of the dewes of fra schippes arryving in Clyd, conforme to the Counsall Estaites ordour set doune theranent, and to requyre from the Magistratis and Counsall of Dumbartane restitutione of the haill saills, amunitioune, missoures, armes, guid and geir, quhich the people of Dumbartane took out of the schippes belonging to this brughe ; And also to requyre them to sett Robert Bogle, burges of the said brughe, frie out of prisoune, conforme to the said Counsalls of Staites ordoures.

22d May.—The said day ordains the thesaurer to have ane warrand for the soume of thrie scoir pundis, debursit be him to William Breaddie, for his bygane service by ane, besyd fyftein pundis schillings hes lying in his hand of ane vthir compt, and for vthir thrie scoir pundis debursit be him to Robert Mair-schell, for his bygane service anent Dumbartanes mater, and ordainis the thesaurer to pay to the mane that did cut out the townes airmes in paper, on ane brode, quhilk is now in the heigh hall, twelf dollours, extending to xxxiiij^{lib}. xvi^s.

9th June.—The same day it is thought convenient that the Magistratis sall settle with Williame Lightbodie and John Williamsone, warkmen, to putt the sturdie beggaris, and vtherie the lyk, aff the towne, and to punisch delinquentis, by putting them on the cock-stool, or vthir wayes, as the Magistratie sall appoynt, and appoynt, and ordainis the clark to subscrieve to them such instructiounes as the Magistratis sall sett down theranent, and the towne to pay to ilk ane of them monethlie threttie schillings Scotis.

Followis the instructiounes given to the saidis Williame Lightbodie and Johne Williamsone :—

First. They sall suffer no strange beggers to beg, bot to pass throw the towne, and sie that they goe closs out.

2. They sall suffer no towne beggers quha receaves contributioune, to goe to door to door to bege.

3. They sall tack notiss of all vagaboundis quha hes no calling, and sarch out the way of thair living, and if they be any wayes suspected, to inform the Magistratis thair of.

4. They sall attend everie day about the Cross, but specially at the sitting of Justice Courtes, for executeing ther decreits against blasphemers, railers, cursers, and other vicious livers.

And quhat persoune in towne sall wrang or abus the said Williame Lightbodie and Johne Williamsoune, for executeing of the premiss, sall be condignelie and severlie punished be sight of the Magistratis.

18th Sept.—*No Cartis on the Brig.*—The same day the customer of the brig is ordained not to suffer any cairtis with wheilleis goe alongst the brig, vntill that the wheilleis be takin off, and the boddie of the cairt alone harled by the hors.

26th Feb., 1659.—*Bauk anent the Soldaris.*—The said day ordaines ane bauk to be sent throw the towne, to discharge all maner of persoues from vtring rude or incivil speaches to the sojors, wnder the paine of most severe punishment, according to the qualitie of the offence and offender; As also that no persoune be fund vaigand on the streits after the taptow be struckin.

23d April.—The same day Johne Hall being knocking at the Counsallhous doore desyring to have entrie, and it being granted that he sould com in his alon, and speak quhat he pleased, Because, he was not permittit to come in with ane multitud at his back, he refused to com in, but protestit at the door.

9th July.—The same day ordainis ane bauk to be sent throw the towne be touk of drume, to command all maner of persoues to receave the Commounwealthes coyne, without ony exceptioun, the samyn being fand sufficient silver and weight.

1st Oct.—The said day, in answer to the supplicatioun given in be Robt. Marshall, pyntor, showing that he hes skill in washing

and pynting of houss, and given proof therof in sundrie places within this brughe, and seeing that ther is but on (e) the lyk within the samyn brughe, and not ane vthir in all the Wast of Scotland desyring therfoir license to practise and occupy the samyn peaceable heirefter, within the said brughe (that occupatioun being rather ane science nor ane craft) quhilk being weighed and considered be the said Provest, Bailleis, and Counsall ; They, after consideratioun had theranent, doe heirby grant licence and libertie to the said Rot. Marschell to wash and pynt houss to any within this burgh or territorie thair of, who pleases to imploy him for that effect, without ony impediment to be made be him thairintill.

8th Nov.—The same day ordaines ane bauk to be sent throw the toune with touk of drum, dischargeing all maner of persounes to sett houss to straingers vntill first they win and acquaint the Magistratis, and that vnder the paine of ten pundis how oft and swa oft as they sall contravein, and ordaines the Magistratis to sie this put to executioun.

22d Nov.—The said day ordaines the thesaurer to have ane warrand for the sowme of threttie pundis, debursit be him to Charles M'Lane for his extraordinarie paines in attending the tolbuith this long time bygane, having had no employment but keiping of some lounes wer wardit thairintill.

Croce to be takin downe and removed.—The same day the said Magistratis and Counsall haveing receavit warrand and ordours for downe takeing of the guard hous was buildit about and wpon the Croce, and in regaird the samyne Mercat Croce throw the building of the said guard house thairupon, was altogether defaced, It is therfor now concludid to remove the samyne with all convenient diligence, and mak it equall with the grund, and to lay the timber and staines of the said guard hous apairt thameselfes, conforme to the tenor of the said ordour.

3d Dec.—*Watch.*—The same day, for preventing of the great hurt

and damage in the futur, quhairof sundrie inhabitants hes fand the smart heirtfoir throw the breking of their houssis and buithes be thiefes. It is therfor heirby statute and ordained that ane watch be keipit nightly heirefter, during the Counsalls will, to be set ilk night be the Bailleis in dew tyme vicissim, to consist of sik ane convenient number as they sall think meit; And ordains ane bauk to be sent throw the towne be touk of drum to command everie persone to com out, or ane sufficient man for that effect, according as he sall be warned therto, and that vnder the paine of xxxs. Scotis, ilk time they contravein vnforgivene.

To Calsay where the Croce stood.—The same day appoynts and ordaines that pairt of the streit where the Croce did stand of befor, to be calsayed in ane most comly and decent maner, and that by the sight and advyce of James Colquhoun, Baillie, as he sall think it most fitting to bedone with the best conveniency.

10th Dec.—Fruitmen and Saltwyfes.—The same day, after reading of the supplicatioune given in be theis who of old keipit craimes * at the Croce, and wer ordained in tyme coming to keep at thair awn houssis, Their is this day libertie grantit to thame to keipe thair craimes on the marcat day in the Tron-gait bewast wher the cordoners stands, but to keipe at thair awn housis the rest of the weik, and to keipe within the guittar; and recommends to the Baillies to sie the weemen and wyfes who sells salt on the Hie Streit, to stand beneth Dowhills foirzett.

31st Dec.—The said day, in answer to the desyre maid be Mr. Gillespie, craving payment of the vacane stipend to the Colledge that is awand since the decease of Mr. James Durhame, and lofting of the wtter Hie Kirk, It is resolvit be the foirsaidis hail Magistrats and Counsall that they will give no answer therto, nor what concerns the Colledge, vntill they gett satisfacioune anent

the Bibliothecar now placed be the said Mr. Gillespie in the Colledge.

The same day ordains the thesaurer to have ane warrand for the soume of twentie pundis, debursit be him to ane distressed gentleman, and for ane hundreth twentie six pundis debursit for the townes herring.

7th Jan., 1660.—The same day Hendric Glen, Maister of Hutchesones Hospitall, is warrandit heirby to wrytt to Pearth for ane plaisterer there to com heir for plastering of the said Hospitall.

21st Jan.—The said day the Deane of Gild and Deacon Conveinar maid report that they had sightit the townes foott mantle, conforme to the ordour, Thairefter it is concludit that the samyne should ly still with Jon. Millar, tailzeour, where it now is, and ordains the Mr. of Wark to caus mak ane meikle buist or litle kist for keiping therof, be sight and advyce of the said Deane of Gild.

4th Feb.—The said day the Deane of Gild maid report that he and the Deacon Conveinar, conforme to the Counsalls ordours, had maid search and tryell of the worth of the old mylne of Partick to the towne, in respect of the great dewtie the towne payis thairfor zeirlie, and having tryed almost the haill former taksmen of the mylnes. they find that the haill malt broune in Partick and Govane is scars worth ane furlott moulter per weik, but that the said mylne was werie stedable to the towne in tyme of ane drouth and frost: As also they maid report that the weavers wer willing to tak the hous of manufactorie for seavine years for thrie scoir pundis per annum, And that the Litsters wer willing to tak the walk mylne for ane hundreth pundis Scots per annum the said space, and they to be bund to keep it the said space of seavin yeares, but the towne to be frie to remove them at ony tyme they intend to mak ane vthir use they pleas of the said mylne.

The said day, in answer to the desyre given in be Mr. Patrick Gillespie anent ane saitt to the Colledge in the Uter Hie Kirk, It

* This Mr. Patrick Gillespie was in very bad odour with the Magistracy. He, a short time since, had obtained a gift of the place of the High Church, and seems to have inquired rather too closely into the Burgh politics, as it was through his influence, and that of his party, that the freedom of electione, and the laws and conversation of the Magistrates of the guid toune, were so strictly inquired into, as cost the town much in raids to Edinburgh to attend the Council of State, and brought an interim order from the Protector suspending the election of Magistrates.—Matters seem to have gone farther after this; for, on 2d October, 1660, there is mention made of a warrand, for which the town "had delt with the Committee of Estaits," for the expenses the town had debursit in *apprehending* of Mr. Patrick Gillespie and Mr. Simpson.

The same day report maid be the Deane of Gild and Deacon Conveinar anent the libertie grantit be them to Johne Bomanno, for out-putting of ane stair on the eist syd of his candle hous, was allowit and approvine; And it is rememberit that the said Johne hes payit thairfoir fyftine pund, quhilk is to be employit vpon ane calsay, to be built or layd betwixt the Gramer Schole Wynd and the heid of the townes rigs, whervpone the candle hous ar buildit, and it is concludit that non geat libertie to put out the lyk stairs there until they give full satisfiounne to the towne therfoir.

19th March.—*Bauk anent the Doyts.*—The said day the Counsall being informed that the towne and cuntry is lyke to be abused be the frequent inbringing and passing of French doys, quhilks ar already discharged be the laws of the nationne, ordaines therfor ane bauk to be sent throw the towne with touk of drum, for inhibiting and discharging of all personis quhatsumever from

inbringing and passing of all sort of such bais capper coyne but such as is allowed be the lawes of the natioune, and coyned within the samyne, and that wnder the paines contained in the lawes and actis sett downe theranent, and that they sall be halden and bund to mak up all skaith and loss any people quhatsumever sall susteane throw their defaults.

The same day the Provest maid report anent his last diligence in Edinburgh with Generall Major Morgane, and productit ane lettre direct to the towne, for furnishing of coall and candle to the Guards, and ordains his and James Hamiltons charges, wha was with him, to be payit.

Young's relict.—The same day the desyre made be the relict of the deceast Mr. George Young, Minister, with hir waik and sad condition, was recommendit be the hail Councill and Provest and Baillies, and therafter it was concludit be thame all that the sowme awand be Johne Thomsone restand of excys money be his band, sall be bestowed wpone hir, and appoynts the Provest and Baillies to sie the samyne made effectual to hir.

26th March.—The said day recommends to the Magistratis to mak choys of some to goe to Hamiltoun to end compts with the Ladie Dutches anent the tynd tak dewtie of Cambusnethan, conforme to the last report maid theranent.

30th April.—*Letter to Argyll.*—The said day ordaines the Clark to wrytt ane lettre to Argyll, in name of the saids Magistrats and Councell, shewing his Lordship that seeing he is awand them above seavine yeares annual rent of twentie fyve thowsand marks, and that his commissioners ar only willing to pay ane year thairof, and desyres not only ane discharge of that year, but ane continowatioune of the princippall sowme, quhilk was never at no tyme of befor requyrit, That they could not with ane saiff conscience grant the same, but wer willing to accept of ane yeares annual rent, and give ane discharge accordinglie, and withal, to show his

Lordship that if *lawes wer patent*, they wer bund in conscience to seik in these sowmes, with the bygoune annual rents, for the weill of their ministers and poor, for whois guid this said sowmes are mortified.

Anent Address to his Majestie.—The same day it was vnanimously concludit and agried vpon, That ane address and applicatioune should be made to the KINGS Most Excellent Majestie, in name of this burghe, and the Provest haveing red some instructiounes alreddie scrolled and drawn up be him, they wer all allowed and approvine in Counsall, and what letters and vthir papers quhatsumever, ar to be drawne up thairanent; As also the electioun of the persones who sal mak the Address, in the townes name to his MAJESTIE, is all referrit to the Provest himselve, and he is appoyntit to be soll actour thairintill; and quhatever papers ar sent up, the clark is to have ane double thairof, to keip for the townes vse; and ordainis Johne Walkinshaw to pay out of the monyes he receaves fra the collectours at the mylnes, twentie pundis starling to be employed about that busines, and *to deburs for the exchange thairof in Gold.*

The said day the foresaids Provest, Baillies, and Counsell of the said brughe, being conveyined, and Patrick Bryce, their taksman of their coalheughis in Gorballs haveing informed them that severall tymes, throw scarcetie of water, he cannot gett his coalls loaded

at the Broomelaw; for the quhilk caus he hes bein necessitat to crave licence of the Right Worshipful Sir George Maxwell of Nather Pollok, Knight, to lead his coalls fra the saids heughs, throw the said Sir George, his land, for loading of them neare to Meikle Govane (quhilk is no comoun way): And now the said Sir George refuissis to grant that former licence and libertie, fearing theis who occupyes the saids heughs may claime right thairto heirefter, be verteu of that licence and tollerance, granted be the said Sir George to the fairsaid Patrick: Quhilk being well weighed and considered be the saids Provest, Baillies, and Counsall, They doe heirby declair that what licence and libertie the said Sir George hes formerlie grantit to the said Patrick Bryce, for leading of his coalles throw his lands, as said is, was of his awne frie will and that nather they, their successors, nor their taksmen of their saids heughes in Gorballes, could or should claim any right or privilege heirafter but what the said Sir George wold grant of his awine guid will, as he hes done formerly, if necessity requyre the same.

4th June.—The same day recommends to James Hamiltoun to ryd to Dumbartane, to intimat and show to the Captane of the Castell there the ordour brought home be Baillie Campbell for not stopping of boats comes up the water as formerlie.

The same day recommends to the Deane of Gild and his bretherine to stob this afternoone the wast syd of Johne Andersounes land that is outwith the Gallowgait port narrest the lone, in respect of the compliments made yeirlie thairanent be the land meithers.

5th June.—*Tynd fisch.*—The same day it was concludit not to sett nor roup the tynd fisch as formerlie, in regard of the great discouragement of theis who brings in the killing, in respect ther was takine from them sex of their best killing, in name of tynd, out of everie boat, quhilk is now dischargit to be exactit heirafter;

and dry killing and dry ling, and all small fishes, to be frie of tynd heirafter; but that ilk boat that brings in fresh killing, ling, or skait, pay, in name of tynd, xiii^s. iiij^d. ilk tyme, and the herring and vthirs to pay as of befor, and the Water Baillie to collect the same vntill farder advysment.

16th June.—The same day, in answer to the supplicatioune given in be the Commissioners of the burgh of Crail, craving help for repairing agane of their herbrie that was brokin out throw storme, it is condischendit that ane contributioune be gathered for that effect, and to be brought in with that of Barrowstounes.

18th June.—*Proclamatioune anent the Kings Majesties gratiouse returne.*—The same day, forsuameikle as ther is ane congratulatioune to be keiped this second tyme, for the happie returne of our dread Soverayne, the Kingis Majestie, and restauratioune of his throne and dignitie, Aproves of the proclamatioune drawine vp be the clark for thar effect, for onputting of baill fyres, and vsing the remanent solemnities requisitie in the lyk, and ordainis twa hodgheits of wyne to be provydit for the vse of the sojourns now in towne, and the Deane of Gild, Fredrik Hamiltone, Rot. Rae, and Johne Barnes, to provyde all vthir necessar for the said solemnitie.

13th Aug.—*Mr Kinnie anent the examining of the people in the wast quarter.*—The said day ane desyre being preferit be the Ministers of this burgh to the Magistrats and Counsall thair of, desyryng that ane young man might be maid choys of to examine the people dwelling within this burgh in the wast quarter, and that for the better furthering of the celebratiowne of the Lords Supper, quhilk hes bein now so long a tyme delayed, And that thair may be something payit to the said young man sua to be choysin out of the vacand stipend for his paines; And Mr. Hugh Blair, ane of the ordinar ministers of this burgh, in name of the rest, having presentit ane lytt, conteaning twa persounes, to the said Magistrats and Counsall, to the effect that they might chuse on of them

for the effect abovwryttin, they did mak choys of Mr. Norman M'Kinnie, sone law^{ll}. to Alex. M'Kinnie, merchand burges of this burgh, to examine the people in the said wast quarter, and they will tak his paines into consideratioune.

Corss.—The same day, in answer to the supplicatioune given in be James Corss, Mathematician, shewing that he was borne within this burghe, and educat therintill, and haveing studied the knowledge of the mathematicks, and obtained ane compitent knowledge thairin, and vthir sciences thairto belonging, being naturallie addicted thairto from his infancie, and that he resolves to tak up ane schoole heir, for teaching of theis airtes and sciences in the vulgar native tongue, quhilk hes not bein done formerlie in this kingdome, for want of incuragments therto, and the tyes of birth and educatioune press him to mak the first proposelles therof to this his native towne; the saids Provest, Baillies, and Counsell, therfor haveing weill weighed and considered the said supplicatioune, they heirby grant licence and libertie to the said James Corss to tak up ane schoole within this burghe for teaching of the mathematics therintill, conforme to the tenour of his petitione, and promiss heirby to grant to him their best incuragments for that effect.

20th Sept.—The same day Baillie Pollok made report that he had gottine in from James Porter, the thrie great Bybilles belongs to the Kirks, and that they were now lying in the clarkes chamber, quhilk dilgence of his wes allowed and approvin be the Counsell.

The same day it is condeschendit unto and agried that ther should be payit to Baillie Colquhoune thrie scoir twelwe pundis for the paines and travell takin be him the tyme of the laying the calsay in Briggait, for convoying away of the water in the syvor on the north syd of the said calsay.*

* A goodly sum for such paines and travell; but this was, we think, the same universal genius formerly noticed, and now a Baillie.

The said day there was producit ane act of Burrowes, daitit the fiftine day of this instant, conteaning therin ingrossit ane coppie of ane letter directlt from the Chancellor to the said meeting of Burrowes, anent the electing of the office bearers within ilk burgh, and be quhilk act it is ordained that in the inshewing electioun of Magistrats, Counsellors, and all vthir office bearers within burgh, That no persone or persones who contryved or subscriyvit the Remonstrance or Associatiounes, or concurred in the prosecutionne of any cours for promoteing the ends therof, or protested against any publict Judicatories their determinatioun, or any wtherwayes disaffected to his Majesties government, or indeavoured by factioun or seditioun, to the disturbance of his Majesties peace, or desertit any charge of his Majesties armies without any lawfull warrand, That non such be admittit to any place of Magistracy, Counsell, or any office of Deaconrie within any burgh; and ordaining also the said act to be speedilie communicat to ilk burgh that now pretend ignorance thairof, and ilk burgh to mak thair report, &c. (Lists of all the crafts, &c., ordained to be made, with a view to the intended purgation).

2d Oct.—Election of the Magistrats.—The same day, being the first Tuesday after Michaelmes, and so the ordinarie day for electing of the Magistratis of this burgh, for the year enshewing, ther was producit ane letter direct from the Right Noble the Earle of Glencairne, now High Chancellor of Scotland, wherein his Lordship desyres that, to the effect the towne may show their wonted affectione to his Majesties service, theis Magistratis that wer most vnjustlie thrust from their places in Anno 1648, may be made use of as Magistratis for the year enshewing; and it being votted quhether obedience should be given to the said letter or not, it was condeschendit that obedience should be given thairto: And vnderstanding that Coline Campbell, elder, was then Provest the said year 1648, and that Johne Ander-

sone, elder, umqll. Jas. Trane, and Wm. Neilsoune, war the thrie baillies then with him, and wer all thrust from their charge, The said Magistrats and Counsell did send for the above named Colin Campbell, and shew him the said letter, and their willingnes to give obedience therto, And wnderstanding that the said Johne Andersoune was Provest sensyne, and so could not beir office as ane Baillie for the year enshewing, and that the said James Trane was departed this lyfe, they sent also thrie of their number to the above named Williame Neilsoune, and requyred him to be pleased to come to receave his charge, to wit, to beare office as ane Baillie for the year enshewing, who declared he was now com to ane great age, and was becom so waik and infirme of bodie, that he was no wayes able now for that charge, and intreated earnestlie that he would be excused, quhilk was sufficientlie known to be trew by the saids Magistrats and Counsell; and the said Coline Campbell, elder, being com to the said Magistrats and Counsell, (after sending for him as said is,) declared his loathsomenes to receave the said charge, in respect of his age, zit was persuaded thereto be the earnest request of all theis present; And for their better keeping of common use and ordour observit in the electioun of the Provest, as formerlie, the said Coline was lytit with the rest of the merchand rank, and Johne Bell, now present Provest, being layd asyde as having borne office theis twa yeares bygane, and the said Coline, with the rest of ye merchand rank, being divydit in thrie lyts, to the effect that thrie persones might be choysen out therof to be presentit at ye Castill of Glasgow to the Duk of Lennox, his Grace or his commissioner, to the effect that ane of them might be named to bear office as Provest of ye said burgh for ye year enshewing, out of the qlks thrie lyts theis thrie persones wer choysen, viz., the said Coline Campbell, elder, James Campbell, and James Pollock, merchands, twa of ye last Baillies, and the said lytt being sent up to the said Castill, with James Colquhoun, baillie, Johne

Walkinshaw, Frederick Hamiltoune, and Wm. Zair, commoune clark deput, to have bein presentit to the Duk of Lennox, his Grace or his commissioner, to the effect foresaid, and they having com to the said castill zett, and finding it closit, after thrie knocks given be the said James Colquhoune, and no opening made or answer given nather be the Duk of Lennox nor his commissioner, nor be no uthers in their names, the said James Colquhoun, ane of the present Baillies, for himselfe and in name of ye rest of ye Magistrats and Counsell, askit instruments therupon in the hands of the said Williame Zair, notar public. And therafter the saids persones returned to the Counsell-hous, qr. the remanent of ye saids Magistrats and Counsell were sitting, and after report made be them that nather ye said Duk of Lennox nor his commissioner wer at ye said castill for receiving of ye said lytt to the effect above wryttin, then ye saids Magistrats and Counsell, be vertue of ye power grantit to them be the Act of Parliament (the said thrie persones above-named being removed), did vott qlk of ye samyne thrie persones should beir office as provest for the yeir enshewing. And therafter, be pluralitie of votts, the said Coline Campbell, elder, was choysen to be Provest of this Burgh for ye year enshewing, who being present did accept, and gave his oath as use is. And then the said new electit Provest, and Johne Bell, last Provest, and his thrie Baillies (all the rest of ye Counsell being removed from the table), did set doune ye lyts of the haill merchand rank, to the effect two of that number might be choysen out to bear office as twa of the thrie baillies of this Burgh for the year coming, and they who wer to be votted being divydit in sex lyts, viz. in twa thries and four twas, their was choysen ane persone out of ilk lyt to mak up the number of six persones—and after voyceing theis six, viz. John Walkinshaw, James Barnes, Johne Barnes, Hendrie Glen, Coline Campbell, and Williame Cumyng, wer choysen. And againe theis same sex persones being divydit by

lyts in twa thries, for choyseing ane persone out of ilk thrie, be pluralitie of vots the saids Johne Walkinshaw and James Barnes wer electit out of the saids twa lyts to beir office as twa of the thrie baillies of this Burgh for ane year to come. And then the hail craftismen on Counsell who wer to be lytit being divydit, in maner forsaid, in thrie lyts of thrie fours, for the choysing of thrie persones out of them that ane of them might be choysen as the third baillie of this Burgh, for the year fallowing. After doeing grof and voyceing, as use is, these thrie persones, viz. Johne Ker, Williame Boyd, and Thomas Atchesoune, war electit and choysen out of the sds thrie lyts to the effect forsaid. And they again yrafter being removed, after voyceing be pluralitie of voits, the aforsaid Johne Ker was electit to beir office as the thrid Baillie of this Burgh for ye said year enshewing. And the saids Johne Walkinshaw, James Barnes, and Johne Ker, who wer ye thrie new electit Baillies, being all present, did accept the said charge, and gave their oathes of fidelitie, as use is. *

6th Oct.—The same day recommends to the Provost and Baillies to consider on the supplicatiounes given in be severall of the inhabitants, anent the commodities broght to this burgh from the Hielands be water.

The said day the foresaid Provost, Baillies, and Counsell of the said burgh, being conveyned, and forsuameikle as be act of the Right Honble. the Committee of Estaits, daitit at Edinburghe, the threitein day of September last, the Magistratis of the said burgh of Glasgow are heirby warrandit to call for George Porterfield, sometyme Provost therof, and all uthir persones, heavers of ane contributioun was gathered within the samyne, under the name of charitie for the distressed Protestants in Polland, Bohæmia, and was not given accordingly; and to receive from them the samyne, to be employed for pius vses, as the said burgh should think fitt;

* [This minute of election is here given unabridged.—W.]

And now, seeing the said George has reallie delyverit the soume of four scoir seaventine pundis ten shillings in reddie monye, And hes also subscrivrit an assignatioune conteining the sowm of four scoir pundis starling that was borrowit, &c., (a discharge is ordained to be given the said George ; and shortly after 600 merks is ordered to be given to Borrowstounness, and 400 merks to Craill, "in satisfaction of the helpe and supplie they wer seiking of the toune, and the rest therof to be laid by for the use of the Colledge.")

20th Oct.—*Pulpit, and Kirk to be pewed.*—The same day, be pluralitie of vots, it is condeschendit that the pulpit in the Laigh Kirk be maid, and that the wast end of the said Kirk be pewed in ane comlie and decent forme, as uthir Kirks abroad, and that with the best conveniencie.

The same day recommends to the Baillies to tak up the names of all persounes, men or weomen, who keepes Scots schooles within the toune, by quhat warrand, and to report the nixt meiting.

The same day, in answer to the supplicatioune given in be Wm. Cokburne, goldsmith in Edinbrughe, desyring libertie of the Magistratis and Counsell to com to this burgh, and setle himselfe ther, for exerceising of his calling, The saidis Magistratis and Counsell did grant the samyne, and to com and mak his residence therin for exerceising of his calling, and to enjoy his freedom during their will and pleasour.

23d Oct.—The quhilk day it is condeschendit, that seing Collonell Clarks regiment, now lying in toune, is to remove presentlie, and thatt here are manye debts awand be them to the inhabitants ; And the Magistratis and Counsell being most willing to help them therto, that ane hundrethe pundis starling be advanced to them out of the excys monye for that effect vpon thair band, and ordaines ane warrand to be given to Rot. Rae for that effect.

The said day, be pluralitie of vots, its agried wnto and con-

dischendit, that ane thowsand pundis Scots be given to the Colledge, to helpe to put on the roof on the foir wark they ar building.—Theis who wer appoyntit to treat with them anent the Bibliothecar having first receavit satisfactioun ther-
anent.

27th Oct.—The same day appoynts James Pollok to goe east to Edinburghe, and to receive fra the officiares of Collonell Clarks Regiment, and to wplift fra them the hail monye he can gett that is awand be the severall companies to the inhabitants, conforme to the severall compts to be sent east with him for that effect, and grants him heirby full power and commission to subscribe to them sufficient discharges wpon receipt therof, als ample as if the Magistratis war their present themselves to grant the samyne, and what monyes he receives, he is heirby warrandit to committ the samyne in the hands of Williame Mitchell, merchand in Edinburghe, for the tounes wse, untill they have to doe to pay their debts there.

The said day ordaines ane bauk to be sent throw the toun to charge the inhabitants to pay quhat moneyes they ar awand for assistance since the thretein of September last bypast, to theis havand right therto, and not to suffer the Magistratis to be trubled therwith wthirwayes to pay the double.

The same day appoynts the Magistratis, with James Colquhoun, Wm. and Gabriell Cummings, Rot. Rae, Andro Moodie, and Wm. Boyd, to meit and divyd the toun in eight pairts, and to give in such names as out of everie quarter they think such persones convenient for setting of the watch, and its heirby concludit that ane watch be keipit nightlie, seing the regiment is removed, and to begin the same night.

10th Nov.—*Supplicatioun, Deane of Gild in name of the Merchands anent the Hospitall.*—The said day, in answer to the supplicatioun given in be Fredrik Hamilton, Deane of Gild,

for himselve, and in name of the rest of the merchand rank, showing that they being of lait at the hearing of the compt of the Merchand Hospitall, and finding that ane guid pairt of the stok of the said Hospitall hes bein waired out on the bwilding therof, and that the volutar contributioune gathered throw the merchands hes not answered according to the expectatioune therof; And now the steiple of the said Hospitall is to be raised, quhilk will prove far moir profitabil to the toune than to the Hospitall, and to lett it ly as it wes, now being brought to such ane heicht as it is, it will be a shame and disgrace both to the toune and Hospitall: Quhilk being at length considerat be the saidis Magistratis and Counsell, they declared themselves all most willing, for the helpe and advancement of the said work; but, considering the tonnes burdin, they did all condeschend and agrie that quhat is restand in Jon. Kerrs, Baillie, hand of his last excys compt, and what is restand in Rot. Andersounes hand of his last compt he made of the excys, as also what glenings can be gottin belonging to the toune, as what is restand undebersit of the bukit monye, and the house in Evandaill, should be all takin in and applyed for advancement of the said work; But wpon this condition, that when the craftis sall have to doe therafter for the building of their Hospitall, they may have the lyk power conferred on them.

The same day recommends to the Baillies to settle with the post.

15th Dec.—The same day, for suameikle as Johne Wright, merchand in Edinburghe, being addebtit to Wright, his sister, the sowme of ane hundreth and sex marks, Becaus shoe remaines within this burgh, and is borne therin, and ane pupill, not able nor in capacitie to give ane discharge therof, and that shoe is seek, and so lyklye the toune to be burdined with her, It was resolvit that the toune should tak it in and delyverid it to the toune thesaurer, and the annual rent to be bestowed on the said

Wright, or sua meikle of the principall as shoe sall stand in neid of; and, therefore, they bind obleis them, and their successores in office, to warrand and releive the said Jon. Wright at the hands of the said Wright, his sister, theranent, and of all cost and expensis he can incur therthrow, and ordainis the thesaurer to be chargit therwith.

24th Dec.—The same day it being fund that Douglas was formerlie appoyntit to remove himselfe aff the toune, quhilk he hes not obeyed as zit, and is brunt on the cheik, and is known to be ane idle vagabound, without ony lawfull calling, He is, therfoir, heirby ordained to remove aff the toune, and all his, and that within ten dayes, and not to returne therto heirafter, wnder the paine of scurgeing him throw the towne and benishing of this burgh.

The same day ordains the thesaurer to have ane warrand for the sowme of ane hundreth marks Scots, debursit be him to James Cors, mathematician, for his better incuragment and helpe; and for ten dollors debursit be him to the man in Edinbrughe who keips correspondance with the toune.

The said day Johne Bell, the tounes Commissioner to the enshewing Parliament, having showine that there was somthing agitat be his procurement befor the burrowes, anent this burghs ranking and place in ryding at the said Parliament; and that he being desyred to submitt the mater to the burrowes, answered, that he had no such commissione, and therfor was desyred to com afterwards sufficientlie instructed thairanent: And after consideration had therof be the said Magistratis and Counsell, they did remitt that mater to the said Johne Bell himself, and to theis of this burgh should happin to be with him at Edinbrughe at the ryding of the said Parliament, being considerit they will doe their best thereintill for the guid and credit of this burgh.

5th Jan., 1661.—The foirsaid Magistratis and Counsall taking

to their consideratioun how that of laitt the toune is overburdened and pestered with straingers and beggars, and if tymous remeid be not vsed theranent, the toune and inhabitants will be greatlie prejudged, and seing the taking notice therof is greatlie neglectit be theis who should doe the samyne, They have, therfor, made choyse of the persones following, to goe throw the hail towne in the severall parts therof as is heirefter divydit, and to tak wp the hail names of everie Mr. or Mrs. of everie familie, with the designatioune of their calling, with their servands names, and to try theis who ar new intrants within their severall bounds, and what orray weamen ar within the samyne bounds, and who sets to all such housis; that they do the same with all diligence, And to give ane compt therof to the Magistratis and Counsell with all convenience, And that they continew the doing of the same monethlie untill Michaelmes nixt, &c. (Follows the names of the persons, and the quarters for which they are appointed.)

19th Jan.—The same day it is concludit to lend and advance to Johne Fergusone, post, fourtietwa pundis Scots, to helpe to buy ane sufficient hors to serve the toune, and he is (to) serve the toune thankfullie, thairfor until the first of May nixt to com, without ony weiklie waiges all that tyme as he got formerlie.

11th Feb.—The same day recommends to the Mr. of Wark to caus bring ane cowbar full of sand, from Cardrois, to mix with lyme for casting of the steiples battellin of the tolbuith, and uthir commoune workes.

23d Feb.—The said day, forsuaimeikle as the said Magistratis and Counsell, taking to their consideratioune that there being formerlie ane regrait and complent presentit to the Right Honble. the Committee of Estaits, wpon the first day of November last by past, in name of the Magistratis and Counsell of this burgh, who did bear charge therein in Anno 1645, and in Anno 1648, Shewing that Mr. Gillespie having procured ane warrand from the lait

Vsurper, in Anno 1656, direct to Lievtenant Coll. Simones, Major Dornie, Captane Davies, and utheris, for the petitioners loyaltie to his Majestie, and anent the trying of their lyfes and conversatioune, since they wer borne to the dait of that warrand, James Porter, Clark to the Sessiounes of Glasgow, did intrude himselfe amongs theis to whom the warrand was direct, to be their clark and informer, notwithstanding the petitioners did earnestlie desyre him to forbeir : Zit he still insisted against the petitioners, and caused laid against them above ane hundreth and fyftie witnesses, without giving them any lybell to answer to : And the petitioners did never knaw zit what was witnessed against them, the lyk quhairof was never hard heirtofor, to the great hurt, chairges, and damages of the petitioners, and defamatioune of their guid names, And of sett purpos to draw them under the compas of imprisonment and fynes, Cravand, therfor, that the said James might be conveyned, and apoyntit to delyver wp the scroll of the foirsaid proces, with the extract of ony vthir proces he satt as Clark for against any of the petitioners ; And the said James Porter being therwpon summoned to compeir befor the said Right Honourable the Committee of Estaits, and he having compeired accordinglie, The said Committee of Staits did then confyne the said James Porter to his hous in Glasgow, therin to remayne untill course be takine with him for his cariage contained in the said petitione or bill, and remitted the doing therof to the Magistratis of this burgh ; And the said Magistratis and Counsell having often delt earnestlie with the said James Porter to exhibit and produce the foirsaid proces led against the Magistratis of this burgh, and sundrie vthir honest men within the same, he ever hitherto refused to do the samyne, (ordain him to remove “aff this burgh,” and “bounds of ten miles ;” and meantime Wm. Andersone, merchant, to “supplie the same place as Clark therto, with the helpe of the ministers, for taking wp the names of the mariages, and bairnes who ar to be baptized.”)

21st *March*.—The same day it was concludit be the Magistratis and Counsell to pay yearlie to Evir M'Neill that cuts the stone, ane hundreth marks Scots, and he to cut all the poor for that frielie, wherwpon a contract was subscrivit betwixt the toune and him theranent this day.

The said day, in respect ther is on J MacKartor, who hes suffered verie much heirtofoir for his loyaltie to the Kings Majestie, and is now under cure of James Phrank, who reports he may be recovered, if he had means for his sustentatioune, it is therfor concludit that the Mr. of Wark give him daily, until he recover, twelfe shillings Scots for his enterthanment.

2d *April*.—The same day the saids Magistratis and Counsell being informed that ther was ane citatioune to be given to them for summonding them, at the instance of Mr. And Flemyng, befor the Parliament, its thought convenient, seing the Provest is there already, that ane commission be sent to him for that effect, to answer for them, &c., and also to wrytt ane letter, in their names, to Jon. Bell, their Commissioner, to give in bill to the Parliament for repayment of the twenty thousand pund the toune payit of ffyne quhen Muntrois com here, and to complein wpon the wrong done then be George Porterfield, then Provest of Glasgow, and his Counsell, anent the expenss and burdines that thrie scoir twelfe honest men wer drawine to wnder notioune of malignants, be quartering wpon them without warrand.

9th *April*.—The same day Jon. Bell producit ane tiket wrytting subscrivit be Mr. Archibald Flemyng, quherin he discharges the Counsell and vthirs therin specifit, of the thing he was craving of them befor the Parliament.

The said day ordaines the thesauror to pae to Charles M'Cleane, Jylor, twenty punds for his extraordinarie paines in attending the tolbuith this long tyme bygane, haveing got no profeit therby, having only theifes and lounes his prisoners.

The said day, forsuaimeikle as umqll. Mr. Johnstoune, at London, did dott and mortifie divers sowmes of monye to severall burghs within this kingdome, and to this burgh among uthiris, for erecting of manufactories and utheris the lyk within the samyne ; and seing that Rot. Spens, his nephew, who (as is reported) should have succeded to all theis meanes, and that the remanent burrowes to whom the said monyes were dotted, upon consideratioune therof, hes condischendit for the said Robert Spens his supplie, in respect he hes fallin in distres and povertie, to bestow upon him some helpe and supplie for his lyflichood, it is therfor this day agried and condischendit wnto, be the said Magistratis and Counsell, to pay and bestow yearlie to the said Rot. in tyme coming, such ane quantitie of monye as uthir burghes who gott the lyk monyes dotted and mortified to them, effeir-and to the sowme mortified be the defunct for the wse of this burgh.

9th April, 1661.—The same day, forsuaimeikle as John Wood, Cordoner, did present to the Magistratis and Counsell conveyed, ane petitione subscryvit with his hand, showing that he hes bein incarcerat within the tolbuith of this burgh theis seavin weiks bypast, and that he confest it was deservedlie, in consideratioune of his bygain miscariages, and that the Lord knowes he was never the inventor of theiss businesses, but that he was coactive thereintill, and that he is sorrowful from his heart that ever he should have been active or accessive to any mater of offence to the Magistratis or Counsell, and that he was long agoe and now weiried of his long imprisonment, and desyred, therfor, that the saidis Magistratis and Counsell wold tak his sad conditione to their wyse consideratioune ; Quhilk being red, after consideratioune had theranent, the said Counsell remits him to the will of the Magistratis.

20th April.—The same day ordains the thesaurer to have ane

warrant for the soume of twentie pundis Scots, debursit be him to Robt. Sanders, for prenting of the preaching was preached be Mr. Hugh Blair befor the Parliament.

The same day ordains ane bauk to be sent throw the toune this efternoone, to comand that Twesday nixt, the 23d instant, be keiped as ane thanksgiving day to God, in relatioune to the Kings Coronatioune in England, quhiik is to be that day, and for uther his blessings shawine to the Kings Majestie, and that all repair to the kirks when the bells adverteis them for that effect, and that they put on bail fyres at night at the rynging of the bells, and that all maner of persones carie themselves as becumeth.

The same day, forsuaimeikle as it is sufficientlie knowne to the saids Magistratis and Counsall that Wm. Watson, candlemaker, hes caried himself most baislie heirtfoir many and divers wayes, and will no wayes amend his lyfe, but proves alwayes a bad example to all vitious livers, and was apprehendit this last night, be the guard, with uthers, his companiounes, drinking in the hous of Mr. James Hamiltoune, at two or thrie hours in the morning, and that throw that occasioun ane honest man, that was on the guard, had his face brokin to the effusioun of his blood ; Ordains, therfor, the said Williame presentlie be put in the stokes, and therein to remayne during the Magistratis will, and thereafter to enact himself to remove aff the toune ; And that also Jon. Stark, for his bais cariage, be also benisched this burgh ; Lykas, seing the said Mr. James Hamiltoune and his wyfe keipes ane verie lewd hous, and will not amend though oft admonished, he is, therfor, discharged brewing during the will of the Magistratis and Counsell.

27th April.—The said ordains Wm. Cumyng to have ane warrant for the sowme of thrie scoir sex pundis, deburst be him to the thrie trumpeters com heir, and for ten dollors deburst to ane distressed gentleman.

8th May.—The said day ordains the thesaurer to pay to Androw Andersoune, printer, the sowme of fyftie marks to helpe to transport his guids and flitting to Edinburghe againe, he discharging his pensiou for all byruns and in tyme coming.

24th June.—The said day ordaines the sour milk mercatt, quhilk is now keiped at the Croce, be transported from thence, and keiped at the Gallowgait brige heirafter.

20th July.—The said day the Provest maid report that the ministers had faithfullie wndertakin to celebrat the Communioune within this burgh in September nixt.

3d Aug.—The same day the said Magistratis and Counsell taking to their consideratioune how many and sundry strangers mae nor formerlie repaires to this burgh with all sort of staple wair to sell, and for ane faschion, maks ane offer therof to the Deane of Gild, But finds their burgesses greatlie prejudged therby; and for preveining of the abuses therintill heirafter, It is therfor this day enactit, statut, and ordained, that all sorts of staple war that sall happen to be brought to this burgh, be strangers, be land, heirafter, to be sold, sall be laid and put in into the Merchand Hospitall, in ane roume, there to be provydit for the same, and there to ly untill they be all sold, conforme to the offer made therof anent the pryces, and appoynts ane collector or clark to be choysen, for booking of all such guids imported be land allenarlie, and ilk persone to pay four schillings Scots for ilk pund starlings worth of the saids guids imported be land, as said is, to the said collector or clark.

The same day appoynts the Mr. of Wark to caus lyine with hair and fries the hail furmes of the Laigh Kirk Counsell saitt, with the best conveniencie.

31st Aug.—The said day ordains the thesaurer to have ane warrand for the soume of fyftie shilling starling, debursit be him to Wm. Rowand, in recompence for the loss he susteined be

carieing ane young orphane to Irland, at command of the Magistratis.

7th Sept.—The said day the foirsaidis Magistratis and Counsell being conveined, and taking to their consideratioune how that be publict act it is statut and ordained that no maner of persone or persones who contryved or subscrivit the Remonstrance or Association, or concurred in the prosecutioune in any course promoting the ends therof, or any wayes hes shoune themselves disaffected to his Majesties government, should be permitted to bear any office or charge within burgh; and seing Mr. John Spreull, Clark therof, is notourlie knowne to have bein ane of that rank and number, and hes bein incarcerat and kepted in waird for the same, The said Provest, Baillies and Counsell therfor doe heirby declair the said Mr. Johne his office and place as Clark of this burgh, to be vacand, &c.

23d Sept.—The said day the Magistratis and Counsell taking to their consideratioune how that the maner of the electioun of their Magistratis is lyk to be invertit be the restauratioune of Bischops wtherwayes than is sett downe in the Act of Parliament, in anno 1641, recommends, therfor, to the Provest, Baillies, Deane of Gild, Deacon Conveiner, and such wthers as they sall pleas to call to thame, to meit theranent, and to consider therwpon, for making ane address to his Majestie, to the effect the toun may have the electioun therof in their awn hands, and power lyk wthir frie Royall Burrowes, and to think wpone and find out the best way and meanes how the samyne sall be effectuat.

The same day, for Robert Sanders, his better incuragment to hold up his prenting hous heir, within this burgh, in respect that Androw Andersoune, last printer therin, is gon away, who had ane hundreth marks of yearlie fiell, It is concludit, therfor, that there be payit be the toun thesaurers yearlie, to the said Rot. Sanders, the soume of fourtie punds, at twa termes, in the year, Mertimes

and Witsunday, so long as he keeps up his prenting press within this burgh, and he to print gratis any thing short the tounne sall employ him to print.

1st October.—The said day, it being resolved that Bogilles well should be assayed for bringing and convoying the water of the same to the Hie Streit, according to the right the tounne hes therof, Recommends, therfor, to the Magistratis to speik and agrie with James Colquhounne for convoying the watter of the said Bogilles well to the said Hie Streit by conduits of led, the most commodious way for the commoditie of the tounne.

The same day ordains the theasurer to pay to James Corss, Philomath, ten dollors, for dedecating his Almanak to the tounne, and to ilk ane of the clarks men sex pund Scots for their bygone service.

5th Oct.—The same day there was productit be Hendrie Craig, Mr. of Wark, ane inventor of the tounnes hail wark lumes and uthirs he hes charge of, quhilk is appoynted heir to be booked, and is as followes, viz. :—

In the first three salt furlots lyand within the tolbuith of the said burgh, in the north end of the meikle hall. *Item*, Ane uthir furlot, marked with Linlithgow measure, with ane 4^t. p^t. cap, marked with the same mark, lyand there. *Item*, Twentie ledders, quhairof fyve lyes in the Grammer Schoole Wynd, and uthir fyve in Fleshmercat, quhairof the Mr. of Wark hes the keyes, and ten in Hutchesones Hospitall, quhairof Hendrie Glen hes the keyes. *Item*, Sex shoffiles, twa spaidis, and four mattocks, quhairof on sharpened in the end. *Item*, Ane great iron querrill mell, and twa gavillocks, with three iron wadges and twa hurlebarrowes. *Item*, Four silver coups in the Mr. of Warks possessiounne, having the tounnes armes on them. *Item*, Ane new coffer for keiping the tounnes Commissioners clothes, quhen he goes abrod. *Item*, Ane broad kist, or buist, for keiping the tounnes foot-mantle. *Item*, There is lying in

the Round at the north end of the platfurme in the tolbuith, thrie scoir twelfe muskits, and sex barrels of puider, quhair of twa laiks ten inches—threttie pair pistolles and hustrelles, and ane hundreth and threttie twa ammunitiounne blaidis.—*Item*, there is standing in the south west round of the heigh pyntit hall, ane dry stool, with ane pan therin, and fyve chamber pots.

12th Oct.—The said day ordains the thesaurer to have ane war-rand for the sowme of nyne pundis twelfe shillings, deburst for the mentinance of Katherin Wryght the tyme she was in curing be ane old man ane strainger was heir, and that by and besyd ane rex dollor was debursit for hir use of befor, and recommends to James Pollok to sie to this lasse, and to bestow som monye that is left in his hands, wpon hir.

The quhilk day the Provost, Baillies and Counsell of the said burgh beine conveyned, compeired Mr. Johne Spreull, somtyme Clark of this burgh, and conforme to thair ordinance, &c., did exhibit and produce the gift he had of the Clarkship therof, (nar-rates production of sundry other documents,) And the aforesaid Provest and Baillies having weill weighted and considered the saids wryts, and wnderstanding that the said Mr. Johne Spreull had most malitiouslie compeired (contrair his dwtie as Clark of this burgh,) with Mr. Gillespie publictlie in judgment against the Magistratis of the samyne, and divers wthir honest men who had borne office as Magistratis within the said burgh, and wthers therin, to the perrell of their lyfes, (if maters had succeded as was indeavoured,) and sua therby annullit his said gift, and that also the said Mr. Johne had lykwayes verie oft and divers tymes compeired against the saidis Magistratis and Counsell of this burgh, in the publict meitings and Counsellis of the lait Vsurpers, and that he was the main caus and instrument of the exhibiting and producing befor them of the Counsell books of the said burgh, the lyk wherof was never done of before: As also that the said Mr. Johne is sufficient-

lie knowne to have been the main stickler in fomenting the vnhappy divisiones that was amongs the Treds within the samyne, wherby many contempts was offered be them to the Magistratis of this burgh for the tyme wherthrow it is most cleir that the said Mr. Johne hes committit many and divers faults, and so hes many tymes forfaulted his said office, and so aught to loos all the benefite and casualtie he had since his foirsaid first compeirance with the said Mr. Gillespie ; and understanding also that the said Wm. Zair was absolved fra all dewes and casualties the said Wm. had uplifted preceding the dait of the said decret, zit the said Mr. Johne made him pay ane thousand marks Scots monye : As also finding the said decret to be null of the law, and not to be regairded, it being pronounced in the first and closs tyme of vacance, after the rying of the Sessioune or Hie Court of Justice for the tyme : Therfor, &c. (ordains him to refund all fees and casualties, and failing therof to enter himself in ward, &c.)

19th Oct.—The said day ordains the thesaurer to have ane war-rand for the sowme of thrie scoir pundis monye, deburst be him to Archibuld Blacklaw to buy ane hors, in respect he had laitlie thrie died in ane nicht on a suddant ; and for fourtie pundis, deburst to Johne Baird, wnder myler in the toune mylne, to help to buy ane horse, also in respect he is mutilet in the left hand, throw ane occasioun of the mylnstone in the said mill.

26th Oct.—The said day appoynts ane heid Court to be holdin at the Gorballes on Moonday nixt, and appoynts the hail Counsell to be present, with the Magistratis, and to intimat the annexing of the lands of Gorballes to the burgh, And that they answer now to the toune Court, being warned be the officiares, and that some Constables be choysen there for keiping of good ordor, but no Baillies to be given them thereafter.

The same day appoynts the monye that is payit heirafter in name of bukit monye, to be employed heirafter in buying of armes,

such as partisones and whirs, such as the Magistratis for the tyme sall think most convenient; and appoynts the hail wair of that monye formerlie collectit, to be bestowed on the Merchand Hospitall.

9th Nov.—The said day recommends to the Deane of Gild to caus mak four leiping on stanes, and to sett them in such convenient places as sall be thought meit, As also to agrie with the wrights.

16th Nov.—The same day recommends to the Baillies to speik with the Mr. of the Grammer Schoole to suffer and permit the bairnes to sit with covered heid, therintill, at such tymes as the Magistratis sall think most convenient.

2d Dec.—The ssid day recommends to Baillie Bell to speik to the Ministers, anent Johne Denistoune, ane burges sone, who is now in the Turks hands, and desyres earnestlie to be releived, that ane contributioune may be collectit for that effect.

18th Jan., 1662.—The said day appoynts Johne Purveyance to pay out of the first and reddiest of the stent he hes collectit, for the wse of the Lords of Sessioune, the first of the twa moneths cesse was appoyntit to be payit in to them, and quhilk is for the moneth of November last, and that according to ane desyre of ane letter sent heir theranent by the Lord President, and appoynts the Provest to wryt ane answer therto.

The said day it is appoyntit and ordained by the hail Magistratis and Counsell that the hail officiares mak use of and carie their halberts at all tymes, and not to be sein at no occasione without the samyne on their shoulders, as aught and should be, And that wnder the pane of deprivatione, although ther be no wthir fault to lay to their charge, And that in respect of the unseimlie abuse they ar come to, by carieing of wands and staffes in sted of halberts.

25th Feb.—The said day ordaines the leid of the Hie Kirk

steiple, quhilk is now wronged with the stormie wether, be sightit be the Deane of Gild and wthirs he pleases to tak with him, and therafter mendit and repaired with the best conveniencie.

8th March.—The same day the aforesaid Magistratis and Counsell, for divers consideratiounes moveing them, discharges the keiping of a guard ony longer, untill further ordours.

22d March.—The same day ordains the thesaurer to have ane warrand, for the sowme of twentie dollors, debursit to Mr. Johne Andersoun, ane of the doctors of the Grammer Schoole, at the Counsellis command, for divers respects, and for dedecating a book to the Magistratis, and for uthir twentie dollors, debursit to James Robesoune, elder, for his helpe and supplie, and for ten dollors, given to a Jew, and sex pundis to James Ffrank, for furnishing of divers medicaments to sundrie poore persones, by warrand and command of the Magistratis, &c.

The same day, it being concludit, for many guid and weightie reasons, that it was conduceable for the toune that the few dewtie and annualrents adebtit furth of the tenements and uthirs within burgh, should be sold at seaventine years purches, and the monye gottin in, be applyed for paying of the pryce of Linnings haugh, Ordains, therfor, ane bauk to be sent throw the toune, and whoever desyres to buy them at the rate foirsaid, that they com and buy the samyne, and pay therfor accordingly, and with certificatioun to all that will not com, but delays to buy their awin few dewties or annualrent, the toune will sell the samyne to whom they pleas.

12th April.—The same day the Baillies had made report that they had agried with twa men, John Williamsone and

to keep the beggars aff the easy, and was to pay ilk ane of them monethlie quhilk was allowed and approvine, and ordaines ilk ane of them to carie ane staff throw the toune, as they walk, having the tounes armes therupon.

17th April.—The same day ordaines the partitiones of old put wp in the Hie Kirk, to be takine doune, and recommends the doeing therof to Mr. Patrik Bell, Baillie, who made choys of James Pollok and James Colquhoun to be with him, and recommends to the Magistratis to bestow on the Chancellor and Noblemen that comes with him als noblie as they can and the toune will afoard.

5th May.—The same day ordains the thesaurer to have ane warrand for the sowme of ane hundreth marks, deburst be him to James Pollok to pay the charges of the young men who were sent to the wast countrie with the Chancellor, conform to nyne shilling starling the man for his charges and hors hyre, and for iij^{li}. deburst to Claud Cleland, officiare, for hyring the hors.

14th May.—The said day the foirsaidis hail Magistratis and Counsell did most gladlie, cheerfullie, and vnanimouslie accept and tak the oath of alledgece, asserting the Kings Majesties, his Royall prerogative over all persones and all causses, conforme as the samyne is sett doune at the end of the alevinth Act of this present Parliament, and by holding up of their hands befor the Eternal God, and confessing the samyne with the tungue.

26th May.—The same day the foirsaidis Magistratis and Counsell, taking to their consideratioune the great truble and fasharie that is amongst neighboures, for want of copper monye to mak wissell,* and the great scruple made at the receaving of doys, For remeid quhairof, they doe heirby enact, statut, and ordaine, that twa doys sall pas for twa pennies Scots, as they doe in uthir parts.

The said day, anent the supplicatioune and complent given in befor them be James Mitchell, present Deacone of the Cordoners of the said burgh, for himselſe, and in name of the rest of the bretherin of that calling, makand mention that quhair it is the wse

and custome of all weil governed burghs within this kingdome, and of the tounes and countrie heirabout wher we dwell, as Hamiltoune, Paislay, Kilmarnok, and wthirs, that whosoever buys the hydys of slaine bestiall, gets the feit with them, as can be made cleirlye appeir be severall instances be their awn tanners in Edinburghe, Stirling, Linlithgow, Hamiltoune, Paislay, wher they bought hydys and got the feit with them, and by so doing, the feit defrayed the charges of the cariage of the samyne, whilk vse and custome was observit also within this burgh, as can be made out by many of our old tanners zit living: And now of lait the fleshors of this burgh hes convoyed the mater so that they keip the feit hinging at the hyd ay, and till the tanners buy the hyd, and therafter being bought, then and not befor that tyme, they cutt them away, and this they doe to fallow out ane double deception, as at the first when the tanners paises* ane of theis hydys, the feit hinging at them as said is, they cannot know the gudnes of the hyd, for the weight of the feit hinging at them makes the samyne appeir to be ane thrie part weight moir nor it is, and all to deceave the buyer; and agane, when they cutt aff the feit, they cutt ane large piece aff the hyd away at everie foot of the four at everie hyd, all to the great prejudice of the buyers, and consequentlie to the supplicants, the handie laborers; and seing it be the vse and custome that the feit goe with the hyd, or be cutt away befor the selling therof, therfor earnestlie requisting and desyring their Lordships to tak the mater to most wyse consideratioune, &c. (after examining witnesses, &c., ordains the fleshers to "cutt the feit from the hydys immediatly after the killing of the bestiall," and no tanner to "buy hydys, within this burgh, till the feit be cutted from them, except cuntrie hydys brought in be cuntriemen.")

28th June.—The same day it is concludit that ane handsome little brige, with ane pen, be put over St. Tenowes burne,

and that the casay be brought in therfra to the Wast Port; and recommens to the Mr. of Work to send for the calsay layer in Rutherglen, and to enter him to lay casay at the Wast Port, and he to lay wastward, quhil he and uthir casay layers there meit, who layes the casay, from the said brige to the port.

24th July.—The said day it is concludit, for many guid reasones and consideratiounes, for the moir commodious laiding and landing of boats, that ther be ane litle key builded at the Broomielaw, and that the samyne be done and perfectit with the best conveniencie, be sight and advys of the Magistratis, Deane of Gild, and Deacon Conveinar.

16th Aug.—The same day recommends to the Deane of Gild to speik to Johne Watsoune, merchand, and ask him the caus why he taks not a right of his Candle-hous, as uthirs hes done for the lyk.

30th Aug.—The same day the foirsaidis Magistratis and Counsell, for divers guid reasones and consideratiounes moving them have grantit to Robert Blair of Phinick, the hail bygane tack teind duty of the lands of Garroch, that he was restand awand to the toun the hail years and crops he was awand the tyme he sold the samyne to Mr. Niniane Hill.

20th Sept.—The said day Johne Bell productit ane license granted be Bruce, who hes ane patent of his Majestie anent the not transporting of stones, zit license is granted be him to the merchands of this burgh to transport the samyne according therto.

18th Oct.—The same day ordaines the Mr. of Work to buy and provyd for Abercrombie, ane poor boy goeing to the College, being a burges sone, ane clouk goune, and ane hatt of the qualitie as the Magistratis sall appoynt him.

24th Oct.—The said day their being productit ane Act of the Kirk Sessioune, quhairby it was regraitit to the said Magistratis and Counsell, that throw the withdrawing of many of the inhabi-

tants on the Lords day, and wthir tymes, from divine worship, the collectiones at the kirk doores wer diminished, and by that the poor greatlie prejudged; and the saids Magistratis and Counsell vnderstanding the samyne to be trew, they, therfor, ordaine that intimatione be maid to the haille inhabitants that the foirsaid prejudice done to the poor be remeided heirafter, with certificatioune to all who neglects the samyne, their monethlie contributioune will be augmented, for making vp of that quhilk is not drawne from the weiklie collectione on the Lords day and wthir tymes.

14th Nov.—The same day recommends to the Deane of Gild, Deacon Conveiner, and Johne Kerr, to call the fewars of the Gorballes to ane accompt anent the bygane stents collectit be thame, and their bestowing therof, and anent the mater relating to there boxe they brack, and there making wp off quhat was therin the tyme of the breaking therof.

20th Dec.—The same day compeired Cuthbert Grege, couper, and productit the warrands he had for gadging of barrells, and becaus he had given charges and summons to divers persones in relacione therto, and that this long tyme bygane there has bein nothing exercessid therafter, and that people now being secur, he might tak advantage against them: He was therfor desyred to tak bak his summons, and not to draw people to idle charges, quhilk he promiseist to doe, and so was demittit.

17th Jan., 1663.—The said day it is statut and ordained that noe mae through stanes be put in the Hie Kirk Zaird nor ar alreddie, without consent of the Counsell, first had and obteneid therto, certifying all who does in the contrarie, they sall be halden as contemners of authoritie, and the stanes custin out agane and brokin.

7th Feb.—The same day recommends to the Deane of Gild and Deacon Conveinar to provyd for ane knock and ane paille

of belles to be put in the steiple, now in building in the Briggait, and ordaines the tounes armes to be fixit on the belles.

21st Feb.—The same day, for the tounes better guid and commoditie, to be servit by ane foot post, it is concludit to pay Johne Fergusone, weiklie, threttie shillings Scots, to keip and susteine the said foot post.

Act anent Bell and Dunckiesoune.—The said day, in respect of the incivill, bais, contemptable, and vncristian carage of Johne Bell, wright, and Johne Dunckiesoune, brassmith, towards som of the ministers of Gods Word within this burgh, quhairof much was confest be thameselfes, and the rest cleirly maid appeir be sundrie probabilities, quhilk bais fact of theirs is not thought worthie to be put vpon particular record, It being alreddie sufficientlie knowne both to toun and countrie, to their great shame and disgrace, It is, therfor, concluded and ordained that ilk ane of thame pay ane hundreth pund Scots, to be applyed for the vse of the poore, and wthir guid commoun works within the toun, and about the same, and is to be performed befor they win out of ward, and wpon Wednesday nixt to come both of them to be takin to such ane publict place as the Magistratis sall tkink fit and appoynt, and there to be laid in the stocks, betwixt ten houres and twelfe houres, with ane paper put on their foirheid, showing that this is done to thame for their most vncivill and vngodlie cariage towards Gods ministers, and furder, for their bais and contemptable cariage thir manye yeares bygain during the tyme of the lying of the Englishes heir, towards the Magistratis and wthirs in autoritie, in contempt of lawfull autoritie in all abuises that then fell out, quhairin they behaved themselves as ringleaders, they are to be actit for keiping ane moir godlie cariage heirafter, and that they attend Gods ordinances in all tyme coming, according to the Acts of his Majesties Privie Counsell, emittit theranent ;

and that vnder the pain of benishment of them of this burgh in all tyme thereafter.

7th March.—The said day its concludit that the toune sall relieve the Gorballes of all burdings can com on thame throw deficiency of the excyse, sua long as they pay fourtie shillings to the toune for ilk mask malt that is browne there, as the toune payes themselves; and as for bygane faults committit be thame in breking of their box, and the disposing of the bands and wtheris was therin, without consent of the Magistrats and Counsell of this burgh, the irsuperiors, all theis particulares ar appoyntit to be laid asyde, so long as they behave thamselves as becometh tennants to their maisters, &c.

14th March.—The same day the Magistrats and Counsell taking to their consideratioune how that for all the paines takin, the poor in toune being so numerous, and the contributionne allottit for their monethlie mentinance being so litle, and cannot be gottin in tymeouslie, notwithstanding of all the great paines and expens waired out vpon twa men and several officers to attend them in collecting therof: As also, how ther ar verie manye persones in the contribution rolls who vexes the Magistratis daylie with their complents theranent, crying out that they have nothing to pay, and had neid of contributioun themselves, and zit for all that, their pots, pannes, stoups, and uthir their household geir, is poyndit for the samyne, quhairby the said Magistratis ar in great vexatioune, and so the poore ar frustrat, and so not tymeouslie payit and suppliet as they aught, quhilk occasiounes manye and divers supplicatiounes to be brought befor the Counsell for supplie, quhilk aught not to be. (It is concluded there be paid monthly, by the treasurer, £20 sterling, for the use of the poor, but first the town to be gone over, and all strangers and beggars removed, and the poor's rolls revised and purged.)

4th April.—The same day appoynts the Mr. of Work to give

weiklie to Patrik Baird, merchand, during the tyme of his wfyes distractioun, twentie shilling Scots.

8th April.—The same day appoynts the Deane of Gild and Deacon Conveinar to appoynt some of their number, as they think convenient, to taist the seck now cellered be Mr. Campsie.

18th April.—The same day its concludit that the monye quihilk is to be debursit for the pail of belles to the steiple in Briggait, be sent to Holland wpon the tounes venter.

The same day it is concludit that the axeltrie now lying at Hutchisones Hospital, be giftit frielie to Sir James Dalrymple, according to the desyre of ane letter.

The same day it is concludit that all meanes be vsed and gon about for dissolving the personage of Glasgow from the Bishoprik, and to get the same allocat for payment of the steipends to the ministers of this burgh and barrony; and recomends this to the cair of the Provost, Baillie Campbell, and such wthirs they please to joyne with them, for effectuating the said mater.

The same day appoynts Mr. Patrik Bell and Frederick Hamilton to meit with Rot. Ingles, who offered himselfe to teache musick within this burgh, and they to try what he would be att, and to report.

23d May.—The same day recommends to the Provost, Colin Campbell, elder, Baillie Colquhoun, Deane of Gilde, and Deacon Conveinar, to have ane cair of the new key now in building at the Broomelaw, and to see it done in height and in baking, and all wthir wayes as they think fittest.

6th June.—The same day recommends to the Provost, Baillies, Deane of Gild, Deacon Conveinar, to lay downe ane way hois, the back of the new key at the Broomelaw should be filled up with sand, and in the interime appoynts ane bauk to be sent throw the toun, for commanding of masters of families to be send out their servands for beiring of sand for that effect.

13th June.—The said day it is ordained ane bauk be sent throw the toune be touk of drum, to command all theis who wer accomptit as strangers and burdingsome persones, to remove aff the toune with all diligence, with certificatioune to all who refuses sall be kairted publictlie throw the toune, and all their landlords to be punished, conforme to the will of the Magistratis.

The same day appoynts the key at the Broomelaw to be heightit twa stones heigher nor it was ordained to be of befor, and ordains the Deane of Gild to try for moir oakin timber, aither in the Hie Kirk or bak galrie, for facing therof.

The same day, considering that all sort of blowing of muttone is discharged, and that now the fleshors, slayers of muttone, does mak holles in the foirmost leg, and therby works in wind throw the whoill bouk, to the great greif of the beholders, and cannot eschew to be dangerous to theis who maks vse therof, And, therfor, it is declared be the said Magistratis and Counsall that such working of muttone sall be punished, conforme to the blowing of muttone, and ordains intimatioune heirof to be made to the hail fleshors.

25th July.—The said day ordains the thesaurer to have ane warrand for the sowme of threttie eight pundis four shillings, deburst be him to James Ffrank, for drvgs, plaisters, and wthirs bestowed by him wpon the curing of divers poor persones, recommended by the Magistrats to him for that effect.

21st Aug.—The same day recommends to the Deacon Conveinar, and wthirs of the Counsell dwelling in Stockwell gait, to advert and sie to the commoune wel there that it be not wronged, as is reportit, by washing therat, or wthrways.

The same day recommends to the Dean of Gild and Deacon Conveinar to advert to the wrong done by the fleshers by tugging & touking, & cutting the sheip skinnes.

17th Oct.—The same day recommends to the Magistrats to cais try out thrie men who are meit for puting the beggers aff the

streit ; and who refuiss to vndertak, that the Magistrats, if they think fit, benish thame aff the toune.

31st Oct.—The same day, forsuaimeikle as the hors post is dischargit, its concludit that Johne Fergusone, post, be continowed foot post, and to have, as befor, thrie pundis Scots per weik, and he only to receive a penny starling for ilk letter he receaves, and als much for ilk letter homwards.

10th Nov.—The same day it is concluded be pluralitie of vots, that Johne Clark, measoune, be not payit of the monye awand be the toune to him, till first he mak wp againe the defect of the new peir he builded at the Broomelaw.

14th Nov.—The same day the kirk bedelles being conveyined anent the neglect of their dewtie, ordains ilk ane of them to carie in their hands, at all respective meittings of divyne service, ane whyt staff, as was in vse of old, not onlie for wakening those that sleips in the kirk, but also to walk to and fro, from corner to corner, in the kirks, for removing of barnes and boyes out of the kirks, who trubles the samyne by making of din in tyme of divyne service.

The said day the persones following were permittit to keip and hold Scots Schooles within the toune, they and their spouses, if they ony have, keipand and attending the ordinances within the samyne, viz. :—Jonet Ramsay in Drygait ; Elisabeth Miller, Wm. Bogill, Marion Watsone, spous to Wm. M'Nab, Alex. Wilson, George Steinstounes wyfe, Mr. Johne Moresoune and his spouse, Margaret Murray, Geo. Frissal, Wm. Brock, Rot. Forrest, Agnes Hutchesoune, Elisabeth Boyd, Jean Mauchen.

The said day licence is grantit to James Hadden, sone lawfull to vmqll. Mr. Johne Hadden, to keip and hold ane Scots Schoole within this burgh, he keiping and attending the ordinances within the samyne.

21st Nov.—The said day, in answer to the supplicatioune given

in by James Barnardon, Professor of the French tongue, dancing, and fencing, After consideration had thereof, they grant to him license and libertie to hold and keep a schoole for that effect; and the lyk license is not to be grantit to any wthir persone for the space of fyve yeares; As also, they have condischendit that he sall be frie, during the said space, of all impositiones and burdings, and to have ane yeirlic fiell of fourtie shillings starling.

16th Jan., 1664.—The same day appoynts the signator obtained in anno 1611, to be sent east to the Provest, conforme to the desyre of his letter, with the ratificatioune therof; and ordains the Clark to wryt a letter to the Provest and theis with him, anent the business of Dumbartain to give them thanks, and to requeist thame not to wirie.

23d Jan.—The said day compeired Mr. M' Math, and his comrad, who hes laitlie brought in a ship of seck to Clyd, and made offer therof to the toune at sextine pund starling the butt, to be receavit at the ship syd, frie of all charges, and for seavintine pund starling the butt, pick and choyse, After consideratioune had therof, be pluralitie of vots, it was concludit that the said wyne be first cellered, to the effect it may the mor comodiouslie be tasted, and then the toune to offer for it.

30th Jan.—The said day, for good reasones moving the toune, it is concludit that the drummers doe not touk to no strangers comes to the toune, or no uthir persones publictie, without licens of the Magistratis.

12th March.—The same day it is concludit that the poor boy James Crawford, measone, who hes gon madd, have for himselfe and theis that keips him, four shillings starling during the Counsells will.

21st May.—The same day the Magistrats and Counsell taking to their considoratioune that the twentie nyne of this instant is appoynted to be keipt as ane solemn day, conforme to the Act of

Parliament, in commemoratioune of his Majesties birth day and restauratioune, and seing the same falls this yeare on the Sabbath day, and they being carfull that all deboshrie and profanitie should be eschewed in respect of the said day, They have, therfor, concluded that there sall onlie be some particular bail fyres set on wpon the tounes charges, in such places as the Magistrats sall appoynt, and that all things theranent be done modestlie and civillie, without ony kind of profanitie, for the caus foresaid.

18th *June*.—The same day, in respect of the heighting of the calsay at the Barraszett, ordains the well there to be heightit twa stones heigher round about, for preservatioune of childerin falling therin.

2d *July*.—The same day the saids Magistratis and Counsell, taking to their consideratioune the great hurt and skaith persones that ar comeing and going to and from the toun, to the commoun lones, gets, throw the casting of bullots therintill, and the great prophanatioune of the Lords name, suering, and banning, and debolishing, and that fightings and janglings followes therupon, They, therfor, heirby statut and ordaine that non of the inhabitants within this burgh presume or tak wpon hand the casting of bullots, and that vnder the paine of punishing the contraveiners in their persone and guidis, at the will of the Magistratis: As also, they heirby statut and ordaine, that all who hes bark holles or lymm holles, that they caus mak their zaird dyks closs and sensible, that no barnes get skaith therby, vnder the paine of punishing the contraveiners in their persone and guidis, at the will of the Magistrats, and ordaines ther presents to be intamat throw touk of drum.

The said day the said Magistrats and Counsell vnderstanding that divers tymes heirtofoir, severall young barnes hes fallin over foir stairs that ar open, to the hazard of their lyfes, and they being most desyrous to have the same preventit heirafter, They doe heirby command and charge all manner of persones within this burgh, to

whom theis staires pertaines, that they put racters throw the hail lang open stairs, for the better preservatioune of young childer in getting skaith therby, vnder the pane of punishing the contraveiners at the will of the Magistratis, and recommends to Baillie Rae to sie this done.

27th Aug.—The same day recommends to ony of the Magistrats, after the skailling of ony buriell, to sight the calsay in the heid of the stinking Vennell, and, if neid be, to give order for mending and repairing the ill places therof.

3^d Sept.—The quihilk day ther was red ane letter sent from Mr. David Williamsons to the Provest, as ane answer of ane former of his direct to the said Mr. David, wherin he refusses to imbrace the call given to him, wpon the same reasones and grunds contained in his former letter, quihilk is thought be the toune not to be satisfactorie, and, therfor, its concludit that the mater be farder insistit wpon, and the Clark to wryt ane letter to him that they will tak no excuse aff his hands, but fallow that call to the vttermost, and appoynts Baillie Colhoun and Dowhill to acquaint the Bischop heiranent.

24th Sept.—The same day the Provest made report that, according to the Counsells ordour, and Mr. David Williamsons letter, he did ryd out to him to Kilsyth, and conferred with him anent the call given be the toune to him, who declared he had settled with the paroch wherin he was, and so could not nor wold not transport himselfe.

15th Oct.—The same day it is statut and ordained that ane bauk be sent throw the toune, to command all maner of persones to remove and away tak their red, stones, and timber aff the Hie Street, betwixt and Wednesday nixt, vnder the paine of twentie punds, and ordains that no fleshour, nor uthirs, suffer their kyne to stand on the Hie Streits in the night tyme, vnder the paine of xx^s. the piece.

22d Oct.—The same day it is recommendit to the Provost to repair to Edinburghe, for doing and agenting the tounes business, and to tak with him whomsoever he pleases: And he is to wakin Dumbartane busines, and the actioun against Silvercraigs, and to sie to all things tends to the guid of the toune, and to mynd the monye awand be the lait Argyll, and to be myndfull of Silver-tounhills busines, and to imploy in thir things whom he pleaseth; and if Baillie Pollok aithir goe with him or after him, he is to mynd Puckie mylne.

The same day, it being regraited that Finnisonne, that maks the graves, does not carie himselve as becometh his station but wrongs many poor people in going to their houses after the corps ar buried, and does there miscarie himselve shamefullie, It is, therfor, recommendit to the Deane of Gild and Deacon Conveinar to try owt ane man to joyne with Finnisonne for a tyme, for making of the graves.

The said day ordaines the thesaurer to have ane warrand for the sowme of fourtie pund Scots, debursed be him to Margaret Semple, for hirselve and Hugh Marjoriebauks, her sone, for their supplie for the losse they susteined by sea and fyre; and its concludit to give to the gentleman who is seiking contributioune for repairing the brig of Die, and ane wthir there in the north, ten or twelwe pund sterling, or then to let him tak the benefite of ane contributioune.

29th Dec.—The same day, in answer to the supplicatioune given in be Thomas Montcur, goldsmith, showing that he had servit his prentiship in Aberdein, and that sensyne he had servit four yeare jurnayman in Edinburghe, with Deacone _____, and that now he was attained to be a perfect craftismañ, and was of intentiounne to transport himselve to this burgh, and tak wp ane buith therin, the toune making him burges and gildbrother, for his better incuragment, It was concludit that so soone he taks wp ane

buith, and settes himselfe here, he sall be made burges without payment of any fyne, and zit to be holden as payit, that the benefeit therof may redound to him and his childerin, and also promeis, wpon his guid behaviour, he sall thereafter be admittit gildbrother.

31st Dec.—The same day, in answer to the supplicatioune given in be James Andersone, travellour, craving supplie, in respect he hes laittie haill four horses dead at ane instant, it is concludit the toune lend him ane hundrede pundis, be band, and ordains Johne Walkinshaw to deburse the samyne.

4th March, 1665.—The same day appoynts the Provost and Baillies to speik with the Principall and Regents of the Colledge, anent the great wrongs and abuses done by the Collegianes to the Gramer Schoole.

8th March—The same day it is concludit that Glasgow raice be kept in maner, and as is set doune and contened in the diurnall, and recommends to the Provost to caus provyde what is necessar to be made for that effect.

25th March—The same day the beddellship of the Laigh Kirk in Trongait, is conferred wpon and given to James Smith, merchand; and he is not onlie to be carfull anent the ringing of the belles, but also he is to walk throw the kirk in tyme of divyne service, with ane whyt staff in his hand, as wont to be of old, for the crubbing of bairnes and wthirs that maks disturbance in the kirk, and for impeiding of all abuses therin.

22d April.—The same day ordaines ane bauk to be sent throw the toune be touk of drum, to charge the haill inhabitants, in his Majesties name and theirs, to bring in their haill armes, and to delyver the same to the Magistrats, to be kept in the tolbuith, with certificatioune to all who neglects to doe the samyne, sall be looked wpon as disaffected to the present Government, and sua punished accordingle.

The same day, in answer to the supplicatioune given in be the

tounes fewers and tennents in Gorballes, grants to thame that old hous neir the tounes barne their, last occupied be _____, to be ane schoole for instructing and training wp of their bairnes, and that during the tounes will and pleasour allenarie.

The said day ordaines the thesaurer to have ane warrand for the sowme of twa hundreth pundis Scots, deburst be him to Wm. Boyd, in part payment of the building of the brig at Linning-shaugh; and for ane hundreth pundis deburst to the goldsmith, in part payment of the coups he is making to the tounes for the raice.

12th May.—The said day, forsuaimeikle as Wm. Selkrig, wrytter, had takin on him at his awine hand, not acquainting the Magistrats and Counsell for obteneing of any warrand of thame, to found ane laigh chope, quhilk he intends to build wnder his foir hinging stair, and quhich hes bein discharged to be so done be severall Acts of Counsell, and seing that place quherin he intends to build his said chop, is ane comodious walk to people to repair in, in tyme of rain and foull wether, Its, therfor, heirby declared be the said Provest, Baillies and Counsell, that it sall be nowayes leisome to the said Williame, or ony of his successors, to build the said chop in that place, but that the same remain as it was, for ane commodious walk heirafter.

15th July.—The said day it is concludit that twa hundreth pundis be lent out of the Excycse monye, to Jon. Gemmell, merchand, in respect he is knowne to be ane verie honest man, and hes lost his stock by sea venter; and ordaines Dowhill to deburse the monye, receive the band aud compt therof at making of his compt.

The same day the saids Magistrats and Counsell taking to their considerationne the lamentabill estait of Margaret Monteith, who is now distractit, and that shoe was borne within this burgh of honest parents, and the wyfe of ane honest man, Its, therfor, con-

cludit that there be payit her ilk day be the Mr. of Wark, during her distractioun, sex shilling Scots.

3d Sept.—The said day ordaines the Mr. of Wark to cause mend, beat, and repair the whoill ports, and to mak thame all fixit with diligence; and ordains ane bauk to be sent throw the toun be touk of drume, to command the whoill inhabitants to clois their closs foots and ends of their zairds, that no repair be made therby now in this dangerous tyme, for fear of the plague of pestilence, and that betwixt and this day eight dayes, vnder the pane of ane hundreth pund, and farder punishing of their persones, be sight of the Magistrats.

7th Oct.—*Act in favor of ye Sojors.*—The said day there being ane letter product in Counsell from Sir James Turner, shewing that of lait it pleased the toun to confer some litle thing monethlie wpon the first thrie companies come heir to be quartered, to be bestowed wpon sojors who had wyfes, and that for the keeping of honest mens houss frie of the burdine of married persones, and that the Lord Lithgowes company hes got notheing of that kynd since they come first here, and, therfor, at desyre of the said Sir James, it is concluded that the said four companys sall get for this moneth, and in tyme coming, during their lying heir, and the Counsell will four pund starling monethlie for the caus forsaid, to be bestowed vpon married sojors.

14th Oct.—The said day ordains the thesaurer to have ane warrand for the sowme of thrie scoir eightine pund eightine shilling, deburst for the new cock put on wpon the heigh steiple of the Hie Kirk, weightand twentie ane pund weight of copper, and four gold binks, and guilding therof, and wthir expens in putting wp the same, conforme to the particular compt therof given in be the Mr. of Work.

9th Dec.—The same day the said Baillies and Counsell taking to their consideratioun how the toun hes been slightit be Jon.

Brodbreidge in not performing his ingadgment in relatione to the perfecting the knock in Briggait, It is concluded that he be seased vpon by the Magistrats, and compellit to perform theis his ingadgments ; and as for the chymes he wes to mak there, for sundrie guid reasons it is concludit that the samyne chymes be maid and put up in the stiple of the tolbuith.

2d Feb., 1666—The same day it is concludit and ordained, be all theis present, that theis guids laitlie brought to this burgh, fra Jedburgh, and theraway, contrair his Majesties proclamatioune, be brunt all publictlie at the Mercat Croce.

17th March.—The same day George Pollok, officer, being compleined vpon, for taking some monye out of the collectiones maid for the poore at the kirk doores, in absence of the collector, and for drinking and debusching part therof, and for sundrie uthir enormities and wrongs, is deposed and put out of his place.

The same day the said Magistrats and Counsell vnderstanding the coalles to be become verie scant and dear, so that the hutch bought of befor on the hill for four shilling, is now bought for no less than sex shilling, and that in regaird of the decay of the coal hewes about the toune, quhilk maks ane great out cry among the inhabitants, and mainlie the poore, and the said Magistrats and Counsell knowing the same to be most trew and being informed that coalles may be win and gottin in their awin land in Gorballes, They have, therfoir, concludit to give to Patrick Bryce, weaver, ane thousand marks monye, to sett downe there twa shanks presentlie, &c.

3d April.—This day there being produced in Counsell ane letter direct therto be the Archbishop of Glasgow, in the quhilk his Grace declaires that efter search, he findes severall persones, both men and weomen, who ordinarlie dishantes publict ordinances, and flateres themselves with hope of impunitie, bot knew not from whence their confidence springes, and therfor thought it

his Grace dewtie to advertis the Counsell, that his Grace intendit (gif thair fynes be not exactlie leived be them) to employ some of the officers of his Majesties Melitia, both to observe who withdrawes from ordinances and also to exact the penalties imposed by law, which his Grace is verie vnwilling to doe: Both becaus his Grace did foirsie it will be ane dishonour and loss to the toune, and also ane greater prejudice and punishment to the persones that offends, as the said letter in itself mair fullie portes; quhilk being severall tymes red, efter mature advyce and deliberatioune had theranent, and the mater being stated quether it was best for the toune that the Magistratis should ingather and collect theis fynes imposed vpon dishanteres of the ordinances, nor to commit the collecting thairof to sojors, Efter dew consideratioune had thairanent, it was concludit be pluralitie of votes, that it was better for the toune that thes fynes war collectit and wpliftit be the Magistrats, (to the effect they might be applyed to pius vses,) then that any sojors should have the collecting thairof.

10th July.—The said day ordaines the thesaurer to have ane warrand for the sowme of twentie punds, deburst to Mr. Wm. Abercumbie, to helpe to paye for his clothes quho was lowriat.

18th Aug.—The same day ordaines the actioun against Dumbartain, anent their last ryot, to be prosequit to the full as accords of law, and the Magistrats of Dumbartain to be summond for that effect.

20th Sept.—The said day, forsnameikle as it is regraitit, by divers and sundrie persones, that the syre in Trongait, on the north syde therof, from Hutchesounes Hospitall, wastward to St. Tenowes burn, was levelled and maid once straight for convoyeing away the water that way, but now, of lait, divers persones, yea, almost all who hes houses and killes narrest the said syre, casts in stra, ilk ane foiragainst their awin land, to mak fuilzie of, quhilk stops the passage of the water should goe that way, and jorgs wp

so that filth and myre is made to be sein in the gutters, quhilk is verie lothsome to the beholders, and the said Magistrats taking this to their wyse consideratioune, and being desyrous that that abuse should be remeided, They, therfoir, doe heirby statut and ordaine that no maner of persones presume to doe the lyk heir-after, but that everie heritor or tennant of the said lands narrest the syre, keip the same frie, ilk ane foiragainst themselves for their pairts therof to the effect the passage of the watter be not gorged or impeided therby, and that vnder the pane of ten pundis to be exactit aff everie contraveiner how oft and sua oft they contravein heirafter the premises.

The same day, forsuameikle as the said Provest, Baillies and Counsell, taking to their consideratioune that it hes bein the vse and custome of the fleshors of this burgh heirtofoir to slay and bluid the wholl bestiall they kill on the Hie Streit in Trongait, on both sydes of the gait, quhilk is verie lothsome to the beholders, and also raises ane filthie and noysome stink and flew to all maner of persones that passeth that way throw the Kings Hie Streit, and is most vnseimlie to be sein that the lyk should be done theron : And the said Magistratis and Counsell, vnderstanding that the lyk is not done in no place within this kingdome, or outwith the same, in any weill governed citie ; And now seing the said fleshors may be provydit uthirwayes, and far moir commodious for blooding and killing the haill bestiall they kill, and also they being most desyrous that the said abuse remeided heirefter, Therfor comands and charges them and ilk ane of them to provyde houses in baksyds for the doeing therof, as is done in Edinbrughe, and uthir weill governed cities, and that betwixt and the term of Witsonday nixt to come, vnder the paine of ane hundreth pundis monye, to be exactit aff ilk ane of the said fleshors, to be applied *ad pios usus*, and that how oft and sua oft, &c.

20th Sept.—The quhilk day, forsuameikle as divers com-

plents hes bein made this summer be the tanners within the same burgh, against the inbringars and sellars of barks for thair vse of tanning, quhilks, of lait, they vse to cut far longer and broader nor of befor, for in foir tymes they wer dung neir all small, as they ar, quhen applyed to lether, The quhilk abus is not to be fund in noe pairt of this kingdome, nor elsquhair, quhairby the saids tanners ar greatlie prejudit and damnified; And againe, divers regrates and complementes hes bein made be John Calder, Patrik M'Clin-tocke, Patrick M'Inturnor, and wtheres, who bringes barkes to this burghe to be sold, for that the sayes now maid vse of quhair-with thair barkes ar missourod, ar maid of greater quantitie nor of befor, quhilk tends also to thair great hurt and prejudice: And the saids Magistratis and Counsell being most willing to remove the ground and causes of the saids compleintes, hes concludit that thair be four new sayes maid agreable to ane of the old sayes lyand now in the tolbuith having ane brokin step in the boddome, and marked with the Deane of Gilds mark, with the quhilk both parties hes declaired themselves content to the Deane of Gild of this burgh, and appoynts the said new sayes to be marked with the said Deane of Gilds mark, not onlie in the boddom but also in everie step therof, to the effect they be not altered or changed, and that noe sayes be vrged vpon the sellars of the said bark bot the saids new sayes, soe sealed and marked as said is: And again the saids Magistratis and Counsell statuts and ordaines that the whoill barkes quhilk sall be brought and missourod within this burghe, sall be onlie of the lenth of thrie or four inches the langest speall thairof, and twa inches broad, to the quhilk the said sellares of bark hes given thair consent to the said Deane of Gild; And this is but prejudice to the said inbringers of the said bark, to mak thair awne pryce thairof as they and thair merchands can agrie, bot onlie that the said barkes be dung and cutted sufficientlie, as they wont to be of old.

2d Oct.—The said day, anent the supplicatioune given in be Johne Rowat, merchand, mentioning that quhair it was the pleasour of the saids Magistrats and Counsell to admitt the supplicant keiper of their Lordships tolbuith, quhilk he hes attendit theis divers yeares bygane, and laitlie ane of the prisoners therein, the Laird of Branshoyle, haveing far exceeded the bounds of ane prisoner towards the supplicant, his keiper, trew it is that in ane passioune the supplicant did exceid his power and commissioun, in laying him in the irones, for the quhilk he is very sore grived from the bottom of his heart, albeit he wes heighlie provoked therto, And trewlie he dar say that he hes dearlie payit for it, for with the anger he took at that time, he hes never sensyne bein quyt of ane most creuell collick and gravell, quhairby he was verie lyklye to have lost his lyfe, and is not zit fullie quyt of it ; And seing it did pleasor your Lordships, for his said great wrong and fault, to suspend him from his charge, quhilk he confesses was most deservedlie done, in respect of his great rashnes, zit now the supplicant wold most humblie beseek the said Provest, Baillies and Counsell, to pitie him at this tyme, seing their Lordships know he hes lived honestlie heirtofoir, and come of honest and ancient parents within this burgh, besyde that he is awand fyfe thowsand marks, and hes the burdine of four motherles childerin, and that your Lordships wold be pleased to readmit the supplicant againe to his charge, and be the grace of God, the lyk should never be sein in him againe, but sall endeavour to carie himselfe in all things as your Lordships most humble servant, As the said supplicatioune more fully proports : Quhilk being red, and the same being weill weighed and pondered, the said Johne Rowat being send for, who come and declaired his grieff anent the foirsaid wrong committed be him. (He is accordingly reponed, but, unfortunately, in a short time after, allows some prisoner to escape out of ward, and is finally deposed without hope.)

17th Nov.—The same day, in respect the report goes that thair is some rying in the West, contrare authoritie, in Golloway, and uthir partes in the West Cuntrie, it is thairfoir concludit that the tounes people be putt in ane good postour for defence of the toune.

22d April, 1667.—The said day the foirsaid Provest, Baillies and Counsell being conveyned, and taking to their consideratioune how that his Excellence the Lord Generall his regiment of foot ar now lying within this burgh, quhairof some hes lyne longer, and some shorter, and seing the single sojors of thame hes nothing to pay for their quarters, in respect they have got no pay for a long tyme, and that his said Excellence the Lord Generall may prove heirafter als behoveful and stedable to the toun as all the worth

of their quartering will extend to, Therfor, the said Magistrats and Counsell does heirby vnanimouslie frielie discharge the payment of the said quarters that is dew and awand be the said sojors since their said entrie to this toune, and ordaines Wm. Zair, their Clark, to subscribe this discharge for thame, and in thair names.

4th May.—The said day the said Magistrats and Counsell taking to their consideratioune the great danger sundrie of our neighbors may fall, in regard of the lait proclamatioune emittit anent the inbringing of armes, and that many of our neighbors' and comburgess may not now frielie travell abrodd, as they wont to doe, without carieing of some armes, It is, therfor, concludit that the Provest sall ryd to Edinburghe, and petitione the Lords of his Majesties Privie Counsell, for granting libertie to our honest neighbors for carieing armes quhen they goe abroad.

daughter, or oy, gottin of lawfull mariage, and failzieing of theis the monye is to belong to the toune, quhairupon the toune subscrivit this day ane band conforme therto.

The same day, in answer to the complent given in be sundrie nighbors in Salt Mercat Streit, anent the hous now sett wp be Alexander M'Kinnie, for drying of his pyps, appoynts the Baillies, Deane of Gild, Deacon Conveiner, &c., to sight the samyne, as also the maner of the baxters placing and setting their hedder aud sticks, and to mak their report thairanent, for better preventing of skaith be fyre may come thairby heirefter.

5th Oct.—The same day, it is concludit and ordained that ane book be maid, and to ly in the Clarks Chamber, to the effect that the entrie of each ship that come in this river of Clyde, may be booked thairintill, and the awners to pay for the entrie of ilk ship, as sall be heirefter declaired, and appoynts fyve salt farlotts to be maid with all diligence.

Coak Stool to be sett wp againe.—The same day ordaines James Andersoune, the Bishops Chamberland, to be payit of that he wants, conforme to his charge; and that ane coak stool be maide and sett wp, for punishing of malefactors.

16th Dec.—The same day its concludit be the said Provest, Baillies and Counsell conveined, that the pewes in the hail kirks of this burghe, be sett out for mail to theis who pleises to tak them; and appoynts Baillie Cauldwell, Dowhill, younger, the Mr. of Wark, to visit the hail seats, and lay on the quantitie of mailles thairon.

The same day the said Provest, Baillies, and Counsell, taking to their consideratioune how that this hail citie is greatlie overburdined with ane number of commoune beggars, all straingers, quhilk aught not to be permittit in any weill governed citie within the kingdome and therfoir, and for remedeing thairof in tyme cuming it is heirby statut and ordainit that the whoill beggars, being

straingers, be all removed aff the toune, and that non be permittit to begg therin but such as ar weill knowne to have bein borne within the same, and to the effect they may be the better knowne, appoynts ane badge with the tounes armes theron, to be maid and given to each one who is suffered to begg, and that non be suffered to begg except such as hes the said badge.

The said day ordains the thesaurer, to have ane warrand for the sowme of four pund sterling, deburst be him to Andrew Purdoune, for causes knowne to the toune.

The same day ordaines Johne Andersoune, yr. of Dowhill, to have ane warrand for the sowme of eight hundrethe fourscoir sevine punds twa shillings, deburst be him out of the monye receavit be him fra the collectors at the mylnes to Thomas Moncur, goldsmith, for making the propyne of silver work, was given to the Ladie Elphingstoune, the Bischops daughter, at her mariage.

Brodbridge, and delyvered againe to Andrew Purdoun; and the said Jon. being sent for, come and did lay downe the said keyes wpon the Counsell table.

29th Feb.—The same day ordaines Dowhill, younger, to have

3^d June.—The same day, forsuaimeikleas Baillie Cauldwell was formerlie charged at the instance of Auchinrivoch, for apprehending the laird of Silvertounhill for some debt, and that he being apprehendit accordingle, the said Baillie being persuadit be some to dimit him, in respect of theis things betwixt the towne and the laird, The said Provest, Bailleis and Counsell, therfore, doe heirby bind and obleis thame and their successors to warrand relieve and skaithles keip the said Johne Cauldwall theranent.

20th June.—The same day ordains the thesaurer to have ane warrand for the sowme of fourtie rex dollors, deburst to theis heralds and wthirs that come here for cognosceing of armes, and that for the better eas and eshewing of inconveniencies quhilk might fall on the inhabitants theranent.

31st Oct.—The same day its concludit that so many of the officers who wants new cloathes, gett new syd coats insted of the clothes.

28th Dec.—The same day the outputting of the militia hors with their ryders, is committit to the Provest and Baillies, and they ar heirby commissionat to aggrie with any who will wndertak the service, upon the best conditionis they can for the guid of the towne.

The same day the said Magistratis and Counsell, taking to their consideratioune that suddane fyre ryseis frequentlie in this place, to the great hurt and wrack of theis who suffers therby, and to the effect the samyne may be moir speidilie quenched heirefter, quhen it happens to fall out: In regaird that the merchand and craftis hospitalls hes the benefit now of the hail buckit monye, they appoynt the said twa housses and their collectors to caus make ane hundreth lether buckits, with all convenient diligence, for the effect foirsaid; and the buckit monye to run in the old channel; And farder, for the better quenching of suddane fyre, quhen it happens ryse heir, It is heirby statut and ordainit be the said Magistratis and Counsell, that everie heritor and uthir responsible persones within the burgh caus mak and provyd ane sufficient lether buckit, and put their awine names thervpon, and to have them in reddines at all occasiounes in their awine housses, and in tyme of suddane fyre (quhilk God avert) that they send out the said buckits with their ablest servands, for quenching of the said fyre, and to carie water therwith, and the said buckits to be in reddines betwixt and the Fair of Glasgow nixt, under the paine of twentie pundis monye, to be exactit aff ilk contraveiner and that intimatioune be maid heirop throw the toune be touk of drum; As also to inhibit and discharge all maner of persones to mak any repair to their barnes for threshing therin their victuall aither morning or evining, unles they have a lantrone or bowet with thame, for preserving the candle or light they sie with, for eshewing of skaith may come therby, as doolfull experience hes laitlie taught, and that under most severe punishing of their persones, and benisching of thame this burgh in all tyme thereafter.

13th Feb., 1669.—The same day, anent the complent given in against Jon. Reid, maltman, for his and his wyfes resetting of stollin geir from sundrie persones, at severall tymes, and for men-teining of lies befor the hail Counsell, in alledging that Baillie

Fairrie sould have vtred and spockine some ill words against the parsons, quhilk the said Jon. Reid confest in presence of the Counsell, but wald not mak it appeir, and for sundrie uthir wrongs and enormities committed be him, quhilk he confest in presence of the Counsell, Therefoir, the said Magistrats and Counsell doe foirfault the threttie dollors alreddie consigned be him, and ordaines the same to be distribut to the poore, and ordaines him to remayne in ward dureing the Counsells wills, and quhill he produce his burges tiket, quhilk they ordain to be cryed downe and riven, and contenes the rest of his punishment till farder occasioun.

20th March.—The same day ordaines my Lord Lyounne to be payit of fyftie pund starling, in relacione to armes used be many who aught not to doe the samyne, and to the effect the tounne may gett their releiff therof aff the transgressors, there is ane assignatiounne and factorie to be gottin from the said Lord Lyounne to his right; and ordaines Peter Gemmill and James Fairrie, baillies, for the tounnes releiff, to cast* the said fyftie punds starling among the transgressors, and to ward thame vntill they pay their proportionable parts therof.

10th June.—The same day, in answer to the supplicatiounne given in be Jon. Hall, chyrugione, grants licence to him to build ane peice of ane ston wall betwixt theis buithes narrest the tolbuith, quhilk he hes laitlie bought, and the gutter ther for withholding the evill smell of the said gutter from the occupyers of the said buithes, provyding the samyne be but on ston thick allenarlie, and of guid aslar wark, and decently builded, in respect its so neir the tolbuith.

26th June.—The said day appoynts the Deane of Gild to sie the hail vickits of the hail tounnes mylne doors sufficientlie neidnailed and put fra opening.

The same day, for sundrie and weightie caussis, it is concludit that ane accurat and dilligent man sall attend weiklie the tounes work at Newport Glasgow, and he is to have for his expenses and hors hyre ten marks the weik he attends the work, and the Deane of Gild is appoynted for the first weik, and appoynts that ane hors be spokkine for to goe doune with the man weiklie who most goe and attend the work.

14th Aug.—The same day the Magistrats and Counsell taking to their consideratioune that this citie is altogether destitute of ane musitian for instructing the youth in the airt of musick, and seing its the earnest desyre of manie honest men that ane able musitiane be tryed out, and brought to this place for that effect, and seing the Bischop is willing to bestow yeirlie upon such a persone ane hundreth pundis Scots, for the mans better incuragement who is to be brought here, Its concludit that the tounne pay him yeirlie thrie hundreth and fyftie marks, and that to conteinew dureing the Counsellis will and pleasour.

The same day, upone good consideratiounes, the Magistratis and Counsell discharges the fleschors in the Land Mercat to kill any muttone or hudron* on the Hie Streit, under the paine of ten pundis ilk persone in caice of failzie, and that they keip their filth and pynches † aff the foir gait.

25th Sept.—The said day ordains Jonet Shearer, spous to James Love, wright, for her bais and leud cariage in her druckines in keeping company with sojors, to be benished this burgh for ever, and that if ever her husband recept her heirefter, he to be benished also.

5th Nov.—*Memorandum*.—The twa justice of peace wands, with the silver on the ends therof, one of the samyne given to Johne Donald, messr., the uthir to Walter Grahame,

12th Feb., 1670.—*Orray Weomen*.—The quhilk day the saids Magistrats and Counsall taking to their consideratioune the great outcry maid be many of the inhabitants of this burgh, for that many of the weomen servands therin hes theis divers yeares bygane desertit their service out of honest mens houss, and hes tak wp houss of their awine, quhair some twa, some thrie of thame dwells together, quhair by idle hous ar keipit, and many male reports are rysen by their bordle houss so keipit, and thairby they doe what they can to bring the plague of God on this citie, Therefoir, the said Magistrats and Counsall being most willing to goe about all means to withhold God's judgement from ws, and to benish awaye againe that ill practiss that is risen among ws, have concluded that twa of their number sall goe throw with the minister of ilk quarter, and some of the Sessioune with them as the minister sall appoynt, the hail quarter, and ilk particular hous therof, and to tak notice of ilk idle and orray woman that hes takin wp houss, and to mak them aither presentlie to returne to service or then to act and obleis themselves to remove aff the toune without delay, and to tak notice of theis persones who sets them the houss, that they may be punished, conforme to the proclamatioune maid in the contrair, &c.

12th March.—The same day ordains the bell in the Blackfreir steiple to be takin doune and sent to Holland to be castin over againe, with the same name, armes, and year of God, as is presently therwpone.

The same day appoynts Dowhill, elder, and James Colhoun, to agrie with quhat smiths they think fitting, for making of ane iron ravill to the tolbuith stair.

The same day appoynts the twa Baillies, the Deane of Gild, Deacon Conveiner, Dowhill, elder, Frederick Hamiltoune, and

James Colhoun, to try out ane fitt persone to dwell at the tounes houss at Newport Glasgow.

23^d April.—The same day ordaines the Deane of Gild to have ane warrand for the sowme of ane hundreth pundis Scots, deburst be him to ane poor man for his help and supplie to buy hors, and to be a stock, in respect he has wndertaken to furnisch the toun with fresch fish out of the wast countrie.

The same day ordaines ane bauk to be sent throw the toun, to charge all persones who hes any of the tounes lethers, to bring in the samyne, and that who knowes where ony of thame ar, reveill the same to the Mr. of Wark, with certificatioun to them who neglects the samyne, they sall be wnlawed in quadruple of the worth of any lethers sall be fund by them.

14th May.—The said day the Deane of Gild being formerlie ordained to repaire to London, or elswher, to petitionne the Kings Majestie in the tounes favor, conforme to the commissioun wnderwrytten, the samyne commissioun was subscrivit this day in Counsell, and delyvered to him, quhair of the tenor followes:—Be it knowne to all men, be thes present lettres, we, the Provost, Baillies, Counsell of the burghes of Glasgow, undersubscrivand, to have given and grantit, as we, be the tenor heirof, give and grant full power, warrand and commissioun, to Johne Andersone, yr., of Dowhill, present Deane of Gild of the said burgh, to repaire with all conveniencie to the citie of London, or elsewhere, as occasioun sall serve, and there, for ws, and in our names, with all humilitie and dew reverence, as becometh, to petitionne our draid Sovereigne the Kings Most Excellent Majestie, for granting to this burgh the frie electioun of their awine Magistrats, as vthir royall burghs of this kingdome hes; As also to doe, exerce, and goe about all vthir maters tending to the liberties and priviledges of this burgh; and does also heirby grant to our said Commissioner our verie full fie plane

power and warrand for that effect and generallie, &c. In witness whereof, &c.

4th June.—The said day ordains the thesaurer to have ane warrand for ten rex dollors, deburst be him out of the monye receavit be him fra the collectors at the mylnes, to Walter Grahame, messr., and uthirs, for apprehending of James Waddrop of Dal-dowie, who had made his escape formerlie out of the tolbuith, and for putting him againe therin, &c.

The same day it is concludit that whosoever sall tak the brig and customes therof, in tyme cuming, sall be obleist not to suffer any beggers com in be that port to the toune, and that conforme to ane old act sett downe theranent.

The same day it is appoynted that the Provost wrytt to London to the Deane of Gild to buy for the tounes use the portrators of King Charles the First and Secund, as also ane carpett, and to send all home for the tounes use.

[With regard to this compliment to his Majesty, and as partly accounting for the "guid toune" incurring the expense, see minutes of 14th May, and 29th Aug.]

16th July.—The said day appoynts Jon. Andersone, skipper, to fix and set vp some sea marks at Newport Glasgow, and quhat expenss he sall be thairin at, it sall be payit back againe to him.

The same day ordains the thesaurer to have ane warrand for the sowme of fyve hundreth, twelfe pundis xiijs. iiij^d., for twa hogheids French wyne, twa rubors, and ane butt of sek, sent to Edinbrughe, to some persones.

18th July.—The same day ordains ane tack to be wrytten and subscrivrit in favors of Sir James Turnor, of the tounes honss and tour in Gorballs, quhilk he presentlie possesses, and that dureing his lyftime, for payment yearlie of thrie pundis Scots, if the samyne be requyred, and that he be obleist to wphold

the said lands on his awine expenss dureing the tyme of the said tack.

27th Aug.—The said day the said Baillies and Counsell being conveyned, and taking to their consideratioune the bais and leud lyf led and used be Alex. Gay, at Newport Glasgow, and Jeane Rankine, his spous, and their leud cariage to all maner of persones quhatsomever, and especiallie for the great abuse done to their nightbors, and seing they now dwell in ane houss belonging to the toune, the said Magistratis and Counsell hes unanimouslie concludit that the said houss they dwell in sall be immediatly pulled down, and the stones and timber thair of laid apairt, and that they, nor non of thame, sall be suffered to dwell within the tounes bounds heirafter ; and appoynts Jon. Herbertsoun, their servant, sie the same done with all expeditioun, and to caus benisch the said persones out of the tounes bounds there.

29th Aug.—The same day ordains Coline Campbell to have ane warrand for the sowme of twentie-fyve pundis starling, deburst be him to the Provest, and quhilk he deburst for the Kings portratour, bought be him for the tounes use.

The same day ordains the thesaurer to have ane warrand for the sowme of nyne rex dollors, deburst by him to George Wilson, post, for his extraordinarie ryding the tyme the Counsell sat here and Air, and for twa hundreth and ten pundis Scots, deburst be him to Jonet Reid, for making and furnishing the denner was maid reddie for the Duk Lennox his west coming.

24th Sept.—The same day ordains Johne Bell to have ane warrand for the sowme of ane hundreth thrie scoir pundis Scots, payit be him out of the excys monye to the lait Bischop of Glasgow, for ane years annual rent of the principall sowme of four thousand marks awand be the toune to him, &c., and for thrie pundis sterling, payit be him to Thomas Davidsons, for ane litle barrell of Ranish wyne, furnisched be him to the toune, quhen the

Duk of Lennox was to come here, and for the sowme of four hundreth and fourtie-eight pundis Scots, deburst be him to the Provest, quhilk compleits his hail accounts and charges deburst be him in the tounes affaires, viz. : To Advocats and Clerks the tyme of the last Sessioune, thrie hundreth pundis; and for his awin expenses, fra the twentie of June last to Sept. instant, in attending the Commissioners, comeing and goeing, seavin hundreth pundis, and for thrie hundreth sextie pundis he gave to freinds, and fourtie-six pundis payed out for wyll meit, bought at Edinburge, against the Duk of Lennox his west coming.

29th Oct.—The same day the Magistrats and Counsell taking to their consideratioune the great abuse and filthines used in not dighting and reding the streits as they aught to be, conforme as is done in wthir weill governed cities, ordaines, therfoir, ane bauk to be sent throw the towne with touk of drum, to command and charge all the indwellers and buith keepers of ilk foir tenement of land within the ports of this burgh, and indwellers in the cloisses at the back of the foirtenements, that they furthwith, and in all tyme coming, wpon everie Saturday, caus harle and sweip the streit of all filth and dirt, from the crowne of the calsie to the drope of ilk ane of their respective foirtenements of land, the lenth of its front, and to remove the said fulzie aff the hie streits immediatly therafter, and that under the paine of four shilling Scots so often they sall happin to contravein the samyne; As lykways, they command and charge all the inhabitants within this burgh, within the ports therof, to remove all middings off the hie streit within eight dayes after the publicatioune heirof; and that, in no tyme coming, they lay out any middings wpon the hie streits without the drop of the houss, excepting that quhilk they sall caus tack or cairie awaye within eight and fourtie hours after the laying out therof, and that wnder the paine of fyve pundis so often as they sall contravein,

to be payit to him whom the the Magistrats hes for that effect appoynted.

12th Nov.—The said day the Provost, Baillies, and Counsell finding it necessar and requisit that ane register be keeped of all persons who happins to deceas within this burgh, They heirby appoynt Samwell Birss to keep the said Register, and to have fourtie shillings Scots weikly for doing therof.

The said day appoynts the Mr. of Wark to receive the turnours* fra the collectors at the mylnes, and to be payit therfor, as Hendrie Craig was, who collectit the same formerlie.

twa of the lait Baillies of this burgh, as commissionat from the merchand rank within the samyne, and did present to them ane supplicatioune from the said merchand rank, makand mentione that they, being informed of the Archbishop of Glasgow, his being now at Court at London, is of intentiounne to demitt his office as Archbishop in our Souereign Lords hands, and considering that the whoill citie and incorporatiounes therin hes lived peaceable and quyetlie since the said Archbishop his coming to this burgh, throw his Christian cariage and behaveor towards them, and by his government with great discretiounne and moderatiounne, and fearing, if his dismissionne be receavit, the samyne may tend to the great prejudice of this burgh and cuntrie about, and therfor intreating and desyring the saids Magistratis and Counsell to mak applicatiounne to quhat persones at Court they think most fitt, and in particular to his Grace the Duk of Lauderdaill, by lettres or uthir such correspondence as they sall pleis.

Wood, merchande in Edinburghe, and his partiners, in the ship callit the Broun Fisch of Dronteime, and maid offer of be him to this burgh at twelwe pund starling the tun, the receavers paying custome, excyss, and bullion, or at eighteen punds starling the tun,

frie of custome, excyss, and bullion, The said Magistrats and Counsell appoynts Rot. Rae, Peter Gemmill, the Deacon Conveiner, and Wm. Wallace, to taste the said wyne, and to tak notice how much therof is whyt, and how much claret, and quhat the hail quantitie is ; And befoir tasting, they are appoyntit to receave fra the said Wm. Wood twa hundreth marks, quhilk he offered to the towne in winter last, for getting libertie to sell eight or nyne butts of sek quhilk he had offered to this burgh, with power also to the saids four persones to quat the said twa hundreth marks to the said Wm. Wood, if he condischend to thame to tak the said wyne aff the toune, and not sell the samyne therin, quhair of he is heirby discharged on this termes.

9th June.—The said day appoynts Baillies Walkinshaw and Hall, the Deane of Gild, Conveiner, Peter Gemmill, and Rot. Rae, to meit and setle with Johne Graham, post Mr., and to setle with him anent the establishing of a post in the toune the best way they can.

20th June.—The said day appoynts the Deane of Gild to call for the bark mesours, and to tak informatioun how big the samyne war formerly, and to caus mak them so as they wer : As also appoynts the Deane of Gild to agrie with Johne Clark, measoune, for setting wp of thrie perchis wpon the thrie lawes betwixt Newport and Grinock, &c.

As also ordains Thos. Boyll to pay to Archd. Gray threttie pundis Scots, in satisfacioun to him of a hors, with saddle and brydle, he lost in the tounes service, when the blew-coats wer put out be the toune : As also to pay this persones who keeps the militia horss for this year, conforme to vse and wont.

The said day the Magistratis and Counsell being conveined, it was represented to them that Mistres Cumyng, mistres of maners, was to goe aff and leive the toune, in respect of the small employment shoe had within the same, quhilk they fand to be prejudiciall

to this place, and in particular to theis who hes young weomen to breid therin, It was, therfor, concludit by the saids Magistratis and Counsell, for her farder incurragement, if shoe will stay within the said burgh, that shoe shall have payit to her ane hundreth marks yearlie in all tyme coming, to pay her houss maill, so long as shoe keepes a school, and teaches childerin, as formerlie, and quhilk they obleist thame and their successors to performe accordingly by thir presents.

The said day the Magistrats and Counsel being conveined, In answer to the desyre and supplicatioune given in be John M'Claine, pypper, craving to be admitted as the tounes ministrell, They have given and granted, and heirby gives and grants to him that office as commoune pypper, or ministrell, within the said burgh, ordaining him heirby to goe throw the towne every day, morning and evining, or at such tymes the Magistrats sall appoynt, vsing his office, for quhilk they ar to pay to him yearlie during his service therintill, the sowme of ane hundreth marks Scots money, at twa termes, &c.

25th June.—The said day there was produced and red, in presence of the Magistrats and Counsell, ane act of his Majesties Secreit Counsell, quhairby the Magistrats of this burgh ar appoyntit to quarter sojors in the toune on theis who ar *suspedit* to keip conventickles, or resett vtted ministers. In obedience quhairunto, the Counsell of this burgh hes recommended the samyne to the Magistrats to caus put the said act to execu-

tionne, and to order the quartering accordingle, as they sall think fitt.

22d July.—The said day appoynts the Baillies, or ony of them, to grant warrant to the collectors at the mylnes to suffer malt to pas out of the mylne, excyse frie, for bruing to any persone my Lord Neill Campbell sall employ for bruing of ten or twelfe tunnes of beir, for the vse of my Lord Argyll, to be caried to the Hielands, the said persones declaring wpon oath they sall not mak use of any therof within the toune.

14th Aug.—The said day, quhairas it being presentit to the Magistrats and Counsell of this burgh that severall of the inhabitants within the samyne buyes severall quantities of woolnzairn and wool, butter, tallow, cheis, lint, tow, and uthir commodities within the said burgh, and caries the samyne home to their chops and houssis without bringing them to the tron or weigh hous, to be weighted therat, and pay the ordinarie dewes therfor, quhilk is fund to be prejudiciall to the commoune guid of this burgh, and to their taksman of the trone, quhilk being takin to the said Magistrats and Counsell, their serious consideratioune, they ordained and enacted that all and sundrie the inhabitants within the said burgh bring quhatsoever guids or commodities they buy or receive within the samyne, and in vse to be weighted to the weigh hous or trone, and weigh the samyne ther, and pay the ordinarie dewes to the troner therfor, in tyme coming, &c.

5th Feb., 1676.—The said day ordains ane bauk to be sent throw the toun to adverteis theis who hes not payit their Zuill wadges to the drummers, that they pay the same, uthirwayes the Magistrats will caus poynd them therfor.

9th Jan., 1677.—The said day it is concludit that there be ane commissioun sent to Niniane Andersoune, in Waterfoord, in Irland, to try if he can get four or fyve hundreth oackin trees to buy there, for the use of the breist-wark at Newport, at fyftine foote of lenth, and eight inches squar; and if they can be gotten, that he fraught a vessel ther for bringing them over, and appoynts the Provost to wryt to the said Niniane, in name of the toun, and to draw a bill upon the toun for payment of the said tries.

24th Feb.—The said day appoynts the lait Deane of Gild and Deacon Conveinor, to call for the whoill doytts and aitchesounes * in the tounes hands, and to sell and dispose therypon, or roup them, as they best can, for the weill of the toune.

The said day ordains the thesaurer to have ane warrand for the sowme of fyve pundis starling, given to Walter Corbett, lait prenteis to Andrew Purdoune, for chyinging the note of the chyme of bells in the tolbuith, quhen his Mr. was at Holland, and to helpe him to buy worklumes to sett up his trade ; and for the sum of four hundredth four scoir twa pundis ten shilling Scots, deburst be him for herring given to the tounes Advocates, and vthirs the tounes pensioners, this last year ; and for carriage of the said herring to Edinburgh, and for their said Advocats their fialls and Pensioune.

16th June.—The said day appoynts the Provest to use all dilligence to get the portratur of King Charles the First, that it may be hung in the Counsell-hous, with the rest now there.

The same day Archd. Gray and Jon. Drew ar appoyntit to find cautioune that *they* sall forbear the eating of the grass at the foot of the New Vennell, quhilk is appoyntit for washing and bleitching, and that all hors or kyne that beis fund theron be poyndit till they pay xx^s., and ordains the Deacon Convener to sic to the exacting therof.

The said day recommends to the Deane of Gild and Deacon Conveinor to try the sufficiencie of George Wallace to be a pynter, and _____ to be a plaisterer, and ordains them to be maid burgess.

6th July.—The said day it is concludit that some persone goe east to Edinburghe to assist the Provest to deall with the Duk of

* Atcheson, a billon coin, or rather copper washed with silver, struck in the reign of James VI., of the value of eight pennies Scots, or two-thirds of an English penny—from the name of the then Assay Master of the Mint. Jamieson.

Lauderdaill, who is on his way for Scotland, for getting some restriction put to the fishing company, and some libertie grantit to burgessis to salt herring, in caice the Provost think fitt, and appoynts a letter to be wryttin to him to know his mynd therein.

20th July.—The said day Jon. Bell, lait Provost, is appoyntit to repair to Edinburghe anent the tounes affaires, and speciallie to try if ther can be any restrictioun put to the priveledge of the Royall Company.

8th Sept.—The said day there was ane letter, subscrivit be the Magistrats and Counsell, direct to Bischop Lightoune, quhairof the tenour followes: My Lord, Wee receavit ane accompt from Mr. Andersoune of your favors and munificence towards the poor of this place, by the mortificatioun of thrie hundreth pundis starling, one half towards ane bursarie in the Vniversitie, and the vthir to twa poor men in St. Nicollas Hospitall; and we cannot but with all gratitude, and sense of obligatioun to your cair and zail to our poor, returne you most heartie (thanks) for this liberality, so, in compliance with your pious and charitable intentiones, we declare that we are verie weill satisfieit to accept on ws, and our successors, the debt of these sowmes to be payit in to ws, and that we will not only mak deu and thankfull payment of the annual rents therof, in maner as they ar by you mortefieit and designed, but we will endeavour, by all meanes in our power, that the whoill vthir circumstances and desygn of your so pious and charitable a work, be dewly observed, and intearlie and punctualle ordored according to your awne method, without innovatioun; and hoping your cair and affectioun for the poor sall not want its awne rewarid by him who repayes quhat is given to them, we doe alwayes remayne, my Lord, your Lordships most humble servants.

29th Sept.—The said day ordains the thesaurer to have ane warrand for fyftie sex pundis Scots, payit to Rot. M'Cuir, for a

terce of wyne furnished to Torrens on the tounes account ; and for sextie fyve pundis nynetine shilling twa pennies, payit to Jon. Robesoune, for drogs and medicaments furnished to poor people att command of the Magistratis, sen the twenty sex of May ; and for twentie thrie pundis x^s. Scots, payit to Colin Hammill for furnishing coall and candle to the guards sen the first of August last ; and for ten pund starling given to Mr. Niniane Patersoune, to help to print a book he hes dedicat to the toun ; and fyve pundis starling, given to Rot. Mak for his supplie, and for ten pund Scots, to Gabriell Conynghame and James Brounlie, for warning the Counsell the last year, as also for sex pundis starling, payit to James Thomesoune, in part payment of quhat he is to get for cutting the Kyngs armes, and for fyve pundis starling, payit to Johne Hendrie, in part payment of quhat he is to get for drawing the Kyngs Chorles the First his portratur, Likwayes for twentie-seavine pundis, ten shilling, payit to James Cleland, for making wp the excyse of the shyre this last year for the lands of Gorballs, and for twelfe pundis Scots, given to on James Williamesone, for helping the bigging of a brig betwix Hamiltoune and Lanerk, &c., &c.

in flame ane uthir, especiallie being contiguouslie joynd and reared w^p of timber and deall boards, without so much as the windskew of stone ; Therfor, they out of their dewtie to sie to the preservative of their burgh and citie, doe statute und ordain, that quhen it sall pleas God to put any of their nighbors in ane capacitie and resolutioun to build *de novo*, or repair their ruinous houss, not only for their probable securitie, but also for decoring of the said burgh, That each persone building *de novo* on the Hie Streit, or repairing, sall be obleiged, and is heirby obleist, to doe it by stone work from heid to foot, back and foir, without ony timber or daill, except in the insett therof, quhilk is vnderstood to be partitions, doors, windows, presses, and such lyk ; and this to be done, or engaged to, befor they be suffered to enter to building ; And seeing that severall heritors at present are not in a capacitie to build, and many vthirs having wnder boothes, and no intrest in the houss covering them, they being at present either not fitting to build, or unwilling, or may be belonging to minors, by which they have their chops uncovered, repairing to the Magistrats for libertie of covering themselves the best way they can for present, till it sall pleas God to capacitat the owners to doe the same, which desyre the said Magistrats and Counsell thought but just, Therfor, they thought fitt to licence the same to be done be the grund heritors, They alwayes enacting themselves to uncover the same againe quhen it sall pleas the super heritor to build, and not to com no farder out with the wpper structur nor the foir face of the vnder chops, and to build the same with stone, except the toune Counsell licence them, quhilk they will tak into their consideratioun how far they may, without spoyling the broadnes of the streit, they alwayes repairing it with stone in the foir wark, by arched pillars, and how many as the Toune Counsell, by the advyce of architects, sall think most convenient, &c., &c.

The said day recommends to Provest Bell, the Baillies, Deane

of Gild, and Deacon Conveiner, to lay doune some fitt way for getting the red of the brunt houssis takin aff the streit.

5th Feb., 1678.—The quhilk day the Provest, Baillies and Counsell being conveyen anent ane order sent be his Grace the Duk of Hamiltoune, as Sheireff of the Shyre of Lanerk, and present Baillie of the Regalite of Glasgow, conforme to ane ordor direct to him be the Lords of the Committee of his Majesties Privy Counsell for the Wast, requyring him to present the band ordored be the said Committee, to be subscryvit be all heritors, lyfrenters, and uthirs, within the said shyre and burghes therin, That they, their wyfes, bairnes, servants, and coaters, sall not be present at any conventickles or disorderly meitings, but sall live orderly, conforme to the Acts of Parliament made theragaint, vnder the paines and penalties mentioned in the said Acts of Parliament, but sall observe and fulfill the haill uthir heids and artickles contened in the said band, vnder the paines and penalties therin mentioned, quhilk being (takin) to the said Magistratis and Counsell their consideratioune, It was concludit and enactit be them, in obedience to the said Act, that the haill Magistratis and Counsell should immediatly tak and sign the said band ; and farder ordains the Deane of Gild to conveye the merchand rank, and the Deacon Conveiner the haill crafts, in their respective houssis, for taking and subscryveing the said band to the effect above wryttin.

(They afterwards, 26th March, get a bond of relief by the burgesses, “to relive the said Magistratis and Counsell, and their successors in office, of any hazard they or the communitie of the said burgh sall happin to sustein throw their taking the said band,” &c.)

16th Feb.—The said day the said Proveist, Baillies and Counsell considering what obligatioune they ly vnder by taking the band oblidging them that they, their families, and tenants, sall live

orderly, and fulfill the vther heids therein contened, as is ordored by the Committee of his Majesties Privie Counsell, be the quhilk the toune may be prejudged by their tennents of Gorballs and Provand that sall happin to live disorderly, They, therefore, have heirby enactit and ordained that their Baillies of Gorballs and Provand to sie the lawes put to executioun against the said tennents within their respective bounds, who does not live orderly, that the said toune and communitie therof be frie of any hazard they sall sustein therthrow, Certifying the said Baillies if they failzie therintill, that quhat prejudice followes theron, sall be on their awne hazard, and the toune to be frie of the samyne; and appoynts the present Magistrats to intimat the same to them.

The same day the said Magistrats and Counsell considering the greit loss sustened by many of the burgessis inhabitants, be having their houss and chops brunt be the lait accidentall fyre, and to let be sein how reddie they ar for the guid and weill of the toune, and of those people that hes a mynd to rebuild their houss and chops that were brunt on the foir streit, to advance to them some thing out of the tounes commoun purs als ample as they can allow, for their incuradgment to build. The said persones who sall happin to build, doeing the same in such ane regular way as the toune, or the Committee aftermentioned, sall think expedient, wpon guid advyce had theranent; And, in the mean time, its heirby concludit that all persones who sall build houssis, that their wind skewes be made of stone work; and they heirby commissionat and appoynt the Proveist, Baillies, Deane of Gild, and Deacon Conveiner for the tyme, and them they pleis to tak with them to consider on the said affaire, and to determine anent the said buildings, and quhat sall be given to the said persones that sall build for their incuradgment, and to report, &c.

2d April.—The quhilk day the Baillies and Counsell, being conveyined anent the complent given in befor them be John

Grahame, Procurator Fiscall of this burgh, against Thomas Crawforde, merchand burges therof, makand mention that upon yeasterday, the 1st of April instant, James Campbell, present Proveist of the said burgh, with sundrie uthirs the Magistratis and uthir burgessis, being standing on the plaine stones beneth the tolbuith, the place ordinarie for the Magistratis ther waiting and attending to heir the complents and grievances of the burgesses and uthirs, and to give them Justice incombent to their office accordingly: And at that tyme, being about thrie houres in the afternoone, severall persones of qualitie and strangers war standing besyd, the said Thos. Crawforde, in ane arrogant and prowde maner, without consideratioune or respect that he, as a burges of this burgh, oweth to his Magistratis, to whom he is sworne be his burges oath, to give them all dew obedience, most contrair therto, in a furious way, come to the said James Campbell, Proveist, and there fell in questioning him about sundrie things, and did challing him therupone; and the Proveist having desyred him severall tymes to decist, becaus of the straingers onlookers, and marvelling at the Proveists patience and the miscarriage of the said Thomas, Trew it is, the said Thomas wold nowayes decist, but said in a disdainfull way to the said Proveist, that he knew his malice, and wold byd the butt of it, and that within a short tyme its lyk he wold get word about with him, and that he defyed him with many more approbrious speeches, laying asyd both the fear of God, and his bundin dewtie to his Magistrats, Be all whilks, he hes committed ane great insolent wrong, And, therfor, craving the said Baillies and Counsell to wnlaw and fyne him, and to rive and destroy his burges and gild brother ticket, and to cry down his fredome, &c. (All which is ordered to be done accordingly.)

29th July.—The said day ordains Frederick Hamiltone to have ane warrand for the sowme of four hundreth marks, payit to Wm. Hoome, merchand in Edinburge, for twa yeares sallerie, advanced

to him in hand, for setting up and keeping the stadg coach betwixt this and Edinburgh, conforme to the agriement made theranent, quhilk agriement was productit and red, and the Proveist and Baillies commissionat to subscriyve the samyne in name of the toune, &c.

The same day the Proveist made report of his dilligence at Edinburgh, at the burrowes and conventioun of Estaits, and vthirs the tounes affaires, and productit a ticket grantit be Sir Wm. Sharp, of ane thousand and fyftie sex pundis Scots, for paying sex hundreth seaventie fyve pundis Scots, quhilk the toune deburst for shoos made to the Angous regiment, the remanent of the quhilk sowme is to be payit to the Earle of Strathmoir himselfe, being his regiment, quhilk he payit out for shoone to the said regiment.

7th Sept.—The said day appoynts the Deane of Gild to buy twa tries to lay betwixt the on syd of the Hie Kirk and the vthir.

The said day appoynts the doys and dinneries* that wer lying in the clarks chamber, and extending to twa hundreth threttie-four livers, ten sous, to be given to Hugh Nisbet, to be sent to France, to be disposed on ther, for quhilk he is to be comptable to the toune.

5th Oct.—The quhilk day, the said Magistratis and Counsell, considering the irregular carriadge of Johne Hamiltoune, their tennent in Provand, throw his keiping of conventickles, and how the Secreit Counsell is insensed against the toune for suffering him to doe the samyne; for preventing, therfor, the danger the toune may sustein, they heirby ordain Jon. Barnes, their Baillie of Provand, to eject and cast the said Johne Hamiltoune out of the said lunds, and to secure his guidis and plenishing, ay and until the toune be satisfeit of the rent, and that he bring in the keyes of the tounes hous till the samyne be disposed wpon, and for this effect appoynts the said Jon. Barnes to tak with him such

persones as he thinks fitt, and for doeing therof this sall be his warrand.

9th Oct.—The said day, in answer to the supplicatioune given in be Alex. Thom, architector, vpon severall consideratioues, the said Magistrats and Counsell hes given and grantit, and heirby gives and grants libertie and licence to the said Alex. Thom to reside within this burgh, and to exerce his imployment and calling in architectorie or in measonrie, and that fra the dait heirof, to the term of Candlemes 1680.

18th Jan., 1679.—The said day ordains * to pay to Johne Craig ten dukadounes, † quhilk is threttie-fyve pundis Scots, quhilk he is to send to Holland to Jonet Hutchesoune, naturall daughter of umqll. George Hutchesoune, for her supplie; And it is concludit that als much be sent her yearlie during her lyfyme.

31st Jan.—The said day complement being made be the Principall and Masters of the Colledge that some persones keeps Bulzard Tables, to the prejudice of the young men their scholars, frequenting the same neir the Colledge, quhen they sould be att their books, and particularly be on ‡ , who lives in Thomas Millers land, Its concludit that he be discharged to keep the same, and that no Bulzard Board be keiped betwixt the Wynd Heid and the Croce; and ordaines the Deane of Gild to sie this Act tak effect, and be put to executioun.

22d March.—The same day there was ane ordor productit be the Lords of the Committee of his Majesties Privie Counsell, ordaining the Magistrats of this burgh to give wp a list of the names and designatioues of the hail persones that ar or sall be

ludged in the Citie of Glasgow each night, to the guards, that the same may be given vnder the Lord Ross, or vther Commanding Officer vnder him, vnder the paine of ane thousand marks; As also commanding the Magistratis to turne out the wyfes and families of all vttered ministers, fugitive and vagrant preachers, inter-communed persones, from the Citie of Glasgow and suburbs therof, betwixt and the tenth of April nixt, vnder the paine of ane hundreth (punds) starling for each of the said persones who sall be fund therein after the said day, As the said Act of the dait the nyntine of Merch instant, at mair lenth beires, quhilk being takin to the said Magistrats and Counsell their consideratioune, they ordaine proclamatioune to be made throw the toune be touk of drum, to the effect forsaid, that non pretend ignorance, and remits to the Magistratis to sie the said Act putt to executioun.

9th Aug.—The said day ordains Jon. Goveane to have ane warrand for the sowme of thrie thousand, twa hundreth, and alevine pundis Scots, payed for the charges and expenss bestowed be the toune on the souldiers at the barracads, provision to their horss, and spent on intelligence, and for provision sent to the toune to the Kings camp at Hamiltoun and Bothwell, and for interteaning the Lord General, quhen he come to this burgh, and the rest of the noblemen and gentlemen with him, and for furnishing of baggadg horss to Loudoun Hill, Stairling, and to the camp at Bothwell and uthirwayes, conforme to the particular compt therof, &c.

23d Aug.—The said day ordaines the Mr. of Wark to pay to ilk ane of the toune officers twa rex dollors, in respect of the loss of the custome at the fair of Glasgow last; and also to pay to the Gorbail officer vther twa rex dollors; and lykewayes to pay to Rot. Hill twentie pundis Scots, for the loss of a baggadg hors that was lost at Loudoun Hill, sent alongs with Clavors troupe and dragounes, and to place the same to the tounes account.

13th Sept.—The said day recommends to the Proveist to tak quhat persones he pleases with him to the buriell of the Lord Cochrane, who is to be interred on the xxv. of this instant, conforme to the letter direct be the Earle of Dundonald for that effect.

The said day the Magistrats and Counsell having considered Mr. Harie Marschells petition, quhairby he compleines of the chyrurgians and formacians, their refusall to admit him frie with them, as they doe to uthirs, They ordaine intimatioune to be made to them to produce their rights, or quhat they have to say why he should not be admittit, against the nixt Counsell, quhairin if they failzie to make certificatioune, the Toune will grant him licence to set wp.

[The Surgeons refuse to admit him, but without assigning reasons, and a long Council minnte of 23d Sept. grants him the required licence.]

23^d Sept.—The said day ordains the Mr. of Wark to pay to Wm. Blak twentie pundis Scots, to helpe him to build ane stone lumheid in his hous.

30th Sept.—The said day ordains the thesaurer to have ane warrand for allowing in his awine hand seaventie-nyne pundis, ten shilling, iiijd., for drogs furnished be him to the poore people in the toune, since the fyftine day of May last, at command of the Magistrats, and to pay to James Robesoune, baxter, twentie pundis, for helping him to build ane oven to baik plack pyes in, as also the sowme of twentie pundis Scots, to buy him ane laid of wheat, to incurradge him to baik guid breid, and to pay to Maister Thomas Findlay fyftie pundis Scots, to buy him clothes and books.

30th Dec.—The said day ordains threttie-sex partizans to be made for the vse of the toune handsomlie, and to be gilded at the heid.

30th Oct., 1680.—The same day recommends to the Baillies to

tak strick cours with theis inhabitants that gives not up a list of these strangers they quarter nightly, vnto the guard : As also with these that dights not the streits conforme to former proclamatiounes emittit for that effect.

21st Dec.—The quhilk day appoynts the Deane of Gild and Conveiner to caus helpe the old bukits, and to mak ane hundreth and fyftie new ons ; As also to caus mak some short leddirs.

The said day ordaines Jon. Robesoune to have ane warrand for the sowme of thrie hundreth sextie pundis nyne shilling Scots, payed be him for the expenses and hors hyres of these that went to the buriell of Kilburne his Ladie, and to the buriell of the Ladie Blackhall.

The said day appoynts the Deane of Gild, Deacon Conveiner, with James Colquhoune, to sight the spout was made for quenching of fyre, and sie if it can be made zit vse of in caice of neid.

30th April, 1681.—The said day there wer some proposells productit fra the ministers regraiting the great paines they are at in preaching so oftin, for want of a fyft minister, they not being able to conteniow any moir in preaching, taking notice of skandails, and doeing the rest of the dewtie incumbent to their imployment, they finding the same to be so weightie, and, therefore, cravand the toun wold be pleased to present some fitt persone in place of the minister of the Blakfreir kirk, for easing them of a pairt of the burdine, quhilk, conforme to ane letter from the Archbishop, was earnestlie recommended to the said Magistrats and Counsell for granting therof and siclyk, that the Archbishop did declair that whomsoever he should present to exerce the function of the parson in the Hie Kirk, that he wold doe (the) same be the joynt advyce of the said Magistrats and Counsell, quhilk being takin to their consideratione, they appoynt thanks to be given to the said Archbishop for his cair in provyding on to be parson, and

taking their advyce theirintill, and that the Bischop may be desyred that he will insist to gett Mr. Kairne-corss to supplie the office of parson in the said Hie Kirk, and that he be told that they will have their thoughts on some persone to be the said fyft minister.

The same day appoynts Wm. Carpander, servitor to Mr. Richard Crump, Esquyr, somtyme Major of Bristoll, to be admittit burges and gild brother gratis, for several favors done be them to our tounes people at Bristoll.

25th June.—The same day there was ane letter direct be the Earle of Argyll, in answer to the tounes, sent to him,* quhairby he doubts not but they all know that his Majestie, out of his Royall bountie, did bestow wpon him a part of that estait quhilk was his faythirs, frie of ony burdine, and disposed on the rest, conforme to his Royall prerogative, so that by no law or reasoun he can be lyable to these debts mentioned in the tounes letter to him, but that he is verie reddie at all occasiounes to serve the toun, quhairin it is possible without ane indispensable ruine to his familie.

The said day ordains James Colhoun to have ane warrand for the sowme of twelfe hundreth threttie-sex punds, payit to him for French wynes, given be the toun to the Archbisshop of Glasgow and uthirs, this last year, and for sek and uthir things, sent to Edinbrughe, to friends there, conforme to the compt therof, quhilk sowme is to be allowed to the said James, at his compt making of the excyse.

The said day ordains George Jonstoun to pay to Rot. Corss twa hundreth and eighty punds Scots, for French wyne sent to Edinburgh to the Duck of Albany and vthirs, of the growth 1680, conforme to the compt therof, quhilk is to be allowed to him at his comptmaking of the excyse.

13th Sept.—The same day ordaines the Clark to wryt a letter to the Proveist at Edinburgh, showing him that the Deane of Gild, Conveiner, and sundrie of the Counsellors, wer aff the toune, and so could not get a quorum, but that they who wer present had pervsed his letter direct to them, quhairby he craves their opinion as to the Earle of Argylls affaire, and resigning the tounes privileges in his Majesties hand, and to show him that they had agried and concludit that the persuit against Argyll anent getting satisfioun of quhat he is due to the Hospitall and Minister of the Blackfreir Kirk, should be prosecutt, and to tak such wayes and methods for doeing the same as should be most proper; and as concerning the privileges of the burgh, if he cannot get them repaired as to their liberties, to desyre him to vse his indeavor to get quhat they have preserved, for they resolve on no accompt to resign their royaltie.

1st Oct.—The said day the Proveist acquainted the Counsell that he had got advertisment that his Royall Heighnes wold be att Glasgow on Moonday nixt, and therfor appoynts the hail Counsell to attend vpon the Magistratis, for waiting on him, That the handsomest of the young men of the toune be warined to beir pirtizains in their (hands), to wait wpon him, as sall wait wpon him; * and ordains a proclamatioune to be sent throw the burgh, ane proclamatioune, * ordaining the inhabitants to put out baill fyres at the heid of ilk closs at such tymes as they be warned by rining* of the bells, vnder such penaltie as the Magistrats sall condiscend on.

8th Oct.—The said day the Proveist, Johne Bell, gave ane accompt of the hail expenss the toune hes bein at in intertaining his Royall Highnes and these that were with him, the tyme he was heir, quhilk is as follows, viz.: To Robert Brock, for silver

and gold boxes given to his Royall Highnes with his burges ticket, and to his servants with their burges tickets at their admissions, and for uthir silver work made for the intertainment wpon the tounes accompt, one thowsand, fyve hundreth, eighty-eight punds, fourtein shilling. *Item*, To Alex. Vaws, for confections at that tyme, four hundreth, threttie-twa punds. *Item*, Drink money given be the Proveist to the Dukes servands, sex hundreth and sixty punds. *Item*, To Hugh Blair and his servant, for coming out of Edinbrughe, and their attendance heir at that tyme, sixtie-four punds. *Item*, For provisions in the Proveists hous, the tyme the Duke was there, and these that were with him, eight hundreth and sixtie punds. *Item*, For wyne, the said tyme, four hundreth and twa punds, extending in the haille to the sowme of four thowsand and one punds, twelfe shilling, quhilk compt was approven, &c.

20th Dec.—The said day, in answer to the letter direct to the Magistrats and Counsell of this burgh be the Ministers in Litle Poland, It is concluded that ane letter be sent, in name of the toun, to James Cornwall of Bonhard, to be transmitted to the saids Ministers, declareing that the toun hes condescendit and agried to accept of such two young men as the said Ministers shall think fitt to send hither for the Colledge, and that they will maintain and keep them at the Colledge ay, and till they shall be found qualified for being Ministers of the Gospell.

4th Feb., 1682.—The same day grants libertie to John Bucklie to sett wp a wark hous within the toun, for dying of silks and linens, and the lyk, in answer to the supplicatioune given in be him desyring the same.

25th April.—The same day the following letter direct to the Magistrats and Counsell of this burgh, be the Marqueis of Montrose, was produced and red, quherof the tennor follows :—Edinburgh, 5th Apryll, 1682.—My Lord Proveist and Gentlemen, His Majestie having appoynted me Baillie of the Regality of Glasgow,

in quhilk, as in all other capacities, I am or shall be stated, I resolve to imbrace every occasion faithfully and zealously to advance His Majesties service, and being confident that you will be no less forward, in your respective statiounes, to promote the Royall interest; and withall, having many resons to have a singular respect to your city, in which I have my friedome, and intend to have my neighborhood, I thought none fitter to discharge the dewty that office owes His Majestie, both for His Majesties service and my credit, then Baillie Nisbett, your Deane of Gild, whom, for my respect to your city, and the personall kyndnes I have for himself, I have deputed Baillie of the Regality, as by the commission heirwith sent appears, and I do resolve to continow it to his successors in that Magistracy, without some indispensable caws to the contrary, this being the greatest testimony I can at present give of my respect to your city. I expect reciprocally that you will see that office dewly and honourably discharged for His Majesties service and my credit, which is my great concern; And if any thing else fall in my way wherein I may be serviceable to you, it shall appeir wpon all occasions that I am really your affectionat friend and servant.—Sic subscribitur MONTROSE.—Conforme thairunto, the forsaid commissione was produced and red, And the saids Magistrats and Counsell ordained that there should immediately be ane letter of thanks written and subscryved be them to the said Marqueis of Montrose for the honour and favour His Lordship hes put wpon the toune by his said letter and commissione, and quhilk was accordingly done, quhairof the tenor also follows: Glasgow, 25 April, 1682.—May it please your Lordship, your servants the Magistrats and Counsell of Glasgow, with all humility and thankfulness, have received your Lordships most oblidging letter and commission therin contained, to Hugh Nisbett; our present Dean of Gild, which (as a new chain of obligation to your Lordships noble predecessors kyndnesses to

this place,) hath so straitly obleiged ws, that, without being reckoned among the chiefest of ungrate, we cannot bot acknowledge the true sentiment we have of your Lordships great and undeserved favor, and especially for your Lordships confidence in this, and our readines to serve his Majestie and the royall interest in our stations, wherof we hope your Lordship sall never have grund to doubt, either of your Lordships present choice of the person, or his successors in office, bot that it shall rather prove to your honour, in seing justice administered to the people without their grudge, the peace preserved, and your right mentained, for all quhilk, (most noble Lord,) The Magistratis and Counsell thought it their dewty to insert this favour and their gratefull acceptance therof in their Records, and to return your Lordship their most hearty thanks and humble obedience, and doe promise and declare that your Lordships satisfioun therin shall be our great endeavour, and that they hope your Lordship shall never be under that indispensable necessity of alteration, so long as it shall please the Lord to preserve them in any capacitie to serve your Lordship, and chearfully they will imbrace all occasiones to serve His Majesties interests and your Lordship with that humble dewty and dew respect that becometh them who wisheth all increase of honor, health, weifare, and happiness to your noble family; Aud that God may long preserve it is the earnest desyre of them, who begs pardon to subscribe themselves.

5th June.—The said day ordains the Proveist to have a warrand for two hundreth and fourty pundis Scots, payed to Edward and James Fountains, masters of the revells, for discharging the ventners in toune of the charges of horning given them, for keiping games or playes, of quhatsoever kynd, in their houssis, and for frieing them of the lyke in tyme coming, during their gift; and for twenty pundis starling, payed to Mr. Richard Tweddale, for transporting him fra Kelso, to be parson in Glasgow; and for ten pund,

ten shilling, for the charges and expenses the toune was at the 29th of May last; As also for four hundred pundis Scots payed to Litlegill, for helping to build the twa bridges wpon Clyd and Dunedin, in respect he hes given his obligatioun, as the toun desyred, for freeing the burgessis and inhabitants from paying any custome thereat.

1st July.—The said day appoynts the Dean of Gild and Deacon Conveiner to take ane inventar of the bibleothick in the Gramer Schooll, and to caws mak ane press to put them in, and delyver the same to the Master, and tak his receipt thairfoir.

13th March, 1683.—The said day ordaines the thesaurer to pay to John Maxwell, wright, the sowme of fyve pounds starling, quhilk he payed to the montebank for cutting off umqll. Archibald Bishops legg.

FROM TREASURER'S ACCOUNT.—DISCHARGE.

18th Sept.—*Item*, For helping to bigg a stane bridge at Innernes over the river of Ness, be warrand, dated 4th May, 1682, 400^{lib.} 0^{s.} 0^{d.}

28th Sept.—The said day . . . ordains the thesaurer to have ane warrand, &c., and for fyve hundred merks payed to Mr. John Bell, which was allowed to him be the toun more than what he gote formerly, for building his land in a decent way, and decoring Bells Wynd, &c.

29th Sept.—The same day appoynts the Proveist, Baillies, Deane of Gild, and Deacon Conveiner, with Johne Crawford, to take ane accompt of what sack and wynes hes bein furnished be the toune to severall persones the last yeir, and to report the same

to the Counsell the nixt meiting, As also to take ane account what reckonings is restand in any taverns in the toune, that hes bein spent wpon the tounes accompt this last yeir, that warrand may be granted for paying the same, and to report, as said is.

The said day, &c., to pay to George Duncan twenty four pounds, for service done be him in furnishing of roses and flowers to the Counsellhouse and Kirks, to the Magistrats and Counsell, &c.

1st Oct.—The said day James Campbell, lait Proveist, gave in ane protestation, quhair of the tennor follows:—Wheras, ther was ane voluntar gift made by the Merchands and Deacon Conveeners Houses to the Magistrats for the tyme, of raising the excyse of the boll of malt from two merks vpon each boll, (conforme to Act of Parliament,) to three pounds Scots, of purpose for defraying the charges and expenss of the burgh, and for paying of the debts and vthir publict burdens affecting their toune and commone good therof; and now finding that the same hes, conforme to the said voluntar gift, bein exactit these twelve moneths bygane, by you, the present Magistrats and Counsell, without imploying the same for the ends and vses aforsaid, and without so much as making ane compt therof, contrair to the practise of former Magistrats and Counsells, Therfor, I, James Campbell, lait Proveist, for myself, and in name of the Merchands and Trades of the Toune Counsell, and of both the saids House, adhering heirunto, doe heirby protest against My Lord Proveist, Baillies and Counsell, refusers to adhere, that ye may be liable for compt, reckoning, and payment of what shall be made appear to be received by you, or any of you, of the said excyse since Michaelmas last, to the effect the same may be imployed for the ends and vses above rehearsed, and that befor the Judge Competent, and for what coast, skaith, and damage this burgh hath received by your misappling the same, And vpon this, my protestatioune,

for myself, and in name forsaid, I ask and take instruments, &c. ; and farder, that no money be allowed in any compts, except what there is warrand for of the Toune Counsell, conforme to the constitution of the toune : Quhilk protestation being given to the Proveist, he made and gave in the following answer therto : The Proveist, Baillies, and Counsell of Glasgow, and sua many as will adhere to them, asserts and maintains that the protestationes given in be James Campbell, lait Proveist, are in themselves most calumnious, groundles, and vnjust, and meere forgeries, in so far as the protester himself was Proveist of Glasgow for severall years and his accompts ought and should be canvasced als weill as ever any Proveists accompts were (without reflection) ; As also his successor to that office, and who was Proveist prior to him in the burgh, his accompts is in that same station with his : And the absurdities committed by both of them, not only by inverting the state of the Counsell, sett of the burgh, and inhansing the excyse in their own hands, is too palpable, especiallie sieing that Johne Bell, when he was Proviest of Glasgow, did by himself intromett with the excyse of the toune of Glasgow, and disposed vpon the same at his pleasour, having no warrand therfor from the Toune Counsell of Glasgow ; yea, farder, many of his procedors and actings, when he was Proveist, was without any booked or registrat act of Counsell, to the great hurt and prejudice of the common weill therof, as can be instructed : As particularly the said Johne Bell, being Proveist of the said burgh, did, in the year 1681, at his own pleasour, without any Act of Counsell, provyde severall silver plate and rich furnishing for intertaining of great persones vpon the toune of Glasgow its proper and great expenss, and did appropriat the same for his own behove by ane surreptitious or clandestine Act of Counsell ; And his accounts now gevin in to the Magistrats and present Counsell of Glasgow, cannot be allowed by them to him, either in conscience or reason, being

most exorbitant; bot it seems, and may easily appear, their refusall therof to him, is the occasion and caws wherfor the said James Campbell and he is drawing ane factious and contentious pairtie with them, (that was joynd with them the last year,) which party hes occasioned great dispeace, trouble and expenss to the toune of Glasgow, in severall actions, and particularly before the Lords of His Majestys Most Honourable Privy Counsell the last yeir, By whose Lordships they wer found to be factious persones, conforme to severall sentences, &c., By all quich, it may appear the forsaid protestatiounes are of purpose to disturb the peace of the toun of Glasgow, and are in themselves meer janglings, proceeding from ane discomposed, unjust, and fanaticall principle, (and party whom they formerly connived and complied with against his Majestie and lawes,) who, of purpose to reestablish themselves in that former imployment, for monopolizing the toune of Glasgow in their own hands, makes so great clamor; And with all submission, this answer is remitted to the Judge Competent, &c.; And farder, as to the last addition, that no money be allowed, &c., it is answered, that the protester and his adherers have been, and are for the present, the reall impeters of the allegiance, because they wer about the same, when the protestatioune was entered against them.

13th Oct.—The said day it is enacted, statute, and ordained, that no persone shall ryde, in convoying any persones aither fra or to the toune, nor spend any money in taverns or otherwayes, without ane ordour fra the Proveist, or in his absence, fra the eldest Baillie present and the Deane of Gild, otherwayes the same is to be wpon their own expenss and the toune not to pay the samyne.

The said day ordains Robert Fynnisonne to have ane warrand for the sowme of twenty pound sterling, payed be him to the Proveist, quhilk he deburset for the portraiture of his Royal

Highnes, quhilk is put vp in the tolbooth, in that rowme where the Toune Counsell sitts.

21st Nov.—The said day ordains the Mr. of Wark to pay to Donald Nicolsons four rex dollors, for helping to mak vp the loss of a horse he had stolin from him.

17th Dec.—The same day appoynts the Dean of Gild and Deacon Conveener to conveen their respective Incorporatiounes, and try if they can sell the salt and cask, and knappell* belonging to the Fishing Society, either by rowpe, or to get them to take it amongst themselves, for the touns best advantage.

22d April.—The same day ordains one proclamatioune to be sent throw the toune to-morrow, ordaining all non-conformist preachers to remove themselves off the toune, within forty-eight hours after the proclamatioune, and their families betwixt and Whitswunday nixt, conforme to ane Act of His Majesties Privy Counsell, dated the 27th of July, 1680.

17th May.—The said day ordains the thesaurer to have ane warrand for the sowme of eight rex dollors, payed to Mr. Wm. Geddes, minister, for his incuradgment to print the twa books called Memoriall Historicum, and another book sett out by him.

17th July.—The said day ordaines John Fleyming, Dean of Gild, to pay to Jean Main thretty pounds Scots, for helping to pay the funeralls of Jonet Hutchesone, ane pensioner of the toune, who deceist in Holland, &c.

26th July.—The said day Andro Purdoun is appoynted to receive the excyse fra the Collectors at the Mylnes, and to begin this day eight days; and the Mr. of Wark is to receive the black money* thairof.

23d Aug.—The said day ordains Robert Fynnison, thesaurer, to pay to John Finlay, maltman, the sum of eighty seven pundis nyne shilling, restand to him, quhilk was spent in his hous at severall tymes, be the Magistrats on the touns account, since Michaelmes 1682, &c.; And lykwayes, to pay to James Anderson the sowm of ane hundreth twenty eight pounds Scots, for rosa

solis and chestnuts furnished be him to the Magistrats, that was given be them to some persones the last yeir, conforme to the accompt therof red and allowed, &c.

26th Sept.—The said day the saids Provest, Bailleis, &c., made report that they had considered John Woddrops petition, with the loss of his hydes that was taken out of his holes, and laid on wpon the sydes of the housis for saving them from the lait fyre in Gallowgait, which they fund to be very considerable, and therfor, for helping to repair the same, they thought fitt to give him vp his band of nyne hundreth and fyftie merks, granted be him to the toun for the drawin teyndis this cropt 1684, whilk report was thought just and reasonable, &c.

The said day Baillie Anderson gave in ane accompt of the hail particular furnishing, furnished be him, that is within the Generalls lodging, quhilk he was desyred to buy for that end, wpon the tounes accompt, and quhilk compt extends to seven hundreth, twenty-fyve pundis, ten shilling, and was allowed and approven, and ordains the said Baillie to be payed of the said sowme, he making the said plenishing forthcoming, and delyvering the same, conforme to the said compt, to some person, in name of the toun, quhilk they ar to keip for the use above written.

The said day ordaines to pay to John M'Cuir, wryter, the sowm of ane hundreth pund Scots, for his pains and expenss in going to Edinburgh laityly for getting the Archbishops hand to a new tack of the teyndis of the Barony, and going throw the countrey and getting the Dean and Chapters hands to the same, &c.

The said day Alexander Thom gave in ane compt of his cutting the Kings armes wpon stone, furnishing ane stone thairto, peynting and gilding thairof, and cutting the Kings armes on timber for the Kings seat in the High Kirk, contryving the modells of the frontispiece of the lafts thairof, and for cutting severall

thistles and crouns for the use of the said seat, and his hail panes and attendance thairon, and the taking doun and putting wp the said lafts, and for eight cedar tables and the pertinents belonging thairto, furnished be him for the use of the toun, whereby the toun will be restand to him by and attour what he hes receaved formerly, the soum of four hundreth and fyve pundis Scots, quhilk compt was allowed and approven.

27th Sept.—The said day ordains Rot. Fynnison, thea-
surer, to have ane warrand for the sowm of twa hundreth and
fourty poundis Scots, payed be him for silver and gold ribbens for
burgess tickets, given to noblemen and gentlemen, and thair ser-
vants, since May, 1683.

The said day ordains _____ to pay to James Muir,
Richard Manuell, and James Heriot, writers in the clerks chamber,
the sowme of ane hundredth and eighty pundis, for taking up severall
lists of the hail inhabitants in the toun, and wryting bilyets, and
helping the Quarter Mr. for quartering the soldiers, and for attend-
ing at the chamber for a considerable space till ten o'clock ilk
night for taking up of strangers names and giving them into the
guard; and for furnishing of parchment to gratis burgess tickets
these twa yeirs; and for severall tymes wryting the test, and vther
extraordinar pains and wryting, quich was very meikle this last
yeir.

27th Oct.—The said day the said Magistrats and Counsell con-
sidering the sad condition the toun is in throw the great debt they
are resting, It is, theirfoir, concludit that the toun shall make use
of no persone as the touns physitian, or chirurgian, in tyme com-
ing; and if any persone who is unwell, and deserves to be cured,
wpon their application to any of the Magistrates, They are em-
powered to recommend them to any physitian they shall think fitt;
And discharges the paying of any money to any pensioners, or
vthirs, on the touns account, till the Counsells farder ordour, &c.

The same day the Magistrats and Counsell, considering the great clamour made be the townes people by the abuses committed by the lait Magistrats these few yeirs past, by decerning severall persones to pay debts and sowmes of money to others, and extorting and exacting fynes from several of them, without vsing ane probatioune or decerning any formall sentence against them in public court, far contrair to the law and practique of the burgh; for remeid therof, it is enacted and concluded that, in tyme coming, none of the Magistrats within the burgh, Baillie of Gorballs, nor Watter Baillie, shall have power to fyne any person except by conveyning the transgressors in a publict court, &c.

4th Nov.—The quhilk day the said Provest, &c. being conveyned, and taking to their consideration ane former act of the Magistrats, &c. daited the 27th day of Sept. last, ordaining the thesaurer to delyver wp to John Barnes, lait Provest, his band, granted be him to the Magistrats, &c. for the tyme, of the sowme of seventeen hundred and six punds, twelve shilling and six pennies, quhilk he is restand to the toune, without any payment, and declairing him to be free of the samyne sowme, for the great pains and trouble he hes bein at in ryding and doeing the townes affairs these two yeirs; and also finding, by the accompts given in be the said John Barnes, and allowed to him be the Magistrats, &c. for the tyme, that the same is very exorbitant, and far beyond any allowance given to former Proveists, considering the townes affairs was in agitation for the tyme, and lykwayes taking to their consideration that their was never any allowance given be the toune to any former Proveist, for his paine in their affairs, but only allowance for their just debursements and expenss, and sua they conceave it wnreasonable that he should be exonered of the said band; Therfor, &c. (rescind the said act, and ordain the clerk to produce the bond, and ordain it to be put to execution.)

17th Jan., 1685.—The said day the Proveist made report of his

dilligence at Edinburgh, and produced Sir George Lockhart, and the rest of the tounes advocates, their information anent what is fitt to be done in the tounes affairs, and particularly to call the lait Magistrats and Counsell to ane accompt for imbazling the tounes revenews aud common good, and that ther wer summons of reduction raised for reducing some bands and acts of Counsell granted be the lait Magistrats, quherof one granted to the lait Archbishop of Glasgow, now of St Andrews, for twenty thousand merks, granted for a tack of the teinds, with the bands granted to Coustoun, Baillie Andersone, and Jon. Andersone, Mr. of wark, quhilk report was allowed and approven, and appoints the reduction to be prosecute, &c.

The said day the Magistrats and Connsell considering how unbeseeming it is in the streets of the toun, to sie the samen so filthie, by peoples letting middings and fulzie ly therupon, and not clating the streets as they ought to doe, Therfor, they heirby inact, statute, and ordaine, that no persons shall lay out, or suffer any middings to ly on the street longer than they may have a competent tyme to take them away ; and that the streets be clated and made clean once every week ; and that the samen be done be ilk persone forganis his own land, be these to whom the land pertains, at least, be these who gets the fulzie of the closs, and that under the pain of four shillings Scots *toties quoties* they failzie to cleanse the said street once a week, quhilk is to be paid to Thomas Vrie, quhair of thrie shilling to be applied to his own use, who is heirby appointed to sie this Act put in executioun ; and the vther twelve pennies to one of the toun officers, whom he is to take alongst with him to sie the samen done ; And if any of the inhabitants shall suffer any fulzie to ly longer wpon the streets than they may conveniently take the same away, the said Thomas is heirby impowered to cause take the same away, and imploy the same to his own use ; and in respect there is severall persons that

hes not convenient places in backsydes to lay their fulzie in, they appoynt Baillie Johnston and the Dean of Gild to look for some convenient place by the way leading to Crapenstock, quhair the people may lay their fulzie ; and also appoynts the said Thomas Vrie to look for what strangers and persones that want testificats come into the town, and to give in ane list theirot to the Magistrats weekly, or monthly, for quhilk he is to have 40s. for his pains.

14th Feb.—The said day ordains John Ritchie to pay to the Provost the sowm of ane hundredth fyfty nyne pundis fyftein shillings Scots, that was spent be him on the touns accompt, the tyme the Earle of Carnwath and remnant Commissioners of Counsell and Justicarie sate here annent the apologeticall declaration.

28th Feb.—The said day the said Magistrates and Town Counsell taking to their consideration that our dread Sovereigne the King (James VII.,) hes be his proclamation, ordained a Parliament to meet at Edinburghe the nynth of Apryll nixt, commanding and requyring all shyres and burghs to make choyce of their respective Commissioners, and thame and all vthers concerned to attend the same at that tyme, In obedience to the quhilk proclamatioune, the saids Magistrats and Counsell have unanimously elected and choysen John Johnston of Clachrie, present Provost, to be Commissioner for this burgh at the said Parliament, and ordains the Clerk to give ane ample Commission, &c., (which Commission, after the usual clauses, proceeds) ;—Attour, we testifie and declare our said Commissioner to be a man fearing God, of the trew Protestant religion, presently in publict profest and authorised by the laws of this kingdome, without suspicion of the contrair, ane merchand inhabitant in our said burgh, bearing all portable charges with his neighbours within the same, and is such as may tyne, and win in all their affairs : In witness wherof, &c.

13th March.—The same day ther was ane humble address, subscribed by the Magistrats and Toune Counsell, to be presented to his Sacred Majestie quhair of the tennor follows: *To the Kings Most Excellent Magestie, &c.*, As we, your Majesties most dutifull and loyall subjects, could not bot in a very special manner have a deep sense of, and be much afflicted for, the inexpressible loss of our lait gracious Monarch, by whose care and protection we wer so weill defended from the dangers that did constantly threaten ws from disorderly neighbours, for quhilk loss each of your Majesties subjects is truly greived, according to the degreis of his sense and loyalty: So this grateful and decent sorrow does not at all hinder us from blessing *Almighty God*, and having our hearts filled with sincere joy for your Sacred Magesties accession to the throne of your Royall ancestors, by whom we and our predecessors have been so long protected, and from whose own extraordinary experience als weill as wisdome and courage, we have just reason to expect that this corner of the kingdome will be again reduced to quiet and happines, and the trade, by which this place is only supported, will be secured and encouraged by that extrordinary skill which your sacred Majestie hes in affairs of that nature, in return of all which, we shall endeavour, with hearts far more loyall then any professions we can make, not only to concurr ourselves in our own stations in your Majesties service, bot be very exemplar to othirs, in spyte of all dangers and opposition, though we have very good reason to hope that none of these will threaten your Majesties peaceable reigne, which, that it may be als happie as your Majesties great vertue deserves, and as our sincere loyalty should inspyre us to wish, shall be the constant and ardent prayer of, *may it please your sacred Majestie, your Majesties most humble, most faithful, and most dutifel subjects.*

16th May.—The said ordains the Mr. of Wark to pay to one Anthoine Nauder, a Frenchman, thrie rex dallors, to help to carry

him and his wyfe off the toun, he having left his cuntry for his religion.

10th Aug.—The said day ordains the thesaurer to pay to John Hall, younger, chirurgian the soun of fourty pounds Scots for cureing of James Hamilton, son to vmppl. James Hamilton, wryter, of ane whyte scabbed head, being ordained to be cured be the Provest, quhilk sowme shall be allowed, &c.

The said day ordains Robt. M'Millen to pay to George Johnstoun, Baillie, the sowme of ane thousand, fyve hundreth, twentie-eight pund, thrie shilling, four pennies, Scots money, debursd be him for baggage horses, furnished for carieing the artillery and others belonging to the Kings forces, and furnishing of post horses and their ryders, and for foot posts the hail tyme of the lait rebellion, fra the tyme that the lait Argyle and his accomplices invaded this kingdome, conforme to the compt therof, &c.

The same day ordains the thesaurer to pay to John Hall, elder, the soun of fyfty fyve pounds two shillings Scots, for dressing the lait Argyle, Rumbold, Mr, Thomas Archer, Mr. Lockhart, and ane poor Dutchman, the tyme they wer prisoners in the tolbooth, being all wounded, and for furnishing drogs to thame, conforme to the compt.

The same day the Proveist made report that he had been dealling with my Lord High Thesaurer and Cash-keeper for getting the tounne reimbursd of what money they had payed for baggage post horses, and uthirs, the tyme of the lait rebellion, quhilk my Lord Thesaurer was very willing should be done, but that ther was no money at present to pay the same, bot that my Lord Thesaurer and Cash-keeper had offerd to give als much meall out of the Castle of Stirling as wold pay the same, at such rate as they should aggree; quhilk being taken to consideratioune, they appoynt the Proveist to repair to Edinburgh anent getting payment of the tounes said debursment, either be meill or what other way

he can obtain the the same, and to speak my Lord Thesaurer anent the tounes other affairs, befor he goe for London.

19th Sept.—The said day the Proveist made report of his diligence at Edinburgh anent the tounes affaires, and that he had got ane order from his grace My Lord High Thesaurer and Cash-keeper for getting als much meall, at seven merks the boll, lyeing at Stirling, for paying what money the toun advanced for baggage and post horses, and vthirs, the tyme of the lait rebellion, quhilk meill he declared is come to Glasgow already, and ordaines the same to be sold at the best advantage, for the touns use.

9th Jan., 1686.—The said day appoints the Proveist, Baillies, and Dean of Gild, to gratifie such of the touns friends as they shall think fitt, by sending them what wyne they think convenient, on the tounes accompt, and to caus pay the samen accordingly.

10th April.—The said day ordains John Ritchie to pay to George Johnstoun, Deane of Gild, the soume of thrie hundreth pundis Scots, depursed be him the tyme of the lait rebellion, by and attoure what was allowed and paid him formerlie vpon that account, of quhilk he declares he can give noe accompt, but that he depursed the same.

5th July.—The whilk day compeared John Johnstoune of Clachrie, lait Proveist of the said burgh, who, in obedience to ane decret and ordinance of the Lords of His Majesties Most Honourabell Privy Counsell, did, before the saids Magistrats and Toune Counsell, crave pardon for his cryme and injurie done to his Grace the Archbishop of St. Andrews, in the termes contained in the saids Lords of Privy Counsell their decret pronounced against him theranent, dated the 25th day of June last: Wherupon the said Proveist Johnstoune took instruments.*

28th Jan., 1687.—Whilk day the gift granted be His Most

Sacred Majestie to this City, was produced and read, wherby His Majestie grants to the Proveist, Baillies, &c., ane imposition of four pennies Scots money upon every pint of ale and drinking beir browne or imported, &c. ; and lykwayes an imposition of fifty pundis money foresaid, on everie tunn of French wyne ; 50^{lib.} on everie butt of Spanish or Ranish wyne ; 50^{lib.} upon everie butt of Brandy, Aquavytie, or strong waters ; and twentie shilling money foresaid, upon everie barrell of Mum beir, † vented, sold, and retailed within the said City, to be applyed in maner mentioned in the foresaid gift, Whilk was very acceptable to the saids Proveist, &c. ; and ane letter of thanks ordained to be sent to His Majestie of their acknowledgment of His Majesties clemencie and bountie to this City, wherof the tennor follows :—May it please your Most Sacred Majestie, In the deepest sense of gratitude, wee most humblie prostrat ourselves at your Royall feet, acknowledging your Majesties clemencie and bountie towards this your Citie of Glasgow, in rescuing it from sinking under inevitable ruine, by your Majesties late princely grant of a moderat imposition on such liquors as are consumed amongst ourselves. By this new and seasonable relieff, your Majestie puts a fresh and lasting obligatioun upon that important place. In returne to which we can humblie assure your Majestie that as this your new bountie shall be carefullie applyed and improved for the support and relieff of this Citie, so it, our lyves, and our all, shall be continuallie devoted to the service of your sacred person, crown, and monarchie, upon all ocasioness ; and wee shall make it our most indefatigable care and indeavor to make this City eminent and examplarie in its loyalty to all about us, so that your Majestie shall never have cause to repent your Royall care of and munificence toward it ; for our pairt, who, by your Majesties nomination, represent

your authority here, wee shall, under the prudent conduct and unspotted loyal example to the Most Reverend Archbishop, your Majestie hath been graciouslie pleased now to nominat for ws, witness to the world our fervent zeall against all your adversaries, and unshaken fidelitie to promot your Majesties interest and service, as is the bounden dewtie of, may it please your Most Sacred Majestie, your Majesties most humble, most loyall, and most obedient subjects and servants.—Follows the tennor of ane other letter, whilk was sent be the Magistrats to the Earle of Melfoord (his Majesties Secretary: May it please your Lordship, As we are eternallie bound to His Sacred Majesties bountie and munificence to this city, in granting the lait imposition, &c. ; so wee consider ourselves infinitely indebted to your Lordships care and goodness in giving a true representation of the perishing state of this place, and solíciteing his Majesties Royall help, without which it would have utterlie perished. By this, your mediation and intercession, you have done true and excellent service to his Majestie, als well as to this poor place, by putting new lyfe in it for serveing the ends of the Monarchie, from which it was quite disabled, and for freeing and relieving itself from such sad pressure and burdens under which it must needs have sunk : For this great and seasonable servise to his Majestie and to ws, wee offer you our most humble and heartie thanks, and most earnestlie beseeches your Lordship to accept of ane humble present, or gratuitie, from ws, which, though it be farre below your merit, and bears no proportion to the benefite aryseing from His Majesties gift, yet it is a small testimony of that gratitude wee owe to your Lordship for so great favour and pains, and for saveing us the great charges and expenses of sending Commissioners to Court to solícite and agent this necessary support and releiff for this City ; and though we cannot offer your Lordship ane suitable remuneration, yet wee shall pray that God, for this and all other your eminent services

rendered to the Crown, and to this your native country, may reward your Lordship with all honor and prosperity here, and eternall happiness heirafter, for wee are, May it please your Lordship, &c.

The said day the saids Magistrats and Counsell taking to their consideration that there is ane gratuitie to be given to the procurers of the said gift from his Most Sacred Majestie, They ordaine ane thousand pounds sterling to be borrowed, and made readie with all expedition, to be payed in the first end of the said gratuitie.

14th May.—The said day ordains the thesaurer to pay to Allan Glen the soum of sex pound nyne shillings sterling, for the pryce of ane horse quhilk he lost, being spoiled and died with ryding with the Provest to Edinburgh, and whilk was ordained to be payed to the said Allan Glen by Act of the Magistrats, &c., dated 29th Sept., 1684, [authorizing him to be paid “be the toun of the six pounds nyne shillings for a horse he had new bought that died at Edinburgh, being bursten ryding thither be the Proveist.”]

13th Sept.—The quhilk day the saids Proveist, &c. being convened anent ane act made be them in favours of the Archbishop of St. Andrews his Ladie, of the date the nynth day of August last, by which they had appoynted her fiftie pounds sterling, in satisfaction of ane gratuitie promised to her, the tyme the personage teinds of Glasgow was set to them be the said Archbishop, and considering that the foresaid soume is over and above the pryce payed be them for the saids teinds, and that any promise she had for the same was only made to her by some few members of the Toune Counsell, and never allowed nor approven of by the rest, and lykwayes considering that, since the making of the said act, they have, be the advyce others, fullie considered the worth of the said teynd, and therupon finds that the highest rate that can be gottin or exacted be them for the same will come fare short of the pryce payed be them therefor, sua that they, upon all the foresaid

considerationes, and after mature deliberation, &c. find sufficient ground and cause to recall and annull the foresaid gratuitie and act above specified : Therefor they have rescinded, &c. and declares the same to have been frae the beginning to be now, and in all tyme coming, void and null.

28th Sept.—The said day the Provest, Baillies, &c., being certainlie informed that severall of the inhabitants marie, and baptize their children, at the meeting houses, They heirby ordaine the hail inhabitants within the said burgh, to booke their marriages, and what children they shall baptize, in the publict and authentic Register as formerlie, That hazard may be evited, and minors may not be prejudged when extracts of their age may be called for at the publict Register, and that they pay the ordinary dues, therefor, to the Clerk, Beddells, and others concerned, conforme to use and wont, under the pane of three pund Scots, to be exacted aff the contraveeners *toties quoties*.

17th Dec.—The said day ordains the thesaurer to pay to James Smith, merchand, the soume of ane hundreth punds, Scots money, for tries and cabers, that was taken frae him be the Duke of Gordones men, that wer here the tyme of Argyles rebellion, whilk they brunt upon the Green of Glasgow for their eldine,* &c.

27th March, 1688.—The said day there was ane testificat produced in favor of Duncan Campbell, subscrivit be the hail doctors and most part of the chirurgianes in toune, of his dexteritie and success in cutting of the ston, as also in sounding with great facilitie, and hes given severall proofes therof within this burgh, whilk being taken to the said Magistrats and Counsell their consideration, they nominat and appoynt him to cutt such poor in toune as he shall be desyred be the Magistrats, in place of Fvir M'Neil, who is become unfit to doe the same through his infirmitie.

26th June.—The quhilk day their was ane letter direct by his

Grace my Lord Archbishop of Glasgow, to the Proveist of the said burgh, whilk was publicly read, narrating, that his Grace finds, by the depositiones of the Master of the Gramar School, and one of the Doctors of the same, that Mr. Hugh Muir deserts his charge sometymes for one day, sometymes for two, without leave from Magistrats or Master ; As, also, both by witnesses and his neighbours, it is found that he doeth exerte too rigide and cruell methods of dissipline, and doeth rudely and unworthilie treat the Master ; and that he did insolentlie upbraid Baillie Gilhagie in ane publict place and companie, to whom, as being ane present Magistrat, he did no honour and reverence, And therefore, and for other reasones contained in the said letter, his Grace judges he ought to be removed frae his office as Doctor in the Gramer Schooll, and this to be his oppinion ; Whilk letter and determination of the said Archbishop was acquiesced and condescended to be the saids Magistrats and Counsell.

The said day ordaines the theasurer to pay to Baillie Bell the soume of twelve pound sterling, for ane hodgehead of sack, and fourtein pound sterling, for halfe ane tun of French wyne, and seven pounds, sextein shillings, and eightpence, more foresaid, for two cask of rasenies and two cask of figs, all furnished by him, on the tounes accompt, of the growth 1687, whilk were given to severall of their friends the last year, extending in Scots money to the soume of ffour hundreth and sex pound four shilling, conforme to the compt therof.

3rd Aug.—The said day ordaines the thesaurer to pay to James Gibsone the soume of ffyve hundreth and fyfe pund, fyve shillings Scots, whereof thrie hundreth and fiftie pund is for seven barells of gunpowder, and ane hundreth, fiftie and fyve pund, fyve shilling, for French wyne, furnished be him on the tounes accompt, and whilk powder and wyne was made use of at the solemnitie for the birth of the Prince of Scotland and Wails, &c.

13th Oct.—The whilk day there was ane letter produced, subscribed be my Lord Chancellor, direct to the Proveist, &c., wherof the tennor followes ; —Gentlemen, your heartie offer to raise ten companies, consisting each of ane hundreth and twentie men, for the service of the King, and securing the peace of the cite of Glasgow, is equallie acceptable to the Privie Counsell, as it is dutiful to the King ; And, therfor, you are heirby not onlie authorised and empowered to raise and levie these companies, and to appoynt officiers to them, But I am desired, in the Councils name, to give you their hearty thanks for this seasonable service, and tender of your duety to his Majestie. Such citizens as ar heretors, who may be necessary for ordoring these companies in your city, are remitted to your Archbishop, to be, in the name of the Counsell, dispensed with from their attendance, with the heretors of the shyres, as he shall judge needful. This I am appointed to signifie to you, in name of His Majesties Privie Council, and to desire the continuance of your zealous endeavour for His Majesties service, to whom your duetifull letter shall be transmitted.—I am, gentlemen. your verie assured friend, (sic subscribitur,) PERTH, Cancell. J. P. D.

The said day it is concluded that the hail widowes within the toun that are able, cause provyde ane sufficient man with ane fire lock and ane sword, and keep guard frae tyme to tyme, as it falls them, with the rest of their neighbours, and appoints ane proclamation to be sent throw for that effect ; As also the hail other inhabitants to bring sufficient armes with them at ilk mounting of the guards, and to bring powder and ball with them ; Also certifieng ilk person that failzie, they shall be fyned and unlawed in twentie merks Scots.

13th Nov.—The whilk day it being represented that severall of the inhabitants neglects to appear and keep the guards when it falls to their turne, Therefor, it is hereby enacted and concluded,

that whatsomever persone that shall be absent frae the guard, and shall not mount the samen at the ordinar tyme, sufficientlie, armed with ane sufficient fyrelock and ane sword, that they shall be fyned and unlawed in twentie merks Scots ilk persone, &c. ; And that noe persone goe off the guard without leive of their officers, under the paine of being fyned in three pundis Scots, and punished as the Magistrats shall think fit.

23^d Jan., 1689.—The said day, in respect that the regiment in the toune refuses to obey the Magistrats, it is concluded that the said regiment be disbanded, and are frae this tyme disbanded, bot that ther shall be ane guard kepted nightly of sextie men, for preventing of stealing and accidentall fyre, as God forbid, and to goe on nightly, and dimiss in the morning, and the toune to furnish them coall and candle ; As also, that these who hes colours and syths, either give in the same to the toune, or pay the samen themselves, and these that gives back the same for the tounes use—that the toune pay for them ; As also, that the touns partizans be called in for, and recommends the Dean of Gild and Deacon Conveener to sie the samen done.

24th Jan.—The said day the Proveist gave in ane adress to be presented to his Royall Highness the Prince of Orange, whilk was allowed be the Magistrats and Toune Counsell, and subscriyvit be the most pairt, and appoynts the Proveist to advyse whether he send the samen or not, and by what persons it shall be presented to his Highness, and the said adress was delivered to him for that end.

2^d Feb.—The whilk day, there being ane letter direct to the Proveist of Glasgow, be Mr. John Buchan, agent to the burrowes, at desyre of the Proveist of Edinburgh, desyryng the toune to send some persone to meet at Edinburgh with the commissioners for the burrowes of Edinburgh, Perth, Dundee, Stirling, and Kirkaldie, for consulting anent the calling of ane Convention anent what

measures shall be taken for promoting ane unioun of trade betwixt Scotland and England, The Proveist of Edinburgh having received letters frae London that the Peers and Commons of England did inclyne thereto, whilk being taken to consideration, they appoynts and commissionats the Proveist to repair to Edinburgh and meet with the Proveist of Edinburgh and remanent burrowes, and to commone anent the said affaire, and to advyse with them and to give report, &c.

18th May.—The said day appoynts the Proveist and Baillies to call and conveyin these persons who brack the pecks in winter last, and these who had accession thereto, and use all dilligence possible against them, conforme to law, till they make als many pecks in the place of these that were brocken, or, at least, pay in the money for doeing the same, and otherwayes to fyne them and punish their persons by and attour payment of the pecks; As also, that the like be done against these who brack the tolbooth, for doeing whereof this shall be ane warrand to the saids Magistrats.

The said day the saids Magistrats, &c., being conveyned anent the petition given in to them be William Somervell, takisman of the pecks, craveing allowance and defalcation aff his tack dewtie, for the loss and dammage he sustained by brecking of the pecks, whilk was done on the eightein day of December last, and the losing of his change since that time, and the ale he had spoiled, and other abuses in his house, through the persons thronging in that brack the pecks, and by keeping the horse guards in the Meill Mercat be the gentlemen of the shyres, in winter last, whereby he was necessitat to keep servants for preserving the victuall in the Mercatt, and for furnishing some candle to the said guard, whilk being taken to saids Proveist, &c., their consideration, They quatt and give doune to the said William Somervell the soume of two hundreth and twentie fyve merks resting be the said Wm.

of his years tack dewtie, for the said pecks, and ordanies John Boyd, the thesaurer to allow the samen to him. &c.

16th Aug.—The said day, there being a double of a signator or letter of gift produced and read, quhilk is to be presented to their Majesties King William and Queen Marie, for getting the election of the Provost and Bailies of this city in their owne hands (bishops now being abolished), whilk was allowed and approvine, And appoints John Andersone of Dowhill to repair to London, for presenting the samen to the King and Queens Majesties for getting the same made effectuell, and ordaines a commission to be given to the said John Andersone for that effect. &c.

18th Jan., 1690.—The said day the said John Andersone, proveist, produced ane Letter of Gift, granted be their Most Sacred Majesties King William and Queen Marie, whilk their Majesties ordaine to be made and passed under their Great Seall of this Kingdome of Scotland, not onlie ratifeing, approveing, and confirming the hail, chartors, priveleges, grants, and concessions, from any of their Majesties Royall Predicessors, to and in favour of the communitie and city of Glasgow, to the Gildrie, Trades, and severall Incorporationes or Deacones therof, as effectuellie as if every severall erection, chartor, or grant, were particularlie enumerated, or therein repeated ; And likewayes, their Majesties being come in place of the Archbishop of Glasgow, for themselves, and for any other right competent to them of new, Give, grant, and dispone to, and in favours of, the said City of Glasgow and Towne Counsell thereof, full power, right and libertie to choise and elect their Proveist Baillies, and hail other Magistrats, In the ordinar maner, and at the ordinar tyme, as freelie as any other royall burgh in the said kingdome doe or may choise their Proveist, Baillies, and Magistrats, begining the first election at Michaelmas nixt, and so to continow in all tyme comeing ; and their Majesties ordaines the said letter to be extended in the most ample and best forme, and to pass the

great seall, and promise to ratifie the same in the nixt Session of their Majesties Parliament.

1st Feb.—*Proclamation to be sent throw the Toune against Debaushrie, &c.*—The said day ordaines ane proclamation to be sent through the toune prohibiting and dischargeing the hail inhabitants, and others reseiding within this burgh, that they, nor nane of them, drink in any taverne after ten a clock at night on the week dayes, or in tyme of sermon, or therafter, on the Sabbath dayes, vnder the paine of fourtie shillings Scots, to be payed be the furnisher of the drink, and twentie shillings Scots be the drinker, for ilk failzie *toties quoties*, wherof the one halfe to the informer, and the other to be applyed to the use of the poor ; As also prohibiting and dischargeing the saids inhabitants and others that nane of them sell or buy any kaill pott-herbs or milk on the streets upon the Sabbath day, under the paine of twentie shilling Scots to be payed by the seller, and the like soume to be payed be the buyer, *toties quoties* ; and likewise prohibiting and dischargeing the saids inhabitants and others that nane of them bring water from wells, or doe any other servile work, on the Sabbath day, under the paine of twentie shilling Scots of penaltie for ilk failzie ; and that nae person profane the name of God by cursing and swearing ; and prohibiting all persones that nane of them set any houses to tennents, or fie servants, who are strangers or vagrant persones, who produces not ane testimoniall of their good behaviour frae these places from which they came, under the paine of ten punds, Scots money, for ilk failzie *toties quoties* ; and lastlie, dischargeing any person, or persones quatsomever, to suffer any of their bestiall to goe on the old or new Greines, or to take away any of the stabbs belonging to any of the saids Greines, under all severe punishment, at the will of the Magistrat.

24th Feb.—The said day ordains the thesaurer to pay to Williame Baxter the soume of two hundreth fourtie two punds, four

shilling, eight pennies, Scots money, for whyte and bleu teffities furnished be him for the touns collours, being ten pair of them, And for silk, threed, ribbens, and other furnishing therto, and for the pryce of ane new hatt and ane hatt band, whilk was given be the Magistrats to ane of the officers of the English Dragounes, conforme to the accompt therof given in and allowed.

7th Aug.—The said day the Proveist produced a letter direct to the Magistrats of this burgh, frae the Earle of Crawford, Lord President of their Majesties Privie Counsell, giveing thanks to the Magistrats and Toune, for their good service in drawing the inhabitants together, and keiping them in armes for their Majesties service, and defending the Toune, and ordains the samen to be insert in the Counsell-book, of the whilk letter the tennor followes: Right Honorabell their Majesties High Commissioner and Lords of Privy Counsell have thought fitt to signifie to you, that they doe not onlie approve your meeting and keeping together in armes, for the securitie and peace of your toune, and the encouragment of others to be foreward in their Majesties service, als weell as to be in readiness to goe against the rebels in the Highlands, that threatned the countries safety, bot also to tell you how sensible wee are of this seasonable and readie expression of your affection and dewtie for their Majesties service, and the preservation of the peace of the kingdome, for which we give you heartie thanks, assureing you, that, as the maintenance of the true Protestant religion, now hapiely satled in this Church, and of our lawes, rights, and liberties, are, and will be, their Majesties chieff care, So your quiet and contented peace and prosperitie, in mutuall love, sobrietie, and the solid practise of true pietie, will be ever their greatest satisfaction.—Signed by warrand, and in name of the Councill, by your most humble servant, (*sic subscriptur,*) CRAWFURD, J.P.D., Sth. Con., daited thus—Edinbr., 2d August, 1690,

The said day the said Provest, &c., taking to their consideration that their Majesties High Commissioner did grant ordour to the toune of Glasgow to scnd four hundreth of their tounes people to Stirling, for defending of that place in absence of their Majesties

forces frae that place, And, accordingly, the toune having sent ther about three hundreth men, or thereby, whilk coast the toune for their charges, expenses, and intertainment, ane considerable soume of money, for defraying wherof ther was delivered to John Aird, who went to Stirling with them, the soume of ane hundreth and threttie pound stirling, Ordains warrand, &c., for said sum.

27th Sept.—The said day ordains the thesaurer to pay to John Baxter, meilman, the soume of three score ane pund, 13 shilling, four pennies, Scots money, for eight bolls of meill sent be the Magistrats and uthirs to the garison at Drumikill, in their streats, at desyre of Captaine Stewart, who commanded the said garison, with twentie eight shilling for cariage of the said meill.

4th Oct.—The said day, the saids Proveist, &c. being conveened, and taking to their consideration the severall abuses hes been committed these severall years past, by electing and choiseing of Magistrats and Deacon Conveeners in this burgh who kepted change and publict taverns, which occasioned much debaushire and drunkenness, and poor people to spend their money, needlesslie in the saids taverns, It is, therefore, hereby enacted, statute, and ordained, in all tyme comeing, that nae person or persones be elected and choisen to bear office as Proveist, Baillies, Dean of Gild, Deacon Conveener, Baillie of Gorballs, or as Water Baillie, who keepes ane publict tavern or change-house, and that in caice any such persones, who do presentlie keep ane publict change shall be elected and choisen to be in any of the saids offices, before they be admitted to exerce the same, Ordains them to find cawtion, obleidgeing themselves that they shall not keep any change dureing the tyme of his exercising therof, vnder the paine of ane thousand merks, Scots money, &c.

6th Oct.—The said day, the said Magistrats, &c., being conveened, and takeing to their consideration that, be Act of Parliament, dated 10th of Sept. last by past, the soume of fourtein

shilling Scots, for every hearth within the kingdome, is to be payed, and the Lords of Privie Counsell, for the better ingathering of the said Hearth Money, have, be their Act, dated the 29th of the said moneth of Sepr. last, ordained the Magistrats of the royall burghs to meet in their severall burghs, at the tyme specifit in the said Act, and make a true and exact tryall, and inquire what number of houses, tenements, mylnes, smiddies, kills for drying of graine, ovens, furnaces for brewing, salt pannes, glass and soapworks, are within their respective jurisdictiones and liberties, alseweill these inhabited as these which are waste, and who are the possessors of the houses and vthirs foresaids inhabited, and who are the owners of such as are waste, (excepting allwayes Hospitalls, and the houses of poor people who are vpon the charitie of the severall burghes), and what number of hearths are in each house, lodgeing, or tene-ment, and vthirs foresaids, and what the total number of these hearths does amount to, and transmitt ane duplicat therof, vnder their hands, to the Clerks of their Majesties Privie Councill, conforme to the said Act, &c. They, therefore, nominate and appoynt John Brysone, &c.

21st Nov.—The whilk day the said Magistrats, &c., takeing to consideration, that, upon the threttein day of October last, John Reid, wright, being killed in the execution of his office, being corporall of the tounes guard, by hindering some abuse was committed in the toun that night, They have enacted and concluded that the persones who were present and committed the said deed, be persewed therefore, on the tounes expenses and charges, &c.

6th April, 1691.—The said day ordaines the theasurer to have ane warrant for the soume of ane hundreth fiftie three punds, twelve shilling, eight pennies, Scots money, payed to James Hamiltone, wryter in Edinburgh, that he disbursed in raiseing the criminall process at the instance of Elizabeth Cochrane, relict of the deceast John Reid, wright, and their children,

against Capitane Bryce and vthirs, officers in Sr. James Leslies regiment, and their servants, for killing of the said John Reid, &c.

23^d May, 1691.—The said day ordains Thomas Peter, late thesaurer, to have warrand to detaine in his oune hand the soume of two hundreth four score twelve pund nyne shilling, whilk was lost be the hay and corne that was furnished to the Danish forces when they lay at Glasgow, more nor the money payed be him to these who furnished the same, and what he received therefor frae the saids forces; and for eightein pund Scots, &c.; and three score ten pund to Baillie Brock, for paying that whilk was furnished to the English horse and dragounes when they were quartered here, &c.

The said day the said Proveist, &c., being conveened, the Dean of Gild and Deacon Conveener made report, that, conforme to the ordinance of the saids Magistrats and Counsell, They had met with Margaret Hamiltone, widow, and had agreed with her that she shall have libertie to keep ane commone cookrie within this burgh during her lyfetime, for serving the burgesses, and strangers that shall come to the towne, for whilk she hes condescended to pay fiftie merks Scots to the toune, whilk report is allowed and approvine, With power to the said Margaret to keep the said cookrie, and to have the freedome as ane burges and gild brothers relict dureing her lifytyme, as a widow, she paying in the fiftie merks foresaid to the thesaurer.

12th Sept.—The said day, &c., considering whereas great and

many abuses in the night tyme, have been of late committed by severall inhabitants of the toune, by maskerading, and other insolencies offered to the guards and others of the toune, to the great scandall of religion, and contempt of authoritie, and hurt to severall persones, for preventing whereof, these are hereby discharging and prohibiting all and whatsoever persones, upon whatsoever pretext, to goe through the toune in the night tyme maskerading, or sirenading, or in companie with violles or other instruments of musick, in any numbers, Certifying all such who shall committ any such abuses, shall be fyned in ane hundreth punds, *toties quoties*, and punished in their persones, and proceeded against by Church censure, as persones nottoriouslie scandalous, and appoints a proclamation to be sent throw the toune to intimat the samen.

24th Sept.—The said day, &c., John Corse and John Gibson, late Baillies, who were nominat and appointed to meet with Mr Lewis de France, musitian, and to agree with him to teach the inhabitants in toune to sing musick, made report that they had met with him, and that he very willinglie condescended to teach the inhabitants music, and to take onlie fourtein shilling per moneth, for ane hour in the day, from these that comes to the schooll, and fourtein shilling for wryting the threttein comon tunes and some psalmes, the schollars furnishing bookes, and also condescended to teach such poor in the toune as the Magistrats be their ordour shall appoint him, and that for nothing, whilk report was allowed and approvine; And for his incuradgement, the saids Magistrats and Counsell have agreed that the said Mr. Lewis de France get ane hundreth punds Scots money payed him yearlie be the toune, and that dureing their pleasure, and no longer, commencing frae Lambmass last, and that there shall be no publict schoolls teaching musick dureing the tyme foresaid, except what the said Mr. Lewis shall keep, &c.

4th Oct.—The said day ordains the toun theasurer to pay to Walter Brock the soum of _____, for intertaining Irish persones in meat and drink in the tolbooth of this burgh, by order of the Magistrats, that were taken in the Hielands, and sent here be the Earle of Argyle and others who apprehendit them, and that frae the 4th day of Augt., 1689, till the 27th day of March, 1690, conforme to the accompt thereof given in and allowed.

12th May, 1692.—The said day the address that was given in to the Right Honorabill the Lords of their Majesties Most Honorabill Privie Councill, in name of the Citie of Glasgow, to be transmitted to their sacred Majesties King William and Queen Marie, was produced and read, &c., quherof the tenour followes:—To their Most Excellent Majesties King William and Queen Marie, our dread Sovereignes, The most humble and loyall address and offer of the Magistrats and Counsell of the Citie of Glasgow, for themselves and the communitie therof, presented to the Most Honorabill the Lords of their Majesties Privie Counsell, to be transmitted to their Majesties, May it please your sacred Majesties, Wee, your Majesties most humble and faithfull subjects, taking into our consideration the report of ane invasion and descent into Brittain, said to be intended by cruell and barbarous French and Irish Papists, and others their adherents, to the indangering of our religion, lyves, liberties, and lawes, and that we doe reallie owe the preservation of all these dear and precious interests to the Kings most Excellent Majestie, as the great and glorious deliver, whom God raised up and honoured, to save us from that sore and violent oppression, uuder which wee had long groaned, and to rescue us from Poperie and slaverie, whereby wee were at lenth readie to have been swallowed up, (a releiffe and blessing never to be forgotten,) doe, therfor, most humblie, heartilie, and cheerfullie offer our lyves and fortunes for the defence of this Kingdome, and of the true Protestant religion, and your Majesties roy-

all authoritie and government therin, against all who shall attempt to invade, quarrell, or impugne the same in any sort, promising that wee, and all of us, will be readie on all occasions to come furth with our armes and competent provisiones, vnder such faithfull officers as shall be appointed over us, to oppose, overthrow, and vanquish, to our power, all such enemies as shall darre to rise up against God, your Majesties, and us, over whom wee trust that God shall every where, and ever more, give your Majesties all success and victorie. Subscryvit, and presented be the ordour, and in name, of the saids Magistrats and Counsell, at Edinburgh, the 6th day of May, 1692, &c.

11th March, 1693.—The said day ordaines the theasurer to pay to John Patersone, wright, the soume of ane hundreth and twelve punds, Scots money, for making ane cabinet of shottles to hold the tounes chartors and papers, and for furnishing timber and other necessars thereto, conforme to his accompt, &c.

17th Nov.—The said day ordains John Robertson, late theasurer, to pay Ninian Hill, of Lambhill, the soume of ane hundreth pounds sixteen shilling for corne that was eaten and taken away aff Rams-horn, that belonged to George Stirling, tennent to Lambhill, be the English regiment that was commanded be Sir John Lanier, whilk soume was allowed to the toun be the publick, being the free money. The expens in obtaining the allowance being deduced.

13th Jan., 1694.—The said day ordaines the Mr. of Wark to pay to Adam Todd four dollars, to help to pay the cure of James Todd, his son, who wes deadlie woundit at Killicrankie.

[7th Feb.—Mr. Robert Park, advocate, was elected Town Clerk “dureing the saids Magistrates and Counsell their pleasure,” and in the minute of 17th Feb. there is a detailed statement of the fees chargeable by rhe Town Clerk, as well as of the “dewes of the Dean of Gild his court.”—See below, minute of 2d Nov. 1694.]

12th May.—The whilk day the Provost, Bailies, and Counsell, haveing it formerly under their consideration that Ninian Hill of Lambhill, was about to sell his lands of Ramshorn and Meadowflatt, and that some person, or persones, who might purchase the said lands, might, perhaps, improve the samine, to the prejudice of this burgh, Therefore, and to the effect any such prejudice might be prevented, the Toun Councill did formerly appoint and recomend to the Provost, Bailies, and some others of the Town Councill, to commun with the said Ninian Hill anent the buying and purchasing the saids lands from him in favours of this burgh, And now the saids Magistrats and Town Councill, considering that the forenamed persons had agreed with the said Ninian Hill, for the soume of twentie thousand three hundreth merks Scots money, as the pryce of the saids lands, to be payed at Whitsunday nixt, at which tyme the disposition thereof is also to be subscriyved; Therefore the saids Magistrats and Town Councill doe now heirby approve of the said transactioun and agreement, and in regaird it is agreed betwixt the Town Councill and the three Hospitalls after specifit (*viz.* the Merchants, Trades and Hutchesones Hospitalls), That the said Hospitalls shall equallie and proportionally make payment of the said pryce, and thereafter get from the saids Magistrats and Town Councill rights and dispositions of the saids lands proportionable to the soumes so to be payed be them, to be holden in few of the said town for the yearly payment of small few dewties, and their dispositions and rights to be burdened with such burdens, provisions, and conditions, as shall be thought fit to prevent the improving of the saids lands heirefter to the prejudice of the town: Therefore, the saids Magistrats and Town Councill heirby binds and enacts themselves that immediatly after receiveing of the said disposition frae the said Ninian Hill, in their favours, and the forsaid pryce from the saids three Houss, or Hospitalls, they shall denude themselves of the said lands propor-

tionable to be holden, and with the conditions and burdens above specifit ; And in caice the said Town Councill shall failzie to grant in favours of the said Hospitalls the foresaids rights and dispositions, that then, and in that caice, they shall refund and pay back to the saids Houss, and ilk ane of them, their respective soumes, so to be payed out with the annual rents of the samine, from the tyme of the advancing thereof,

[In a previous minute regarding these lands there is the following clause :—“And there is ane gratuity to be given to Lamblills Lady, not exceeding fifteen guineas.”]

8th Sept.—The whilk day the Magistrats and Town Councill being conveened, There wes a supplicatione presented be the trading merchands of this burgh, craveing that the Magistrats and Town Councill would take to their consideration the great advantages and conveniencies specifit in the said supplicatione, that would arryse not only to the merchants and traders within this burgh, bot also to the hail inhabitants therof, by establishing of three posts in the week, And establish three posts in the week to goe for Edinburgh and return, and that they would consider such methods as to make the same effectual, which petition being read in presence of the saids Magistrats and Councill, They appointed and heirby appoints and recommends to John Corse, Dean of Gild, and John Anderson of Dowhill, late Provest, to consider upon what methods may be taken to establish the saids three posts a week, and what expenss the same may coast, and to report their diligence therin and judgment therof, &c.

2d Nov.—The whilk day the Provest, &c., being conveened, they doe heirby commissionat and appoint James Peadie and John Andersone, late Provests of this burgh, and James Slosse, ane of the present Baillies therof, or any two of them, to repair to Edinburgh as soon as possible, and make a just and true representation of the way and maner how umqll. Mr. Robert Park,

Town Clerk of this burgh, was murdered by umqll. Major James Meinzies, and of the way and maner how the said Major Meinzies wes killed be one of these persons who, be ordor of the Magistrats, went in persute of the said Major for apprehending and bringing of him to justice : As also the said Magistrats and Town Counsell doe heirby commissionate and appoint the said three persons, or any two of them, as said is, to use all diligence, and take all care, to defend John Gillespie, tailzeor, burges of this burgh, against any persute that may be against him upon the accompt foresaid, &c.

[The expense of defending an action at the instance of Major Menzies' friends, amounted to £3540: 0: 4: Scots, or £295: 0: 9½: sterling.]

17th November.—Ordain the thesaurer to pay Andrew Angus, litster, sex pounds Scots money, in respect that he being one of these that persewed aftor Major James Menzies, murderer of Mr. Robert Park, late Town Clerk, he wes hurt and wounded in his returning by some of the officers of Lord Lindsayes regiment (as informed) wherby he is unable to work, and this for supplying of his present need because of his poverty.

19th Jan., 1695.—[The Council records upon its minutes that although the Magistrates and Town Council had on “the fifth day of this instant subscribed” an address to King William “upon the sad emergent of the death of his Royall Consort Queen Mary,” yet they “thought it not convenient to ingross the said address in their Counsell book untill the same might have come to his Majestie’s hands, therfore they *now* ordain,” &c., &c., &c.]

6th April.—Whilk day, in answer to a supplication given in be Archibald Haddua, a student of Philosphie, presently lawried, or to be lawried,* ordains the thesaurer to pay to the said Archibald the soume of twentie four pounds, Scots money, for

supplying his present wants, and helping him to buy cloathes and books.

20th April.—Appoints the thesaurer to have allowance in his own hands of two hundreth merks, payed out be him as the pryce of ane hogsheid of wine given to a friend of this town, whom it is not fitt to name. *

The whilk day, &c., ordains the Thesaurer to pay to the Mr. of Wark the soume of two hundreth ffourtie ane pounds eight shilling eight pennies depursed be him of incident charges in the persewing of the deceist clerk his murderers.

12th Sept.—The whilk day the Magistrats and Town Counsell conveened, Takeing to their consideration that the publick work of this burgh hes been in tyme bygain very expensive, and that the towns circumstances are now low, Therefore, ordains that in all tyme comeing the Dean of Gild and Master of Wark of this burgh present, and for the tyme being, undertake no publick work the expenss wherof exceeds the soumes respective efter specifieit, viz. : —The Dean of Gild not above fourtie pounds, and the Master of Wark not above ten pounds, and that without ane act of the Town Counsell warranding to that effect, with certification to them that doe in the contrair, they shall obtain no payment nor allowance yrof from the Counsell.

30th Sept.—The whilk day the Magistrats and Counsell, conveened, In answer to ane petition given into them, be James Smith, merchant, craveing that the town would give him somewhat in consideration of his pains and depursements when he was ordered to goe to the woods of Buchanan, to seek for palisadoes for the Kings use, att Inverlochie, Ordains the thesaurer to pay to the said James Smith fourteen pounds Scots, in full of all he can ask or crave for the causs foresaids, &c.

2d Nov.—Whilk day the Magistrats &c., conveened, considering

that the number of Students att the Colledge is so increased, that their seatt in the High Church is not able to contain them, doe therefore appoint the Dean of Gild to make up what seats or accommodation he thinks (fit) for that effect.

[*2d Dec.*—The minute of this date contains a list of regulations to be observed and dues to be exacted at the “Harbour and Key of Porttglasgow,” and at the “Key att the Broomielaw,”—the dues at the latter being expressly stated to be, “And that by and attour what old dewes are payed for the Bridge.” The maximum tonnage contemplated in the former port seems to be “att or above ane hundreth tuns burden,” and at the Broomielaw “att or above twelve tuns burden.” There are likewise regulations and dues for “the Carters in and about ye toun of Glasgow who have shod cairts.” These last dues were applied to the laying and repairing of the “Calseys.”]

[*16th Jan.*, 1696.—A long statute, entitled “against nestines,”* principally prohibiting the casting “out att their windows be day or night, either on fore or back streets, or in lanes, or closes, any excrement, dirt, or urine, or other filth, or water foul or clean,” also “That no person whatsomever voyd or lay down their excrement of dirt or urine within any turnpyck or stair, or on the High Street, or other streets, lanes, closes, entries, or passages,” &c., under the penalties therein named, “and all masters or heads of families shall be lyable for all persones within their families their transgresseing of ye premiss or any pairt yrof,” &c., &c.]

Act for Sweeping of Lums.—Whilk day the Magistrates, &c., conveened, takeing to consideration the hazard, terror, and amazement, As also the great prejudice that frequently falls out be soot takeing fyre in chimney heads and braces, through the negligence and carelessness of the inhabitants in not

sweeping of and keeping the same clean, Therefore, they statute and ordain that in all tyme comeing the hail inhabitants of this burgh shall once every quarter of ane year sweep and make clean the hail braces and lums possesst and kept in constant use be them, whether they be of kitchines, halls, chambers, baik-houss, brewhouss, smiddies, or others whatsomever, and such other chimneys and braces that ar not kept in constant use, to be swept at leist once every year, and that under the pain of fourtie shillings Scots for each faillie; And in caise any fyre shall break out in any brace or chimney head, through the defect of not tymeous sweeping therof, as said is, the persons guilty shall be lyable to the fyne of ane hundreth pounds Scots, and punished farder in his person att the will of the Magistrats.

5th March.—*The Towns Interest in the African and Indian Trade.*—Whilk day the Magistrats, &c., conveened, takeing to their consideration that the company of this nation, for tradeing to Africa and the Indies, lately appoynted and established be Act of Parliament, dated the 26th day of June, 1695 years, seems to be very promiseing, and apparently may tend to the honour and profite of the kingdome, and particularly to the great advantage of this burgh to share therin, and seing by the late Act of Parliament, dated the 17th of July last, power and liberty is thereby granted to royall burrowes to adventure and putt in money for a share and pairt to be purchased be them in the said company, Therefore the saids Magistrats and Town Councill (with consent of the Merchants and Trades, their respective houss previously conveened for giveing advyce in the said matter) doe resolve and conclude to stock in and adventure for this burgh, and common good therof, in the said company and trade, the soume of three thousand pounds, sterling money, and heirby enact themselves, &c., for payment of the said soume, &c.

(They afterwards grant bond to the company for £750, the

fourth part of their subscription ;—but it would appear the company had called up more money than they knew what to do with, for in Oct., 1696, they again, under a power to that effect, lend to the town two-thirds of their subscription, or £500, for three months, at 4 per cent.)

21st March.—Ordains the thesaurer to make payment to Walter Rob, servitor to Hugh Blair, postmaster, of fyve dollars, upon consideration that he being employed to carry in to Edinburgh the hail Councill books since the year 1658, he received such stresse and prejudice therby that he lay sick in Edinburgh for twentie days, to his great expenss and losse of tyme, &c.

16th May.—The whilk day the Magistrates and Town Counsell conveened ordain the dewties and impositions laid on be former Acts of this Town Counsell with consent therin specified upon veshells, boats and goods att Bromielaw, and upon carters and their carts, in maner specified in the saids Acts to be roupd within the Old Grein of this Burgh the first Tuesday of June nixt att the ordinary tyme of roups there in order to a tack yrof to be granted be the Town Counsell to those who shall bid most therfore of rent at the said rouping for the space of ane year thereafter and appoints the Magistrates, Dean of Gild and Deacon Conveener to draw up the terms of the said roup and the Magistrates to make usuall publication of the said roup. [The June “nixt” here named appears to refer to June, 1697, for upon the first day of that month “the dues payable for the conveniencie of the key at Bromielaw and use of the Cran are sett to Thomas Calder for the soume of thretteen hundered merks Scots money.”]

29th Aug.—Ordains the thesaurer to pay to David Weir, hammerman, twentie four pounds Scots, for his changeing of the chimns of the musick bells, so as to ring before the hours, while as formerly they did ring eftir the hours, &c.

5th Sept.—Ordains the Mr. of Wark to pay to John

Dunlop, a poor scholar, six pounds Scots, to help to buy him a coat.

Ordains the Mr. of Wark to give to Baillie Aird, elder, six pounds Scots, for the use of John Whyte, a poor lad, who hes a leg cutt from him.

5th Oct.—The whilk day the Magistrates and Town Counsell conveyed takeing to their consideration that the Directors of the African and Indian Company are willing to lend out to these who are members of the said Company two third pairts of the proportion of the stock payed in be these members, for three months att four per cent, doe therefore resolve to borrow frae the said Company Five hundreth pounds sterling to be imployed (with what other money the town can provyd) for payment of their debt att Mertimes nixt.

(10th Nov.—The treasurer's account of this date contains an account extending to two pages, entitled, "Ane Accompt of Disbursements and Expenss in the Criminall Proces before the Lords of Justiciarie, pursued be the friends of Major Meinzie, who murdered Mr. Robert Park, late Town Clerk," amounting to £4456 Scots—£371 6s. 6d. sterling.

the severall rolls of the inhabitants in each Quarter being computed, and the totall being divided into six, and laid out as on the other syde, after mature consideration of the same, the Committee did unanimously, by there vote, agree upon it, as a fitt scheme and modell of the said six Paroches, to be presented to the Toun Counsell att their next meeting, and appoynts this to be subscribed in there name, by (*sic subs.*) Ja. Brown, Clerk, *pro tempore*, which report and division above written, being read in presence of the said Magistrats and Toun Counsell, they approved, and hereby approves therof.

20th Nov.—*Act against Profainess.*—The qlk day the Provost, &c., &c., conveened, Taking to there serious consideratione how much gross Immoralities and abominable vices doo prevail and abound as weell in this city as in other places unto the great dishonour of God, the discredit of our religion, the ruine of souls, and the drawing down of divine wrath upon us, &c., &c., &c. Doo hereby prohibite and discharge all profanation of the Lord's day by haunting of tavernes or alehouses any tyme of that day (except for refreshment betwixt sermons) as also by unnecessary walking abroad and travelling the said day, by vaging or standing idle upon the streets or in the church yards or fields, ether in tyme of publick worship or before and efter the same, as also by doeing any servile work, by selling and buying ether in shopes or houses, by keeping of a milk mercat ether on the streets or in closes, and by bearing of things from place to place unsuitable unto that holy day, under the pain of Ten pounds Scotts to be exacted of each contraveener *toties quoties*, and in lyke manner, prohibites and discharges all keepers of Tavernes and houses or others within this burgh, to intertaine any persons drinking in there houses after ten of the clock att night on work dayes, and att no tyme on the Sabbath day (except for refreshment betwixt sermons) and that under the penalty of three pounds money forsaid *toties quoties* and

this but prejudice to the exacting of the penalties contained in the saids Acts of Parliament against drunkenes and intymous haunting of taverines, as said is; As also, that they make not there houses ane haunt for leud and vile company keepers whatsoever under the pain of ten pounds *toties quoties*. [The Act goes on to prohibit any one from abusing or insulting persons searching the houses in questions—to direct the town guard to report offences—and finally, to prohibit landlords and others to “sett” premises to persons “who shall not have sufficient testimonialls” under a penalty of £12].

Whilk day the Magistrates and Toun Counsell conveened, Thomas Hamilton Baillie, John Anderson, and James Peadie, late Provests, Robert Zuill, Dean of Gild, William Wallace, George Buchanan and some others of the Committee, appoynted be a former Act, dated the 27th of October last, had mett with John Aird, younger, and Thomas Peters, Baillies, the Deacon Conveener, and John Corss, Manadgers of the building of the new Church, and had stated and cleared the accompt of the said building, and had seen the same clearly instructed, and did find that the sowme of the hail charges and expenses of the said building contained in the charge, extends to twenty one thousand three hundereth and eight pounds, three shillings and eight pennys, and that the sowme of the discharge, which consists of money receaved be the Manadgers, extends to fyfftein thousand three hundereth sixty fyve pounds, seven shilling and eight pennys, so that there yet rests to the saids Manadgers of ballance fyve thousand nyne hundereth fourty two pounds, sixteen shilling and two pennys, all Scots money, and produced the particular accompt of charge and discharge, extending as said is: Which report, &c., being read, &c., the Magistrates, &c., approved and hereby approves thereof, and declares they are weell satisfied with the hail building, and finds that the saids manadgers have manadged the

28th July.—Ordains Stephen Crawford, treasurer, to pay to Thomas Hamilton, Deacon Conveener, £263 18s., Scotts money, whereof there is £188 6s. debursed be him att Edinburgh to Henry Lohead, vintner, there, which soume was spent in his house att some treats and entertainments given be the Provest, &c., to those that attended the Provest to the Abbay to the ryding of the Parliament in May last. (The remainder for horse hyre and other ordinary expenses.

5th Feb., 1704.—*The Dean of Gild exonered of some old roustie Musquets.*—Whilk day, &c., John Aird, yr., Dean of Gild, represented that about the tyme of the late Revolution, the publict having ordered a certain number of musquets to be sent to this Burgh, off which there being many ordered to be dispersed throw the countrey, there were about four hundred of the said musquets, all matchlocks, kept by the Magistrats, and put in the hands of

the inhabitants, for the safetie of the place, and which four hundred being thereafter gathered in from the inhabitants, they have lyen by these many years, so that they became altogether useless, except as to the roustie ratches, and that the Dean of Gild, considering present circumstances; thought fitt, by the advyce of the Magistrats and others, to give out and divyde the saids ratches amongst such of the inhabitants as were notourly known to be affected to the Government, to be stocked and made up be them, in order to their being armed for keeing of the guard and defence of the burgh, which did in some pairt encourage the receavers to the effect forsaid, albeit they saved little expenss thereby, Whilk being heard and considered, &c., (approve of the distribution, and grant warrandice to the said John Aird, and exoner him of the saids “roustie musquets.”)

(17th Feb., 1704.—Some gunpowder, 515 lb. weight, at a merk the pound, bought for the town’s use, “because of present circumstances,” and the Dean of Gild appoynted to lay up the same in the “south-east torrett in the Queens Hall.”)

(16th Nov., 1705.—A report of the procedure anent the list of tonnes debts, and a detailed list of these debts, amounting, in all, to £149 13s. 4d. Scots, at this time.)

18th Nov., 1706.—Whilk day, &c., the Representation underwritten, was given in, in Councill, by John Bowman, Dean of Gild, and George Buchanan, Deacon Conveener, of this Burgh, whereof the tenor follows:—Unto the Right Hon. the Provest, Baillies, and Councill of Glasgow, the Representation of the Dean of Gild and Deacon Conveener of the said burgh, and members of their respective ranks, Sheweth, that where wee takeing to our serious consideratione the late tumults and uproars that has been in this city, and the indignitys and abuses done to the Magistrats in the tumults, to the great scandall and opprobry of the place, whereby the Magistrats cannot in safety to their persons officiat,

nor the inhabitants be protected from injuries, by reason of such tumults, and the Merchants House having mett, &c., in order to the considering of such proposealls and overtures as may be found requisite to the keeping of the peace in the city, &c., and in pursuance thereof, did meet, &c., and have made the overtures and proposealls following, to be presented to your Lordship and Council, and your authority to be humbly craved thereto, viz. :

That the tounes guard be duly kept, and that a wholle company be mounted att once, and every master of a family, if in health or upon the place, be there in person himself sufficiently armed, or if unwell or not upon the place, that his family send out a sufficient person for him, to the satisfaction of the Captain of the Guard, and that the guard be mounted every day att three in the afternoon, and to continue upon guard till the next day att the same tyme that they be relieved ; and that the drumm beatt att two in the afternoon, for the mounting of the guard, and that the company that falls to be on the guard meet all together, with their arms, before three in the afternoon, att their Captains quarters, and to march from thence, in order, to the guard, and that each upon the guard, whither Merchants or Trades, be subject to their officers upon the guard, their orders, and observe the same punctually.

And in regaird it was concluded by the severall Deacons and their crafts, that when any tumult arises in the city, that a certain number of every trade should repair immediately to the Guard, in order to compesce* these tumults, therefore, it is agreed betwixt both ranks, that whatever merchants or trades, in caise of such disturbance, shall repair to the Guard, they shall be subject to the Commanders of the Guard, whether they be merchants or trades.

That all women, boys, young men, and servants, be strictly prohibited and discharged to be upon the streets after cloud of night above what number together your Lordship and Counsell

shall think fitt; and that if any tumult arise in the city, that masters of families be lyable for these in their houses found in these tumults.

That all masters of families, also weell of private as of publict houses, give up the names of the strangers they harbour in their houses, to the Captain of the Guard, before ten of the clock att night.

That a proclamation be sent throw the toun with tuck of drumm, ordering the hail fencible men to be upon the Green in arms upon Munday next, being the 18th of Nov., Jmviij C and Six, that publict intimation may be made to them of the above proposalls.

May it, therefore, please your Lordship, &c.

[22d Jan., 1708.—The Council considers a “suplication given in by Baxters,” complaining that at the present price of wheat, viz. £10 Scots per boll, they were unable to sell bread at the price to which a former act had restricted them, and the Council consequently ordains, “that the twelvenpenny loaf of fine flower and weell baken shall be eleven ounces and three drops,” and other bread in proportion. See minutes of 29th March, 1709, 17th Oct., 1713, and 2nd July, 1714.]

12th March, 1708.—Whilk day the Provost having represented that he having bought from Mr. Scowgall, Limner in Edinburgh, two portrays, the one of King William, the other of Queen Mary, both of full length, for twentie seven pounds sterling, the Magistrats, &c., doe approve of his buying of the same, &c.

(3d May.—The oath of abjuration quoted, and is taken by the present and late office-bearers, who are named.)

(2d Oct.—Detailed account of intromissions, with the Barony and “Burrow aikers, teynd, grassum,” &c.)

29th March, 1709.—“The Baxters” again apply in consequence of the advance in the price of wheat to £12 10s. Scots per boll,

and are authorized to make the twelvepenny loaf weigh "8 ounces and 15 drop," and so on.

7th Nov.—Whilk day, &c., considering that there are many complaints made by the foreign tradeing merchants in this burgh, and divers other inhabitants, of the want of a horse post betwixt the burgh of Edinburgh and this burgh, Therfor, recomends to the Magistrats, &c., to address the Earle of Godolphin, Lord High Treasurer, for obtaining an order from him for establishing a horse post betwixt Edinburgh and this burgh, as said is, &c.

The which day the Magistrats and Town Counsell conveened, have subscribed an address to Her Majestie Queen Anne, which they recomend to Provost Rodger to *deliver* in an *agreeable* manner.

(22d Oct., 1711.—"The sett or accustomed way of the Burgh of Glasgow in their elections of Provost, Bailies, Town Council, Dean of Gild, Deacon Convener, Treasurer, and others," detailed and engrossed, and ordered to be transmitted to the "Clerk of the Burrows.")

(10th Jan., 1712.—Call subscribed to Mr. Robert Woddrow, minister of Eastwood, to be minister of the South Quarter.)

27th May.—The "new English weight, and none other to be observed and used by all merchants and others in this burgh, both in buying and selling of all foreign and also of all English goods and wares, in time coming."

2d Aug., 1712.—Ordains Wm. Gow, treasurer, to pay to John Scougall, elder, painter, fifteen pound, sterling money, as the pryce of the picture of Her Magesty Queen Anne, painted and furnished be him, and now put up in the Counsell house of this burgh, &c.

(On a fly leaf at the end of this volume (vol. XVIII.) there are notes of sundry “passes” granted to individuals, betwixt the years 1708 and 1710, inclusive; some to pass through North Britain, some through South Britain, some to Ireland, some to Holland, and from which it appears there had been then a pretty strict surveillance instituted.)

17th Oct., 1713.—*Statute of wheat bread and tallow.*—The which day the Magistrats, &c., conveened for setting down the pryces of wheat bread and candle to be sold within this burgh for the year ensuing. [They accordingly decide that wheat, being now at ten pounds ten shillings the boll, the twelveny loaf shall weigh “ten unces and ten drops,” with smaller bread in proportion; also, that the “stone of good and sufficient rough tallow shall be sold at 53/ Scots, and of good and sufficient candle at 56/ Scots].

2d July, 1714.—*Act anent the pryce of the wheat bread.*—[The irrepressible “Baxters” are again up with a “supplication,” complaining that wheat having now risen to £13 10/ Scots ꝑ boll they cannot afford to sell at the limits of the Statute of 17th Oct., 1713, whereupon the twelveny loaf is ordered to weigh “8 unces and 4 drops,” with smaller bread in proportion].

(1st Oct.—An address to the Electoral Prince George Augustus, Duke of Cambridge, on his being expected to visit this country, and sending him a burgess ticket, with his reply in French, thanking the town for their *billet de bourgeoisie*—a translation thereof, and the towns rejoinder.)

1st Jan., 1715.—Which day the Magistrats, &c., conveened, The Magistrats represented that, by ane act of the Lords of Justiciary,

dated 30th of Nov. last on a petition given in be the burgh of Jedburgh, that, in May last, the persons afternamed, viz., Peter and Mary Faas, Mabile Stirling, Janet Yorstoun, John Finnick, Elizabeth Lindsay, Jean Ross, and Mary Robertson, prisoners in the tolbooth of Jedburgh, were sentenced by the Lords of Justiciary at the then Circuit, to be transported to the plantations, for being habite and repute gipsies, sorners, &c., and that the said burgh could get no occasion of transporting them, and, therefore, craving their Lordships to grant warrant for transporting them to Glasgow to!booth, The Lords did, thereupon, ordain, &c., and ordained the Magistrats of this burgh to receive, keep, and detain the saids gipsies until occasion offered for transporting them; and ordained the Magistrates, &c., with the first conveniencie to sett them aboard of any ship going to the plantations; and to take (a) receipt for them from the master of the ship, &c., and that, according therunto, the saids gipsies are transported here, and the Magistrates. conforme to the act, were obliged to receive them in prison, where they have lyen these severall days bygone, on the touns charge, there being no fond laid down by the publict for their maintenance, That, on the said gipsies coming here, they (the Magistrats,) had written to Edinburgh to the Clerk, to represent to the Lords of Justiciary how that the town was brought under a burden by receiving of these gipsies, they being neither judged here, nor belonging to the place, nor any fond laid down for their maintenance, and that the lyke was never done to this burgh, which Representation was accordingly made to the Lords, who acknowledged they were sensible it was a burden upon the place, but for the future the toun should not be troubled with the lyke; And that since, they had used endeavours with several merchants who have ships now going abroad to Virginia, to take them, who, upon no terms, would condescend thereto, there being six of the eight women, one of them having a young child, and some of them in

age, except they got money for taking them ; and the Magistrates considering that their maintenance continuing here would be a burden on the town, and in a short time exceed what they could agree with the merchants for their transportation, Therefore, and for freeing of the town of the saids gipsies and sorners, &c., they had agreed with Robert Buntine of Aairdoch, James Lees, and Charles Crawford, merchants, concerned in the ship Greenock, James Watson, commander, bound for America, to transport them aboard the said ship, and for which they are to give them thirteen pound stirling. (Receipt is granted for them, and the transaction approved of.)

26th Aug.—Which day the Magistrates, &c., conveened, The Provest represented, that being informed that upon severall occasions their Royall Highnesses the Prince and Princess of Wales had expressed their affection to the town of Glasgou, and their speciall notice of and regard to every token and evidence of affection and duty from this city, it was, therefore, judged not improper to send to Her Highness a swatch of plaids as the manufactory peculiar only to this place, for keeping the place in Her Highness' remembrance, and which might contribute to the advantage thereof, and to the advancement of the credite of that manufactory, and that, accordingly, he had sent some pairs of the best plaids which the place afforded at the tyme, with a letter to Her Royall Highness, which had been tendered to Her Highness by Mr. Smith, Member of Parliament for the City, and was graciously received by her Highness ; and thereupon she had directed Mr. Smith to return her thanks to the Magistrats, who accordingly had wryten a letter therant, and another letter was also wryten to the same effect, by his Grace the Duke of Montross, by whom Mr. Smith was introduced to her Highness ; As also represented that, upon the evidences of a designed invasion from abroad, signified by His Majestys Royall Proclamations, the inhabitants of

this city, having, by the Magistrats authority, mett to concert measures most proper for their own security, and the defence of his Majesty and his Government, and of our religion, laws, and libertys, and having proposed to the Magistrats to address his Majesty, and to make ane offer of a Regement, to consist of five hundred centinels, and to be commanded by ten captains, and other proper officers, to be payed by the inhabitants for the space of sixty days, for the ends above-mentioned ; in prosecution whereof the Magistrats, &c., did make the above offer, which was presented to his Majesty by his Grace the Duke of Montrose, and was very graciously received as a seasonable testimony of the city of Glasgows singular zeal and affection, and upon which his Majesty had directed his Grace the Duke of Montrose and my Lord Secretary Tounsend, to acquaint the Magistrats of his Majestys gracious reception, &c. (The address and letters read and procedure approved of, and the address and letters ordered to be recorded in the principall Councill book. Then follows the letter by the Magistrates to the Princess of Wales, with the plaids, which are described as “generally used over that part of the United Kingdom, called Scotland, by our women, for covers, when they goe abroad, and by some men for the morning guns (gowns?) or for hangings in bed-chambers,”—next, the address and offer to his Majesty, signed by the Magistrates—then, the letter by the Duke of Montrose, Secretary Tounsend’s letter, and Mr. Smith’s. The following are copies of the two last letters :—)

Whytehall, Aug. 1715.—My Lord—Having received from my Lord Duke of Montrose the letter of the city of Glasgow to his Majesty, I took the first opportunity of delivering it, which his Majesty received very graciously, looking upon it as a very seasonable testimony of the city of Glasgows singular zeal and affection to his Majesty’s person and government ; and your Lordship is directed to return them his Majestys thanks, for the cheerfull offer

and tender they make of their duty and service on this occasion : But his Majesty hopes such measures have been taken for the security and defence of those parts as shall be effectually for that end, without putting his subjects of your city to any further trouble and expenses ; for orders have been given for returning the three regiments which were lately sent to Ireland, and which we hope may be with you before this, and also for the marching into these parts of Generall Carpenters regiment of dragoons, and of the levying with you of the regiments of foot, to be commanded by Brigadier Grant, and for the augmenting of all the regiments now in North Brittain to twelve companys each, and sixty men a company ; and if any further reinforcement shall be judged necessary, shall not be wanting as soon as the new levies here are compleated, which we hope may be by the first of September. This your Lordship will take the first opportunity to communicate to the Magistrats and City of Glasgow, that, at the same time, they may take the satisfaction of knowing the just sense his Majesty has of their zeal for his service, and the care the Governement has taken of the peace and quiet of these parts. I have nothing further to trouble your Lordship with, but to assure you that, so long as I have the honour of serving his Majesty in this station, I shall always make it my study to promote the interest and concerns of your city, I am, with great truth, my Lord, your Lordships most humble servant (sic sub.) TOWNSEND.

Mr. Smiths Letter.—My Lord, yesterday the Duke of Montrose presented your letter to the King, which was most graciously received by his Majesty. My Lord Townsend told me yesternight that he was ordered by the King to thank you for your zeal, &c., which, I suppose, he does by this post. This day I presented the plaids to the Princess. She was extremely pleased with the complement, and said a great many kind things of the city of Glasgow,—that she would make that use of the plaids as should

keep you in her remembrance. I had the honour to kiss her hand; and when I was going out of her clossett, she said, pray, Mr. Smith, forgett not to return my hearty thanks to the Magistrates of Glasgow for their fyne present.

(12th Oct., 1715.—The following letters from the Duke of Argyll and Lord Secretary Townshend presented, and ordered to be recorded as above :—)

Stirling, 18th Sept., 1715.—Sir—I am informed by Baillie Brown that there are 500 of your people upon their march to joyne me here, for which I return you most hearty thanks, and shall be sure, as it is my duty, to represent your great zeall and faithful service to his Majesty, by ane express to-morrow morning. At present I will not insist upon any greater number, but desyre you will, with the greatest dispatch, inform all his Majestys friends in the West Country, that I think it absolutely necessary for his Majestys service that all the fencible men should draw together at Glasgow, and be ready to march, as I shall acquaint them,

that his Majestys service requires. I am, &c. (sic. subscrivitur) ARGYLL. *

Whytehall, 24th Sept., 1715.—My Lord the Duke of Argyll having, by his letter of the 18th, to Mr Secretary Stanhope, acquainted him with the City of Glasgow having sent 500 of their militia to joyn his Grace at the camp at Stirling, and this having been communicated to his Majesty, I have received his ordors to return the City thanks for this new demonstration of their zeal for his Majestys service, and to assure them that, in all their concerns, they may depend on his Majesty's countenance and favour. It is with pleasure I obey his Majesty's orders, which your Lordship will be pleased to communicate to the Magistrats and City; and believe me to be, with great truth, &c., TOUNSHEND. †

29th Oct.—Which day the Magistrates, &c., conveened, the Magistrates represented that, in this tyme of common danger, the toun is put to vast charges and expenses in fortyfieing the toun, and many other ways which they cannot evite, and that it is the advyce of his Grace the Duke of Argyll, Generall and Commander in Chiefe of his Majestys Forces in North Brittan, the toun should be put in a better posture of defence by drawing lynes of intrinchment about the toun, in case of ane attack against it by the rebells now in arms against his Majesty, and that the same be done with all expedition, which will be a furder charge upon the toun; and in respect of the present stope of payments, that the toun cannot gett up money from the tacksmen, and others, their debtors, there is a necessity that the toun borrow money to save the touns credit. (Therefore order the Treasurer to borrow to the extent of £500 sterling.)

12th Dec.—Which day, &c., Robert Robertson represented that

he, with a pairty of the inhabitants, being appointed be the Magistrats to goe into Edinburgh to receive 300 stand of arms and cartridge boxes from the storekeeper of the Castle of Edinburgh, by ane order from his Grace the Duke of Argyll, which the Magistrates procured for the service of the toun, He had, accordingly, brot here the saids arms, and, by the Magistrats orders, had distributed the said three hundred stand of arms, with the cartridge boxes, among the severall captains of the touns trainbands, for supplying of such of the inhabitants in their severall companys who wanted arms for watching and warding, and other duty, and that he had taken receipts, &c. They ordain the saids receipts to lye in the Clerk's hands, to be made forthcoming when there shall be occasion for calling in of the saids arms.

Appoynts the Magistrates to wryte to his Grace the Duke of Argyll, &c., that his Grace would be pleased to give orders for removing of the 353 rebell prisoners, who are lying on the touns hand, and in custody in the Castle prison, and easing of the toun of the burden of them and of their mantainance, in respect the Militia who formerly guarded them are now gone home, which now lyes upon the toun; and that, besides the other guards, which are very numerous, these prisoners require a guard of about ane hundred men always upon them, without which they might have opportunity to escape, which very much weakens the toun, and dissables the toun to make that opposition which otherwise the toun might make, in case of ane attack, and also exposes the toun to be attacked by the enemy, in order to the reliefe of the prisoners.

16th Feb., 1716.—From “Accompt of the extraordinary charge and expenses the toun of Glasgow was put to upon account of the present Troubles and Rebellion, from the latter end of July, 1715, to 1st Jan., 1716.”

16th Feb., 1716.—Whilk day John Aird, late Provost, represented, that, in May last, before the rebellion broke out, there was an information given in to him, &c., that there was some fire-arms brought into this city, with a design to be transported to the Highlands, for the use of some nonjurors and disaffected persons; and that these arms were carried to broomielaw, in order to be put on board of a boat for the highlands. The said John Aird, on giving in of the said information, having gone along with some others to the Broomielaw, they found there, among some other chests and barrells belonging to the boat, whereof one Alex. M'Donald owned himself the master, three chests or boxes, wherein there was in one of the boxes thirteen firelocks, three pair of pistolls, and twelve speir bayonets; in ane other box, ten firelocks, seven pair and ane single pistoll, and nine speir bayonets; and in

the third box, nine firelocks and five pair and ane single pistoll, quhilk arms the said Provost caused secure and carry them to the Tolbuith, where they lay till the rebellion broke out, And that when the volunteers from Glasgow went to Stirling to joyn his Majesty's forces, the saids arms were taken out and delivered to such of the volunteers as wanted arms, and seeing that the said arms are yet imployed in service by the inhabitants, &c., (Therefore, exonerate the said John Aird of the said arms, and of all costs, skaith, &c., thereanent.)

Maxwell having left his own family and country, above 70 miles distance from this place, at the desyre of the Magistrats and chiefe of the inhabitants, to take upon him the said charge, and continued here, undergoing the said toyll and trouble, from the 2d of Oct., at which time he came here, to the 9th of February last, that the rebellion was in part supprest, and the rebells scatered and chased.

M'Crea, who severall tymes came to them with drink throw the night, and satt down upon the mans knee, and took him in her arms and kissed him, and lykwise took up her cloaths before him, and now and then leaving the man and the said Elizabeth Watson, the servant, together in the room, who both went to bed together ; and that witnesses were adduced thereupon, who fully proved what was alledged against them, and much more not suitable to be exprest, &c. ; and in respect the crime is so gross, the Magistrates desired the Council might give their judgment what is proper to be inflicted on them, they being a scandall to the place, and the more for a terror to others, (They are ordered to be fined £100 Scots—to lose their freedom in the place—the said Davids burgess ticket lacerat over the tolbuith stair head, with touk of drum—both to be committed to prison, to lye for 30 days—and on each of 3 next Wednesdays Mary M'Crea to be put in the pillory, to be erected for that purpose, on the market place, with a paper on her “brow,” or above her head, containing her crimes, and thereafter both to be banished furth of this city and precincts thereof.

5th March.—Ordains Francis Hopkirk, Thesaurer, to pay to Robert Wilson, son to Wilson, weiver, who was one of the touns volunteers that went to Stirling at the late rebellion, and lost his eye there by ane accident, £18 Scots money, to help to defray the charges for the mending his eye, &c.

21st Sept.—Ordains the Treasurer to Robert Robertson, merchant, £15 sterling, as the pryce of the picture of his Majesty King George, now put up in the Councill house.

(12th Oct.—The whole procedure before the Presbytery and Synod, relative to the call of Mr. John Anderson, Minister at Dumbarton, to be Minister of the North-west Quarter of Glasgow, engrossed ;—and on 22d Feb., 1718, there is farther procedure engrossed ;—and on 31st May, 1718, there is recorded a Report of the General Assembly's decision, on appeal to

them, ordering Mr. Anderson to be transported to Glasgow, and ordaining him to be received the "last Thursday of August nixt.")

23d Dec., 1717.—Abstract of the toun of Glasgows extraordinary charge the time of the late Rebellion, as the same is recorded in the Councill books, quhilk is besyde what was payed by the inhabitants for the subsistence of the Touns 600 Volunteers that went to Stirling.

17th Jan., 1718.—Which day, &c., the Magistrats represented that Daniel Campbell, of Shawfield, Member of Parliament for this district, had writt from London for a power of Attorney from the toun, to demand and receive for the touns behoove, the £736 13s. 5d. sterling ordered by the Parliament to be payed to the toun, for the maintenance of the rebell prisoners quhilk were brought here the tyme of the rebellion, quhilk being considered, (grant the warrant for a power of Attorney).

Which day, &c., the Provost represented that the arms which the toun received from the Government the tyme of the rebellion, being called for from the toun, there were sent in by the toun to the magazines of Edinburgh Castle, three hundred and fifty snaphans, two hundred eighty-five cartridge boxes, and fourty-eight belts, with nynety-nine bayonets, which are no part of the Kings arms, but being made upon the touns charge to fit the snaphans for service, were sent in to satisfie, in so far, for these musquets which are amissing; and that he had received back a receipt from the Commissary of the Field Train, accordingly which he produced, &c.

(25th Jan.—Rules to be observed by the fleshers engrossed.)

(29th April.—Shoremaster appointed for Port-Glasgow, and rules and regulations to be observed by him laid down, and a “Table of dues, as a fond for the Shoarmaster his encouragement, and lykways some deus to be pay’d to the officer in Port-Glasgow.”)

27th Oct.—A long letter from James Lowdon to the Rev. Mr. Ramsay, minister at Kelso, containing political accusations against the Magistrates, relating to the call to Mr. Anderson: * among others, that they had joined the Tories to embarass the King’s Government, for which he is deprived of his freedom as a burgess.)

* See before, 12th Oct., 1717, &c.

13th Jan., 1719.—Ordain John Orr, late Treasurer, to pay to William Steward, elder and yr., gardeners, tacksmen of Hutchesons Hospitalls yeard, at the head of the Candleriggs, the soume of £108 16s. 4d., Scots money, in full satisfaction to them for the loss and damage by the rooting out of their cherry and aple trees, goose berry and curran busses, kaill, leeks, and other ground herbs, upon the one rood and ane half taken off the said yeard for a church and churchyeard to be builded therupon, and benefit of the gooding of the said ground, &c.

(7th Nov.—There is engrossed of this date, “An Act determining the difference betwixt the Surgeons and Barbers,” and after a good deal of discussion, the Surgeons give in a Demission and Renunciation of the Letter of Deaconry in their favour, in conjunction with the Barbers, which Renunciation is, by an Act of 22d Sept., 1722, accepted, and the stock divided between the Surgeons and Barbers.)

(11th Dec.—Petition to Parliament against prohibiting the weaving of “painted, printed, and stained linen,” which had been petitioned for by the weavers of London, and other parts of South Britain. See also a subsequent petition, 18th Nov., 1721, to have the duty taken off linen cloth.)

31st March, 1720.—Which day, &c., the Magistrates and others of the Committee, appoynted by a former Act, &c., reported that, in respect the Provost, as Chiefe Magistrat, whiles in that station, is oblig’t to keep up a port suitable thereto, and cannot but be at considerable charge in furnishing his house with wines, for the entertainment of gentlemen who may have occasion to wait on him at his house. That it is their judgment there should be forty pound sterling settled upon the Provost yearly, for defraying the said charge, and he may therewith furnish himself with what wines he thinks most fitted, which being considered by the Council, they agree thereunto, &c.

25th April, 1721.—“*Model anent calling a Minister, and draught of a call,*” engrossed, shewing the mode of procedure to be adopted in future calls.)

13th Jan., 1722.—Which day the Magistrats and Toun Council, conveyed, have agreed that the Barras port be taken down, and the door of the Green be made a tirlie door, and remitts to the Dean of Gild and Mr. of Work to see the same done.

(22d June.—Masons agreed with to build and furnish stones to the “key” from the Broomielaw to the “Dowcat Green.”) The minute includes a minute specification.

24th July.—Which day, &c., the Provost produced ane act of the Convention of Burrows statuting and ordaining that for hereafter, in all the burrows, fresh herrings shall be sold by mett, and not by tale, viz.:—In the North and West, by the measure commonly called the barrell, containing sixty six pynts;—and in the Firth of Forth, by the measure called the mett, containing fourty two pynts; and recommending to the Magistrats of the respective burrows to execute the same, &c. (Ordain the same to be put in execution.)

21st Sept., 1723.—Ordain James Luke, Treasurer, to pay to James Robison, schoollmaster three guinzeas, for his encouragement, and compiling and prenting a litle book, entituled a dialogue betwixt a young Lady and her Schoollmaster, shewing the right way of sillabing, &c.

(30th Dec.—“Minute of agreement betwixt the town and Borrowfield, anent the sale of the said estate to the toun,” engrossed and signed; and on 28th May, 1724, “Report of the Magistrats of the estate of Borrowfield, and price thereof, and way of their ending with Borrowfield.”)

26th Sept., 1724.—The town’s ground annuals ordered to be sold at 25 years’ purchase.

7th July, 1725.—Which day, the Magistrats and Toun Council

conveened, Represented that by the Edinburgh newspaper called the Calladonia Mercury, quhilk gives account of the late tumult and ryott in this place, of the mobbs entering upon and pillageing of Shawfields house, and of attacking the kings troups at the guard, and the troups firing upon the mob, whereby severalls who were innocent were killed, and others wounded, There are severall things in that print set furth not fact, and likeways contains gross reflections on the conduct of the Magistrats and inhabitants, And that the Magistrats, upon their getting account of the said print, judgeing it their duty, for their and the inhabitants vindication of their conduct, did, with the concurrance and advice of severalls of the Councill and principall inhabitants, draw up a true account of the wholl matter, made up of informations taken from persons who were eye witnesses of the facts, and had sent the same into Edinburgh, in order to be put into the publick prints, which, though refused, yet with difficulty was printed, by way of letter from the Magistrats, and a considerable number of copies cast of and disperst, whereby many entertained a juster notion of the Magistrats and inhabitants their conduct dureing these molestations, then what they were formerly imprest with by the account in the Mercury, And that before the Provost went to Edinburgh, to the Convention, where he is at the time, it was concerted and agreed to among the Magistrats and severall of the Councill meet in a Committee, that when he, the Provost, went in to Edinburgh, he should employ some of the ablest lawers, and draw up a Representation, or Memorial, of the whole affair, and transmitt the same to London to the Lords Justices, with all dispatch; And farder represented that they had this day received a letter from the Provost at Edinburgh, giveing account that he had been with the Generall, and with the Kings Advocat, and that in a day or two the Generall, with some regiments, and train of artillery, were to be here upon account of the late tumult, and likeways the Ad-

vocat or Solicitor, with some others, to take a precognition in the said affair: Quhilk letters the Magistrats produced, and craved the Councillis mind what answer to return to the Provost, All which being heard and considered by the Councill, and that severalls of the Councill were present, and concurring with the Magistrats in drawing up of the foresaid account, and that the Magistrats could have done no less, Therefore (approve of the procedure, and direct the Provost to lay a statement before lawyers, and a Memorial to be transmitted to the Lords Justices, and the Provost to come West, and bring with him lawyers to appear on the part of the town in the precognition.)

31st July.—Which day, &c., empower the Provost to sign two doubles of the following Address, &c. : To the Kings Most Excellent Majesty, &c. Most Gracious Sovereign, Wee, your Majesties most loyall and dutyfull subjects, beg leave humbly to represent to your Majestie the great sense we have of the many blessings your kingdom do enjoy under your Majesties mild and auspicious government, and to express our utter abhorrence and detestation of these ryotts and disorders that have lately happened in this your Majesties loyall tho', in so far, infortunate city of Glasgow. Wee are deeply sensible how highly criminal such outrageous proceedings are, how destructive to society, and how unbecomeing a corporation, that hath endeavoured to distinguish itself by an exemplary affection and zealous adherence to your Majesties government, and the interest of your Royall and illustrious family; but as these disorders were begun and carried on only by the lowest and abject sort of the populace, without the countenance or approbation of any person of note or consideration in the place, wee humbly hope, from your Majesties known justice and great goodness, that neither the folly nor wickedness of such mean, obscure, and, for the most part, unknown miscreants, will be charged to the account of your Majesties most loyall city. Your

Majesties most faithful and well meaning citizens have, with no small concern and astonishment, seen their Magistrats committed to the goal of that town, with the government of which they are intrusted, without being allowed the benefit of finding bail, and carried, in an extraordinary way, prisoners thro' a considerable part of the country, and then thrown unto the nauseous common prison of Edinburgh, as favourers and encouragers of tumults, which they utterly detest. But, while we are conscious and persuaded of their innocence, we presume to approach your Majesties royall throne, with humble confidence of your Majesties most gracious protection and countenance, and to lay before your Majesty the true and faithfull account, hereunto annexed, of the severall circumstances of these unhappy disorders; and, although we cannot take upon us to justify their behaviour from errors in point of judgment, which may readily have fallen when under the concern and anxiety that naturally arise from so an unexpected emergent, yet, with regard to the sincerity of these our intentions, and candour of our endeavours to settle and maintain the peace of the town intrusted to our management, we do most humbly submit our conduct to your Majesties great wisdom.—That your Majestie may enjoy a long, glorious, and quiet reign, &c., &c.

A True and faithful account of the proceedings touching the ryots and tumults which have lately happened in the City of Glasgow.—1725.

Upon the 23d and 24th days of June last, the day before and the day on which the malt tax commenced in Scotland, for the service of the year 1725, there was an appearance in the streets of some disorderly persons, consisting chiefly of women and boys, who were soon dispersed by the Provost and other inhabitants. Upon the 24th, in the evening, two companies of his Majesties forces came to the town, under the command of Capt. Bushel, which drew a concourse of people into the streets, but that being

usual on such occasions, gave the Magistrats no appearance of any ryots, untill the Provost (who is chief Magistrate) had notice brought him that the persons he had ordered to prepare and fit-up the guard-room, for the reception of the forces, were dispossessed by a mob, the doors of the guard-room lockt, and the keys carried off.

The Provost thereupon sent the town officers to break open the doors of the guard-room, but they being bruised and beat off, he went in person from the Town-house towards the guard, to have the same made open, and in his way was informed that the mob was much increased, and threatened to pull him in pieces if he came there on that errand, and was thereupon advised by severall of the most respectfull burgesses that it might tend to quiet the disorders should the souldiers be sent to quarters that night, upon billets, and the common Town-guard advertised to attend as usuall. Of this the commanding officer being advertised, he agreed thereto, by reason his men being fatigued and few, and saying he expected to be reinforced next day with two other companys, upon which the Town-guard was advertised to meet at the ordinary time, which is between ten and eleven at night. The Provost, with Mr. Campbell of Blythswood, the only other Justice of Peace then in the place, with severall of the burgesses of best account, continued in the town house till towards nine a clock at night, and then there being no appearance of the least disorder, they went together to a tavern hard by.

A little after ten at night, accounts was brought to the Provost that the mob had again gote together, and were making an attempt upon Mr. Campbell of Shawfields house, situated in one of the extremeties of the town, whereupon the Provost, and gentlemen with him, went immediately to Mr. Campbells house, and by entreaties and threats had prevailed upon them to retire, having then done litle other damage then breaking some of the win-

dows; and at that time, when there was good hopes of their dispersing, great numbers of disorderly and ryotous people advanced from severall quarters towards the house, insulted the Provost, beat down the town officers, and threatened the Provost and burgesses with him, on some of whom they laid violent hands, so that they, seeing it was impracticable to stay the torrent, were obliged to make their escape, which they did with great difficulty, haveing been pursued by severall fellows armed with clubs,—After which, being then near twelve at night, while the Provost was consulting with some of the burgesses about calling the military together, a serjant came to the Provost from the comanding officer, offering (if there was occasion,) the assistance of the military: To which the Provost answered, he was most willing, provided they could be gote together, adding, he only feared they would be in bed, and would be disarmed and knockt in the head, before they could be brought to meet together (the mobb being then in full possession of the house, and very numerous and outrageous), to which the serjant answered, that was the case, for the men would be in bed.

The nixt day, being the 25th, for preventing farther confusions, the Provost desired the comanding officer that he might have his troops readie to take possession of the guard-house; and while they were conveening, the Provost, and a good many principall inhabitants went to Mr. Campbell's house, caused secure and shutt up the entries and doors in the best maner and returning to the guard-house, where the military were drawn up, gave possession of it to the officer, and two companies under his command. Immediately after the Kings troops were lodged, the Provost gave orders that twenty men of each of the towns companies of trainbands should conveen at the Town-house, at three o'clock afternoon, in order to assist in suppressing any tumults might happen. Betwixt two and three, a considerable number of riotous persons,

consisting chiefly of women and boys, haveing gote together, near the Town-house, the Provost, with the assistance of sundry of the inhabitants, caused them soon disperse and fly; but in a little time (as the Provost was afterwards informed) a good many more appeared before the guard-hous, and insulted the military by throwing stones. It has not hitherto appeared any of the troops were disabled or hurt by this insult, nor does it appear that the officer, or soldiers under his command were at this time in any great danger. However, the commanding officer ordered them to fire, by which first fire two men were killed, who had no way been concerned in the ryott, and were then at a good distance from the guard house; and thereafter continued to fire by platoons towards the four principal streets though in some of them there was no mob, nor not so much as a single stone thrown.

The Provost, on hearing the first fire, sent a gentleman with a request to the commanding officer that he might fire no more, and to acquaint him that a sufficient number of townsmen should be sent to assist in quelling the mob. The Capt. promised not to fire till the gentleman should return, notwithstanding which he did fire. Upon the gentlemans return to the Provost, he found him invironed by a more formidable mob then was at the guard, complaining highly of the injury done the town by firing sharp in the streets, whereby some of the inhabitants were killed, and severalls wounded. The Provost did all he could to pacifie them by threats and smooth words, but all was of no avail. The multitudes was so incenced, that they proceeded to break open the doors of the townhouse, in order to ring the alarm bell, and to take from thence some old fire arms and halberts were therein lodged. The Provost, hereby perceiving he should not be able to quell the intraged mob, who were encreasing every minute, and who, he presumed, would still be greater upon the ringing the alarm bell, dispatcht again the same gentleman immediately to the officer

with a message that he believed it would tend to the safety of the officer and the kings troops, and the quieting the present tumult, for him and his men to retire out of town. The officer accordingly retired, and though there were no numbers pressing upon him, he continued firing upon the streets, whereby, in all, there were nine persons killed, particularly one gentlewoman, out of a window, two stories high, some in the sides, and others crossing the streets, going about their lawfull affairs, and sixteen dangerously wounded, whereby not above five or six at most (so far as can yet be known) were any way concerned in the mob. Upon the troops leaving the town, some of the mob followed after, and came up only with two of the souldiers, who, throw indisposition, had fallen behind. These two being brought back to the town, one of them was dismissed, and the other being hurt in the head, was carried to the Town-house to be taken care of, and in a few days, being fully recovered, was likeways sent off.

(14th Aug.—A letter is produced from “Secretary Delafay,” relative to the above, and a reply ordered to be sent, in which the town state they are sorry their account does not agree with that furnished by his Majesty’s Advocate, and it goes on, “We are very much mistaken if our account does not perfectly agree with the examinations taken by his Majesties Advocate, when he was pleased to allow us to be present: As for other examinations which his Lordship may have thought fitt to take in presence of Major-Generall Wade, Colonell Spotswood, and Collonel Guest, without allowing us to be present, or acquainting us of such examination, we can say nothing about them, &c. We cannot think my Lord Advocate will give the name of examinations to some discourses past betwixt his Lordship and some of the Magistrats in a tavern, when the honourable persons you mentiou were present, &c. We did not doubt that his Majesties Advocate had done the malsters in this city the justice to represent that, in

conformity to the law imposing the malt duty on grain malted, they have given security for the stock in hand, and for all the malt they made from the 23d of June, and that the officers of excise have free, quiet, and ready access to all their barns also oft as they require it.")

25th Sept.—Ordain Arthur Tran, late Treasurer, to pay to John Stark, Dean of Gild, £50 sterling, which he payed at London for a fire engine, for the service of the town, which is now upon the way coming home.

22d Jan., 1726.—Which day, &c., the Magistrats represented that, in pursuance of a former act, &c., they had mett with the proprietars of the suggar houses, and had received in from them some proposals, viz:—That, upon the towns exeeming their servants from keeping of the town guard, in respect their labour and work in the sugar house necessarily requyres their working in the night time as well as throw the day, they, in lieu thereof, aggree and condescend that the suggar boyler of each of their sugar houses, with their servants, which will be ten, at least, from each sugar house, shall be ready at all tymes when fire happens in the city, on their being advertised by the drum, or bell, or first allarm thereof, to attend the Magistrats, and give their best help and assistance, The toun provyding each suggar house with four slings, and stands and buckets, So that, upon the first occasion of fyre, they shall come to the place with them filled with water, and thereafter observe the orders and directions of the Magistrats, and others whom they shall appoynt.—(Agreed to.)

(11th March.—Act anent linnen and cotton handkercheffs. [This act is directed against the use of false or loose colour, and against handkerchiefs being made "shorter in lenth than they are in breadth."])

12th April.—Which day, &c., considering that there is an agreement, signed by several of the heretors within the burgh, for

a mutuall insurance of tenements and houses from losses by fire, do agree that the touns corner house at the Crofs be lykeways insured, &c.

(22d April.—Address to the King, on the Commons having passed a resolution to enable his Majesty to grant the sum of £6,080 out of the supplies, to Daniel Campbell of Shawfield, in consideration of the damage he sustained by the riots of 24th and 25th June, and that it had been moved that such sum shall be replaced out of the fund that arises to the town from the grant of 2d. on the Scots pint of ale and beer sold within the town. This grant is on 26th May, 1726, vested in his Majesty, in security for the above sum ; and there is subsequently the following entry.

13th June.—*The Council* to have their thoughts in reference to the 2d.—Which day the Magistrats and Town Council conveened, they recommend to one another to have their thoughts upon what is proper for the town to do in reference to the £6080 sterling granted by the Parliament to Daniel Campbell of Shawfield, for his dammages, and wherewith the touns 2d. on the pint is burdened with the repayment thereof to his Majesty, whether the toun, in its present circumstances, should borrow the money for the payment thereof, or that the 2d. should continue vested in his Majestie till repayment, &c.

(The sum is afterwards borrowed by the town on bonds to sundries, and the 2d. on the pint relieved.)

(7th March.—Agreement with John and Thos. M’Fies, for keeping up the causeways in town.)

21st Oct.—Which day, &c., approves of the contract betwixt the Magistrats, &c., on the one part, and Susannah Smith, relict of the deceased Mr. Archd. Wallace, minister at Cardross, on the other part, dated 12th Sept. last, whereby the said Susannah Smith is nominate Mistress of the Public School, erected in this city, for teaching girles to spin flax into fine yearn fitt for making threed or cambrick, upon an encouragement of thirty pounds sterling annually, granted by the Commissioners and Trustees for improveing Fisharies and manufactories in Scotland, out of the publick money which is put under their manadgement, and that during the full term of three years, from and after the 11th November instant, &c.

The which day, considering the great dammage which the streets of this city and avenues thereof sustain thro’ a late method of fixing the iron bands to the trades of carts by square-headed stob-nails, and the vaste expense the toun is at in mentaining and upholding the caussies and streets thereof without any relief from or burden upon the carters occasioning the said damadge, do therefore strictly prohibite and discharge, &c., and from and after the first of January next, &c.

(18th June, 1730.—New regulations as to the price of bread wheat being now down to ten pounds the boll, and again on 13th July, 1732, wheat being then declared to be down to £9 per boll.)

Liberary Keeper every four years, to make the office *ad vitam aut culpam*, they remit the said proposal to the quarter committee to consider thereupon and report.

7th Nov.—Which day, &c., ordain Robert Luke, late Treasurer, to pay to Mr. Robert Wodrow, Minister of the Gospel at Eastwood, ten pounds sterling of charity, for the behoove of the poor sufferers at Saltzbrugh, who have been constrained to leave their country for their steady adherence to the Protestant religion.

(3d April, 1733.—Statute as to the wheat bread-wheat being of this date at £8 Scots per boll; and again on 13th Aug., 1734, when wheat was up at £11 Scots per boll; and again on 4th Feb., 1737, when wheat was at £9 10s. per boll.)

14th June.—Which day, &c., the Magistrats represented, that, considering the deplorable circumstances of many of the inhabitants of the burgh of Paisley, by which they are reduced by the violent conflagration by fire which happened there on the second instant, whereby in a few hours a third or fourth part of the town was laid in ashes, and many families dislodged, and their effects consumed, The said Magistrates, out of charity and compassion, and for a present help and relief to such of the sufferers as are reduced to want and indigence by the said fire, did recommend to the inhabitants of this burgh for a voluntary contribution throw the city for the present relief and supply of the saids sufferers, and recommended to the Sessions of this city to nominate fitt persons of their number, as they should think necessary, for ingathering the said contribution, and the same to be paid in unto John Craig, thesaurer, and be paid in by him to the Baillies of Paisley, to be distributed, &c., which being heard by the Councill, they approved, &c.; and funder ordain John Craig, thesaurer, out of the towns common good to pay in to the Baillies of Pasley, or any of them, to the end foresaid, fourty pound sterling money.

1st Oct.—Ordain John Craig, Thesaurer, to pay to Robt. Mackie, hammerman, £10 7s. 2d. sterling, for making a large copper weather cock to the High Church steeple, busked with four pieces cast brass, and screwed together with forty brass screw nails and roves, gilding the cock with gold leaf, and a brass globe made of two pieces, and screwed together with two brass screw nails, conform to an account, &c.

Ordain John Craig, Thesaurer, to pay to James Nisbett, glazier, £2 12s. 8½d. sterling, whereof 12s. sterling for glass to a window of thirty-eight foot, new glass in the Outter Church, broke by one Campbell, a prisoner, who made his escape throw the said window, and the remainder of the account for glass to brokin lamps, and new tirlies* to the Clerks chamber windows, and colouring them, and other glass work.

14th March, 1734.—Which day the Magistrats represented that they are informed that this Session of Parliament there is a bill to be presented to the House of Commons for repealing the septennial,† and restoring the triennial law, and that severall counties and corporations have sent, and are to send, instructions to their Members thereanent, which being considered by the Councill, they remitt to and appoint the Magistrats, in their name, to write to such of the Members of the House of Commons as they shall think proper, in favours of so good and desireable an act.

(12th April.—An address to the King “on the happy conclusion of the marriage of the Princess Royal with his most Serene Highness the Prince of Orange.”)

27th Sept.—Which day, &c., anent a memorial given in by the Company of Archers, signed by George Leitch, merchant, their Preses, craving the Councils encouragment to give them a prize,

which is never to go out of the Company, but to be kept by them as a lasting instance of the town, favour, which being considered by the Magistrats and Councill, they ordain John Gartshore, thesaurer, to pay to the said George Leith, the Preses, £5 sterling, for defraying the expense of the prizes and to be made by the direction of the Magistrats, &c.

2d May, 1735.—Ordain the Dean of Gild and Bretheren to admitt Mr. Laurence Hill, Minister at Kilmarnock, burgess and gildbroyther, by the right of Hill of Lambhill, burges and gildbrother, &c.

2d July.—Ordain Robert Cross, thesaurer, to pay to William Craig, Baillie, £5 stirling, which he paid out as the price and value of a small set of musick bells in Edinburgh, which were made by John Fife, and delivered to Rodger Redburn, musician here, for the use and behoove of the town, and which bells are lodged with the said Rodger Redburn, for his practising, in order to enable him to play upon the towns great chime of bells.

4th Oct.—Ordain Robt. Cross, thesaurer, to pay to Robt. Fulton, coppersmith, £2 3s. 2d., for making a new jack pinnet* and new ensign, raising the main mast and fore mast, and making a new rudder, and other reparations on the ship on the Bridgegate steeple, per account revised, &c.

Which day, &c., remitt the petition given in by John M'Ure, writer, craving some consideration for defraying his charges in putting furth a book which he calls the Hystory of the present state of the City, to the Annual Committee.

20th Feb., 1739.—Which day, &c., remitt to the Magistrats to procure authentic copies of the towns writes and others belonging to the burgh, which were carried off at the Reformation, and lodged in the Colledge of Dowie, and to apply to proper persons for procuring the same.

9th March.—Which day, &c., considering that the sett of musick bells which the town had got from London about two or three years ago, were not in consort, and did not answer, and that John Fife, player on the musick bells at Edinburgh, was employed by the toun to right and make them in consort, and that he has been for these six months past taken up at the said work, whereof four months here in chizelling and other work, and two months at Edinburgh in overseeing and attending the casting of fourteen small bells, and tuning them, and giving directions, which, with the former bells, are all now put up, and give satisfaction, and that the account of casting and tuning the above fourteen bells, after deduction of the weight of one of the great bells sent to Edinburgh, which was not in consort, and weighted 620 pound, at rod. the pound, there remains of ballance £16 17s. 8d. sterling, with which the said John Fife is charged, in name of the toun, by Wm. Johnstone & Compy., who made the said fourteen bells, &c., Ordain Andw. Armour, late thesaurer, to pay the said John Fife the sum of £60 sterling, (including said ballance, and that in full, &c.)

23d May.—Which day, &c., the Magistrats represented that they had made application, by petition, to the Earl of Glasgow, Lord Ross, and Sir John Maxwell of Pollock, overseers, nominated by the Barons of Exchequer, for overseeing the laying out

of the expense for supporting and repairing the Cathedral Church, setting furth that, by the late violent storm and hurricane,* which happened in the night betwixt the 13th and 14th days of Jan., 1739, several of the turrets of the Church, and battlements surrounding the same, were thrown down, part whereof fell down upon the roof of the Church, and broke through and damnified the roof, and other parts of the said roof which were covered with lead and sclates, was uncovered and tirred by the said hurricane, and the roof thereby much damnified and spoiled, and several other parts of the Church chatterd and disordered, and the top of the speir made to decline and bow down, which will cost a considerable expense for repairing thereof, &c., (craving that persons might be named to cognosce the said damage, which was accordingly done, and the visitors having inspected the Cathedral, find) Two pinnacles upon the speir of the steeple, the greatest part of the ballastrades about the steeple, the top of the pedament upon the south side of the Church, and a great part of the parapats round the Church, were beat down, and fell in upon and drove down the roof, and the two spires whereon the weather cöcks were fixt were turned aside, and a great part of the roof, as well what was clad with lead, as what was covered with slate, was uncovered, and severall parts of the wall chattered, and disordered, which will, by the most modest computation, and most exact manangement, require £50 sterling to repair the stone work, and £93 9s. 9½d. sterling for timber, slate, nails, and scaffolding, to repair the roof, and £236 2s. 8d. sterling for cleading the lead roof, which they declare, upon soul and conscience, to the best of their knowledge and judgment; and furder reported that the jests and floor which support the steeple, which is but one stone thick, are failed, and should be renewed, and judge that a sum not under

£17 sterling, will not defray the expense thereof,—All which being heard, &c., (agree to make the repair, and remit to the Magistrates to see the same done).

24th Sept.—Which day, &c., considering that, by their act dated the 24th of August last, they statued and ordained that the wheat being at 19s. sterling the boll, including the manufacturing, that the wheat bread, whether white, wheaten, or houshold, be prepared, marked, and sold by the baxters conform to and according to the assize fixt and determined by the Act of Parliament, &c., The Magistrats and Council do now furdur statute and ordain that the baxters for the future affix upon their bread the initial letters of the bakers name; and upon the severall sorts, whether white, wheaten, or houshold, the letters following, viz., the letter F on the white bread—the letter W on the wheaten bread—and the letter H on the houshold bread. As also affix distinct figures, such as I for a penny loaf—II for a two penny loaf, and so furth for larger loafs. And likeways agree and ordain that there be scales and weights provided, and fixt in the Clerks Chamber, for weighing the bread, and that any of the inhabitants who have any suspicion of the weight of the bread furnisht to them, may bring the same to the Clerks Chamber to be weighted, and if found light, do impower the Magistrats to pay for the loaf, and give half a crown of reward to the person who brings the loaf formed light, (and order intimation hereof to be made).

(There is again another Act on this subject, with additional regulations, on 6th Nov., 1740.)

8th May, 1740.—Which day, &c., the Councill agree that a tryal be made this season of deepning the river, by carying away the banks below the Broomielaw, and remitt to the Magistrats to cause do the same, and go the length of £100 sterling of charges thereupon, and to cause build a flatt bottomed boat for carying off the sand and chingle from the banks.

Which day, anent the petition given in by James Lochhead, teacher of cookery, mentioning that he being regularly educated by his Majesty's cooks, under whom he served in the art of cookery, pastry, confectioning, candying, preserving, and pickling, and of making of milks, creams, syllabubs, gellies, soups and broaths, of all sorts, and also taught to dress and order a table, and to make bills of fare for entertainments of all kinds, and that of late he has successfully taught severall young ladies, to their own and their parents satisfaction, and that for instruction of his scholars he is obliged to provide, on his own charge, flesh, fowles, fish, spiceries, and severall other ingredients, but when dresst, lye on his hand for want of sale, by which he is a loser, and will be obliged to lay aside his teaching unless he be assisted in carrying it on, and, therefore, craving a yearly allowance, &c., (remit to the Magistrats to agree with him as to teaching, and allow him £10 sterling yearly during their pleasure).

15th Dec.—*Grain to be purchased for the poor, &c.*—Which day, &c., the Provost represented that the other Societies, viz., the Merchants House, the Trades House, and General Session, with the Magistrats, had applyed to the Bank for money, to the extent of three thousand pounds sterling, for providing grain for the service of the place in this straitning time, and that the Bank had given them credit for that sum, and that the said Andrew Buchanan, Provost, and Andrew Cochran, Baillie, for the towns part, had joined with the other Societys, and signed the bond to the Bank. Therefore, the Councill enact and oblige them to indemnify the said Andrew Buchanan, Provost, and Andrew Cochran, Baillie, of the said bond, &c., and of any loss that may be sustained by purchasing the grain, and selling the same out again to the inhabitants for retail.

26th Dec.—Which day the Magistrats represented that, at a meeting with the severall Societys, &c., it was agreed that for the

present supply of the poor in this scarcity, each of the Societys should contribute a certain moyety for three months, besides what the inhabitants should contribute and sign for, and that the Magistrats had agreed that the towns part should be £15 sterling per month, which being heard by the Council, they approve thereof, &c.

5th March, 1742.—Which day, &c., the Magistrats by the Council are desired to write to Neill Buchanan, Esq., Member of Parliament for the town, thanking him for what he has done in Parliament, and that as there is already brought into the House of Commons some bills for more effectually securing the independence of Parliament and the rights and libertys of the subjects, and that they hope and expect more will, That they desire he will heartily promote all such laws being enacted, and particularly the limiting the number of placemen and pensioners in the House of Commons, and repealing the law for Septennial Parliaments, and procuring a law for Triennials.

9th Nov.—The letter itself is of this date, and is as follows:—

“The securing and restoring our liberty and Constitution, and preserving the independence of Parliament, having been our chief care in promoting your election as Member of the House of Commons for this city and district, it is with the outmost pleasure we observe that in your Parliamentary conduct you have answered these our intentions, for which we make you our most grateful acknowledgement.

“But, as the present conjuncture is extremely critical, you will permit us to give our sentiments at the opening of this new Session, which, we have no doubt, are perfectly agreeable to your own.

“We earnestly request of you, in the name of the Corporation, to promote every maxim for preventing and restraining all manner of pecuniary influence over the Members of your House, the

unhappy source of all our calamities—for restoring frequency of new Parliaments, and for giving such vigour to our once happy, but now exhausted, Constitution. That you be as sparing of the national treasure as the present exigencies will admit, and join in all the Parliamentary enquiries into the past conduct and management of publick affairs, whereby his Majestys Government will be founded on its proper basis—the affections of his people; former mismanagements and grievances may be corrected and redressed, and all further abuse of power, we hope, be prevented.

“Your attendance to these points, and any others that may come before your House for the good of your country, will endear you to all lovers of liberty, and be particularly acceptable to all the members of this community.”

15th Oct., 1743.—Which day, &c., there was a proposal produced, signed by John Walker, merchant in Edinburgh, for erecting a stage coach betwixt Edinburgh and Glasgow, and to set out twice a week from Edinburgh to Glasgow, and twice a week from Glasgow to Edinburgh, and the coach, or lando, to contain six passengers, with six sufficient horses, for twenty weeks in the summer, and the rest of the year once a week, and each passenger to pay ten shillings sterling, and to be entitled to fourteen pound weight of baggage, and that as long as he continues the stage coach, that the town should insure to him that two hundred of his tickets shall be sold here each year, Which being read, &c., (remit to a Committee, and to report.)

(1st Dec.—Address of congratulation to the King, on the success of his arms in Germany—the marriage of the Prince and Princess Royal of Denmark—the happy increase of the Royal family—and his Majesty’s safe return to the British dominions, after “having hazarded his most precious life in maintenance of the balance of power in Europe.”)

(3^d Jan., 1744.—Act in favour of “the Directors of the Towns

Hospital, erecting them into a Corporation and Society," which narrates that the inhabitants, "from a voluntary contribution among themselves, have erected a large Hospital and Workhouse, with a spacious Court about it, and a handsome well contrived Infirmary at a small distance from the Hospital, and all upon a plot of ground gifted to them by the Magistrats and Town Council, most wholesom, pleasant, and commodious, on account of its good air, and being near the River of Clyde," and erects the forty-eight Directors to be annually chosen, to be a legal Society and Incorporation.)

(17th Aug,—Rules for suppressing profaneness at great length.)

(5th June, 1745.—Decreet arbitral on submission between the Merchants' and Trades' Houses, in relation to the several mortifications by Robert Sanders of Auldhouse.)

27th Sept.—Which day the Magistrats and Town Council, with the Trustees and Commissioners * nominat by former Acts, dated the 15th and 26th days of September instant, and a plurality of the inhabitants, both of the Merchants and Crafts rank, being mett and conveened, The Trustees and Commissioners foresaid, reported that there was produced and delivered to them a letter, dated at Holyrood house, of 25th current, signed Charles P. R., direct to the Provost, Magistrats, and Town Council of the City of Glasgow, demanding compliance with the payment of the £15000 sterling which he required by his former letter, with a commission, of the same date, signed as above, to John Haye, Esq., empowering him furthwith to repair to Glasgow, and treat with the Magistrats and Toun Council, in terms of the said letter, and represented that they had, accordingly, mett with the said John Hay, and after much time spent, they had prevailed with Mr. Hay to restrict the demand of £15000 sterling, to the sum of

£5500 sterling, which, in their opinion, ought to be complied with, to save the inhabitants, and their dwellings and goods, from being exposed to the discretion of the numerous army of Highlanders now in arms, of whom some are at the entry and confines of the city, and desired the opinion of the inhabitants as to their compliance with the terms offered, and that such as had any money, or bank notes, or could draw bills, would condescend upon the sums which could be lent, for the security of the inhabitants, Upon which, the whole inhabitants present declared that, in their present circumstances, and as necessity has no law, they approved of the opinion of their Trustees and Commissioners, and such as had money, bank notes, or could draw bills, condescended upon the extent thereof, and consented to pay in the same on receipt of any proper person, and take a bond from the Magistrates and Town Council for security thereof, and that what further was necessary, might be borrowed on the towns security, for satisfying the above demand, and that the repayment thereof might be thereafter divided and payed by the inhabitants according to their respective abilities and interests in their dwelling, trade, and commerce, in the city, which being considered by the Magistrates and Town Council, they authorise John M'Gilchrist, Deput Town Clerk, to receive from the respective inhabitants such sums, bank notes, and bills of blank indorsations, as shall be offered to him for the effect foresaid, and grant receipt thereof, until an act of Council, or other security, can be granted for the several sums to be so lent, and recommend to the Magistrates, or any of their number, to apply to the Right Hon. the Earle of Glencairn, or any other person possesst of money or credit, for a loan of what further sums may be necessary for completing the above demand, &c.

(On 17th Dec., 1745, a bond is signed to the Earle of Glencairn for £1500; and on 26th Sept., 1746, there is an entry declaring

that the Earl agrees to restrict the annual rent thereon to $4\frac{1}{2}$ per cent.)

3d Dec.—Which day, &c., considering that there being sent to the city, from Edinburgh Castle, by the Government, one thousand firelocks, one thousand bayonets, one thousand cartouch boxes, eight barrells of gun powder, and ten barrells of musket ball, with two barrells of flint, for the defence and service of the city and his Majestys Government, and that the Magistrats had granted a receipt, &c., &c., all which the Magistrats promise to return to Lieut. Gen. Guest, on demand, at the Castle of Edinburgh, &c., and the Council considering that the inhabitants are subscribing for levying and paying to the number of six hundred volunteers, upon the subscribers charge, for the service foresaid, for the space of two months, the Council agree that the above arms and ammunition be given out and distribute among the said volunteers, and others of the inhabitants, for the service foresaid, and remit to the Magistrats to see the same done, &c.

6th May, 1746.—Which day, &c., John Cochran, Mr. of Work, represented that, by advice of the Magistrats, he had sent to London to sell the brocken necklace of diamonds, which several years ago were found among the rubbish of Daniel Campbell of Shawfields house, when mobbed by the crowd in the year 1725, and exposed by some of the mobb to sale, with a piece of gold coin, and that the same had been offered back to the Lady Shawfield, who refused to take it, in regaird Shawfield was satisfied by the Parliament as to his damages, and the town fyned upon that account, and that, accordingly, the said necklace was sold at £30 sterling, and the piece of gold at two pound ten shillings. (Ordain him to pay the same over to the Treasurer.)

16th July.—Which day, &c., remit the counter petitions given by the candlemakers, in relation to the crackling house,—as also the petition of the merchants who furnished the goods and others,

demanded by the Highland rebels, when here, from the town, as a fyne put on the town by their pretended Prince, for appearing in arms against him, craving their accounts may be ascertained and docket, in order for their payment, to the Annual Committee, to consider thereupon, and to report.

8th Sept.—Which day, &c., ordain John Murdoch, sen., Treasurer, to pay to George Murdoch, merchant, late Baillie, £14 4s. sterling, whereof £3 1s. as his expenses at Edinburgh with the Provost, in February last, about the towns affairs, and £11 3s. as his expenses with Richard Allan, Baillie, who were sent by the Council to Inverness, to congratulate the Duke of Cumberland, after the battle of Culloden, when the rebels were defeat, per particular account.

Which day, &c., ordain Robert Donaldson, late Treasurer, to pay to George Carmichael, Baillie, and Archd. Coats, merchant, who were taken away by the rebels along with them, in January last, as hostages for the town, that the iniquitous fyne imposed upon the town would be paid them, the sum of £13 15s. 8d., as their expenses and charges for themselves, servants, and horses, from the 3d January to the 4th February, when they were released, per particular account.

Which day, &c., The Committee, in consequence of an appointment by a former act, &c., Report, that on the 14th Sept., 1745, The Pretenders son sent a written demand to the Magistrats, requiring, on their peril, payment of £15000 sterling, besides sundry other things, That, upon the notice thereof, the principal inhabitants, by their petition to the Magistrats and Council setting furth that the city was threatened with a force which they were unable to resist, and that the inhabitants, and their trade and dwellings, were in imminent danger of being exposed to irreparable losses, did beseech the Magistrates and Council, by their act, to authorise such persons therein named, or their quorum, on the

approach of any such force, to meet with their leaders, and make the best terms they could for saving the city, its trade, and inhabitants, from these dismal consequences, and to indemnify these trustees from any engagement they should come under, That, in pursuance of said petition, the Magistrats and Council gave a commission, in terms thereof. The Committee farther report, that, on the 26th of Sept., 1745, The Magistrats, at a full meeting of the inhabitants, in the Touns New Hall, represented that they had certain information that a party of the rebels were to be in Glasgow the same day, setting furth what the Council had done, and desiring their approbation, and instructions to the Commissioners in the Councils act,—Upon hearing thereof, the inhabitants unanimously approved of the Councils act, and authorised the foresaid Commissioners, in conjunction with the Magistrats, to make the best terms they could, That, accordingly, said 26th Sept. last, John Hay, Writer to the Signet, came with a party of horse, and presented a written commission to him, the said John Hay, together with a demand from the Pretenders son, for £15000 sterling, and the Magistrats and Trustees for the inhabitants, having had a long conversation with him, they, at last, with much difficulty, got him to restrict his demand to £5000 in money, and £500 in goods. The Committee also report that, on the 27th of September last, at another full meeting of the inhabitants in said New Hall, the Magistrats resumed what had been communed with Mr. Hay, and desired to know their opinion, Upon which, the whole inhabitants present (except William Pagan, an under boyler in the Western sugar house,) approved of the transaction, Whereupon, the Magistrats represented that money would be wanted immediately, and that tho' the Council were, in the meantime, to give the touns security, yet the fyne was to be proportioned among the inhabitants according to their abilities, at a more settled time, and desired such of the inhabitants as had money, to pay it in to

John M'Gilchrist, the town clerk, who should be immediately authorised by the Council to give his receipts therefor, all which was approved of by the inhabitants: That accordingly the Council authorised the said John M'Gilchrist to grant receipts to such of the inhabitants as had money to lend, for which they should have Act of Council, who accordingly paid to him the sum of £3500 sterling, which, with £1500 sterling borrowed from the Earle of Glencairn, made the sum of £5000 sterling; and Port-Glasgow Ropework and Glasgow Tanwork, and Richard Allan, merchant in Glasgow, and James Smith, weaver in Glasgow, furnished goods to the extent of £500 sterling, in full of the said oppressive demand made by the said John Hay; all which money and goods were, on the 30th of Sept. last, paid and delivered to said John Hay, conform to receipt. The Committee also report, that the above matters and transaction were laid before the Merchants and Trades Houses, and approven of by them, conform to their separate Acts. The Committee farther report, that the rebels having entered Glasgow the 25th of December last, with the Pretenders son, there was a demand made (on account of the citys late appearance in arms for our happy government) of 6000 short cloath coats, 12000 linen shirts, 6000 pairs of shoes, and the like number of pairs of tartan hose and blue bonnets, whereon the Magistrats, on the 28th of Dec. last, laid this most exhorbitant demand before a full meeting of the inhabitants, in said New hall, who unanimously considering their then unhappy situation, agreed to comply with said unjust demand, and named John Wilson, James Wardrop, and Walter Brisbane, all merchants, to buy and provide the cloaths, Thomas Dunmoor,

also merchants, to provide the linens, Robert Finlay,
tanner, . to

provide the shoes, Archibald Coats,

to buy the tartan for the hose, John Hamilton,

to provide the blue bonnets, who, in virtue of said order, purchased said respective goods, part whereof were delivered to the rebels before they left Glasgow, and for relieving the hostages whom the rebels carried from Glasgow, the remainder was sent after them to Bannockburn, the account whereof, with the names of the furnishers, is insert in a book made for that purpose, in the hands of said John M'Gilchrist, amounting in all, with the expenses of some cartages to Bannockburn, to the sum of . The Committee also report, that the far greatest part of the inhabitants, by writes under their hands, approved of said last transaction, and appointed the buying of goods, and promised to pay their parts of them, as it should be proportioned by persons authorised for that end. The Committee moreover report, that it is just and reasonable the lenders of said money, and furnishers of said goods, should be secured concerning their repayment, but that the touns ordinary and stated revenue is altogether unable to pay such two heavy debts, and that it is their humble opinion this whole affair should be laid before the Merchants and Trades Houses, and that separate Acts should be obtained from them, approving of the foresaid transactions, and recommending to the Magistrates and Council to give the touns security for the repayment of the sums lent and goods furnished, as above said, and promising and engaging each of said Houses, for themselves and constituents, that they will concur and agree in all measures for applying to the King and Parliament for relief and reimbursement of said two iniquious fynes ; or if that cannot be obtained, or shall become ineffectual, to apply to the Magistrats and Council to name proper persons, in the same manner as is done with respect to the towns land tax, for proportioning and dividing the said two heavy sums among the heritors, landholders, traders, and inhabitants, conform to their interests and abilities, and vesting proper powers in the Magistrats for levying and up-

lifting thereof in a summary manner, or that they will concur in procuring an Act of Parliament for prolonging the grant of the towns two pennies on the pint of ale and beer, and for extending that imposition upon malt brewn by or for the use of private inhabitants, and consenting to the touns levying their present or any future grant of said imposition which they shall obtain to the full extent of the Act of Parliament, and that they will concur in any other measures that shall be judged proper for the relief and reimbursement of the touns publick stock of the said two oppressive and unjust exactions, which Report, above written, being heard, &c., by the Magistrats and Council, they approved of the same, and agree thereto, &c.

(17th Nov., 1746.—Decreet Arbitral on Submission between the Town and the Colledge, as to the property of the latter being freed from payment of cess, stent, or land tax.)

7th May, 1747.—Which day, &c., ordain James Clark, Treasurer, to pay to Mr. Wm. Cross, Advocat, the sum of £119, as his personal charge and expenses in going to, and at, and coming from London, upon the towns affairs, in relation to the towns being redrest, by the Government, of the unjust and heavy demands made by the rebel army upon the city, in the year 1745, and exacted by the rebels—being desired to go there by the Magistrats in winter last, &c.

(Regulations as to the management of the three fire-engines.)

(Regulations of the Merchants' House.)

9th Sept.—Ordain James Clark, Treasurer, to pay to Archd. Campbell, horsesetter, £6 sterling, he being sent by the Magistrats, when the rebels were marching from the Highlands, to get notice of their marches, and being apprehended by a party of men, they seized on his horse, saddle and bridle, and took what money he had upon him.

(15th April, 1748.—The porters and workmen erected into a Society, and regulations to be observed by them.)

(Regulations with respect to the sett of the town, at great length.)

(13th May.—The horse setters constituted a Society, and very full regulations to be observed by them; and fixing the hires of horses, chaises, &c.)

(13th Dec.—Commissions in favour of Provost Cochrane and Bailie Murdoch, to apply, in name of the town, to Parliament, for a prolongation of the Act, in favour of the town, for the two pennies on the pint of ale, beer, &c.; and for relief of the above-mentioned fines levied by the rebel army.)

14th June, 1749.—Which day, &c., Andrew Cochrane, Provost, and George Murdoch, late Bailie, who were empowered by the Council, by their Act 13th Dec. last, to repair to London, to apply to his Majesty and Parliament for reimbursing the sums extorted from the town, upon account of the towns loyalty, by the rebels, during the late unnatural rebellion, represented that the Parliament had granted to his Majesty the sum of £10,000 to reimburse the town of the above extorted fines, and that the same was to be paid to the town by his Majesty's Exchequer, by his Majesty's warrant to the Commissioners of Treasury.—The Magistrates and Council, for themselves, and in name of the community, being sensible of the Provost and George Murdoch their good services and diligence in procuring such relief to the town, do tender them their most hearty thanks. And in order to obtain the payment, the Magistrates and Council have subscribed a Commission and Power of Attorney, the tenor whereof follows, &c. (In the usual terms, in favour of Messrs. Campbell and Bruce, Bankers in London.)

28th June, 1749.—*Provost Cochran and Bailie Murdoch's Expences at London.*—The which day, Andrew Cochran, Provost, and George Murdoch, late Baillie, gave in an account of their charge and expences in relation to their late journey to and from London,

about the town's affairs, which is as follows:—To a chaise, and makers servant, twenty eight pound, two shillings and sixpence.—To John Stewart, the servant, at several times, on the road, six pound, seven shillings, two pence.—To Ditto, at London, to account five pound, eight shillings.—To the servant, to carry him with two horses, one pound, ten shillings.—To charges at Whitburn, and four days at Edinburgh, eight pound, ten shillings.—To charges on road to London, eleven days, twenty eight pound, ten shillings.—To lodging at London, and house account for coalls, candle, tea, sugar, breakfasts, &c., sixty one pound, fifteen shillings, nine pence.—To William Alloë, the servant, for wages, boarding, and incidentals, at London, and for turnpikes and expenses on road down, seventeen pound, thirteen shillings, three pence.—To shaving and dressing, two pound, seven shillings.—To Mr. Bowden, for liquors to quarters, four pound, twelve shillings.—To chaise mending, ten shillings.—To post hire from London to Edinburgh, twenty one pound.—To hostlers, riders, horns, &c., two pound, two shillings.—To charges on road from London, five pound, twelve shillings, six pence.—To charges at Edinburgh and Whitburn, two pound, thirteen shillings and six pence.—To charges from Edinburgh home, and to driver, two pound.—To extraordinary entertainments at London, thirty pound.—To writing copies petition and memorial, &c., seven pound, eleven shillings, sterling.—To expences and incidentals, ordinary and extraordinary, at London, viz., By Andrew Cochran, one hundred twenty five pound, twelve shillings.—By George Murdoch, one hundred and five pound, four shillings, $\frac{1}{2}$ d.—To a writing master, to come down, five pound, five shillings.—To charge of advertisements, six shillings,—extending the said sums to four hundred seventy two pound, eleven shillings, eight pence $\frac{1}{2}$ d., sterling; and by the said account, they give the town credit for the sums following, viz. :—One hundred forty two pound of militia money, got from Robert

Colquhoun.—Fifty pound, fifteen shillings, 10½d., sterling, of
 , from Arthur Robertson, late Treasurer.—One hundred
thirty eight pound, fifteen shillings, of remains of one hundred and
fifty pound, stirling, borrowed by the town from Robert Hamilton
of Bourtreehill, after deducing eleven pound five shillings of
interest, on a bond of two hundred and fifty pound sterling, one
hundred pound by bill, on said Arthur Robertson, by said Andrew
Cochran, in favour of William Ballantyne.—Twenty pound by
Messrs. Campbell and Bruce, London, taken from them on receipt.
Twenty one pound, ten pence, of cash, to be received from Arthur
Robertson, Treasurer,—extending the said credite side to four
hundred seventy two pound, eleven shillings, eight pence ½d.,
sterling, which ballances the charge, which account being read in
presence of the Magistrats and Council, They approve thereof,
and ordain Arthur Robertson, late Treasurer, to pay the said
Andrew Cochran the foresaids sum of twenty one pound and ten
pence, sterling, and their presents.
