This walnut beaureand was made for Ate Sincolne it has been thought that Ale Lincoln cut the timber to make it as he was a great At man and was a froor man at that time he posibaly Paid no eashat that time lots of work was swop or barter I am not tilling this as facts but I now will procede to give the history of it as handed down to me by my mothers family after Lincoln was engaged to Ann Rutlege he gave the Beaureau to Ann at Anns death it was returned to Abereham Lincoln who sold it to James Alexander west of Springfield at Richland at his Weather he gave it to his over

sister Garrah Alexander who Married Sam OiNeal who lived in the vecinity of what at her death she asked it to be given to her daughter Abartha Turko gaire it to Martha A Marsord my mother who gave it to me at her death 1922, it has never been out of my famly since James Alexander bought it from lincoln and these are all the changes it has made

CHARLES W. STEWARD

SHELBYVILLE, Ill., Oct. 26.—
Charles W. Steward, 84, is the only man in Shelbyville now alive who has seen Abraham Lincoln. When very small, his father took him to Bowser's tavern, a stage coach stop in Rural township in the western part of Shelby county, where Lincoln stopped for the night when traveling through the county to Springfield. Mr. Steward remembers that Mr. Lincoln sprawled in his chair with one pants leg tucked in the top of his boot, and the other one out, while he drawled his comic stories. A handmade walnut desk Lincoln used when as a young lawyer riding the circuit he stopped in Shelbyville is one of Mr. Steward's treasured possessions. Still active in business, he is proud of having lived at the same location in Shelbyville for 51 years. For 33 years he served either as assessor or as a member of the board of review and for several terms he served as alderman of the second ward. His insurance agency is one of the oldest in central Illinois.

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
