Routing P.G.E. To Peace River In Final Phase

Work Announced by Premier, Gives No Hint of Further Aid

Final location surveys have been started for extension of the Pacific Great Eastern Railway beyond Prince George to Dawson Creek in the Peace River district.

This was disclosed yesterday by Premier Byron Johnson, who telephoned from Ottawa to express satisfaction at the Federal grant of \$15,000 a mile for the 63-mile extension of the line from Quesnel to Prince George.

Work has started on this phase of the work, which is estimated to cost \$10,000,000. When completed it will link the P.G.E. with the Canadian National Railways at Prince George.

DAWSON CREEK GOAL Premier Johnson stated in his policy speech to the Legislature this morning that it was the Government's intention ultimately to push the P.G.E. to Dawson Creek, a distance of 250 miles, via the Pine Pass route. The line would pass through high-grade coal measures estimated at 200,000,000 tons, and would link up with the Northern Alberta Railway at Prince George.

St. Laurent Confirms Aid For Extension of P.G.E.

OTTAWA, Aug. 4.—Announcement that the Federal Government will grant a subsidy of \$15,000 per mile for extension of the Pacific Great Eastern Railway over the stretch from Quesnel to Prince George, connecting there with the C.N.R. was made today by Prime Minister Louis St. Laurent.

The necessary legislation for payment of the grant, a matter of \$1,245,000 will be placed before Parliament for its approval at the next session opening September 15. Mileage subsidies had been the traditional method by which the Government of Canada had assisted railway construction in the past, Premier St. Laurent recalled. He referred particularly to the subsidy paid to Ontario to defray part of the cost of constructing the Temiskaming and Northern Ontario Railway, under authority of the Temiskaming and Northern Railway Act of 1912.

The announcement followed conferences here between Prime Minister St. Laurent, Provincial Premier Byron Johnson and Fisheries Minister R. W. Mayhew.

Korea Seeking Big Trade Pact With Canada

OTTAWA, Aug. 4 (CP)—Korea, one of democracy's outposts on Russia's doorstep, is prepared to commit itself to a major trade and diplomatic pact, with Canada, Dr. Pyung Ok Chough said today.

In fact, the scholarly, United States-educated Korean added, the more friends Korea had in the democratic Western Hemisphere, the better.

To External Affairs Minister Pearson Dr. Chough brought thanks of his people for voting in favor of Korea's independence at the United Nations, to which Dr. Chough is the Korean delegate.

He asked Mr. Pearson to consider the possibility of exchanging diplomatic missions, or at least establishment of consuls.

Dr. Chough said there was the prospect of an appropriation of \$400,000,000 through Marshall Aid to be spent by Korea during the next three years.

Part of that money, said Dr. Chough, would be spent in Canada, buying Canadian lumber, foodstuffs and industrial machinery.

Korea wanted to build up a strong merchant marine and Dr. Chough said his Government would give strong consideration to getting some of her ships from Canada.

Heavy Fighting Rages in Korea As Reds Attack

SEOUL, Aug. 4 (INS)—Heavy fighting with mounting casualties raged today between Communist and non-Communist troops in Central Korea.

The fierce battle started this morning when an estimated 4,000 to 6,000 North Korean Communist troops surged into South Korean territory in the vicinity of the 38th Parallel boundary on the Ongjin Peninsula.

Reports reaching Seoul said that two South Korean infantry companies were annihilated in the early fighting provoked by the heaviest Communist invasion yet to strike into democratic South Korea. The infantry companies comprised approximately 250 men.

Report Stalin Has Five Terms As Peace Price

NEW YORK, Aug. 4 (AP)—A five-point "price for peace" said to be in the mind of Prime Minister Stalin, including a \$2,000,000,000 United States loan to Russia, today was outlined in United Nations World, a privately-published magazine.

The magazine quoted an unidentified "top-ranking American business man" on the basis of a conversation the periodical said the American had in the summer of 1948 with Andrei A. Gromyko, Stalin's conditions for peace were jotted down by the American, the magazine said, after his talk with Gromyko. The five points, the magazine said, were:

- 1. A treaty between the United States and the U.S.S.R. formalizing the commitments of both countries as set forth in the Yalta and Potsdam documents.
2. Four-power unanimity on all questions concerning Germany.
3. Western generosity on reparations for the U.S.S.R.
4. Immediate cessation of the United States and United Kingdom support of "subversive Fascist and Hitlerite" elements.
5. Elimination of all alleged discriminatory trade practices on the part of the United States and resumption of normal trade relations, stimulated by a \$2,000,000,000 loan.

Wirephoto Service Will Speed Pictures

The Associated Press Wirephoto system, the "miracle of the picture age," will start service this week for The Colonist and its subscribers. It means that The Colonist will now be able to receive news pictures from any transmitting centre on this continent in as little as eight minutes. Pictures from London, European and other overseas transmitting stations will be in The Colonist's newsroom half an hour after they are sent. They will cross the oceans by radiophone and be retransmitted from New York by Wirephoto.

First on Island

It will be the first time that Wirephoto has ever been used on Vancouver Island.

Receiving equipment for the new picture service was installed at The Colonist last night. It is being perfected today and barring transmission difficulties will be in full swing for Sunday morning's edition.

If there are any major news stories on Saturday, which would normally be printed in Sunday's Colonist and illustrated several days later, they will have pictures alongside them. Canadian, American and world sports events from now on will also be illustrated in the next morning's edition.

A.P.'s Wirephoto network, operating 24 hours a day, extending from coast to coast and from Canada to the Gulf of Mexico, is the longest circuit of its kind in existence. Pictures for Wirephoto are provided by trained news photographers stationed at strategic points all over the world, and the cream of each day's picture output is selected by Wirephoto by skilled photo editors.

CHICAGO, Aug. 4 (INS)—An ex-convict pursued for auto-theft wounded three policemen today and was in turn machine-gunned to death in a blazing gun battle in the downtown Northwestern railroad station near Chicago's congested loop.

More than 100 shots were fired in the wild exchange of gunfire which terrorized office workers and passengers in the crowded station.

Living Costs at New Peak, June Index Hits 162.1

With the cost of living index for Canada reported yesterday at a staggering all-time high of 162.1, Victoria housewives were getting some meagre comfort from slight price reductions in certain food commodities.

The index figure was tabulated as of July 2 by the Bureau of Statistics, and shows a 1.6 increase in living cost during June.

Despite the news of slightly lower prices for potatoes and some kinds of meat in the last two days here, the report attributes the index jump to a 4.3 rise in food costs in the period measured.

Food and rents are the main items on which the index is calculated. In the meat department prices are reported down from four to ten cents a pound on chicken, lamb, veal and beef.

Leaders In Accord On Defence

PARIS, Aug. 4 (AP)—The United States Joint Chiefs-of-Staff today reported they have reached complete agreement with European leaders approached thus far on defense plans to be laid by Atlantic-Pac countries.

The Joint Chiefs arrived in Paris this afternoon by plane from London where they had met with army, navy and air force heads of Britain, Norway and Denmark.

In Paris and at Fontainebleau they will meet for two more days with similar leaders of France, The Netherlands, Belgium and Portugal, and Field Marshal Viscount Montgomery.

They already have visited Germany, and Sunday they will leave for Vienna.

Mysterious Gas Causes Terror In U.S. Cities

LOS ANGELES, Aug. 4 (INS)—A mysterious gas cloud that invaded scores of Southern California cities today terrified thousands of persons and brought to mind the 1948 accidental gas siege of Duquoin, Pa., in which 20 people were killed and 600 others were stricken.

The mysterious "garlic gas" was first reported in the Los Angeles area shortly after midnight when children began to whimper and dogs began to howl.

Terrified residents swamped the switchboards of newspapers and police stations demanding an explanation. Some people thought it was an enemy invasion. Others asked if an atomic bomb had been dropped.

By 3 a.m. the obnoxious odors had spread to the San Fernando and San Gabriel Valleys, enveloping dozens of cities and communities. Motorists in downtown Los Angeles said that the gas was so thick that it could be "touched by hand."

Night workers in office buildings said that the gas crept even into offices and buildings where doors and windows were locked.

Health authorities and scientists said they were mystified as to the source and origin of the gas. Investigators were checking nearby oil fields and refineries for a possible explanation.

Toronto Police Sift Flood of Clues As Hunt Pressed for Two Killers

TORONTO, Aug. 4 (CP)—Toronto's crack police investigators today waded through a fresh flow of false reports and dead-end clues in their intense search for the hitchhiking slayer of Robert and Gloria McKay and the gunman who murdered Alfred Laying.

Restless citizens and amateur detectives, spurred by rewards totaling \$8,000, plugged telephone lines with reports of missing persons and suspicious characters.

In the wake of five murders in a week — unprecedented in Toronto crime annals — traffic officers were ordered to question all hitchhikers. Cars on provincial highways are being stopped and checked. Freight cars in Toronto and suburban districts are being searched by police.

Tito Tells Army To Be Prepared For Any Attack

Marshal in Fighting Speech Hurls Defiance at Cominform

BELGRADE, Aug. 4 (INS)—Marshal Tito, in a fighting speech, declared today the "Red army would never attack Yugoslavia," but added the armed forces "must be vigilant and alert."

Tito told a luncheon given him by officials and generals of the Yugoslav army in Macedonia that an attack by the Russian army on Yugoslavia "would mean the end of world Socialism."

The marshal, currently a steady target of the Russian-dominated Cominform, told the troops they must be ready to meet the "first onslaught" of Yugoslavia's enemies in any new war.

"You are now stationed in a sector of our country's defenses in which various provocations have frequently occurred. . . . We station our best soldiers here because we knew that should anything happen you would be able to hold the first onslaught."

MUST BE STRONG "We must have a strong army and be strong ourselves. . . . It would be an illusion to think there will be no more war."

According to the broadcast, Tito said his Macedonian forces are "in a state of preparedness to safeguard the peaceful constructive work of our country."

Tito's speech took official cognizance of reports a Cominform effort is afoot to wrest the Macedonian Republic away from Yugoslavia. (Yugoslavia is embroiled with Bulgaria over the fate of Yugoslav Macedonia, which had been slated

New Move Against Tito Seen in Plane Incident

VIENNA, Aug. 4 (INS)—A reliable source said tonight that a Soviet or Communist satellite plane "intercepted" a Yugoslav C-47 over Soviet-controlled territory in the Cominform's first overt move against Marshal Tito's air links with the outside world.

The reported incident underscored the tense situation arising from the steadily deteriorating relations between Yugoslavia and the Cominform world.

The source said the Yugoslav plane was "intercepted" as it was returning to Belgrade from Stockholm where it had taken the Yugoslav football team for an international match.

The informant said no details were available on the nature of the interception and added it was not known whether the Yugoslav plane was "buzzed" or shot at.

Presumably the incident occurred near the border of Soviet-controlled Austria, Yugoslavia and Hungary.

Changsha Lost To China Reds

CANTON, China, Aug. 3 (Friday) (AP)—The Nationalist today officially admitted the loss of Changsha, rice bowl bastion, 385 miles north of this refugee capital.

The Yugoslav plane returned safely to Belgrade but Yugoslav officials canceled plans for a return flight over the same route.

Instead they asked permission for the plane to fly over the American and British occupation zones of Austria and Germany to avoid Soviet-controlled territory.

The permission was granted, and the plane, at the end of last week, brought back the Yugoslav football team without incident.

## Parliament Sits September 15; No Cabinet Changes Expected

OTTAWA, Aug. 4 (CP)—Canada's new Parliament will open its first session Thursday, September 15, Prime Minister St. Laurent disclosed today in a series of announcements which indicated there will be no early changes in the present Cabinet.

The announcements included the fact that there will be no immediate Cabinet vacancies created to make way for the promotion of the parliamentary assistants. Following the general Federal election, in which the Government piled up an overwhelming majority, there was some speculation that at least a few of the older Cabinet ministers might be replaced by younger men in the Liberal Party.

But Mr. St. Laurent gave no indication of any planned changes in his announcements, which included the following:

### NO VACANCIES

This move was interpreted by some political observers as meaning that the Government is determined to maintain its present Cabinet until the next election.

## Truman Curbs His Own Power To Allot Arms

WASHINGTON, Aug. 4 (CP)—Faced with growing opposition, President Truman today abandoned a section of the Foreign Arms Bill giving him sweeping power to allot arms aid anywhere in the world.

He is not interested in blanket powers, he told a press conference, but he insisted that the full \$1,400,000,000 he requested should be voted quickly.

All he wants is to see that the European countries in the North Atlantic Pact are properly taken care of, he said. Several Congressmen have talked of restricting the President's proposed authority by spelling out which countries shall be eligible for the arms aid.

### TO DELETE CLAUSE

Later, Chairman Tom Connally (Dem., Tex.) of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, told reporters the clause giving authority to rearm "any nation" will be deleted. Senator John Foster Dulles (Rep., N.Y.) said he believed the President's attitude would make it easier to get action on an arms program. Senator Arthur Vandenberg (Rep., Mich.) said: "This looks like encouraging progress toward a bill that can be passed."

Presumably among the blanket powers Truman now is prepared to give up is a provision authorizing him to buy foreign-made arms for Europe.

## Ingrid Bergman To Leave Screen

ROME, Aug. 5 (Friday) (AP)—Ingrid Bergman announced today she will divorce her husband, Dr. Peter Lindstrom, and retire from pictures. The announcement did not mention Miss Bergman's Italian director, Roberto Rossellini, 48. However, well-informed sources close to the Swedish actress said she intends to marry Rossellini after her divorce from Lindstrom.

## Hurl Threats at Clergy, More Priests Arrested

PRAGUE, Aug. 4 (AP)—Roman Catholic authorities today reported several new arrests of priests as the controlled Czecho-Slovakia press thundered threats of further treason trials against the clergy.

Reports from Rome also told of new fights between police and Slovak Catholics seeking to protect their parish priests from arrest. A Vatican source said in one such clash police fired on the people, killing one and wounding many others.

These reports could not be directly confirmed in the Czech capital. It has been generally believed in Prague that the Communist Government would try to keep things calm in strongly Roman Catholic Slovakia until the harvest season ends. At least ten Catholics were known to have been jailed or fined for such clashes in Slovakia six weeks ago.

### PLAN FINISH FIGHT

The Prague press declared the Government is determined to wage a finish fight with the Czech Catholic hierarchy and clergy over the recent Vatican decree excommunicating militant Communists.

The press attacks indicated that the Government might be preparing to bring treason charges against top church figures. One religious leader singled out for attack today was Archbishop Joseph Matocha of Olomouc. He was accused of having excommunicated a priest who chose to side with the Government in the church-state controversy. Archbishop Matocha ranks second only to Archbishop Joseph Beran of Prague in the Roman Catholic hierarchy of Czecho-Slovakia.

### CHARGES HURLED

Alexei Cyplicka, Communist Minister of Justice, and other Government spokesmen already have informally buried treason charges at Archbishop Beran. Meanwhile, Archbishop Beran remained silent and secluded in his Prague palace. He has not left the building since June 18 when Communist hecklers shouted down his sermon in St. Vitus Cathedral. A high church source said Beran is in good health, but "he does not know what eventually will happen to him—whether he will be formally arrested and tried or just neutralized until the Government can impose its control over the churches."

## Aly Khan, Screen Star Wife Kept Under Guard by Police

NICE, Aug. 4 (INS)—A police guard was thrown around the luxurious Deauville chateau of Prince Aly Khan and his wife, Screen Star Rita Hayworth, tonight as a precaution against another strike by the bandits who robbed the Aga Khan and his wife of \$606,000 worth of jewels.

Deauville is 525 airline miles north of Nice, where Rita's father-in-law and mother-in-law were robbed yesterday by a gang armed with tommy-guns.

But the bandits, still at large, were considered capable of striking swiftly and no chances were being taken by Deauville authorities.

## Mayor Convenes Mainland Session On School Costs

Mayor George spent yesterday afternoon in Vancouver where he convened a special meeting of school and municipal representatives seeking more Government aid in financing education.

Mayor George, president of the Union of British Columbia Municipalities, was appointed last June as chairman of the special joint committee of representatives from the U.B.C.M., the British Columbia Teachers' Association and the B.C. Teachers' Federation.

### HOPES FOR BRIEF

Before he left for the meeting the mayor said he hoped the committee would be in a position to frame a brief for presentation to the Premier and the Provincial Cabinet.

The group claims that the Government has failed to implement the implications contained in the Cameron report on education, which were later advocated strongly by H. Carl Goldenberg in his report on Provincial-municipal financial relations.

### "REALISTIC" REVIEWS

It is the belief of the committee that the Government has failed to make "realistic" reviews of salaries and other costs from time to time, as recommended in the Goldenberg report, leaving municipalities to bear the major share of rising costs.

It is understood that if the Government will not implement the provisions of the report, the committee will ask for a 50-50 share of the 3 per cent sales tax.

## Saw "Golden Spike" Ceremony, Col. Mallandaine Dies at Creston

Colonel E. Mallandaine, former Victoria resident and one-time reserve officer of the Fifth Regiment Garrison Artillery here, died in Creston, B.C., this week at 82.

One of the real pioneers in the development of British Columbia, Colonel Mallandaine was one of the few remaining citizens who saw the driving of the golden spike at Craigellachie, B.C. in the ceremony that marked the completion of the Canadian Pacific Railway to the West Coast.

### CONSTRUCTION ENGINEER

Educated in Victoria, he first went to the Creston area in 1897 as a construction engineer on the old Bedlington-Nelson Railway from Bonner's Ferry to Kootenay Lake.

Later he settled in the district, forming a partnership with another Creston Valley pioneer, F. G. Little, to start the township of Creston.

During his career as town builder

he served first as postmaster and first justice of the peace for Creston.

He was with the C.P.R. land department until the outbreak of the Great War in which he served with the Kootenay Regiment.

### LEADER IN CRESTON

After the war, he devoted his time to fostering the development of Creston and is credited with leading the move to incorporate, the building of the hospital and the establishment of the Creston Board of Trade.

He was first school trustee of the district in 1899 and served a long term as reeve from 1936 to 1947.

Besides his work in establishing the hospital and the board of trade he also formed the Creston branch of the Canadian Legion in 1919, the Knights of Pythias branch, 1928, and the Creston Rod and Gun Club. He was also a Mason.

## Club Hears Garden Plan Now in Full Swing Here

The Victoria Tourist Bureau is doing a wonderful job in bringing tourists to Victoria, but they have no money left to look after them when they get here, E. H. Scott, world traveler and radio manufacturer, said last night.

He addressed members of the Oak Bay-Kiwans Club at a meeting in Oak Bay Beach Hotel.

Mr. Scott, now living in Victoria, brought back from England the idea of having private gardens thrown open to the public and a small charge levied, which would go towards Community Chest work.

With the assistance of the Victoria Tourist Bureau, which publishes a weekly guide book with up-to-date information on the gardens that are open to the public, the plan is now in full swing.

"We have had wonderful cooperation from the garden owners in Greater Victoria," Mr. Scott said, "and we now have one garden open

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Hungary, Romania and Bulgaria Cited for Breach

The British Commonwealth and the United States have launched formal complaints against three Balkan countries for asserted breach of the peace treaties which brought hostilities in them to an official close. They are requesting a commission, as provided for in the peace treaties, to investigate the matter. Canada is associated with the Commonwealth's request in respect of two of the countries, Hungary and Romania. The complaint turns on the suppression of political and religious liberties guaranteed by the peace treaties, and is the outcome of the state treason trials of leading church dignitaries and the subsequent developments which took place.

The issue thus raised is a fundamental one. If one man's religion is attacked, all men's religions are in jeopardy. If political freedom is denied anywhere, it is denied everywhere. These, two of the fundamental safeguards of human rights, were part and

parcel of the peace treaties signed by the Balkan nations concerned. That the treaties have been flagrantly and callously ignored seems self-evident. From the trial of Cardinal Mindszenty on there has been open persecution of one religious denomination in these satellite Soviet lands. That concerns the members of not alone that, but also of every other faith; because freedom of worship is the just claim of free men everywhere.

So far the appointment of investigating commissions has been blocked by the failure of Russia to name representatives to sit on them. Yet Russia was a guarantor of the peace treaties concerned and is bound by their terms. If to the world's sight these two human freedoms have been abridged, then under the peace treaties the responsible nations are answerable for that. Russia here is meeting a circumstance which no veto will evade. The issue must be answered before the bar of public opinion throughout the free world.

New Zealand Electors Endorse Conscription

BY a referendum majority of 535,401 votes to 152,810, the people of New Zealand have instructed their Labor Government to introduce conscription for peacetime military service. Government and Opposition members united in supporting the proposal, and the House of Representatives can now proceed to put compulsory service into effect, secure in the knowledge that it has the backing of an overwhelming majority of the people. Nor in these circumstances is there any likelihood that the decision would be reversed by any change in government.

There could be no more convincing proof than that contained in the results of this poll of New Zealand's willingness to accept a full measure of responsibility for the preservation of world peace. At the same time, of course, it can be recognized as a reflection of public consciousness of the Dominion's own peculiar vulnerability to

attack. A rich prize of considerable strategic importance to any aggressor, New Zealand is separated from her nearest neighbor by twelve hundred miles of sea, and her two main islands share a population considerably less than two million.

This makes it obvious that, whatever its size, the army New Zealand proposes to train could be for initial defence only, and would be inadequate to repel a sustained attack in force. Nor could New Zealand look to Australia for much help, since Australia would be fully occupied in defending her own thousands of miles of coastline.

It is easy to understand, therefore, why both countries are urging the formation of a Pacific union to give them a measure of the security enjoyed by signatories to the Atlantic Treaty, and less easy to understand why they have been given so little encouragement on this side of the ocean.

Why Build Too Small a Building?

DISCLOSURE that the Government intends to keep the present Post Office Building and the Belmont Building even after the new Federal building is completed, denies the general impression that had prevailed in Victoria. It was expected, and indeed implied if not said precisely by Federal authorities, that the new building would house all Dominion departments here. This would have removed the Post Office and Belmont buildings from the tax-free category that bears heavily on civic revenues, as well as making valuable downtown office and retail space available for civilian purposes.

Instead, therefore, of easing the tax-free burden the discrimination seemingly is to be extended. Federal departments are to spread themselves luxuriously at the expense of the taxpayers. Insult is to be con-

tinued to be added to injury by the present pernicious practice of Federal rental of Belmont Building store space without compensating money grant to the city. The situation is one that calls for strong protest by civic authorities.

Why build a new Federal building that will not provide all of the accommodation required by the Dominion in this city? That is the question that will be asked now. One had believed that this new building, even if it merely took the place of other tax-free properties, would certainly not add to a long-standing imposition. It would seem to be in order for a recasting of Federal plans so that the new Government Street building will do the two things it should do, viz.: provide more Federal office space yet enable the present Post Office and Belmont buildings to go on the civic tax roll.

This is for you ladies, for you and your griddles.

LEON'S GATE PANCAKES

British Columbia: "Okanagan apples and whipped cream put the pancake in a new and starring role."

Recipe: 2 cups sifted pastry flour, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 4 teaspoons baking powder, 2 eggs, 1 1/2 cups milk, 3 tablespoons melted shortening.

Method: Sift dry ingredients into bowl, add beaten eggs, milk and melted shortening. Mix well and drop by spoonful onto hot griddled griddle. When bubbles appear, turn cakes and brown other side. Serve immediately on hot plates.

Serve with hot applesauce and whipped cream instead of the usual syrup. Sweeten the cream with brown sugar or ground-up maple sugar. Put hot applesauce and whipped cream into separate large bowls, sprinkle both with grated nutmeg and let each person help himself. Yield: 4 servings.

BEEFSTEAK PIE

Alberta: "Juicy, rich flavored Alberta beef with gravy under a flaky crust."

Recipe: Plain pastry, 1 1/2 pounds beef (round or chuck steak), 4 tablespoons drippings, 2 teaspoons salt, 1/4 teaspoon pepper, 2 cups sliced onions, 2 cups hot water, 4 tablespoons bread flour, 8 tablespoons cold water, 1 tablespoon thick condiment sauce.

Method: Prepare pastry and roll out top crust and chill. Cut beef into 2-inch pieces. Brown in hot drippings in deep frying pan. Add salt, pepper, sliced onions and hot water. Cover and simmer for 2 hours. Remove meat to baking dish. Thicken gravy with flour mixed with cold water.

Preparation: Preheat oven to 475 degrees F. Thoroughly grease 8 muffin cups of glass, iron or heavy aluminum with butter. Place in preheated oven until piping hot. Then quickly prepare batter.

Method: Beat eggs well, beat in milk, then flour and salt, using rotary beater. Pour into piping-hot muffin pans, filling about one-half full. Bake 45 minutes. Use very hot oven (475 degrees F.) for 15 minutes, then moderate oven (350 degrees F.) to finish baking. Serve hot. Yield: 8 popovers.

BLUEBERRY CRISP PUDDING

Ontario: "Nature was lavish with her blueberries in Ontario and Ontario cooks know how to make the most of them."

Recipe: 4 cups fresh blueberries, 1-3 cup granulated sugar, 2 teaspoons lemon juice, 4 tablespoons butter, 1-3 cup brown sugar, firmly packed, 1-3 cup flour, 3-4 cup quick-cooking oats.

Method: Place blueberries in greased deep baking dish (1 1/2-quart size). Sprinkle with sugar and lemon juice. Cream butter, gradually add sugar. Blend in flour and oats. Spread over blueberries. Bake in oven preheated to 375 degrees F. for 25 to 40 minutes. Serve with plain or whipped cream. Yield: 6 servings.

LAURENTIAN FAMILY SOUP

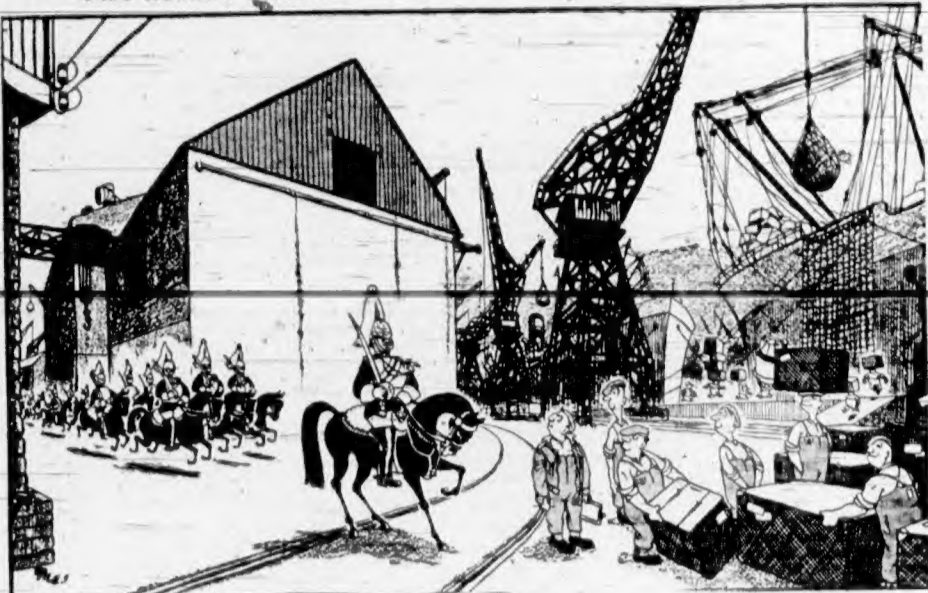
Quebec: "The French Canadian cuisine is the result of a dozen generations of good cooks."

Recipe: 1 small cabbage, 1 carrot, 1/2 small turnip, 2 onions, 4 tablespoons butter or margarine, salt and pepper, 3 cloves, 2 quart beef stock, 1 tablespoon chopped parsley, French bread, grated cheese.

Method: Wash cabbage, peel carrot, turnip and onions; cut in small cubes. Melt butter in saucepan, add vegetables, and stir. Season with salt and pepper and add cloves. Cover and cook slowly for 20 minutes. Then add the stock and simmer for 30 minutes. Add parsley and a little grated nutmeg. Brown thin slices of French bread. Sprinkle with cheese. Place on top of each serving of soup—or put in bowls lined with bowls with soup. Yield: 8 to 10 servings.

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Britain's Air Defence Techniques

By E. COLSTON SHEPHERD

LONDON—During the recent air exercises in Southern England, perhaps the most valuable aspect was the introduction of units and observers from nations of Western Europe which will join in air defence, if trouble should come.

Military observers from France, Holland and Belgium saw how Britain's complicated, but wartime-tested defence machinery works. Steps are being taken to set up similar machinery on a concerted plan in Western Europe.

Two foreign squadrons of jet fighters—one from the United States and one from Holland—participated in these exercises, marking the beginning of standardised operational practices.

Small factors which can hinder the smooth operation of an elaborate ground-air setup are best overcome by giving pilots and control posts an opportunity to develop mutual confidence, and the exercises were valuable in this respect. Also, practical demonstrations to the Western Powers' representatives form, perhaps, the soundest background possible for

the training syllabus they are bringing into use.

The exercises demonstrated the accurate detection and tracking of hostile aircraft and the highly important method of linking the anti-aircraft guns and their own short-range radar stations with the filter rooms and controllers of the fighter force. The whole process depends on so nice a relation of various activities that it might be thought impossibly intricate if it had not already been made to work smoothly and effectively during wartime.

Since the setup is manned almost entirely by people who had no experience of it in war, the Royal Air Force organized these exercises especially for practice purposes and not as a trial of strength between bombers and fighters. Everything that the defence machine might encounter was obligingly simulated by the bomber force in daylight and darkness. All the facets of the system were shown. A high-speed bomber attack was featured by using twin-engine Hornet fighters (which have a speed of more than 470 m.p.h.) to represent the speed at which a raid may develop.

Against present-day bombers, the fighters can count on about 10-min-

ute warnings. Jet fighters can climb to 40,000 feet in less than nine minutes, so they can deal with Superforts and even with the B-36. Dealing with the jet bombers when they appear will demand an equal warning time, a faster rate of climb, or an extended radar range.

What these exercises should have made plain was the helplessness of the best fighters without a sound organization to serve and direct them. The dictum that the "bomber will always get through" was laid down before the defence machine was given "telescopic eyes" and a detailed scheme of ground-to-air communications within interconnected sectors.

Jet bombers need not succeed in neutralizing a defence if the "machinery of interception is good and if fighter planes have been designed and developed for swift interception.

The supreme value, in European circumstances, of the fighter plane's fast rate of climb and ability to manoeuvre at great height, was again emphasized in these exercises. These two characteristics are more important to the R.A.F. than high forward speeds, and this line of development is being pursued.

Cripps and the Record

SIR Stafford Cripps, called by a contemporary "Britain's Superman," is declared to be "so moral and impeccable and intellectual that his countrymen, while admiring him beyond words, are almost afraid of him." This is high praise for a politician, too high for Sir Stafford.

An example may give the measure of his political honesty. In 1934 he said Macdonald had "sold the pass" by not preventing the conquest of Manchuria. In 1935, when Italy attacked Ethiopia, he left the Labor party because it supported sanctions.

In his hatred of Conservatives he fought rearmament within two years of war. In 1937, the year of Chamberlain's great rearmament plan, he urged workers to seize the "most glorious opportunity" they had ever had, saying: "Refuse to make munitions. Refuse to make armaments."

The Labor party admired him so little that it expelled him for trying to engineer an alliance with Communists. He had so little knowledge of men and nations that he trusted not only the

Soviet Government but its servile agents in Britain.

He was sent to Moscow to win over the Soviet. He failed until Hitler attacked Russia. When he left Russia he said: "This I can say with certainty, if I have had it from Stalin himself—that the Russians do not want to interfere with the internal affairs of other countries."

Because of his talk about independence for India he was sent there with the Cripps mission. It failed and he parted from the Indians in anger, blaming Gandhi for having prevented agreement. Nehru called him a "devil's advocate," accusing him of twisting Gandhi's words.

In June, 1945, with Russia's record plan and her intentions clear, he was still blind. Saying some people feared she would over-run Eastern Europe and impose her own form of government on her neighbors, he declared: "I believe these fears are unfounded."

This is hardly the record of a Superman. It is marked by folly, failure and, at one point, almost criminal lunacy. If his advice had been taken the war would have been lost.

3,700,000 Canadian Medals

(From The Canadian Military Journal)

THE amount of work that has gone into the minting of medals, campaign stars, clasps and oak leaves—the eagerly awaited Service decorations of hundreds of thousands of Canadian men and women—is revealed in figures released at Ottawa. They show that to reward all Canadians who served during the World War, more than 3,700,000 decorations must be turned out by the Royal Canadian Mint at Ottawa.

As almost everyone who enlisted for "active service" is entitled to the War

Medal, some 1,060,000 have been ordered. For sheer numbers, this is rivaled only by the Canadian Volunteer Service Medal of which 900,000 medals and 524,000 clasps—denoting service outside Canada—are being struck. Other decorations and the number on order at the Mint, are: 1939-45 Star, 288,000; Atlantic Star, 40,000; Africa Star, 12,000; Pacific Star, 10,250; Burma Star, 5,200; Italy Star, 102,500; France-Germany Star, 250,000; Defence Medal, 480,000, and the Air Crew Europe Star, 12,000.

# Land and Air Manoeuvres To Test North Defences

GRANDE PRAIRIE, Alta., Aug. 4 (CP)—An enemy force theoretically seizes a strategic air base in northern British Columbia some time tonight and sets off Canada's biggest peacetime land-air manoeuvres.

More than 1,200 army and air force troops will take part in a mock battle equivalent of what Maj.-Gen. M. H. S. Penhale told reporters today is the only potential threat to Canada at this time—a limited diversionary airborne raid designed to scare the country into keeping the bulk of its forces at home.

Officially, the Chief of the Army's Western Command and other spokesmen say it is mere convenience and coincidence that the three days of Exercise Eagle will unfold largely along the first 80 miles of the Alaska Highway. No particular enemy is conceived or considered, they say.

**ONLY RUSSIA THREAT**  
But this and two smaller subsequent exercises along the highway plus the strategic nature of the 1,800-mile road itself leave little doubt that this is another segment in preparations to meet any emergency provoked by Russia which Defence Minister Claxton has said is the only potential aggressor left in the world.

An American-built wartime base normally manned, now by 18 R.C.A.F. men, the airfield five miles from this northern Alberta town was alive tonight with planes, paratroops, jeeps and general bustle because it is the operational base for the whole affair. Grande Prairie is 250 miles northwest of Edmonton and some 120 miles south of Fort St. John, the air base that is to be seized by the "enemy."

**CIVILIANS BROUGHT IN**  
As an example, more than two dozen civilians have been brought in, some hundreds of miles by air, to feed the invasion in a huge hangar. The cooks get \$1 an hour and board. Boys get 50 cents as waiters and help.

**Boy Rescued By Helicopter**

He was sped to Lewis Memorial Hospital in Yosemite Valley, where physicians pronounced him in "excellent" condition, and said his reflexes were "coming back in good shape."

Terence was injured Sunday on a fall from his horse. He was on a pack trip with two other youths, who went for aid when their companion was hurt.

The boy's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Vincent Hallinan, and others who had gone to the lake, shore to attend him, began packing out through the difficult terrain after Terence was picked up by the helicopter.

**Horse Shipment Protest Grows**  
WINNIPEG, Aug. 4 (CP)—Sending live horses across the Atlantic Ocean in slow freight boats "is a scandalous business," Sally Warnock, secretary-treasurer of the Winnipeg Humane Society, said today.

She was commenting on a report from Victoria that the president of the society there is protesting the situation.

"For many years, horses were slaughtered on this side, then sent under refrigeration to European countries," Miss Warnock said.

"Judging by information I have received lately, ship owners refuse to provide sufficient refrigerating facilities for horse meat, and meat companies now are forced to ship the horses alive."

Miss Warnock added: "Horses are very poor sailors." She asked that a qualified veterinarian be sent with each consignment of horses.

# Prince Philip Posted to Duty On Destroyer

LONDON, Aug. 4 (CP)—Prince Philip, the Duke of Edinburgh, was ordered today to active duty with the Royal Navy's destroyer force in the Mediterranean.

The Prince, who is a professional sailor as well as the husband of the future British Queen, will join the flotilla leader H.M.S. Chequers at Malta, October 17.

Princess Elizabeth and their son, Prince Charles, will remain at Clarence House, their London home.

Philip will be First Lieutenant—second in command—of the 1,710-ton Chequers. He will be its executive officer, responsible for discipline and daily ship routine.

**Canada Makes Trade Gains**  
OTTAWA, Aug. 4 (CP)—Despite tightening foreign markets, Canada is making new gains on the international trade front.

Exports in June climbed to \$256,100,000, up 9 per cent from the \$237,500,000 worth of goods sold in June last year, the Bureau of Statistics reported today.

The June increase, which reflected boosts in exports over the same period last year to the United States, the Commonwealth and Latin America, helped bring Canada's total exports for the first half of 1948 to the \$1,400,100,000 worth of goods sold during the first half of 1948.

# Russians Admit, Defend Prison Labor System

By J. M. ROBERTS, JR., A.P. Foreign Affairs Analyst

WASHINGTON, Aug. 4 (CP)—President Truman said today that the United States will publish a White Paper on its relations with China to clear up "misrepresentation, distortion, and misunderstanding."

One important point on which the British put the finger is the economic aspects. It is significant that the M.V.D. Secret Police organization is not only charged with preserving the security of the state, but also with providing mass labor for Russia's industrial expansion. In the present stage of Russian development, manpower still plays a big part of the role taken by machinery in Western industrial systems. So much so that in a country of 180,000,000 people, with far less industrial or agricultural production than the much smaller United States, men, women and children have to work almost unceasingly.

This probably accounts for part of the Russian system of deporting "politically irresponsible" people from her satellites to the new industrial and agricultural developments beyond the Urals.

Nicholas Radescu, former Prime Minister of Romania, reports more than a million such deportations from his country alone. There have been similar reports from other conquered areas.

The forced labor camps also are spreading throughout the Communist sphere in Eastern Europe. There the political aspects seem to outweigh economic considerations. They are primarily prisons, where as the Russian camps are both prisons and centers of labor re-education.

There have been many charges of brutality to the Russian camps. In the main, from hundreds of such reports, I get the impression that such brutality is usually the result of carelessness for human life, or poor organization and shortages of vital food and medical supplies, rather than deliberate.

But through the whole thing runs a vast difference in thinking, one of the most difficult factors in the great gap between East and West.

**Ancient Fossil Of Fish Found**  
WINNIPEG, Aug. 4 (CP)—The fossilized remains of a prehistoric fish, estimated to be 65,000,000 years old, has been discovered at Thornhill, Man., L. T. S. Norris-Ely, director of the Manitoba Museum, said today.

The fossil was found a few hundred yards away from where the remains of a Plesiosaur were discovered last June. Both discoveries, which were at the same level in the Bonaventure clay, were reported by P. L. Woelke, manager of the Pembina Mountain Clays.

The remains of the fish, well-preserved and covered with plaster, are about four feet long.

**Heat Bursts Thermometer**  
TRAIL, Aug. 4 (CP)—Even the thermometers can't stand the blistering heat—save that has engulfed this Interior-British Columbia mining centre.

At least one thermometer has "blown its top."

W. J. Baily reported today that a thermometer at the back of his home notched up to 120 degrees and then burst.

Baily added, however, he was "too hot to get hot about the incident."

B.C. Indian Girl's Paintings Win Praise at Ottawa Showing

OTTAWA, Aug. 4 (CP)—Although only 19, Judith Morgan of Kitwanga, B.C., already is on the high road to success as an artist.

The Indian girl has been studying art at the Museum in Victoria. Today, she achieved a coveted goal when 20 of her paintings went on display at the National Museum.

If she were here, Judith would thrill to the praise which her work is drawing from visitors and museum officials.

"She has a great feeling for her own cultural heritage," said one official.

Wonderful Future  
"She has a wonderful future ahead of her," said another.

With the exception of one black and white print, the 20 pictures in the collection are done in pastels.

In grey-blues and smoky tones, most of them portray the traditional

customs and haunting legends of the British Columbia Indians. They are filled with a mysticism one seldom finds in a girl of 19.

"The Unknown" shows sunlight glowing thinly through the rich olive-green of heavy foliage, casting its light on a carved wooden figure.

Although no camp fire is in sight, one expects it to be near in "Shaman Dancer," where the freighted casts its warmth over the painted face of the warrior as he goes into his dance.

Show Great Interest  
Anthropologists at the National Museum have expressed great interest in Miss Morgan's work, which they say preserves an authentic and valuable history of the culture of the West Coast Indian tribes.

"In the museum we have samples of ancient Indian art and it is an interesting contrast to show what a modern Indian can do," said one official.

Because soap plays such a stellar role in our lives, for it cleanses our bodies as well as our clothes and keeps our homes sanitary, every woman should know what it is made of, the difference between an alkali soap and a bland soap, and why some bars are more expensive than others.

The quality of soap depends upon the quality of its ingredients—its alkalis and fatty bases. Soap is made from two alkalis, soda and potash. Soda is used for the hard soaps, potash for the softer, more easily lathered soaps.

The fatty bases may consist of olive oil, coconut oil, palm or palm kernel oil, mutton tallow. Sometimes cottonseed oil, linseed oil, soy bean oil and castor oil are used. Most toilet soaps combine tallow with one or more oils and upon the way these are blended, and their quality, depends the price. The best makes use only the purest, whitest and least odorous fats. Pure castile soap for instance, is made of the finest olive oil and soda, and both of these

ingredients should be clearly printed on the label of the soap you buy. This is one of the mildest and purest soaps on the market.

Hard Water Soap  
Soaps to lather in hard water contain more alkali than other soaps so if your skin is dry or sensitive do not use such a soap on your face. You will be a wise lady if you will soften the hard water before bathing instead of using a hard-water soap! Once the water is softened you may use the milder soaps.

Floating Soaps  
Generally speaking, a soap that floats is no purer than one which doesn't. Mixing air in the soap formula while it is still liquid makes soap float. The mere fact that it floats has nothing whatsoever to do with its purity. However, people like

to find soap floating when they are bathing, and there are a couple of very good brands on the market.

SOME SOAP FACTS

The soap you use on your face should contain not more than from 5 per cent to 10 per cent of free alkali. This makes it neutral.

White or pastel soaps which hold their perfume and color to the last usually are made from pure ingredients. Don't use dark base soaps on your skin unless they are a lot of one of the finest transparent soaps. Cheap transparent soaps contain too much alcohol, glycerin and sugar plus alkali.

Never wash your face with your liquid shampoo soap—it is too harsh. Soap bargains usually are not bargains unless very good brands are reduced for clearance.

As you use soap on your skin once a day, or more often, take time to select a good brand.

If you are ever in doubt, buy a pure castile soap or one of the better super-fatted soaps—especially for young skins, or those which are dry and sensitive.

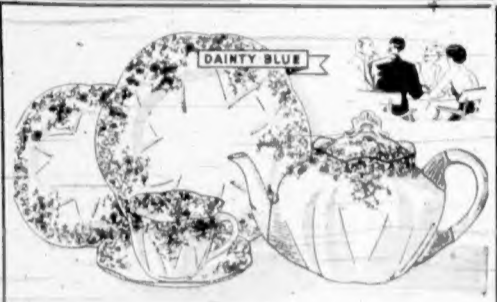

## Company on Mainland Interested in City Hall

There were indications yesterday that a Vancouver real estate firm is interested in negotiating the purchase of the present City Hall site, L. C. Creery, of the Vancouver firm of MacGregor, Creery & Farmer, has requested immediate information as to the status of the City Hall property, regarded as an excellent site for a commercial enterprise.

We seem to recollect that the city of Victoria more or less recently sold the old City Hall site on Douglas Street between Pandora Avenue and Cormorant Streets, or if it was not sold it was the intention of the city to sell same. Mr. Creery stated in a letter to the city, "We would be pleased if you could advise us as to the present status of the property."

**MAY GO TO PUBLIC**  
City Hall officials said that the building had not been sold. There were indications, however, that a reasonable offer for the site might be put up to the ratepayers for a decision.

The present City Hall has long been regarded as outmoded. Officials have voiced the opinion that city business could be handled more expeditiously if it were conducted in a more modern type of building. Recently, however, both Mayor Percy George and Alderman Edward Williams, chairman of a special

committee dealing with the question of a new City Hall, said they did not think ratepayers would welcome any large expenditures for a new building or for renovation of the existing building at the present time.

Now it is felt that ratepayers may view the matter in a different light if a reasonable price could be obtained for the City Hall property.

Construction of a new building has been under consideration for three years. Schemes to erect a department store and a hotel on the site both fell through.

**THREE SITES**  
If City Hall property is sold civic offices may be located on city-owned property on Quadra Street, adjacent to the Memorial Arena; on Cook Street near Athletic Park; or on the southwest corner of Blanshard and Cormorant Streets.

Location at the corner of Blanshard and Cormorant Streets has been favored by city electors. With the announcement this week that the Federal Government intended to retain the Belmont Building following construction of the new Post Office building, the door seemed closed on a possible move to locate civic offices in the Government Street building. At one time it was believed the city would get the first opportunity to bid on the purchase of the Belmont Building.

## Placed on Bond For One Year

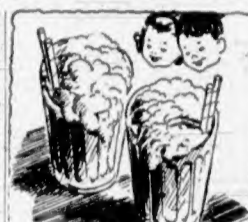

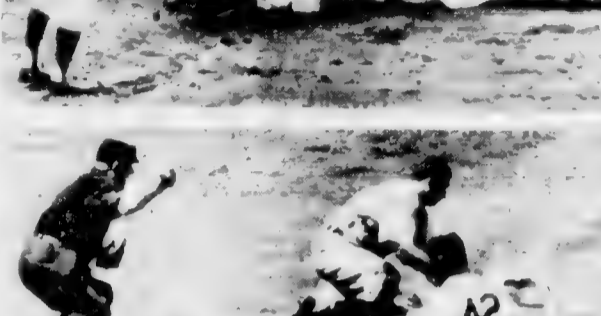

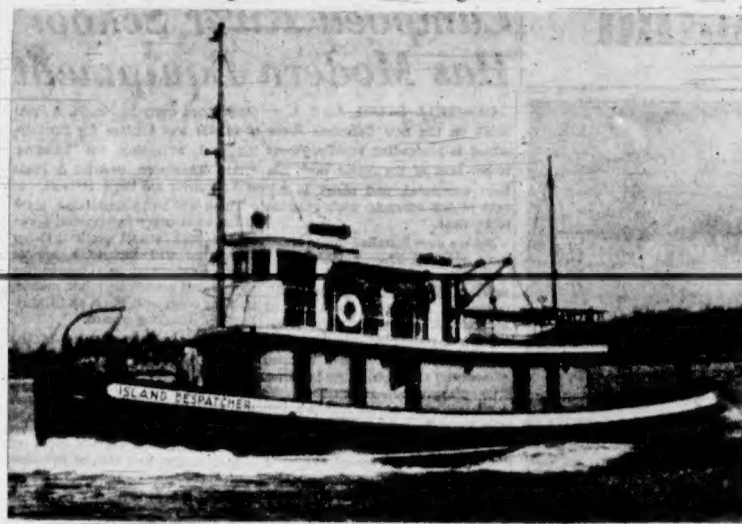

The \$5-a-ton drop in potato prices announced yesterday was a bright note in the dealers' scale of woes attendant on embargo restrictions and tight United States dollar quotas.

At the present moment, however, retailers' shelves are featuring a cornucopia of local and imported fruit, despite the restrictions.

REPLACE APRICOTS  
Peaches are selling at four for 25 cents or 18 cents a pound and have reached the local market in time to replace dwindling supplies of apricots.

The peaches are of the Rochester variety, good for both cooking and munching.

Another carload from the Okanagan is expected today and further shipments tomorrow.

Okanagan cantaloupes are also on the way to the Coast, dealers say, but none will be imported from the United States because of the Government's United States dollar saving program.

ROLES SOURCE  
The Okanagan will also be the only source of supply for watermelon this year because of the embargo.

Pears and plums from the Okanagan are on the market. Pears are selling at 17 cents a pound, plums between 17 and 20 cents.

A few grapes are still available at prices from 30 to 40 cents a pound and bananas are becoming more plentiful with two carlots arriving yesterday.

LOCAL BERRIES  
Local blackberries and blueberries from the Fraser Valley are appearing in the fruit stores to augment disappearing stocks of raspberries and loganberries.

And the citrus fruit situation is improved with the arrival of shipment of grapefruit from British Columbia.

## World Students Attend 12th Shawnigan Session

SHAWNIGAN LAKE, Aug. 4.—Le Camp Français at Strathcona Lodge, Shawnigan Lake, is in the

12th session, the 12th since it was founded by Miss Dorothy Punderson. Nearly 60 persons from a dozen lands are in camp under the direction of Miss Punderson. "Elan," meaning education for living among nations, is the official title for a larger group, and Le Camp Français at Shawnigan Lake is its summer centre and organizational point.

Other activities of Elan include organized tours in various parts of the world, one Elan group of 40 being at present on tour in Europe. Touring with them is Mrs. Edith Riley, of Vancouver, who spent several summers at the Shawnigan camp.

Countries represented at the camp this year, include Canada, the United States, England, Scotland, France, Switzerland, Belgium, Germany, Italy and Denmark. As always since its inception, the basic language of the camp is French, with emphasis placed on the study of French culture, considered by Elan to have been the basis throughout the years of most European culture.

**LANGUAGE OF IDEAS**  
When asked concerning the possibility of an eventual universal language, Miss Punderson, president of Elan, considered that French would remain the language of ideas, and might continue to be used as a means of diplomatic exchange, but that English, in simplified Americanized form, would probably become the language of trade and commerce.

The French language was richer in vocabulary and grammar than the English that is usually spoken, the French insisting on niceties in grammar and expression, Miss Punderson explained.

The busy days at Le Camp Français are filled with classes, sports, picnics and hikes, all conducted in French, with informality

the keynote. "There is no separation of professors and students, the teacher in one class being a student

in the next. Languages were spoken of the living, not the dead, and were taught as such, including the modern slang and idioms of each, Miss Punderson pointed out.

**NEIGHBORLY SPIRIT**  
At the camp a group of individuals is learning to live together and finding that the similarities of the nationalities outstrip the differences. "We are trying to do something in a practical way to make people realize that all the world is a neighbor," said Miss Punderson. Pointing up this statement, Miss Punderson remarked that several campers expected this year were absent on various diplomatic and international government missions in exercise of the ideals taught at the camp.

Recently Le Camp Français celebrated Bastille Day, when the special guest was Madame Sanderson Mongin, Victoria, one of the original campers, and one who has not missed a year. Activities on that day included a special French luncheon, games, treasure hunt, a buffet dinner with guests from Victoria and other points, a talk in the evening by M. Lucien Wolff, and dancing on the tennis courts.

Courses at the camp include French, German, Swedish, Spanish, English, psychology, group singing, dramatics, folk-dancing, music theory and European cookery.

## Campbell River School Has Modern Equipment

CAMPBELL RIVER, Aug. 4.—Work on the new Campbell River school is proceeding rapidly. About 70 per cent of the frame work has been completed, and about 10 per cent of the concrete work remains to be done.

Boilers were installed in the boiler room recently. They will be fed by automatic coal stokers. As a safety measure against fire, floors, walls, ceiling of the boiler room are of concrete. All stairways in the building are of reinforced concrete.

Fluorescent lighting will be used extensively throughout the building. The playground, situated in the southeast wing of the building, will also have fluorescent lighting, and the floor will be of blacktop.

Contract for the school was let to Marwell Construction Company of Vancouver for \$485,309, and work

large stage and boys' and girls' dressing rooms. Natural lighting for the auditorium will be provided by overhead upright windows.  
A cafeteria and kitchen in the northeast wing will provide substantial hot lunches for the students. The cafeteria section will be used as a multi-purpose room. It will serve as a lunchroom and visual education room, and will accommodate 230 to 300 students. The school will accommodate 500 students.  
An excellent view of Discovery Passage can be seen from the northwest side of the building, and from the southeast wing a partial view can be seen.

Plastering in some wings is scheduled to start on August 15, but it is possible that this work will be held up due to lack of adequate water supply. For some time it has been necessary to haul tanks of water from the Campbell River three miles away to overcome the lack of water supply.  
If all goes well and there are not too many delays, students of Campbell River may be attending classes in the new school shortly after the New Year.

## Hunters Seek Reduction In Deer Season Length

NANAIMO, Aug. 4.—The Vancouver Island Affiliated Fish and Game Association passed a motion urging that the deer season this year be cut by two weeks. Members suggested it open September 19, and close October 31.

Representatives at the meeting, not empowered to vote, were instructed to have their clubs call special meetings within a week's time and notify George Laird of their decisions. The recommendations will be forwarded to the Game Board.

Cowichan District requested that the meetings be called, as that club views with alarm the undesirable effect the closing of Sayward for deer would have on Cowichan area, where hunters would flock. The Cowichan Club asked the affiliated group to find a solution to Dr. McTaggart Cowan's report relating to the closing of the Sayward area.

**SAYWARD SUFFERS**  
Other speakers pointed out that Sayward area had suffered from climatic conditions and other effects during the past two years, more than any area on Vancouver Island, as far as deer were concerned.

James Dewar, chief predatory hunter, told the meeting that Campbell River was "worse than he ever had known it." He has hunted that area since 1929.

While hunting cougars there recently he saw only four deer. He killed three cougars. All had cougar meat in their stomachs. Another female cougar he killed later had killed a male cougar and feasted on its carcass.

A Courtenay speaker, who claimed to know the country, said there were

Lady Smith reported deer in that area to be artful. Before and after hunting season they were seen in the slashes. Where they went in hunting season nobody seemed to know.

Mr. Dewar said there were plenty of deer in the Nanaimo area. They went too far back for hunters to get at. Speakers forecast the closing of the Sayward area would eventually lead to a new deal for Vancouver Island, by closing and opening different areas in a rotation system that would effect desired conservation.

A motion proposed by a Cowichan delegate passed. It asked that fish and game clubs be notified of future deer surveys, which they might have under consideration before their clubs made recommendations on deer season dates.

Discussion took place on recent provincial legislation banning hunting with bow and arrow. It was disclosed that Lower Mainland clubs were having a rally taken to ascertain opinion, with a view to making representations to have the act repealed.

J. C. Cunningham, game board commissioner, took part in the discussion.
