SECOND DAY--REGINA vs. ANGELO.

August 12th, 1859.

The jury appeared in court, and answered to their names, at 10 o'clock, a. m.

The next witness called was Mr. Hamly. Examined by the Att. General. Witness assumed permit shewn him for 701 barrels of flour, to be an export permit; had seen the permit before in Custom House; it was brought at the same time as the book in which it should have been entered; it was shown witness by Mr. Angelo, who made a statement that he had received \$1.; witness told him he thought it was a forgery; it was dated Nov. 25th, 1858; if Angelo had wished to prove the genuineness of the document, it could only have been done by bringing forward the party in whose name it was issued; when witness told Angelo it was a forgery, he scarcely replied, and never referred to it afterwards; could not make out the name on the permit; the duplicate has not been found: this is the duplicate, not the original permit; has examined the duplicate in the office; there is none answering to this in the office.

Cross-examined by Mr. Wight. Mr. Angelo brought the permit, not Mr. Bigham; witness thought a forgery had been committed; he had gone over the books, and it was not entered; the mistake was in Angelo's favor; can not say where the flour was sent; believed it was forgery, because it was dated wrong; the ink was fresh, and made out in Angelo's writing; witness believed that Mr. Jeffrey kept no account of goods which went up the river; it was after witness took office that the books were examined; when doing so asked Mr. Angelo for explanations, who never refused to give information; when he found a discrepancy he asked Mr. Angelo for information not money; there were other errors besides Mr. Angelo's, in the books; he applied to Angelo for explanation because he received the money; he judged by the books there was a deficiency on the 25th November, 1858; has never known a deficiency since he took hold of the books; has seen money received by Angelo placed in cash-box; Anderson put money in the same cash-box; the safe was partially open during the day; the money in the cash-box was put in the safe at night; the money was counted at night; it was Angelo's custom to count the money; other parties were present; witness put permits on the file; has never known duplicates mislaid since he has been in the office; entered the office on the 23d May last; has not abused Angelo in the office; gave Angelo every chance as long as it was possible to

do so; never applied to Mr. Sam'l Bigham to look over accounts; did not think that Mr. Angelo produced the forged permit again, and never heard of it afterwards; unintentional irregularities might take place in the office; witness was not trained to Custom House business; has expressed an opinion that various errors were not intentional; Mr. Angelo handed no sum to witness as a surplus; witness thinks \$135 was produced before him as a surplus; the sum of \$29 might have been contained in that sum; Mr. Angelo handed over the surplus willingly.

Direct examination by Att. General.—It was the duty of the issuer of permits to enter the name of the party concerned on the permit and in the book; there are no means of detecting the amount of duty paid when permits are made out and entered in blank; it is impossible not to miss money when the accounts are made up in the evening, if it has been paid in; witness has gone over all the books and permits in the office; has found in the office two duplicates not entered; a great many which came down the river were not entered; the 42 permits were almost all signed by Angelo; the signature purports that the duty is paid on permits to British Columbia; from the time witness took office, Mr. Angelo took charge of money; has found entries in Angelo's hand-writing relating to surplus, in the books.

The next witness was Mr. Lindhart, who stated that he had paid sums of money for permits, in December last; on 22nd December received permit shewn him and paid the money to Mr. Angelo.

Cross-examined by Mr. Jones. Does not know the number of the permit; does not remember how he paid the money; whether in coin or compensation tickets; does not remember whether he received money in change from Angelo at the time; does not know what Angelo did with the compensation tickets; the compensation tickets were taken the same as cash.

Att. General.—Witness does not remember if he paid in cash as well as in compensation tickets; he considered the tickets the same as cash.

Thomas Williams sworn. He had paid money to Mr. Angelo for a Harbor License, on the 12th May, amount \$17.50.

Cross-examined by Mr. Jones. Does not know at what time of day he paid it; paid the money to Angelo in the Custom House, in gold coin.

Attorney General.—Has seen this paper before; it is the license granted to me.

The next witness called was Mr. Muir. Has seen this sailing license before; paid \$10 for that paper to Mr. Angelo.

Cross examination by Mr. Jones. Does not know Mr. Angelo's writing; Mr. Angelo gave me the paper and the money was paid to him.

Attorney General.—Witness gave security; he signed a paper which Mr. Angelo made out; he did not know whether it had anything to do with the \$10.

The Attorney General then found that \$10 had been entered the next day, and as it was entered in blank, and might be the amount paid by Muir; he requested the jury to dismiss that evidence from their minds.

Judge Begbie was then sworn, and identified a letter handed to him, as one which he received from Mr. Angelo about the 21st of July; it was dated 21st July, and contained a request from Mr. Angelo that Judge Begbie would appear as a witness in his case. The Attorney-General produced Judge Begbie as a witness, in order to give the defence an opportunity of cross-examining him, but Mr. Wight declined to take advantage of it. Mr. Mackay, the next witness, being in the Assembly, the court was adjourned until half-past one.

Capt. McClure, the discoverer of the north-west passage, who thus solved an interesting problem, and extended the domain of geographical science, has had the honor of K. C. B. conferred upon him. Captain McClure is a native of Derry.

ANGELO CASE--SECOND DAY.

FRIDAY AFTERNOON, August 12th.
The Court met at half past one, pursuant to adjournment.

J. W. McKay: To the best of my recollection I paid the duty on the goods received on this permit to Mr. Angelo to the amount of \$646 50.

Cross examined: I am employed by H. B. Co.; there were one or two disputes between the Company and Custom House, about the value of the dollar; in some instances the duties on goods sent were not paid at the time; I am quite positive I paid this permit dated April 7th 1859, to Mr. Angelo, for I received the amount \$646 50 in cash from Mr. Finlayson; this permit No. 1235, was not on account of Government; the H. B. Co. have paid duties in cash and by drafts on Treasury; I paid \$646.50 in the Custom House; counted the money over to Mr. Angelo; saw Mr. Angelo in possession of the money; never paid duties to Mr. Anderson.

The Attorney General here remarked that he thought it would facilitate the progress of the case if a statement of the accounts between the H. B. Co. and Custom House was made out. The court consequently adjourned until 10 a. m. on Saturday.

Third Day.

SATURDAY, August, 13, 1859.

Owing to a misunderstanding on the part of the Sheriff the Court was not opened till 11 o'clock. Mrs. Angelo was present this morning.

Attorney General stated that Mr. Kerr had prepared a statement from the books of the H. B. Co., Customs, and Treasury.

Mr. Kerr sworn: Has made a careful examination of the books and prepared a statement. It is a correct extract from the books; is quite sure \$646 50 the amount of permit issued to the Hudson's Bay Company, is not entered in the books; there is no entry of harbor license taken out by Pike; nor entry of Williams; neither are the following three amounts paid by Lindhart: \$23 90, \$17 73, and \$102.32.

Cross examined by Mr. Angelo: How do you know my hand writing? have you ever seen me write? Witness said he had been told which was Mr. Angelo's writing in the books.

Mr. Jeffries sworn. The unentered permits and licenses were in all cases written by Mr. Angelo, with the exception of three written by Mr. Anderson. Has had conversations with Mr. Angelo since the charges were brought against him; cannot state what was said.

Cross-examined by Mr. Angelo.—There was sometimes confusion in the Custom House toward the close of business hours; it was the practice of merchants to defer getting permits until late in the afternoon; Hudson's Bay Company's goods were allowed to go up without permits, by keeping an account of goods so sent; did not gauge Hudson's Bay Company's liquors; did gauge those of other parties.

By Att. General.—\$646.50 is paid on this permit; this permit did not go up with the goods; received the duplicate of this permit from Mr. Angelo.

Mr. Finlayson sworn:—This statement is a true representation of the entries in our books.

Cross-examined by Mr. Angelo.—Duties were received prior to December 9th, at my office; had invoices from merchants and made my books up from them; has advanced money to Mr. Angelo on orders.

Attorney General resumed direct examination: There is a discrepancy on March 1st, 4th, and 5th, between the Custom House and Hudson's Bay Company's books; can not explain the discrepancy; that document, viz., the statement prepared, is the only explanation witness can give.

The Attorney General then handed the statement prepared to the jury, for their inspection, and stated the difference between the two accounts amounted to \$37, on the 1st, 4th, and 5th of March; and that there was also a deficiency of \$646.50.

Examination resumed by the Attorney General.—The duplicates from May 1858-9 were placed on the file.

In answer to the foreman of the jury, the Attorney General stated that drafts received in payment at the Custom House, were passed over to the Treasury and received as cash.

The Attorney General then stated that the case for the prosecution was closed. Upon which Mr. Wight asked for an adjournment of the court, until Monday morning, which was granted.

Fortifying San Juan.

Yesterday a party returned from the disputed territory, bringing the news that eight 32-pounders were landed, on Saturday, from on board the U. S. S. *Massachusetts*. The intention is to erect batteries on the two highest eminences, about two miles apart, on the south end of the island, near the camp.

300 soldiers were expected from Steilacoom, yesterday. By the end of the present week enough soldiers will be landed, to augment the American forces to 700.

Gen. Harney was hourly looked for.

A large wharf will be constructed for the U. S. Government, near that of the H. B. Company, in the harbor. Two or three hundred thousand feet of lumber was landed for U. S. Government buildings.

COACHES FOR RED RIVER.—Messrs. Burbank & Co., to-day despatch for Breckinridge, on Red River, two four-horse post coaches. This is the first attempt at connecting St. Paul with the valley of the Red River by regular land conveyance. At Breckinridge the coaches will connect with the Anson Northrup for Pembina and Fort Garry. A number of passengers go up to-day in the coaches, and among them two Scottish ladies, the Misses Sterling, who are en route for Lake Athabasca, 1700 miles north of St. Paul. They have come from Scotland alone, and will proceed to Fort Garry by Burbank's stage line and the Anson Northrup, where they will take one of the annual trains sent by the Hudson's Bay Co. from that post to Lake Athabasca. But one train leaves Garry yearly for that far-off locality. To give a romantic color to the affair, it is only necessary to add, what we hear is the truth, that one Dan Cupid is the moving cause of this long and perilous journey.—*St. Paul Pioneer*.

THE DOOM OF THE WORLD.—The North British Review, discoursing on the doom of the world, has the following remarks:—What this change is we dare not even conjecture, but we see in the heavens themselves some traces of destructive elements, and some indications of their power, the fragments of broken planets—the descent of meteoric stones upon our globe—the whirling comets wielding their loose material at the solar surface—the volcanic eruptions on our own satellite—the appearance of new stars and the disappearance of others, are all foreshadows of that impending convulsion to which the world is doomed. Thus placed on a planet which is to be burned up, and under heavens that are to pass away; thus residing, as it were, on the cemeteries and dwelling upon the mausoleums of former worlds, let us learn the lesson of humility and wisdom, if we have not already been taught in the school of revelation.

Lord Palmerston, First Lord of the Treasury, and head of the new British Ministry, is now seventy five years of age, having been born on the 22nd day of February, 1784. His family name is Henry John Temple, of an old English stock, although his titles are Irish. He married the Countess Cowper, mother of the present Earl, but has no children.
