A Good Word for Rock and Kettle Creeks.

In the San Francisco Alta of the 15th inst., we find a letter headed "Notes on the Valley of the Upper Columbia River." The letter is written by a Mr. S. Mattingly, now residing at Clickatat Prarie, in Washington Territory, near the Dalles, on the Columbia Mr. M. speaks very encouragingly of the whole valley of the Upper Columbia, but more particularly of that portion of the country lying in the vicinity of Rock and Kettle Creeks. The following is an extract

Kettle Creeks. The following is an extract from the letter:

The mines of Rock Creek and Kettle River, in the valley of the Upper Columbia, are highly spoken of. Rock Creek is about 300 miles distant from the Dalles, in a morthward direction. It is a tributary of Kettle River, and has some rich bars, where some miners are now at work, but there is room for five times as many. All the country in this vicinity is auriferous, but it has not been prospected save along a portion of the streams named; but the paying bars already found contain much dirt that has not yet been washed. The amount made per hand per day varies, of course, as in all mines; but the wages for good laborers is four dollars per day. There have been cases where men have made more than \$100 a day with a rocker. Two men working with a rocker averaged \$56 a day each for ten consecutive days. Mr. M. has three acquaintances who have worked with one another for over two months, and they told him that the lowest day's work was \$4.18 each, and the highest was \$17.60. They were mining on Boundary Creek, part of which is in British Columbia. A nugget worth \$560 was found a few weeks since on Rock Creek, which isentirely in Critish Columbia. All the other auriferous branches of Kettle River are in Washington Territory. Kettle River are in Washington Territory. Kettle River itself is about as large as Feather River. Much mining will be done on this stream and its tributaries next year. There is good grain and rich soil in the basin of Kettle River. Two hundred persons will spend this winter in the Rock Creek mines. The Wenatchee is a small tributary of the Columbia, rising in the Cascade mountains, near the Snoqualmie Pass and running enstward. It has long been known to have some rich diggings in its bars and ravines. Twenty-five minewill spend the winter there. Flour is work from 20 to 25 cents per pound, fresh beet from 12 to 15 cents.

Washington Territorial Legislature.

We see in the last number of the Washington Standard, published at Olympia, that a Mr. Hyatt, one of the Representatives, has been attacking our authorities, on account of the policy of the Hudson Bay Company towards Americans; for the taking of the boy Charley from on board the steamer Eliza Anderson, some three months since; and finally for their "absurd" claims to San Juan Island. The Standard says:

Juan ISIANG. The Standard says:

"Mr. Hyatt reviewed at length the policy of the British and Hudson Bay authorities towards Americans, the taking of the boy Charley from the steamer Eliza Anderson, in the harbor of Victoria, and finally, their absurd claim for the Island of San Juan. While we recognize as true very much of what was said by the speaker, we doubt the policy of indulging in language of crimination against the British authorities."

In repard to the policy of the Undson Ray.

In regard to the policy of the Hudson Bay Company towards Americans, we presume Mr. Hyatt alludes to the rule adopted by Gov. Douglas in 1858, in not allowing miners and others to ascend Fraser River without taking out a mining license in advance, and also for throwing many obstacles in the way of trude. But Mr. Hyatt, if he ever reads newspapers, should bear in mind that not only were Americans debarred from entering the country without a license, or from trading therein, but that British subjects were also denied the same privileges; and he should also remember that our authorities were severely reprimanded for their course in that respect, by the Home Government. Everybody—British subjects or not, here or abroad—condemned the policy; and we protest against Mr. H., or any other public man, at this late day coming forward and asserting that Americans-in fact, all foreigners-have not as fair a chance here as British subjects. It is clearly an attempt to prevent American immigration in the opring to this and our sister Colony; and we believe the intelligence of our neighbors generally will so view it, and give the remarks no heed.

The taking of the slave boy Charley from on board the steamer Eliza Anderson, was perfectly proper and legal, and the Federal Government must look upon it in the same light, or we should have heard of a protest long since. The decision of the Chief Justice in this instance was a most righteous one, and he deserved and received credit and praise for it from both American citizens and British subjects.

The claim of Great Britain to the Island of San Juan may be "absurd" in Mr. Hyatt's eyes; but there is probably as much reason to suppose that Englishmen generally look upon the claim of the United States to the same section, as quite as "absurd" as the Americans regard ours. The matter is now far beyond the meddling of such astute minds as Mr. Hyatt seems to possess. It is a question to be settled between the two vernments, and with which small-beer politicians have nothing to do. Each government is no doubt competent to look to its own interest in the matter, and when they need the opinions of the numerous Mr. Hyatts on both sides of the Line, will no doubt ask for them, and not accept them gratuitously. The rebuke by the editor of the Standard to Mr. Hyatt for language calculated to create ill feeling between two nations who should be on terms of the most cordial and fraternal character, is good, and should serve as a less in to others of the same stripe, who are seeking popularity by such discreditable means.

Reciprocity of Trade.

We observe that some discussion is going on among our neighbors in Oregon and Washington Territory respecting reciprocity of trade between these colonies and British Columbia. It would appear from a letter in the Portland Advertiser that packers, in order to reach Rock Creek from Fort Hope, have to pass over some twenty-five miles of United States territory south of the boundary line. It is also stated that packers the Dalles going to American Creek gold mines in Washington Territory have to pass through British Columbia. It is alleged that the British Columbian authorities have en collecting heavy duties and taxes on all the merchandise, etc., crossing the line, even though not destined for consumption on the British side, but bound to American Creek. It is strongly urged, therefore, that either our Government should reciprocate so far as to allow American products to pass duty free through our territory, so as the American Creek mines; or that that the United States government should insist on the collection of duties according to their tatiff on all merchandise passing

from Hope to the Rock Creek mines. We from Hope to the Rock creek mines. Howe not been able to verify the statement about both parties having to cross the boundary line, but are inclined to the opinion that our neighbors are correct. Besides, British merchandise destined for Rock Creek, it is intimated that Fort Colville also obtains its supplies by crossing American soil; and for that reason the services of a United States Collector is necessary. In such a state of things, we see no good reason why an arrangement should not be entered into to allow both nations to cross the boundary n route to places within their own territories The only measures apparently necessary would be some precautions—on the bonded system perhaps—to guard against violations of the revenue laws of the respective countries. It is very certain that the more accomodating and the less restrictive, is the policy of each country, the better it will be for all concerned.

AN ACT

To Levy an Annual Tax of £1 per Centum ou the Value of all Real Estate in the Colony of Vancouver Island and its Dependencies.

W HEREAS, it is expedient to levy an Annual Tax of £1 per centum on all the Real Estate in the Colony of Vancouver Island and its Dependencies, for the use of Her Majesty, Her Heirs and Her Successors;

in the Colony of Vancouver Island and its Dependencies, for the use of Her Majesty, Her Heirs and Her Successors;

Be it enacted by the Governor, on behalf of Her Majesty, by and with the advice and consent of the Legislative Council and Assembly, as follows:

I. This act may be cited as the "Real Estate Tax Act, 1860."

II. The term "Real Estate," includes all buildings, whether moveable or immoveable, erected on the land, and all mines, minerals, quarries and fossils, in and under the same.

III. There shall be raised, levied and collected, upon all Real Estate in the Colony of Vancouver Island and its dependencies, except as hereinafter mentioned, as from the first day of June, 1860, an Annual Tax of £1 per centum on the market value thereof, and to be paid for the use of Her Majesty, Her Heirs and Her Successors.

First Exception—All Real Estate vested in, or held in trust for Her Majesty, or for the public uses of the Colony, either unoccupied or occupied by some person in an official capacity.

Second Exception—All Property vested in any person or body corporate, in trust for, or for the use of any tribe or body of Indians.

Third Exception—Every place of Public Worship, Churchyard, Burying Ground, Public School House, Public Roadway, Square, Town or City Hali, Gaol, House of Correction, Lock-up House, and Public Hospital, with the Land absolutely requisite for the due enjoyment thereof.

Fourth Exception—All Agricultural Buildings and

IV. The Governor shall appoint two or more Assessors to assess the value of the Real Estate for the various Town and County Districts.

V. Any one or more of the Assessors so appointed for any one District, may be also appointed Assessor for any other District or Districts; and may be also empowered to assess any land not included in any of the wait Districts.

VI. The Assessors shall, on or before the expiration of three clear days from the time of their appointment, publish a notice in the following form:

The Governor may appoint five persons to be the Court of Revision for each District; three members of the Court of Revision - hall be a quorum; the members may choose their own Chairman, who shall have a casting vote in case of an equality, and a majority of those present at any meeting may decide all questions.

XIII. The Court shall meet within seven days after the completion of the assessment roll, and shall continue their sittings from time to time, until he business of equalization presented to them is tisposed of; and they shall complete such equalization, and deliver the roll as amended to the treasurer, within thirty days from their first sitting. TXIV. The Court, or any member thereof, may administer an oath to any party or witness; the wilful violation of which oath shall be punishable as perjury. as perjury.

XV. The Court shall try all complaints with

XV. The Court shall try all complaints with regard to wrongful assessments or omissions, and may amend the roll necordingly.

XVI. The proceedings for the trial of complaints, shall be as follows:

1st. Any person complaining of an error or omission in regard to himself, or being undercharged or overcharged by the Assessor, shall personally, or by his agent, within fourteen days after the posting up of the roll, give notice in writing to the Assessors, that he considers himself aggrieved for any or all of the rolls agent. up of the roll, give no that he considers him the causes aforesaid.

2d. If a person assessed thinks that any person has been assessed too low or too high, or has been wrongfully inserted on or omitted from the roll, he shall, within fourteen days after the copy of the roll has been posted in manner aforesaid, give five clear days notice to such person and to the Assessor of his intention to object, and the matter shall be decided as soon after the expiration of the said five days as shall meet the convenience of the Court.

3d. The Sheriff shall post up in some convenient and public place within the District, a list of all complainants against the assessment roll, with a concise description of the matter complained of, together with an announcement of the time when the Court will be held to hear complaints.

4th. The Sheriff shall also advertise in the Government Gazette the time at which the Court will hold its first sitting.

5th. The Court, after hearing the complainant and the Assessor or Assessors, and any witnesses adduced by or on behalf of either of them, shall determine the matter, and confirm or amend the ro!l accordingly.

6th. If either party fails to appear, either in person or by an agent, the Court may proceed exparte.

XVII. The roll, as finally passed by the Court, and certified by them as so passed, shall bind all parties concerned, notwithstanding any defect or error committed, in or with regard to such roll.

XVIII. The assessment roll, as finally passed, shall, within seven days from its final passage, be posted up by the Sheriff in at least six conspicuous places in each District, and shall also be published in the Government Gazette.

XIX. The person liable to pay the assessment shall be personally liable for the amount of the said assessment.

XX. The Real Estate, in respect of which an assessment has been made, shall also be primarily

If the amount assessed in respect of any Real Estate be not paid into the Treasury within thirty days after the date of the publication of the roll as finally passed, an amount equivalent to five per cent. upon the amount due, shall be paid, collected and levied, in addition to the amount due; and if payment be not made in sixty days from the date of publication aforesaid, the Sheriff shall levy the same by distress of the goods and chattels of the person liable to pay the same; and if such person cannot be found, or is not known, or in default of a sufficient distress, by the sale of so much of the Real Estate in respect of which such assessment continues either partially or entirely unpaid, as shall be approximately sufficient to pay the amount assessed, together with the five per cent. aforesaid.

XXIV. The Sheriff shall advertise in one of the newspapers circulating in the Colony, and shall post up in six conspicuous places in each District, wherein Real Estate is liable to be sold for non-payment of the assessment, a notice of the Real Estate liable to be sold, the hour and day upon which he proposes to sell the same, not being less than twenty-one days from the date of such notice,

and the place where he proposes to conduct such

and the place where he proposes to conduct such sale.

XXV. Upon the day fixed for the sale aforesaid, the Sheriff shall, within two hours after the hour-fixed, put the said Real Estate up to auction, and sell the same to the highest bidder.

XXVI. If, at the time appointed for the sale, no bidders appear, or bid a sum equivalent to the amount due in respect of the said assessment, and the probable costs hereinafter mentioned, the Sheriff may adjourn the sale, and so on from time to time.

XXVII. The purchaser, until the expiration of one year, shall hold the Real Estate sold for a legal estate in fee-simple, subject to the right to redeem hereinafter provided.

XXVIII. The owner of any Real Estate, which may hereafter be sold for non-payment of taxes, or his heirs or assigns, may, at any time within one year from the day of sale, redeem the estate sold, by paying to the Treasurer, for the use and benefit of such purchaser, or his legal representatives, the sum paid by him, together with twenty per cent. thereon; and the said Treasurer's receipt shall be the evidence of the redemption.

XXIX. The certificate of the Sheriff as to the amount payable for the redemption of the Real Estate so sold as aforesaid, shall be pro uced and delivered to the Treasurer, as his authority to receive the said money.

XXX. From and after payment to the Treasurer

Estate so sold as aforesaid, shall be pro uced and delivered to the Treasurer, as his authority to receive the said money.

XXX. From and after payment to the Treasurer of the full amount of redemption money required by this Act, the said purchaser shall case to have any further right in or to the Real Estate in question.

XXXI. The amount so paid by the person redeeming, shall be paid over by the Treasurer on application, to the purchaser or his representatives.

XXXII. Purchasers shall not, during the said year, commit or allow waste upon the Real Estate purchased.

XXXIII. The Sheriff shall, at the expiration of the said year, if no redemption has taken place, convey such Real Estate to the purchaser, whose title shall be an absolute and indefeasible estate in fee-simple, notwithstanding any irregularity or informality in such sale, or the proceedings prior thereto or subsequent thereon.

XXXIV. The Sheriff shall defray the expenses prior to and of such sale and attendant thereon, out of the purchase money, and next the amount due in respect of said assessment, and shall pay the residue thereof into the Treas.ry, in trust for the person or persons to whom as Real Estate it shall belong.

XXXV. The term "agricultural improvements" shall include all improvements in or upon the land; all fences, gates, barns, stables, stiles, out-houses, and laborers' dwelling houses.
