The Austrian Empire.

During the progress of the Crimean war, and until very recently, writers have been in the habit of styling the Turkish nation the "sick man of Europe"-just as the Americans call Mexico the "sick man of America." But lately a " man " much worse affected than Turkey, has turned up. It is the Austrian Empire. Turkey suffered from a weakness in his legs and arms. Austria, although strong in his limbs, is suffering from a chronic affection of the chest. In other words, he is heavily in debt, and has not a florin with which to relieve himself; and fears are entertained that if a breach should be made in the walls of Venetia, death will spedily ensue. "Caustic," an able writer in the London Dispatch, thus alludes to the condition of affairs in the House of Haps-

"Austria is a State caten up by its army. The empire is bankrupt to the lowest degree, without credit, pressed with taxation that leaves no residue to the tax-payer, pledges him for more than he has. Discontent bordering on revolt, is the national sentiment through all its dominions. No sign of well-being or contentment exists in it. But there is yet the tremendous array of armed men, that leave behind them nothing worth protecting, marshalled to obey a Monarch whose reign brings nothing but evil to all he rules over. Anstria has arrived at the very climax of political absurdity, at well as political wickedness. It is impossible that this brute force, having no real root in the nations that must supply it with life, can continue what it is, a blind, self acting machine for tyranny and plunder. It must go to pieces for lack of repair.

A traveller who has just passed through Venetia tells the truth of this portion of the Austrian monarchy as soon as he gets out of it. He sees the army and uothing else. That occupies all the railroad conveyance. Its officers only fill the inns and sit at the tables d'hote. The tramp of the soldiery is the most accustomed sound in the streets, the long march of columns is echoed for hours in the night. Villages, farms, cottages, are filled with the troops. The territory is not peopled but militarily occupied. For the young men flee to escape the conscription, so that a fine of 2,000 florins is, in the desperate vengeance of the ruling power, inflicted on the community from which any young man absents himself, while every sign of getting a living by trade is met by the instant exaction of an arbitrary impost. THE TAX ON BOATMEN.

Petitions are in circulation here for signatures requesting His Excellency the Governor to abrogate the law requiring the boatmen plying between here and Lytton to pay one-half of one per cent. on their cargoes. It is thought His Excellency will grant the prayer of the petitioners, as the case of the boatmen is one of peculiar hardship. They derive no benefit from the fund raised by this tax; they pay another heavy tax at the "ways" in the casion; they risk life and property at the most inclement season of the year, when the trails cannot be travelled. Many have expended considerable sums on boats, tarpaulins, tow-lines, etc., and can ill afford to pay this onerous tax on their industry. Another important consideration is the increased field of employment for many of our population who are now literally waiting on their oars.

THE SOUTHEN BOUNDARY ACT.

It is the opinion of many that the late proclamation called the "Southern Boundary Act" will work injury in the Cariboo district. That section of country is but little prospected as yet; the diggings, in miners' parlance, are "spotted" and difficult of access, and unless the miners can get provisions at living rates, they will be obliged to "clatawa," as they did last spring. But for the timely arrival of a few trains with supplies from the Dalles, few miners could have remained in the Quesnelle and Cariboo country. Let the traders from the Dalles pay a just and reasonable duty; and if, with the superior advantages possessed by the traders of British Columbia, they cannot compete for the trade successfully, they had better sell out to somebody who can.

WAR PREPARATIONS .- The chance for a war between Austria, Piedmont, and probably France, next Spring, seems increasing. Garibaldi, in his farewell address, said that he should require 1,000,000 Italians ready for the field by the last of February-and Austria seems to he placing herself in an attitude of defence. Orders are said to have been received at Venice from Vienna, that he appears to leave Vasatishell be diversely in cases of absolute necessity, to be clearly proved by the applicant. Persons have been arrested for wearing the rings called "tears of Italy;" among them is a young lady of 17. Noblemen, besides, have been compelled to leave their country houses m order that soldiers may be lodged in them; only 24 hours were allowed them to remove, and they were told that if they had not left by that time their furniture would be thrown out of doors. The construction of bridges has been commenced, and other attitude of defence. Orders are said to have be induced has been commenced, and other measures of precaution taken usual on the eve of war—such as the cutting down of trees and the prohibition to peasants to sow grain in fields likely to be required for camps. The Piedmontese Government, on its part, is on its guard, and making preparations.

The Gunpowder Magazine.

We would like to know when the powder magazine will be removed? Beyond a talk in the Assembly and the construction of a new magazine on paper, not a thing has been done, so far as we can learn, for the protection of the lives and property of our citizens. True, a sentinel has been placed over the magazine. But what sentinel is placed over the neighboring houses within a few feet of the magazine? There is none. Were a fire to occur-and it may at any momentwhat fire company, what citizen, would be foolhardy enough to risk his life alongside a combustible that may accidentally explode at any moment. We cannot but look upon the torpidity of the government respecting the removal of the powder, as an act of criminal neglect. The last Grand Jury were equally oblivious. They went off duty, not caring, apparently, whether the magazine went off or not. Why should they oare? The sacrifice of a few wooden and brick houses, and the shattering of a large number more would be a mere nothing in such a clay-bottomed and wooded topped country as ours. Human life, notoriously cheap on this side of the continent, is likely to be still chemper for all the Grand Jury or Executive cares. Life may be too scarce to render trade as brisk and as large as we would like; yet our government is willing to take the risk of getting rid of a few more of its citizens, rather than bestir itself to move the pawder out of town; or it is probably favorable to giving them a chance to smell brimstone before they sight the portals of "Kingdom Come." That powder must be removed,-and removed at once Procrastination cannot be allowed. If the authorities will not act, we recommend our citizens to club together and dump the powder into the harbor, if it is too much trouble to carry it out of town. Such a mode would abate the dangerous nuisance speedily and satisfactorily, although it might be

startling to the nerves of some people. CAYOOSH .- The town of Cayoosh, in British Columbia, is situated at the terminus of the Harrison-Lilooet trail, on Fraser River, and about sixty miles above Lytton City, but on the opposite or east side of that stream. The town at present contains about 35) souls, most of whom are wintering there with the intention of starting for the upper country as soon as the first sign of a " break up" in the cold weather is given. The town is growing rapidly, and new houses are daily being erected. Several families have taken up their abode within the limits of th to a since last spring. On the opposite side of the Fraser is a small hamlet known as Parso ville, which was started as an opposition town. It is at Parsonville that the pack-trains stop on their arrival from Cariboo; and during last summer, it contained several d vellings and stores. Now, how-ever, since the winter has set in, it has gradually dwindled down to one store, kept by a merchant named Neufelder. It is thought that when the bridge is built, the packers will go direct to Seton Lake for their goods. The point at which the crossing will be made is above Bridge River and four miles above Cayoosh, consequently both Fraser and Bridge Rivers will have tobe crossed to reach the town. The question now agitating the Cayooshites is, whether they had not better move higher up the river, so as to catch the travel over this bridge, and thereby prevent the mule-owners from going to Seton. Considerable mining is going on in the vicinity of the town, and preparations are making for washing off the whole flat. The town was named by Chief Justice Begbie, from a tribe of In-dians ...nown as the Cayooshes, during his first visit to the locality in the Spring of

IMPORTATION OF TOBACCO INTO ENGLAND. -According to the trade and navigation returns just issued, there has been a large increase in the importation of tobacco. In the nine months ending the 30th of September last, there were 2,193,2051bs of stemmed to bacco imported, 9,399,6211bs of unstemmed, and 1,823,2471bs of manufactured and snuff, against 2,159,266lbs of stemmed, 7,717,-8201bs of unstemmed, and 1,170,853lbs of manufactured and snuff in the same period in the preceding year.

Cotton .- Cotton is still king. Late statistics show that five million persons are supported in England by cotton-that thirty million spindles are employed in the produ tion of the yarn; and that the capital absorbed exceeds \$750,000,000. Four-fifths of the cotton consumed in England-800, 000,000 pounds-is American.

HORRIBLE BRUTALITY.—We find in the HANDSOMELY BOUND Ladles' O. S. White Norway Gauntlets, for English papers an account of ada made by the students at the great French Vetinary School at Alfort, to Dr. Fraser, concerning the continued practice of horse torture at that school. The Doctor states that the students "unhesitatingly admitted that, in addition to practicing vivisection for the sake of physiological research or experiments every operation which could by possibility be required to be performed in the course of vetinary practice was, on two days of the week during the session, performed over and over again by the teachers and students, on living (diseased or wornout) horses, operations of the most exquisitely painful nature being soccessively performed on different parts of the same horse, until nature gave way, the wretched animal having been tor-tured to death by knife and fire, in as bar-barous a manner as man or devil could devise. To add to the bratality, horses which have only been partially experimented on are often left till the next operating or experimenting day, (not the foll wing day,) when a renewal of their torture takes place. His question as to whether they ever gave chloroform or ether to the animal before vivinction, was answered in the practice. To add to the brutality, horses which visection, was answered in the negative, and with a derisive smile."

CALIFORNIA SHIPMENTS FROM EASTERN Ports.—In consequence of the immense productions of California, a constant decline of shipments from the Atlantic ports is now seen. The decline has even been more marked from New York than from Boston, as a year or two since that city sent three times the number of vessels that sailed from this port, and now it sends only twice the number. In three months of the present year—April, June, and August—Boston only despatched one ship each month. We hope never again to see this 'trade pursued with such recklessness as it was a year or two since. Three ships per month (two from New York and one from Boston) would abundantly supply the California market at the present time, with its present greatly diminished wants.—Boston Transcript.

How many years, we wonder, will elaps before some California paper will make the same remark about Victoria?

LOCAL INTELLIGENCE.

A BOLD STRIKE FOR FREEDOM .- On Sunday afternoons, prayer meeting is held at the prison. Last Sunday evening, a party of thirty convicts listened to a very impressive sermon from the Rev. Mr. Dundas, and at its conclusion were taken charge of by Jailor McKenzie for the purpose of being locked np. While that officer was inside the jail, securing two or three of their number, some of those on the outside slammed the door to and turned the key upon him, thus making him an involuntary prisoner. They then tore up two planks that are laid down for a walk from the prison to the outer yard, and proceeded to the rear of the jail, where Sprague, the Fort Yale burglar, having succeeded in fixing one of the planks against a grated window, and resting it on the side of the fence, climbed nimbly up, cleared the spikes on the top and jumped over into Langley street. In doing so, he had to fall some twenty feet, which he accomplished without injury. He was seen by the officer on guard at the powder magazine, who ran towards him with his baton raised. The burglar, on seeing the officer approach, caught up a large stone, and threatening to knock his brains out, the latter retreated, and Sprague fled up View Street, his heavy rous (which still on him) clanking an accompaniment at every step, and betraying the fugitive's character to passers-by. He proceeded on his way up View to Government and Fort, and from thence to Douglas, where he secreted himself under the flooring of an outhouse at the rear of Mr. Curtin's house. He was followed to his hiding-place by several cit-izens, and Sergt. Blake of the police. Candies were brought, and he was finally discovered by Mr. Lumley Franklin, and officer Blake dragged him forth and conducted him back to his cell. When taken into the prison he abused the officers soundly, and cursed and swere terribly, as they locked him up. Although the intention seems to him up. Although the intention seems to have been formed for a general stampede, have been formed for a general stampede, none of the irons on any of the prisoners appear to have been at all tampered with. How they could have expected to escape so heavily ironed, through the crowded streets, is a mystery.

SEIZURE OF THE HUDSON BAY COMPANY'S SCHOONER .- On Saturday evening last, Mr. Stenhouse, acting under orders from Capt. E. Hammond King, brought into the harbor the Hudson Bay Company's schooner, which vessel he had seized under suspicious circumstances,near the wreck of the Nannette. The vessel was loaded with goods at the time, and was in charge of a special officer, who, we are told, is a servant of the comwho, we are told, is a servant of the company. The schooner had no permit from the wieck-master, Capt. Main, to take goods from the Nannetta and cleared at the custom house a few days ago for Nanaimo, and went to Race Rocks instead. The vessel went to nace works instead. The vessel was handed over to Capt. Nagle, and the goods to the agents for the Underwriters. Dr. Tuzo, of the Company, threatens to commence a suit against Mr. Stenhouse for detaining the vessel. It is worthy to be boin mind that all other vessels are subject It is worthy to be borne seizure if found wrecking without a permit; and the officer, seeing no difference between a corporation and a private individual, eu-forced the rule in this case.

FEARFUL THAT AN ACCIDENT HAS HAP. PENED. - The Government has become alarmed at the prolonged absence of the gun-boat Forward, which left this harbor on the 15th ult .- more than three weeks agoto relieve the Peruvian brig Florencia, lying disabled at Nootka Sound. H. M. S. Hecate. was dispatched on Saturday last in search of the Forward, and if any accident has happened, we should be in receipt of reliaintelligence in two or three days. Yesterday a rumor was circulated to the effect that the gun-boat had struck a rock and gone down, with all on board; but it proved to be false. We are of opinion that the For-ward has remained to convoy the brigantine to this port.

THE SALE ON SATURDAY .- The sale of damaged goods on Saturday last realized good prices. A large number of persons were in attendance, and the bidding was very spirited. One case, mentioned in the catalogue as " contents unknown," was run up to \$300, and was finally knocked down at that price to the Hudson Bay Company, who seemed to "know a thing or two" about its inmost recesses. A small iron safe, supposed to contain valuables, was knocked down to a tradesman at three times its value, and when he came to open it, found that it contained just nothing at all. Another sale, it is thought, will come off on Wednesday.

FIRST SNOW-THE WEATHER .- On Saturday morning last, a few flakes of snow came down from above, and awakened fond recoilections of sleigh-rides and snowballing parties. A PAUPER'S BODY .- There is something wrong in the management of the graveyard at the Church Reserve. On Saturday the body of Wm. Jones, who died at the Union Restaurant the previous night was sent to the Church Reserve cemetery by the coroner, in charge of a drayman. It was in a pine coffin; and the drayman, from what cause have not yet learned, left it inside of the railing, and there it re-mained uncovered all night. The next morning it was plainly visible to passers-by and to the neighbors just where it had been "dumped" the night before It remained in that position until two o'clock on Sanday, when a gentleman residing in the vicinity, determining that if the proper authorities would not attend to it, he would bury it himself, went to the sexton, or person having charge of the cemetery, and informed him that if he did not immediately inter the corpse, he would, and afterwards inform the Governor of his heartlessness. The person applied to promised to attend to it at once, and cause a man to dig a grave,-and during the afternoon the body of the poor unfortunate was taken from the position in which it had rested a monument of disgrace to our Christian community, and, we suppose, interred. Upon whom the responsibility of this affair rests, we cannot say; but hope the party to blame will at least be severely reprimanded. There is such an exhibition of heartlessness connected with the circumstance as to awaken a feeling of disgust in the minds of all right thinking persons. Had the deceased been a man ot consequence, his remains would have been consigned to mother earth; but as he was a pauper, the refrain-

"Rattle his bones over the stones, He's only a pauper who nobody owns,"

is hummed, and the corpse left to take care of itself.

RACE .- A match has been made between Parker's horse " Moustache," and Roberts' "cream colored horse" (name unknown) to come off over Beacon Hill course on the 5th day of February next. The stakes are \$2000 aside-\$1000 forfeit money, which was deposited with Wells, Fargo & Co. on Sat-arday night last. We recommend the adoption of rules to govern this race, as well as all others that may in future occur, to pre-vent the recurrence of such scenes as took place at the last over the same course.

LAMENTABLE .- Whilst engaged in holding the inquest over the body of Wm. Jones, the ex-policeman, on Saturday, Ceroner Dickson stated as a lamentable fact, that of the large number of cases in which he had been officially called upon to act during the past fourteen months, only one death had occurred that was not clearly attributable either directly of matecaty, to the use or inquer. What a sad commentary upon an excessive indulgence in ardent spirits.

CORONER'S INQUEST .- The coroner's jury summoned on Saturday to inquire into the cause of the death of Wm. Jones, returned a verdict that he had "died from natural causes, and that death was hastened by the too free use of ardent spirits.

IN AID OF THE POOR INDIAN .- The collections in aid of the Indian Mission, taken up on Sunday at St. John's and Christ Churches, amounted to \$210 371, viz.: St. John's, \$78 50; Christ's, \$131 874.

DISHONEST WRECKERS .- Geo. Samson was fined 40s.: Ambroiso Babuglia, £5: and Geo. Burborn, £5; in the Police Court on Saturday last, for stealing goods from the wreck of the Nannette.

ARMED .- The guard at the powder magazine has been armed with a double-barreled shot gun, to wing such of the jail-birds as may in future feel disposed to fly over the prison fence.

CITY TRADE REPORT

MONDAY EVENING, Jan. 7, 1861. A few sales of staples took place to-day, but hardly any of them were of sufficient importance to note. The freight of the Otter on her next trip will not be large, and composed almost entirely of case goods and miscellaneous articles. In staples the river seems very well supplied-advantage having been taken of low freights to run up large stocks, especially of Flour and Bacon. We state in an item some days ago, that there were 1600 barrels of Flour in Fort Yale; we have since learned that the Hope and Yale stocks together will not fall short of 2500 barrels. How many barrels there may be in New Westminster, Douglas and the upper towns, we have no means of knowing, but presume the stock of the entire colony to be about 8000 barrels. This may be considered by some a high estimate; but we believe it to be correct. Owing to the large amount of damaged goods forced upon the market by the wreck of the Nannette, case and dry goods are very dull and of slow sale-and Blankets and coarse Clothing are drugs in the market. Our merchants will suffer considerably from this cause, as it is estimated that at least \$100,000 worth of the Nannette's cargo has been, or will be disposed of at Flour remains unchanged, with sales of 100 bbls G. G. at \$5 75. Oregon Meats in demand and sales of a few small lots to-day at 18/4c p th. Eggs are not plenty, and are ranging from 45 to 60c p doz. Eastern Bacon ruling at 17c p tb; a good supply with small sales. Adamantine Candles are steady at 27c@ 30c p lb, with light jobbing transactions.
