Hope for Educated Women.

The Registrar General's last Quarterly Return of the marriages, births and deaths in England during the winter quarter that ended on March 31, 1862, is rather an interesting document. It is a true as well as popular doctrine, that the poorest men are the fathers of the largest families; and we are told that in 1861 the marriage rate quickened with the increase of pauperism. With the increase of births and deaths owing to physical and sanitary improvements, there was a decrease in the rate of mortality. During the first three months of the present year, English emigrants left their native land at the rate of 53 daily; about two thirds proceeding to the Australian colonies. There is another fact connected with the increase of births, viz: That the number of females is out of all proportion to that of males. Where are young girls to find husbands, especially now that, despite the Times, men have proved the impracticability of marrying upon an income of three hundred pounds sterling a year?

In the midst of this dilemma, so harassing to politicians, and more so to political economists, "an infant Hercules" in the shape of a colony comes to the rescue; and that colony, described by the golden pen of a Times correspondent, is British Columbia and Vancouver Island, the one the actual "Dorado" imagined faintly by the early explorer of the sixteenth century, the other the Seat of Government, the emporium of trade, the mine of mineral treasure, the Paradise which has long been crying out for, but has never been visited by practical farmers—men of the right stamp. Miners are amassing fortunes in those golden veins which have been flowing down from time immortal from the Rocky Mountains, and miners want wives as well as other people. Here is a bright idea, a gleam of hope for educated women, who in vain sigh alike in rich Belgravia, and in the wretched courts and alleys of St. Giles' and Westminster, for men who will have the courage to propose.

The English papers tell us that there is a college for the purpose of promoting the emigration of educated women; and it appears that a lady named Miss Rye, afflicted with the cacothies scribendi, is the head mistress of the college, or at least a leading graduate. Miss Rye, or some other lady, is about to favor us with a large supply of eligible females, who will possess in addition to all other lady-like accomplishments, the peculiar attractions of the "Blue-Stocking." There were days when the arrival of a mail steamer at Calcutta, with its fair cargo imported direct for the marriage market, created a perfect furor among the civil and military departments of our Indian government; and the pen of the most brilliant novelist is required to portray the glowing scene faintly shadowed down the vista of lagging months, to describe the rapturous meeting between our colonial youths, who are dying to turn Benedict, and to quote Tennyson—

"The fair girl-graduates with their golden hair." Joking apart, we fear that merely educated females will find that colonial life has its thorns as well as its roses. While we do not wish for a moment to discourage the settler, whether male or female, who approaches our shores, we wish to state the truth, and to advise those who may be misled. The "comparatively leisurely life of a British colonist" is a sight which only exists in the brain of British novel-readers, whose idea is founded upon such works as Kingsley's "Westward Ho!" Mr. Kinglake's "Tokay," Mr. Warburton's "Present and the Cross," and Charles Reade's "Never too Late to Mend." If an educated woman is one who requires a lady's maid to attend upon her, who is too proud to answer the door-bell, and is far above performing her ordinary household work which falls to the lot of the housemaid at home, she will look in vain for a happy home in Vancouver Island, British Columbia or in any other colony.

There is another question to which little attention has been paid: As regards schools in Victoria we are tolerably well provided for, and we are not sure that a new school might not prove like a new Greek grammar, an unhappy speculation, if not a doubtful improvement. Whether in England or in the colonies, only wealthy families are in a position to keep a governess. If the educated females are only accustomed to move in high society, may not a more unhappy fate than that of a governess await them in this thriving colony? We never knew a man with matrimony in his eye who expressed any affection for "blue-stockings" in general, and are certain that however much we may prove the gamers, it will be a great fall for women of the gentry class to be compelled through sheer hunger and want to sink to the grade of comparatively uneducated domestic servants. The women we want in this and all other colonies are women prepared to rough it as well as ourselves, women who, while acting as domestic servants, the class we particularly lack, will possess all the fair graces of womanhood and the virtues which will make them an ornament to their sex, at once model servants as well as model wives.

EXTRAORDINARY ADVENTURES OF AN IRISHMAN AMONG CANNIBALS.—The Cork Herald says:—There is at present a person in a charitable institution of this city who was a prisoner on the island of Kikuhewa, one of the Marquesas group in the South Pacific Ocean, for the space of sixteen months. He describes the natives as cannibals, and during his residence amongst them he was forced to attend their kokks or feasts on three different occasions. The natives had taken some prisoners from another tribe with whom they were at war, and their feasts on these prisoners are described as most

horrible and inhuman. He was forced by the natives to eat with them, and, to save himself from being devoured by them, he partook of a delicate steak taken from a boy about thirteen years of age. He describes it as delicious, and says that the only drawback to the feast was the revolting idea of human flesh. He was wrecked on the reefs near the island. Sixteen of the crew were lost. The captain, cook, steward, cabin-boy and himself escaped to land, and were taken by the natives. A squaw, daughter of the Napeika, or King, took a fancy to him and protected him from harm, while the other four were eaten by the cannibals with great gusto. He managed to save from portions of the wreck which floated ashore some of the effects of the captain and sailors, and, finding paper and ink, he kept a very minute journal of every day's proceedings. His description of their manners, customs, religion, and amusements, &c., together with a full and complete geography of the island, is most interesting and valuable. He brought with him a species of nut, which has effected a most astonishing cure of a case of epilepsy, and which will probably cause a stir in the medical world.

Provincial Items. Dr. Peter Guimarin, one of the oldest inhabitant and physicians of New Brunswick, died recently at the advanced age of 90. He was for fifty years a resident of New Brunswick.

The estimated sum required to complete the Parliament buildings at Ottawa, C. W., is \$2,603,400. The original contract was for \$387,000.

A bark loaded with oil has been chartered direct from Sarnia to Liverpool.

The Kingston Herald tells a story of a retired naval officer, who has been sold at the head waters of the Ottawa. Usually we do not find people who make these discoveries in any hurry to report them.

The Halifax Colonist says that it is impossible to doubt that, under the existing position of public affairs, a dissolution of the Legislature must take place. The late of Nova Scotia, it thinks, is for the present in the hands of Lord Mulgrave.

In the Nova Scotia Legislature the notice of the House was called to the shameful falsification of the census returns in connection with the Presbyterian bodies in the Province.

Mr. Robert Montgomery, of Edwardsburch, was drowned in the Niagara river at Spencerville, on Tuesday last week. He had been in the village during part of the day, and wishing to cross to the east side of the river, he took off his boots, and undertook to swim, when, before reaching the opposite side, he sank to the bottom.

A party of four American deserters, provided with full and fatigue uniforms, arrived at Dunville recently, and raised the wind by selling their clothes.

EDITOR BRITISH COLONIST.—The "Press" of yesterday's date contains an advertisement for the truly apposite quotation from Shakespeare of the character in which the writer of that article appears, viz. as "Shylock," with the very admirable and, if he be in truth an Englishman, CHRISTIAN-like profession of his principles: "If you wrong us shall we not REVENGE! If we are like you in the rest we will resemble you in that." Of a verity we may safely and rightly apply the words of Burns to this redoubtable champion of the colored race, and say to him:

"Right, sir, your text, I'll prove it true, Though heretics may laugh; For instance there's yourself, just now, God knows an unco' cat!" I had hoped that after the observations made by Mr. Pemberton yesterday, some friendly arrangement might have been effected and better feelings induced between the parties, but it appears that the chivalrous Englishman will not permit this to be done, laboring, as he evidently does, under the disease known as "cacothies scribendi" (for he boasts of paying for the insertion of his edifying communication), he rushes into print, and reversing the Latin maxim—

"Fratrein facere ex hostibus," he desires to make a foe of a brother by endeavoring to excite and create hostile feelings and demonstrations between the English and Americans.

I cannot believe the writer of the article referred to to be an Englishman, but that he is some "jay in borrowed plume," and that for a sinister motive he seeks to raise a prejudice against the respected proprietor of the Exchange Saloon, through the clap-net medium of professing the principles of "Liberty, Equality and Fraternity." By the bye, is the author aware that he adopts the language of the French revolutionists and which led to the success of their butchers under the sanguinary rule of Robespierre, and that he is, in fact, desirous of carrying out for himself a name in the same line?

Now let us see "what is this great insult" for which "vengeance" and "revenge" are so invoked and threatened: Mr. Francis enters the bar of a tavern in company with two Englishmen; he knew perfectly well that a feeling did and does prevail against supplying the colored race with drinks by certain portions of the community. Knowing this he goes to Mr. Lovett, and it is felt aggrieved by anything that took place, there he has him—if only he refused to supply him with a drink was in no way a violation of the English law or against the tenor of the license. The case cited by "the Englishman" as to the billeting of soldiers on tavern keepers is not at all analogous. There is an express provision in the English law which requires tavern keepers to take in soldiers on the production of their billet and to provide them with lodging gratis. There is no provision even there that they shall be supplied with drinks. With respect to hotel keepers being obliged to supply "to every one" with "refreshments," that cannot be said to apply in the present instance. Francis was not a traveler, in the just or legal acceptance of the term, and if he really wanted refreshment he might have had it at half a dozen houses within a few yards.

The real secret of the case is that the colored race desire to rule the whites,—if they do not why is there such an anxiety on their part for the whites to serve them with drinks when they know that it is repugnant to the feelings, education and habits of a large portion of the white community? When the hypocritical Liberal Englishman give his daughters in marriage to the colored race? nay, will he even ask them to his table and allow them to put their feet under the same mahogany with himself and family? I am sure he will not, but doubtless like other of his class—

"He keeps the word of promise to the ear, But breaks it to the hope."

The enthusiastic Englishman will, I expect, be found to resemble a very ardent advocate for the abolition of slavery, (God forbid that I should be supposed to uphold slavery) who, after holding forth one evening to a crowded audience on the misery of slavery, was discovered at the lecture, notably ensconced on a rocking chair, with three slaves attending on him (the luxurious wretch)—one engaged in fanning him, another in brushing his hair, and the third in washing his feet.

The writer in the "Press" travels to California for an authority to eke out his case. I am happy and proud, as an Englishman, of the privileges which the law affords me here; but as that writer has chosen to tell us what the Californian rule as to testimony is as contradistinguished from the English, I will tell him what took place at Sacramento, and which was vouched to me by a "respectable Englishman" now residing here. This gentleman went into a place of religious worship there on a Sunday, the congregation consisting of colored people. The officiating minister stopped in the performance of his sacred duties, and politely informed my friend "that whites were not permitted to remain at their prayers," and so walked him out.

I will answer the nota bene of the "Press" writer: There are no Courts of Quarter Sessions held here, which is much to be regretted. By the Incorporation Bill doubtless English law as to the granting of licenses will be introduced by which "the right men" will be found to be in possession of the right places.

Before concluding I would say to the gentleman "who knows his rights and will maintain them"— "O what a pain's in thy breast; Thou need'st not start and be hasty, WI' bickering brattle!"

I would be loath to rib an' chase thee WI' murthering pattle."

House of Assembly.

MONDAY, JUNE 30th, 1860.

House met at 3 o'clock. Present—Speaker Helmcken, and Messrs. Ring, Cary, Tolmie, Harris and Franklin.

The Sanitary Commission Bill was read a second time.

House in Committee on the Fire Limits' Bill, Mr. Harris in the chair. The Bill was read in Committee of the Whole, and adopted with but slight amendment, as follows:

1. That from and after the passage of this Act, no person shall erect any building more than 16 feet high within the limits of that portion of the Town of Victoria which is described in the schedule to this Act annexed, under the penalty of £500 for each month during which such building shall be erected or in course of erection.

2. Until the passage of an Act for the Incorporation of the Town of Victoria, the penalties aforesaid shall be recoverable in an action at the suit of the Attorney-General, and shall be paid into the Treasury for the use of Her Majesty, her heirs and successors.

3. From and after the passage of such Act as last aforesaid, the said penalties shall be recoverable in an action at the suit of the said Corporation.

4. The person paying over such penalties may pay the same to such persons as may be appointed by the said Town Council upon the production of an order for payment to some person named therein, signed by the Clerk of the Council and countersigned by the Mayor or presiding Councillor.

SCHEDULE.—All that piece of land bounded by Johnson street on the north, the west side of Douglas street on the east, the north side of Fort street on the south, and by the harbor on the west.

The committee next considered the Sanitary Bill, which provides that the Governor may appoint Commissioners to act as a Board of Health in each electoral district, whose duty it shall be to order the removal of any nuisance dangerous to public health.

Pending a discussion on the merits of this bill, the committee rose and reported progress, and the House adjourned till Tuesday, at 3, p. m.

A WEAK CASE.—A young man named Henry Spence was brought before Mr. Pemberton yesterday morning at the Police Court, charged with robbing the till of the Phoenix Saloon of the sum of \$5. The evidence of the barkeeper went to show that during his temporary absence from the room, Spence passed through it, and immediately thereafter the money was missed. The evidence was considered very slight by the magistrate, but the accused having been before the court on a previous occasion charged with assault, he was remanded for one day in order that enquiry as to his character might be made.

A BEAN FAMINE.—There is a great scarcity of beans in the San Francisco market. New Byons are worth 15 cents per pound. Here they sell at 12 1/2 cents; and a shrewd speculator on Wharf st., who professes to "know beans" (and no doubt he does), has in store 200 bags, or about 10,000 lbs. of the excellent which he proposes to ship below on the next steamer and supply the famine-stricken San Franciscans at the highest market rate. The speculator, by the operation, would receive \$250 advance on the Victoria price, which, deducting the steamer's freight, will leave him a clear profit of \$200 by the transaction. Not a bad operation, certainly.

GREAT SUIT FOR SLANDER.—A suit for slander was entered yesterday in the Supreme Court, the damages in which are laid at £10,000. It is enaged that E. B. Earles, of the Colonial Hotel, defendant in the suit, stated to several parties that D. B. Ring, Esq., who appeared in the police court as counsel for the prosecution in the case of Francis vs. Lovett, sold himself to the latter party, and took ground against his client. The suit is therefore instituted by Mr. Ring to recover the sum of £10,000—damages to his professional character alleged to have been sustained from Mr. Earles' statements.

SOMETHING LIKE A BISHOP.—We are pleased to learn, from an anti-Church of England source, that Bishop Hills, now on his way to Cariboo, personally visited the Lillooet Indian villages and vaccinated all the natives who came forward for that purpose. The Bishop, our informant says, is well provided with vaccine matter, and will similarly treat all the Indians through whose country he may pass. Great pity a movement of the kind was not inaugurated by Bishop Hills on this island and the coast of British Columbia months ago.

THE EUCALYPTUS.—This late powerful and warlike tribe, residing for centuries near Cape Mudge, on the west coast of this island, are dying from small pox in scores. The way the disease first spread among them is this: For many years they have been at war with the Hydans, and espying one day recently a canoe containing four or five of their ancient enemies passing the encampment, they put out and murdered the occupants, and took possession of all their traps. The plunder thus obtained was divided among the thieves, and in a few days the dreadful disease broke out in the tribe.

REN UP YOUR SHANTIES.—Parties who contemplate erecting buildings on their lots within the district bounded by Johnson street on the north, the west side of Douglas street on the east, the north side of Fort street on the south, by the harbor on the west, had best make haste or they will soon be restrained by government. Vide the Fire Limits' Bill, which passed the House of Assembly yesterday, and will become law so soon as it has gone through the Council and received the Governor's assent.

SADDLE FOUND.—Yesterday morning early, a porter in the Hudson Bay Company's store found a bay horse attached to a stump by the stirrup of a saddle. The porter relieved the animal by removing the saddle, when the latter darted away and was soon lost to view. The saddle remained in the hands of the porter for identification by the owner.

SADDLE STOLEN.—A BOLD RASCAL.—On Saturday evening last Mr. Hardesty called at a friend's house near Beacon Hill, leaving his horse outside the door. When he started for home the animal was nowhere to be seen, but on the next morning the animal returned home minus the saddle. He had no doubt been stolen by some party whose principal object was the theft of the saddle.

CARGO SALE.—Mr. McCrea will hold the heaviest sale of general merchandise at his saleroom to-morrow morning ever held here. The goods to be offered comprise the entire cargo of the bark Onward, recently from Australia, and consists of a general assortment of merchandise well adapted to this market.

FOR THE RIVER.—The steamers Enterprise and Eliza Anderson left yesterday afternoon for Fraser River with about forty passengers and a large amount of freight. They may be expected back to-day.

BURNED OUT.—The gunboat Forward's boilers are reported as worn out, a circumstance which, if true, will account for her protracted absence on the west coast. She will probably arrive to-day from Nanaimo.

THE "PAINFUL RUMOR."—We mentioned about ten days ago the prevalence of a rumor that a whale boat on its way to Stickeen had been capsized off Cape Mudge, and several well-known citizens of Victoria drowned. Yesterday we learned that the report is entirely without foundation—nothing to give even color to it having occurred.

FOR ALBERTO.—The bark John Howe and ship Annie Kimball will load with lumber at Nanaimo.

Island potatoes (new) are now selling at from 12 to 15 cents per pound.

A FRENCH WILL CASE.—The Civil Tribunal of the Seine has given judgment, after five days' hearing, in a suit respecting the validity of a will made by a Madame Lamotte, disposing of property to the amount of nearly 1,000,000fr. In opening the case for the plaintiff, Madame Drouot, a cousin of the deceased, M. Leon Duval stated that the testatrix, Mademoiselle Morin, was a native of St. Marks, in Champagne, where her parents possessed considerable estates, producing together with property in Paris, a rental of about 30,000fr. a year. She was, unfortunately, of weak mind, but well disposed. Her parents dying soon after she attained her majority, the young lady came to Paris, and took up her residence at a furnished hotel, the Passage des Petits Peres, kept by a M. Collinet. There she became acquainted with M. Lamotte, the master of a boarding school, in which Collinet's sons were being educated, and was ultimately induced to marry him, both parties having made a will, before the ceremony, bequeathing all their property to the survivor. The plaintiff's counsel maintained that Mademoiselle Morin was in a manner forced into this marriage to save her honor, and that soon afterwards she bitterly repented of it, and shut herself up in her own rooms, refusing to see any one for more than two years. All her intercourse with her husband and her servants was from that time carried on by means of letters, which she thrust under the door, and received the answers in the same manner. Her food, and whatever articles she wanted, were placed upon a table in an ante-chamber, which she never entered till she was sure the servants had withdrawn. Things went on in that way till 1851, when her husband died suddenly of apoplexy, and the Juge de Paix was called in to put the seals upon the property. At his efforts, however, to obtain an interview with her were fruitless; she would not even seem to take the oath required by law of the individual left in charge of the deceased person's property. From that time her estates in the country were managed by two notaries, M. Costel, the father of Mademoiselle Aspasic Costel, one of the residuary legatees, and M. Trouve, the nephew of the latter. The property in Paris was under the care of a M. Peureau, the brother-in-law of her deceased husband's brother, Alphonse Lamotte, to whom by a holograph will, dated October, 1861, she bequeathed her house in Paris, with 400,000fr., and left the rest of her property to Mademoiselle Costel and a Madame Lapique, as residuary legatees, with the exception of a legacy of 100,000fr. to Mademoiselle Peureau. On the 22nd April, 1861, Mademoiselle Lamotte died, and on the following day Mademoiselle Costel, who had not touched her breakfast from the ante-chamber as usual, and supposing that something had happened, she apprised M. Peureau of the fact. He hastened to the house, and, breaking open the door of Madame Lamotte's chamber, found her lying on the floor, still breathing, but quite insensible, while, on a table, lay an empty phial labelled "laudanum," large enough to hold about half an ounce. She died during the day without being able to speak a word. A paper was found pinned to the wall, on which the deceased had written the following: "I have taken the resolution—let me be buried in the sheet I have laid ready on the chair." The room was in the utmost confusion, and the floor covered with scraps of paper to the thickness of a mattress, the deceased having, during her twenty-seven years' confinement, torn up all the letters she had received, and left them lying where they fell. How she obtained the poison is not known, but it is supposed she must have had it in her possession for many years. The learned counsel concluded with demanding that the will should be declared invalid, as having been made under undue pressure upon a person of weak intellect by the person directed to be buried in the sheet, and that the testatrix, M. Dufaire, counsel for the legatee, maintained that the testatrix was a person of sane mind with respect to things in general, but that she was a hypochondriac, and fancied herself so ugly as not to be fit to be seen. He read a great number of letters addressed to her agents and friends, of the most business-like character, and proving that her judgment was sound on all matters therein treated, and concluded by asserting that a person who could write such letters was perfectly competent to dispose of her property as she pleased. After hearing the Imperial Advocate, who coincided with the views expressed by M. Dufaire, the Tribunal gave a judgment rejecting the plaintiff's demand, and consequently, confirming the will.

THE CONSPIRACY AT MILAN.—The following particulars concerning the military conspiracy discovered at Milan, a few days ago, are given by the Lombardian, an official journal.—All Milan is in a state of excitement, occasioned by the discovery of a reactionary conspiracy concocted on a vast scale, which would have made many victims, had it not been providentially discovered. The horrible plan was to be put into execution this evening. Several soldiers, formerly belonging to the Neapolitan army, who were in the military hospital of St. Ambrose and Monastero Maggiore, had been provided with arms and abundance of money by the reactionary party, for the purpose of commencing a brigand warfare in Lombardy. General Durando, accompanied by the colonel of the Carabinieri and several officers of the staff, proceeded to the above hospitals at two o'clock on the evening of this occasion, and upwards of 400 men were arrested. It is stated that several soldiers and two nuns employed in the hospitals are implicated in the affair, and have been arrested. A military commission has this morning visited the barracks and other military establishments. The Perseveranza of Milan adds that the soldiers in question are members of the camorra of Naples, and that they were endeavoring to introduce a similar system into the Italian army. The camorra is a kind of secret society for the perpetration of all kinds of nefarious practices, which grew up and acquired great power under the Bourbon rule in the Kingdom of Naples, and is now very difficult to eradicate. Such is the tenacity of this society, that even in the present system it does not abandon those of its members who have got into trouble; and the fact of the *Martini* of Genoa states that several camorristi who had been arrested at Genoa some time ago used to receive pecuniary assistance even in prison from their brethren at Naples.

EXCAVATIONS AT ROME.—The excavations on Mount Palatine continue to attract much attention. The immense quantity of rubbish which covered the pavement of the building erroneously styled the Temple of Apollo has been removed, and the access obtained to the vaulted rooms below, two of which are now quite cleared out. The first, immediately below the Casina Farnese, appears to have been stripped of all its ornaments at a comparatively recent date, and then filled with earth. Adjoining this is another room, which had not been despoiled. The walls are Albano stone, and the corners travertine. The recesses of the deprecators seem to have ended before coming there for, on removing the soil, many works of art were found. Among them may be noticed a torso column, ornamented with acanthus leaves, and having, instead of a capital, two pineapples connected by leaves; a thyrus, in the form of a candied almond; and a red marble cornice, also surmounted by a pineapple, and foliage, and numerous fragments of red marble, which have been carefully preserved, and all the objects found are retained in the spot and arranged for inspection, instead of being removed. A great number of persons visit this new museum, and are well repaid for their trouble, as all the articles belong to a good period of art.

A CHILD SENTENCED TO THREE MONTHS' IMPRISONMENT FOR POACHING.—At Maidstone, on the 5th, a child, named Charles Thomas, between nine and ten years of age, was charged with poaching and trespassing in the park of game. The gamekeeper discovered four snares, or wires, set in a hedge about thirty rods from the house of the prisoner, and accordingly watched the spot. About six o'clock in the morning of the 20th April, they saw the child go along the hedge and examine the wires, taking the fourth one up. The prisoner's mother, the wife of an agricultural laborer, spoke for her child, and said he had gone out that morning in search of food for his rabbit, and seeing the string in the hedge he picked it up to tie the rabbit's food up in a bundle. The mother characterized the present information as spite to her, and told the keepers they were neither of them men enough to come and tell her that her child had been doing wrong, so that she might have corrected him. The bench inflicted a fine of £2 and costs, 11s.; or, in default, three months' imprisonment. The poor woman said she had no means of paying such a sum, and made more than one appeal for time for payment; but the justices would not allow a day, consequently the child was taken off to Maidstone jail.—*European Times*.

THE PRINCE OF WALES AND THE JEWS AT JERUSALEM.—Ten days after the arrival of the Prince in the Holy City he met by appointment, at the western wall of the temple, the Chief Rabbi and others of the heads of the Jewish community of Jerusalem. The Chief Rabbi appeared in his full robes, and with the insignia of his office as Hacham Elyah, being, as he is appointed by the Sultan, confers on him great civil powers and authority. The Prince received the deputation in a most gracious manner, and after the ordinary formalities entered freely into conversation with the Chief Rabbi; of whom he inquired if he believed the massive wall by which they stood to be a portion of the great master work of King Solomon. The Chief Rabbi's explanatory remarks in answering this question in the affirmative evidently impressed the prince; for he raised the covering from his head in token of the sincere veneration which he felt for the sacredness of the spot; and who can tell what impression in the thought crowded on him at that moment, for he immediately requested the Chief Rabbi to offer up a prayer for "mother, the Queen of England!" The Chief Rabbi then prayed aloud in Hebrew for the health of "Queen Victoria, and with great fervency, that she might long continue to reign, and with wisdom like unto that of Solomon. At the conclusion, all the deputation ejaculated "Amen, Amen." The prayer being interpreted to the Prince, he was greatly moved, and even more so when the Chief Rabbi followed this prayer with an invocation to the King of kings that the soul of the Prince Consort might rest in peace in the realms of eternal bliss. The Prince, accompanied by the Chief Rabbi, then visited the synagogues, which were brilliantly lighted up and decorated as on a festival, and were crowded to excess. Prayers were there offered up for the Prince, Alfred, and all the royal family. At the first synagogue which he visited, the Prince asked to see one of the scrolls of the law, and he examined the sacred volume with great earnestness. The Prince then went with the Chief Rabbi to view the two new synagogues and the Rothschild Hospital, and during this time they held almost uninterrupted conversation in the Italian language. The familiarity of the Prince on this occasion was as conspicuous as was the deep interest which he exhibited in all that took place; and his most courteous demeanour throughout towards the Chief Rabbi and the whole Jewish community is creditable alike to his heart and to his enlightened mind.—*Jewish Chronicle*.
