How Chief Justice Cameron, Governor Douglas, and Mr. Young, have wronged Mr. John Copland.

It has been with great reluctance that we have been silent respecting the manner in which Mr. John Copland has been treated by Chief Justice Cameron and others. Onr silence has however been wholly attributable to the express solicitations of the former gentleman. We are now at liberty to enter upon the subject. The perusal of the abstract of correspondence which we publish this morning, that has passed between Mr. Copland and our Colonial and Imperial authorities, as well as other important persons, will amply repay the labor. It shows a disposition in our local government to put the ton heel of oppression down on every man in this community who may be independent enough to hold and express political opinions adverse to the administration. The promise of the Chief Justice has been unfulfilled; his word falsified; the law set at defiance; an honest man deprived of his rights; virtually robbed of money that he might have obtained from the fruits of professional industry. The Provincial Secretary, Mr. Young, has written one thing about a date whilst the dispatch of the Duke of Newcastle rebuts his assertion-makes it false. Gov. Douglas in like manner has been equally culpable in allowing such wrongs to go unredressed. Our readers-one and all-old residents and new comers-have a common interest in examining the facts of Mr. Copland's case. It concerns every one in the country. No man ought-no upright man can allow such a graceless outrage to pass unnoticed-without censure. If there had been just cause why Mr. Copland should not have been enrolled as a solicitor; if there had been any reasonable doubt as to the legality or propriety of his admission, the benefit of a doubt might have been given to the Chief Justice. But there is not a doubt on which to test the wrong that has been committed. Even the Duke of New castle declares that he finds no reason neither in law nor propriety why the Chief Justice should not fulfil his promise of admission. And will any man dare to assert that a constitutional opposition to a political administration in a British Colony, is sufficient to withhold from any man his legal rights? We need not press for an answer. One universal No!! is echoed and re-echoed from end to end of the country. But notwithstanding the unhallowed oppression in which Mr. Copland has been the chief and greatest sufferer, he has manfully struggled for his rights with the unconquerable will of a true son of unconquered Scotland. He has bearded the Douglas and the Cameron in their Augean stable. He has aroused the sympathy and co-operation of the bar at Edinburgh, with the Lord Advocate at its head. He has gained for his cause the approval of the Duke of Castle, the highest Colonial official authority. He now knocks at the door of the Supreme Court, backed by every honest man in the country, waiting to enter and record his name on the Rolls as a Solicitor, where it ought to have been placed in November,

Let us glance through the case; examine its real merits; how it bears, and who have been the real offenders. We have first to enquire what the Order in Council, consti-tuting the Supreme Court of this Colony, says in reference to the admission of Solic-It is as follows:

itors. It is as follows:

"And Her Majesty doth further authorize and empower the said Supreme Court to approve, admit, and enrol any persons being Attorneys or Somitister or Dublin, or being Proctors admitted to practice in any Ecclesiastical Court in England or Ireland, or being Proctors admitted to practice in any Ecclesiastical Court in England or Ireland, or being Writers to the Signet in Scotland, to act as Attorneys, Solicitors and Proctors, in the said Supreme Court, And Her Majesty doth further authorize Her said Supreme Court, in pursuance of any Rule or Rules or Court to be for that purpose made, in manner hereinafter mentioned, to approve, admit, enrol, and as such Attorneys, Solicitors, or Proctors, as aforesaid, such and so many persons as may be instructed within Her said Colony in the knowledge and practice of the law, by any Barrister or Adocate, Attorney, Solicitors, or Proctor duly admitted to practice in said Court."

From this extract we learn that the Chief

From this extract we learn that the Chief Justice is authorized to admit any person who has been instructed in the law within this Colony by any Barrister admitted to practice in the Supreme Court. The Duke of Newcastle, in his dispatch, states that there is nothing in 12 and 13 Vic., c. 48, that alters, repeals, or affects the power given to the Chief Justice under this Order in Council. Having the advantage of high legal authority, we must conclude, without doubt, that the sections of the Order in Council in reference to the admission of Solicitors From this extract we learn that the Chief doubt, that the sections of the Order in Council in reference to the admission of Solicitors in this Colony, enjoys its full and original force and effect. Such being the case, let us enquite whether Mr. Copland complied with the provisions of the Order. He tells us, in his petition to the Queen, that he showed to the Chief Justice his certificate of candification as a Writer to the Signet, his showed to the Chief Justice his certificate of qualification as a Writer to the Signet, his certificate of law studies in the University of Edinburgh, and that the Judge fixed upon a twelve-month's clerkship in this Colony with a Barrister, as the only other qualification necessary to being placed on the Rolls. Judge Cameron repeated this statement to Mr. Copland and Mr. D. B. Ring. He went father; he sanctioned the articles of clerkship under which Mr. Copland bound himself to a Barrister-at-law—that is Mr. Ring. The articles were filed in the archives of the Supreme Court. All those preliminaries were done, our readers will remember, by the Chief Justice, and with his knowledge and consent.

Of course Mr. C. thought there would be no further difficulty about the matter, and when his term of service expired, expected that he would be duly admitted—enrolled. The service commenced on September 24, 1859, and ended on September 24, 1860. The certificate of Mr. Ring to that effect was filed in Court. After this service expired, Mr. Copland enquired of the Chief Justice when he would be admitted? The ieply was in "November"—that word was written by the Judge himself in the notice. Subsequently application was made for a fiat for admission, but it was refused. The Chief Justice said that he had made no rule for his admission. Nor has any been made since. Thus we have a great wrong committed. We find that Mr. Copland served his year with Mr. Ring, the barrister, with his year with Mr. Ring, the barrister, with the sanction of the Chief Justice. That time is lost. Since the expiry of that year, time is lost. Since the expiry of that year, he has been unable to practice for one year and eight months! Twenty months of professional practice has been lost, through the mon-fulfillment of Mr. Cameron's word as Chief Justice, and twelve month's clerkship besides!! Such are the effects of the conduct of our chief judge. Could anything be more intolerable? Two years and eight months of an industrious man's life are thus thrown away by a drager-judge not fulfilling months of an industrious man's life are thus thrown away by a draper-judge not fulfilling his promise. Why has this judge done this thing? Can it be a court of justice where such things occur? Can such a judge be a fit person to divide out justice in this Colony? Is there not in this transaction, something that ealls for an expression of public opinion to remove from the bench a man who is morally guilty of wasting two years and eight months of the time of an honest man? honest man?

Let us look into this matter a little farther. We find that the first petition was forwarded to the Duke of Newcastle on Jan. 19th, 1861 the buke of Newcastie on Jail. 19th, 1802. The second was sent through the Governor on July 25th, 1861. It was endorsed by one hundred of our best citizens. If Gov. Douglas wished to do justice why did he tot interfere at once and have Mr. Copland enrolled? But no? we discover the foul blot on His Excellency's escutcheon in this transaction. An upright Governor would have rediressed this wrong—and at once. If Mr. Cameror was unwilling to fulfil his promise—discharge his public duty—he should have been removed—or, if that extreme were not resorted to, an act for the tellef of Mr. Copland could have been passed by His Excellency's influence. What would occupy ten minutes is left undone. How can the Governor and the Chief Justice excuse such deeds? We shall not.

We have before us some voluminous correspon dence, between Mr. John Copland of this city, and the Colonial and Imperial authorities, respect-ing his right to be admitted on the Rolls of the

Chief Justice.

4. On July 25, 1861, Mr. Copland sent a letter

4. On July 29, 1891, Mr. Cophand sent a letter enclosing a petition, signed by one hundred inhabitants of Victoria, to Mr. W. A. G. Young, Provincial Secretary, asking him to forward it with the Governor's remarks.
5. On July 27, 1861, Mr. Charles Good, for the Provincial Secretary, acknowledges the receipt of Mr. Copland's letter and petition, and stating that it had been Jaid before the Governor, and would be duly forwarded.

6. Mr. J. any other class of immigrants to settle up the country, and create a British population in these colonies—after a voyage, too, of months, and without looking at the nature of things here, not even devoting one week to making enquiries into the state of affairs—leave the country because they hear a few hundred out of the thousands we have had here this season, many of whom have not benear the mines, are likely to return to California where, it may be, many have left their business and their claims.

I would warn those of my countrymen, who have lately arrived to be on their guard against misrepresentation; to judge for themselves; and although the expense and distance in reaching the mines are certainly points of grave consideration, yet by finding some occupation here they may eventually get there to realize what most did last season in Cariboo—a handsome competency. Editor British Colonist:—In the Press, date June 27th and 30th, (Weekly.) I observe two notices in regard to disturbances between myself, or my boats, and passengers, all of which are based principally on falsehoods. I trust I am not trespassing in giving the facts. The Henrietta was at Port Douglas about the 25th of June, and a large number of miners went on board and actually took temporary possession of her, refusing to pay their passage down or to go as help. Henry Davis, who was commanding her at the time, finding he could do nothing with the passengers, concluded to go on down to New Westminster, (having previously been to the Justice of the Pcace at Port Douglas to find out his true position.) expecting to meet the Hope coming up. The Henrietta, on the approach of the Hope, rounded to and came along side. On finding the steps the miners had taken. I concluded to learn them a lesson. I collected full fare from about 80 passengers, the balance I took back on the Hope to Douglas. I am ready to swear neither knives nor pistols were used, and I did not consider there was any cause to fear. What I did I would do again under the same circumstances. When I am afraid to collect the fare from my passengers I will sell out and leave the country. It is an erroneous idea for men to think of taking steamboats and forcing their owners to do as they desire. It is true, steamboating on Fraser river is and has been one continued opposition, consequently, the owners of them are looked upon as being fools. However, I have managed to run an independent boat, and have kept freights and passages at moderate figures; still I do not choose to have the boats run entirely for glory. It was rather annusing to see the very men who were "broke" not five minutes before, coming down with their fares at the demand of Capt. M. Those who really had no money were taken back to Douglas on the Hope—not because Capt. Millard was too mean to bring them down, but because he wanted to teach them a lesson not to attempt to "come the gammon" over Fraser River steamboat men in future, I think, Mr. Editor, the men were well served. Grub continues high on account of the rush of people to Carlboo; and for the same reason the price keeps up here. Flour is 25 cents per lb., beans, 28c; bacon, 40c, and though from 12 to 15 tons arrive here daily, yet the supply is insufficient to lower the prices at present.

As might be expected, men are beginning to return from above discouraged and disheatened; but it is only surprising that more have not come back before this.

Malt is reported that 4000 men are on the road from the Salmon River mines, by men who have come over from there.
