OTTAWA, Feb. 8.--The Chinese merchants of Victoria have sent a petition to the Customs department, asking that a certain weight be allowed for tare on each bundle of crude opium imported, and the minister has the matter under consideration.

A supply of sockeye ova for the new government hatchery has been ordered to be forwarded from the Fraser River hatchery.

Wm. Atkins, of the Victoria Customs, has been authorized to administer oaths.

The request of the canners' delegation for the appointment of a Customs officer at Ladner's Landing has been granted by C. S. Green, of Green-Croft, and preventive officer.

The modus vivendi expires next week. The Premier informed THE COLONIST's representative this afternoon that the government had not yet considered the question of renewal.

Hon. Mr. Carling has called for a cargo of the best English two-row barley, which will arrive next month in time for the spring sowing, put up in two bushel bags, enough for an acre plot and disposed of to farmers all over the Dominion.

The Ottawa lady evangelists, who are going over to Hull on Tuesday to conduct services, have been offered a body guard of one thousand young men from the Athletic Association and Orange Order to defend them from French trouble, but have declined, preferring to go alone.

There are prospects of a big row. The dinner of Northwest and British Columbia products has collapsed; the British Columbia members say as the fault of the Manitobans, the Manitoba members say the British Columbians are responsible.

THE QUEBEC ELECTIONS SOON TO BE HELD. Hope Held Out for Kane, the Wife Murderer--Winnipeg Visited by a Terrible Snowstorm.

OWNERS VICTORY. QUEBEC, Feb. 8.--In the House yesterday Owen asked leave of the House to introduce a private bill. Hon. Mr. Mercier objected, saying that the time had expired for introducing such bills. On the question being put to a vote it was carried in Owen's favor.

TO RETURN TO THE PEOPLE. MONTREAL, Feb. 8.--It is reported again that Mercier will soon bring on the Provincial elections.

HEARD DISCASE. SWIFT CURRENT, Feb. 8.--The wife of Superintendent Nilcock died suddenly this morning at Medicine Hat of heart disease.

WRECKED BY FIRE. WINNIPEG, Feb. 8.--The carriage of T. Montgomery and adjoining buildings were burned this morning.

SENTENCED TO THE CENTRAL. BRAMPTON, Feb. 8.--James Downey, convicted of reducing the daughter of Dennis Corrigan, of Toronto township, was given eighteen months in the Central prison. The girl, who is only fourteen, was confined recently.

BRITISH COLUMBIA BLAMED. OTTAWA, Feb. 8.--The Northwest dinner is postponed until next season. The failure is owing to the British Columbia members endeavoring to freeze out Manitoba.

ST. JOHN'S RENAISSANCE. ST. JOHN'S, N. B., Feb. 8.--Mrs. Weeks, who is under arrest at the Dufferin hotel on a charge of having tampered with medicine given to Mrs. Southerland, of Charleston, is seriously indisposed. She caught a severe cold in crossing the Straits to catch the train which brought her here. There is a great deal of excitement over Mrs. Weeks' illness, and it is impossible to learn anything from her.

KANE MAY BE ESCAPED. TORONTO, Feb. 8.--There has been some new light thrown on the Kane murder, for which Kane was to be hanged on Wednesday, and the result may be the acquittal of the alleged wife murderer. This Peer, a well-known cattle dealer, made a statement before Mayor Clarke to-day, that on the night of the murder he saw two men leave Kane's house. As Kane was drunk at the time of the murder and said he had no recollection of what occurred, this new evidence may secure him a new trial, and the statement will be forwarded to the minister of justice at Ottawa.

SNOWED UNDER. WINNIPEG, Feb. 8.--The biggest snow storm for many years visited Winnipeg last night and to day, and it is still blowing. The snow is drifted four feet deep in many places. All the trains to-day are from six to ten hours late.

OVER THE GARDEN WALL. WINNIPEG, Feb. 8.--Two prisoners escaped this morning from the Stony Mountain penitentiary.

AMERICAN NEWS. THE RAILING DISPLACED THEM. HELENA, Mont., Feb. 7.--Yesterday eight Democratic senators, interested in the routing of Lieut.-Governor Richard, took the railway trains in different directions. Their united absence will block all legislation, and the Democratic caucus will be subsequently arrested at Helena. He is the only senator whom the sergeant-at-arms succeeded in capturing under the resolution to compel the absent members to appear in their places. Decker will apply for a writ of habeas corpus.
