

THE BISHOP'S RESIGNATION

Of the See and Diocese of British Columbia Has Been Forwarded to the Archbishop,

And His Lordship Will Bid Victoria Good-Bye Early in November.

After upwards of thirty years of active energetic ministry, the Right Reverend George Hills, D.D., Lord Bishop of Columbia, is about to sever his connection with the church in this province, with which he has been so long and so prominently identified.

On Monday last the following letter was received by the secretaries of the Synod, Ven. Archdeacon Scriven and Mr. E. Baynes Reed, informing them of the step which His Lordship has seen fit to take, and which cannot be termed entirely unlooked for, as his failing health has long occasioned his co-workers considerable anxiety and led them to urge upon him the necessity of husbanding his energies, which have so long been expended in the advancement of the province of his adoption.

My Dear Archdeacon and Mr. Baynes Reed: I beg to inform you that on Saturday, August the 6th, I forwarded to the Archbishop of Canterbury my formal resignation of the See and Diocese of British Columbia.

Notice of the bishop's resignation having been given to the Synod through its secretaries, the next step to be taken is thus described in clause 1 of the Canon:— "The Bishop shall, within one fortnight after formal notice has been given as aforesaid, summon a special meeting of the Synod to meet at the Cathedral City of the Diocese, in not less than three or more than six months from the date of such summons, for the purpose of electing a successor to the See."

The special meeting of the Synod, it is expected, will be held on November 22, one week after the vacancy of the See, and the departure of His Lordship from the Country.

The Synod Magazine, in its next issue, will make the following editorial reference to the departure of the Bishop, the sentiments of which will be cordially endorsed by all members of the church in British Columbia:

"It is with feelings of sorrow too deep for words to express, that we have to announce the resignation and near departure for England, of our Bishop. For 33 years, or for a generation, he has been the broad expanse of British Columbia, meeting with difficulties which were unique in the annals of colonial missionary work.

"Dr. Hills joined one clergyman here, when he arrived thirty-three years ago; he will leave twenty-five toiling in Christ's vineyard; he found no church, he leaves the island overgrown with them; he came amongst a few thousand colonists settled in a huge colony, he leaves 100,000 prosperous people, presided over by three Bishops and upwards of 50 clergy.

DR. WATT DISCUSSED.

To THE EDITOR:—Considerable interest is manifested in the forthcoming election in the Cariboo District. Two candidates are before the electors, Dr. Watt, of Victoria, and Mr. Morrison of the 131 Mile House.

As stated by your correspondent "X" in your issue of 22nd July, the people of the mining section of Cariboo, acknowledge the right of the agricultural portion of the district to a representative, and will unite with the people of the lower section in supporting a candidate brought out by them.

Now, Mr. Editor, in regard to the first statement, however good Dr. Watt's intentions may be, let us examine the possibilities of his becoming a resident. Cariboo

has a small population; observe, there are only 399 names on the Voters' List. To meet the requirements of the residents, there are at present three doctors practising in the district, two of whom receive salaries from the Government as an inducement to reside here.

Again, the doctor's second statement cannot be allowed to pass unchallenged. If Dr. Watt was so strong a supporter of the late Hon. John Robson's Government, why is it that at the general election of 1890, when he had charge of Mr. Robson's nomination paper, he suspiciously delayed placing the document in the hands of the returning officer until the last moment, and then only did so, after the repeated urging of Mr. Robson's friends?

In the Watt-Barnard election for the House of Commons in 1891, Dr. Watt announced himself an unqualified supporter of the Liberal-Conservative party, contrary to his previous life-long expressed opinions. This fact alone did not excite much comment, as it is not unusual for men to change their views; but notice his further actions.

Now, in view of all these circumstances, the people of Cariboo would do well, before casting their votes, to consider whether Dr. Watt can be trusted. It is generally believed that Dr. Watt's motive in seeking election in Cariboo is not to serve the district, but to satisfy his personal animosities against certain of the Government officials and those electors who opposed him at the late election referred to.

In conclusion, we feel that it would be ungrateful in the extreme for Cariboo, at this election, to return as a successor to our late illustrious representative a member whose fidelity to the district and to the Government is not beyond question.

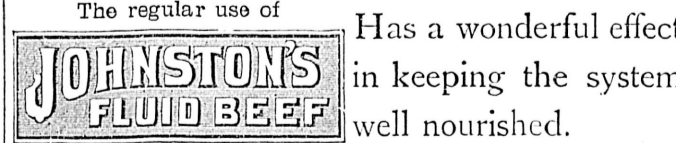

MAYOR BEAVEN'S LETTER.

Mayor Beaven's letter to the Attorney General, which we published in yesterday's issue, is characteristic of the man. The Attorney General wrote the Mayor of Victoria a purely business letter; the Mayor's reply is a political manifesto. It is evident from the first line to the last of Mayor Beaven's letter, that it is intended for political effect.

Like most political manifestos from the same source, Mr. Beaven's letter is full of inaccurate and misleading statements and innuendoes, which are calculated to produce false impressions. In the second sentence of his letter, he says: "I have no doubt inconvenience will arise in consequence of the interference with municipal affairs of irresponsible persons."

Mr. Beaven asserts that "the Board of Health and the Finance Committee are quite competent to attend to their duties." The law of the land assumes that when there is reason to apprehend the invasion of any contagious disease the Local Board of Health are not competent to cope with it.

INFORMATION WANTED.

No reason has been given for raising the amount asked for by the City Council for health purposes from fifty thousand to seventy-five thousand dollars. Before such a change as this was made, the Finance Committee were bound to show to the Council and the ratepayers that the fifty thousand dollars first put in the by-law was not sufficient.

From what we have heard, we believe, that the fifty thousand dollars first asked for, will be more than sufficient to meet all demands arising out of the outbreak of the smallpox. It would not be difficult for the Chairman of the Finance Committee to find out the expense that has been already incurred. He knows what was spent on the Albert Head station. Mr. Davies will, no doubt, be happy to inform him what the expenses of the Jubilee Hospital station have been up to date, and we think if he tries very hard, he will be able to find out what that horrible bugbear of his, the suspect station, has cost the city.

We think that it is due to the ratepayers who are to vote upon the by-law to let them know that the City Council is asking for what will be reasonably near the amount required.

It will be recollected that provision is made for the ordinary expenses of the health department in another by-law, in which \$15,000 is allowed for the "Board of Health—all purposes." This is a moderate sum, but we presume that it is sufficient. We mention this because it might be thought by the reader, who had not seen the by-laws, that the \$75,000 was all that the Council wants to raise for health purposes. In point of fact they propose to raise \$90,000 for current health expenditure.

We may say here that we have good reason to believe that the cost of stamping out the smallpox in the city will be, in proportion to the number of cases, very much less than it will be in Vancouver and other places in which there have been outbreaks, and that consequently it will be found that there has been no ground for the accusations of extravagance which have been preferred against those who are engaged in freeing this city from the dread disease.

CONGRESS CLOSED.

The session of Congress which closed on the 5th inst was not a very eventful one. It might be supposed that when the Democrats had a majority of 140 in the House of Representatives, the policy of the United States would be democratic. But it was nothing of the kind. A Republican President and a Republican Senate more than counteracted the efforts of the Democratic House to give the policy of the Administration a Democratic tinge.

It will be very different, indeed, in Great Britain. There, in a House of 670 members, the Gladstonian party has a majority of only forty, yet the Salisbury Government will not, in the face of that small majority, attempt to direct the affairs of the nation after the adverse vote, which shows them to be in a minority.

The virtues of the Democratic House, according to the dictum of one of its apologists, were chiefly negative. He says "It did not increase taxes; it passed no subsidy bill; it passed no bills to overthrow elections in the States; it vacated no Republican seats for Democratic contestants, except in one case, and that upon a practically unanimous committee report; it did not rob the minority of their rights nor servilely surrender their own rights into the hands of its Speaker and its Committee on Rules."

YATES' LETTER.

Lord Salisbury's Dilemma—Gladstone and Vernon Harcourt's Pretensions—Will the Government Last?

The Irish Home Rule Question the Issue Upon Which All Depends.

New York, Aug. 9.—Edmund Yates' special telegram from London says: "Lord Salisbury, in addition to his public anxieties, is at present a victim to domestic worries. The Queen has again offered him a dukedom, which he refused in 1887, and now he again wishes to decline, but Lady Salisbury and several members of the Cecil family are most desirous that he should accept. I hear that Mr. Gladstone is announced to be in bed and forbidden to see visitors in order that he might escape the place hunters who have been pestering him from morning till night ever since his arrival in London. His house was besieged by applicants for admission, and it was necessary to take excellent measures in order to escape such intolerable persecutions. The rank and file of the party came in swarms, each man pressing his own claims for office upon Mr. Gladstone, and most of these sturdy beggars wanted at least to be heads of departments if no place could be found for them in the cabinet."

It is a mistake to suppose that Gladstone complacently regards Sir William Harcourt as his alter ego. He has no confidence whatever in the member for Derby, and only tolerates him because he can't possibly throw him over, and also because he is rather afraid of him. John Morley now passes most of his time with Gladstone, and maintains his part of *Adas achates* by politely agreeing with him in everything. Gladstone's domestic circle, who urge him to persist in undertaking a task beyond the powers of a man of his age, consists of Mrs. G., his daughter, Mrs. Drew, his son Herbert, George Armistead and Stuart Rendal, who compete eagerly for the honor of lodging him and ministering to his wants, Sir Algernon West and Arnold Morely.

How long the Gladstone government will hold together after it comes down to work, as according to present arrangements it will do at the beginning of February, no one can pretend to answer accurately at this time, but there are certain indications of the way in which things are likely to go, and these may profitably be revived. The duration of Gladstone's tenure of office depends entirely on the attitude which he takes toward home rule. If he insists upon putting the Irish question first and going steadily on with it he will be out again in a month. Of this political expert on both sides of the House have no manner of doubt. If he can manage to shilly-shally with the anti-Parnellites he will probably prove capable of throwing soap to the faddists judiciously enough to enable him enough to hold his own for perhaps three years. The very consciousness of their mutual weakness and the reciprocal regard for each other's foibles will prevent the factions from going to extremes in public. In private they are certain to worry the Liberal leader to an extent which would suffice to break down a much younger man than Gladstone.

DISTRESSFUL VENEZUELA.

Faction Fighting—Puerto Caballo Attacked—A General Famine Feared.

PANAMA, (via Galveston, Texas), August 9.—Reports from Venezuela show that complete anarchy reigns throughout the republic. Many petty leaders are collecting small armies and are fighting each other for the purpose of self advancement. There is revolution and counter-revolution, and the whole country has been put under arms, but his intentions and whereabouts are only approximately known. General Monagas has returned to Caracas and is now Governor. Villegas is nominally President, but he is vacillating and completely under the influence of the corrupt clique around him. He is almost a poor figure-head, and cannot last long in his present place. Dr. Rojas Paul is still in Caracas. Congress is unable to meet on account of the impossibility of communicating with all members, and the shifty condition of things at the capital. Puerto Caballo was attacked on August 3 by one of the numerous armies organized by ambitious politicians. Scores were killed on the outskirts of the city, and the shops and houses were partially plundered. There are fears of a general famine, as prices are already enormous and the goods have been devastated. Meat is 75 cents to \$1 a pound, bread 40 cents a loaf. The poor are unable to buy and live by theft or on charity.

BOLIVIAN REVOLUTION.

Difficult in Arriving at the Correct Situation of Affairs.

New York, Aug. 9.—The Herald's special telegram from its correspondent at La Paz, Bolivia, says: "A revolution was started, yesterday, at Sucre, and troops were at once sent from La Paz to suppress it. A general uprising is feared all over the country. The Liberal party openly avowed its intention to oppose President-elect Baptiste at all odds. It is hard to get the embargo on telegraph affairs, owing to the fact that the going into Bolivian territory from Peru. VICTORIA MARKETS.

The First Instalment of New Wheat—General Improvement in Business.

The markets are picking up wonderfully after the stagnation of the last few weeks, and everything, just at present, gives promise of good business. The most encouraging reports come from the agricultural districts, and these have a telling effect upon trade generally. The tightness in the money market which was conspicuous of late, is also fast giving way, and on the whole an improvement is everywhere apparent.

Flour continues as last quoted, and a good general stock is reported in the hands of the millers. Although a couple of the mills have closed down, it is because of having worked with more than usual energy with last season's grain.

Wheat promises to be an exceptionally good crop, this year. The Brackman & Ker mills received, during the week, the first load of this season's grain, which was of excellent quality. It sold at fancy prices. The ruling figures are \$10 to \$15 per ton.

Oats continue to come in from the Northwest Territories in abundance, and sell at an average of \$22 per ton. Finer samples run up to \$22.

Potatoes are in good supply, but recent warm weather has done much to injure the stalks. Although in some districts the crop will be materially injured in consequence, it is generally considered fully up to the average.

Hay is in demand at prices quoted, the crop promising to be an excellent and abundant one. There being a lot of last season's haying in stock, the new stuff is not pressed on the market, and is not coming in in any large quantity.

Fruit is plentiful and cheap. The berries of the season demand still prices, but the ordinary classes are sold at reasonable and seasonable figures. Cherries have practically disappeared, but apples, pears, peaches, plums, etc., are abundant, ranging in price from 8c. to 12c. per lb.

Eggs are scarce, and have advanced 5c. per dozen.

Vegetables are in good supply, the Chinamen enjoying almost a monopoly in their production and sale.

TWO INTERESTING LETTERS. Which Have Passed Between the Attorney-General and the Mayor. The following letters are self explanatory. The one signed by Mayor Beaven was written in reply to two letters from the Attorney-General, informing the city of the payment of several of the accounts for wages due by the city on account of smallpox matters. This letter is as follows:—CITY HALL, Aug. 8, 1892.
