sion, which showed an overwhelming majority in favor of free Empire wheat.

J. A. Pease, junior lord of the treasury, speaking at Rotherham, said that Mr. Balfour's climb-down was a mere electioneering dodge. The party managers realized that food tax was unpepular, so they were going to waive for a little time the idea of taking a Canadian wheat tax, which Mr. Chamberlain said was essential to uniffeation of empire."

GIANT WHEAT CARS

Grand Trunk Preparing for Hauling of Grain Eastward in Winter Time.

MONTREAL, April 18.—Preparations for the time when the Grand Trunk and Grand Trunk Paelfic will become important factors in the handling trade of Canada are shown by tenders now being called for by the Grand Trunk for a number of big box cars particularly adapted for grain traffic.

These form part of orders for a freight equipment totalling over \$3,000.000, for which tenders are to be asked. The grain cars are steel frame box cars of the largest size, with a capacity of 100,000 pounds, and are intended for the handling of grain from lake ports to tidewater.

A short train of twenty of these monster cars will be able to carry a thousand tons of wheat each trip with a minimum of handling.

CONSTABLE LANE

Provincial Officer at Mission Killed While Trying to Eject Gang of Toughs from C.P.R.

CREW OF TRAIN

Knocked Down by Ruffians and Kicked to Death—Three Men Arrested on Suspicion of Being Implicated in Crime

VANCOUVER, April 18.—After a desperate battle with a band of hoboes on the incoming Seattle express this evening, in which the train crew participated, Provincial Constable Lane of Mission Junction, lost his life, and the desperadoes escaped by jumping while the train was in motion. Provincial Constables Campbell and Munroe were rushed to the scene on a special C. P. R. train on report of the

news.

Constable Lane was killed while answering a summons sent in by officials stating that a band of hoboes, numbering at least seven, had boarded the train as it pulled out on the Canadian side of Sumas. The constable at once boarded the southbound train and met the express two sections south of Mission. The hoboes were seated at their ease, and defiant of the conductor, in the smoking car when the constable arrived. He at once ordered them off, but the orders were met with a volley of epithets.

The constable seeing that further parley was useless, resorted to force, and with the help of the train crew, grabbed two of the men, and rushed them towards the door. In the melee which followed the constable was thrown to the floor and was lost to view. The train crew, which consisted of the brakeman, conductor and fireman, finally succeeded in getting rid of the men, who had by this time taken up their position in the vestibule, when it was found that the constable was lying on the car floor in a pool of blood. A hasty examination revealed terrible injuries, which had been inflicted by many feet. The constable was placed on an improvised stretcher and medical ald summoned, but before that had been secured he had passed beyond all human aid.

The dead constable was one of the best known officers along the line.

OTTAWA, April 18.—This was another field day for Hon. Sydney Fisher The minister of agriculture evidently expected that after his exhaustive review of the workings and policy of his department on Friday his votes would go through when supply was reached today, but not only the opposition but several government supporters showed a strong disposition to dig beneath the surface of Mr. Fisher's explanation. J. A. Sexsmith, of East Peterboro, caused many a smile by recounting a recent visit he made to the experimental farm here. He found the pispen in an extremely filthy condition. Mr. Fisher's reply to this criticism was that experiments had been made with various kinds of bedding for pigs, but the results had not been satisfactory. 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

COUNCIL REJECTS

No Test of Pressure System to Be Carried Out at City's Expense-Engineer's Recom-

With the exception of the city engineer's report on conditions affecting Smith's Hill reservoir, the attention of the city council last night was largely engaged with routine matters, no time being left for consideration of the bylaw to amend the liquor license bylaw, which was expected to evoke considerable discussion. In this comeetion letters were read from the solicitors of the corporation and the city electrician. They further stated that Mr. Smith, of the D'Olier Pump Company had interviewed them, stating that he had seen certain of the aldermen, who had expressed dissent from the action of the executive of the council in rejecting the pumps and he had stated that there had been an agreement to give the pumps a test. The solicitors expressed surprise at what they termed "the nunsual course" of individual aldermen allowing themselves to be interviewed by contractors with whom the city was in contention, and stated that such a course embarrassed the executive of the council in protecting the able discussion. 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

RECIPROCITY

There is no doubt that this refusal was a great disappointment to the people of the provinces, and one of the arguments made during the Confederation campaign, which began almost immediately, was that inter-provincial trade would take the place of the internaional trade thus interrupted. Once there was disappointment. There was not much in which inter-provincial trade could be built up, for e reason that all the provinces produced substantially the same things Especially in the Maritime Provinces was this disappointment felt, and the lemand for reciprocity was renewed. The Washington authorities refused to entertain any overtures. They seem-ed to be of the opinion that Canada's necessity was their opportunity, and they waited with ill-disguised anticipation for the time when the Dominion would drop into the lap of the Re-

In a fortunate hour Sir John Macdonald launched the National Policy which, as has already been explained protective tariff, though commonly so understood, but a policy for the development of Canada along national Yet the hope of reciprocity was not abandoned, and there was a general belief that, now that Canada had something to offer in the way of a reduction of duty, the United States would be more ready to negotiate. Everywhere the conduct of public affairs has fallen into the hands of the least estimable and least trustworthy classes. Everywhere we find in the management of public business wastefulness, inefficiency and frequent scandals. Everywhere the burden of taxation is already heavy, and tends to become more grievous, and there is a universal belief that the expenditure of public money produces less than its legitimate fruit for the public welfare.

Other evils, now widely prevalent, constitute material factors in the problem of good government for great We quote: Other evils, now widely prevalent constitute material factors in the problem of good government for great cities. The enforcement of the law, especially as to offences against good morals, has become generally difficult and uncertain. The political influence of those who gain their livelihood through the vices or folies of the community is scandalously great, and a receptized system of traffic in the price of impunity for their transgressions is fully established in some cities, and rapidly growing up elsewhere. Extortion is practised upon others beside criminals and purveyors to vice; statutes, ordinances, police regulations are enacted merely that politicians, of high or low degree, may be paid for the privilege of disregarding them; in some States, wealthy corporations now pay the reigning boss a fixed price for protection against this form of blackmail as regularly, and with as little disguise, as they employ counsel. ploy counsel.







In Victoria there are in most homes those modern conveniences which lighten labor.

But, from the point of view of an English womanservant, what are the disadvantages which are to be set against the mild climate, the high wages and the convenient and pretty homes? There is only one, but it is one that weighs heavily on the minds of most English women who have been bred to service. There are few families here, comparatively, who keep more than one servant. The mistress of the house assists with the housework in almost every home.

She has learned in girlhood, if she is a Canadian, to turn her hand to every part of the work of the house, and she expects her servants to do the same. This is a new experience for most girls brought up in the old land. There, it is the exception for a lady to have but one maid, who must be ready to cool: a menl, to serve it, to make a room tidy, or, should it be necessary, to care for a baby. A well-trained cook or housemald or nurse, who comes here from an English home, finds that she has much to learn. There is, of course, a demand for those who excel in any line of work, but it is limited.

If English girls come, as it is hoped and expected many of them will, there must at first be much tact and forbearance on the part of their employers. 

McKECHNIE CUP HERE AT LAST

The major portion of the forenoon session was occupied with the late city engineer, C. H. Topp. Mr. Alkman examined Mr. Topp on the matter of the increase in the amount of work demanded of the sewers over and above what they were planned to do. Mr. Topp told of having received a complaint from Mr. Oliphant in the fall of 1909 to the effect that water from the park was being drained on to his property. Mr. Topp said that there had been no other complaints to his knowledge. No laterals were put in to relieve this drainage. Overflows were not included in the original plan of the sewage system by the former city engineer, Mr. Mohun, but were put in to avoid a flood in a business district. The sewers had had to be connected with surface drains. Moveover much ground water got into the sewers between the joints. Anecdote of Bill Miner's Last Exploit Illustrates Diversity of Characteristics of Notorious Outlaw

Many anecdotes, all possessing an intense human interest; have been told of Bill Miner, the outlaw of the West, but it is questionable if any of them so exemplify the incongruity of characteristics possessed by the train robber better than one which Provincial Police Superintendent Hussey has just recalled in conversation with the Colonist.

When the Protesilaus was at Tacoma the busy customs officers of the Sound port, who now delve into every liner for smuggled wares, confiscated a quantity of silk goods, 'tea sets and curlos owned by Chinese members of the crew. There were 40 dozen silk handkerchiefs, embroidered silk kimonas, silk shirts, pyjamas, table covers, shawls and bolts of pongees.

Word was received by cable yesterday that the British steamship Strathtay had been fixed for a six months charter. The Strathtay's charter provides for delivery at Comox and redelivery at San Francisco, with an option of six months at three shillings on deadweight.




